Minneapolis, MN---It only lasted two weeks. As far as the Minnesota Golden Gopher hockey team was concerned, that was long enough.

The "it" in question happened while Minnesota spent two weeks off in non-conference play. In that time UM was replaced atop the WCHA standings by the red-hot Northern Michigan Wildcats.

Last weekend, however, Minnesota roared back into the top spot by sweeping a road pair at Denver, 6-5 and 6-3. Northern, meanwhile, was out of league play and the Gophers now own a 3-point edge in the standings. UM has still played three less WCHA games than Northern.

But it doesn't get any easier. Minnesota plays three times this week: tonight (Tuesday) against Alaska-Fairbanks to close its non-conference schedule, plus home games Friday and Saturday against Maine and Lowell, respectively, of the Hockey East Association (HEA).

WAYL-980 AM and KSTP-1500 AM will broadcast both games from Mariucci Arena this weekend with KITN-TV, Ch. 29 airing the Maine contest Friday.

The series sweep at Denver last weekend provided a boost for the Gophers. After getting off to a blistering start by winning 13 of its first 16 WCHA games, Minnesota went into a slight slump recording only one win and a tie in its next five outings.

But beginning with a 5-2 win against Michigan Tech on Dec. 23, UM has now won three straight. Even more important, all three victories were anchored by freshman goalie Jeff Stolp who is in for the injured Robb Stauber.

"Jeff (Stolp) really played good in goal last three games while other players seemed to sense the need to excel, too," head coach Doug Woog says.

"That really showed up in our second game at Denver when we had three starting defensemen out of the lineup. Todd Richards hurt his knee Thursday at Denver, Randy Skarda was sitting out a disqualification, and Tom Pederson was with the U.S. National team at the World Junior Games in Alaska. Both Richards and Skarda, and hopefully Pederson, will be back in the lineup this weekend."

Stolp shows a record of four wins, two losses and a tie in starts this season. In eight appearances, his goals allowed average has dropped to 3.96 while his save percentage has risen to .879%. It is still up in the air as to when Stauber will be ready to return to action. He has been out with a severe ankle sprain since Dec. 3.

Woog added how pleased he was to see junior wing Tom Chorske back in the lineup at Denver after being out of action with a shoulder injury since Nov. 18. "He (Chorske) was a factor in both games, but I've seen him play better, too," Woog said Monday.

Chorske scored a goal in each game at Denver, including the game winner breaking a 5-5 tie Thursday. He continues to lead his teammates in goals scored with 14 in just 13 games.

Freshman Cory Laylin was UM's leading scorer at Denver. Laylin got a goal and an assist Thursday before hitting a pair of scores Friday including the eventual game winner of the 6-3 decision.

Another freshman, Larry Olimb, scored two goals Thursday while sophomore center Jason Miller got one each night.

Miller and junior wing Peter Hankinson are tied for the team lead in scoring with 20 points each, while Chorske, sophomore Grant Bischoff and Olimb have 19 points apiece.

Asked what emphasis he is placing on games this weekend against Maine and Lowell, Woog answered, "The only way we look at any games on our schedule is that each one is worth two points. If we begin pointing towards certain opponents, there is a very good chance to lose games against others.

"Whatever happened against either of these teams last season has absolutely no bearing on games this season. Both Maine and Lowell are formidable opponents and we had better be ready for the challenge both nights."

Maine, like Minnesota, is attempting to repeat as conference champion. In winning the HEA last season, Maine defeated Minnesota in a highly emotional home game, 6-4. The Black Bears also took the third place NCAA game in Lake Placid, NY, 5-2. Woog's teams are 3-2 vs. Maine the last three years. Overall, Minnesota owns a 5-2 record vs. the Black Bears.

Maine was 15-3-0 going into a key game Tuesday (tonight) against HEA leader Boston College. B.C., at the time, held a two-point lead over the Bears at the top of their league standings.

In the game at Lowell last season, Minnesota fell behind 4-0 early, but rallied to defeat the Chiefs 8-4. Overall, Minnesota owns a 3-1 record vs. Lowell with all games played the last three years under coach Woog.

The Chiefs ended Tuesday's nights game against New Hampshire at home with a 5-9-1 season record and were tied for 5th place in the HEA.

Next weekend Minnesota plays host to Northern Michigan, and then travels East the following week for its final games against HEA teams. Minnesota plays at Boston College, Boston University and New Hampshire Jan. 20-23. All remaining games are against WCHA schools.

SWIM TEAM RETURNS TO ACTION IN GOLD COUNTRY INVITATIONAL

After several weeks off from competition, the Golden Gopher men's swim team returns to action this week in the Gold Country Invitational. The Invitational, a co-ed meet, will be held at the Cooke Hall pool on Friday evening and Saturday afternoon, January 6 and 7. The Gophers, ranked 15th in the country, recently spent some time in the warmer climes of Boca Raton, Florida, on a training trip. In addition to being able to enjoy the warm weather, the trip gave the Gophers a chance to concentrate on swimming and get some excellent workouts in before the holidays. This weekend the Gophers will again be led by All-American Dan Egeland (Sr, St. Anthony, MN). Egeland, a two-time NCAA qualifier, has won all eleven races he has entered this season, and has posted top times of 1:51.51 in the 200 individual medley and 1:39.47 in the 200 freestyle. Other top performers for the Gophers include junior Bill Asmus (Lakeville, MN-free, back) and senior Mark Gabos (Glendale, WI-one and three-meter diving).

TWO CAGERS TO TRANSFER

Two members of the 1988-89 University of Minnesota basketball team have announced that they plan to transfer to Hutchinson, KS, Community College beginning the winter academic term.

Kelvin Hammonds, a freshman guard from Macon, GA, who saw action in four games early in the non-conference season, and Erik Wilson, a redshirt freshman center from Detroit, MI, who sat out last season, both have left the University of Minnesota.

According to Coach Clem Haskins, Hammonds and Wilson have indicated that they plan to return to the University of Minnesota once they have graduated from Hutchinson Community College.

ON the other side of the ledger, Rob Metcalf, a 6-6 junior guard from Wisconsin Rapids, WI, who transferred to the U of M a year ago from the University of Virginia, now has finished sitting out his one transfer season and is eligible for competition beginning Wednesday at Wisconsin.

GOPHERS FACE TWO BIG TEN GAMES THIS WEEK

Two Big Ten Conference assignments are on tap for the University of Minnesota basketball team this week, one on the road and the other at home in Williams Arena.

First the Golden Gophers make their annual trek to Michigan to take on the Wolverines at 8:05 p.m. (EST) on Thursday. Then Coach Clem Haskins will bring his charges home to entertain Iowa at 2:05 p.m. on Saturday.

The Golden Gophers came into this week's action with an overall record of 8-3 and a Big Ten log of 0-1 after splitting honors last week.

Minnesota downed Kansas State of the Big Eight Conference 72-67 at home on Saturday after earlier dropping its' Big Ten opener 75-67 at Wisconsin.

"The loss at Wisconsin was disappointing," Coach Haskins admitted after his charges blew a 14-point second-half lead. "Losing to Wisconsin is nothing to be ashamed of, but we need to show more composure. We did not run our offense well enough in the second half, and it cost us. We simply have to do a better job of protecting the ball and a lead."

Against Kansas State three nights later, Minnesota did all of those things.... especially protect its lead. The Golden Gophers were up by five at the half, and they expanded that to 13 with just over five minutes remaining in the game.

And then, when the visiting Wildcats made a move and attempted to overtake Minnesota, the Golden Gophers made several clutch free throws and protected the win.

"Yes, we made some big free throws at the end," Haskins said, "but more important we stayed together as a team for the full 40 minutes. That's what we have to do consistently now that we are into the Big Ten season."

Junior guard Melvin Newbern set the scoring pace for Minnesota at Wisconsin with a career high 27. Two other Golden Gophers, Jim Shikenjanski with 14 and Willie Burton with 10 also finished in double figures.

The balance was even better against Kansas State when five Minnesota cagers reached those double digits. Shikenjanski was high with 16 while Burton had 15, Kevin Lynch 14 and Ray Gaffney and Newbern 11 each.

But now the Golden Gophers move from the frying pan into the fire as they get into the Big Ten season in earnest and immediately take on two of the nation's top-ranked teams.

"It's a challenging way to start," Coach Haskins admitted. "After finishing the non-conference part of our season with a team that was in the NCAA's final eight last year (Kansas State) this past weekend, we now have to take on two teams that are capable of winning the national championship this year. Both Michigan and Iowa are tough teams. We have the greatest respect for both of them."

Michigan came into the week with an overall record of 13-1 and a Big Ten mark of 1-0. They were ranked seventh in the nation in last week's polls.

Iowa came into the week at 13-1 overall and 1-0 in the Big Ten. The Hawkeyes were ninth on the polls last week, and that was before they knocked off number six North Carolina 98-97 at North Carolina.

No changes are expected in Minnesota's lineup for this week's assignment, and that means that Shikenjanski again will be at center, Richard Coffey and Burton at forward and Lynch and Newbern at guard with Gaffney still playing Minnesota's "sixth man" role.

Minneapolis, MN---Last weekend saw Minnesota withstand a challenge from the Hockey East Association (HEA) by defeating Maine (6-3) and Lowell (9-2) at home. This week, however, delivers a challenge from within.

The Northern Michigan Wildcats, second only to Minnesota in the WCHA standings, invades Mariucci Arena for 7:05 p.m. CST games Friday and Saturday. KSTP-1500 AM radio will air both contests locally with WAYL-980 AM and KITN-TV, Ch. 29, joining in to broadcast Saturday's contest.

Northern (15-9-1) trails the defending champion Gophers (18-4-0) by five points, 36-31. The next closest challenger is third place Wisconsin (11-7-4) with 26 points.

In addition, Minnesota still owns three games in hand over Northern Michigan. The Wildcats have played 25 WCHA contests, Minnesota 22.

Earlier this season Northern Michigan became the first team to defeat Minnesota. After winning its first six games of the season, Minnesota traveled to Marquette, MI, only to be derailed 6-5 in overtime by NMU. The Gophers came back to win 4-2 the next night.

What headlines this series is the highest scoring WCHA team, NMU, with 188 goals and a 4.7 per game average against the stingiest defensive team in the WCHA, Minnesota. The Gophers are allowing opponents just 2.4 goals per game.

One item lies directly in Minnesota's favor this weekend. In the last three years, since Doug Woog took over as head coach of the Gopher program, Northern Michigan has yet to taste a victory at Mariucci Arena.

Woog's previous teams have taken four of four from the Wildcats on home ice. Including this year's games, Woog is 9-3-0 vs. Northern.

Forward Phil Berger, runner-up in last year's WCHA scoring race, is back on track for NMU this season. Berger has scored 31 points (13 goals, 18 assists) in 25 games this season. Actually, forward Jeff Gawlicki tops Berger in goals scored for Northern with 14. Billy Pye, with a 3.13 WCHA goals allowed, average, is expected to be in the Northern nets both nights.

Against Lowell last Saturday, the previously unheralded line of center Dean Williamson flanked by wings Ken Gernander and Brett Strot did in the Chiefs. Following a scoreless first period, Williamson, Strot and Gernander scored Minnesota's three goals in the first 5:27 of the second period. In all, the Gophers scored seven times in that period.

Williams ended the game with his highest scoring total ever, two goals and three assists, while Strot was 1-3 and Gernander chipped in two more goals.

Against Maine on Friday, junior wing Dave Snuggerud did the most damage by scoring two goals and as many assists. Minnesota trailed early, 1-0, but came back to take period leads of 2-1 and 4-2 against the Black Bears.

Freshman goalie Jeff Stolp continued his excellent play in authoring both victories last weekend. He lowered his goals allowed average to 3.14 in league play and owns a won-lost-tie record of 6-2-1 overall.

Earlier in the week, sophomore goalie Al Fritsinger won his first collegiate game as the Gophers defeated Alaska-Fairbanks 4-3. Minnesota, in its last non-conference game of the year, trailed UA-F 3-1 entering the final period, but came back on goals by Lance Pitlick, Jon Anderson and Snuggerud to win. Snuggerud's game-winner came on a breakaway with 1:23 remaining.

The 8th-ranked Gopher wrestling team was shorthanded this week at the National Wrestling Team Championships, and the result was losses to two nationally ranked teams. GOLDEN GOPHERS AT NORTHWESTERN ON SATURDAY

Another two-game week is on tap for Coach Clem Haskins and his University of Minnesota basketball team which invades Northwestern on Saturday after entertaining Purdue Wednesday.

Both are Big Ten Conference assignments and will find Minnesota attempting to improve its overall record of 9-4 and its conference mark of 1-2.

The Golden Gophers split honors in the Big Ten last week, losing at Michigan 98-83 in the mid-week shootout but then bouncing back to stun Iowa 80-78 at Williams Arena on Saturday.

Minnesota had staying with Michigan through much of the contest. In fact the Golden Gophers led at one point in the second half only to falter down the stretch.

"We are getting there," Coach Haskins said after the Michigan loss, "but it is an uphill climb. We played as hard as we can play, but we still must learn that we have to execute for a full 40 minutes."

Against Iowa, it was a similar story only with better results. Minnesota trailed the Hawkeyes by as much as 16 points in the early going but battled back and won the game on a tip-in by Jim Shikenjanski with only seconds remaining.

"It was a very big win for us," Haskins said, "and maybe the biggest win I've ever been involved in personally.....high school, college or professionally."

An elated Haskins, who had seen so many good efforts slip away over the past three seasons, figured this victory over Iowa may have been the win that would prove Minnesota was "back" in the Big Ten.

"That game proved a great deal," he said. "I feel it shows the nation that our program has turned the corner. It doesn't mean that we are ready to win the Big Ten Championship, but it does ~~mean~~ show that we can compete with anyone on our home court."

There were a lot of heroes in the Hawkeye victory.....beyond Shikenjanski who got the game-winner. Try Willie Burton who finished with 28 points and Melvin Hewbern who finished with 27. That duo combined for ALL of Minnesota's 37 points in the first half.....23 for Burton and 14 for Hewbern.

Another standout was Ray Gaffney who came off the bench and scored 18.....all in the second half.....and hit four-of-five baskets from the three point range.

Walter Bond and Bob Martin also drew praise from Coach Haskins for their individual efforts as they came off the bench for the foul plagued Richard Coffey and Kevin Lynch and performed admirably.

But the victory celebration was short as Haskins pointed out that two more toughies were on tap this week including the invasion by Purdue on Wednesday and they trek to Northwestern for a 3:05 p.m. start Saturday.

A year ago Purdue whipped Minnesota twice, winning 93-66 at Purdue and 82-74 in Williams Arena. Northwestern and Minnesota split, the Wildcats winning 65-61 at Northwestern and the Golden Gophers winning at home 82-67.

Can the Minnesota contingent improve that standing this time out of the blocks? Coach Haskins, with spirits lifted after last week's two performances, figures ~~how~~ his cagers can. And so do his Golden Gophers.

Minneapolis, MN---The University of Minnesota hockey Gophers extended their lead in seven points in the WCHA standings over second place Northern Michigan University by taking three of four points from the Wildcats at home last weekend.

After settling for a 2-2 overtime tie Friday even though Minnesota outshot NMU 54-27, the Gophers came from behind twice to edge Northern 5-4 the next night.

The Gophers are 19-14-1 in the WCHA, 21-6-2 overall, good for 39 points. Northern dropped to 15-10-2 and 32 WCHA points, just two ahead of third place Wisconsin at 13-8-4 and 30 points.

The Gophers have 11 regular season games remaining with home series against Colorado College Jan. 27-28, and Wisconsin Feb. 17-18.

With three WCHA games in hand over Northern Michigan and one over Wisconsin, Minnesota makes its final trip East this weekend. The Gophers play at Boston College Friday, Boston University Saturday, and the U. of New Hampshire Monday.

Unfortunately for Gopher fans, there will not be any electronic coverage of UM's games Saturday and Monday after WAYL-980 AM and KITN-TV, Ch. 29, broadcast Friday's contest at Boston College.

Friday's game showcases leaders of two conferences as Boston College, like UM in the WCHA, rests atop the Hockey East Association (HEA). This trip marks the final series for Minnesota against HEA teams in the interlocking league schedules that have been played the past several years.

Head coach Doug Woog has seen his first three Minnesota teams split six games against Boston College. Only one contest, a 4-3 overtime decision last season, was played in Mariucci Arena. All other games were at Boston College either in regular season or the NCAA playoffs.

Against Boston University, Woog's clubs are 4-2 with two of the wins coming on home ice. Woog's charges have fared better vs. New Hampshire winning four of four, one at home and three in Durham, NH.

Last weekend saw Minnesota withstand a solid offensive attack from Northern Michigan, plus some heady defensive play. Northern goal tender Billy Pye was fantastic both games fending off 75 of Minnesota's 82 shots on goal.

For Minnesota, freshman goalie Jeff Stolp was also equal to the task. He saw his record improve to 7-2-2 and his goals allowed average sink to 3.04 in the WCHA. Stolp faced 51 shots in the series and stopped 45.

Word is still out as to when Minnesota All-America junior goalie Robb Stauber can return to action. Out since Dec. 3 with an ankle injury, it is hoped that Stauber might return this weekend, but no official word had been received as of this date.

Cory Laylin and Grant Bischoff scored Minnesota goals Friday. Northern created the tie by scoring with 3:13 remaining in the third period.

Dean Williamson and Dave Snuggerud each scored two goals and Tom Chorske got his team-leading 17th goal in Saturday's victory. It was Williamson who counted the eventual game winner at 0:18 of the last period making the score 5-3 before Northern scored its final goal at 8:52.

For excellent defensive play in both games, junior Lance Pitlick was named one of three WCHA Players of the Week. Although he didn't score a single point in the series, Pitlick continually thwarted offensive attacks by Northern and was equally effective in rushing the puck. His solid checks also took a toll.

GOPHER WRESTLERS SPLIT ON WEEKEND; FACE IOWA NEXT SUNDAY

The Golden Gopher wrestling team, currently ranked 12th nationally, opened the Big Ten season this past weekend by splitting a pair of dual meets. On Friday night the Gophers upset 8th-ranked Wisconsin 22-12 in a home meet at the Bierman Gym. The Gophers had a slim 4-point lead going in to the heavyweight match in that contest, but an injury suffered by Wisconsin's Scott McKernan forced him to default the match to the Gophers' Jeff Balcom as the Gophers went on to win. On Saturday the Gophers traveled to Evanston, Illinois, where Northwestern topped the Gophers 22-18. Winning in both matches for the Gophers were Gordy Morgan (158 pounds, Bloomington, MN), and Dave Dean (177 pounds, Montrose, MI). The Gophers now stand at 7-3 on the season in dual meets and 1-1 in Big Ten competition. After facing two rated teams last weekend, the road gets no easier for the Gophers, who this Sunday travel to Iowa City to face perennial Big Ten champion Iowa. The Hawkeyes have been ranked as high as 4th nationally this year, and should be a good test for the Gophers. SWIMMERS EASILY DOWN ST. OLAF; TRAVEL TO SIOUX INVITATIONAL NEXT WEEKEND

The Gopher men's swimming and diving team ran their dual meet record to 5-0 with an easy 165-75 victory over St. Olaf in a non-conference dual meet Saturday at Cooke Hall pool. The Gophers, who are 2-0 in conference meets, had first-place finishes in ten of eleven individual events and two relays in the meet, with the 200 Breaststroke the only event a Gopher did not capture first place in. For the Gophers, diver Mark Gabos again captured both the one and three-meter competitions, winning by wide margins in both events. Gabos, a senior from Glendale, Wisconsin, has finished first in nine of ten diving competitions he has entered this year. Also winning two events was Bengt Zikarsky (Fr, Erlangen, West Germany), who finished first in the 50 Freestyle and the 100 Freestyle. Next up for the Gophers is a trip this weekend to Grand Forks, North Dakota, where they will compete in the Sioux Invitational, hosted by the University of North Dakota, this Friday and Saturday nights.

NETTERS OPEN UP DUAL SEASON VERSUS KENTUCKY

The Golden Gopher men's tennis team, currently ranked 25th nationally by a panel of college coaches, open up the dual match portion of their schedule this Sunday when they take on the University of Kentucky at 98th Street Racquet and Swim Club. This will mark the first dual match for the Gophers under first-year coach David Geatz, who took over for longtime coach Jerry Noyce this past year. Geatz directed the Gophers to a very successful fall season, which was highlighted by Minnesota's capturing of the team championship at the "Ice Volleys" Tennis Showcase last November. After a nearly two-month long break from competition, the Gophers are anxious to get back on the court. A starting lineup was not set early in the week, but starters will include Duke Uihlein (Sr, Lake Forest, IL), Brian Uihlein (Fr, Lake Forest, IL), Rafer Leach (Jr, Lexington, KY), Jason Hall (Jr, Prior Lake, MN), and Kevin Werwie (So, Sheboygan, WI). Junior Anthony Cruz (Medinah, IL) is still hampered by an ankle injury that slowed him during the fall season, but may be back in action. All those players will likely see action in doubles as well as singles.

TRACKSTERS OPEN UP YEAR AT NORTHWEST OPEN

The University of Minnesota men's track and field team will kick off their indoor season by hosting the Northwest Open this Saturday at the University of Minnesota Fieldhouse. The Gophers appear to have a strong squad this year, and will likely improve this season on last year's seventh-place Big Ten indoor meet finish. Bjorkli (Sr, Hommelvik, Norway), finished 4th in the 3,000 meters at last year's Big Ten indoor meet, while Hoeft (Sr, Plymouth, MN) was 4th in the one mile run at that meet a year ago. Other strong performers will include throwers John Stekmeier (Sr, Mahtomedi, MN) and Dan Mensing (Sr, Blue Earth, MN), and distance runner Chris Harder (Jr, Austin, MN).

Harder and Frank Bjorkli were recently recognized for their contributions to the Gopher cross country team at their postseason awards banquet. The two were named co-recipients of the Fred Watson Award, which goes to the Most Valuable Runner on the Gopher cross country squad. Harder was also named a captain for the 1989 season.

GOLDEN GOPHERS HOME AND AWAY AGAIN THIS WEEK

It's another one of those one game at home and one game on the road patterns for the university of minnesota basketball team this week.

First the Golden Gophers are slated to entertain top-ranked Illinois at 7:05 p.m. on Thursday in Williams Arena before they journey to East Lansing, MI, to take on Michigan State at 3:05 p.m. (EST) on Saturday.

Coach Clem Haskins' charges will go into the Illinois contest with an overall record of 10-5 and a Big Ten mark of 2-3 after splitting honors against conference opponents last week.

And it was the kind of pattern that may be causing some concern. Minnesota stopped Purdue 76-66 at home but then fell at Northwestern 75-67 in a familiar win at home but lose on the road trend.

After Minnesota knocked off Iowa and Purdue in successive outings at Williams arena, Coach Haskins voiced the opinion that his club had the ability to beat almost anyone on its home floor. But now, after posting a 2-4 record on the road this season (0-3 in Big Ten play) Haskins must be wondering if his club will ever come of age on the road.

Haskins was delighted with the win over Purdue. "When you can play a below par game and still win," he said, "you have to be pleased. We trailed by 10, but we came back. We found a way to win. We still have the feeling that we can beat anyone at home."

Then, however, the Golden Gophers slipped into an old and familiar routine, and Haskins had difficulty figuring how his club could find that way to win over a first-division (the defending Big Ten champs!) team like Purdue but then falter against the cellar-dwelling Wildcats.

"We have to learn that we must be ready to play every game," Haskins told his club. "We have to learn that we must be ready physically, mentally and emotionally." That was not the case at Northwestern where the Wildcats jumped off to a 10-point lead and then held off a closing UM rally.

"We just could not get our offense going," Haskins analyzed. "As a result we wind up with a tough loss after getting two good wins in a row. We must learn how to handle prosperity."

Last week's duels were games of contrast. In the home win over Purdue, Minnesota committed only 15 turnovers and shot 54 percent from the field in the second half. At Northwestern, the Golden Gophers also had 15 turnovers....but a bunch came at critical times when they were trying to make a comeback in the second half. And, while Minnesota finished with a below-average 40 percent shooting average, it was only 33 percent (10 of 30) in the first half.

"Obviously didn't shoot well," Haskins admitted. "Maybe our shot selection was not as good as it should have been, but we simply have to execute better."

But now Illinois(17-0) invades Williams Arena. Will the feeling that Minnesota can beat anyone....including the Nation's number one team....at home still hold true? The Gophers hope to be ready.

CHRISTIANSSEN TO RETIRE AT U OF M

Holger Christiansen, associate athletic director at the university of Minnesota, announced this week that he plans to retire from that post effective September 30, 1989.

Christiansen has been a part of the scene at the U of M since 1963. He served as the associate director of the Men's Athletic Department since February of 1985, and he was the Interim Athletic Director from July until December of 1988.

"It has been my privilege to have been associated with the University of Minnesota, one of the great universities in the country," Christiansen said, "for nearly 26 years. I have had the opportunity to be a part of one of the most dramatic periods in this institutions's history. Through it all, the highs and the lows, the joy and the despair, I would not have wished to be anywhere else. But now there are other things I want to do. It has been a pleasure to work with so many fine people through the years. Leaving those who are still here will be the most difficult part of retiring."

Rick Bay, newly appointed director of the Men's Department of Athletics, has indicated that he would begin his search immediately for Christiansen's successor.

"I wish Holger well in his retirement when that time comes," Bay said, "but for now he is providing the same loyal service and cohesiveness for the department that he has for so many years. I am especially grateful to him for helping me through this important transition period. He has provided me with a perspective and a wealth of knowledge which I could not have obtained anywhere else. I am grateful for his service to the department and know it will be a very difficult challenge to replace him."

Christiansen gained his B.A. degree in business administration from Luther College in Decorah, IA, in 1950. He received his M.A. degree from the University of Minnesota in 1963.

Prior to becoming associate athletic director, Christiansen had served as Athletic Facilities Coordinator for more than 21 years. In that assignment, he was responsible for the administration and operation of the University golf course, ice rink, tennis courts and scheduling all athletic facilities for physical education classes, intercollegiate practices and events and for recreational use.

As associate athletic director, Christiansen has been responsible for the day-to-day operation of the men's department including annual budgets, travel plans for all teams, scheduling and contractual obligations.

He also has been involved in the development of the department's policy on academic counseling and has served as Minnesota's representative at Big Ten Conference, Western Collegiate Hockey Association and National Collegiate Athletic Association meetings.

GOPHER NETTERS UPSET 6TH-RANKED KENTUCKY (1-0 Overall)

The 25th-ranked Gopher men's tennis team opened their 1989 season in impressive style with a 5-2 victory over 6th-ranked Kentucky on Sunday at the 98th St. Racquet Club in Bloomington.

After taking four of the six singles matches, sophomore Kevin Werwie (Sheboygan, WI) and senior Dave Massart (Milwaukee, WI) put the match on ice with a 6-1, 6-3 victory over Kentucky's Andy Potter and Scott Hulse at the third doubles slot. In singles play, senior Duke Uihlein (Lake Forest, IL) topped Mario Rincon, ranked #69 in the country, 5-7, 7-6, 6-1 at the No. 1 position, junior Rafer Leach (Lexington, KY) scored a 6-4, 6-3 victory over John Yancey at second singles, junior Jason Hall (Prior Lake, MN) won at the fifth singles slot, 6-2, 6-2 over Ian Skidmore, and then senior Mathias Olsson (Tumba, Sweden) recorded a 6-2, 6-3 win against Sammy Stinnett at sixth singles.

"Everybody played great," said head coach David Geatz, who took over the reins of the program from Jerry Noyce this season, and directed the Gophers to the team crown at the Ice Volleys Tennis Showcase last November. "That's a great win for us. I'm as happy as can be."

The Spartan Invitational in East Lansing, MI is up next for Geatz's Gophers. The tournament will run Saturday-Monday on the campus of Michigan State University.

SWIMMING & DIVING TEAM BREEZES TO TEAM TITLE AT SIOUX INVITATIONAL (5-0 Overall/2-0 Big Ten)

With senior Dan Egeland (St. Anthony, MN) leading the way, the Gopher men's swimming and diving team captured the team crown at the Sioux Invitational held on Friday and Saturday in Grand Forks, ND.

Recently honored as the Big Ten Conference Athlete-of-the-Month, Egeland won the 100 (56.76) and 200 (2:07.16) breaststroke events, the 500 freestyle (4:35.61), the 200 individual medley (1:52.39), and also as a member of the Gophers winning 400 (3:05.87) and 800 freestyle (6:55.33) relay units.

Junior Andrew Lorys (Portland, OR) also turned in a fine meet for the Gophers, joining Egeland on the victorious 800 freestyle relay unit, and then also touching first in the 200 backstroke (1:56.34), 400 individual medley (4:09.64) and the 1650 freestyle (15:59.00).

The Gophers, who won all but three of the events in the competition, tallied 1559.5 points in the meet to easily outdistance the University of Manitoba (1226), North Dakota (1116.5), St. Cloud State (709), North Dakota State (368) and South Dakota State (203) in the final team standings.

A Big Ten showdown with Michigan State and Northwestern awaits head coach Dennis Dale's Gophers this Saturday in Evanston, IL.

GYMNASTICS TEAM FINISHES SECOND AT WINDY CITY INVITATIONAL

The Golden Gopher men's gymnastics team finished second in a strong 11-team field at the Windy City Invitational held on Friday and Saturday at the University of Illinois-Chicago.

The Gophers scored 270.20 points to narrowly trail Ohio State (271.20) in the chase for the team title. Illinois (268.95), Iowa (265.60) and Northern Illinois (261.15) rounded out the top five teams.

Junior Mike Miller (Aloha, OR) paced the Gophers in the competition with a runner-up finished in the all-around behind Iowa's Jeff Dow. Miller recorded score of 108.35, while Dow raced up 109.20 points. Sophomore Jay Caputo (Longwood, FL) with 106.70, sophomore Mike Farina (Mundelein, IL) with 105.50 and junior Mark McKiernan (Darien, CT) with 105.45 finished fifth, seventh and eight respectively in the final all-around standings.

In the individual apparatus events, McKiernan tied Illinois-Chicago's Mike Costa for top honors on the pommel horse with identical scores of 9.50. Farina finished sixth in

After falling behind 17-2 midway through the match, the 12th-ranked Gophers wrestling team rallied back into contention, but dropped a heartbreaking 22-17 decision to 5th-ranked Iowa before 4,130 fans in Iowa City.

After freshman Ben Morris (Wooddale, IL) battled to a 9-9 draw with Iowa's Steve Martin at 118 to open the meet, the Hawkeyes proceeded to reel off four straight victories en route to the 15-point bulge through five matches. Junior Gordy Morgan (Bloomington, MN) changed the momentum with a 7-2 victory over Mark Reiland at 158, and then brother Marty Morgan (Bloomington, MN), a sophomore, kept it going with a pin (4:25) of Mike Hruska at 167. Senior Dave Dean (Montrose, MI) then drew with Don Finsh 6-6 at 177, before freshman Chris Short (Inver Grove Heights, MN) set the stage for a dramatic finish with a 14-6 win over Brooks Simpson at 190. In a classic ending, Andy Haman secured Iowa's 14th straight victory over the Gophers with a 2-1 victory over freshman Jeff Thue (Regina, Saskatchewan, Canada) in the heavyweight division.

The Gophers will host Mankato State at 7:30 p.m. on Tuesday, before competing in the Big Ten Dual Meet Tournament in Indianapolis, IN on Friday and Saturday. With six teams in the Big Ten ranked in the Top 20 (No. 4 Michigan, No. 5 Iowa, No. 7 Wisconsin, No. 12 Minnesota, No. 15 Ohio State, No. 17 Northwestern), the competition promises to be interesting indeed.

The Gophers men's track and field squad captured four events as the host of Saturday's Northwest Open competition at the U of M Fieldhouse.

Freshman Michael Beebe (Glen Ellyn, IL), and juniors Matt Ferry (Maple Grove, MN) and Jeff Svedahl (Cloquet, MN) joined Scarince on the winning relay unit.

Junior Rich Benoy (Ukiah, CA) collected top honors in the 55 meter hurdles with a winning time of 7.4, while senior Jim Scott (Bloomington, MN) and freshman Sean Fitzgerald (Brookfield, Ontario, Canada) went one-two in the 800 meter run with clockings of 1:54.4 and 1:55.2 respectively. The Gophers closed out the meet in grand fashion by winning the 4 x 400 meter relay. Freshman Tyrone Oliver (Buffalo Grove, IL), senior John Briese (Cottage Grove, MN), sophomore Chris York (Dubuque, IA) and freshman Armand LeCrone (Downers Grove, IL) won the event with a time of 3:25.2.

Minneapolis, MN---As regular season play enters its final stages, the first place U. of Minnesota hockey Gophers are, at this time, only concerned with a single digit. . ."3".

With just eight league games remaining, any combination of Gopher wins or second place Northern Michigan losses adding up to three delivers a second straight Western Collegiate Hockey Association (WCHA) championship to head coach Doug Woog and his players.

Minnesota extended its WCHA standings margin over Northern Michigan to 10 points, 42-32, by going 1-1-1 on its final trip against Hockey East Association (HEA) teams last weekend. The Gophers, 20-5-2 in the WCHA (22-7-3 overall) over Northern's 15-10-2 league mark, battled Boston College to a thrilling 4-4 overtime tie last Friday. Many in attendance called that game a true college hockey classic.

The next night, however, saw Minnesota come up empty on the scoreboard for the first time in 80 games as Boston University and its goalie, Peter Fish, whitewashed UM 1-0. Unlike Friday when the Gophers blasted 50 shots on B.C. goalie David Littman, they only managed to direct 17 shots towards Fish.

The second and third points out of a possible six earned on the eastern swing came Monday night when Minnesota charged past New Hampshire, 3-1, at Durham. Dave Snuggerud put the lid on the latter game by scoring into an empty net from mid ice with 15 seconds remaining to play.

But the best news of all last weekend was the return to duty of junior goal tender Robb Stauber. Out since Dec. 3 when he suffered an ankle injury, Stauber played the second and third games of the eastern swing. He allowed just two goals while making 45 saves in the two outings.

Stauber appeared to have lost none of the sharpness that brought Minnesota 13 wins in its first 16 games this season prior to his injury. He also lowered his WCHA-leading goals allowed average to 2.06 with a save percentage of .926.

But now the Gophers must contend with the surging Colorado College Tigers at home this weekend. Games Friday and Saturday boast 7:05 p.m. starting times with WAYL-980 AM, KSTP-1500 AM and KITN-TV, Ch. 29, carrying Friday's game only.

The Tigers, after a relatively slow start, are coming on fast having lost just once in their last six outings (4-1-1). C.C. is now just two points out of seventh place in the WCHA standings.

It will be a homecoming of sorts for first-year Colorado College coach Brad Buetow. Buetow, a Mounds View High School product, was an outstanding student/athlete at Minnesota in the early 1970s. He went on to become assistant to head coach Herb Brooks with the UM hockey program, and then replaced Brooks as head coach from 1979-80 through 1984-85.

Buetow compiled a 171-75-8 coaching record here which included WCHA championships in 1981 and 1983. He had spent three seasons as head coach at U.S. International University in San Diego, CA, prior to his joining the C.C. staff.

Snuggerud and Peter Hankinson led the Gopher attack last weekend with three points apiece. Snuggerud scored two goals and one assist while Hankinson was 1-2. Together they lead the Minnesota scoring parade with 28 points apiece. Snuggerud is 15-13 and Hankinson 11-17 in goals and assists.

Tom Chorske continues to lead Minnesota in goals scored with 17 while Hankinson and center Jason Miller own the most assists, 17 each.

Minnesota is tied for second in goals scored among WCHA teams. Both the Gophers and Denver have hit for 112 scores behind Northern Michigan's 124. The Gophers, however, own the stingiest defensive yield giving up just 66 goals in 27 games for a 2.4 average. Next best is Wisconsin at 83 goals (3.1).

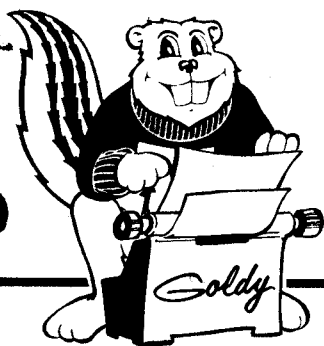

FIRST HALF OF BIG TEN SEASON AT AN END

Minnesota will wind up the first half of the 1988-89 Big Ten Conference basketball season this week with another one-at-home and one-on-the road kind of schedule.

Coach Clem Haskins' up-and-down Golden Gophers are slated to entertain the Ohio State University Buckeyes in a Big Ten television game of the week extravaganza at 7:05 p.m. on Wednesday in Williams Arena.

Then on Saturday, Minnesota reach the halfway point of the current conference schedule when invading Bloomington, IN, to take on the Indiana University Hoosiers at 3:30 p.m.(EST).

The Golden Gophers will take an overall season record of 11-6 and a Big Ten mark of 3-4 into Wednesday night's confrontation with the Buckeyes, and when they do, they hope to keep their unblemished conference home floor record intact.

Thus far this season at Williams Arena (former players fondly referred to it as "The Barn" while this year's band of cagers have tabbed it "Our House") Minnesota has knocked off Iowa Purdue and Illinois in loop contests. That most-recent win over the Fighting Illini last week was the most significant because the invaders were ranked number one in the nation at the time, and the Golden Gophers prevailed by a 69-62 margin.

Minnesota, has in fact, won nine straight at home this season after losing the 1988-89 opener in overtime to Ball State. And it is a string Haskins would like to see his club keep alive against OSU Wednesday.

The road, however, has been another matter, and Minnesota's lofty penthouse feeling of last week did not last long as they fell at Michigan State 73-64 on Saturday. It was the fourth straight Big Ten loss away from home for the Golden Gophers.

That unbeaten home mark (against conference foes) and the winless road record may indicate that Minnesota still lacks maturity.....or at least the kind of consistency that it takes to be a Big Ten title contender.

"We still have to prove that we can play well in back-to-back situations," Coach Haskins analyzed after that recent loss at Michigan State. "To be a true contender, we have to prove that we can play with consistency."

So.....Minnesota will take on Ohio State at home Wednesday in an atmosphere where the Golden Gophers feel they can play with anyone. But then on Saturday they must invade Indiana where they will be attempting to prove to the nation that they can win on the road while getting the monkey off their back and breaking that away-from-home losing streak..

How have Minnesota and Ohio State fared in the past? Over the years there have been a total of 99 confrontations, and the Buckeyes will bring an edge of 61-38 in the series into Wednesday's game.

A year ago Ohio State swept both games. The Buckeyes won 77-74 down in Columbus, and they turned the trick 85-76 in Williams Arena. Ohio State has, in fact, posted five straight wins over the Golden Gophers. Minnesota's most-recent win in the series was by a 70-65 margin mid-way through the 1985-86 season. It is a game Williams Arena fans will long remember since it was the first start for the "Iron Five" following the "Madison Incident" and the forfeit to Northwestern.

And with Saturday's opponent, the Indiana Hoosiers? Minnesota and IU have met 118 times over the years, and the Hoosiers will take a comfortable edge of 73-45 into Saturday's confrontation.

Indiana swept both games a year ago. The Hoosiers won 91-85 in Minneapolis and 92-63 in Bloomington. Indiana actually has a string of 13 victories over the Golden Gophers. Minnesota's last win in the series was by a 69-62 margin at Indiana during the 1981-82 campaign.....the last year that Minnesota won a Big Ten championship.

Coach Haskins altered his starting lineup for both games last week, and he's expected to stick with that same new unit against Ohio State. That means Richard Coffie, Willie Burton and Walter Bond will start up front while Kevin Lynch and Melvin Newbern will get the nod in the back court.

That's all wins the the U. of Minnesota hockey Gophers need to clinch at least a tie for a second straight WCHA championship and gain the number one seed for the league playoffs. T

wo wins in its last six games would give Minnesota the title outright.

Minnesota put itself in this position by winning twice at home from Colorado College last weekend. The Gophers took Friday's opener 7-1 and came back to win the next night 6-3.

That gives UM a season record of 24-7-3 and a WCHA log of 22-5-2, the latter good for 46 points. Minnesota's closest challenger, Northern Michigan, also won twice at home and is now 17-10-2 for 36 WCHA points. Only 12 possible points remain for both schools.

But capturing any point total at all will be a major test this weekend. Minnesota travels to Michigan Tech to be the focal point of Tech's annual Winter Carnival celebration. During Winter Carnival, MTU seldom loses a hockey game.

Friday's 6:30 p.m. CST game will be carried in the Twin Cities by WAYL-980 AM radio. There will not be any electronic coverage of Saturday's 12:30 p.m. CST contest.

Junior All-American and Hobey Baker Award winner Robb Stauber again backstopped the Gophers. Not only did he make 47 saves on 51 Colorado College shots, but Stauber also picked up three assists on Gopher goals, two in Saturday's game. He now has four assists for the season.

His goals allowed average, best in the WCHA, now stands at 2.05 with a save percentage of .925 thrown in. Stauber's record is 16-4-0 on the season, and his next victory will tie him with former teammate John Blue (1985-87) for most career victories at Minnesota, 64.

Dave Snuggerud and Grant Bischoff headed up the Gopher scoring in Friday's victory as each hit for two goals. Bischoff scored twice on the power play and had the game winner while Snuggerud had one man-advantage score.

Center Jason Miller added three assists Friday as the Gophers jumped to a 3-1 first period lead and were never threatened.

Saturday's game, after a scoreless first period, saw an explosion of goals early in the second period. Bischoff and Ken Gernander scored on breakaways just 14 seconds apart to give UM an early lead. But only 11 seconds after Gernander's score, Matt Shaw potted a breakaway goal for Colorado College.

Moments later C.C.'s Tim Budy swiped the spuck off Stauber's stick behind the UM net and came around to score into an empty cage and tie the game 2-2.

Freshman wing Cory Laylin broke the tie for Minnesota at 18:19 and UM was ahead to stay. Brett Strot, Peter Hankinson and Laylin added Gopher goals in the final period.

By gaining three points on the weekend, Snuggerud surged back into the Gopher scoring lead. The 1988 U.S. Olympian, in 31 games played, has 17 goals and 14 assists to lead his teammates with 31 points.

Bunched close behind, however, are Tom Chorske, Peter Hankinson and Miller with 30 points apiece.

Coach Doug Woog's next league victory will be his 100th in the WCHA. Now in his 4th year at the UM helm, Woog's overall record reads 127-44-4, while his WCHA record stands at 99-31-3.

WRESTLERS FINISH FIFTH AT GREAT AMERICAN CLASSIC; WHITWASH MANKATO STATE EARLIER IN THE WEEK: FACE A PAIR OF BIG TEN ROAD TESTS THIS WEEKEND (10-6 Overall/3-4 Big Ten)

Tabbed the Great American Classic, the Big Ten dual meet wrestling tournament was everything it was built up to be...and more. With seven teams appearing in the most recent NWCA national poll, the 10th-ranked Gophers knew going in that they would have their hands full last weekend in Indianapolis, IN. After opening the tournament with a 21-13 victory over Northwestern on Friday evening, the Gophers fell 26-13 to Iowa and 20-18 to Wisconsin, before bouncing back with a 35-6 win over Indiana on Saturday to end up in fifth-place in the tournament.

The third-seeded Gophers gained a measure of revenge with their opening round victory over sixth-seeded Northwestern, ranked 13th in the latest national poll. The Wildcats had scored a 22-18 victory over the Gophers back on Jan. 14 in Evanston, IL. Freshman Shannon Ward (Irving, TX) at 126, senior Jim Caughey (Brainerd, MN) at 142, junior Gordy Morgan (Bloomington, MN) at 158, sophomore Marty Morgan (Bloomington, MN) at 167, senior Dave Dean (Montrose, MI) at 177, and junior Jeff Balcolm (Fairmont, MN) at HWT recorded victories to propel the Gophers to the win.

After narrowly missing a huge upset over Iowa (22-17) in Iowa City a week earlier, the stage was set for a semifinal match with the Hawkeyes on Saturday. Ranked fifth in the latest national poll and seeded second in the tournament, the Hawkeyes came away with a 26-13 victory over Head Coach J. Robinson's Gophers. Marty Morgan with a pin at 167 and Dave Dean with a 7-2 victory at 177 provided the highlights for the Gophers in the match. Caughey at 142 and Gordy Morgan at 158 drew in their matches.

Fourth-seeded Wisconsin, ranked sixth nationally, was next and the Gophers dropped a tough 20-18 decision to the Badgers. After digging an early hole, the Gophers bounced back strong in the upper weights. Gordy Morgan won at 158, Dean recorded a technical fall at 177, and Thue won by decision at heavyweight. In the big victory over fifth-seeded Indiana, ranked 18th nationally, the Gophers won eight of the ten weight classes and drew in another. Freshman Ben Morris (Wooddale, IL) at 118, Ward at 126, senior Jim Hamel (Vesper, WI) at 134 by injury default, Caughey at 142, Gordy Morgan at 158, Marty Morgan by pin at 167, Dean at 177, freshman Chris Short (Inver Grove Heights, MN) at 190, and freshman Jeff Thue (Regina, Saskatchewan, Canada) at HWT were victorious for the Gophers in the match.

In their final tuneup before the Great American Classic, the Gophers breezed to a 49-0 victory over Mankato State on Tuesday in Williams Arena. Freshman Scott Rohrer (Waupun, WI) at 126, Marty Morgan at 177, and Dave Dean at 190 recorded pins in the contest for the Gophers.

Big Weekend: Things certainly won't get any easier for Robinson's Gophers as they travel to Ann Arbor, MI, for a Friday evening Big Ten matchup with 4th-ranked Michigan, and then on Saturday journey to East Lansing, MI to take on the Michigan State Spartans, and non-conference foe Ferris State.

BJORKLI'S PACE GOPHERS TO TEAM TITLE AT REEBOK-GBS SPORTS INVITATIONAL; HOST IOWA THIS SATURDAY

The Bjorkli brothers paced the Gophers track & field squad to the team title at last Saturday's Reebok-GBS Sports Invitational in the U of M Fieldhouse. The Gophers tallied 52 points to top Drake (48), Stanford (33) and the University of Manitoba in the final team standings.

Senior Roger Bjorkli (Hommelvik, Norway) captured the 5000 meter run with a clocking of 15:02.09, and then brother Frank Bjorkli (Hommelvik) kept up his end of the family bargain with a convincing victory in the 3000 meter run. His time of 8:21.09 set a new meet record. Recognized as one of the area's outstanding early-season meets, a total of 11 meet records fell by the wayside on Saturday.

The Gophers swimming and diving team upped their dual meet record to a sparkling 7-0 and 4-0 in the Big Ten, with a pair of victories in double-dual action at Evanston, IL on Saturday.

With Bengt Zikarsky (Erlangen, West Germany) and senior Mark Gabos (Glendale, WI) leading the way, the 17th-ranked Gophers easily defeated Northwestern (94-17) and Michigan State (81-32). The twosome each captured a pair of individual events on the day, with Zikarsky winning the 50 (20.60) and 100 (44.63) freestyles, and Gabos once again winning both the one (527.00) and three (589.75) meter diving events. Junior Brett Outcalt (Plymouth, MN) in the 200 freestyle (1:41.64), senior Dan Egeland (St. Anthony, MN) in the 200 individual medley (1:52.51), Sean Quackenbush (Rochester, MN) in the 200 butterfly (1:49.81) and Scott Tripps (Seattle, WA) in the 200 backstroke (1:52.74) also won individual events overall for the Gophers.

This Weekend: Head Coach Dennis Dale's Gophers will travel to Madison, WI to take on the host Wisconsin Badgers, Purdue and Illinois in a trio of Big Ten dual meets. Purdue finished fourth, Wisconsin fifth, the Gophers seventh and Illinois ninth in the 1988 Big Ten Championships, so this weekend is an important one for the Gophers with the conference meet down the road (March 2-4, Indianapolis, IN). Still buzzing from their 5-2 victory over 6th-ranked Kentucky in the dual meet season opener at the 98th St. Racquet Club on Jan. 22, the Gopher tennis team took part in the Spartan Invitational in East Lansing, MI, on Saturday and Sunday. 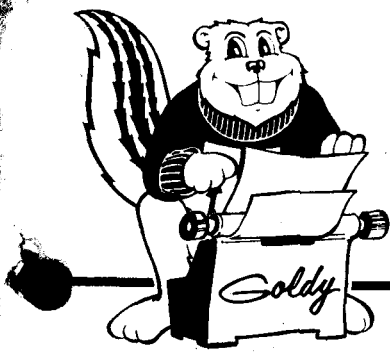

BARRON TO RETIRE AS WILLIAMS FUND DIRECTOR

Tom Barron, Director of the Williams Fund in the University of Minnesota's Men's Athletic Department for the past 13 years, announced this week that he was retiring from that position effective May 1, 1989.

Barron joined the U of M staff in the fall of 1976, and as the Williams Fund director has overseen a program that has raised more than \$15,000,000 for the athletic department through golf and tennis tournaments, special events and activities as well as direct contributions and future commitments.

"Leaving the University is something I truly regret," Barron said. "I have enjoyed my work and my close associations with our staff and Williams Fund donors very much. However, my orthopaedic problems have left me with a physical condition that does not permit me to continue my work. On the directive of my physicians, it is necessary for me to step down. I will certainly do everything I possibly can to help Rick Bay during this transition period as well as in the future in his attempt to have the finest total academic-athletic program in the country."

Born in Duluth, the 66-year old Barron grew up in Cloquet and was graduated from Murray High School in St. Paul in 1940. Following four years of service in the U.S. Navy during WWII, Barron enrolled in the American Institute of the Air and was graduated in 1947.

Prior to joining the staff at the University of Minnesota, Barron acquired more than 30 years of experience and expertise in sales, marketing and management in the business world. For 22 years, he served as sales representative, sales manager of Ed Phillips & Sons Co.

Among the milestones achieved during Barron's tenure at Minnesota, for which he is most pleased, are: one of the founders of the Williams Fund Golf Outings more than 20 years ago; developed a golf/tennis program that generated an average of 20 outings each of the past 15 years throughout Minnesota and as far West as Arizona; additional fund raising events such as the fishing contests, trap shoots, Minnesota State Fair promotions and silent auctions; inauguration of the Joseph Durda Computer learning center developed through the generous contribution of \$1,000,000 from Durda.

Bay, Minnesota's recently-appointed Director of Athletics, wished Barron well on his retirement. "I am very grateful for all that he has contributed to University of Minnesota athletics," Bay said. "He has been especially helpful to me in my first two months on the job by making certain that I am introduced to our major contributors. I also am pleased that Tom apparently will be remaining in the Twin Cities and will be available to continue to serve the department....at least on an informal basis. He has a big heart and has done a great job for Minnesota."

CAGERS TO OPEN 2ND HALF OF BIG TEN SEASON

When the University of Minnesota tips off the second half of this year's Big Ten Conference basketball season this week, it will be done in an unfamiliar fashion.

The Golden Gophers, who have been following a one-game-at-home and one-game-on the road pattern in recent weeks, now find themselves in the enviable position of playing two straight at home in the span of four days.

First Minnesota will host Wisconsin at 7:05 p.m. on Wednesday. Then the Golden Gophers will entertain Michigan at 12:05 p.m. on Saturday. Both of those Williams Arena encounters have been tabbed as Big Ten TV Game of the Week affairs.

Coach Clem Haskins hopes that the double dip in the friendly confines of Williams Arena will, indeed, be friendly and provide his club with the opportunity to add two more numbers in the cherished win column.

He knows the task will be difficult. He knows that Michigan will enter "The Barn" with a club boasting more talent than any other team in the league. And the Golden Gophers remember getting spanked by 15 at Michigan earlier this year.

They also know that Wisconsin tipped Minnesota 75-67 at Madison in the Big Ten opener after it had led by as many as 15 points in the second half. That is hard to forget.

And, while both are strong opponents, Coach Haskins isn't spending much time looking ahead to the Wolves. Instead he's concentrating (for now, at least) on the Badgers. "The Wisconsin game is critical for us," Haskins says. "They really have me concerned."

That concern may have begun to develop last weekend when Minnesota had a 14-point bulge over the Hoosiers at Indiana only to wind up falling 66-62. It was another case of the Golden Gophers not being able to protect a lead. Shades of the loop opener at Wisconsin.

That setback at Indiana also was Minnesota's fifth straight loss on the road in Big Ten play for the Golden Gophers and dropped their conference mark to 4-5. Overall they are 12-7.

In direct contrast, Minnesota polished off Ohio State 76-73 at home last week and in the process protected that unblemished Big Ten home record. The Golden Gophers now are 10-1 at Williams Arena this season have won 10 straight at the "friendly" site.

That should make Minnesota fans happy that both games are at home this week, and it could give the Golden Gophers a chance to "get even" or "pay back" a couple of loop foes for earlier losses.

Haskins isn't sure about his starting lineup for Wisconsin or Michigan. He opened with Jim Shikenjanski at center against Indiana, but a week earlier he had opened with Richard Coffey, Willie Burton and Walter Bond across the front.

Melvin Newbern and Kevin Lynch have been the starters in the back court, but Ray Gaffney has been logging a great deal of playing time off the bench. It would seem that any combination of those players could get the nod against Wisconsin on Wednesday.

Bob Martin, the 7-0 freshman center who has been playing in a back up role for Minnesota, suffered a sprained ankle in practice late last week and did not make the trip to Indiana. His status for Wisconsin remains a question.

Historically, Minnesota and Wisconsin have met 149 times over the years, and the Golden Gophers will take an 81-68 edge in the series into Wednesday evening's contest.

Michigan and Minnesota have squared off a total of 106 times in the past, and the Wolverines will bring an edge of 58-48 in the series into Williams Arena on Saturday.

The Badgers have won two straight over the Golden Gophers.....the second meeting last year and the first encounter this year. Michigan boasts six straight wins over Minnesota in the series.

Minneapolis, MN---The sweetest phrase of all has come into being for the U. of Minnesota hockey Gophers. . . "Back To Back."

For the first time since the Western Collegiate Hockey Association (WCHA) was formed in 1959-60, Minnesota has won consecutive championships. The Gophers, with four league contests remaining, clinched the title by scoring a surprising sweep last weekend at Michigan Tech's annual Winter Carnival series.

Minnesota, possibly playing its strongest six periods of hockey this season, won by scores of 7-3 and 6-3. Second period goal outbursts in each game provided Minnesota with its winning margins. The Gophers hit for four goals in Friday's second period, and scored five times in the middle stanza Saturday.

Minnesota has produced an unsurpassable total of 50 WCHA points on a league record of 24-5-2 (UM is 26-7-3 overall) to retain possession of the prized MacNaughton Cup another 12 months.

The Gophers, however, hope to keep their winning ways intact heading into their final WCHA series while preparing for the playoffs. Minnesota will be home for the first round WCHA playoffs February 24-26 facing the 8th place finisher in a best two of three series at Mariucci Arena.

Before that, Minnesota faces serious challenges from teams battling for the coveted first four places in the WCHA. The Gophers travel to Grand Forks this weekend to meet fourth place North Dakota, and the following week is home for the regular season final series vs. third place Wisconsin.

WAYL-980 AM radio will cover Friday's contest at Grand Forks, while KITN-TV, Ch. 29, will telecast both 7:35 p.m. CST games back to the Twin Cities.

In reaching the 1989 WCHA championship, here are some of the things that have happened:

- won the schools' 6th WCHA championship.
- won the school's 8th league championship overall counting titles won in the old WIHL in 1952-53 and 1953-54.
- continued a string that has seen Minnesota finish first or second in the WCHA in 9 of the last 11 years. The other two years produced 3rd place finishes.
- in the last five years, UM has finished 2nd three times and 1st twice.
- Coach Doug Woog saw his players win his 100th and 101st WCHA games last weekend at Michigan Tech. Woog is in his 4th year behind the Gopher bench. His overall record stands at 129-44-4, while he is 101-31-3 in the WCHA.
- UM became the first team in 11 years to sweep a Tech Winter Carnival series.

-- Gopher junior goal tender Robb Stauber set a school record by recording his 64th and 65th career victories last weekend. He has surpassed the previous record of 64 wins by former teammate John Blue (1985-87).

-- Um has suffered just one loss in its last 15 games (12-1-2).

Junior forwards Dave Snuggerud and Tom Chorske, plus freshman defenseman Tom Pederson, led the Gopher scoring parade at Tech last weekend. Snuggerud, Minnesota's nominee for WCHA Player of the Week honors, totaled six points on three goals and three assists. He scored the game winning goal Friday.

Chorske potted Saturday's game winner and had five points on three goals and two assists in the series to win the series MVP trophy. Pederson had his best college game as he counted two goals and as many assists Saturday. He added another assist Friday.

WRESTLERS FALL TO MICHIGAN IN ANN ARBOR ON FRIDAY; TOP MICHIGAN STATE & FERRIS STATE IN EAST LANSING ON SATURDAY: ON THE ROAD AT NORTH DAKOTA THIS FRIDAY, PURDUE AT HOME SATURDAY (12-7 Overall/4-5 Big Ten)

The 10th-ranked Gopher wrestling team lost a heartbreaking 22-18 decision to host Michigan on Friday, before journeying to Michigan State on Saturday where head coach J. Robinson's team bounced back in convincing fashion, upending the host Spartans 37-10 and then drubbing Ferris State, the No. 1 ranked Division II team, 31-6.

Freshman Ben Morris (Wooddale, IL) at 118, junior Kent Johnson (Monticello, MN) at 150, sophomore Marty Morgan (Bloomington, MN) at 167, senior Dave Dean (Montrose, MI) at 177, and junior Jeff Balcolm (Fairmont, MN) at HWT were victorious for the Gophers in the loss to Michigan on Friday. The big blow to the Gophers chances for an upset bid was at 158 pounds, where junior Gordy Morgan (Bloomington, MN), who had a 23-2-3 record going into the match, was disqualified at 4:48 of his match with the Wolverines' Joe Pantaleo, ballooning Michigan's 13-7 advantage to 19-7 with just four matches remaining. The Gophers drew close but could not overcome the 4th-ranked Wolverines in the four-point loss.

The Gophers wasted no time in getting back on the winning track, however, by scoring the victories over Michigan State and Ferris State on Saturday. Morris at 118, senior Jim Hamel (Vesper, WI) at 134, Johnson at 150, Marty Morgan at 167, and Dean at 177 recorded a pair of victories on the day for the Gophers. Michigan State had finished ninth in the recent Great American Classic, where Michigan claimed the top spot and the Gophers finished fifth, while Ferris State entered the weekend as the No. 1 ranked Division II team.

Hi Stranger: Marty Morgan defeated Ferris State's Brad Morris 3-1 in a rematch of their 1987 NCAA Division II championship bout. Morgan also won that match.

Dean Rolls Along: After winning all three of his matches over the weekend, Dave Dean upped his overall season mark to 23-1-1, with three pins. He is 16-0-1 in his last 17 matches, with the lone blemish on his record coming way back on Nov. 26 at the hands of Wisconsin's Dave Lee at the Northern Open in Madison, WI.

North Dakota On The Road, Purdue At Home: The Gophers will travel to Grand Forks, ND on Friday to take on the University of North Dakota, before returning home to take on the Big Ten's Purdue Boilermakers on Saturday at 7:30 p.m. in Williams Arena. North Dakota finished fifth in the NCAA Division II Championships last year. Senior Kory Mosher, a two-time Division II national champion, is the leader of a talented Fighting Sioux squad. Purdue finished seventh in the recent Great American Championships.

TENNIS TEAM SPLITS A PAIR OF MATCHES IN ARIZONA OVER THE WEEKEND; ROLEX NATIONAL INDOOR TENNIS CHAMPIONSHIPS BEGIN ON THURSDAY (2-1 Overall)

After falling 5-4 to 23rd-ranked Arizona State on Saturday, the 25th-ranked Gophers men's tennis team turned around to score a 5-3 victory over UC-Santa Barbara on Sunday in a full weekend of tennis action down in Tempe, AZ.

Sophomore Kevin Werwie (Sheboygan, WI) at No. 4, junior Jason Hall (Prior Lake, MN) at No. 5 and senior Dave Massart (Milwaukee, WI) at No. 6 were singles winners for the Gophers against Arizona State. Hall and senior Mathias Olsson (Tumba, Sweden) won a three-setter at No. 2 for the Gophers only victory of the match in doubles play. A pair of three-set matches that the Sun Devils captured proved to be the difference in the tight match.

UC-Santa Barbara had topped Arizona State 6-3 on Friday, so Sunday's victory was especially sweet for head coach David Geatz's Gophers. The Gophers won five of the six individual events, and sophomore Mike Farina (Mundelein, IL) a 1-2-3 finish in the all-around as head coach Fred Roethlisberger's team scored a 276.65-255.45 victory over Iowa State in their regular season home opener on Saturday in Williams Arena.

Junior Mark McKiernan (Darien, CT) led the Gophers charge in the individual events, winning the pommel horse with a score of 9.7 and the parallel bars with an identical score. He also tied for top honors in the vault, an event in which he is the defending Big Ten champion, with junior teammate Mike Miller (Aloha, OR). The twosome recorded identical scores of 9.20 in the event. Miller also captured the rings with a 9.6, while junior Mike Graham (Green Bay, WI) claimed the horizontal bars with a 9.4.

Farina won the all-around by recording scores of 9.0 in the floor exercise, 9.4 on the pommel horse, 9.35 on the rings, 8.9 on the vault, 9.2 on the parallel bars, and 9.0 on the horizontal bar, for a total of 54.85. Graham finished second with 54.35, while sophomore Jay Caputo (Longwood, FL) completed the Gophers sweep with a score of 53.55.

Going West: The Gophers will have a busy weekend coming up, competing the the UC-Santa Barbara Invitational on Friday, and then the UCLA Invitational in Los Angeles on Saturday. After finishing seventh in the NCAA Championships a year ago, the Gophers will once again have the opportunity to see how they stack up with the nation's finest this weekend.

GOPHERS SWIMMING & DIVING TEAM DEFEATS PURDUE & ILLINOIS, BUT DROPS CLOSE CALL TO WISCONSIN; HOST IOWA STATE ON SATURDAY (9-1 Overall/6-1 Big Ten)

Senior Dan Egeland (St. Anthony, MN) and sophomore Bengt Zikarsky (Erlangen, West Germany) each won a total of three events to pace the 17th-ranked Gophers swimming & diving team in Big Ten quad-dual action on Friday and Saturday in Madison, WI.

The Gophers topped Purdue (100-29) and Illinois (104-23), but fell from the ranks of the unbeaten with a tight 67-62 defeat to the host Badgers.

Egeland captured the 200 freestyle on Friday with a season-best clocking of 1:38.38, just .23 seconds off of his own school record. He won two more events, and registered season-bests in the process, on Saturday, taking the 400 individual medley with a time of 4:02.92, and then the 200 breaststroke in 2:04.90. Zikarsky stroked to victory in Friday's 50 freestyle with a time of 20.78, and then touched first in Saturday's 100 freestyle with a time of 45.28. He finished off another productive competition by leading off the Gophers victorious 400 freestyle relay. The team of Zikarsky, freshman Del Cerney (Lakeville, MN), freshman Sean Quackenbush (Rochester, MN) and junior Bill Asmus (Lakeville, MN) won the meet's final event in 3:03.67.

Quackenbush also won Saturday's 200 butterfly with a clocking of 1:50.72, while senior Mark Gabos (Glendale, WI) finished on top overall in 3 Meter Diving with a score of 549.00

Egeland Shines: All-American Dan Egeland won all three of his individual events for the Gophers over the weekend. For the season, the senior star has won 22 of 23 individual races and shown that he will once again be a force to watch in the championship meets that lie ahead. Oh by the way, his lone loss of the season was in the 100 butterfly at the Gold Country Invitational on Jan. 7 to none other than freshman teammate Sean Quackenbush. Honored as the Big Ten's athlete-of-the-month for December, Egeland clocked a fine time of 50.68 in the race, with Quackenbush touching just ahead of him in 50.35.

Iowa State: The Gophers will host Iowa State at 2:00 p.m. on Saturday in Cooke Hall. They topped the Cyclones 112-104 a year ago, and Saturday's meet could be every bit as close.

GOLDEN GOPHERS FACE TWO MAJOR CAGE CHALLENGES

Two Big Ten Conference basketball assignments are on tap this week for the University of Minnesota, and once again the Golden Gophers find themselves in that old one-game-on-the-road and one-game-at-home pattern.

First Coach Clem Haskins' charges get the road assignment as they invade Purdue Thursday for an 8:05 p.m. (EST) confrontation. Then the Golden Gophers return home to entertain Indiana at 2:05 p.m. (CST) on Saturday.

Both of those outings are rematches. Minnesota will be looking for opposite results in each, and both will present major challenges to the undermanned Golden Gophers.

In an earlier meeting this season, Minnesota downed Purdue 76-66 in Williams Arena. The Golden Gophers would like a repeat performance on Thursday. But Minnesota and Indiana also met earlier, only the Hoosiers prevailed 66-62 over the Golden Gophers in that shootout. Obviously, then, Minnesota would like to reverse the tables this time around.

But that brings on the challenges. Consider the fact that Thursday's contest will be played in Mackey Arena, and Minnesota has not won there since the 1981-82 season when the Golden Gophers, enroute to their most recent Big Ten championship, eked out a 53-52 triumph.

Also consider the fact that Minnesota is 0-6 on the road in Big Ten Play this season, and it has won only two contests away from Williams Arena all season long.

That makes the prospect of winning at Purdue somewhat bleak. Then consider Saturday's shootout with Indiana, a team that boasts 14 straight wins over Minnesota. The Golden Gophers will be facing a team which has not lost in the "friendly" confines of Williams Arena since the 1979-80 season.

Now compound the issue by taking Richard Coffey, the defending Big Ten rebound champion and Minnesota's leader in that department this season, out of the lineup, and Golden Gopher fans don't have many reasons to be optimistic this week.

Coffey suffered an injury to his left knee in Minnesota's embarrassing 99-61 loss at Iowa last weekend, and preliminary diagnosis indicates he will be on the shelf for at least three weeks.....perhaps longer.....depending on decisions made later this week when all test results are in.

The loss of Coffey means Haskins, already shorthanded as he strives to get Minnesota into post-season play, probably will start Willie Burton and Walter Bond at forward, Jim Shikenjanski at center and Kevin Lynch, who had a team-high 21 points at Iowa last Saturday, and Melvin Newbern at the guard spots.

That disappointing loss at Iowa dropped Minnesota's overall season record to 14-8. The Golden Gophers now are 6-6 in Big Ten play with six games left on the schedule.

"Our loss at Iowa was an old fashion kicking," Haskins lamented. "They beat us in every phase of the game. Now we've got six games left, and we've got to play up to our potential for 40 minutes in every one of them if we want to get into post season play. We're good enough to win, but we must play smart basketball every minute of the way to get the job done."

That job starts Thursday. On the road. And it continues Saturday. At home. At Williams Arena, where the Golden Gophers have won 14 straight games, where they are unbeaten in Big Ten play this season.

It should be an interesting week for Haskins, his courageous but undermanned cagers and for Golden Gopher basketball fans who are beginning to believe.

He recorded a season-high score of 55.65 in the all-around to tie Kirksey for second in the final standings behind Nebraska's Mike Epperson who tallied a score of 55.90. Along the way, **Caputo** registered season highwater marks in both the floor exercise (9.45) and the pommel horse (9.0).

Host UW-Oshkosh On Saturday: The Gophers will be back in the friendly confines of Williams Arena this week, when they host UW-Oshkosh at 7:30 p.m. on Saturday. Last season the Gophers scored a relatively easy 278.60-229.90 victory over the Titans. The meet will open a three-meet homestand for Head Coach Fred Roethlisberger's Gophers, who will also host Wisconsin in the Big Ten opener on Thursday, March 2, and then Michigan and Michigan State on March 4.

Senior **Frank Bjorkli** (Hommelvik, Norway) finished 4th in the 3000 meters last year with a clocking of 8:13.63, and has a clocking of 8:21.07 to his credit this season, along with a swift 3:52.70 in the 1500 meters as well. Brother **Roger Bjorkli** (Hommelvik, Norway) ended up 8th in the 5000 meters last year with a time of 14:56.60 and has gone 15:02.09 thus far this winter, and 8:33.74 in the 3000 meters. Junior **Chris Harder** (Austin, MN) also appears fit and ready to go after recording clockings of 4:16.41 in the mile and 8:21.04 in the 3000 meters. He was 10th at last year's conference meet in the 3000 with an 8:27.00. Senior **John Siekmeier** (Mahtomedi, MN) placed sixth in the shot put a year ago with a heave of 51'8½" and has matched that distance already this season.

4 x 800 Relay: With a talented stable of half-milers in the fold, the Gophers should be a threat in the 3200 meter relay once again after finishing 5th in the event a year ago. Senior **Jim Scott** (Bloomington, MN) has gone 1:54.40, freshman **Sean Fitzgerald** (A.P.O., NY) 1:55.20, junior **Steve Scarince** (St. Cloud, MN) 1:55.55, and senior **Dan Hebl** (Menomonie, WI) 1:55.70 thus far in the 800 meters this season. In addition,

Scarince headlines the list of relay-split times with a 1:52.3 to his credit, followed by **Hebl** at 1:53.2, **Scott** at 1:54.2, **Fitzgerald** at 1:54.4, and **Frank Bjorkli** with a 1:55.1. Moreover, **Fitzgerald** ran the mile in 4:08.97 at the Central Collegiate Championships in South Bend, IN on Feb. 11. Former Gophers great and U.S. Olympian Garry Bjorklund holds the freshman indoor record with a time of 4:05.5 set back in 1970. Both in the relay and in their individual events, the Gophers middle distance brigade will be put to the test in the talent-rich Big Ten.

Watch Out: In addition to **Siekmeier** in the shot put, freshman Mark Lacy (Oak Brook, IL) has a throw of 50'1" to his credit this season and could get into the hunt for points in the event this weekend. Senior **Kelly Griffitts** (St. Charles, IL), along with juniors **Jeff Svedahl** (Cloquet, MN) and **Jeff Renlund** (Minnetonka, MN) might also score points in the distance events. **Griffitts** has gone 14:27.46 in the 5000 meters and 8:31.85 in the 3000 meters, **Svedahl** 8:30.36 in the 3000, and **Renlund** 14:42.00 in the 5000 and 8:35.12 in the 3000 meters this winter. In the hurdles, junior **Rich Benoy** (Ukiah, CA) and freshman **Lance Knuckles** (Racine, WI) are the Gophers top threats. **Benoy** has a 7.45 tucked away this season, while **Knuckles** has gone 7.67. Sophomore **Mark Terwilliger** (Stillwater, MN) won the high jump at last weekend's Illini Strider Classic with a leap of 6'9½", but with better than a half-dozen jumpers in the Big Ten over 7-feet this season, he has his work cut out for him this weekend. Senior **Scott Anderson** (Muscatine, IA) went 6-8 at last weekend's meet. Sophomore **Willie Young** (Atlantic Beach, FL) soared 23'5½" to finish second in the long jump at the Illini Striders Classic, but he has a tough road ahead since the Big Ten Conference is loaded in the event this year. Sophomore **Ross Thompson** (Esko, MN) has gone 15'8½" in the pole vault this winter, while senior **Jason Bruce** (Eagan, MN), sophomore **Chris York** (Dubuque, IA), and freshmen **Armand LeCrone** (Downers Grove, IL) and **Tyrone Oliver** (Buffalo Grove, IL) will handle the majority of the short-long sprint events for the Gophers.

GOPHER NETTERS ADVANCE TO FINALS OF UNLV INVITATIONAL (5-2/0-0 Big Ten)

The 25th-ranked Gophers tennis team advanced to the finals of the 16-team UNLV/Nevada Bob's Invitational Tennis Classic over the weekend, before falling 5-3 to Fresno State in the championship match on Sunday.

Reunion For Geatz: First-year Gophers head coach, David Geatz, who came to Minnesota from the University of New Mexico, where he served as the Lobos' head coach for the past six seasons, didn't have to wait long to face his old team. The Gophers opened the tournament with a 6-2 victory over New Mexico in first-round play on Friday morning.

The Dueling Uihleins: Fresh off of their march into the semifinals of the recent Rolex National Indoor Intercollegiate Tennis Championships, senior **Duke Uihlein** (Lake Forest, IL) and freshman **Brian Uihlein** (Lake Forest, IL) continue to sizzle as the Gophers No. 1 doubles combination. The brother combination won tough three-set matches in the Gophers 6-2 victory over UNLV in the quarterfinals on Friday, and the 5-4 win over Auburn in the semifinals on Saturday. In the opening round match with New Mexico, the issue was already decided so they did not even take the court, while in the title match with Fresno State they were down 7-5, 4-4 and setting the stage for yet even more heroics before the match was stopped when Fresno State collected their fifth victory. They are now 15-7 on the season, while **Brian** has a team-leading 18 victories (18-10) in singles play. Junior **Rafer Leach** (Lexington, KY) is right behind at 17-14, while both **Duke** (12-11) and junior **Jason Hall** (Prior Lake, MN) (12-8) have 12 victories apiece.

Florida Trip Next: A trip to Miami, FL looms ahead for the Gophers. They will face 16th-ranked Miami on March 3, Florida on March 4, and then wind up the trip against 20th-ranked Mississippi on March 5.

Minneapolis, MN---The first leg of the U. of Minnesota hockey Gophers season was completed last weekend. The second leg begins this weekend.

Minnesota dispatched Wisconsin in its final regular season series by the scores of 4-1 and 5-2. The wins gave Minnesota a final WCHA record of 27-6-2 good for 56 points and its second consecutive Association championship. Minnesota, for the entire season, is 29-8-3.

The Gophers ended their league campaign 14 points ahead of second place Northern Michigan. The Wildcats ended 20-13-2 for 42 points. Wisconsin finishes next in line with a 17-13-5 record good for 39 points, but was tied by North Dakota which also totaled 39 points on a 20-14-1 record.

Wisconsin, however, gained third place in the playoff seeding based upon winning its regular season series from North Dakota.

Thus, the first round playoffs are set. The Gophers will be home this weekend for a best of three series against 8th place Colorado College. Games are set for Friday and Saturday nights at 7:05 p.m. at Mariucci Arena, with the same time and place Sunday if needed.

The remainder of the first round, all best of three, sends 7th place Minnesota-Duluth to runner-up Northern Michigan, 6th place Michigan Tech to Wisconsin, and 5th place Denver to North Dakota.

The four survivors of the above series then head for the Saint Paul Civic Center and the WCHA Playoff Championship Tournament Sunday and Monday, March 5-6, immediately following the annual Minnesota State High School Hockey Tournament also at the Civic Center.

This is the second year the WCHA has decided its playoff championship at the Civic Center. Last year more than 52,000 viewed the two-day, four-game event. Wisconsin edged Minnesota 3-2 in the championship game, but both teams qualified for the NCAA playoffs which followed.

This year's WCHA playoff champ, just like last season, receives an automatic bid into the first round NCAA playoffs. The champion is not, however, guaranteed home ice.

By sweeping Wisconsin at home last weekend, Minnesota did something it had not accomplished since the 1979-80 season. . . win all four regular season games from the Badgers.

Minnesota opened its season at Wisconsin winning both games, 3-2 in overtime and 4-2.

Junior goalie Robb Stauber was a major factor for the Gophers again last weekend. He totaled 56 saves out of 59 shots on goal, an amazing .949 percent. For the second straight year Stauber showed the lowest goals allowed average in the WCHA with a 2.33 mark. Last year he was 2.91 in league play.

Dave Snuggerud and Peter Hankinson led the Gophers scoring parade with four points apiece. Snuggerud scored back to back unassisted goals Friday breaking a 1-1 tie in the third period. He added another goal and an assist in Saturday's contest and continues to lead his teammates in scoring with 42 points on 24 goals and 18 assists. His goal total is also tops.

Hankinson, after counting one assist Friday, added a goal and two assists Saturday. His totals are now 15 goals and 23 assists for 38 points, second only to linemate Snuggerud.

Three UM seniors--David Espe and Brett Nelson, defensemen from White Bear Lake, and defenseman Todd Richards from Crystal--were honored, along with members of their families, prior to Saturday's game on "Senior Night." Also honored were junior wings Tom Chorske, Minneapolis, and Snuggerud of Minnetonka.

The latter pair were members of the same freshman class as the first three, but missed last year as members of the U.S. Olympic Team.

The entire team was formally presented with the symbol of supremacy in the WCHA, the prized MacNaughton Cup, following Saturday's contest.

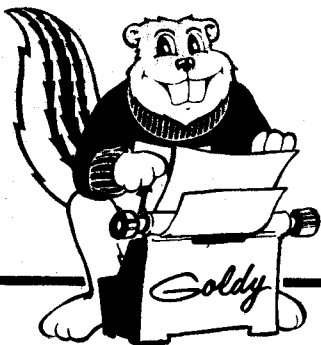

FOUR GAMES REMAIN FOR U OF M CAGERS

Only four regular-season games are left on the 1988-89 schedule for the University of Minnesota basketball team, and two of them are on the road while two of them are at Williams Arena.

Coach Clem Haskins will bring his club into this week's action with an overall record of 14-10 and a Big Ten mark of 6-8, and while both of those standards are an improvement from a year ago.....or even the past two seasons.....they are not as good as the Golden Gophers hope for.

When the current campaign got underway, Minnesota set a couple of goals. One was to finish OVER the .500 mark, and to do that the Golden Gophers must win at least one more game. The undermanned U of M contingent also aimed for a post-season tournament bid, and to achieve that lofty goal Minnesota needs more than one more victory.....if not for an NIT invitation certainly for an NCAA bid.

So it seems to be an out of the frying pan and into the fire situation for the Golden Gophers who suffered two heartbreaking losses last week.....one on the road and one at home and in the process had a 12-game home-floor win streak snapped.

First Minnesota fell at Purdue by a 78-63 margin. Then the Golden Gophers dropped a 75-62 verdict to front-running Indiana 75-62 at Williams Arena. And while both losses smarted a little, the home-court defeat was even harder to take after considering that Minnesota had reeled off six consecutive Big Ten Conference wins over such nationally-ranked contingents as Iowa, Michigan, Illinois and Ohio State in "The Barn."

"We didn't do a good enough job of protecting the ball at Purdue," Haskins said after his club notched 15 turnovers, "and we were not able to control the tempo of the game at all. Purdue just would not let us get into any kind of offensive flow, and we really didn't show the kind of patience we need against a good ball club. We played well at times, but again it was not over a full 40-minute period."

Against Indiana it seemed to be two different games, and the second one....., the second half.....destroyed Minnesota's chances. The Hoosiers outscored the Golden Gophers 12-0 from the free throw line in the second half, and they outscored Minnesota 38-20 overall in the final stanza to overcome a 42-37 Golden Gopher halftime lead.

"We were really shorthanded," Haskins pointed out. "We can't expect to beat the number one team in the conference when our number one rebounder (Richard Coffey.....sidelined with a knee injury) and our leading scorer (Willie Burton..... played only 23 minutes and in foul trouble through most of the game) are on the bench. We had our opportunities, but we just could not get the job done."

And those two games were the frying pan. Now comes the fire, a mid-week assignment at Illinois and a Saturday home contest with Northwestern. Then next week, the final week of the regular season, Minnesota entertains Michigan State before winding things up at Ohio State a week from Saturday.

All of those four games are 1988-89 re-matches for the Golden Gophers including Thursday's 7:05 p.m. (CST) shootout against the Fighting Illini. Earlier this season Minnesota nipped the then number-one ranked Illinois contingent 69-62 at Williams Arena. Over the years there have been 136 meetings between these two clubs, and Illinois will take an edge of 84-52 in the series into Thursday's game.

The Golden Gophers fell at Northwestern 75-67 in the first meeting between these two clubs earlier this year, but Minnesota still takes a 67-50 edge in the series into Saturday's game.

Minneapolis, MN---For the second straight year, the U. of Minnesota hockey Gophers carry the #1 seed into the WCHA Playoffs Championship Tournament at the Saint Paul (MN) Civic Center.

Minnesota claimed this right by winning its second WCHA regular season title in as many years, and then defeating Colorado College 5-4 and 7-1 last weekend in the first round Association playoffs, a best of three series.

The Gophers semi-final round opponent at 8:05 p.m. CST Sunday is the Denver University. Denver, which ended 5th in the regular season, surprised many by winning two of three games at 4th place North Dakota. The Sioux took the opening game of the series 7-1 last Saturday only to see DU bounce back and win 5-4 Sunday, and 3-2 Monday.

The other semi-final game Sunday pits #2 Northern Michigan against #3 Wisconsin. Northern eliminated Minnesota-Duluth 2-0 while Wisconsin took the measure of Michigan Tech, also in straight wins, in the first round.

Losers of Sunday's games play a third place contest at 2:05 p.m. Monday, with the playoff title game slated for 7:35 p.m. All four games will be carried live in the Twin Cities via KSTP-1500 AM radio and KITN-TV, Channel 29.

Slightly more than 2,000 reserved seat tickets remain for the WCHA playoff championship series. The tournament, now in its second year at the Civic Center, is already guaranteed of bettering last year's total attendance mark of 52,000 for the four games.

Tournament tickets have been selling briskly for \$39. Beginning at 9 a.m. Wednesday, single game tickets (\$11) go on sale at Bierman Building on the U. of M. campus at 516 15th Avenue SE. Call 624-8080 for information. Seating capacity for hockey at the Civic Center is listed at 15,600.

Last Friday's game vs. Colorado College was really three games in one. Minnesota gained a slim 1-0 margin in the first period, and then scored three times in the first five minutes of the second period.

In the latter scoring splurge, freshman center Larry Olimb and junior defenseman Lance Pitlick combined to set a new school record. Olimb scored Minnesota's second goal of the game at 0:44 of the middle period before Pitlick followed with his goal just :06 seconds later at 0:50. The former mark for the fastest two goals in UM history was 0:08 seconds by Tom Sathre on January 12, 1970 vs. the same school, Colorado College.

Senior defenseman Todd Richards followed with Minnesota's 4th goal at 4:31 and it appeared the Gophers were heading for smooth sailing. Nobody, however, thought to tell the C.C. Tigers.

Colorado College answered the call with two late second period goals, and then tied the game 4-4 at 8:16 by the final period. Fortunately for Minnesota, the Gophers entered its third stage of the game on a wild forchecking shift that produced the game winner by freshman wing Cory Laylin at 11:12. UM blasted four straight shots on goal before Laylin snuck in a rebound shot.

Saturday saw junior wing Dave Snuggerud and junior goalie Robb Stauber combine to hand Minnesota its series victory. Snuggerud scored three goals and assisted on another while Stauber held the Tigers to one goal while making 19 saves.

Minnesota peppered outstanding C.C. goalie Derek Pizzev with 46 shots. Many of his saves were of the spectacular variety. Jon Anderson, Olimb, Grant Bischoff and Jake Enebak also scored for the Gophers.

Snuggerud triggered Minnesota's second goal of the game in the first period, then sandwiched his 26th and 27th of the year around the lone Tiger score in the middle period. Snuggerud now leads his teammates in scoring with 46 points on 19 assists to go with his team best 27 goals. His four points Saturday matched the two goals and two assists by Olimb on the weekend.

Last year Minnesota lost to Wisconsin 3-2 in the WCHA inaugural playoff final at the Civic Center. The Gophers would love to atone for that loss starting with Denver Sunday evening. UM defeated Denver in four meetings this year; 4-3 twice at home in October, and 6-5 and 6-3 at DU in December.

The Gophers track & field team wrapped up their indoor season by finishing ninth in the final team standings at the Big Ten Championships held on Friday and Saturday in Iowa City, IA.

Final Team Standings: Illinois 94, Purdue 73, Indiana 72, Michigan 68, Wisconsin 62, Ohio State 51, Iowa 34, Michigan State 27, MINNESOTA 15.

Gopher Placewinners: Junior **Steve Scarince** (St. Cloud, MN) paced the Gophers with a third-place finish in the 800 meters with a fine time of 1:52.11. Indiana's Jim White won the event with a clocking of 1:51.68, followed by Aaron Rogers of Illinois in 1:51.73. Also scoring points for the Gophers were junior **Rich Benoy** (Ukiah, CA), who finished fifth in the 55 meter hurdles with a time of 7.50, sophomore **Mark Terwilliger** (Stillwater, MN) was sixth in the high jump with a leap of 6'10 3/4", freshman **Sean Fitzgerald** (A.P.O., NY) ended up sixth in the mile in 4:15.86, senior **Frank Bjorkli** (Hommelvik, Norway) was sixth in the 3000 meters with a clocking of 8:19.74, and the Gophers 4 x 800 meter relay team finished fourth in 7:39.84.

Close Calls: Several Gophers were within striking distance of scoring points but fell short in their quest despite turning in solid performances. Junior **Chris Harder** (Austin, MN) finished one place out of the points. He was seventh in the 3000 meters with a clocking of 8:25.03. A trio of Gophers - senior **Scott Anderson** (Muscatine, IA) in the high jump with a leap of 6'8 3/4", senior **John Siekmeier** (Mahtomedi, MN) in the shot put with a heave of 50'10 1/4", and senior **Kelly Griffiths** (St. Charles, IL) in the 5000 meters in 14:48.26 - finished eighth.

Heading Outside: The Gophers will be off from competition until March 24-25, when they open up their 1989 outdoor campaign at the Stanford Invitational in Palo Alto, CA.

Pinkham, 35, has been tabbed by Head Coach John Gutekunst to work with the Golden Gopher defensive secondary. He replaces Billy Miller who resigned recently to accept a post at Oklahoma State.

For the past 12 years, Pinkham has been on the staff at the University of New Hampshire, and for the seven most recent campaigns he has functioned as the defensive coordinator.

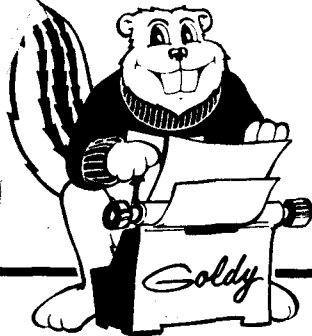
In 1988, New Hampshire led the nation in the turnovers gained department, and under Pinkham's guidance recorded a total of 50-plus in turnovers over the last two football seasons.

"I've been aware of Pinkham for many years," Gutekunst said. "We have followed his career very closely. He has shown that he is an excellent recruiter, and his coaching record speaks for itself. He is a welcome addition at Minnesota."

TWO GAMES REMAIN IN REGULAR SEASON PLAY FOR GOLDEN GOPHERS

Only two games remain in regular season play for the 1988-89 University of Minnesota cagers, and it seems fitting that the final week follows that same old pattern.....one game at home and one on the road,

On Wednesday, the Golden Gophers bring down the curtain on their home slate for this season by entertaining Michigan State University in a Big Ten TV Game of the Week production at 7:05 p.m. (CST).

Then on Saturday regular season play ends for real when Minnesota invades Columbus to take on the Ohio State Buckeyes. That finale is scheduled to get underway at 8:07 p.m. (EST).

The Golden Gophers will take an overall record of 15-11 and a Big Ten mark of 7-9 into Wednesday's confrontation with the Spartans, and a win would keep Minnesota's slim NCAA hopes alive while probably cementing a bid to the NIT.

Gaining that win will be another tough task for the Richard-Coffey-less Golden Gophers, however, as Michigan State already boasts one win over the U of M this season.....that a 73-64 decision at East Lansing late in January.

And gaining a win at Ohio State on Saturday could be even more difficult for Minnesota to achieve since its' road record only stands at 2-9 on the year, and it has not been able to win in league play away from home in 1988-89.

The Golden Gophers have been able to win at home, however, and they did so again last weekend when belting Northwestern 78-59 in the friendly confines of Williams Arena.

That victory snapped a four-game Big Ten losing streak and marked Minnesota's first win since Coffey suffered that sidelining knee injury at Iowa nearly three weeks ago.

"The Northwestern game was a tough one for us," Coach Clem Haskins admitted. "People expected us to win easily, but I was very concerned. Fortunately we shot pretty well, and we got good balance in our scoring. We also showed good patience on offense."

That patience was something Minnesota exhibited for the second straight outing. At Illinois just three nights earlier the Golden Gophers may have done their best job of the season in that department and totally controlled the tempo against the highly-ranked Fighting Illini. The effort went by the boards, however, as the under-manned U of M contingent fell 63-58.

"We still had to feel good about our effort at Illinois," Haskins maintained. "I was extremely proud of the way we played. And it was on the road. And it was against an excellent basketball team."

Junior forward Willie Burton set the pace for the Golden Gophers in both of those games with 19 points at Illinois and 16 at home against Northwestern. He'll go into the Michigan State game Wednesday ranked as Minnesota's leading scorer with 444 points and an average of 17.9.

Ray Gaffney, Minnesota's only senior this season, will make his final home appearance of the 1988-89 season.....at least in regular-season play.....against the Michigan State Spartans.

Over the years Minnesota and Michigan State and Minnesota have met 74 times, and the Golden Gophers will bring a 43-31 edge in the series into Wednesday's game. Minnesota trails in the OSU series 61-39.

Minneapolis, MN---After dropping both its games at the WCHA playoff tournament in Saint Paul, the U. of Minnesota hockey Gophers now sit and wait for the NCAA selection committee to decide Sunday who will make the final field of 12 teams.

Based on its season record of 31-10-3, including a second straight regular season WCHA championship. the Gopher staff, at this time, feels confident the U. of M. hockey team will be selected to play in the NCAA field.

As to where Minnesota will be seeded, that's another question. Teams seeded one or two in both the East and West regions receive a first round bye for the NCAA playoffs. Last year the Gophers were seeded #1 West.

That would mean a long layoff for Minnesota. The first round series is to be played the weekend of March 17-19, with the second round set for March 24-26.

The following weekend, March 30-31/April 1, sends the final four survivors back to Saint Paul for the NCAA championship tournament at the Civic Center. The tournament has already been announced as a sell out.

Many favored the Gophers to win the WCHA playoffs held last Sunday and Monday at the Civic Center. But once again Minnesota found the Civic Center not to be "their" arena.

On Sunday, following Northern Michigan's thrilling 4-2 victory over Wisconsin, the Gophers ran into a great goal tending performance by Denver's Lucian Carignan and dropped a 2-1 decision.

Denver scored twice in the second period before junior center John Anderson tipped in his 16th goal of the season on a power play for UM's lone score of the game. Minnesota outshot Denver 43-26, but Carignan was awesome in robbing several UM players with sensational saves. Minnesota goalie Robb Stauber stopped 24 Denver shots.

The next afternoon found familiar rivals Wisconsin and Minnesota facing off in the third place game. Wisconsin rallied no less than four times to take a penalty-marred 4-3 decision.

Minnesota held leads of 1-0, 2-1 and 3-2 on goals by Dean Williamson and Jason Miller in the first period, and another by Tom Chorske in the second stanza.

But Wisconsin came out strong in the final period to break a 3-3 tie when Chris Tancill scored on a power play at 12:40 with what proved to be the game winner. The Gophers skated shorthanded much of the final period receiving five minor penalties to one for Wisconsin.

Northern Michigan went on to gain the 1989 WCHA playoff championship Monday night by defeating Denver 9-4 in the title game.

As there is no way UM can figure out who or when they will play again, a period of quiet is in order.

Coach Doug Woog said Monday night his squad will practice hard the latter part of this week, and then taper off for final exams next week. How much practice will be scheduled next week depends on the NCAA seedings.

CHORSKE, STAUBER HONORED

Junior wing Tom Chorske and junior goalie Robb Stauber were singled out when WCHA honors were announced at a tournament banquet last Saturday in Saint Paul.

Chorske was named to a forward position on the All-WCHA first team, while Stauber, for the second straight year, was named WCHA Goalie Of The Year.

Chorske finished with 35 points on a league-leading 22 goals, plus 13 assists. He missed seven WCHA games with a shoulder injury in December.

Stauber once again led all WCHA goalies with a stingy 2.33 goals allowed average. He was also named goalie on the All-WCHA second team.

Senior defenseman Todd Richards and junior wing Dave Snuggerud joined Stauber on the second honor team, while junior defensemen Lance Pitlick and Randy Skarda received honorable mention status.

This weekend, the CCHA, HEA and ECAC conferences hold their playoff finals with each winner gaining the same status as Northern Michigan. This does not, however, guarantee home ice for the NCAA first round to any of the four automatic qualifiers.

2) NAMING 8 MORE TEAMS -- The NCAA selection committee on Sunday will announce which additional eight teams will be chosen to complete the field of 12 teams. Of those remaining eight teams, one school must be an independent and not a member of the four conferences named above.

3) SEEDING THE FIELD -- The NCAA selection committee Sunday will announce seeding the teams 1 through 6 East, and 1 through 6 West. Any team from any section can be seeded in either the East or West regions.

4) FIRST ROUND BYE -- Teams seeded 1-2 East and 1-2 West will receive a first round bye the weekend of March 17-18-19. Teams seeded 5-6 East will play on the home ice of teams seeded 3-4 West, and teams seeded 5-6 West will play on the home ice of teams seeded 3-4 East in the first round. A best of three format will be used.

5) SECOND ROUND -- On March 24-25-26, the four first round winners will play another best of three series on the home ice of those schools who received a first round bye. Possible pairings for these series will be made clear by the NCAA selection committee during Sunday's news conference.

6) CHAMPIONSHIP TOURNAMENT -- The four winners of the second round series then travel to Saint Paul for the national semifinals and finals. One semifinal is scheduled at 7:35 p.m. CST Thursday, March 30, with the other set for 7:35 p.m. Friday, March 31. A third place game will be played at 2:05 p.m. Saturday, April 1, with the championship clash set for 7:35 p.m. that evening.

ADDITIONAL MEDIA NOTES --

a) ESPN-TV owns exclusive television rights to the NCAA national championship game. NCAA Productions owns rights to the telecast of any other game in the Division I Men's Ice Hockey Championship. The rights will be coordinated by Jack Waters, director of licensing (913-384-3220).

b) Any radio station wishing to broadcast any or all of the NCAA games, including first round, second round, semifinals and finals, must contact the SID office of the host school. NCAA contract forms will be provided by the SID office staff.

c) Media wishing to secure credentials are asked to write a letter on your outlet letterhead to the SID office of the host school. All requests will be forwarded to the NCAA main offices for approval. Media who have staffed a school's games through the regular season will be given first consideration.

CONSISTENCY IS THE KEY TO SUCCESS FOR GOPHERS OFFENSE

Quarterback: **Scott Schafner** (West Chester, OH) turned in a fine rookie campaign for the Gophers last fall, rushing for 146 yards and three touchdowns, and hitting 106-191 passing attempts (55 percent) for 1,234 yards and seven more touchdowns. The sophomore has been sidelined much of spring practice, however, and as a result freshman **Marquel Fleetwood** (Decatur, GA) has charted a solid spring thus far. Sophomore **Keswic Joiner** (Moss Point, MS) and freshman **Robert Nittolo** (Middlesex, NJ) have also seen plenty of action.

Backfield: **Darrell Thompson** (Rochester, MN) enters his senior season with 3,379 yards, a new school record. Despite injury problems a year ago, he still rushed for 910 yards. Without a doubt he will be one of the finest in the Big Ten...and the country again this season. He has looked razor-sharp this spring. Junior **Octavius Gould** (Browns Mills, NJ) has been slowed this spring by rib injuries that plagued him throughout last season. Freshman **Jim King** (Watertown, MN) has been switched from the defensive backfield and has played well, along with senior **Pat Cummings** (Madison, WI). Senior **Marcus Evans** (Orlando, FL) and sophomore **Al Settembrino** (Philadelphia, PA) had fine outings in the team's first scrimmage.

"Darrel is practicing much more this spring, which concerns me because there's always a greater risk of injury," said head coach John Gutekunst. "But it's time to put a team together, and we can't have our best player not be a part of that. He makes everyone around him a better player. He ran exceptionally well in our first major scrimmage. We've moved Jimmy King to fullback to see if he can be the same type of physical, inside runner as Octavius, because we know he's a very tough kid. We have a veteran back in Pat Cummings, who has shown improvement this spring. Pat used to be a tailback, he's a 220 pounder, but he's starting to run more like a fullback now. He's not trying to make the long play, but he's now willing to take the few extra yards. That's a big plus."

Line: Finding a center has been the major task this spring. Junior **Chris Thome** (West St. Paul, MN) has been switched from guard to center this spring and has been impressive early-on. Junior **Mark Drabczak** (Minneapolis, MN) has been moved to guard, while JC transfer **Craig Hendrickson** (Tucson, AZ) is another talented candidate at guard, who has the ability to also play tackle. Senior **J.J. Lennon** (St. Paul, MN) is another experienced returnee. The tackles, headlined by seniors **Dan Liimatta** (Aurora, MN) and **Jon Melander** (Fridley, MN), along with junior **John Selvestra** (Rosemount, MN), have played well this spring according to Gutekunst.

"We have a lot of kids on the offensive line who have played Big Ten football," Gutekunst said. "I think you can see that right away. We have to find a center though. Thome has looked real good at guard and we know that he's a great athlete. He's looked very good in the short time he's been at center."

Receivers/Tight End: Senior **Chris Gaiters** (Zanesville, OH) was simply sensational for the Gophers last fall. He caught 42 passes for 564 yards and four touchdowns, and was honored as a third-team AP All-America choice as a return specialist after running back 17 punts for 178 yards, and 27 kickoffs for 612 more. Sophomore **Paul Hopewell** (Loveland, OH) had a promising start for the Gophers last season, before a broken leg shelved him for the final half of the season. He is fully recovered and has had an outstanding spring thus far. Juniors **Kevin Grant** (Miami, FL) and **Pat Tingelhoff** (Prior Lake, MN) have also emerged this spring, as has tight end **Trey Whitson** (Unicoi, TN), a freshman.

"Gaiters has been exceptional all spring, just like he was in the fall," Gutekunst said. "He's one of the best in the country. Paul Hopewell had an exceptional freshman year before his injury, Pat Tingelhoff is a steady, tough performer, and Kevin Grant is sort of like the newcomer, who has great speed. His time may have come. Trey Whitson has had a good eight days. He's been a pleasant surprise."

Overall: "Consistency was a problem for us last year," Gutekunst said. "You can't win at this level without being a complete football player every day. We have to make sure that the center position is consistent to the point where it doesn't break down the rest of the offensive line, and then the rest of it is just having the team play up to their ability each and every time they're out there."

Offense Shines In Scrimmage: The offense held the upper hand in last Sunday's scrimmage, indicating that the moves and adjustments being made this spring are having a positive effect.

The Golden Gophers offensive attack was impressive, as 12 different runners carried the ball for 453 net yards on the ground. Two Gophers went over the century mark on the day. Marcus Evans led the way with 119 yards on 15 carries, while Al Settimbrino was right on his heels with 109 yards in nine carries.

"It took us a while to get going offensively," Coach Gutekunst said after the hour-and-a-half workout, "but eventually we did move the ball fairly well."

GORDY MORGAN & DAVE DEAN LEAD GOPHER WRESTLERS TO A RUNNER-UP FINISH AT BIG TEN CHAMPIONSHIPS; SEVEN GOPHERS ADVANCE TO NCAA CHAMPIONSHIPS; ROBINSON HONORED AS COACH-OF-THE-YEAR

Led by individual champions **Gordy Morgan** (Bloomington, MN) and **Dave Dean** (Montrose, MI), the Golden Gophers wrestling team finished second in the final team standings at the Big Ten Championships held Saturday and Sunday at Purdue University in West Lafayette, IN.

The runner-up finish was the Gophers' best showing since 1982 when they also ended up second behind the powerful Iowa Hawkeyes, who have now won an unprecedented 16 straight league crowns.

Competing for the Gophers at the NCAA Championships will be: 118 - Sophomore **Keith Nix** (Tulsa, OK) 2nd at Big Ten's; 134 - Senior **Jim Hamel** (Vesper, WI) 5th, Wild Card Selection; 158 - **Gordy Morgan**, 1st; 167 - Sophomore **Marty Morgan** (Bloomington, MN) 3rd; 177 - **Dean**, 1st; 190 - Freshman **Chris Short** (Inver Grove Heights, MN) 3rd; HWT - **Jeff Balcom** (Fairmont, MN) 2nd

Dean The Machine: **Dave Dean**, 29-1-1 overall and 23-0-1 in his last 24 matches, roared to the second Big Ten title of his career in grand style. Ranked No. 3 at 177 in the Amateur Wrestling News poll, he scored a 12-8 decision over Purdue's Mike McHenry, ranked No. 4, in the title match. He was the 1987 Big Ten champion at 190 pounds and runner-up at the NCAA Championships that year as well, before redshirting last season because of a knee injury.

Morgan Wins A Thriller: **Gordy Morgan** defeated Michigan's Joe Pantaleo, ranked No. 1 by AWN, in a nailbiter to gain the title at 158 pounds. The match was tied 3-3 after regulation time, and 4-4 after the overtime, before the sixth-ranked Morgan won by criteria.

Oh So Close: **Keith Nix** at 118 pounds and **Jeff Balcom** at heavyweight advanced to Sunday's championship round before falling. Nix, the defending champion and runner-up at the NCAA Championships last year, lost by injury default to Northwestern's Jack Griffin in a rematch of their 1988 championship match. Nix was ranked No. 4 by AWN going into the tournament, while Griffin was ranked No. 3. The unranked **Balcom** surprised many of the experts by advancing all the way to the title match, where he fell 3-2 to No. 9 Jon Llewellyn of Illinois.

RECORDS FALL AS GOPHERS BLAZE TO THIRD-PLACE FINISH AT BIG TEN SWIMMING & DIVING CHAMPIONSHIPS; EGELAND, QUACKENBUSH & COACH DALE HONORED

Records fell by the wayside as the Golden Gopher men's swimming and diving squad churned up the waters of the IUPUI Natatorium in Indianapolis, IN from Thursday thru Saturday in dramatic fashion. When everything had settled, the Gophers found themselves in third-place in the final team standings at the Big Ten Championships, a lofty position that the program has not attained since the 1963 season.

Egeland Named Swimming MVP: Minnesota's "All-Everything", **Dan Egeland** went out in style in the final Big Ten Championships of his illustrious career. All he did over the three days was set seven school records, four individual (200 freestyle as leadoff leg of 800 freestyle relay) and three on relays, win a total of four events (two individual, two on relays), set two Big Ten Meet Records on Gopher relay units, and set a new all-time Big Ten record in the 200 individual medley. For his efforts, he was honored as the Swimmer-of-the-Championship.

"I think that Dan is the guy that our team really focuses around," Dale said. "Not only does he win events and score points, but he motivates everyone else around him as well. He's our key man."

Quackenbush Honored As Freshman of the Championship: **Sean Quackenbush** exploded on the scene at the Big Ten Championships for the Gophers. He qualified for the NCAA Championships and set new school records in both the 100 and 200 butterfly events, as well as a member of the Gophers 400 Medley relay unit. On top of that, he chipped in valuable points by going out of his area of specialty and finishing 14th in the 200 IM in 1:52.42. The rookie was named the Freshman-of-the-Championship.

"I think he surprised just about everybody," Dale said. "As the meet went on, he swam better and better. He did just a super job."

Dale Named Coach-of-the-Year: In his fourth season at the helm of the Gophers program, Dennis Dale has been the driving force behind Minnesota's resurgence on the national collegiate swimming scene. Ranked No. 14 in the final dual meet rankings, the Gophers' third-place finish at the Big Ten Championships is a 26-year highwater mark for the program. The Gophers also garnered third-place honors at the 1963 Big Ten Meet. After Egeland and Quackenbush collected their awards, Dale completed the triple play for the Gophers when he was honored as the Big Ten Coach-of-the-Year.

"It's nice to be recognized by your colleagues," Dale said. "But you obviously don't receive this kind of honor all by yourself. It reflects on your team's performance and the rest of the coaching staff, along with the entire athletic department from Rick Bay our athletic director on down. I don't think that any one person does it. Everybody has a part in it."

GOPHER GYMNASTS GO 4-0 ON THE WEEK; HIT THE ROAD THIS WEEKEND (6-1 Overall/4-0 Big Ten)

Head Coach Fred Roethlisberger's sixth-ranked Gophers men's gymnastics team scored a 278.50-268.40 victory over ninth-ranked Wisconsin on Thursday, and then tallied a season-high score of 279.60 en route to victories over Wisconsin, Michigan State and Michigan on Saturday as the Gophers wrapped up the home portion of their schedule.

The Right Pair: Juniors **Mark McKiernan** (Darien, CT) and **Dan Zimpher** (Kent, OH) came out on top in two events apiece to lead the Gophers over Wisconsin on Thursday. **McKiernan** had season-high scores of 9.70 on the parallel bars and 56.10 in the all-around, while **Zimpher** recorded a season-high 9.65 in the floor exercise, and also captured the horizontal bar with a 9.55. Junior **Mike Miller** (Aloha, OR) was the other individual winner on the evening for the Gophers. He scored a season-high score of 9.70 to collect top honors in the still rings.

Home Finale: The Gophers' season-high score of 279.60 was more than enough to outdistance Big Ten rivals Wisconsin (271.40), Michigan State (269.60) and Michigan (261.40) in the home finale on Saturday. Four Gophers captured individual events on the day with season-high scores. **Miller** won the still rings with a 9.70, matching Thursday's winning score, senior **Brad Pries** (Bloomington, MN) took the pommel horse in 9.65 in the final appearance of his collegiate career at Williams Arena, sophomore **Jay Caputo** (Longwood, FL) captured the parallel bars with a 9.75, and sophomore **Mike Farina** (Mundelein, IL) won the horizontal bar with a 9.60.

On the Road Again: The Gophers will wrap up their regular season this week, traveling to Madison, WI for a Friday night encounter with the host Badgers and Northern Illinois, before heading over to Iowa City, IA to meet the 12th-ranked Iowa Hawkeyes on Sunday. The Big Ten Championships, held March 24-25 at Madison, WI loom ahead after that.

ROUGH WEEKEND IN MIAMI FOR GOPHERS TENNIS TEAM (5-5 Overall/0-0 Big Ten)

The 18th-ranked Gophers tennis team traveled to Miami, FL over the weekend and came back with three losses against three outstanding teams.

Miami Heat: The University of Miami Hurricanes, ranked No. 19, won five of six singles matches to score a 5-1 victory over the Gophers on Friday. Sophomore **Kevin Werwie** (Sheboygan, WI) was the only winner on the day for the Gophers. He scored a 6-2, 7-5 victory over Miami's Patrice Baker at the fourth singles slot.

A repeat occurred on Saturday as the University of Florida clinched the match with five singles victories. Junior **Rafer Leach** (Lexington, KY) scored a 3-6, 6-3, 6-0 win over Florida's Tom Finnegan for the lone Gophers point.

Things didn't get any better on Sunday as 23rd-ranked Mississippi swept to a 6-0 win over the Gophers. **Leach**, along with junior **Jason Hall** (Prior Lake, MN) and senior **Mathias Olsson** (Tumba, Sweden), lost tough three-setters in the contest.

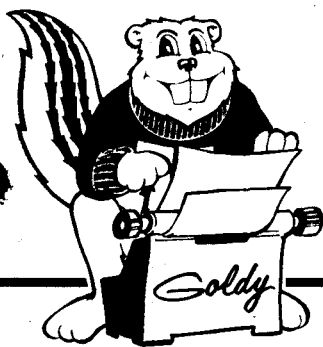

UNIVERSITY OF MINNESOTA GETS NCAA BASKETBALL TOURNAMENT BID

The University of Minnesota, with its courageous band of overachievers who were taking "one step at a time," took a giant step back to basketball respectability this week when they were tabbed to participate in the 1989 NCAA post-season tournament.

Third-year Coach Clem Haskins and his Golden Gophers will take on Kansas State University of the Big Eight Conference at 12:07 p.m. (EST) in Greensboro, North Carolina, on Thursday in the first round of the NCAA's East Tournament.

This marks the third time in University of Minnesota history that the Golden Gopher basketball team has been selected to participate in an NCAA tournament. In 1972, Minnesota fell to Florida State 77-72 in the opening round. In 1982, the Golden Gophers drew a bye in the first round and then edged Tennessee-Chattanooga 62-61 in the second round. They advanced to the regional tournament but fell in the opener 67-61 to Louisville.

Minnesota's trip to Greensboro marks the seventh time in U of M history that the Golden Gophers have been involved in post-season play. In addition to those two previous NCAA bids, Minnesota also has been in four NIT post-season tourneys.....the most recent being in 1983.

And there were many who figured the Golden Gophers would be in that meet again this year.....but when the Golden Gophers knocked off Michigan State 77-61 last Wednesday and then nudged Ohio State 78-70 at Ohio State last Saturday to up their season record to 17-11, the NCAA took notice.

Minnesota's final two wins enabled Haskins' gutty contingent to post a 9-9 record in the Big Ten and finish in undisputed possession of fifth place in the final standings. And actually the Golden Gophers finished regular-season play with three straight wins (Wisconsin was the other victim) to gain that "lofty" status.

While Golden Gopher fans were happy, Coach Haskins was delirious with joy. "I am so pleased for this group of young men," Haskins said. "They have been through so much. They have brought this program back so far. It's a great feeling."

The Golden Gophers entered the final week of regular-season play knowing they had their work cut out for them, but Willie Burton, the club's leading scorer, set the pace against the invading Spartans with 22. Then in the finale at Columbus, he and teammate Melvin Newbern each tallied 17 to do in the Buckeyes.

"We made the plays when they had to be made," Haskins emphasized, "and that was the case against both Michigan State and Ohio State. We had nice scoring balance (four in double figures against both the Spartans and Bucks), and that made a big difference."

But now it is on to Greensboro and a re-match with Kansas State, a team Minnesota beat 72-67 early in January at Williams Arena. But Haskins knows it will be tougher this time around.

"Kansas State did not have its' fine forward Fred McCoy when we played earlier," he pointed out, "and we DID have Richard Coffey who won't play this time. That's quite a switch. Plus we had that one at home, and this one is on the road. But we'll give it our best shot."

No changes are anticipated in Minnesota's starting lineup for Thursday's opener. Burton will be joined by Walter Bond at forward, Jim Shikenjanski at center and Kevin Lynch and Newbern at guard.

Minneapolis, MN---For the fifth consecutive year, the U. of Minnesota hockey Gophers have been named to compete for the NCAA championship.

In pairings and seedings announced by the NCAA Selection Committee Sunday in Saint Paul, MN, site of the NCAA championship finals, Minnesota (31-10-3) received the #2 West seeding and a first round bye.

The Gophers next play on home ice at Mariucci Arena March 24-26 in the best of three second round series. Minnesota's opponent will be winner of the first round series between host St. Lawrence (29-5-0) of the ECAC, and Wisconsin (23-14-5) of the WCHA.

The latter schools met in a first round total-goal series last year, also at Canton, NY, with the Saints winning 10-4 on scores of 7-0 and 3-4. St. Lawrence went on to eliminate Minnesota 3-2 in an NCAA semifinal game at the championship round in Lake Placid, NY.

Minnesota and St. Lawrence did not meet during regular season play this year, but the Gophers took four of five meetings against Wisconsin.

Minnesota won all four regular season games from the Badgers, 3-2 in overtime and 4-2 to open the season at Madison, and 4-1 and 5-2 in Mariucci Arena to close regular season play. Wisconsin rebounded to hand Minnesota a 4-3 defeat in the third place game of the WCHA championship playoffs in Saint Paul.

Should Minnesota prevail in its best of three series against St. Lawrence or Wisconsin, UM would then play a semifinal game at the Saint Paul Civic Center Friday, Mar. 31. The national title game is the next night.

This year's NCAA finals was announced as a sellout in mid February. It is the earliest that any NCAA hockey championships have been sold out.

COACH WOOG ON THE PLAYOFFS

"We are pleased, but not surprised, to receive the #2 West seeding," Minnesota head coach Doug Woog said Sunday. "I believe our team earned that ranking by its season-long performance.

"The two games we lost at the WCHA playoff tournament is the only time this season we have lost two games in a row. We also won our league championship by the largest margin in the history of the WCHA, 14 points.

"So looking at the entire picture, I believe we are where we are supposed to be.

"Having this week off is a blessing for us in that this is term-ending exam week at Minnesota. Our players now can fully concentrate on their exams and not be concerned about playing this weekend. We will hold practices Monday, Wednesday and Friday only for those players who can work it in around their exam schedule. We'll go back to work hard this weekend."

Asked which team he and the Gophers would rather meet next week, Woog answered, "It's something about which we have no control. We'll simply have to prepare our best and do the best we can against whomever is our next opponent."

THIRD STRIGHT UNDER WOOG

Minnesota, under Woog's direction, has made it to the final four each of the last three years only to lose in semifinal games at Providence, RI, Detroit and Lake Placid.

Sunday marked the 17th time a U. of Minnesota hockey team has made it to the NCAA playoffs. Gopher teams have been in the NCAA final four 13 times winning national crowns in 1974, 1976 and 1979. Other Gopher teams reached the championship games of 1953, 1954, 1971, 1975 and 1981.

Linebackers: A wealth of depth and experience returns this season to make the Gophers linebacking corps one of the team's strongholds. Senior **Jon Leverenz** (Ankeny, IA), who had knee surgery after being injured in the team's season opener last fall, will not appear until the fall. Senior **Mac Stephens** (Akron, OH), who led the Gophers with 119 tackles last season, has also missed some action this spring with a sprained ankle. Senior **Ron Goetz** (Waconia, MN), second behind Stephens last fall with 117 tackles, and sophomore **Joel Staats** (Winona, MN), third on the club with 81 tackles, also return. Sophomore **Kevin Sutton** (Brooksville, FL), who saw limited action last season before suffering a broken leg, along with freshman **Ben Williams** (Belzoni, MS), have done well this spring as well.

"We have some experience back because they all played last year," said Gophers defensive coordinator Dick Biddle. "The problem this spring is that Mac (Stephens) got hurt and has missed some time, and then Leverenz isn't practicing. But we should be pretty solid if they all come back healthy and ready to go in the fall. Goetz is a pretty good football player who really developed towards the end of the year. Staats was forced to play as a freshman because a couple of guys were injured, and he got better towards the end of the season. Kevin Sutton, who played a little bit before breaking his leg, and Ben Williams, who has a lot of ability, are also in the top 5-6 at the position. Then maybe out of the incoming freshman group you can get one or two guys who can contribute as backups."

Line: Senior **Eddie Miles** (Miami, FL), juniors **Skeeter Akre** (Aubrey, TX), **Bob Coughlin** (Brooklyn Park, MN) and **Mike Sunvold** (Brooklyn Center, MN), and sophomore **Kraig Hackbarth** (Fond du Lac, WI) headline the Gophers defensive line. **Sunvold** recorded 53 tackles last season, **Akre** had 33 to go along with a team-leading four sacks, **Miles** registered 27 tackles, and **Hackbarth** finished with 13 tackles on the season. Sophomore **Gary Isakson** (Apple Valley, MN), who had 30 tackles last fall, has missed most of the spring with a knee injury.

"What we're trying to do is develop some depth and solidify things in there," Biddle said. "There are a lot of people who played in there last year, and now they just have to get better. We moved Sunvold from defensive end to tackle and he's doing a good job this spring. I think he'll be a pretty good football player for us. And then we moved Miles to defensive end which gives us some speed there. Skeeter Akre is also back, so we've got a lot of experience there. Coughlin has lost some weight and has looked pretty good this spring, and we've moved Kraig Hackbarth from defensive end to tackle too."

Secondary: Senior **Doug Evans** (Montgomery, AL), juniors **Fred Foggie** (Waterloo, SC) and **Frank Jackson** (Detroit, MI), sophomores **Carlton Burt** (Canton, OH), **Sean Lumpkin** (Golden Valley, MN) and **Andre Thaddies** (Delray Beach, FL), and freshman **Derek Fisher** (Miami, FL) headline the secondary candidates for the Gophers. Junior **Les O'Hara** (Chicago, IL) and freshman **Ken Sebree** (Detroit, MI), a walk-on, have also looked impressive this spring. **Lumpkin** leads the returnees with 36 tackles last season and an interception, while **Thaddies** recorded 29 tackles and had an interception as well. **O'Hara** registered 25 tackles last fall for the Gophers.

"Fred Foggie, who was a running back for us last year, has been moved to cornerback," Biddle said. "He doesn't have much experience back there, but he's improving every day. He gives you good speed and he also has good size. The other cornerback right now is Derek Fisher. And then there's two kids who played well last year, Carlton Burt and Andre Thaddies. We moved Frank Jackson, who was a cornerback last year, to a safety. Then we've got Sean Lumpkin at free safety, and he's a very good player. He really came on last year. Doug Evans at strong safety has a lot of experience and does a steady job. Les O'Hara will be in there as well, and Ken Sebree has looked good."

Overall: "We have a lot of experience coming back, but we need to develop some depth," Biddle said. "I think that the guys have a real positive attitude. They've put last year behind them, and are playing well together this spring. We have to be a lot more aggressive and then it's just a matter of getting better every day."

Dean The Machine: **Dave Dean**, 29-1-1 overall and 23-0-1 in his last 24 matches, roared to the second Big Ten title of his career in grand style and is on top of his game heading into the NCAA's. He was the 1987 Big Ten champion at 190 pounds and runner-up at the NCAA Championships that year as well, before redshirting last season because of a knee injury.

The Morgan Brothers: It'll be a family affair for **Gordy Morgan** and his younger brother, **Marty Morgan** at the NCAA Championships. **Gordy** has chalked up an outstanding 30-4-4 overall mark this season to lead the Gophers in victories. He won the first Big Ten title of his career with a thrilling 3-3, 1-1(OT), criteria, victory over Michigan's Joe Pantaleo, ranked No. 1 by AWN going into the tournament, in a nailbiter at 158 pounds. **Marty**, who won the 1987 NCAA Division II 167 pound title while competing at North Dakota State, finished third at 167 pounds at the Big Ten Championships to qualify for the NCAA tourney. He has logged a 27-7 overall mark this season, including a team-high 12 pins.

Hamel Gets The Nod: After finishing fifth at 134 pounds at the Big Ten Tournament, **Jim Hamel** was selected as one of seven NCAA wild card entrants by the league's coaches. The top four finishers automatically qualified for the NCAA's, with the remainder of the Big Ten's entrants selected by the coaches. The 134 pound weight class was considered to be the toughest division of the tournament by many of the experts. Making his first appearance in the NCAA Tournament, **Hamel** has charted an overall 23-12-4 mark thus far this season.

The Big Boys: **Chris Short** at 190 pounds, and **Jeff Balcom** at heavyweight will also be making the first appearance of their careers at the NCAA Championships. **Short**, who red-shirted last season after suffering a broken foot, comes into the NCAA Tournament with a 14-7-1 record. The former Junior Nationals champion and two-time Minnesota State Champion

during his prep career at Simley High School, is 7-1 in his last eight matches. Also a two-time state titlist at Fairmont High School, Balcom turned a lot of heads with his runner-up finish at the Big Ten Championships. He is 16-3-1 on the season, including 10-1-1 in his last 12 matches.

Gopher Champions: The University of Minnesota has had a total of seven individuals win eight NCAA titles for the Gophers through the years. Vern Gagne holds the distinction of being the school's only two-time national champion, winning the 191 pound class in 1948, and then the heavyweight division the following year. The Gophers who have garnered national crowns are as follows: 1937 - John Whitaker, 175 pounds; 1939 - Dale Hanson, 128 pounds; 1941 - Leonard Levy, Heavyweight; 1948 - Gagne, 191 pounds; 1949 - Gagne, Heavyweight; 1953 - Dick Mueller, 123 pounds; 1976 - Evan Johnson, 190 pounds; 1977 - Pat Neu, 134 pounds.

Coach Robinson: In his third season at Minnesota, J. Robinson was honored by his colleagues as the Big Ten's Coach-of-the-Year at the recent league championships. The ringleader behind the Gophers resurgence on the national collegiate wrestling scene, J. was an assistant coach under Dan Gable at Iowa from 1976-83 and served as the interim head coach of the 1983-84 Big Ten and NCAA champion Hawkeye squad. A member of the 1972 U.S. Olympic team, he has served as an assistant coach on the 1976, 1980, 1984 and 1988 U.S. Olympic teams, and was the head coach of the U.S. team at the 1983 Pan American Games.

"All six of our guys have a chance to be seeded in the Top 12," Robinson said. "So even without **Nix** we feel that we still have an outside chance. We're darkhorses once again just like the Big Ten's. We're going to have to get two or three of these guys in the finals, and the other two or three will have to come back. If we can do that, then we can still win the tournament with six. **Gordy Morgan** should be seeded around two, three or four, **Marty Morgan** should probably be seeded around fifth, **Dave Dean** should be seeded around third, **Chris Short** should be seeded somewhere between eight and twelve, **Jim Hamel** will probably be somewhere between eight and twelve, and **Jeff Balcom** will probably be anywhere from six to twelve. Had we had **Nix**, there were even some people who were picking us to win, but we can't worry about that. But it does show an indication of where we are and how far we've come."

GOPHER GYMNASTS CONTINUE TO ROLL; BIG TEN CHAMPIONSHIPS ON TAP NEXT (9-1 Overall/6-0 Big Ten)

The sixth-ranked Gophers men's gymnastics team continue their winning ways last week, scoring a season-high 280.10 points to outdistance 12th-ranked Wisconsin (275.15) and 17th-ranked Northern Illinois (266.00) in Madison, WI on Friday, and then coming back strong on Sunday to record a 277.90-275.30 victory over 10th-ranked Iowa in Iowa City.

Over The 280 Mark: The Gophers surpassed the 280 point plateau on Friday evening with a steady across the board performance that resulted in a final score of 280.10. Junior **Mark McKiernan** (Darien, CT) registered a season-high score of 9.85 on the parallel bars, while sophomore **Jay Caputo** (Longwood, FL) connected for a season highwater mark in the horizontal bar with a 9.70. With the NCAA 5-Score System (3 Away, 2 Home Meets), the meet was especially important to the Gophers with the Big Ten and NCAA Meets looming ahead.

Regular Season Finale: The Gophers finished off a 9-1 dual meet season with Sunday's victory over Iowa. Pacing the Gophers in the win, were back-to-back 1-2 finishes in the floor exercise and pommel horse. Junior **Dan Zimpher** (Kent, OH) captured the floor exercise with a score of 9.25, followed closely by **Caputo** with a 9.20. On the pommel horse, senior **Brad Pries** (Bloomington, MN) led the way with a season-high score of 9.75. **McKiernan** finished in the runner-up slot with a 9.65.

Big Ten Championships: The Gophers will now prepare for the Big Ten Championships to be held on March 24-25 in Madison, WI. With four schools (Illinois - 4th, Ohio State - 5th, **MINNESOTA** - 6th, Iowa - 10th) from the conference appearing in the latest Top 10 national rankings, the competition promises to be fierce indeed.

MINNESOTA ADVANCES IN NCAA BASKETBALL TOURNAMENT

Minnesota's Golden Gophers, under the guidance of third-year coach Clem Haskins, have earned the right to advance in the 1989 NCAA championship basketball tournament.

After posting two consecutive wins in the first and second rounds of play at Greensboro, NC, last week, Minnesota now moves on to the East Regional semi-finals at East Rutherford, NJ, as part of this year's "Sweet Sixteen."

The Golden Gophers downed Kansas State of the Big Eight Conference 86-75 in its' first assignment last Thursday and then downed upstart Siena of the ECAC North Atlantic 80-67 in the second contest on Saturday.

"We're pleased to be moving ahead in the NCAA tournament," Haskins acknowledged, "and we're proud of what we have accomplished so far." And he should be. His current band of gutty but undermanned cagers now have equalled the best NCAA effort ever by a University of Minnesota contingent.

And, as they advance to the regional tournament at the Meadowlands to take on highly-ranked Duke of the Atlantic Coast Conference at 7:30 p.m. (EST) on Friday, they will do so knowing they now boast a five-game winning streak.... their longest of the current campaign.

Minnesota also knows that it will take an overall record of 19-11 into Friday's confrontation with the Blue Devils, and that's the best for a Golden Gopher five since the 1981-82 campaign when the U of M finished 23-6 and lost to Louisville in the first round of NCAA regional play.

Duke and Minnesota have met only once before, that in the Dixie Classic during the 1954-55 campaign when the Golden Gophers prevailed by a 79-73 margin. Over the years, Minnesota has a 5-8 record against ACC teams, and the most-recent meeting was in the Winston Tire Classic in Los Angeles during the 1980-81 season when the Golden Gophers downed North Carolina 76-60. The only post-season tourney confrontation was in 1979-80 when Virginia beat the U of M in the NIT finals 58-55.

Coach Haskins doesn't plan any lineup changes for Friday night's contest with Duke. That means Jim Shikenjanski, who had his best effort of the season (and maybe his career) in the crucial win over Siena when he scored 17 points and had four rebounds.

In the backcourt Minnesota again will go with Kevin Lynch and Melvin Newbern. Lynch had a fine two-game set at Greensboro, scoring 18 against Kansas State and then adding 14 more against Siena. Newbern tallied 12 against KSU and then exploded for 17 in the most-recent NCAA outing against the Saints. He also had a total of eight steals and 11 ASSISTS (eight against Siena) in those two games.

Up front Walter Bond (he scored eight in each of the games at Greensboro) will be joined by Willie Burton, Minnesota's Most Valuable Player this season, as Minnesota's starting forwards against Duke.

Burton was they key aginst both Kansas State and Siena in the first and second rounds of play. He had 29 points (a game high) and 13 rebounds against Kansas State and then tallied 19 more points while cornering 11 more rebounds against Siena. Those were All-America type performances.

But now it is Duke. The assignment is bigger for the Golden Gophers. The task is larger and the challenge overwhelming. Minnesota knows, however, that the potential rewards fall into that same category.

Minneapolis, MN---"Well, at least we don't have to worry about scouting our next opponent," was the statement made by University of Minnesota hockey coach Doug Woog Sunday.

His next opponent couldn't be more familiar. . .the U. of Wisconsin Badgers.

Wisconsin qualified to play a best of three series at Mariucci Arena Friday and Saturday, and Sunday (if necessary) by winning its first round NCAA series at St. Lawrence, 2-0. The Badgers defeated the Saints 3-1 and 4-2. Minnesota, by receiving the #2 West seed and a first round bye, has been idle the last two weekends.

Minnesota (31-10-3) and Wisconsin (25-14-5) have already met five times this season. The Gophers captured all four regular season games, 3-2 in overtime and 4-2 at Madison to open the season in October, and 4-1 and 5-2 at Mariucci Arena in February to end regular season play.

The lone Badger victory came in Minnesota's last game. Wisconsin won 4-3 in the third place game of the WCHA Playoff Championships at the Saint Paul Civic Center March 6.

At stake this weekend is the trip to the NCAA Championships being conducted at the Civic Center March 30 through April 1. Minnesota has made it to the final four each of the last three years, but lost each time in a semifinal game.

"The fact that we had no control over who our next opponent would be answers the question almost everyone asked us all last week," Woog continued. "The only thing I'm not pleased with is the brackets.

"With Wisconsin and ourselves playing in the second round, one of us will not make it to the Civic Center. It's too bad when we have two WCHA teams still in the running that each one doesn't gain the opportunity to make it to the championships on its own. That would be a great plus for our league.

"I'm also sorry our playoff champion, Northern Michigan, didn't make it through the first round. The more opportunities the WCHA has to display its talents and balance, the better it is for all of us in our league."

Woog gave his team most of last week off to concentrate on final exams. The entire squad went back to hard work Saturday and Sunday, however, but will get Monday off, too, for the final day of exams.

"Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday will call for extensive practices as we have to sharpen up from being off from competition since March 6," Woog added. "Whatever the case, I believe our squad will be ready for the challenge, and at full strength. There is an awful lot at stake for both teams."

This weekend marks the 17th time a U. of Minnesota hockey team has made it to the NCAA playoffs. Gopher teams have been in the NCAA final four 13 times winning national crowns in 1974, 1976 and 1979. Other Gopher teams reached the championship games of 1953, 1954, 1971, 1975 and 1981.

When looking at scoring production through Minnesota's first four playoff games (a sweep of Colorado College and two losses at Saint Paul), a surprising name comes to the top in the scoring column.

Senior co-captain and defenseman Todd Richards has scored six points on a goal and five assists to lead his teammates. Richards, in his fourth year of varsity play, already owns school career records for most points (156) and assists (127) by a defenseman.

Right behind Richards comes freshman center Larry Olimb (2-3=5) and sophomore center Jason Miller (1-4=5). Junior wing Dave Nuggerud has the most UM goals in the playoffs with three.

Minnesota's Hobey Baker finalist, junior goalie Robb Stauber, is 2-2 in the playoff nets and sports a 2.82 goals allowed average. Stauber, of course, won the Baker Award last year.

Senior **Dave Dean** (Montrose, MI), freshman **Chris Short** (Inver Grove Heights, MN), sophomore **Marty Morgan** (Bloomington, MN), and junior **Marty Morgan** (Bloomington, MN) garnered All-America honors to lead the Gophers wrestling team to a seventh-place finish at the NCAA Championships held Thursday thru Saturday in Oklahoma City, OK.

Dean and **Short** finished third at 177 and 190 pounds respectively, while the **Morgan** brothers also got into the Gophers' All-America act. **Marty** finished sixth at 167 pounds, while **Gordy** was eighth at 158 pounds.

He injured the anterior cruciate ligament of his right knee just 38 seconds into his championship match at 118 pounds against Northwestern's Jack Griffin at the Big Ten Tournament on March 5 at West Lafayette, IN. **Nix** finished second at 118 pounds at the NCAA's as a freshman last year, and would have undoubtedly been one of the favorites in the weight class in Oklahoma City.

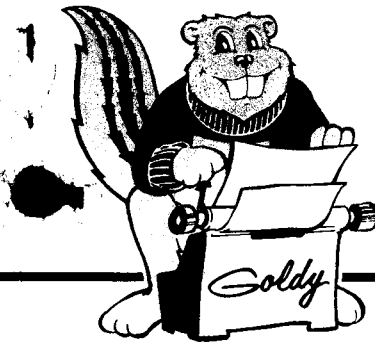

Minneapolis, MN---For the fourth consecutive year, head coach Doug Woog and his U. of Minnesota hockey Gophers are knocking on the NCAA Championship Tournament door.

Three years in a row the door wouldn't budge. Three straight semifinal game losses dampened what were great, great seasons. This time Woog and Co. hope the door comes ajar.

Last weekend saw Minnesota (33-10-3) qualify for the school's 14th trip to the NCAA championships. The Gophers took the measure of Wisconsin by identical 4-2 scores in a best of three NCAA second Round series at Mariucci Arena.

Next up for Minnesota is a 7:35 p.m. meet Friday against Maine (31-12-0) at the Saint Paul Civic Center. The winner goes on to the title game Saturday evening with the loser playing the third place game that afternoon.

The other bracket finds Harvard (29-3-0) going up against Michigan State (35-8-1) in Thursday's semifinal at the Civic Center. The tournament was announced sold out in mid-February.

Minnesota has now reached NCAA hockey's final four more times (14) than any other NCAA Division I school. This also marks the 17th year Minnesota has been in the NCAA playoffs, the 8th time in the 1980s.

Local electronic coverage of the NCAA championships is as follows: KSTP-1500 AM will carry all four games: KITN-TV, Ch. 29, will carry UM's game Friday, and, if UM loses, will carry Saturday's 2 p.m. game: ESPN-TV has the exclusive rights to the 7 p.m. championship Saturday; and WAYL-980 AM will broadcast whichever game UM plays Saturday.

Minnesota and Wisconsin played about as tight a checking series as anyone has seen at Mariucci Arena. Both goalies, Hobey Baker Award nominee Robb Stauber for UM, and Wisconsin's Curtis Joseph, were equally sharp. Nobody got a fluke goal. All but one was hard earned. The easy one was an empty-netter by UM's David Snuggerud to clinch Saturday's win after Joseph had been pulled for an extra attacker.

Junior wing Tom Chorske and his center, sophomore Jason Miller, were the scoring heroes for Minnesota. Chorske came up with the first goal of the series and added two assists in Friday's contest. He assisted on two more goals Saturday, including Miller's game winner.

Miller did it the other way around. He assisted on UM's last two goals Friday, and then scored the tying and winning goals Saturday as the Gophers came from a 2-1 second period deficit to win.

Tom Pederson, Todd Richards and Grant Bischoff chipped in with goals Friday, Bischoff's the game winner, while Lance Pitlick and Snuggerud's empty net goal were the other Gopher scores Saturday.

How closely was the series played? Stauber totaled 46 saves for the two games, Joseph 45.

Snuggerud carries a slim 1-point scoring lead over Chorske into the final two games of the season for Minnesota. "Snuggy" has 47 points on a team-high 28 goals to go with 19 assists, while Chorske's totals read 25-21-46.

Stauber's goals allowed average has dropped to 2.37. Last year going into the final four tourney at Lake Placid, his average yield read 2.66.

The Gophers practice at Mariucci Arena today and Tuesday, then move to the Civic Center to work out Wednesday and Thursday.

An NCAA news conference is scheduled for 4:45 p.m. Wednesday at the Civic Center. All four head coaches and several players will be present.

GOLDEN GOPHERS END BASKETBALL SEASON WITH 19-12 RECORD

Minnesota's Golden Gopher basketball team finished the 1988-89 season with an overall record of 19-12, and it equalled the University's previous high of the NCAA's Sweet Sixteen.

While the Golden Gophers fell to Duke 87-70 in the first round of the East Region tournament, the season remains an excellent one and a satisfying one to Coach Clem Haskins and his cagers.

"We can hold up our heads with pride," Haskins said after the loss to the Blue Devils in East Rutherford, NJ. "We are disappointed with the final loss, but we can regard it as a fantastic year."

And that was the way Minnesota fans regarded the total picture. Fantastic. Picked to finish in the cellar of the Big Ten prior to the start of the season, the Golden Gophers wound up fifth with a 9-9 mark.

Then they advanced to the NCAA tournament and beat Kansas State and Siena in the first and second rounds of play at Greensboro, NC, before moving on to the East Regional where Duke, eventually a final-four participant, ended Minnesota's dream for this season.

"Our season and our record are something to build on," Coach Haskins said. "All season long we have maintained that we were striving to take a step forward and upward. But we knew we were taking one step at a time. We want to climb that mountain, and we've taken a big step towards reaching that goal."

What more will it take to reach that goal? "Duke was strong and aggressive," Haskins pointed out, "and that is what we have to become with hard work in the off season."

Haskins was quick to point out, however, that he was proud of his players and their efforts, and he said, "Our future at the University of Minnesota looks very bright."

Helping brighten the view is the fact that the Golden Gophers had only one senior on the squad that made the trip to the NCAA's East Region tournament..... 6-2 guard Ray Gaffney.

A valuable contributor to Minnesota's success, Gaffney will be missed. He scored 263 points this season and was Minnesota's top scorer from the three-point range with 30 (of 73 attempts).

But the rest of the squad should be back including forward Walter Bond who was named Minnesota's Most Improved Player this season, and Richard Coffey, another forward who led the Golden Gophers in rebounding and came back after missing eight games with a knee injury to play well against Duke.

Also returning with hope for the future is Bob Martin, the towering freshman that Coach Haskins describes as "Our center of the future" as well as Jim Shikenjanski, Minnesota's center of the present. Plus additional squad members such as Mario Green, Terence Williams, Connell Lewis and Rob Metcalf.

Plus two future honors candidates.....guard Melvin Newbern and forward Willie Burton. They were standouts in 1988-89 and should reap post-season accolades next year.

Newbern was Minnesota's second leading scorer with 453 points, and he topped the Golden Gophers with in assists with 135 and in steals (as well as the Big Ten) with 101. Burton was Minnesota's leading scorer with 557 points (he's now 13th

Minneapolis, MN---After enjoying one of Minnesota's best spring trips ever, the U. of Minnesota baseball Gophers now must host three nationally ranked teams in this year's PILLSBURY CLASSIC at the Metrodome Thursday through Sunday.

Minnesota, 6-5 overall, won six of eight games against NCAA Division I opponents last week in the Los Angeles area. According to head coach John Anderson, that may well be one of the best spring trip records ever recorded at Minnesota.

"We normally go out on spring break to simply spread our wings and see what we have to look forward to when the Big Ten season rolls around," Anderson offered. "We usually expect to take our lumps against schools who have already played 20 or 30 games. For us it's usually out first time playing outdoors."

That was not the case this year as earlier in March the Gophers traveled to Miami, FL, and dropped three games to the Miami Hurricanes. Minnesota, however, led as late as the 8th inning in two of those contests.

So now it's back home for the 5TH ANNUAL PILLSBURY CLASSIC. In a change in scheduling this year, the CLASSIC features two exhibition games Saturday evening and Sunday afternoon between the Minnesota Twins and Chicago Cubs. Here in the entire schedule of this year's PILLSBURY CLASSIC.

As of this morning (Tuesday), Oklahoma State and Arizona were ranked 8th and 10th in one national collegiate poll, with Arizona 7th and OSU 10th in another national figuring. Up until last week, Georgia Tech also held a spot among the nation's top 20. The Engineers fell from the rankings this week.

OSU sports a 20-4 record and the Cowboys are led by pitcher/designated hitter Ray Ortiz. Ortiz is hitting .442 with 14 home runs and 36 runs batted in. On the mound the lefty is 3-1 with a 4.32 earned run average.

Arizona, coached by Gopher All-American Jerry Kindall, is 24-11 on the season, and 10-5 in the PAC 10 Southern Division. The leading UA batter is catcher Alan Zinter. He has a .369 average with 11 home runs and 47 RBIs.

The top RHP for Arizona is Scott Erickson (11-1, 2.73), while their best lefty is Lance Dickson (1-4, 5.70). Dickson, however, has 48 strike outs in 47 IP.

Georgia Tech owns a 17-10 record and is led by third baseman Andy Bruce. Bruce is hitting a torrid .415 with 5 home runs and 30 RBIs. The best GT pitcher is a freshman, Marc Pisciotta (4-0, 4.28), who throws from the right side. Top lefty is Doug Creek (3-3, 5.49).

More Gophers Baseball - 2

Minnesota came up with key hitting and pitching during its stay on the west coast. In 11 games to date, the Gophers are batting at an even .300 clip with its opponents hitting .276.

Even though UM trails its opponents in earned run average, 5.55 to 5.27, several new members of the mound corps have backed up the faith put in them by coach Anderson and his staff.

Jon Wroge, a transfer to UM this season, owns a 2-0 record and a stingy 1.42 ERA. Although he only pitched 6.1 innings, Wroge has allowed just one earned run. As of now he appears to be Minnesota's top reliever.

Junior lefty Denny Neagle, after being way off target in the Miami series, came back strong last week. His record stands 1-2 with one save, but his stratospheric ERA has been lowered to 6.62 after being well into double digits. Neagle is expected to be the ace of Minnesota's staff this season. He will probably get the starting nod Thursday Oklahoma State.

Others who have impressed on the mound include senior Shane Kangas (1-0, 3.20) and freshman John Lowery (1-0, 4.63).

Another newcomer, freshman shortstop Brent Gates, has been the biggest surprise both at the plate and in the field. Gates leads UM in hitting with a .400 average, has the most hits, 18, and has only committed three errors while handling 45 chances.

"We believed from the start that (Brent) Gates had the potential to play major college baseball, but we didn't know if he could do it right from the start," Anderson said. "We have lost two shortstops in two years to injury and pro signing, so to see Gates come through for us so soon is a genuine bonus."

Another who is off to a good start is senior Jay Anderson. Anderson had to play SS the last two years, but now appears more comfortable at third base. His is hitting at a .349 clip and also playing steady afield.

Brian Raabe, the junior second baseman who was named pre-season All-America by national publications, overcame a slow start and hit his stride in California. Raabe collected his first two career home runs last week while upping his bat average to .348.

He is tied for the team lead in runs batted in with nine and is second only to Gates in hits with 16.

Minnesota's outfield appears to have found a new member in sophomore Greg Johnson. Previously a third baseman, Johnson has taken hold of center field with a .345 bat average and superior defensive play.

Several players who did not make the trip to California could make it into the lineup at the PILLSBURY this weekend. One is freshman outfielder George Behr who has the potential to be Minnesota's top power hitter this season. Behr injured a knee during winter drills and has yet to make an appearance.

Once the PILLSBURY CLASSIC winds down Sunday evening, the Gophers return to Siebert Field for non-conference games Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday against St. Olaf, St. Cloud State and Minnesota-Duluth, respectively.

Next weekend finds the 1988 regular season Big Ten champion Michigan coming to the Twin Cities to open conference play. The Gophers and Wolverines play 1 p.m. doubleheaders Saturday and Sunday, April 8-9, at Siebert Field.

Minnesota is the defending Big Ten champion having won the playoff tournament hosted by Michigan at Ann Arbor last May.

When everything had settled, the Gophers found themselves in third-place in the final team standings, a lofty position that the program has not attained since the 1963 season. Amazingly, the Gophers broke school records in all but one race in the meet. **Egeland** captured the 100 breaststroke in 54.92, set a new all-time Big Ten record of 1:47.48 in the 200 IM, and then joined **Dan Tripps**, sophomore **Bengt Zikarsky** (Erlangen, West Germany), and **Assmus** to win the 400 freestyle relay in a new Big Ten Meet Record time of 2:56.18, and **Assmus**, **Outcalt**, and senior **Mark Granovsky** (St. Paul, MN) to set another Big Ten Meet Record in the 800 freestyle relay in 6:32.00.

"On a scale from 0-10, it was an 11½," said an ecstatic Gophers head coach Dennis Dale following the meet. "Overall, things went very, very well. Our swimmers were constantly amazing the fans, the coaches and sometimes even themselves."

Leader-of-the-Pack: Minnesota's "All-Everything" **Dan Egeland** went out in style in the final Big Ten Championships of his illustrious career. All he did over the three days of the competition was set seven school records, four individual and three on relays, set two Big Ten Meet Records on Gopher relay units, and set a new all-time Big Ten Record in the 200 IM. FOOTBALL COACHING CLINIC ON TAP AT U THIS WEEKEND

Spring football practice at the University of Minnesota returned to high gear this week after a two-week layoff following the completion of winter quarter exams and an abbreviated break from the classroom and football field.

But now those drills have resumed, and the University of Minnesota will highlight the week's activities with its' annual Golden Gopher Spring Football clinic for area coaches.

Head Coach John Gutekunst has indicated that the clinic will get underway at the University of Minnesota's indoor football facility on Friday, March 31, with registration at 7:30 a.m.

Lecture and technique demonstration sessions will be conducted by Golden Gopher assistant coaches through the morning and afternoon until clinic visitors adjourn to attend the U of M practice session at 3:30 p.m.

Those lecture and demonstration sessions will continue on Saturday until the Golden Gophers wind up the clinic and their week of practice with a scrimmage in mid-afternoon.

Gutekunst then will run his squad through three additional days of practice next week, including a final scrimmage a week from Friday. That will be the end of things for U of M football until the squad returns for fall drills in mid-August.

"We aren't able to hold our traditional spring game in the dome this year because of a conflict with dates for Twins baseball," Gutekunst pointed out, "but we do hope to hold a passing scrimmage in the Metrodome next fall prior to the start of the season."

Not Bad For A Rookie: **Sean Quackenbush** exploded on the scene at the Big Ten Championships for the Gophers. He qualified for the NCAA Championships and set new school records in both the 100 (48.90) and 200 (1:46.42) butterfly events, as well as a member of the Gophers 400 medley relay unit. On top of that, he chipped in valuable points by going out of his area of specialty and finishing 14th in the 200 IM in 1:52.42. He was honored as the "Freshman-of-the-Championship" for his efforts.

"I think he surprised just about everybody," Dale said. "As the meet went on, he swam better and better. He did just a super job."

Relays Covered: The Gophers will be entered in all five relays in the meet which is ultimately important as they shoot for team points. The points are doubled in the relay events.

"You cannot be in the Top 20 without scoring some relay points," Dale said. "It's possible, if you score really heavily in the relays, to finish in the Top 10 without having an individual place in the meet. We expect to have our individuals place, and I think that in most cases, our relays can be somewhere between 9th and 12th. We can rack up a lot of points that way."

Do You Remember?: In his fourth season at the helm of the Gophers program, Dennis Dale has been the driving force behind Minnesota's resurgence on the national collegiate swimming and diving scene. Ranked No. 14 in the final dual meet national rankings, the Gophers' third-place finish at the Big Ten Championships is a 26-year highwater mark for the program. The Gophers also garnered third-place honors at the 1963 Big Ten Meet. Dale was honored as the Big Ten "Coach-of-the-Year" following the meet. Ironically, as the Gophers head into the NCAA Championships with a high finish etched in their minds, Dale can look back to the 1967 season, when as a senior he led the team to their most recent Top 10 NCAA finish. He finished seventh in the 100 backstroke and led off the ninth-place 400 medley relay team for the Gophers to earn All-America status and help Minnesota to 10th-place in the final standings.

"I think that the Top 10 may be a little unrealistic for us this year," Dale said. "I don't feel as though we are strong enough to do that. But I think that the Top 15 is certainly a realistic goal and one that we can really shoot for."

Minneapolis, MN---The U. of Minnesota hockey Gophers were once again denied the golden chalice of their game as Harvard won its first NCAA ice championship ever by winning 4-3 in overtime at Saint Paul last Saturday.

In front of a SRO crowd of 15,861 in the Civic Center, Ed Krayer scored off a rebound play at 4:16 of the extra period to end Minnesota hopes of finally coming through in its fourth consecutive trip to the national final four.

It was, according to just about anyone who saw the game in person or on national cable television, a college hockey classic.

Both teams exhibited excellent skating, attacking and defense throughout. Both teams showed great transition games. Both goal tenders were outstanding from the first save to the last.

One could say that Minnesota was done in by the pipes. No less than four Gopher shots clanged off the goal standards in the game. An inch or so one way or the other could well have brought a fourth national title to UM. That is now, however, just wishful thinking.

Minnesota ended its 1988-89 campaign with a sparkling 34-11-3 record. The win total is just one shy of the school record 35 wins in 1985-86.

By his teams posting a record of 137-48-4, head coach Doug Woog has won more games in his four years at Minnesota than any other NCAA Division I school covering the same span. But you can bet that coach Woog, his staff and players would trade the whole thing for one big, big victory at the NCAA finals.

Last weekend marked the fourth consecutive year Minnesota has made it to hockey's final four. But the result was the same. This year, at least, UM made it to the title game. The three previous trips ended in semifinal losses.

The appearance in Saint Paul last weekend was Minnesota's 14th trip to the national college finals. That is the most times in the NCAA Division I finals of any school in the nation.

Junior center Jon Anderson, who scored a hat trick in leading Minnesota to a 7-4 win against Michigan State in a semifinal game Friday, banged in the first goal of the game for the only score of the first period Saturday.

Harvard came back with two goals in the second period before Gopher Jason Miller tied the game 2-2 with a power play score in the same period.

Harvard took a 3-2 lead when tournament MVP Ted Donato scored for the Crimson at 12:53 of the final stanza. That lead lasted until 16:34 when Minnesota, after a long string of constant pressure, finally cashed in.

Junior Peter Hankinson one-timed a perfect feed from freshman defenseman Tom Pederson and scored from the left side for the final tie at 16:34.

Then came the decisive goal that gave Harvard its first national hockey title.

By outscoring teammate Dave Snuggerud 3-2 in the two games, Tom Chorske, like Snuggerud a U.S. Olympic Team member last year, forged a scoring tie. Both players ended the season with 49 points. Snuggerud ended with the most goals, 29, to go with 20 assists while Chorske's totals read 25-24=49.

Goalie Robb Stauber ended his third season by setting several more school records, including 73 career wins. His goals allowed average this season ended at 2.43 while winning 26 games and losing only eight.

A second straight WCHA championship was another highlight of UM's 12th straight winning season, and its 5th consecutive year featuring more than 30 victories.

GOLDEN GOPHERS TO CONCLUDE SPRING GRID DRILLS

Three more practice sessions are on tap for the University of Minnesota football team this week and then the Golden Gophers will stow away their gear until fall practice opens in mid-August.

Coach John Gutekunst will put his charges through one more scrimmage late in the week, and that will be the final opportunity to check out the Golden Gophers under game-like conditions until next fall.

"We aren't able to have a spring game as traditionally has been the case," Gutekunst explained. "This year's schedule does not permit us to have such an event in the Metrodome, and our own indoor facility won't permit us to open up anything to the public. It just would not be safe. We do plan to have a passing scrimmage in the dome next fall prior to the start of the season, so our fans might be able to get a preview at that time."

Minnesota did go through a grueling three-hour scrimmage last weekend, and apparently the results were indicative of the progress made this spring..... and apparently the coaching staff was at least somewhat pleased with what it saw.

The scrimmage, billed as part of the annual coaches clinic at the U of M, was pitted as a possible evaluation period for the top four quarterback candidates currently battling for the number one position.

All four seemed to draw praise from Coach Gutekunst for their efforts, and that may indicate that the Golden Gophers are not ready to tab one of those signal-callers as the starter.

Scott Schaffner was number one last fall, and he's fighting to keep that spot. His challengers are Marquell Fleetwood, Rob Nittolo and Keswic Joiner, and all of them saw action last Saturday.

"Scott and Marquell both did some things very well," Gutekunst said after the three-hour session. But he added that "Rob and Keswic also did some good things" in the workout.

Three of Minnesota's runningbacks also drew a tie-of-the-hat for their efforts in the scrimmage. That trio included Albert Settembrino, Marcus Evans and Rick Meyer.

GOPHER BASEBALL TEAM GOES 2-1-1 AT PILLSBURY CLASSIC; MONSON HONORED AS TOURNEY MVP;
BIG TEN OPENER THIS WEEKEND AGAINST MICHIGAN

With tourney MVP **Jeff Monson** (Bloomington, MN) showing the way, the Gopher baseball team went 2-1-1 at the Pillsbury Classic held last Thursday thru Sunday at the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome.

Handcuffed by righthander Tim Pugh, the Gophers dropped a 4-1 decision to No. 8 Oklahoma State in the tourney opener on Thursday. Pugh limited the Gophers to just four hits on the evening, two of which were by freshman shortstop **Brent Gates** (Grandville, MI). Freshman **David Anderson** (Barrington, IL) withstood a rocky second inning, where the Cowboys struck for three of their four runs in the contest, to turn in a fine outing for the Gophers against the powerful Big Eight Conference club. He went 6 2/3 innings, surrendering eight hits, and three earned runs, while striking out four.

The bats came alive on Friday night as the Gophers scored a 14-4 victory over four-time defending Atlantic Coast Conference champion. **Monson** led the offensive attack with a superlative performance. The sophomore first baseman went four-for-five, with eight RBI's, and a run scored. His bases-loaded triple in the first inning started the offensive fireworks and sent the Gophers on their way. Senior **Jay Anderson** (Bloomington, MN) went three-for-four, with two RBI's and three runs scored in the game. Sophomore **Eric Porter** (Mt. Prospect, IL) raised his '89 season record to 1-2 on the mound, allowing just four hits, three earned runs and striking out four in seven innings of work.

On Saturday the Gophers and Arizona battled to a 5-5 tie through seven innings. The game will go down in the books as a tie, after it was halted because of the Twins-Cubs exhibition game that was scheduled. **Gates**, along with sophomore **Greg Johnson** (Edina, MN) and freshman **Dan Wilson** (Barrington, IL) each recorded a pair of hits in the contest. Down 5-1 through 5½ innings, the Gophers rallied for two runs each in the bottom halves of the sixth and seventh innings to finish in the stalemate with the Wildcats.

In front of a national TV audience on ESPN, the Gophers shot out to a 6-0 lead, saw that evaporate in a six-run fifth inning by Oklahoma State, and then rallied for the winning run in the seventh to score a rousing 7-6 victory on Sunday. Fueling the fire once again was none other than MVP **Monson**, who finished off a sparkling tournament by going three-for-four at the plate with a run scored and an RBI. Freshman lefthander **John Lowery** (Sheperdstown, WV) relieved starter **Denny Neagle** (Gambrills, MD), and went the final five innings to collect the victory on the hill. He allowed no runs and just two hits to finish the tournament with a spotless ERA through 6 2/3 innings of work and three separate appearances.

MVP Monson: **Monson** finished the four games by going 9-for-16 at the plate for a sparkling .563 average. He recorded a double and a triple en route to registering 10 RBI's, a pair of runs scored, and a perfect 1.000 fielding percentage in 29 total chances (27 PO, 2 AST) at first base. **Gates** at shortstop, and **Anderson** at third base, joined **Monson** on the All-Tournament Team. **Gates** went 5-for-13 at the plate for a .385 average, with seven runs scored and three RBI's. **Anderson** was 5-for-14 batting (.357 average), with six runs scored and four RBI's. He also did not make an error in 11 total chances in the field.

GOPHERS SWIMMING & DIVING TEAM BLAZES TO 11TH-PLACE FINISH AT NCAA CHAMPIONSHIPS

If there were any doubters still remaining, the Gophers swimming & diving team converted them to the ranks of the believers by finishing 11th in the final team standings at the NCAA Championships held Thursday thru Saturday at the IUPUI Natatorium in Indianapolis, IN.

The meet capped off an incredible season for the Gophers, who had earlier recorded a third-place finish at the Big Ten Championships, a lofty position that the program hasn't attained since the 1963 season, and registered an overall 11-1 dual meet record during the season. The 11th-place finish at the NCAA Championships is the best for the Gophers since they placed 10th at the 1967 national meet.

"The meet was a capsule of how the season went," said Gophers head coach Dennis Dale. "The season started off well, and just kept getting better and better. The NCAA Championships were like the frosting on the cake. We did better than anyone expected and that's just great."

Minneapolis, MN---After winning just one of three games against Michigan in their opening Big Ten series of the year, Minnesota's baseball Gophers now face the unenviable task of playing the next 10 conference outings on the road.

The defending Big Ten champions begin their trek tomorrow (Wednesday) with two games at Iowa followed by a weekend trip to Indiana. The Gophers and Hoosiers play doubleheaders Saturday and Sunday in Bloomington.

"I was, however, fairly pleased with our overall play. Yes, we did have some key errors that led to six of their eight series runs being unearned. But I am not concerned about our defense. We're going to be OK in that area."

Michigan took the first two series games Sunday at the Metrodome 3-0 and 5-1 on two-hitters by their starting pitchers. But on Monday morning, again in the Dome, the Gophers broke out with seven hits good for six runs in the third inning en route to a 6-3 victory.

Sophomore Eric Porter pitched 5 1/3 solid innings for Minnesota in evening his season record at 2-2. Jon Wroge mopped up allowing just one hit in 1 2/3 innings. Starter Denny Neagle (1-3) and reliever Shane Kangas (2-1) took the losses for Minnesota even though both pitched well.

Brian Raabe, Jon Anderson, Steve Calvert and Brian Hartmann came up with the run-scoring base hits in the big inning Monday.

Anderson said that because of playing seven conference games this week, his pitching staff could be stretched to the limit. As of Monday he had not made any decisions as to what his rotation would be this week.

The Golden Gopher gymnastics team will compete in the NCAA Championships this Thursday thru Saturday at the University of Nebraska in Lincoln, NE.

McKiernan Shines: Junior **Mark McKiernan** (Darien, CT) led the Gophers to their runner-up finish at the Big Ten Championships held March 24-25 in Madison, WI. **McKiernan** tallied a score of 56.75 in the optional phase of the all-around to trail Ohio State's Mike Racanelli (57.60) and Illinois' David Zeddies (58.00) heading into the compulsory round. He then scored a 9.40 on the pommel horse to catapult past both Racanelli (8.85) and Zeddies (7.20) in the standings en route to the title with a score of 110.10.

McKiernan also won the pommel horse competition with a score of 9.75, finished sixth in the still rings with a 9.50, and claimed the runner-up slot on the parallel bars with a score of 9.65. He was honored as the Big Ten's Gymnast-of-the-Year following the meet.

The Best: The Gophers enter the NCAA meet as the top-ranked team on the parallel bars with a Five-Score Average of 47.29 in the event. **McKiernan** is ranked No. 1 individually in the event with a Five-Score Average of 9.73, while freshman **Leif Carlson** (Bloomington, MN) also cracked the national poll, coming in at No. 20 with a 9.47.

The Horse: Ranked second in the country with a Five-Score Average of 46.81 on the pommel horse, the Gophers showed why at the Big Ten Championships by taking three of the top six individual spots. **McKiernan** won the event, followed by senior **Brad Pries** (Bloomington, MN) in second with a 9.65 to **McKiernan's** 9.75. Junior **Mike Graham** (Green Bay, WI) finished sixth in the event with a score of 9.30.

Coach Roethlisberger: In his 18th season at the helm of the Gophers program, Fred Roethlisberger has led the University of Minnesota to seven Big Ten titles and five runner-up finishes in league action. His gymnasts have won 32 individual titles, and 14 of his Gopher athletes have competed for the US National Gymnastics Team. He was selected by his colleagues as Midwest Coach-of-the-Year in 1972 and 1978.

Roethlisberger competed in the 1966 World Championships, the 1967 Pan American Games and the 1968 Olympics in Mexico City. He was the second highest scorer for the US team in Mexico City, and captained the Pan American Games squad, en route to winning gold medals in the all-around, horizontal bar, and parallel bars at the competition in Winnipeg, Canada.

A 1966 graduate of the University of Wisconsin, where Roethlisberger was the first individual to receive the school's Athlete-of-the-Year award while participating in a sport other than football or basketball, Roethlisberger returned to his alma mater to earn his Masters Degree in 1970.

Roethlisberger's daughter, Marie, a six-time US National Team member, 1984 Olympian, and 17th-place finisher at the 1985 World Championships, will compete for the Gophers women's squad at the NCAA Championships in Athens, GA this weekend. She goes into the meet as the top-ranked at-large individual in the all-around competition.

FOOTBALL SEASON TICKET SALE OPENS

The 1989 Golden Gopher Football season ticket sale will open Monday, April 24, and current season ticket holders will have until Friday, May 19, to renew their priorities.

Prices are unchanged from 1988, so the six-game package will be sold for \$96.00. Season ticket holders will realize a saving on the Nebraska game, since tickets for that game will be sold for \$20.00 on a single game basis. Tickets for other games will be \$16.00 each.

The Economy Plan season ticket option also remains available at \$66.00. Seating for Economy Plan patrons is currently section 100, but the area is expandable if demand warrants it.

According to Ticket Manager Ken Buell, the sale opening is about three weeks later than usual. "The successes of the hockey and basketball teams meant a lot of post season action for both, and since we were already heavily involved with the WCHA and NCAA hockey tournaments, it seemed appropriate to let things settle a bit before starting the football sale. It was a nice problem to have, and we appreciate everyone's patience while we get caught up."

On July 1, the season ticket phase of the sale ends and the single game ticket sale begins. "We have a great home game schedule - the kind we like to sell," said Buell, "It's not very often that we can offer the likes of Nebraska, Ohio State, and Michigan in one season. We're also exploring the possibility of creating a couple of single game packages, and we will have more information available when that sale opens."

There will be some restrictions on the sale of tickets for the Nebraska game and for the Iowa game in Iowa City. During the month of July, sales for both games will be restricted to Minnesota residents and limited to four tickets per customer. If tickets still are available for Nebraska on August 1, all restrictions for that game will be lifted. Sales for the Iowa game, however, will remain limited until the entire allotment is sold.

The purpose of the restriction is to protect the interests of Golden Gopher fans and to make sure that as many fans as possible have a chance to order tickets for these very popular games.

Buell is optimistic about the coming season. "We hope the success and the spirit of the past winter will carry right into the fall. We're looking forward to a great season, both on the field and at the gate."

Minneapolis, MN---After winning three of four wild games at Indiana last weekend, Minnesota's baseball Gophers head back on the road this weekend for four games against Northwestern at Evanston, IL.

The Gophers, 17-10-1 overall, improved their league record to 5-4 in the Big Ten by winning three games at Indiana after losing the opener 2-1 in nine innings Saturday.

The loss was doubly hard as junior lefty Denny Neagle (1-4) pitched the full nine innings allowing just six hits and two earned runs. In Neagle's last two Big Ten starts, his teammates have only come up with seven hits and two runs.

Saturday's second game saw Minnesota bats start to come alive. The Gophers scored five runs in the first two innings of the 6-1 win to back the combined 5-hit pitching of winner Shane Kangas (3-1) and reliever Karl Johnson.

Sophomore catcher Dan Wilson hit a costly double driving in two first inning runs. When cruising into second base, he sprained an ankle and will be lost for two weeks.

Freshman shortstop Brent Gates slammed a two-run homer in the second inning and UM scored once more in the fourth when junior second baseman Brian Rabbe drove in the sixth run with a single.

Sunday's games were something else. In fact, the doubleheader started at 12:03 p.m., and didn't finish until after 1:30 p.m. MONDAY!

After Minnesota came from an 8-5 deficit to win the first game 15-13 in nine innings, the second game was called by darkness with the score tied 11-11 after eight complete innings.

The teams returned to the field Monday and played just one inning. With two outs and an 0-2 count, sophomore reserve outfielder John Kopfer slammed his first home run of the year to put the Gophers ahead 12-11.

Junior transfer Jon Wroge (2-0) gained his second save of the season by facing just four batters in the Indiana half of the 9th.

Sunday's first game featured numerous turnarounds. The Gopher rally started on solo home runs by first baseman Jeff Monson in the 5th inning, and another by freshman outfielder Keith Krenke in the 6th. It was Krenke's first Big Ten start and his second homer of the game. He belted out a 2-run home run in the second inning.

Minnesota then scored five times in the 7th inning to go ahead 12-8 only to see Indiana roar back with four runs to tie the score.

The Gophers then put the win away with three more runs in the top of the 9th. Two runs scored on Raabe's triple. He later scored on a bunt single by Gates. Gates had hit a two-run homer in the first inning.

Minnesota's fourth pitcher, freshman John Lowery (5-0), gained the win in relief in spite of giving up a lead off home run in the 9th to Indiana designated hitter Bill Jordan.

For the weekend the Gophers slammed out nine home runs, 10 doubles and one triple in outscoring the Hoosiers 34-27. The wind was blowing out all four games which didn't do too much for pitchers on either team.

Minnesota now stands fourth in the Big Ten standings at 5-4, three games behind Michigan (9-2).

Among Gopher hitters. Gates (.373), Monson (.371) and Jay Anderson (.370) and waging a battle to team leadership. On the mound, Wroge (1.80 ERA) leads his teammates after pitching 15.0 innings.

After reaching the finals of the high bar with a score of 9.55, **Farina** fell in the finals and finished 11th with a score of 8.35.

Two BIG Ten Wins: The Gophers won five of the six singles matches to put Friday's contest with No. 22 Indiana on ice. Senior **Duke Uihlein** (Lake Forest, IL) scored a huge three-set (7-5, 2-6, 6-4) victory over Indiana's Eoin Collins, ranked No. 53 nationally, at No. 1 singles to get the ball rolling the Gophers way. PRIORITY SEATING PLAN FOR FOOTBALL ANNOUNCED AT THE UNIVERSITY OF MINNESOTA

The University of Minnesota men's athletic department has announced plans to establish seating options that will be available to football season ticket purchasers who wish to enhance their seating locations through contributions to the Williams Fund.

The new options are designed to give those who contribute to the Williams Fund more input into the location assignments of their football season tickets while still taking into account the longevity of other season ticket holders who may choose not to contribute at this time.

"Ticket receipts, broadcast revenue, and our current fund-raising levels no longer pay for the operation of our self-supporting athletic program," said men's athletic director Rick Bay. "Even with the recent success of our basketball and hockey programs, the men's athletic department will still face an operating deficit situation this fiscal year, and unless steps are taken to increase revenue, the future projections would be no more encouraging. However, I should point out this problem is not unique to the University of Minnesota. Virtually every other Division I athletic program is relying on major fund-raising efforts to remain operational and competitive, and most of those institutions have installed some type of priority seating program. Compared to plans at many other universities, this is a modest approach which leaves 90 percent of the stadium, or more than 57,000 seats, unaffected by priority status."

The immediate concern of the fund-raising effort will be to raise money for student-athlete scholarships. Athletic scholarships are not provided by the University; they must be paid for by the men's athletic department. This year, scholarship costs are in the neighborhood of \$1.2 million, and such costs will continue to rise with inflation. Beyond that, plans are being made to improve the athletic facilities, many of which are the poorest in the Big Ten Conference.

For those currently located in preferred seating areas who do not contribute to this new program, their seats will not be relocated unless it is absolutely necessary - that is, in order to accommodate an increasing number of donors. Even then, such relocation will be as gradual as possible from season to season.

"We have always reserved the right to assign seating locations on a season-by-season basis," said Bay, "but we have tried to do so with sensitivity, and that will continue to be the case."

The Economy Plan seating option, in place since 1969, will remain available.

"We are implementing priority seating only out of financial necessity, to more clearly establish and define preferred seating options that have already been available, and to enhance the ability of season ticket holders to have more control over the assignment of their seat locations," Bay said. "We want an athletic program that is competitively successful while operating within NCAA rules, that is academically superior, and is financially self-supporting."

GOPHERS BSB PLAYS NEXT 10 AT HOME

4/24/89

Minneapolis, MN---After a stretch in what seemed the U. of Minnesota baseball Gophers had become a permanent road team, Siebert Field becomes site of UM's next 10 games.

Beginning Tuesday with a single nonconference game at 3 p.m. against Northern Iowa, Minnesota next plays the U. of Iowa, second in the Big Ten, in a 1 p.m. double-header Wednesday.

The weekend sees third place Illinois invading Siebert Field for 1 p.m. doubleheaders both Saturday and Sunday.

Minnesota finishes its home stand next week with nonconference games at Siebert against Grandview College (1) Tuesday, May 2, and a pair against Iowa State Wednesday, May 3.

The Gophers fell from fourth to fifth place in the Big Ten standings last weekend by splitting its 4-game series at Northwestern. The Wildcats relied on crack pitching and timely hitting to take the first two weekend games Saturday, 2-1 in nine innings and 3-0.

Minnesota, however, relied on the same resources Sunday to win both games, 6-3 and 11-10, the latter game going nine innings.

Sophomore pitcher Eric Porter (4-2, 3-0) went the distance in gaining his third conference win in the first game Sunday. He held Northwestern to five hits while whiffing four batters.

Freshman third baseman Steve Calvert broke open a 3-3 tie with a run-scoring double in the 6th inning before the Gophers went on to get two more runs in the 7th to preserve the victory. It was Porter's second complete Big Ten start.

The second game was the next thing to unbelievable. It took 3 hours and 40 minutes to play the nine innings, a game in which Minnesota scored six runs in the third inning, but had to come from behind to win. A lack of control hurt both teams as 20 walks were issued by the combined staffs.

Trailing 6-8 in the sixth inning, Calvert came through again with a single to narrow the margin. Then senior left fielder Jay Anderson plated the tying run with a two-out single in the seventh.

The Gophers continued tied going into the ninth behind a stout relief performance by senior co-captain Karl Johnson. After coming in in the 4th inning, Johnson allowed just one hit while striking out four before tiring in the bottom of the ninth.

In the final inning, Minnesota scored three runs. Junior catcher Joe Wallraf singled home the first run, and a bases loaded walk to freshman outfielder Keith Krenke plated the second. The third run scored on an NU error.

But the Wildcats were not done. NU reached Johnson for three hits and a run after two were out. So senior Shane Kangas, who lost the 3-0 decision Saturday, came on in relief.

He gave up a run-scoring single before getting the final batter on a swinging third strike to gain his first save of the year. The victory was also the first of the year for Johnson (1-0).

Junior Denny Neagle continued to ride the hard luck trail for Minnesota. In Saturday's opener, the ace lefty went the full nine innings giving up just five hits while walking three and striking out four. But once again his teammates couldn't come up with much offense, and Northwestern got the win when Gregg Martin stroked a two-out home run in the bottom of the ninth for a 2-1 victory.

In three Big Ten starts this season, Neagle has thrown three complete games while his teammates have provided him with the combined total of 11 hits and two runs. Neagle's conference ERA is a sparkling 1.90. His record is 0-3.

The Golden Gopher tennis team took to the road last weekend, coming away with a 5-4 upset victory over 18th-ranked Northwestern in Evanston, IL on Saturday, before falling 7-2 to Iowa in Iowa City, IA on Sunday.

Big Upset: The Gophers split the six singles matches and then took two of the three doubles contests to come out on top over Northwestern. The team's depth once again came through, as sophomore **Kevin Werwie** (Sheboygan, WI) won at No. 4 singles, followed by victories by junior **Jason Hall** (Prior Lake, MN) and freshman **Philippe LeBlanc** (Montreal, Canada) at No. 5 and 6 respectively. Junior **Rafer Leach** (Lexington, KY) and senior **Mathias Olsson** (Tumba, Sweden) were victorious at No. 2 doubles in a tough three-setter, as were **Wervie** and **Hall** at No. 3 doubles.

Fall From The Unbeaten Ranks: Life in the tough Big Ten can be tough indeed. Less than 24 hours after upsetting Northwestern, the Gophers were ambushed 7-2 in the backyard of the Iowa Hawkeyes. **Leach** at No. 2 singles, and **Wervie** at No. 4 singles, won in straight sets for the Gophers. Senior **Duke** and freshman **Brian Uihlein** (Lake Forest, IL) lost their second three-set match in as many days at No. 1 doubles, while **Leach** and **Olsson** also fell while going the distance.

Wervie Hot: **Kevin Werwie** has been red-hot for the Gophers at the No. 4 singles slot. Sporting a perfect 6-0 record in Big Ten play, he has won his last 11 matches.

Big Weekend: The Gophers will face defending Big Ten champion Michigan in Ann Arbor on Friday, and then tangle with Michigan State in East Lansing on Saturday. Michigan stands alone atop the league standings with a perfect 5-0 record, and is led by sophomore Malivai Washington, ranked No. 1 in the country, senior Dan Goldberg, No. 4 in the nation, and freshman David Kass, ranked No. 36. Michigan State, on the other hand, goes into the week's play still searching for their first Big Ten victory.

TRACKSTERS DROP CLOSE DUAL MEET WITH IOWA; DRAKE RELAYS THIS WEEKEND

The Gophers track & field team dropped a 63-61 dual meet decision to the Iowa Hawkeyes on Saturday in Iowa City.

Beetcher A Double-Winner: Junior **Todd Beetcher** (Rochester, MN) captured the 3000 meter steeplechase with a personal-best clocking of 9:20.88, and then completed a tough double by winning the two-mile run in a time of 9:39.48 later in the meet.

Gopher winners: The Gophers won a total of seven events in the meet. In addition to **Beetcher's** two victories, senior **John Siekmeier** (Mahtomedi, MN) in the shot put with a toss of 51'½", sophomore **Ross Thompson** (Esko, MN) in the pole vault with a mark of 15'1¼", junior **Jeff Svedahl** (Cloquet, MN) in the 1500 with a 3:54.06, senior **Dan Hebl** (Menomonie, WI) with a clocking of 1:54.54 in the 800, and senior **Dan Mensing** (Blue Earth, MN) with a throw of 148'7" in the discus, won events for the Gophers.

So Close: After falling 75-47 to the Hawkeyes during the indoor season, the Gophers showed that they are a much stronger team outside after losing by just two down in Iowa City. The Gophers won seven events on Saturday, after finishing first in just four during their indoor confrontation back in February.

Drake Relays/Carleton Invitational: The Gophers will compete as a split-squad this weekend. Head Coach Roy Griak will take a contingent of Gophers down to Des Moines, IA to compete in the prestigious Drake Relays on Friday and Saturday, while assistant coach Phil Lundin will take the remainder of the squad to Northfield on Saturday for the Carleton Invitational.

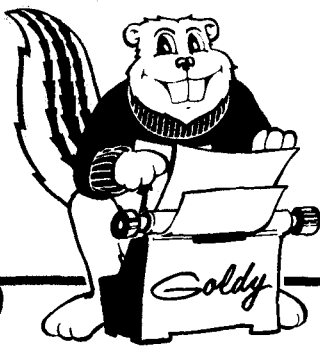
Prior to that, McKinnie held positions as an assistant coach at the University of Alabama, at Rice University and at Kentucky State where he also served as the head coach for one season.

Minneapolis, MN---The U. of Minnesota baseball Gophers could be facing something that hasn't happened since the Big Ten began its playoff tournament in 1981. . . missing the playoffs.

After dropping four of its last six conference games, Minnesota resides in 7th place of the Big Ten standings at 9-10. That puts the Gophers five games out of first place.

The good news, however, is that Minnesota is only 1½ games out of fourth place, the last spot which makes the post season tournament.

Quest for moving up to the latter begins this weekend when Minnesota, 21-18-1 overall, invades Madison, WI., to play doubleheaders Saturday and Sunday against the U. of Wisconsin Badgers. Wisconsin stands one spot behind the Gophers in 8th place at 6-14, 3½ games behind Minnesota.

Minnesota, at this time, could easily have found a better place to go. Revenge lies heavily in Wisconsin's favor. Last season the Badgers came to the Twin Cities in hopes of reaching the playoffs. But Minnesota scored a four-game sweep eliminating Wisconsin's hopes. UM later claimed the 1988 Big Ten championship by winning the playoff tournament at Ann Arbor.

The Big Ten week began for Minnesota last Wednesday when rain forced the Gophers into the Metrodome to play a doubleheader against Iowa. The Hawkeyes ruined another complete game performance by junior lefty Denny Neagle defeating the Gophers 2-0 in the first game.

But UM rallied for the winning run in the last inning of the second game on a bases walk to Jay Anderson giving the Gophers a 3-2 victory.

Then on Monday, after Illinois came on with an awesome home run barrage to sweep the first two games Sunday, 11-7 and 7-4, it was Neagle again who came to the Gopher rescue.

Looking back at his first four Big Ten starts, Neagle had completed all four games, two in extra innings, and had a 2.05 earned run average. His record, however, was 0-4 as his teammates, in his 30.2 innings pitched, had produced but 13 hits and two runs for Neagle.

But it all came home Monday as Neagle, while throwing a 1-hitter at Illinois for six innings, received a season's worth of offense from his teammates. Minnesota's batters produced 15 hits and 17 runs, 12 in the sixth inning, to defeat the Illini 17-0. Karl Johnson pitched the 7th inning for UM.

Then Neagle even went as far as to start the second game Monday. As he only threw 68 pitches in the first game, he asked coach John Anderson for the start, and got it.

Neagle went four innings giving up just five hits and two runs departing with a 3-2 lead. He was replaced by expected starter Shane Kangas who, unfortunately, gave up a one-out, two-run home run to Illini first baseman Charles "Bubba" Smith in the last inning. Those runs stood up for a 4-3 Illini win.

For the week, Neagle started three games, pitched 17 innings, allowed but 11 hits and 4 earned runs while striking out 17. He was Minnesota's nominee for Big Ten player of the week.

Robinson's Gophers next season. **Johnson** was a prep school national champion and a placewinner in the junior national tournament. In addition, he was a state champion in Oklahoma before moving to New Jersey. **Short** joins his brother Chris, an All-American for the Gophers this past season after finishing third at 190 pounds in the NCAA Meet, at the University of Minnesota. **Willy** is a two-time Minnesota state high school champion and has finished second in the junior nationals and third in the world junior trials. **Wallman** won an unprecedented six South Dakota state championships and logged a sparkling 201-0 record during his prep career. He forms yet another brother combination for the Gophers. **Troy Wallman**, a four-time South Dakota state champion at Freeman High School, red-shirted this past season for the Gophers. ZECHMEISTER & OUTCALT HONORED ON GTE/COSIDA ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICA AT-LARGE DISTRICT 5 TEAM

Senior Mike Zechmeister (Brooklyn Park, MN) and junior Brett Outcalt (Wayzata, MN) have been selected to the GTE/CoSIDA Academic All-America At-Large District 5 Team.

Both members of the Gophers' swimming & diving squad which finished third at the Big Ten Championships and 11th at the NCAA Championships this past season, Zechmeister and Outcalt will now move on to the national ballot for Academic All-America consideration. That team will be announced on June 27.

A four-year letterwinner for the Gophers during his career, Zechmeister was recently named recipient of the University of Minnesota's Big Ten Conference Medal of Honor at the annual "M" Banquet. Each Big Ten Conference school presents this award annually to a student-athlete who demonstrates a high degree of proficiency in scholarship and athletics.

Zechmeister was the Gophers' top butterflyer for three seasons and a team captain in both his junior and senior seasons. He was a four-time Big Ten Conference consolation finalist in the 100 and 200 butterfly for the Gophers.

A three-time Big Ten All-Academic selection, Zechmeister has recorded 12 consecutive quarters with a 4.0 GPA, and has registered a cumulative 3.90 GPA in the Carlson School of Management. This year he was a finalist for the prestigious Donald R. Zander Award. In addition, he is a three-time recipient of the President's Student Leadership & Service Award, and has received the Maurice L. Rothschild Merit Scholarship twice.

Zechmeister, who will graduate from the University of Minnesota in the fall of 1989 and begin pursuing an MBA at Harvard in the fall of 1990, is the president of the Beta Gamma Sigma Honor Society, and the vice-president of the undergraduate marketing association. An elected representative to the U.S. Swimming-Minnesota Executive Board, he is also active in the "Just Say No To Drugs" program.

Outcalt was a member of the Gophers' Big Ten champion 800 freestyle relay which clocked a school record time of 6:32.00 en route to the title. He then collected honorable mention All-America honors in that relay with an 11th-place finish at the NCAA Championships. He also finished ninth in the 200 freestyle and 13th in the 500 freestyle at the 1989 Big Ten Championships.

At the 1988 NCAA Championships, Outcalt was a member of the Gophers' 400 freestyle relay which placed 28th, as well as the 800 freestyle relay unit which finished 18th. Honored as a swimming academic All-America by the coaches association in 1988, he has recorded a 3.74 cumulative GPA majoring in electrical engineering. In addition, he is also a Williams Scholar as well.

Marion Raihala, a legendary figure in the University of Minnesota athletic ticket office for the past 37 years, was honored by university staff, coaches, faculty and friends at a retirement roast on Thursday at the Radisson University Hotel in Minneapolis.

Raihala, a 1950 graduate of the University of Minnesota with a B.A. degree in journalism, has held virtually every position in the ticket office during her career. Presently the assistant ticket manager, she will retire at the end of June.

Ken Buell, ticket manager at the University of Minnesota, Al Renfrew, ticket manager at the University of Michigan, Bill King, ticket manager at Indiana University and Pam Finke, assistant ticket manager at Iowa University, presented Raihala with the "Digger Award", which is given by the Big 10 Conference Business and Ticket Managers for outstanding service. In addition, University of Minnesota athletic director, Rick Bay, presented Raihala with an "M" Jacket. She was made an honorary "M" Club member two years ago.

During her tenure at the U of M, Raihala has worked for six different athletic directors and five head ticket managers. FIRST PAUL GIEL SCHOLARSHIP AWARDED IN AUSTIN, MN

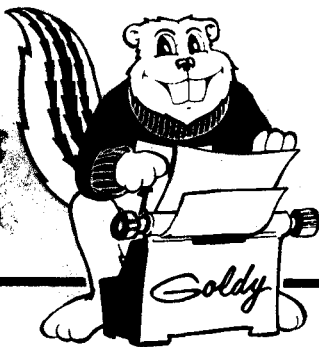

Minneapolis, MN---A fight for survival, and then some, is what faces the U. of Minnesota baseball Gophers at Siebert Field this weekend.

Seeking a spot among the final four regular season Big Ten finishers to earn a playoff berth, the Gophers close their conference schedule Saturday and Sunday with 1 p.m. home doubleheaders against Purdue.

All four games will be carried locally by KANO-1470 AM radio, with KITN-TV, Ch. 29, showing Saturday's first game on tape at 11 p.m. that evening.

Minnesota is in fifth place with a 12-11 Big Ten record (26-21-1 overall) after taking three of four Sunday and Monday at Wisconsin. The Gophers, however, only trail fourth place Michigan State (13-11) by one-half game. The Spartans are at home this weekend for four games against Ohio State (12-12).

Purdue, 8-14 is only 2½ games behind the Gophers and can act as a spoiler this weekend. Minnesota has been in the playoffs every year since they were first held in 1981.

Minnesota unloaded its heavy artillery in its three wins at Wisconsin. In those games the Gophers totaled 47 hits and 40 runs. Wisconsin's lone win came from a brilliant one-hit pitching performance by Marcus Hamilton. Hamilton gave up a one-out 7th inning single to Gopher left fielder Jay Anderson en route to a 5-0 victory in Monday's first game. UM starter Eric Porter (4-4) took the loss.

Anderson and his teammates bounced back with 15 hits, three by the outfielder, to win the second game, 11-3. Anderson was playing in his UM career record 215th game breaking the mark of 214 set last year by Jeff Goergen. Anderson also surpassed Goergen's career record 672 official at bats by one.

On Sunday Minnesota pummeled Wisconsin pitchers for 30 hits and 29 runs in winning both ends of a doubleheader, 9-1 and 20-2. The first game lasted eight innings and saw Denny Neagle, earlier UM's tough luck pitcher in the Big Ten, earn his third victory of the season on a 4-hitter. All 9 Gopher runs, including 8 in the 8th inning, were unearned.

Minnesota used the long ball to win the second game. Vince Palyan knocked out a pair of two-run homers and scored four times himself, while Joe Wallraf belted his team-leading 7th home run and Brian Raabe got his 4th. Both the latter were solos. Brent Gates went 5 for 6 at the plate in that contest.

Gates, the Gopher freshman shortstop, was red-hot at the plate for Minnesota in the four-game set at Wisconsin. "Gater" went 10 for 17 (.588) while driving in 5 runs and scored 6 times. He also hit his 19th double of the season in the 20-2 win equaling the second season record set by Ronn VanKrevelen in 1982.

For the entire season, Gates continues to lead his teammates with a healthy .390 bat average. He has also taken over the team leadership in runs batted in with 36, one more than previous leader Rabbe, and has the most hits, 69.

Palyan's 6 home runs are second only to Wallraf while Anderson is second in hits with 60 and is tied with Wallraf for the most game winning RBIs with 5.

The Gophers face non-conference foes Augsburg College today and meet Mankato State at New Ulm Wednesday before hosting Purdue this weekend.

SENIORS BOW OUT SUNDAY

Besides being Mother's Day Sunday, five members of this year's Gopher varsity baseball squad will be playing their final home game. They are the senior members of the 1989 UM team.

To be introduced between games Sunday are: Jay Anderson, outfielder from Bloomington (Jefferson); Ted Beaulieu (BO-lee-oh), catcher from St. Paul (Hill-Murray); Co-Captain Karl Johnson, pitcher from Stacy (Forest Lake); Shane Kangas, pitcher from Frazee-Vergas, and Co-Captain Vince Palyan, outfielder from New Brighton (Irondale).

Palyan has enjoyed an outstanding four-year career at Minnesota capped by being named MVP of the Big Ten last spring at Ann Arbor, MI, and won by Minnesota. He was also named to the all-tournament team as an outfielder.

After coming to Minnesota, Johnson was converted to a side-arm pitching motion and has been UM's ace out of the bull pen the last three years. He has 9 career saves.

Kangas sports a 21-6 won-lost record on the mound and has also picked up 5 saves during his time here. He has the most wins of any member of this year's pitching staff.

Anderson has played five different positions in his four years as a Gopher starter. He began as a second baseman, played the last two years at shortstop and first base, and this year opened at third base before finding a home in left field. He also has, as mentioned earlier, set two UM career records, and is within reach of several more, including most hits and most doubles.

Beaulieu transferred to UM as a sophomore and has played mostly in a utility role as back-up catcher, designated hitter and pinch hitter. In his limited plate appearances, he has contributed four home runs and knocked in 24 runs.

A Look Back at '88: The Golden Gophers finished second in the 1988 Big Ten Championships at West Lafayette, IN, falling 5-0 to Michigan in the championship match. The Gophers topped Northwestern 5-1 in the quarterfinals and then Indiana 5-4 in the semifinals to advance to the title match.

Michigan & Minnesota Dominate: The Big Ten Championships have truly become an "M & M" affair with Michigan and Minnesota dominating the tournament. Not since 1967, when Michigan State took the crown, has a team other than Michigan or Minnesota won the title. The Wolverines have been a dynasty to say the least, with 31 conference championships already tucked away, more than the other nine schools have won...combined. The Wolverines have not finished lower than second since 1958. The Gophers, on the other hand, have won three Big Ten crowns (1981 co, 1984, 1986), and have finished no worse than second since 1981.

Dueling Uihleins: The Minnesota brother connection of senior **Duke** and freshman **Brian Uihlein** are ranked No. 23 in the latest Volvo Tennis/Collegiate Rankings, and have been the Gophers' No. 1 doubles combination all season long. Highlighting the twosome's 22-13 overall record this season was their performance at the Rolex National Indoor Intercollegiate Tennis Championships held Feb. 9-12 in the Twin Cities. With the hometown crowd behind them, the **Uihlein's** upset Clemson's Todd Watkins and Vince Van Gelderen, ranked No. 1 at the time and No. 13 presently, in the first round of the 16-team doubles draw tournament, and UC-Irvine's Mike Briggs and Trevor Kronemann, ranked No. 5 at the time and No. 24 now, in the quarterfinals. They fell to the nation's No. 2 ranked team, and eventual tournament champions, Woody Hunt and Ted Scherman of California in a tough three-setter in the semifinals.

Massart Back: The Gophers' efforts at the Big Ten Championships will certainly be boosted by the return of senior **David Massart** to the lineup. Playing his first match since March 21 because of a back injury, he looked in fine form against Wisconsin on Saturday. **Massart** scored a 6-4, 6-2 victory over the Badgers' Jim Schneider at No. 5 singles, and is expected to fill the No. 3 slot in the Gophers lineup this weekend.

Coach Geatz: "It's wide-open. We're the No. 2 seed going into the tournament, and Iowa, the No. 7 seed, beat us 7-2 a couple of weeks ago. The league is so tight this year. Michigan is obviously the favorite, but anything can happen."

Thriller In Madison: After dropping the top four singles slots, the Gophers won at No. 5 and 6 singles, and then swept the three doubles positions to score a thrilling 5-4 victory over host Wisconsin on Saturday night. The victory secured the No. 2 seed in the Big Ten Championships for the Gophers.

DEAN HONORED AS MOST VALUABLE WRESTLER; TWO MORE PREP STANDOUTS SIGNED

Senior **Dave Dean** (Montrose, MI) was honored as the Gopher wrestling team's MVP at the squad's post-season banquet on Monday night at JAX Restaurant in Minneapolis.

Dean put the appropriate finishes touches on an outstanding career this season, recording a 34-2-1 mark overall, and winning the Big Ten title at 177 pounds en route to a third-place finish at the NCAA Championships. In 1987, he was the conference champion at 190 pounds and the runner-up in the division at the NCAA's. He finished his career at Minnesota with an overall record of 100-10-1. He was also the recipient of the first Frazer Dean Most Courageous Wrestler Award, named in honor of his father who died last month after suffering a heart attack while attempting to save a drowning child. The award is given to the wrestler who most exemplifies devotion, unselfishness, courage, and leadership.

Sophomore **Marty Morgan** (Bloomington, MN) was honored as the team's Most Dedicated Wrestler. A transfer from North Dakota State University where he captured the NCAA Division II national title at 167 pounds in 1987, he registered an overall 32-10 mark this past season for the Gophers. 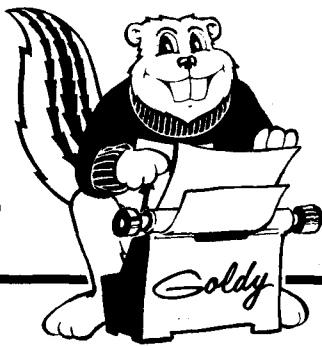

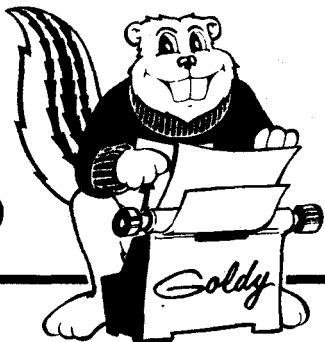

A Look Back at '88: The Golden Gophers finished second in the 1988 Big Ten Championships at West Lafayette, IN, falling 5-0 to Michigan in the championship match. The Gophers topped Northwestern 5-1 in the quarterfinals and then Indiana 5-4 in the semifinals to advance to the title match.

Michigan & Minnesota Dominate: The Big Ten Championships have truly become an "M & M" affair with Michigan and Minnesota dominating the tournament. Not since 1967, when Michigan State took the crown, has a team other than Michigan or Minnesota won the title. The Wolverines have been a dynasty to say the least, with 31 conference championships already tucked away, more than the other nine schools have won...combined. The Wolverines have not finished lower than second since 1958. The Gophers, on the other hand, have won three Big Ten crowns (1981 co, 1984, 1986), and have finished no worse than second since 1981.

Dueling Uihleins: The Minnesota brother connection of senior Duke and freshman Brian Uihlein are ranked No. 23 in the latest Volvo Tennis/Collegiate Rankings, and have been the Gophers' No. 1 doubles combination all season long. Highlighting the twosome's 22-13 overall record this season was their performance at the Rolex National Indoor Intercollegiate Tennis Championships held Feb. 9-12 in the Twin Cities. With the hometown crowd behind them, the Uihlein's upset Clemson's Todd Watkins and Vince Van Gelderen, ranked No. 3 at the time and No. 13 presently, in the first round of the 16-team doubles draw of the tournament, and UC-Irvine's Mike Briggs and Trevor Kronemann, ranked No. 5 at the time and No. 24 now, in the quarterfinals. They fell to the nation's No. 2 ranked team, and eventual tournament champions, Woody Hunt and Ted Scherman of California in a tough three-setter in the semifinals.

Massart Back: The Gophers' efforts at the Big Ten Championships will certainly be boosted by the return of senior David Massart to the lineup. Playing his first match since March 21 because of a back injury, he looked in fine form against Wisconsin on Saturday. Massart scored a 6-4, 6-2 victory over the Badgers' Jim Schneider at No. 5 singles, and is expected to fill the No. 3 slot in the Gophers lineup this weekend.

Coach Geatz: "It's wide-open. We're the No. 2 seed going into the tournament, and Iowa, the No. 7 seed, beat us 7-2 a couple of weeks ago. The league is so balanced this year. Michigan is obviously the favorite, but anything can happen."

Thriller In Madison: After dropping the top four singles slots, the Gophers won at No. 5 and 6 singles, and then swept the three doubles positions to score a thrilling 5-4 victory over host Wisconsin on Saturday night. The victory secured the No. 2 seed in the Big Ten Championships for the Gophers.

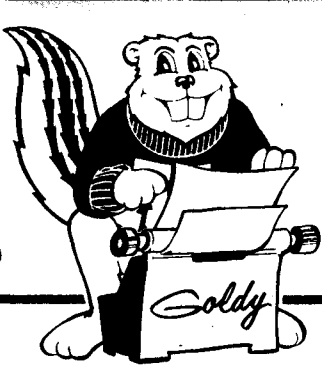

Nate Tubbs, a 6-5, 191-pound senior at Wayne High School in Ft. Wayne, IN, has signed a national letter of intent to enroll at the University of Minnesota and become a Golden Gopher under Coach Clem Haskins.

Tubbs signed his tender early this week after posting an outstanding three-sport athletic career at Wayne High School, and he will be a forward-guard candidate with Minnesota.

Coach Haskins, who saw Tubbs play in the Indiana "Top Forty" tryouts early in April, described him as "a great athlete that gets things done on both ends of the court."

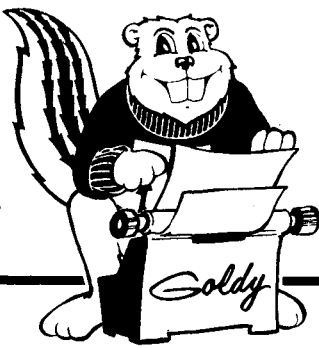
The "great athlete" description appears accurate. Tubbs was an All-State selection in football last fall as a defensive back and in basketball as a forward that averaged 23.0 points, 10 rebounds, five assists and three steals a game as a senior. Tubbs also was the Player of the Year in Ft. Wayne this past season and was selected to play in both the Indiana All-Star Football Game and the Indiana State Basketball All-Star Game.

Signing tenders earlier were Arriel McDonald, a 6-2, 170-pound point guard from Athens Drive High School in Raleigh, NC, and Ernest Nzigamasabo, an exchange student from Bjumura, Burundi, Africa who played his prep basketball at Mound Westonka, MN.

BASEBALL WINS 3 OF 4, ENDS SEASON 31-22-1

Minneapolis, MN---Even in winning three out of four home games from Purdue last weekend, including a critical pair Sunday, the U. of Minnesota baseball Gophers missed making the Big Ten playoffs for the first time since they began in 1981.

Ohio State grabbed the fourth and final playoff spot by sweeping its final four games at Michigan State. The Buckeyes edged the 5th place Gophers by one-half game in the final regular season standings. Michigan, the regular season conference champion, Illinois and Iowa are the other qualifiers.

To some it would seem Minnesota had an unseuccessful 1989 season. But to those in the know, that's the farthest from reality.

The Gophers, for the 26th consecutive year, ended with a winning record. The 31-22-1 final log, 15-12 in the Big Ten, also marks the 9th time in the last 10 years Gopher teams have come in with more than 30 victories. Additionally, Minnesota teams have also enjoyed 24 consecutive winning Big Ten campaigns.

Looking at the schedule UM faced this year--44 of its 54 games were against NCAA Division I teams--makes its final result even more glowing. Minnesota's schedule was considered the toughest in the nation this season.

According to head coach John Anderson, who now owns an eight-year record of 269-180-2, a winning percentage of .599 coupled with three Big Ten titles, Minnesota's 1989 season resulted in three different segments.

"Our first 20 games came at national power Miami, our spring trip to California where we won six of eight games in eight days against seven Division I teams, and the Pillsbury Classic where we enjoued our best tournament ending 2-1-1," the head coach offered.

"Our second 20 games is where we ran into a lot of trouble losing several one-run games as we fell into a batting slump.

"Our last 15 games show 11 wins, seven in the Big Ten, when we really came alive at the plate to back up some solid pitching. So I guess that pretty well tells our story.

"I am not at all disappointed in the efforts given by our players. They battled all the way and came from behind to win some very big games. In fact, we did not play poorly in most of the Big Ten games we lost. The losses came when we simply didn't hit the ball.

"Probably the key to our Big Ten season came in the first four starts by junior left-handed pitcher Denny Neagle. He pitched four complete games, but lost twice by 2-1 scores in nine-inning games, and two more seven-inning games when we were shut out 2-0 and 3-0. In those four starts, Neagle gave up just seven earned runs for an ERA of 2.08, yet was 0-4 for his efforts.

"Foul weather also had its effect. We got backed up because of delays and it seemed like we were always traveling with little chance to practice. With a young team like ours, it was made more difficult not to have the necessary time off to work on those little things that can often make the difference in games.

"It's also possible that my staff and I were somewhat too optimistic when the season started and simply expected too much out of both our returnees and newcomers. Three of our veterans just pressed too hard and did not reach their previous offensive levels. That played a part, too, in our final results.

"However, with seven of our nine defensive players returning and only two pitchers lost, we are already getting excited about next year. Our preliminary schedule, if approved, appears tougher than this year's. Stanford, Miami and Washington State will be in for the Pillsbury Classic, and we hope to play several more ranking powers outside the Big Ten, too. It never seems to get any easier."

JAY ANDERSON WINS MOLITOR BAT TROPHY

Senior left fielder Jay Anderson edged freshman shortstop Brent Gates for the 1989 Gopher batting title. Anderson, going three for five with a pair of 2-run home runs in the final series against Purdue, ended the season with a .387 batting average. Gates, who like Anderson played in all 54 games this season, finished with a .382 average.

Anderson will receive the Paul Molitor Batting Champion trophy at the Annual Gopher Dugout Club Awards Banquet Sunday, June 4, at the Minneapolis Metrodome Hilton Hotel. Reservations may be made by calling 612-625-0869.

Besides winning the bat crown, Anderson also set three career records: most games played (221), most official at bats (690), and most hits (228). All three records broken were previously set last year by third baseman Jeff Goergen.

Gates, in his first year of college competition, set a single season UM record by banging out 20 doubles. He surpassed the previous high of 19 by Ronn VanKrevelen set in 1982. In addition, Gates led his teammates this season with most hits, 76, most runs batted in, 40, and was tied for second in home runs with six. Junior catcher Joe Wallraf had the most round trippers, eight.

Among the starting pitchers, freshman lefty John Lowery had the most wins and best record, 7-0, while Neagle owns the best ERA, 3.56. Reliever Jon Wroge, who transferred to Minnesota last fall, owns the lowest ERA among all pitchers, 2.51, to go with his 5-1 record. Wroge also posted a team-high two saves.

GOPHER NETTERS SOAR TO BIG TEN TITLE; FACE UNIVERSITY OF SAN DIEGO IN FIRST ROUND OF NCAA TOURNAMENT ON FRIDAY; UIHLEIN BROTHERS SELECTED TO PLAY IN 32-TEAM NCAA DOUBLES FIELD

Mission accomplished. First-year head coach, David Geatz, and his Golden Gopher tennis team capped off an incredible weekend of "team" tennis by scoring a 5-2 victory over defending champion Michigan in the championship match of the Big Ten Tournament in Iowa City, IA on Sunday.

The victory qualifies the Gophers for the NCAA Tournament in Athens, GA, where they'll face the University of San Diego at 9:00 a.m. on Friday in the first round.

A Look Back: The Gophers opened the Big Ten Tournament with a thrilling 5-3 win over host Iowa on Friday. The win avenged a 7-2 defeat at the hands of the Hawkeyes on the same courts back on April 23. Junior **Rafer Leach** (Lexington, KY) at No. 2, senior **David Massart** (Milwaukee, WI) at No. 3, sophomore **Kevin Wervie** (Sheboygan, WI) at No. 5, and junior **Jason Hall** (Prior Lake, MN) at No. 6 won in singles action, while the No. 2 doubles combination of **Leach** and senior **Mathias Olsson** (Tumba, Sweden) rallied from being down 3-6, 2-5, to give the Gophers the clinching point with a rousing 3-6, 7-5, 6-4 victory.

Senior **Duke Uihlein** (Lake Forest, IL) at No. 1, freshman **Brian Uihlein** (Lake Forest, IL) at No. 4, **Wervie** at No. 5, and **Hall** at No. 6 were victorious in singles play, while the No. 2 doubles team of **Leach** and **Olsson** once again put the match on ice in the Gophers 5-2 semifinal round win over Ohio State on Saturday. The twosome won in straight sets this time, 6-3, 6-4.

Leach at No. 2, **Brian Uihlein** at No. 4, **Wervie** at No. 5 and **Hall** at No. 6 gave the Gophers a 4-2 advantage in Sunday's title match with Michigan after singles play, and then **Wervie** and freshman **Philippe LeBlanc** (Montreal, Canada) won at No. 3 doubles to set off the Gophers wild victory celebration. After dropping the first set, **Leach's** 3-6, 6-2, 6-2 victory over Michigan's Dan Goldberg, ranked No. 3 in the country but hobbled by wrist and ankle injuries during the tournament, was the key to open the door to the championship. For **Leach** it just may have been the biggest singles win of his career.

"The first year I was at the NCAA's (1987 - Played in the doubles draw while at the University of New Mexico), I watched him (Goldberg) go all the way to the finals," **Leach** said. "I have a lot of respect for him. He's a great player. I knew that I could play with him and it meant a lot to me to beat him."

Michigan & Minnesota Dominate: The Big Ten Tournament have truly become an "M & M" affair with Michigan and Minnesota dominating the tournament. Not since 1967, when Michigan State took the crown, has a team other than the Wolverines or Gophers won the title. Since the team dual meet format was introduced in 1985, the two teams have met in the final all five years, with the Wolverines winning three and the Gophers two. The 1989 crown gave the Gophers their 10th all-time league title, and fourth of the 80's (1981-co, 1984, 1986, 1989).

The Second Time Around: The Gophers' three seniors - **Duke Uihlein**, **David Massart**, and **Mathias Olsson** - were freshman on the 1986 Big Ten champion squad that fell 5-0 to UCLA in the first round of the NCAA Tournament. During their careers at the University of Minnesota, the trio has helped the Gophers log an impressive 77-39 record in dual matches.

Uihlein Honored On All-Big Ten Team: **Duke Uihlein** was named to the All-Big Ten squad at the annual awards banquet held on Thursday evening. He has been the Gophers No. 1 singles man all season long, and has formed a powerful doubles combination with his brother **Brian Uihlein**.

Give Me A Four, Five, Six: A team void of any individual stars, the Gophers have thrived all season long with their great team balance. In dual meet matches this season, the Gophers have registered a 60-23 mark at the No. 4, 5 and 6 singles slots combined, including an 8-1 record at the Big Ten Tournament last weekend. The Gophers are 39-48 at the top three singles positions.

"There's very little difference in our lineup from top to bottom," **Geatz** said. "That's just the way we thought we were going to win - at four, five and six (singles), and then sneak one in at the top three. There's no superstars on this team. Superstars win medals, teams win championships."

How Sweet It Is: In six seasons at the helm of the New Mexico program, Geatz finished runner-up at the WAC (Western Athletic Conference) Tournament four times. In his first season directing the Gophers, he's led them to the Big Ten title and an NCAA Tournament berth. Combined with a 121-65 mark during those six seasons at New Mexico, he now has registered an overall record of 142-73 in seven seasons.

On The Road To Athens: The Gophers will play the University of San Diego in the first round of the NCAA Tournament on Friday in Athens, GA at 9:00 a.m. (CST). The winner will move on to face fourth-seeded UC-Irvine on Saturday at 11:00 a.m. (CST).

The Third Time a Charm?: This will be the Gophers third appearance in the NCAA Championships. The present dual meet format was first instituted in 1977. In 1984, the Gophers dropped a 6-2 decision to Trinity University (TX), and in 1986, they fell 5-0 to UCLA. Both tournaments were also held in Athens, GA.

Gophers vs. San Diego: If the past holds any indication, Friday's match with San Diego promises to be a real barnburner. The two teams have met three times in the past, with each match ending up 5-4. The Gophers have won twice - on March 25, 1983 in San Diego and also on March 26, 1981 in San Diego - while San Diego came out on top on March 4, 1983 in Corpus Christi, TX.

University of San Diego: With Jose-Luis Noriega winning the singles bracket, and then teaming with David Stewart to claim top honors as well in doubles, the University of San Diego snapped Pepperdine's 16-year hold on the team title at the recent West Coast Athletic Conference Championships in Malibu, CA. San Diego is presently ranked No. 15 in the latest national poll, and has charted an overall dual meet mark of 24-6 heading into Friday's match.

Taking A Look At The Field: The Gophers and San Diego have played three common opponents during the 1989 campaign. Both teams topped Yale, the Gophers 6-1 and San Diego 8-1. The Gophers defeated Auburn 5-4, while San Diego fell 4-3. Against Fresno State, San Diego scored a 5-4 victory, while the Gophers dropped a 5-3 decision.

The Gophers have played three teams which have been selected to play in the 20-team NCAA Tournament, defeating Kentucky 5-2, and falling to both Miami (5-1) and Mississippi (6-0).

Dueling Uihleins: Ranked No. 23 in the latest national poll, the Minnesota brother connection of **Duke** and **Brian Uihlein** have been selected to play in the 32-team NCAA doubles draw. The brackets for the doubles competition will be announced on Monday, May 22, with first-round matches set to start in Athens on Thursday, May 25.

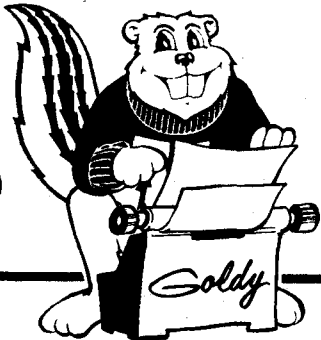

GOPHER NETTERS FALL TO SAN DIEGO IN FIRST-ROUND OF NCAA TOURNAMENT; UIHLEIN BROTHERS BEGIN DOUBLES PLAY ON THURSDAY (21-9 Overall/10-2 Big Ten)

The Big Ten champion Golden Gopher tennis team dropped a 5-1 decision to the University of San Diego in the first-round of the NCAA Tournament last Friday in Athens, GA.

Toreros Clinch Match in Singles: San Diego put the match on ice by taking five of the six singles matches in Friday's contest. Sophomore **Kevin Wervie** (Sheboygan, WI) was the lone winner for the Gophers, registering a 6-4, 6-4 victory over San Diego's J.R. Edwards at No. 5 singles. Junior **Jason Hall** (Prior Lake, MN) lost a tough three-setter, 1-6, 6-2, 7-6 (7-4) to the Toreros' Dan Mattera at No. 6 that would have sent the match into doubles play and given the Gophers new life.

At No. 1 singles, San Diego's Jose Luis Noriega, ranked No. 24 in the country, topped senior **Duke Uihlein** (Lake Forest, IL) 6-1, 6-2. Junior **Rafer Leach** (Lexington, KY) lopped 6-3, 7-6 (7-1) to David Stewart at No. 2, Mark Farren, ranked No. 95 nationally, topped senior **David Massart** (Milwaukee, WI) 6-1, 6-1 at No. 3, and the Toreros' Chris Toomey scored a 6-1, 6-3 victory over freshman **Brian Uihlein** (Lake Forest, IL) in the No. 4 slot.

Third Time Not A Charm: The Gophers fell to 0-3 in NCAA Tournament action with their 5-1 loss to San Diego. In 1984, the Gophers dropped a 6-2 decision to Trinity University (TX), and in 1986, they fell 5-0 to UCLA. Both tournaments were also held in Athens, GA.

A Year To Remember: Picked by many to finish fourth or fifth in the Big Ten at the start of the season, the Gophers capped off an outstanding season by scoring a 5-2 victory over defending champion Michigan in the championship match of the Big Ten Tournament in Iowa City, IA, on May 14 to earn a berth in the NCAA Championships. The Gophers opened the tournament with a thrilling 5-3 win over host Iowa in the quarterfinals, avenging an earlier 7-2 defeat to the Hawkeyes, and then topped Ohio State 5-2 in the semifinals.

Ranked as high as No. 18 in the national polls this season, the Gophers opened their season with a rousing 5-2 upset of Kentucky, ranked No. 6 at the time, at home on Jan. 22. In front of their home fans this season, the Golden Gophers registered a sparkling 8-0 mark. The team fashioned an overall 21-9 dual meet record, playing a schedule that often saw them take the court with many of the nation's finest teams.

Dueling Uihleins: Unranked in the latest national poll, the Minnesota brother connection of **Duke** and **Brian Uihlein** will begin play in the 32-team NCAA doubles draw on Thursday in Athens. The brackets for the competition will be released on Tuesday.

After suffering the disappointment of not qualifying for the 1500 meters in Saturday's prelim heats, **Frank Bjorkli** (Hommelvik, Norway) came back on Sunday to finish fourth in the 5000 meters with a personal-best clocking of 14:18.64. **Kelly Griffitts** (St. Charles, IL) also recorded a personal-best with a time of 30:38.10 in Saturday's 10,000 meter run. In Saturday's discus, **Dan Mensing** (Blue Earth, MN) registered a sixth-place finish with a toss of 163-1.

Three Place In 1500 Final: The Gophers tallied eight points alone with three placewinners in the 1500 meter final on Sunday. Junior **Jeff Svedahl** (Cloquet, MN) recorded a personal-best time of 3:49.39 to finish fifth, junior **Dan Hebl** (Menomonie, WI) was right on his heels in sixth with a time of 3:49.72, while freshman **Sean Fitzgerald** (Ottawa, Ontario, Canada) placed eighth in a personal-best clocking of 3:50.62.

Harder, York & Lacy Finish Eighth: Junior **Chris Harder** (Austin, MN), sophomore **Chris York** (Dubuque, IA) and freshman **Mark Lacy** (Oak Brook, IL) also scored points at the conference meet by placing eighth in their respective events. **Harder** registered a personal-best time of 9:10.85 in Sunday's 3000 meter steeplechase, **York** went 54.56 (53.98 prelims) in Sunday's 400 meter intermediate hurdles, and **Lacy** uncorked a personal-best heave of 50-8½ in Sunday's shot put. Although he didn't place in Saturday's discus, **Lacy** tossed the platter a personal-best of 149-6 to end up 13th.

SHAFFER NAMED NEW MINNESOTA DIVING COACH; FIVE SWIMMING & DIVING RECRUITS SIGNED

The University of Minnesota men's and women's athletic departments have announced the hiring of **Douglas Shaffer** as the head men's and women's diving coach, pending approval by the U of M Board of Regents.

Schaffer, who will replace **Chris Gentz** at the U of M, is currently the head men's and women's diving coach at UCLA, where he has coached three Pac-10 champions, six NCAA qualifiers, and four NCAA All-Americans. His diving team finished second overall in diving points in the league this past season.

A native of Baltimore, MD, **Schaffer** supervised and taught the Learn to Dive Program at the Mission Bay Aquatic Training Center in Boca Raton, FL, last year. He has also served as a Mission Bay Diving Camp coach and counselor.

A 1986 graduate of UCLA with a B.A. in history, **Schaffer** competed in diving for 18 years on the national and international level with 10 years under the direction of U.S. Olympic Team Coach Ron O'Brien. He has earned 11 national and two international titles, and was a Pan American Games silver medalist in 1987, when he was a Sullivan Award nominee. In addition, he was an Olympic Trials finalist in both 1984 and 1988.

Gophers Sign Five Recruits: Head Coach Dennis Dale has announced the signing of five outstanding recruits.

Paul Nelsen from Lincoln Southeast High School in Lincoln, NE, was the Nebraska high school state champion in both the 200 individual medley and the 100 backstroke, as well as the Junior Olympic champion in the 400 individual medley. He was also a finalist in the 200 breaststroke and 200 individual and garnered high school All-American honors. The 6-foot-7, 175-pound **Nelsen** has recorded career-bests of 3:59.67 in the 400 individual medley, 1:52.52 in the 200 individual medley, and 2:05.37 in the 200 breaststroke.

"Paul is still growing and will continue to improve," Dale said. "His versatility is a real asset. He is already as fast as our school record in the 400 individual medley (3:59.97)."

Chris Carlisle, a state finalist in the 200 freestyle and 100 backstroke at Lamar High School in Arlington, TX, has logged personal-bests of 1:41.8 in the 200 freestyle and 53.7 in the 100 backstroke. He was also a Junior Olympic finalist in the 200 backstroke.

"Chris has an extensive swimming background and his senior year successes were hindered by a serious case of mono," Dale said.

Eric Seanger, from Melrose (MN) High School, will also join the Gophers. He was the 1989 Minnesota High School 100 breaststroke state champion.

"Eric is going to help us in the sprint breaststroke," Dale said. "He has a great future, and with more experience, should be a Big Ten finalist for us."

Steve Busse, a six-time high school All-American and Junior Olympic finalist at Moeller High School in Cincinnati, OH, has registered personal-best times of 20.79 and 46.02 in the 50 and 100 freestyles respectively. He is a 6-foot-6, 225-pounder.

"Steve is the fastest sprinter to ever come to Minnesota out of high school," Dale said. "His size and strength are real assets."

Scott Hart, a freshman transfer from the University of Michigan, will also join the Gophers next season. He was an NCAA qualifier and Big Ten finalist in the 400 individual medley for the Wolverines, as well as a finalist in the 100 breaststroke at the conference meet. He was the 1988 Minnesota High School state champion in the 500 freestyle and a prep All-American at Rochester Mayo High School. He was also the Junior Olympic champion in the 200 breaststroke.

"We are happy to have Scott back in the state," Dale said. "He is very versatile and should help ease the loss of Dan Egeland (Gopher All-American)."

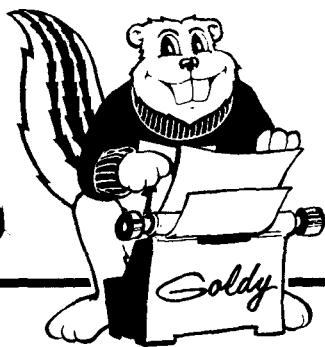

ZECHMEISTER RECEIVES TOP HONOR AT M BANQUET

Mike Zechmeister, a four-year letterwinner in swimming and diving from Brooklyn Park, MN, was named recipient of the University of Minnesota's Big Ten Conference Medal of Honor at the M Banquet on Wednesday at the Radisson University Hotel in Minneapolis.

(NOTE: Each Big Ten Conference school presents this award annually to a student-athlete who demonstrates a high degree of proficiency in scholarship and athletics).

A team captain for the Gophers both as a junior and a senior, Zechmeister was the team's top butterflyer for three years. He is a four-time Big Ten Conference consolation finalist in the 100 and 200 butterfly for the Gophers.

A three-time Big Ten All-Academic selection, Zechmeister has recorded 11 consecutive quarters with a 4.0 GPA, and has registered a cumulative 3.88 GPA in the Carlson School of Management. This year he was a finalist for the prestigious Donald R. Zander Award, which is based on academic performance, student leadership, and service to the community. In addition, he is a three-time (1987-89) recipient of the President's Student Leadership & Service Award, and has received the Maurice L. Rothschild Merit Scholarship twice (1988-89).

Zechmeister, who will graduate from the University of Minnesota in the Fall of 1989 and begin pursuing an MBA at Harvard in the Fall of 1990, is the president of the Beta Gamma Sigma Honor Society, and the vice-president of the undergraduate marketing association. An elected representative to the U.S. Swimming-Minnesota Executive Board (1987-89), he is also active in the "Just Say No" to Drugs Program.

"There's no question in my mind that Mike is an outstanding example of what the University of Minnesota is looking for in a student-athlete," said Dennis Dale, head swimming & diving coach for the Gophers. "He has planned and prepared for his future extraordinarily well."

DOUG MEANS -- 5-9, 170 D from Rochester (John Marshall). . .if needed can also move up to play at a wing position. Helped lead RJM to the state title game last March. Shoots well from the point, could add scoring potential to UM power play.

TOM NEWMAN -- 6-2, 190 G from Blaine. . .all-state in both football and hockey, led grid team to state title as a QB, has excellent future potential in the UM nets, owns excellent athletic ability.

Highlighting the twosome's 22-14 overall record this season was their performance at the Rolex National Indoor Intercollegiate Tennis Championships held Feb. 9-12 in the Twin Cities. With the hometown crowd behind them, the Uihleins upset Clemson's Todd Watkins and Vince Van Gelderen, ranked No. 3 at the time and No. 25 presently, in the first round of the 16-team doubles draw of the tournament, and UC-Irvine's Mike Briggs and Trevor Kronemann, ranked No. 5 at the time and No. 13 now, in the quarterfinals. They fell to the nation's No. 2 ranked team, and eventual tournament champions, Woody Hunt and Ted Scherman of California in a tough three-setter in the semifinals. Against teams in the NCAA Tournament, the Uihleins charted a 4-3 record this past season.

EGELAND HONORED AS SWIMMING & DIVING TEAM'S MVP; 1989-90 CAPTAINS NAMED

Minnesota's "Mr Everything" during his career for the Gophers, senior **Dan Egeland** (St. Anthony, MN) was honored as the swimming & diving team's MVP at the squad's banquet on Sunday, May 21.

Egeland went out in style in the final Big Ten Championships of his illustrious career held March 2-4 at the IUPUI Natatorium in Indianapolis, IN. All he did over the three days was set seven school records, four individual and three on relays, win a total of four events, two individual and two on relays, set two Big Ten meet records on Gopher relay units, and set a new all-time Big Ten record in the 200 individual medley with a clocking of 1:47.48. For his efforts, he was honored as the Swimmer-of-the-Championship, after leading the Gophers to a third-place finish in the final team standings, a lofty position that the program has not attained since the 1963 season.

At the NCAA Championships in Indianapolis on March 30-April 1, **Egeland** helped lead the Gophers to an 11th-place team finish, best for the program since they finished 10th at the 1967 national meet. **Egeland** garnered All-America status by finishing sixth in the 200 individual medley with a time of 1:48.10. He had also earned the distinction in 1988 with an eighth-place finish in the 100 breaststroke.

Egeland, along with junior **Erik Engnell** (Minneapolis, MN) were honored as the team's hardest workers. **Engnell** set the school record in the 400 individual medley with a clocking of 3:59.97. He finished 11th in the event at the Big Ten Championships. He also finished eighth in the 200 butterfly at the league meet with a time of 1:49.29.

Freshman **Matt Moseman** (Madison, WI) was named the team's most improved performer. He raced to a third-place finish at the Big Ten Championships in the 200 butterfly in a time of 1:48.11 and ninth in the 100 butterfly with a 49.91.

Senior **Preben Olsen** (Oslo, Norway) was honored as the recipient of the Jerry McCaul Award, given annually to the outstanding Gopher swimmer or diver who best exemplifies the late Jerry McCaul's (1957-1979) enthusiasm and dedication towards the sport. **Olsen** set a new school record with a clocking of 15:30.74 en route to a fifth-place finish at the Big Ten Championships this season. In addition, his 1000 split of 9:21.27 in that race, also set a new school standard.

Bill Asmus (Lakeville, MN), **Andrew Lorys** (Portland, OR) and **Mike Zarns** (New Brighton, MN) were selected as the 1989-90 Gopher captains. All three will be seniors at the University of Minnesota next season.

For the past seven years, Scanlan has been the head football coach at Cretin-Derham High School in St. Paul where he posted a record of 55-18.

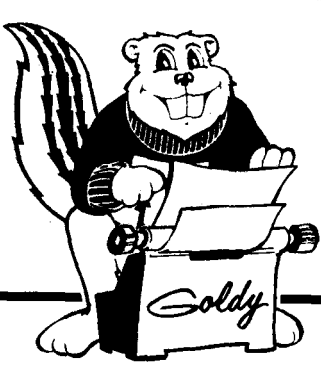

FIRST PAUL GIEL SCHOLARSHIP AWARDED IN AUSTIN, MN

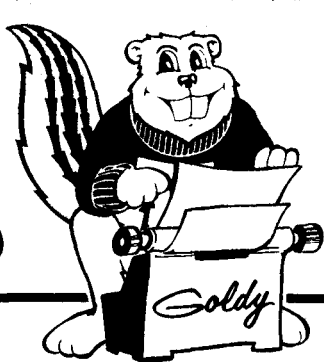

ZECHMEISTER HONORED ON COSIDA GTE ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICA AT-LARGE THIRD TEAM

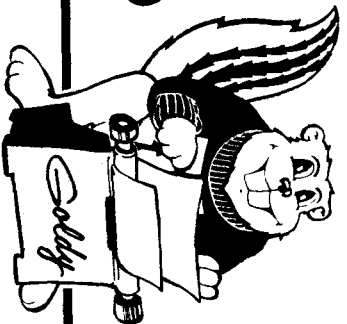
Senior Mike Zechmeister (Brooklyn Park, MN) has been selected to the CoSIDA GTE Academic All-America At-Large third team.

SCHEDULE TIMES SET FOR 1989 GOLDEN GOBER FOOTBALL

Starting times for the University of Minnesota's six home football games at the Albert H. Humphrey Metrodome have been set for the 1989 season.

Minnesota's two non-conference games in September will kick off at 7:00 p.m., the same starting time established for the Golden Gobbers when they moved into the Metrodome in 1982.

All four of Minnesota's home Big Ten Conference games, however, will start at 1:30 p.m., the kick-off time used by the Golden Gobbers when they played at Memorial Stadium on the U of M campus.

Minnesota began considering day games a few months ago, and Athletic Director Rick Bay indicated that reactions have been varied. "The word coming back to us," he said, "has been both pro and con, but most of the responses have been based on personal considerations."

Bay indicated, however, that Minnesota's reasons for the change were based on several factors. "We believe," he said, "that we can gain more publicity and better coverage for our team if we complete our games in time to meet news deadlines, especially in the Eastern Time Zone. Moving our starting times to the afternoon will help put Minnesota back into the mainstream of college football."

In addition, Bay said that the move was made to help Minnesota fans. "We feel that the University of Minnesota belongs to the entire state," he said, "and by playing some of our games in the afternoon, we will better accommodate the people outside the Metropolitan area. In addition, the afternoon games should provide us a better marketing opportunity to attract younger fans to U of M football."

Ken Ball, U of M athletic ticket manager, also reminds fans that the individual game football ticket sale opens July 3. Paid orders will be accepted by mail or over the counter. Telephone credit card orders also will be accepted for all games except Nebraska at home and Iowa at Iowa City. Single game ticket prices for home games are \$16 with the exception of the Nebraska game which is \$20.

All U of M home football starting times, whether 1:30 or 7:00 p.m., remain subject to change in order to accommodate television coverage as designated by the Big Ten Conference.

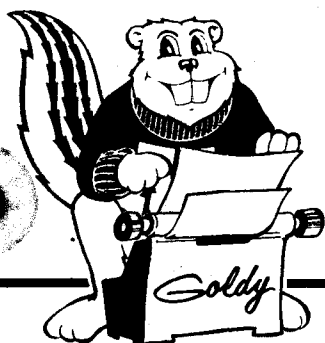

Freshman recruit, John Roethlisberger (Afton, MN), finished ninth in the all-around competition at the U.S. Gymnastics Championships held last Friday thru Sunday at the Met Center in Bloomington, MN, to qualify for the U.S. Senior National Team.

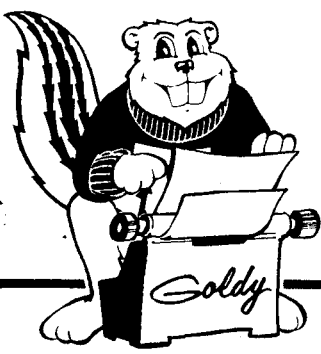

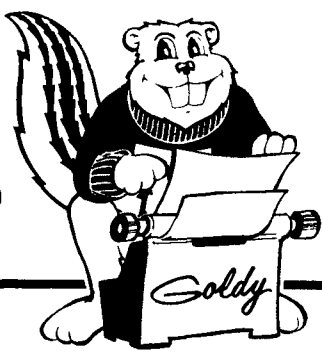

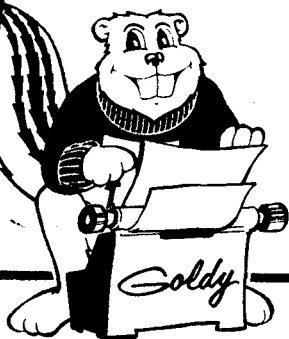

FOOTBALL PRACTICE TO GET UNDERWAY FOR GOLDEN GOPHERS

Preparations for the 1989 football season will get underway for the University of Minnesota next week when fall drills open under fourth year Head Coach John Gutekunst.

First the newcomers, nearly 50 of them, will begin three days of orientation and preliminary practice next Monday. That delegation will include freshmen, walk-on candidates and transfers.

Then the veterans, more than 80 in that category, arrive on Thursday. They are scheduled to go through Media Activities on Friday, and then the entire squad begins practice on Saturday.

Gutekunst will put his charges through two sessions daily during the first couple of weeks of drills before tapering things off as the Golden Gophers near the season opener at Iowa State September 16.

While early workouts may include some conditioning time and serve as a refresher course for most of the squad, Gutekunst intends to get to work in earnest as early as possible in an attempt to solve some of the problems which developed a year ago when UM posted a 2-7-2 record.

Among the priorities is settling on a number one quarterback. Scott Schaffner, now a sophomore, was the starter a year ago and goes into fall camp listed as number one. But he's expected to be challenged by Marquel Fleetwood, a redshirt freshman who had an impressive spring.

Another priority might be helping All-America tailback Darrell Thompson achieve another 1,000-yard season.....and another to get more records for wide receiver and kick return specialist Chris Gaiters.

Defensive priorities drew an abundance of attention last spring when a number of position changes took place including converting Fred Foggie to cornerback. But another would be to keep premier linebacker Jon Leverenz, who missed all of last season after suffering a knee injury in the opener, in good health.

In all, Gutekunst expects to have 38 lettermen in camp, and those veterans will form the nucleus for this year's squad. But he also has an impressive list of redshirts available, and they, too, are being counted on as contributors. Throw in a couple of transfers, like tight end David Shoemaker from Oklahoma, and the picture brightens considerably.

After invading Iowa State, the Golden Gophers will return home to entertain Nebraska. In all, Minnesota will play six games at home in the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome this fall.....the non-conference encounters at 7:00 p.m. and the Big Ten games at 1:30 p.m.

1989 PLAYER INTERVIEW PROCEDURE --

Head coach John Gutekunst has requested the following for this season. He has asked that all player interviews be arranged through the SID office. Please call (612) 625-4090 anytime between 8 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. for scheduling. The more advance warning you can give our SID office the better chance we have of making positive arrangements.

If a player interview is requested, we can help arrange the time and location (in our SID office, if possible). Or, by leaving your phone number, we can try and arrange to have the player return your call. No player phone numbers will be made available under any circumstances.

In general, player interviews may be conducted prior to or after practice so long as they DO NOT conflict with any meetings, injury treatments, weight lifting, or other obligations. Media should be aware that practices are not officially concluded until such obligations are completed.

Once the season officially opens, players will be available from the time post-game interviews are conducted until after Thursday's practice. Players will not be available Fridays or Saturdays until after games are completed. Again this year the U. of M. will conform to an equal access policy which means the locker room in the football facility will be closed to the media. Interviews must be conducted outside that area. Our post-game locker room policy will be determined weekly on a need basis.
