



OCLC Membership Report Released

OCLC recently released a new membership report called *Seeking Synchronicity: Revelations and Recommendations for Virtual Reference*. This membership report from OCLC Research suggests that by transforming virtual reference (VR) service encounters into relationship-building opportunities, librarians can better leverage the positive feelings people have for libraries. This is critically important in a crowded online space where the biggest players often don't have the unique experience and specific strengths offered by librarians. The report demonstrates that today's students, scholars and citizens are not just looking to libraries for answers to specific questions—they want partners and guides in a lifelong information-seeking journey.



Seeking Synchronicity: Revelations and Recommendations for Virtual Reference distills more than five years of virtual reference (VR) research into a readable summary featuring memorable quotes that vividly illustrate very specific and actionable suggestions. Taken from a multiphase research project that included focus group interviews, online surveys, transcript analysis and phone interviews, with VR librarians, users and non-users, these findings are meant to help practitioners develop and sustain VR services and systems. The report asserts that the "R" in "VR" needs to emphasize virtual "Relationships" as well as "Reference."

Among the topics addressed are:

- How convenience is the "hook" that draws users into VR services
- The exaggerated death of ready reference
- The importance of query clarification in VR
- Ways to boost accuracy and build better interpersonal relationships in VR
- What can be learned from VR transcripts
- Generational differences in how people perceive reference interactions and determine success
- The need for more and better marketing of a suite of services—a "multi-asking" approach

The report's two primary authors, Lynn Silipigni Connaway, Ph.D., OCLC Senior Research Scientist, and Marie L. Radford, Ph.D., Associate Professor, School of Communication & Information, Rutgers, the State University of New Jersey, said that the goal of their work together, which began in 2005, has been to deliver research-based recommendations that improve the VR services provided by information professionals. Connaway said:

"The purpose of this new publication is to showcase several years' and several hundred pages' worth of work with a few very specific, practical suggestions for sustaining and developing VR services and systems..."

The report from OCLC Research was completed in partnership with Rutgers, the State University of New Jersey, and additionally funded by the Institute of Library and Museum Services (IMLS).

Minitex RDA E-mail Discussion List Proposal and Survey

With a timeline now set for the expected adoption of Resource Description and Access (RDA) in early 2013, the Minitex BATS unit seeks your thoughts on establishing an e-mail discussion list on the new cataloging code.

Discussion lists such as AUTOCAT, OCLC-CAT, and RDA-L often acquire a large international audience. Topics are wide-ranging and, as is typically the case, a vocal minority dominates the conversation as the majority of subscribers lurk in the background. Our aims with the proposed Minitex RDA list are twofold:

1. to provide an open and more comfortable venue for two-way communication between colleagues on matters concerning RDA—preparation, implementation, rule interpretations, announcements.
2. To enable conversations among those library staff who, by and large, may not engage with others on discussion lists.

We intend to limit the subscriber-base to library staff and institutions in the Minitex region (chiefly Minnesota, North Dakota, and South Dakota). This smaller scope, we hope, promotes greater interaction among subscribers, many of whom know one another formally or informally. Moreover, discussion topics springing from this interaction are likely to be more pertinent to regional libraries due to their local origin.

We have set up a survey to gather feedback on this proposal. The responses will inform our decision on the implementation and management of such a list:



Resource Sharing

OCLC's Article Exchange

OCLC; edited

OCLC has developed Article Exchange, an experimental document-sharing site that provides a single, secure location where lending libraries can place requested PDF and TIFF documents, and library users can retrieve articles or book chapters obtained for them via interlibrary loan. Use of the site integrates with interlibrary workflows of libraries that use WorldCat Resource Sharing, ILLiad, WorldCat Navigator or other resource sharing services.

Highlights

- Eliminates file size and security issues often encountered when documents are transmitted through email. PDF and TIFF files of any size – including high resolution PDF documents – can be placed on the site for pick-up by library users.
- Automatic deletion of files supports compliance with copyright guidelines. Viewed files are deleted after 5 days and unviewed files are deleted after 30 days.
- Minimal local technical support is needed because the website requires no software download or special arrangements for access through a local firewall. The platform-independent site can be accessed from PCs, MACs or any operating system.

How it works

Borrowing libraries use the "Borrowing Notes" field of the request form to indicate their desire to retrieve a document from this site. **Lending** libraries scan documents and upload them to the site for retrieval by users. They have two ways to inform borrowing libraries of a document's availability:

- The site generates a unique tinyURL and password for each document. Cut and paste the tinyURL and password in the Lending Notes or Alert field of the request form and update the request status to SHIPPED.
- Use the email function within Article Exchange. When a lender uploads a file, the site generates a unique tinyURL and password for each document. An email button is also present so the lender can click on the email button, insert the borrower's email address and send the link and password directly to the borrower.

A file can be picked up a maximum of three times for each URL/password combination.

Recent Enhancements

OCLC has received many comments and suggestions about Article Exchange and incorporated them into the service since it was first launched in mid-July. Here's a brief list of those enhancements:

- More detailed and descriptive email message
- Increased view times from 3 to 5
- Requests that the word "Library" be used for the Username
- Removed the sensitivity of the password copy and paste function to handle accidental copy and pasting of leading and proceeding blank spaces.

This year the Upper Midwest CONTENTdm User Group will be meeting in person. Though we received great feedback for the all-virtual meeting in Nov. 2010, users noted that they missed the networking opportunities that an in-person meeting

provides. And, this year with the CONTENTdm 6.0/6.1 release, the planning group felt that providing in person training and other networking opportunities was more important than ever. We hope to provide a virtual component for those who cannot travel to attend in person.

Not planning to submit a proposal? The planning committee still wants to hear from you! The very first question on the form asks you to select the topics that interest you most. We'll use your feedback to seek out presenters that we know can address the topic. The deadline to submit a proposal and/or feedback is **August 26th**.

Suggested topics include, but are not limited to:

- CONTENTdm 6.0/6.1 (experience with version 6.0/6.1 new features, customizing the end user interface/website, upgrading on a shoestring budget-from a systems perspective)
- Creative Uses of CONTENTdm (using the CONTENTdm API, searching across multiple instances for consortia; customization on version 6; neat use of tools, maps, social media; anything outside the box)
- Exposing and Marketing Digital Collections (marketing digital collections within your institution and beyond, using the WorldCat Digital Collection Gateway)
- Content Types (maps, multi-page documents, video or audio, oral histories, government documents)
- Newspapers (scanning newspapers in-house, how to work with a vendor)
- Collection Management (creating new collections, editing existing collections, policies for taking collections offline)
- Metadata and Controlled Vocabulary (best practices for metadata, creating/editing metadata templates, retrospective implementation of new metadata standards, geographic metadata capture)
- Digital Archiving (backing up and archiving CONTENTdm images)
- Statistics
- Beginner User Topics (how to add and work with PDF files, working with compound objects, editing metadata, "how we did it" session)
