GOOD NEWS!

The College of Liberal Arts has been allocated \$14,000 for faculty travel in 1980-81 from a State Legislature appropriation of \$150,000. These funds are intended to be used exclusively for the purpose of securing financial support for projects of research, training or public service. Funds may not be used for recruiting, for international travel, for hand-delivering proposals to agencies, or for anything else.

The travel form is a simple one-page form available in 404 Johnston Hall. Procedures for obtaining travel funds are as follows: (1) fill out Request for Faculty Travel Funds form and return to 404 Johnston; (2) investigator is notified of approval or disapproval; (3) investigator fills out Type 06 Travel Authorization and gives it to departmental secretary for processing; (4) after the trip is completed, the Travel Expense Voucher is filled out (be sure to keep all travel-related receipts); (5) give Travel Expense Voucher to departmental secretary for processing through the CLA Budget Office; (6) file a post-travel report with our office. This last point is very important as the Legislature expects a full, reliable report on the use of the funds.

We in ORD encourage you to submit requests for travel funds. If you have questions regarding the guidelines for use of these funds or procedures for getting the funds please do not hesitate to call us at 373-5101.

* The Committee on Scholarly Communication with the People's Republic of China (CSCPRC) has announced three programs of scholarly exchange in the natural sciences, engineering, social sciences and humanities between the United States and China in 1981-82. The programs and deadlines are as follows: National Program for Advanced Study and Research in China, deadline November 7; Distinguished Scholar Exchange Program, deadline October 6; Conferences Program, deadline December 1. Details are avail-

* Mellon Fellowships in the Humanities at Harvard University are for non-tenured, experienced junior scholars who have completed at least two years' postdoctoral teaching in the humanities-- usually as assistant professors. Annual salary is \$17,000 with a one-year appointment. Applications are due November 3. For particulars and application procedures write: Dr. Richard M. * The Rockefeller Foundation has established October 1 as the preliminary application closing date for 1981-82 Humanities Fellowships. The program welcomes applications from writers and scholars in traditional humanistic disciplines whose projects focus on the analysis and evaluation of contemporary issues. Grants range from \$10,000 to \$15,000 per year and normally extend for one year. * Applications are invited by the Bunting Institute of Radcliffe College for the Bunting Fellowship Program. The purpose of the fellowship is to provide the opportunity and support for a professional woman to complete a substantial project in her field and thereby to advance her career. Appointments are full time July 1 through June 30 and require residence in the Boston area. The current stipend is \$12,500. Applicants may be at various levels of career development ranging from early postdoctoral to senior professional ranks. October 1 is the application deadline. * The W. K. Kellogg Foundation invites applications for its 1981 Kellogg National Fellowship Program. Individuals must be 40 years of age or younger as of July 1, 1981 and be well established in their profession. * Andrew W. Mellon Fellowships at Stanford University are available to highly promising scholar teachers in the humanities. * Awards for postdoctoral scientific research and study in the mathematical, physical, biological, engineering, and social sciences, in the history and philosophy of science, and in interdisciplinary areas are available from the National Science Foundation Postdoctoral Fellowships in Science Program. Part- and full-time tenures are available for those who will have held the doctorate for no more than 5 years as of November 3, 1980. Application deadline is November 3; for complete information please call 373-5101.

* The Columbia Society of Fellows in the Humanities will appoint a number of postdoctoral fellows in the humanities for 1981-82. Newly appointed fellows must have received the Ph.D. between January 1, 1979 and July 1, 1981. The stipend is \$16,250; additional funds are available for research materials, typing etc. Application forms are obtainable from: The Director, Room 1509, International Affairs Building, 420 West 118th Street, Columbia University, New York, New York 10027. Deadline is November 1.

* Program information for Individual Artists Assistance Grants from the Minnesota State Arts Board is available in 404 Johnston Hall. There are a number of changes in this program and it seems to be greatly improved. The two remaining deadlines are: Performing Arts--October 10 and Visual Arts and Design--December 1.

* Applications for awards under the 1981 German Marshall Fund Fellowship Program, which supports scholars and professionals whose research may contribute to a better understanding of significant contemporary problems common to industrialized societies, have a postmark deadline of November 30. Projects should focus on comparative political, economic and social aspects of domestic and international problems, and must include the U.S. and at least one European country. Within a maximum (\$36,000 in 1979-80),

* Nominations for Junior Fellows are being sought by the Michigan Society of Fellows at the University of Michigan. Nominees should have their doctoral degree and be at the beginning of their professional career. The stipend in the first twelve months is \$14,000 plus health insurance. * The Columbia Society of Fellows in the Humanities, with a grant from the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation, will appoint two Senior Fellows for 1981-82. Awards will be made to scholars who have held the doctorate and who have been teaching as full-time faculty for at least five years but have not yet received tenure, and who have at least one significant publication to their credit. Senior Fellows will receive a stipend of \$21,000 plus regular faculty benefits. Candidates must be nominated by the chairman of their departments or of an appropriate interdepartmental committee. FUNDING NOTES

* Applications for research initiation grants under the National Science Foundation's Program of Applied Social and Behavioral Sciences must be postmarked by December 15. Full-time faculty who have had no substantial research support are invited to submit proposals in areas of their own choosing, and which will expand their research capabilities beyond the research done for the doctoral degree. These grants support initiation of theoretical or empirical projects in any area normally supported by the Social and Behavioral Sciences Section of NSF's Division of Applied Research. Applicants must be assistant or associate professors who have held the doctorate for not more than five years by December 1980. For more information, contact: Dr. Charles N. Brownstein, Applied Social and Behavioral Sciences Research Initiation Grants, Division of Applied Science, National Science Foundation, Washington, D.C. 20550. Telephone: 202/357-7538.

* Professor Stephen Gudeman has announced that the Fall quarter deadline for submission of McMillan Travel Fund requests is November 21. Application forms are available in the College Dean's office (215 Johnston Hall) and in the divisional Associate Dean's offices (205-1/2 Folwell Hall and 348 Social Sciences Building). Completed applications should be returned to 215 Johnston in care of Professor Gudeman.

* Applications for postdoctoral grants for international research should be submitted to the Social Science Research Council by December 1. These awards support research in one country, comparative research between countries in a given area, and comparative research between areas. Countries and areas included are: Africa, China, Japan, Korea, Latin America and the Caribbean, the Near and Middle East, South Asia and Southeast Asia. Announcements containing a complete description of program interests are available in 404 Johnston Hall (3-5101).

* A new guide to University and agency research policies and procedures, Sponsored Project Management, is in the process of distribution by the Office of Research Administration. * The National Research Council plans to award approximately 35 to 40 Postdoctoral Fellowships for Minorities in a program designed to provide opportunities for experience in research for American Indians and Alaskan Natives, Black Americans, Mexican Americans/Chicanos, and Puerto Ricans. Citizens of the United States who are members of one of the designated minority groups, who are engaged in college or university teaching, and who hold doctoral degrees may apply for a fellowship award of one year's duration. The deadline for submission of applications is February 2, 1981. CLA FACULTY WIN MAJOR AWARDS

April has historically been a good month for CLA faculty in regards to announcements of major fellowships and grant awards. This year is no different! The Office of Research Development is pleased to announce the following:

The only University of Minnesota faculty member to win a prestigious Guggenheim Fellowship is *George T. Wright*, English. Professor Wright will use his fellowship to write a book on "English iambic pentameter in the Renaissance." The book will consist principally of four chapters studying the metrics of Sir Thomas Wyatt, Shakespeare, Donne, and Milton.

Two CLA faculty members received Bush Foundation Fellowships for Artists. *Michael Dennis Browne*, English, will use his fellowship to complete his third volume of poetry, *Hidden*. *David Goldes*, Studio Arts, was awarded a Bush Fellowship to produce a body of photographic works dealing with objects and rituals.

All three candidates nominated by the College for National Endowment for the Humanities Summer Stipends were awarded stipends. The successful applicants are: *Pauline Yu*, Humanities, who will do a theoretical and historical study of the development of Chinese nature poetry; *John Archer*, Humanities, "Ideals of Country and City in British and American Town Planning, 1700-1870;" and *George T. * Faculty members should begin to plan and prepare now for upcoming summer and fall deadlines of major funding agencies. ORD urges you to look

carefully at the Funding Notes and Deadlines in this issue of LARES. It is not too early to begin to plan for 1982-83 and '83-'84 sabbaticals and leaves! Call us at 373-5101--we will be glad to assist you.

* The American Institute of Indian Studies (AIIS) has announced a new deadline for submitting applications: July 1, 1981. AIIS Fellowship Programs include the following: Senior Research Fellowships, Faculty Training Fellowships, Postdoctoral Study Tour Awards, Library Service Fellowships, Professional Development Fellowships, Short Term Grants, Travel Grants, Junior Fellowships, Translation Projects and Language Fellowships. For more information on these programs call 373-5101.

* July 1 is the deadline for submitting applications to direct an NEH Summer Seminar in the summer of 1982. Summer Seminars provide opportunities for teachers at undergraduate and two-year colleges to work in their areas of interest with distinguished scholars at institutions with library resources suitable for advanced study. Proposal guidelines will be available shortly from NEH. Last year's guidelines are available in our office; we will be glad to look over preliminary proposals but we ask that you get them to us as soon as possible.

* Reminder! June 1 is the deadline for submitting applications for Fulbright-Hays awards in Australia, New Zealand and the American Republics. Applications for awards in Africa, Asia and Europe are due July 1. For more information call 373-5101.

* The National Endowment for the Humanities through its Research Materials Program, offers translation grants for annotated, scholarly translations of works that contribute to the understanding of the history and intellectual achievements of other cultures and can serve as tools for further research. Texts from all disciplines relevant to the humanities are eligible for consideration. For detailed information regarding these grants call 373-5101. July 1 is the deadline for submitting translation grants proposals.

* The Ford Foundation invites applications for grants to finance the writing of non-fiction books that offer humanistic perspectives on major issues and trends in contemporary society. Approximately \$500,000 will be awarded; individual grants will range from \$10,000 to \$50,000. The program is designed to encourage work that emphasizes the following: a humanistic approach; direct observation of people and their problems; the combined insights of several disciplines. In general the work should aim to advance the understanding of concerned citizens; expanding the knowledge of a scientific audience is secondary. There are no application forms. For specific information on applying please call 373-5101. The deadline for submissions is June 5.

* June 1 is the application deadline for National Endowment for the Humanities Fellowships for Independent Study and Research. These fellowships are designed to provide time for uninterrupted full-time study and research. Fellowships are awarded for continuous periods of either six or 12 months, and carry a maximum stipend of \$11,000 for six months and \$22,000 for 12. Forms are available from: National Endowment for the Humanities, Division of Fellowships and Seminars, 806 15th Street, N.W., Washington, D.C. 20506. Please note that these applications do not have to be processed through our office.

* Some bits and pieces from the 23rd Institute on Federal Funding held in Washington, D.C. March 31 - April 2: If your research project fits the guidelines for the Army, Navy or Air Force you will receive funding! The Army Research Office's budget will increase from \$124 million in FY81 to \$179 million in FY82. Social science research is being cut across the board, from NSF to NIMH (where it is being eliminated) to AOA. Generally, research programs for minorities and women are being sharply curtailed and in some cases eliminated. At NIH profit-making corporations will soon be eligible to receive research grants--how many grants will they take away from the University? NIH is also eliminating institutional allowances and indirect costs on training grants. At NIMH federal support for mental health trainees will be eliminated by 1983. NSF fellowship programs are assured of continuation for only one more year; if the programs continue they will most likely be under a new format. At AOA most funds available are tied up in continuing commitments; the outlook for new projects is very bleak. The only program to remain intact at the National Institute for Education (NIE) is the unsolicited proposals program. Generally, the direction of NIDA's drug abuse programs is to the states. The exception is the research area which will stay in NIDA. The bad news is that the proposed FY82 budget for NIDA research is only 16.9 million as opposed to 49 million in FY80. Last but not least, in NEH's Fellowships for Independent Study and Research program, undergraduate college teachers will be emphasized rather than university faculty.
