SOUTH DAKOTA SITE VISIT SUMMARY

Mark Wilhelmi and Sara Ring of the MINITEX Bibliographic and Technical Services (BATS) Unit spent four days in mid-May visiting libraries in Brookings, Sioux Falls, and Vermillion – stopping at South Dakota State University, Siouxland Libraries, the Wegner Health Sciences Information Center, the University of Sioux Falls, the University of South Dakota, and Augustana College. Some of the common themes we encountered were renovation and construction, weeding projects, and libraries gearing up for more collaborative projects with other South Dakota libraries—especially in the realm of digitization. At each library, we talked about OCLC services, helped with problem-solving whenever we could, and learned a lot about the libraries and the challenges they face. After we meet with library staff we always ask for a library tour. Some things we learned about each library:

South Dakota State University, Brookings – They have their own bindery in house! They showed us a giant paper cutting machine and examples of their work.

Siouxland (Public Library system in Sioux Falls) – The administrative staff and technical services staff each have sinks their offices as they are all temporarily housed in the old health department building. They have torn down a huge section of the Main (downtown) library and are rebuilding. There's a great section of their Web site that tracks the construction as it happens:

Wegner Health Sciences Information Center, Sioux Falls – They support about 10 different educational institutions and hospitals in South Dakota. Among their holdings, they have a nice collection of children's books that addresses different developmental disabilities.

University of Sioux Falls – They were gearing up for a Spring book sale during our visit. They have a large education curriculum collection and Sara spotted her old Fisher Price Play Family House!

University of South Dakota, Vermillion – There's a lot of moving going on. Lommen Health Sciences Library is merging into the ID Weeks Library. We got a peek at their archives – they have some very old, very rare music books. They took us to a room with two freezers – both for storing

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and preserving very old negatives.

Augustana College –There’s a lot going on here, too. They’ve undertaken a lot of renovation, and from the drawings we’ve seen, the new library will look great! The other big news is that Sioux Falls Seminary is merging its library with Augustana’s within the next year or so.

We also had to do a little sight-seeing along during our visit. We stopped at roadside attractions like Mr. Bendo, had lunch at the Falls Overlook Café (both in Sioux Falls), explored the National Museum of Music in Vermillion, and even drove out to Mitchell to take a look at the Corn Palace. RESOURCE SHARING

WCRS ENHANCEMENTS

On May 11, WorldCat Resource Sharing introduced the ability to turn off access from the WorldCat Resource Sharing Staff View to the WorldCat Services Administrative Module. This allows librarians greater

control over who may access administrative functionality. Users can make this change from the Resource Sharing Staff ILL Settings Authorizations page of the Administrative Module.

Additionally, all new constant data records now have

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Library Mail in the Ship Via and/or the Return Via fields instead of *Library Rate*. Existing constant data records must be manually updated if your institution wishes to make this change.

This change affects relevant mailing labels effective June 15. Labels will be changed from *Library Materials* to *Library Mail*.

CHANGES TO YOUR OPUS REPORT

If you have looked at your Online Product Usage Report (OPUS) recently, you may have noticed two changes to the way your Interlibrary Fee Management (IFM) Debit and Credit amounts display.

Last September, a change was made to the IFM processing to correct truncation errors with international currencies. This, in effect, changed how the billed amounts were calculated. A result of the change was to record a "1" instead of debit/credit amounts.

The debit/credit amounts will still show up on the monthly OCLC billing detail that you receive, and they are also accessible at the OCLC Online Usage Statistics Web site. There is both a borrower and lender IFM report available for each month. This report lists the number of transactions and which items were lent to others or borrowed from your institution via IFM. The report also shows the detailed IFM charges at the transaction level.

MINITEX encourages staff of participating libraries who use IFM to look at these reports not only to get a breakdown of IFM billing information, but also to examine their library's IFM usage to look for patterns that could improve service and workflow. TWO UPCOMING WEBINARS IN DIGITIZATION SERIES

WiLS (Wisconsin Library Services) and MINITEX are sponsoring the last two of four webinars focused on digitization information and skill development. CONTENTDM LICENSE CHANGES

OCLC recently announced a fundamental change in JPEG2000 licensing for all CONTENTdm users.

JPEG2000 functionality is now available free of charge to all CONTENTdm users. Additionally, all Acquisition Stations can now be used with JPEG2000 functionality. This means that all institutions have at least 50 JPEG2000 Acquisition Stations without incurring additional costs. This replaces the previous license restrictions that allowed only a few dedicated JPEG2000 Acquisition Stations per CONTENTdm license.

If your institution does not have the JPEG2000 Extension, you will receive a free upgrade July 1.

The JPEG2000 Extension enables collection builders to convert full resolution TIFF and JPEG files to JPEG2000 files during the import process. End users benefit from higher quality, detailed images without spending a lot of

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time waiting for large images to be transmitted. JPEG2000 is ideal for image archives, maps, drawings, medical images, and other large image formats requiring high compression efficiency and image quality. Empire Period Drama

The collection was created by the University of Warwick Library and is taken from the Marandet Collection of 18th and 19th century French drama held in the University Library's special collections. All the plays in the collection are full-text searchable.

The Gerald Warner Taiwan Image Collection is a photographic record of a US consul's impressions of urban and rural life in Taiwan under Japanese colonial

rule. Totalling 340 photographs and postcards gathered by Warner between August 26, 1937 and March 8, 1941, these images provide a snapshot of Taiwan's hybrid culture of Chinese, Taiwanese, Austronesian, and Japanese influences.
