LOTUS DELTA COFFMAN

The death of our President on the eve of the opening of school has had a sobering effect on faculty and student body alike. The sense of personal loss and our sympathy for the family is very real at the present time. We must now take up the challenge to continue as he would have us do. Dr. Coffman's leadership was the more effective because of his delegation of responsibility to us as individuals, the mark of a great leader. He protected us to the best of his ability from the many inconveniences which ordinarily trouble university people. He gave us group insurance, hospital insurance, a retirement plan and aided us in the building of our homes. He did not ask us to share his views in everything but he did want us to be honest with ourselves. He did not allow intolerance to raise its ugly head on this campus. He was wise and just in that he helped all departments to better themselves as the record so clearly reveals. He had the courage of his convictions as his many utterances on mooted questions will show. He wanted his associates to judge him and he asked of us that we win the respect of ours and not necessarily the general public. The incidents that came about as the result of this philosophy will some day be known and will add greatly to his fame as a man and leader. He came to us in middle life and left before his time, always a progressive, alert, active man with greater vision than most of us. He alone deserves entire credit for the Center for Continuation Study, an institution whose possibilities are not yet visualized. And he did this after the age of 60. Truly a great man died last week, but his spirit will never die if we can but in small measure imitate his virtues.

I. NEW YEAR

Each year brings its changes as old and new members mingle on the opening day of staff meeting. Those who are not here this year are with us in memory as we greet the new members of our group. Some of the changes which have occurred since last we met are as follows:

Obstetrics and Gynecology:

Emeritus Professor Jennings C. Litzenberg is now in private practice as Professor John McKelvey takes over the reins with the best wishes of all for a long and successful career. Leonard A. Lang goes to the Minneapolis General Hospital as a successor to the late John Urner. His office will be at the University of Minnesota Hospital pending the opening of his new quarters in the Medical Arts Building, Minneapolis. A testimonial dinner will be given at the Minnekahda Club on the evening of October 14 by Dr. Litzenberg's former associates and students for the chief. Their present has already been given to him in the form of the lowest maternal mortality in 1937 in the history of Minnesota.

Neurology and Pediatrics:

Child Guidance has come home to the Medical School with a new department in charge of Eric Kent Clarke and Reynold A. Jensen. The former is a delightful gentleman who should have little difficulty converting us to the cause while the latter is one of our own men back with new polish collected in the East. The creation of the department was made possible by the generosity of the Stevens Avenue Foundation of Minneapolis and the Commonwealth Fund.

Pediatrics:

The mother of pediatricist Paul Dwan has given funds for a new human serum laboratory which is located in the Department of Pediatrics. This activity fills an important need in the prevention and treatment of the specific infectious diseases in adults and children. A comprehensive dental research program between pediatrics and dentistry is now being formulated as the result of a gift from the Carnegie Corporation. Extensive alterations are being made in the infirmary of the Dental School to accommodate the research group.

Postgraduate Medical Education:

The Commonwealth Fund has made possible the study and development of the program of postgraduate medical education at Minnesota. (See program elsewhere). Dr. Hebbel, pathology, Dr. Novak, bacteriology, and a clinical biochemist to be appointed will take over the laboratory service. The administration of the course in medical technology and the conduct of the general staff meeting will remain as present. Dr. Rudolph Koucky is now in private practice as pathologist to St. Mary's, Eitel and Abbott Hospitals. His long and faithful service contributed greatly to the success of these meetings. This is our first year without him and he will be missed.

Cancer Institute:

The National Cancer Institute of the United States Public Health Service has designated the University of Minnesota as a training center. Doctors Buirge, Craft and Lind have been appointed National Cancer Institute Fellows to serve on pathology, surgery and irradiation therapy under the direction of Drs. Bell, Wangensteen and Stenstrom.

Orthopedic Surgery:

The parents of Dr. Wallace H. Cole, Director of the Division of Orthopedic Surgery, have established an orthopedic fellowship which the University has named in their honor. Appointment will soon be made. This will assure proper training for several men in this important subject.

Medicine:

Dr. Cecil J. Watson, Associate Professor of Medicine, has been named Director of the Division of Medicine with J. C. McKinley remaining as Head of the Department of Medicine and Director of the Division of Neuropsychiatry.

Other Departments:

Certain changes in administrative procedure, promotion of members and special projects will be detailed in later issues of the bulletin. Visitors to our institution sense the constant urge to improve patient care, teaching and research.

The 500 registrants in postgraduate medicine during the past 18 months have also sensed our eager willingness to help them to the best of our ability with their problems. With departments of undergraduate, graduate and postgraduate medicine, we are now one of the few schools which has a complete educational service for the profession as well as direct service to the underprivileged sick of our state.

The spirit of this organization is the direct result of the able leadership of Harold S. Diehl, Dean of the Medical Sciences, who has demonstrated beyond any question of a doubt that Minnesota will develop a medical school along lines that will soon make her the leader among the better schools.

SUGGESTIONS FOR MEETINGS

- Type II -- Group studies of diseases and injuries with special reference to end results.
- Type III - Special departmental reports with review of activity of entire department or special messages to the group.

Copy for mimeographing should be from 14 to 28 double-spaced typewritten pages in length. In order to give those who will be asked to discuss the subject an opportunity to plan their remarks, copy should be delivered at least two weeks in advance of the meeting. If submitted in longhand material should be in our hands at least three weeks in advance.

A limited number of lantern slides will be made from the special fund. Everyone should plan to deliver his paper in thirty minutes which will allow fifteen minutes for discussion.

Bulletin

One will be published each week. Copies will be available in the corridor after the meeting. The bulletin is financed by special educational funds contributed by the Citizens' Aid Society of Minneapolis, a philanthropic group consisting of Mrs. George Chase Christian, Franklin M. Crosby, George P. Case, and William P. Christian. This is the tenth successive year they have sponsored this bulletin, and we are deeply grateful to them for their continued interest and support.

Program

According to the American College of Surgeons, a general staff meeting program should consist of: "(1) selected cases containing object lessons on improvement of technique of diagnosis or therapy; (2) group studies of various common diseases and injuries with special reference to end-results; (3) discussion of special reports from various clinical and scientific departments; (4) discussion of ways and means of elevating scientific efficiency of hospital staff." We attempt to follow this outline.

Abstracts

Reviews of recent literature pertaining to the subject under discussion have been assembled by various staff members for several years. We have the promise of continued support during the coming year. These abstracts are a valuable contribution as for the most part they are compiled from the more recent knowledge in the field correlated with older experiences.

Case Reports

It has been our aim to present illustrative case reports or group summaries of all subjects under consideration. In practically every instance, it is the individual case report or a study of a group of cases which determines the choice of the subject for discussion.

Departmental Reports

In our organization, the staff business proper is conducted by an administrative committee. We have welcomed departmental or general reports in the past because they give us information which promotes cooperation between the departments. Research studies of the staff of the <sup>M</sup>edical School and Hospital are presented at the Interdepartmental Seminar.

Movies

A single reel sound picture will be shown at the beginning of each meeting from 12:15 to 12:27 P.M. As a general rule, the selection will be made from non-medical subjects. This service is supplied by the Department of Visual Education, University of Minnesota. We would like to show a scientific film for each subject, but, as a general rule, such pictures are not available. We would

greatly appreciate learning from any staff member of pictures they can recommend.

### Discussions

The discussions are the most important part of the meetings. An attempt is made to base them on the case reports, group studies and abstracts. Advance copies of the bulletin are supplied to the persons most interested so that they may prepare their discussions. In the past, this has proven very valuable but it must not be assumed that the discussion is limited to these staff members. It is our earnest hope that any person present will take part.

### Guests

Any practitioner, intern or graduate student is welcome. As a general rule, undergraduate students to not take part.

### Distinguished Visitors

It has not been our policy to relinquish our meeting time for lectures by visiting physicians but we are most anxious to have them join in our discussions. If we know of their coming for a reasonable time in advance, we can prepare meetings in fields in which they are interested. We wish to thank all who have cooperated in the past and trust that they will assist us during the present year.

### Cooperation

It has been decided to plan the entire year's program in advance. For this purpose, meetings have been assigned to the various departments. The contribution from each department will be a direct assignment from the head. We trust that all who are given these assignments will cooperate to the best of their ability in the preparation of good programs.

### Appreciation

We thank all who have helped in the past and look forward to continued cooperation during the coming year. Come to the meetings on time, arrange your work so that you can stay until the end, willingly accept responsibility in the preparation of the programs and discussions, and you will make these meetings an all-hospital affair. The standard in the past has been very high; through your cooperation and interest it can be improved. It is not the purpose of the program committee to burden anyone with excessive responsibility. For that reason we trust that even a greater number of our staff men will take part this year.
