A PERSONAL MESSAGE TO THE FACULTY

On 15 September 1975 I became Coordinator of Research Development for CLA. I am a new man in a new job. In order to understand the way in which my duties are unfolding it is necessary to provide some background.

Last year the central officers of the University with the endorsement of the Senate Committee on Research, initiated a reorganization of research administration. Some of the functions of the old Office of Sponsored Programs (OSP) were combined with those of the Research Accounting Office in a new Office of Research Administration (ORA). Many of the research development activities of OSP were decentralized into the several colleges and became a major responsibility of a "Research Officer" in each college.

In CLA there was some discussion over what this new position was to be entitled. "Research Officer" had some undesirable connotations and finally, Coordinator of Research Development was found acceptable. From my point of view, the most denotatively accurate title would have been "Research Facilitator" for my most important role is to facilitate the grant and contract seeking activity of the faculty, particularly when the proposed research activity will cross departmental and/or collegiate lines.

Most simply, I see myself facilitating your research in three ways. (1) If you wish to undertake research that requires financial support, I will try to put you in touch with funding agencies which may be interested in your research ideas. (2) If you have a research interest that can best be pursued in collaboration with other scholars I will help you identify and contact appropriate people. (3) When funding agencies indicate an interest in supporting certain lines of research I will bring their announcements to your attention.

In addition to these activities within the college, I serve with the research officers of the other colleges on the Research Development Council which is chaired by the Associate Dean of the Graduate School. This council will discuss existing policies relating to research and recommend new policies when appropriate. It has been proposed that the views of the council should be considered in regard to changes in the policy governing overhead, contract provisions, etc. I would be pleased to have your ideas about these matters so that I could bring them to the attention of the council.

In order to facilitate communication with you, my office will be putting out this monthly newsletter. It will contain news of funding opportunities, information on new research facilities at the University, announcements of grants received by the faculty, etc.

APPLIED SOCIAL SCIENCE RESEARCH RECEIVES NEW EMPHASIS AT NSF

The NSF Authorization Act recently passed by Congress contained the following clause:

Of the total amount authorized under RANN (\$70,500,000), not less than \$23,000,000 shall be available for "Applied Social Research" and for "Policy-Sciences Research" directed toward increasing the cost-effectiveness of policies and programs dealing with urban and human service problems at the Federal, State and local government levels. Such funds shall not be available for use with respect to any program or activity if such use would result in a substantial

duplication of any program or activity which is receiving other Federal financial assistance. Such funds may be used to identify, analyze and contribute knowledge to improved productivity in the public sector; identify, analyze and evaluate more effective, efficient and equitable ways to deliver human services; and develop the data base and analytical techniques required for improving applied research on municipal systems and human service delivery.

This amount is authorized with the proviso that such research should not substantially duplicate other federally funded research; and not less than 7.5% of available funds to be expended to small business concerns. The Conferees (in the conference report) also agreed that the Foundation should make an effort to expend up to 10% to small business concerns and indicated that for fiscal year 1977 a set-aside at that level should be considered. (P.L. 94-86 National Science Foundation Authorization Act fy 1976)

The appropriations act provided RANN with \$60,000,000 for fiscal 1976, and NSF is apparently interpreting the above amendment in percentage rather than absolute terms. Nevertheless about \$20,000,000 is mandated for "Applied Social Science" and "Policy Science" research. The next month or two is a most propitious time to apply for research funding that fits within the guidelines. We expect to receive some program announcements in the next few weeks, but interested faculty should not wait. The iron is hot; those with a hammer should strike.

NSF ANNOUNCES NEW PROGRAM FOR ASSISTANCE TO UNDERGRADUATE SCIENCE EDUCATION

A new NSF program entitled Comprehensive Assistance to Undergraduate Science Education (CAUSE) is being initiated this year. This program encourages the improvement in quality and effectiveness of undergraduate science (including social science) education in institutions of higher learning. CAUSE will provide support up to three years in response to detailed plans from science departments, groups of departments and consortia of institutions. Support may be used in a variety of ways, justified by the plan of instruction to strengthen the undergraduate component of universities and colleges.

If members of the faculty in the social sciences wish further information, they should contact their chairman who has a copy of the program announcement.

CLA JOINS ROPER LIBRARY

CLA has taken out a one year trial membership in the International Survey Library Association Program sponsored by the Roper Public Opinion Research Center.

Established more than 25 years ago, the Roper Public Opinion Research Center at Williams College is the oldest and largest archive of sample survey data in the world. In 1964 the Roper Center inaugurated the International Survey Library Association (ISLA) Program to parallel, within the academic community of data users, the formal program already existing between the Center and major data suppliers.

The Roper Center data bank maintains the raw data from polls conducted regularly by The Gallup Poll; is the repository for studies from many other major U.S. polling organizations; annually acquires between 300 and 400 surveys conducted by major non-American research organizations and distributes the General Social Survey conducted annually by the National Opinion Research Center. The data bank also has brought together and standardized the response data files, with support from the U.S. Bureau of Census, for major family planning surveys conducted in scores of countries over the past two decades.

In addition the data bank is the archival site for surveys sponsored around the world by the U.S. Information Agency; provides data resources to investigators wishing to study highly specialized samples; archives data from surveys undertaken by major national commissions; publishes a monthly digest (Current Opinion) of significant findings from recent opinion surveys in the U.S. and abroad and publishes an annual summary (Newsletter) of recently acquired data sets.

Our membership entitles us to (A) 50 hours of computational service or (B) 20 fully cleaned/processed data sets or (C) any proportional combination of A and B. NEH SUPPORTS SOCIAL WELFARE HISTORY ARCHIVES

The National Endowment for the Humanities has awarded a \$347,000 grant (\$70,000 of which are funds contributed by the University of Minnesota) to Clarke A Chambers and Andrea Hinding, director and curator, respectively, of the Social Welfare History Archives, to conduct a nationwide survey of archives and manuscripts for material relating to the history of women in the United States from the colonial period to the present. The 27-month project, funded under NEH's new research-tools-in-the-humanities program, will survey by mail questionnaire or field visit more than 7,000 repositories. Each repository will be asked to report manuscript collections or archives records groups containing significant data on women and women's organizations or on individuals, families, movements, and organizations which significantly affected women's role in society. Results of the survey will be published in a multi-volume reference tool designed to facilitate research by scholars in the humanities and social sciences.

The project began at the 1972 Organization of American Historians annual convention where Professor Chambers chaired a session on women's history sources and distributed a preliminary guide compiled by Professor Hinding in cooperation with other archivists and historians. On the basis of the reception given the preliminary guide, **national professional** associations in history and

archives urged Chambers and Hinding to seek funding from NEH for a systematic national survey. Leading archivists and historians were also moved to urge the Minnesota Center to assume responsibility for this project because of the Welfare Archives' national reputation as one of the outstanding research centers in the country, widely respected for its efficient and imaginative work.

The National Endowment for the Humanities invested a substantial portion of its research-tools funds for one period in the project because of its belief in the significance of the project not only for the field of women's history but as a model for increasing bibliographic control of the country's primary sources. As American Historical Association executive secretary Paul Ward wrote in a letter supporting the project, such control is especially needed for the diffuse field of social history and for materials housed at the regional and local level. While the entire universe of primary materials couldn't be surveyed at once, for such a project would be too big, "women's history. . .has in unique measure the scholarly and popular resources" to do a model survey, he said.

A central staff consisting of the two principal investigators, an administrative assistant, an editor, and two senior secretaries will conduct the basic project work of designing questionnaires, analyzing responses, and preparing entries for the published guide. During the summer of 1976 nineteen field workers will visit selected repositories across the country to make on-site analyses of holdings. Experimental field work to develop and test procedures was conducted during the past summer. Mary Ostling, graduate student in History, visited Duluth, Rochester, the Red River Valley, and repositories in South Dakota where she identified more than 100 important collections known at this time only to local residents and a few scholars. Among her "finds", for example, were card files kept by the Duluth Chapter of the American Red Cross on 10,000 volunteers, most of whom were women. The cards contain data on sex, age, education, family, occupation and special skills of the volunteers.

The project staff is advised formally by a national board of distinguished historians and archivists and informally by many other scholars, feminists, and librarians. Locally the project has enjoyed the continued support of the College of Liberal Arts and the University Library.

FORD FOUNDATION ANNOUNCES NEW COMPETITIVE PROGRAM IN INTERNATIONAL SECURITY AND ARMS CONTROL

The Ford Foundation's Office of European and International Affairs is inviting scholars to submit research proposals in the area of international security and arms control. Proposals will be reviewed in five thematic areas.

- I. Basic Theory of Arms Control
- II. The Implications of New Technologies for International Security
- III. Alternative Security Proposals
- IV. Domestic Influences on Arms Control
- V. International Security and New Configurations of International Power

It is expected that between eight and fifteen grants will be made from a total fund of \$350,000.

The following application procedures will be followed:

A. Preliminary Outlines: To enable the Foundation staff and consultants to determine whether proposals qualify for formal submissions, applicants should submit prior to January 1, 1976 three copies of a brief outline, in English, of the proposal they wish to prepare. These brief outlines should be less than five typewritten, double spaced pages in length and, in addition to a description of the project, should contain the names and affiliations of all the principal researchers and an estimated budget. Appropriate curriculum vitae should be appended to the outline.

These outlines are a prerequisite for consideration in the final competition. Early submission of these outlines is strongly encouraged. They should be addressed to:

These outlines do not have to clear through the Coordinator of Research Development.

B. Formal Applications: If the Foundation's response to the preliminary outline is positive, applicants will be invited to submit formal, full-length proposals to be received by the Foundation no later than April 1, 1976. Instructions concerning the format and content of the formal application will accompany the Foundation's response.

FEBRUARY DEADLINE FOR ROCKEFELLER ENVIRONMENTAL FELLOWSHIPS

Applications to the Rockefeller Foundation's new program of fellowships for research and/or public service in environmental affairs must be submitted by February 1, 1976. Emphasis will be on postdoctoral participation in innovative interdisciplinary efforts to deal effectively with comprehensive environmental problems. Awards will cover periods up to 12 months, and renewal requests will be considered.

There are no standardized application forms. Applicants should submit: (1) concise statement of scope, purpose and methodology of proposed study, its significance for critical environmental problems, and its value in developing environmental leadership in the candidate; (2) letter of endorsement from institution or agency with which candidate will be associated during the study; (3) two letters of recommendation; (4) resume of the candidate and other principal investigators; and (5) itemized budget.

SMITHSONIAN INSTITUTION ANNOUNCES POST-DOCTORAL FELLOWSHIPS

The Smithsonian Institution is continuing its program of post-doctoral fellowships. Four areas are open to scholars in the humanities and social sciences: (1) the history of art (including particularly American Art, modern painting and sculpture, and Oriental art; (2) the history of science and technology; (3) American history and material culture; and (4) anthropology.

Awards of \$10,000 per annum plus a research allowance are made to support independent research in residence at the Smithsonian. HAROLD C. CANNON, NEH OFFICIAL, VISITS UNIVERSITY

On 14 November Harold C. Cannon, Acting Director of the Division of Educational programs for the National Endowment for the Humanities, visited the University. He toured the Immigration and Social Welfare History Archives and discussed with Professors Hinding and Vecoli their on-going programs. Professors McNally, Nelson, Poor and Steyaert from Art History gave him a brief demonstration of the teaching materials they have developed in consultation with Professor Burriss and the Instructional Design Group which is financed by NEH.

Professors Steinmann (English) and Sonkowsky (Classics) each had the opportunity to discuss with Dr. Cannon their proposals which are under review at the Endowment at the present time.

Following lunch with Deans Sorauf, Simon and Howe and 14 department chairpersons, Dr. Cannon met individually or in pairs with the following faculty to discuss research and teaching interests and possible NEH funding: Professors Taraba, Clausing, Marshall, Farmer, Graham, Ultan, Riedel, Plummer, Lowry, Wang and Liu.

NEW LEGISLATIVE PROPOSAL TO REGULATE RESEARCH INVOLVING HUMAN SUBJECTS

Senator Kennedy has introduced a bill (S 2515) to provide permanency and a government-wide jurisdiction for the temporary federal commission that was created last year to develop guidelines for human experimentation. With the subject rapidly sinking into a legal and moral quagmire, the social science research community has a lot at stake in the operations of the commission and the proposal for a continuing and broader organization.

As these things now stand, the existing National Commission for the Protection of Human Subjects of Biomedical and Behavioral Research has a jurisdiction limited to research supported by the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare; moreover, the Commission's charter is due to expire in 13 months.

Kennedy's new bill was introduced after recent revelations about experiments on humans performed by the Department of Defense and the Central Intelligence Agency. As provided for in the bill, the present National Commission would be elevated to a Presidential Commission, thus giving it authority to write the rules for all federal agencies whose funds support research on human

subjects. The present membership, which is composed of scientists and physicians, would be expanded to include four members of each house of Congress, the secretaries of HEW and DoD, the administrator of the Veterans Administration, and the director of the CIA. These additions would be non-voting members who would constitute a special committee for advising the other members on classified matters.

FEDERAL GOVERNMENT HAS MANY PROGRAMS TO SUPPORT UNDERGRADUATE EDUCATION

In the past few months we have brought to the attention of Department Chairmen several programs that provide support for the improvement of undergraduate education. It is becoming a little difficult to keep them all straight, so let us review them briefly. The National Science Foundation has three major programs: (1) Comprehensive Assistance to Undergraduate Science Education (CAUSE) provides support for up to three years to encourage improvement in quality and effectiveness of science education. As the University is limited in the number of applications it can submit, all proposals are screened through Vice-President Koffler's office. (2) Educational Program Restructuring (EPR) seeks to encourage the development, testing and evaluation of new or unconventional approaches to all aspects of science instruction at the undergraduate level. Of greatest interest to our faculty is a sub-program RULE (Restructuring the Undergraduate Learning Environment) which supports attempts to change significantly undergraduate instructional programs. One new focus under RULE is Faculty Oriented Projects which provides support for a faculty member (or small groups) who wish to bring about innovative changes. This program has a deadline for applications of 26 January 1976. (3) The Instructional Scientific Equipment Program (ISEP) provides support specifically for instructional equipment and requires 50% University matching. Closing date for application is 19 January.

The National Endowment for the Humanities has a division of Educational Programs which offers two programs of major interest: Educational Projects and Institutional Grants. The former promotes the development and testing of imaginative approaches to humanities education by supporting well defined demonstration projects that can be completed within a specified period of time. The latter are divided into three groups - Planning, Program and Development - which are designed to support long-range programs that will strengthen a humanities curriculum. Normally a University seeks first a Planning Grant (maximum \$50,000) to plan a program and then support is sought for a Program and Development Grant. The next deadline for Planning Grants applications is 1 May 1976.

The Department of Health, Education and Welfare has several programs, the most comprehensive being the Fund for the Improvement of Postsecondary Education. As the deadline date for preliminary applications is 5 January 1976,

it is very late to apply for funding in the upcoming round of competition. Faculty interested in learning more about the funding opportunities created by this program should contact this office.

FEBRUARY 2 DEADLINE FOR FOREIGN LANGUAGE AND AREA STUDIES RESEARCH PROGRAM

The Office of Education has announced a Foreign Language and Area Studies Research Program. Under this program the Commissioner is authorized to contract for studies and surveys to determine the need for increased or improved instruction in modern foreign languages and related fields, to conduct research on training methods for use in such languages and fields, and to develop specialized materials for use in training students and language teachers. (This program is not to be confused with the HEW Program in International Studies at the Graduate and Undergraduate Level.)

Program information may be obtained from the Foreign Language and Area Research Program, Bureau of Postsecondary Education, U.S. Office of Education, Room 3928, 7th and D Streets S.W., Washington, D.C. 20202. A sample of the suggested format for a proposal is available in 410 Johnston, phone 373-5101.

In order to be assured of consideration for funding, proposals must be received by the Office of Education on or before February 2, 1976.

COORDINATOR'S CORNER

One of the most difficult problems faced by my office is assisting faculty in obtaining funds in support of sabbatical leave. In order to provide some measure of help we have put together a booklet entitled Research Funding Opportunities for Individual Scholars. A copy should be appearing in your mail boxes before the first of the year. All of the programs described in this booklet can be applied for directly; it is not necessary to go through this office. We expect to put out an edition of this booklet every fall with Volume II appearing in August 1976. You should understand, however, that if you are planning on sabbatical leave for the academic year 1977-78 you should begin thinking of financing now. There are deadlines for application for the fall of 1977 which occur in the spring of 1976.

EARLY WARNING! SABBATICAL LEAVE FINANCING 1977-78

It is time for faculty members interested in sabbatical starting a year from next fall to begin making plans for financial support.

More than 500 awards for university lecturing and post-doctoral research in more than 75 countries will be made to Americans for the academic year 1977-78 under the Fulbright-Hays program. American citizens holding the doctorate or college teaching experience may request announcement of openings in his/her field of specialization. Requests should indicate preferred countries or geographic areas and probable dates of availability. Faculty who are interested in Fulbright-Hays may complete a form for the Council for International Exchange of Scholars (CIES). In April 1976 each registrant will be sent an announcement of opportunities under the 1977-78 program. Formal applications are due in the summer of 1976. Write to CIES, Eleven Dupont Circle, Washington, D.C. 20036.

The deadline for submission of 1977-78 NEH Fellowships for Independent Study and Research applications is June 1, 1976. These fellowships are intended for scholars, teachers and other interpreters of the humanities who have made, or demonstrated promise of making, significant contributions to humanistic knowledge. Their purpose is to provide support for uninterrupted, full-time study or research. Fellowships are available for 6 or 12 months of tenure with a maximum stipend of \$20,000. Fellows may not hold other grants or major fellowships during tenure, except sabbaticals and other grants from their own institutions. FEDERAL APPROPRIATIONS FOR RESEARCH

There are a number of organizations that lobby in Washington on behalf of professors for federal support for research. Among the most notable are the American Council on Education, Association of American Universities and National Association of State Universities and Land Grant Colleges.

In February Thomas F. Jones, Vice President for Research, Massachusetts Institute of Technology, testified on behalf of all three of these organizations before the House Committee on Science and Technology on the proposed budget for NSF. You may be interested in the specific support he gave for social science research.

"...colleges and universities and a great majority of faculty members support research in the social sciences. There was a time when many people in universities and many people in Congress opposed research in the social sciences. Let me quote a colloquy of exactly 30 years ago in a hearing on the original National Science Foundation Act:

Committee member: 'There is a sort of antipathy against social science that might make a difference in whether this legislation gets approval. I think we had better stick to fundamentals.'

Witness (College president): 'Your remarks, Congressman, are in effect a summary of the views of most of the scientists who have testified.'

Committee member: 'That is a very great compliment.'

Witness: 'We are just average fellows trying to do a job.'

Committee member: 'You are the experts.'

Witness: 'It seems to me essentially unsound to put into a National Science Foundation a wide range of social questions upon which the people of America have not yet made up their minds.'

Committee member: 'There would be a lot of short-haired women and long-haired men messing into everybody's personal lives.'

This exchange is instructive for several reasons. It shows that on the whole - taking Congressmen and university presidents as a group - attitudes have changed over three decades. It also calls to mind, however, the fact that there is still opposition to research in the social sciences.

There are still important and legitimate questions to be asked about federally financed research in the social sciences. The rights of individuals who give information or who serve as research subjects must be protected. Research designs must be sound and investigators must be competent. Due regard must be paid to priority needs in selecting investigations for support. These are all important aspects of social science research to which continuing attention must be paid. As with peer review and curriculum development, it is possible to design guidelines, review systems, and safeguards which will permit sound research to go forward while protecting the legitimate interests of all concerned. In short, we support research in the social sciences not only in the National Science Foundation but in all Federal agencies whose missions can be carried out more effectively with the help of investigations in these fields.

I believe we would agree that the actions of humans as individuals and in

groups are incomparably more difficult to describe, measure and predict than is the case with physical phenomena. Accordingly, patience and understanding are called for in assessing the utility of research in the social sciences. Equally important, social scientists are well advised, as are scientists in all fields, to avoid claiming more than they can deliver in terms of findings useful for social policy.

At this time social scientists are struggling valiantly to apply rigor, logic, and careful measurement in studies of human beings and social organizations, and their interactions. The work is in its infancy but is far advanced from what it was 50 years ago, or even 20 years ago. If we continue these researches we can find out more about what the facts are and have at least a chance of operating government, business and industry, with greater certainty of effectiveness.

I believe we would agree that our greatest and most pressing unsolved problems are in the social science sphere. But, because attitudes and values are basic components of cultures and cultural differences, controversy and some unpleasantness is inevitable. Nevertheless, the work must be done if our leaders are to have better factual bases to avoid serious mistakes in making decisions which affect people and social organizations."

The Research Program on Population and Development Policy, sponsored by the Rockefeller and Ford Foundations is interested in receiving proposals on: (1) empirical relationships between development processes and population trends; (2) reciprocal effects of development and population policies; or (3) means by which development processes and population trends might be modified to achieve improvements in human welfare.

NEW NATIONAL HUMANITIES CENTER

Research Triangle Park near Raleigh, North Carolina has been named as the site for the headquarters of the National Humanities Center. The center will promote humanistic studies in America according to the American Academy of Arts and Sciences. A 15-acre site was donated to the Humanities Center by the Triangle Universities Center for Advanced Studies Inc., an organization formed by three universities to promote intellectual pursuits in the area. The universities group will also donate a \$1.5 million building to the center with completion expected in 1978. North Carolina corporations, private foundations and state agencies have promised the center nearly \$3 million. A number of "major" universities including the University of California at Berkeley, the University of Michigan, the University of Pennsylvania and the University of Texas were reportedly rejected in favor of the North Carolina site. The centers operating budget will be provided by the three universities for the first five years with additional funds being sought from private foundations and government agencies. Each year about 50 persons will win fellowships at the center to study a wide range of cultural, social or intellectual issues.

PROFESSOR SIMS NOMINATED FOR AWARD

Professor Christopher A. Sims of the Department of Economics has been selected as the nominee of the University of Minnesota for the first Alan T. Waterman Award to be granted by the National Science Foundation to an "outstanding young scientist". Several names were submitted from various colleges in the University and a faculty selection committee recommended to President Mc Grath that Sims be nominated. His name has been submitted to the National Science Foundation for the national competition. Congratulations!
