BSB OPENS BIG TEN AT DEFENDING CHAMPION ILLINOIS

It almost appears that the U. of Minnesota baseball Gophers are going into the third portion of their season this weekend when they head to Champaign and a four-game series against Illinois.

In its first 10 games, all against national powers, Minnesota ran up a 6-4 record. The next ten outings, including two tournaments, spelled trouble. The Gophers record in the latter games fell to 2-7-1. Minnesota ended fourth out of six teams at the Spartan Classic in San Jose, CA, then last weekend went 0-3 while hosting the 6th Annual PILLSBURY BASEBALL CLASSIC.

The latter three losses were not surprising to anyone. The field for this year's tournament held at the Metrodome included #1 ranked Wichita State, #2 Miami (Fl.) and #5 Stanford, depending on which national poll used. Miami defeated Stanford 3-2 in 10 innings to win the 1990 Pillsbury title.

Minnesota, however, was in every game of its tournament games until both mental and physical miscues took them out by giving opponents a big inning. The toughest loss of all was a 10-inning classic against Miami.

Sophomore pitcher **Scott Bakkum (LaCrosse, WI)** held the Hurricanes to four hits and no runs the first nine innings. The 10th inning, however, saw Miami score three times and walk away with a 3-0 victory. The loss dropped Bakkum's record to 1-2.

Travel to Illinois is a rude way to open the 1990 Big Ten chase. Illinois won the conference title in 1989, its first baseball championship since 1963. There is evidence, however, that the Illini could be even better this season.

"I believe Illinois proved Sunday they are ready to defend their championship," Gopher head coach John Anderson said today. "Illinois defeated Purdue 10-7 and 14-5. If noth-

ing else, that proved they will score a lot of runs on anyone. Last year Illinois came to Siebert Field and beat us three of four games."

Asked if he could put his finger on any single reason for the recent Gopher slump, Anderson said, "Defense has been our biggest detractor. In any team sport, defense usually effects your won-lost record more than any other single factor.

"We have been in almost every game we have lost until a key error has taken us out of a chance for a win. What hurts even more is that although we have a basically young team, it has been our veterans who, for the most part, are making the mistakes. What's even stranger is that it was our defense that carried us through our first nine or ten games.

"I'm certain that it's as much self-doubt mentally as anything else that causes teams to kind of go into the patterns we have seen recently. At the same time, it's just as amazing what a key win or two can do to heal mental doubts in a hurry. I just hope the healing process starts this weekend."

Anderson went on to list his probable starters for the Illinois series. He said sophomores **David Anderson (Barrington, IL)** and **Bakkum** will pitch Saturday with another soph, **John Lowery (Shepherdstown, WV)**, throwing Sunday's opener. Coach Anderson added he has not decided who will be his fourth starter.

Junior All-America candidate at catcher **Dan Wilson (Barrington, IL)** was Minnesota's lone representative on the PILLSBURY All-Tournament. He batted out four hits and cut down six of 10 would be base stealers. Wilson also won the top batting title at the San Jose tournament one week earlier.

EASTERN REGIONALS ON TAP THIS SATURDAY FOR GOLDEN GOPHER GYMNASTS; MCKIERNAN NOMINATED FOR IBM/GEORGE NISSEN AWARD (9-1-1/5-1 Big Ten)

Head coach Fred Roethlisberger's second-ranked Golden Gopher gymnastics team will travel to Penn State University in University Park, PA to compete in the Eastern Regional Championships on Saturday.

NCAA Qualifier: The top four teams, along with the top 12 individuals in each event will advance to the NCAA Championships to be held April 19-21 at Williams Arena.

The Competition: No. 3 Ohio State, No. 5 Iowa and No. 7 Penn State are expected to battle the Golden Gophers for the regional title on Saturday. The Golden Gophers dropped a 274.50-272.90 decision to Ohio State in the season opener in East Lansing, MI back on January 12, before bouncing back the following week to take the Windy City Invitational team crown with a score of 274.65 with the Buckeyes in the runner-up slot with a score of 274.15 and the Hawkeyes in third at 270.40. During the regular season, the Golden Gophers also scored a 281.15-275.10 victory over the Hawkeyes in dual meet action held at Williams Arena on February 17. At the Big Ten Championships in Iowa City on March 2, the Golden Gophers tallied a season-high score of 282.60 to win the team crown, while the host Hawkeyes were second with a 281.70 and the Buckeyes were third with a 281.55. Penn State and Minnesota have not faced each other thus far this season, but the Nittany Lions finished ninth at last year's NCAA Championships in Lincoln, NE. Minnesota finished third, Ohio State was seventh and Iowa was 10th at the national meet a year ago.

McKiernan Nominated For IBM/George Nissen Award: Senior Mark McKiernan (Darien, CT) is one of five finalists for the prestigious IBM/George Nissen Award which is presented annually to the outstanding senior in men's collegiate gymnastics. Jeff Dow from Iowa, Patrick Kirksey from Nebraska, Mike Racanelli from Ohio State and Chris Waller from UCLA are the other nominees for the award. The gymnastic equivalent of college football's Heisman Trophy, the winner will be announced at the National Association of College Gymnastics Coaches (NACGC) annual awards dinner on April 18 at the Radisson University Hotel in Minneapolis. The University of Minnesota will host the NCAA Championships on April 19-21 at Williams Arena.

McKiernan was honored as the 1989 Big Ten Conference Gymnast-of-the-Year after winning the all-around and the pommel horse. A member of the U.S. National Team, the Golden Gopher co-captain helped lead the squad to the 1990 conference team title by winning his second straight pommel horse crown and placing in a total of four individual events during the competition. He garnered All-America honors after finishing fourth on the pommel horse at the 1989 NCAA Championships. During his collegiate career, he has captured a total of four individual Big Ten titles and has become the first four-time All-Big Ten gymnastics selection in Minnesota history. Presently ranked No. 13 in the all-around in the latest national rankings, he is an applied design major with a 2.8 GPA.

Last Time Out: After a week away from competition due to finals, the Golden Gophers wrapped up their regular season on March 24 in Madison, WI by registering a score of 281.30 to top No. 5 Iowa (277.80) and host Wisconsin (263.15). No. 3 Ohio State was originally scheduled to compete but they could not get out of Columbus due to a snowstorm. Mark McKiernan, along with juniors Jay Caputo (Longwood, FL) and Mike Farina (Mundelein, IL) and freshmen John Roethlisberger (Afton, MN) and Rob Hanson (Ramsey, MN) each won an individual event for the Golden Gophers in the competition. McKiernan won the pommel horse with a score of 9.75, Caputo the still rings with a 9.70 and Farina the parallel bars with a 9.60. Roethlisberger with a 9.75 on the floor exercise and Hanson with a 9.75 on the high bar, tied for top honors on the evening.

Call It "C" For Consistency: The Golden Gophers have registered five straight scores of 281.15 or better, with a winning score of 282.60 at the Big Ten Championships in Iowa City on March 2 leading the way.

All In The Family: For the third consecutive month (December, January, February), John Roethlisberger has been named Big Ten Conference Gymnastics Athlete-of-the-Month. John and his sister Marie, a senior for the Golden Gophers who collected Athlete-of-the-Month honors in women's gymnastics for the month of February, thus become the first brother-sister combination in league history to win the award in the same month. John led the Golden Gophers to their first Big Ten team title since 1984 and 18th overall at the league championships held in Iowa City on March 2-3 (included in February voting). He won the all-around title with a score of 113.35 (57.40 optional, 55.95 compulsory) and the horizontal bar crown with a 9.75. In addition, he finished second on the parallel bars (9.675), fifth in the floor exercise (9.25) and seventh on the pommel horse (9.050) en route to being honored as the Big Ten Gymnast and Freshman-of-the-Year. On top of that, Golden Gopher men's coach Fred Roethlisberger was honored as the Big Ten Coach-of-the-Year after directing his squad to the conference title.

The Top 10: The Golden Gophers were ranked second in the latest national rankings by NCAA average. No. 3 Ohio State and No. 5 Iowa give the Big Ten Conference three of the top five teams in the nation. The next national computer rankings will be released on Tuesday, April 3.

BUSY WEEKEND FOR GOLDEN GOPHER TRACK & FIELD TEAM

The Golden Gopher track & field team will be in two places this weekend. Head coach Roy Griak will be at the Texas Relays with a pair of Golden Gophers, while assistant coach Phil Lundin will be at the Georgia Invitational on Saturday with the rest of the squad.

Texas Relays: Freshman Chris Murrell (Grand Island, NE) and senior Carson Hoeft (Plymouth, MN) will compete at the Texas Relays in Austin on Saturday. Murrell is entered in the high jump competition, while Hoeft will be entered in the 1500 meters.

Georgia Invitational: The majority of the Golden Gopher squad will compete at the Georgia Invitational in Athens on Saturday.

Great Start: The Golden Gophers opened their 1990 outdoor season in impressive fashion by winning a total of five events at the Georgia Relays in Athens, GA on March 24. Winning was contagious for head coach Roy Griak's team. In the distance events, junior Chris Harder (Austin, MN) won the 3000 meter steeplechase with a clocking of 9:30.41, and sophomore Sean Fitzgerald (Ottawa, Ontario, Canada), junior Chris York (Dubuque, IA) and seniors Carson Hoeft and Dan Hebl (Menomonie, WI) took top honors in the distance medley relay with a time of 10:05.75. In the sprints, sophomore Tim Arinze (Festic Town, Lagos, Nigeria) took the 100 meter dash with a time

of 10.62. In the field events, junior **Ross Thompson** (Esko, MN) won the pole vault with a mark of 16'0", while Chris Murrell continued his winning ways with a leap of 6'11" in the high jump.

Murrell the Magnificent: Recognized as one of the finest prep high jumpers in the country a year ago when he won the Nebraska state high school crown for Grand Island with a state record jump of 7'1 1/4", Chris Murrell has continued to shine in Gold Country. After an amazing indoor season, he kept things rolling along by winning the Georgia Relays title in the first outdoor collegiate competition of his career. His winning leap of 7'3" at the Big Ten Indoor Championships held at Bloomington, IN on February 24 broke former Golden Gopher great Mike Vukovich's school indoor record of 7'2 1/2" set in 1988. He was honored on the All-Big Ten Team for his efforts and also finished fifth in the Athlete-of-the-Year and third in the Freshman-of-the-Year voting following the competition. At the NCAA Indoor Championships held on March 9 at the Hoosier Dome in Indianapolis, IN, he finished 10th overall with a leap of 7'2 1/2".

GOLDEN GOPHER NETTERS WIN A PAIR OF BIG TEN MATCHES; AT OHIO STATE & INDIANA THIS WEEKEND (7-9/2-0 Big Ten)

The defending Big Ten champion Golden Gopher tennis team opened conference play in impressive fashion last weekend on the road, defeating Purdue 8-1 on Friday and then Illinois 6-3 on Saturday.

Double Trouble: Junior **Kevin Werwie** (Sheboygan, WI) and freshman **Rick Naumoff** (Columbus, OH) won both of their singles matches for the Golden Gophers over the weekend. Werwie topped Purdue's Andy Berlinski 6-0,6-3 on Friday at the No. 2 position and then came back to defeat John Murray from Illinois 6-4,4-6,6-1 at No. 3 singles on Saturday. Naumoff crushed Curt Lowry of Purdue 6-2,6-2 and then did the same the next day to David Nasser of Illinois 6-1,6-1 at the No. 4 slot. Senior **Rafer Leach** (Lexington, KY) and junior **Anthony Cruz** (Medinah, IL) swept their matches at No. 2 doubles, defeating Purdue's Scott Micus and Paul Wagner 7-6,7-5 on Friday, and then Hector Ortiz and Mike Eberly of Illinois 6-2,7-6 on Saturday. Freshman **Dominic Roderiguez** (Albuquerque, NM) joined Naumoff for a 6-1,6-2 victory over Curt Lowry and Matt Carey of Purdue at No. 3 doubles and then came back the next day with freshman **Grant Julian** (Voorhees, NJ) to take a 6-3,3-6,6-3 win at the No. 3 slot over Brian Dillman and Sadri Gueche of Illinois.

The Road Gets Tougher: The Golden Gophers will take to the road this weekend for another pair of Big Ten matches, taking on Ohio State in Columbus on Saturday and then Indiana in Bloomington on Sunday. The Buckeyes are led by the potent doubles combination of Kevin Dibelius and Gabor Koves, ranked No. 13 nationally, and Ty Tucker, ranked No. 29 in singles. The Hoosiers are paced by Gunnar Salumaa, ranked No. 97 in the latest national singles rankings.

Uihlein 85th In National Rankings: Sophomore **Brian Uihlein** (Lake Forest, IL) has been ranked No. 85 in the most recent Volvo Tennis/Collegiate Rankings. He scored a big 6-2,7-6 victory over No. 6 Byron Black from USC on March 20 and is 19-15 in singles action on the season. For the first time this season, the Golden Gophers fell out of the national team rankings.

GOLF TEAM TO COMPETE AT PURDUE INVITATIONAL THIS WEEKEND

Emo Leads The Way: Junior Billy Emo (Ridge Manor, FL) paced the Golden Gophers at the Sugar Tree Invitational with a 54-hole total of 236. A pack of Golden Gophers followed Emo. Junior Paul Keller (Dickinson, ND), sophomores Dave Carothers (Owatonna, MN) and Mike Fish (Marshfield, WI), and freshman Rick Grand (Bemidji, MN) all tallied identical scores of 241 in the competition.

MINNESOTA CONNECTION SET FOR USA-CUBAN WRESTLING DUAL

The University of Minnesota wrestling team will have a strong representation when the USA National Team takes to the mat with the Cuban National Team on Sunday at 2:00 p.m. at the National Sports Center in Blaine.

Golden Gopher head coach, J Robinson, and assistant head coach, Gary Keck, will reverse their roles for the competition. Keck will serve as the head coach of the USA squad on Sunday and also at the Pan Am Championships to be held in Colorado Springs on June 15-16. Robinson will serve as Keck's assistant on Sunday.

Junior Marty Morgan (Bloomington, MN) will wrestle at 180.5 pounds for the USA squad on Sunday. The two-time All-American for the Golden Gophers finished second at 177 pounds at the recent NCAA Championships. He led the squad in victories, finishing with an overall record of 39-2 on the year, setting a new single-season school record in the process with 20 pins. In addition to winning the Big Ten crown this year, he also claimed individual titles this past season at the Bison Open (Fargo, ND), Nebraska-Omaha Open, Northern Open (Madison, WI) and the Oregon Classic (Portland, OR). A year ago he charted an overall record of 32-10 with 12 pins, finishing sixth at the national meet at 167 pounds. He transferred to Gold Country from North Dakota State University where he won the NCAA Division II national title at 167 pounds in 1987 for the Bison.

A two-time All-American during an illustrious career for the Golden Gophers and a graduate assistant coach at his alma mater this past season, Dave Dean will wrestle at 198 pounds for the USA squad on Sunday. He put the appropriate finishing touches on an outstanding career as a senior in 1989 by winning the Big Ten crown at 177 pounds and then finishing third at the NCAA Championships. He led the team in victories that season with a 34-2-1 mark. A knee injury forced him to redshirt the 1987-88 season. In 1986-87, he was the Big Ten champion at 190 pounds and the runner-up in the division at the national meet. He finished his career with an overall record of 123-32-3.

An assistant coach for the Golden Gophers, Greg Randall will wrestle at 136.5 pounds for the USA team on Sunday against the Cubans. He was a two-time NCAA runner-up and a three-time All-American during his collegiate career at the University of Iowa. In 1984 he was honored as the NCAA's Freshman-of-the-Year. During his career he was a member of three national championship teams for the Hawkeyes.

"Everyone dreams, not only of winning the NCAA title, but also of someday winning an Olympic gold medal," Keck said. "This is a great opportunity for our guys to see how they stack up with some of the best wrestlers in the world. It should be a great meet."

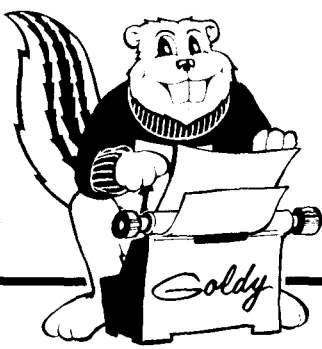

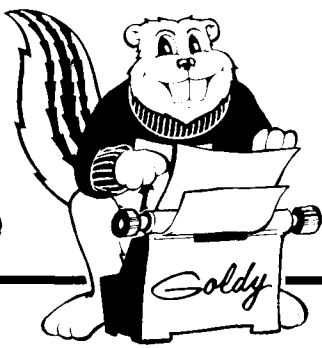

MCKIERNAN & MURRELL HONORED AS BIG TEN ATHLETES-OF-THE-MONTH

Senior gymnast, **Mark McKiernan** (Darien, CT), and freshman high jumper, **Chris Murrell** (Grand Island, NE), have been honored as the Big Ten Conference Athletes-of-the-Month in their respective sports for the month of March.

One of five nominees for the 1990 IBM/George Nissen Award which honors the outstanding senior collegiate gymnast, McKiernan helped lead the Golden Gophers to the 1990 Big Ten team title on March 2-3 by winning his second straight league pommel horse crown and placing in a total of four individual events. Following the conference meet, he then won the parallel bars competition with a score of 9.85 in the dual against Nebraska on March 10 and the pommel horse with a score of 9.75 in the meet against Iowa and Wisconsin on March 24. Presently ranked second in the nation on the pommel horse, third on the parallel bars and 13th in the all-around, he is the first Minnesota gymnast to ever become a four-time All-Big Ten performer after capturing a total of four league individual crowns during his career. A member of the U.S. National Team, he collected All-America honors on the pommel horse after finishing fourth in the event at the 1989 NCAA Championships.

Recognized as one of the finest prep high jumpers in the country a year ago when he won the Nebraska state high school crown for Grand Island with a state record leap of 7'1 1/4", Murrell has continued to shine in Gold Country. After an amazing indoor season, he kept things rolling along by winning the Georgia Relays title on March 24 with a leap of 6'11" in the first outdoor collegiate competition of his career. His winning leap of 7'3" at the Big Ten Indoor Championships held at Bloomington, IN on February 24 broke former Golden Gopher great Mike Vukovich's school indoor record of 7'2 1/2" set in 1988. He was honored on the All-Big Ten Team for his efforts. At the NCAA Indoor Championships held on March 9 at the Hoosier Dome in Indianapolis, IN, he finished 10th overall with a leap of 7'2 1/2".

First item on the agenda is appointing a Final Four Twin Cities Organizing Committee, a blue ribbon delegation that will include an Executive Committee and an Operations Committee made up of individuals from the community and from the University of Minnesota.

"We are extremely excited to have all but one committee member in place," U of M Men's Athletic Director Rick Bay said, "We have posted the position of Executive Director for the tournament, and that individual also will serve as the Assistant Director For Media Relations on our department's administrative staff. 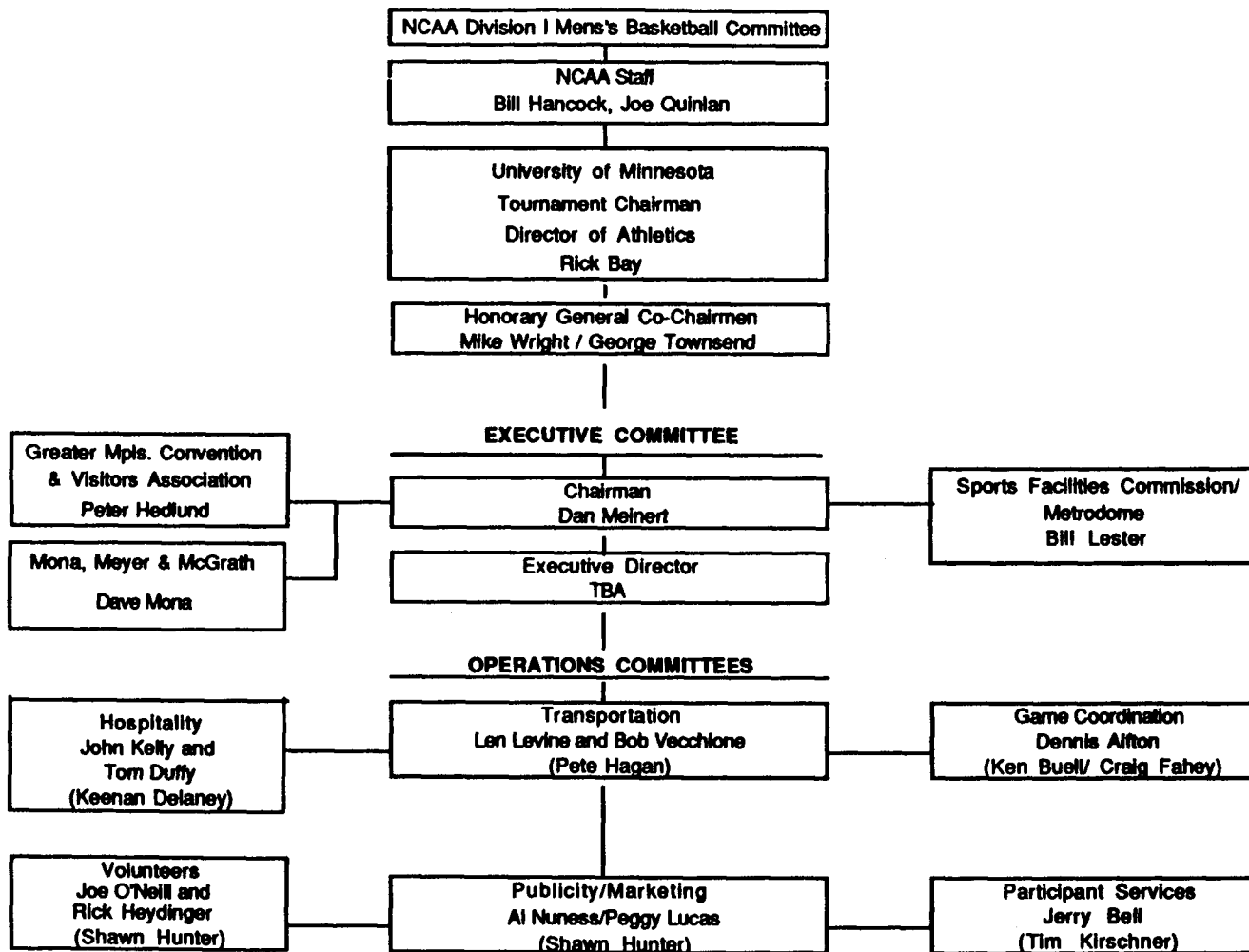

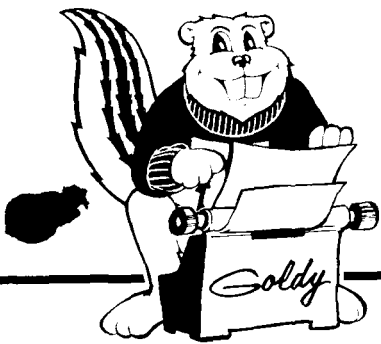

GOPHER HOCKEY AWARDS ANNOUNCED

Peter Hankinson (Edina), senior co-captain and right wing, tonight was named recipient of the John Mariucci Most Valuable Player Award announced at the annual U. of Minnesota Hockey Awards Banquet held at the Minneapolis Athletic Club.

Hankinson was Minnesota's leading scorer this past season with 66 points on 25 goals and 41 assists in 46 games. Hankinson also set a new school career record by playing in 176 games during his four years at Minnesota.

Peter's younger brother, junior right wing **Ben Hankinson**, was later named captain of the 1990-91 Gopher varsity. Ben Hankinson has won three varsity letters with the Gopher program and is known as the team's enforcer with his hard checking style of play.

Two more outstanding junior players, left wing **Grant Bischoff (Grand Rapids)** and center **Ken Gernander (Coleraine)**, were elected alternate captains by their teammates.

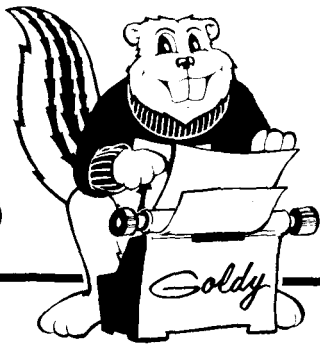
John Mayasich Outstanding Student/Athlete -- **Jason Miller, Jr. C (Bloomington)**

NCAA MEN'S GYMNASTICS CHAMPIONSHIPS

Head coach Fred Roethlisberger's powerful Golden Gopher gymnastics team registered a school record score of 286.05 to claim the team crown at the Eastern Regional Championships held last Saturday at Penn State University in University Park, PA.

NCAA Qualifiers: Minnesota from the Eastern Region and Nebraska, the winners of the Western Regional Championships held Saturday at the

University of Oklahoma in Norman, headline the list of eight team qualifiers for the NCAA Championships to be held April 19-21 at Williams Arena. The top four teams from each regional, along with the top 12 individuals in each event, advanced to the national meet. Ohio State, Penn State and Iowa join the Golden Gophers as team qualifiers from the East, while UCLA, Oklahoma and New Mexico join the Cornhuskers from the West.

Minnesota Head Coach Fred Roethlisberger: "The guys have really worked hard and they did a great job on Saturday. But we don't want to get too carried away with this. The big thing was to qualify. We wanted to go out there and, more than anything else, come back with a positive feeling from it. This certainly will give us a lot of confidence in our training leading up to the NCAA Championships."

Records Fall: The Golden Gophers not only shattered the previous school record of 283.35 set in the qualifying round of the 1989 NCAA Championships in Lincoln, NE, but their score of 286.05 on Saturday also stands as the nation's best score heading into the national meet. Their scores of 48.25 on the pommel horse and 48.15 on the still rings also set new school records. The old pommel horse record was 48.20 and the still rings mark was 47.75. Both of those were also set in the qualifying round of the national meet a year ago.

Almost Perfect: Overall, the Golden Gophers came out on top in five of the six events in Saturday's competition, scoring 47.30 on the floor exercise, 48.25 on the pommel horse, 48.15 on the still rings, 47.60 on the parallel bars and 47.90 on the high bar. Ohio State scored 47.05 on the vault, with the Golden Gophers right behind with a 46.85.

Looking Good: The Golden Gophers had three of the top five all-around performers at the Eastern Regional Championships on Saturday. Freshman John Roethlisberger (Afton, MN) finished third with a score of 57.05, junior Jay Caputo (Longwood, FL) was fourth in 56.75 and senior Mark McKiernan (Darien, CT) tied for fifth with a 56.70. Ohio State's Mike Racanelli (58.25) and Temple's Bill Roth (58.05) finished 1-2 in the final standings. McKiernan also tied with fellow senior Mike Graham (Green Bay, WI) for the runner-up spot on the pommel horse with identical 9.80 scores and for third on the parallel bars with sophomore Leif Carlson (Bloomington, MN) with 9.65's. Other individual highlights included senior Jeff Weltzin (Libertyville, IL) tying for second on the still rings with a 9.75 and Caputo garnering the runner-up spot on the high bar with a 9.70.

McKiernan Nominated For IBM/George Nissen Award: Mark McKiernan, recently honored as the Big Ten Conference Gymnastics Athlete-of-the-Month for March, is one of five finalists for the prestigious IBM/George Nissen Award which is presented annually to the outstanding senior in men's collegiate gymnastics. Jeff Dow from Iowa, Patrick Kirksey from Nebraska, Mike Racanelli from Ohio State and Chris Waller from UCLA are the other nominees for the award. The gymnastic equivalent of college football's Heisman Trophy, the winner will be announced at the National Association of College Gymnastics Coaches (NACGC) annual awards dinner on April 18 at the Radisson University Hotel in Minneapolis.

McKiernan, who helped lead the Golden Gophers to their impressive victory at last Saturday's Eastern Regional Championships, was also honored as the 1989 Big Ten Conference Gymnast-of-the-Year after winning the all-around and the pommel horse. A member of the U.S. National Team, the Golden Gopher co-captain helped direct the squad to the 1990 conference team title earlier this season by winning his second straight pommel horse crown and placing in a total of four individual events during the competition. He garnered All-America honors after finishing fourth on the pommel horse at the 1989 NCAA Championships. During his collegiate career, he has captured a total of four individual Big Ten titles and has become the first four-time All-Big Ten gymnastics selection in Minnesota history. Presently ranked No. 14 in the all-around in the latest national rankings, he is an applied design major with a 2.8 GPA.

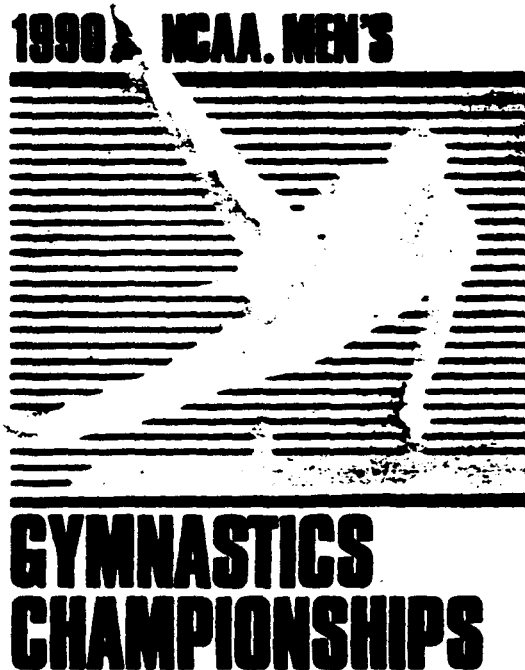

Call It "C" For Consistency: The Golden Gophers have registered six straight scores of 281.15 or better, with Saturday's winning score of 286.05 at the Eastern Regional Championships leading the way.

All In The Family: John Roethlisberger was named the Big Ten Conference Gymnastics Athlete-of-the-Month for three consecutive months (December, January, February). After Mark McKiernan was honored with the distinction for the month of March, it gave the Golden Gophers a clean sweep of the league award for the 1989-90 season. John and his sister Marie, who won the women's NCAA Central Regional all-around crown at Williams Arena on Saturday, became the first brother-sister combination in league history to win the award in the same month when Marie, a senior for the Golden Gophers, collected Athlete-of-the-Month honors in women's gymnastics for the month of February. In addition to finishing third in the all-around at Saturday's Eastern Regional Championships, John led the Golden Gophers to their first Big Ten team title since 1984 and 18th overall at the league championships held in Iowa City on March 2-3 (included in February voting). He won the all-around title with a score of 113.35 (57.40 optional, 55.95 compulsory) and the horizontal bar crown with a 9.75. In addition, he finished second on the parallel bars (9.675), fifth in the floor exercise (9.25) and seventh on the pommel horse (9.050) en route to being honored as the Big Ten Gymnast and Freshman-of-the-Year. On top of that, Golden Gopher men's coach Fred Roethlisberger added to the family's ever-expanding collection of hardware when he was honored as the Big Ten Coach-of-the-Year after directing his squad to the conference title.

The Top 10: The Golden Gophers were ranked second in the latest national rankings by NCAA average. No. 3 Ohio State and No. 6 Iowa give the Big Ten Conference three of the top six teams in the nation. The final national computer rankings will be released on Wednesday, April 11.

HOEFT WINS TEXAS RELAYS 1500; NEBRASKA INVITATIONAL ON SATURDAY

Senior **Carson Hoeft** (Plymouth, MN) won the Texas Relays 1500 meter run on Saturday to headline a very busy weekend of action for the Golden Gopher track & field team.

Hoeft Shines: One of the Big Ten's finest middle distance runners throughout his career in Gold Country, Carson Hoeft tucked yet another big victory away in his already impressive running portfolio with his win in the Texas Relays 1500 meters in Austin on Saturday. He clocked a time of 3:48.34 in the race. Teammate **Sean Fitzgerald** (Ottawa, Ontario, Canada), a sophomore, finished sixth in the race with a clocking of 3:54.60.

Georgia Triangular: Senior **Dan Hebl** (Menomonie, WI), juniors **Chris Harder** (Austin, MN) and **Ross Thompson** (Esko, MN) and sophomore **Tim Arinze** (Festic Town, Lagos, Nigeria) won individual events for the Golden Gophers in a triangular meet at the University of Georgia on Saturday. Hebl won the 800 meters with a personal-best clocking of 1:50.96, Harder took the 3000 meter steeplechase in 9:22.36, Thompson the pole vault with a mark of 16'0" and Arinze the 100 meters in a personal-best time of 10.54. Georgia Tech won the competition with 78 points, followed by Georgia with 67 and the Golden Gophers with 39. Arinze, who also finished fourth in the 200 meters with a personal-best time of 21.62, and freshman **Chad Rodvold** (Williston, ND), who placed second in the javelin with a fine toss of 197'1", also turned in exceptional efforts on the day.

Murrell Honored: Freshman **Chris Murrell** (Grand Island, NE) has been honored as the Big Ten Conference Track & Field Athlete-of-the-Month for March. Recognized as one of the finest prep high jumpers in the country a year ago when he won the Nebraska state high school crown for Grand Island with a state record jump of 7'1 1/4", Chris Murrell has continued to shine in Gold Country. After an amazing indoor season, he kept things rolling along by winning the Georgia Relays title in the first outdoor collegiate competition of his career. His winning leap of 7'3" at the Big Ten Indoor Championships held at Bloomington, IN on February 24 broke former Golden Gopher great Mike Vukovich's school indoor record of 7'2 1/2" set in 1988. He was honored on the All-Big Ten Team for his efforts and also finished fifth in the Athlete-of-the-Year and third in the Freshman-of-the-Year voting following the competition. At the NCAA Indoor Championships held on March 9 at the Hoosier Dome in Indianapolis, IN, he finished 10th overall with a leap of 7'2 1/2".

Nebraska Invitational: The Golden Gophers will compete at the Nebraska Invitational in Lincoln on Saturday. The host Cornhuskers won the team crown a year ago with 104 points, followed by Kansas State (81), Minnesota (55.5), Missouri (30) and Wyoming (14.5). Dan Hebl won the 1500 meter title at last year's meet for the Golden Gophers with a time of 3:49.39.

GOLDEN GOPHER NETTERS SPLIT A PAIR OF BIG TEN MATCHES; PLAY AT HOME THE REST OF THE WAY (8-10/3-1 Big Ten)

The defending Big Ten champion Golden Gopher tennis team closed out their regular season road schedule last weekend by splitting a pair of Big Ten matches. On Saturday, head coach David Geatz's squad dropped a 5-3 decision at Ohio State, before bouncing back with a big 6-3 victory at Indiana on Sunday.

LeBlanc Leads The Way: Sophomore **Philippe LeBlanc** (St. Bruno, Quebec, Canada) won a pair of singles matches for the Golden Gophers over the weekend. He defeated Ohio State's Kostis Glavas 3-6,6-2,6-0 at No. 5 singles and then Indiana's Chris Decker 6-2,5-7,6-4 at the No. 4 slot. For a little icing on the cake, he joined senior teammate **Rafer Leach** (Lexington, KY) for a 6-4,6-3 win at No. 2 doubles over Indiana's Chris Decker and Dave McCallum.

Home Cooking: The Golden Gophers will wrap up their regular season with seven straight home contests beginning on Friday when they host Gustavus Adolphus in non-conference action at the 4th Street Courts at 10:00 a.m., before taking on Iowa in Big Ten play at 6:30 p.m. that night at the 98th Street Racquet Club in Bloomington. They will also host No. 21 Northwestern at 6:30 p.m. on

Saturday at the 98th Street Racquet Club. The Wildcats are led by Todd Martin, winner of the Rolex National Indoor Intercollegiate Tennis Championships last February and ranked No. 1 in the latest Volvo Tennis/Collegiate Rankings.

Uihlein 81st In National Rankings: Sophomore Brian Uihlein (Lake Forest, IL) has been ranked No. 81 in the most recent Volvo Tennis/Collegiate Rankings. He will most likely face the nation's top-ranked player in Todd Martin when the Golden Gophers host Northwestern on Saturday night at the 98th Street Racquet Club.

GOLF TEAM FINISHES 11TH AT PURDUE INVITATIONAL; DUKE INVITATIONAL THIS WEEKEND

Junior Paul Keller (Dickinson, ND) finished in a tie for eighth in the individual standings to pace the Golden Gopher golf team at the 36-hole Purdue Invitational last weekend.

Keller Looks Sharp: An All-Big Ten selection for the Golden Gophers last season, Paul Keller fired rounds of 73-75 to finish with a score of 148 and end up in a five-way logjam for eighth-place in the final individual standings. He was followed by sophomore Dave Carothers (Owatonna, MN), who finished 35th in the 60-player field with identical rounds of 77-77 for a 154 total.

Duke Invitational: The Golden Gophers will compete at the Duke Invitational in Durham, NC this Friday thru Sunday. A year ago head coach Greg Harvey's squad finished 22nd in the final team standings with a 54-hole score of 947.

ZUNIGA LEADS USA WRESTLERS OVER CUBANS

Junior Dave Zuniga (Worland, WY) scored an impressive 4-2 victory over Lazaro Reinoso at 136.5 pounds to lead a USA wrestling squad filled with present and former University of Minnesota standouts to a 21-17 victory over Cuba last Sunday at the National Sports Center in Blaine.

Zuniga, who won the Big Ten title at 134 pounds and then finished second at the NCAA Championships in the weight class for the Golden Gophers this past season, scored the big upset victory over Reinoso in the first international competition of his career. Reinoso has already beaten the top two Americans in the weight class, Golden Gopher assistant coach Greg Randall and three-time world champion John Smith.

Junior Marty Morgan (Bloomington, MN), a two-time All-American for the Golden Gophers who captured the Big Ten crown at 177 pounds this season and then also finished second at the NCAA Championships, lost a 5-3 decision to Orlando Hernandez at 180.5 pounds. Pressed into duty at the last minute, redshirt freshman Scott Dooley (Lakewood, CO), a two-time Colorado state champion during his prep career, was pinned at 2:44 of his match at 125.5 pounds against Osbel Rodriguez.

Two former Golden Gopher All-Americans also competed in the meet. Ed Geise scored a 7-6 victory over Alfredo Leyva at 114.5 pounds and Dave Dean lost a 6-1 decision to Geovany Redmond at 198 pounds.

Golden Gopher head coach, J Robinson, and assistant head coach, Gary Keck, reversed their roles for the competition. Keck served as the head coach of the USA squad on Sunday and will also be at the controls of the USA squad at the Pan Am Championships to be held in Colorado Springs on June 15-16. Robinson served as Keck's assistant on Sunday.

For three games it was a case of missed opportunities and lack of execution that did in the U of Minnesota baseball Gophers in their Big Ten-opening series at Illinois last weekend. Minnesota dropped three of four games to the powerful Illini, both the defending conference champs and odds-on favorite repeat this year.

Minnesota, for the second straight week, goes back on the road, this time for six games. The Gophers play a doubleheader Wednesday at Iowa, then travel to Ann Arbor to meet the struggling Wolverines in four games Saturday and Sunday. All six outings will be broadcast live on WAYL-980 AM radio with Doug McLeod handling play-by-play chores.

The fact that Minnesota plays 12 of its first 14 Big Ten games on the road doesn't seem to phase head coach John Anderson. "Oh, I guess it would be nice to get in a few home games early," he said today. "But what's the real difference? We have to play them sometime. Why not now?" The following week finds UM hosting Iowa for two, then traveling to Ohio State to complete its conference road assignments.

The weekend in Champaign opened on a sour note Saturday when Illinois struck for six runs in the second inning of the first game and coasted to an 8-4 victory. Then the frustration set in.

Minnesota used its own second inning in the nightcap to score five times for a 5-1 lead. But the Illini chipped in a run here and a run there eventually taking a 7-5 lead in the sixth inning. The eventual tying and winning runs scored as a result of a dropped fly ball in short left field with the bases loaded and one out.

Minnesota came back in its final at bat to score once and see the tying run stranded at third base when the rally fizzled. Sophomore pitchers Scott Bakkum (LaCrosse, WI) (1-3, 0-1) and David Anderson (Barrington, IL) (1-3, 0-1) took the losses for Minnesota.

Sunday's first game started out with more of the same. Second baseman Brian Raabe (New Ulm) and center fielder Ryan Lefebvre (Los Angeles, CA) opened with sharp singles. Shortstop Brent Gates (Grandville, MI) followed with a line smash. The ball, however, went directly to the Illini SS who promptly turned it into a triple play.

Minnesota bounced back to take a 2-1 lead in the second inning on Keith Krenke's (Owatonna) two-run homer, and tied matters at 3-all in the 4th on Krenke's double and a single by first baseman Jeff Monson (Bloomington). But Illinois got a pair of solo home runs in the sixth inning off UM starter and loser John Lowery (Shepherdstown, WV) (2-3, 0-1) to snare another victory. Both round trippers were aided by a stiff wind blowing out to center field.

The Gophers got one back in their last at bat only to leave the bases loaded when the last batter grounded into a force play. "It was not the wind that beat us, but a lack of execution," Anderson said.

The final series game, however, gave UM needed hope. Minnesota lashed out 20 hits off three pitchers to gain a whopping 14-1 victory. Freshman Eric Slagle (Barrington, IL) (1-2, 1-0) gained his first collegiate win on a 4-hitter.

Gopher All-American candidate at catcher, junior Dan Wilson (Barrington, IL), supplied all Slagle needed to win. Wilson banged out two home runs, the second a grand slam, and added a sacrifice fly giving him six RBIs for the contest. For the weekend he was 6 for 12 from the plate with 8 RBIs. Raabe matched that by going 10 for 15 and scoring five times. Raabe led off all four games for Minnesota with singles. Wilson is now hitting .430 on the season while Raabe, in the last week, raised his average more than 100 points to .343.

GOPHER BASKETBALL AWARDS ANNOUNCED

Senior Willie Burton (Detroit, MI) was honored as the most valuable player of the University of Minnesota basketball squad at the team's awards banquet on Sunday night at the Marriott City Center in Minneapolis. Head coach Clem Haskins' Golden Gophers finished the season with a 23-9 overall record, equalling the second-highest win total ever recorded in school history, and advanced to the "Elite Eight" of the NCAA Basketball Tournament.

An All-Big Ten First Team selection, Burton led the Golden Gophers in scoring this season, averaging 19.3 points a contest. He finished his career in Gold Country as the school's second all-time leading scorer with 1,800 points, after recording 35 points in the heartbreaking 93-91 loss to Georgia Tech in the Southeast Regional Final at New Orleans, LA. He also averaged 6.4 rebounds, shot 52 percent (210-405) from the field and made a team-leading 77 percent (144-187) of his free throws this past season.

He will be aided by two junior forwards, **Grant Bischoff (Grand Rapids)** and **Ken Gernander (Coleraine)**, who were named alternate captains for next season. This trio of student/athletes has played major roles in Minnesota reaching the NCAA playoffs each of their last three seasons.

Numerous other awards were also announced at the banquet. Additional players honored included senior wing **Brett Strot (Brooklyn Park)**, who received the Dr. George V. Nagobads Unsung Hero trophy, senior center **Dean Williamson (Edina)**, who was given the Mike Crupi Most Determined Player trophy, and junior center **Jason Miller (Bloomington)** the John Mayasich Outstanding Student/Athlete trophy.

Gernander was further honored when he was given the Elwin "Doc" Romnes Leadership/Sportsmanship trophy, and two freshmen players, goalie **Tom Newman (Blaine)** and freshman right wing **Trent Klatt (Osseo)**, were named co-winners of the Frank Pond Rookie of the Year trophy.

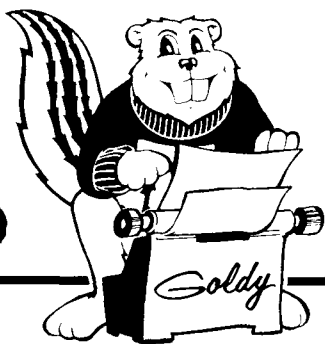

Prior to that, Donahue held the post of vice-president at the Colorado Women's College where she functioned as a dean of the college and faculty as well as director of the summer school. She also has taught at the elementary, high school and college levels.

A 1950 graduate of River Falls, WI, High School, Donahue attended the University of Wisconsin in Madison and received her B.S. degree there in 1954 as well as her M.S. degree in 1967. She also received her Ed. D from the University of Colorado in 1969.

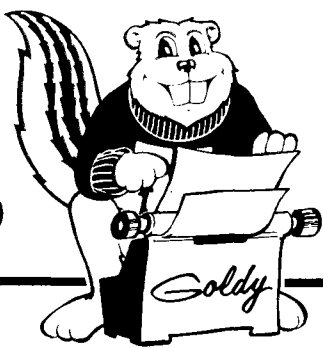
KURTZ SIGNS WITH UNIVERSITY OF MINNESOTA

Andy Kurtz, a five-time Minnesota State High School swimming champion during his prep career at Coon Rapids High School, has signed a national letter of intent to attend the University of Minnesota.

Kurtz won the 100 yard backstroke and 100 yard butterfly at the 1990 state meet, after taking top honors in the 100 yard backstroke and 200 yard individual medley, along with swimming a leg on the school's victorious 200 yard medley relay unit at the 1989 state competition. He is a five-time high school All-American and won the 1989 Junior Olympic title in the 100 meter backstroke in record time.

In addition to holding the state record in the 200 yard individual medley with a clocking of 1:53.71, Kurtz also has registered personal-best times of 51.3 in the 100 yard backstroke, 50.0 in the 100 yard butterfly and 1:53.2 in the 200 yard backstroke. The son of Erwin and Jeannine Kurtz of Coon Rapids, he has been selected to compete in the 1990 U.S. Olympic Festival which will be held at the new \$11 million University of Minnesota Aquatics Center. He plans on majoring in either aero or mechanical engineering at the University of Minnesota.

"We are ecstatic that Andy has chosen the University of Minnesota to continue his athletic and academic career," said Golden Gopher head coach Dennis Dale, whose 1990 squad recorded their best finish at the Big Ten Championships since 1927 when they finished second at the league meet. "He is a great addition to the team. Andy's backstroking talents and his versatility will make him an instant contributor to the team."

Ohio State scored 47.05 on the vault, with the Golden Gophers right behind with a 46.85.

Looking Good: The Golden Gophers had three of the top five all-around performers at the Eastern Regional Championships. Freshman **John Roethlisberger** (Afton, MN) finished third with a score of 57.05, junior **Jay Caputo** (Longwood, FL) was fourth in 56.75 and senior **Mark McKiernan** (Darien, CT) tied for fifth with a 56.70. Ohio State's **Mike Racanelli** (58.25) and Temple's **Bill Roth** (58.05) finished 1-2 in the final standings. McKiernan also tied with fellow senior **Mike Graham** (Green Bay, WI) for the runner-up spot on the pommel horse with identical 9.80 scores and for third on the parallel bars with sophomore **Leif Carlson** with 9.65's. Other individual highlights included senior **Jeff Weltzin** (Libertyville, IL) tying for second on the still rings with a 9.75 and Caputo garnering the runner-up spot on the high bar with a 9.70.

National Championships: The University of Minnesota has won 13 NCAA national titles, with the last one coming in 1979

McKiernan Nominated For IBM/George Nissen Award: Mark McKiernan, recently honored as the Big Ten Conference Gymnastics Athlete-of-the-Month for March, is one of five finalists for the prestigious IBM/George Nissen Award which is presented annually to the outstanding senior in men's collegiate gymnastics. Jeff Dow from Iowa, Patrick Kirksey from Nebraska, Mike Racanelli from Ohio State and Chris Waller from UCLA are the other nominees for the award. The gymnastics equivalent of college football's Heisman Trophy, the winner will be announced at the National Association of College Gymnastics Coaches (NACGC) annual awards dinner on Wednesday, April 18, at the Radisson University Hotel in Minneapolis.

McKiernan, who helped lead the Golden Gophers to their impressive victory at the Eastern Regional Championships, was also honored as the 1989 Big Ten Conference Gymnast-of-the-Year after winning the all-around and the pommel horse. A member of the U.S. National Team, the Golden Gopher co-captain helped direct the squad to the 1990 conference team title earlier this season by winning his second straight pommel horse crown and placing in a total of four individual events during the competition. He garnered All-America honors after finishing fourth on the pommel horse at the 1989 NCAA Championships. During his collegiate career, he has captured a total of four individual Big Ten titles and has become the first four-time All-Big Ten gymnastics selection in Minnesota history. Presently ranked No. 15 in the all-around in the latest national rankings, he is an applied design major with a 2.8 GPA.

Call It "C" For Consistency: The Golden Gophers have registered six straight scores of 281.15 or better, with their winning score of 286.05 at the Eastern Regional Championships leading the way.

All In The Family: John Roethlisberger was named the Big Ten Conference Gymnastics Athlete-of-the-Month for three consecutive months (December, January, February). After Mark McKiernan was honored with the distinction for the month of March, it gave the Golden Gophers a clean sweep of the league award for the 1989-90 season. John and his sister, Marie, who won the women's NCAA Central Regional all-around crown at Williams Arena on April 7, became the first brother-sister combination in league history to win the award in the same month when Marie, a senior for the Golden Gophers, collected Athlete-of-the-Month honors in women's gymnastics for the month of February. In addition to finishing third in the all-around at the Eastern Regional Championships, John led the Golden Gophers to their first Big Ten team title since 1984 and 18th overall at the league championships held in Iowa City on March 2-3 (included in February voting). He won the all-around title with a score of 113.35 (57.40 optional, 55.95 compulsory) and the horizontal bar crown with a 9.75. In addition, he finished second on the parallel bars (9.675), fifth in the floor exercise (9.25) and seventh on the pommel horse (9.050) en route to being honored as the Big Ten Gymnast and Freshman-of-the-Year. On top of that, Golden Gopher men's coach Fred Roethlisberger added to the family's ever-expanding collection of hardware when he was honored as the Big Ten Coach-of-the-Year after directing his squad to the conference title. He will also be inducted into the U.S. Gymnastics Hall of Fame as a gymnast, coach and contributor at Wednesday's NACGC awards dinner at the Radisson University Hotel.

Freshman **Justin Daler** (Toledo, OH) tied the school outdoor pole vault record with a winning mark of 16'6" to pace the Golden Gopher track & field team to second-place in the final team standings at the four-team Nebraska Invitational in Lincoln last Saturday.

A Trifecta: Justin Daler, who captured the 1989 Ohio State High School Championship with a vault of 16'0", tied the old school record of 16'6" set by Al Whitesell in 1981 and Glenn Bullick in 1975 and set a new freshman outdoor school record in the process. He easily outdistanced Brad Hasler and Tim Grimmert from Missouri who cleared 15'5" in the competition. During the indoor season, he set a new school freshman record with a vault of 16'4". Freshman **Chris Murrell** (Grand Island, NE) with a leap of 7'1" in the high jump and junior **Keith Eidman** (Roseville, MN) with a clocking of 31:22.7 in the 10,000 meters were also individual event winners in the competition for the Gophers.

Coming On: One of the Big Ten's finest middle distance runners throughout his career in Gold Country, senior **Carson Hoeft** (Plymouth, MN), who won the Texas Relays 1500 in 3:48.34 on April 7, continued to shine on Saturday. He finished third in the 800 meters with a personal-best clocking of 1:50.55. Nebraska's Dieudonne Kwizera, a world-class competitor, won the race in 1:48.09, followed by Kansas State's Marcus Wright in 1:49.00. Senior **Eric Overby** (Kenyon, MN) clocked a personal-best of 31:35.9 to finish second behind teammate Eidman in the 10,000 meters, junior **Chris Harder** (Austin, MN) was the runner-up in the 3000 meter steeplechase in 9:19.30, senior **Dan Hebl** (Menomonie, WI) finished second in the 1500 meters with a fine time of 3:49.6 and junior **Chris York** (Dubuque, IA) was second in the 400 meter intermediate hurdles in 53.55 as a number of Golden Gophers turned in outstanding efforts on the day.

Murrell Honored: Chris Murrell was honored as the Big Ten Conference Track & Field Athlete-of-the-Month for March. Recognized as one of the finest prep high jumpers in the country a year ago when he won the Nebraska state high school crown for Grand Island with a state record jump of 7'1 1/4", Chris Murrell has continued to shine in Gold Country. After an amazing indoor season, he kept things rolling along by winning the Georgia Relays title in the first outdoor collegiate competition of his career on March 24 with a leap of 6'11". He added another victory at last Saturday's Nebraska Invitational after clearing 7'1" in the competition. His winning leap of 7'3" at the Big Ten Indoor Championships held at Bloomington, IN on February 24 broke former Golden Gopher great Mike Vukovich's school indoor record of 7'2 1/2" set in 1988. He was honored on the All-Big Ten Team for his efforts and also finished fifth in the Athlete-of-the-Year and third in the Freshman-of-the-Year voting following the competition. At the NCAA Indoor Championships held on March 9 at the Hoosier Dome in Indianapolis, IN, he finished 10th overall with a leap of 7'2 1/2".

Heading To Iowa City: The Golden Gophers will head to Iowa City on Saturday to face host Iowa, Northern Iowa and Western Illinois. In a triangular meet held indoors at the U of M Fieldhouse back on February 3, Northern Iowa (57) topped both the Hawkeyes (53) and Golden Gophers (49) in a meet that went right down to the wire. Iowa went on to finish sixth at the Big Ten Indoor Championships with 35 points, with the Golden Gophers right behind with 28 points.

The defending Big Ten champion Golden Gopher tennis team won two of three matches at home last weekend. After defeating Gustavus Adolphus 7-2 and Iowa 8-1 on Friday, head coach David Geatz's squad narrowly missed the sweep after dropping a heartbreaking 5-4 match to No. 21 Northwestern on Saturday.

Thank God Its Friday!: The Golden Gophers went two-for-two on Friday. Junior Kevin Werwie (Sheboygan, WI) at No. 1, freshman Grant Julian (Voorhees, NJ) at No. 2, freshman Dominic Roderiguez (Albuquerque, NM) at No. 3, sophomore Dean Hlushko (Arden Hills, MN) at No. 4, senior Rafer Leach (Lexington, KY) at No. 5 and sophomore Brian Uihlein (Lake Forest, IL) at No. 6 led the team to a sweep of the singles matches in the 7-2 victory over Gustavus Adolphus at the 4th Street Courts. Junior Anthony Cruz (Medinah, IL) and Werwie also teamed for a straight-set win at No. 2 doubles. Andy Kurtz, a five-time Minnesota State High School swimming champion during his prep career at Coon Rapids High School, has signed a national letter of intent to attend the University of Minnesota.

Kurtz won the 100 yard backstroke and 100 yard butterfly at the 1990 state meet, after taking top honors in the 100 yard backstroke and 200 yard individual medley, along with swimming a leg on the school's victorious 200 yard medley relay unit at the 1989 state competition. He is a five-time high school All-American and won the 1989 Junior Olympic title in the 100 meter backstroke in record time.

In addition to holding the state record in the 200 yard individual medley with a clocking of 1:53.71, Kurtz also has registered personal-best times of 51.3 in the 100 yard backstroke, 50.0 in the 100 yard butterfly and 1:53.2 in the 200 yard backstroke. The son of Erwin and Jeannine Kurtz of Coon Rapids, he has been selected to compete in the 1990 U.S. Olympic Festival which will be held at the new \$11 million University of Minnesota Aquatics Center. He plans on majoring in either aero or mechanical engineering at the University of Minnesota.

"We are ecstatic that Andy has chosen the University of Minnesota to continue his athletic and academic career," said Golden Gopher head coach Dennis Dale, whose 1990 squad recorded their best finish at the Big Ten Championships since 1927 when they finished second at the league meet. "He is a great addition to the team. Andy's backstroking talents and his versatility will make him an instant contributor to the team."

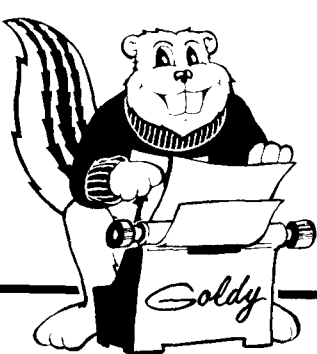

BRINKWORTH & MAX SIGN WITH UNIVERSITY OF MINNESOTA

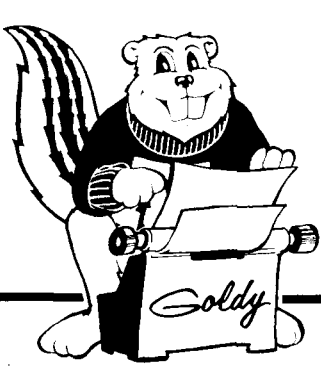

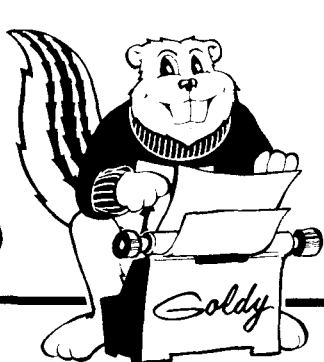

Mike Racanelli from Ohio State University was named the winner of the 1990 IBM/George Nissen Award at the National Association of College Gymnastics Coaches (NACGC) annual awards dinner held on Wednesday evening at the Radisson University Hotel in Minneapolis.

The gymnastic equivalent of college football's Heisman Trophy, the prestigious award is presented annually to the outstanding senior in men's collegiate gymnastics the day before the start of the NCAA Championships. Racanelli, from West Babylon, NY, finished second in the all-around at the 1989 NCAA Championships. In addition, he also tied for third on the floor exercise and fifth on the vault, as well as placing seventh on the still rings at the national meet a year ago. A co-captain for the Buckeyes this season, he captured the all-around with a score of 58.25, the floor exercise with a 9.80, the vault with a 9.70 and the parallel bars with a 9.80 at the Eastern Regional Championships held on April 7 at University Park, PA. According to the final national computer poll, he enters the NCAA Championships as the top-ranked competitor in the all-around and he's tied for the top spot on the floor.

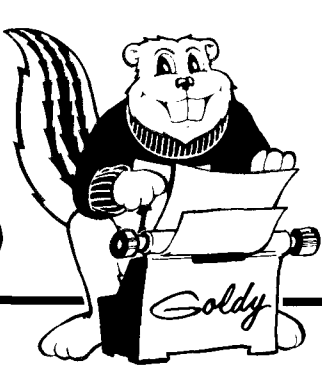
A member of the U.S. National Team after winning the floor exercise and finishing third in the all-around at the National Championships held last summer in Bloomington, MN, Racanelli has finished third in the all-around at the past two Big Ten Championships. 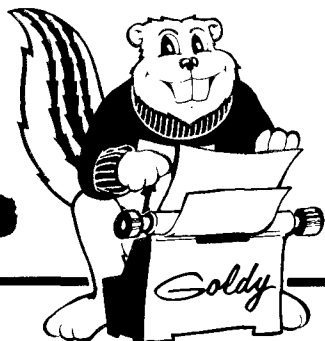
KRAFFT SIGNS WITH UNIVERSITY OF MINNESOTA

GOLDEN GOPHER BASEBALL LIGHTS UP THE BIG TEN

The University of Minnesota will open up its Big Ten night baseball schedule with the official Siebert Field Light Dedication Ceremony on Friday, April 27, at 7:00 p.m. The Gophers will play host to the Northwestern Wildcats in a four-game series Friday, Saturday (2), and Sunday.

The lighting ceremonies will showcase the \$280,000 light system that was recently installed at Siebert Field. The system consists of eight 100 foot towers. The four outfield towers with their 75 foot candles of illumination, combined with the 100 foot candles of light provided by the infield towers, will make Siebert Field the mecca of outdoor night baseball in the Twin Cities.

There will be a number of Gopher Baseball legends at the ceremonies. Paul Giel, the first All-American athlete in Gopher Baseball history, will throw out the ceremonial first pitch.

Giel, a member of Dick Siebert's 1952-54 Gopher teams, had 21 career wins and is still the all-time Gopher strikeout leader with 243 in his three years with the squad. For his accomplishments, Giel was named second team All-American in 1952, and was named to the first team in 1953.

Another legendary name in Gopher Baseball will participate in the lighting ceremonies, Marie Siebert, widow of the late Dick "Chief" Siebert, will throw the switch to officially begin the night baseball era at the University of Minnesota.

The lighting ceremonies are being sponsored by KLXK/WAYL radio, who are the broadcasters of Golden Gopher Big Ten Baseball at 980 on the AM dial. The first 1,000 fans to enter the game will receive a Golden Gopher Tradition poster. Tickets for the games may be purchased at the gate.

The history of Gopher Baseball at its current site began in 1953 when the old baseball facilities at Northrop Field were moved north to accommodate the arrival of the new field house on University Avenue.

The new field was known as Delta Field and was located just east of the current site of Siebert Field. Delta Field was the home of Gopher Baseball from 1953 until 1970 when the Bierman Field Athletic Complex was built..

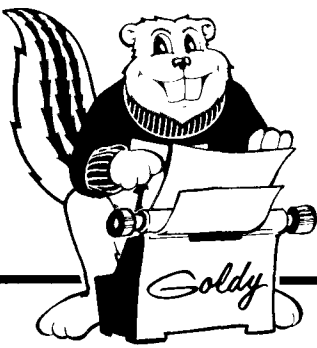
In 1971 the Gophers began play at the new Bierman Field baseball stadium which was part of the Bierman Field athletic complex built in that same year. Bierman Field baseball stadium was dedicated in Dick Siebert's memory on April 21, 1979.

Siebert Field as it is now known, remains as one of the finest collegiate fields in the country. In 1988 Siebert Field was named the top collegiate field in the country by Collegiate Baseball magazine. The installation of the lighting system can only add to that prestigious history.

In addition to the new lighting facilities, a new parking lot for Gopher Baseball games is now available just north of the stadium at the intersection of 15th Avenue and Rollins.

The facility is an important part of Gopher Baseball tradition, but its namesake is a legend in Gopher Baseball history. Dick "Chief" Siebert was the Skipper of the Minnesota baseball program from 1948-1978. During that span the "Chief" compiled a record of 754-361-4, for a .676 winning percentage.

During Siebert's illustrious career his teams made 12 appearances in NCAA post-season play, and five appearances in the College World Series, where he came away with three national titles (1956, 60, 64).

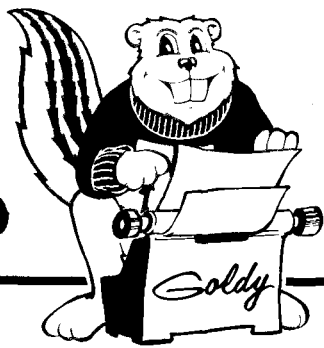

ERGENEKAN SIGNS WITH UNIVERSITY OF MINNESOTA

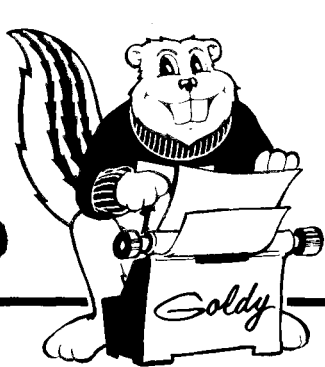
Can Ergenekan, a two-time high school swimming All-American out of Aloha (OR) High School, has signed a national letter of intent to attend the University of Minnesota.

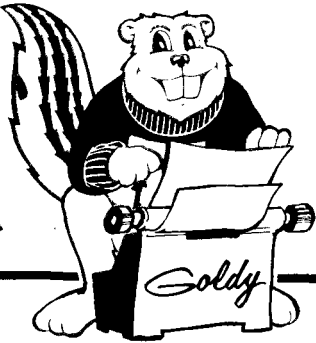
KLINGLESMITH SIGNS WITH UNIVERSITY OF MINNESOTA

Hamline University of St. Paul will be the first visiting team to experience the lighting when the Pipers take on the Gophers at 7 p.m. tonight (Tuesday). Following are single 7 p.m. games Wednesday vs. Mankato State, and Thursday against Bethel College.

Then comes the big celebration Friday when the Gophers begin a four-game home series against Northwestern. Formal dedication ceremonies have been planned as Friday's single game marks the first Big Ten contest under the Siebert Field lights.

Marie Siebert, widow of the late Gopher legend and head coach Richard "Chief" Siebert, has agreed to participate and will throw the ceremonial switch to officially inaugurate the lighting system. Then Paul Giel, Minnesota's first All-American baseball player and later men's athletic director, will throw out the first ball. A Minnesota Baseball Tradition poster will be given to the first 1,000 fans who attend Friday's game. Other special events are planned that evening, also.

Minnesota then closes the week with a twi-nighter (2 games)

against Northwestern Saturday beginning at 4 p.m., and a single 1 p.m. contest Sunday.

The Gophers have also scheduled additional night games against its remaining home opponents. Included are single games against Northern Iowa May 1, Wisconsin the 5th, St. Thomas the 8th, Concordia the 10th, and Michigan State the 11th and 12th.

For the first time this season, Minnesota enjoyed sweeping a Big Ten double header, then experienced what a four-game win streak feels like.

That happened last weekend when the Gophers took four straight from Ohio State in games played at Cooper Stadium, home of the Yankees AAA farm team, the Columbus Clippers. Minnesota defeated the Buckeyes 4-3 in eight innings the first game, then took consecutive regulation games by scores of 6-3, 7-5 and 8-3. The four wins moved Minnesota out of the conference cellar and into a tie for sixth place with Ohio State. Both teams are 7-9 in Big Ten play with 12 games remaining.

Minnesota's main hope now is to reach fourth place in the final regular season standings and qualify for the conference post season championship tournament. Iowa (13-3), Illinois (12-4) and Michigan State (13-5) appear safe bets to fill the other three spots.

GOLDEN GOPHER GYMNASTS FINISH SECOND AT NCAA CHAMPIONSHIPS WITH SCHOOL RECORD SCORE; THREE COLLECT ALL-AMERICAN HONORS

The Golden Gopher men's gymnastics team turned in a sparkling performance in last Friday's team final of the NCAA Championships held at Williams Arena...but it still wasn't enough. Head coach Fred Roethlisberger's squad registered a school record score of 287.30 but was denied the program's first-ever national crown when Nebraska scored one-tenth of a point better at 287.40 to claim their seventh team title.

Down To The Wire: In one of the most exciting team finishes in NCAA history, the Golden Gophers and Cornhuskers were like two great heavyweights going toe-to-toe, each delivering their best blow. With Nebraska ahead by one full point going into the final rotation, the Golden Gophers continually hit their high bar routines in dramatic fashion, while the Huskers countered with some impressive performances of their own on the parallel bars. Junior **Mike Farina** (Mundelein, IL) was first up in the event and he scored a 9.55. He was followed by freshman **John Roethlisberger** (Afton, MN) with a 9.80, freshman **Rob Hanson** (Ramsey, MN) with another 9.80, junior **Jay Caputo** (Longwood, FL) with a 9.75 and senior **Dan Zimpfer** (Kent, OH) with a 9.70. Last up was senior **Mike Graham** (Green Bay, WI), who had clinched the Big Ten title earlier this season on the pommel horse with a clutch routine. Once again, he was equal to the task. He hit his routine superbly receiving a 9.80 score in the process. But the Huskers were still able to hold off the Golden Gophers by that mere one-tenth of a point.

Oh So Close: The .10 margin between first and second place is the closest margin in NCAA history. Indiana State and Oklahoma battled to a tie (434.475 points, new scoring system went in place in 1981) in 1977. The Golden Gophers' score of 287.30 is also the highest runner-up score under the current scoring system.

Best Since '49: The Golden Gophers' runner-up finish at the NCAA Championships this past weekend marks the third time in school history that the men's gymnastics program has collected the second-place trophy. They also finished second in 1941 and 1949. This was the best finish under Coach Roethlisberger, surpassing last year's third-place finish.

Records Fall: The Golden Gophers' score of 287.30 on Friday not only shattered the previous school record of 286.05 set first at the Eastern Regional Championships at University Park, PA and then equalled in Thursday's qualifying round, but they also surpassed the school records on the pommel horse and on the high bar in Friday's team finals and on the parallel bars on both Thursday and Friday. Their scores of 48.55 on the pommel horse and 48.85 on the high bar eclipsed the old records of 48.25 (Eastern Regional Championships, 4/7/90) and 48.20 (NCAA Championships, 4/14/88) respectively. They tallied identical parallel bars scores of 48.25 on Thursday and Friday to break the old mark of 47.95 set in this season's dual at UW-Oshkosh on February 23 and the NCAA Championships (4/13/89) a year ago. McKiernan Nominated For IBM/George Nissen Award: Senior Mark McKiernan (Darien, CT), recently honored as the Big Ten Conference Gymnastics Athlete-of-the-Month for March, was one of five finalists for the prestigious IBM/George Nissen Award which is presented annually to the outstanding senior in men's collegiate gymnastics. Mike Racanelli of Ohio State, who went on to win both the all-around and floor exercise competitions at the NCAA meet, won the 25th edition of the award which was announced at the National Association of College Gymnastics Coaches (NACGC) annual awards dinner on Wednesday at the Radisson University Hotel in Minneapolis. Jeff Dow from Iowa, Patrick Kirksey from Nebraska and Chris Waller from UCLA were the other nominees for the award. The gymnastic equivalent of college football's Heisman Trophy, the winner will be announced at the National Association of College Gymnastics Coaches (NACGC) annual awards dinner on April 18 at the Radisson University Hotel in Minneapolis.

McKiernan was a mainstay of the Golden Gopher lineup throughout his career in Gold Country. He helped lead the Golden Gophers to their runner-up finish at the NCAA Championships after their equally impressive victory at the Eastern Regional Championships. Individually this past weekend, he finished ninth in the final all-around standings with a score of 111.25 (56.70 optionals) and was eighth on the parallel bars. He was also honored as the 1989 Big Ten Conference Gymnast-of-the-Year after winning the all-around and the pommel horse. A member of the U.S. National Team, the Golden Gopher co-captain helped direct the squad to the 1990 conference team title earlier this season by winning his second straight pommel horse crown and placing in a total of four individual events during the competition. He garnered All-America honors after finishing fourth on the pommel horse at the 1989 NCAA Championships. During his collegiate career, he captured a total of four individual Big Ten titles and became the first four-time All-Big Ten gymnastics selection in Minnesota history. He is an applied design major with a 2.8 GPA.

Call It "C" For Consistency: The Golden Gophers registered eight straight scores of 281.15 or better, with last Friday's score of 287.30 at the NCAA Championships leading the way.

All-Americans: John Roethlisberger, Jay Caputo and Mike Graham all collected All-American certificates for the Golden Gophers. Roethlisberger finished off a very fruitful first season in Gold Country by finishing second in the all-around with a score of 114.10 (57.60 optionals), tied for fourth on the still rings with a 9.75, fourth on the parallel bars with a 9.55 and fourth on the high bar with a 9.85. Caputo, who finished sixth on the parallel bars at the 1989 NCAA Championships to garner All-American honors, finished third on the high bars with a 9.875 and fifth on the parallel bars with a 9.525. Graham finished his collegiate career in style, tying for fourth on the pommel horse with a score of 9.75.

All In The Family: The Roethlisberger family had yet another outstanding weekend. John Roethlisberger added four All-American certificates to his already overflowing treasure chest and helped lead the Golden Gophers to their runner-up team finish at the NCAA Men's Gymnastics Championships at Williams Arena. He was named the Big Ten Conference Gymnastics Athlete-of-the-Month for three consecutive months (December, January, February). After Mark McKiernan was honored with the distinction for the month of March, it gave the Golden Gophers a clean sweep of the league award for the 1989-90 season. John and his sister Marie, who won the NCAA uneven bars national title and was honored as the Gymnast-of-the-Year at the women's national meet also held last weekend at Corvallis, OR, became the first brother-sister combination in league history to win the Big Ten award in the same month when Marie, a senior for the Golden Gophers, collected Athlete-of-the-Month honors in women's gymnastics for the month of February. John also led the Golden Gophers

to their first Big Ten team title since 1984 and 18th overall at the league championships held in Iowa City on March 2-3 (included in February voting). He won the all-around title with a score of 113.35 (57.40 optional, 55.95 compulsory) and the horizontal bar crown with a 9.75. In addition, he finished second on the parallel bars (9.675), fifth in the floor exercise (9.25) and seventh on the pommel horse (9.050) en route to being honored as the Big Ten Gymnast and Freshman-of-the-Year. On top of that, Golden Gopher men's coach Fred Roethlisberger added to the family's ever-expanding collection of hardware when he was honored as the Midwest Region Coach-of-the-Year for the second year in a row, after earlier being named Big Ten Coach-of-the-Year. He was also inducted into the U.S. Gymnastics Hall of Fame at last Wednesday's NACGC Banquet, where Golden Gopher assistant coach Russ Fystrom was also selected as the National Assistant Coach-of-the-Year.

Werwie, who has recorded a 3.48 GPA majoring in management in the Carlson School of Management, presently leads the Golden Gopher tennis team in wins this season with an overall 25-15 record. A year ago, he led the Big Ten champions with a 30-13 record after winning 18 of his last 19 matches down the stretch. During his career in Gold Country the Williams Scholar and Academic All-Big Ten selection has registered an impressive 77-35 mark in singles play.

Schaffner has been the Golden Gophers' starting quarterback for the past two seasons. A member of the Academic All-Big Ten Team, he has completed 207 of 381 passes (53 percent) for 2607 yards and 14 touchdowns during his career. On top of that, he has added five rushing touchdowns as well. He has a combined major in business, psychology and speech in the College of Liberal Arts and has recorded a 3.58 GPA.

A landscape architecture major in the College of Architecture and Landscape Architecture, Stefansson has recorded a 3.48 GPA. Competing for the Golden Gopher track & field squad, he finished fourth in the Reebok Invitational 5000 meters with a time of 15:46.83 during the past indoor season and placed sixth in the 10,000 meters at the Nebraska Invitational outdoors.

The first-ever open tryout for Goldy, the men's athletic mascot, will take place Sunday, May 6 from 1:00 to 3:00 pm at Williams Arena.

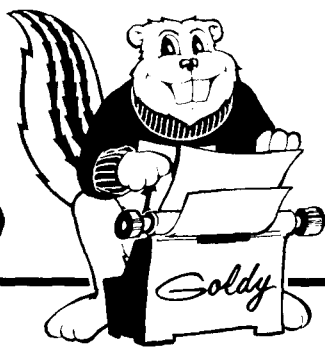

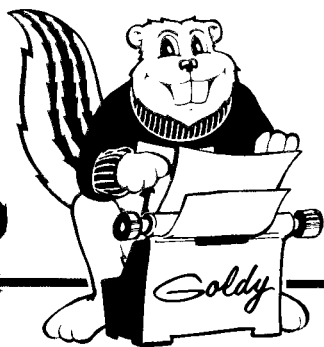

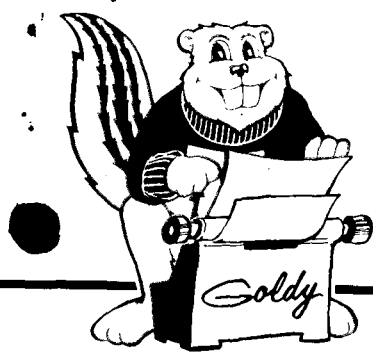
BROWN SIGNS WITH UNIVERSITY OF MINNESOTA

BSB SWEEPS WILDCATS AND TIES FOR 4TH IN BIG TEN

Minnesota baseball this past weekend was cold, windy, and most wet. A four-game home sweep of Northwestern, however, including the first Big Ten night games every played at Siebert Field, somehow made the adverse weather conditions much easier for the Gopher players to withstand.

The four wins brings Minnesota's winning streak to 10 straight, including eight in conference play. Minnesota finally went above the .500 mark for all games played, 24-21-1, but more importantly moved into a fourth place tie with Indiana in the Big Ten race at 11-9.

Minnesota has moved from last place to the first division in the span of two weekends. But now comes the hard part. The Gophers face eight more home games against conference opposition starting this weekend when Wisconsin comes to town.

The Gophers and Badgers play a day-night doubleheader at 1 and 7 p.m. Saturday, and another doubleheader at 1 p.m. Sunday. All four games will be carried live in the Twin Cities by WAYL-980 AM radio with Doug McLeod handling the play by play chores.

Following night game wins against Hamline (16-8) Tuesday, and Wednesday vs. Mankato State (5-2), Minnesota Friday, following official dedication ceremonies celebrating the all-new \$280,000 lighting plant installed this season, got off on the right foot. The Gophers buried Northwestern 18-2 with a 16-hit attack.

Included in the offensive statistics were five runs driven in apiece by designated hitter Brian Hartmann (Arlington) and left fielder Greg Johnson (Edina). Hartmann pumped out four hits, including a double, while Johnson went 2 for 3 with a double and a sacrifice fly. Starter John Lowery (Shepherdstown, WV) got the win with four innings of 6-hit pitching.

Minnesota took both ends of Saturday's twi-nighter, 6-3 and 12-3. Home runs by second

baseman Brian Raabe (New Ulm) and outfielder Keith Krenke (Owatonna), the latter with two men aboard, led the UM attack in the opener. Eric Toijala (Cottage Grove, WI) gained his first Big Ten win pitching 5.1 innings and allowing two runs. Freshman Chris Lawler (Milwaukee, WI) finished up to gain his first conference save.

The Gophers scored seven runs in the second inning of the nightcap as Scott Bakkum (LaCrosse, WI) hurled his team-high 6th complete game of the year, a 6-hitter. Jeff Monson (Bloomington) and Dan Wilson (Barrington, IL) backed Bakkum with a pair of 2-run homers. It was Wilson's 8th round tripper of the season, tops for the Gophers.

The series ended in the rain and mud Sunday as Minnesota bested the Wildcats 14-0 in a game called at the end of 4 1/2 innings because of a downpour. The Gophers scored nine unearned runs in the second inning as Northwestern committed three errors. Pitcher Brent Davis (Minnetonka) only pitched one inning, the Northwestern fifth, and became the pitcher of record when the game was called. It was the first Big Ten appearance ever for the sophomore lefty.

Before the Wisconsin series, Minnesota hosts Northern Iowa in a single night game at 7 p.m. Tuesday, and travels to Iowa State for two games in Ames Wednesday.

RAABE ON RECORD PACE

University of Minnesota senior second baseman and co-captain **Brian Raabe** (New Ulm) is on track to rewrite a healthy section of his school's baseball record book.

Through games last weekend, a 4-game series sweep at home against Northwestern, Raabe has already written his name into the Gopher book twice: most career hits, 245, and at bats, 723.

Although individual fielding records are scarce in collegiate baseball, Raabe has made his mark in this area, too. In his sophomore season, 1988, when Minnesota captured the Big Ten championship, Raabe played in 65 of his team's 66 games and unbelievably made just one error. He handled 269 out of 270 fielding chances cleanly that season for a percentage of .996.

In fact, through 213 career games, Brian has only made 17 errors in 917 chances. That figures out to an amazing .982 fielding percentage.

Listed below are Raabe's career records and where he stands in several additional categories:

With 13 regular season games remaining and, hopefully, a shot at the Big Ten playoffs, Raabe's totals will continue to rise. The only question is how far and how many additional career records can he establish.

Even if he does not set any additional marks, his contributions to the Gopher baseball program have already been more than anyone could have anticipated. If there ever really was a "Charlie Hustle" in baseball, the term had to be coined with Brian Raabe in mind.

A Decade Of Excellence: During the 1980's, the University of Minnesota tennis program won four league titles, finished runner-up five times and placed third once at the Big Ten Championships.

The Third Time A Charm?: The Golden Gophers will meet the Wisconsin Badgers for the third time this season when they clash on Friday in the quarterfinal round of the Big Ten Championships. The Badgers won 5-1 in the quarterfinal round of the UC-Irvine 20 Team Tournament back on March 23 and then took a tight 5-4 decision in the regular season finale for both teams at the 98th Street Racquet Club in Bloomington last Saturday.

Michigan & Minnesota Dominate: The Big Ten Championships have truly become an M&M affair with Michigan and Minnesota dominating the tournament. Not since 1967, when Michigan State took the crown, has a team other than Michigan or Minnesota won the title. The Wolverines, who have not finished lower than second since 1958, lead the pack with a total of 35 conference championships tucked away.

Uihlein 86th In National Rankings: Brian Uihlein has been ranked No. 86 in the most recent Volvo Tennis/Collegiate Rankings.

HOEFT SHINES AT DRAKE RELAYS; MINNESOTA INVITATIONAL ON SATURDAY

Senior Carson Hoeft (Plymouth, MN) turned in a pair of sparkling performances to headline a strong showing by the Golden Gopher track & field squad at the 81st annual Drake Relays held last Friday and Saturday in Des Moines, IA.

Hoeft Leads The Way: Carson Hoeft anchored the school record-setting 4 x 1600 meter relay to a fourth-place finish with a 4:05.9 split on Friday. Sophomore Sean Fitzgerald (Ottawa, Ontario, Canada) led off the relay with a 4:07.4, junior Chris Harder (Austin, MN) was next with a 4:09.4 and senior Dan Hebl (Menomonie, WI) turned in a 4:06.4 on the third leg before turning it over to Hoeft. The foursome's final time of 16:29.17 broke the 20-year old school record of 16:34.3 set by Mike Lawless, Mike Hanley, Greg Nelson and Garry Bjorklund. Hoeft then came back to finish second in Saturday's 1500 meters with a personal-best and NCAA provisional qualifying time of 3:43.14. He had won the Texas Relays 1500 in 3:48.34 back on April 7. Hebl also clocked a personal-best in the race, finishing fifth in an outstanding time of 3:46.18. Iowa State's John Nuttall set a new Drake Relays record of 3:41.74 to claim top honors in the race.

Looking Good: A number of other Golden Gophers turned in some outstanding efforts of their own at the prestigious competition. Junior Keith Eidman (Roseville, MN) and senior Eric Overby (Kenyon, MN) clocked personal-best times of 30:35.1 and 30:55.3 respectively in Saturday's 10,000 meters. Eidman finished seventh and Overby ninth overall in the race. Freshman Chris Murrell (Grand Island, NE) tied for fifth in Saturday's high jump final with a leap of 6'11". Fellow freshman, Justin Daler (Toledo, OH), tied for seventh in Saturday's pole vault competition with a mark of 16'2". Chris Harder placed 14th in Saturday's 3000 meter steeplechase with a season-best clocking of 9:17.6. Freshman Chad Rodvold (Williston, ND) placed ninth in the javelin on Friday with a toss

of 186'5", while sophomore Mark Lacy (Oak Brook, IL) was 14th in Friday's discus competition with a throw of 154'4" and 18th in Saturday's shot put with a heave of 50'8 3/4". Sean Fitzgerald, junior Chris York (Dubuque, IA), senior Matt Ferry (Maple Grove, MN) and freshman Mark Narveson (Mankato, MN) placed 15th in Saturday's distance medley relay with a time of 10:08.40.

Minnesota Invitational: With the Bierman Field Track & Field Stadium still under construction, the Golden Gophers will host the Minnesota Invitational on Saturday at the College of Thomas. Field event competition will get underway at 11:00 a.m., with the first race on the track in the co-ed meet slated to begin at 12:36 p.m. On the men's side, Minnesota will be joined by traditional SEC power Georgia, Drake, led by sprint standout Kevin Little who won the 100 and 200 meter invitationals at the Drake Relays last weekend, perennial NCAA Division III and MIAC power St. Thomas and the University of Manitoba.

Head Coach Roy Griak: "Some people probably don't realize that we'll have possibly the best 200 meter runner in the nation here on Saturday in Kevin Little of Drake. He's great in the 100 and 400 meters as well. That alone should be worth the price of admission. Plus the fact that we'll have some outstanding athletes from Minnesota, Georgia, the University of Manitoba and St. Thomas. We're going to go full-bore this weekend. We're going to put our people in the events where we feel that they can do the best job and will have the ability to score some points for us. We may even double some of our people. It's two weeks before the Big Ten Championships and we're going to have some fun on Saturday."

Murrell Honored: Chris Murrell was honored as the Big Ten Conference Track & Field Athlete-of-the-Month for March. Recognized as one of the finest prep high jumpers in the country a year ago when he won the Nebraska state high school crown for Grand Island with a state record jump of 7'1 1/4", Chris Murrell has continued to shine in Gold Country. After an amazing indoor season, he kept things rolling along by winning the Georgia Relays title in the first outdoor collegiate competition of his career on March 24 with a leap of 6'11". He also came out on top at the Nebraska Invitational on April 14 after clearing 7'1" in the competition and then surpassed the NCAA outdoor provisional qualifying mark with a winning leap of 7'2" at the Iowa triangular on April 21. He finished in a fifth-place tie with a leap of 6'11" at the Drake Relays last Saturday. His winning leap of 7'3" at the Big Ten Indoor Championships held at Bloomington, IN on February 24 broke former Golden Gopher great Mike Vukovich's school indoor record of 7'2 1/2" set in 1988. He was honored on the All-Big Ten Team for his efforts and also finished fifth in the Athlete-of-the-Year and third in the Freshman-of-the-Year voting following the competition. At the NCAA Indoor Championships held on March 9 at the Hoosier Dome in Indianapolis, IN, he finished 10th overall with a leap of 7'2 1/2".

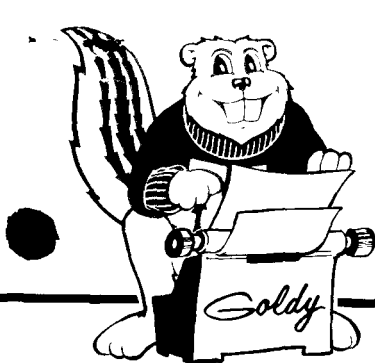

Mark Dienhart has been named Associate Director for External Operations in the Men's Intercollegiate Athletic Department at the University of Minnesota, with that appointment pending final approval of the U of M's Board of Regents.

A native of Minnesota, Dienhart comes to the University of Minnesota from the College of St. Thomas in St. Paul where he has served as the Executive Director of Public & Alumni Affairs for the past five years. He is expected to begin his new assignment on Athletic Director Rick Bay's administrative staff June 1.

"We are delighted at the prospect of having Mark join our team," Bay said. "He has an excellent Minnesota background, has earned two graduate-level degrees from the University, has extensive experience in athletics as well as an excellent track record in community, media and alumni relations. We are confident that the expertise he brings to the University of Minnesota will be a great asset in our staff re-organization plans."

As Minnesota's new Associate Director, Dienhart will be the number three person in the men's athletic department chain of command under Bay and Senior Associate Director Dan Meinert. He will be responsible for fund raising, promotions & marketing and media relations.

Dienhart, 36, is a 1971 graduate of De La Salle High School in Minneapolis. The class Salutatorian, Dienhart attended the College of St. Thomas and was graduated Summa Cum Laude in 1975 after gaining NAIA football All-America and Academic All-America honors.

Following his graduation, Dienhart served as Work Study Coordinator at St. Thomas for four years before functioning as the Sports Information Director for two years and the director of the college news bureau for two years.

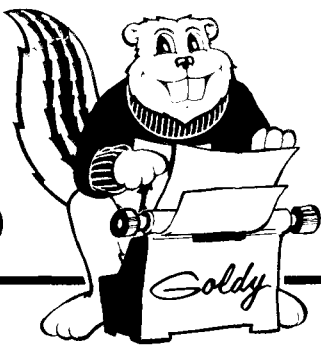
In 1980 Dienhart was named an assistant to the Director of Athletics and Track Coach at St. Thomas, leading the Tommies to their first outdoor conference championship in 30 years during the 1983 season. During his tenure as track coach, St. Thomas won four conference outdoor titles, three indoor titles, the 1984 NCAA national championship and developed 21 All-Americans.

Gophers Big Ten Streak at 12, Host Michigan State Friday/Saturday/Sunday

Minnesota continued its rapid climb up the Big Ten baseball standings by sweeping a four-game series from Wisconsin last weekend at Siebert Field.

Three weeks ago Minnesota was tied for last place in the conference standings at 3-9. Since then the Gophers have won 12 consecutive league games, including a road sweep at Ohio State and four home wins over both Northwestern and Wisconsin.

With a 15-9 record in conference play, 30-22-1 overall, Minnesota has but four games remaining in its regular season drive. Michigan State provides the

final opposition this weekend at Siebert Field.

The Gophers and Spartans play a single game at 7 p.m. Friday, a day-night doubleheader at 1 and 7 p.m. Saturday, and a single game at 1 p.m. Sunday to close out the 1990 conference campaign. WAYL-980 AM radio will broadcast all four games live in the Twin Cities. Michigan State brings a 13-11 Big Ten record to the weekend series.

Saturday's 1 p.m. game is "Sunglasses Day" at Siebert Field. The first 1,000 fans attending that contest receive free a pair of sunglasses compliments of OSCAR MAYER & WLOL RADIO.

Prior to this weekend, Minnesota hosts 7 p.m. non-conference games against St. Thomas and Concordia, both from St. Paul, Tuesday and Thursday, respectively.

Minnesota used a completely different set of measures to sweep Wisconsin. Saturday saw the Gophers twice enter its final turn at bat trailing the Badgers. In both games, however, two-out rallies provided winning margins.

In the afternoon opener, Ryan Lefebvre and Jeff Monson singled after two were out in the 7th inning. Freshman shortstop Brent Gates followed with his 5th home run of the year, a line drive over the center field fence, to give Minnesota a thrilling 6-4 victory.

In the evening contest, Minnesota faced the same problem. The Gophers trailed 3-2 in the seventh after Wisconsin rallied for two runs on three hits in the top of the inning. Once again it got down to two outs and runners on first and third.

Junior catcher Dan Wilson, batting with a sprained ankle suffered the previous inning, drove in the tying run with a sharp single to center field before junior right fielder Keith Krenke doubled home the winning run one pitch later. Wilson, a pre-season All-America selection, did not play Sunday but hopes to be ready for the weekend series vs. Michigan State.

Sophomore lefty John Lowery (6-3, 3-1) hurled his third complete game to win the opener, while J.T. Gilbert (2-2, 1-1, 2 sv.) got the second game win. Gilbert relieved starter Scott Bakkum in the top of the final inning retiring the last two batters before the Gopher rally.

Sunday saw Minnesota combine a rash of hits (28) with eight Wisconsin errors to win 15-0 and 15-5. Senior Jon Wroge (2-2, 1-0) pitched the first six innings of the opener with freshman Jeff Schmidt working the final inning for a combined 6-hit shutout.

Senior second baseman Brian Raabe and Gates each hit two-run homers to key the opener.

Minnesota scored nine times in the third inning as Wisconsin contributed three miscues. Only three of the runs were earned.

In the nightcap, Monson, who had a torrid weekend both at the plate and in the field, smacked a three-run homer, a double and a single to lead the Minnesota attack. In the four games, Monson was 7 for 10 at the plate, had two doubles besides the home run, knocked in five runs and scored six times. He upped his Big Ten average to .382 and is hitting .337 for all games.

Sophomore lefty **Brent Davis (5-0, 2-0)**, for the second straight Sunday, proved to be an opportunist. Davis pitched one inning in relief, the fifth inning, and was credited with the second-game victory. He was the third of five pitchers **coach John Anderson** used in the 15-5 win. Davis recorded a like victory with one inning pitched the previous Sunday against Northwestern.

Minnesota upped its Big Ten team batting average to .332 by crashing out 45 hits good for 40 runs in the four weekend games. The Gophers are batting .317 for all games. Minnesota's earned run average also dipped to 4.61 in the Big Ten, 5.12 overall.

Wilson continues to lead his teammates for all games played with a .377 average. He is also tops in home runs (8), runs scored (42), walks (37), and is second only to Gates in runs batted in with 44. Gates has driven home 54 runs.

Sophomore **Brian Hartmann (Arlington, MN)** is possibly the biggest and best surprise for the Gophers this season. Hartmann took over the designated hitter's role midway through the season and is now hitting an amazing .410 in 21 Big Ten games. He is batting .344 for all games.

On top of his hitting prowess, Hartmann replaced Wilson behind the plate Sunday and turned in a stellar job. He threw out the one baserunner who tried to steal second base. If Wilson is not ready, Hartmann will again get the call this weekend.

Lowery, as he did last season, tops the Gopher pitching staff in wins with a 6-3 record. He was 7-0 in his rookie season. He also has one save and is the only Gopher hurler with an ERA, 3.80, under 4.00.

NETTERS FINISH FIFTH AT BIG TEN CHAMPIONSHIPS; UIHLEIN & WERWIE NAMED TO ALL-BIG TEN TEAM (15-13 Overall/9-4 Big Ten)

After falling to Wisconsin in the quarterfinals, the Golden Gopher tennis team bounced back in style with three straight wins to finish fifth at the Big Ten Championships held last Friday thru Sunday at Champaign, IL.

A Long Road: The third time definitely was not a charm as head coach David Geatz's squad dropped a 5-0 decision to Wisconsin in Friday's quarterfinals. It marked the third time this season that the Badgers had dumped the Golden Gophers. In consolation play on Saturday, the Golden Gophers topped Purdue 5-2 and then Illinois 5-1, before upending Michigan 5-4 in Sunday's match for fifth-place.

On "Cruz" Control: Junior Anthony Cruz (Medinah, IL) went 3-0 at the No. 6 singles slot for the Golden Gophers at the Big Ten Championships to cap off an outstanding year. After having his match against Wisconsin's Dan Nabadrick suspended because the outcome of the match was already decided, he scored a 7-5, 6-3 win over Matt Carey of Purdue, a 2-6, 6-2, 6-3 victory over Mark Hoppenjans of Illinois and a 6-2, 6-2 win over David Pierce of Michigan. He finished the season with an overall singles record of 17-8, including a sparkling 8-0 mark in Big Ten action. He redshirted the 1988-89 season with an ankle injury.

Northwestern Breaks Through: When Northwestern claimed the Big Ten team title on Sunday with a 5-0 whitewashing of Indiana in the championship match, it marked the first time since 1967 that someone other than Minnesota or Michigan won the Big Ten crown. Michigan State was the last school to win it all before the Wildcats broke the Minnesota/Michigan stranglehold last weekend.

Uihlein & Werwie Honored: Sophomore Brian Uihlein (Lake Forest, IL) and junior Kevin Werwie (Sheboygan, WI) were named to the 12-member All-Big Ten Team for their play this season. Playing primarily at No. 1 singles, Uihlein finished with an overall 25-21 mark. He also chalked up a 17-9 record in doubles, including a perfect 6-0 mark with senior David Massart (Milwaukee, WI) at the No. 1 slot. With an overall 28-17 record this season, Werwie led the Golden Gophers in singles wins for the second straight season after going 30-13 a year ago. He also registered a 20-11 mark in doubles, including a spotless 7-0 record at the No. 3 position.

A Perfect 10: The Golden Gophers have won 10 Big Ten team tennis titles: 1910*, 1911, 1912, 1918*, 1932*, 1933*, 1981*, 1984, 1986, 1989 (* Co-champions).

A Decade Of Excellence: During the 1980's, the University of Minnesota tennis program won four league titles, finished runner-up five times and placed third once at the Big Ten Championships.

Uihlein 70th In National Rankings: Brian Uihlein has been ranked No. 70 in the most recent Volvo Tennis/Collegiate Rankings.

TRACK & FIELD TEAM WINS MINNESOTA INVITATIONAL; WISCONSIN INVITATIONAL ON SATURDAY

Sophomore sprinter, Tim Arinze (Festic Town, Lagos, Nigeria), and freshman pole vaulter, Justin Daler (Toledo, OH), turned in sparkling performances to pace the Golden Gopher track & field team to a one point victory over favored Georgia at Saturday's Minnesota Invitational held at St. Thomas' O'Shaughnessy Stadium.

held March 1-3 at Ann Arbor, MI, setting a new all-time Big Ten record in the 200 butterfly with a winning clocking of 1:44.33 and also taking the 100 version of the stroke with an impressive time of 47.93. Both times erased school records that he had set during his rookie season in Gold Country. In addition to finishing sixth in the 200 individual medley final with a time of 1:50.89, he also was a member of the 400 freestyle relay unit which finished second in 2:58.62, the 800 freestyle relay which was fourth in 6:37.08 and the 400 medley relay which was second in 3:17.53.

"If by chance there was anyone who wasn't impressed with Sean last year, they certainly became convinced of his ability this time around," said Golden Gopher head coach Dennis Dale following the conference meet. "He was sensational. In fact, his relay performances were as good, or possibly even better if that's possible, than those in his individual events."

Quackenbush then went on to record the Golden Gophers' best finish at the NCAA Championships held March 22-24 at Indianapolis, IN, placing ninth in the 200 butterfly final with a clocking of 1:45.61. He also collected honorable mention All-America honors by placing 15th in the 100 butterfly (48.57), and as a member of the 200 freestyle (16th, 1:22.00) and 400 medley (15th, 3:18.03) relay units.

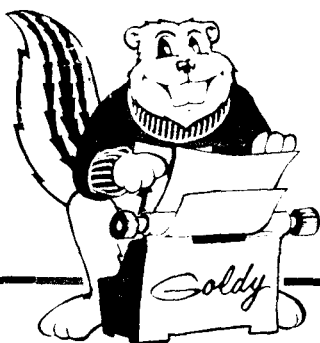

DIENHART NAMED TO GOLDEN GOPHER STAFF

Mark Dienhart has been named Associate Director for External Operations in the Men's Intercollegiate Athletic Department at the University of Minnesota, with that appointment pending final approval of the U of M's Board of Regents.

A native of Minnesota, Dienhart comes to the University of Minnesota from the College of St. Thomas in St. Paul where he has served as the Executive Director of Public & Alumni Affairs for the past five years. He is expected to begin his new assignment on Athletic Director Rick Bay's administrative staff June 1.

"We are delighted at the prospect of having Mark join our team," Bay said. "He has an excellent Minnesota background, has earned two graduate-level degrees from the University, has extensive experience in athletics as well as an excellent track record in community, media and alumni relations. We are confident that the expertise he brings to the University of Minnesota will be a great asset in our staff re-organization plans."

As Minnesota's new Associate Director, Dienhart will be the number three person in the men's athletic department chain of command under Bay and Senior Associate Director Dan Meinert. He will be responsible for fund raising, promotions & marketing and media relations.

Dienhart, 36, is a 1971 graduate of De La Salle High School in Minneapolis. The class Salutatorian, Dienhart attended the College of St. Thomas and was graduated Summa Cum Laude in 1975 after gaining NAIA football All-America and Academic All-America honors.

Following his graduation, Dienhart served as Work Study Coordinator at St. Thomas for four years before functioning as the Sports Information Director for two years and the director of the college news bureau for two years.

In 1980 Dienhart was named an assistant to the Director of Athletics and Track Coach at St. Thomas, leading the Tommies to their first outdoor conference championship in 30 years during the 1983 season. During his tenure as track coach, St. Thomas won four conference outdoor titles, three indoor titles, the 1984 NCAA national championship and developed 21 All-Americans.

Dienhart also served as an assistant football coach from 1975 until 1981 when he was elevated to the head coaching position. He held that post through 1986 and compiled a 44-14-1 record. His 1983 team finished 9-0 and won the school's first conference championship in 28 years.

In addition to holding his B.A. degree from St. Thomas, Dienhart also has his M.A. and Ph. D. degrees from the University of Minnesota. He also has done post doctoral work at Stanford University.

Golf author Otis Dypwick dies; was U sports info chief

Otis J. Dypwick, former sports information director at the University of Minnesota and a prolific author of golf instruction books, died Tuesday morning at his St. Louis Park home, apparently after suffering a massive stroke. He was 79.



Dypwick

A native of Minneapolis, Dypwick attended Washburn High School and graduated from the University of Minnesota in 1935. While in school, he worked as a sports writer for the Minneapolis Morning Tribune and the Minneapolis Journal.

In 1944, he became sports information director at the university, learning himself and the school a host of friends with his congenial personality and desire to help people. He retired in 1976.

"He did so much for sports at the university," said Patty Berg, a longtime friend and a former professional golfer. "He made friends all over the country. Everybody knew him, and everybody loved Otis."

He was as well-known nationally, however, for two dozen books, most of them about golf instruction, on which he worked with such greats as Ben Hogan, Arnold Palmer, Gene Sarazen, Byron Nelson, Sam Snead and Gary Player.

He collaborated on his first effort with Patty Berg, a neighbor and friend who won 85 amateur and professional tournaments, including the inaugural U.S. Women's Open in 1946, and her father, Herman. Most of the funeral was done in Dypwick's living room shortly after his wedding in

1940.

"My bride was deathly afraid that many of her prized wedding gifts and furniture pieces would fall victim of Mr. Berg's frequent club-in-hand demonstrations," Dypwick once wrote.

The book did very well, largely because of the distinctive touch Dypwick provided, according to Berg, now of Fort Myers, Fla. "He had a great knack for writing and a way of describing things," she said.

His most successful golf book was "Winning Golf," which he wrote in 1946 with Nelson, who still holds the PGA record for most consecutive victories (11, 1945).

Another of Dypwick's most successful books was about football. He wrote "Oklahoma Split-T Football" with another old friend from South Minneapolis, Bud Wilkinson, the former Gophers football player and University of Oklahoma football coach.

"He was just a totally fine person," Wilkinson said. "He was an avid hunter and fisherman, and he loved athletics. He was just an all-around citizen."

"I travel a lot and I can't go anywhere without people telling me, 'You must be Oty's kid,'" said a son, Jeff. "It seemed like everybody in the state knew him. He was sort of a good old guy."

"I can see my Dad now sitting in the back porch with guys like Gary Player and Arnold Palmer, talking golf," Jeff Dypwick said. "There were a lot of them here."

Survivors include his wife, Helen; two sons, Jeff, of Chanhassen, and Douglas, of Minneapolis; a daughter, Linda Bjorke, of Woodland Park, Colo.; a sister, Barbara Dypwick, of St. Louis Park; and four grandchildren.

A graveside memorial service tentatively has been scheduled for Friday at Lakewood Cemetery in Minneapolis.

Otis Dypwick, ex-'U' sports information director

Otis J. Dypwick, 79, longtime sports information director for the University of Minnesota, died Tuesday at his St. Louis Park home.

When he retired in 1975 Dypwick had handled public relations for Gopher teams for 32 years. "I enjoy every minute of it," he said in the hectic fall of 1960, when the Gophers football team was marching toward a championship season.

Dypwick, a native of Minneapolis, graduated from Washburn High School and received a journalism degree from the University of Minnesota. While he was there he organized the Galloping Gophers, a basketball team of ex-athletes that barnstormed the Upper Midwest from 1934 to 1941 and once beat the Harlem Globetrotters.

Dypwick also helped several athletes write their books. He collaborated with golfer Patty Berg on "Golf" and Oklahoma football coach Bud Wilkinson on "Oklahoma Split-T Football," and also worked with golfers Byron Nelson, Sam Snead and Arnold Palmer.

Dypwick, an enthusiastic waterfowl hunter and dog owner, was a member of the Hennepin County Animal Rescue League.

He married Helen Fredell in 1940. She survives him, as do his two sons, Doug of Minneapolis and Jeff of Chaska; his daughter, Linda Bjork of Woodland Park, Colo.; a sister, Barbara Dypwick of Minneapolis, and four grandchildren. Times for visitation and services have not been set. Arrangements are being handled by Werness Brothers, 3500 W. 50th St., Minneapolis.

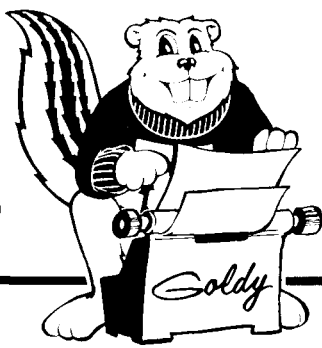

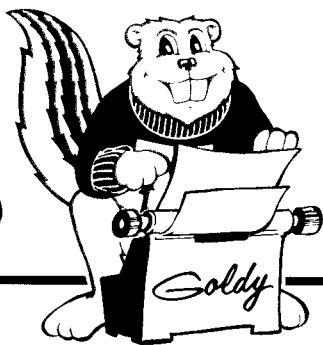

Orr will join fall signees Chad Kolander (6-9, Owatonna, MN), Randy Carter (6-8, Memphis, TN) and Jon Laster (6-5, Denver, CO) at the University of Minnesota. Sean Pell (6-9, Clearwater, FL), who had also signed last fall, will attend Prep School during the 1990-91 academic year.

"We are not sure whether this concludes our recruiting for next season," Haskins said. "We still have one scholarship available and are presently looking at another player."

GOLDEN GOPHER 1990-91 CROSS COUNTRY/TRACK & FIELD CAPTAINS ANNOUNCED

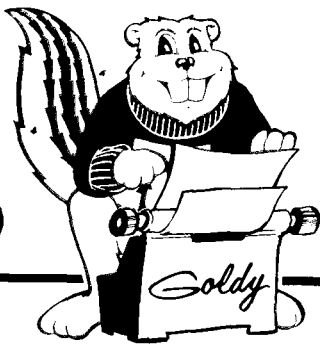
University of Minnesota head cross country/track & field coach, Roy Griak, has announced team co-captains in each sport for the 1990-91 season.

Keith Eidman (Roseville, MN) and **Chris Harder** (Austin, MN) will be the Golden Gopher cross country co-captains this fall. Both will be in their senior seasons of competition. Eidman led the squad to a third-place finish in the final team standings at last fall's Big Ten Championships with a 10th-place individual finish. In track this spring, he placed seventh at the Drake Relays in the 10,000 meters with a personal-best clocking of 30:35.1. He will be right in the thick of things in both the 5000 and 10,000 meter runs at this weekend's Big Ten Outdoor Track & Field Championships at Champaign, IL.

Harder redshirted the 1989 cross country season, but finished 23rd at the 1988 Big Ten Championships for the Golden Gophers. On the track, he placed eighth at the 1989 Big Ten Outdoor Track & Field Championships in the 3000 meter steeplechase with a personal-best time of 9:10.85 and will look to be a factor in the event once again at this weekend's conference meet. He also was a member of the 4 x 1600 meter relay which finished fourth at the Drake Relays earlier this season with a time of 16:29.17, breaking a 20-year old school record in the process.

Sean Fitzgerald (Ottawa, Ontario, Canada) and **Ross Thompson** (Esko, MN) will be the co-captains of the Golden Gopher track & field squad next season. Fitzgerald, who will be a junior next season, raced to a personal-best clocking of 3:50.62 in the 1500 meters to finish eighth at the 1989 Big Ten Outdoor Track & Field Championships. This season, he was a member of the 4 x 800 meter relay unit which placed third at the Big Ten Indoor Championships in a time of 7:35.75 and then outdoors he joined Harder on the record-breaking 4 x 1600 meter relay at the Drake Relays.

Thompson, who will be a senior next season, finished ninth at last February's Big Ten Indoor Championships in the pole vault with a mark of 16'0". This spring, he has won both the Georgia Relays and Georgia Invitational titles with identical 16'0" vaults. He looks for a high finish in the event at the Big Ten Championships this weekend.

Baseball Sweeps MSU Gains 9th Big Ten Tourney Berth in 10 years

Minnesota established a Big Ten record of 16 consecutive league victories by sweeping four home games from Michigan State last weekend, and at the same time qualified for the conference baseball playoff tournament this week at Iowa City.

Tournament play, which features a double elimination format, finds the Gophers meeting second place Illinois (19-9, 38-19) at 12 noon Thursday in Iowa City while regular season champion Iowa (22-6, 37-15) plays 4th place Ohio State (16-12, 30-27-1) at 3:30 p.m. Losers and winners play Friday and it goes on from there.

This trip marks the 9th time in the 10-year history of the Big Ten playoffs that Minnesota has been one of the four finalists. The only year out for one of coach John Anderson's teams was last spring when the Gophers missed the final cut by 1/2 game.

The Gophers tied Illinois for second place in the final regular season conference standings with a 19-9 record. Illinois, however, gained the second place seed on a tie breaker having defeated Minnesota three times in four games. What makes it even more remarkable is that four weeks ago Minnesota was 3-9 and tied for last place in the Big Ten. The Gophers are 36-22-1 overall.

Saturday's first game ended in a strange fashion when designated hitter Brian Hartmann was hit by a pitch with two outs and the bases loaded in the last of the 9th for the 2-1 win. It was the second time in the game, and third time in the series Hartmann was hit by a pitch.

The second game featured more dramatics. Minnesota had to come from behind on a 2-out single by Dan Wilson to tie the score in the 8th inning, and then win it in the 12th.

After Michigan State scored once in the top of the 12th, the winning Gopher rally was keyed by a single from shortstop Brent Gates to tie the score, and won when Keith Krenke singled over the right fielders's glove scoring Gates from second base. Both hits came after two were out.

Freshman Chris Lawler (5-2, 4-1) gained the first game win pitching in relief while sophomore J.T. Gilbert (3-2, 2-1) won the same way in the nightcap.

Back-to-back fifth inning run-scoring doubles by first baseman Jeff Monson and Gates helped Minnesota win Sunday's finale, 4-1. Lawler, with another fine relief performance, gained his 2nd win of the weekend.

Now it's on to Iowa City where Lowery could gain the starting job against Illinois Thursday. The rest of the Gopher rotation, however, has not been announced.

Minnesota has come out of the playoffs as champion on three occasions. . . .1982, 1985 and 1988. The first year was Anderson's rookie season as head coach at Minnesota. He now boasts a 9-year record of 305-202-3, and his teams are 113-63 in Big Ten play.

Last weekend's series sweep began Friday night when Minnesota won 8-1 against Michigan State. Then came two dramatic extra inning games Saturday which saw the Gophers win 2-1 in nine innings, and 4-3 in 12 innings. Sunday's series final resulted in a 4-1 Gopher victory.

Sophomore lefty John Lowery (7-3, 4-1) pitched his 4th complete game of the season, 3rd in the Big Ten, to win Friday. He walked one and struck out 5.

Keller Looks For Repeat Performance: Paul Keller led the Golden Gophers at the 1989 Big Ten Championships with a fourth-place finish in the final individual standings. He fired a 72-hole total of 289 over the par-72 Wisconsin Cherokee Country Club en route to earning All-Big Ten honors. He will look to be right in the thick of things on Minnesota's home course this weekend.

Coach Harvey's Farewell: Greg Harvey is in his 12th and final season as head coach of the Golden Gopher golf program. The University of Minnesota will hire a full-time head coach of the program. He has combined his duties as golf coach at the University of Minnesota along with his full-time dentist practice. A three-time letterwinner (1968-70) for the Golden Gophers under fabled head coach Les Bolstad, he directed the program to fourth-place finishes at the Big Ten Championships in 1979, 1981 and 1983 (tie).

"It certainly would be a nice swan song to finish off with a Big Ten title. I've enjoyed the past 12 years at the University of Minnesota and I think I'm leaving the program in pretty good hands for the new full-time coach coming in. But it's more important for the players. We tell our guys that you only get a handful of chances in your career to win a Big Ten title and to have that Big Ten championship ring on your finger the rest of your life would be awfully nice."

More From Coach Harvey: "We have not played well this spring, but the team plays our home golf course very well and it's a big advantage to be on your own facility. The potential is certainly there for Minnesota to be a legitimate contender for the Big Ten championship. Friday is the key for any team trying to win the championship. You play two rounds and you literally make or break the tournament on Friday. If you play well on Friday, you're right in the hunt on Saturday and Sunday. If you play poorly, you can get so far behind that you can't catch anybody. The key for us to get into contention and possibly win a Big Ten title is going to be consistency. The par will be 284 for each round and I don't think that any team can shoot over 290 and have a chance to win the title."

Last Time Out: The Golden Gophers finished 14th in the final team standings of the Midwestern Invitational held May 4-5 at DeKalb, IL. Originally scheduled to be a 54-hole event, the competition was shortened to 36 holes due to rain on the first day. Paul Keller finished in a tie for 17th in the final individual standings with a score of 152 (78-74) to pace the Golden Gophers in the tournament.

Returning Placewinners: The Golden Gophers will return five placewinners from a year ago. Junior Chris York (Dubuque, IA) placed eighth in the 400 meter intermediate hurdles in a time of 54.56 (53.98 prelims), senior Dan Hebl (Menomonie, WI) was sixth in the 1500 meters in 3:49.72, sophomore Sean Fitzgerald (Ottawa, Ontario, Canada) was eighth in the 1500 in 3:50.62, junior Chris Harder (Austin, MN) placed eighth in the 3000 meter steeplechase in 9:10.85 and sophomore Mark Lacy (Oak Brook, IL) finished eighth in the shot put with a toss of 50'8 1/4".

Sprint Star: Sophomore Tim Arinze (Festic Town, Lagos, Nigeria), who sat out last season under the NCAA's Proposition 48 Rule, is one of the Big Ten's best sprinters. He won both the 100 and 200 meters at the Minnesota Invitational on May 5 with wind-aided clockings of 10.40 and 21.37 respectively. He has registered personal best clockings of 10.54 in the 100 and 21.28 in the 200 meters thus far this season.

Hoelt Leads Strong Middle Distance Brigade: Senior Carson Hoelt (Plymouth, MN), who redshirted the 1989 season but has been a dominant performer for the Golden Gophers in the middle distances once again this year, will be in the hunt for the first individual conference title of his career in the 1500 meters at the Big Ten Championships. At the Drake Relays in Des Moines, IA on April 27-28, he anchored the school record-setting 4 x 1600 meter relay to a fourth-place finish with a 4:05.9 split. Sean Fitzgerald led off the relay with a 4:07.4, Chris Harder was next with a 4:09.4 and Dan

Hebl turned in a 4:06.4 on the third leg before turning it over to Hoeft. The foursome's final time of 16:29.17 broke a 20-year old school record. Hoeft, who had already won the Texas Relays 1500 meters in 3:48.34 back on April 7, then came back the next day to finish second in the 1500 meters with a personal-best and NCAA provisional qualifying time of 3:43.14. He finished second to Indiana's Bob Kennedy in the mile at the 1990 Big Ten Indoor Championships with a time of 4:11.90 and also ran on the Golden Gophers's 4 x 800 meter relay which finished third in 7:35.75 at the league indoor meet. Hebl, fifth in the Drake Relays 1500 with a personal-best 3:46.18, will attempt the tough 1500-800 double this weekend and is always a threat with his patented kick. Fitzgerald is another talented performer who will also be in the thick of things this weekend.

Going The Distance: Junior Keith Eidman (Roseville, MN), who led the Golden Gopher cross country team at last fall's Big Ten Championships with a 10th-place individual finish, will run in both Saturday's 10,000 meters and then come back in Sunday's 5000 meters. He finished fourth at Drake in the 10,000 with a personal-best clocking of 30:35.1 and then was the runner-up at the Minnesota Invitational on May 5 in the 5000 with a time of 14:53.32. Senior Eric Overby (Kenyon, MN) finished seventh at Drake in the 10,000 with a personal-best 30:55.3 and will look to be a factor as well in the event at the league meet. Chris Harder, who despite a spill on the final water jump recorded a season-best 9:13.61 in the 3000 meter steeplechase at the Minnesota Invitational, appears ready and able to uncork a good one at the Big Ten Championships.

York Set For Hurdles: A two-time placewinner in the 400 meter intermediate hurdles, Chris York will be looking to go three-for-three this weekend. He finished seventh (54.14) in the event in 1988 and then eighth a year ago in 54.56 (53.98 prelims). On April 14, he was second at the Nebraska Invitational with a clocking of 53.55.

Murrell Looking For High Jump Sweep: After winning the Big Ten indoor high jump title with a leap of 7'3", a new University of Minnesota school indoor record (Mike Vukovich, 7'2 1/2", 1988), freshman Chris Murrell (Grand Island, NE) will be out to add the outdoor crown to his already overflowing treasure chest of championships. He was honored on the All-Big Ten Team for his efforts, before going on to place 10th overall at the NCAA Indoor Championships on March 9 at the Hoosier Dome in Indianapolis with a jump of 7'2 1/2". Recognized as one of the finest prep high jumpers in the country a year ago when he won the Nebraska state high school crown for Grand Island with a state record jump of 7'1 1/4", he has continued to shine in Gold Country. After his amazing indoor season, he kept things rolling along by winning the Georgia Relays title in the first outdoor collegiate competition of his career on March 24 with a leap of 6'11". He also came out on top at the Nebraska Invitational on April 14 after clearing 7'1" in the competition and then surpassed the NCAA provisional qualifying mark with a winning leap of 7'2" at the Iowa triangular on April 21. He also finished in a tie for fifth at the Drake Relays with a jump of 6'11".

Javelin Debut: The javelin will be making its debut as an event at the Big Ten Championships this season and Golden Gopher freshman Chad Rodvold (Williston, ND) has established himself as one of the league's very finest. He won the Iowa triangular on April 21 with a throw of 196'0" and was the runner-up at the Georgia Invitational on April 7 with a personal-best toss of 197'1".

Pole Vaulters Look To Score: Freshman Justin Daler (Toledo, OH), who finished sixth at the Big Ten Indoor Championships with a mark of 16'1 3/4", and junior Ross Thompson (Esko, MN), both eye solid finishes in Sunday's pole vault competition. Daler, who captured the Ohio State High School Championship a year ago with a vault of 16'0", won the event at the Minnesota Invitational with a school outdoor record of 16'7". He also finished tied for seventh at the Drake Relays with a mark of 16'2" and won the Nebraska Invitational on April 14 with a vault of 16'6". Thompson, ninth at the Big Ten Indoor Championships with a vault of 16'0", won both the Georgia Relays on March 24 and the Georgia Invitational on April 7 with identical 16'0" vaults.

Lacy Leads Weightmen: Mark Lacy will be going into the Big Ten Championships with a full head of steam. At last Saturday's Wisconsin Twilight Open in Madison, he won the shot put with a

personal-best heave of 56'4" and then came back to finish third in the discus with another personal-best of 166'2". He finished sixth at the 1990 Big Ten Indoor Championships in the shot put with a heave of 53'2 1/4".

Coach Griak: "I would say that we have the chance to score in about 14 different areas this weekend. That's probably the largest point production possibility we've had in recent years. We also have the opportunity to score some big points in about three or four events. If our guys can improve upon their personal bests and rise to the occasion, then we can do some damage. I don't know where we'll finish, but I feel that we have the capability of scoring 40, possibly even 50, points this weekend."

QUACKENBUSH HONORED AS MVP OF GOLDEN GOPHER SWIMMING & DIVING TEAM

Sophomore Sean Quackenbush (Rochester, MN) was honored as the MVP of the Golden Gopher swimming & diving team at the squad's annual banquet held last Sunday at the Decathlon Athletic Club in Bloomington.

Honored as the Big Ten Freshman-of-the-Year in 1989, Quackenbush turned in another outstanding conference meet in 1990, leading the Golden Gophers to a runner-up finish in the final team standings, the program's best finish since 1927. He swept the butterfly events in the competition held March 1-3 at Ann Arbor, MI, setting a new all-time Big Ten record in the 200 butterfly with a winning clocking of 1:44.33 and also taking the 100 version of the stroke with an impressive time of 47.93. Both times erased school records that he had set during his rookie season in Gold Country. In addition to finishing sixth in the 200 individual medley final with a time of 1:50.89, he also was a member of the 400 freestyle relay unit which finished second in 2:58.62, the 800 freestyle relay which was fourth in 6:37.08 and the 400 medley relay which was second in 3:17.53.

"If by chance there was anyone who wasn't impressed with Sean last year, they certainly became convinced of his ability this time around," said Golden Gopher head coach Dennis Dale following the conference meet. "He was sensational. In fact, his relay performances were as good, or possibly even better if that's possible, than those in his individual events."

Quackenbush then went on to record the Golden Gophers' best finish at the NCAA Championships held March 22-24 at Indianapolis, IN, placing ninth in the 200 butterfly final with a clocking of 1:45.61. He also collected honorable mention All-America honors by placing 15th in the 100 butterfly (48.57), and as a member of the 200 freestyle (16th, 1:22.00) and 400 medley (15th, 3:18.03) relay units.

"This really solidifies our backcourt," said Golden Gopher head coach Clem Haskins. "Townsend is not only an excellent passer, but he's a fine shooter as well. Along with Arriel McDonald, this gives us an excellent combination at the point-guard position." Orr averaged 20 points, 7 rebounds, and 7 assists for Thornridge, while hitting 49% from the field and 81% from the line.

Orr was named All-Suburban, All-Conference, and All-State in the 1989-90 season, while playing in the tough SIAC suburban Chicago conference.

Orr will join fall signees Chad Kolander (6-9, Owatonna, MN), Randy Carter (6-8, Memphis, TN) and Jon Laster (6-5, Denver, CO) at the University of Minnesota. Sean Pell (6-9, Clearwater, FL), who had also signed last fall, will attend prep school during the 1990-91 academic year.

"We are not sure whether this concludes our recruiting for next season," Haskins said. "We still have one scholarship available and are presently looking at another player."

WERWIE HONORED WITH LEN BAILEY AWARD AT TENNIS TEAM BANQUET

Junior Kevin Werwie (Sheboygan, WI) was honored as the recipient of the prestigious Len Bailey Award and named team captain for the 1990-91 season at the Golden Gopher tennis squad's annual awards banquet held on Wednesday at the Edina Country Club.

The Len Bailey Award is given to the player who best exemplifies grit, determination and team spirit. Werwie was named to the 12-member All-Big Ten Team for his exceptional play this season. With an overall record of 28-17, he led the Golden Gophers in singles wins for the second consecutive season after going 30-13 a year ago. He also registered a 20-11 mark in doubles. Through three seasons in Gold Country, he has registered an 80-37 record in singles play and a 53-30 mark in doubles action. In addition, the general management major is a two-time Big Ten All-Academic selection.

Senior Jason Hall (Prior Lake, MN) was given the Louis Ratner Award, given annually to the player who has made an outstanding contribution to Golden Gopher tennis. Presently ranked No. 70 in the Volvo Tennis/Collegiate Rankings in singles, he has logged records of 53-40 in singles and 39-23 at the halfway point in his collegiate career.

Junior Anthony Cruz (Madinah, IL) and freshman Rick Naumoff (Columbus, OH) were also honored. Cruz, who redshirted the 1988-89 season with an ankle injury, took the Unsung Player of the Year Award. He was on "Cruz Control" for the Golden Gophers down the stretch this season. He went 3-0 at the No. 6 singles slot for the squad at the Big Ten Championships to cap off an outstanding season. 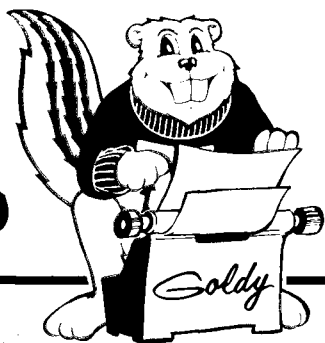

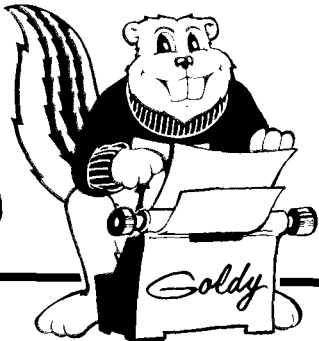
U OF M GOLF COURSE TO CLOSE FOR MAINTENANCE

"It needs rest and proper maintenance work immediately, and it is impossible for our crews to work efficiently on the course when play is so heavy. We regret the inconvenience to our golfing public, but we believe this plan is in the long range best interest of the facility."

Once the course is back in operation, just prior to the start of the Memorial Day weekend, it will be closed each Monday until noon (with the exception of Labor Day) through the remainder of the golf season in hopes of allowing for continued proper maintenance.

MORGAN HONORED AS GOLDEN GOPHER WRESTLING MVP

Junior **Marty Morgan** (Bloomington, MN) was honored as MVP of the University of Minnesota wrestling team at the squad's annual banquet on Monday at the James Ballentine VFW Post in Minneapolis.

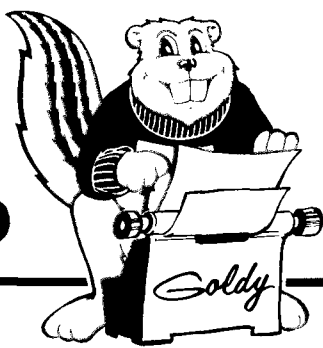
Morgan won the Big Ten title at 177 pounds this past season and then went on to finish second at the NCAA Championships. In addition to setting a single-season school record with 20 pins, Morgan also led the Golden Gophers this season in victories with an overall 39-2 mark, including a sparkling 16-0 dual meet record. He was selected as the Big Ten Wrestling Athlete-of-the-Month in both December and February. After transferring from North Dakota State University where he won an NCAA Division II individual title for the Bison in 1986-87, he placed sixth at the 1989 NCAA Championships at 167 pounds for the Golden Gophers and finished with an overall 32-10 mark in his first season in Gold Country.

Senior **Chuck Heise** (Mosinee, WI) was honored as the Most Improved Wrestler, along with receiving the Upper Class Outstanding Academic Award. He was second on the team in victories this past season finishing with a 37-4-1 record, winning the Big Ten title at 142 pounds and earning an NCAA Tournament berth in the process. In the classroom, the three-time Academic All-Big Ten selection has registered a sterling 3.66 GPA as a dual major in genetics and cell biology.

Junior **Dave Zuniga** (Worland, WY) and senior **Jeff Balcom** (Fairmont, MN) were honored with the Most Exciting Wrestler and Most Dedicated Wrestler Awards respectively. Zuniga, a transfer from Utah State University, finished with a 27-2 record after becoming eligible to compete for the Golden Gophers in January due to the transfer. At the Big Ten Championships held on March 10-11 at Evanston, IL, he topped Iowa's Tom Brands 6-5 in the thrilling championship match at 134 pounds en route to being honored as the Big Ten Athlete-of-the-Championship. He went on to collect All-American honors after finishing second in the weight class at the NCAA Championships. Balcom, who charted a combined 1-16-4 dual meet record during his first two seasons, came back to go 18-5-1 last season and 33-7-3 this past season for the Golden Gophers. On top of that, he earned trips to the NCAA Championships in both seasons as well.

Sophomore **Joe Russell** (Portland, OR), who was seriously injured in a motorcycle accident in high school, was honored with the Frazer Dean Most Courageous Wrestler Award. The award is given to the wrestler who most exemplifies devotion, unselfishness, courage and leadership. **Willy Short** (Inver Grove Heights, MN), who registered a 20-15-1 record this past season, received the Outstanding Freshman Wrestler Award, while **Scott Dooley** (Lakewood, CO), a two-time Colorado state champion who redshirted this season, received the Freshman Outstanding Academic Award.

Head coach J Robinson's Golden Gophers put the appropriate finishing touches on yet another prosperous season by finishing 10th in the final team standings at the NCAA Championships held March 22-24 at College Park, MD, after earlier finishing in a tie for third at the Big Ten Championships. Under Robinson, the Golden Gophers have now finished in the top 20 at the past four NCAA Championships, including back-to-back top 10 finishes. During that time, a total of seven Golden Gophers have collected nine All-American certificates and six wrestlers have won seven Big Ten individual titles. In addition, four Golden Gophers have garnered a total of nine Academic All-Big Ten certificates.

FIVE BLUE-CHIPPERS SIGN WITH GOLDEN GOPHER WRESTLING TEAM

The University of Minnesota wrestling program has announced the signing of five more outstanding student-athletes to national letters of intent.

Cliff Casteel, who charted a 204-22-1 career record at Montrose Hill-McCloy High School, won the Michigan State High School crown at 167 pounds as a senior, after finishing second as a junior. During his prep career, he registered more than 100 pins and over 400 takedowns. An outstanding student with better than a 3.0 cumulative GPA, he was also a second-team all-state performer in football.

"Cliff is a great wrestler from Montrose, MI, home of Golden Gopher All-American Dave Dean," said University of Minnesota assistant head coach Gary Keck. "He could help fill a hole for us at 167 if he is not redshirted next season. He is a super athlete who wrestles all year and has the potential to be an All-American for us during his career."

Brett Columbini captured the California State High School 175-pound crown as a senior this past season at Ukiah High School, finishing with a sparkling 54-0 season mark. He then went on to finish second at the National High School Wrestling Tournament. Prior to this season, he was a runner-up at the state meet. He finished his prep career with an overall record of 162-10-1. A two-time all-conference choice on the school's football team, he has registered a 3.0 cumulative GPA in the classroom.

"Brett is probably one of the most physical high school wrestlers in the nation," Keck said. "He went undefeated this season in one of the toughest weight classes in California. He recently placed second at the first National High School Tournament which shows that he can go with the best. Brett has an outstanding work ethic and with his physical abilities, he could end up being one of our finest recruits in years."

Tim Harris was a three-time placewinner at the Missouri State High School Championships for Oakville High School in St. Louis. He finished third at the state meet this past season at 132 pounds, after placing fourth in both his sophomore and junior seasons. During his prep career, he racked up an impressive 65-4 overall record and also placed fourth at the USA Junior National Championships. In the classroom, he has recorded an equally impressive 3.6 GPA.

"Tim is an excellent athlete with a great attitude," Keck said. "Although he has never won a state title, he has proven himself at the national level. He has great size and strength for his weight class, which will be an asset to him in college. Tim's also a great student and has set high goals for himself."

Todd Moss finished third at the 1990 Minnesota State High School Class "AA" Championships at 179 pounds for St. Paul Johnson High School, duplicating his finish at the state tournament as a junior in 1989. In addition to finishing with an 88-11 career prep record, he placed fourth at the USA Junior National Championships. He also competed in football and track for the Governors and has a 3.2 GPA in the classroom.

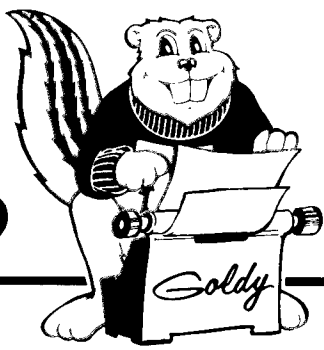
"Todd's disappointing third-place finish at the state tournament does not indicate the great potential that he has," Keck said. "He has the physical and mental abilities to be one of the best wrestlers in the nation. He has proven himself nationally already and will most likely redshirt behind Marty Morgan next season, but would be ready if called upon. I can't say enough about his attitude. He's a great kid from this area, with a great desire to be a Golden Gopher."

Shawn Phillips finished fourth at the 1990 Minnesota State High School Class "AA" Championships at heavyweight for Shakopee High School. As a senior, he recorded an overall 31-4 record. During the fall, the 5-foot-10, 240-pounder served as a captain on the school's football squad. An excellent student, the National Honor Society member who has received Rotary Club honors, has compiled a 3.25 GPA.

"Shawn could step right in next season as our next heavyweight replacing Jeff Balcom," Keck said. "Even though he's somewhat short, he's very powerful. He didn't place as high as expected at the state tournament because of an injury, but we feel that he has outstanding potential. Shawn possesses outstanding academic abilities and has the desire to excel in everything he does."

Casteel, Columbini, Harris, Moss and Phillips join previous signees Michael Klingsmith, a 1990 Oklahoma State High School champion for Midwest City High School and Chad Carlson, a two-time Minnesota State High School Class "AA" champion at Willmar High School, as signees for the Golden Gophers. Keck said that there still may be one additional signee forthcoming.

"We've put a lot of emphasis on getting the best student-athletes this year," Keck said. "Not only are these guys outstanding wrestlers, but they've excelled in the classroom as well. They are a great bunch of student-athletes who really believe in our program."

A Closer Look: In addition to Paul Keller and Billy Emo, sophomore **Dave Carothers** (Owatonna, MN), freshman **Rick Grand** (Bemidji, MN) and junior **Paul Remus** (St. Charles, IL) also turned in fine efforts for the Golden Gophers at the Big Ten Championships. Carothers finished in a tie for 25th overall with a 72-hole score of 299 (78-74-74-73), Grand was tied for 30th with a score of 302 (74-73-79-76) and Remus tallied a 306 (76-71-80-79) to finish in a tie for the 40th spot overall.

Looking Good: The Golden Gophers turned in a number of personal-best scores during the tournament. Billy Emo's final round of 70 was a University of Minnesota personal-best, while Paul Keller's 69, Paul Remus' 71 and Rick Grand's 73 during Friday's second round were all collegiate bests and led the Golden Gophers to a tournament-best team score of 285.

Ohio State Leads The Pack: Ohio State has now won 13 of the past 15 Big Ten team titles and leads the league with 20 overall league golf team championships. Chris Smith's individual crown also gave the Buckeyes their 16th Big Ten

meet medalist...also tops in the conference.

Minnesota At The Big Ten Championships: The University of Minnesota has won a total of four Big Ten team titles (1929, 1938, 1963, 1972) and captured seven individual medalist (Les Bolstad - 1927 & 1929, James Teale - 1943 (co), Bill Brask - 1968, Dave Haberle - 1971, Jim Berggeson - 1972, John Harris - 1974) crowns at the league championships.

Coach Harvey's Farewell: Head coach Greg Harvey completed his 12th and final season as head coach of the Golden Gopher golf program on Sunday. The University of Minnesota will hire a full-time head coach of the program. He has combined his duties as golf coach at the University of Minnesota along with his full-time dentist practice. A three-time letterwinner (1968-70) for the Golden Gophers under fabled head coach Les Bolstad, he directed the program to fourth-place finishes at the Big Ten Championships in 1979, 1981, 1983 (tie) and in 1990. **See You Next Year:** With the entire five-man Big Ten Championship lineup returning next season, Coach Harvey has certainly left the program in great shape. The Golden Gophers will be one of the team's to watch during the 1990-91 season.

Minneapolis, MN

Setting a Big Ten record 16 straight league wins, taking victories in 22 of its last 25 games, ending 2nd in regular season conference play, making the playoffs and ending just four wins short of the school record (40) for a single season, should be enough for any baseball team. Not for some connected with the University of Minnesota baseball program.

There was belief, or maybe just hope, an at-large bid from the NCAA would cap off the school's 28th consecutive winning season. The Gophers, however, could only look forward to tonight's awards banquet as a fitting end to another successful season.

Minnesota, after dropping both games at the Big Ten Championships tournament in Iowa City, has to settle for all the above, a 36-24-1 season record and a 19-9 conference log. The latter record marked the 25th straight time Minnesota has not finished below .500 in league play.

In the middle of the 1990 season, anyone who said this Gopher baseball team will finish as high as it did would have been considered a candidate for some other planet. At one time the Gophers were 3-9 in the Big Ten and tied for last place.

"At that point I said to our players that they have one of two choices---either they get better or get worse. I'm glad they chose the first route," head coach John Anderson said last weekend.

"This team could have easily folded up. That was not their nature, however. I'm very proud of this team. They began to battle, play solid defense, move runners up, get the key hits with runners in scoring position, all the little things a baseball team has to do to become a winner. A lot of personal sacrifices were made, and I don't mean just laying down bunts, to make this club a winner.

"Yes, there was disappointment at the end. But there so may wonderful moments, so many highs this year that our players can look back with pride to the 1990 season. We can look at the two wins in Arizona to open the season in January.

"There was another when we defeated the #1 pitcher from the U. of Texas, took two of three at Kansas, and had a solid chance to win two of the three games in the strongest PILLSBURY CLASSIC field ever, and, of course, our winning streaks later in the year.

"All the above points to a group of dedicated young men who played with a purpose. They gave everything asked of them, and then went out and gave some more. I believe it is in that content why I am probably more disappointed than anyone our players were not rewarded by the NCAA."

To the surprise of few, if any, Gopher second baseman **Brian Raabe** (New Ulm) and catcher **Dan Wilson** (Barrington, IL), 1990 team co-captains, were voted to the coaches' All-Big Ten first team. Wilson, a junior, was a unanimous selection.

In his spare time, Wilson also added a batting title to his numerous accomplishments. Wilson led his teammates with a solid .370 batting average for all games. He ended third in number of base hits, 67, walked 42 times while scoring 43 runs and driving in 49. He also led the team in home runs with eight.

Raabe, a senior, closed out his Minnesota stay by securing three career records in his name. He has played in more games (228), stroked the most hits (264), and had more official at bats (773) than any other player in Gopher baseball history.

Another standout, sophomore shortstop **Brent Gates** (Grandville, MI), was named to the conference second team and added two more season marks to the 20 doubles he rattled off in 1989. Gates set standards for most hits in a single season, 82, when he lined a single to left field in his last at bat of the season against Ohio State. He also appeared at the plate 223 times for another UM record.

Gates teamed with Raabe and junior first baseman **Jeff Monson** (Bloomington) to turn a majority of the school-record 68 double plays. For the season, the Gophers compiled a sparkling .968 fielding percentage, just inches short of the record .969 percentage set by the 1981 Gopher team. Included this year was another school season fielding record, 666 assists.

Sophomore lefty **John Lowery** (Shepherdstown, WV) upped his two-year record to 14-4 with a 7-4 season log. He pitched the most innings (82 2/3), had the most strike outs (62) and the most starts (19) for the Gophers. Lowery also compiled a 4.14 ERA.

Among the starters, senior **Jon Wroge** (Norwood) ended with the lowest ERA, 3.54, while reliever **Brent Davis** (Minnetonka), a sophomore lefty, was the right man at the right place and time. Davis ended the season with an unblemished 6-0 record and only had one start. He picked up back-to-back Big Ten wins with just one middle inning of work in each game.

A Closer Look: In addition to Paul Keller and Billy Emo, sophomore **Dave Carothers** (Owatonna, MN), freshman **Rick Grand** (Bemidji, MN) and junior **Paul Remus** (St. Charles, IL) also turned in fine efforts for the Golden Gophers at the Big Ten Championships. Carothers finished in a tie for 25th overall with a 72-hole score of 299 (78-74-74-73), Grand was tied for 30th with a score of 302 (74-73-79-76) and Remus tallied a 306 (76-71-80-79) to finish in a tie for the 40th spot overall.

Looking Good: The Golden Gophers turned in a number of personal-best scores during the tournament. Billy Emo's final round of 70 was a University of Minnesota personal-best, while Paul Keller's 69, Paul Remus' 71 and Rick Grand's 73 during Friday's second round were all collegiate bests and led the Golden Gophers to a tournament-best team score of 285.

Ohio State Leads The Pack: Ohio State has now won 13 of the past 15 Big Ten team titles and leads the league with 20 overall league golf team championships. Chris Smith's individual crown also gave the Buckeyes their 16th Big Ten meet medalist...also tops in the conference.

Minnesota At The Big Ten Championships: The University of Minnesota has won a total of four Big Ten team titles (1929, 1938, 1963, 1972) and captured seven individual medalist (Les Bolstad - 1927 & 1929, James Teale - 1943 (co), Bill Brask - 1968, Dave Haberle - 1971, Jim Berggeson - 1972, John Harris - 1974) crowns at the league championships.

Coach Harvey's Farewell: Head coach Greg Harvey completed his 12th and final season as head coach of the Golden Gopher golf program on Sunday. The University of Minnesota will hire a full-time head coach of the program. He has combined his duties as golf coach at the University of Minnesota along with his full-time dentist practice. A three-time letterwinner (1968-70) for the Golden Gophers under fabled head coach Les Bolstad, he directed the program to fourth-place finishes at the Big Ten Championships in 1979, 1981, 1983 (tie) and in 1990.

See You Next Year: With the entire five-man Big Ten Championship lineup returning next season, Coach Harvey has certainly left the program in great shape. The Golden Gophers will be one of the team's to watch during the 1990-91 season.

TRACK & FIELD TEAM FINISHES SEVENTH AT BIG TEN CHAMPIONSHIPS; HOEFT NAMED ALL-BIG TEN

Behind runner-up finishes from senior **Carson Hoeft** (Plymouth, MN), and freshmen **Chad Rodvold** (Williston, ND) and **Chris Murrell** (Grand Island, NE), the Golden Gopher track & field squad finished seventh in the final team standings with 50 points at the Big Ten Championships held last Saturday and Sunday at Champaign, IL.

Most Points Since 1982: Head coach Roy Griak's Golden Gophers registered 50 points at the Big Ten Championships, their most ever at the league meet since his 1982 squad scored 54 points at the 1982 competition en route to a sixth-place team finish. It was also the program's best finish since 1986 when they were sixth.

The Placewinners: The Golden Gophers had a total of 10 competitors place (top eight) in nine events at the Big Ten Championships. They are as follows:

Hoeft Named To All-Big Ten Team: Carson Hoeft, who redshirted the 1989 season but has been a dominant performer for the Golden Gophers in the middle distances once again this year, was denied the first individual conference title of his career by Indiana superstar Bob Kennedy in the 1500 meters on Sunday. In a race that went right to the wire, Kennedy won in a tactical 3:49.18, with Hoeft right on his heels in 3:49.96. Hoeft was honored as an at-large choice on the All-Big Ten Team by the league's coaches after having already received the distinction at the indoor conference meet back in February. He has turned in an outstanding campaign thus far for Griak's Golden Gophers. At the Drake Relays in Des Moines, IA on April 27-28, he anchored the school record-setting 4 x 1600 meter relay to a fourth-place finish with a 4:05.9 split. Sean Fitzgerald led off the relay with a 4:07.4, Chris Harder was next with a 4:09.4 and Dan Hebl turned in a 4:06.4 on the third leg before turning it over to Hoeft. The foursome's final time of 16:29.17 broke a 20-year old school record. Hoeft, who had already won the Texas Relays 1500 meters in 3:48.34 back on April 7, then came back the next day to finish second in the 1500 meters with a personal-best and NCAA provisional qualifying time of 3:43.14. He also finished second to Indiana's Kennedy in the mile at the 1990 Big Ten Indoor Championships with a time of 4:11.90 and then ran on the Golden Gophers' 4 x 800 meter relay which finished third in 7:35.75 at the league indoor meet.

Murrell Just Misses High Jump Sweep: After winning the Big Ten indoor high jump title with a leap of 7'3", a new University of Minnesota school indoor record (Mike Vukovich, 7'2 1/2", 1988), Chris Murrell just missed adding the outdoor crown to his already impressive resume. Wisconsin's Todd Vogt won the event with a leap of 7'2 1/2", with Murrell in second at 7'1". During the indoor season, he was honored on the All-Big Ten Team for his winning efforts, before going on to place 10th overall at the NCAA Indoor Championships on March 9 at the Hoosier Dome in Indianapolis with

a jump of 7'2 1/2". Recognized as one of the finest prep high jumpers in the country a year ago when he won the Nebraska state high school crown for Grand Island with a state record jump of 7'1 1/4", he has continued to shine in Gold Country. After his amazing indoor season, he kept things rolling along by winning the Georgia Relays title in the first outdoor collegiate competition of his career on March 24 with a leap of 6'11". He also came out on top at the Nebraska Invitational on April 14 after clearing 7'1" in the competition and then surpassed the NCAA provisional qualifying mark with a winning leap of 7'2" at the Iowa triangular on April 21. He also finished in a tie for fifth at the Drake Relays with a jump of 6'11".

Javelin Returns In Style: The javelin returned as an event at the Big Ten Championships this season and Golden Gopher rookie Chad Rodvold established himself as one of the league's very finest right away. He placed second behind William Patrowicz of Wisconsin (206'0") with a throw of 191'2". Earlier this season, he won the Iowa triangular on April 21 with a throw of 196'0" and was the runner-up at the Georgia Invitational on April 7 with a personal-best toss of 197'1".

Sprint Star: Tim Arinze, who sat out last season under the NCAA's Proposition 48 Rule, became one of the Big Ten's best sprinters this season. He finished fourth in the 100 meters with a wind-aided 10.40 (10.38w prelims, NCAA provisional qualifying time) and fifth in the 200 meters with a wind-aided clocking of 21.40 (20.95w prelims) at the conference meet. He registered legal personal best clockings of 10.54 in the 100 and 21.28 in the 200 meters this season.

Middle-Distance Mania: The Golden Gophers proved their strength in the middle distances at the Big Ten Championships, placing three in the top six of the 1500 meter final. In addition to Carson Hoeft's runner-up finish, Dan Hebl was right there in fourth with a time of 3:50.81 and Sean Fitzgerald was sixth in 3:52.07. The threesome also joined Chris York to finish eighth in the 4 x 400 meter relay with a time of 3:26.60.

Going The Distance: Keith Eidman who led the Golden Gopher cross country team at last fall's Big Ten Championships with a 10th-place individual finish, finished seventh in Saturday's tactical 10,000 meters with a time of 32:24.75. Earlier this season, he finished seventh at Drake in the 10,000 with a personal-best clocking of 30:35.1 and then was the runner-up at the Minnesota Invitational on May 5 in the 5000 with a time of 14:53.32. Chris Harder ran to a personal-best clocking of 9:09.57 to place eighth in Sunday's 3000 meter steeplechase final.

Lacy Fourth In Shot: Mark Lacy placed fourth in Sunday's shot put competition with a throw of 56'0". Scott Cappas of Indiana won the event with a heave of 60'9 1/2". At the Wisconsin Twilight Open in Madison on May 12, he won the shot put with a personal-best heave of 56'4" and then came back to finish third in the discus with another personal-best of 166'2". He had finished sixth at the 1990 Big Ten Indoor Championships in the shot put with a heave of 53'2 1/4".

Provisional Qualifiers: Carson Hoeft (1500 meters, 3:43.14), Chris Murrell (High Jump, 7'3" indoors) and Tim Arinze (100 meters, 10.38w) are provisional qualifiers for the NCAA Championships to be held at Duke University in Durham, NC on May 30-June 2. The minimum field size in the 100 meters is 24 competitors, 18 in the 1500 meters and 16 in the high jump. Performances meeting provisional standards will be used to develop a descending-order list to fill the field for each event if there are not enough automatic qualifiers.

Cross Country/Track & Field Captains Announced: Coach Griak has announced co-captains for both the 1990 cross country and 1991 track & field seasons. Keith Eidman and Chris Harder will be the Golden Gopher cross country co-captains this fall. Both will be in their senior seasons of competition. Sean Fitzgerald, who will be a junior, and pole vaulter Ross Thompson (Esko, MN), who will be a senior, will co-captain the track & field squad next season.

MORGAN HONORED AS GOLDEN GOPHER WRESTLING MVP

Junior **Marty Morgan** (Bloomington, MN) was honored as MVP of the University of Minnesota wrestling team at the squad's annual banquet on Monday at the James Ballentine VFW Post in Minneapolis.

Morgan won the Big Ten title at 177 pounds this past season and then went on to finish second at the NCAA Championships. In addition to setting a single-season school record with 20 pins, Morgan also led the Golden Gophers this season in victories with an overall 39-2 mark, including a sparkling 16-0 dual meet record. He was selected as the Big Ten Wrestling Athlete-of-the-Month in both December and February. After transferring from North Dakota State University where he won an NCAA Division II individual title for the Bison in 1986-87, he placed sixth at the 1989 NCAA Championships at 167 pounds for the Golden Gophers and finished with an overall 32-10 mark in his first season in Gold Country.

Senior **Chuck Heise** (Mosinee, WI) was honored as the Most Improved Wrestler, along with receiving the Upper Class Outstanding Academic Award. He was second on the team in victories this past season finishing with a 37-4-1 record, winning the Big Ten title at 142 pounds and earning an NCAA Tournament berth in the process. In the classroom, the three-time Academic All-Big Ten selection has registered a sterling 3.66 GPA as a dual major in genetics and cell biology.

Junior **Dave Zuniga** (Worland, WY) and senior **Jeff Balcom** (Fairmont, MN) were honored with the Most Exciting Wrestler and Most Dedicated Wrestler Awards respectively. Zuniga, a transfer from Utah State University, finished with a 27-2 record after becoming eligible to compete for the Golden Gophers in January due to the transfer. At the Big Ten Championships held on March 10-11 at Evanston, IL, he topped Iowa's Tom Brands 6-5 in the thrilling championship match at 134 pounds en route to being honored as the Big Ten Athlete-of-the-Championship. He went on to collect All-American honors after finishing second in the weight class at the NCAA Championships. Balcom, who charted a combined 1-16-4 dual meet record during his first two seasons, came back to go 18-5-1 last season and 33-7-3 this past season for the Golden Gophers. On top of that, he earned trips to the NCAA Championships in both seasons as well.

Sophomore **Joe Russell** (Portland, OR), who was seriously injured in a motorcycle accident in high school, was honored with the Frazer Dean Most Courageous Wrestler Award. The award is given to the wrestler who most exemplifies devotion, unselfishness, courage and leadership. **Willy Short** (Inver Grove Heights, MN), who registered a 20-15-1 record this past season, received the Outstanding Freshman Wrestler Award, while **Scott Dooley** (Lakewood, CO), a two-time Colorado state champion who redshirted this season, received the Freshman Outstanding Academic Award.

Head coach J Robinson's Golden Gophers put the appropriate finishing touches on yet another prosperous season by finishing 10th in the final team standings at the NCAA Championships held March 22-24 at College Park, MD, after earlier finishing in a tie for third at the Big Ten Championships. Under Robinson, the Golden Gophers have now finished in the top 20 at the past four NCAA Championships, including back-to-back top 10 finishes. During that time, a total of seven Golden Gophers have collected nine All-American certificates and six wrestlers have won seven Big Ten individual titles. In addition, four Golden Gophers have garnered a total of nine Academic All-Big Ten certificates.

JORGENSEN SIGNS WITH UNIVERSITY OF MINNESOTA

Eric Jorgensen, 1990 Minnesota State High School swimming champion in the 50 and 100 freestyles for Rochester John Marshall High School, has signed a national letter of intent to attend the University of Minnesota.

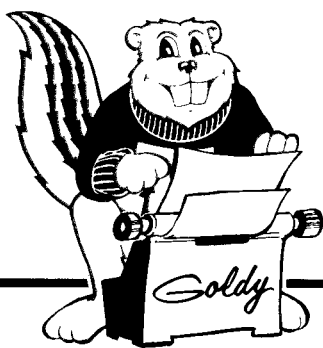

U of M Assistant Basketball Coach Dan Kosmoski Promoted By Coach Haskins

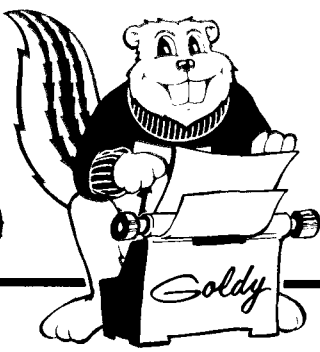

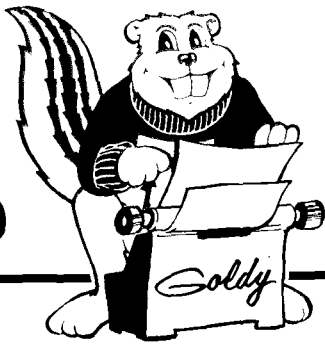

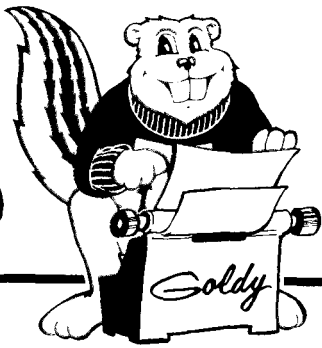
A member of the honors program in the College of Biological Sciences as well as a senior lab assistant, Heise has already been accepted to the University of Minnesota Medical School.

SIX GOLDEN GOPHERS TO COMPETE AT USA GYMNASTICS CHAMPIONSHIPS

Head coach Fred Roethlisberger's NCAA runner-up Golden Gopher gymnastics team has qualified six individuals, more than any other collegiate program in the nation, for the USA Gymnastics Championships to be held June 7-10 at McNichols Arena in Denver, CO.

The men's all-around portion of the competition will be held on Thursday, June 7 and Saturday, June 9, with the top twelve competitors from the meet comprising the U.S. National Team. The individual event finals will be held on Sunday, June 10.

Headlining the list of Golden Gophers will be **John Roethlisberger** (Afton, MN), who qualified for the national team with a third-place finish in the all-around (108.78) at the USA Winter Nationals held last December at Colorado Springs, CO. He just completed a stellar freshman season for the Golden Gophers, leading the squad to the Big Ten team crown by winning the all-around with a score of 113.35 (57.40 optional) and the horizontal bar title with a 9.75, en route to being honored as the Gymnast & Freshman-of-the-Year in the league. He continued to shine at the NCAA Championships, earning All-American honors in the all-around (114.10, 2nd), still rings (tied for 4th, 9.75), parallel bars (9.55, 4th) and high bar (9.85, 4th).

A pair of outgoing seniors, **Mark McKiernan** (Darien, CT) and **Dan Zimpfer** (Kent, OH), will also be in the hunt once again at the national meet. A finalist for the prestigious IBM/George Nissen Award which is presented annually to the outstanding senior in men's collegiate gymnastics, McKiernan, who placed 16th at last December's USA Winter Nationals and 19th at the USA Championships in July, was a mainstay of the Golden Gopher lineup throughout his career. He won his second straight Big Ten pommel horse (9.85) crown this past season and in 1989 was honored as the league's Gymnast-of-the-Year after also capturing the all-around (110.10) title. A 1989 All-American on the pommel horse, he captured a total of four individual Big Ten crowns and became the first four-time All-Big Ten gymnastics selection in Minnesota history. Zimpfer, who was injured at the USA Winter Nationals but placed 14th at the USA Championships last summer, is a top-flight gymnast who claimed the Big Ten floor exercise (9.575) title this past season.

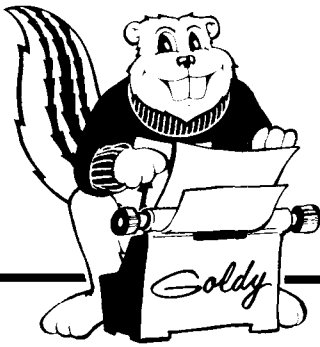
Jay Caputo (Longwood, FL), **Mike Farina** (Mundain, IL) and **Rob Hanson** (Ramsey, MN) should also make some noise of their own in Denver. Caputo, who placed 18th at the USA Winter Nationals and 26th at the USA Championships, is a three-time All-American for

the Golden Gophers with his senior season upcoming. Farina, who will also be a senior for Roethlisberger's squad next season, has been a steady performer throughout his collegiate career. Hanson, who along with John Roethlisberger gave the Golden Gophers the best freshman combination in the country this past season, appears ready and able to hit some big routines as well at the national meet.

"Every one of those guys has a chance to make the national team," Coach Roethlisberger said. "They'll select the U.S. Olympic Festival and Goodwill Games teams, along with at least a half-dozen other big competitions from this meet. This and the NCAA Championships are our two most important competitions of the year. It's every gymnast's dream to someday represent the USA in international competition."

Minnesota senior second baseman **Brian Raabe**, New Ulm, and junior catcher **Dan Wilson**, Barrington, IL, have been named to the 1990 All-Region IV baseball team announced today by region selection coordinator Fred Decker, head coach at Western Michigan University.

Raabe completed his four-year career at Minnesota with a .337 career batting average. He also set three school career records with most games played (233), most at bats (783) and most hits (264). Raabe was recently named to the 1990 All-Big Ten first team.

Wilson has played three years for Minnesota and compiled the exact same batting average as Raabe, .337. Wilson, however, has exhibited more power with 17 home runs and 119 runs batted in while playing 170 games. He is also widely known for his defensive abilities having thrown out better than 60% of would-be base stealers during his three collegiate seasons.

Last week Wilson was named first team All-America by **BASEBALL AMERICA**, a national publication. He, too, was an All-Big Ten first team selection this season.

Raabe and Wilson were co-captains of the 1990 Minnesota varsity team, and both are expected to be chosen in the major league amateur draft which begins today.

Big Ten schools dominated the All-Region IV team with 10 selections on the 13-man honor team. Regular season champion Iowa led with four players voted to the squad, while Michigan, like Minnesota, had two with Illinois and Michigan State gaining one player each on the honor team.

University of Minnesota senior, **Chuck Heise** (Mosinee, WI), has been honored on the GTE/CoSIDA District 5 Academic All-America At-Large first team.

Heise, the recipient of the University of Minnesota's Big Ten Conference Medal of Honor at last Wednesday's M Banquet, charted an impressive 37-4-1 record this past season en route to winning the Big Ten title at 142 pounds and qualifying for the NCAA Championships in the process for head coach J Robinson's squad. Ranked eighth in the final Amateur Wrestling News national poll, he recorded a sparkling Big Ten record of 8-0-1 this past season. In addition to opening the season with 14 consecutive victories, he also captured titles at the Bison Open, Nebraska-Omaha Open and Northern Open for the Golden Gophers. As a first team selection, Heise will now move on to the national ballot. The GTE/CoSIDA Academic All-America At-Large Team will be announced on June 21.

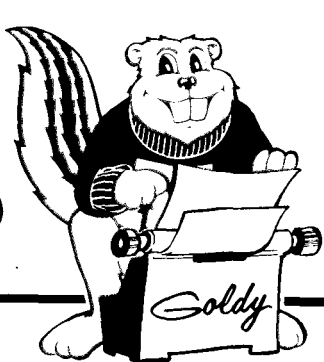

ROETHLISBERGER TO BE INDUCTED INTO WISCONSIN ATHLETIC HALL OF FAME

University of Minnesota head men's gymnastics coach, Fred Roethlisberger, will be inducted into the Wisconsin Athletic Hall of Fame at a special enshrinement program to be held at MECCA in Milwaukee on Thursday, September 27.

One of five outstanding athletes to receive the honor, Roethlisberger joins five-time Olympic speedskating gold medal winner Eric Heiden, four-time All-Pro football player for the Green Bay Packers Paul Hornung, tennis standout Robert Stuckert and Robert "Red" Wilson, a football and basketball standout at the University of Wisconsin who went on to an outstanding career (1954-60) in professional baseball after also being a #1 pick in the NFL draft, as new inductees.

"It's a big honor and quite humbling to say the least to be included in a group like that," Roethlisberger said. "I feel indebted to both the Milwaukee Turners and the University of Wisconsin for helping make this all possible."

Roethlisberger is the man behind the success of the University of Minnesota gymnastics program. Since taking over the reins of the program in 1972, he has led the Golden Gophers to eight Big Ten titles, never finishing lower than fourth at the league meet. In addition, his teams have placed in the Top 10 at the NCAA Championships a total of 11 times. His gymnasts have captured 37 individual Big Ten crowns and a number of his athletes have competed for the U.S. National Team.

Roethlisberger was honored by his colleagues as the 1990 Big Ten Conference Coach-of-the-Year after directing the Golden Gophers to the Big Ten team title at the league meet held on March 2-3 in Iowa City. In a real family affair, son John, a freshman standout for the Golden Gophers, captured Gymnast and Freshman-of-the-Year honors after claiming the all-around and horizontal bar titles. He was honored as the 1990 Midwest Region Coach-of-the-Year as well. The Golden Gophers finished second to Nebraska by one-tenth of a point at the NCAA Championships held last April in Williams Arena in one of the most exciting finishes in the history of the competition.

Roethlisberger, who was inducted into the U.S. Gymnastics Hall of Fame this year as a gymnast, coach and contributor, was also honored as the 1989 Midwest Coach-of-the-Year, after the Golden Gophers finished third at the NCAA Championships. *USA Today* selected him as their 1989 Minnesota Coach-of-the-Year.

Roethlisberger charted an illustrious gymnastics career of his own. Starting at an early age, he was an active participant with the Milwaukee Turners club team through high school. Following his prep days, he went on to star at the University of Wisconsin, where he became the first individual to receive the school's Athlete-of-the-Year Award while participating in a sport other than football or basketball. He earned his bachelor's degree in 1966, and his master's in 1970.

On the international scene, Roethlisberger competed in the 1966 World Championships, the 1967 Pan American Games and the 1968 Olympic Games in Mexico City. He was the second-highest scorer for the U.S. squad in Mexico City, and captained the Pan Am team, while winning gold medals in the all-around, horizontal bar and parallel bars at the competition in Winnipeg.

Following the 1968 Olympics, Roethlisberger began his coaching career at Wisconsin-Whitewater. In 1971 he came to the University of Minnesota where he assisted head coach Pat Bird for one season before being named the head coach the following season.

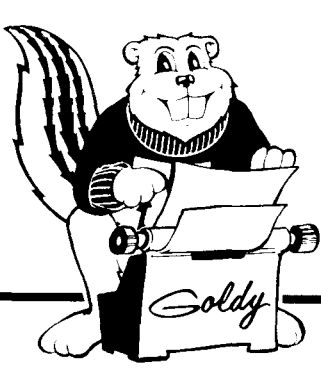
Throughout his career, Roethlisberger has been an active figure in the efforts of the U.S. National Team. In 1988, he served as head coach in the U.S.-U.S.S.R. dual meet in Phoenix, Arizona. In addition, he coached the U.S. National Team that traveled to Europe to compete against West Germany, Hungary and France in 1977, and has led contingents that participated in the 1978 Canada Cup, 1979 and 1985 Barcelona Invitational Tournaments, 1979 Taiwan Cup, 1981 South America Cup, 1982 France Invitational, 1982 and 1985 London Coca-Cola Invitational Tournaments, and the 1986 U.S.-China meet in Boston.

Roethlisberger is currently the Collegiate Coaches Association representative on the United States Gymnastics Federation Board of Directors, and served for eight years, including three as chairman, on the USGF Men's Program Committee.

Gymnastics runs deep in the Roethlisberger family. Daughter, Marie, is a six-time U.S. National Team member and 1984 Olympian. She finished 17th at the 1985 World Championships and captured the uneven bars title at the 1990 NCAA Women's Championships at Corvallis, OR, becoming Minnesota's first-ever NCAA female champion. Son, John, who finished third at last December's USGF Winter National in Colorado Springs to qualify for the U.S. National Team, had a standout first season for the Golden Gophers this year. He collected four All-American certificates to help lead the Golden Gophers to their runner-up finish at the NCAA Championships, after earlier helping the squad win the Big Ten team title after capturing Gymnast & Freshman-of-the-Year honors. Fred and his wife, Connie, a professor and coach at the University of Wisconsin-River Falls, have a third child, four-year old August.

This past spring saw Gates set a Minnesota season record with 82 hits while batting .368. He was named to the All-Big Ten second team.

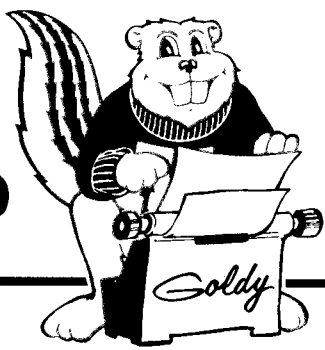
Three more Gopher players will spend their summer playing for the Cape Cod League in Massachusetts. HOEFT COLLECTS ALL-AMERICA HONORS TO WRAP UP COLLEGIATE CAREER

Senior **Carson Hoeft** (Plymouth, MN) closed out a productive collegiate career by finishing seventh in Saturday's 1500 meter final at the NCAA Track & Field Championships held at Duke University in Durham, NC. The Golden Gopher middle-distance star clocked a time of 3:42.35 earning All-America honors in the process.

Battling traffic the entire way, Hoeft put on a furious kick down the homestretch to finish seventh. Indiana's Bob Kennedy won the race in 3:40.42, followed by Phil Mulaney from Providence in 3:40.59. The top eight finishers all crossed the line within two seconds of each other.

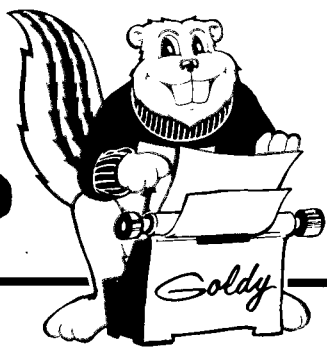
Hoeft qualified for Saturday's final after running a personal-best time of 3:41.99 in Thursday's prelims. That time was just shy of 1988 U.S. Olympian Steve Plasencia's school record clocking of 3:41.6 set back in 1977.

The NCAA Championships put the appropriate icing on the cake for Hoeft's career in Gold Country. During the outdoor season, he collected All-Big Ten honors after finishing second to Kennedy in the 1500 meters with a time of 3:49.96. He also was runner-up in the 1500 meters at the Drake Relays with a time of 3:43.14, after having earlier anchored (4:05.9 split) the Golden Gophers' 4 x 1600 meter relay to a fourth-place finish in a school record time of 16:29.17. In addition, he won the Texas Relays 1500 in 3:48.34 and placed third at the Nebraska Invitational in the 800 meters with a personal-best clocking of 1:50.55.

At the Big Ten Indoor Championships, Hoeft was honored on the All-Big Ten team after finishing second to old nemesis Kennedy in the mile with a time of 4:11.90, after running on the Golden Gophers' 4 x 800 meter relay which placed third in 7:35.75. A tri-captain for head coach Roy Griak's squad this season, he also claimed top honors in the 1500 meters at the Northwest Open (3:53.06) and in the mile at the Central Collegiate Championships (4:10.89) and Iowa-Northern Iowa triangular (4:11.00).

During his career, Hoeft was a four-time placewinner in the 1500 meters at the Big Ten Outdoor Championships, finishing fourth as a freshman in 1986 (3:46.74), third in 1987 (3:47.68) and 1988 (3:44.22), and then second this past season. Indoors, he was fourth at the league meet in the 1000 yards in 1987 (2:09.72), fourth in the mile in 1988 (4:09.78) and then second this past winter in the mile. A four-year letterwinner in cross country as well, he redshirted the 1989 track & field season.

Hoeft was a two-time all-state performer in both cross country and track at Armstrong High School. He helped lead the school to the state team crown in track as a senior. In addition to winning the 800 meters at the 1985 Junior Olympics with a 1:52 clocking, he captured the 1500 meter title at the 1986 Pan Am Junior Championships following his freshman season in Gold Country.

TRACK & FIELD TEAM SIGNS FOUR STANDOUTS

The University of Minnesota track & field program has announced the signing of four more outstanding student-athletes to national letters of intent.

Martin Eriksson from Stockholm, Sweden is the top ranked pole vaulter in the junior ranks in Sweden. Interested in studying computer science, he has a personal-best of 17'1" to his credit. Justin Daler set a new University of Minnesota school record as a freshman this past season with a vault of 16'7" and will team with Eriksson to give the Golden Gophers a very potent combination in the event.

"Martin is an excellent student and the top ranked junior vaulter in Sweden," said Golden Gopher assistant coach Phil Lundin. "He's an impact type of athlete in that he'll be able to compete at the national level right away."

Jason Cole from Shelby (MT) High School is regarded as one of the nation's finest prep performers in the javelin. He won the Montana State High School title in the event the past two seasons and has a personal-best of 218'0" to his credit. An all-state quarterback as a senior, he has recorded a 3.95 GPA and is interested in studying pre-medicine in college. Along with Chad Rodvold, Big Ten runner-up in the javelin this past season, the Golden Gophers should be very strong in the event for years to come.

"Jason is an excellent student and one of the top prep javelin throwers in the country," Lundin said. "He's an outstading all-around athlete and will complement Chad Rodvold very nicely."

Chris Sohre from Sheboygan (WI) South High School finished second in the Wisconsin State High School Class A (large schools) Championships held recently at LaCrosse with a clocking of 48.41. He also collected all-conference honors as a member of the school's football team last fall.

"Chris finished second at the state meet to probably one of the country's top three 400 meter runners in the country in Bryan Jones," Lundin said. "That kind of performance speaks for itself. He has the ability and work ethic to be a force in the 400 meters in the Big Ten during his collegiate career."

Jason Rathe from Osseo (MN) High School will compete for both the Golden Gopher cross country and track & field squads. After finishing fifth in both the 1600 (4:20.51) and 3200 (9:30.29) meters at the 1989 Minnesota State Class AA Track & Field Championships, he placed second at last fall's Class AA cross country meet. Although he has been bothered by injury problems, he will be one of the favorites in both the 1600 and 3200 meter runs at this weekend's state meet which will be held on Friday and Saturday at the National Sports Center in Blaine. In the classroom, he has recorded a perfect 4.0 GPA.

"Jason has the complete package," said Golden Gopher head cross country/track & field coach Roy Griak. "Not only is he a fine athlete, but he has already earned the equivalent of 45 credits at the University of Minnesota as a high school student. I see him developing into an outstanding runner as well for us."

Eriksson, Cole, Sohre and Rathe join Chris Brinkworth, a shot put and discus standout at Bloomington (MN) Kennedy High School, and Jason Max, 1989 Minnesota State Class AA 800 meter champion at Minnetonka (MN) High School, as signees for the Golden Gophers.

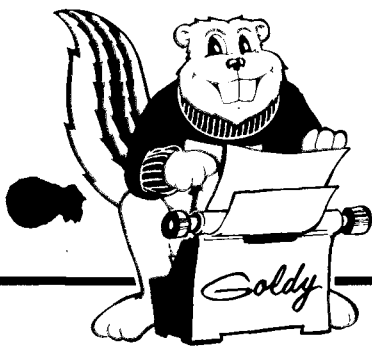

GADD NAMED GOLDEN GOPHER DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR

University of Minnesota head football coach, John Gutekunst, has announced the appointment of Tom Gadd as defensive coordinator for the Golden Gophers, effective immediately.

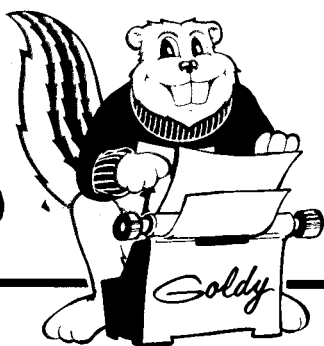
Gadd, 42, was the defensive coordinator at the University of Utah from 1977-82 and then again from 1987-89. In between, he served as the defensive coordinator at the University of South Carolina from 1983-86. He also was the defensive coordinator at Long Beach State from 1974-76 and from 1969-73 he coached at the University of California-Riverside, including the final two seasons as defensive coordinator.

Throughout Gadd's coaching career, his defensive units have been at, or near, the top of the final conference and national rankings. At California-Riverside in 1972, his defensive unit led the nation with 33 interceptions, allowing an average of just 75 yards rushing per game en route to racking up a 9-1 overall record, best in the school's history. His 1976 defensive unit at Long Beach State finished first in the PCAA and ninth in the nation in total defense on their way to an 8-3 overall record, after finishing with a 9-2 mark the year before when they ranked 16th overall in total defense. In 1978 at Utah, the Utes defense was ranked first in the Western Athletic Conference in rushing defense and total defense after recording an 8-3 mark. Utah charted an 8-2-1 overall record and ranked eighth in the nation in rushing defense in 1981. At South Carolina in 1984, his defense played a major role in helping to lead the Gamecocks to a school record 10-1 regular season mark and an appearance against USC in the Gator Bowl.

A 1970 graduate (B.S. History) of the University of California-Riverside, Gadd was honored as a District 3 All-NAIA selection in 1968 when he also served as team captain. A member of the American Football Coaches Association, he and his wife, Carol, have two sons, Danny (12) and Jeffrey (11).

"I'm really looking forward to the challenge," Gadd said. "The opportunity to compete in a great conference like the Big Ten is very exciting. In watching us play, people will notice that we'll hustle, play well together and have strong feelings towards each other. The great teams play with a purpose and have that feeling that they're destined to be successful."

"We're very happy to get a man with Tom Gadd's experience," Gutekunst said. "I know firsthand of his success when our paths crossed when he was at South Carolina. I look forward to having him pick up where we left off after spring practice."

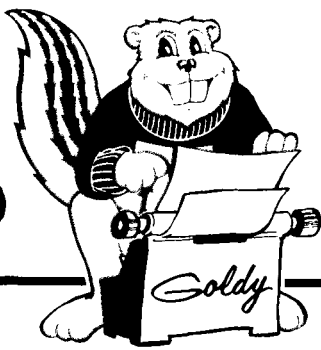

MEANS NAMED U OF M MEN'S GOLF COACH

University of Minnesota men's athletic director, Rick Bay, has announced the hiring of John Means as head men's golf coach and co-head professional at the Les Bolstad/University of Minnesota Golf Course, pending final approval by the U of M's Board of Regents.

Since 1980, Means, 34, has served as head coach at the United States Military Academy in West Point, NY. He will be the first full-time coach of the men's golf program at the University of Minnesota since Les Bolstad retired in 1976. He will also be a part of the Les Bolstad/University of Minnesota management team along with Chris Korbol, golf course manager, and Nancy Harris, head women's golf coach. Greg Harvey, who had combined his duties as golf coach along with his full-time dental practice, directed the Golden Gophers to a fourth-place finish and was named Coach-of-the-Year at the 1990 Big Ten Championships in his 12th and final season at the helm.

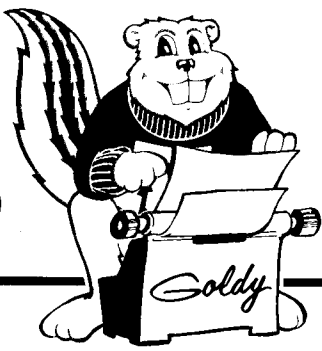
Means directed Army to nine consecutive Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference (MAAC) team titles, before taking the inaugural Patriot League Conference team crown this past spring. His squads at Army have made four appearances at the NCAA Division I Championships, including a 20th-place finish at this year's national tournament. Prior to that, he served as head men's coach at Colorado State 1979-80, after leading Norman High School to the Oklahoma state team title in 1978. In all, he has coached two All-Americans, four Academic All-Americans, 17 All-District selections, 54 All-Conference selections and has had a 100 percent graduation rate during his collegiate coaching career.

Currently the Vice-President of the Golf Coaches Association of America, Means is also a guest speaker for the PGA of America and a golf instructor for the National Golf Association, traveling throughout the country on their behalf and for the promotion of golf. In addition, he has served as the East Coast Athletic Conference tournament chairman, NCAA District II tournament chairman and is on the executive committee of the Golf Coaches Association of America.

A 1973 graduate of nearby Burnsville High School, Means is a 1979 graduate of the University of Oklahoma with a Bachelor's degree in physical education. He earned his Master's degree in physical education from Colorado State University in 1980. He and his wife, Barbara Ann, have two children, Deborah and John.

"I'm looking forward to the challenge," Means said. "I think that the University of Minnesota has so much to offer because it's a great academic institution and everyone is really behind the entire athletic department. I've been a follower of Minnesota golf ever since I lived there. In fact, I was there watching the competition when Minnesota won their last Big Ten title back in 1972. Greg left a good, young team to build upon. I realize that things don't happen overnight, but my goal is to have the University of Minnesota qualify for the NCAA Championships within three years."

"We're very pleased to be able to attract a coach of John Means' caliber," Bay said. "His program at Army was nationally recognized and he is known as an excellent teacher of the game. Now that the golf course is under the direction of the athletic department for the first time, we also feel that his background in golf course management will be an asset as well."

HASKINS TO BE INDUCTED INTO KENTUCKY ATHLETIC HALL OF FAME

University of Minnesota head basketball coach, Clem Haskins, has been selected for induction into the Kentucky Athletic Hall of Fame. Official ceremonies will take place on August 27 in Louisville.

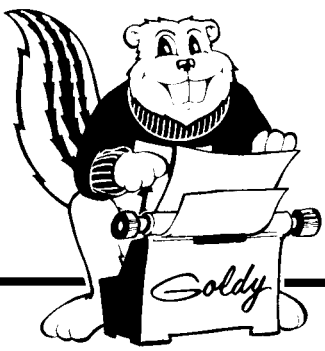
The Kentucky Hall of Fame has been in existence for more than 20 years and has a distinguished membership that includes such names as Adolph Rupp, Muhammad Ali, Pee Wee Reese and Paul Hornung to name just a few. Haskins will join Jerry Claiborne, Louie Dampier, Dan Issel, Warner Jones, Amos Martin, Jack Ryan and Louise Wilson as new inductees. A plaque in his honor will be hung with the rest of the members for permanent display in Freedom Hall at the Kentucky State Fair & Exposition Center.

A native of Campbellsville, KY, Haskins led small Taylor County to the state tournament during a stellar prep career. Known as "Clem the Gem", he is still recognized as one of the most dominant players to ever play in the Ohio Valley Conference after charting a standout collegiate career at Western Kentucky. A consensus All-American choice as a senior after being named to various All-American teams throughout his career, he is the only player in league history to ever be named Player-of-the-Year three consecutive seasons.

With 1,680 career points, Haskins ranks second on the school's three-year list and his career scoring average of 22.1 points per game is also ranked second among Hilltoppers. During his career, the Hilltoppers fashioned a sparkling 66-15 overall record, a winning percentage of .815. The 1964-65 club went to the quarterfinals of the NIT, while both the 1965-66 and 1966-67 teams claimed Ohio Valley Conference titles en route to consecutive appearances in the NCAA Tournament. During his senior year, the Hilltoppers ran off a string of 21 straight victories...still school and conference records to this day. He was the third player selected in the NBA draft and he went on to play nine outstanding seasons with three different clubs in the professional ranks.

In 1977, Haskins returned to his alma mater as an assistant coach, before being named head coach in the spring of 1980. He promptly directed the Hilltoppers to a 21-8 mark that first season, the Ohio Valley Conference regular season crown and a berth in the NCAA Tournament en route to being honored as the league's Coach-of-the-Year. In fact, NBC-TV named him their Rookie Coach-of-the-Year as well. The following season in 1981-82 his team went 19-10 and were co-champions of the Ohio Valley Conference, before making an NIT Tournament appearance. In 1982, Western Kentucky joined the rugged Sun Belt Conference, and after three seasons of building to that level of talent, his 1985-86 team went 23-8 and advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament.

Haskins has once again worked his winning magic after accepting the head coaching position at the University of Minnesota in 1986. After two rebuilding seasons, the Golden Gophers went 19-12 overall in 1988-89 and advanced to the "Sweet 16" of the NCAA Tournament, before registering a 23-9 mark this past season on their way to the NCAA Tournament's Southeast Regional Final.

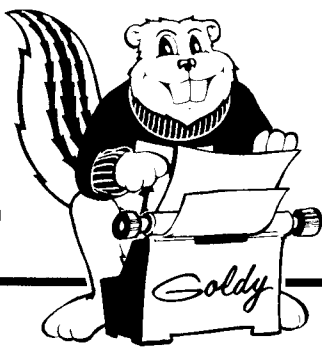

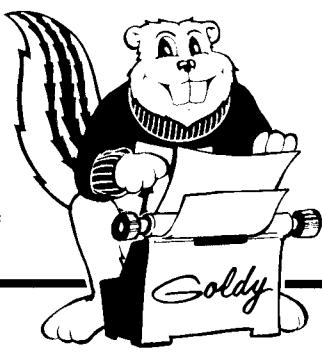

ROETHLISBERGER WINS U.S. GYMNASTICS TITLE

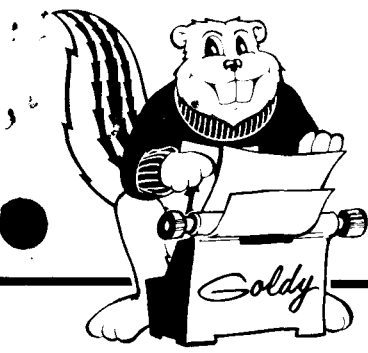

Roethlisberger also placed in five of the six individual events at the competition. He finished second in both the floor exercise (9.775) and on the pommel horse (9.60), was fourth on the high bar (9.50), tied for fifth on the parallel bars (9.525) and was sixth on the still rings (9.45). Caputo finished fifth on the still rings with a score of 9.50.

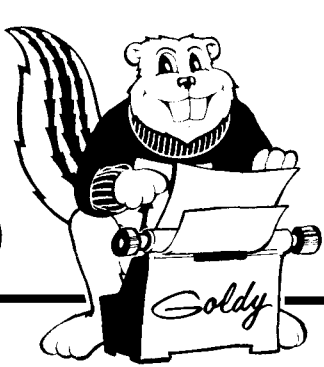
DIENHART SELECTED TO ATTEND HARVARD SUMMER PROGRAM

Dr. Mark Dienhart, Men's Associate Athletic Director for External Operations at the University of Minnesota, has been selected as one of 95 participants from around the world to attend Harvard University's summer 1990 Management Development Program (MDP). The coursework covers organizational and small group leadership; governmental relations; legal aspects of higher education; academic personnel policy and administration; budgeting and financial management; strategic planning; human resource management; and current issues in higher education.

Dr. Sharon McDade, director of the Management Development Program, said that this year's admissions committee was extremely impressed with the quality of the applicant pool from which the participants were selected. "It was a very competitive situation, and we are very proud of the higher education leaders that Harvard selects for the MDP."

"I consider myself fortunate to have been selected to participate in the MDP program," Dienhart said. "I hope to be able to apply much of what I learn to the challenges we currently face in Men's Intercollegiate Athletics."

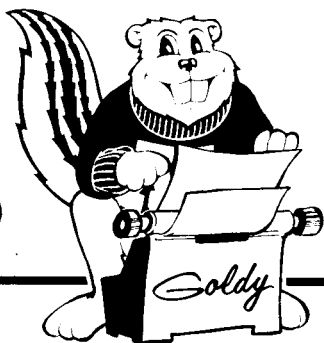
HEISE RECEIVES NCAA POST-GRADUATE SCHOLARSHIP AWARD

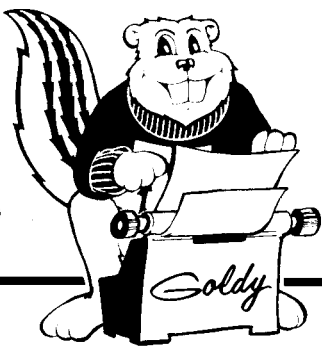
WILLIAMS SIGNS WITH UNIVERSITY OF MINNESOTA

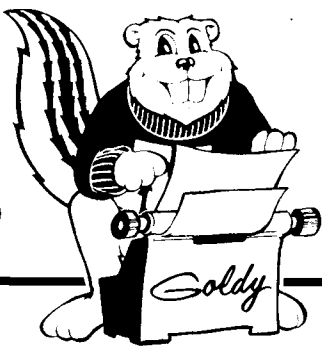
THREE GOLDEN GOPHERS TO COMPETE AT TAC USA JUNIOR TRACK & FIELD CHAMPIONSHIPS

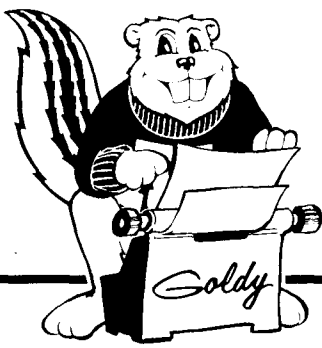

USA Basketball and 1990 USA National Team head coach, Mike Krzyzewski, announced the finalists following a two-day mini-camp held June 15-16 at Duke University in Durham, NC.

The 1990 USA Team is scheduled to return to Duke for training camp that will run July 10-17. 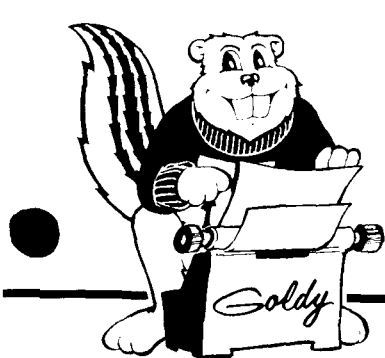

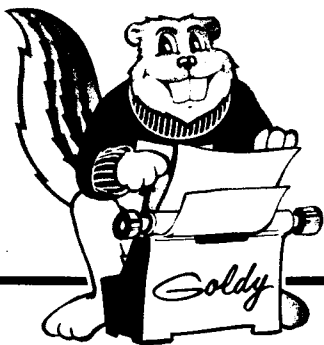
MICA department position on the danceline:

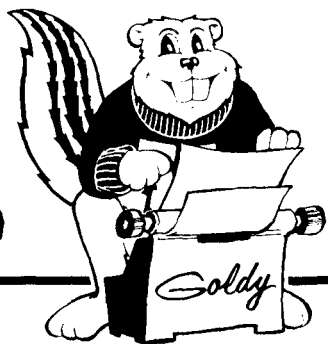

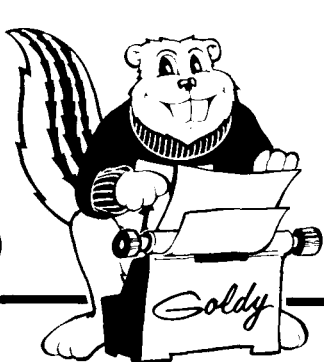

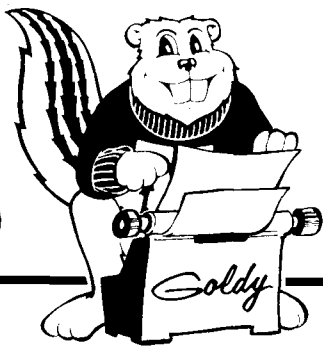
RYAN SELECTED TO POST AT GOODWILL GAMES

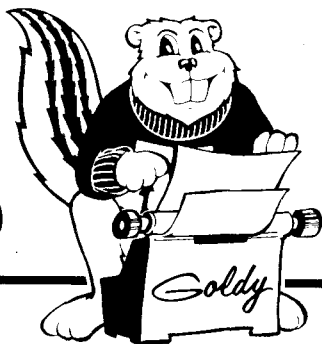

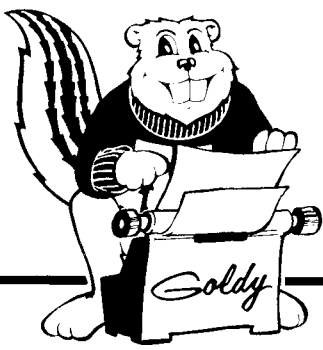

THE UNIVERSITY OF MINNESOTA NOMINATES COACH DOUG WOOG FOR NCAA SILVER ANNIVERSARY AWARD

The University of Minnesota Men's Athletic Department announced today that they will nominate former All-American center iceman, and current head hockey coach Doug Woog for the NCAA's Silver Anniversary Award. The award is given to individuals who have had a very successful collegiate career in athletics and went on to become a successful and active member of their community. Other requirements include achieving a four-year degree and completion of their competition in the 1965-66 school year.

Woog was a very successful high school athlete who was recruited by the U of M for football and hockey out of South St. Paul, MN. He chose hockey and went on to gain All-American and All-WCHA honors for Minnesota in that sport, as well as being named captain of the team and MVP his senior season.

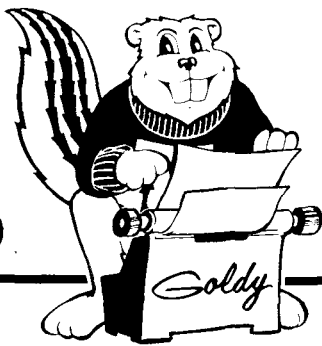
After graduation he went on to begin an extensive career as an educator and youth hockey coach. Woog taught and coached at Hopkins West Junior High before returning to his high school alma mater. His coaching resume is very extensive with stops with six U.S. Olympic Festival squads for hockey, a six-year stint with the St. Paul Vulcans and Minnesota Junior Stars of the USHL. In 1984 he served as an assistant for the U.S. Olympic team and the following year he was the head coach for the U.S. National Junior Team. He later served as an assistant for Team USA in the Canada Cup series and headed a U.S. Select 17 Team that competed in Europe.

On June 12, 1985 he was named head coach at the University of Minnesota and his coaching record since that date is unmatched by any other collegiate coach in the country during that period. He has a five-year record of 165-64-6 for a winning percentage of 71.5 percent. Under Woog the U of M has never finished lower than second place in the WCHA, and his squads captured back-to-back conference titles in 1988 and 1989. In addition, the Golden Gophers recorded four consecutive trips to the NCAA Final Four (1985-1989) and currently hold a streak of five consecutive trips to the NCAA Tournament.

As a result of the success of the team and the fan support garnered by the program, the U of M and the Twin Cities have served as host of the WCHA Tournament and the NCAA Final Four for hockey. These tournaments held at the St. Paul Civic Center have broken many attendance records and established the Twin Cities as perennial favorites to host them. In fact, both the WCHA and The NCAA Final Four tournaments for this season will be hosted by the U of M at the St. Paul Civic Center in the spring of 1991.

VETERANS JOIN FROSH IN GRID DRILLS AT "U"

Veterans are scheduled to join the freshmen in football drills at the University of Minnesota later this week, and practice for the entire squad will commence on Saturday under fifth-year Head Coach John Gutekunst.

The old-timers actually report Thursday night. Both the veterans and the freshmen will go through a media day session on Friday, and then Gutekunst will blow the whistle for the official start of pre-season varsity workouts Saturday morning.

Minnesota's newcomers arrived this past weekend, and they are being put through a few orientation sessions before holdovers arrive. Once the entire squad is together on Saturday, it will go through three days of workouts in shorts and shirts before donning pads one week from Wednesday.

In all, the Golden Gophers expect more than 120 candidates to be on hand by Saturday, with that delegation including a corps of 32 lettermen who are expected to form the nucleus for this year's contingent.

Most obvious among the missing is tailback Darrell Thompson, but Gutekunst also knows he must

replace a handful of offensive linemen as well as part of his 1989 receiving corps, his punter and linebackers.

"We will look very hard at our new freshmen," Gutekunst said. "The passing game will get some attention, and in the process we'll scrutinize our incoming receivers. We also hope to get an opportunity to evaluate our young linebackers."

A total of 38 new faces were on hand for the start of the freshmen workouts on Monday, and that group included 24 scholarship signees.

Gutekunst plans to conduct two-a-day practices through the first two weeks of this year's pre-season camp and then cut back to one session each day during the week of the 1990 football opener.

The Golden Gophers kick off the '90 campaign when entertaining the University of Utah at the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrdome on Saturday, September 8, at 7:00 p.m. All other home games currently show afternoon (1:30 p.m.) kickoffs.

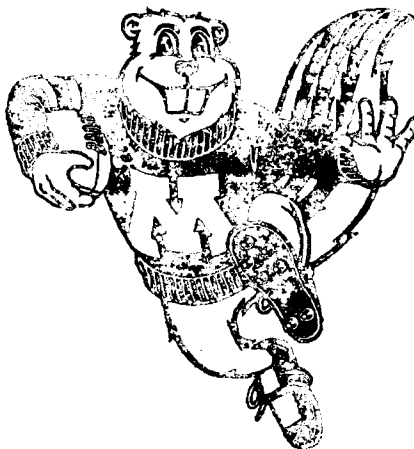

This year's Big Ten Conference weekly teleconference with coaches begin on Tuesday, September 4. Coach John Gutekunst makes his presentation at 11:30 Central Time. Call (312) 399-1700 to access the teleconference. Complete information about the teleconference is available in a release from the Big Ten Service Bureau and distributed at the U of M Media Day luncheon.

Coach Gutekunst will host a weekly media luncheon each Wednesday in the Gold Room at Williams Arena beginning at 12:00 noon. The first of these luncheons is scheduled for Wednesday, September 5. Visiting sports information directors will be on hand to distribute information about the current opponent. During the non-conference portion of our schedule, the coach of that week's opponent also will participate via a telephone interview conducted with attending media.

Minnesota's policy regarding player interviews will remain the same in 1990 as it was a year ago. All interviews should be arranged through the sports information office. Please call (612)625-4090 between 8:00 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. to schedule interviews, and by notifying the sports information office of such a request one day in advance, arrangements will be greatly facilitated.

If a player interview is requested, we will attempt to arrange a time and location (in the sports information office if possible), or if the interview is to be conducted by phone, we will arrange to have the student-athlete call you at the specified time. NO telephone numbers of student-athletes will be made available under any circumstances.

In general, player interviews may be conducted prior to or after practice sessions so long as they do not conflict with meetings, training room treatments or other team obligations. Media should understand that practices are not officially concluded until such team obligations are completed.

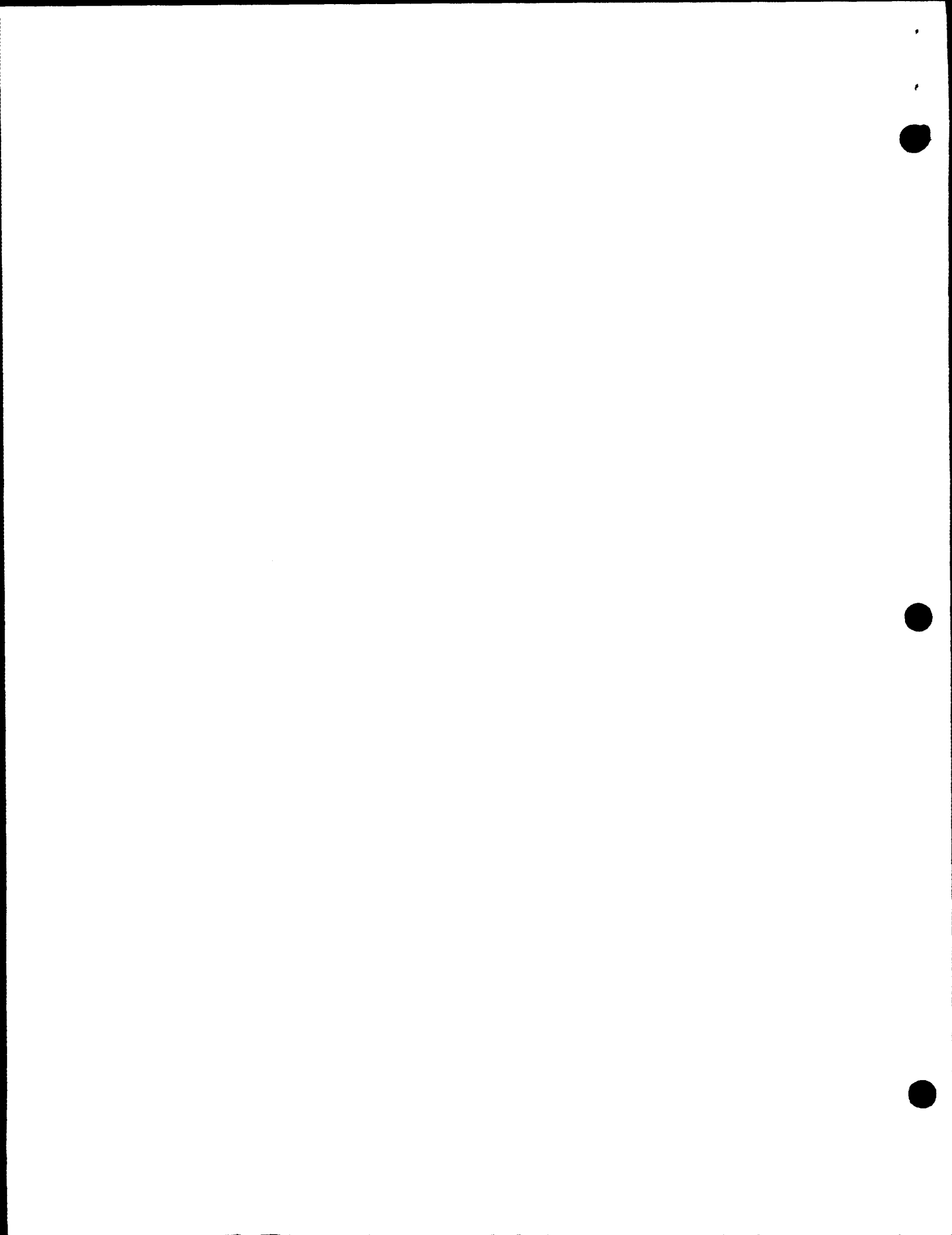
Once the season is underway, players usually will be available to the media from the time post-game interviews are conducted until after Thursday's practice. Players will NOT be available Fridays or Saturdays until after games are concluded.

Again this year, the University of Minnesota will conform to an "equal access" policy, and this means that the football locker room and the training room in the football facility will be closed to the media. Interviews must be conducted outside those areas, and members of the sports information staff will be on hand to provide assistance in locating student-athletes for pre-arranged interviews. The post-game locker room policy will be determined weekly on the basis of equal access requests.

1990 MEDIA INFORMATION

This year's Big Ten Conference weekly teleconference with coaches begin on Tuesday, September 4. Coach John Gutekunst makes his presentation at 11:30 Central Time. Call (312) 399-1700 to access the teleconference. Complete information about the teleconference is available in a release from the Big Ten Service Bureau and distributed at the U of M Media Day luncheon.

Coach Gutekunst will host a weekly media luncheon each Wednesday in the Gold Room at Williams Arena beginning at 12:00 noon. The first of these luncheons is scheduled for Wednesday, September 5. Visiting sports information directors will be on hand to distribute information about the current opponent. During the non-conference portion of our schedule, the coach of that week's opponent also will participate via a telephone interview conducted with attending media.

Minnesota's policy regarding player interviews will remain the same in 1990 as it was a year ago. All interviews should be arranged through the sports information office. Please call (612)625-4090 between 8:00 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. to schedule interviews, and by notifying the sports information office of such a request one day in advance, arrangements will be greatly facilitated.

If a player interview is requested, we will attempt to arrange a time and location (in the sports information office if possible), or if the interview is to be conducted by phone, we will arrange to have the student-athlete call you at the specified time. NO telephone numbers of student-athletes will be made available under any circumstances.

In general, player interviews may be conducted prior to or after practice sessions so long as they do not conflict with meetings, training room treatments or other team obligations. Media should understand that practices are not officially concluded until such team obligations are completed.

Once the season is underway, players usually will be available to the media from the time post-game interviews are conducted until after Thursday's practice. Players will NOT be available Fridays or Saturdays until after games are concluded.

Again this year, the University of Minnesota will conform to an "equal access" policy, and this means that the football locker room and the training room in the football facility will be closed to the media. Interviews must be conducted outside those areas, and members of the sports information staff will be on hand to provide assistance in locating student-athletes for pre-arranged interviews. The post-game locker room policy will be determined weekly on the basis of equal access requests.

BIG TEN FOOTBALL COACHES' TELECONFERENCE ENTERS ITS FIFTH YEAR

Schaumburg, Ill. -- For the fifth consecutive season, Big Ten head football coaches will be available for interviews by newspaper, radio and television representatives via a telephone conference call every Tuesday starting September 4 and continuing through November 20.

Each teleconference lasts one hour, 50 minutes. The sessions start at noon Eastern time (11 a.m. Central) and conclude by 1:50 p.m. Eastern (12:50 p.m. Central). Every Big Ten coach is available for the same 10-minute period on each of the 11 Tuesday teleconferences.

Following the football coaches on the call is a Big Ten volleyball coach. All 10 Conference volleyball coaches will be on the teleconference this season with a different coach appearing each week for 10 minutes starting at 1:40 p.m. Eastern (12:40 Central).

A taped replay of the teleconference will be provided each Tuesday from 5 to 6:30 p.m. Eastern time (4 to 5:40 p.m. Central) for media members not able to participate in the earlier session.

The Big Ten Tuesday teleconferences use services provided by the Darome Connection. Media representatives can call in at any time during the teleconferences to hear and/or ask questions of a particular coach. By the same token, a media representative can hang up at any time during the session.

A reporter may access this teleconference from any telephone in the world. In order to participate in the call (including the taped replay), a media member must dial (312) 399-1700. One hundred lines have been reserved each week. If you wish to participate at the teleconference's start, it is recommended that you call three to five minutes prior to the start of the teleconference.

More than 2,000 calls have been placed to the football coaches' teleconference in each of the past four years. Patience and cooperation from all teleconference participants helped insure smooth-running sessions.

Please note that head football coaches and sports information directors have established the following protocol: all participants will be in a "listen-only" mode for the first portion of each coach's presentation. The balance of the coach's 10-minute interview will be a question and answer period by the assembled reporters. The Darome system is a "voice-activated" system; only one person at a time can talk and be heard. Reporters must identify themselves and their media outlet in order to be recognized. Darome operators have been alerted to disconnect any reporter who does not identify him or herself. The nature and short length of each coach's interview cannot allow for "hometown" features and/or questions about third- or fourth-string players, etc.

Reporters and broadcasters are urged to use restraint in asking these types of questions and to be considerate of those who are participating. You are free to contact each Big Ten SID to review that particular coach's policy in regards to interviews other than the Big Ten teleconference. Should you have any questions about the teleconference, please contact the Communications Department or any Big Ten sports information director.

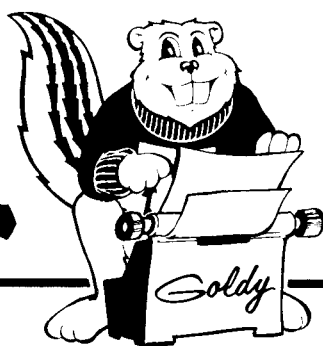

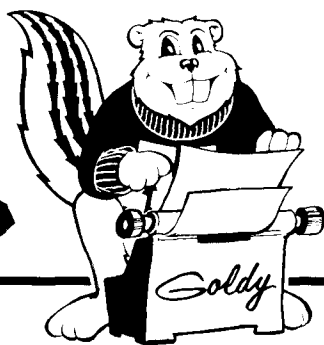

Call (312) 399-1700 to access the teleconference. Complete information about the teleconference is available in a release from the Big Ten Service Bureau and distributed at the U of M Media Day luncheon.

Coach Gutekunst will host a weekly media luncheon each Wednesday in the Gold Room at Williams Arena beginning at 12:00 noon. The first of these luncheons is scheduled for Wednesday, September 5. Visiting sports information directors will be on hand to distribute information about the current opponent. During the non-conference portion of our schedule, the coach of that week's opponent also will participate via a telephone interview conducted with attending media.

Minnesota's policy regarding player interviews will remain the same in 1990 as it was a year ago. All interviews should be arranged through the sports information office. Please call (612)625-4090 between 8:00 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. to schedule interviews, and by notifying the sports information office of such a request one day in advance, arrangements will be greatly facilitated.

If a player interview is requested, we will attempt to arrange a time and location (in the sports information office if possible), or if the interview is to be conducted by phone, we will arrange to have the student-athlete call you at the specified time. NO telephone numbers of student-athletes will be made available under any circumstances.

In general, player interviews may be conducted prior to or after practice sessions so long as they do not conflict with meetings, training room treatments or other team obligations. Media should understand that practices are not officially concluded until such team obligations are completed.

BIG TEN FOOTBALL COACHES' TELECONFERENCE ENTERS ITS FIFTH YEAR

Schaumburg, Ill. -- For the fifth consecutive season, Big Ten head football coaches will be available for interviews by newspaper, radio and television representatives via a telephone conference call every Tuesday starting September 4 and continuing through November 20.

Each teleconference lasts one hour, 50 minutes. The sessions start at noon Eastern time (11 a.m. Central) and conclude by 1:50 p.m. Eastern (12:50 p.m. Central). Every Big Ten coach is available for the same 10-minute period on each of the 11 Tuesday teleconferences.

Following the football coaches on the call is a Big Ten volleyball coach. All 10 Conference volleyball coaches will be on the teleconference this season with a different coach appearing each week for 10 minutes starting at 1:40 p.m. Eastern (12:40 Central).

A taped replay of the teleconference will be provided each Tuesday from 5 to 6:30 p.m. Eastern time (4 to 5:40 p.m. Central) for media members not able to participate in the earlier session.

The Big Ten Tuesday teleconferences use services provided by the Darome Connection. Media representatives can call in at any time during the teleconferences to hear and/or ask questions of a particular coach. By the same token, a media representative can hang up at any time during the session.

A reporter may access this teleconference from any telephone in the world. In order to participate in the call (including the taped replay), a media member must dial (312) 399-1700. One hundred lines have been reserved each week. If you wish to participate at the teleconference's start, it is recommended that you call three to five minutes prior to the start of the teleconference.

More than 2,000 calls have been placed to the football coaches' teleconference in each of the past four years. Patience and cooperation from all teleconference participants helped insure smooth-running sessions.

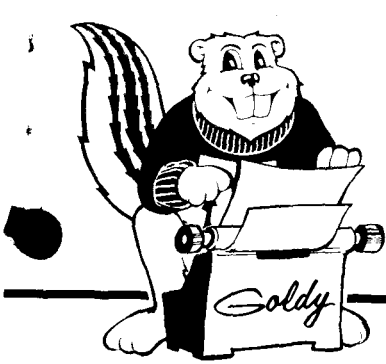
Please note that head football coaches and sports information directors have established the following protocol: all participants will be in a "listen-only" mode for the first portion of each coach's presentation. The balance of the coach's 10-minute interview will be a question and answer period by the assembled reporters. The Darome system is a "voice-activated" system; only one person at a time can talk and be heard. Reporters must identify themselves and their media outlet in order to be recognized. Darome operators have been alerted to disconnect any reporter who does not identify him or herself. The nature and short length of each coach's interview cannot allow for "hometown" features and/or questions about third- or fourth-string players, etc.

Reporters and broadcasters are urged to use restraint in asking these types of questions and to be considerate of those who are participating. You are free to contact each Big Ten SID to review that particular coach's policy in regards to interviews other than the Big Ten teleconference. GOLDEN GOPHER GRIDDERS TO DON PADS WEDNESDAY

After three days of demanding workouts in shirts and shorts, the University of Minnesota football team will don pads for the first time Wednesday as preparations for the September 8 opener against Utah continue.

Fifth-year Head Coach John Gutekunst was not pleased with the overall physical condition of his squad when it reported last weekend, and as a result conditioning and fundamentals were stressed in those first three days of pre-season drills.

Gutekunst also has taken a good look at the newcomers, and in some cases judged that there are a handful that will play immediately.....and that has enabled him to make some position changes and move a few veterans to new spots.

All of which could mean that Minnesota not only has a good recruiting class in camp but that it will result in the Golden Gophers being able to develop more depth than may have been the case in recent football campaigns.

The early practices without pads found Gutekunst scrutinizing the passing game and the special teams areas extensively, and in the passing game both the quarterbacks and the receivers drew his close inspection.

"I was pleased with the way some of our freshmen caught the ball," he said after Sunday's three-hour workout, "but I did not think our quarterbacks (veterans Scott Schaffner and Marquel Fleetwood) threw the ball as well Sunday as they did on Saturday.

Among the newcomers who seemed most impressive in the receiver category were John Lewis, Omar

Douglas and Lewis Garrison. "I also thought Chuck Rios did a good job of catching the ball coming out of the backfield."

Minnesota's special-team's work included most phases of the kicking and receiving game although inclement weather kept the Golden Gophers indoors and restricted some of those activities. They did go through some field goal work, and while veteran Brent Berglund seemed flawless, holdover Mark Keller and newcomer Omar Salas also got a chance to show their stuff.

One phase of things that has drawn Gutekunst's raves has been the "attitude" new defensive coordinator Tom Gadd already has instilled in his delegation. "Our defensive people are developing great work habits and tremendous enthusiasm," Gutekunst pointed out after Sunday's drills.

The Golden Gophers, after that lone session on Sunday, were back to three-a-days on Monday and then were scheduled for two workouts daily (in pads) for the remainder of the week before going through their first full-scale scrimmage on Saturday.

That kind of pace should point out that Gutekunst and his 1990 contingent mean business. "We're not satisfied with six wins," Gutekunst told a media gathering last Friday. "We have higher goals. We've been (while turning in 6-5 seasons in three of his four years as grid boss at Minnesota) playing exciting and record-breaking football."

Gutekunst also pointed out that Minnesota has been improving its goal of graduating its student-athletes. "Our emphasis remains on academics as well

as football," he stressed. "I just wish we could get more of the people of Minnesota to see us play BEFORE we start to win, because those people can help us win."

GOLDEN GOPHERS CONTINUE TWO-A-DAY DRILLS THIS WEEK

Minnesota's Golden Gophers will continue running through two drills daily for the remainder of this week, and they also are expected to conduct two more scrimmages before taking some time off over the Labor Day weekend.

Head Coach John Gutekunst will then ease up the pace with only one workout a day slated next week and with fewer contact sessions included as he gets his squad ready for the 1990 season opener against Utah at the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome on Saturday, September 8, at 7:00 p.m.

At this stage of things, the physical condition of his squad becomes a concern, and Minnesota currently has a number of gridders who are nursing bumps and bruises after the strenuous workouts that have been conducted the last two weeks.

While most of the "walking wounded" are not classified as serious and should return to drills as the week progresses, one major injury has resulted. Arthur Layton, a third-year sophomore defensive end, has

suffered a separated shoulder and has been ruled out of further competition.

By conducting two scrimmages this week, Gutekunst will be following the same pattern as was established last week, and it should give the Golden Gopher coaches even more opportunities to evaluate the squad under simulated game conditions.

In last Wednesday's initial skirmish, Minnesota concentrated on the running game, and people like Marcus Evans and Albert Settembrino were in the spotlight. Then on Saturday the Golden Gopher passing game drew Gutekunst's attention, and Scott Schaffner and Marquel Fleetwood.....as well as some of the freshmen.....were on display.

"Schaffner had a good day Saturday," Gutekunst said, "and Scott Eckers (one of those freshmen) ran a great drive for a score at the end of the scrimmage. Chuck Rios also ran the ball well." He led Golden Gopher rushers with 42 yards in 10 carries, and he had one touchdown.

While four interceptions, three fumbles and eight penalties for 65 yards didn't excite Gutekunst, most of the workout did, and at its end he evaluated the hard-hitting session by saying, "Generally I was very pleased."

But that was last week. Now more improvement is needed, and that is something Gutekunst has stressed to his squad daily. After viewing films of last Saturday's scrimmage, he can be expected to emphasize the same "We still have a lot of work to do" theme in drills this week.

It also might be safe to assume that some position changes might be conducted as Gutekunst's staff attempts to finalize its depth chart in preparation for the 1990 season and the rapidly-approaching opener against the Utes.

Senior co-captains Keith Eidman and Chris Harder will lead a talented Golden Gopher cross country lineup that returns virtually intact after surprising many of the experts with a third-place finish in the final team standings at the 1989 Big Ten Championships. Although Head Coach Roy Griak is aware that his squad won't sneak up on anyone this time around, his harriers have their sights focused on even bigger and better things in 1990.

Set back by numerous nuisance-type injuries throughout his career, Eidman was finally healthy last season and he was the leader of the Golden Gopher brigade all season long. He finished 10th individually at the Big Ten Championships with a time of 24:55 over the 8000 meter course and then 29th overall in a stellar 198 competitor field at the Region 4 Championships with a clocking of 32:12 for the 10,000 meter course.

Harder's return to the fold after redshirting the 1989 season will provide a major boost to the Golden Gopher lineup. He was the squad's number one or two competitor in 1987, finishing 23rd in a time of 25:11 over the 8000 meter course at the Big Ten Championships, before going on to place 37th in 32:35 for 10,000 meters at the Region 4 Championships. He has also been a consistent performer on the track during his career in Gold Country.

It was no secret that Griak brought in an exceptional freshmen class a year ago and that group didn't waste anytime making some noise immediately on the collegiate level. Letterwinners Scott DeLong, Mark Narveson, Doug Milkowski and Chris Berg turned in fine performances at both the Big Ten and Region 4 Championships and should all improve with a year of seasoning under their belts.

Junior Sean Fitzgerald, a 3:50 performer in the 1500 meters on the track, will also look to make an impact this fall for the Golden Gophers. Fellow junior Chris Schmid, along with sophomores Craig Collier, Dan Fumo, Curt Kotsonas and Dan LeCloux will also vie for spots in the lineup this season. Headlining the list of newcomers will be Jason Rathe. He was the runner-up at last fall's Minnesota State Class AA Championships for Osseo High School.

The Golden Gophers will open their season on September 15 with a dual meet at Iowa. They will once again host the prestigious Minnesota Invitational at the Les Bolstad/University of Minnesota Golf Course on October 6. A year ago, the meet featured the top-ranked and eventual national champion men's team from Iowa State and women's team from Villanova. They will also host the Big Ten Championships on October 27, before journeying to the Region 4 Championships at Lafayette, IN on November 10. The NCAA Championships will be held at Knoxville, TN on November 19.

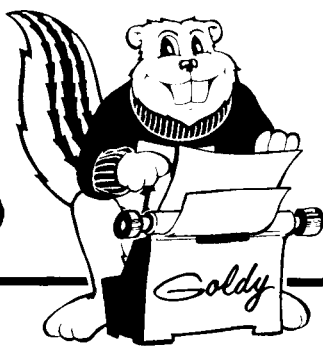

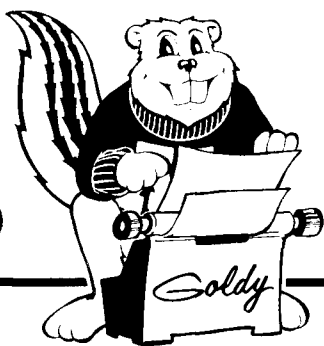

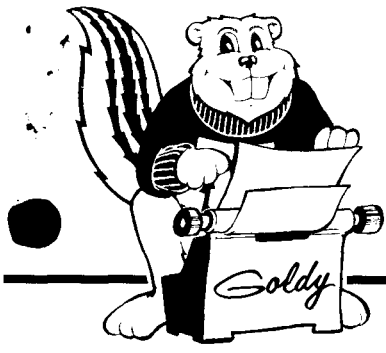

GOLDEN GOPHERS TO OPEN '90 GRID SEASON SATURDAY

Minnesota's Golden Gophers, over .500 finishers three of the last four years under Head Coach John Gutekunst, kick off the 1990 campaign Saturday at 7:00 p.m. when they play host to the University of Utah in the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome.

It will mark the second time in history that these two schools have met in football, and the U of M hopes to make it two in a row after nudging the Utes 13-12 at Memorial Stadium during the 1967 season.

Invading Utah has one up on the Golden Gophers. It downed cross-state rival Utah State 19-0 in its season opener last weekend, and the advantage of having played a game seems to outweigh the opportunity to have scouted an opponent.

Utah was 4-8 a year ago, and it finished 2-6 in the Western Athletic Conference, but new Head Coach Ron McBride has 45 lettermen on his current roster, and the Utes look for great improvement in 1990.

All of which means Minnesota will face a big challenge in the lid-lifter Saturday night. "Utah looks good," Coach Gutekunst said. "They were

very impressive in their opening game last weekend."

Several factors, in coach Gutekunst's mind, made that 19-point Utah victory extra special. "To play a traditional rival on the road this early in the season and have no turnovers AND make the big plays defensively to maintain a shutout is a great achievement," he said.

Gutekunst also figures McBride and the Utes have a leg up on the Golden Gophers. "It's nice to have a game under your belt like Utah does," he pointed out, "but we've been in this position before."

So what is in store for Minnesota in its' final week of preparation? Gutekunst ran his charges through a brisk two-hour workout Saturday morning and then gave the Golden Gophers some time off before they came back Sunday evening to view films. Monday saw the beginning of a regular one-a-day, game-week routine.

Last spring two of the most-frequently asked questions around camp were: 1) Who will replace Darrell Thompson at tailback? and 2) who will take over for four-year punter Brent Herbel?

As the opener approaches, it appears that Marcus Evans, a 5-9, 188-pound senior from Orlando, FL, will get the nod at running back. In three seasons, Evans has registered 142 carries for 611 yards, and he's scored two touchdowns. Dean Kaufman, a 6-3, 225-pound sophomore from Sauk Centre, MN, apparently has won the punting assignment. It will be his first appearance.

"We are anxious to see our new players in their new roles as starters or on special teams with their new responsibilities," Gutekunst analyzed, "but it is somewhat frightening when you are still learning some of their names." Youth, and the Golden Gophers have more than their share, can bring on that kind of reaction.

BIG TEN FOOTBALL COACHES' TELECONFERENCE ENTERS ITS FIFTH YEAR

Schaumburg, Ill. — For the fifth consecutive season, Big Ten head football coaches will be available for interviews by newspaper, radio and television representatives via a telephone conference call every Tuesday starting September 4 and continuing through November 20.

Each teleconference lasts one hour, 50 minutes. The sessions start at noon Eastern time (11 a.m. Central) and conclude by 1:50 p.m. Eastern (12:50 p.m. Central). Every Big Ten coach is available for the same 10-minute period on each of the 11 Tuesday teleconferences.

Following the football coaches on the call is a Big Ten volleyball coach. All 10 Conference volleyball coaches will be on the teleconference this season with a different coach appearing each week for 10 minutes starting at 1:40 p.m. Eastern (12:40 Central).

A taped replay of the teleconference will be provided each Tuesday from 5 to 6:30 p.m. Eastern time (4 to 5:40 p.m. Central) for media members not able to participate in the earlier session.

The Big Ten Tuesday teleconferences use services provided by the Darome Connection. Media representatives can call in at any time during the teleconferences to hear and/or ask questions of a particular coach. By the same token, a media representative can hang up at any time during the session.

A reporter may access this teleconference from any telephone in the world. In order to participate in the call (including the taped replay), a media member must dial (312) 399-1700. One hundred lines have been reserved each week. If you wish to participate at the teleconference's start, it is recommended that you call three to five minutes prior to the start of the teleconference.

Reporters and broadcasters are urged to use restraint in asking these types of questions and to be considerate of those who are participating. 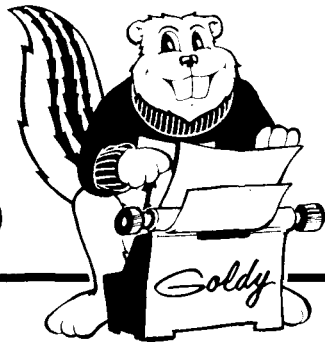
Harder's return to the fold after redshirting the 1989 season will provide a major boost to the Golden Gopher lineup. He was the squad's number one or two competitor in 1987, finishing 23rd in a time of 25:11 over the 8000 meter course at the Big Ten Championships, before going on to place 37th in 32:35 for 10,000 meters at the Region 4 Championships. He has also been a consistent performer on the track during his career in Gold Country.

"In Keith and Chris we have two runners who will be battling it out at the front of just about every race," Griak said. "They'll give us a nice one-two punch."

It was no secret that Griak brought in an exceptional freshmen class a year ago and that group didn't waste any time making some noise immediately on the collegiate level. Letterwinners Scott DeLong, Mark Narveson, Doug Milkowski and Chris Berg turned in fine performances at both the Big Ten and Region 4 Championships and should all improve with a year of seasoning under their belts.

Junior Sean Fitzgerald, a 3:50 performer in the 1500 meters on the track, will also look to make an impact this fall for the Golden Gophers. Fellow junior Chris Schmid, along with sophomores Craig Collier, Dan Fumo and Curt Kotsonas will also vie for spots in the lineup this season. Jason Rathe, runner-up at last fall's Minnesota State Class AA Championships for Osseo High School, was expected to headline the list of newcomers, but he is still feeling the effects of a foot injury that put a damper on his summer training.

The Golden Gophers will open their season on September 15 with a dual meet at Iowa. They will once again host the prestigious Minnesota Invitational at the Les Bolstad/University of Minnesota Golf Course on October 6. A year ago, the meet featured the top-ranked and eventual national champion men's team from Iowa State and women's team from Villanova. They will also host the Big Ten Championships on October 27, before journeying to the Region 4 Championships at Lafayette, IN on November 10. The NCAA Championships will be held at Knoxville, TN on November 19.

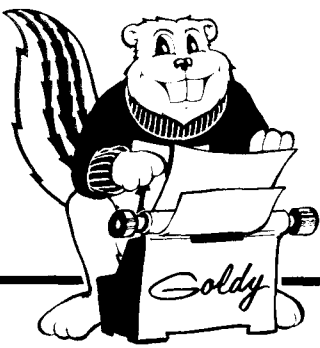

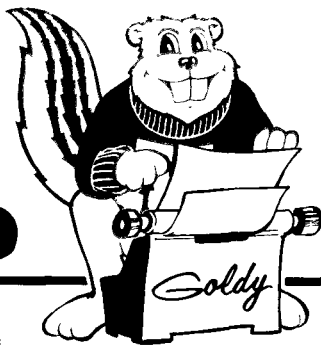

Gutekunst felt that the offensive package which Utah runs is comparable to the style that San Jose State ran last season, when Ron McBride was the offensive coordinator there.

"We had a better workout today than we did yesterday," said head coach John Gutekunst. "I thought we had better concentration in practice today."

Saturday's contest against the Utes is slated to begin at 7:05 p.m.

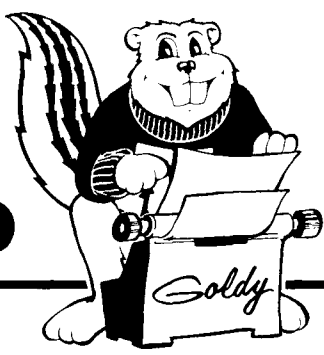

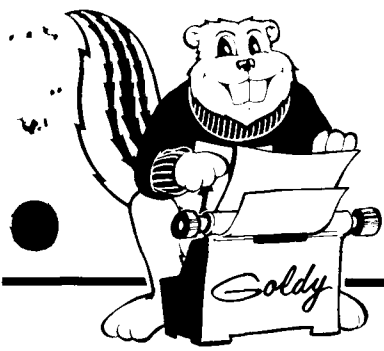

GOLDEN GOPHERS HOPE TO REBOUND AGAINST ISU

Minnesota's Golden Gophers, stunned in their season opener 35-29 by Utah last weekend, hope to rebound Saturday when they play host to Iowa State University of the Big Eight Conference at 1:30 p.m. in the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome.

It will be the 24th football meeting in history between these two teams, and Minnesota will take a comfortable 20-2-1 lead in the series into Saturday's confrontation. The Golden Gophers lead 18-1-1 in games played in Minneapolis, but this will be the first meeting in the Metrodome.

A year ago Minnesota prevailed 30-20 down in Ames as Darrell Thompson rushed for 106 yards and Scott Schaffner passed for 220 more as well as for a pair of touchdowns.

Despite the edge in the series and last year's victory, Gutekunst knows it will be a tough assignment on Saturday against 1-0 Iowa State which whipped Northern Iowa 35-6 in its' season opener last weekend.

"We'll find out what we are

made of right now," Coach Gutekunst challenged his squad after the heartbreaking setback to Utah, "but we have to approach things with the idea that we have 10 games remaining. It was a very tough loss, but our people never quit. We fought back and got ourselves in a position to win. We just did not make the play when we had to."

Will the Golden Gophers be able to make those plays this week, to rebound against Coach Jim Walden's invading Cyclones? Gutekunst knows it will be a challenge and says, "Iowa State is bigger and stronger than Utah, and in Blaise Bryant, they've got an outstanding running game. They are just a quality football team."

Despite that loss to the Utes, Minnesota did have some bright spots.....like Pat Tingelhoff's two touchdown receptions, and Marquel Fleetwood's touchdown run and three touchdown passes, and the play of such young defenders as Pat Wright, William Collins and Drinon Mays.

When Gutekunst combines those bright spots with some of

the less appealing things that happened last weekend, it could result in a shakeup in Minnesota's lineup for Saturday's assignment against Iowa State.

Fleetwood, for example, probably will get the starting call at quarterback. Wright, who had four tackles, two interceptions and two passes broken up, will open at linebacker. And Mays, who registered eight tackles and a fumble recovery, is expected to get the call at cornerback.

"Our offense didn't give our defense a chance in the early going against Utah," Gutekunst analyzed. "Then when we started to have some success offensively, we turned the ball over. We just did not execute when we had to."

Gutekunst hopes that Minnesota got all of its first-game mistakes out of the way last weekend and will be ready to play a full game against Iowa State. "We have to remember that a football game is 60 minutes long," Gutekunst said.

The University of Minnesota Men's Intercollegiate Athletic Department this week announced plans for the formation of a first-ever Golden Gopher Sports Hall of Fame, honoring exceptional athletes from the U of M.

Honoring athletes in 11 varsity sports from a period of time that will span over 80 years, the Hall of Fame will be created with the cooperation of Minnesota's Graduate "M" Club.

Initial Hall of Fame inductees will be announced in January of 1992 as part of the University of Minnesota's Williams Arena renovation ceremonies. A Hall of Fame selection Committee has been established that will include U of M President Nils Hasselmo, Men's Athletic Director Rick Bay, a University faculty member, the "M" Club president and a rotating member of the Minnesota media, a fan and two additional "M" Club members.

The first Hall of Fame inductee group will number 20, with 10 of those from a "pioneer group" (graduating class prior to 1940) and 10 from a "contemporary group" (graduating classes from 1940 through 1985). After the initial induction of 20 athletes, smaller class inductions, including at least one from the "pioneer" category, will be made each year.

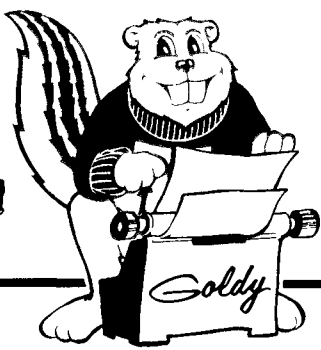
A special fan voting program has been planned, allowing Golden Gopher fans and the general public to vote through ballots which will be available at the U of M Athletic Ticket Office, through the local newspapers and at 1991 University of Minnesota home football games.

Each year an induction ceremony will be held at a dinner the night preceding one of Minnesota's home football games, and those new inductees will be introduced in a special half-time ceremony at the game the next day.

Hall of Fame Committee Chairman and Golden Gopher basketball "M" man Pat Fitzsimmons said, "We did extensive research and contacted over 25 major universities from around the country to see how their hall of fames were organized. We found the criteria for selection to some of the more successful halls to be quite consistent, so we've used them as role models. With such a strong contingent of great Golden Gopher athletes over the years, it is going to be a lot of fun and create a lot of excitement for U of M fans, alumni and the State of Minnesota while recognizing our outstanding men and former athletes."

"We are long overdue in publicly recognizing our tradition on an annual basis," Athletic Director Bay said. "A Golden Gopher Hall of Fame is the perfect vehicle to accomplish this objective. The "M" Club is off to a great start in planning this endeavor, and we are looking forward to honoring former great Minnesota student-athletes ever year."

The University of Minnesota Graduate "M" Club is a national organization of over 4,000 former Golden Gopher student-athletes serving the Men's Intercollegiate Athletic Department at the U of M with programs in career placement and counseling, fund raising, special programs and coach support programs. 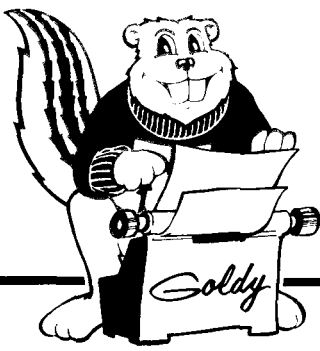
