PEW INTERNET REPORT: SOCIAL ISOLATION AND NEW TECHNOLOGY



People who use modern information and communication technologies have larger and more diverse social networks, according to new national survey findings.

The following summary is an excerpt from *OCLC Abstracts*, Nov. 9, 2009 (Vol. 12, no. 43)

Key findings from a new *Pew Internet & American Life Project* report:

- Some have worried that Internet use limits people's participation in their local communities, but the *Pew Internet report* finds that most Internet activities have little or a positive relationship to local activity.
- Challenging the assumption that Internet use encourages social contact across vast distances, this study shows that many Internet technologies are used as much for local contact as they are for distant communication.
- Internet use does not pull people away from public places. Rather, use is associated with frequent visits to places such as parks, cafes and restaurants, the kinds of locales where research shows that people are likely to encounter a wider array of people and diverse points of view.
- People's mobile phone use outpaces their use of landline phones as a primary method of staying in touch with their closest family and friends, but face-to-face contact still trumps all other methods.
- Social media activities are associated with several beneficial social activities, including having discussion networks that are more likely to contain people from different backgrounds.



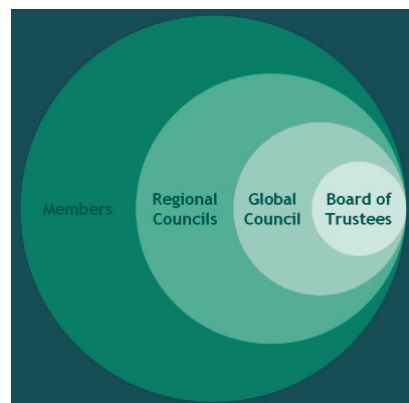

NORTH AMERICAN MARC RECORDS**MARKETPLACE STUDY**

The following text was excerpted from the report *Introduction to the Study of the North American MARC Records Marketplace*.

In Jan. 2009, the Library of Congress contracted with R2 Consulting (R2) to investigate and describe current approaches to the creation and distribution of MARC records in US and Canadian libraries. The primary focus of their investigation was on the economics of existing practice, in effect mapping the "marketplace" for cataloging records, including incentives for and barriers to production.

R2's conclusions are based on survey results; interviews and conversations with practicing librarians and vendors; discussion among members of the Bibliographic Record Production social network; extensive reading; participation in the OCLC/NISO Metadata Symposium (April 2009); and their own experience with cataloging production and distribution.

R2's primary conclusions include:

- Library of Congress cataloging continues to be widely valued: School and public libraries are especially reliant on LC's output, but all market segments have built services on the foundation of inexpensive and easily obtainable LC records.
- The Library of Congress subsidizes portions of the market: LC catalogs many titles that ultimately are not retained in its collections. As a result, LC bears significant costs from which it receives no direct benefit, for activity that is not explicitly in support of its core users. At present, libraries and vendors enjoy the largely unrecognized benefits of an LC subsidy.
- LC records are significantly underpriced: Not only does LC bear a disproportionate share of the costs associated with producing records for titles it may not retain; the law governing its sale of those records allows only the cost of distribution (plus 10%) to be recouped.
- Cataloging backlogs continue to grow in many areas and market segments: Non-Roman languages, maps,

and DVDs pose particular problems.

- There is adequate cataloging capacity in North America: A conservative interpretation of survey data suggests that there are more than enough catalogers to handle the collective need.
- Cooperative cataloging has not realized its full potential: The Program for Cooperative Cataloging (PCC)'s BIBCO initiative contributed more than 76,000 records in 2008, but BIBCO and CONSER each have fewer than 50 members and ten BIBCO libraries contributed nearly 2/3 of all records produced in 2008.
- The market for cataloging records is conflicted: The library market must accommodate both community values and commercial values. Libraries operate within a "community" value system that prizes openness, accessibility, and free access to information. Vendors operate within a "commercial" system that creates sustainability, growth and profit.
- The market provides insufficient incentives to stimulate additional original cataloging: Many libraries choose not to participate in cooperative cataloging programs and vendors do not see

opportunities to serve as cataloging agencies. Neither commercial nor community incentives have much effect.

- 80% of libraries edit records for English-language monographs in their local catalog: Most editing is performed "to meet local needs"; such as re-Cuttering, adding workmarks, or removing unwanted subject headings. There is widespread resistance to the idea of simply accepting the work of another library.
- 78% of libraries are unaware of any restrictions on MARC record use or redistribution: In part this stems from the perception that cataloging records are free, or perhaps community-owned. While this is true for LC records, it becomes problematic for those records where the cost of production has not yet been recovered.

CONTRACT CATALOGING

CONTRACT CATALOGING RECENT PROJECTS

The past two years have been a busy time for the Minitex Contract Cataloging Program (ConCats) staff. In addition to the day-to-day cataloging we do for area libraries, two large projects have captured our attention.

First, we are presently wrapping up work on the University of Minnesota's Forestry Library backlog. The first phase of this project originated in early 2008 with the cataloging of foreign language serials and some state government documents; the next phase, which commenced later that year and continues to this day, placed a greater emphasis on federal and state documents.

These uncataloged materials cover a wide range of formats and content: a DVD on constructing mountain bike trails; a series of newsletters on the Boundary Waters Canoe Area blow down event of July 4, 1999; and several works found in print and CD-ROM on the emerald ash borer.



Though much of the subject matter in this untapped

collection of over 8000 works is complex and scientific, catalogers still found time for lighthearted discoveries.

Consider the several authors whose surnames mirror the forestial topics of their writings, such as David W. Green on Alaskan yellow cedar trees and the short essay on drying lumber by Paul J. Bois (Bois is French for “wood”). And lest we forget, Keith Wood has something to say on drought-tolerant trees.

The second project came to us in early 2008 with the construction of the Science/Library Building on the

Century College campus. The new library called for an opportunity to consolidate with the rest of the LC-classified collection the many books and scores marked with Dewey Decimal numbers. By July, ConCats staff was well underway, and, with the help of a couple of macros and plenty of elbow grease, we reclassified nearly 27,000 items, producing labels for each along the way - and all in less than four months.

ConCats welcomes all projects great and small such as those I describe above. And we are proud to continue serving libraries' cataloging needs in the Minitex region and beyond.

NEW OCLC POLICIES DIRECTORY

The project to implement a new OCLC ILL Policies Directory has been underway for the past year and is finally coming to fruition. A new Policies Directory interface is planned to be installed on Dec. 13.

The install will also include a new underlying database and platform for the Policies Directory. Your access to the Policies Directory will remain the same.

- Via the existing URL (<https://illpolicies.oclc.org>) using your OCLC ILL authorization and password.
- Through the WorldCat Resource Sharing interface, either by clicking the Policies Directory link or on the ‘Libraries that Own Item’ screen, by clicking on the red ? next to the library symbol.
- Via the existing links in ILLiad and the WorldCat Services Administrative module.

All existing data (policies, deflections, contact data) will remain. You do not need to make any changes to your existing Policies Directory data.

OCLC implemented some new features, which can be found below:

- OCLC supplier status changes are now reflected in

real time in the WorldCat Resource Sharing interface.

- Supplier status changes can be scheduled ahead of time via the ‘Schedules’ tab to plan for holiday closures, vacation schedules, etc.
- Deflection, Copy, and Loan policies are all contained on one screen - less clicking to find the information that you need to help you make borrowing decisions.
- The number of policies defined is included on the ‘Policies’ tab to make it easy to see at one glance whether or not any policy information is available.
- Search function now always available via the panel on the left side of the screen.
- Basic and Advanced search combined into one search function.
- Institution symbol search now an exact match search (no need to enter quotes before the search to get an exact match)
- Contact types updated to more accurately reflect real world use.

CONTENTdm 5.2 RELEASED

With the new release, the CONTENTdm Project Client now supports auto updates, enabling users to get updates as quickly as they are available. Additionally, PDF print quality can now be specified in the Project Client, enabling users to select a quality level when generating optional print versions of their compound objects.

For users with large, full-text collections, several enhancements improve performance and reduce indexing times. Other enhancements include the addition of a new thesaurus, Canadian Subject Headings (CSH), and configuration options to filter hits in Usage Reports.

The software for CONTENTdm 5.2 is available for download from the User Support Center (<http://www.contentdm.com/USC>). The User Support Center is password protected and first time visitors will need to register and create a personal account. To do this, each user must select the "Register now" option and then enter an *Organization ID*. If you do not know your Organization ID, or have problems setting up a personal account, please contact contentdmsupport@oclc.org for assistance.

Hosted users will be contacted directly about the timing of upgrading their hosted site to CONTENTdm 5.2.

If you are still running version 4.3, you will be able to upgrade directly to CONTENTdm 5.2. Additionally, OCLC is extending the 90-day waiver of the EULA restriction that limits organizations to installing and running only one instance of CONTENTdm for users migrating from 4.3 to 5.2. That means you can run version 4.3 and 5.2 in parallel for 90 days to assist with your migration.
