Series Information:

Minnesota holds the all-time series lead over Ohio State 60-52-1, including a 10-1 victory the last time the Golden Gophers visited Columbus. The Maroon and Gold rocked the Buckeyes in an elimination game in the Big Ten Tournament, sparking a run that pushed Minnesota into the title game versus the University of Michigan.

The last time the Golden Gophers were in Columbus for a four-game series, they dropped the first two games by one run each, but rebounded to take the next two for the series split.

Offense, Offense, Offense:

Minnesota's bats have been cracking as of late, and they have been driving in runs. The Maroon and Gold have scored in double figures in 13 of its last 24 games, including four games of 15 or more runs. Anderson and his staff are 16-0 in 2001 when scoring in double figures and have won their last 37 games, dating back to 1999, when scoring 10 or more runs in a game. The last time Minnesota lost a game when they tallied 10-plus runs was May 23, 1999 when they lost to Michigan 12-11 in the second game of a double-header. Minnesota won the first game 13-10.

Slammin' Sammy:

Freshman outfielder Sam Steidl has been swinging a good bat for Minnesota. Steidl, leading the team in average at .391, has the team's longest hit streak of the season at 22 games. In those 22 games, Steidl batted .476 (30-63) with 18 RBI and 19 runs scored, including three three-hit performances and six other multi-hit contests. Steidl is currently 26th in the nation in hitting with a .424 average on the year.

All Jack'd Up:

Junior third baseman Jack Hannahan earned Co-Big Ten Player of the Week honors for his performance versus the University of Michigan. On the weekend, Hannahan batted .533 with nine runs scored and seven runs batted in. He belted four home runs in the series, including a game-winning two-run shot in the bottom of the seventh inning Saturday afternoon.

Hired Hit Man:

Junior Scott Howard entered play last week 25-for-107 (.234), but in his last four games, Howard batted .625 (10-for-16) with eight runs scored, including a streak of eight consecutive hits versus Iowa. Howard reached first base with a hit or a walk in his first 10 plate appearances against the Hawkeyes. Howard was a flawless 4-for-4 with runners in scoring position and 6-for-8 as a leadoff hitter. In his stretch of eight straight hits, Howard roped a career-high five knocks – two for doubles – versus Hawkeye pitching.

Mowin' Em Down:

Minnesota pitching struck out 31 batters in 32 innings last weekend versus Iowa, including a 10-strikeout performance from sophomore C.J. Woodrow. Woodrow sat down the career-high in seven innings of work, while walking just one batter, for his second career complete-game victory. Freshman lefty Jay Gagner added to total by buzzing six Hawkeyes in his six-inning performance. Woodrow, Gagner and freshman Chad Drexler each struck out the side to help bring Minnesota's team total to 273 strikeouts in 349 innings.

The Long Ball:

Minnesota has been knocking the ball out of the park as of late. Over the last 20 games, the Golden Gopher offense has roped 33 round trippers – five in the last two games. In the first 19 games of the schedule, Minnesota only managed to fly five pearls over the wall. Collectively, the Golden Gophers have hit 42 home runs in 2001. Hannahan leads the team with 12. The power surge began when Minnesota hit the road for a stretch of games in Indiana for the annual "spring trip".

Road Warriors:

Minnesota wrapped up its Indiana road trip with a 4-3 extra inning victory over Indiana University. The Golden Gophers won seven of nine games in the Hoosier state by taking three of four from Indiana, two of three from Purdue and two non-conference wins against Butler and Ball State. As a team, the Golden Gophers hit .348 (114-328) over the trip. They scored 66 runs and launched 36 extra-base hits, including 15 hoe runs. In the field, the Maroon and Gold committed just nine errors in less than favorable (and sometimes less than playable) conditions. Pitching struck out 72 batters, while walking just 36. Minnesota returned home with an 8-2 record in its last 10 road games.

Anderson Reaches 700, then Surpasses Legend:

Head Coach John Anderson became the winningest coach versus conference opponents in Big Ten history with the Friday win over Indiana. It was record-breaking win number 296 for "14", but just another notch on his pole. Anderson earned career victory 700 versus Purdue the weekend before, and the weekend following Indiana, he tallied win number 300 versus Big Ten opponents.

Heading into this weekend, Anderson is 717-441-3 overall and 308-161 in the Big Ten, and surpassed legend and former Golden Gopher coach Dick Siebert for the most conference wins of any Big Ten coach in conference history.

Anderson, in the midst of his 20th season as the Minnesota skipper, is ranked 40th in the nation amongst active coaches for career victories, and 49th for career winning percentage. Anderson has not had a losing season in his tenure, and has twice been named Big Ten Conference Coach of the Year – most recently last season when he led Minnesota to a 20-8 conference record and a regular season conference crown.

The Program:

The Golden Gopher baseball program is one filled with a history of success and pride. Among the facts:

A Har-raise-ing Effort:

Senior catcher/designated hitter Kurt Haring was named the Big Ten's Baseball Player of the Week for his performance versus the University of Iowa this past weekend. He is the second consecutive Golden Gopher to earn the honor. Junior third baseman Jack Hannahan collected the award last week.

Haring, a native of Champlin, Minn, batted .438 (7-16) with a double, a triple and three home runs - all in consecutive games. He posted a slugging percentage of 1.188 and 19 total bases, while scoring six times and knocking in eight RBI against a Hawkeye pitching staff that was at the top of the conference entering the weekend. All three of Haring's home runs were solo shots to lead off an inning, sparking the Golden Gopher offense. In each of those three games, Minnesota held a slim lead or trailed Iowa, scoring a combined five runs - only three of which were earned. Following Haring's heroics, the Golden Gopher bats erupted for 23 earned runs against Iowa pitching, en route to a weekend sweep of the Hawkeyes and sole possession of first place in the Big Ten. The sweep also continued a streak of 23 consecutive victories over the Hawkeyes, dating back to 1996.

This is Haring's first year in the batter's box. He spent his first three seasons with Minnesota on the mound, but moved to the

catcher position to help alleviate a vacancy caused by graduation. Haring is batting .375 on the year - second on a Golden Gopher team that is batting .322 collectively - with six home runs, seven doubles, 30 RBI and 25 runs scored. He is also second on the team with a .656 slugging percentage.

Walking Off:

Hannahan's two-run home run in the first game of Saturday's double-header was Minnesota's second "walk-off" home run of the season. The two-RBI bomb lifted the Golden Gophers over the Wolverines by a score of 7-6. In the top half of the inning, Michigan hit a three-run homer to take a one-run lead over Minnesota, but Hannahan countered with his jack to right-center field, sparking the Golden Gopher offense the rest of the weekend.

Sophomore Scott Welch belted his second career home run in the first game of the double header against Central Michigan (2/12). It also could not have come at a more opportune time, as it gave the Golden Gophers a 5-4 victory over the Chippewas. Minnesota hit just one game-winning home run in all of last season. Josh Holthaus connected for a three-run home run in the bottom of the ninth inning to lift the Maroon and Gold over Indiana on May 5, 2000 at Siebert Field by a score of 5-4.

Birk Lost for Most of 2001:

Senior lefthander **Ben Birk** has missed the last six weeks of play, after being struck in the face by a line drive in the Hormel Foods Baseball Classic tournament.

Birk, who started the game against fourth-ranked Miami, delivered a 1-2 pitch to Hurricane third baseman Kevin Howard that was returned at 99 miles per hour, hitting Birk just over his left eye. Birk suffered multiple fractures to his face and underwent surgery to repair the injuries on Friday, March 16. The Golden Gophers are hopeful that he will be able to return before the end of the season. Birk is currently ranked as one of the "Top 100 College Prospects" by *Baseball America*.

National Recognition:

The Golden Gophers entered the season ranked 24th in the nation by *Baseball America*. They were the only Big Ten representative in the poll. It is the third consecutive year Minnesota has been rated among the nation's top 30 teams in the preseason. Anderson and company were also recognized by *Collegiate Baseball* and *Baseball Weekly* as one of the top 40 teams in college baseball for 2001. *Street and Smith* ranked the Golden Gophers as high as 22 in its preseason poll.

The 2001 Pro-Alumni Game:

The Pro-Alumni team dropped the 2001 varsity squad 4-0 for the first no-hitter in the history of the event. The visiting veterans opened up the game by tallying three runs in the top half of the first inning and never looked back. Rick Brosseau started the Alumni off with a single to right. Matt Scanlon shortly followed with a single of his own. Robb Quinlan picked up right where he left off in a Golden Gopher uniform by doubling in Brosseau and Scanlon, and putting the Pro-Alumni team on the board first. Seattle

Mariner Dan Wilson backed up Quinlan with another double, and just like that, the former greats were ahead 3-0. Both sides would trade swings, but the vets added one more insurance run in the eighth for good measure, thanks to a Quinlan home run, as the 2001 Maroon and Gold surrendered nine hits and yet another game to the Pro-Alumni team.

Neagle Endows School's Fourth Scholarship:

Former pitcher and current major league star Denny Neagle gave the University a \$180,000 gift to permanently endow a scholarship in his name for the Dick Siebert Scholarship Endowment Program. The endowment program was started in 1993 and has endowed four scholarships since then. The University has 7.7 more scholarships to go to fully endow the program's 11.7 NCAA allowable baseball scholarships.

Neagle was an All-Big Ten selection in 1989 and helped lead the team to a Big Ten title in 1988. A third-round selection in the 1989 Major League Draft by the Minnesota Twins, he won a National League title with Atlanta in 1996 and a World Series title last year with the New York Yankees. He recently signed a five-year deal with the Colorado Rockies. He has a 105-69 all-time record with a 3.92 career earned run average.

Neagle joins Paul Molitor, Calvin Griffith and David Weiner as benefactors of scholarships in each of their names.

2000 Season in Review:

The Golden Gopher baseball team earned its 18th Big Ten Conference title and advanced to an NCAA Regional for the 24th time in school history. By winning the regular season title, Minnesota earned the right to host its first Big Ten Tournament since 1986. The conference title and big wins on the road at Wichita State earned the U of M the right to host its first NCAA regional since 1977. The Golden Gophers had seven players earn all-conference honors, tied for the most in the Big Ten. Another milestone was the 10-3 win over Michigan on March 24, 2000. The school's 2,000 win, it made Minnesota only the 14th school in NCAA history to surpass that plateau. The school's all-time record at the end of the 2000 season stood at 2,033-1,187-26 (.630), which is currently the 16th-best among Division I baseball programs in the country.

These Guys Were Big:

The Golden Gophers had seven players earn All-Big Ten honors in 2000 - tied for most in the conference. Righthanded pitcher Mike Kobow highlighted Minnesota's All-Big Ten team by earning first-team honors. Kobow was outstanding on the mound for Minnesota as he compiled a record of 9-2 with a 3.71 ERA in 13 starts this season. Ten players from the roster garnered Academic All-Big Ten accolades.
