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UNIVERSITY OF MINNESOTA  
BOARD OF REGENTS, 1851 - 1956

In the Act of February 13, 1851, establishing the University of Minnesota, the Legislature made provision for a governing board, as follows:

"The government of the University shall be vested in a board of twelve regents, who shall be selected by the Legislature as hereinafter provided:

"The members of the board of regents shall be elected at the present session of the Legislature and shall be divided into classes numbered one, two, and three; class numbered one shall hold their offices for two years; class numbered two, for four years; and class numbered three, for six years, from the first Monday of February one thousand eight hundred and fifty one; biennially thereafter there shall be elected in joint convention of both branches of the legislature, four members to supply the vacancies made by the provisions of this section and who shall hold their offices for six years respectively."

"Whenever there shall be a vacancy in the office of regent of the University, from any cause whatever, it shall be the duty of the governor to fill such office by appointment, and the person or persons so appointed shall continue in office until the close of the session of the legislature, then next thereafter, and until others are elected in their stead."

"The regents of the University and their successors in office shall constitute a body corporate with the name and style of the "Regents of the University of Minnesota," with the rights of such, of suing and being sued, of contracting and being contracted with, of making and using a common seal and altering the same at pleasure."

On February 14, 1860, in an Act to provide for the government and regulation of the University of Minnesota, the legislature made the following provision:

"The University shall be governed and managed by a board of regents consisting of the governor, lieutenant governor, chancellor and five electors of the state to be appointed by the governor by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, immediately after the passage of this act, and such other persons as may be appointed in accordance with a subsequent provision.

Two of the five persons thus appointed shall hold their office for (2) years, and three for four (4) years. At the expiration of their terms, successors shall be appointed in the same way for a period of four (4) years. Whenever a vacancy occurs by death, resignation, or removal from the state or otherwise, it shall be the duty of the governor to fill the vacancy, subject to the confirmation of the Senate."

"On March 4, 1864, a special board of regents was appointed to handle the financial situation of the University - empowered to pay claims against the University and to sell and buy lands necessary to clear the indebtedness of the University.

O.S. Merriman, John S. Pillsbury and John Nicols, are hereby appointed sole regents of the University of Minnesota, for the term of two years from the day of the passage of this act."

On February 28, 1866, the following Act was passed:

"The terms of office of the regents of the University of Minnesota, as limited in section one of this act, is hereby extended two years from the fourth day of March, 1866, and the said regents shall have the same powers that they now have for and during the period of said two years from March 4, 1866."

On February 18, 1868, in an act to reorganize and provide for the government and regulation of the University of Minnesota, the legislature provided that:

"The government of the University shall be vested in a board of nine regents, of whom the governor of the state, and the state superintendent of public instruction shall be ex officio members, and thereof shall be appointed by the governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate. Whenever a vacancy therein occurs for any cause, the same shall be filled for the unexpired term in the same manner. Of the regents thus appointed two shall be commissioned and hold their offices for one year, and two for two years, and three for three years. Their successors shall be appointed in like manner, and shall hold their offices for the full term of three years from the first Wednesday of March succeeding their appointments, and until their successors are appointed and qualified."

On February 29, 1872, by legislative amendment, the following provision for electing regents was made:

"The government of the University shall be invested in a board of ten regents, of which the governor of the state, the state

superintendent of public instruction, and the president of the University shall be members, ex officio." The rest of the provision to be the same as that of February 18, 1868, with the addition "The president of the University shall have the same rights, powers and privileges as other members, except the right of voting, and he shall be ex officio, the corresponding secretary of the board of regents."

On April 24, 1889 a Legislative act provided:

"The government of the University shall be vested in a board of twelve (12) regents, of which the governor of the state, the state superintendent of public instruction, and the president of the University shall be ex officio members, and the nine remaining members thereof shall be appointed by the governor by and with the advice and consent of the Senate. Whenever a vacancy occurs for any cause the same shall be filled for the unexpired term in the same manner. After the expiration of the term of the members of the present board of regents, their successors shall be appointed in like manner and shall be appointed in like manner and shall hold their office for the full term of six (6) years from the first Wednesday in March succeeding their appointment, and until their successors are appointed and qualified. The president of the University shall be ex officio the corresponding secretary of the board of regents."

On March 27, 1895, the following provision was made, making John S. Pillsbury an honorary member:

"The government of the university shall be vested in a board of thirteen (13) regents, of which the governor of the state, the state superintendent of public instruction, the president of the University and the Honorable John Sargent Pillsbury for and during his good pleasure as an honorary member, having the same power as any other members, shall be members ex officio, and the remaining nine (9) members thereof shall be appointed by the governor by and with the consent of the Senate."

The remainder of the act is the same as that of April 24, 1889.

A Legislative Act of February 5, 1907 provided:

"The government and general educational management of the state university is vested in a board of twelve regents, consisting of the governor, the state superintendent, the president of the university, ex officio, and nine other regents appointed by the governor by and

with the advice and consent of the Senate. Such board shall be a body corporate under the name of the University of Minnesota. It shall have a common seal and alter the same at pleasure. The appointed members of the board, each to serve until the first Wednesday in March of the year set opposite their names respectively, shall be as follows:

From and after the expiration of the terms of the aforesaid appointed members, no appointed member of the board shall, during the term for which he is appointed, hold any other office, elective or appointive, under the State of Minnesota."

On April 21, 1923, in an act relating to the number, qualifications and appointment of the Board of Regents, of the State of Minnesota, the Legislature provided that

"The government and general educational management of the State University is herein vested in a board of regents consisting of the Governor, the Commissioner of Education, and the President of the University, all as ex officio members, and one member from each Congressional district of the state to be appointed by the governor by and with the advice and consent of the Senate. No person shall be eligible to appointment by the governor as a member of the Board of Regents unless he shall have been a member of the Congressional district from which he is appointed for at least five (5) years immediately preceding the time of his appointment. This Act shall not terminate the terms of any of the present members of the board. Vacancies in the offices of appointive members shall be filled by the governor by the appointment of members from such congressional districts as are not represented on such board by an appointive member. Such board shall be a body corporate under the name of the University of Minnesota. It shall have a common seal and may alter same at pleasure. No appointive member of the board shall hold any other office, elective or appointive, under the State of Minnesota."

This provision increased the number of regents to ten. J. E. G. Sundberg was appointed to represent the ninth district.

In July, 1928, in order to clarify the authority and autonomy and authority of the University, the State Supreme Court made a decision with regard to election and authority of the regents.

The Supreme Court held that the University which had been perpetuated by the State Constitution adopted in 1857 was the territorial university established by the Legislature of 1851 - a University governed by a corporate board of regents elected by the Legislature. The University was a corporation of which the regents were the sole members and the governing board. This is an Act which the Legislature can not change.

The attorney general, in a letter to the president of the Board of Regents, August 17, 1928, stated that under the decision of the Supreme Court the organization of the Board was controlled by the law of 1851 and the Legislature could not change it. The same law provided that whenever a vacancy occurred in the board of regents for any cause whatever, it should be the duty of the governor to fill it by appointment. The regents in office had been appointed according to that law, but election must take place at the meeting of the next legislature, 1929.

On April 4, 1929, the Legislature in joint session elected nine members who had been serving on the board and three new ones.

## Music Department

In 1903 Emil Oberhofer, former director of the Minneapolis Symphony Orchestra, taught the first classes in Music at the University. The department had two rooms in the basement of Pillsbury Hall. In 1904 Carlyle M. Scott was appointed to take charge of Music. He held his classes in Wilson's Hall on the corner of Fourteenth and University Avenues. From there he moved to a brick building on Washington Avenue, and in 1916 to the Students Christian Association Building (now Music Education) where the Department of Music was housed until 1922 when the Music Building (Scott Hall) was built.

In 1919 Mr. Scott, chairman of the Department of Music, was made University Director of Music, a new position in the College of Science, Literature, and the Arts. This position was created to centralize all music of the University, including the Band, the orchestra, and other musical organizations.

## INSTITUTE OF AGRICULTURE

Provision for the creation of the Department of Agriculture was made in the University charter and the first organization, which lasted only two years, provided for a College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts. The reorganization in 1871 established the college as an independent unit. In 1885 the Agricultural Experiment Station was organized and in 1888 the School of Agriculture. In 1903 the first courses in Forestry were offered and in 1908 the Division of Forestry was established, followed by the Division of Home Economics in 1910. In 1917 collegiate courses in Agriculture, Forestry and Home Economics were combined in the College of Agriculture, Forestry and Home Economics. In 1947 the Division of Veterinary Medicine was designated as a school and the name of the College was changed to the College of Agriculture, Forestry, Home Economics and Veterinary Medicine. In 1949 the divisions of Forestry and Home Economics were raised to the status of schools.

In 1952 the Department of Agriculture was reorganized and named the Institute of Agriculture. The reorganization provided for a dean and five principal assistants - a director of the Agricultural Experiment Station, a director of the Agricultural Extension Division, and three assistant deans.

COLLEGE OF ENGINEERING

Organized in 1871.

Provision for the establishment of this college was made in the charter of the University. The first organization which lasted only two years provided for a College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts. The re-organization in 1871 established the College of Mechanic Arts as an

independent college.

Two courses were offered in 1871 - civil engineering and mechanical engineering, with Arthur Beardsley as Professor of Civil Engineering and Industrial Mechanics. Professor Beardsley resigned in 1872 and was succeeded by Professor Mitchell D. Rhame. In 1880 William A. Pike was appointed Professor of Engineering and in 1886 he was made director of the college.

In 1891 the School of Mines was established and incorporated in the College of Engineering. The new name of the college was The College of Engineering, Metallurgy, and Mechanic Arts.

In 1915 the name was changed to the College of Engineering and Architecture. In 1949 when the School of Architecture was reconstituted as a separate school, within the Institute of Technology, the name of the college was changed accordingly to College of Engineering.

INSTITUTE OF TECHNOLOGY

In 1919 President M. L. Burton advocated the creation of an Institute of Techology consisting of the College of Engineering and Architecture, the School of Chemistry, and the School of Mines and Metallurgy. The Regents voted to correlate the administration of the College of Engineering and Architecture and the School of Chemistry under one administrative head, with the understanding that the inclusion of the School of Mines and Metallurgy would be considered later.

In 1935 the Institute of Technology was established and included the College of Engineering and Architecture, the School of Chemistry, and

the School of Mines and Metallurgy. A dean for the Institute was appointed as well as a dean of administration, an administrative assistant for each unit, and an advisory board.

### School of Mines and Metallurgy

The School of Mines was established in 1888 and existed as a separate organization until 1891 when it was consolidated with Engineering under the title, The College of Engineering, Metallurgy and the Mechanic Arts. In 1896 it was made a separate school, the School of Mines, and in 1927 the name was changed to the School of Mines and Metallurgy. It remained a separate school until 1935, when it became a part of the Institute of Technology.

### ROSEMOUNT RESEARCH CENTER

One of the United States Government's great war plants, the Gopher Ordnance Works, was located fifteen miles south of the Twin Cities. After the war, the University faculty saw here a great laboratory for scientists in all branches. The matter was taken up with the Government and 8,000 acres and 172 buildings were made available for various research projects.

The Department of Aeronautical Engineering is engaged in research in aerodynamics. By arrangement with the Bureau of Ordnance and the Office of Naval Research, Rosemount has a supersonic tunnel in which it is hoped that air velocities eight times the velocity of sound will be achieved. John D. Akerman heads this research work.

The Department (Institute) of Agriculture acquired 1,440 acres of land here. Special funds were voted by the Legislature and the Experiment Station started investigations in various fields.

The College of Medical Science is also using Rosemount Research Center.

### MINNESOTA GEOLOGICAL SURVEY

The State Geological Survey was authorized by the Legislature March 1, 1872. This work was under the direction of Newton N. Winchell, who was the state geologist, until 1900. The Survey was discontinued from 1900 to 1911, when the Legislature made an appropriation to revive the work.



William H. Emmons, who joined the Geology Faculty in 1911, became director of the Survey and work began in 1912.

GENERAL EXTENSION DIVISION

Extension classes were first offered in 1881 in the College of Engineering when Professor William A. Pike held evening classes in drawing and shop work. For many years extension lectures and classes were offered by different departments, but there was no central organization. In 1900 the College of Education received an appropriation to encourage extension work in Education and Economics, including correspondence courses. Edward Quigley was placed in charge. Within the next two years the scope of work was enlarged to include a number of academic courses.

The University Weeks program, which consisted of lectures, conferences and entertainment, was inaugurated in 1911. Faculty members, students, and others spent two or three weeks visiting towns in the state. This program was well received and was continued until 1916 when it was abandoned because of the exigencies of World War I.

In 1913 it was determined that all extension activities of the University should be grouped under the term "Extension Service", with two directors in close cooperation. Richard R. Price was appointed director of the General Extension Division and A. D. Wilson continued as director of the Agricultural Extension Division.

Radio Station KUOM

The General Extension Division operates the University radio station on a noncommercial basis. The station was first licensed in 1922 with call letters WLB and is one of the oldest educational stations in the country. In 1945 the name was changed to KUOM.

In 1926 weekly all-university programs were broadcast for the first time from the new studio in the Electrical Engineering Building. L. J. Seymour, head of Community Service, arranged the programs and did the announcing. The programs were under the direction of the director of Community Service until 1939, when a full time manager was appointed.

In 1938 the School of the Air was organized to supplement the work of the schools.

Radio experimentation at the university was begun in 1912 as an activity of the Electrical Engineering Department, but was interrupted by World War I. In 1920 C. M. Jansky, Jr., of the Electrical Engineering Department, revived this activity and daily weather reports were transmitted on an experimental license. In 1922 government information concerning crops and markets was added as well as musical programs and reports of home football games. Plya by play notes were relayed from the sidelines to the Electrical Engineering Building.

The radio station was housed in the Electrical Engineering Building until 1938 when Eddy Hall was remodeled. Since 1938 the station has occupied the ground floor of Edgy Hall.

APPLIED MORTUARY SCIENCE

In 1908 provision was made for a Course in Embalming in the Medical School, but the work was not organized until 1914. It covered a period of six weeks and in 1915 eight weeks. The course was lengthened during the years and in 1932 was extended to nine months.

Embalmng was transferred from the Medical School to the General Extensior Division in 1921. In 1944 the name was changed to the Course in Applied Mortuary Science.

In 1951 the curriculm was revised on a two-year basis and a degree, Associate in Mortuary Science, was authorized

SUMMER SESSION

In 1881 for the first time the University offered courses in science for teachers and others interested. These courses were offered during the month of July and the attendance was 42. In 1882 German, English and other subjects were added. Professor Christopher Hall was in charge of the school.

In 1892 the State Department of Public Instruction made provision for holding a summer school at the University. The University furnished buildings and equipment and the faculty was largely made up of University faculty members. Until 1911 the summer school was held on the Minneapolis campus under the general direction of the State Department of Public Instruction, but under the direct supervision of the University Department of Education. The summer session was held over a period of six weeks. In 1921 a second session of five weeks was added.

From 1888 to 1896 Dean Pattee was the only resident professor. He was assisted by lecturers (lawyers from Minneapolis and St. Paul). In 1896 James Paige and A. C. Hickman were appointed to the faculty.

From the beginning of the college Dean Pattee held night classes for students who could not attend day sessions. These developed into the Night School of the College of Law. The night classes, so far as a degree is concerned, were abolished in 1911.

During the first year of its existence the college was housed in the Hermean Room in the basement of the Old Main Building. In 1899 the Law Building was completed, and the college occupied this building until 1927 when the new Law Building was ready for use. In 1931 the Old Law Building was renamed Pattee Hall and in 1949 the new Law Building was renamed Fraser Hall.

COLLEGE OF MEDICAL SCIENCES

In the spring of 1888 three private medical schools, the Minnesota Hospital College, the St. Paul Medical School, and the Minnesota Homeopathic Medical College, surrendered their charters to the University of Minnesota for the purpose of establishing a medical college of high grade. The work in the college of Medicine and Surgery began in the fall of 1888.

The College was housed in the building of the Minnesota Hospital College at Sixth Avenue and Ninth Street South, Minneapolis, for four years until the first Millard Hall, now Wulling Hall, was completed.

COLLEGE OF HOMEOPATHIC MEDICINE AND SURGERY

This was one of the three colleges of the Department of Medicine which was organized in 1888. In 1892 it became a separate college and in 1909 was abolished.

UNIVERSITY SERVICES

In 1903 Joseph C. Poucher was placed in charge of the University Post Office which was located in the Old Main Building. At that time a number of students found it necessary to work part time and an employment service was started by the postmaster. This was operated on a courtesy basis until 1911, when an employment bureau was officially organized as a department within a department. Also in 1911 the job of maintaining perpetual inventory was turned over to the postmaster. In 1914, when the intercampus car was installed, a new enterprise was added. Others followed and in 1925, when the department moved to the Administration Building, the services included the post office, inventory, employment bureau, cold storage, army and navy storehouse, truck service, intercampus car, Union food service, glass blowing and scientific apparatus shops.

In 1929 the new Northrop Auditorium garage was added to the list of services, also the University laundry and Sanford Hall. These were followed in the 1930's by men's residences (Pioneer Hall), stadium lunch stands, milk and cream department, and the garage, dormitory service and food service in Center for Continuation Study. In 1945 Thatcher Hall was placed under the management of Service Enterprises, in 1946 Printing and Mimeographing on the main campus and Mimeographing and Bulletins on the farm campus, and in 1948 University Village. In 1950 Centennial Hall and Audio-Visual Education were added. Other recent services taken over by the department are Duluth Branch cottages and apartments, Winchell Cottages, Kiwanis Court, lockers, the bindery, and Grove rentals.

In 1952 the name of the department was changed from Service Enterprises to University Services.

## THE UNIVERSITY POST OFFICE

The first University Post Office was located in the Old Main Building. In 1904, when the Old Main was destroyed by fire, the Post Office was moved to the rotunda of the Library Building (now Burton Hall) and when Folwell Hall was completed, to the basement of basement of that building. Next it was housed in the basement of the Mechanic Arts Building from 1913 to 1924 when the Administration Building was completed. In 1940 it was transferred from the ground floor of the Administration Building to the ground floor of Coffman Memorial Union.

In its early years the Post Office was managed successively by the registrar, the University Bookstore, and the business manager of the Ariel. Finally Clara Poucher was placed in charge on a full time basis and received the rental fees for her services. In 1908 Joseph C. Poucher was appointed manager as a regular University employee.

The Post Office was the first of the twenty-eight services which were established from time to time and combined in the Department of Service Enterprises, now University Services.

## COLLEGE OF EDUCATION

Organized in December, 1905.

The first courses for prospective teachers were offered by the University during the period 1885-1892. Lectures were given to seniors one hour a week by Harry P. Judson, Professor of History, later President of the University of Chicago.

In 1892 a two-year course for teachers was conducted by David L. Kiehle, State Superintendent of Public Instruction. The next year Mr. Kiehle was appointed Professor in charge. In 1899 this course was discontinued, the work was reorganized as a department of Education and the University Teachers's Certificate was granted to graduates of the College of Science, Literature, and the Arts who took certain prescribed work in Psychology and Education. In 1902 Mr. Kiehle resigned and George F. James was appointed dean of the newly organized college.

Although the Graduate School was not organized until 1906, graduate work was provided almost from the beginning of the University and was under the direction of a graduate committee. The first chairman was Jabez Brooks. The first Master of Arts degree was awarded to Graham Cox Campbell in 1889, the first Doctor of Philosophy degree to Charles Elliott in 1888.

MINNESOTA UNION

The movement for a men's building, which resulted in the organization of the Minnesota Union, was started in the spring of 1906. Max Lowenthal and John F. Sinclair were leaders in the movement.

On May 5, 1908, a constitution was adopted, elections were held, and a Board of Governors was chosen. The first problem before the Board was to secure a new building. The students were unable to raise funds and in 1913 the Legislature made an appropriation to remodel the Chemistry Laboratory which was to be vacated when the School of Chemistry moved into the new Chemistry Building. In 1914 the Chemistry Laboratory (now Nicholson Hall) was ready for the students and was renamed the Minnesota Union. It also housed the Campus Club. The need for a larger building increased and in 1940, after a campaign among students, alumni, and friends of the University, the new building (Coffman Memorial Union) was completed for the use of both men and women students. The constitution was revised and provision was made to include women students on the Union Board.

The Union was under the direction of a student manager on a part time basis until 1922, when a full time manager was appointed.

## DEPARTMENT OF CIVIL SERVICE

Securing part time employment for students was started as a courtesy service by the University Post Office. In 1911 an employment bureau was officially established within the Department of Service Enterprises, which included the Post Office, and a student was placed in charge.

This bureau remained under Service Enterprises until 1927 when an independent employment service was established, with a director in charge. In 1937 Classified service for nonacademic personnel was approved and the Employment Bureau served as the central employment office for this group.

In 1942 the Civil Service Department was established and the nonacademic employment came under its jurisdiction.

## THE MUSEUM OF NATURAL HISTORY

A considerable amount of museum material was assembled first in the Old Main Building and later in Pillsbury Hall by Professors Newton H. Winchell and Henry F. Nachtrieb in connection with the work of the Geological and Natural History Survey. Beginning with the fall of 1915 the University offered through the College of Science, Literature and the Arts a four-year course in Business Administration. In 1917 Professor W. E. Hotchkiss was appointed Director of Business Education and he urged the organization of a separate school. In 1919 the School of Business was established. In 1927 the name was changed to the School of Business Administration.

The school was housed in the old Mechanic Arts Building until 1938, when Vincent Hall was completed.

UNIVERSITY ARTISTS' COURSE

The University Concert Course was inaugurated in 1919 in cooperation with the Faculty Women's Club, when noted musicians were brought to the campus to give concerts. In February, 1920, by Regents' action, the course was put on a permanent basis and Mrs. Carlyle Scott was appointed manager. In 1929 the name was changed to the Artist's course.

Mrs. Scott was director of the Course from the time of its establishment in 1920 to the time of her retirement in 1944.

When the Department of Concerts and Lectures was established in 1944, the Artists' Course was included in this department.

### THE UNIVERSITY PRESS

In 1925 the Board of Regents approved the establishment of the University Press, which was to operate under a director and an executive committee appointed by the President. The Press did not begin operations until March, 1927 when Mrs. Margaret Harding was appointed managing editor.

GREATER UNIVERSITY FUND

Plans for the organization of the Greater University Fund were started in the fall of 1945 when President Morrill first met with the alumni advisory committee. At that time he suggested that the alumni consider the possibility of establishing an Alumni Fund through which alumni and friends of the University might make gifts to the University. The executive committee acted on this suggestion, and at the annual meeting of the Alumni Board, October 22, 1946, submitted proposals for the expansion of the alumni program, including an Alumni Fund through which gifts to the University would be solicited. The Board approved this proposal and the President of the Alumni Association appointed a committee to work out details and policy of the Fund program and to consult with President Morrill with regard to the matter. Plans for the organization of the Greater University Fund, sponsored by the General Alumni Association, were incorporated in a resolution which was approved by the Board of Directors of the General Alumni Association April 30, 1947, and submitted to the Board of Regents. On May 9, 1947, the Regents approved this resolution establishing the Greater University Fund.

The purpose of the Fund is to encourage and enable alumni and friends of the University of Minnesota to share in forwarding the total educational program of the University, including teaching and research and services for the public good, and to supplement the University income through annual giving as well as through bequests and devises.

GREATER UNIVERSITY CORPORATION

On May 14, 1921, representative alumni from Minneapolis and St. Paul and delegates from various alumni clubs in the state met at the University and adopted resolutions outlining a proposal to raise \$2, 000, 000.00 for the erection of an auditorium and a stadium and the purchase of land for the enlargement of the athletic field. On June 1, 1921, the Board of Regents approved these resolutions and appointed a committee (Fred B. Snyder, L. D. Coffman, and George H. Partridge) to assist the alumni in outlining plans, in determining policies, and in the successful conduct of the campaign.

A corporation was formed and named the Greater University Corporation, its general purpose being to receive contributions, donations, devises and bequests for the educational needs and uses of the University.

The first, or charter, members of the corporation were George K. Belden, James F. Bell, Joseph Chapman, Lotus D. Coffman, Douglas A. Fiske, John M. Harrison, Charles G. Ireys, Charles F. Keyes, Arnold C. Oss, George H. Partridge, Ernest B. Pierce, John S. Pillsbury, Edward A. Purdy, John H. Ray, Fred B. Snyder, and Thomas E. Wallace, all of Minneapolis, Horace C. Klein and Charles L. Sommers of St. Paul, N. Robert Ringdahl of Shakopee, and Dr. William F. Braasch of Rochester.

The first officers were, Thomas F. Wallace, president; Charles G. Ireys, vice president, Ernest B. Pierce, Secretary and Edward A. Purdy, treasurer.

Charles G. Ireys was appointed chairman of the executive committee which had control of the campaign for the auditorium and stadium. Lyman Pierce was secured to conduct the campaign, which started on the campus in October, 1922. Tom Phelps, a senior, was chairman of the student campaign and Otto Zelner was in charge of the faculty. The alumni campaign was conducted in the spring of 1923.

The stadium was ready for use for the football season of 1924. The dedication took place at the Minneapolis-Illinois game, November 15, 1924. The auditorium was completed in 1929 and the dedication was one of the homecoming events.

In 1938-1939 the Corporation conducted another campaign to raise funds to build a student center, the Coffman Memorial Union. At this time George K. Belden was president of the Corporation, Arthur E. Larkin, vice president, Ernest B. Pierce, secretary, and Edward A. Purdy, treasurer. John M. Harrison was general chairman of the campaign.

After the Greater University Fund was established, the Greater University Corporation ceased to function.
