IV. REPORT OF THE ADMINISTRATIVE COMMITTEE

Reported for Information

1. *Leaves of absence*—It was the sense of the committee that a very conservative policy should be followed with respect to leaves of absence. It was voted to suggest that President Coffey write the president of the American Council on Education recommending that the Council, possibly through its Committee on Relations with Military Services, urge the Armed Forces to:

- Arrange for early release of key men for return to university positions
- Utilize the specially trained men they now have instead of making further inroad on university personnel.

2. *Resolution concerning veterans' housing*—President Coffey reported that the Board of Regents on May 11, 1945 adopted a resolution to urge congress to provide funds for housing of veterans. Copies of the resolution have been sent to all Minnesota senators and representatives.

3. *Five-day week, summer quarter*—President Coffey asked for an expression of judgment on the matter of a five-day week for the summer quarter scheduled for consideration at the next meeting of the Board of Regents.

It was voted the sense of the committee that it be permissive for departments who wish to do so to operate on a five-day week summer 1945.

4. *Advisory Committee on Administration of the Tenure System*—The president announced the appointment of an Advisory Committee on Administration of the Tenure System to be known as the *Tenure Committee* to establish procedures for the administration of the Regulations Concerning Academic Tenure approved by the Senate, December 21, 1944 and by the Board of Regents, February 9, 1945. Members of the committee include Malcolm M. Willey, chairman, William Anderson, Wilbur H. Cherry, Lester O. Gilmore, J. Lewis Maynard, James S. McCartney, Signe Holmstrom, and Jean Alexander.

5. *Report of the Tenure Committee*—Mr. Willey, chairman, reported that at the first meeting of the Tenure Committee it became apparent that the problems to be considered will fall in two categories: (1) Transitional problems in determining status of staff members as of July 1, 1945, (2) Problems related to continued administration after initial status is determined.

Attention was called to President Coffey's request of June 7, 1945 to deans that names of instructors and assistant professors not to be reappointed be submitted to the president's office by June 12 so that each may be informed and copies of notices sent to the dean and department head as provided in the tenure regulations adopted.

Mr. Willey said that matters of interpretation of regulations will be referred to the president for decision.

The president indicated that he would report the interpretations he makes on these questions through the Administrative Committee to the Senate for information.

The following interpretations, approved by the president, will guide in preparing the forms designed to establish present tenure of all members of the academic staff:

- Periods covered by leaves of absence do not count in computing years of service if the leave involves absence that reduces the services of the staff member below an average of two-thirds time during any academic year.
- A staff member who has attained tenure as an instructor (or research fellow) or assistant professor (or research associate) does not jeopardize his tenure rights, if subsequently, he takes up uncompleted studies in the Graduate School, or for any reason temporarily reduces his percentage of time.
- In determining probationary credit and in the absence of an agreement to the contrary, one year's credit should be granted for full-time

service on a regular appointment during two quarters of any academic year or for part-time service on a regular appointment which averages at least two-thirds time during the three quarters of any academic year. Service of less than two-thirds time for any academic year does not count in establishing tenure.

- d. All service on a regular appointment, even though not consecutive, if it meets the two-thirds requirement, shall be credited toward the completion of the probationary period.
- e. Staff members with dual titles acquire no academic tenure credit if the first title as shown in the printed budget falls under the civil service.
- f. Normally, time service on X or T appointments does not count toward the completion of the probationary period. However, in individual cases, credit may be given for such service upon the recommendation of the dean.

6. *Leave of absence*—President Coffey read replies received from Mr. Zook and Mr. Brumbaugh to his letter to the American Council on Education regarding progress in discussion with the Armed Forces with respect to: (1) Early release of key men for return to University positions and, (2) Utilization of specially trained men within the Armed Forces to avoid further inroad on University personnel. The replies indicated that the council is doing everything it can to bring about a satisfactory solution to these problems through the Committee on the Relationships of Higher Education to the Federal Government.

7. The President presented a letter from the Norwegian Embassy in which it was asked what the University might be able to do in offering special facilities for Norwegian students who might wish to study here. Following general discussion, the President indicated he would refer the letter to a special committee recently created with Dean Blegen as chairman, which committee has been requested to study the problem of both undergraduate and graduate foreign students.

Dean Schmitz suggested that it might be possible to interest Norwegian groups in this state in providing funds for scholarships for Norwegian students. And President Coffey indicated, that, in referring the letter to the committee, he would request an exploration of this possibility. Dean Schmitz also expressed a hope that fraternities and sororities might be interested in the problems of foreign students, and as in the past, make some provision for board and room scholarships.

8. The president, for the information of the committee, called attention to the flexible and liberal policies of the University of Minnesota governing admittance of students whose preparatory training may have been somewhat irregular and not in full conformity with university admission requirements. It was requested that the acting director of admissions send to the members of the committee a copy of the document which outlines these present admission policies.

9. Dean Bailey moved that, since this was the last meeting of the Administrative Committee over which President Coffey would preside before his retirement on June 30, the committee express its appreciation of the many services of President Coffey, particularly the sincere appreciation of the manner in which he has presided over meetings of the Administrative Committee, for his cordial and understanding relationships with the individual members of the committee, and best wishes for the future.

The motion was put by Mr. Willey and adopted by a rising vote.

10. *Mimeographed material*. It was voted to approve the following: *Laboratory Manual of Meteorology, Materia Medica, and Pharmacology for Nurses*, published as a planographed manual by the John S. Swift Company of Dubuque, Iowa. The manual is copyrighted in the name of the Department of Pharmacology of the University of Minnesota and is to be sold at a cost of 85 per cents per copy. This manual is to take the place of the manual of similar name previously mimeographed by the University and sold at a cost of 65 cents per copy. To be sold by Professional Colleges Bookstore.

20 copies of *Consumption and Action of Alcohol* by Dr. Carl J. Potthoff, Dr. Raymond N. Bieter, and Dr. Haven Emerson. Ruth E. Grout, editor. This is to fulfill the requirements of the law recently enacted by the State Legislature to provide teachers in training at the University of Minnesota with information on "effects of narcotics and alcohol upon human system, upon character and upon society." To be held by Professional Colleges Bookstore at 20 cents per copy.

Social Criticism in Modern Poetry—Part IV—to be used in the course in the Humanities. Consists of pages of poetry from various authors and various books, assembled in mimeographed form to make it possible for the student to have all the material together and to reduce number of books to be purchased. Part IV to be used in the Summer Session. 150 copies to be sold by Folwell Hall Bookstore at 25 cents per copy.

- b. Credit will be allowed by fields designated as follows:

VIII. REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON NECROLOGY

PETER CHRISTIANSON

1864-1945

Peter Christianson, Professor Emeritus of Metallurgy, was born in the Province of Jylland in Denmark on September 20, 1864. He prepared for college in the Owatonna High School, and graduated from the University of Minnesota in 1890. From 1892 to 1894 he was a scholar in Mining at this University; in 1894 he was granted the M.E. degree. For 43 years Peter Christianson was a member of the University of Minnesota faculty: Instructor in Metallurgy, 1894-1897; Director of Laboratories, 1897-1906; Assistant Professor of Metallurgy, 1906-1908; Professor of Metallurgy, 1908-1935; and Professor Emeritus thereafter. He died in Los Angeles, California, on May 17, 1945.

Professor Christianson was a life member of the American Institute of Mining and Metallurgy and of the American Society for Metals. He was a prominent figure in the development of the iron industry in Minnesota from the opening of the Mesabi range to his retirement ten years ago.

HORACE NEWHART, M.D.

1872-1945

Dr. Newhart was born in New Ulm, Minnesota, December 9, 1872. After preparatory education there, he attended Carleton College and later Dartmouth College, where he received his Bachelor's degree, and where he was elected to Phi Beta Kappa. He then went to the University of Michigan where he received his M.D. degree in 1900. He practiced briefly in Albany, New York, after which he returned to Minneapolis, entering general practice in 1901.

Deciding to specialize in diseases of the eye, ear, nose, and throat, Dr. Newhart studied abroad under such men as Neumann, Hayek, Rutin, Alexander, and others, many of whom became his close personal friends. He was at the University of Vienna in 1898-1899, 1905-1908, and 1911-1912 and at the University of Freiberg in 1908.

Dr. Newhart was appointed to the faculty of the University of Minnesota Medical School in 1912. For several years before his retirement from active teaching in 1941 he was Professor and Director of the Division of Otolaryngology. He also served as staff member at University, Abbott, Northwestern, and St. Barnabas hospitals. His chief interest was always in otology. In this field he was one of the foremost champions of the prevention of deafness and conservation of hearing, and he always interested himself in the problems of the hard of hearing. His accomplishments in this direction were many, only a few of which need be named, such as the establishment of routine hearing tests for school children, improvement in audiometers for testing hearing, and the development of better hearing aids. For many years he was chairman of the Committee of the American Academy of Ophthalmology and Otolaryngology which dealt with conservation of hearing. He was President of the Academy in 1925.

Dr. Newhart was a leading figure in the local and state medical societies and the American Medical Association, the Minneapolis Society for the Hard of Hearing, which he organized and of which he was president from 1925 to 1929; the American Society for the Hard of Hearing, President 1927-1928; American Laryngological, Rhinological and Otolological Society; the American Otolological Society, President 1939-1940; American College of Surgeons; American Acoustical Society; Minnesota Academy of Medicine and Minnesota Academy of Ophthalmology and Otolaryngology.

Horace Newhart died on July 9, 1945, leaving behind him a most distinguished record as a citizen of Minnesota, a scientist, a practicing physician and surgeon, and a friend of the physically handicapped.

LURA CLAIRE HUTCHINSON

1884-1945

The service of Lura Claire Hutchinson to the Division of Library Instruction at the University of Minnesota came as the climax to many years of association with library work in the state. Born in Champlin, Minnesota, December 1, 1884, she later attended Central High School in Minneapolis and completed her Bachelor of Arts degree at the University of Minnesota in 1908. After three years of teaching at Milaca, she went to

Western Reserve University for advanced training in library science. From 1911 to 1928 she served the Minneapolis Public Library, the last eight years as head of the Reference Department. Of special note was her establishment in the city library from 1917 to 1920 a training class for librarians, at a time when no such facilities were available in Minnesota.

In 1928 she came to the University of Minnesota as Assistant Professor of Library Science in the newly established library school, becoming Associate Professor in 1938, a position which she held until her death on June 14, 1945.

Miss Hutchinson inherited from her father, a much beloved professor of Greek at the University of Minnesota until 1920, a love of learning and an intense feeling for scholarship. Her quiet yet potent influence came from the clarity of her thinking on library problems, her sanity of judgment, and her persistent demand for true professionalization of library service. To her, library work could never be a clerical job; it was always an exciting cultural mission.

Modest and gracious, she never failed to put her students first in everything she did. She knew them individually—their hopes, their elements of strength, and their peculiar weaknesses, and she spent hours of her time counseling with them both during their period of training and in the years beyond their university course. The influence she exerted was a peculiarly personal one, not through writing or speaking primarily, but through intimate contact with her students.

It was typical of Miss Hutchinson that at her death she returned to the University her group insurance to be used for fellowships for promising students. In turn, her students in the library school are raising funds for a scholarship in her memory. The University has lost in her a noble spirit and a true scholar, and the librarians of Minnesota, a warm friend and inspired leader.

FREDERIC KING BUTTERS

1878-1945

Frederic King Butters, Professor of Botany, was born in Minneapolis on February 8, 1878, and died in this city on August 1, 1945. He was granted the B.S. degree by the University of Minnesota in 1899, the B.A. degree by Harvard University in 1900, and the Ph.D. degree in 1917. His professional career was spent at Minnesota, as Instructor in Botany from 1901 to 1910; Assistant Professor from 1910 to 1919; Associate Professor from 1919 to 1934; and Professor from 1934 to his death, one year short of retirement.

Professor Butters was an Associate in the American Botanical Society, a Fellow of the American Association of Science, and a Fellow of the Royal Geographical Society. He was an authority on the botany of Minnesota and the author of numerous papers on the flora of the state. Two handbooks which he prepared with Professor C. O. Rosendahl have been frequently reprinted and are in wide use: *Trees and Shrubs of Minnesota* and *A Guide to the Spring Flowers of Minnesota*.

The natural world held significance for Frederic Butters both as a scientist and as a man. In astronomy he was a well-informed amateur; he was also an accomplished mountain-climber, and a member of the Alpine Club. In his Sigma Xi address in 1938, he made a humanistic plea for personal research as an intellectual end in itself, as distinguished from the impersonality of industrial research.

Encyclopedic knowledge, varied interests, and willingness to aid in all kinds of scientific projects made Frederic Butters a most useful member of the scientific faculties. His active interest in academic policies and his sympathetic understanding of departments other than his own made him equally valuable to the University as a whole. His own college will particularly miss his unflinching practicality and his dry wit.

CARLYLE McROBERTS SCOTT

1873-1945

Carlyle McRoberts Scott, Professor Emeritus of Music and for thirty-eight years a member of the faculty, was born in Lawrence, Massachusetts, on December 1, 1873, and died August 2, 1945. He attended public and preparatory schools in Lawrence and Amesbury, Massachusetts, and Lyndon, Vermont, and from 1895 to 1900 studied at the Royal Conservatory of Music and the University in Leipzig.

In 1904 he came to Minneapolis to succeed Emil Oberhoffer in the Music Department of the University of Minnesota. At the time the department had six students, enrolled under the fee system and allowed no university credit for courses in music. For seven years Mr. Scott was the only instructor in the department. Shortly, however, music became a regular part of the university curriculum, and under his enthusiastic and energetic leadership achieved widespread recognition in the field of musical education. In 1921, together with President Lotus D. Coffman, he laid the cornerstone of the present \$250,000 Music Building. From 1917 to his retirement on June 16, 1942, Professor Scott served as head of the department.

With Mrs. Scott, he was associated with the Artists Course Series which for years brought outstanding programs of music and drama to Minneapolis. He was also closely identified with the plan under which the Minneapolis Symphony Orchestra presented its regular concerts on the University of Minnesota campus.

St. Olaf College, Northfield, Minnesota, awarded him the honorary degree of Doctor of Music. In 1940 he was elected vice president of the Music Teachers National Association during the annual convention of the organization in Cleveland.

During his long period of service in the University, Professor Scott held a high place in the musical life of the community. Friends and acquaintances will remember his geniality and the pleasure he derived from music and his daily association with people. They will remember too his sound judgment, his deep knowledge of music, and the unique contribution he made to life and culture in the University and the state.
