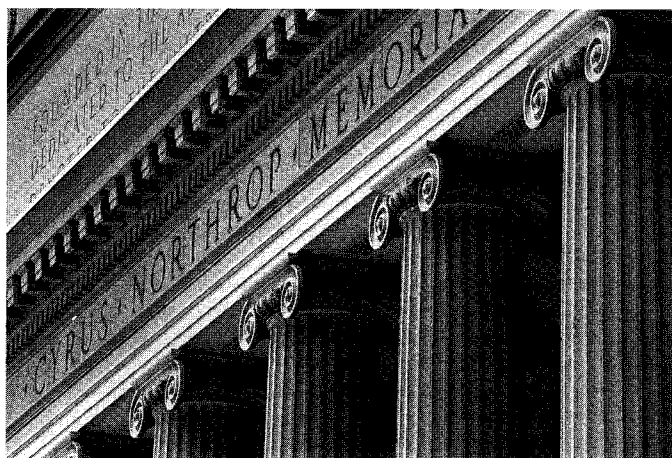
The University of Minnesota, ranked among the nation's top public universities, reflects the state of Minnesota's strong and enduring commitment to education. It is almost alone among universities in the

United States in its three defining characteristics:

- It is an international research university.
- It is a land-grant institution with a strong tradition of education and public service.
- Its largest campus—the Twin Cities campus—is located in a vibrant metropolitan area with not one, but two great cities at its center: Minneapolis and St. Paul.

The University is the primary center in Minnesota (and much of the Upper Midwest) for instruction and research in the liberal arts and sciences, health sciences, law, education, engineering, agriculture, and forestry. The Twin Cities campus comprises 19 colleges and offers a full range of academic and professional degrees. A comprehensive campus in Duluth offers undergraduate and graduate programs. The Morris campus offers a four-year liberal arts program. Crookston offers associate and baccalaureate degrees in technical, career-oriented programs. Through the Minnesota Extension Service, the University is present in each of Minnesota's 87 counties.

When the University was founded as a preparatory school in 1851, Minnesota had been a territory for just two years, and statehood was still seven years away. The school was built on little more than the pioneers' faith in education. The University struggled financially in its early years and was forced to close during the Civil War. It reopened in 1867, thanks to the energetic leadership of then-Governor John S. Pillsbury, who



came to be known as the "Father of the University." Mathematics Professor William Watts Folwell became the University's first president in 1869.

Two students received bachelor of arts degrees at the first commencement in June 1873. Since then, the University has granted a total of 515,676 degrees. Students earn undergraduate and graduate degrees in more than 250 fields of study. During the 1997–98 academic year, the University of Minnesota conferred a total of 10,312 degrees on all of its campuses.

The Duluth campus joined the University in 1947; the Morris campus, in 1960; and the Crookston campus, in 1966. Enrollment in fall 1997 was 49,184 on all four campuses. Enrollment was 37,615 on the Twin Cities campus, 7,442 at Duluth, 1,908 at Morris, and 2,219 at Crookston.

University alumni include four Nobel Prize winners, a former chief justice of the United States, two former U.S. vice presidents, the heads of Fortune 500 companies, pioneers in medicine, civil rights leaders, top journalists, distinguished teachers and scholars, performing artists, and men and women who have achieved distinction in every field.

Alumni and their families and friends are always welcome at the University. We invite you to visit campus regularly to enjoy the many educational, cultural, and entertainment opportunities that are open to the public—including performances by students in CLA's arts programs. We also invite you to continue your relationship with the University through the Minnesota Alumni Association and the CLA Alumni Society.

THE COLLEGE OF LIBERAL ARTS

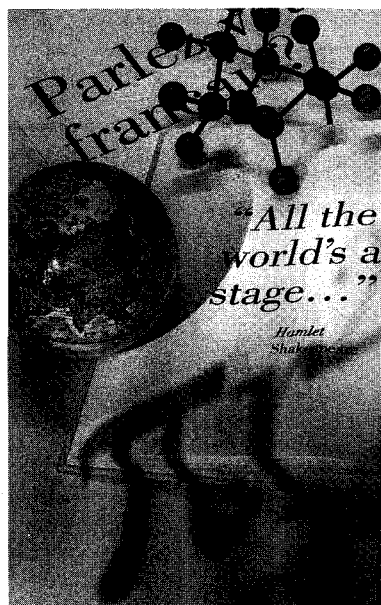

The College of Liberal Arts (CLA) was formally established at the University of Minnesota in 1868, 17 years after the founding of the University. Since then, it has become an international center for education in the arts, humanities, and social sciences.

The liberal arts span all areas of human knowledge, enterprise, and aspirations. The college offers 60 majors, with study and research opportunities in fields ranging from anthropology to women's studies. Students whose interests cross disciplines may also choose to design individualized major programs.

The majority of students who enter CLA as first-year students complete their undergraduate education in CLA. Others complete their basic liberal arts coursework in the college and then transfer to other units of the University. The college offers strong preprofessional programs with close ties to the health sciences and other professional schools at the University.

There are 13,491 undergraduate students and 1,636 graduate students enrolled in CLA programs. Nearly 500 permanent faculty members—teachers and scholars of international stature—share with students



their vast knowledge, their provocative insights, and the most current research in their fields.

CLA students acquire both breadth of knowledge and particular depth and proficiency in a specialized field of knowledge. Whatever their majors, students complete an education based broadly in the liberal arts. Courses necessary to meet general education requirements introduce students to

modes of inquiry and subject matter across the major branches of knowledge. This education is the very best preparation for lives and careers in a rapidly changing world—a solid grounding in ideas and knowledge across disciplines, across centuries, across cultures, and across geographic boundaries, as well as in critical analysis, communication, and research methodologies.

Equipped with this education, College of Liberal Arts graduates bring into the world the communication skills, critical and innovative thinking, creativity, and intellectual versatility needed for a lifetime of learning and leadership.

MADELEINE KORBEL ALBRIGHT

UNITED STATES SECRETARY OF STATE

KEYNOTE SPEAKER AND HONORARY DOCTOR OF LAWS

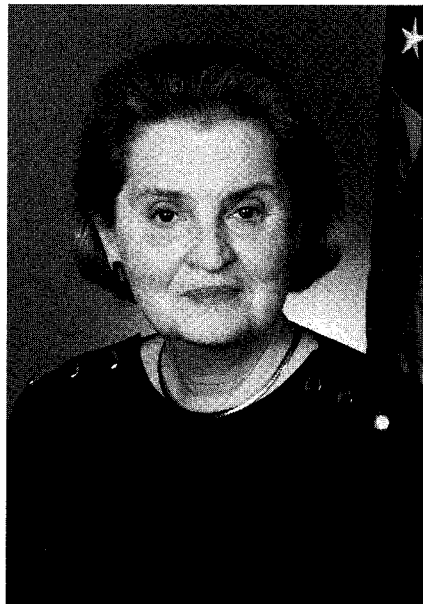
Madeleine Albright once told Ed Bradley on an interview for “60 Minutes,” “I think I was pretty boring in high school. I was a foreign policy wonk even then.”

Most observers today would call Madeleine Albright anything but boring. Known for her principled, courageous, and outspoken advocacy of democracy and human rights, Secretary Albright serves as President Clinton’s principal adviser on U.S. foreign policy and travels the globe representing the U.S in international affairs.

Daughter of a Czech diplomat and schooled in five countries and four languages by the time she was 11, Secretary Albright set out early along a path that would one day take her to New York as United States Representative to the United Nations and then to Washington, D.C., where in January 1997 she would be sworn in as the 64th United States Secretary of State. She is the first woman ever to serve in that office and is the highest ranking woman in the United States government.

As secretary of state, Secretary Albright has logged about 260,000 miles and visited with political leaders in 67 different countries around the world. As an international leader and educator, she also has been a role model for young people, whom she advises to set their sights high. She advises them as well to learn other languages—both to open doors and to show respect for other cultures.

Secretary Albright earned her credentials as an international scholar and diplomat over a period of several decades. Prior to her 1993 appointment to the United Nations, she was President of the Center for National Policy, a nonprofit research organization;



Research Professor of International Affairs and Director of Women in Foreign Service Programs at Georgetown University; a fellow at the Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars at the Smithsonian Institution; and a senior fellow in Soviet and Eastern European Affairs at the Center for Strategic and International Studies. From 1979 to 1981, Secretary Albright was a staff member on the National Security

Council and at the White House, where she was responsible for foreign policy legislation. From 1976 to 1978, she served as Chief Legislative Assistant to Senator Edmund S. Muskie.

Secretary Albright received her B.A. with honors in political science from Wellesley

College and studied at the School of Advanced International Studies at The Johns Hopkins University. At Columbia University, she received a certificate from the Russian Institute and master’s and doctoral degrees from the Department of Public Law and Government. She is fluent in French and Czech, with good speaking and reading abilities in Russian and Polish.

Today, Secretary Albright is awarded the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws. The highest award conferred by the University of Minnesota, the honorary degree is reserved for those who have achieved acknowledged eminence in cultural affairs, in public service, or in a field of knowledge or scholarship.

WILLIAM K. ESTES

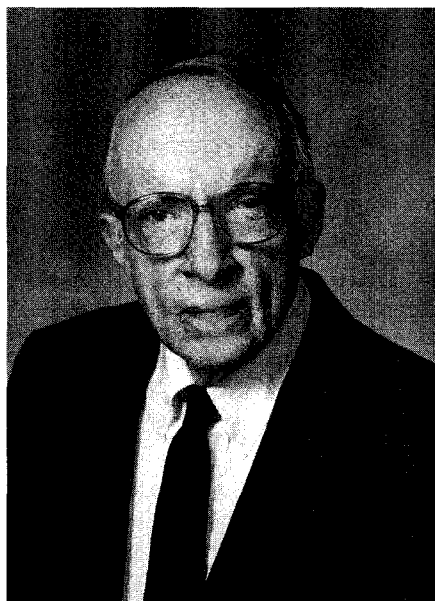
HONORARY DOCTOR OF SCIENCE

William K. Estes was awarded the U.S. National Medal of Science, the nation's highest scientific award, "for fundamental theories of cognition and learning that transformed the field of experimental psychology and led to the development of quantitative science." It was said at the time—in 1997—that "his pioneering methods of quantitative modeling and insistence on rigor and precision established the standard for modern psychological science."

Such high praise recognizes a career of intellectual leadership that began in 1940, when Estes received his B.A. in psychology from the University of Minnesota's College of Science, Literature, and the Arts (now College of Liberal Arts). Just three years later, in 1943, he received his Ph.D. in psychology at the University.

Following wartime service, mainly in the Pacific, Estes joined the faculty of Indiana University. Subsequently, he held professorships at three other great research universities: Stanford, Rockefeller, and Harvard, where he is currently on the faculty.

In research extending over 50 years, Estes developed and tested theories explaining how living organisms are able to learn stable habits in an endlessly varying



environment and how people can in many respects outperform even supercomputers at retrieving and using information from a very large-capacity memory.

Estes' extraordinary record of published research includes several hundred articles and five books. Estes counts among his many academic honors a D.Sc. degree from Indiana University and the American Psychological Foundation's Gold

Medal for Lifetime Research Achievement in Psychological Science. As a member of the National Academy of Sciences since 1963, he has led numerous collaborative efforts with scientists in Eastern Europe, focusing especially on applying methods of mathematical behavioral science to problems of reducing international tensions. His work has had and continues to have a profound impact on modern scientific psychology.

The honorary degree of Doctor of Laws that Estes receives today is the highest award conferred by the University of Minnesota. It is reserved for those who have achieved acknowledged eminence in cultural affairs, in public service, or in a field of knowledge or scholarship.

PROFESSOR CHARLES SUGNET

ARTHUR H. "RED" MOTLEY OUTSTANDING TEACHING AWARD RECIPIENT DEPARTMENT OF ENGLISH

When Professor of English Charles Sugnet talks about teaching, his eyes light up. His obvious enthusiasm for his vocation is one of the reasons why Sugnet—"Charlie" to almost everyone—has been selected to receive the Arthur H. "Red" Motley Outstanding Teaching Award.

The award honors Arthur H. "Red" Motley, an alumnus and civic leader whose lofty standards and considerable talents inspired countless others. A generous gift from Motley's family to the University of Minnesota Foundation established the endowment fund from which an annual cash award is made to honor an outstanding faculty member who is nominated by CLA students and recommended to the dean by a review committee of students, alumni board representatives, and faculty members.

As this year's recipient, Sugnet exemplifies the college's highest standards in teaching and scholarship. A very popular teacher who also is a recognized scholar of Shakespeare, feminist literary studies, creative writing, and postcolonial literature, he has consistently initiated or helped to develop new areas of research, study, and instruction that have become Department of English strengths.

Sugnet's teaching philosophy can be summed up in one word: engagement—engagement with ideas, engagement with students, engagement across cultures and perspectives. Sugnet not only welcomes alternative points of view but actively encourages them, believing that in challenge and exploration lies education.



"In my classroom," he says, "I want that rubbing of different voices against each other. It helps to maintain interest, and the students learn to formulate and express an opinion." In the words of a colleague, "Charlie's tolerant, easygoing manner and his commitment to unorthodox points of view give him a peculiar facility for both provoking and gently guiding spirited conversations in which students produce sophisticated interpretations based on their own collective insights."

To help students arrive at their own interpretation of literary texts, he encourages informal writing, which he calls "thinking on paper." Of course he expects formal writing as well, and he is an astute and exacting but generous critic. One of his former students, now a working writer, says, "Charlie convinced me that hard work pays off, that intuition must be tempered with good editing, and that writing is not a lifestyle but simply an awareness, and a dedication to the next word on the page."

Sugnet, who also received the Horace T. Morse Award for teaching in 1995, spent the 1995–96 academic year as a senior Fulbright Lecturer in Dakar, Senegal. Of that experience he says, "It was very moving for me to listen to students discussing in their third or fourth language a text as complex as Leslie Marmon Silko's *Ceremony* and showing they understood it profoundly and could relate the Native American situation in that novel to their own situation of cultural struggle and cultural hybridity."

LIBERAL ARTS DEGREES

The College of Liberal Arts offers five bachelor's degrees—bachelor of arts (B.A.), bachelor of fine arts (B.F.A.), bachelor of science (B.S.), bachelor of individualized studies (B.I.S.), and bachelor of music (B.M.). The bachelor's degrees have many requirements in common.

DEGREE CANDIDATES

Subject to successful completion, degrees will be conferred on those students listed below and on others meeting all curriculum requirements for graduation. Honor citations are provisional and do not become final until all requirements are met for the level indicated. Degrees and degree candidates are listed alphabetically in this program.

Honors designations—Honors graduates complete college and departmental honors requirements with a minimum of 60 credits overall with a grade of 'A.' Students graduating *cum laude* have earned As in at least 50 percent of their upper division credits. Students graduating *magna cum laude* have earned As in 66 percent of their upper division credits. Students graduating *summa cum laude* have earned As in 75 percent of their upper division credits and have completed an honors thesis or project.

THE DEGREE OF BACHELOR OF ARTS

This degree can be earned through majors in most CLA departments and programs. Its breadth and diversity in general education make it valuable as a base for many kinds of careers or for advanced study. CLA offers several professional majors and specializations as well as interdepartmental programs for the B.A. degree.

ACADEMIC COSTUME

Academic gowns date back to the 14th century, when they served two functions of nearly equal importance: to indicate the academic rank of the wearer and to keep the scholar warm in the drafty stone halls of academia.

The markings, cut, and color of modern-day academic-costume—cap, gown, and sometimes hood—indicate the academic degree, the field of study, and the institution that granted the degree.

Bachelor's degree gowns are black and untrimmed. A tassel hanging from the mortar board worn on the head is color-coded by college at the University of Minnesota. The College of Liberal Arts tassel is white. Honors graduates wear a medallion adorned with a maroon and gold ribbon.

Master's degree gowns, black and untrimmed, have pointed sleeves. Doctoral gowns in the United States traditionally have been black with velvet front facings and crossbars on the sleeves, but in recent years a number of universities have adopted gowns of distinctive school colors.

A new University of Minnesota Ph.D. gown and matching tam made their appearance in 1988 to celebrate the centenary of the first Minnesota doctor of philosophy degree. The new Minnesota gown is maroon-trimmed with black velvet chevrons and gold metallic braid. The traditional gown may still be worn.

The Minnesota hood, which may be worn by anyone with a doctoral degree from the University of Minnesota, is black with maroon chevron on gold. Each institution has its own pattern of colors on the hood, worn around the neck and down the back of the gown. The length and shape of the hood identify the most advanced degree the wearer has earned, and the velvet edging shows the field: blue for doctor of philosophy, light blue for doctor of education, and pink for doctor of musical arts.

At commencement ceremonies those who already have the doctoral degree wear hoods. Degree candidates wear the gowns appropriate for the degrees they are about to receive, and new doctorates are hooded on stage.

THE MACE

The University of Minnesota mace was carried for the first time in 1961 by Regent's Professor of Physics Alfred O.C. Nier at the inauguration of President O. Meredith Wilson. Art professor Philip Morton designed the mace: a crystal sphere four inches in diameter surmounted by the North Star, symbol of the state of Minnesota, on a solid aluminum handle set with the University regents' seal.
