The University of Minnesota

The University of Minnesota, ranked among the nation's top public universities, reflects the commitment to education of a state that is only 21st in population. It is almost alone among universities in the United States in its combination of three characteristics; an international research university, a land-grant institution with a strong tradition of education and public service, and a metropolitan academic community.

The Twin Cities campus, the University's largest campus, is made up of 20 colleges and offers the full range of academic and professional degrees. A comprehensive campus in Duluth offers undergraduate and graduate programs. The Morris campus offers a four-year liberal arts program. Crookston offers four-year degrees in technical, career-oriented programs. Through the Minnesota Extension Service, the University is present in each of Minnesota's 87 counties.

The University is the primary center in Minnesota (and parts of the surrounding region) for instruction and research in the health sciences, law, engineering, agriculture, and forestry; it offers all of the graduate-level programs in these fields. In all the arts and sciences and in teacher preparation the University is the only doctorate-granting institution in the state.

When the University was founded as a preparatory school in 1851, Minnesota had been a territory for just two years, and statehood was still seven years away. The school was built on not much more than the pioneers' faith in education. The University struggled financially in its early years and was forced to close during the Civil War. It reopened in 1867.

Two students received bachelor of arts degrees at the first commencement in June 1873. Since then, the University has granted a total of 472,857 degrees. Students earn undergraduate and graduate degrees in more than 250 fields of study. During the 1992-1993 academic year, the University of Minnesota conferred a total of 10,815 degrees on all its campuses.

The Duluth campus joined the University in 1974, the Morris campus opened in 1960, and the Crookston campus in 1966. Enrollment in fall 1993 was 48,524 on all four campuses. Enrollment was 37,548 on the Twin Cities campus, 7,586 at Duluth, 1,933 at Morris, and 1,457 at Crookston.

University alumni include four Nobel Prize winners, a former chief justice of the United States, two former vice presidents, the heads of Fortune 500 companies, pioneers in medicine, civil rights leaders, top journalists, and men and women who have achieved distinction in every field.

Alumni and their families and friends are always welcome at the University. Alumni are invited to continue their relationship with the University through the Minnesota Alumni Association and its college groups.

The College of Liberal Arts

At the heart of every great university is a college encompassing the basic disciplines of knowledge. That college at the University of Minnesota is the College of Liberal Arts (CLA). The college was formally established in 1868, 17 years after the founding of the University.

The traditional branches of knowledge are housed here—the social sciences, the humanities and fine arts, and the natural sciences. In addition, the college offers professional programs with close ties to these fields. Study and research opportunities are available in more than 60 major areas, from the usual, such as English, economics, history, to the less usual, such as women's studies, theoretical statistics, and speech and hearing science. They include disciplines as old as philosophy and as new as computer science. A student may also choose to design an individualized major program.

About 13,200 undergraduate students and about 2,000 graduate students were enrolled in CLA programs in fall 1993. The college is staffed by nearly 510 permanent faculty members who can share the most current research in their fields.

Many students complete their education in CLA. Others take their basic liberal arts coursework in the college and then transfer to another unit of the University such as the Carlson School of Management or one of the health science schools.

The degree requirements established by the college are designed to provide an education solidly based in the liberal arts. Courses necessary to meet general education requirements introduce students to modes of inquiry and subject matter characteristics of the major branches of knowledge.

A liberal education means not only a breadth of knowledge, but depth and proficiency in a single field of knowledge. Students are required to select a major project, usually a written paper.

The College of Liberal Arts' faculty believes a liberal arts education gives students the analytical skills and flexibility needed for shaping their lives and for adapting to new careers.



Honors & Awards

Honorary Doctorate of Science

Sir David Cox is Warden of Nuffield College at Oxford University. He earned the Master's degree at Cambridge University and the Ph.D. from University of Leeds (1949). In nominating Sir David for his honorary doctorate, the faculty of the School of Statistics described him as "arguably the pre-eminent statistician in the world." He has taught at Cambridge University, the University of North Carolina, and Imperial College of Science and Technology, where he served as head of Mathematics for five years, before

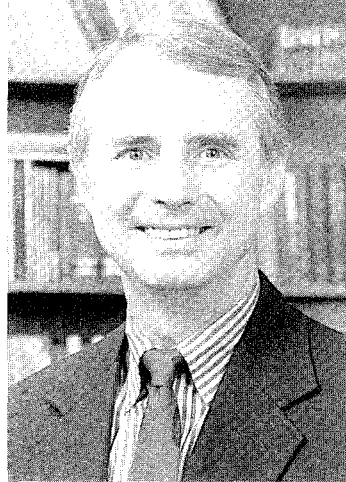
taking his current post at Nuffield College in 1988. He was knighted in 1985.

Sir David's publications number in the hundreds; he was for over twenty years editor of the leading international journal of biostatistics. His statistical methods have come to be used in many applications in technological and life science research.

Sir David's professional honors include election to the Bernoulli Society, the Royal Statistical Society, the Royal Danish Academy of Science and Letters, the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, and the U.S. National Academy of Sciences. He also received Oxford University's Weldon Memorial Prize (1984) and the Kettering Prize for Cancer Research (1990), primarily for his groundbreaking analytical and interpretive work on cancer treatment trials. Sir David has also done prize-winning work in the field of AIDS research.

Outstanding Achievement Award

Donald J. Foss earned the Ph.D. in Psychology from the University of Minnesota in 1966. After one year as a post-doctoral fellow at Harvard University, Professor Foss joined the Department of Psychology at the University of Texas-Austin. He has served at Austin since then, with the exception of two visiting scholar years at the University of Minnesota and the Max Planck Institute for Psycholinguistics in the Netherlands. Professor Foss has served as Chair of the Psychology at Texas-Austin for the last ten years. He received the Outstanding Graduate Teaching Award in 1986.



His research interests include the psychology of language, cognitive processes, and applications of experimental psychology. His primary teaching interests, in addition to these topics, include methods in psychology, applied psychology, human/computer interaction, and seminar work on various advanced topics. He has served as Consulting Editor, Associate Editor, or Editor of six leading journals of psychology, and as a Guest Consulting Editor of as many more.

Professor Foss has served the larger profession in many capacities, including development of important international databases of professional literature while on the APA's Board of Publications and Communications, chairing the Board and several of its committees, and appointing top scholars to editorial positions. His other memberships include Phi Beta Kappa, the Psychonomic Society, and the Society of Engineering Psychologists. Professor Foss is a Fellow of the APA's Division of Experimental Psychology, of the American Psychological Society, and of the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

He has served the President of the University of Texas, and many foundations, in key advisory capacities, and is a member of the University of Minnesota's President's Club.



Morse Alumni Award

Teaching and advising go hand-in-hand for Professor **Donald Gillmor** because he maintains a 9-5 “open door” policy that provides student with access to him at all times. Because of that policy and because of the kind of person and teacher he is, Professor Gillmor has had an amazing and memorable impact on his students. Letters from his students show a teacher who passionately cares about the subject he teaches and about the students he teaches. His three principles for teaching are the foundation of his success: (1) a teacher must have a general affection for students and an empathy with their inevitable trials and

tribulations, (2) he/she must genuinely feel and convey to others the excitement one finds in the material of the field, and (3) a teacher must demonstrate to students as close a mastery of the field as is possible. In addition, Professor Gillmor’s requirement of a term paper in all his courses but one reinforces his emphasis on and appreciation for the written and spoken language. His methods of teaching reflects the content of his courses: when teaching theories of free speech, he takes pains to insure every opportunity for free speech in the classroom. Finally, he is nervous before a class now as he was 30 years ago; such uneasiness is a sign of a professional.

In addition to teaching and advising, Professor Gillmor is a scholar of national and international renown. He has provided leadership in reshaping the School’s curriculum, guiding it through innovative change that provides a more flexible and integrated curriculum. This reshaped curriculum quickly became known as “The Minnesota Model” and it has been adopted by many other journalism schools during the 1980’s and early 1990’s. He worked with the Association for Education in Journalism and Mass Communication to develop a Law Division for teachers of media law. He is the director of the Silha Center for the Study of Media Ethics and Law and is the Silha Professor of Media Ethics and Law.

Commencement Address

“An Impressionist Painting”

John E. Turner, Regent’s Professor Emeritus, was a faculty member in the Political Science department from 1950 until his retirement in 1988. He is the author, coauthor, or coeditor of ten books, chapters contributed to other books, and numerous articles in professional journals. He has served as Executive Director of the International Studies Association and as a member of the councils of the American Political Science Association and the Midwest Political Science Association. He has also been on the review panels of the National



Endowment for the Humanities and the U.S. Department of Education. For seven years, he was coeditor of the John Wiley series in Comparative Studies in the Behavioral Sciences. Before his retirement, he served on a large number of committees at all levels of the University, and for two years he was Vice President of the University Senate. His special recognitions include the Morse-Amoco Award for Outstanding Contributions to Undergraduate Education, an alumni award for contributions to student government, an honorary degree from his undergraduate college, the John R. Emens Award for Support of a Free Student Press, and a Senior Fullbright Scholarship. Upon his retirement, the College established the John E. Turner Honors Essay Prize for the best essay submitted each year by students in the College of Liberal Arts.

Student Speaker

“On Being Non-Traditional”

Penelope Klein is a *summa cum laude* graduate, majoring in English with minors in Latin and History. A British citizen, she originally came to the University to attend the School of Music but decided to transfer to the Department of English, where she was very active, participating in Project Shakespeare, the peer advising program, and the undergraduate education committee. Her interest in Shakespeare, English history, and political thought, led her to write her undergraduate thesis on the political context of Shakespeare’s later history plays.

While attending classes at the University, Penelope worked for the Office of Special Learning Opportunities as the Field Listings Coordinator, maintaining a database of available internships. She also wrote a weekly theatre review for *The Minnesota Daily*, and still contributes to *University Graffiti*. Penelope also participated in student government, including membership on the Student Intermediary Board, and was active in student groups, such as the University Scholars. Her other student activities included working as publicity director and dramaturg for the Punchinello Players, and being a presenter at the National Conference for Undergraduate Research in 1992. She continues to be a radio presenter for the State Services for the Blind.

Penelope is currently applying to Library Science programs, and hopes to attend either Simmons College in Boston, or the University of Michigan, Ann Arbor, in 1994. She then wants to complete a doctorate in English or History.

Liberal Arts Degrees

The College of Liberal Arts offers five bachelor's degrees--bachelor of arts (B.A.), bachelor of fine arts (B.F.A.), bachelor of science (B.S.), bachelor of individualized studies (B.I.S.), and bachelor of music (B.M.). The bachelor's degrees have many requirements in common.

Students making satisfactory academic progress are generally free to select the major and minor of their choice. Some programs, however, limit the number of majors admitted (the B.F.A., the B.M., computer science, the B.S. in economics, English, international relations, journalism, music, political science, speech communications, and biology in CLA, as well as some health science programs and some programs in other colleges).

Degree Candidates

Subject to successful completion, degrees will be conferred on those students listed below and on others meeting all curriculum requirements for graduation. Honor citations are provisional and do not become final until all requirements are met for the level indicated. Degrees are listed alphabetically with this program.

Associate in Liberal Arts

The Associate of Liberal Arts is a two-year degree, now discontinued, that is comprised of a portion of the general education requirements for the baccalaureate degree. This degree is conferred only upon special permission of the college.
