NISO Publication Now Open Access



NISO's first open access issue of *Information Standards Quarterly* (ISQ) is now on the NISO website at:

<http://www.niso.org/publications/isq/2011/v23no1>

The full issue as well as individual articles are available for free download in PDF format. Previously, Minitex and other NISO voting members received the publication as a benefit of membership, but it was decided that the publication should be made freely available.

- *ISQ* Winter 2011 is the annual Year in Review and State of the Standards issue. Karen Wetzel summarizes the 2010 work of NISO's active working groups and standing committees in our main feature article. This is followed by a review of the 2010 accomplishments of NISO's equivalent in the



international arena, ISO TC46 on Information and Documentation.

- Last year saw a surge in the implementations of the SUSHI protocol. Two of those implementers share their experiences: Omar Villa from Grupo Integra describes a SUSHI client implementation and Brinda Shah from H.W. Wilson represents the server side.
- Andrew Pace from OCLC, a long-time participant in NISO's work, explains why he is dedicated to standards and why you should be too.
- In the Spotlight section, Phil Norman and Jeff Young, also from OCLC, tell how the OpenURL maintenance agency is working to extend and promote the use of the OpenURL standard for new and innovative applications. Linda Beebe provides a member spotlight on her organization, the American Psychological Association, and how they use standards throughout their product lines.
- Three members of the NISO ESPReSSO working group—Heather Ruland Staines (Springer), Harry Kaplanian (Serials Solutions), and Kristine Ferry (University of California, Irvine)—provide a report on their development of a recommended practice for improving single sign-on authentication to licensed or protected content.
- The issue wraps up with the annual State of the Standards portfolio, listing all of NISO's published standards, recommended practices, and technical reports as well as the status of all the in-development work.

In the March *Minitex/OCLC Mailing*, we announced the new and improved OCLC Usage Statistics. This month's article will provide more details about the new features. The following text is an excerpt from OCLC's original announcement.

OCLC Usage Statistics make it easier to track your library's service usage and give you data for decision making. OCLC Usage Statistics help you plan for the future and provide an easy-to-use interface for understanding how people are using your OCLC services. Whether you are just discovering this tool, or have been using it for years to manage your OCLC activities, OCLC Usage Statistics offer several helpful, new features to explore.

New Assessment Tools tab

This new tool enables your library to evaluate your WorldCat holdings and ILL Lending and Borrowing activity. Within this tab are two new tools called the WorldCat Collection Dashboard and the ILL Reciprocity Report.


ILL Reciprocity Report

Use WorldCat Resource Sharing statistics to create reports of your library's borrowing and lending activity with libraries of your choice. These reports provide data

you can use to manage your interlibrary loan partnerships, such as reciprocal borrowing agreements.

WorldCat Collection Dashboard Report
Displays your unique and commonly held titles, percentage of holdings by format and number of titles by publication year. This report can be used as the starting point for updating your WorldCat holdings and to aid in your collection development decisions.

Library Technology Conference

When I attended the Library Technology Conference at Macalester College, March 16-17, I was particularly drawn to sessions on aspects of library instruction. In each the ultimate goal was to improve instruction for library patrons, but the information and techniques they covered could also be used in training library staff. Here are some highlights.

Built for Speed: Designing Media on a Deadline described the Agile Development Team approach to creating presentations. With it, design would be a true collective effort; a team would include IT staff as well as librarians but no divas. They would focus on the users' needs with the intention of using a simple design and always being flexible in response to feedback.

Meeting the Users Where They Are described web conferencing for reaching library patrons at a distance (in this case, in Montana) using Adobe Connect. This software offers features like chat, polls, file sharing, and Web page sharing to encourage attendee participation. The live camera view of the presenter is particularly popular. With so much going on, it's best to have two presenters: one to teach and one to monitor chat and handle any technical problems.

E-Learning: Tips, Tricks, and Tools of the Trade covered the benefits and drawbacks of online instruction plus planning and specific presentation tools. In comparison with face-to-face instruction, e-learning can potentially be available anytime and anywhere. The presentation can be created and recorded once, and then, then used many times. On the other hand, with e-learning it is difficult for the teacher and the students to really connect. It also requires more technical skill than fact-to-face instruction and the contents of a presentation are harder to update. In planning, it is essential to know your goals: who are we trying to reach and what do attendees need to come away knowing? You must also know what tools are needed. This session discussed three tools as examples:

- Jing (from TechSmith) is a tool for video and image capture. It offers effective user support and for that reason it's a good product for a beginner.
- Articulate (Adobe) enables you to add audio to PowerPoint one slide at a time.
- With Captivate (Adobe) you can capture screen shots like a camera and then edit slide by slide. It is highly customizable but hard to use making it more appropriate for experienced e-learning designers.

More Highlights

Minitex also offered a live webinar that highlighted some of the sessions from the conference entitled *2011 Library Technology Conference Highlights: Trends, Tips, and Tools*. Anne Hatinen (Minitex/CPERS) hosted and reviewed the keynote speaker from March 16, Siva Vaidhyathan, who just published the book *The Googlization of Everything and Why We Should Worry*; Carla Pfahl (Minitex/Reference) gave a summary of the session *My Life as a Cha Cha Guide: Are They Our Competition?*; Sara Ring (Minitex/BATS) summarized *Debunking the DCMA: DVDs and Digital Devices*; and Michael Berkowski (Minitex/Information Technology) spoke about and gave a short demonstration Prezi, a tool featured in the session *Prezi: Designing presentations that tell a story*. RDA Test Records Available for Download: Update

Over the past few weeks the U.S. RDA Test Coordinating Committee posted the last of the RDA test records to the Library of Congress' "RDA Test Record Downloads" webpage:

These final test records constitute what are called the Common Original Set and the Common Copy Set. Both sets are available in plain text format and in MARC21 format.

Each formal testing institution participating in the U.S. RDA Test last year was given the same set of 25 items to catalog. For each item, catalogers had to create original bibliographic records and, if applicable, authority records for each item two times over: first, following AACR2 instructions, and a second time following RDA. Since it was impossible for the Test Coordinating Committee to offer physical copies of these items to all the institutions, surrogates—mainly digital scans—of the items were produced. The Common Copy Set is a collection of five works and their respective bibliographic records. Catalogers had to copy catalog each work following RDA guidelines, approaching these records as if the new cataloging code had already been implemented at their respective institutions. Surrogates and instructions for this Copy Set are also available in the documents referenced above.

U.S. RDA Test Coordinating Committee Report News

Those following the development and testing of RDA may be aware that the end of March 2011 called for distribution of a report by the U.S. RDA Test Coordinating Committee on the economic and operational feasibility of implementing RDA. Judith Kuhagen, member of the Committee, recently posted a message to the RDA-L discussion list updating readers on where the Committee's work stands at present. ¹

The records and surveys submitted by formal and informal RDA testers are still being analyzed. (This delay is not surprising given that, by my count, there are 23,357 bibliographic and authority records to review in addition to the roughly 2850 cataloger surveys submitted for each of the records that make up the so-called Common Original and Common Copy Sets.) The end product of this analysis, the aforementioned report, will be submitted to the directors of the three U.S. national libraries—Library of Congress, National Library of Medicine, National Agricultural Library—on May 6. A decision by these directors on whether or not to adopt RDA will be made at some point in June. Kuhagen went on to add that "the report for the public will be released before the 2011 ALA Annual Meeting (June 23-28)." ■

OCLC will soon release a new print edition of the Dewey Decimal Classification, DDC 23. The new edition includes several major changes held for simultaneous publication in the print and Web versions of the DDC plus many interim updates already distributed to users in WebDewey 2.0.

The DDC print edition is scheduled for delivery in May. OCLC is now accepting pre-orders for DDC 23. Order by July 1 to receive a 10% discount on DDC 23. There is a minimal price increase for DDC 23.

- Numbers informed by interaction with the worldwide community of Dewey users
- A complete overhaul to the representation of groups of people
- Revisions to several standard subdivisions

CONTENTdm 6 Released

CONTENTdm 6, the latest version of OCLC's CONTENTdm Digital Collection Management software, was released in early March. This release offers a complete redesign for the end-user experience along with new website configuration tools that enable digital collection administrators to easily customize their collections websites without programming expertise. CONTENTdm now offers new customization options, new architecture and improvements for search engine optimization.

Created with a user-centered design approach, the new CONTENTdm is the result of extensive usability testing. OCLC incorporated the feedback from these usability studies—along with CONTENTdm user community input, security and performance considerations, and a secondary design goal of ease of customization—to create a more intuitive experience for end users and tools that enable digital collection administrators to quickly customize their collections websites.

The new CONTENTdm website has consistently passed usability tests with 97 percent of end users able to accomplish their tasks. Improved usability leads to greater use and participation in libraries' digital collections. The new end-user interface offers simpler access to digital items, easier navigation paths, dynamic interaction with digital items, and multiple avenues for discovery. It also offers end users more functionality, including the ability to share digital items (via e-mail, Facebook, Twitter, Flickr and many more), an enhanced image viewer for zooming and panning, and viewing images in full screen, as well as features that support discoverability such as QuickView, Advanced Search, Suggested Topics, Facets, breadcrumbs and RSS feeds.

The new Website Configuration Tool enables CONTENTdm digital collection administrators to tailor the appearance and behavior of their collections. With the new tool, administrators have the ability to create a branded look and feel for their websites, without programming skills or Web developer resources. Administrators can customize colors and styles or upload logos, as well as preview their website before publishing any changes, using the toolset. Additionally, all customizations persist through future software updates.

Other CONTENTdm enhancements include improved Search Engine Optimization, updated Controlled Vocabularies and many more. It also includes a new feature that makes metadata creation more efficient by automatically extracting embedded image metadata.

Now, EXIF and IPTC metadata embedded in JPEG and TIFF images can be automatically extracted and then mapped to Dublin Core or Qualified Dublin Core fields.

"This new CONTENTdm version serves as the foundation on which we will build more advanced functionality in the future. OCLC plans to follow this release with more enhancements later this year that will include social features such as commenting, tagging and rating; additional configuration tools and even more customization options,"

said Claire Cocco, Director, OCLC Digital Collection Services. ■

Homer Calkin Slides Digital Collection

This collection features a portion of the more than 15,000 color slides taken by former U.S. Department of State Deputy Director Homer L. Calkin (1912-1995). Images taken from 1948 to 1983 by this distinguished University of Iowa alum show historic and tourist sites in New England, Canada, Europe, and Asia. Slides Calkin left unlabeled have been identified as specifically as possible using Calkin's appointment books and diaries as well as online resources.

Evolutionary Biology Digital Dissection Collection

The BIO200 digital dissection project serves the illustrative and narrative needs of the students in the University at Buffalo Evolutionary Biology course. The materials were created to supplement the peer-learning system in place and to offer opportunities for unlimited interactive engagement with the laboratory content. The Project team planned and produced a digital image "narrative"

for each of the sixteen animals illustrated in this digital collection. The collection includes multiple, fully labeled external and internal views and details of each animal. The BIO200 course site was developed collaboratively by a Clyde F. Herreid, SUNY Distinguished Teaching Professor at the University at Buffalo; University librarians; graduate student assistants and IT staff.

KMOX Popular Sheet Music

This digital sheet music collection contains popular titles in the public domain dating from the early 20th Century. It is a subset of the complete KMOX Music Collection at Lovejoy Library, Southern Illinois University Edwardsville. The parent collection consists of the performing music library—original and stock arrangements—compiled by the St. Louis radio station KMOX, a CBS affiliate, when the station maintained a live studio orchestra.

Doc Roach Fire Collection

Spectacular fires, historic firefighting equipment, and Boise city streetscapes are among the images preserved in the William F. "Doc" Roach digital collection at Boise State University. A Boise city firefighter for more than 50 years, Doc Roach was not a photographer himself, but rather a collector, especially in the latter years of his career when he was a fire marshal and fire prevention captain. This digital collection, which features images from 1904 to 1965, is drawn primarily from Doc Roach's photograph collection and is supplemented by related images from other collections in Boise State University Library Special Collections. ■
