### 120 GRIDDERS INVITED

Minneapolis, MN--- "Smokey" Joe Salem and his "boys" are scheduled to open pre season football practice Monday, August 20, when the University of Minnesota begins fall preparations for its 1979 football season.

Salem, returning to his alma mater for his first year as head coach, will greet approximately 120 candidates for the Golden Gopher varsity. Included are 32 returnees, 24 incoming freshmen and transfers, plus several walk ons.

All newcomers, under new NCAA rules, report August 15 for five days of familiarization and indoctrination drills in T-shirts and shorts, no pads.

The returnees assemble Saturday, August 18, and do their thing for writers and photographers on media day, with the entire squad starting twice a day drills the following Monday.

The Gophers have three weeks of preparation before their season home opener September 8 against Ohio University. Remaining home opponents and dates include Ohio State, September 15, Northwestern, September 29, Purdue, October 6, Illinois, October 27, and Wisconsin, November 17.

The Illinois game October 27 has been designated Minnesota's Homecoming gala.

Salem, 41, returns to Minnesota where he played backup quarterback under coach Murray Warmath in 1958-59-60. He was a member of the national championship and Rose Bowl squad the latter year listed behind All-America QB Sandy Stephens on the depth chart.

Salem remained at Minnesota as an assistant to Warmath through 1965. He then was head coach at the U. of South Dakota for nine years, and has just completed a four-year stint at Northern Arizona University.

At both the latter schools Salem inherited football programs that were at rock bottom in terms of successful campaigns. However, he turned both programs into championship organizations. He was named Big Sky Coach of the Year in 1977 and 1978, and NCAA District 8 Coach of the Year in 1977.

At Minnesota, Salem inherits a program playing mostly at the .500 level. But to raise that level of performance against Big Ten competition, well, it may take some patience on all sides.

His 13-year coaching record reads 73 wins, 55 losses and 2 ties. In

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conference play his teams were 47-33-1. Northern Arizona won the Big Sky Conference last year with a 6-0-0 record.

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FINAL GRID TENDER

Minnesota head football coach Joe Salem announced today he has completed signing recruits for 1979 as John Wood, a defensive lineman from Wausau, WI, inked his national letter of intent this week.

Wood was scouted by the Gopher staff on film last Winter in games played for D. C. Everest high but is wasn't believed he had the necessary size to play Big Ten football. However, through an intensive conditioning and weight program, Wood built himself up to 228 pounds to go with his 6-foot-3 frame.

Salem scouted the Wisconsin prep all-star game recently and said Wood was a standout in the contest. His team won the game and Wood played exceptionally well on defense. His signing brings to 25 the number of freshmen and transfers who have accepted football tenders at Minnesota this year.

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BIG TEN SKYWRITERS

Approximately 25 of the top newspaper sportswriters from the midwest will visit the University of Minnesota campus August 28 when the annual Big Ten Skywriters end their 1979 conference swing.

The party each year visits every Big Ten campus to preview its upcoming football program for newspapers across the midwest. This year marks the 26th annual skywriters tour.

GOPHERS IN OLYMPIC HOCKEY

University of Minnesota hockey, and all Minnesota amateur hockey in general received a giant boost of recognition this week when the final roster of the 1980 U.S. Olympic Hockey Team was announced.

A total of 17 Minnesota natives--including 10 current or former University student-athletes--were named to the 26-man roster.

Olympic Team coach Herb Brooks, on a year's leave as head coach of the Minnesota Gophers, and his seven-man advisory board made up mostly of other college coaches, announced their selections Tuesday in Colorado Springs, site of National Sports Festival II.

Gopher underclassmen named to the squad include sophomore to be defenseman Mike Ramsey, an all-NCAA tournament selection last March, plus sophomore center Neal Broten, 1979-80 Gopher co-captain and senior center Rob McClanahan, and senior wings Steve Christoff and Eric Strobel.

However, both Strobel and Christoff had already indicated they would not return to Minnesota next season. They elected to either make the Olympic Team or try professional hockey. Both have already been drafted.

Additional former U. of M. standouts named include All-American defenseman Bill Baker, goalie Steve Janaszak, and wing Phil Verchota, members of Minnesota's 1979 NCAA championship team, plus defenseman Les Auge and wing Buzz Schneider.

"I have to be honest and admit that I greeted the news with mixed emotions," says Brad Buetow, acting U. of Minnesota head hockey coach for 1973-79 in Brooks' absence.

"Naturally I'm thrilled and proud as anyone to see both the University program and all Minnesota gain such recognition. We have long believed our State has constructed the best amateur program in the nation.

"That has been further proved by the outstanding success--three NCAA championships in six years under coach (Herb) Brooks--of recent university teams.

"On the other hand, the loss of three men who would have been the heart of our 1979-80 team--(Rob) McClanahan, (Neal) Broten and (Mike) Ramsey---has to be a bit of a blow. But it was not entirely unexpected.

"I know Brooks did not want to deplete our ranks, and actually could have taken more of our underclassmen to Colorado Springs. But I also know the men he and his advisors chose are players who not only deserved to be on the Olympic squad but will also help represent the U.S. with its strongest team possible.

"I can only wish coach Brooks and his players the very, very best and hope they come back to Minnesota covered with glory and Olympic medals."

new positions have been established and staff members named in the Men's Intercollegiate Athletic Department at the University of Minnesota, with both appointments subject to final approval by the Board of Regents.

Those additions "include" Jerome Fishbain who will serve as the Administrative Assistant to Head Coach Joe Salem, and Robert Rohde who will function as weight training coordinator.

"We're extremely pleased to be able to add these two positions to our staff," Salem said this week, "and we're even more pleased that we were able to find such qualified people to fill those posts." Both hope to assume their new duties prior to the start of fall football practice August 20.

Rohde will be responsible for Minnesota's complete in-season and out-of-season conditioning program for Gopher football, and he also will direct and supervise a weight training program for all varsity athletes at the U of M.

Fishbain will function as an off-the-field assistant to Salem and will concentrate his efforts on coordinating Minnesota's recruiting efforts, both in and out of the football season.

"We felt a definite need for the addition of both of these positions," Salem said. "It was our belief that we needed someone to work with our athletes on their strength in and out of the season. And we felt that it could be accomplished with better efficiency if that program could be directed during football season at hours other than those normally used for practice. Rohde will be able to accomplish those things for us."

In regard to Fishbain, Salem said, "We felt that it would be extremely difficult to find a person with backgrounds in both football and administration, so we feel extremely fortunate to come up with a person with the qualifications that Jerry has. We're very pleased."

Rohde will come to Minnesota from Lourdes Academy in Oshkosh, WI., where he served as head football coach last year. Prior to that, he was a physical education instructor and football coach at Jacobs Junior High School in Stevens Point, WI., and at Ben Franklin Junior High School, also in Stevens Point. He has his B.S. degree from UW Stevens Point and his M.S. degree from Winona State.

Fishbain boasts 21 years of experience as a teacher, coach and administrator at the high school and college level. For the past four years he has served as the assistant director of admissions and defensive coordinator at UW River Falls. He has his B.S. degree from UW LaCrosse and his M.S. degree from the University of Wisconsin.



## U OF M VETERANS REPORT FOR DRILLS

After a half-dozen workouts with Minnesota's incoming freshmen, Coach Joe Salem seemed pleased to have his veterans report for the start of fall football practice on Monday.

"The new NCAA plan permitting freshmen to come in early is a good idea," Salem said, "and we got a lot done in a short time. But it's nice to have the old timers here now so we can really get down to work."

That "work" will include three sessions daily as the Golden Gophers prepare for the 1979 season opener against Ohio University at Memorial Stadium on Saturday, September 8.

And although Salem expressed approval of having his entire squad assembled, and while the hopefuls numbered more than 100, there was one notable among the missing that does cause some concern.

Kent Kitzmann, senior-to-be fullback from Rochester, has not reported and will be unable to compete this year. Kitzmann suffered a neck injury late in the 1978 season and missed the final three games. He passed up spring drills because of that injury but hoped to be ready this fall. However, the three-year starter who set an NCAA single game rushing record with 57 carries against Illinois two seasons ago, found that despite treatment there was no improvement over the summer. Consequently, he has been advised to give up football.

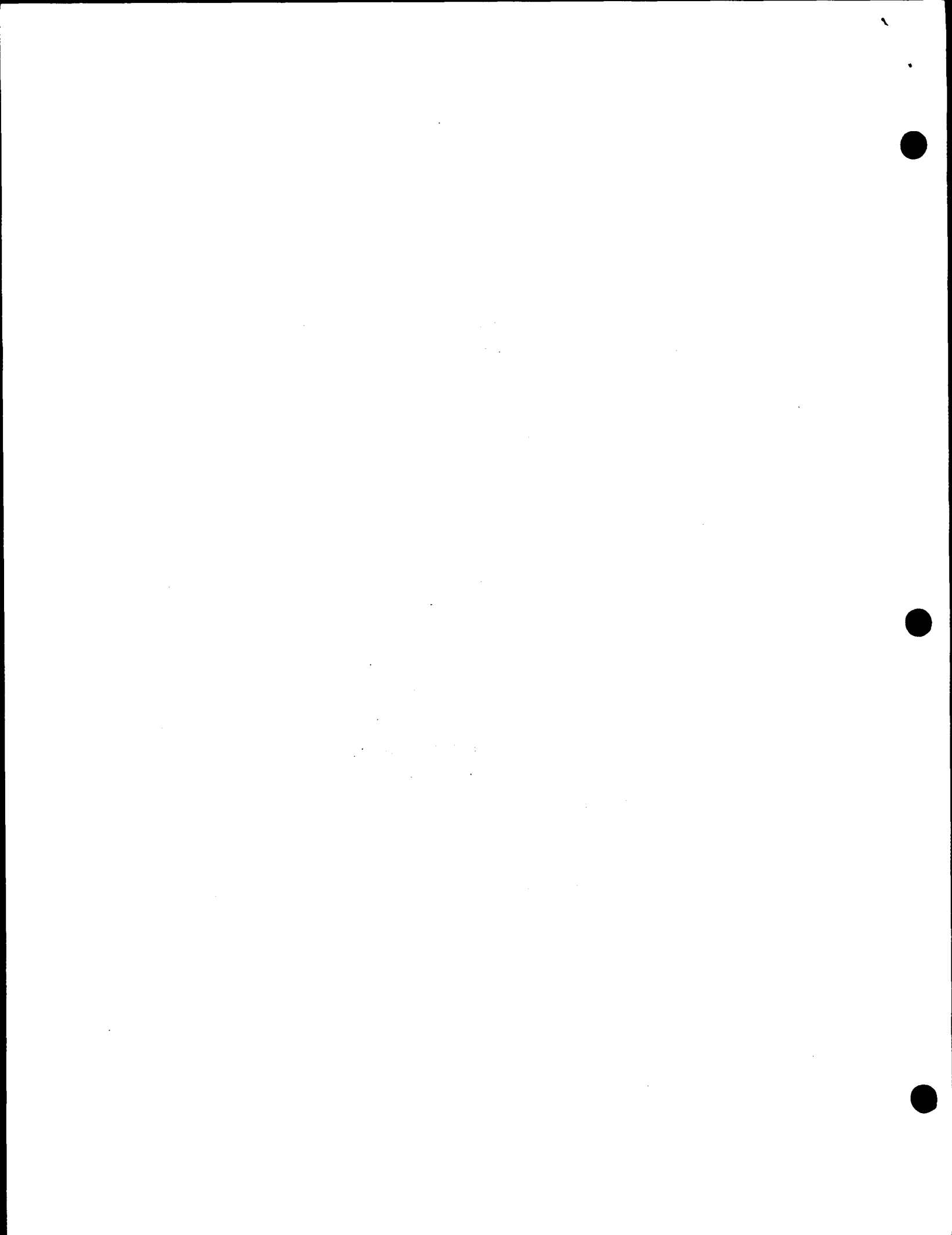
In an attempt to offset that loss, Coach Salem immediately announced that he would move Glenn Lewis, a junior from Edina, from tailback to fullback.

That wasn't Salem's only change this week. He also indicated that Roy Artis, a junior from Lawnside, N.J., would be given a trial at flanker.

"Artis has excellent speed," Salem pointed out, "and he's a quality athlete. We want to get as many of that kind of player on the field at the same time as possible....rather than have him back up Marion Barber at runningback. We'll take a look."

Meanwhile, the major question being posed to Salem by visiting writers during last weekend's press-day activities was: "Who is going to be your starting quarterback?"

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Apparently it wasn't necessary to issue a reminder concerning the fact that Minnesota has had an "unsettled" situation at the signal-callers post during the past two seasons.

Wendell Avery, a senior from Corpus Christi, TX., and Mark Carlson, a senior from Deerfield, Illinois, have shared the starting spot during the two most recent campaigns.

Mark Tonn, a senior from Green Bay, WI., also saw duty at that spot last fall after transferring to Minnesota the previous year. Two more candidates surfaced in spring drills in the persons of Greg Pylatiuk, sophomore from Columbia Heights, and Ahmad Shareef, a red-shirted freshman from Pittsburg, PA.

Now an incoming freshman, Tom Pence, a highly-touted passer from Crystal Lake, IL., has moved onto the scene and is considered as a possibility.

But Salem holds firm on the fact that Avery came out of spring drills as number one, and that's the way things are as fall practice gets under way. Salem promises, however, that "They'll all get their chance." He also promises that he'll "pick one quarterback and go with him. I have never liked the idea of changing or alternating people at that position."

So the stage is set. For the veterans. For the newcomers. For the battle at quarterback. And for Smokey Joe's first season as head coach at the University of Minnesota.

EXTRA POINTS----Salem will take a career record of 73 wins against 55 losses and two ties as a head coach at the University of South Dakota and at Northern Arizona University into the 1979 season.

The Gophers who finished with a 5-6 record and a 4-4 mark in the Big Ten Conference last fall, are being tabbed as a "fifth or sixth" place finisher for 1979 in most pre-season polls.

Marion Barber and Paul Rogind have been given berths on the pre-season All-Big Ten teams. It's only natural....Rogind, a senior kicking specialist from Farmington, MI., has earned spots on the last two honor squads while Barber made it last fall as a sophomore when leading the league in rushing.

Rogind will go into his senior season already owning three U of M records....most PAT's (54), most field goals (35), and most points scored (159). He'll also move into '79 working on a string of 53 consecutive extra points without a miss.

Barber, who set a new Minnesota single season rushing standard when churning out 1,210 yards last fall, will go into his junior campaign with 1,792 yards. He needs 397 yards to break the U of M's career rushing record of 2,138 set during the 1951, '52, '53 seasons by Paul Giel, current Gopher athletic director.

The 1979 Big Ten Skywriters Tour will bring media representatives from around the conference to the Minnesota Campus on Tuesday, August 28. Jeff Elliott of the Big Ten Service Bureau will head the tour.

#### INJURIES DEplete GOPHER OFFENSIVE UNIT

Not too many months ago, Golden Gopher football fans were looking ahead to the 1979 season with glowing visions of an offensive show unparalleled in University of Minnesota history.

That optimism seemed well founded. After all, Smokey Joe Salem was back as the Gophers' new head coach, and EVERYBODY knew he thrived on an explosive, big play offense.

In addition, not one member of Minnesota's 1978 starting offensive unit was lost through graduation, and with the return of such super stars as Marion Barber, the Gophers certainly were going to be adept at putting points on the board.

Now, however, there is some concern in Minnesota's pre-season camp, some concern about those dreams vanishing in thin air. Not because of any change in Smokey Joe's style, but because injuries have begun to deplete the Gopher ranks.

Two offensive starters from a year ago missed spring drills, but there was hope that at least one of them would be back this fall. Neither made it, however, as offensive guard Pat Paquette and fullback Kent Kitzmann were forced to end their careers pre-maturely.

Now Ken Wypyszynski, a 6-5½, 243-pound senior guard from DePere, WI., has been shelved for the season (following a second concussion), and the look of concern on the faces of Minnesota's coaches is no apparition, it's real.

Offensive line tutors Pat Morris and Jim Clements share the burden of having to rebuild that once veteran offensive line. They know they will have to put together a unit capable of opening holes for Barber, or protecting for passers like Mark Carlson and Wendell Avery. And they know it has to be done by the time Minnesota opens it's '79 season against Ohio University at Memorial Stadium on September 6.

The newest name to appear on Morris' lineup card is Bill Mumphries. A 6-2, 244-pound red-shirt freshman from Chadsey High School in Detroit, MI. (That's the same prep school that produced Barber!), Mumphries is a promising offensive guard, and he's been moved into the starting lineup as Wypyszynski's replacement.

"We think Mumphries can handle things," Coach Morris says. "We know he has

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talent. But Wypyszynski was an EXPERIENCED player with talent. Not only was he an established front-liner, he had great leadership qualities. We'll miss that most of all."

Morris hopes, however, that Minnesota's other experienced players can provide that missing leadership. And if that's the case, Humphries might be able to fill the bill.

"He showed us in Saturday's scrimmage that he can play. He missed spring practice with an injury, so he's a little behind on some things now. But he blocks well, and he's very aggressive. All he needs is a little time."

Teaming with Humphries at guard last weekend was Darell Schwen. The tackles were Marty Stein and Greg Murtha. Steve Tobin was the center and Glenn Bourquin the tight end. All are seniors and were starters last year.

"Murtha is an excellent tackle," Morris acknowledged, "but the fact that he was not with us last spring hurts. Overall our line still needs work on technique, but we are pleased with most phases of our game. And that includes our pass protection. Tobin's play Saturday was especially pleasing."

In general, the initial shootout of the season was somewhat ragged, but Coach Salem still found some good things in the gruelling two and one-half hour session.

"Our first units played pretty well," he pointed out, "Our number one defense blanked the number two offense, which means the defense had to be playing well. They really played aggressively. But our offense, other than the first unit, did not execute well. We still made too many mistakes. Overall we had 11 penalties, five fumbles and an interception. Those are mistakes that we have to eliminate.

The battle for the starting quarterback continued on relatively even terms, although Mark Carlson had slightly better statistics in Saturday's scrimmage.

Carlson threw eight passes and completed seven for 93 yards...one a 13-yard touchdown strike to Marion Barber. Wendell Avery was four of six for 59 yards. Carlson was at helm for three touchdowns (one a 70-yard scamper by flanker Roy Artis) while Avery engineered one TD and moved his unit close enough for a 39-yard field goal by Paul Rogind on another occasion.

Best news about the scrimmage was that the Gophers came out of the day without any further injuries. There were the normal number of bumps and bruises, but nobody was sidelined for the season as was the case a week ago.

Minnesota will continue its three workouts daily through this week and then conduct its final tuneup scrimmage Saturday (closed to the public) in Memorial Stadium on Saturday.

Series History

All three past meetings between these schools have been held at Memorial Stadium. The schools first met in 1969 when Murray Warmath coached UM. The result was a 35-35 tie. But Minnesota took the next two, 49-7 in 1970 and 21-0 in 1975, the latter victory under Cal Stoll. Minnesota leads the series 2-0-1.

Series History:

Ohio State leads in wins between the schools with 17 to five for past Gopher elevens. There have not been any tie games recorded. The series began in 1921 when the Buckeyes took UM 27-0. Minnesota's first series win came the next year, a 9-0 decision. However, Ohio State has gained its large victory margin in this series over the last 10 meetings. Minnesota has not defeated the Scarlet and Gray since 1966 when the Murray Warmath-coached Gophers took a 17-7 decision. Since that year, the Bucks have picked off all ten meetings. The closest UM has come to turning away OSU in that stretch was 12-14 in 1971, and 3-9 in 1976, both games played here at Memorial Stadium. Largest margins of victory came in back to back years when UM won 27-0 in 1949, and OSU returned the favor 43-0 the next fall.

Minneapolis, MN---Well, Minnesota got one Ohio school out of the way last Saturday when the Gophers defeated Ohio University 24-10 at home. Now comes the "biggie" when Ohio State University comes to Memorial Stadium this Saturday.

The Buckeyes, for the first time in what seems like eons, come to Minnesota without the familiar Woody Hayes leading the way. Like Minnesota, OSU has a new head coach.

Earl Bruce will patrol Memorial sidelines for the first time in OSU scarlet and gray, while across the way Joe Salem will pace the Gopher bench area. Both are undefeated in their new positions.

Last Saturday the Bucks opened '79 by thrashing Syracuse 31-8. Leading the way was the same man who dumped the Gophers last fall, sophomore quarterback Art Schlichter (SLEES'-stur). Schlichter passed for one score and gained another 96 yards rushing against Syracuse.

Against the Gophers last year Schlichter scored two touchdowns on runs of 3 and 1 yards, gained 56 yards on the ground, completed 3 of 7 passes for 57 yards, and ran the OSU option play offense with the precision expected of a veteran. It was only his second game as a freshman last season when he led OSU over the Gophers 27-10.

Running backs Paul Campbell and Calvin Murray compliment Ohio State's ground attack while the Buckeye defense again appears to be one of the best in the Big Ten.

In short, Salem and his Gophers could be in for a long, long afternoon unless vast improvement is seen in just one short week.

#### SALEM ON THE GOPHERS

Salem, to say the least, was anything but pleased with Minnesota's total effort against Ohio University.

"Don't get me totally wrong, there were some good things that came out of Saturday, especially the victory," the coach offers.

"To be a good football team you have to win on off days. This we did. We were not mentally ready to play football. It was that simple. But we overcame many of our problems and beat a darned good Ohio University football team. Maybe that by itself will help us be a good club.

"We played well at times, but very poorly at others. We'll need a much better effort on both offense and defense this Saturday. We have to tighten things up if we hope to do anything against Ohio State.

"Possibly the best thing that happened to our club last Saturday is that we had to dig down. We had to come back from being behind 10-7. In the second half we came together as a team and our defense stopped their ground attack. When you can do this, rally in the face of adversity, it shows character.

"Obviously we were happy to gain that first win. But we were not happy with the way we played most of the game. We hardly ever had the ball in the first half. But when we did, we made way too many mistakes. We had more mental breakdowns, more missed assignments than I expected to have. Those things must be eliminated for us

to show any improvement.

"Ohio U. was extremely well coached and well prepared. They outplayed us early because they were ready to play and they came to play. We didn't at first. But thank goodness we came back in the second half. I'm not certain what would have happened to this team had we not come back to win.

"As for Ohio State, well, look at the record. We haven't beat them in 10 straight games. I certainly would like to see that turned around. But it will take an incredible effort by every man on our squad.

"We must eliminate every single mental error. We can't afford any dumb penalties or cough up the ball against a solid, veteran team like Ohio State.

"Coach Earl Bruce owns an outstanding record wherever he coached. I'm certain he will do the same at Ohio State. However, we would dearly like to delay his initial success just a little. But like I said, for that to happen will take some kind of effort by all of us."

#### FOXWORTH OUT

The most serious blow suffered by Minnesota last weekend is the loss of senior cornerback Ken Foxworth (St. Louis, MO), suffering a knee injury early in the game but did not leave action until the fourth quarter. It appears he will be lost for at least two weeks. No surgery is predicted.

The rest of the Gophers came through with the usual bumps and bruises, but everyone is expected back in uniform Saturday, except "Foxy."

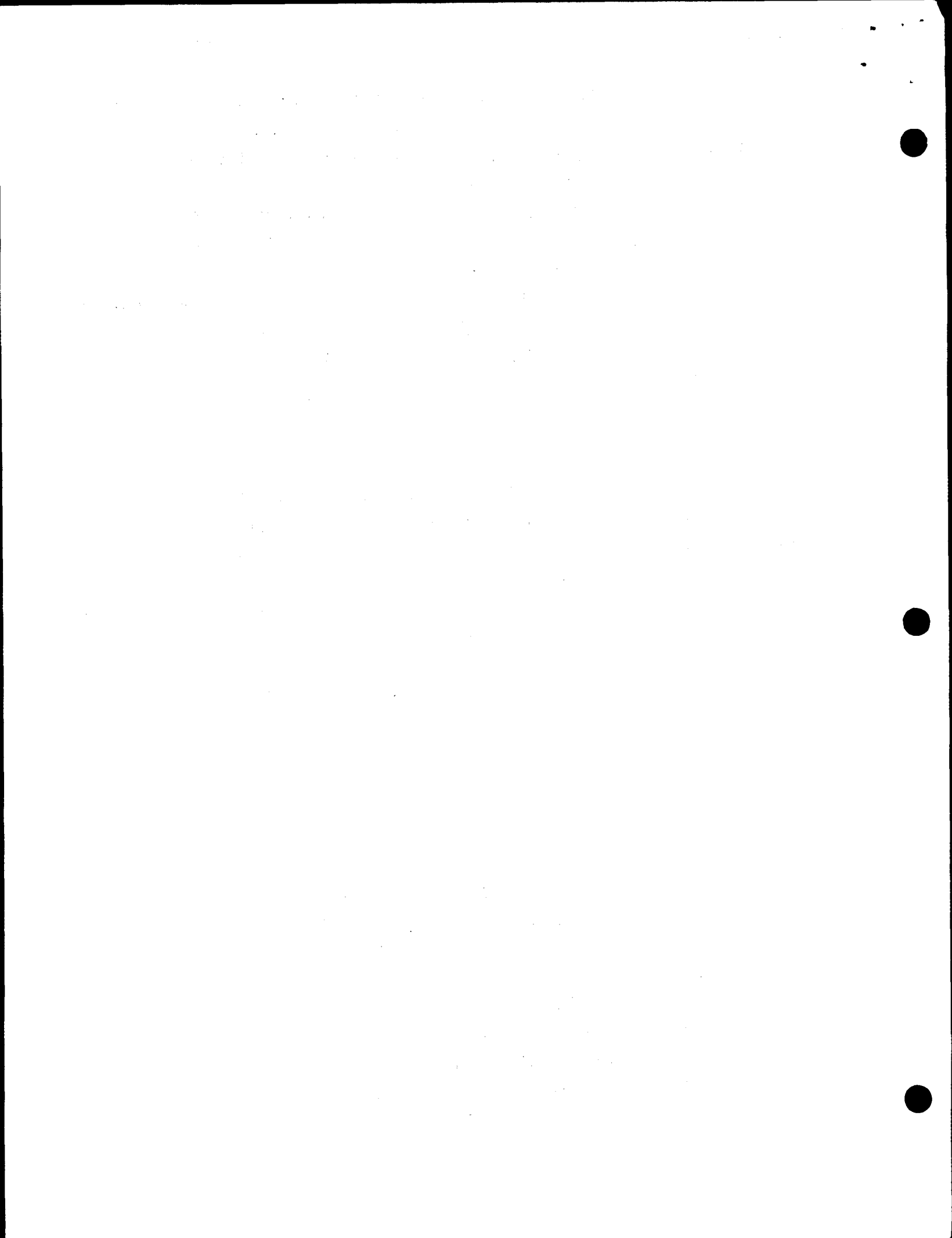
According to Monday's practice lineup, red-shirted freshman Glenn Cardelli (Elmwood Park, IL) will move into the position vacated by Foxworth. In his second year at Minnesota, Cardelli, like all other 1973 freshmen, was held out of action last fall.

Another change could see senior Dave Gardner (Rochester) move into the starting nose guard position on defense. Senior John Kuduk (Minneapolis) was slightly injured and may be slowed this week.

#### GOPHER PLUSSES

Senior placekicker Paul Rogind (Farmington, MI) kept his consecutive extra point streak alive by converting after all three Gopher touchdowns. He has now booted 56 in a row and is 57 of 58 over all. He also added his 36th career field goal, a 27-yarder, to tie the game 10-10 in the third quarter.

Junior tailback Marion Barber (Detroit, MI), held to, for him, a low total of 57 yards rushing by the aggressive OU defense, attempted his first collegiate pass and found instant success. Late in the game Barber threw a 35-yard halfback option pass to flanker Roy Artis (Lawnside, NJ) for UM's final score.

The schools tied 20-20 in 1965 out in L.A. before USC took the last meeting 29-20 in the Twin Cities. In the latter game, famed USC runningback O.J. Simpson had one of his "normal" days. He carried the ball 39 times for 236 yards and scored TD's on runs of 36, 1, 7 and 7 yards. His last two scores brought the Trojans back from a 16-20 deficit. ## GOPHERS TO FACE TOP RANKED TROJANS ON SATURDAY

It probably seems like an "Out of the frying pan, into the fire" situation for Coach Joe Salem this week as he prepared his University of Minnesota football team for the unenviable task of taking on Southern California.

The Gophers suffered their first setback of the season last weekend when falling 21-17 to 15th ranked Ohio State University, and with the bitter taste of that loss very much in evidence, Salem's contingent now must invade the Los Angeles Coliseum to face the nation's number-one rated USC Trojans.

"We played our hearts out against Ohio State," Salem said, "and I take my hat off to every guy on our squad. We gave it everything we had, but it was not enough. We lost. And it's over. Now we've got to get ready for Southern Cal."

And that may not be easy, as Salem well knows. "Our biggest problem now may be forgetting about Ohio State and bouncing back this week. We spent an awful lot emotionally against the Buckeyes, and getting our people to do even more this week, against a team that is supposed to be even better, may be asking too much," Salem said.

But that's the way things look this week....do better against a better team if there is to be any chance of improving Minnesota's 1979 record of 1-1. And even with a game that produced over 500 yards for the Gophers, there is room for improvement.

Before the season opened, Salem was described as a coach who thrived on the big-play offense. However, against Ohio State, Minnesota missed on its chances for big plays while the Buckeyes came up with theirs.

Salem can look back on four or five plays in the Ohio State contest that turned the decision in favor of the visitors....and those biggies included some the Gophers didn't make....like the fourth and one situation with only two minutes remaining, like the dropped pass in the end zone early in the game, and like the fumble at the goal line that Minnesota did not recover.

So if Minnesota entertains any hopes of achieving better results against the Trojans this week, some of the improvement Salem is looking for may come in the area of making the big plays.

Even more evident last weekend was Minnesota's being outplayed by OSU's special teams. While Tom Smith's punting was vastly improved for the Gophers, the Minnesota coverage of its kicks left something to be desired. Salem has indicated that his club will get a little work in that phase of the game as they get ready for Southern California this week.

But how does Minnesota get ready for a team that is ranked best in the country, a team that has won its first two games impressively, a team that overwhelmed Oregon 42-5 last Saturday and was so much in command that the first team did not play in the second half?

(MORE)

In fact, the powerful Trojans were without their top offensive star and Heisman Trophy candidate Charles White who was sidelined with an injury. Unfortunately for the Gophers, White probably will play against invading Minnesota Saturday in that 1:30 p.m. contest (3:30 Twin Cities' time).

Minnesota hopes to counter with its new "Gopher" offense as Salem calls it, or the "Run and Shoot" offense as it was tabbed by Earle Bruce of Ohio State last Saturday afternoon.

Salem simply explains it as a double wing type of formation with a man in motion. It gave Minnesota a lot of yards, and it gave Minnesota fans a lot of excitement, but will it give the Gophers a win in Los Angeles.

"We won't surprise anyone anymore," Salem admitted, "but we still plan to use it. I think it is a great offense. It is wide open and difficult to defense even when you know it is coming. Hopefully it will continue to be successful for us even if it isn't a surprise."

GOPHER TALES-----Garry White, junior fullback from Rockdale, TX., who carried the ball 34 times for 221 yards last weekend, leads the Gophers in rushing with 293 yards after two games. That's 21 yards more than he gained all last season.

White also has five pass receptions for 76 more yards. And he's tallied touchdowns to lead Minnesota in scoring with 18 points. For his personal efforts against OSU, White was named UPI Midwest Back of the Week.

Paul Rogind, senior kicking specialist for the Gophers, added another field goal to his U of M record in the Big Ten opener, but he had his string of consecutive PAT's snapped at 56 when the Buckeyes broke through to block his attempt after the opening touchdown Saturday.

Marion Barber, Minnesota's junior tailback who led the Big Ten and the Gophers in rushing, carried the ball only four times for 24 yards last week. In two assignments, Barber has 31 yards on the strength of 19 carries. Salem admits that's not enough. "We have to get the ball to him more," Minnesota's coach says.

Mark Carlson, senior quarterback who has started both games for Minnesota thus far, has completed 29 of 49 passes (that's a .592 rate) for 335 yards and a pair of touchdowns. On the receiving end, Barber has seven grabs for 51 yards while Glenn Bourquin has seven catches for 56 yards from his tight end position.

Minnesota and Southern California have met on the gridiron four times since the inter-sectional series began in 1953, and the Trojans have won twice, Minnesota once and one duel ended in a tie. The Gophers' only triumph was 25-19 in 1955. In the most recent battle, USC prevailed 29-20 at Memorial Stadium...with O. J. Simpson accounting for 24 points, rushed for 236 yards and caught six passes for 57 more.

Following Saturday's contest at Los Angeles, Minnesota returns home for two straight Big Ten Conference assignments...next Saturday against Northwestern and the following week against Purdue. --UM--

## ABOUT THE TROJANS

Several have said this year that maybe Southern California is playing in the wrong league. Instead of being a member of the Pac-10, the Trojans should be in the Western Division of the NFL.

An almost unanimous choice as the nation's number one team in every pre-season poll, and still on top after two weeks of play, the only way USC is expected to lose a game this year is if the entire team is felled by smog.

Off to a flying start with wins against Texas Tech, 21-7 and Oregon State, 42-5, both on the road, coach John Robinson's Trojans have accomplished this without the flying feat of All-America tailback Charles White.

White only played one quarter of the first game before bruising a shoulder. He did not dress last Saturday but, unfortunately for the Minnesota Gophers, USC's first home opponent of 1979, White is expected back in action this week. He gained 39 yards in 10 carries at Texas Tech.

But even without their top Heisman Trophy candidate, USC is now tied with Alabama as owners of the longest winning streak in the nation among NCAA Division I schools, 10 straight.

Leader of the Trojan attack is quarterback Paul McDonald. This 6-foot-2, 130-pound senior has played in the shadow of White and several other USC stars. But it's McDonald who has been the Trojan catalyst.

Last season he completed 115 of 203 pass attempts (57%) for 1,690 yards and a whopping 19 touchdowns. In his last nine games, including the two this season, McDonald has thrown 17 TD bombs, suffered only one interception, and hit on 89 of 139 attempts for an amazing 64% accuracy.

And listen to what he's already done this season: 18 completions in 26 attempts (69%), 241 yards and four touchdowns with no interceptions.

On top of McDonald's exploits, Minnesota will have to deal with the rushing of sophomore fullback Marcus Allen (158 yards in 33 carries) and number two tailback, senior Michael Hayes (141 yards on 30 carries). Last Saturday the #3 TB, freshman Mike Harper, totaled 126 yards and 2 touchdowns on 20 carries at Oregon State.

Last season Southern Cal only gave up an average of 2.3 yards on every opponent rush and only four touchdowns on the ground. Against enemy passing attacks the Trojan secondary picked off 27 interceptions.

One crippling injury struck down giant offensive tackle Anthony Munoz (MOON-ys) who is out for the year. He was considered a leading candidate for the Outland Trophy. However, to show USC's amazing depth, Munoz (6-7, 280) was replaced by the man Robinson and others expect will be their next all-everything candidate, freshman Don Mosebar, a slim 6-foot-7 and 265-pounds.

The Series:

Minnesota and Northwestern have met 60 times dating back to the first game in 1892 when Minnesota prevailed 16-12. To date Minnesota has defeated past Wildcat teams 36 times while the Purple and White have come out on top 20 times. There have been four series games ending in a tie. Northwestern's first series win came in 1899 when the Wildcats won 11-5 after UM had taken the first three games. Probably the two biggest games in this excellent rivalry came in 1936 and 1973. The first game saw Northwestern bring to an end the longest undefeated streak in Minnesota grid history, 23 games. Back in Minnesota's "Golden Era" under the legendary Bernie Bierman, the Gophers had already won the 1934 and 1935 national championships. UM steamed into Dyche Stadium the next year and had allowed its previous 4 opponents just 7 points. But in the mud and slop of one rainy afternoon, the streak came to a grinding halt as NW won 6-0 following a highly controversial penalty which gave the home team the ball on UM's 1-yard line. From there NW scored the winner and ended UM's best streak ever. In 1973 UM and NW put on the best shoot-out in the history of the Big Ten. When it ended, the Gophers were atop a 52-43 decision, again at Dyche Stadium. The Gopher QB was John Lawing who threw 3 TD passes to split end Mike Jones. That, too, was a day to remember.

NW Travel Plans:

Wildcat SID Jim Vrugink comes to town Wednesday for the weekly media luncheon with coach Joe Salem. The NW team arrives 12:30 Friday, will work out that afternoon and then be quartered at the Marriott Inn in Bloomington.

## GOPHERS RETURN TO BRICKHOUSE SATURDAY

This week the University of Minnesota comes home to the Brickhouse...and goes back to the drawing board...as it prepares for its next (in a series) of critical football assignments.

Coach Joe Salem's charges are slated to play host to Northwestern in Big Ten action Saturday (September 29) at 1:30 p.m. in Memorial Stadium, and the Gophers need a win to even their record at 2-2.

Minnesota dropped its second straight decision out on the West Coast 48-14 to top-ranked Southern California last weekend, and Smokey Joe hopes that his Gophers can erase that contest from their minds in time to prepare for the Wildcats.

"We didn't play as well at USC as we did the previous week against Ohio State," Salem said. "They beat us up front. They wouldn't let us run the ball, and we couldn't hit anything with our passing game. But maybe we played as well as we can. Maybe we weren't so good because Southern Cal was so awesome. But it's over. We have to forget it and regroup for Northwestern."

And that's exactly what the Gophers will try to do in drills this week. The surprise "run and shoot" offense that produced over 500 yards against Ohio State in the Big Ten opener two weeks ago reaped only 235 against the Trojans Saturday, so Minnesota will attempt to get back in gear this time out of the blocks.

"We know we've lost the element of surprise we had against Ohio State," Salem admitted, "but we have confidence in the offense. We know it is difficult to defend against. We just have to execute."

The invading Wildcats will bring an identical 1-2 record into Saturday's clash after falling 54-21 to Syracuse University in their most recent assignment. They, like the Gophers, also are 0-1 in Big Ten play.

Northwestern dropped its season opener 49-7 at Michigan but then got its first win since the 1977 finale by downing Wyoming 27-22 two weeks ago. That was Rick Venturi's first win as head coach at Northwestern, and he ranked it as "A great moment in my life. It was made possible by a great bunch of kids who have overcome every adversity. To say it was a big win for us puts it mildly."

And while the Cats had hoped to keep rolling this past week, Syracuse untracked the comeback special and put Venturi's invaders in a position not unlike the host Minnesota club.

"Southern Cal blew us out in the first half last Saturday," Salem admitted, "and if we learned anything it was how far our program has to go. But we played better in the second half, and we never gave up. We showed some character, and that can't be taken away from us. Our only concern now is getting back on the winning track this week against Northwestern."

There might be another concern facing Salem, however, and that's the physical condition of his football team. The Gophers literally limped into the USC assignment, and they came home in an even more battered condition.

Four starters did not make the trip to the West Coast. That delegation included Jim Fahnhorst at linebacker, Ken Foxworth at cornerback, Glenn Bourquin at tight end and Bill Humphries at offensive guard.

While Salem hopes to have both Foxworth and Fahnhorst back, Bourquin and Humphries both still must be considered doubtful. In addition, backup offensive tackle Kent Penovich suffered a knee injury at USC, and if surgery is required, he could be done for the season.

GOPHER TALES---Salem used both Mark Carlson and Wendell Avery at quarterback against USC, but he has indicated that Carlson will get the starting nod for the fourth straight week against Northwestern.

Thus far Carlson has thrown 73 passes, completed 40 and had three attempts picked off by the opposition. His efforts have netted 462 yards and one touchdown. Roy Artis, Minnesota's top flanker, has accounted for 112 yards in the receiving department on six catches.

Junior fullback Garry White, although netting only 16 yards on eight carries against the Trojans, will go into the Northwestern clash Saturday as Minnesota's leading rusher. He has 310 yards on 56 carries in three games.

Marion Barber, junior tailback who led the Big Ten in rushing last season hopes to get "untracked" Saturday. In three games, the 6-3, 213-pounder has carried only 31 times for 126 yards.

In the scoring department, White is on top with 13 points while Barber has 12. Paul Rogind, senior kicking specialist, is next in line with 11 on the strength of five extra points and a pair of field goals.

Senior linebacker Jack Johnson continues to set the pace for Minnesota's defensive crew. In three games, Johnson has been credited with 42 hits including 25 solo tackles and 17 assists. He has one "tackle for loss" accounting for four yards.

Alan Blanshan, senior defensive tackle, is second in those categories with 30 hits on the basis of 14 solos and 16 assists. He got one "tackle for loss" credited to him last weekend, and it was a 14-yarder.

Minnesota and Northwestern have met 60 times on the gridiron since the series started back in 1892, and the Gophers hold an edge of 36-20-4. In fact Minnesota has won four straight, with Northwestern's most recent victory a 21-13 affair in 1974.

While it will be Salem's first shot at the Wildcats as a head coach, he admits that Minnesota's luck against Northwestern was not overwhelming when he was a player. The Cats beat Salem's team 7-3 in 1953 and 6-0 in 1959 before the Gophers prevailed 7-0 in 1960.

Saturday will be Band & Industry Day at Memorial Stadium, and the Brickhouse crowd is expected to include several thousand representatives of local business and industry firms as well as high school bands from around Minnesota.

### CROSS-COUNTRY WINS

Coach Roy Griak's 17th University of Minnesota cross-country team got off on the right foot Saturday in winning its first meet of the season.

Minnesota defeated four teams to win the 8,000-meter Gopher Invitational run at the UM Golf Course by scoring the low total of 23 points.

Minnesota easily outdistanced North Dakota State (81), St. Olaf (33) and River Falls (WI) (169).

Top Gopher finishers included Don Hurley with a time of 25:32, John Idstrom at 25:50 and Gerald Metzler at 26:01. Former Gopher star Steve Plasencia, running unattached, took the meet blue ribbon with a time of 25:10.2.

Minnesota heads on the road for its next races traveling to Des Moines, Iowa, for a dual meet against Drake University Friday, September 23, and at the River Falls Invitational the next day.

Next home action for the Gophers is October 6 when UM hosts Wisconsin.

### HOCKEY STARTS

University of Minnesota's defending NCAA hockey champions, under acting head coach Brad Buetow, take to the ice of Augsburg Arena Tuesday, September 25, for the first day of drills.

The 1979-80 edition of the Gophers is minus nine of the outstanding players who led UM to its third national championship in the last six years. Gone are four seniors--all-America defenseman Bill Baker, defenseman Joe Baker, wing Phil Verchota and team MVP in goalie Steve Janaszak--plus five underclassmen who opted for the U. S. Olympic Team.

Buetow, an assistant under now Olympic coach Herb Brooks the last four years, expects to greet more than 60 candidates when the Gophers begin skating drills Tuesday. Minnesota will move into Williams Arena in about two weeks once the ice sheet is put down.

"Sure there are a lot of big names missing from last year's team," Buetow commented recently, "but that doesn't mean Minnesota will not play representative hockey this season.

"We have some awful good young men returning among the veterans, and our rookie crop of recruits appears the best group we've had in the last four years. So we are not down at all. All of us are eager to get things underway and see who are the men who will play for Minnesota in 1979-80."

Leading the returnees are a pair of high scoring wings in captain Don Micheletti and Tim Harrer. Micheletti was second in scoring for UM last year with 72 points on 36 goals and 36 assists. Harrer was fifth with figures of 23-25-53. Between them Micheletti and Harrer accounted for 12 game winning goals and 26 power play scores.

Series History:

Minnesota owns a slim 19-15 edge in the series with Purdue with 3 more games ending in a tie. This series began in 1894, but has seen numerous interruptions. The last dates back to 1974, the most recent meeting between the schools, when Minnesota scored an upset 24-20 victory. It was the first win ever in Purdue's Ross-Ade Stadium for a Gopher football team. On that day QB Tony Dungy, TB Rick Upchurch and FB J. Dexter Pride scored TD's for the Gophers, but it was a 26-yd. FG in the 4th period by Steve Goldberg that gave UM some breathing room. Purdue got scores from Scott Dierking, Reggie Arnold and Barry Santini, the latter with 41 seconds left in the game. Upchurch was the difference for UM that day gaining 120 yards on 21 carries. Dungy completed 1 pass in 1 attempt the entire afternoon, but it was for 8 yards and a TD to Upchurch. This series has long been known as one of the hard-hitting rivalries in all college football. Many great upsets by both sides have been recorded. Maybe the biggest ever was Purdue's 13-7 conquest of what many call Minnesota's most talented team ever, the 1949 squad. Another giant Purdue win was the 23-14 decision over UM's 1960 national championship and Rose Bowl eleven, the only loss they suffered that year.

## GOPHERS TO HOST PURDUE UNIVERSITY SATURDAY

Nobody said it would be easy, but University of Minnesota football coach Joe Salem may get that "This is ridiculous" feeling as he looks at the fifth week of the 1979 season.

Saturday the Gophers entertain Big Ten opponent Purdue University at 1:30 p.m. in Memorial Stadium, and in the process will face one of the nation's premier passers in Mark Herrmann.

And then? And then the Gophers take to the road for two straight Big Ten assignments at Michigan and at Iowa. Winning on the road has been an almost impossible task for Minnesota in recent years, and that means winning the home contests is that much more important.

With this week's conference duel in the Brickhouse, Salem knows it's important.... maybe crucial....for his Gophers to win. But against Purdue and Mark Herrmann? Nobody said it would be easy!

Minnesota, remember, opened the season with a 24-10 victory over Ohio University, but they were unimpressive in the process. The next week, however, Salem's charges exploded for over 500 yards against mighty Ohio State. But they lost 21-17. Then it was off to the West Coast where number one ranked Southern California had an easy time disposing of the Gophers 43-14. Last week Minnesota returned to Memorial Stadium and breezed past youthful Northwestern 33-3.

All of that means the Golden Gophers will go into Saturday's confrontation against highly-touted Purdue standing at 2-2 on the season and 1-1 in Big Ten Conference play.

The invading Boilermakers, picked by many prior to the start of the '79 season as a solid favorite to win this year's conference championship, will bring a 3-1 log into the Brickhouse.

Purdue opened the year with an easy 41-20 verdict over Wisconsin but then fell victim to the Los Angeles heat and smog as UCLA prevailed 31-21. Herrmann left that game early with heat exhaustion, and things weren't the same. Two weeks ago the Boilermakers regained their form by stopping Notre Dame 28-22, and in their most recent outing downed Oregon 13-7.

"Herrmann is a fine quarterback, and Purdue is an excellent football team," Salem warns his gridders. And they know about good quarterbacks after already lining up against Art Schlichter of Ohio State and Paul McDonald of USC.

At this point Salem can only hope that Minnesota's impressive win over the Northwestern Wildcats will give the Gophers some momentum, something on which to build, as they get ready for Purdue.

"We played an excellent first half against Northwestern," Salem pointed out, "and that was good to see. We were concerned going into last week's game about how we were going to play, how we were going to react after disastrous games with Ohio

State and Southern Cal. So we are especially pleased about the fact that we got off to such a good start against Northwestern. It shows once again that our players have some character."

Salem also admitted that things got a little ragged in the second half. "We didn't play as well in the later stages of the game," he said, "but that can be expected in a game like that. Hopefully the experience some of our younger people got in the second half will be of benefit to them. Maybe we found some new players who are going to help us as the season progresses."

The big concern for Salem at the moment is that the win over Northwestern will provide some good things that Minnesota will carry over to Purdue. "We hope that is the case," he said. "We're not planning any big surprises for this week. We'll make some adjustments and try to do things well. That's what we'll have to do if we hope to beat Purdue."

EXTRA POINTS---Marion Barber had his first 100-yard day of the season against Northwestern, and it "felt good!" Barber, who led the Big Ten in rushing last year as a sophomore, netted 143 yards against the Wildcats and now has 268 on the season. He now needs 129 yards to break the U of M career rushing record of 2,188 set by Paul Giel in '51-52-53. Barber also needs 126 more carries to surpass Giel's mark for most rushes....551.

Barber also accounted for three touchdowns against Northwestern and now leads the Gophers in scoring with 30 points. Garry White, who added one TD Saturday, is next in line with 24 points.

Paul Rogind, Minnesota's kicking specialist, hit five straight extra points in the Gophers' most recent outing and added a 25 yard field goal. He now has 13 points on the season.

Jack Johnson continues to lead the Gopher defense from his linebacking post. Against Northwestern, Johnson had four solo tackles and two assists. On the season he has 29 solo tackles and 19 assists for a total of 48 assists. One of his tackles resulted in a 14-yard loss for the Wildcats.

Minnesota and Purdue have met 37 times on the gridiron and the Gophers hold a slim edge of 19-15-3 in the series which dates back to 1894. These two teams have not played since 1974, however, when Minnesota won 24-20.

Purdue's last appearance in Memorial Stadium was in 1973 and on that Saturday the Gophers prevailed by a 34-7 margin. The Boilermakers' last win over Minnesota was by a 28-3 mark in 1972.

Saturday will be American Legion Day in Memorial Stadium. It will be the fourth straight year that members of American Legion posts from around the state join the Memorial Stadium crowd for a special day. In 1976 Legionnaires saw the Gophers fall to Ohio State 9-3. In 1977 they cheered the Gophers to a 16-0 win over Michigan. And last year they helped Minnesota hold on for a 22-20 victory over Iowa.

Minneapolis, MN---In the fall of the year, you spell Purdue "Herrmann."

He doesn't do it all, but Junior QB Mark Herrmann plays the major roll in everything done by the Boilermaker machine. Besides being possibly the best passer in the nation, he also directs the Purdue ground attack sending sophomore tailback Wally Jones or junior fullback John Macon through, over or around enemy defenses.

Herrmann's passing proficiency speaks for itself. He sets a new record for his school every time he raises his golden right arm. Minnesota, where Purdue visits this Saturday, may rue the day this game was scheduled. But at least it's the first time UM has faced Herrmann. Purdue and Minnesota have not met since 1974.

Herrmann is already the all-time Purdue completion leader with 385 connections. His first pass completion last Saturday vs. Oregon broke the mark of 376 set by Mike Phipps (1967-69).

His career passing yardage stretches out to 5,104 yards, just 319 short of Phipps' school record 5,423. The latter mark by Phipps is second in the Big Ten only to the 5,706 passing yards amassed by Ed Smith of Michigan State (1976-78). So by the end of this season, Herrmann will be the most productive passer in conference history. And he's only a junior!

In four games this season Herrmann has connected on 58 of 87 attempts (.667%) for 746 yards and eight touchdowns. Five of his TD tosses have gone to giant tight end Dave Young (6-6, 235, Jr.).

But don't believe for a minute Purdue lives by the pass alone. Jones has already gained 356 yards rushing on 80 carries and scored four touchdowns, including both Boiler scores last Saturday in the 13-7 win over Oregon.

The Purdue attack shows excellent balance with 716 yards rushing and 801 passing. Minnesota's totals read 752 yards rushing and 687 passing.

But the big difference in this game could be the defense. Purdue has given up just 269 yards a game to the enemy, including just 143 yards total offense to Oregon last Saturday. The Gophers are allowing 319 enemy yards per outing.

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#### ICERS TO SKATE

Acting head hockey coach Brad Buetow puts his 1979-80 varsity candidates on display for the first time this weekend with intrasquad games scheduled Saturday and Sunday evenings.

The Gophers face off against each other Saturday, October 6, at Columbia Arena at 7:30 p.m., and Sunday at the Bloomington Ice Garden at 7 p.m. Proceeds from all Gopher intrasquad games are donated toward junior hockey programs in the respective areas where these intrasquad games are played.

Even though he is 3-0 in 1979, Griak is more concerned with this weekend's big meet with Wisconsin. Last year's edition of the Badgers finished fourth in the nation, while Minnesota came in 10th.

"We have to run with all seven cylinders going to beat Wisconsin," said Griak. Griak noted that on paper the Badgers are more impressive because of five returning lettermen. "We are planning on making it close," said Griak. But the Gophers will have to overcome "a slightly below par" performance from last Saturday. Minnesota ran past Drake 25-30 and Wichita State 21-41.

The Gopher's Don Hunkey grabbed top honors with a winning time of 25:54, eight seconds ahead of Drake's Vern Iwancin. Other Minnesota finishers were John Keohen (6th, 26:35), Gerald Metzler (9th, 27:02), Dave Chatelaine (10th, 27:07), John J. Griffin (15th, 27:21), Tom Polisen (17th, 27:29), Mike Gebeke (18th, 27:43) and Larry Berkner (23rd, 28:34). This Saturday's 10,000-meter meet will be at University of Minnesota Golf Course starting at 10:30.

The Series:

Michigan owns a commanding 44-22-3 edge in this series which began in 1892. Minnesota took the first two meetings 14-6 and 34-20 before Michigan broke through 20-0 in 1895.

But the Rivalry series began in 1909, the first "Little Brown Jug" game. In 1909 when the schools battled to a 6-6 standoff in the Twin Cities, Michigan left its water jug behind. When they asked for it to be returned, Minnesota said, "Come and get it." Thus was born the most famous collegiate trophy, a rather inexpensive piece of crockery, "The Little Brown Jug." In the Jug series Michigan has taken possession 40 times while Minnesota has owned the trophy 20 times. There were two series ties, 1933 and 1950. Minnesota's last possession came in dramatic fashion when the Gophers defeated Michigan, the latter ranked #1 at the time, 16-0 in Minneapolis in 1977. It marked the only time Minnesota has defeated a team coached by Schembechler.

## GOPHERS TO INVADE MICHIGAN ON SATURDAY

Minnesota's moment of glee, perhaps even jubilation, was just what the word implies.....momentary.....for just seconds after Coach Joe Salem finished congratulating his Gophers following their 31-14 win over Purdue last Saturday he was urging those same players to "Start getting ready for Michigan."

And that's exactly what Smokey Joe hopes the University of Minnesota will be able to do in practice this week: prepare properly for their Big Ten Conference football assignment at Ann Arbor this weekend.

Kickoff for that encounter is scheduled for 1:00 p.m. E.D.T. (12 noon in the Twin Cities), and Michigan Stadium is expected to be jammed with more than 104,000 fans for the annual battle of the Little Brown Jug on Saturday.

"Let's hope we have another good week of practice," Salem said following his club's upset victory over the Boilermakers in their most recent assignment. "We had a great week of practice getting ready for Purdue. I felt all week that our attitude was excellent and if that carried over we could win. It DID carry over, and the results are history. We know, however, that it will take the same kind of intensity this week....in practice and on Saturday.....if we hope to do well at Michigan."

Salem also feels that the victory over Purdue helped to erase some of the bad taste that had been lingering in the Gopher camp following that heartbreaking loss to Ohio State and the humiliation at USC.

"I said after we let the Ohio State game get away from us that we just had not learned how to win," Salem explained this week. "Our players were determined not to let the same thing happen again. Maybe we learned how to win against Purdue

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Minnesota's fiery coach maintains there's another lesson for his Gophers to learn, however. "We had a lousy week of practice before we went out to the West Coast," he pointed out, "and the results out there were an embarrassment. Now we need to have a GOOD week of practice and go to Ann Arbor. We still have to learn how to win on the road. And Ann Arbor is a tough place to get an education."

The older members on this year's Minnesota squad know what Smokey Joe is talking about. Last fall the Gophers fell 42-10 at Michigan. Three years ago it was 45-0 in favor of the Wolverines in that stadium.

In fact, Minnesota has not won at Michigan since 1962 when Coach Murray Warmath's Gophers prevailed 17-0. Minnesota's most recent victory over the Wolves was 16-0 at Memorial Stadium in 1977.

Bringing the Jug home will be a difficult assignment, no matter how high the Gopher spirits soared after beating Purdue. "I said at the start of the season that Michigan had the best personnel in the league," Salem said, "and after the way they handled Michigan State at East Lansing last weekend, I am convinced of it."

Coach Bo Schembechler's Wolverines will go into Saturday's contest against the Gophers 4-1.....2-0 in Big Ten play. Their only loss was that 12-10 toughtie three weeks ago to Notre Dame.

Minnesota will risk its 3-2 log Saturday. The Gophers are 2-1 in the Big Ten and have notched two straight loop wins leading up to the Michigan encounter this weekend.

GOPHER TALES---Bo Schembechler has lost only once to Minnesota in his 10 years as boss of the Wolves...that shutout in '77 when Michigan came into the Brick-house ranked as the nation's number one team.

Joe Salem knows how tough it is to win against Michigan. During his years as a player at Minnesota, the Gophers won only one of three confrontations...10-0 in 1960. In '58 Michigan won 20-19, and in '59 it was 14-6 for the Wolverines.

Garry White, who had 94 yards against Purdue, continues to lead the Gophers in rushing. He now has 452 yards on the season and is averaging 5.3 yards per carry.

### HOCKEY SCRIMMAGES

Head coach Brad Buetow said Monday he was not all that pleased with his 1978-79 Minnesota hockey varsity scrimmages last weekend, but at the same time he was not all that surprised.

"The games Saturday and Sunday evenings were almost devoid of defensive play by everyone. Scores like 10-5 Saturday and 9-5 Sunday illustrate that point.

"But there are several reasons for this, too. It's still early in camp and the lines we set up are not familiar with each other. There are also numerous items we have yet to put in and that, too, plays a big factor in the overall play of the men at this point.

"But now that we are back in Williams Arena, I'm certain we'll be able to get back to the teaching portion of pre-season camp. I hope our club begins to settle down and we can start into our systems and team concepts rather than spending so much time on individual work."

Buetow added that he didn't want to sound too critical at this point, but that he wanted to make it clear the Gopher program has a long, long way to go. "But we'll get there. Count on it," the coach offered.

He did give some praise for goalies Jim Jetland and Paul Butters. At the same time Buetow added that they didn't play that much which could account for some of the high scoring.

The Gophers return to intrasquad action with games Thursday, Oct. 11, at 7 p.m. in the North St. Paul Arena, Saturday, Oct. 13, at St. Cloud, and Monday, Oct. 15, in Farmington. The latter pair also begin at 7 p.m.

### X-COUNT DROPS FIRST

Wisconsin's Badgers showed why they had the talent to finish third in the nation last season as they bested the Minnesota Gopher cross-country team 19-42 last Saturday on UN's home course. The loss was Minnesota's first dropping the harriers to 5-1 while Wisconsin is 4-0 on the season.

Competing for the first time this season on a 10,000-meter course, Minnesota placed only three runners among the top ten. While Jim Stintzi won for the Badgers with a time of 30:59.2, Gopher Don Hurley finished second at 31:22. Gerald Metzler (32:36) finished eighth for UN while Joe Nabberfeld (32:40) was ninth.

"We did not run competitive enough," said UN coach Roy Griak. "After the first two miles their number four, five and six runners moved 20 yards ahead of our men. We just let them get away."

Griak added that his men did not get out to a fast enough start, but they had best get accustomed to the 10,000-meter distance. This Saturday the Gophers travel to East Lansing, MI, to meet host Michigan State and the U. of Michigan.

"We hope to be tougher out there," says Griak. "It should be a good meet." There is nothing like running a mere 10,000 meters on a Saturday morning, is there?

## GOPHERS TO INVADe IOWA FOR SATURDAY ASSIGNMENT WITH HAWKS

If that old adage about 'No rest for the wicked' is true, then Coach Joe Salem and his University of Minnesota football team must feel as though it is filled with wickedness.

Last week they had the unenviable task of journeying to Ann Arbor, Michigan, to take on the Big Ten leading Michigan Wolverines. And they'll be given no rest this Saturday, because now they have to invade Iowa City to meet the red hot Iowa Hawkeyes in a 1:05 p.m. Big Ten Conference encounter.

"It will be another tough assignment," Coach Salem admits. "Maybe it would have been easier if Iowa had faltered a little bit against Northwestern last Saturday, but when they won 50-6, we got the message that the Hawks were ready."

Other people had that message earlier. Despite the fact that Iowa has not had an impressive won-loss record this year (3-3), that club has given an indication that it had plenty of talent as it pushed Oklahoma to the limit, led Nebraska until the final seconds before falling, drilled arch-rival Iowa State 30-14 and then downed Illinois 13-7.

Thus Iowa will put a three-game winning streak on the line against the Gophers on Saturday. And it will be Homecoming for the Hawkeyes. And they want to keep the Floyd of Rosedale trophy in Iowa City.

How will Minnesota rebound after losing 31-21 in the Little Brown Jug battle at Michigan last week? Salem hopes they don't react the way they did after falling to Ohio State, going on the road the following week and being smothered by Southern Cal.

"We made too many mistakes at Michigan," Salem maintained. "We gave up the big plays and then failed to make the big plays ourselves when we had the chance. We can't do that and expect to be contenders in the Big Ten."

The most encouraging thing to Salem about the Michigan contest was the way his Gophers came back in the second half. "We gave up that touchdown in the final seconds of the first half," Salem pointed out, "and that really hurt. It put them ahead 24-7, and we were on the verge of being blown away. But we came back very well in the third quarter, and I was proud of the way we never gave up. When we pulled to within three at 24-21, I figured we could still win it. But Michigan is an excellent football team, and it made the plays when it had to. That was the difference."

So now the Gophers must wipe away the disappointment of losing that one and turn their attention to the Hawkeyes. They know it is difficult to win in Iowa City, and they know that Iowa is a vastly improved team over the one which fell 22-20 in Memorial Stadium a year ago.

"Iowa is a good football team," Salem says. "They have proved to be an advantageous team...one that has taken advantage of every opportunity. They've turned fumble recoveries and interceptions into scores, and that's a sign of a good club. They are explosive offensively, and after losing some close ones early in the

year, they really have found themselves lately and have put a lot of points on the board."

GOPHER TALES---Minnesota and Iowa have met on the gridiron 72 times since the series started in 1891. The Gophers hold a 48-22-2 advantage in the series, and lead in the Floyd of Rosedale battle 28-14-2.

The Gophers scored a slim 2-point win a year ago in the Brickhouse after leading 22-0 at one stage of the game. Their last victory in Iowa City was by a 31-7 margin in 1975 when Tony Dungy was Minnesota's quarterback.

Joe Salem's memories of the Iowa series are somewhat mixed. He remembers his 1958 Gopher team falling 28-6 and his 1959 squad going down to defeat 33-0. But he also remembers coming off the bench to spark Minnesota to a 27-10 second-half win over the Hawks enroute to a national championship and a trip to a Rose Bowl in 1960.

Minnesota, although losing at Michigan last week, made its mark in the school record book. Quarterback Mark Carlson set a new standard with 51 passing attempts and another with 339 yards passing. Tight end Glenn Bourquin established a new mark with 12 receptions.

The old records were 47 passing attempts by Phil Hagen against Ohio State in 1969, 304 yards by Hagen in that game against the Buckeyes, and 11 receptions by Ken Last against Kansas State in 1966.

Coach Salem may be in daily conferences with trainer Jim Marshall this week as he makes his plans for Iowa. It now appears that linebacker Jim Fahnhorst and cornerback Ken Foxworth are done for the season. Offensive guard Bill Humphries still has his foot in a cast, and his chances of returning appear slim. None of those players saw action at Michigan.

Bumps and bruises against the Wolves are still bothering a number of Gophers, the most obvious of whom is Bourquin who injured an ankle and boarded the plane for the flight home last Saturday on crutches. If Bourquin is not ready, Randy Sonnenfeld, who did not make the trip to Michigan, could take over. But if he isn't pronounced fit, the tight end assignment could go to redshirt freshman Mike Curtis who came off the bench last weekend to grab three passes for 27 yards. Fullback Garry White did not make the trip to Michigan but hopes to return this week.

Carlson now has completed 38 of 157 attempts for 1057 yards this season. He has thrown for four touchdowns. He hit his longest pass of the season against Michigan ....55 yards to Marion Barber. And Barber covered the last 30 yards of that play minus one shoe!

University of Minnesota basketball coach Jim Dutcher, starting his 5th year as boss of the Gopher cage program, greeted 12 varsity candidates Monday, the first day of practice for the 1979-80 season.

Coming off an 11-16 record last year, which moved his record at Minnesota to 68-39 and his 10-year career mark to 190-89, Dutcher and his staff hold high hopes for an improved record this season and a possible move back to the Big Ten's first division. The Gophers ended 6-12 in the Big Ten last year.

"Last season we decided to go with our fine group of freshmen recruits," Dutcher says. "By doing so we lost some games because of some rookie mistakes.

"This year we have more experience and I believe we recruited the right men to give us special aid in the areas where we were short last season.

"However, moving up in the Big Ten is another story. No less than 41 of last year's 50 starters return, and you know the strength of our conference last season. But we are still optimistic about our chances. We have a very fine group of student-athletes on this squad. I'm anxious for our first game to get here."

Leading the returnees back is senior captain Kevin McHale. The 6-foot-11 forward-center had an active summer. He played both center and forward on two gold medal winning U. S. National teams at the Pan Am Games and the World University Games. An All-Big Ten selection last winter, McHale is expected to be a dominating force in the Gopher quest to rise in the final conference standings.

Other returning lettermen included four sophomores: 6-10 C Gary Holmes, 6-2 G Mark Hall, 6-4 G Darryl Mitchell; and 6-5 F-G Trent Tucker.

Four incoming freshmen and three transfer students round out the opening Gopher roster. Among the first year men are: 7-2 C Randy Breuer (Lake City), 6-3 F Ben Coleman (Minneapolis North), 6-7 F Zebedee Howell (Ocala, FL), and 6-1 G Bruce Kaupa (Woodbury).

The three transfers are: 6-0 Jr G Gary Copperud (Washburn, WI) from Golden Valley Lutheran College, MN; 6-0 Jr G Carl Dale (Chicago, IL) from San Diego City College, CA, and 6-6 So. F Andy Thompson (Nassau, Bahamas) from U. of South Florida. Thompson is the younger brother of Mychal Thompson, former Gopher All-American and Big Ten MVP now with the NBA Portland Trailblazers.

Missing from the roster is 6-10 junior center-forward Brian Pederson, a two-year letterman who has been forced to sit out the coming season due to a back injury.

The Gophers will conduct daily practice sessions with Saturday morning scrimmages leading up to the season opener at home November 30 vs. Eastern Michigan. Dutcher coached six years at EMU before moving to the University of Michigan as an assistant coach to Bobby Orr prior to taking the Minnesota job.

## HOCKEY OPENER 10/23

Minneapolis, MN—Next week has become zero hour for the 1977-80 University of Minnesota hockey Gophers. On Tuesday, Oct. 23, acting head coach Brad Buetow takes his squad to the St. Paul Civic Center to meet the 1980 U.S. Olympic Team under the direction of the man Buetow replaced, Herb Brooks.

Then Friday and Saturday of next week, Oct. 26-27, the young and relatively inexperienced Gopher sextet opens its regular season playing host to Michigan State, a WCHA darkhorse under new head coach Ron Mason who moved over from Bowling Green.

The biggest problem facing Buetow and Co. is time . . . or rather, lack of same. "I really wish we had another week or a scrimmage game against another team before opening against the Olympic team," Buetow said Monday.

"Our intrasquad scrimmages can do only so much in terms of development. Our men are tired, sore, and sick of skating against each other. But I have to add that the attitude and willingness to work by the men on this team has been excellent throughout our pre-season camp.

"The results have been positive, but at the same time slow in coming. It has been mostly a teaching situation because of so many new and inexperienced people on our roster. Going from high school to all-new and possibly more complicated systems is awfully tough for freshmen and transfers to digest.

"Fortunately injuries have been held to a minimum, but as I said, they are pretty sore from all that hitting. I'd like to say we are completely ready, but that may not be the story. I just wish we had a little more time."

Some position changes are reflected when talking about who will be on the ice when the Gophers face the Olympians Oct. 23. Buetow made the following rundown about the men who at this time appear ready to suit up for the first game.

Four veterans are ready at left wing, including sr. captain Don Micheletti, plus juniors Steve Ulseth, Dave Terwilliger and Brad Doshan. Ulseth, however, has been slowed by a leg injury.

At right wing veteran Gophers Tim Harrer, a senior, plus so. Kevin Hartzell and sr. John Meredith are about set, as is jr. transfer Mike Reilly who played two years at Colorado College before moving to UM last season.

The biggest questions of all come at center ice. Only one returnee, so. Jeff Teal, is set. Behind him are five freshmen and one transfer, the latter being Paul Lundeen who attended Wisconsin one season.

The frosh battling for duty at center include Aaron Broten, younger brother of Neal, last year's UM rookie of the year. Aaron was moved over from left wing. Scott Lynch, Steve Griffith, Scott Bjustad and Gino Peluso, the latter moved from defense, are additional frosh battling for center positions.

It appears right now that five defensive spots could be settled. Leading for duty are sr. Peter Hayek, jr. Bart Larson, both vets, plus another C.C. transfer, jr. Mike Knoke, and freshmen Mike Meadows and Dave Jensen.

Battling for the sixth spot at this time are sr. vet Bob Bergloff, so. Dave Dillon and so. vet Brian Zins, the latter moved from right wing.

In goal two men have come to the top...so. vet Jim Jetland and frosh Paul Butters. According to Buetow, this duo is neck and neck for the top job at this time. However, Jetland has been slowed with a sore hip. They could be used alternately in WCHA series at the start of the season.

Buetow and Co. will visit three more arenas for intrasquad games this week. Starting tonight (Mon. 10/15) the Gophers played at Farmington. The pre-season schedule finishes up with games at Wakota Arena, 7 p.m. Wednesday, and New Hope Ice Arena, 7 p.m. Saturday.



### X-COUNTRY TO IOWA SAT.

Minnesota's varsity cross-country team hopes to return to the win column this week when the Gophers travel to Iowa for a dual meet with the Hawkeyes Saturday, Oct. 20. The six-mile course is laid out on the U. of Iowa Golf Course.

Last Saturday the Gophers disappointed head coach Roy Griak by not running a smart race and losing a double dual to host Michigan State, 20-35, and Michigan, 18-42, in a meet run at East Lansing.

"We are simply not running smart mentally," Griak says. "Our men are letting opponents get a big jump in the first mile and then finding out they cannot catch up. I find it hard to believe we are not doing a better job.

"Only one of our men, sophomore Don Hurley, is showing any consistency. Hurley ran a good race at Michigan State covering the six-mile course in 30:43 to come in third. Our next man was 11th. We've just got to get smarter if we plan to challenge anyone this season."

Good news came when Griak announced that junior vet Joe Nabbefeld appears ready to begin competition after recovering from a leg injury suffered this summer. He and Hurley are expected to lead a team of seven men against Iowa.

Also competing will be Dave Chatelaine, John Griffin, John Idstrom, John Keohen and Gerald Metzler. Minnesota is now 5-3 on the season.

Series History:

Minnesota owns a slight edge in this series 23-16-1 dating back to the first meeting in 1893. On that date the Illini won 11-10, Minnesota's first series win was 23-0 in 1900. Gopher teams have taken 6 of the last 8 meetings, including the last three straight. The closeness in series games is pointed out in that UM's largest margin of victory over Illinois was a 33-0 decision in 1961. The biggest Illini win was 40-13 margin in 1947. Illinois last won at Minnesota's Memorial Stadium 17-14 in 1974. Possibly the biggest game in the entire series came in 1924 when Illinois was the guest team as the University of Minnesota dedicated its all-new stadium. On that afternoon Illinois, with famed runningback Red Grange, was a heavy favorite. However, UM prevailed coming out with a 20-7 victory.

Homecoming History:

Saturday marks Minnesota's 61st Homecoming celebration on campus. Gopher grid teams on those dates have posted a 40-18-2 record. Illinois was the first Gopher Homecoming opponent, and spoiled the festivities by defeating UM 10-6 in 1919. In all, Illinois has provided the opposition 7 times with Minnesota winning 4 and the Illini 3. The last time Illinois was here for Homecoming was 1976, and Minnesota took that one 29-14.

## GOPHERS TO HOST ILLINOIS IN HOMECOMING GAME SATURDAY

In 1924, the immortal Red Grange led the University of Illinois into town in a Big Ten Conference football assignment designed to dedicate Minnesota's Memorial Stadium.

An inspired band of Golden Gophers shut down the legendary number 77 and won that historical game 55 years ago by a 20-7 margin. It was an impressive beginning for Minnesota's new facility.

Saturday at 1:30 p.m. Coach Joe Salem's charges host Illinois once again, and with Homecoming on tap at the University of Minnesota, an abundance of excitement is expected in the Brickhouse.

Minnesota will go into that contest with an overall record of 4-3 and a Big Ten log of 3-2 after subduing red-hot Iowa 24-7 at Iowa City last weekend and in the process bringing Floyd of Rosedale home for at least another year.

"It really was a big win for us" Coach Salem acknowledged. "It's tough to win at Iowa, but we stressed in practice all week that if we could avoid making mistakes, avoid those turnovers, we could win."

Not only did Minnesota avoid coughing up the football (the Gophers fumbled only once against the Hawkeyes and did not throw a pass interception), it gained possession four times on Iowa turnovers.

Mike Robb accounted for one fumble recovery and the interception, Steve Cunningham got another fumble recovery and Mike Stensrud, seeing his first college action, notched the third.

But it was more than that. "We played well defensively most of the way," Salem pointed out. "We maybe had to bend a little at times to stop Dennis Mosley (he went into the game ranked as the leading rusher in the Big Ten), but we never broke."

On offense, Glenn Lewis, who made his first start as a Gopher, led the way with 84 yards in 22 carries while Marion Barber had 38 yards and a touchdown. Elmer Bailey, however, was the top scorer with two touchdown passes from Mark Carlson. On the day Bailey had six receptions for 158 yards.... and Carlson was 14 of 17 for 230.

"We were able to make the big play at Iowa," Salem said. "We got a couple of long touchdowns from Bailey, and that was the first time this year it's happened. That may have been the best thing about our win. That and the fact that we were able to win....ON THE ROAD!"

But now it's back home in the brickhouse, and Salem's two major concerns may be that his Gophers will have a letdown, and the physical condition of his squad this week.

"We were pretty banged up going to Iowa," Salem admitted. "We had to use

two more freshmen in our defensive secondary. Hopefully we didn't lose anybody else down there, and some of the people that didn't play last week should be ready for Illinois."

As far as a letdown goes, the Gophers are being warned not to take the Fighting Illini lightly. "They gave Michigan all they wanted for almost three quarters last week before running out of gas," Salem explained. "We can't be fooled by their record."

Illinois has won only once this year....that in non-conference play over Air Force. On the season the Illini are 1-6, and they are 0-4 in the Big Ten battling Northwestern for the league cellar. This past weekend, Illinois fell 27-7 to the Michigan Wolverines after waging a scoreless first half.

GOPHER TALES--Minnesota and Illinois have met in football 40 times since the series started in 1898, and the Gophers will take a 23-16-1 edge into Memorial Stadium on Saturday.

The Gophers have won three straight from the Illini. Last year Minnesota triumphed 24-6. In 1977, when fullback Kent Kitzmann set an NCAA record with 57 carries, the Gophers prevailed 21-0. In 1976 Minnesota won 29-14. The most recent Illinois victory over Minnesota was 42-23 in 1975.

Elmer Bailey set a new U of M single game receiving record at Iowa. His six catches netted 158, and that's the most ever for a Gopher. The old standard was 136 set by Mike Jones against Northwestern in 1973.

Bailey, who now leads Minnesota in receiving yards with 344, has thrived on Iowa the last three years. In that trio of games against the Hawkeyes, Bailey has notched a total of five touchdowns.

Marion Barber, who had 42 yards receiving and 38 rushing against the Hawks, now needs only 15 yards against Illinois Saturday to become the all-time leading rusher in University of Minnesota history. Barber, who also leads the Gophers in scoring with 10 touchdowns, has 2,174 yards rushing in his U of M career. The record is 2,183 set by Paul Giel (current U of M athletic director) in 1951-52-53. Barber would like nothing better than to set the new standard in front of a Minnesota homecoming crowd.

Historically, the Gophers have done well in homecoming assignments. Through the years, Minnesota has won 40, lost 18 and tied two in front of the old grads. Against Illinois at homecoming, the Gophers are 4-3.

Coach Joe Salem's injury list is still causing concern, and tight end is one of the trouble spots. Starter Glenn Bourquin did not make the trip to Iowa and is not expected to play against Illinois. Mike Curtis injured a knee against the Hawks and was on crutches Saturday night. Randy Sonnenfeld, who missed the Michigan game two weeks ago, played at Iowa but was not 100 per cent. He should be ok for Illinois. Keith Edwards and Mike Peppe were missing from the defensive secondary at Iowa but hope to be ready this week.

U RECOGNIZES BRONKO

Besides Homecoming celebrations at Memorial Stadium Saturday when the football Gophers host Illinois, another event will take place when the University of Minnesota honors possibly the greatest individual player the game has ever known. . . Bronislav "Bronko" Nagurski.

In fitting halftime ceremonies to be conducted by athletic director Paul Giel, the jersey worn by Bronko in his playing days at Minnesota (1927-28-29) bearing #72 will be permanently retired. No future Gopher player will ever don that jersey after this season.

It marks the second number retired in football. In 1974 the UM athletic department permanently retired #54, the jersey worn by Minnesota's only Heisman Trophy winner, halfback Bruce Smith (1939-40-41).

Nagurski, who went on to later fame with the NFL Chicago Bears, has been called by football experts far and near the outstanding individual to ever play the game of football. He remains today the only player to ever be voted to the All-America first team at two positions. . . fullback and tackle.

Bronko has already been enshrined in both the collegiate and professional Halls of Fame. He has actually received just about every possible honor that can be granted, including being named player of the first-half century in a landslide vote.

The only player close to him in the latter balloting was Harold "Red" Grange, famed Illinois halfback in 1923-24-25. After playing as teammates for the Bears, Grange once made the following statement about Nagurski.

"A lot of times reporters ask who I think was the greatest football player of all time and there is only one--the Bronk," Grange offered. "I was also asked if I could describe Bronk's abilities in modern terms and I said--'he played fullback like Larry Csonka and defense like Dick Butkus.'"

Illness will prevent Bronko from attending the ceremonies Saturday, but present to accept the accolades in his father's name will be his son, Bronko, Jr.

GOPHER FROSH PACES CROSS COUNTRY TEAM

Freshman David Michael ran to the fourth-place spot in the Minnesota-Iowa cross country race this Saturday. The Gophers, after losing three straight meets, got on the winning track by whipping the Hawkeyes 19-42. This weekend Minnesota will host the Gopher Classic at the University of Minnesota Golf Course at 10:30.

"Michael ran well and we are very high on him," said coach Roy Griak. "He did a super job. David worked out very well and really helped our cause."

Although the Gophers had slipped to 5-3 before the Iowa race, the Hawks didn't present too much of a cause to go for, according to Griak. "It's nice to win, but Iowa is not too strong as a team and it really isn't an indication of anything significant as far as the conference goes."

The Gophers copped eight of the top team places at Iowa with Don Hurley covering the four-mile course in 20:02 to win first place for Minnesota. Teammate Gerry Metzler was second at 20:31. Other Gopher placers were Michael at fourth (20:54), John Idstrom at fifth (21:01), John Keohen placed seventh (21:04) and was followed by John Griffin, Joe Habbefeld, Larry Berkner and Dave Chateline.

ICERS OPEN WITH 3 GAMES

Acting head hockey coach Brad Buetow places his 1979-80 edition of Golden Gopher hockey on display three times in the opening week of action.

The Gophers travel to St. Paul to meet the 1980 U. S. Olympic Team under the direction of Buetow's former boss, coach Herb Brooks, Tuesday at 7:30 p.m. CDT in the Civic Center.

Then Friday and Saturday of this week, the Gophers return home to Williams Arena to host Michigan State in a pair of 7:30 p.m. contests marking the WCHA openers for both clubs.

"I actually wish we had some more time before our league openers," Buetow said Monday. "But I can't do anything about the schedule."

"We have an awfully lot of young players on our roster, so most of pre-season camp has dealt with teaching situations. But I cannot complain about our camp. These players have taken everything we've thrown at them and come back for more.

"The team attitude is excellent, and before long I believe we are going to become a very representative hockey club. We can't do anything but improve as our new men gain experience and learn more about our systems.

"I do know they are extremely eager to start skating against someone other than their teammates. We have gone through seven intrasquad games and our men are tired of hitting each other.

"I'm not certain we are completely ready to face the U. S. Olympic squad this early, and I harbor many of the same feelings about Michigan State. I know the Spartans will be vastly improved this year under new head coach Ron Mason who moved over after a successful stay at Bowling Green.

"But I believe I'll be saying the same thing about every WCHA team this season. Everyone is improved, with the possible exception of Minnesota. We lost an awful lot of production to graduation, the Olympics and pro hockey. But we're not crying. We're just getting ready to do all we can to defend Minnesota's winning last year's national championship.

"We'll find out soon enough if we are ready to do just that. But we're still #1 until somebody proves different. I just hope our fans will continue to give us the same great support they have in past years."

Buetow listed his probable lineup for Tuesday's game and stated it could probably hold true to Friday's opener vs. MSU. But he quickly added that some changes could develop for Saturday's contest.

The top line for UM right now appears to have sr. captain Don Micheletti (Hibbing) at left wing, sr. Tim Harrer (Bloomington) on the right with so. Jeff Teal (Rochester) at center. Teal has the most experience of any center on the Gopher varsity, and he's only a second-year man.

The next three lines boast newcomers at center. Frosh Aaron Broten (Roseau), younger brother of Neal who was UM's top rookie last season, will join center jr. Steve Ulseth (Roseville) on the left and so. Kevin Hartzell (St. Paul) on the right. Soph transfer Paul Lundeen (Minneapolis), who spent a year at Wisconsin, will center fr. Steve Griffith (Roseville) on the left and jr. transfer Mike Reilly (Roseville) at right wing. Reilly played two years at Colorado College.

A final line should see frosh Scott Bjugstad (New Brighton) centering vets Dave Terwilliger (Edina), a jr., and sr. John Meredith (Minneapolis) on the left and right, respectively.

Four newcomers will line up along the blueline on defense. The only vets back there are sr. Peter Hayek (Robbinsdale) and jr. Bart Larson (Bloomington). One transfer, jr. Mike Knoke (Minneapolis), after two years at C.C. will skate with fr. Mike Meadows (Hibbing) who played in the USHL for Waterloo last season.

The remaining twosome includes so. Brian Zins (Hoyt Lakes), who was moved from RW, and fr. David Jensen (Crystal).

In goal Tuesday, Buetow said he expects to start so. Jim Jetland (Grand Rapids), but said he could come back with fr. Paul Butters (Rochester) this weekend. Buetow said Jetland and Butters are neck and neck in competition for the starting job. That could lead to a split series situation this season.

Buetow also said that several more players could break into the lineup by Saturday. Included are jr. LW Brad Doshan (Hastings), defenseman Bob Bergloff (Bloomington), a jr., or so. Jay Larson (Minneapolis), plus a pair of freshmen centers in Gino Peluso (Pengilly) or Scott Lynch (North St. Paul).

The following weekend finds the hockey Gophers on the road at Michigan November 2-3.

The Series:

Minnesota and Indiana first met in 1906 when the schools ended up in a 6-6 faceoff. In all, IU and UM have faced each other 40 times on the gridiron with Minnesota owning a 26-11 edge in wins. There have been 3 series ties. Last year produced probably the most exciting game in the series history when UM came from a 24-7 halftime deficit to win 32-31 on a 31-yard FG by Paul Rogind with 2 seconds remaining. However, that was in UM's Memorial Stadium. Minnesota has not won at Indiana Stadium (cap. 52,354) since 1968 when the Gophers took a 20-6 decision. Since that year Minnesota has lost five straight contests to the Hoosiers at IU Stadium. Conversely, the last IU victory in Memorial Stadium was in 1963 when the Hoosiers won 24-6. The game Saturday is Parent's Day at IU. The biggest series win for UM was a 34-0 decision in 1957. The most lopsided IU win was a 49-0 victory in 1945.

Gopher Travel Plans:

UM leaves Friday via charter flight Friday at 10 a.m. to Indianapolis and buses to Bloomington. The squad works out at IU stadium that afternoon and will be quartered at the Bloomington Holiday Inn. The team returns home Saturday after the game arriving Twin Cities approximately 6 p.m. CDT.

## GOPHERS GO BACK ON THE ROAD FOR TWO WEEKS

That old "back to the drawing board" syndrome has hit the University of Minnesota football team, and to make matters worse, the Gophers also go "back" on the road. . . for two straight Big Ten assignments.

Coach Joe Salem's charges were flying high two weeks ago when they soared into Iowa City to meet the Hawkeyes. By winning that one, Minnesota looked ready to finish its final four 1979 contests with a flourish.

But the Gopher special was sidetracked at home this past weekend when lowly Illinois tied the host club 17-17 and all but destroyed any hopes Minnesota may have been nourishing for a post season bowl invitation.

"If we can't beat a team that is 1-6, we don't deserve to go anywhere," Salem said. "All we can do now is hope that we can pull ourselves together and play well in our last three games."

The biggest problem with those last three is that two of them....this Saturday at Indiana and the following week at Michigan State....are on the road. And despite that impressive win at Iowa two weeks ago, Minnesota has been anything but impressive away from home in recent years.

To make the task Saturday even tougher, Indiana is nursing bowl hopes of its own. And the Hoosiers almost pulled a major upset their last time out of the blocks before falling at Michigan 27-21 when the Wolves scored on the final play of the game.

Indiana will take an overall record of 5-3 into Saturday's contest. The Hoosiers are tied with Iowa for fourth place in the Big Ten standings at 3-2.

Minnesota, meanwhile, saw its overall log slip to 4-3-1 with the deadlock against Illinois. The Gophers are 3-2-1 in the conference standings and are listed sixth behind Indiana and Iowa.

"We knew all along that Indiana had a good club, and we knew they were playing well," Salem acknowledged, "but the way they performed against Michigan indicates they are even tougher than we thought."

One area where Salem may be concerned as he prepares his Gophers for this weekend's battle is the mental attitude of his club. "We played without enthusiasm against Illinois," he pointed out, "while Indiana obviously went after Michigan with a great deal of intensity. Whether we can bounce back this week remains to be seen."

Minnesota had its problems defensively against Illinois, and unless those difficulties are overcome, Indiana could make it a long afternoon for the Gophers with their varied and explosive attack.

Mike Harkrader ranks as an outstanding runner for the Hoosiers and the Gophers don't need to be reminded that he had over 100 yards rushing in last year's encounter at Memorial Stadium.

But the development of Tim Clifford at quarterback has made Indiana even better. He looms as one of the better passers in the Big Ten, and last week at Michigan accounted for 232 yards passing and a pair of Indiana touchdowns.

All of which means the Gophers will have their work cut out for them Saturday.... and for the final three weeks of the season. The concensus of opinion among Minnesota's coaches seems to be that this is the time of year when a team can do a complete folding act....or pull themselves together and finish impressively.

It has to do with character. And pride. And maturity. Minnesota will find out if it has those ingredients this weekend.

GOPHER TALES--Despite the disappointing outcome of last Saturday's game against Illinois, Minnesota players did manage to establish three more University of Minnesota records.

Marion Barber, who finished the game with 76 yards, became the all-time U of M career rushing leader. He now has 2,250 yards and broke the old mark of 2,133 set by Paul Giel (current Gopher athletic director) in 1951-52-53.

Mark Carlson completed 22 of 33 passing attempts for 232 yards against the Illini and now has 124 completions on the season....another new U of M standard. The old record was 123 set by Tony Dungy during the 1975 season.

Paul Rogind, who previously had established himself as the Minnesota record holder for most points, most field goals and most PAT's, booted a 57 yard field goal against Illinois and now owns that record for the longest in U of M history. The previous best was 52 yards by Steve Goldberg against Ohio State in 1974.

Minnesota and Indiana have been battling in the football wars since 1906 when the Gophers eked out an 8-6 decision. In all there have been 40 games in the series, with Minnesota holding a 26-11-3 advantage.

Last year's 32-31 win for Minnesota may rank as the most thrilling of all time.... and the Gopher comeback certainly stands as the greatest ever. The Hoosiers jumped off to a 24-0 lead in that contest and led 31-14 in the fourth quarter before Wendell Avery came off the bench to rally the Gophers and pull out the decision. Rogind's 31 yard field goal with two seconds remaining provided the margin of victory.

But that was in the Brick House. Minnesota has not won at Indiana since 1965 when Coach Murray Warmath's Gophers prevailed 20-6. Since then the Gophers have lost five straight at Bloomington.

When Salem played at Minnesota, the Gophers won two at home....24-14 in 1959 and 42-0 in 1960. But in 1958, at Indiana, the Hoosiers won by a slim 6-0 margin. Salem hopes his return to Bloomington provides a better outcome on Saturday.

Coach Lee Corso of the Hoosiers is 3-3 against the Gophers. He's lost all three decisions at Minneapolis....and won all three at home.

## ICERS AT MICHIGAN

After winning its opening series at home against Michigan State (9-3, 11-5), Minnesota's defending NCAA champion hockey Gophers take to the road for another pair of WCHA games Friday and Saturday at Michigan.

The Wolverines also bring a perfect record into the series having swept Minnesota-Duluth 11-6 and 6-4 at home following two earlier non-conference wins against Bowling Green (9-5, 7-2).

Although it was nice to take the opening pair, rookie Minnesota coach Brad Buetow was not entirely pleased. "I can't really be much less than happy about winning our opening series," Buetow said Monday, "but at the same time I'm far from pleased with the defensive play of everyone, particularly in our own end.

"Giving up 13 goals is way too much. We are not about to score 20 goals again, either. I believe we caught Michigan State's goalies in an off weekend. I know they are better than they showed. But we had better improve fast on defense or we could be in for a very long trip.

"Michigan has its centers back from last year who sat out most of the season with injuries. Right now four of their top five scorers play center ice. And they are much stronger in goal with freshman Paul Fricker.

"I'm very concerned about this series for several reasons. It's always critical when new people first go on the road. And we will be taking plenty of new people.

"How they handle their concentration and poise, and can they maintain whatever momentum we gained from last weekend are vital factors. It's seldom easy to go on the road. It's always tough to play at Michigan.

"This weekend could tell a lot about what this Minnesota team is made of. Our overall conditioning and depth, plus a team effort, played major roles against Michigan State. Now we'll find out if our men can capitalize on these points."

Two men who skated against MSU are expected to miss this weekend, and possibly longer, from injuries sustained. Sophomore defenseman Brian Zins may have to undergo knee surgery after a complete examination, and freshman defender Mike Meadows is extremely doubtful with a shoulder separation.

But not all is dim. Buetow said Monday he was pleased with the contributions of senior Bob Bergloff and soph Jay Larson on defense Saturday in place of Zins and Meadows. Bergloff scored two goals, one shorthanded.

The coach also offered words of praise about the play of junior wing Steve Ulseth Saturday. After sitting out Friday, Ulseth scored twice and played well on both the power play and killing penalties. "Having (Steve) Ulseth Saturday added another dimension to our play," the coach offered.

The Gopher goalie situation is still far from settled, which means soph Jim Jetland and freshman Paul Butters will probably split the Michigan series. Buetow would not say who would play the first game.

Minnesota owns a slim 11-8-0 margin in this series with State which began in 1950. That year, when MSU entered the Big Ten, the powerful Spartans under former UM All-American, the late Biggie Munn, trounced the Gophers 27-0. MSU also won the next meeting 21-0 in 1953, the first year they were eligible for the Big Ten title. State tied for the championship and went on to defeat UCLA 28-20 in the Rose Bowl. UM's first series win came the next year when the Gophers triumphed 19-13 in Murray Warmath's first season. Minnesota's biggest series win was a 39-12 decision in 1958, while MSU's best day was a 42-13 victory in 1957. The last two years saw MSU blitz the Gophers on long bombs from QB Ed Smith to All-America wide receiver Kirk Gibson. Fortunately for the Gophers, both are gone from the collegiate scene. A memorable victory for UM came in 1972 when Cal Stoll, who assisted under MSU's Duffy Daugherty 10 seasons, directed the Gophers to a 14-10 victory here in Daugherty's last season as Spartan boss.

## GOPHERS TO INVADE MICHIGAN STATE SATURDAY

The University of Minnesota invades Michigan State Saturday in its second straight....and final....road trip of the 1979 season still nursing hopes of winding things up with a winning record.

Coach Joe Salem's faltering Gophers will put an overall 4-4-1 and a Big Ten record of 3-3-1 on the line at Michigan State. But Minnesota's ability to win will depend on whether it can show a complete reversal of the form displayed in the last two weeks.

"We were tied 17-17 by Illinois two weeks ago, a team that had won only once all season," Salem analyzed, "and last weekend we get blown out by Indiana 42-24. Unless we do a complete turnaround, we'll be in bigger trouble at Michigan State this week."

The Spartans had their own troubles earlier this year, and their record dipped badly. It all was due to an unbelievable rash of injuries that seemed to grow every week, however, but now that's over.

Michigan State "got well" in its most recent outing, drilling Northwestern 42-7. That win ended a five-game losing streak and means the host contingent will bring a 4-5 overall mark and a Big Ten record of 2-4 into Saturday's confrontation.

"There isn't any doubt about the fact that Michigan State has good people," Salem warned, "and we can't think of them in any way except that they are the defending Big Ten champions with almost that entire team back."

Salem also contends that Michigan State's win over Northwestern will give them all the more incentive to finish in a strong fashion. "They'll be flying high," he says, "and it could come down again to how well we can bounce back after two straight lousy performances."

And lousy might not be strong enough in describing Minnesota's effort at Indiana. "We were awful," Salem responded. "Our defense was the worst I've ever seen. We got totally destroyed, totally blown out. They ate our lunch."

And Minnesota's first year coach isn't about to predict how the Gophers will react, how the beating will affect them as they prepare for Michigan State. "It was a miserable performance for us," Salem said. "It was like we weren't out there. We played with no feeling, no effort, no intensity. All we can hope now is that our people have what it takes to come back with strong efforts in our last two games."

If Minnesota does have that kind of maturity, that kind of character, it could still wind up with a winning record by beating Michigan State at East Lansing in that 1 p.m. (EST--12 noon in the Twin Cities) Saturday and then beating Wisconsin in the season finale a week later at Memorial Stadium.

But defensively it will take an effort similar to the one shown by the Gophers when they whipped Purdue 31-14 more than a month ago. "Our defense has played poorly its last four games," Salem said. "We know we lack team speed on that side of the line, but it's more than that. We need to find some people who want to play, who can play with some feeling."

(MORE)

Salem hopes he can make that find by this weekend, shore up the defense and help keep Minnesota's offense in the game.

The Gophers held their own....or almost....offensively against Indiana. They had 21 first downs, 357 total yards and those 24 points. But it wasn't enough as three dropped passes in crucial situations, seven penalties, four fumbles and a pass interception helped Indiana thwart Minnesota's efforts.

GOPHER TALES---Minnesota and Michigan State have met 19 times since the series started in 1950, and the Gophers will take an 11-8 advantage into Saturday's game.

Michigan State has won two straight from the Gophers including that 33-9 rout in East Lansing a year ago. Minnesota's most recent victory at Michigan State came in 1976 when Tony Dungy led Cal Stoll's Gophers to a 14-10 triumph.

Marion Barber, who hails from Detroit Chadsey, will play his final game in Michigan this week. He's only a junior, but next year Minnesota will play both Michigan and Michigan State at Memorial Stadium.

Barber carried the ball only twice at Indiana and now has 459 yards on the season. He'd like nothing better than to finish with a flurry on Michigan turf (artificial as it is) this weekend.

Mark Carlson completed 19 more passes against the Hoosiers and continues to extend his single-season record. He now has 143 completions on the year and is connecting at a .596 rate. He also notched two more touchdown strikes at Indiana and has 10 on the year.

Glenn Lewis, who started at fullback in place of Garry White at Indiana, had his best day as a Gopher. He finished with 95 yards and now has 263 this season. Lewis also ranks as Minnesota's top kick returner with 355 yards....an average of 20.9 per return.

Elmer Bailey caught another TD pass at Indiana and now has seven this year. His 32 grabs are tops for the Gophers as are his 486 yards. The Gophers have four players who have caught more than 20 passes in 1979.

Coach Salem faced Michigan State only once as a player. In his sophomore season as a Gopher, Minnesota beat the Spartans 39-12 in Minneapolis. When Smokey Joe was a member of Murray Warmath's staff, the Gophers notched a 13-0 win in 1961 and a 28-7 win in 1962. Both of those triumphs came in East Lansing.

Paul Rogind, Minnesota's record-holding kicker, added another field goal to his book last Saturday....that one from 27 yards out. He now has seven field goals on the season and is Minnesota's second-leading scorer with 46 points.

The Gophers' injury list remains lengthy. Don Meyer added his name to the casualty corps Saturday with an injured elbow. He won't play at Michigan State.

GOPHERS BACK ON EARTH -- TIGERS IN TOWN

With a 3-1 Colorado College team in town for a weekend hockey series with a 2-2 Minnesota squad, things don't exactly look rosey for the Gophers.

Au contraire! -- the Gophers of 1979 are playing their best hockey so far of the young season and show no signs of a letdown after dropping two to Michigan in Ann Arbor last weekend. Michigan is now 6-0, alone atop the WCHA.

"It was tough to take those two losses," said Minnesota ass't coach John Perpich. "The players are bitter, sure, but they know that they played well in Michigan and will only get better."

The Wolverines hit the Gophers with 5-2 and 3-2 losses, but what is somewhat concealed is that Minnesota outshot Michigan 88-46 over the weekend. Wolverine goalie Paul Fricker, a freshman from Vancouver, stonewalled the Gopher attack. During the third period of Friday's game, Fricker turned aside 22 shots. Just as superior in the other end as Jim Jetland. Minnesota yielded an open-net goal at the finish and that was that for the Gopher's first loss of this year.

Saturday saw the same furious pressure exerted on the Michigan defenses. At one point of the second session, according to Perpich, the Gophers had control of the puck for two and one-half minutes, but Fricker stopped all Minnesota attempts to light the lamp. For the night, Fricker had 36 saves, while Paul Butters stopped 28 Michigan shots.

"We are happy with our goaltending," said Perpich. "Both Jim and Paul played well. It is good for our goaltenders to play well after we questioned our goaltending earlier. Both are now much better."

But now, Colorado College, fresh from a sweep of Denver last weekend will be in Williams Arena this Friday and Saturday for a series with the 2-2 Gophers, game time both nights 7:30. Meanwhile, Michigan travels to South Bend, Indiana, to take on 2-2 Notre Dame. The Irish swept UM-D during the weekend.

If the Gophers are to grab the Tigers by the tail will depend on whether they can "score alot of goals and be quick," according to Perpich.

This Friday at noon in Jax Cafe, the BlueLine Club will hold a luncheon. The public is invited.

Individual champion was Ohio State's Steve Crane. Crane, who is undefeated in home meets this year, set a course record with a time of 23:27.9. Badger ace Steve Stinzi was second at 23:29. Stinzi and Metzler split their two duels this year. Dann Heikkinen of Michigan ran to third, winding up 23:31. Two Indiana Hoosiers were fourth and fifth, respectively. Jim Spivey (23:42) and Randy Stoneman (23:44) rounded-out the top five.

The Gophers finished 7-4 for 1979 and coach Roy Griak's team next sets itself for the indoor track season.

Minneapolis, MN--Beating Wisconsin in hockey is one thing.

Beating Wisconsin twice in hockey is another.

Sweeping Wisconsin at home in hockey for the first time since January, 1975, is another.

All or/None of the above means a hill of beans to defending WCHA champion North Dakota. Accept all of the above as fact!!!

You see, UND (5-3-0) split at Michigan State last weekend (9-2, 4-5 OT) and relinquished first place in the league standings to surprise! surprise!, Minnesota (7-3-0). And guess who plays at Grand Forks, ND, Friday and Saturday?. . .Minnesota.

At this same time last year Minnesota was atop the WCHA (but that time as expected) and went to Grand Forks. The second place Sioux blitzed UM 4-1 in the first match, but UM rebounded to gain a split with a 6-3 decision.

This year UND is heavily favored to repeat as WCHA champion. The Gophers were picked as an also ran. But home ice has proved a stepping stone for UM as the Gophers are undefeated at Williams Arena. Last weekend Minnesota made it six straight for the home fans defeating Wisconsin 6-5 and 7-2. UM is 1-3-0 on the road.

Last year Minnesota and North Dakota played five great, great games of hockey, the kind which left thousands of fans limp. . .not to mention the players and coaches.

In the final regular season series at Williams Arena last March, UND took the second game 4-2, after UM won the opener 5-2, to win its third WCHA title. But three weeks later the Gophers edged the Sioux 4-3 in the NCAA final at Detroit to win Minnesota's third NCAA crown. Thus, UM took the season series 3-2, not counting two exhibition games played before the regular season start.

But again, what went before means little, if anything. This great series has long produced some of the fastest and best college hockey games found from Colorado to Massachusetts.

The Sioux, like the Gophers, lost several key players up the middle from last season to graduation and the Olympics. But UND returned more veterans and was picked by everyone to repeat at champions of regular season play. So Minnesota's aim this weekend has to be to gain at least a split. And that's the norm when looking at WCHA road action.

#### HARRER, ULSETH STAR

Senior alternate captains and wings Tim Harrer and Steve Ulseth waged personal scoring duels against Wisconsin last weekend. Harrer scored one goal and three assists Friday, then turned those figures around with his team's first hat trick, the fifth of his career, to total eight points for the series.

Ulseth matched Harrer's goal output with two each night. On Saturday he broke the Gophers from a 3-1 second period lead to 5-1 with a pair of goals :34 seconds apart after playing a major role in killing off 4½ minutes while the Gophers played shorthanded due to penalties. Ulseth also had an assist Friday for five series points. Bart Larson and captain Don Micheletti chipped in with four assists each against Wisconsin.

Harrer not only leads the Gophers in scoring this season with 11 goals and 12 assists for 23 points, but that total also places him on top of the WCHA scoring race. Several players who led last week were in non-conference action over the weekend. Harrer scored both game winners vs. Wisconsin.

#### BUETOW ON GOPHERS, PRAISES GOALIES

"We saw two goal tenders play up to their full potential last weekend in leading us to the pair of wins against Wisconsin," says Gopher hockey coach Brad Buetow. "Sophomore Jim Jetland played his best game ever on Saturday, and freshman Paul Butters was also excellent in the first game.

"Each made the big saves, the key saves when we needed them. My plan at this time is to continue to alternate this pair, but I'm not certain in which order. I guess I'm just like other coaches with two good goalies. We tend to go on hunches, that gut feeling as to who should work the first game and who plays the next night. Either way I'm certain these men are going to give us solid performances all season.

"But to be a contender we've got to get our goals allowed figure down. And that means team effort. When you talk defense you are not just speaking of goalies. That means every skater.

"We have shown defensive improvement, but not enough. We've got a long way to go in this area.

"North Dakota again has an excellent hockey team. When they want to really go, they are the best team in the nation. At this time it appears they are searching for consistency. I'm certain they'll find it against us. Ours is a good, solid, intense rivalry. I know North Dakota will be ready for us.

"We skated 120 minutes with excellent intensity last weekend. We'll have to double that effort if we plan to stay with the Sioux. They can be awesome."

Phase II of "A New Era" will get underway Friday at 8 p.m. when the University of Minnesota basketball team plays host to Eastern Michigan in the 1979-80 season opener at Williams Arena.

A year ago Coach Jim Dutcher found himself in the unique position of picking a starting lineup without names like Mychal Thompson, Ray Williams, Osborne Lockhart, Dave Winey etc etc. For Dutcher....AND Gopher fans....it was the start of "A New Era."

Four freshmen and a junior carried the load through most of that campaign. Now those fuzzy-cheeked freshmen are seasoned sophomores. That junior is a senior. And there is promise of improvement coming out of Minnesota's basketball camp.

"We're a much better ball club than we were a year ago when we finished 11-16," Dutcher proclaims. "For one thing, we have more depth than we did last season, and that will help a great deal. Obviously we are more experienced, and experience means a lot. Each of our younger players is an improved player. It is very encouraging."

Exactly how encouraging, exactly how much improvement, exactly how much better Minnesota will be this year remains to be seen. In fact the experts predict that the Gophers can be better than they were last year and still wind up with a poorer record.

That's because "everybody else is better" this year. In fact, Indiana already has been labeled the top team in the nation. Throw in an improved Ohio State team, a better Iowa team, a climbing Illinois team, an impressive Purdue team and it is easy to see why Minnesota boosters are concerned.

The Gophers have been picked to finish anywhere from fifth to 10th in the Big Ten by pre-season prognosticators. But, according to Coach Dutcher, "We're not playing for fifth. We're shooting for the top. We'll just have to see what happens."

A preview of things to come is on tap Friday night when the Hurons invade Williams Arena, and even Dutcher does not know what to expect. "We don't know much about them," he admits, "but it should be a good opener for us."

Dutcher points out that Eastern Michigan has a new coach in Jim Boyce. "He was an assistant at Michigan for the past few years," Dutcher says, "so he knows all about us. But we don't know what he will do with that team. We do know they have good guards, but it does not appear that they have a big club."

Minnesota's opening lineup still isn't set....and it probably won't be until Friday night. Captain Kevin McHale, 6-11 senior, will open at one forward. Gary Holmes, 6-10 sophomore, will start at center. Beyond that, decisions still must be made.

Zebedee Howell, 6-7 freshman, could start at the other forward. Trent Tucker, 6-5 sophomore, might start at that forward....or he could open at guard. And Mark Hall, 6-2 sophomore, and Darryl Mitchell, 6-4 guard, also are listed as possible starters in the back court. Time will tell. --UM--

HARRIERS FINISH AT NATIONALS

Gerald Metzler was 113th and Don Hurley ran to 205th place in the NCAA cross country championships held at Lehigh University November 17.

Henry Rono, of Washington State, winner in 1976 and 1977, recaptured his crown that he lost to Alberto Salizat of Oregon last year.

Metzler covered the 6.2-mile course in 31:10.1 while Hurley's time was 32:38.0. Minnesota's team was unable to compete due to finishing fifth in the District IV meet. What's next for UM's "bread and butter" runners? Both are training for the indoor track season.

## DUTCHER PREPARES GOPHERS FOR CAGE OPENER

With the 1979-80 basketball opener less than two weeks away, Coach Jim Dutcher has stepped up the pace of preparations for his University of Minnesota Golden Gophers.

That lid-lifter is on tap in Williams Arena on Friday, November 30 against Eastern Michigan University. In fact the Gophers will play four straight at home to tip off the current campaign with Fresno State, North Dakota and Nebraska also slated to invade Williams Arena early in December.

The Gophers slipped to 11-16 a year ago when Dutcher was faced with the task of starting one junior and four freshmen most of the way. This year those youngsters are veterans, and hopes are high that Minnesota will take a step upwards.

"We're obviously better than we were a year ago," Dutcher maintains. "The Big Ten race will be a tough one. Indiana already has been labeled the number one team in the nation, and Ohio State figures to give them plenty of trouble in our conference race. Purdue, Iowa and Illinois also are regarded as title contenders."

With that kind of power around, what chance will Minnesota have of improving its standing in the Big Ten? "We'll take a shot at it," Dutcher maintains. "Sure there are a lot of teams given better chances, but we don't intend to start the season aiming for fifth place. We'll shoot for the top and hope for the best."

Minnesota's chances for success rest squarely on the shoulders of Kevin McHale, senior captain from Hibbing, MN. A 6-11 forward, McHale has been a fixture in the Gopher lineup for three years. He returns as Minnesota's leading scorer and rebounder, and he'll have to do it all again this year.

McHale will be joined up front by Gary Holmes, a 6-10 sophomore from Miami, FL, at center. Holmes was a starter last year and finished second in rebounding to McHale. The other forward spot remains up for grabs, but if the Gophers were to open their season tomorrow, Zebedee Howell, a 6-7 freshman from Vanguard, FL, probably would get the nod. "Zebedee will give us the rebounding help we lacked a year ago," Dutcher said. But don't count out such other candidates as Andy Thompson, 6-6 sophomore transfer from Nassau in the Bahamas, or Ben Coleman, 6-9 freshman from Minneapolis, MN. In addition, 7-2 Randy Breuer has been impressive at center.

In the backcourt, Dutcher has been going with Mark Hall, 6-2 sophomore from Springfield, MA, and Trent Tucker, 6-5 sophomore from Flint, MI. Both started several games a year ago.

"We still are not satisfied with our play at guard," Dutcher admits. "We need to have somebody take charge. Somebody has to emerge as a leader. Hopefully that will happen before the opener with Eastern Michigan."

Darryl Mitchell, sophomore from West Palm Beach, FL, has shown sparks and could move into the starting role. The same holds true for Carl Dale, 6-0 junior from Chicago, IL out of San Diego City College. "Dale has quickness, the ability to penetrate and the knack for hitting the open man."

## GOPHERS LOSE FOOTBALL FINALE

First-year coach Joe Salem was bitterly disappointed with the way the 1979 football season ended....not only the fact that his University of Minnesota Gophers lost the finale 42-37 to Wisconsin but that they finished with a losing record.

"That final game was typical of our season," Salem lamented. "We came up an inch short all year long. We failed to make the big play, the crucial play all season long and until we learn to do that, we can't expect to be winners."

So the '79 Gophers were not winners. They wound up the year with a 4-6-1 overall record and a 3-5-1 mark in the Big Ten Conference....good for sixth place in the final standings.

But the most alarming thing about Salem's first season as head coach at Minnesota may have been the fact that the Gophers lost their final three contests and had only a tie in their final four to show for their efforts.

"We thought early in the year that we might turn out to be a pretty good ball club," Salem admitted, "and we played fairly well early in the year. But for the final month-and-a-half, we went down hill."

Highlights of the 1979 campaign would have to start with Minnesota's stunning 31-14 victory over Purdue at Memorial Stadium where the Gophers completely outclassed the Boilermakers by intercepting Mark Herrmann four times and registering four sacks of the vaunted quarterback.

The Gophers also played well at Iowa where they registered a 24-7 verdict over the Hawkeyes. But that was Minnesota's only win on the road this season....and then the Gophers came home the following week to suffer through a 17-17 tie with lowly Illinois, the handwriting for a tailspin was on the wall.

"Our defense did not play well during the last five or six weeks of the season," Salem admitted, "and that was the difference. We moved the ball decently most of the time during the season, but still could not make the big play when we needed it."

That was the case in the loss to Wisconsin and that was the case most of the campaign. "It just shows how much work we have to do, how far we have to go to be competitive," Salem analyzed.

Even in the disappointment, Salem found some bright spots, however, and he praised Mark Carlson for an outstanding season. A senior quarterback from Deerfield, IL., Carlson set a ton of records in his final campaign. "The success of a run-and-shoot offense depends on how good the quarterback is," Salem pointed out, "and when you can roll up as many yards as we did, your quarterback has to be doing a good job. Carlson got the job done for us. He improved with every game and wound up leading the Big Ten in passing and total yardage."

Salem also tipped his hat to Garry White, junior fullback from Rockdale, TX. "Garry wound up as our leading rusher," Salem explained, "even though he sat out three games with an injury. He finished second in the Big Ten in rushing to Dennis Mosley of Iowa, (Mosley averaged 111.5 per game while White was 111.0) and was a key in our offense all year long."

Nevertheless, Ericksen did mention that Griffith is among the top ten freestylers in the world. He added that his squad did alright for the meet overall.

"We swam OK for where we are now," said Ericksen.

### GRAPPLERS START WITH A STUNNER

Minnesota's wrestling team opened their season with an upset of Iowa Friday night in the Minnesota Quadrangular, "out-firsting" the Hawkeyes 5-4. No team scores were kept. Mankato State took one first while Northern Iowa had to accept a goose egg in the winners' circle.

Brad Huckle (118), Gary Lefebvre (126), Jim Martinez (142), Dan Zilverberg (158) and George Bowman (190) earned first places for the Gophers. Dan Egesdahl (150) and Jim Trudeau (167) won second-place honors, while Gene Shaw was third at 126.

The Gophers kept up their winning ways Saturday at the Bison Open at North Dakota State. Leading the pack with four firsts, Minnesota had the "old reliables" do the jobs in another "no team scores" meet.

Huckle wrestled to first at 118 again, while Lefebvre (126), Martinez (142) and Zilverberg (158) took the laurels in their divisions.

Shaw snared a second and Gary pulled a surprise for a third at 126. Dale Wasmund, a transfer from the Naval Academy, was second at 142. Egesdahl "slipped" to third at 150, as did Trudeau at 167. Bowman settled for third at 190, but the Gopher heavyweights, Chuck Vavrosky and Jim Becker, raised eyebrows by being second and third, respectively.

The Gophers travel to DeKalb, Illinois for the Northern Open November 24.

### "BIG BOYS DON'T BOTHER UM GYMNASTS

Competing with the probable national champ and the defending national champ, the Minnesota men's gymnastics team came away with a fifth at the Windy City Invitational over the weekend.

With 13 teams entered, the Gophers scored 255 points, compared to first place Iowa State's 270. Runnerup and 1979 NCAA king Nebraska had 269, followed by host Illinois-Chicago Circle with 257 and Houston Baptist scored 256.

Brian Meeker led all Gopher performers, finishing eighth in the all-around with 103.95 points. Reid Goldetsky was 13th with 101.60 and Dan Price was 15th with 99.50.

"We did well," said UM coach Fred Roethlisberger. "I am very pleased. We were competing with Nebraska and Iowa State, both national championship teams. One of those two will win it and one will be second."

Roethlisberger noted that his team must "learn skills in performing that will take lots of time, but we have room for." He also said that now he is concerned with the teams in the Mideast region, most notably Chicago Circle, Iowa State and Northern Illinois. The Gophers did receive some comfort in that they beat all Big Ten entries (perennial pain in the neck Ohio State was not entered), though.

## ICERS HOST WISCONSIN

Wisconsin plays hockey at Minnesota Friday and Saturday. Both games start at 7:30 p.m. CST. The teams are tied for second in the WCHA at 5-3-0. SRO is anticipated both nights at Williams Arena. 'Nuff said!!!

Maybe when this series is over, part of the log jam will be broken. It used to be in the great upper midwest that when anyone mentioned a log jam, people went down to the river to watch the dynamite explosion.

Now when an explosion occurs, fans know it has to do with breaking a jam in the WCHA standings. There should be more than one explosion at Williams Friday and Saturday. Minnesota and Wisconsin do not have teams loaded with candidates for the Ice Follies.

Only two games separate the top seven WCHA teams. After four weekends of league play, North Dakota, as expected, is at the top with a 4-2-0 record. They moved up last weekend while taking two from St. Lawrence outside the WCHA.

Next comes Minnesota, Wisconsin and Michigan at 5-3-0, with Michigan Tech, Notre Dame and Colorado College another game back at 4-4-0.

Michigan went into last weekend atop the WCHA with a 5-1-0 mark. But the Wolverines lost both ends at Madison 8-4 and 2-0. Now the Gophers get to host the red-hot Badgers.

"I'm not at all surprised about the closeness of the standings," UM coach Brad Buetow after his Gophers split a pair at Minnesota-Duluth last weekend. Minnesota won 5-4 Friday but lost 6-3 the next night.

"I believe league standings will remain bunched all season," Buetow added. "The talent and teams are evening out. Each school has done an excellent job of recruiting and coaching. There are so many good, young players coming into the WCHA that everybody is getting better and the gaps are closing.

"This could be one of the tightest WCHA races ever. Hockey fans across the league are in for an extremely exciting season."

As for Wisconsin, Buetow said he expects the Badgers to maintain momentum and come at the Gophers fast and hard. "They have an excellent goal tender in Roy Schultz and possibly the best defensive player in Theran Welsh," the coach said. "They also have some awfully quick forwards.

"For us to stay with the Badgers this weekend we'll have to continue with the same effort given last weekend at Duluth, but capitalize more on our chances. We didn't do the latter against the Bulldogs.

"Our offensive play was excellent. It seemed we controlled play most of both games in their end. But we simply couldn't put the puck in the ocean Saturday. I'm told we hit five pipes that night. It happens.

"But their goalie, Bill Perkl, is an excellent player. He is just coming into playing form, reaching his stride.

### WRESTLERS SCORCH REBELS, SCORE WELL AT WILDCAT

It was the old proverbial "Bad Day at Black Rock." It was the day when your teenage son says that he wishes that Anita Bryant would mind her own business. It was. . . well, it was THAT kind of day for Nevada-Las Vegas when they faced Minnesota Nov. 28.

Having wrestled Utah State just earlier in the day, the Rebels ran in the Gopher steamroller and were swamped by UM 40-2. The Golden Gophers won every weight class save for Mark Miller's 11-11 draw at 177 with UNLV's Mike Lomori.

Brad Huckel (118), Gary Lefebvre (126), Dalen Wasmund (134), Jim Martinez (142), Dan Egesdahl (150), Dan Zilverberg (158), Jim Trudeau (167), George Bowman (190) and Chuck Vavrosky (HWT) all earned wins for Minnesota.

Due to a freak in scheduling, the Rebels squared-off with Utah State just fours earlier and lost two starters to injuries. Of the two JV men that faced Minnesota, well, Custer had a better day with Indian relations. Zilverberg had his foe pondering the meaning of life and a 22-2 deficit until Zilverberg pinned him at 5:23. Trudeau had Jim Kennedy down 15-1 until justice and mercy prevailed for a Trudeau-styled "for your mama" pin at 3:14.

This was the first dual meet of the season for the Gophers, while UNLV fell to 4-1.

Competing with such national mat powers at such an early point in the season can make of break (or brake?) a team and only time will tell following the Wildcat Invitational held in Tucson, Ariz., Nov. 30.

Minnesota, famous for its "through hell and high water" scheduling, came away with third place at the Wildcat, scoring 85 3/4. Oklahoma won the tourney with 119 3/4 and was followed by Arizona State with 91 3/4. Other "names" in the meet were Cal St-Bakersfield (83), Iowa State (58 1/2), Oregon (69 3/4), UCLA (54 3/4) and LSU (48).

Overall, Minnesota had one individual champion and five other placers.

However, two big mainstays of the Gophers, Huckel and Wasmund, didn't win a match between them.

"It was just a tough tournament," said UM head coach Wally Johnson.

"We had some bad draws and drew against some seeded kids."

Old Faithful Zilverberg won the title at 158. Zilverberg is 13-0 now on the year and the Big Ten champ of last year looks certain of repeating again. Martinez and Bowman took seconds while Lefebvre finished third. Vavrosky and Egesdahl both finished sixth.

HALFTIME EXTRAVAGANZA PLANNED

Saturday, when the University of Minnesota basketball team plays host to Nebraska in Williams Arena at 8 p.m., a special halftime show is on tap, and that extravaganza ranks as one of the most entertaining performances scheduled this year.

The F M Acro Team is the featured attraction, and again this year will provide a halftime of gymnastics and tumbling for the enjoyment of Minnesota basketball fans.

That group has performed at the U of M for the past four years and also has been in shows during North Dakota High School Basketball Tournaments, at other college and University events and in Kemper Arena in Kansas City with the Kansas City Kings.

This group is comprised of girls ages 5 to 16 and is coached by Jim Simle. The original team was formed in 1971 and has "captivated each audience with its youthful vitality and performing excellence" ever since.

"We're delighted to have the Acro Team coming back to Williams Arena," said U of M Athletic Director Paul Giel. "Our basketball fans really enjoy their performance, and it is a treat for all of us to have them on our campus."

After a 10-day reprieve for fall quarter exams, the University of Minnesota basketball team returns to action Saturday night to take on Nebraska at Williams Arena in a 8 p.m. non-conference assignment.

Coach Jim Dutcher's Gophers will be shooting for their fourth straight win of the 1979-80 season, but he knows that the challenge Saturday will be much tougher than what his club has faced thus far.

Minnesota whipped North Dakota 87-60 in its most recent outing after having disposed of Eastern Michigan 77-56 and Fresno State 65-49 in earlier non-loop confrontations.

"Now comes the tough part," Dutcher admitted as his club began preparing for the invading Cornhuskers. "We liked to get those three wins, and we made some improvement in each one of them. They were good for us. But now we move into the tough part of our non-conference schedule."

Dutcher was eluding to the fact that several experts have rated Minnesota's non-loop schedule as tough as anyone in the nation. And the most challenging portion of that slate looms on the horizon.

After hosting Nebraska Saturday, the Gophers hit the road to play at Tennessee next Monday (December 17) and then at Florida State a week from Thursday (December 20). It will be a demanding road trip.

Then Minnesota returns home to entertain red-hot Kansas State (December 22) before playing host to Loyola, Rutgers and Texas A & M in the sixth annual Pillsbury Classic (December 28-29) at Williams Arena.

First, however, come the Cornhuskers. "We owe Nebraska one," Dutcher told his squad last week. "They have beaten us two straight, and we have a chance to get even on Saturday. We hope to make the most of it."

No changes are anticipated in Minnesota's starting lineup, as Dutcher, for all practical purposes, will open with the same unit which has clicked off three consecutive victories.

That group will put a pair of sophomores....6-4 Darryl Mitchell and 6-2 Mark Hall ....at the guards. Gary Holmes, 6-10 sophomore, is expected to open at center while 6-5 sophomore Trent Tucker probably will team with 6-11 senior captain Kevin McHale at forward.

Dutcher cleared his bench again last week when Minnesota was downing North Dakota, and several of those reserves could see heavy duty against Nebraska Saturday. Among the top candidates are a pair of freshmen forwards, 6-7 Zebedee Howell and 6-9 Ben Coleman.

Randy Breuer, 7-2 freshman center, also has played extensively and more of the same appears likely this weekend.

McHale leads Minnesota in scoring with 66 points for a 22.0 per-game average. He's also on top in rebounding with 31. Tucker is next in line in scoring with 37 points while Holmes has 16 rebounds to rank second in that department. --UM--

Minneapolis, MN---After two weeks off for term-ending exam break, Minnesota's hockey Gophers return to the WCHA wars with a road trip to Colorado College Saturday and Sunday, December 14-15.

However, the Gophers play the Tigers probably minus two more top players sidelined with injuries. Captain and senior left wing Don Micheletti could miss up to the next six weeks of action due to a knee injury suffered in the last Gopher outing at North Dakota. Minnesota lost twice at Grand Forks 3-6, and 6-7 in overtime.

In addition, freshman defenseman Mike Meadows may also miss the series at C.C. Meadows suffered his second shoulder separation of the season (one on each side), also at Grand Forks.

"The way things are going we soon may not have enough men to fill out a travel roster," says Gopher head coach Brad Buetow. "But I guess injuries are a part of every season and you just have to play over them."

Buetow said this week that either sophomore Dave Dillon or freshman Gino Peluso could replace Meadows at the blueline for the next series. But he also said replacing Micheletti is not that simple.

"Not only are we losing his excellent play on the ice," the coach added, "but also his invaluable leadership, both on and off the ice. Donny is one of the finest leaders I have ever coached. I just hope he stays close to us during his time away from the game."

Buetow said he has scheduled several scrimmage sessions this weekend following almost a full week of voluntary practices during exams. Hopefully the right combinations will come out this weekend.

"The only line that appears solid at this time is our top unit of Aaron Broten centering Steve Ulseth and Tim Harrer," Buetow says. "We could move a center or right wing into Micheletti's left wing spot."

"Actually, we are not making changes just for the sake of changing. I was considering this aspect even before our two losses at North Dakota. We have not been receiving enough good performances both ways from our other three lines. Hopefully our scrimmages will aid our decisions this weekend."

Harrer, Broten and Ulseth are Minnesota's top scorers, and Micheletti is listed fourth with 16 points (4G, 12A). Harrer leads the pack with 27 points (15-12), Broten is next (6-14-20) and Ulseth third (10-7-17). Harrer has seven goals in his last three games, including four in the 6-7 OT loss last Saturday.

The Gophers have scheduled nighttime practices early next week to get around the exam schedule, but Buetow said he does not believe these irregular practice times will cause an adverse effect on the team's preparations. Minnesota is 7-5-0 and in fourth place in the WCHA. The Gophers defeated Colorado College 8-3 and 7-4 at home in November.

They left with more battle wounds than the USS Arizona after UM's men's gymnastics team thrashed them 260.95 - 188.45.

The Gophers made it a clean sweep in all categories of competition, earning the top three places.

Dan Price scored 9.35 to win the floor exercise. Brian Meeker and Tom Anderson tied in the pommel horse with 8.75 scores, while Pete Velguth wow-ed 'em with a 9.65 on the still rings. Meeker stole the spotlight again with a 9.6 in the vault. The vault performances were so tough that Price's 9.4 only looks good to his mother and girlfriend.

Meeker and Price dueled it out again in the parallel bars, tying for first with 8.95 scores. Meeker turned in a spectacular show in the high bar to score 9.55. This enabled him to edge Price for the all-around medal 54.7 - 53.2. Joe Wickert was third in the a-a with 51.3.

What made the affair so bad for UW-L were scores like a 3.8 in the pommel horse by Bryce Gaffney. Or a 4.3 in the same event by Steve Krueger. Or a 4.6 by Gaffney in the rings. Possibly it was the 4.95 by Krueger in the HB. Little Sisters of the Poor, meet UW-LaCrosse.

UM's gymnastics squad will be at home December 15 against the probable national champion this year, Iowa State. They take their gymnastics seriously in Ames and the Cyclones' win over defending NCAA king Nebraska in the Windy City Open makes them something more than just a team to think about. The meet will start at 1:30 in Williams Arena.

### LAFLEUR HELPS USA TO THIRD-PLACE FINISH

Former UM gymnast Tim LaFleur scored a 114.3 in the all-around competition to help the US men's gymnastics team take third place at the World Championships held in Fort Worth, TX.

With his score, LaFleur finished 36th from a field of 137 performers. To get a taste of the competition, between the placers from sixth to 36th, there was no more than a two-point difference. Normally, the top 36 individuals move on to the finals. However, only the top five US gymnasts can move on and LaFleur was sixth among US men.

The Soviet Union was first followed by Japan and then the United States.

### GOPHER TANKERS UPSET INDIANA, TAKE SECOND

Not only did the UM men's swimming team take second in the powerful Illinois Invitational last weekend, but in doing so the Gophers beat perennial Big Ten king Indiana and another group of conference flying fish, Wisconsin.

Five Gophers copped firsts. Led by Art Griffith's win in the 50-, 100- and 200-yard freestyle, Minnesota topped the Hoosiers and happily settled for second behind host Illinois in the 12-team tourney.

The 400-yard freestyle relay team of Griffith, Dave Monkman, Brian Mortenson and Pat Mahoney swam to another first for UM. Diver Brent Bordson won the 1-meter event and helped in the scoring for Minnesota.

Scott Malm swam to a strong showing in the 100- and 200-yard backstrokes and took second in both events. Monkman captured third in the 100-yard event. The Gophers received more points from Mortenson's second in the 100-yard freestyle and Craig Jurchison's second in the 400-yard individual medley.

CAGERS HOST K-STATE

Minneapolis, MN--Along every trail we follow there are rocks. Sometimes boulders.

Monday night the Minnesota basketball team ran into its first rock. Er, uh. . . make that boulder. It proved insurmountable as the Gophers dropped their first game of the year at Tennessee, 71-64. Minnesota is now 4-1.

But there are more rocks/boulders around the next corner. On Thursday (12/20), Minnesota travels to Tallahassee, FL, to meet ranked Florida State. The Gophers then follow the trail home where on Saturday night Minnesota plays host to undefeated (8-0) Kansas State in an 8:05 p.m. CST Williams Arena tipoff.

What proved Minnesota's downfall Monday at Tennessee was rebounding. The Vols whipped UM on both boards coming up with a 38-24 margin in carroms.

"No question about it, rebounding was the difference," said head coach Jim Dutcher after the game. "We just got whipped on the boards and we couldn't contain their Howard Wood who came off the bench to score 26 points.

"He (Wood) did it all for them and we fouled out trying to stop him. We tried to keep the ball away from him, but he still got it. And whenever he missed a shot (MORE)

he crashed the followup and got it back.

"Tennessee didn't have excessive turnovers and they took it to us on the boards. That's what it takes to win.

"I haven't had the chance to see the Big Ten this year, but Tennessee has the physical talent to compare with some of our teams. I'll be able to tell more about them after they play Ohio State and Indiana this week."

Minnesota cruised to a 36-32 halftime advantage, twice holding leads of eight points, behind the scoring of sophomore guard Mark Hall and senior captain Kevin McHale

Hall scored 16 of his team high 21 points in the opening 20 minutes. McHale just about split his 18 game points in each session. It marked the fifth time McHale has reached double figures this season, but his scoring average fell from 23 to 22 points a game.

The Gophers outshot Tennessee .558 to .393 from the field, but it was Tennessee's incredible free throw accuracy that kept them ahead the last 13 minutes. The Vols canned 23 of 24 attempts (.958%) from the line.

For the season, Minnesota is shooting a hot .547 percent from the field, but a not so hot .595 from the charity stripe. McHale (22 of 23) is the only Gopher showing consistency in the latter area. He is also leading the Gophers in rebounds with 51 (10.2 per game), and is second only to Hall in field goal accuracy. Hall is hitting at a .667 clip from the floor, McHale .603.

Kansas State, expected to be good before the season opened, has already proven to be better than expected. The Wildcats have run up an average of 83 points a game while battering eight straight opponents. K-State is allowing a miserly 58.8 points to each opponent.

On Monday the Cats slaughtered California-Bakersfield 106-53. They led 65-24 at halftime. Other impressive KSU wins came against Oklahoma City, 83-65, Arizona State, 63-50, and Southern Illinois, 75-69.

Leading the Wildcats is 6-6 junior guard Rolando Blackman who is scoring at a 14.3 clip. He has been their top scorer in four of the eight games. He also leads in assists with 32.

Other KSU starters, with point and rebound totals included, are: 6-7 sophomore Ed Nealy at forward (11.8, 11.0), 6-7 senior Jari Wills at center (9.2, 6.1), 6-6 sophomore Tyrone Adams at forward (10.8, 3.7), and 5-11 senior Glenn Marshall at the other guard (7.0, 1.2).

The Wildcats, under veteran coach Jack Hartman (472-194 and in his 25th year, his 10th at K-State), play a rugged zone defense with continuous pressure all over the floor.

Yes, Virginia, rocks and boulders will be on the trail Saturday at Williams Arena. And then comes the Pillsbury Classic December 28-29 at Williams with Chicago-Loyola, Rutgers and Texas A&M providing the opposition.

## ICERS HOST BROWN U.

Minneapolis, MN---Minnesota takes time off from league hockey wars the next two weeks, but no rest is involved for the beleaguered Gophers.

Heading for Williams Arena this weekend is Brown University, Minnesota's opponent Friday night (7:30 p.m. CST) and Saturday afternoon (2 p.m.). The Bruins are 2-2-2 on the season, but one victory came against Boston University, 3-2 in overtime.

That same Boston University squad, reigning power in the East the last decade, provides the next Gopher opposition coming into Williams December 26 and 27 for a pair of 7:30 p.m. games. The Terriers are 4-3-0.

On Friday, the Minnesota hockey program will celebrate "Parents Night" with the parent's and their sons being introduced just prior to the evening contest against Brown. A brief social period for the parents and players follows the game.

But what coach Brad Buetow and Co. might want mostly for Christmas is a complete rest, and overhaul.

Minnesota is on a four-game loss streak having dropped a pair at North Dakota 3-6 and 6-7 in OT at the first of December before exam break, and then losing two more last weekend at Colorado College, 3-6 and 4-6.

The latter pair dumped the Gophers into a fifth place tie in the WCHA standings at 7-7-0. UM is tied with Wisconsin (7-7-0) and Notre Dame (5-5-0).

North Dakota, idle until January from league play, remains in first place at 8-4-0 followed by Michigan (6-4-0), Colorado College (8-6-0) and Michigan Tech (5-6-1).

A pair of early C.C. leads did the Gophers in at Colorado Springs last weekend. A pair of impressive rallies then fell inches short as the Gophers saw their road record drop to 1-6-0. UM is 6-0-0 at home.

On Friday the Tigers jumped ahead 4-1 before goals by freshman Aaron Broten and senior Tim Harrer narrowed the gap to 4-3. But a goal by C.C. when both teams were skating shorthanded, and another score 18 seconds later, this one smacked into his own net by a Gopher player, gave C.C. its winning margin.

Saturday was somewhat the same. The Tigers banged into a 4-0 lead before Harrer got his second goal of the series, 17th on the season, late in the second period. Minnesota tied the score at 4-all with three quick markers in the final period by Mike Reilly, Brian Thoreson and Broten, only to see Colorado College again get the last pair to score their sweep.

And if losing four straight isn't bad enough, Buetow will be without two starters for the Brown and Boston University series. Freshman goalie Paul Butters and freshman defenseman David Jensen are in Europe skating with the U.S. National Junior Team at the World Games. Ahh, the delights of coaching.

"There is little question that Iowa State is the best there is," said Gopher head coach Fred Roethlisberger after the meet. "They not only have top performers in every event, but also excellent depth. They placed three men with nine or more points in every single event. On the road that's really hitting it.

"I'm only sorry we didn't give them a better battle. We were missing two of our key gymnasts, but it could not have made any difference in the final outcome.

"Iowa State's Ron Galimore has to be one of the best, if not THE best, individual performers in the nation. He worked the meet with a badly bruised toe, but still scored an incredible 9.8 in the vault. He is a picture to watch."

The Gophers take the rest of the holiday season off from outside competition, but return for a big meet at home January 5 to host Ohio State at Williams Arena. Minnesota owns a 2-1 dual meet mark thus far. All hands are expected to be healthy and ready to go when the Buckeyes come in.

Roethlisberger and sophomore Brian Meeker, plus two former UM greats, U. S. National Team members Jeff and Tim LaFleur, left Sunday for Taiwan and a week of exhibitions. They return home December 24. --UM--

WRESTLERS IMPRESS IN NORTHWEST

Minnesota's varsity wrestling team headed into the Pacific Northwest and came out with positive results last weekend.

Coach Wally Johnson's Gophers scored back to back dual meet victories against Washington State (47-0) and the U. of Washington (29-11) Thursday and Friday.

On Sunday, Minnesota surprised more than one team as the Gophers finished a strong third in team standings at the Washington Invitational. A rugged field of 20 teams competed with six clubs being nationally ranked.

California-Poly at SLO took the blue ribbon with 86½ points followed by Iowa State at 72 ¾ and Minnesota with 62 2/3.

Only one Gopher grappler, senior co-captain Dan Zilverberg (Hopkins), captured a first place at the meet as he waltzed through the 158-pound division. However, two more Gophers, soph Gary Lefebvre (1a-FABE) (Elk River) and freshman Steve Martinez (Osseo), grabbed runner-up spots at 126-pounds and 142-pounds, respectively. All three were undefeated in the three events, until Lefebvre and Martinez lost in the tourney finals.

This week the Gophers take on two more opponents on this road swing, going to the University of Oregon tonight (Tuesday), and Oregon State Wednesday.

Minnesota goes from Corvallis, OR, to DeKalb, IL, for the Northern Illinois Tournament Friday and Saturday, December 21-22, and then returns to Illinois for the prestigious Midlands Tournament at the University of Northwestern in Evanston, December 29-30.

Coach Johnson calls the latter tournament tougher than the NCAA finals as unattached wrestlers compete, including many who expect to be on the 1980 U. S. Olympic Team.

Zilverberg is expected to be the only seeded Gopher at the latter meet. Just a few years ago his older brother, Larry, was named the outstanding wrestler at the Midlands Tournament.

ICERS HOST IRISH

Minneapolis, MN---After a successful trip through the holiday season, Minnesota's hockey Gophers return to quick reality this weekend when Notre Dame invades Williams Arena for a two-game WCHA series Friday and Saturday. Both games start at 7:30 p.m. CST.

The Gophers swept four holiday games from eastern opponents. Included were a pair of wins against Brown University, 8-2 and 16-2, the latter score a new Minnesota goal record for one game, and followed up with two more victories against Boston University, 5-4 and 5-1. All four games were at home.

The Gophers played one more time facing a touring Russian team at Omaha, NE, on Dec. 29. Surprisingly, after giving up five second period scores to fall behind 7-2, the Gophers closed to 6-7 only to see the Russian squad score in an open net in the final minute to secure an 8-6 decision.

Minnesota left the WCHA wars in mid-December after dropping four straight to North Dakota (3-6, 6-7 OT) and Colorado College (3-6, 3-6). All four losses came on the road.

The Gophers sport a 7-7-0 WCHA record and are 11-7-0 against college opposition overall. Notre Dame is tied with both Minnesota and Wisconsin for fifth place in the league at .500, but has played four fewer games. The Irish come in with a 5-5-0 league mark.

During the non-conference portion of his schedule, coach Brad Buetow experimented with several new players taking the ice each night. To date he has dressed and played 30 different players, including three goal tenders.

Two players who were in Europe with the U.S. Junior National team, defenseman David Jensen and wing Butsy Erickson, rejoin the Gophers this weekend. However, goalie Paul Butters, who underwent an appendectomy operation in Copenhagen, is out for an undetermined period.

## GOPHERS TO OPEN BIG TEN CAGE SEASON AT MICHIGAN

With all of the "preliminaries" out of the way, Minnesota's Golden Gophers get down to their basketball wars in earnest this week, and they'll do so with a 7-2 record after completing this season's nine non-conference assignments.

For the third straight year, Coach Jim Dutcher will open the Big Ten season by taking his youthful Gophers on a trek through Michigan. They'll oppose the University of Michigan Wolverines in Ann Arbor on Thursday and the Michigan State Spartans in East Lansing on Saturday. Both games show 8:05 p.m. (EST) tip-offs.

And while Minnesota may have been fairly impressive in its two most recent outings, Dutcher knows that the tough part of the season is just starting. And he knows how tough it is to open up at Michigan.

Records show that Dutcher has never taken a Gopher team into Ann Arbor and won. That means his clubs have lost five straight there. And a Dutcher-coached U of M five has not won at East Lansing since his Mychal Thompson--Ray Williams led contingent turned the trick during the 1976-77 season.

"It isn't going to be an easy road trip," Dutcher admitted, "but I told our players after they won the Pillsbury Classic this past weekend that we owed those people in Michigan something. We're going over there with the intention of winning."

Skeptics point out, however, that winning on the road is never easy, and for recent Minnesota contingents it has seemed doubly hard. This year's Gophers, for example, suffered their only two losses of the season at Tennessee and at Florida State while their five victories have come in the comfortable confines of Williams Arena.

All of which means little to Dutcher and his hopeful cagers. "We're in good physical condition," Dutcher points out, "and we are playing much better than we did early in the season. We'll give it our best effort."

Minnesota will take a three-game winning streak on the road with them. They beat Kansas State 78-61 in their final pre-Christmas tune-up. And enroute to their sixth consecutive Pillsbury title, the Gophers downed Rutgers 98-59 and highly-touted Texas A & M 69-63.

Captain Kevin McHale, 6-11 senior forward, was named the tournament's Most Valuable Player for the third time in his career after scoring a total of 43 points and grabbing 13 rebounds.

McHale will go into the Big Ten season as the key man for Minnesota. In seven games, McHale has scored 208 points for an average of 23.1 per game. He also has 87 rebounds, and that figures out to 9.7 per assignment.

Expected to join McHale in the starting lineup at Michigan are 6-7 freshman Zebedee Howell at forward, 6-10 sophomore Gary Holmes at center, and 6-5 sophomore Trent Tucker and 6-2 sophomore Mark Hall at the guards.
