VII. REPORT OF THE ADMINISTRATIVE COMMITTEE

Reported for Information

1. *The Legislative Situation and the 1959-60 Budget.* On May 27, 1959, the President discussed the budgetary outlook, insofar as that was possible at the time, and for this purpose he had invited the chairman and the secretary of the Faculty Consultative Committee to be present with the Administrative Committee. He reported letters from the Faculty Consultative Committee and from the president of the local chapter of the AAUP and indicated how he had responded. He went on to say that he would consult as fully as possible with both the Administrative Committee and the Consultative Committee, considering the unprecedented shortness of time which would be involved in preparation of the next budget. To be sure, those Committees and the Regents had participated in the formulation of the legislative request and as of the time of the Committee meeting only the most general possibilities of budgeting could be considered, since action had not then been taken on any of the University's legislative bills.

Despite the many different means used to present the work load of the University, and not withstanding the major extent to which the impending increases in costs are unrelated to enrollment, student numbers still remained, the President said, an important factor in legislative understanding. Failure of the University to realize the expected enrollments in the current biennium had necessarily worked against our case, as would failure to realize the 28,150 student estimate for next fall. (By Summer, 1959, the forecast was 27,000 students.)

Retrenchment suggesting that of the 1951-53 biennium seemed to be indicated by the attitude and resources of the current Legislature. Even with substantially greater legislative grants for next biennium, as compared with the current resources, the University would face inescapably higher costs in its current program. Among these will be those of salary adjustments, OASI and SERA contributions, the custodial, maintenance, and power costs of new buildings, and numerous smaller items such as increased charges for postage, telephone service, and the like. Disregarding certain newly increased rates and after imposing on the physical plant such delay of repairs and maintenance as will result in deterioration and perhaps greater ultimate costs, payroll retrenchment seemed to be inevitable.

No formulation of the retrenchment could be made at the time. It appeared probable that the uncertainties as to where the loads will fall next academic year suggested that reversion of funds may be called for in the autumn of 1959. The President hoped to discuss the general principles of the budget in the June 13 meeting of the Regents. On a motion which was duly seconded and passed unanimously, it was voted to express confidence and appreciation to the President and his associates in the legislative negotiations.

2. *Tentative Budgetary Plans for 1959-60.* The President convened a special meeting of the Administrative Committee on June 23, 1959, to discuss budget. There was, he said, still uncertainty concerning the status of University support but some tentative approach to drawing up a maintenance budget seemed to be necessary. He announced that he had asked the Faculty Consultative Committee to meet with him during the afternoon of the same day and that he would discuss with that committee the recommendation on budget which might be made to the Regents.

The major problems to be dealt with, almost independent of the detail of the final legislative enactment, appeared to be (a) the management of necessary retrenchment and (b) the allocation of academic salary increases. There was extensive discussion of both of these matters. On academic salaries, the discussion centered around allocation of increases between general ones and those based on individual merit. Although sentiment was expressed for holding the across-the-board increases to less than one-half of the mandated over-all salary improvement, it was finally moved, seconded, and voted to recommend that approximately 4 per cent minimum salary increases be projected, leaving the balance of salary adjustment funds for merit increases.

With respect to retrenchment, the President suggested three possibilities. One plan could be based on return (saving) of a percentage of the payroll of each college or administrative unit. Another might involve action related to anticipated enrollments and teaching loads expressed, for example on some student credit hour basis. A third could necessitate drastic temporary or permanent curtailment of selected University activities.

After extensive discussion of possible retrenchment procedures, it was taken by common consent that a return of funds based on a small percentage of payroll was the most acceptable method. There was placed into the hands of each dean or director a tentative prospectus of possible income and expense items for 1959-60 and this was studied and discussed. It was clear that the tuition increases called for, and other deterrents to student attendance, as well as uncertain, curtailed support allotments, would result in loss of expected income. After the enrollment and revenue out-

comes are known, in the fall of 1959, there will surely be need for further adjustment and retrenchment. The President will hold no discretionary fund for allotment.

The University may be forced to consider abolition of units or reduction of particular costs as it comes to the making of a 1960-61 budget.

After further discussion during which a variety of questions were asked and answered, it was voted without dissent that the Administrative Committee give approval to the pattern of the budget.

3. *Council of Ten Recommendations on Employment Offers.* The Council of Ten, an association of the presidents of the Big Ten Universities, has been meeting for years. Recently, to foster closer relationships, the group appointed a Committee on Institutional Co-operation and included representation from the University of Chicago. Mr. Wenberg represents President Morrill on this committee.

President Morrill presented a resolution recommended by the committee and voted by the Council of Ten at its meeting of April 27, 1959. This dealt with the giving of satisfactory notice to the administrative head of a college, school, or institute if a full-time academic staff member of that unit is to be employed by another college, school, or institute at the assistant professor level or above, after June 1 of the year in which the appointment is to take effect.

It was pointed out that the resolution is intended as a gentlemen's agreement, not with the idea of enforcement, but in the belief that it may be helpful and that it should encourage co-operation on staff matters. It was moved, seconded, and voted that the resolution be adopted and there was the understanding that the deans will provide notice of this action in their colleges, as they deem best.

4. *Honors Committee Recommendations.* A mail vote was taken on recommendations of the Committee on University Honors for the granting of certain Outstanding Achievement Awards and Alumni Service Awards. Twenty-eight responses were received from the Administrative Committee by the President's office, all favorable; consequently the recommendations were fully sustained as of May 27, 1959. There were before the Administrative Committee, May 27, 1959, additional recommendations from the Committee on University Honors. These involved the granting of four Outstanding Achievement Awards and the naming of certain buildings. On motion, made and seconded, it was voted to recommend the awards. The buildings for which names were proposed were the architecture-engineering overflow building on the Minneapolis Campus and the newly enlarged home economics building and the dairy industries building, both on the St. Paul Campus. It was voted to approve and recommend to the Regents that the buildings be named as proposed by the Honors Committee.

5. *Motion on Behalf of Vice President Middlebrook.* Dean Kozelka said that in the course of being present in groups honoring Vice President and Mrs. Middlebrook on the occasion of Mr. Middlebrook's retirement, he had sensed the desire of members of the Administrative Committee to do something on their own account. A suggestion of this to the membership had brought complete response to providing a suitable farewell gift. He furthermore moved that the Administrative Committee be on record as expressing to Mr. Middlebrook on the occasion of his retirement its sincere appreciation of his efforts and its genuine affection for him. The motion was seconded and passed by unanimous standing vote. Mr. Middlebrook responded briefly and informally.

6. *Revision of the System of Medical Excuses for Students.* Since 1928 the University Health Service has been involved in the issuance of excuses for students absent from class on account of illness for more than 1 day at any single time. Changes in conditions, plus experience with the system, suggested that the work could be reduced and the intended purposes served if the issuance of routine excuses were discontinued for short periods of absence or in the cases of students seen in the out-patient clinics of the Health Service under conditions indicating no prolonged absence from class. Both Vice President Willey and Dr. Boynton discussed the memorandum which proposed the following procedure for handling of student excuses.

- a. As is the present custom, the dean of each college will be sent the names of all students confined to the Health Service Hospital, stating the days on which each student was hospitalized.
- b. If a student is ill though not hospitalized and will apparently miss several days of school work, the dean of the college will be informed of this fact.
- c. No statements will be sent to the deans of the colleges for students who are seen in the out-patient clinics of the Health Service unless prolonged absence is anticipated. Decision as to whether an absence will be excused will be the responsibility of the instructor and the dean of the college.
- d. When an instructor is concerned about a particular student who has had frequent absences which the student reports as due to illness, the instructor may call the Health Service for a conference on the student's health. Although a diagnosis may not be given, an appraisal of need for medical services can be discussed with the Health Service physician.

It was asked if the representatives of student government had been canvassed on this proposal, inasmuch as the new procedure is obviously of concern to students and no doubt to the Office of the Dean of Students. There was the suggestion that the student governing body should be advised of any action taken by the Administrative Committee before an announcement would be made in the *Daily* or otherwise. One dean asked if item "C" in the proposal would result in instructors and college offices calling the Health Service to find out if students were ill or confined there. The director of the Health Service assured the committee that information of this nature would be available on request.

It was voted to approve the recommendations of the Health Service with the stipulations discussed and with the understanding that Vice President Willey will implement them, as may be necessary.

VIII. REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON INTERCOLLEGIATE ATHLETICS

1. Reported for Action

Conference Legislation Subject to the White Resolution Procedure. At the meetings of the Conference on May 21-22, 1959, the following action was taken under the White Resolution Procedure by which, if any Conference institution objects and gives notice thereof within a specified time, the matter must be reconsidered and voted upon again at the next Conference meeting.

It was voted to amend Eligibility Rule 4 to read: "No student having participated as a member of any varsity college athletic team during any semester or quarter and not having continued in residence through that period shall again become eligible until he shall have been in attendance one calendar year."

Before this amendment of Rule 4 the required period of attendance to regain eligibility was 6 months.

Recommendation: That no objection be filed.

2. Reported for Information

1. *Actions by the Conference pertaining to which this Senate had filed objection* (Minutes, year 1958-59, page 69). A motion to reaffirm authorization of an agreement for participation in the Rose Bowl game after January 1, 1960 failed through a 5 to 5 vote. A subsequent motion to rescind the last sentence of Regulation II-1 ("Post-season competition in all sports is prohibited. Seasons in all sports, unless otherwise limited in these Regulations, shall close with the N.C.A.A. championship meet in each sport. Nothing herein shall apply to the Rose Bowl game") failed through a 5 to 5 vote.

X. NECROLOGY

ELMER WALTER JOHNSON
1892-1959

Elmer Walter Johnson, professor and assistant dean in the Institute of Technology, died at his desk of heart failure on September 20, 1959.

He was born in Minneapolis on January 11, 1892. When he was 5 years old, his family moved to Staples, Minnesota, where he attended public schools. In 1914 he received the B.S. degree from the University of Minnesota. This was followed by the E.E. degree in 1915 and by the M.E. degree in 1923. He also attended the University of Sorbonne in Paris while stationed there as a member of the U. S. armed forces in World War I.

His activities were predominantly in the educational field, which he entered in 1921, as instructor at the University of Minnesota. Previously he had been employed by Westinghouse Electric and Manufacturing Company, Northern States Power Company, United States Army—33rd Engineers, and the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul Railway. As a registered Professional Electrical Engineer, Dean Johnson continued consulting work during most of his life. At the University of Minnesota he advanced through the positions of assistant professor, associate professor, professor, and, in 1944, assistant dean.

He served on many University committees, such as the Veterans' Committee, R.O.T.C. and Military Affairs Committees, and the Committee on Institutional Relationships. He was closely associated with various student groups in an advisory capacity, and especially active for many years in Plumb Bob, the leadership and service honor society of the Institute of Technology, and the Technical Commission, the student governing body of the Institute.

Dean Johnson always had a sympathetic understanding of college students and also younger boys. He worked with the Boy Scouts and served as senior adviser for Alpha Phi Omega, the scouting service fraternity at the University of Minnesota, for many years.

An important member of Mayflower Congregational Church, he was a truly righteous leader and teacher in his church and in the University.

He was co-author of two textbooks, *Alternating Current Machinery* and *Alternating Current Circuits*, and several articles in scientific journals.

Surviving Dean Johnson are his wife Matilda, his son Douglas of Simsbury, Connecticut, and three grand-daughters.

RUTH V. JOHNSTON
1907-1959

Ruth V. Johnston, professor in the School of Nursing, died April 20, 1959 at the height of her career, serving on the faculty of the University of Minnesota for 15 years.

Miss Johnston was born September 7, 1907 in Hopkinton, Iowa. She received her Bachelor's degree from the State University of Iowa. She later attended the University of Minnesota, where she received a Master's degree in 1940 and a doctor or philosophy degree in educational psychology in 1952.

From 1943-46 she was a counselor in the University Student Counseling Bureau. From 1946-47 Miss Johnston was the first director of the Minnesota Nurses' Association Professional Counseling and Placement Service. Under her leadership this Service was initiated and developed into a strong state program with several local units.

In 1947 Miss Johnston was appointed assistant professor and counselor in the University of Minnesota School of Nursing. In 1958 she was made a full professor. She was a member of Pi Lambda Theta, honorary educational society; Psi Chi, honorary psychological society; Sigma Theta Tau, national nursing scholarship society; the National and Minnesota Leagues for Nursing; the American Association of University Professors; she served also as a fellow in the American Psychological Association. Her name appears in the 1959 edition of *Who's Who of American Women*. She was author of several articles and of a textbook, *Personnel Program Guide for Schools of Nursing*, published in 1958.

The memorial services for Miss Johnston were officiated by Rev. Keith Irwin and Rev. Robert W. MacGregor at the Andrew Presbyterian Church, Minneapolis.

Her personal life was one of dauntless courage and an inspiration to all who knew her. She had the faculty of bringing forward the best in people with whom she associated.

Many letters and memorial gifts in her memory further indicate the far reaching influence and genuine help given by her. One letter in particular from Dean Walter W. Cook, addressed to the director of the School of Nursing, showed the respect and assistance Ruth Johnston gave. "All of us in the College of Education join with you and your faculty in deep regret at the loss of Professor Ruth Johnston. Not only did she make a top contribution professionally, but in addition she had an extraordinary combination of kindness and objectivity in her relations with others which increased her effectiveness for beyond that of ordinary people. We were proud that she held her doctorate from the University of Minnesota with a major in our field."

Surviving are two sisters and a brother, Mrs. C. R. Fehlman, Mrs. E. N. McIlrath, and Walter G. Johnston.

ELMER EDGAR STOLL

1874-1959

Elmer Edgar Stoll, professor of English emeritus, died Sunday morning, May 24, 1959, at the Abbott Hospital in Minneapolis, after a month's illness.

Professor Stoll, son of Joseph Henry and Belle Stoll, was born in Orrville, Ohio, February 11, 1874. He was graduated A.B. in 1893 from the College of Wooster; A.B. 1895 and A.M. 1896 from Harvard University; studied at the University of Berlin in 1902; received his Ph.D. from the University of Munich in 1904; and was awarded the honorary degrees of Litt.D. by Yale University in 1941 and L.H.D. by the University of Minnesota in 1950. On July 16, 1902, he married Harriet Coe Agerter, who died in February, 1955. He began his professional career as an instructor of English at Adelphi College, Brooklyn, where he taught from 1900 to 1902. He was an instructor in English in Harvard College 1905-1906; assistant professor of English at Western Reserve University 1906-1912; and after 2 years devoted to research in the British Museum, 1912 to 1914, he came to the University of Minnesota as a professorial lecturer in 1914. He was appointed professor of English in 1915, and retired in June of 1942. He was the incumbent of a visiting lectureship at each of three other universities: Toronto, Wellesley, and Johns Hopkins.

His more important publications were *Shakespeare Studies*, 1927; *Poets and Playwrights*, 1930; *Art and Artifice in Shakespeare*, 1933; *Shakespeare's Young Lovers*, 1937; *Shakespeare and Other Masters*, 1940; and *From Shakespeare to Joyce*, 1944.

The historical approach to Shakespeare, though already long understood in theory to be the only way to sound interpretation, emerged in Stoll's work, thanks to his encyclopedic learning and what one of the reviewers has called his "massive common sense," with the force of a new and revolutionary illumination. Stoll led a new school of criticism in exposing the fallacy of a whole series of ideas about Shakespeare's plays inherited by his contemporaries from the 19th century that had become handbook commonplaces. He demonstrated with an overwhelming wealth of evidence that the meaning of a Shakespeare play often turns on effects of the poetry as such and on highly artificial stage conventions, so that it can be radically mistaken by those critics who insist on interpreting the plays as if life on the stage were the same thing as life off stage and on reading the poetry as if all that counted in it were its prose meaning. His great lesson has been the essential simplicity of Shakespearean drama, in a day when the tendency of critics has been increasingly to suppose its depth to lie in psychological complexities and linguistic riddles.

Already on the appearance of *Shakespeare Studies* in 1927 Stoll was seen as one of the great Shakespeareans, not of his day only, but of the ages. Reviewing that book, Levin L. Schucking wrote (in the *Beiblatt zur Anglia*, xxxviii, 1927, p. 312) that "Der eindringende Scharfsinn der Betrachtungsweise, die Menge des aus allen Literaturen herausgezogenen Materials, die Vielheit und Neuheit der Gesichtspunkte sichern diesem Buch eine Stelle in der allerersten Reihe der Shakespeareliteratur." A. C. Sprague called Stoll "probably the greatest Shakespearean critic since Bradley" (*America*, January 27, 1934, p. 300); and it has been recognized as the measure of his stature that his approach to Shakespeare is nothing less than direct opposition to three giants: not only Bradley, but Coleridge and Goethe as well (G. W. Stonier, *The New Statesman and Nation*, June, 1944, p. 900).
