I. GENERAL ANNOUNCEMENTS:

1. This is our first newsletter printed on a Diablo 630 ECS (extended character set) printer. We call your attention to it as it is especially useful for scholars using foreign languages and scientific symbols. The printer has no difficulty reproducing letters such as Å Æ ö ñ, etc., without having to change printwheels.

2. In cooperation with several CLA departments, our office has subscribed to a data base system which allows us to search through the proceedings of Congress and the Federal Register for grant opportunities, federal funding trends, voting records of Congressmen on aid to education, and more. In future issues of LARES, we will inform you of federal action affecting sponsored research, perhaps in a new section of the newsletter called "Washington Notes."

3. Copies of an article entitled "Subjective Variables Effecting Funding Decisions By Federal Research & Development Agencies: The Grantsmanship Game" are available for your perusal. The article, which was published in the Summer 1984 issue of the Journal of the Society of Research Administrators, deals with human variables in the decisional apparatus of the peer review system utilized by several federal agencies including the National Science Foundation and the National Institutes of Health. This is an excellent article, one we recommend for anyone applying to federal agencies for research support.

4. Dr. Margrete Klein, Program Director, Visiting Professorships for Women, and Dr. Joe Danek, Program Director, Research in Undergraduate Institutions, will discuss National Science Foundation funding opportunities at a conference to be held Friday, September 28

from 9:30-12:30 a.m. The conference will be held at the Earl Brown Center, Room 135BD. The program will be of particular interest to young investigators, women in the sciences, graduate students and first time applicants to NSF. The discussion of NSF programs will include a one hour proposal development workshop. Attendance will be limited to 200. Please contact the Office of Research Administration at 376-7682 if you would like to attend.

II. FUNDING NOTES (Deadlines are summarized in Section VII):

A. Fellowships:

1. Reminder! Guggenheim Fellowship applications are due OCTOBER 1. Please request application forms from the following address: Guggenheim Memorial Foundation, 90 Park Avenue, New York, N.Y. 10016. The Foundation will not allow ORD to distribute application forms.

2. For the academic year 1985-86, Harvard Law School offers four to five Liberal Arts Fellowships to faculty in the arts and sciences for a year of study at the Harvard Law School. Fellowship holders will study fundamental techniques, concepts and aims of law, so that in their teaching and research they will be better able to use legal materials and legal insights which are relevant to their own disciplines. The fellowship grant covers tuition and health fee only, as well as provision of office space. Call 373-5101 for information on application procedures. The deadline is JANUARY 15, 1985.

3. The deadline for submission of completed applications to the W. K. Kellogg Foundation for Kellogg National Fellowships is DECEMBER 31. Information and application forms for this program are available in the Office of the Vice President for Academic Affairs, 213 Morrill Hall (373-2033).

Fellowships for the Humanities:

1. Applications for fellowships from the National Humanities Center, which supports advanced study in history, philosophy, literature and other fields of the humanities, will be due OCTOBER 15. Under this program, both senior scholars and young scholars several years beyond the doctorate pursue research and writing in residence at the Center in Research Triangle Park, North Carolina. Fellows may organize or participate in interdisciplinary seminars on areas of mutual concern. In addition, NHC will support 3 to 5 scholars to form a seminar in 1985-86 on historical, philosophical or cultural contexts of the American Constitution on the occasion of its bicentennial.

Some 35-40 fellowships are awarded annually; most are for the academic year, but a few are available for the fall or spring semester. Stipends are based on a scholar's usual academic salary. For application forms, write: National Humanities Center, Box 12256, Research Triangle Park, North Carolina 27709. Telephone: 919/549-0661.

2. American Council of Learned Societies Fellowships and Grants-in-Aid application forms must be obtained directly from them at the following address: American Council of Learned Societies, 228 East 45th Street, New York, N.Y. 10017. Deadline for fellowships is OCTOBER 1 and for grants-in-aid DECEMBER 17.

3. Villa I Tatti: The Harvard University Center for Italian Renaissance Studies will award upward of ten fellowships for independent study on any aspect of the Italian Renaissance for the academic year 1985-86. I Tatti offers fellowships for scholars of any nationality, normally postdoctoral and in the earlier stages of their careers. For application procedures and forms call 373-5101. NOVEMBER 1 is the deadline for receipt of materials.

4. Scholars who have received their Ph.D.'s within the last three years in any field of the humanities are invited to apply for Mellon Postdoctoral Fellowships in the Humanities at Wesleyan University. During 1985-86 the Wesleyan Center for the Humanities will examine areas of study relevant to all fields of the Humanities: art history, literature, history, philosophy, religion, literary theory, and those disciplines of the social sciences that deal with traditional areas of humanistic inquiry. For more information and application procedures call 373-5101 or use the tear-sheet. Applications must be postmarked by NOVEMBER 15.

5. For 1985-86, The Rockefeller Foundation announces a program of fellowship awards for writers and scholars in the humanities whose research aids the understanding of contemporary social and cultural issues. Twenty individual awards will be made. Particularly encouraged for this year's competition are applications from arts-based humanities disciplines: musicology, art history, drama and literature in foreign languages. There are no standard application forms for the competition. However, procedures for application must be conformed to. For a copy of the fellowship announcement and application procedures call 3-5101 or use the tear-sheet. First-stage proposals must be received by OCTOBER 15.

6. The purpose of The Bush Foundation Fellowships for Artists is to assist up to 15 selected artists to set aside a significant period of uninterrupted time for work in their chosen art forms. The Program is limited to applicants working in the visual arts, literature, music composition and choreography. A stipend of \$1,666 per month for 6 to 11 months, or a total stipend of \$20,000 for 12 to 18 months will be

awarded to each Fellow. An additional \$5,000 is available for production costs and travel directly related to the Fellowship. Application guidelines are available by calling 3-5101. NOVEMBER 30 is the deadline.

B. Grants and Contracts:

1. The Smithsonian Foreign Currency Program, a national research grants program, offers opportunities for support of research in Burma, Guinea, India and Pakistan in the following disciplines: Anthropology, Archaeology and related disciplines; Systematic and Environmental Biology; Astrophysics and Earth Sciences, and Museum Programs. Grants in the local currencies of the above countries are awarded to American institutions for the research of senior scientists. Collaborative programs involving host country institutions are welcome. Awards are determined on the basis of competitive scholarly review. The deadline for submission is NOVEMBER 1 annually. 2. DECEMBER 1 is the deadline for grants for international research offered by the Social Science Research Council (SSRC). These grants are designed to support research in one country, comparative research between countries in an area, and comparative research between areas. The grants may be used for travel and research expenses as well as for maintenance. Countries and areas included in this program are Africa, China, Japan, Korea, Latin America and the Caribbean, Near and Middle East, South Asia and Southeast Asia. New this year is the Indochina Studies Program which encourages and supports research, writing and the archiving of materials on Cambodia, Laos, and Vietnam, drawing on the knowledge and experience of the refugees who have left those three countries since 1975 and who are now residing in North America. 3. International Research and Exchanges Board (IREX) administers research exchange programs with the U.S.S.R. and the countries of Eastern Europe. The program is open to advanced graduate students, postdoctoral scholars, and faculty members in all fields of study who are U.S. citizens. Exchange agreements are in effect with Bulgaria, Czechoslovakia, the German Democratic Republic, Hungary, Poland, Romania, the U.S.S.R., and Yugoslavia. In addition to fellowships, IREX offers travel grants to senior scholars; grants for collaborative projects involving American scholars and their counterparts in Eastern Europe and the U.S.S.R.; and developmental fellowships for special advanced training prior to exchange participation in the Soviet Union and Eastern Europe. Avenue, New York, New York 10017. The application deadline for most programs except travel is NOVEMBER 1.

C. Intramural Funding:

1. State Legislative funds will again be available in 1984-85 to support faculty travel for the purpose of securing sponsored grants and contracts. \$8,000 in travel funds has been allocated to the College of Liberal Arts.

These funds are intended to be used exclusively for the purpose of securing financial support for projects of research, training or public service. Generally speaking, the funds should be used for the purpose of discussing a preliminary proposal. They might occasionally be used to negotiate the budget of a final proposal, when it appears that such a face-to-face meeting would ultimately prove beneficial to the investigator's grant. The funds might also be used for travel to meet with a collaborating investigator to prepare a final proposal.

Funds may not be used for recruiting faculty or students, for student travel, for hand-delivering final proposals, or for general conferences on how to write grant proposals. They may not be used for travel to professional meetings either, though if such meetings include time spent with a program officer to discuss the investigator's preliminary proposal/research program, an appropriate amount of per diem expenses may be covered. International travel is also not supported by these funds, though as in the example of the professional meetings, an investigator may have the opportunity, while attending an international conference, to discuss a preliminary research proposal with federal agency officers. In such cases, some per diem expenses might be reimbursed.

The Carnegie Foundation has identified 4 major areas for support in the next fiscal years. Note the name of the program officer at the end of each section.

1. PROGRAM TITLE: Toward healthy child development: prevention of damage to children. This program seeks to explore ways to prevent four of the major kinds of serious harm to children and young adolescents--school failure, school-age pregnancy, childhood injury and drug abuse. In two of the areas--school failure and school-age pregnancy--grant proposals are encouraged; while in the other two areas the corporation will initiate its own projects. CONTACT: Vivien Stewart.

2. PROGRAM TITLE: Education: science, technology and the economy. Presently, there are five area of concentration: improving education in science, mathematics and technology; encouraging minorities and women in science; advancing the effective use of technology in education; pursuing research and applications in cognitive science; and developing and implementing educational policy. Emphasis will be placed on grants with wide applicability and leverage. CONTACT: E. Alden Dunham.

3. PROGRAM TITLE: Avoiding nuclear war. This program has four main areas of emphasis. The first involves support for a major effort to develop new ideas for decreasing the chance of nuclear war and to relate these ideas to the policymaking, policy-advising community. The second area will take the results of this work and support serious educational efforts to build a broad nonpartisan interest in them. The third will involve an exploration of what the behavioral sciences have to offer about negotiations, decisionmaking and conflict resolution and the long-term understanding of human conflict and its resolution. The fourth emphasis will be directed specifically at the

possibilities for fundamental, long-term change in the relationship between the Soviet Union and the United States. CONTACT: Frederic Mosher.

4. PROGRAM TITLE: Human resources in developing countries. Grants under this program are intended to identify and make use of opportunities for improving the lives of people in developing countries. Their purpose is to inform leaders and the general public in the U.S. of the needs of developing countries and the potential for helping to address these needs effectively. The program will focus initially on mothers' and children's health, on nutrition and on basic education for women and girls. CONTACT: Jill W. Sheffield.

PROGRAM TITLE: National Fellowship Program

OBJECTIVES: The program offers outstanding young professionals an opportunity to develop skills and competencies which transcend traditional disciplinary and professional methods of addressing problems. Pursuits involving broad issues in agriculture, education and health are of particular interest to the sponsor. The program provides experiences which equip participants to address social issues in creative ways.

RESTRICTIONS: Applicants must be nominated by the employing organization or an approved national association. Eligible applicants are U.S. citizens in the early years of their professional careers. In the past, Fellows have ranged in age from twenty-six to fifty, with an average age of thirty-six. Awards range up to \$35,000 for the three-year period. Although Fellows maintain their present employment during the program, they are expected to spend approximately twenty-five percent of their time on Fellowship-related activities. Awards are not made for basic research or for the acquisition of new knowledge or skills within the applicants' principal disciplines or professions. Application forms are provided.

V. BUDGET NOTES FOR SPONSORED PROGRAMS:

Our office has prepared a checklist of allowable versus unallowable costs for sponsored research. The checklist indicates whether a particular type of expenditure is usually treated as a direct cost, an indirect cost, an unallowable cost (or allowable under special conditions). Also, we have a brief outline of similarities and differences between contracts and research grants. If you wish to receive a copy of either item, please indicate on the enclosed order sheet.

VI. RESEARCH NOTES:

For a year, we have been experimenting with a computerized bibliographic system called PBS. Because of some severe shortcomings, we have not advertised the program widely. But these are apparently about to be corrected. The bibliographic system will now permit the user to create up to 1000 items on a file using an ANSI standard, to combine files, and hopefully, to download files to a word processing program for editing. Of particular interest is the ability of the program to copy bibliographic items directly via modem from mainframe data base systems such as RILIN. We believe the system will be useful for both classroom and research tasks.

A. Fellowships:

Fellowships for the Humanities:

1. The Rockefeller Foundation Humanities Fellowships have annually aided scholars from all disciplines in the humanities to advance understanding of the modern world through the better understanding of the past or through the direct assessment of the present. For 1985-86, additional Humanities Fellowships will be offered as residencies through a set of host institutions. These residencies are intended to support individual scholarship while at

2. Mellon Postdoctoral Fellowships in the Humanities at the University of Pennsylvania are for younger scholars who, by September 30, 1985 will have held the Ph.D. for not fewer than three and not more than eight years. Research proposals are invited in all areas of humanistic studies. The award carries an annual stipend of \$18,000. Completed applications must be received by DECEMBER 1. OBJECTIVES: The sponsor's general grants provide support for innovative projects whose focus is upon significant problems and their solution in the areas of:

EDUCATION--addressing the future of the educational system in promoting educational excellence and equity; the mission and effectiveness of higher education; and the use of new information technologies in formal educational settings;

GOVERNANCE--defining and improving governmental productivity and improving citizens' participation in governance;

JUSTICE--critical issues and areas of need in providing criminal and civil justice; and

MASS COMMUNICATIONS--for the improvement of the practice of journalism and the impact of media on public opinion and public policy formation.

RESTRICTIONS: There are no set limitations regarding the duration or amount of awards. Programs requiring several years of support will be considered. The sponsor encourages applications that show promise of stimulating support from other sources. Challenge or matching grants will be considered. The General Grants Program does not generally provide support for service delivery, operating programs, professional education and training, professional or popular journals or conferences, equipment or general support of other foundations or institutions. The sponsor will not consider programs that are routine responsibilities of government. However, grants to governmental and nonprofit organizations may be made for exemplary initiatives. Funds will not be awarded for any type of political activity; for conferences, publications or films, unless they are an integral part of a project; completed projects; for regular development campaigns, annual contribution drives, institutional fundraising functions or similar appeals. Please note that the indirect cost rate for research has been increased to 41% for on campus work and to 22.7% for off-campus activity. The rate is charged on total direct costs (including fringe benefits) less capital equipment, stipends and tuition, patient care, and subcontracts. The off-campus rate applies to faculty who will be

off campus for a minimum of 90 consecutive days. For additional information on indirect costs rates, call ORD or ORA. We have a booklet available on indirect costs and preparing budgets in general. Note that fringe benefits should be estimated at 26% for faculty and 23% for civil service personnel beyond 6/84.

1. Lack of new or original ideas
2. Diffuse, superficial, or unfocused research plan
3. Lack of knowledge of published relevant work
4. Lack of experience in the essential methodology
5. Uncertainty concerning the future directions
6. Questionable reasoning in experimental approach
7. Absence of an acceptable scientific rationale
8. Unrealistically large amount of work
9. Lack of sufficient experimental detail
10. Uncritical approach

I. GENERAL ANNOUNCEMENTS:

1. Please note that we have revised the order sheet at the end of LARES. It is shorter and that may present a problem for you but the sheet now has your name and departmental address already on it making it easier and quicker to fill out. Also, and most important from our perspective, it alleviates a common problem of our getting an order from "the anonymous faculty member." If you have not gotten a response from us in the past, more than likely you did not write your name on the order sheet.

2. We would remind you of our travel funds to support the preparation of applications for sponsored research. For example, if you need to consult with a program officer of a funding agency in order to complete or improve a grant application, you may apply to ORD for assistance. Please contact our office for details and an application form (very short).

3. We are prepared to install an electronic bulletin board with which you can communicate via computer with ORD. The latest issue of LARES, deadlines, and agency profiles will be available on the system in addition to your being able to transmit specific questions or leave messages for us. Also, we are hoping to have Budgetwriter on the system so that you can take advantage of the program without having to come to Johnston Hall. You must have a computer with a modem and use PC-DOS or MS-DOS. In order to participate, you will have to contact us first in order to secure a password and instructions.

4. We have obtained a copy of Stanford University's booklet on copyright regulations. If you are interested in having a very useful summary of federal regulations pertaining to copyrights as well as an overview of your rights (and nonrights) as a faculty member, we will send you a copy on request. We also have a copy of rules pertaining to patents developed by M.I.T. For software developers, we would recommend Legal care for your software by Daniel Remer, ISBN 0-917316-58-4.

5. A central topic of discussion at the National Council of University Research Administrators (NCURA) annual meeting November 6-8 concerned lobbying of Congress by universities for federal grant monies. For example, an appropriation to the Office of Education of \$50 million for a "competitive" university program, contained wording guaranteeing \$28 million to several universities including Columbia. Representatives of NSF expressed concern that the trend would continue to the detriment of their programs.

PROGRAM TITLE: The Future and the Social Welfare State

The Ford Foundation is initiating a major effort to examine and develop policy options regarding social insurance and income

protection programs. The project will support research, policy analysis, and public discussion of the future course of welfare policies in the United States. Comparisons will be made with the experiences of other industrialized states in maintaining similar programs.

The research component will consist of an advisory committee of experts who will recommend to the Foundation specific projects needed to advance the field. At least three broad topics have been identified as potential subjects for in-depth work: international interdependence (the impact of international developments on domestic social policy); values, culture, democratic theory, and social policy; and methodology and societal structures.

FINAL FUNDING LEVELS FOR INTERNATIONAL ACTIVITIES

- . USIA - 30% increase for Fulbright international exchange activities
- . Department of Education - Despite the Administration's request to eliminate these programs, Title VI International Education was increased from \$25.8 to \$26.65 million for FY85 and Fulbright to \$5.5 million, up from a half million.
- . Department of State - Title VIII Soviet Research and Studies program gets start up funds of \$4.8 million. Competition announcement will be published soon.
- . USDA - despite House attempts to cut, final conference funds new \$1.5 million scholarship program for students from middle income countries.
- . Not Passed - the Immigration bill failed to reach the House floor.

CENTRAL AMERICAN SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAMS

In the U.S. Information Agency (USIA), the FY85 appropriations for the agency includes \$9.5 million for educational exchange activities in seven countries in Central America. While programming is tentative, the agency is planning to fund about \$1 million to increase its International Visitors Program, \$4.5 million for Fulbright academic and graduate scholarships, and about \$3.5 million to initiate a new undergraduate scholarship program for students from these countries to study in the U.S.

This new undergraduate program follows the recommendations from the Kissinger BiPartisan Commission, which urged new opportunities for the economically disadvantaged in these developing countries, to counter the recent heavy recruiting in Central America for scholarships by the Soviet bloc. While it is understood that OMB has

refused to approve funding proposals for a world wide program of undergraduate scholarships in the Third World, the extensive use of education and scholarships by the Soviets in Sub Saharan Africa and the Middle East may trigger further Congressional action next session.

V. BUDGET NOTES FOR SPONSORED PROGRAMS:

NSF is continuing its efforts to streamline application procedures. A number of problem areas have been identified and changes are likely. Included on NSF's agenda are:

1. removing redundancy in signatures required and prior approvals;
2. unnecessary auditing. For example, state auditors may replace DHHS;
3. fluctuating start and stop dates;
4. less and longer term reporting;
5. removal of effort reporting;
6. shorter period of record retention.

Much of the problem confronting researchers is caused by the government treating sponsored research as procurement rather than as assistance. Consequently, we must comply with Federal Acquisition Regulations (FAR's) which make sense if one is purchasing equipment but is less appropriate with respect to controlling costs of basic research. An official at NSF called the current laws governing sponsored research at the university the "Accountants Full Employment Act."

VI. RESEARCH NOTES:

The Pew Memorial Trust awards grants through four major program areas: education, health, culture and human services. Nearly half of the grant-making budget is allocated to education grants. After listening to the concerns of representatives from the higher education community, staff at the Pew Memorial Trust have further identified critical areas of support and are expanding their grant making in those areas. They include graduate level humanities studies, purchase of scientific instrumentation, computer applications and training, improving campus libraries, access to higher education for students from economically disadvantaged backgrounds, teacher quality, and the connection between secondary schools and higher education institutions. IN ADDITION:

Professor Roy Carter, Journalism and Mass Communication, was awarded a National Science Foundation Travel Grant in the amount of \$2,561. Professor Carter will travel to Chile to plan cooperative research on mass communication, empathy, individual modernity and opinion leadership.

Two CLA faculty won Fulbright-Hayes awards for 1984-85. Professor Caesar Farah, History, will do research in Turkey while Professor Sandra Pinkerton, Linguistics, will carry out her research in Brazil.

V. AGENCY PROFILES AND FUNDING TRENDS:

The White House is seriously considering adopting a presidential commission's recommendation for a cabinet-level department of science and technology to coordinate federal research and development activities, according to a Reagan administration science official. While the commission did not specify the composition of the new department, discussion is said to be centering around the National Science Foundation, the National Institutes of Health, the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, the Department of Energy, the National Oceanographic and Atmospheric Administration and the National Bureau of Standards.

The federal government will spend roughly \$50 billion this year on research and development, most of which is awarded by NSF, NIH, NASA and the defense and energy departments. An 18-member House task force reviewing federal science policy has not yet considered the idea of a federal science department, congressional aides said.

1. PROGRAM TITLE: University Affiliation Program

OBJECTIVES: The sponsor supports university partnerships between institutions in the U.S. and abroad in the fields of humanities, social sciences, education and communications. Proposals should be designed to advance the cultural and political understanding of each country, strengthen research and teaching abilities of U.S. and overseas institutions, enrich each institution's international program and contribute to the academic excellence of the participating institutions. Awards are available in 1985 for affiliations in the following areas: Africa--Benin, Botswana, Ethiopia, Gabon, Guinea, Lesotho, Madagascar, Mauritius, Niger, Nigeria, Sierra Leone, Swaziland, Zaire and Zambia. American Republics--Argentina, Belize, Chile, Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras, Mexico, Nicaragua, Panama, Paraguay, Uruguay, Venezuela and the countries of the West Indies. East Asia/Pacific--Australia, Japan, Korea, Malaysia, New Zealand, People's Republic of China, Singapore and Thailand. Near East/Southeast Asia--Bahrain, Egypt, Jordan, India, Iraq, Morocco, Pakistan, Sri Lanka, Syria and West Bank. Europe--Ireland, Italy, Portugal and Turkey.

RESTRICTIONS: Eligible applicants in the U.S. are accredited, degree-granting institutions of higher education. Universities abroad must be recognized but not necessarily degree-granting. Proposals must be submitted by U.S. institutions. Support is provided for a minimum of two years and a maximum of three years of affiliation. The maximum amount of the award is \$50,000 and may cover the salary supplements and travel costs of participants. Institutional overhead is not allowed.

2. PROGRAM TITLE: English as a Foreign Language Institute Grants

OBJECTIVES: The sponsor provides funds for summer institutes related to English as a Foreign Language (EFL). The program is designed to support the efforts of African countries in upgrading secondary education and related teacher training. Types of awards offered are: **SUMMER INSTITUTE FOR SUPERVISORY SKILL DEVELOPMENT**--to develop a three-and-a-half week program for twelve to fifteen English teaching inspectors, supervisors and teacher trainers from Francophone Africa to upgrade teacher training in English as a Foreign Language. Activities include: supervisory skill development; teacher training; microteaching; teacher and program evaluation; current methodology for all skills; small group work and teaching large classes; materials evaluation; psycholinguistic and sociolinguistic understanding; and language enhancement, including work on pronunciation, communication and syntax. The projected cost generally should not exceed \$45,000. **ENGLISH AS A FOREIGN LANGUAGE INSTITUTE**--to develop a five-week program for thirty English teachers, inspectors, curriculum specialists and supervisors from Rwanda and Togo to upgrade teacher training in English, math and science.

3. PROGRAM TITLE: Fulbright Teacher Exchange Program

OBJECTIVES: The sponsor offers opportunities for teacher exchange and seminars abroad through the Fulbright Teacher Exchange Program. **RESTRICTIONS:** Types of awards offered are: **TEACHING POSITIONS ABROAD**--for direct exchange positions with foreign teachers and one-way exchanges. Eligible applicants are elementary and secondary school teachers, school administrators and college faculty. Not all categories of applicants are eligible for exchange with all countries. Applicants must be U.S. citizens, hold a bachelor's degree, have a current full-time teaching/administrative assignment and have three years of full-time education employment in the appropriate subject field and at the level of the position for which application is made. A teacher may reapply three or more years after completing the first exchange. Exceptions may be made for seminar participants who later apply for a teaching position. The sponsor anticipates programs in the following countries in 1985-86: Canada, Denmark, Federal Republic of Germany, France, Italy (tentative), Switzerland and the United Kingdom. **SEMINARS ABROAD**--for senior high school teachers, community and junior college faculty, four-year college/university instructors and assistant professors to participate in seminars. Not all categories of applicants are eligible for all seminars. Applicants must be U.S. citizens, hold a bachelor's degree, have two years of relevant full-time teaching experience and have current full-time employment in the subject area of the seminar. Application may be made during the second year of full-time teaching. Dependents are not permitted to accompany seminar participants. Programs are planned in Italy and The Netherlands in 1985. **COMMON FEATURES:** Preference is given to applicants who have not participated previously.

D. For Your Information:

At the fourth annual meeting of the U.S.-China Joint Working Group on Cooperation in the Basic Sciences, held in November 1984, NSF and its three Chinese cooperating organizations (the Chinese Academy of Sciences, the Chinese Academy of Social Sciences, and the Ministry of Education) agreed to expand the scope of the U.S.-China Cooperative Science Program to encompass all fields of science (including social sciences) and engineering normally supported by NSF.

The program will continue to devote most of its resources to cooperative research projects. Evaluation of proposals stresses potential benefits to science and engineering in the U.S. as well as in China. I. GENERAL ANNOUNCEMENTS:

1. If you are considering taking a sabbatical for 1986-87, the deadline for applying for federal monies in support of your research leave is quickly approaching. Most federal agencies which support sabbaticals have June deadlines; the most attractive non-federal agencies have late September or early October deadlines. ORD has a sabbatical opportunities booklet available to help you prepare an application for sabbatical support.

2. Travel funds are available to faculty in the process of preparing an application for sponsored research. If you are anticipating consulting with a program officer during the summer, it would be helpful if you would apply for these funds prior to June 30th as we would like to encumber as much of this year's allocation as possible.

3. In addition to travel support, ORD will provide limited financial assistance to offset other costs (typing, xeroxing) incurred in the process of completing an application for sponsored research.

4. During the summer, ORD will be revising its booklets on how to write proposals and budgets, application strategies, etc. If you are working on a proposal and need assistance, please request an appropriate packet of brochures to help you. We will be available all summer to consult with you on an individual basis, to search for opportunities on the SPIN system, and to assist you in the preparation of budgets.

A. Fellowships:

1. The American Institute of Indian Studies provides fellowship funds for those seeking to carry out research in India. The scope of support includes but is not limited to, the following: history, philosophy, languages, linguistics, literature, archaeology, jurisprudence, history and criticism of the arts, ethics, comparative religion and those aspects of the social sciences that employ historical or philosophical approaches. This last category includes cultural anthropology, sociology, political theory, international relations, and other subjects concerned with questions of value rather than quantitative matters.

If you wish to be considered for nomination for a stipend, send a two-page proposal outlining your project and a curriculum vitae to: Dean's Office, the Graduate School, 321 Johnston Hall. The Graduate School must receive your proposal no later than SEPTEMBER 13. The three nominees will be notified by September 20 with their final proposals due in Washington OCTOBER 1. 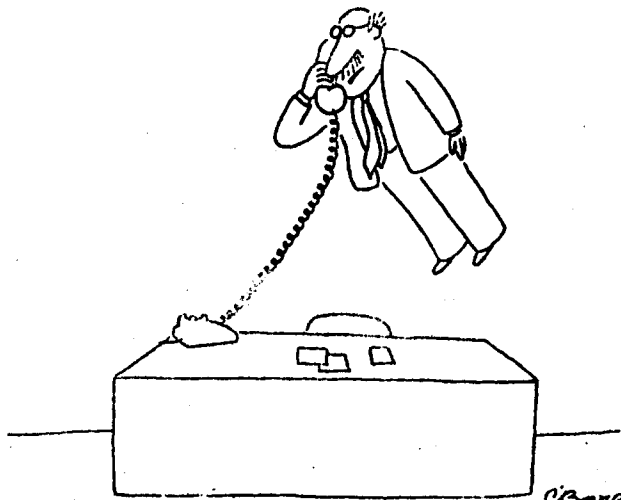
