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TWO-WEEK SUMMER COURSE
TO CONSIDER U.S. WOMEN

Attitudes toward women as reflected in elementary and high school social studies curricula will be among the topics of discussion during a two-week seminar at the University of Minnesota this summer.

The course is open to "just about anyone" and will also consider human sexuality and women in American history, literature and the arts, according to Clarke A. Chambers, a history professor who will coordinate the course.

The seminar will be taught by historians, educators, psychologists, sociologists, literary critics and American studies teachers from the University as well as high school teachers and counselors from around the state, Chambers said.

"All will be persons sensitive to the issues which have arisen from the current debate about the role of women," he said.

Classes will meet from 9 a.m. until noon daily July 19-30 and will include an hour of lecture, an hour of general discussion and an hour of small group discussion each day.

Chambers said the course, which is designed primarily for teachers and counselors, can be taken for three credits in the College of Education. (Course no. Educ 5-110).

Students in the seminar will be asked to do a project, prepare a teaching unit or write a paper relating the influence of women in their subject area. Tuition will be \$42 and students may register by mail through Continuing Education for Women, 138 Westbrook Hall, University of Minnesota, Minneapolis.
