**IV REPORT OF THE ADMINSTRATIVE COMMITTEE**  
 Reported for Action

1. *Athletic Scholarships*—Professor Henry Rottschaeffer, Faculty Representative to Big Nine Intercollegiate Conference, reported action by the Conference on June 6, 1948, recommending the following change in rules:  
*From: Rule 6 Section 4—*  
 No scholarships, loans, or remissions of tuition shall be awarded on the basis of athletic skill, and no financial aid shall be given to students by individuals or organizations, alumni or other, with the purpose of subsidizing them as athletes or of promoting the athletic success of a particular university.

#### FOUR—Senate Minutes

##### To: Rule 6 Section 5—

**Unearned Financial Aid.** In general, athletes should not receive financial aids which exceed either in proportion, or in amount, the aids available to all students. The following conditions govern the eligibility of students who receive unearned financial aids of any type:

- (a) **Awarding Agencies.** No student shall be eligible who receives a scholarship, remission of tuition, prize, award, or other type of unearned financial aid which is not awarded by the same agencies, and by the same procedure, as apply to all students in his institution. The approval by a regularly constituted scholarship committee or agency of an award granted by others shall be equivalent to an initial award by that committee or agency. Furthermore, the existence and terms of such unearned financial aid must be published in an official bulletin of the university.
- (b) **Scholarship Requirements.** No student shall be eligible who receives any type of unearned financial aid, other than from persons upon whom he is naturally or legally dependent, unless he qualifies either by superior scholarship or by a level of scholastic achievement plus demonstrated need as outlined below:

##### *Aids Exceeding Tuition and Incidental Fees*

A student may receive financial aid amounting to not more than \$300.00 in excess of tuition and incidental fees of his institution, without loss of eligibility, if he has demonstrated superior scholarship. "Superior scholarship" is defined as follows:

- (1) If an entering freshman, he must rank in the upper one-fourth of his high school graduating class, or, in the upper one-third of entering college freshmen on either a standard college aptitude examination or a standard college entrance examination.
- (2) If an entering transfer student, he must have achieved a cumulative scholastic record in college at the "B" level in an ABCD-Fail grading system or its equivalent in other grading systems.
- (3) If a continuing student, he must meet the same requirements as outlined for transfer students in paragraph (2).

##### *Aids Not Exceeding Tuition and Incidental Fees*

A student may receive unearned financial aid not exceeding the tuition and incidental fees of his institution, without loss of eligibility, if (a) he presents clear evidence of need for financial aid, and (b) he has demonstrated the level of scholastic achievement outlined below:

- (1) If an entering freshman, he must rank in the upper one-half of his high school graduating class; or above the 50th percentile of entering college freshmen on either a standard college aptitude examination or standard college entrance examinations.
  - (2) If an entering transfer student, he must have achieved a cumulative scholastic record in college which places him no lower than one-fourth of the way between the "C" and "B" grades in an ABCD-Fail grading system, or its equivalent in other grading systems.
  - (3) If a continuing student, he must have achieved a cumulative scholastic record in college which places him no lower than the "C" level in an ABCD-Fail grading system, or its equivalent in other grading systems.
- (c) **Special Aid Unrelated to Athletic Skill.** A student may receive, without loss of eligibility, any type of unearned financial aid for which he is qualified because of circumstances unrelated to his athletic skill, and which may not demand the scholastic requirements outlined in Section 5 (b) and which, in fact, is not awarded on the basis of athletic ability in whole or in part.
  - (d) **Total Aid.** In no case shall any student receive aids which total more than the amount permissible under Section 5 (b), *Aids Exceeding Tuition and Incidental Fees*.
  - (e) **Loans.** A student may receive, without loss of eligibility, loans which are made or approved by the regular agency established by his institution for granting loans to all students.
  - (f) **Penalty.** A student shall be deprived of one year of intercollegiate competition for each year or fraction thereof during which he received illegal aid under this section. The period of ineligibility shall commence with the first year in which the student normally would have been permitted to compete.

The Conference regulations provide that the recommended changes in rules will become effective unless objection is received within 60 days. If an objection is filed, the matter must be reconsidered by the Conference. In the event of re-enactment, the action would then be final and binding on all institutions.

Under date of June 8, 1948, the Senate Committee on Intercollegiate Athletics, at a regular meeting, after full consideration and discussion of the foregoing amendment, passed the following motion: "The Senate Committee on Intercollegiate Athletics recommends to the University Senate that they disapprove the Conference revision of Rule 6, Section 4."

The Administrative Committee, acting ad interim for the University Senate July 14, 1948, voted to go on record disapproving the Conference revision of Rule 6, Section 4, and endorsing the stand of the faculty representative.

#### Reported for Information

1. **Channeling of Alumni Gifts Through the Greater University Fund—**President Morrill recounted our experience with the Greater University Fund, essentially through about its first year of operation. He indicated that we have made a fair beginning and emphasized the necessity of attempting to route gifts through the fund whenever consistent. The Committee heard a letter from Mr. Stanley J. Wenberg, Director of the Greater University Fund, requesting assistance from the deans in adding the names of potential givers to the mailing list. Members will informally bring about the results desired.

2. **Budget for 1948-49 and Biennial Requests—**At a regular meeting June 16, 1948, President Morrill reported action of the Regents in adopting the budget for 1948-49 and presented various aspects of the fiscal situation. There was discussion of the salary and wage schedules of the University, and of the merit and cost-of-living increases granted in recent years to faculty and non-academic personnel.

On the basis of the increasing burden of teaching work at senior college level, we must, in all probability, ask the Legislature for more money than ever in the face of declining enrollments. We should begin to think of budget requests for 1949-51. These must be larger if we are to maintain the present quality levels, because of fewer student fees and the impending decline in tuitions from the Veterans Administration. President Morrill asked that, by August 15, 1948, deans address communications to him indicating special or developing needs for Regents' consideration in the biennial planning. Furthermore, since the building program of the biennium is to be crystallized, colleges should consider the housing needs in their separate areas, and should formulate and transmit a schedule of priority requirements for the proposed buildings with which they are directly concerned. The counsel and guidance of the deans was solicited.

In a budgetary meeting of the Committee, October 28, 1948, material prepared for the 1949-51 biennial request was discussed. President Morrill listed both favorable and adverse factors with which we shall have to contend in attaining the fiscal goals toward which we must work. Needs of the University were considered under the general categories of maintenance, specials, and buildings. Factors such as changes in the number of teaching positions and salary rates were discussed in detail. The University faces a large reduction in income from student fees, coupled with an unprecedented shift of teaching to advanced levels. These things will occur even when certain academic betterments require additional funds. Building needs of the University were viewed against the earlier Dorweiler Report, and general programs for the next two to four years were evolved. The Committee found itself in general agreement with both the budget figures and the course of action outlined.

3. **Data on the Staff at the Duluth Branch—**The Committee heard a report concerning the faculty at the Duluth Branch, giving detailed information on the numbers, ranks, backgrounds, and salaries of faculty. There was a comparison of the Duluth and Minneapolis campus salary schedules.

The first problem at Duluth was reclassification of staff according to University standards. The second problem is a review and analysis of course offerings in comparison with courses offered on the Twin City campuses. The interchange of staff will receive increasing attention beginning this year. It is the next problem in the thinking of the advisory committee. Dean Blegen discussed the importance of bringing the Duluth and Minneapolis Campus faculties closer together so that they may be cognizant of what each is doing.

4. **Graduate Work at Duluth—**Dean Blegen said that it will be logical to expect an interest in research and graduate work to develop at Duluth. The President indicated that, in his judgment, if and when such a demand occurs, proposals should be fully discussed.

5. **Procurement of Data Concerning University Personnel—**It was asked that the deans elicit the assistance of department heads, secretaries, and others in obtaining and transmitting to the President's office, timely and full information regarding personal citations, awards, and the like, received by staff members.

6. **Recognition of Staff Accomplishments Not Normally Included in the Staff Publications Bulletin—**Ways and means of recognizing staff accomplishments other than through their publications were discussed. Mention was made of a proposed revision in style and context of *Minnesota Chats*. This would afford the possibility of additional recognition.

7. **Employment of Persons Who Are Not Citizens of the United States—**Special attention was called to a letter from the President's office dated May 28, 1948, concerning employment of persons who are not United States citizens. Dean Williamson suggested that the foreign student adviser would be willing to give assistance to foreign applicants for their use in reporting to authorities and obtaining necessary clearances.

8. **Combining of the Committee on the Naming of University Buildings, the Committee on Honorary Degrees and the Committee on University Honors—**The Committee heard a letter from Dean Everett Fraser calling attention to a vacancy in the chairmanship of the Committee on Honorary Degrees and pointing out that it might be well to consider combining that Committee with the Committee on University Honors, if not also with the Committee on the Naming of University Buildings. It was voted that all three of the committees be combined.

9. **Applications for Research Grants During the Calendar Years 1946 and 1947—**Vice President Willey introduced a written report on research grants requested and received during the calendar years 1946 and 1947. From requests totaling \$5,885,862.34 approved by the Regents, there had been received as of the spring of 1948 amounts totaling \$2,491,277.98. Some additional money will come to the University from the requests reported inasmuch as a number of the projects are still pending or are of a continu-



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ing nature. The tabulation indicated the different sources of funds, as public vs. private, and the University divisions to which they were given. It was apparent that within the period of the study approximately seventy per cent of the filings were productive of something. Discussion emphasized the extent to which this work reflects the prestige of the University, the value of it to the staff and to the productivity of this institution, and the concentration of it in certain departments or colleges. President Morrill outlined the advantages and liabilities of the situation. Mr. Lunden pointed out the need of reasonable time for processing and clearing requests for special research grants and asked that the administration be given all reasonable prior notice when it is desired to file requests.

10. *The Reserve Officer Training Program*—President Morrill reported that the Land Grant College Association has been concerned about the effect of the new draft law on R.O.T.C. While in Washington recently, he talked with General Dahlquist of the General Staff and was told that the Army regards R.O.T.C. as the most valuable source of officer material next to West Point, and plans to continue and develop the program.

Colonel Ericson reported that the specialized R.O.T.C. units in operation this fall will include the present signal, engineer, quartermaster, transportation, artillery, medical, air forces, and chemical warfare corps and the newly established dental and pharmacy corps units. With this broad offering any student in the University can select an R.O.T.C. program appropriate to his course.

11. *Discontinuance of the Joint Registration Program*—Vice President Willey told of correspondence he has had with presidents of Minnesota colleges on the effects of the joint registration program and the logic of closing it to further admission of applicants. It was brought out that the plan has served a useful purpose, but that no real need exists for continuing it into the fall of 1948 or later. The newly reconstituted Committee on the Relation of the University to Other Institutions of Learning can deal with whatever terminal problems may arise from the plan. It was moved, seconded, and voted that the plan not be extended beyond the initial period 1946-48.

12. *Advice to Pre-professional Students*—The President reported having received a letter from President Charles J. Turck, of Macalester College, writing for his church group, to the effect that he understood the University is advising students to take their pre-professional work at the University rather than at private colleges and asking for a statement of University policy in this regard. Inquiry of the colleges, Counseling Bureau, and Admissions and Records offices brings assurances that such advice is not being given.

13. *The Grey Friar's Report on University-Alumni Relations*—Many persons on the Committee have been thinking that the University should make fundamental improvements in its program, as through the humanization of its dealings with applicants and students, moving toward a deep-seated alumni loyalty. Senior honor societies, especially the Grey Friars, have been cooperating in formulating a specific program for improvement. The Committee heard a letter expressing student views and offering services of the Grey Friars. The general reaction was that the letter be gratefully accepted, and that the deans be reminded to weigh these oft-repeated criticisms and complaints. There was an appeal for faculty support in developing programs to alleviate feelings of anxiety and resentment on the part of students. It was asked that copies of the letter be made available to members of the Committee.

14. *Clearance of Plans for Meetings at the University Involving Off-Campus Groups*—The housing and feeding of groups of persons who come to the campus for regional or scientific meetings constitutes a problem for Service Enterprises. Additionally, such full use is made of lecture rooms and other University space that real hazards exist in scheduling meetings in addition to those of the regular instructional program. It was decided that early prior clearance should be obtained by any staff member who contemplates inviting a group to meet on the campus. Normally, that clearance should extend to the appropriate units in the office of Mr. J. C. Poucher and to the Room Scheduling Office in Admissions and Records.

15. *Schedule of the Summer Session*—Problems have arisen because the Summer Session has operated with courses scheduled some on a two-term basis and others on a quarterly basis. It was pointed out by Dean Teeter that prior to World War II the Summer Session was conducted essentially in two terms of six weeks each. Acceleration of teaching during wartime caused a change to the quarterly basis of scheduling. During the summer just closed, the Institute of Technology and the Law School, chiefly, used the quarterly schedule and other colleges generally operated their courses in two terms. Dean Teeter requested a decision on a common scheduling procedure. When it developed that various interests are to be taken into account in any common schedule, it was moved, seconded, and ordered that the President appoint a committee to obtain the facts and to report on this matter to the Administrative Committee. That Committee was named as Dean Teeter, Chairman, Comptroller Lunden, Dean Peik, and Dean Summers.

16. *Report of the Senate Committee on Intercollegiate Athletics*—As a result of recommendations made by a staff committee in physical education and athletics, the President has had a report from the Senate Committee on Intercollegiate Athletics dealing with problems of the Big Nine Conference. That report, as of June 29, 1948, was passed on to the Administrative Committee for study. It is to become the basis for discussion at an early meeting of the Administrative Committee.

17. *Financial Supervision of Student Organizations*—The Administrative Committee met in special session October 20, 1948, for the purpose of conducting a review of the University's policy on financial supervision of student organizations, including fraternities and sororities. This was the result of a request from the Senate Committee on Student Affairs, based on its resolution of October 5, 1948, that the President of the University conduct such a review, with opportunity given to Alpha Chi Sigma and Kappa Eta Kappa to present their views concerning the policy.

In summarizing the general situation, President Morrill pointed out these facts to the Administrative Committee:

- (a) The President solicits the judgment of the Administrative Committee.
- (b) The President previously effected a review of the financial supervision of student organizations. The outcome was reported by him on May 28, 1948, based on findings under date of May 18, 1948. In general, the outcome was a reaffirmation of the wisdom of the policy and a recommendation that it be enforced.
- (c) The Administrative Committee acts ad interim for the Senate on various matters.
- (d) The regulations challenged are those of the Senate, and at least certain phases of the policy questioned are those of the Committee on Student Affairs which acts for the Senate.
- (e) The President requests a fair and logical hearing before the group. He asks for a perfectly disinterested, de novo, review of the entire matter without any obligation on the part of the Committee to support his previous action.

Dean Williamson presented a general background statement on behalf of the Office of the Dean of Students. He outlined (a) the development of policy and programs designed to prevent disruptive disorders, and (b) the growth of positive educational programs through favorable relationships between student organizations and the University. In conclusion he pointed out that:

- (a) Various undesirable characteristics in student organizations are coordinate with poor finances.
- (b) Continuous work with student groups is necessary for the avoidance of unfavorable publicity.
- (c) The isolationist point of view of fraternal groups toward campus life is an inevitable tendency which has to be offset.
- (d) There is need for frequent conferences by staff members of the Office of the Dean of Students with organizations on all of the problems which they encounter.
- (e) It is apparent, he thinks, that resident counselors (graduate students) are needed to develop positive programs.

Additionally, he introduced much other evidence, largely written, related to the interview.

Dean Marcia Edwards commented on the period in which she has observed objection to financial audits. She made the point that financial supervision was, she thought, just one factor in the objection raised, that students and faculty members of the Student Affairs Committee have repeatedly supported continuous financial control without exception for any student organization. Dean Schmitz discussed the attitude of the Committee, which he has observed through the years to be one of constructive approach and assistance to student organization.

Dean Pirsig emphasized his interest from the standpoint of University service to the student. He made it clear that the University must be continuously assured of the stability of each organization and that the cost of obtaining such assurance is trivial in view of the joint benefits from it. It was brought out in the incidental discussion that the Regents have taken explicit cognizance of the finances of student organizations.

On a question put to the representatives of the fraternities as to how they should like to present their case, it was asked that they be represented by their counsel, Mr. Ben Palmer. After recounting how he was brought into the picture, Mr. Palmer presented a brief which is filed supplement to the minutes.

On questions from the Committee, Mr. Palmer stated that he and his clients did not question the power of the Regents or their authority to require advisory counseling. He did think that the differences should be resolved and that a shift of certain costs would be desirable. The Committee heard figures from the Office of Student Activities on the costs and requirements of the audit. In the course of that discussion, Mr. Palmer withdrew the proposal of his brief which dealt with annual audits, since no such audits are required by the University.

Various student and faculty representatives spoke, largely reiterating what had been said or presenting views of student groups. The consensus of student opinion was that objection to audits has now largely subsided.

In executive session the Administrative Committee took action as expressed by the following resolution, duly voted:

*Resolved*, That the Administrative Committee of the Senate reaffirms the University policy of financial supervision of student organizations, including fraternities and sororities, under the rules and regulations of the Senate Committee on Student Affairs.

## Reported for Action

1. The following basketball schedule for 1948-49 is submitted for approval:

2. The Western Conference at its September 12, 1948 meeting, revised its Regulations XIV, XV, and XVI, governing the recruitment of athletes. At its meeting of November 8, 1948, your Committee voted to approve the revision. These regulations as revised read as follows:

## GEN. REG. XIV. RECRUITING

This Conference strongly affirms that (a) intercollegiate athletic teams should be truly representative of their student bodies, and (b) prospective students should elect the schools which they shall attend primarily for educational reasons. Therefore, the following agreements and regulations with respect to recruiting shall govern each member institution.

1. *Actions Not Permitted.* Employees or representatives of any athletic department, or, general field secretaries of any alumni association of this Conference shall not

(a) in any manner, take the initiative in approaching a prospective student for the purpose of persuading him to attend their institution because of his expected participation in athletics, and therefore, the uses of banquets or group meetings as occasions to solicit athletes is not permitted;

(b) pay for travel, other than local, of prospective students;

(c) offer or promise, to prospective students, scholarships, loans or remissions of tuition;

(d) try out prospective students to learn their athletic capabilities;

(e) delegate to any other person permission to act in behalf of the athletic department in offering a job or help in getting employment to prospective students.

2. *Actions Permitted.* Employees or representatives of any athletic department, or, general or field secretaries of any alumni association of this Conference may

(a) suggest to alumni or other friends that prospective students open correspondence or communicate with representatives of their institution;

(b) answer correspondence initiated by prospective students;

(c) approach prospective students at a regularly publicized meeting which has not been scheduled for the purpose of making such an approach;

(d) interview prospective students who visit the campus upon their own initiative; and furnish entertainment not in excess of ordinary meals and one night's lodging;

(e) offer assistance in securing employment, if prospective students request such help.

## GEN. REG. XV. ADMINISTRATIVE REPORTS

Each member of this Conference shall send to the office of the Commissioner copies of the transcripts of athletes who are receiving scholarships, remissions of tuition, awards, prizes or other types of unearned financial aid. Each member also will send copies of the transcripts of freshman numeral winners who are receiving unearned financial aid.

Each member of this Conference shall submit each year a record of the jobs held and assistance given to athletes who have been on the eligibility lists, and to freshmen or others on the numeral lists.

Members of the Conference shall not make public any information or rumors regarding alleged violations of Conference rules, regulations and agreements; members of the Conference athletic staffs shall communicate such information only to their own Directors, whom may, at their discretion, report it to the Commissioner.

## GEN. REG. XVI. PENALTIES

1. *Procedures.* Each Conference member has primary responsibilities for the enforcement of Conference regulations and agreements in its own institution. Enforcement at the institutional level is at once the most effective and most desirable control. If, however, violations by any member of the Conference regulations and agreements upon recruiting or subsidizing are alleged, the following procedures shall be followed.

*Violations by Institutions or Their Staff Members*

(a) The Commissioner shall make an investigation of the alleged violation.

(b) If, in the judgment of the Commissioner, the evidence indicates guilt, he shall present his findings to the Athletic Directors of the Conference.

(c) The institution, or the person, against whom the charges have been made, shall be given full opportunity to present an explanation.

(d) If, after a full hearing the Directors vote that a violation has occurred, the Directors may apply one or more of the penalties described below.

*Violations Involving Eligibility of Students*

(a) The Commissioner shall report all information pertinent to the alleged violation to the Faculty Representatives.

(b) If, after a full hearing, the Faculty Representatives vote that a violation has occurred, the Representatives shall declare the student(s) ineligible and determine the conditions of their reinstatement to eligibility.

(c) When information in the hands of the Commissioner strongly indicates ineligibility on the part of any student because of violation of the rules and regulations governing recruiting and financial aids, though direct proof of such ineligibility may be lacking, the Commissioner may require that such student be withheld from the eligibility list until evidence is presented that the student is eligible.

2. *Penalties.* The following penalties relate to the above procedures.

*Against Institutions and Their Staff Members*

(a) The offending institution or staff members shall be officially reprimanded by the Commissioner and warned against repetition of the offense.

(b) The staff member shall be denied the privilege of contact with prospective students.

(c) In case of repeated violations, the institution shall be denied the privilege or right of scheduling games with other Conference members in the sport or sports in which the violation(s) occur.

(d) In case of flagrant violations, clearly established, the Directors shall recommend to the Faculty Representatives that members of the Conference sever athletic relations with the offending institution.

*Against Students*

(a) If a student does not comply with the eligibility rules of the Conference, he is not eligible.

(b) If a student receives illegal aid, he shall be deprived of one year of intercollegiate competition for each year or fraction thereof during which he received the illegal aid. The period of ineligibility shall commence with the first year in which the student normally would have been permitted to compete. (See Rule No. 6, Sec. 5(f).)

## VII. REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON NECROLOGY

ANTHONY ZELENY

1870-1947

Anthony Zeleny, Professor Emeritus of Physics, died on December 15, 1947.

He was born April 20, 1870 near Racine, Wisconsin. His parents moved to Minnesota a few years later, and Anthony spent the remainder of his life in this state. His education was begun in a country school some two miles distance from home, and it is easy to suppose that his later great interest in the cultivation of native Minnesota wild flowers rose from his early observations on walks to and from school through brush and virgin timber. At the age of 18 he entered the University of Minnesota and obtained his Bachelor of Science degree in 1892 and his Master's degree one year later. The degree of Doctor of Philosophy was conferred upon him in 1907. During the year 1900 he studied in Chicago, and two years later at Göttingen. The academic year 1915-16 was spent at Princeton University.

Dr. Zeleny advanced to the various academic ranks from instructor to professor. His specialty was electricity and magnetism. He was the author of a widely known text on this subject. He was also the inventor of the electrical thermometer known as the Zeleny System and which now is used in determining the condition of stored grain and other materials. He took an active interest in the affairs of the community and neighborhood and was a friend to all. His interests in his students extended beyond the classroom and was not restricted to the teaching of science. Many a student has remarked in later years on some of his comments in the classroom which Dr. Zeleny himself termed "sermonettes." In many ways he was a crusader for that which he was sure was the best for mankind, and no ridicule or denunciation could deter him from his purposes.

Dr. Zeleny reached the age of retirement in 1938, and since that time he remained in Minneapolis doing some writing and devoting his time to his hobby of cultivating flowers.

He is survived by his wife, Mattie Day Zeleny, and two sons, Leslie and Lawrence.

Henry Van Dyke has summarized man's task in life with the words, "To keep the honor of a certain aim, amid the perils of an uncertain way." These words characterize the activities of Anthony Zeleny who set his course with certainty, courage, integrity, and devotion.

## JENNINGS CRAWFORD LITZENBERG

1870-1948

Dr. Jennings Crawford Litzenberg, Professor Emeritus of Obstetrics and Gynecology, died suddenly on August 15, 1948.

He was born in Waubeck, Iowa, on April 6, 1870. He received his Bachelor's degree at the University of Minnesota in 1894 and completed his medical course in 1899. Equipped by extensive studies abroad, he was an instructor in the University from 1901 to 1907, assistant professor until 1910, and associate professor until 1914. In 1914 he became professor and chairman of the Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology. After twenty-four years in this capacity he became professor emeritus in 1938. His career was especially noteworthy because of the number of obstetricians whom he trained and the marked reduction of mortality in maternity cases throughout the Northwest which resulted from his work.

He received many professional honors, among them a fellowship and the presidency of the American Gynecological Society as well as the presidency of the American Association of Obstetricians and Gynecologists and Abdominal Surgeons. In the American Medical Association he was at one time chairman of the section on gynecology and abdominal surgery. In 1932 he was president of the Minnesota Academy of Medicine.

He is survived by his wife, Dr. Olga Hanson, his daughter, Mrs. Avis L. Chase, and his son, Dr. Karl Litzenberg of the University of Wisconsin. A wide circle of professional and personal friends cherish his memory.
