ATTENTION MN, ND, AND SD LIBRARIES

You may have seen the OCLC announcements about two “quick start” options for libraries:

- CONTENTdm Quick Start
- WorldCat Local Quick Start

Did you know that most libraries and schools in Minnesota, North Dakota, and South Dakota qualify for both of these options because of the Minitex group subscription to the OCLC FirstSearch Base Package, which includes WorldCat? While these services are available at no charge, there may be significant staff time and other resources needed to implement these project-type options.

CONTENTdm Quick Start

OCLC’s CONTENTdm Digital Collection Management Software can make everything in your digital collections available to everyone, everywhere. No matter the format -- local history archives, newspapers, books, maps, slide libraries or audio/video -- CONTENTdm can handle the storage, management and delivery of your collections to users across the Web.

As a FirstSearch Base Package subscriber, many libraries in the Minitex region are eligible to receive:

- The CONTENTdm software hosted by OCLC
- Three Project Clients for building digital collections
- 10GB of storage for up to 3,000 digital items

OCLC has created training modules and provided resource information and the form to activate your CONTENTdm “quick start” hosted instance.

WorldCat Local Quick Start

WorldCat Local “quick start” provides a single search result that delivers your library’s resources and those of other WorldCat libraries. WorldCat Local “quick start” offers libraries:

- Display of a local library’s holdings first in search results, followed by the holdings of other WorldCat libraries
- Local branding of a WorldCat search box, URL and user interface
- Links to an existing OpenURL resolver for access from the over 58 million article citations in WorldCat.org to the online full text to which libraries subscribe
- Integration of existing OCLC delivery/interlibrary loan services (WorldCat Resource Sharing, ILLiad)
- Interoperability with a single local library catalog for real-time item availability information and place holds
- Access to the same social networking tools available on WorldCat.org

WorldCat Local provides libraries with the following additional functionality:

- Group-level searching
- Interoperability with a second integrated library system (ILS)
- Additional integration of your library’s print, electronic and digital materials

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Please note: Availability of interoperability features will vary by ILS. Interoperability is available now for most libraries with the following integrated library systems and methods: Ex Libris Aleph (Z39.50), Ex Libris Voyager, SirsiDynix Horizon, SirsiDynix Unicorn and Symphony, Innovative Interfaces Millennium and INNOPAC.

Libraries with other Web-accessible ILSs can now benefit from features, such as local branding, ranked search results and links to existing services. Expanded access to real-time availability interoperability will be added in phases, beginning with a prominent link to library catalogs later in 2009 and a method for libraries to create their own interoperability with WorldCat in 2010.

GENERAL

FALL CONFERENCE WRAP UP

Staff from the Bibliographic and Technical Services Unit presented programs and attended fall conferences in South Dakota, North Dakota, and Minnesota. What follows is a summary of some of the interesting session we attended.

North Dakota Library Association Annual Conference, Sept. 23-26, Dickinson, ND

Five Minitex staff members (Bill DeJohn, Anne Hatinen, Dave Paulson, Sara Ring, and I) attended the North Dakota Library Association's Annual Conference. The weather was unseasonably warm and traveling went smoothly.

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We were out in the open spaces of western North Dakota where you can often see many miles in any direction. Bill DeJohn and I gave a Minitex and OCLC Update. I also attended four other sessions. *Theodore Roosevelt Digital Library: Making History* described the Theodore Roosevelt Center's project to digitize the papers of the 26th President. *Evolution Fact and Theory: Examining the Changing Face of Life* sought to dispel misconceptions about Darwin's ideas. *Web-based Library Automation* was a presentation of Book System, Inc.'s Web-based library software.

My favorite, the Intellectual Freedom Panel, was a lively, well-attended discussion of censorship in libraries and academia. Another highlight was the reception at the Dickinson Public Library. The renovated fireplace and beautiful tin ceiling in the oldest part of the building were particularly impressive.

I co-presented at the session *Creating Digital Projects Using CONTENTdm*, along with Rachel White from the State Historical Society of North Dakota. While my talk focused on the software CONTENTdm and how to use it to store and provide access to digital content, Rachel White spoke about a digital collaborative to which they belong,

Digital Horizons. She also spoke about a pilot project that the State Historical Society was involved in over the summer of 2009. With a grant, they hired library school students to visit a number of local historical societies to collect, digitize, and describe some of the gems of their collections. I attended the session *DLSD: The Digital Library of South Dakota*, presented by Dr. Anne Moore and Danielle de Jager Loftus, from The University of South Dakota.

The DLSD is a project to digitize images and text from the collections of the six regental libraries in South Dakota. Those include: Black Hills State University, Dakota State University, Northern State University, South Dakota School of Mines and Technology, South Dakota State University, and the University of South Dakota.

The first half of the session was an overview of how the six institutions work together and the second half was a demo of some of the current content of the DLSD. During the session, the DLSD also announced that it was opening

Minnesota Library Association Annual Conference, Oct. 14-16, St. Cloud, MN

Along with other Minitex staff members, I attended the Minnesota Library Association's Annual Conference. When I go to conferences, I focus on technical services, but I also like to learn about what's happening in other areas. Here are a few highlights. My first session was the pre-conference workshop *Cataloging Streaming Media* in which Mary Huismann gave a thorough introduction to descriptive cataloging for streaming audio and visual materials. In *The Effect of Controlled Vocabulary on Keyword Searching*, Tina Gross spoke about her research on the role of subject headings in keyword searching. In *Best Practices for Creating Online Tutorials*, Matt Lee not only took us through the steps for developing a tutorial, he also gave us an example of an effective live presentation. I also went to *What's New in Young Adult Literature* and heard about award winning novels as well as *Fast and Fun: Lightning Presentations on Library 2.0 Tools and Topics* and found out about the newest tools for librarians.

NEW TRAINING SESSION: DUBLIN CORE FOR BEGINNERS

Are you involved in a digital project at your institution? How will you describe your digital objects in order to provide online access to them? One option is to use the Dublin Core, an international metadata standard used to describe digital content.



This two-hour webinar will introduce you to Dublin Core and its 15 elements. As we look at several examples, the Western States Dublin Core Metadata Best Practices will be used as a guideline.

WORLDCAT.ORG ENHANCEMENTS

OCLC has added more article-level metadata to WorldCat.org. Elsevier metadata for SCOPUS and ScienceDirect collections from 2006 to the present have now been indexed in WorldCat.org search results. This article-level metadata joins similar content such as the GPO Monthly Catalog, ArticleFirst, Medline, ERIC and the British Library Inside Serials. The ScienceDirect content corresponds to 1,800 journals, 150 book series and more than 1.3 million records. **NOTE:** The article level metadata only

appears in the WorldCat.org interface (not in WorldCat on the FirstSearch platform, WorldCat through the cataloging or Resource Sharing interfaces).

Have you used Goodreads before to share and read book reviews with your friends? WorldCat has now added Goodreads reviews to help users evaluate materials with fellow readers' comments. You'll find Goodreads reviews in the "Reviews" section alongside WorldCat, WeRead and Amazon reviews.

CATALOGING & METADATA

HELPFUL LINKS FOR RESOURCE DESCRIPTION AND ACCESS

Resource Description and Access (RDA) is a new set of descriptive cataloging rules developed to replace the Anglo-American Cataloging Rules. It is intended to support resource discovery more effectively than AACR2. Due for release later this calendar year, RDA will bring significant changes in cataloging, but there has been so much said and written about it that you might have difficulty getting a clear picture of it and the issues around it.



Milwaukee Public Library

Milwaukee Waterways illustrates the role Lake Michigan and Milwaukee's rivers have played in the history of Milwaukee. Pictures of the harbor and ships from around the world loading and unloading materials show the variety of materials that have passed through the Port over time. Other pictures illustrate the role the rivers played in the commercial development of the city. Aerial views of the harbor and rivers and lakefront show the changing uses of

the water and land. The photographs are from three collections contributed by the Port of Milwaukee, the Milwaukee Public Library, and the Wisconsin Marine Historical Society.

Early Advertising of the West, 1867-1918

This collection contains over 450 print advertisements published in local magazines, city directories, and theater pamphlets from 1867 to 1918. These advertisements were selected and digitized in order to help researchers and students examine social, cultural and economic trends during this period. The collection is categorized into thematic groups and features advertisements about health care and hygiene products, liquor, tobacco, machinery, manufacturing, transportation, fashion, food and household goods and local tourism.
