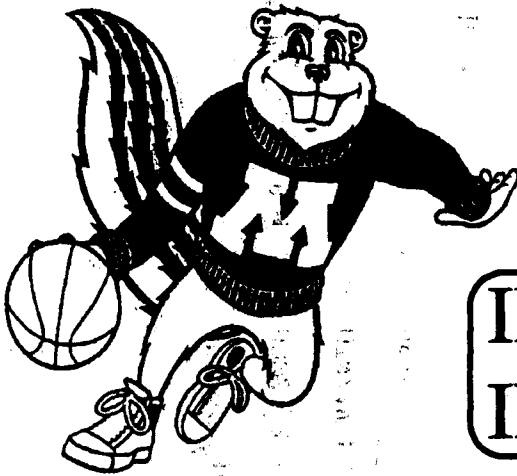

GOPHERS TO HOST ILLINOIS IN BIG TEN OPENER

The Golden Gopher Basketball team will open the 1990 Big Ten season Saturday by hosting the Fighting Illini at Williams Arena. Both teams will enter the matchup with very impressive non-conference records. Minnesota's record currently stands at 8-1 and will finish the non-conference portion of their schedule by facing Rider College Wednesday night at Williams Arena. Illinois finished their non-conference schedule 10-0 and will open their Big Ten season against Wisconsin Thursday before traveling to Minnesota. Illi will enter this week ranked fourth in the nation.



ILLINI HERE SATURDAY IN '90 BIG TEN OPENER

With the preliminaries.... including Wednesday night's home encounter with Rider College....neatly tucked away, the University of Minnesota will tip off the 1990 Big Ten Conference Season Saturday by playing host to Illinois in a 7:05 p.m. basketball game.

Coach Clem Haskins' Golden Gophers came into this week's action with a non-conference record of 8-1 after stopping Youngstown State 97-57 last Saturday while the Fighting Illini upped their record to 10-0 by beating Grambling 97-73 and Memphis State 83-71 over the weekend.

Illinois was ranked fourth in the nation after those triumphs, and it was scheduled to get a head-start on Minnesota in this year's quest for the Big Ten crown by opening conference play at home against Wisconsin Thursday.

Minnesota and Illinois have met in basketball 135 times over the years, and the Fighting Illini hold an edge of 84-51 in the series. Illinois leads in games played at Champaign 52-15, but it trails 32-36 in Minneapolis.

A year ago Minnesota fell 63-58 late in the season at Champaign, but Coach Haskins saw his club upset the then number-one

ranked Fighting Illini 69-62 at home in friendly Williams Arena early in the year.

Thus far this season the Golden Gophers are 5-0 at home and 3-1 on the road. Their only loss came in the season opener at Cincinnati by a 66-64 margin.....all of which means Minnesota has won eight straight and has an unblemished record at home.

Can it keep those things intact against high-powered Illinois? "We know we are taking a step up Saturday as far as the level of competition is concerned," Coach Haskins admits, and he knows how talented and tough the invading contingent will be.

He's pleased with the progress his club has made through the non-conference portion of the schedule, however. Beginning with Minnesota's appearance in the Sweet Sixteen last March, Haskins remembers that it was a good 1989. "This has been a great year," he said. "We closed out last spring on a strong note, and we would be 9-0 this week if it were not for eight-tenths of a second and a three-point basket at Cincinnati. A lot of good has happened to us, but we know that we still have a lot of work to do in 1990."

And the work begins Sat-

urday against Illinois.

Haskins again is expected to open with Willis Burton and Walter Bond at the forwards, Richard Coffey at center and Melvin Newbern and Kevin Lynch at the guards. Jim Shikenjanski again can be expected to be the first Golden Gopher off the bench.

Haskins in preparation for the Illini contest, continues to stress the fact that Minnesota needs to work hard to get the job done. "We played well in spurts last Saturday against Youngstown," he analyzed, "but for us to achieve what we want, we have to work hard all the time....in practice and every minute of every game."

These recent non-conference games have provided Haskins an opportunity to give his bench some playing time, and he sees progress being made. "Our second unit deserves a lot of credit," he said after the Youngstown game. "Those people played very well," and he was referring to Bob Martin, Connell Lewis, Rob Metcalf, Mario Green, Nate Tubbs and Junior Graves, a delegation that put 12 names in the box score and all of them scored.

HART LEADS GOLDEN GOPHER SWIMMERS TO SIOUX INVITATIONAL TITLE; HOST ST. OLAF AND NORTHWESTERN THIS WEEKEND (4-2/2-1 Big Ten)

With sophomore Scott Hart (Rochester, MN) showing the way, the Golden Gophers swim team raced to the team title at the six-team Sioux Invitational held last Friday and Saturday in Grand Forks, ND. Head coach Dennis Dale's squad won 14 of the 17 swimming events in the competition.

Final Team Standings: Minnesota 921.5, North Dakota 740.5, Manitoba 645, St. Cloud St. 435, South Dakota 387, North Dakota State 105.

Lots of Hart: Scott Hart turned in a workmanlike performance for the Golden Gophers, winning four individual events in the competition. A transfer from Michigan where he was an NCAA qualifier for the Wolverines a year ago, he captured the 500 freestyle (4:33.07) and the 400 IM (4:01.23, new meet and pool record) on Friday, and then the 1650 freestyle (15:48.56) and the 200 IM (1:54.75) on Saturday.

That Winning Feeling: Sophomore Sean Quackenbush (Rochester, MN) in the 200 butterfly (1:52.77), senior Bill Asmus (Lakeville, MN) in the 100 backstroke (54.38), freshman Paul Nelson (Lincoln, NE) in the 100 breaststroke (57.17), sophomore Jay Fischer (Hutchinson, MN) in the 100 freestyle (46.28), freshman Chris Carlisle (Arlington, TX) in the 200 backstroke (1:55.81, meet record), sophomore Matt Moseman (Madison, WI) in the 100 butterfly (51.69) and sophomore Bret Engnell (Minneapolis, MN) in the 200 breaststroke (2:11.46) also won individual events in the meet for the Golden Gophers. In addition, the Golden Gophers touched first in the 400 (3:06.45) and 800 (6:54.67) freestyle relays, as well as in the 200 medley relay (1:35.02).

Back Home: The Golden Gophers will entertain St. Olaf in non-conference action at 6:00 p.m. on Friday and then Northwestern in a Big Ten meet at 12 Noon on Saturday in the Cooke Hall Pool. Both meets are co-ed. St. Olaf, a perennial Division III national power, finished second at the Gold Country Invitational held at the Cooke Hall Pool on January 5-6. The Golden Gophers tallied 687 points to come out on top of the six-team field, while the Oles finished in the runner-up slot with 470 points. The Golden Gophers handily defeated Northwestern in Evanston, IL last year, 94-17, before finishing third in the final team standings with 466.5 points at the 1989 Big Ten Championships. The Wildcats were 10th at the league meet last season with 54 points.

National Rankings: The Golden Gophers have been ranked 14th in the most recent College Swimming Coaches Association of America national poll.

NETTERS TOP NORTHERN ILLINOIS; BIG TEN INDOOR CHAMPIONSHIPS THIS WEEKEND (3-1/0-0 Big Ten)

The 25th-ranked Golden Gopher tennis team rolled to a 7-2 victory over Northern Illinois in their home opener last Friday at the 98th Street Racquet Club in Bloomington.

Rolling Along: Sophomore **Philippe LeBlanc** (St. Bruno, Quebec, Canada) at No. 1, junior **Kevin Werwie** (Sheboygan, WI) at No. 2, senior **Jason Hall** (Prior Lake, MN) at No. 4, junior **Anthony Cruz** (Medinah, IL) at No. 5 and freshman **Grant Julian** (Voorhees, NJ) at No. 6, were winners on the evening in singles action for the Golden Gophers. Cruz joined senior **Rafer Leach** (Lexington, KY) for a victory at the top doubles spot, while Julian joined fellow freshman, **Dominic Roderiguez** (Albuquerque, NM), for the win at No. 3 doubles.

Big Ten Indoor Championships: In an effort to recognize a Big Ten individual champion, the conference will hold a single-elimination singles tournament at Michigan State University in East Lansing this Friday thru Sunday. Each team can enter up to seven individuals in the tournament. Seedings will take place at the site on Friday. Golden Gopher head coach **David Geatz** will enter **Rafer Leach**, **Jason Hall**, **Kevin Werwie**, **Philippe LeBlanc**, freshman **Rick Naumoff** (Columbus, OH), sophomore **Brian Uihlein** (Lake Forest, IL) and either **Grant Julian** or **Anthony Cruz** in the tournament. The present Big Ten dual meet championship format was started in 1985, while individual championships were discontinued following the 1985 season.

Leach, Uihlein & Werwie To Play in Rolex: **Geatz** announced that **Rafer Leach** will play singles and that **Kevin Werwie** and **Brian Uihlein** will compete in the doubles portion of the Rolex National Intercollegiate Tennis Championships to be held at the 98th Street (Feb. 8-9) and Crosstown Racquet Clubs (Feb. 10-11). Last year, **Duke** and **Brian Uihlein** advanced all the way through the 32-team draw to the doubles semifinals of the tournament before falling to the nation's top-ranked twosome. **Leach** lost in the first-round of the 64-player singles draw, then won his first round consolation match, before falling in the next.

Pre-Season National Rankings: The Golden Gophers, who finished 23rd in the final national rankings last season, open up the 1990 season in a four-way logjam in the 25th spot.

ICERS RETURN TO WCHA AT DU F-S

Minneapolis, MN.--So much for holiday non-conference hockey. Friday and Saturday it's back to the WCHA when the U. of Minnesota hockey Gophers head for Denver and a league pair in the Mile High City.

Both games have an 8:05 CST start time with WAYL-980 AM and KITN-TV, Ch. 29, carrying Friday's contest live. WAYL will broadcast Saturday's game on a delayed basis.

Although Minnesota saw its longest win streak (7) in the nation this season broken at the Dexter Classic by the host school, Maine, last weekend, the Gophers head into Denver still tied for first place in the WCHA with an 8-4-2 league mark good for 18 points.

Minnesota is tied with Minnesota-Duluth and Wisconsin, both 9-5-0, for the top spot. The Gophers, after winning eight of their last nine games, are 12-7-2 for all games. Included in the recent win streak was a pair of very satisfying victories against defending NCAA champion Harvard. Last March the Crimson defeated Minnesota 4-3 in overtime in the national title game played at the Saint Paul Civic Center.

The Gophers hosted Harvard Dec. 22-23 at Mariucci Arena and prevailed 3-1 and 6-3. The second game was very important as it marked the first ever victory for senior walk-on goalie **Scott Nelson (Grand Rapids)**. Nelson, making his first start and only second appearance of the season, was steady in stopping 23 shots.

Freshman wing **Trent Klatt (Osseo)** gave Nelson all the room he needed by scoring two goals, including the game winner, and an assist. Klatt also got the game winning goal in Friday's 3-1 victory as freshman goalie **Tom Newman (Blaine)** recorded his fifth win of the season.

Then last weekend at Orono, ME, the Gophers simply couldn't dent the goaltending of Scott King in the first outing as the Black Bears triumphed 5-3. The Gophers lead 1-0 after the first period as **Grant Bischoff (Grand Rapids)** scored his 8th goal of the season. Maine, however, bounced back with three straight power play goals in the middle stanza, and increased its lead to 4-1 in the final period before **Scott Bloom (Burnsville)** and Bischoff narrowed the deficit to one goal. Maine got its final score into an empty net after Newman was pulled in the last minute.

Minnesota won the consolation game by turning back St. Lawrence 5-3 Saturday. Klatt, **Travis Richards (Crystal)**, **Jason Miller (Bloomington)**, **Ken Gernander (Coleraine)** and **Jon Anderson (White Bear Lake)** scored for Minnesota. Miller's goal was shorthanded while Anderson scored into an empty net.

Gernander's goal was his 18th of the season giving him a three-goal margin over Bloom's 15 markers for team leadership. However, senior co-captain **Peter Hankinson (Edina)** continues to lead the Gophers in scoring with 33 points (11-22) in 21 games. Hankinson was shut out by St. Lawrence ending a streak of 14 games in which he had scoring at least one point. In fact, he has only been shut out in two of the 21 UM games this season.

Minnesota hopes to welcome back three of its players who missed both the Harvard series and the tournament games in Orono. Sophomore goalie **Jeff Stolp (Nashwauk)**, sophomore wing **Cory Laylin (St. Cloud)** and freshman defenseman **Doug Zmolek (Rochester)** are with the U.S. National Junior Team at the World Games in Finland. Another key UM player, senior co-captain and defenseman **Lance Pitlick (New Hope)**, has been out injured since Dec. 1. It has yet to be decided when he can return to action.

After the Denver series, Minnesota returns home to face Colorado College at Mariucci Arena Jan. 12-13. Following the latter series, Minnesota will only skate on Mariucci ice in two more WCHA series the rest of regular season play. UM hosts North Dakota Jan. 26-27, and Wisconsin Feb. 16-17.

ROETHLISBERGER HONORED AS THE USA TODAY MINNESOTA COACH-OF-THE-YEAR

Head Golden Gopher gymnastics coach, Fred Roethlisberger, has been honored as the 1989 *USA Today* Minnesota Coach-of-the-Year.

USA Today is honoring athletic achievers of the year in each state in five categories - high school, college, amateur/at-large, coach and team. Joining Roethlisberger from Minnesota as honorees are Chris Weinke, St Paul Cretin-Derham Hall High School (High School), Anna Prineas, Carleton College (College), Tasha Nelson, Buffalo High School (Amateur/At-Large) and the Mankato State University men's cross country team (Team).

Roethlisberger, who has recorded an overall record of 130-41 (.760 winning percentage) in 18 seasons at the helm, has been the driving force behind the success of the University of Minnesota gymnastics program. Since taking over the reins of the program in 1972, he has led the Golden Gophers to seven Big Ten titles, finishing in the top three in all but one year at the league meet. In addition, his teams have placed in the Top 10 at the NCAA Championships a total of 10 times. His gymnasts have captured 32 individual Big Ten crowns and 10 of his athletes have competed for the U.S. Senior National Team.

Honored by his colleagues as the 1989 Midwest Coach-of-the-Year, Roethlisberger is showing no signs of slowing down either. A year ago, the Golden Gophers finished third at the NCAA Championships, the program's best finish at the national meet in 40 years (2nd, 1949). The 1990 edition of the Golden Gophers would appear to have all of the ingredients to be one of his best team's ever and should be in the thick of things when the University of Minnesota hosts the NCAA Championships in Williams Arena on April 19-21.

Roethlisberger has been active on both the national and international gymnastics scene throughout his career. In addition to charting an outstanding career at the University of Wisconsin, he competed on the U.S. National Teams at the 1966 World Championships, the 1967 Pan American Games in Winnipeg, Canada and the 1968 Olympic Games in Mexico City. He has also served as a coach for a number of U.S. National Teams and has been active in the United States Gymnastics Federation, where he is currently the Collegiate Coaches Association representative on the USGF's Board of Directors. He is also vice-president for the National Association of College Gymnastics Coaches.

14TH-RANKED SWIMMING & DIVING TEAM TO HOST GOLD COUNTRY INVITATIONAL THIS WEEKEND

The 14th-ranked Golden Gopher swimming & diving team will open up the 1990 portion of their schedule this weekend when they host the Gold Country Invitational on Friday and Saturday at the Cooke Hall Pool.

The Schedule: The diving portion of the Gold Country Invitational will be held on Friday beginning at 7:00 p.m. The swimming competition will be held on Saturday starting at 10:00 a.m.

Teams Entered: The Golden Gophers will be joined by St. Olaf, St. Cloud State, Bemidji State, Hamline and Mankato State at this weekend's competition.

Last Year: The Golden Gophers easily won the team crown at the 1989 Gold Country Invitational with 822 points. St. Olaf finished second with 413.5 points, followed by St. Cloud State with 179, Mankato State with 150, Bemidji State with 130.5 and Hamline with 21.

11TH-RANKED GOLDEN GOPHER WRESTLERS FACE TOUGH WEEK (4-1 OVERALL)

After the holiday break, head coach J Robinson's 11th-ranked Golden Gopher wrestling team will head west to compete in the Arizona State Duals in Tempe on Wednesday and then the Oregon Classic in Portland on Saturday.

Arizona State Duals: Five of the eight teams competing in Wednesday's competition to be held in the University Activity Center appeared in the Top 20 of the latest Amateur Wrestling News national poll. Headlining the entrants are the top-ranked and host Sun Devils, followed by No. 4 Nebraska, the Golden Gophers at No. 11, No. 17 Bloomsburg and No. 20 Clarion. Brigham Young, Liberty and Southern Illinois-Edwardsville complete the field. Quarterfinal action will begin at 9:00 a.m., with the semifinals starting at 1:30 p.m. and then the championship match at 7:00 p.m.

Oregon Classic: A total of 18 teams are slated to compete in Saturday's competition. The Golden Gophers are expected to vie for team honors along with No. 2 Oklahoma State and No. 24 Oregon. The matches will begin at 8:30 a.m. with the finals starting at 6:30 p.m.

A Look Back: After taking a week off for final exams, the Golden Gophers returned to action by sweeping three matches on their western trip on December 12-13. Minnesota won two matches on December 12, defeating Brigham Young 26-10 and Portland State, the defending NCAA Division II champions, 32-10 in Provo, UT. The next night the Golden Gophers traveled to Boise State, where they downed the host Broncos 30-13.

The Big Three: Marty Morgan (Bloomington, MN), Chuck Heise (Mosinee, WI), and Jeff Balcom (Fairmont, MN) are all ranked in the Top 10 nationally, and all three continued to turn in outstanding performances on the western trip. Morgan and Balcom each recorded three wins, while Heise was 2-1, suffering his first loss of the year. Morgan, a junior and a 1989 All-America, was dominant at 177 pounds, pinning two opponents and defeating his third opponent by a score of 18-7 in raising his overall record to a spotless 12-0, including a team-leading eight pins. One of his pins was over Tony Champion of Portland State, who last year was a champion won the NCAA Division II title. Senior Balcom, runner-up at heavyweight at the Big Ten tournament a year ago, also posted three impressive wins on the trip to up his record to 11-1 on the season. Heise, a senior who was redshirted a year ago, suffered his first loss of the year to Robbie Winter of Brigham Young, dropping a 4-3 decision. Heise bounced back, however, to defeat Portland State's James Sisson, a defending NCAA Division II champion, by a score of 7-5. He is 12-1 overall this season.

Strong Top to Bottom: The Golden Gophers received strong performances throughout the lineup during their western swing, with a total of eight wrestlers recording at least two wins in the three

duals. Aside from Balcom, Heise, and Morgan, Gopher standouts included sophomore Joe Reasbeck (Superior, WI), who was 3-0 at 158; sophomore Ben Morris (Wooddale, IL), 2-0-1 at 118; freshman Brad Gibson (Chokio, MN), 2-1 at 190; sophomore Shannon Ward (Irving, TX), 2-1 at 134; and sophomore Scott Rohrer (Waupun, WI), 2-1 at 126.

National Rankings: The Golden Gophers are ranked No. 11 in the latest Amateur Wrestling News national poll. Sophomore Chris Short (Inver Grove Heights, MN), Morgan, Heise, and Balcom also appeared in the individual rankings as well.

GOPHERS ROLL OVER 4TH RANKED ILLINOIS

The Golden Gophers opened the 1990 Big Ten season last Saturday by dominating 4th ranked Illinois 91-74. The Gophers were led by senior guard Melvin Newbern who was good for 27 points and eight assists. Kevin Lynch also turned in an outstanding performance by contributing 17 points and three assists. Other Gophers deserving praise are All-America candidate Willie Burton who tallied 21 points as well as Richard Coffey who was good for 12 rebounds.



TWO ROAD ASSIGNMENTS NEXT FOR GOPHERS

After five straight home-court assignments, the University of Minnesota now has a pair of tough road games on tap as the 1990 Big Ten Conference race moves into high gear.

Thursday Coach Clem Haskins' charges invade West Lafayette, IND, to take on the Purdue Boiler makers in an 8:00 p.m.(EST) confrontation. On Saturday the Golden Gophers move up to Ann Arbor, MI, to face the Michigan Wolverines at 3:00 p.m. (EST). Purdue whipped Northwestern 93-77 in its conference opener last weekend and will bring an overall record of 9-2 into Thursday night's contest. Michigan 10-1, did not compete over the weekend but was scheduled to play at Indiana Monday night.

Minnesota and the Boiler makers have met 131 times over the years, and Purdue will take an edge of 70-61 into this week's meeting. The Boiler makers lead 46-21 in games played in West Lafayette but trail 38-26 in games played in Minneapolis.

Purdue had a string of 11 straight in the series until Minnesota upset the Boiler makers 76-66 in Williams

Arena early last year. Purdue won the rematch 78-63 at West Lafayette later in the season. The Golden Gophers and the Boiler makers have been involved in eight overtime games including a Big Ten record-setting six overtime period contest in 1955. (Minnesota won that one at West Lafayette, but Purdue leads 6-2 in extra-session verdicts).

Michigan and Minnesota have had 107 basketball shootouts over the years, and the Wolverines will take an edge of 58-49 into next Saturday afternoon's game. The Golden Gophers have won only 16 times at Ann Arbor, and their lone victory in Crisler Arena was by a 61-50 margin during the 1982 season when enroute to a Big Ten championship. Minnesota will go into the Purdue contest with an overall record of 10-1 and a Big Ten log of 1-0 after whipping Rider College 116-48 in its final non-loop start last Wednesday and then upending fourth-ranked Illinois 91-74 in the Big Ten opener Saturday.

"Those were very big wins for us," Coach Haskins proclaimed over the weekend. "It is a great way to start 1990. We were able to

dominate Rider, and it gave us a chance to use our bench and build some confidence."

That confidence was apparent against the Fighting Illini when Minnesota shot 57%, outrebounded Illinois 36-29, recorded a total of 21 assists and had nine steals against the highly-touted and previously unbeaten visitors. "We executed both offensively and defensively," Haskins analyzed, "and when we are able to do that as well as we did against Illinois, we feel we can compete with anyone."

Haskins had special praise for several individuals including his backcourt duo of Melvin Newbern and Kevin Lynch. "They make as good a pair of guards as we'll see in college basketball," he said after Newbern hit for 27 and Lynch 17 against Illinois. Newbern also added eight assists while Lynch chipped in with three. But he also praised All-America candidate Willie Burton who tallied 21 as well as Richard Coffey who had 12 boards.

Now Haskins must hope that kind of play will continue as Minnesota hits the road.

WHO WOULD HAVE THOUGHT IT?.....1ST PLACE IN JANUARY

Minneapolis,MN---While two other first place WCHA teams were splitting their head-to-head series last weekend, the Minnesota hockey Gophers were winning twice at Denver. The result.....the Gophers are alone in first place.

There are not many, including right here on the UM campus, that at the start of this season would have given any odds that Minnesota would be in first place, not only at this time, but at any time this season. Gone are seven players from last season who were instrumental in Gopher teams winning the last two WCHA titles. Gone is the top goalie in the nation the last two years. It was termed a rebuilding season at Minnesota.

So all of a sudden Minnesota owns a two-point bulge over Minnesota-Duluth and Wisconsin for the top spot. The Gophers, following 8-5 and 7-2 wins at Denver, stand 10-4-2 good for 22 WCHA points. UM is 14-7-2 overall. Both the Bulldogs and Badgers own 10-6-0 league records.

What comes now is the struggle to remain in first place. That begins this weekend when the surprising Colorado College Tigers invade Mariucci Arena. C.C. swept a home series from Michigan Tech last weekend moving up to fourth place in the WCHA race with an 8-7-1 league log. Colorado College and the Gophers split a November series at Colorado Springs. The Tigers won 7-5 and the Gophers 3-2, the latter game in overtime.

WAYL-980 AM will broadcast the games live Friday and on tape delay Saturday, with KSTP-1500 AM carrying both 7:05 p.m. games live. There is no television this weekend.

"We played awfully well for the better part of six periods last weekend," Gopher head coach Doug Woog says. "There were some times, however, where we were not effective on the power play. At the same time we kept Denver's power play in check as we shut them out on all seven tries in the two games. I'm very proud of the efforts shown by all our players."

After falling behind 2-1 early in the second period Friday, Minnesota scored six unanswered goals, three in the second and three more in the third, to take a commanding 7-2 lead. Denver roared back with three goals of its own, but it was too little, too late. Scott Bloom (Burnsville) ended it all with an empty net goal in the final minute of play.

The most spectacular scoring of the game came in the final period when senior co-captain Peter Hankinson (Edina) scored back-to-back shorthanded goals while killing penalties. Hankinson got another shorthander Saturday giving him four for the season.

Trent Klatt (Osseo), Ben Hankinson (Edina), Grant Bischoff (Grand Rapids), Jason Miller (Bloomington) and Luke Johnson (Brooklyn Park) scored the other UM goals Friday.

Saturday saw the Gophers take it to Denver right off the bat. Peter Hankinson opened the scoring with the third shorthanded goal of the weekend before UM goal leader Gernander got the next two, his 19th and 20th scores of the season. Jon Anderson (White Bear Lake), Dean Williamson (Edina) and Miller also scored and the Gophers led 6-1 after two periods. Klatt got his second of the series in the final stanza to end the UM scoring.

Freshman goalie Tom Newman (Blaine) added two notches to his win column by working both games effectively in the Gopher nets. He lowered his goals allowed average to 3.78 in the WCHA, and now stands 7-6-2 overall, 6-3-2 in league play.

Woog will welcome back three varsity regulars this weekend for the Colorado College series. Returning from playing with the U.S. National Junior Team in Finland are goalie Jeff Stolp (Nashwauk), forward Cory Laylin (St. Cloud), and defenseman Doug Zmolek (Rochester). Each missed the last six UM games, but only the Denver series in league play.

More Winners: Senior tri-captain **Bill Asmus** (Lakeville, MN) in the 200 freestyle with a time of 1:42.66, senior **Erik Engnell** (Minneapolis, MN) in the 200 butterfly in 1:52.89, sophomore **Kevin Brooks** (Plymouth, MN) in the 1650 freestyle in 16:44.30 and freshman **Chris Carlisle** (Arlington, TX) in the 500 freestyle in 4:44.46 also were individual event winners. The Golden Gopher added the title in the 200 medley relay, the first swimming event on the schedule, to the cause.

Head coach J Robinson's 11th-ranked Golden Gopher wrestling team headed west last week, finishing third in the Arizona State Duals in Tempe on Wednesday and then second at the Oregon Classic in Portland on Saturday.

Arizona State Duals: Five nationally-ranked teams took part in the Takedown Duals II at Arizona State University on Wednesday. The Golden Gophers opened the competition by defeating No. 21 Clarion 20-16 in the first round, fell 26-15 to No. 4 Nebraska in the semifinals, whipped unranked Liberty 44-4 in the consolation semifinals, and then scored a 24-12 victory over No. 17 Bloomsburg in the battle for third-place. The host Sun Devils, ranked No. 1 in the country, won the competition with a 21-16 victory over Nebraska in the finals.

Zuniga Shines: Junior Dave Zuniga (Worland, WY), a two-time NCAA qualifier at Utah State who transferred to Gold Country and became eligible to compete for the Golden Gophers last week, started off in grand fashion. The 134-pounder won all four of his matches at the Arizona State Duals, including a 12-6 victory over Bloomsburg's Tony Reed, ranked No. 6 in the nation at 142 pounds. He continued to turn heads at the Oregon Classic on Saturday, totally dominating Chuck Barbee from Oklahoma State, the No. 1 ranked wrestler in the 134-pound weight class, en route to being honored as the Outstanding Wrestler of the Meet. He won the title with a convincing 19-4 technical fall decision over Barbee.

More Shining Stars: Junior Marty Morgan (Bloomington, MN), senior Jeff Balcom (Fairmont, MN) and sophomore Shannon Ward (Irving, TX) also claimed individual titles at the Oregon Classic for the Golden Gophers. Morgan remained undefeated on the season by pinning Curt Strahm from Oregon at 3:35 in the final, after taking 6:43 to score the fall over Portland State's Tony Champion in the semifinal. An All-American for the Golden Gophers after finishing sixth at 167 at the NCAA Championships a year ago, he has been simply unstoppable this season, pinning more than half of his opponents. Balcom, who drew 2-2 with No. 2 ranked Kurt Angle from Clarion and lost a tough 5-3 decision to No. 3 Joe Malecek from Nebraska at the Arizona State duals, scored a hard-fought 5-4 victory over No. 8 ranked Kirk Mammen from Oklahoma State in the final at the Oregon Classic. Ward defeated Jarrett Clark from University of the Pacific 7-4 in the Oregon Classic final at 126 pounds. Senior Chuck Heise (Mosinee, WI), who won four straight at the Arizona State duals, dropped a 5-3 decision to Eric Wilson from Oklahoma State in the 142-pound final. Yet another noteworthy performance was that of sophomore Ben Morris (Wooddale, IL) at 118 pounds. He scored an 11-9 victory over Oklahoma State's Tony Purler, ranked No. 10 in the nation, in the consolation final.

Cal-State Fullerton: Unranked Cal-State Fullerton will invade Williams Arena to take on the Golden Gophers at 2:00 p.m. on Saturday. Last season the Golden Gophers defeated the host Titans 29-10. Under the direction of head coach, Dan Lewis, in his eighth season as head coach at the school, the Titans registered an overall record of 13-6 in 1988-89, finishing 25th in the final Amateur Wrestling News national poll. A pair of NCAA qualifiers, senior Scott Schumm (150) and junior David Jones (HWT), headline the lineup.

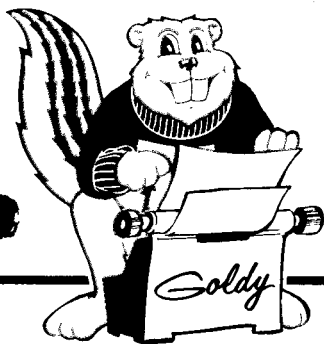

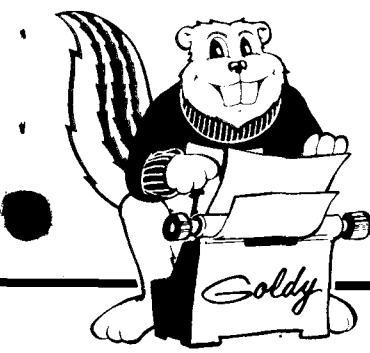

GOLDEN GOPHER CAGERS EYE HOME SWEET HOME

Minnesota's bloody but unbowed Golden Gophers return home this week for two more Big Ten Conference basketball assignments with renewed hope that "friendly" Williams Arena will be just that and indeed will be home sweet home.

Coach Clem Haskins' battered cagers are slated to play host to Northwestern University in a 7:00 p.m. contest on Thursday and then entertain The Ohio State University at 12 noon on Saturday.

Northwestern will bring an overall record of 7-6 and a Big Ten mark of 0-3 into Thursday night's contest. The Buckeyes, who will warm up for their meeting against the Golden Gophers by invading Michigan Thursday, came into the week with an overall record of 8-5. Ohio State was 3-1 in conference play.

Minnesota and Northwestern have met 118 times in basketball, and the Golden Gophers will take an edge of 68-50 in the series into Thursday's game. A year ago the two teams split, the Cats winning at home 75-67 and Minnesota at Williams Arena 78-59.

The Buckeyes have tangled with the Golden Gophers 101 times on the hardwood, and they will bring a commanding 61-40 edge in the series into Saturday's confrontation despite the fact that Minnesota swept both games last season. Minnesota won at Ohio State 78-70 and 76-73 in Minneapolis.

But back to the "friendly" factor of Williams Arena. Minnesota hit the Big Ten trails a week ago and limped home with two disappointing setbacks....and that means the Golden Gophers will go into the Northwestern game 10-3 and 1-2.

First Minnesota fell at Purdue 86-78 and then it suffered an 87-83 heart-breaker at Michigan. Those losses were not easy to accept by the Golden Gophers and by Coach Haskins especially after having reeled off 10 straight triumphs.

"We were not happy with the way we played at Purdue," Coach Haskins admitted, "but we were pleased with the way we fought back. We did a better job at Michigan, and it was especially pleasing to see how we bounced back with a good effort after the disappoint-

ing loss just a couple of nights earlier."

At Purdue, the Golden Gophers got off to a poor start, dug themselves into a hole and just could not get out of it. But they did make a game of it down the stretch. At Michigan, Minnesota led much of the game but faltered in the final minutes. "We had our chances to win both games right at the end," Haskins pointed out, "but we just could not pull them out. When you look back, the Purdue game may have been our poorest performance of the season, and at Michigan it was tough trying to overcome a 26-3 free throw difference."

Haskins was alluding to the fact that at Michigan, Minnesota was whistled for 28 personal fouls as compared with 15 for the host club. And Michigan shot 32 free throws (made 26) as compared to only nine (made three) for Minnesota. It was almost as bad at Purdue where the Boiler makers outscored the Golden Gophers 23-9 from the line.

That was downright unfriendly. Minnesotans hope Williams Arena is more friendly!

ICERS WIDEN LEAD, PLAY AT UM-D FRI/SAT

Minneapolis, MN---One of the most keenly contested series in all college hockey resumes this weekend when in-state rivals Minnesota and Minnesota-Duluth go head to head in games Friday and Saturday at the Duluth Arena in the Port City.

The Minnesota Gophers, 16-7-2 overall and 12-4-2 in the WCHA, suddenly own a 6-point lead (26-20) over the Bulldogs (16-10-0, 10-8-0) in the race for the league lead. Duluth, which opened the season with a bang, has struggled recently after losing key players to injury, and is now tied with Wisconsin for second place in the WCHA standings.

WAYL-980 AM radio will carry both 7:05 p.m. games live in the Twin Cities, with KITN-TV, Ch. 29, televising Friday's contest, also live.

When the Minnesota Gophers come to town, however, throw everything that went before out the window. This rivalry calls for the SRO sign to go up every time a Gopher team visits the Duluth Arena.

The Bulldogs made their mark early in the season when they whipped the Gophers 9-6 and 4-2 at Mariucci Arena on the first weekend of league action. However, things have changed recently for both clubs.

Minnesota was 4-4-2 in its first 10 WCHA outings. Since that time, however, the Gophers have clawed their way back into the lead by winning their last eight conference games, and 12 of their last 13 overall.

A combination of torrid scoring and vastly improved goalie play has led Minnesota back to where its teams of the last two years stood most of the time. Minnesota has won the last two WCHA crowns, the first time in its history UM took back to back titles.

The latest conquests came at home last weekend when Minnesota swept Colorado College 8-4 and 4-2. The six point lead over Minnesota-Duluth resulted when the Bulldogs surprisingly lost twice at Michigan Tech, 5-4 in overtime and 8-4.

The Colorado College series opened with some kind of a bang when Minnesota scored twice and the Tigers once. . . all in the first minute of play Friday. The Gophers owned period leads of 4-2 and 7-3 to gain the victory. Freshman wing **Trent Klatt** (Osseo) and junior wing **Ben Hankinson** (Edina) each scored two goals for Minnesota, while senior wing **Peter Hankinson** (Edina) recorded his fourth shorthanded goal in the last three games. It was also his 5th shorthanded goal of the season tying a school record.

On Saturday junior center/wing **Ken Gernander** (Coleraine), who was out of practice all week with the flu and missed Friday's game, came back to score two goals Saturday, a which included the game winner. Gernander now has a team-high 22 goals in 24 games. He has scored 18 of his goals in league play tying him for the WCHA lead with Denver's Dave Shields.

Peter Hankinson, who continues to lead his teammates in scoring with 39 points (15-24), is tied for second in the WCHA scoring derby with 31 points. Gernander is next with 27. Klatt has moved into a tie with senior center **Scott Bloom** (Burnsville) for the second most goals scored on the team with 17. He added a third goal for the weekend Saturday.

Freshman **Tom Newman** (Blaine) won Friday's game in the UM nets making 24 saves, while senior **Scott Nelson** (Grand Rapids) enjoyed his first WCHA start Saturday after being called on to make just 14 saves. Each will probably see action this weekend at Duluth.

Despite competing shorthanded, the 14th-ranked Golden Gopher swimming & diving team still scored a 61-52 victory over the Big Eight's Kansas Jayhawks and a 96-17 win over the Southwest Conference's Arkansas Razorbacks in triple dual action at Lawrence, KS last Saturday.

Double Winners: Despite being sick with the flu, senior tri-captain **Bill Asmus** (Lakeville, MN) joined fellow senior tri-captain, **Andrew Lorys** (Portland, OR), as a double winner on the day. Asmus won the 50 (21.18) and 100 (46.45) freestyles, while Lorys took the 500 (4:38.30) and 1000 (9:32.97) freestyles.

More Winners: Sophomore **Scott Hart** (Rochester, MN) in the 200 breaststroke (2:07.67), sophomore **Matt Moseman** (Madison, WI) in the 200 butterfly (1:50.71), sophomore **Scott Tripps** (Seattle, WA) in the 200 backstroke (1:53.40) and sophomore **Mike Wermager** (Mounds View, MN) in three meter diving (325.45) were also winners on the day for the Golden Gophers.

Down & Out: Sophomore **Sean Quackenbush** (Rochester, MN), Big Ten Conference Freshman of the Year last season when he also collected All-American honors for the Golden Gophers, missed Saturday's meet because of the flu, while freshman standout, **Steve Busse** (Cincinnati, OH), also could not swim after suffering second-degree burns when hot soup spilled onto his ankle earlier in the week. He is expected to be out for another two-three weeks. Moreover, Asmus, Hart and freshman **Paul Nelsen** (Lincoln, NE) also had the flu bug, but did compete in the meet.

Big Win: The victories were especially big considering the fact that the Golden Gophers, who finished 11th at the NCAA Championships a year ago, beat a pair of teams, Kansas 13th and Arkansas 25th, who were also in the top 25 at the national meet last season.

Coach Dale: "I'm ecstatic," said Golden Gopher head coach Dennis Dale. "It's nice to win a close meet, but it's even nicer to win without some of your best swimmers. 11TH-RANKED WRESTLERS TOP CAL STATE FULLERTON; OPEN BIG TEN SEASON THIS WEEK (8-2/0-0 Big Ten)

The 11th-ranked Golden Gopher wrestling team upped their overall record to 8-2 on the season with a 31-9 victory over Cal State Fullerton last Saturday in Williams Arena.

Perfect Pair: Leading the way once again for the Golden Gophers was junior **Marty Morgan** (Bloomington, MN). Ranked No. 2 in the country by Amateur Wrestling News, he pinned Dwayne Buth at 2:13 of their match at 177 pounds for his team-leading 17th pin of the season, raising his record to a sparkling 23-0 in the process. Junior **Dave Zuniga** (Worland, WY), a transfer from Utah State where he was a two-time NCAA qualifier, upped his record to 9-0 with an 8-6 decision over Lyndon Campbell at 134 pounds on Saturday. He defeated Oklahoma State's Chuck Barbee, ranked No. 1 in the weight class, by technical fall at the Oregon Classic in Portland on January 6.

"Marty looked good," said Golden Gopher head coach J Robinson. "He's doing what he has to do to win. Zuniga is one of those guys that personifies what being a competitor is all about. He got down 4-0 and a lot of guys might have just thrown in the towel. But he kept battling and eventually won the match."

Winning is Contagious: Sophomore **Ben Morris** (Wooddale, IL) with a major decision at 118, sophomore **Shannon Ward** (Irving, TX) with a decision at 126, Zuniga at 134, senior **Chuck Heise** (Mosinee, WI) with a major decision at 142, freshman **Willy Short** (Inver Grove Heights, MN) with a decision at 150 and sophomore **Joe Reasbeck** (Superior, WI) with a fall at 158 staked the Golden Gophers to a 23-0 advantage through six matches. Reasbeck also drew praise from Coach Robinson following his performance on Saturday that lifted his record to 20-5 on the season.

"Joe has been a real bright spot for us this year," Robinson said. "He's turned into a real competitor for us. He'll face some outstanding people in the next couple of weeks, so we'll get a real good opportunity to see just how far he's come."

Big Ten Opener on Friday: The Golden Gophers will entertain 12th-ranked Northwestern in the Big Ten opener on Friday at 7:30 p.m. in the Bierman Gym. The two teams met twice in dual meets last season with the Wildcats claiming a 22-18 victory in Evanston, IL on January 14 and the Golden Gophers winning 21-13 at the Great American Classic in Indianapolis, IN on January 27. The Golden Gophers went on to finish second at the Big Ten Championships and seventh at the NCAA Championships, while the Wildcats were sixth at the conference meet and then eighth at the national meet. Leading the Wildcats will be senior Jack Griffin, ranked No. 3 in the country at 118 pounds, senior Brad Traviola, ranked No. 3 at 167 and senior Mike Funk, No. 5 at 177. The matchup between Funk and Morgan should be an interesting one to say the least.

Wisconsin on Sunday: After facing Northwestern on Friday, the Golden Gophers will travel to Madison, WI to take on the Wisconsin Badgers on Sunday. The match is slated to begin at 7:00 p.m. The two teams split a pair of dual meets last season, with the Golden Gophers taking a 22-12 decision at Williams Arena on January 13 and then the Badgers winning by a 20-18 margin at the Great American Classic on January 28. Matt Demaray, ranked No. 6 at 150 and John Harms, No. 10 at 158, lead the Badgers.

Morgan Honored: Marty Morgan has been honored as the Big Ten Conference Wrestling Athlete-of-the-Month for December. Ranked No. 2 at 177 pounds by the Amateur Wrestling News, he has been unstoppable thus far this season for the Golden Gophers. In addition to registering a sparkling 23-0 record with 17 pins, he has won individual titles at the Bison Open (Fargo, ND), Nebraska-Omaha Open, Northern Open (Madison, WI) and the Oregon Classic (Portland, OR). A year ago he charted an overall record of 32-10 with 12 pins, finishing sixth at the NCAA Championships at 167 pounds to earn All-America honors. He transferred to Gold Country from North Dakota State University where he won the NCAA Division II national title at 167 pounds in 1987 for the Bison.

More Honors For Morgan: The accolades continue to roll in for the red-hot Morgan. He has been selected to compete in the East-West All-Star Wrestling Classic to be held on February 5 in Portland, OR. He will face Chris Barnes from Oklahoma State, ranked No. 1 at 177 pounds, in the competition.

Squeeze Bottle Night on January 24: The first 1000 fans in attendance at the Minnesota-Iowa match in Williams Arena at 7:30 p.m. on January 24, will receive a free Cenex/Land O' Lakes Golden Gopher squeeze bottle. In addition, coupons will be distributed for 1/2 off a large pizza from Valli Pizza in Dinkytown. Tickets are \$4.00 for adults, \$2.50 for U of M students with their college ID and fee statement, and for students 18 years of age and under. The featured match of the night between the No. 11 Golden Gophers and the No. 3 Hawkeyes is expected to be the one pitting Iowa's Tom Brands and Minnesota's Dave Zuniga at 134 pounds. With Brands ranked No. 2 in the country and Zuniga having already dismantled the No. 1 ranked competitor, that match will most likely be for the No. 1 ranking.

National Rankings: The Golden Gophers remained in the No. 11 spot in the latest Amateur Wrestling News national poll. Sophomore **Chris Short** (Inver Grove Heights, MN), Morgan, Heise, and Balcom also appeared in the individual rankings as well.

TENNIS TEAM UPSETS 10TH-RANKED ALABAMA AT THE O'CHARLEY'S CLASSIC; HOME OPENER ON FRIDAY (2-1/0-0 Big Ten)

Head Coach David Geatz's 25th-ranked Golden Gopher tennis team topped unranked Georgia Tech 8-1 on Friday, upset 10th-ranked Alabama 5-4 in the quarterfinals on Saturday and then dropped a 5-2 decision to 17th-ranked Tennessee in the semifinals on Sunday as they opened their 1990 dual meet season at the O'Charley's Tennis Classic in Knoxville, TN.

Big Win Over 'Bama: Despite returning the nucleus of last year's Big Ten champion squad that advanced to the NCAA Tournament, the Golden Gophers were surprisingly ranked just 25th in the pre-season national rankings. After opening up with the victory over Georgia Tech, the Golden Gophers definitely turned a few heads around the country with their 5-4 victory over Alabama on Saturday.

"That's a big win for us," Geatz said. "It was 3-3 after the singles and we feel that if we're even or ahead after singles, that we can beat any team. We played hard-nosed, aggressive doubles. We work real hard on our doubles and take a lot of pride in it."

Northern Illinois: The Golden Gophers will take on Northern Illinois in their home opener at 6:30 p.m. on Friday at the 98th Street Racquet Club in Bloomington. The Golden Gophers are ranked No. 2 in the pre-season Region IV rankings, while Northern Illinois is No. 15. Minnesota scored a 5-2 victory over the Huskies at the 98th Street Racquet Club last season.

Leach, Uihlein & Werwie To Play in Rolex: Geatz announced that senior **Rafer Leach** (Lexington, KY) will play singles and that junior **Kevin Werwie** (Sheboygan, WI) and sophomore **Brian Uihlein** (Lake Forest, IL) will compete in the doubles portion of the Rolex National Intercollegiate Tennis Championships to be held at the 98th Street (Feb. 8-9) and Crosstown Racquet Clubs (Feb. 10-11). Last year, Duke and Brian Uihlein advanced all the way through the 32-team draw to the doubles semifinals of the tournament before falling to the nation's top-ranked twosome. Leach lost in the first-round of the 64-player singles draw, then won his first round consolation match, before falling in the next.

Pre-Season National Rankings: The Golden Gophers, who finished 23rd in the final national rankings last season, open up the 1990 season in a four-way logjam in the 25th spot.

With a number of key individual performers on the sidelines because of injuries, the Golden Gopher gymnastics team opened their 1990 season last weekend. Head coach Fred Roethlisberger's squad fell to Ohio State and defeated Michigan State in East Lansing on Friday, and then topped Michigan, Kent State and Western Michigan in Ann Arbor on Saturday.

Ohio State/Michigan State: The Buckeyes, who finished seventh at the '89 NCAA Championships, tallied a score of 274.50 on Friday to defeat the Golden Gophers, third at the national meet last year, who opened their season with a score of 272.90, and the host Spartans who registered a 266.45. Senior **Jeff Weltzin** (Libertyville, IL) won the still rings with a score of 9.55, senior **Mark McKiernan** (Darien, CT) took the parallel bars with a 9.55 and freshman **John Roethlisberger** (Afton, MN) won the horizontal bar with a score of 9.75.

Michigan/Kent State/Western Michigan: Behind Roethlisberger, the Golden Gophers tallied a score of 274.50 to easily defeat host Michigan (259.80), Kent State (254.65) and Western Michigan (241.20) on Saturday. Roethlisberger claimed top honors in the all-around with a score of 55.50, while also winning the vault with a 9.35 and the parallel bars with a 9.70. McKiernan on the pommel horse (9.45), Weltzin on the still rings (9.70) and senior **Mike Graham** (Green Bay, WI) on the horizontal bar (9.65) also won events for the Golden Gophers in the competition.

On The Mend: Senior **Dan Zimpfer** (Kent, OH) (sternum) and junior **Mike Farina** (Mundelein, IL) (shoulder) did not compete for the Golden Gophers last weekend. Their return will certainly

bolster the Golden Gopher lineup. Senior **Mike Miller** (Aloha, OR), on the other hand, is out for the season with a shoulder injury.

A year ago, Ohio State won the meet with a score of 271.20, followed by the Golden Gophers (270.20) and eventual Big Ten and NCAA champion Illinois (268.95) in the 11-team field.

Roethlisberger Honored: John Roethlisberger has been honored as the Big Ten Conference Gymnastics Athlete-of-the-Month for December. Son of Golden Gopher head coach, Fred Roethlisberger, he finished third at the U.S. Winter National Championships held on Dec. 1-2 in Colorado Springs, CO to qualify for the U.S. National Team. Sitting eighth after the first day, he moved up with a strong performance on the final day to finish third with a score of 108.78. He also won the all-around title at the Wisconsin Open held on Nov. 17-18.

PENDINO REJOINS MINNESOTA GRID STAFF

Minneapolis, MN---Athletic Director Rick Bay announced today that Mike Pendino (pen-DEE-no) has been hired as assistant football coach by the University of Minnesota, pending approval by the University Board of Regents.

Actually, Pendino is rejoining the Golden Gopher staff. He first served as a graduate assistant coach in 1985 and 1986, then as a volunteer assistant the next two years. The last three of those seasons were under present Minnesota head coach John Gutekunst.

Last season Pendino coached the offensive line for the University of Maine. Maine ended with a 9-3 record and made the NCAA Division I AA playoffs. That team also featured a running back who gained the most rushing yards nationally in I AA football.

On Dec. 23, 1989, Pendino accepted an assistant coaching position at the University of Nevada at Las Vegas (UNLV) under its new head coach, Jim Strong. Strong had previously served as an assistant coach at Minnesota and Notre Dame.

"I was totally pleased with my new assignment at UNLV," Pendino said today. "However, when I was offered the position at Minnesota, I just couldn't turn down the offer to return to a major Big Ten University. I really enjoyed my years at Minnesota and met my wife here, too. So it's really a homecoming for both of us."

Coach Gutekunst said Pendino will coach the offensive line beginning this spring. "We are pleased to welcome Mike (Pendino) back to our family," Gutekunst says.

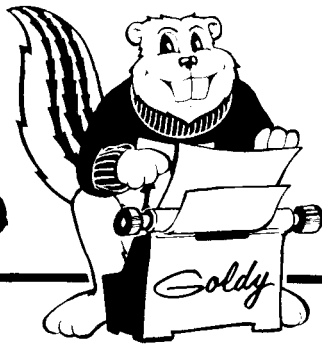
"He did an outstanding job for us both as a graduate and volunteer assistant. He knows our system and we look forward to his further contributions to our program."

Pendino, a graduate of Temple University where he was an outstanding football player, replaces assistant coach Mal Scanlon on the Minnesota staff. Scanlon, who in 1989 took a one-year leave of absence from Cretin-Derham Hall High School in St. Paul, resigned to return to Cretin-Derham Hall after spending one season on the UM staff coaching the quarterbacks.

"Coach (Mal) Scanlon did a superb job for us in his one year here," Gutekunst offered. "He had begun an extensive fund raising campaign for his high school and believed the time had come for him to return and complete what he started."

Pendino is wasting little time getting on the job. He is scheduled to go on a recruiting trip to Florida early Wednesday morning. Pendino, his wife, Amy, and son Michael, 9 months, hope to move back to the Twin Cities as soon as possible.

5 GOPHER GAMES TO BE TELEVISED THIS WEEK

The name of the game for Gopher athletic teams this week is exposure. No less than five men's games will be telecast both locally and nationally. It all started last night when ESPN-TV carried the Gopher-Wisconsin game at Madison. The same national cable carries Thursday's 8:35 p.m. cage game against Iowa from Williams Arena. Friday and Saturday's 7:05 p.m. hockey games from Mariucci Arena can be viewed in Minnesota via K1TN-TV, Ch. 29, when the first place Golden Gophers, on an 11-game win streak, go up against the North Dakota Sioux. It's all capped Sunday when ABC-TV, and local affiliate KSTP-TV, Ch. 5, air the Minnesota-Indiana basketball game coast to coast from Williams Arena at 1:05 p.m. CST.



HAWKEYES AND HOOSIERS NEXT FOR GOPHERS

After Monday's heart-breaking 77-75 loss at Wisconsin, the University of Minnesota will return to Williams Arena this week for a pair of crucial Big Ten Conference basketball assignments.

On Thursday, the Golden Gophers are slated to entertain Iowa in an 8:35 p.m. ESPN television affair. Then on Sunday Coach Clem Haskins' charges play host to Indiana at 1:05 p.m. in a confrontation set for ABC-TV.

Great significance might be attached to those two contests. First of all Minnesota needs to get back on track after falling to the Badgers earlier this week. Second, if it hopes to remain in contention for Big Ten honors this season, it must improve its conference record of 3-3. Third, the Golden Gophers are 9-0 at home this season, they have won 12 straight in Williams Arena, and they have been victorious in 23 of their last 24 starts on that floor. They want to keep that string going.

So what are the chances of things falling into place for the U of M? "We've certainly got to play better against Iowa and Indiana than we did at

Wisconsin," Haskins announced. "We've got to come ready to play, which we weren't on Monday, and we've got to be mentally ready to perform for a full 40 minutes."

The invading Hawkeyes and Minnesota have met 146 times in basketball over the years, and the Golden Gophers will take an edge of 78-68 in the series into Thursday night's encounter. Iowa leads 40-31 in games played in Iowa City, but Minnesota is ahead 47-28 in games played in Minneapolis. It is 30-25 at Williams Arena.

A year ago these two teams split, Iowa winning at Carver-Hawkeye Arena 99-68 despite a 21-point effort by Kevin Lynch, and Minnesota prevailing in Minneapolis behind Willie Burton's 28 and Melvin Newbern's 27.

The series against Indiana is a little different. The Hoosiers and the Golden Gophers have faced each other 110 times on the hardwood, and Indiana leads 75-45. At Indiana, the Hoosiers hold a 49-12 edge, but in games played at Minnesota the Golden Gophers lead 33-26.

Last season Indiana swept both games, winning 66-62 at Indiana despite a 17-point effort from Burton and in Williams Arena 75-62 even though Newbern connected for a game high of 19.

Minnesota's overall record going into the Iowa encounter is 12-4 after it won two at home and then dropped one on the road in its' most-recent action. First Minnesota whipped Northwestern 97-75 and then outlasted Ohio State 83-78 before that two-point setback at Wisconsin.

"We played exceptionally well at times against Northwestern and Ohio State," Haskins said. "Our intensity level was good and our pressure defense got the job done. We had high shooting percentages because our defense put us in good position."

His analysis was just the opposite at Wisconsin, and he knows he'll need a turnaround both Thursday and Sunday. "Our seniors are not supposed to be making the mistakes that they have been making," he said. "We can play better. We MUST play better if we hope to win and stay in the race."

ICERS SWEEP BULLDOGS, HOST SIOUX FRI/SAT

Minneapolis, MN---Minnesota's hockey Gophers extended their WCHA winning streak to 11 games and their first place margin to eight points by winning twice at Minnesota-Duluth last weekend.

The Gophers (18-7-2, 14-4-2 WCHA) will attempt this weekend to maintain its lead over second place Wisconsin (19-8-0, 11-7-0) when they host North Dakota (17-8-3, 8-8-2) at Mariucci Arena. Both Friday and Saturday's 7:05 p.m. games will be telecast by KITN-TV, Ch. 29, with KSTP-1500 AM radio going live both nights and WAYL-980 AM live Friday and on tape delay Saturday.

Junior wing Grant Bischoff (Grand Rapids) led the Minnesota offense in Duluth by scoring three goals, one Friday and two more Saturday as the Gophers won by scores of 4-1 and 5-2.

That sweep allowed Minnesota to even the season log with the Bulldogs. UM-Duluth took the Gophers 9-6 and 4-2 at Mariucci Arena to open the WCHA season back in October.

In winning for the 13th time in its last 14 games, Minnesota received two solid goal tending performances against UM-Duluth last weekend. Freshman Tom Newman (Blaine) continued his improved play by stopping 23 of 24 shots in Friday's contest. He is now 8-3-2 with a goals allowed average of 3.60 in the WCHA.

Senior walk-on Scott Nelson (Grand Rapids) turned in an equally impressive job Saturday in allowing the Bulldogs just two scores on 25 attempts. It was Nelson's second WCHA start leaving him 2-0-0 with a 2.17 GAA. Both goalies are expected to continue alternating starting assignments this weekend.

Senior wing Peter Hankinson (Edina) extended his team scoring lead by picking up four points on the weekend. Hankinson recorded one assist Friday adding a goal and two more assists Saturday.

Hankinson has now scored at least one point in all but two of Minnesota's 27 games this season. He has also played consecutively in Minnesota's last 89 games. Peter has 43 points on 16 goals and a team-high 27 assists, while junior wing Ken Gernander (Coleraine) continues to lead in goals with 22 even though being shut out at Duluth.

Junior wing Ben Hankinson (Edina), younger brother of Peter, gave the Gophers leads they did not relinquish both nights. He put Minnesota ahead 2-1 with second period goals Friday and Saturday. They were his 9th and 10th scores of the season.

Scott Bloom (Burnsville), Cory Laylin (St. Cloud) and Jon Anderson (White Bear Lake) scored the remaining Minnesota goals on the weekend.

Not all news was good in the Gopher camp, however. Senior defenseman and co-captain Lance Pitlick (New Hope) underwent surgery last Thursday to correct abdominal muscle problems. Although there was no announcement from the medical staff, it is hoped Pitlick could be ready to rejoin the Gophers for the playoffs.

Freshman wing Trent Klatt (Osseo) slid into the side of the net at Duluth Friday suffering an ankle sprain. After taking two more short shifts, he retired from the remainder of the game. He did not play Saturday and his status for this weekend is unanswered at this point.

Minnesota recorded a 6-5 victory at North Dakota earlier this season while the teams played to a 4-4 tie in the second game.

11TH-RANKED WRESTLERS SPLIT A PAIR OF BIG TEN MATCHES; HOST 3RD-RANKED IOWA ON WEDNESDAY (9-3/1-1 Big Ten)

The 11th-ranked Golden Gopher wrestling team opened Big Ten Conference action last week, falling 24-19 to 12th-ranked Northwestern in the Bierman Gym on Friday, and then bouncing back with a 28-14 win over Wisconsin in Madison on Sunday.

Perfect Pair: Leading the way once again for the Golden Gophers were juniors Marty Morgan (Bloomington, MN) and Dave Zuniga (Worland, WY). Ranked No. 2 in the country at 177 pounds by Amateur Wrestling News, Morgan decisioned fifth-ranked Mike Funk of Northwestern 11-5 on Friday and then scored a 13-5 major decision over Wisconsin's Keith Davison on Sunday, raising his record to a sparkling 25-0 in the process. Zuniga, a transfer from Utah State where he was a two-time NCAA qualifier, upped his record to 11-0 in impressive fashion. On Friday, the 134-pounder pinned Northwestern's Tad Yeager at 4:53 of their match, before doing the same to Wisconsin's Steve Hoffman at 3:38 on Sunday. He defeated Oklahoma State's Chuck Barbee, ranked No. 1 in the weight class, by technical fall at the Oregon Classic in Portland on January 6.

Morgan Honored: The accolades continue to roll in for the red-hot Marty Morgan. He has been selected to compete in the East-West All-Star Wrestling Classic to be held on February 5 in Portland, OR. He will face Chris Barnes from Oklahoma State, ranked No. 1 at 177 pounds, in the competition. Honored as the Big Ten Conference Wrestling Athlete of the Month for December, he has been unstoppable thus far this season for the Golden Gophers. In addition to registering a perfect record through 25 matches, he has registered 17 pins this season, just two shy of the single-season school record of 19 set by Mike McArthur during the 1976-77 season. He has won individual titles at the Bison Open (Fargo, ND), Nebraska-Omaha Open, Northern Open (Madison, WI) and the Oregon Classic (Portland, OR). A year ago he charted an overall record of 32-10 with 12 pins, finishing sixth at the NCAA Championships at 167 pounds to earn All-America honors. He transferred to Gold Country from North Dakota State University where he won the NCAA Division II national title at 167 pounds in 1987 for the Bison.

Host Iowa on Wednesday: The stage is set for Wednesday night in Williams Arena when the Golden Gophers will host No. 3 Iowa (13-1, 2-0). The meet will begin at 7:30 p.m.

Powerful Hawkeyes: The Hawkeyes have won an unprecedented 16 straight Big Ten titles, with Michigan being the last team to sit atop the league standings back in 1973, when University of Minnesota athletic director Rick Bay was head coach of the Wolverines. In addition, the Hawks reeled off a string of nine NCAA Championships from 1978-86 and had a 98 consecutive conference dual meet win streak dating back to the 1974 season snapped by Michigan last season.

National Rankings: A total of seven Hawkeyes appeared in the most recent Amateur Wrestling News national rankings. Senior Steve Martin is No. 5 at 118, sophomore Terry Brands is No. 5 at 126, sophomore Tom Brands is No. 2 at 134, freshman Troy Steiner is No. 11 at 142, sophomore Doug Streicher is No. 8 at 150, sophomore Mark Reiland is No. 6 at 167 and senior Brooks Simpson is No. 4 at 190. The Golden Gophers will counter with some outstanding individuals of their own. Marty Morgan is undefeated and ranked No. 2 at 177, senior Chuck Heise (Mosinee, WI) is No. 5 at 142 and senior Jeff Balcom (Fairmont, MN) is No. 5 at heavyweight. In addition, Dave Zuniga, who became eligible to compete second semester after his transfer, should appear in the next rankings after having already defeated the top-ranked 134-pounder in the country.

The Feature: The match between Iowa's Tom Brands and Minnesota's Dave Zuniga at 134 pounds should be a real barnburner. With Brands ranked No. 2 in the country and Zuniga standing undefeated and having already dismantled the No. 1 ranked competitor, that match will most likely be for the No. 1 ranking. The two met back on November 24 in the 134-pound final at the Northern Open in

Madison, WI, with Brands scoring a 5-1 victory over Zuniga, who was wrestling unattached due to his transfer from Utah State.

Last Year: A year ago, the host Hawkeyes scored a thrilling 22-17 victory over the Golden Gophers in a contest that went right down to the heavyweight match. The Hawks went on to win the Big Ten title and finish sixth at the NCAA Championships, while the Golden Gophers were second in the Big Ten and seventh at the NCAA's.

The Coaches: Iowa head coach, Dan Gable, and Minnesota head coach, J Robinson, are certainly no strangers to each other. Prior to taking over the reins of the Minnesota program, Robinson was a graduate assistant coach at Iowa from 1973-76, before serving as the top assistant to Gable from 1976-83. During the 1983-84 season, Robinson took over as interim head coach of the Hawkeyes and directed the Hawks to their seventh straight NCAA and eighth straight Big Ten titles, after registering an undefeated dual meet season. In his fourth season at Minnesota, he has been the guiding force behind Minnesota's resurgence on the national collegiate wrestling scene and was honored as the 1989 Big Ten Coach of the Year. In his 14th season at Iowa, Gable has charted a 237-15-2 career record (.937 winning percentage), including an 85-1 mark in Big Ten action. He has never lost a Big Ten title during his tenure in Iowa City.

The Series: Iowa holds a 48-14-1 advantage in the series, including 15 straight over the Golden Gophers. The last Minnesota victory dates back to the 1973 season when they scored an 18-16 win in Iowa City on January 20, 1973.

National Rankings: The Golden Gophers remained in the No. 11 spot in the latest Amateur Wrestling News national poll. Sophomore Chris Short (Inver Grove Heights, MN), Morgan, Heise, and Balcom also appeared in the individual rankings as well.

BASEBALL OPENS IN TUCSON SAT/SUN/MON

Minneapolis, MN---Head coach John Anderson begins his 9th season at Minnesota this weekend when the baseball Gophers travel to Tucson to meet the U. of Arizona in single games Saturday, Sunday and Monday.

In his eight seasons at Minnesota, Anderson's teams have presented him with a record of 269-180-2 for all games. His Big Ten record is 94-54 which includes championships in 1982, 1985 and 1988. He is still, at age 34, the youngest head coach in Big Ten baseball, and one of the youngest in the nation among NCAA Division I schools.

A combination of veteran position stars combined with a youthful pitching staff is the key to Minnesota's 1990 hopes. "We return our entire infield from last year's team which was 31-22-1," Anderson informed us. "Pitching, as is the case most every year, supplies the biggest question marks.

"We believe the talent and arms are there for us to be more than just competitive on the mound. Granted, we must replace 10 wins from last year's senior pitchers who have departed, but we just may have in some of our newer candidates the pop to do it.

"Whatever the pitching results, I know we'll score runs with the veteran hitters we have coming back. It could be some kind of interesting season, if you like to see high scoring games, that is."

Leading Minnesota at the plate will be two talented players who were standouts for U.S. National Teams last summer and fall. Junior catcher Dan Wilson (Barrington, IL) and sophomore shortstop Brent Gates (Grandville, MI) are expected to be the team leaders both offensively and defensively.

Wilson was named to just about every pre-season All-America first team this season, while Gates was a member of the 1989 All-America freshman team as selected by BASEBALL AMERICA.

Another giant key for the Gophers is the double play combination of Gates and senior second baseman Brian Raabe (New Ulm). Raabe has only made a handful of errors in three seasons and owns a .342 career bat mark.

There are, of course, several others who are expected to come to the front for the Gophers this season. In most cases, who wins which job will be determined by performances leading up to the Big Ten schedule.

Anderson is expected to pencil in the following starting lineup this Saturday when the Gophers play the nationally ranked Wildcats at 1 p.m. (with last year's averages included):

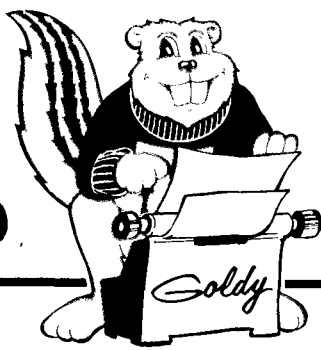

The basketball Gophers then receive their first weekend off from the Big Ten cage race returning to action Thursday, February 8 at Illinois.



GOLDEN GOPHER CAGERS TO INVADE MICHIGAN STATE

After two straight victories at home, the University of Minnesota basketball team packs its bags again this week to head for Michigan State University where it will take on the Spartans in a Big Ten Conference assignment at 7:05 p.m. (EST).

That confrontation, in Michigan State's new Breslin Center, will mark the 76th meeting between the Spartans and the Golden Gophers. Minnesota will take an edge of 44-31 in the series into Thursday's game.

The two clubs split a year ago, Minnesota winning at home in Williams Arena 77-61 but Michigan State prevailing in East Lansing 73-64 despite a 28-point explosion by Willie Burton.

In addition to the 13-victory edge in the series, Minnesota leads in wins recorded in Minneapolis 29-10. However, Michigan State leads in games played in East Lansing 21-15. The Golden Gophers have not won there since recording a 59-56 verdict there during the 1987-88 campaign. And Thursday's shootout will be in a new facility.

Michigan State will come into Thursday's game with an

overall record of 16-4 and a Big Ten mark of 5-2 which earns the Spartans sole possession of third place in the current standings.

Coach Clem Haskins' charges will go into the game with an overall record of 14-4 and a conference log of 5-3.....good for a fourth-place tie with Illinois as the week began.....after whipping Iowa 84-72 and Indiana 108-89 in Big Ten action last week.

"Those were great wins for us," Coach Haskins agreed, "Especially that one Sunday over Indiana. We feel that our program has made great progress, and that we now have a stable program. The win over Indiana helps strengthen that belief."

There were several keys to both Minnesota wins. One was balanced scoring, another was the contributions made by the Golden Gopher bench, the third was excellent shooting, and the fourth solid defense.

Against Iowa, four players finished in double figures as Willie Burton had 21, Melvin Newbern 17, Richard Coffey 14 and Kevin Lynch 12. Against Indiana, the balance was even more significant as Burton had 22, Lynch and Walter Bond 17 each, Jim Shikenjanski 16, and

Coffey and Newbern 14 each.

Connell Lewis was an eye-lash away with eight, and that was part of the bench contribution mentioned by Coach Haskins. The Golden Gophers shot 56% against the Hoosiers, they were five-of-11 from three-point land and they converted 35-of-40 free throw.

The defense, which chalked up 11 steals against Iowa and eight more against Indiana, was just as impressive. "Great defense got us going," Haskins stressed. "It was the defensive pressure that made the difference."

But that was at "friendly" Williams Arena. Now it is back on the road where Minnesota has recorded only three wins this season, none in Big Ten play. The Golden Gophers are 3-4 on the road and would like to unload the monkey with a victory at Michigan State Thursday night.

ICERS SPLIT, END WIN STREAK, HOST ALASKA-ANCHORAGE F/S

Minneapolis, MN---As has been said, all good things must eventually come to an end.

The North Dakota Sioux made certain of the above adage when they administered a 7-4 defeat to the Minnesota hockey Gophers last Saturday at Mariucci Arena. The win ended an 8-game Gopher win streak for all games, and also ended a 12-game streak counting just WCHA games dating back to a 3-2 overtime win at Colorado College on Nov. 18, 1989.

The latter streak tied a school record set in 1953-54 when Minnesota played in the old WIHL (Western Intercollegiate Hockey League), forerunner to the present WCHA.

But not all was lost on the weekend. Senior co-captain **Peter Hankinson (Edina)**, fast becoming a prime candidate for both **All-American** and **Hobey Baker Award** honors, scored with just 11 seconds remaining in the game Friday to give his teammates a 5-4 victory over the Sioux.

Hankinson converted a rebound off a shot by defenseman **Tom Pederson (Bloomington)** which marked the third goal scored in the final 3 1/2 minutes of the game. Prior to that both teams had been blanked by the goalies from the middle of the second period when Neil Eisenhut of ND scored to tie the game 3-3.

Ken Gernander (Coleraine) gave Minnesota a short-lived 4-3 lead with a rebound goal at 16:36 of the third period only to see North Dakota's Dixon Ward tie it up again on an excellent solo effort at 17:58. That set the scene for Hankinson's dramatic game-winner.

Linemates **Dean Williamson (Edina)** and **Brett Strot (Brooklyn Park)**, along with wing **Cory Laylin (St. Cloud)**, scored the other Gopher goals. Freshman **Tom Newman (Blaine)** played one of his finest games of his rookie season in the UM nets making 26 saves.

Saturday, however, was a different story. Although Laylin opened the scoring for Minnesota with his second of three weekend goals early in the first period, North Dakota came back with three straight to take a 3-1 period lead.

The Sioux made it 4-1 early in the second period before **Ben Hankinson (Edina)** and **Scott Bloom (Burnsville)** scored back to back narrowing North Dakota's lead to one goal. But the Sioux scored three of the next four goals to end Minnesota's hopes of extending its dual win streaks.

The main Sioux culprit was winger **Dane Jackson** who scored four goals. His final tally was a 150-footer into an empty Minnesota net after its goalie had been pulled.

Scott Nelson (Grand Rapids) and Newman split the goal tending duties with each finding trouble stopping Jackson and Co. Said Gopher head coach **Doug Woog** following the outstanding series, "North Dakota is the best skating team we have played all year. They really seem to have found themselves after a rather slow start."

Three Gopher regulars missed the weekend series with assorted ills. Senior co-captain and defenseman **Lance Pitlick (New Hope)** is only given even odds of being back in time for the playoffs. One week ago Pitlick underwent surgery for torn abdominal muscles.

Two freshmen wings were also missing. **Trent Klatt (Osseo)** is expected to be out 3-5 weeks with torn ankle ligaments, while **John Brill (Grand Rapids)** could be back next week for games at Northern Michigan after a shoulder separation mends.

Minnesota (19-8-2, 15-5-2) takes time off from the WCHA this weekend by playing host to Alaska-Anchorage in 7:05 p.m. games Friday and Saturday at Mariucci Arena. The Seawolves are 18-5-1 for the season, and are undefeated in their last nine outings, including a pair of home wins against Maine.

12TH-RANKED WRESTLERS FALL TO 3RD-RANKED IOWA; FINISH SECOND AT COWBOY CLASSIC (9-4/1-2 Big Ten)

The 12th-ranked Golden Gopher wrestling team dropped a 31-7 decision to 3rd-ranked Iowa in Williams Arena last Wednesday and then finished second behind defending NCAA champion and top-ranked Oklahoma State at the Cowboy Classic held on Friday and Saturday in Stillwater, OK.

Powerful Iowa: Iowa has won 16 straight Big Ten Conference titles and they showed why once again last Wednesday in Williams Arena. Before a season-high crowd of 2,754, the Hawkeyes, with 9 of their 10 competitors appearing in the top eight of the most recent national poll, won 8 of the 10 matches on the evening en route to the victory.

Battle for No. 1: In what was billed as the battle for No. 1, Iowa sophomore Tom Brands scored a thrilling 5-3 victory over Minnesota junior **Dave Zuniga** (Worland, WY) at 134 pounds. Brands is ranked No. 1 in the weight class, while Zuniga, ranked No. 5, had recently beaten the No. 2 ranked performer in the division. Rest assured those two will undoubtedly meet each other down the road at the Big Ten and NCAA Championships.

Tough Competition: There were two other battles between nationally-ranked competitors on Wednesday. Minnesota senior **Chuck Heise** (Mosinee, WI), ranked No. 5, scored a 3-2 victory over Iowa freshman Troy Steiner, ranked No. 6 at 142 pounds. Iowa freshman John Oostendorp, ranked No. 6, closed out the meet with a 12-7 victory over Minnesota senior **Jeff Balcom** (Fairmont, MN), ranked No. 4, at heavyweight. Golden Gopher junior **Marty Morgan** (Bloomington, MN) topped Iowa's Don Finch 10-1 at 177 pounds for Minnesota's other victory on the evening.

Zuniga Leads the Way: Dave Zuniga scored a hard-fought 7-6 victory over Chris Owens from Oklahoma State in the 134-pound final. The junior, who transferred from Utah State to Minnesota, is now 15-1 on the season.

The Battle for No. 1...Part II: As expected, the featured match of the Cowboy Wrestling Classic turned out to be the 177 pound final that pitted top-ranked Chris Barnes from Oklahoma State against Marty Morgan. Barnes registered a 4-1 victory over Morgan, who lost his first match of the season and is now 28-1 with a team-high 18 pins.

Morgan Honored: The accolades continue to roll in for the red-hot Marty Morgan. He has been selected to compete in the East-West All-Star Wrestling Classic to be held on February 5 in Portland, OR, where he will have a rematch with Chris Barnes from Oklahoma State. Honored as the Big Ten Conference Wrestling Athlete of the Month for December, he has been simply sensational for the Golden Gophers. In addition to registering a 28-1 overall record, he has registered 18 pins this season, just one shy of the single-season school record of 19 set by Mike McArthur during the 1976-77 season. He has won individual titles at the Bison Open (Fargo, ND), Nebraska-Omaha Open, Northern Open (Madison, WI) and the Oregon Classic (Portland, OR). A year ago he charted an overall record of 32-10 with 12 pins, finishing sixth at the NCAA Championships at 167 pounds to earn All-America honors. He transferred to Gold Country from North Dakota State University where he won the NCAA Division II national title at 167 pounds in 1987 for the Bison.

Taking a Break: The Golden Gophers next action will be on February 9 when they host 15th-ranked Michigan in a Big Ten Conference dual meet in Williams Arena at 7:30 p.m. It will be the first of a three-match homestand that also includes meets against Michigan State on February 10 at 7:30

p.m. in Williams Arena and the home finale on February 14 at 7:30 p.m. at the National Sports Center in Blaine against 4th-ranked Nebraska.

National Rankings: The Golden Gophers have been ranked 12th in the latest Amateur Wrestling News national poll, released on January 24. Zuniga, Heise, Morgan and Balcom also appeared in the individual rankings as well.

On Friday, head coach Dennis Dale's squad disposed of Division III national power St. Olaf 153.5-77.5, before coming back on Saturday for a convincing 90-18 victory over Northwestern.

Double Trouble: Sophomore Sean Quackenbush (Rochester, MN) and freshman David Zarns (New Brighton, MN) each won a pair of individual events to pace the Golden Gophers to the Friday night win over the Oles. Quackenbush took the 200 freestyle in 1:43.56 and then the 100 butterfly in an outstanding time of 49.74. Zarns won the one meter diving event with a score of 283.73 and then took the three meter board with a 304.65. The Golden Gophers won 12 of the 13 events in the meet.

Picture Perfect: The Golden Gophers captured all 13 events en route to the rout of the Wildcats on Saturday in Big Ten Conference action. Senior tri-captain Bill Asmus (Lakeville, MN) was the lone double individual event winner on the day, taking the 50 (21.52) and 100 (47.19) freestyle events. Fellow senior tri-captain, Andrew Lorys (Portland, OR), turned in a sensational winning time of 9:24.16 in the 1000 freestyle.

The Golden Gophers won four events en route to a runner-up finish in the final team standings at the Marathon Sports Invitational held last Saturday at the U of M Field House.

Looking Good: The Golden Gophers opened Saturday's meet in style by winning the 4 x 800 meter relay in a time of 7:40.00 on the strength of senior **Carson Hoefft's** (Plymouth, MN) 1:53-plus anchor leg. Rice was a close second in 7:40.40, with Manitoba right there as well in third at 7:40.90. Senior **Matt Ferry** (Maple Grove, MN) led off the relay, followed by senior **Dan Hebl** (Menomonie, WI), sophomore **Sean Fitzgerald** (Ottawa, Ontario, Canada) and the Hoefft. Hebl came back later in the meet to win the mile. Behind an explosive final 200 meters, he hit the tape with a winning clocking of 4:16.10. Senior **Jeff Svedahl** (Cloquet, MN) was equally impressive en route to winning the 3000 meters with a time of 8:30.22 and sophomore **Mark Lacy** (Oak Brook, IL) captured the shot put with a personal-best throw of 54'8 1/2". Freshman high jumper **Chris Murrell** (Grand Island, NE) opened his career with a bang, finishing second in the event with a leap of 6'11 3/4". Former Golden Gopher great **Mike Vukovich** won the competition with a new Field House and meet record jump of 7'3 3/4".

Host Triangular on Saturday: The Golden Gophers will host Big Ten rival Iowa and Northern Iowa in a triangular at the U of M Field House on Saturday beginning at 1:00 p.m. A year ago, head coach **Roy Griak's** squad dropped a 75-47 decision to the Hawkeyes on February 4. The Golden Gophers went on the finish ninth at the Big Ten Indoor Championships, while the Hawks ended up seventh. Leading the Hawks will be long/triple jumper **Paul Jones**. He qualified for the 1989 NCAA Outdoor Championships in the long jump.

UIHLEIN ADVANCES TO THE FINALS OF THE AT&T SPARTAN INVITATIONAL; NETTERS HOST BALL STATE SUNDAY (3-1/0-0 Big Ten)

University of Minnesota sophomore **Brian Uihlein** (Lake Forest, IL) advanced to the finals of the AT&T Spartan Invitational held Saturday thru Monday in East Lansing, MI, before dropping a 6-3,6-3 decision to Northwestern's Todd Martin.

This single-elimination tournament was held in an effort to recognize a Big Ten individual champion. The present dual meet championship format was started in 1985, while individual championships were discontinued following the 1985 season.

Uihlein Shines: Brian Uihlein, seeded 11th in the tournament, surprised many of the experts by advancing to the final of the 64-player tournament. On Sunday, he scored a big 6-1,6-4 straight-set victory over Wisconsin's Jack Waite, seeded fourth and ranked No. 19 in the latest national rankings, in the round of 16, before topping fifth-seeded Thomas Adler from Iowa 6-3,6-2 in the quarterfinals later that day. He then defeated 10th-seeded Ty Tucker from Ohio State in Monday's semifinals 7-5,6-2, before running into the top-seeded Martin, ranked No. 4 in the country. Senior **Rafer Leach** (Lexington, KY) advanced to Monday's consolation semifinals, where he fell 7-6 (5),6-2 to Hector Ortiz from Illinois.

Ball State: Head Coach David Geatz's Golden Gophers, ranked No. 2 in the pre-season Region IV rankings, will host Ball State at the 98th Street Racquet Club on Sunday at 10:00 a.m. The Cardinals are ranked No. 3 in the region and have won six straight Mid-American Conference (MAC) team titles. Three Ball State individuals appeared in the individual Region IV rankings. Senior John Noble, the defending MAC #1 singles champion, is listed at No. 5, sophomore Dan Kronauge is No. 17 and junior Brian DeVirgilio is No. 19. For the Golden Gophers, junior **Kevin Werwie** (Sheboygan, WI) is No. 12, Brian Uihlein is No. 15 and freshman **Rick Naumoff** (Columbus, OH) is No. 30.

Pre-Season National Rankings: The Golden Gophers, who finished 23rd in the final national rankings last season, open up the 1990 season in a four-way logjam in the 25th spot.

ROLEX NATIONAL INDOOR INTERCOLLEGIATE TENNIS CHAMPIONSHIPS

For the third consecutive year, the nation's finest men's and women's collegiate tennis players will be coming to the Twin Cities to compete in the Rolex National Indoor Intercollegiate Tennis Championships.

The Rolex National Small College Championships will be played at the 98th Street Racquet, Swim & Health Club in Bloomington on February 6-7. The major college portion of the tournament will be held at the same site on February 8-9, before switching to the 494/Crosstown Racquet, Swim & Health Club in Eden Prairie for the semifinals and finals on February 10-11.

Included in the men's 32-player singles field are 12 of the top 13 players in the first Volvo Tennis/Collegiate Rankings of 1990, including top-ranked Al Parker from Georgia. Overall, 25 of the 31 Division I players are ranked in the Top 50, while four of the unranked players were in the top seven of the preseason rankings back in October. The 16-team doubles field includes seven of the top nine teams from the first Volvo Tennis/Collegiate Rankings of 1990, headlined by California's top-ranked twosome of Doug Eisenman and Matt Lucena. For the Golden Gophers, senior Rafer Leach will play singles and junior Kevin Werwie and sophomore Brian Uihlein will compete in the doubles portion of the tournament. A year ago, Brian and Duke Uihlein thrilled local fans by advancing all the way to the semifinals of the tournament before falling to the eventual champions in a three-set match.

"It's a great opportunity not only for our players to go up against the nation's best, but also to showcase Minnesota tennis," said David Geatz, head coach of the defending Big Ten champion Golden Gophers. "With the tremendous community support and the beautiful tennis facilities we have here, the rest of the country gets to see that tennis is indeed alive and thriving in Minnesota."

Included in the women's 32-player singles field are 17 of the top 20 players in the first Volvo Tennis/Collegiate Rankings of 1990, with top-ranked and defending NCAA champion Sandra Birch from Stanford headlining the field. Overall, 28 of the 31 Division I players are ranked in the Top 50. The 16-team doubles field includes 10 of the top 12 teams from the first Volvo Tennis/Collegiate Rankings of 1990. Sophomores Jennie Moe and Sofie Olsson will compete in the tournament for the Golden Gophers. Moe is a former Minnesota State High School Class "AA" singles and doubles champion for nearby Edina High School.

"This is a great opportunity for our program and our players to play in this tournament against some of the top competition in the country," said head Golden Gophers women's coach David Creighton. "It's really exciting to see it in our hometown, especially since these are the best collegiate, and maybe the best amateur players around."

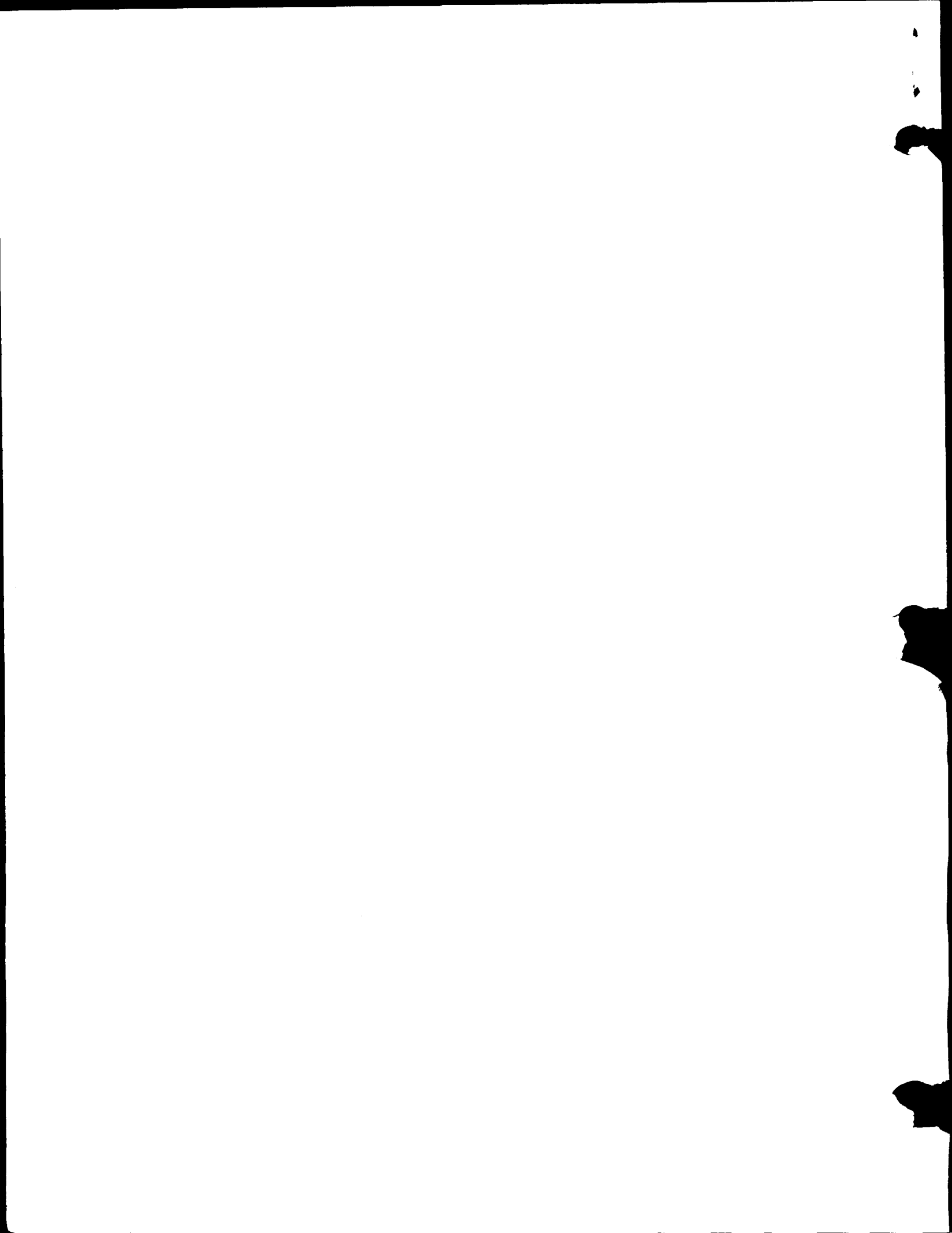

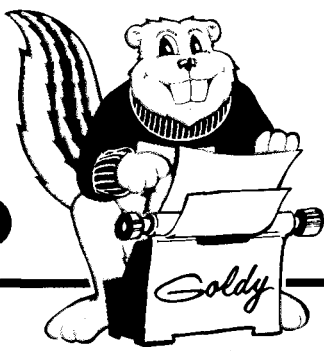

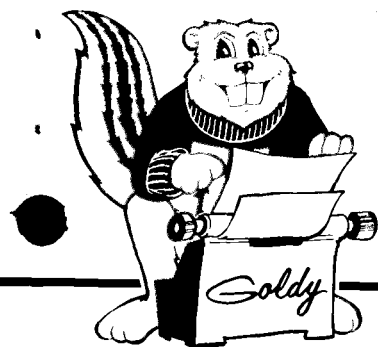

MORGAN & ROETHLISBERGER HONORED AS BIG TEN CONFERENCE ATHLETES-OF-THE-MONTH

Junior wrestler, Marty Morgan (Bloomington, MN), and freshman gymnast, John Roethlisberger (Afton, MN), have been honored as the Big Ten Conference Athletes-of-the-Month in their respective sports for the month of December.

Morgan, ranked No. 2 in the nation by Amateur Wrestling News at 177 pounds, has been unstoppable thus far this season for the Golden Gophers. He has registered a sparkling 22-0 record with 16 pins and has won individual titles at the Bison Open (Fargo, ND), Nebraska-Omaha Open, Northern Open (Madison, WI) and the Oregon Classic (Portland, OR). A year ago he charted an overall record of 32-10 with 12 pins, finishing sixth at the NCAA Championships at 167 pounds to earn All-America honors. He transferred to Gold Country from North Dakota State University where he won the NCAA Division II national title at 167 pounds in 1987.

John Roethlisberger, son of Golden Gopher head coach Fred Roethlisberger, finished third at the U.S. Winter National Championships held on Dec. 1-2 in Colorado Springs, CO to qualify for the U.S. National Team. Sitting eighth after the first day, he moved up with a strong performance on the final day to finish third with a score of 108.78. He also won the all-around title at the Wisconsin Open held on Nov. 17-18.

The basketball Gophers then receive their first weekend off from the Big Ten cage race returning to action Thursday, February 8 at Illinois.



GOLDEN GOPHER CAGERS TO INVADE MICHIGAN STATE

After two straight victories at home, the University of Minnesota basketball team packs its bags again this week to head for Michigan State University where it will take on the Spartans in a Big Ten Conference assignment at 7:05 p.m. (EST).

That confrontation, in Michigan State's new Breslin Center, will mark the 76th meeting between the Spartans and the Golden Gophers. Minnesota will take an edge of 44-31 in the series into Thursday's game.

The two clubs split a year ago, Minnesota winning at home in Williams Arena 77-61 but Michigan State prevailing in East Lansing 73-64 despite a 28-point explosion by Willie Burton.

In addition to the 13-victory edge in the series, Minnesota leads in wins recorded in Minneapolis 29-10. However, Michigan State leads in games played in East Lansing 21-15. The Golden Gophers have not won there since recording a 59-56 verdict there during the 1987-88 campaign. And Thursday's shootout will be in a new facility.

Michigan State will come into Thursday's game with an

overall record of 16-4 and a Big Ten mark of 5-2 which earns the Spartans sole possession of third place in the current standings.

Coach Clem Haskins' charges will go into the game with an overall record of 14-4 and a conference log of 5-3.....good for a fourth-place tie with Illinois as the week began.....after whipping Iowa 84-72 and Indiana 108-89 in Big Ten action last week.

"Those were great wins for us," Coach Haskins agreed, "Especially that one Sunday over Indiana. We feel that our program has made great progress, and that we now have a stable program. The win over Indiana helps strengthen that belief."

There were several keys to both Minnesota wins. One was balanced scoring, another was the contributions made by the Golden Gopher bench, the third was excellent shooting, and the fourth solid defense.

Against Iowa, four players finished in double figures as Willie Burton had 21, Melvin Newbern 17, Richard Coffey 14 and Kevin Lynch 12. Against Indiana, the balance was even more significant as Burton had 22, Lynch and Walter Bond 17 each, Jim Shikenjanski 16, and

Coffey and Newbern 14 each.

Connell Lewis was an eyelash away with eight, and that was part of the bench contribution mentioned by Coach Haskins. The Golden Gophers shot 56% against the Hoosiers, they were five-of-11 from three-point land and they converted 35-of-40 free throw.

The defense, which chalked up 11 steals against Iowa and eight more against Indiana, was just as impressive. "Great defense got us going," Haskins stressed. "It was the defensive pressure that made the difference.

But that was at "friendly" Williams Arena. Now it is back on the road where Minnesota has recorded only three wins this season, none in Big Ten play. The Golden Gophers are 3-4 on the road and would like to unload the monkey with a victory at Michigan State Thursday night.

ICERS SPLIT, END WIN STREAK, HOST ALASKA-ANCHORAGE F/S

Minneapolis, MN---As has been said, all good things must eventually come to an end.

The North Dakota Sioux made certain of the above adage when they administered a 7-4 defeat to the Minnesota hockey Gophers last Saturday at Mariucci Arena. The win ended an 8-game Gopher win streak for all games, and also ended a 12-game streak counting just WCHA games dating back to a 3-2 overtime win at Colorado College on Nov. 18, 1989.

The latter streak tied a school record set in 1953-54 when Minnesota played in the old WIHL (Western Intercollegiate Hockey League), forerunner to the present WCHA.

But not all was lost on the weekend. Senior co-captain **Peter Hankinson (Edina)**, fast becoming a prime candidate for both **All-American** and **Hobey Baker Award** honors, scored with just 11 seconds remaining in the game Friday to give his teammates a 5-4 victory over the Sioux.

Hankinson converted a rebound off a shot by defenseman **Tom Pederson (Bloomington)** which marked the third goal scored in the final 3 1/2 minutes of the game. Prior to that both teams had been blanked by the goalies from the middle of the second period when Neil Eisenhut of ND scored to tie the game 3-3.

Ken Gernander (Coleraine) gave Minnesota a short-lived 4-3 lead with a rebound goal at 16:36 of the third period only to see North Dakota's Dixon Ward tie it up again on an excellent solo effort at 17:58. That set the scene for Hankinson's dramatic game-winner.

Linemates **Dean Williamson (Edina)** and **Brett Strot (Brooklyn Park)**, along with wing **Cory Laylin (St. Cloud)**, scored the other Gopher goals. Freshman **Tom Newman (Blaine)** played one of his finest games of his rookie season in the UM nets making 26 saves.

Saturday, however, was a different story. Although Laylin opened the scoring for Minnesota with his second of three weekend goals early in the first period, North Dakota came back with three straight to take a 3-1 period lead.

The Sioux made it 4-1 early in the second period before **Ben Hankinson (Edina)** and **Scott Bloom (Burnsville)** scored back to back narrowing North Dakota's lead to one goal. But the Sioux scored three of the next four goals to end Minnesota's hopes of extending its dual win streaks.

The main Sioux culprit was winger **Dane Jackson** who scored four goals. His final tally was a 150-footer into an empty Minnesota net after its goalie had been pulled.

Scott Nelson (Grand Rapids) and **Newman** split the goal tending duties with each finding trouble stopping Jackson and Co. Said Gopher head coach **Doug Woog** following the outstanding series, "North Dakota is the best skating team we have played all year. They really seem to have found themselves after a rather slow start."

Three Gopher regulars missed the weekend series with assorted ills. Senior co-captain and defenseman **Lance Pitlick (New Hope)** is only given even odds of being back in time for the playoffs. One week ago Pitlick underwent surgery for torn abdominal muscles.

Two freshmen wings were also missing. **Trent Klatt (Osseo)** is expected to be out 3-5 weeks with torn ankle ligaments, while **John Brill (Grand Rapids)** could be back next week for games at Northern Michigan after a shoulder separation mends.

Minnesota (19-8-2, 15-5-2) takes time off from the WCHA this weekend by playing host to Alaska-Anchorage in 7:05 p.m. games Friday and Saturday at Mariucci Arena. The Seawolves are 18-5-1 for the season, and are undefeated in their last nine outings, including a pair of home wins against Maine.

12TH-RANKED WRESTLERS FALL TO 3RD-RANKED IOWA; FINISH SECOND AT COWBOY CLASSIC (9-4/1-2 Big Ten)

The 12th-ranked Golden Gopher wrestling team dropped a 31-7 decision to 3rd-ranked Iowa in Williams Arena last Wednesday and then finished second behind defending NCAA champion and top-ranked Oklahoma State at the Cowboy Classic held on Friday and Saturday in Stillwater, OK.

Powerful Iowa: Iowa has won 16 straight Big Ten Conference titles and they showed why once again last Wednesday in Williams Arena. Before a season-high crowd of 2,754, the Hawkeyes, with 9 of their 10 competitors appearing in the top eight of the most recent national poll, won 8 of the 10 matches on the evening en route to the victory.

Battle for No. 1: In what was billed as the battle for No. 1, Iowa sophomore Tom Brands scored a thrilling 5-3 victory over Minnesota junior **Dave Zuniga** (Worland, WY) at 134 pounds. Brands is ranked No. 1 in the weight class, while Zuniga, ranked No. 5, had recently beaten the No. 2 ranked performer in the division. Rest assured those two will undoubtedly meet each other down the road at the Big Ten and NCAA Championships.

Tough Competition: There were two other battles between nationally-ranked competitors on Wednesday. Minnesota senior **Chuck Heise** (Mosinee, WI), ranked No. 5, scored a 3-2 victory over Iowa freshman Troy Steiner, ranked No. 6 at 142 pounds. Iowa freshman John Oostendorp, ranked No. 6, closed out the meet with a 12-7 victory over Minnesota senior **Jeff Balcom** (Fairmont, MN), ranked No. 4, at heavyweight. Golden Gopher junior **Marty Morgan** (Bloomington, MN) topped Iowa's Don Finch 10-1 at 177 pounds for Minnesota's other victory on the evening.

Zuniga Leads the Way: Dave Zuniga scored a hard-fought 7-6 victory over Chris Owens from Oklahoma State in the 134-pound final. The junior, who transferred from Utah State to Minnesota, is now 15-1 on the season.

The Battle for No. 1...Part II: As expected, the featured match of the Cowboy Wrestling Classic turned out to be the 177 pound final that pitted top-ranked Chris Barnes from Oklahoma State against Marty Morgan. Barnes registered a 4-1 victory over Morgan, who lost his first match of the season and is now 28-1 with a team-high 18 pins.

Morgan Honored: The accolades continue to roll in for the red-hot Marty Morgan. He has been selected to compete in the East-West All-Star Wrestling Classic to be held on February 5 in Portland, OR, where he will have a rematch with Chris Barnes from Oklahoma State. Honored as the Big Ten Conference Wrestling Athlete of the Month for December, he has been simply sensational for the Golden Gophers. In addition to registering a 28-1 overall record, he has registered 18 pins this season, just one shy of the single-season school record of 19 set by Mike McArthur during the 1976-77 season. He has won individual titles at the Bison Open (Fargo, ND), Nebraska-Omaha Open, Northern Open (Madison, WI) and the Oregon Classic (Portland, OR). A year ago he charted an overall record of 32-10 with 12 pins, finishing sixth at the NCAA Championships at 167 pounds to earn All-America honors. He transferred to Gold Country from North Dakota State University where he won the NCAA Division II national title at 167 pounds in 1987 for the Bison.

Taking a Break: The Golden Gophers next action will be on February 9 when they host 15th-ranked Michigan in a Big Ten Conference dual meet in Williams Arena at 7:30 p.m. It will be the first of a three-match homestand that also includes meets against Michigan State on February 10 at 7:30

p.m. in Williams Arena and the home finale on February 14 at 7:30 p.m. at the National Sports Center in Blaine against 4th-ranked Nebraska.

National Rankings: The Golden Gophers have been ranked 12th in the latest Amateur Wrestling News national poll, released on January 24. Zuniga, Heise, Morgan and Balcom also appeared in the individual rankings as well.

On Friday, head coach Dennis Dale's squad disposed of Division III national power St. Olaf 153.5-77.5, before coming back on Saturday for a convincing 90-18 victory over Northwestern.

Double Trouble: Sophomore Sean Quackenbush (Rochester, MN) and freshman David Zarns (New Brighton, MN) each won a pair of individual events to pace the Golden Gophers to the Friday night win over the Oles. Quackenbush took the 200 freestyle in 1:43.56 and then the 100 butterfly in an outstanding time of 49.74. Zarns won the one meter diving event with a score of 283.73 and then took the three meter board with a 304.65. The Golden Gophers won 12 of the 13 events in the meet.

Picture Perfect: The Golden Gophers captured all 13 events en route to the rout of the Wildcats on Saturday in Big Ten Conference action. Senior tri-captain Bill Asmus (Lakeville, MN) was the lone double individual event winner on the day, taking the 50 (21.52) and 100 (47.19) freestyle events. Fellow senior tri-captain, Andrew Lorys (Portland, OR), turned in a sensational winning time of 9:24.16 in the 1000 freestyle.

Big, Big Ten Weekend: On Saturday in Champaign, IL, the Golden Gophers take to the pool against host Illinois, Wisconsin and Purdue in what should be an interesting competition indeed. The Golden Gophers finished third at the Big Ten Championships a year ago with 466.5 points, Wisconsin was fifth with 337 points, Purdue was eighth with 147 and Illinois ninth with 136. Rice was a close second in 7:40.40, with Manitoba right there as well in third at 7:40.90. Senior **Matt Ferry** (Maple Grove, MN) led off the relay, followed by senior **Dan Hebl** (Menomonie, WI), sophomore **Sean Fitzgerald** (Ottawa, Ontario, Canada) and the Hoeft. Hebl came back later in the meet to win the mile. Behind an explosive final 200 meters, he hit the tape with a winning clocking of 4:16.10. Senior **Jeff Svedahl** (Cloquet, MN) was equally impressive en route to winning the 3000 meters with a time of 8:30.22 and sophomore **Mark Lacy** (Oak Brook, IL) captured the shot put with a personal-best throw of 54'8 1/2". UIHLEIN ADVANCES TO THE FINALS OF THE AT&T SPARTAN INVITATIONAL; NETTERS HOST BALL STATE SUNDAY (3-1/0-0 Big Ten)

University of Minnesota sophomore **Brian Uihlein** (Lake Forest, IL) advanced to the finals of the AT&T Spartan Invitational held Saturday thru Monday in East Lansing, MI, before dropping a 6-3,6-3 decision to Northwestern's Todd Martin.

This single-elimination tournament was held in an effort to recognize a Big Ten individual champion. The present dual meet championship format was started in 1985, while individual championships were discontinued following the 1985 season.

Ball State: Head Coach David Geatz's Golden Gophers, ranked No. 2 in the pre-season Region IV rankings, will host Ball State at the 98th Street Racquet Club on Sunday at 10:00 a.m. The Cardinals are ranked No. 3 in the region and have won six straight Mid-American Conference (MAC) team titles. Three Ball State individuals appeared in the individual Region IV rankings. Senior John Noble, the defending MAC #1 singles champion, is listed at No. 5, sophomore Dan Kronauge is No. 17 and junior Brian DeVirgilio is No. 19. ROLEX NATIONAL INDOOR INTERCOLLEGIATE TENNIS CHAMPIONSHIPS

For the third consecutive year, the nation's finest men's and women's collegiate tennis players will be coming to the Twin Cities to compete in the Rolex National Indoor Intercollegiate Tennis Championships.

The Rolex National Small College Championships will be played at the 98th Street Racquet, Swim & Health Club in Bloomington on February 6-7. The major college portion of the tournament will be held at the same site on February 8-9, before switching to the 494/Crosstown Racquet, Swim & Health Club in Eden Prairie for the semifinals and finals on February 10-11.

Included in the men's 32-player singles field are 12 of the top 13 players in the first Volvo Tennis/Collegiate Rankings of 1990, including top-ranked Al Parker from Georgia. Overall, 25 of the 31 Division I players are ranked in the Top 50, while four of the unranked players were in the top seven of the preseason rankings back in October. The 16-team doubles field includes seven of the top nine teams from the first Volvo Tennis/Collegiate Rankings of 1990, headlined by California's top-ranked twosome of Doug Eisenman and Matt Lucena. For the Golden Gophers, senior Rafer Leach will play singles and junior Kevin Werwie and sophomore Brian Uihlein will compete in the doubles portion of the tournament. A year ago, Brian and Duke Uihlein thrilled local fans by advancing all the way to the semifinals of the tournament before falling to the eventual champions in a three-set match.

"It's a great opportunity not only for our players to go up against the nation's best, but also to showcase Minnesota tennis," said David Geatz, head coach of the defending Big Ten champion Golden Gophers. "With the tremendous community support and the beautiful tennis facilities we have here, the rest of the country gets to see that tennis is indeed alive and thriving in Minnesota."

Included in the women's 32-player singles field are 17 of the top 20 players in the first Volvo Tennis/Collegiate Rankings of 1990, with top-ranked and defending NCAA champion Sandra Birch from Stanford headlining the field. Overall, 28 of the 31 Division I players are ranked in the Top 50. The 16-team doubles field includes 10 of the top 12 teams from the first Volvo Tennis/Collegiate Rankings of 1990. Sophomores Jennie Moe and Sofie Olsson will compete in the tournament for the Golden Gophers. Moe is a former Minnesota State High School Class "AA" singles and doubles champion for nearby Edina High School.

"This is a great opportunity for our program and our players to play in this tournament against some of the top competition in the country," said head Golden Gophers women's coach David Creighton. "It's really exciting to see it in our hometown, especially since these are the best collegiate, and maybe the best amateur players around."

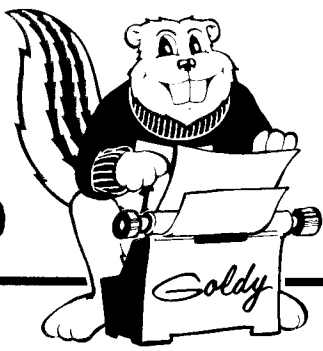

GOLDEN GOPHERS TO OPEN 2ND HALF OF CAGE SLATE

Minnesota's Golden Gophers will tip off the second half of the 1990 Big Ten Conference basketball schedule when invading Illinois for a crucial re-match with the Fighting Illini at 7:05 p.m. (CST) on Thursday.

It will be the second-straight road assignment for Coach Clem Haskins' contingent after last Thursday's stunning 79-74 victory at Michigan State, and it follows a weekend off for the U of M.

Haskins and his cagers welcomed the break. "With the number of games we've had in the past couple of weeks," he said, "the time off gave us a chance to get our minds and legs refreshed. Our players also had an opportunity to spend some time on their books."

After returning from Michigan State, Haskins gave his club Friday, and most of the remainder of the weekend, off. They returned to their regular practice routine on Monday and immediately began preparations for the Fighting Illini.

Earlier this season these same two clubs met in Wil-

liams Arena and the Golden Gophers prevailed 91-74 as Melvin Newbern scored 27 points and Richard Coffey grabbed 12 rebounds.

A year ago the two teams split honors, Minnesota winning at home 69-62 and the Fighting Illini finishing on top in Champaign 63-58. In the 138-game series, Illinois leads 85-53. In games played in Minneapolis, the Golden Gophers hold a 37-31 edge. In games played in Champaign, the Fighting Illini lead 53-15.

Illinois has beaten Minnesota 11 straight times in Champaign, Minnesota's last victory there coming by a 75-69 margin during the 1977-78 season.

Minnesota will take an overall record of 15-4 and a Big Ten mark of 6-3 into Thursday's shootout with the Fighting Illini. The Golden Gophers are 4-4 on the road this year, and that triumph at Michigan State last week was their first Big Ten win away from home this season.

"It was a great win for us," Haskins proclaimed. "It was tough right up until the final seconds. We won it because we made the big play(s) when

it counted, when we had to."

Haskins pointed to several factors that were keys for Minnesota in gaining the verdict. "We had balanced scoring (six Golden Gophers finished in double figures), our defense got us some turnovers and were able to capitalize on them, and we rebounded aggressively," he said.

The balance in the scoring was obvious. Walter Bond came off the bench and led the attack with 15. Melvin Newbern had 14, Kevin Lynch 13, Willie Burton and Jim Shikenjanski 12 each and Richard Coffey 11. Minnesota registered six steals and 13 assists, and Coffey paced the board work with nine rebounds.

But now comes the re-match with Illinois. "The first half of the Big Ten season is over," Haskins pointed out. "Now we want to get a few more wins and qualify for the NCAA tournament." One step at a time.

And the next step after the Fighting Illini at Illinois Thursday? Purdue at home Sunday!

STRETCH DRIVE BEGINS -- ICERS AT NMU F/S

Minneapolis, MN---After seeing its WCHA lead dwindle to just two points, the Minnesota hockey Gophers head out on the road this weekend.

With just six league games remaining, this week finds Minnesota (20-9-2, 15-5-2) heading into an arena when UM teams have found trouble winning. The Gophers play at fourth place Northern Michigan (16-15-1, 11-10-1) Friday and Saturday. Both 6:05 p.m. CST games will be carried locally by WAYL-980 AM radio.

Narrowing Minnesota's lead last week was streaking Wisconsin (24-8-0, 15-7-0). The Badgers swept Michigan Tech 5-4 and 7-2 at Tech's annual Winter Carnival series.

At the same time Minnesota was taking its last weekend off from league play. The Gophers posted a home split against the #1 independent in College hockey, Alaska-Anchorage. Minnesota won the first battle 9-5, but dropped Saturday's contest 4-3 in overtime.

Friday's game saw Minnesota play an uninspired first period and fell behind 2-0. Evidently head coach Doug Woog caught his team's attention during the intermission as the Gophers stormed back to outscore Anchorage 6-1 in the second period. Minnesota added three more goals in the final 20 minutes to secure its 20th win of the season. That marked the 13th consecutive year Minnesota has won at least 20 games.

Peter Hankinson and Dean Williamson, both Edina seniors, each scored two goals to lead the Gopher attack. Hankinson added two assists to up his team scoring lead to 49 points on 19 goals and 30 assists.

Luke Johnson (Osseo), Larry Olimb (Warroad), Cory Laylin (St. Cloud), Jason Miller (Bloomington) and Grant Bischoff (Grand Rapids) scored the other Minnesota goals. Freshman **Tom Newman (Blaine)** won his 11th game of the season in the Gopher nets.

The next night saw a vastly improved performance by the Seawolves who overcame Gopher leads of 1-0, 2-1 and 3-2. Johnson, **Ben Hankinson** and Olimb scored for Minnesota.

Anchorage tied the game 3-3 with a late third period goal before Cary Fisher scored from point blank range just 1:39 into overtime. Goalie **Scott Nelson (Grand Rapids)** took the loss as Minnesota dropped its first overtime decision in four tries.

The series, however, proved more costly to Minnesota than a non-conference loss. Miller, a junior center, suffered a hyperextended elbow Saturday and his status for the weekend series at Northern was unknown today.

Good news could come with the return of freshman wing **John Brill (Grand Rapids)**. Brill, who has been out the last four UM games with a shoulder injury, is hoped to be ready by Friday. Another rookie wing, **Trent Klatt (Osseo)**, has been out with an ankle injury since Jan. 19, but was scheduled to resume skating this week. It is hoped he can return to action in 2-3 weeks.

Minnesota skated to a 5-5 tie and an 11-4 victory against Northern Michigan back in November. Coach Woog owns an 11-3-2 win margin against Wildcat teams, but his Gopher squads have lost three times at the Marquette Arena.

GOLDEN GOPHER STUDENT-ATHLETES EXCEL IN COMPETITION...AND IN THE CLASSROOM

Senior punter Brent Herbel's selection to the first-team GTE/CoSIDA Academic All-America football team last fall climaxed the finest academic season in the history of the University of Minnesota men's athletic department.

Voted on by the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA), the award honors student-athletes for excellence both on the field and in the classroom. Herbel joins former Golden Gophers Barry Mayer (1970, running back), Bob Stein (1968, end), Frank Brixius (1960, tackle) and Bob Hobert (1956, tackle) as winners of the prestigious award.

Revealing the program's commitment to excellence both athletically and academically, the Golden Gophers had a total of 12 student-athletes earn Academic All-Big Ten honors last fall, which was more than any other school in the league. Head coach Roy Griak's cross country team, which placed third in the Big Ten Championships with five freshmen in the lineup, led the conference in the sport with six honorees. Seniors Todd Beetcher, Dan Hebl and Jeff Svedahl, junior Keith Eidman, and sophomores Sean Fitzgerald and Chris Schmid received the distinction.

The Golden Gopher football squad, which wrapped up their third winning regular season in the past four years with a 6-5 mark last fall, had a team-record six student-athletes receive the award. Seniors Pat Cummings, Dan Liimatta and Jon Melander, along with sophomores Scott Schaffner and Joel Staats, joined Herbel on the team.

In the classroom, student-athletes passed an average of 13.4 credits last fall which is a highwater mark for the men's athletic department. A total of 33 percent of the student-athletes achieved a 3.0 grade-point average or better during the quarter, which ties an all-time high. In fact, 16 student-athletes recorded a perfect 4.0 in the classroom.

"I attribute that success to a lot of hard work, and a reorganizing of priorities certainly first and foremost by the student-athletes themselves, the coaches and the academic advisors," said Elayne Donahue, Director of Academic Counseling.

In a feat unmatched by any other athletic program in the country, seven University of Minnesota men's athletic teams were nationally-ranked as of February 2. Headlined by head coach Fred Roethlisberger's top-ranked gymnastics team, hockey (3), baseball (12), wrestling (12), swimming & diving (14), basketball (19) and tennis (25) all appeared in the national rankings of their respective sports.

Donahue referred to a specific example to show the commitment to both athletics and academics. Following the big 108-89 victory over Bobby Knight's Indiana Hoosiers on Super Bowl Sunday on ABC, a number of Golden Gopher players immediately returned to the Bierman Building to do classwork following the game.

"They didn't go out and celebrate or watch the Super Bowl like most everyone else," Donahue said. "Their desire, with no prodding, was to start right in on the classwork. That's where academics has to be, it has to become a personal responsibility. It was very gratifying to see such self-discipline."

The most recent study done has student-athletes graduating at a higher rate than the average university student. Statistics from the class that entered during the 1983-84 academic year, given five years to graduate, show that student-athletes from the men's athletic department graduated at a 28.6 percent rate, while the university average is 27.1 percent.

"I think that the exceptional work that our student-athletes have done in the classroom, combined with the impressive success of our teams on the national level, shows that self-discipline, commitment and motivation have become an important part of their lives," Donahue said. "It proves that academic success and athletic success do go hand in hand."

ROLEX NATIONAL INDOOR INTERCOLLEGIATE TENNIS CHAMPIONSHIPS

For the third consecutive year, the nation's finest men's and women's collegiate tennis players will be coming to the Twin Cities to compete in the Rolex National Indoor Intercollegiate Tennis Championships.

The Rolex National Small College Championships will be played at the 98th Street Racquet, Swim & Health Club in Bloomington this Tuesday and Wednesday. The major college portion of the tournament will be held at the same site on Thursday and Friday, before switching to the 494/Crosstown Racquet, Swim & Health Club in Eden Prairie for the semifinals and finals on Saturday and Sunday.

Included in the men's 32-player singles field are 12 of the top 13 players in the first Volvo Tennis/Collegiate Rankings of 1990, including top-ranked Al Parker from Georgia. Overall, 25 of the 31 Division I players are ranked in the Top 50, while four of the unranked players were in the top seven of the preseason rankings back in October. The 16-team doubles field includes seven of the top nine teams from the first Volvo Tennis/Collegiate Rankings of 1990, headlined by California's top-ranked twosome of Doug Eisenman and Matt Lucena. For the Golden Gophers, senior **Rafer Leach** (Lexington, KY) will play singles and junior **Kevin Werwie** (Sheboygan, WI) and sophomore **Brian Uihlein** (Lake Forest, IL), will compete in the doubles portion of the tournament. A year ago, Brian, who advanced to the finals of the recent Big Ten Indoor Singles Championships, and Duke Uihlein thrilled local fans by advancing all the way to the semifinals of the tournament before falling to the eventual champions in a three-set match.

"It's a great opportunity not only for our players to go up against the nation's best, but also to showcase Minnesota tennis," said David Geatz, head coach of the defending Big Ten champion Golden Gophers. "With the tremendous community support and the beautiful tennis facilities we have here, the rest of the country gets to see that tennis is indeed alive and thriving in Minnesota."

Included in the women's 32-player singles field are 17 of the top 20 players in the first Volvo Tennis/Collegiate Rankings of 1990, with top-ranked and defending NCAA champion Sandra Birch from Stanford headlining the field. Overall, 28 of the 31 Division I players are ranked in the Top 50. The 16-team doubles field includes 10 of the top 12 teams from the first Volvo Tennis/Collegiate Rankings of 1990. Sophomores **Jennie Moe** (Edina, MN) and **Sofie Olsson** (Asmundtorp, Sweden) will compete in the tournament for the Golden Gophers. Moe is a former Minnesota State High School Class "AA" singles and doubles champion for nearby Edina High School.

"This is a great opportunity for our program and our players to play in this tournament against some of the top competition in the country," said head Golden Gophers women's coach David Creighton. "It's really exciting to see it in our hometown, especially since these are the best collegiate, and maybe the best amateur players around."

The Golden Gophers dropped a trio of three-set matches that could have turned the tide against the Cardinals, winners of six straight Mid-American Conference titles.

12TH-RANKED WRESTLERS HOST MICHIGAN & MICHIGAN STATE THIS WEEK (9-4/1-2 Big Ten)

After a week off from competition, the 12th-ranked Golden Gopher wrestling team will host 15th-ranked Michigan on Friday and then Michigan State on Saturday in back-to-back Big Ten Conference competition in Williams Arena.

Scouting Michigan: The Wolverines scored a 22-18 victory over the Golden Gophers in Ann Arbor last season on their way to finishing third in the final team standings at the Big Ten Championships and then fifth at the NCAA Championships. The Golden Gophers placed second at the Big Ten and then seventh at the NCAA Championships. Freshman Joey Gilbert, who was the first wrestler in Illinois state high school history to claim four Class AA Championships during a prep career in which he registered an outstanding 161-1 record, is ranked No. 6 by Amateur Wrestling News at 134 pounds. His match with Golden Gopher junior, **Dave Zuniga** (Worland, WY), ranked No. 5, should be an interesting one to say the least. A transfer from Utah State University where he was a two-time NCAA qualifier, Zuniga has gone 15-1 since becoming eligible to compete for the Golden Gophers in January. His only defeat was a 5-3 setback against top-ranked Tom Brands from Iowa. The other matchup between nationally-ranked competitors pits No. 9 Phil Tomek from Michigan against Golden Gopher senior **Jeff Balcom** (Fairmont, MN), ranked No. 4 at heavyweight. Senior Larry Gotcher, the 1989 Big Ten champ at 142 pounds who is ranked No. 8 at 150 this season, and senior Sam Amine, No. 11 at 158, also appear in the national rankings for head coach Dale Bahr's Wolverines.

Scouting Michigan State: The Golden Gophers defeated Michigan State 37-10 in East Lansing last season in dual meet action. The Spartans went on to finish ninth at the Big Ten Championships and 44th at the NCAA Championships. Brian Smith, an NCAA qualifier a year ago who is ranked No. 9 at 126 pounds this season, leads the Spartans.

Looking Back: The Golden Gophers dropped a 31-7 decision to 3rd-ranked Iowa before a season-high crowd of 2,754 in Williams Arena on January 24 and then finished second behind defending NCAA champion and top-ranked Oklahoma State at the Cowboy Classic held on January 26-27 in Stillwater, OK in their most recent action.

The Battle For No. 1...Part II: The accolades continue to roll in for the red-hot **Marty Morgan** (Bloomington, MN), ranked No. 2 at 177 pounds. The junior has been selected to compete in the East-West All-Star Wrestling Classic to be held this Monday (February 5) in Portland, OR, where he will have a rematch with Chris Barnes from Oklahoma State. The top-ranked Barnes registered a 4-1 victory over Morgan in the 177-pound final at the Cowboy Wrestling Classic. Honored as the Big Ten Conference Wrestling Athlete of the Month for December, he has been simply sensational for the Golden Gophers. In addition to registering a 28-1 overall record, he has registered 18 pins this season, just one shy of the single-season school record of 19 set by Mike McArthur during the 1976-77 season. He has won individual titles at the Bison Open (Fargo, ND), Nebraska-Omaha Open, Northern Open (Madison, WI) and the Oregon Classic (Portland, OR). A year ago he charted an overall record of 32-10 with 12 pins, finishing sixth at the NCAA Championships at 167 pounds to earn All-America honors. He transferred to Gold Country from North Dakota State University where he won the NCAA Division II national title at 167 pounds in 1987 for the Bison.

Looking Ahead: In their final home appearance of the season, the Golden Gophers will host 4th-ranked Nebraska on Wednesday, February 14 at the National Sports Center in Blaine. The Cornhuskers defeated the Golden Gophers 21-17 in Lincoln last season, before finishing 17th at the NCAA Championships. The matchup between Nebraska's Joe Malecek and Minnesota senior **Jeff Balcom** (Fairmont, MN) at heavyweight could be a real barnburner. Malecek, ranked No. 3, defeated Balcom, ranked No. 4, 5-3 at the Arizona State Invitational on January 3. Jason Kelber,

ranked No. 3 at 126, Scott Chenoweth, No. 4 at 167, Cory Olson, No. 10 at 177 and Chris Nelson, No. 6 at 190 also appear in the strong Cornhusker lineup.

National Rankings: The Golden Gophers have been ranked 12th in the latest Amateur Wrestling News national poll, released on January 24. Zuniga, senior **Chuck Heise** (Mosinee, WI), Morgan and Balcom also appeared in the individual rankings as well.

14TH-RANKED SWIMMING & DIVING TEAM SWEEPS THREE BIG TEN DUALS; AT IOWA STATE ON FRIDAY (9-2 Overall/5-2 Big Ten)

The Golden Gopher swimming & diving team captured 10 of 15 events en route to winning three Big Ten Conference dual meets at Champaign, IL over the weekend.

Three Big Ones: Head coach Dennis Dale's Golden Gophers defeated Illinois 89-40, Wisconsin 96-33 and Purdue 93-36 to run their overall dual meet record to 9-2, 5-2 in the Big Ten.

Rochester Connection: The talented "Rochester Connection" of sophomores **Scott Hart** (Rochester, MN) and **Sean Quackenbush** (Rochester, MN) won three events for the Golden Gophers on Friday and Saturday. Hart captured the 200 freestyle in a time of 1:41.36 and swam the third leg of the winning 800 freestyle relay unit (6:50.26) the first night, and then came back on Saturday to touch first in the 200 breaststroke with a clocking of 2:05.79. He transferred to Gold Country from Michigan, where he was an NCAA qualifier for the Wolverines a year ago. Quackenbush, honored as the Big Ten Freshman of the Year last season, took over from Hart and anchored Friday's winning 800 freestyle relay unit, and then on Saturday took the 200 butterfly in 1:50.80 and then led off the winning 400 freestyle relay quartet that won in 3:07.37. They were teammates at Mayo High School in Rochester, where both claimed Minnesota state titles during brilliant prep careers for the Spartans.

Double Trouble: Senior tri-captains **Andrew Lorys** (Portland, OR) and **Bill Asmus** (Lakeville, MN), along with freshman **Paul Nelsen** (Lincoln, NE), won a pair of events in the competition for the Golden Gophers. Lorys controlled the distance freestyle events, winning Friday's 1650 freestyle in a time of 15:52.30 and then taking Saturday's 500 freestyle in 4:36.58. Asmus led off Friday's 800 freestyle relay and then anchored Saturday's 400 freestyle relay that both took top honors. Nelsen swept the individual medley races, winning the 200 IM the first night in 1:52.86 and then the 400 IM on the final day in 4:01.00.

Iowa State: The Golden Gophers will travel to Ames, IA to take on the Iowa State Cyclones on Friday. Dale's squad topped the visiting Cyclones 141-95 in the Cooke Hall Pool last season. Head

coach Trip Hedrick's squad is much improved and will look to be a big factor at the upcoming Big Eight Championships. Leading the team is diver Lee-Jay Strifler, an All-American on both the one and three meter boards at the 1989 NCAA Championships. The meet is scheduled to begin at 7:00 p.m.

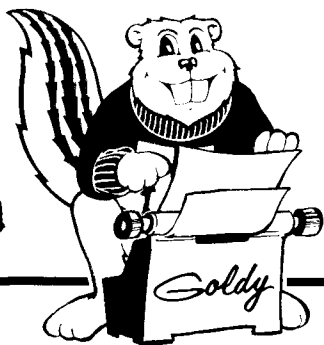

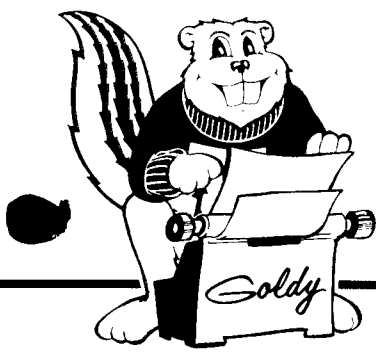

ROETHLISBERGER HONORED AS BIG TEN GYMNAST OF THE MONTH

For the second consecutive month, University of Minnesota freshman John Roethlisberger (Afton, MN) has been honored as the Big Ten Conference Gymnastics Athlete of the Month.

Roethlisberger led the top-ranked Golden Gophers to the team title at the prestigious Windy City Invitational held in Chicago on January 19-20 by claiming top honors in the all-around competition with a score of 109.05. He also won the all-around in a meet against Kent State, Western Michigan and host Michigan in Ann Arbor on January 13 with a score of 55.50. To date, he leads the Big Ten on the parallel bars and on the horizontal bar with scores of 9.70 and 9.75 respectively.

The son of Golden Gopher head coach Fred Roethlisberger, John also won the league award for the month of December, after finishing third at the U.S. Winter National Championships held on December 1-2 in Colorado Springs, CO, qualifying for the U.S. National Team in the process. Sitting eighth after the first day, he moved up with a strong performance on the final day to finish third with a score of 108.78.

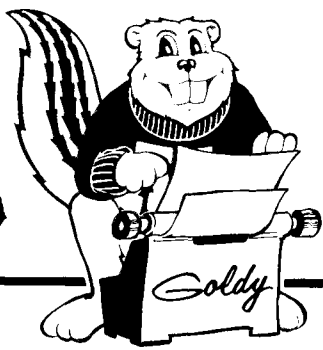

GOLDEN GOPHER CAGERS SET TO HOST MICHIGAN

Minnesota's Golden Gopher cagers, still in the hunt for the 1990 Big Ten Conference championship, continue their basketball wars Thursday by playing host to Michigan in Williams Arena.

Then on Saturday Coach Clem Haskins will take his charges back on the road to face the Wildcats at Northwestern on Saturday. Both of those Big Ten confrontations are slated for 7:05 p.m. tip-offs.

Both of those contests also are rematches, and in the Thursday confrontation with Michigan it will be a case of Minnesota hoping to get even after falling 87-83 at Ann Arbor earlier in the season. Against Northwestern, the Golden Gophers will be attempting to sweep this year's series after topping the Wildcats 97-75 at Williams Arena earlier.

Minnesota and Michigan have met 108 times in basketball over the years, and after that most-recent Wolverine victory, the invaders will bring an edge of 59-49 in the series into Thursday's game. In games played in Ann Arbor, Michigan leads 39-16. In games played in Minneapolis, Minnesota leads 33-20.

And the Golden Gophers won at Williams Arena a year ago 88-80.

Northwestern and the Golden Gophers have had 119 previous meetings, and Minnesota holds an edge of 69-50 in the series which it takes into Saturday's outing. The Cats have won 16 and lost 41 in Minneapolis, but at Evanston they hold a 34-27 edge.

The Golden Gophers will take an overall record of 16-5 and a Big Ten log of 7-4, good for fourth place in the standings as the week began, into Thursday's game. Michigan was 18-4 overall and in a tie for second place at 8-3 while Northwestern was 8-13 overall and in the loop cellar at 1-10.

Minnesota split honors last week, falling at Illinois 99-72 last Thursday before winning at home 73-72 over Purdue on Sunday. It was a case of two different teams performing for the Maroon and Gold.

"Illinois just plain kicked us," Coach Haskins admitted. "We didn't shoot well and we didn't play well. Our execution was very poor, and we never were able to control any kind of tempo in the game."

It was a different story against the Boilermakers. "We played an outstanding game against an outstanding team," Haskins said after the Sunday win. "We executed the way we were supposed to, and we made some very key plays when we had to in the late stages of the game."

Haskins refused to single out any Golden Gophers for special mention because "So many players made key contributions." But he might have mentioned Richard Coffey's 11 rebounds, or Willie Burton's 18 points, or Melvin Newbern's three assists and game-winning bucket, or Kevin Lynch's four assists and 16 points, or Jim Shikenjanski's three-of-three free-throw effort and 13 points.

The bottom line is that it was another team effort accounting for Minnesota's 16th win of the season.....but Haskins warns that it will take more of the same Thursday when Minnesota gets another "tough assignment" against Michigan. And the Golden Gophers need no reminder about playing on the road at Northwestern Saturday.

GOPHERS/BADGERS MARIUCCI GAMES SOLD OUT F/S AS UM TRIES TO REGAIN WCHA LEAD FROM UW

Minneapolis, MN---What the WCHA head coaches predicted prior to the 1989-90 season has come true. They said collectively that this year's race, like previous years, would again go down to the wire.

Well, here we go again. Wisconsin invades sold out Mariucci Arena for games Friday and Saturday having seized the WCHA lead from Minnesota by two points, 34-32. While the Gophers (20-11-2, 15-7-2) have lost their last three WCHA outings, including 7-5 and 5-2 decisions last weekend at Northern Michigan, Wisconsin (26-8-0, 17-7-0) has been on a torrid 7-game league win streak.

One has to go back to January, 1987, to find the last time Minnesota dropped three consecutive games. In that span the Gophers lost four straight leagues games.....at home to Lowell, two at WCHA champion North Dakota, and another at Boston University before returning to the win column.

With only four games (8 possible points) remaining in regular season play, this series calls for every cliché in the book. All that remains after this weekend is Minnesota playing two at last place Michigan Tech with the Badgers closing out at home against third place North Dakota.

Early in the season the Gophers and Badgers split two games in Madison. Minnesota took the series opener 5-3 with Wisconsin coming back to win 4-3 the next night. Overall, Gopher teams coached by Doug Woog are 18-8-0 vs. Wisconsin, including 13-1-0 in Mariucci Arena.

If there is a positive to be gained from last weekend, even in losing twice at Northern Michigan the Gophers clinched home ice for the first round WCHA playoffs. That series, best of three, is scheduled March 2-3-4 with games set for 7:05 p.m. CST face offs. For the first time, this year's Gopher season hockey tickets include first round WCHA playoffs. For additional ticket information call (612) 624-8080.

For fans without tickets this weekend, Friday's 7:05 p.m. CST game will be televised by KSTN-TV, Ch. 29, with WAYL-980 AM and KSTP-1500 AM radio airing both games live.

Saturday's contest marks the final regular season home appearance for six Gopher players. Five of them will be playing, with only Co-Captain and defenseman **Lance Pitlick (New Hope)** not dressing. Pitlick is recovering from abdominal surgery, but hopes to be back for the playoffs.

The seniors who will be introduced along with Pitlick prior to Saturday's game include: center **Jon Anderson (White Bear Lake)**, center **Scott Bloom (Burnsville)**, Co-Captain and right wing **Peter Hankinson (Edina)**, right wing **Brett Strot (Brooklyn Park)**, and center **Dean Williamson (Edina)**.

Peter Hankinson and **Ken Gernander (Coleraine)** were the only multiple goal scores for Minnesota last weekend. Gernander hit twice in Friday's contest while Hankinson scored a power play goal in each game. Gernander continues to lead his teammates in goals scored with 25 while Hankinson upped his team scoring leadership to 51 points on 21 goals and 30 assists. Hankinson has scored at least one point in his last 10 WCHA outings, and in 11 of the last 12 UM games overall.

It is possible that junior center **Jason Miller (Bloomington)** and freshman wing **Trent Klatt (Osseo)** could return to action this weekend. Miller missed the last two games with an elbow injury while Klatt has been out for seven games with an ankle injury.

11TH-RANKED WRESTLERS SPLIT A PAIR OF BIG TEN MATCHES; HOST 4TH-RANKED NEBRASKA ON WEDNESDAY AT THE NATIONAL SPORTS CENTER (10-5/2-3 Big Ten)

The 11th-ranked Golden Gopher wrestling team dropped a 21-13 decision to 13th-ranked Michigan on Friday, before bouncing back with a 24-15 victory over Michigan State on Saturday in Big Ten Conference action held at Williams Arena.

Fearsome Foursome: Junior **Dave Zuniga** (Worland, WY) at 134 pounds (17-1), senior **Chuck Heise** (Mosinee, WI) at 142 (32-3-1), junior **Marty Morgan** (Bloomington, MN) at 177 (31-1) and senior **Jeff Balcom** (Fairmont, MN) at heavyweight (27-4-2) each won a pair of matches over the weekend for head coach J Robinson's squad.

The Battle For No. 1...Well Almost: The accolades continue to roll in for the red-hot Marty Morgan, ranked No. 2 at 177 pounds. He was selected to compete in last Monday's East-West All-Star Wrestling Classic in Portland, OR, where he was scheduled to have a much-anticipated rematch with Chris Barnes from Oklahoma State. The top-ranked Barnes registered a 4-1 victory over Morgan in the 177-pound final at the Cowboy Wrestling Classic back on January 27. Honored as the Big Ten Conference Wrestling Athlete of the Month for December, Morgan has been simply sensational for the Golden Gophers. In addition to recording a 31-1 overall record, he has registered 18 pins this season, just one shy of the single-season school record of 19 set by Mike McArthur during the 1976-77 season. He has won individual titles at the Bison Open (Fargo, ND), Nebraska-Omaha Open, Northern Open (Madison, WI) and the Oregon Classic (Portland, OR). A year ago he charted an overall record of 32-10 with 12 pins, finishing sixth at the NCAA Championships at 167 pounds to earn All-America honors. He transferred to Gold Country from North Dakota State University where he won the NCAA Division II national title at 167 pounds in 1987 for the Bison.

Nebraska at the National Sports Center: In their final home appearance of the season, the Golden Gophers will host the 4th-ranked Nebraska Cornhuskers on Wednesday at the National Sports Center in Blaine, the first-ever wrestling event to be held in the 58,000 square foot sports arena. The Cornhuskers defeated the Golden Gophers 21-17 in Lincoln last season, before finishing 17th at the NCAA Championships. The matchup between Nebraska's Joe Malecek and Minnesota's Jeff Balcom at heavyweight could be a real barnburner. Malecek, ranked No. 3, defeated Balcom, ranked No. 6, 5-3 at the Arizona State Invitational on January 3. Jason Kelber, ranked No. 2 at 126, Paul Herrera No. 8 at 142, Scott Chenoweth, No. 6 at 167, and Chris Nelson, No. 5 at 190 also appear in the strong Cornhusker lineup. Olson, from Rochester, along with Osseo's Darren and Dave Droegemueller, and Dan Harrison from Inver Grove Heights, headline an outstanding Minnesota contingent that will come back home to face the Golden Gophers on Wednesday.

National Rankings: The Golden Gophers have been ranked 11th in the latest Amateur Wrestling News national poll, released on February 8. Sophomore **Ben Morris** (Wooddale, IL), Zuniga, Heise, Morgan and Balcom also appeared in the individual rankings as well. A total of six Big Ten Conference teams appeared in the top 16. The conference meet will be held on March 10-11 in Evanston, IL.

The Golden Gopher gymnastics team finished third at the prestigious UCLA Invitational held on Saturday night in Los Angeles with a season-high score of 278.80.

Great Field: In what may very well have been a mini-preview of the NCAA Championships to be held on April 19-21 in Williams Arena, Nebraska, second at the '89 NCAA's, won the team crown on Saturday with an outstanding score of 283.075. UCLA, fourth at the national meet a year ago, finished second, followed by the Golden Gophers, third at the NCAA's last year, in third. Arizona State also matched their '89 national meet finish by placing fifth on Saturday, while Illinois, the defending NCAA and Big Ten champions, finished sixth in the meet.

McKiernan Leads the Way: Senior **Mark McKiernan** (Darien, CT), the defending Big Ten all-around champion, paced the Golden Gophers on Saturday, finishing fifth in the all-around with a season-high score of 56.80. Defending NCAA champion Patrick Kirksey won the competition with a fine score of 57.475 to just edge teammate Bob Stelter, fourth at the national meet a year ago, who registered a score of 57.40. In individual event competition, McKiernan tied for second on both the pommel horse and the parallel bars with scores of 9.65 and 9.75 respectively.

Caputo Wins the High Bar: Junior **Jay Caputo** (Longwood, FL) tied UCLA's Chainey Umphrey and Nebraska's Mark Warburton for top honors on the high bar with a score of 9.80. Freshman **John Roethlisberger** (Afton, MN) tied for third in the vault with a score of 9.40.

Host Iowa on Saturday: The Golden Gophers will host Iowa in a Big Ten dual meet on Saturday beginning at 2:00 p.m. in Williams Arena. The Hawkeyes, who finished fourth at the Big Ten and 10th at the NCAA Championships last season, are led by senior Jeff Dow. On Thursday and Friday, matches were played at the 98th Street Racquet Club in Bloomington, before shifting to the 494-Crosstown Racquet Club in Eden Prairie on Saturday and Sunday. An overflow crowd of 2,000 fans was on hand to watch Sunday's finals.

The Golden Gophers: Junior **Kevin Werwie** (Sheboygan, WI) and sophomore **Brian Uihlein** (Lake Forest, IL) competed in the doubles draw for the Golden Gophers. After dropping a 6-4,6-4 decision to Bill Barber and Mark Quinney from UCLA in Thursday's first round, they bounced back in Friday's consolation round with a 6-3,6-2 victory over Paul Grubi and Darren Price from Wichita State, ranked No. 9 in the country, and a 7-5,4-6,6-4 win over David Hopper and Stephane Simian from South Carolina, ranked No. 25. In Saturday's consolation championship, they dropped a tough 6-4,3-6,6-3 decision to Trevor Kronemann and Shige Kanroji from Cal-Irvine, a combination that was ranked No. 1 in the pre-season national rankings. 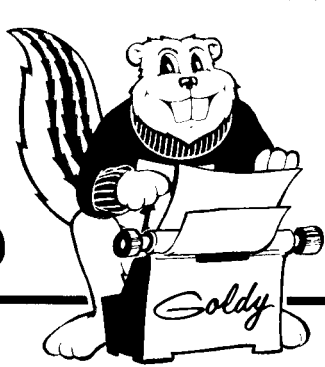
The University of Minnesota hockey program holds its annual "Skate With The Gophers" day this Sunday at Mariucci Arena.

BADGERS AND HAWKS NEXT FOR GOLDEN GOPHERS

With just under three weeks of regular-season play remaining on the 1989-90 basketball schedule, the University of Minnesota is concentrating its attention on a pair of crucial re-matches against Big Ten Conference opponents this week.

First Coach Clem Haskins will send his charges up against Wisconsin at Williams Arena on Thursday. Then on Saturday the Golden Gophers will travel to Iowa to take on the Hawkeyes.

Both of those loop shootouts are slated for 7:05 p.m. tip-offs, and both fall into the re-match category. Minnesota fell at Wisconsin earlier this season 77-75, but it downed Iowa at Williams Arena 84-72 in the previous confrontation.

Neither the Badgers nor the Hawkeyes are unfamiliar to the Golden Gophers. The Wisconsin series started in 1900, and in all there have been 151 meetings. Minnesota will take an edge of 82-69 into Thursday's event. The Badgers lead 44-29 in games played in Madison, but the Golden Gophers lead 53-25 in games played in Minneapolis.

Iowa and Minnesota first met in 1902. In all the two clubs have faced each other 147 times,

and the Golden Gophers will take an edge of 79-68 into Saturday's challenging road assignment. Minnesota leads in victories at Minneapolis by a 48-28 margin. It is a different story in Iowa City, however, where the Hawks hold a 40-31 bulge.

The Golden Gophers stood at 17-6 overall and 8-5 in the Big Ten (good enough for fourth place in the standings) coming into this week's action after splitting honors last week.

First Minnesota fell 77-73 at home to Michigan.....a setback that snapped Minnesota's two-year, 14-game Williams Arena win-streak. The Golden Gophers bounced back on Saturday, however, and won at Northwestern 90-72.

Two significant points about those games: the loss to the Wolverines was Minnesota's first at home this year, and it now means that NO team in the Big Ten has a perfect home-court record; the win over the Wildcats in Evanston was Minnesota's second conference road conquest of the season (the Golden Gophers had only one all of last year!) besides allowing Minnesota to get its' 17th victory of '89-'90....the number it

finished regular-season play with a year ago.

"The loss to Michigan was a tough one," Coach Haskins admitted. "We did not execute our offense the way we wanted to, but give Michigan credit for not letting us do so. And in the end we had our chances but just could not cash in. At Northwestern, we were able to get a big road win, and it felt great. We had an excellent second half (Minnesota scored 61 points after the intermission), and we had good scoring balance (five in double figures).

All five starters reached double digits.....Willie Burton had 21, Kevin Lynch 17, Melvin Newbern 14, and Richard Coffey and Jim Shikenjanski 12 each.....after Burton had paced the Golden Gopher attack against Michigan with 25.

It will take more of the same kind of scoring this week, and Coach Haskins knows it. "Wisconsin already has beaten us once this year," he pointed out, "and we all know how tough Iowa is at home." That's life in the Big Ten.....and with only five games remaining, time is running out. Still at stake? The loop title and an NCAA post-season berth.

ICERS CLOSE AT MTU AFTER SPLIT WITH BADGERS

Minneapolis, MN---As is often said, some things never change. Well, at least they seldom change.

Case in point.....the annual race to the wire for the Western Collegiate Hockey Association (WCHA) regular season championship and ownership of the famed MacNaughton Cup.

Last year Minnesota upset the odds by winning the WCHA race by a record 14 points. This year things are back to normal. The championship, as is usually the case, will again be decided on the final weekend of the regular season schedule before the playoffs begin.

Wisconsin came to Minnesota last weekend leading the Gophers by two points. After the teams split a torrid series, the margin remains the same. Wisconsin (27-9-0, 18-8-0) still leads Minnesota (21-12-2, 16-8-2) by two points, 36-34. But they are no longer alone.

North Dakota (24-9-3, 15-9-2) continued its January-February streak by sweeping Michigan Tech at home last weekend. The Sioux, just two points behind Minnesota, have won 15 of their last 16 games.

About the only thing in Minnesota's favor this weekend is that the Gophers travel to last place Michigan Tech (9-27-0, 5-21-0) for games Friday and Saturday while Wisconsin is at home to, you guessed it, North Dakota. And one more team, Northern Michigan (20-15-1, 15-10-1) remained in the hunt by sweeping Colorado College (17-17-2, 9-16-1) and is in fourth place with 31 points.

The only thing certain at this point is that the top four teams---Wisconsin, Minnesota, North Dakota and Northern Michigan---have clinched home ice for the first round WCHA playoffs. The order of seeding for that playoff round is what's still up for grabs.

The series at Mariucci Arena last weekend between Minnesota and Wisconsin was a classic. Both teams exhibited top skating and checking abilities, and some of the goaltending bordered on the spectacular. Wisconsin came from a 0-2 first period deficit to win 6-3 Friday, while the Gophers broke from a 1-1 tie after one period to take Saturday's game 4-2.

The ace for Minnesota Saturday was freshman goalie **Tom Newman (Blaine)**. "Friday's loss was not (Tom) Newman's fault, but he didn't come up with some big saves when he needed them," Gopher head coach **Doug Woog** said Saturday.

"He did, however, come up with some awfully big saves tonight to keep us in the lead. It may have been his best performance of the season. Our skaters also showed more life and spark which enabled us to win Saturday. It was a classic series from start to finish, and a huge win for us Saturday."

Senior wing **Prett Strot (Brooklyn Park)**, who, along with five teammates was honored before Saturday's game on "Senior Night", was the only Gopher to score more than one goal against Wisconsin. Strot got UM's final goal in Friday's loss, and came through with the game winning goal which put Minnesota up 3-1 in the second period Saturday.

Sophomore defenseman **Larry Olinb (Warroad)** chipped in with three assists on the weekend. He now has 27 assists for the season placing him second in that category to Gopher scoring leader **Peter Hankinson (Edina)**, senior right wing and co-captain. Hankinson has 30 assists and 52 points. He scored his 22nd goal of the season Saturday which put Minnesota ahead to stay early in the second period.

Newman recorded his 12th win of the season Saturday and in the process lowered his goals allowed average to 3.96.

Saturday's victory broke a four-game loss string for Minnesota, the longest winless streak since January of the 1986-87 season. Attendance Saturday was 7,713, the largest crowd of the home season. Minnesota is averaging 7,076 for home games this year.

BASEBALL TEAM TO TEXAS FOR 3

Minneapolis, MN---The University of Minnesota Gopher baseball team heads out on its second road trip of the season for games Friday through Sunday against the University of Texas in Austin.

Last month Minnesota opened its 1990 season by winning two of three games against Arizona University in Tucson. Minnesota won the first two games, 11-8 and 10-4, before dropping the final, 10-7. Arizona is coached by Jerry Kindall, former UM All-American and assistant baseball coach.

"Going to Texas this weekend is a bigger challenge for us," says Minnesota head coach John Anderson. "We were really pleased with our success at Arizona, but playing at Texas is another matter.

"Their program has been on a .830% winning clip covering the last 20 years. They were national runners-up to Wichita State last year and have most of the team back. The Texas baseball program has been No. 1 for years, so this trip should provide a real barometer for us to find out just where our program is at at this time."

Looking back on the Arizona series, Anderson went on to say, "We were able to play a sunbelt team on even terms. Those games were the first for Arizona just as they were for us. It helped prove to us we can prepare correctly with the winter facilities we have here.

"Winning two out three in their ball park is a credit to our staff and veteran players. . .the latter group for getting our young men ready to play. We took 17 freshmen and sophomores on that trip and everybody had to play.

"We started three freshman pitchers against Arizona and each did well. Each man who pitched down there only threw three innings. That's kind of like pitching by committee. We'll probably allow some of our pitchers to go longer this time, providing they are getting the job done.

"Senior pitcher **Jon Wroge (Norwood)** will make this trip and probably see some short duty. He was unable to join us in Arizona. Wroge underwent minor surgery last summer but appears well on the way back to being a key part of our pitching staff.

"Although our infield appears pretty well set, we will continue to platoon in the outfield. We have six players battling for three starting spots out there, and it's playing against competition like the U. of Texas that can help us get a better handle of who is ready to play against the very best.

"Since returning from Arizona we have had three weeks of good, solid practice. We still need to improve on our conditioning, but that's sometimes difficult until we get outdoors.

"I can say one thing about this Minnesota team, this group will not be intimidated and they go on the field every day prepared to win. That's quite a mouthful when going up against a national power like Texas, but our players really believe in themselves and each other. I believe we have the makings for an exciting baseball season."

The next games for Minnesota are March 3-4 in Lawrence, KS, where the Gophers play three games against the University of Kansas. Those games are followed by the annual spring break trip, this year in San Jose, CA. Minnesota will compete in a six-team tourney against host San Jose State, Washington, Ohio State, Oregon State and Brigham Young.

After that the Gophers finally play at home in the Annual PILLSBURY BASEBALL CLASSIC at the Metrodome March 30-31 and April 1 against Stanford, Miami (Fl.) and defending NCAA champion Wichita State. In fact, all four teams entered in this year's Pillsbury are former NCAA champions. Minnesota won national titles in 1956, 1960 and 1964 under late head coach Richard "Chief" Siebert.

The biggest shoes to fill will be Darrell Thompson's. Currently the leading candidates for the position are senior tailback Marcus Evans and junior Rick Meyer.

Freshman **Chris Murrell** (Grand Island, NE) also continued to excel in the high jump, finishing second in the competition with a leap of 7' 1/2", while sophomore **Lance Knuckles** (Racine, WI) finished third in the 55 meter high hurdles final with a clocking of 7.61.

GOLDEN GOPHER NETTERS SHINE AT DOUG FORD INVITATIONAL; HOST NOTRE DAME ON SATURDAY (3-2/0-0 Big Ten)

The 25th-ranked Golden Gopher tennis team won four titles over the weekend at the Doug Ford Invitational hosted by Oklahoma State University in Stillwater, OK.

That Winning Feeling: Sophomore **Brian Uihlein** (Lake Forest, IL) defeated Eric Fahnestock from Oklahoma State 6-4,6-3 for the top spot at No. 1 singles, junior **Kevin Werwie** (Sheboygan, WI) won at No. 2 singles with a win over Oklahoma State's Justin Stead, freshman **Grant Julian** (Voorhees, NJ) topped New Mexico's John Sanzarri 6-3,6-2 for the crown at No. 5 singles, and then the top doubles combination of Uihlein and Werwie won with a tough 6-3,6-7,6-2 three-set victory over Fahnestock and Stead. Freshman **Dominic Roderiguez** (Albuquerque, NM) advanced to the final at No. 6 singles, before dropping a 7-6,6-1 decision to Rich Ellman of Texas.

Big One on Saturday: The Golden Gophers, ranked No. 2 in the Region IV rankings, will face No. 4 Notre Dame on Saturday at the 98th Street Racquet Club in Bloomington. The match is scheduled to begin at 6:30 p.m. After falling 6-3 to Ball State, ranked No. 3 regionally, earlier in the season, Saturday's match is ultimately important to head coach David Geatz's squad. The Fighting Irish are led by David DiLucia, ranked No. 44 in the country in singles.

Pre-Season National Rankings: The Golden Gophers, who finished 23rd in the final national rankings last season, open up the 1990 season in a four-way logjam in the 25th spot. The next national rankings will be released on March 6.

11TH-RANKED WRESTLERS DROP CLOSE DECISION TO 4TH-RANKED NEBRASKA; BIG WEEKEND (10-6/2-3 Big Ten)

The 11th-ranked Golden Gopher wrestling team dropped a heartbreaking 17-16 decision to 4th-ranked Nebraska on Thursday at the National Sports Center in Blaine.

A Real Nailbiter: In a match that lived up to its billing, Golden Gopher senior **Jeff Balcom** (Fairmont, MN) and Nebraska's Joe Malecek wrestled to a 2-2 draw at heavyweight in the meet finale as the Huskers came away with the one point victory. Malecek, ranked No. 3 in the country, had defeated Balcom, ranked No. 6, 5-3 at the Takedown Duals II held at Arizona State University earlier this season. Senior **Chuck Heise** (Mosinee, WI), ranked No. 6, scored a big 5-1 victory over No. 8 Paul Herrera at 142 pounds in the other matchup between nationally-ranked foes. Junior **David Zuniga** (Worland, WY) topped Dave Droegemueller 7-4 at 134, freshman **Willy Short** (Inver Grove Heights, MN) defeated Todd Enger 4-2 at 150 and junior **Marty Morgan** (Bloomington, MN) registered an 11-4 win over Corey Olson to complete the list of winners on the night for head coach J Robinson's Golden Gophers. Sophomore **Joe Reasbeck** (Superior, WI) battled to a 6-6 draw with Dan Harrison at 150 pounds, while freshman **Brad Gibson** (Chokio, MN) turned in a fine performance in a 6-4 loss to No. 5 Chris Nelson at 190 pounds.

Fearsome Foursome: Dave Zuniga at 134 (18-1), Chuck Heise at 142 (33-3-1), Marty Morgan at 177 (32-1) and Jeff Balcom at heavyweight (27-4-3) have led the Golden Gophers all season long. They have compiled an overall record of 110-9-4. In dual meets, the fearsome foursome is 51-4-4, including a 17-2-1 mark in Big Ten action.

Morgan Chases Record: Marty Morgan has registered 18 pins thus far this season, just one shy of the single-season school record of 19 set by Mike McArthur during the 1976-77 season. His only setback this season was a 4-1 loss to top-ranked Chris Barnes from Oklahoma State in the 177-pound final at the Cowboy Wrestling Classic in Stillwater, OK back on January 27. Honored as the Big Ten Conference Wrestling Athlete of the Month for December, he defeated No. 5 John Kohls from Brigham Young at the East-West All-Star Classic in Portland, OR on Feb. 5. He has won individual titles at the Bison Open (Fargo, ND), Nebraska-Omaha Open, Northern Open (Madison, WI) and the Oregon Classic (Portland, OR). A year ago he charted an overall record of 32-10 with 12 pins, finishing sixth at the NCAA Championships at 167 pounds to earn All-America honors. He transferred to Gold Country from North Dakota State University where he won the NCAA Division II national title at 167 pounds in 1987 for the Bison.

Big, Big Ten Weekend: The Golden Gophers will be busy this weekend with three Big Ten road dual meets on tap, including back-to-back matches on Saturday when they'll face No. 5 Indiana at 2:00 p.m. and then Purdue at 7:30 p.m. They'll wrap up the weekend on Sunday with a 2:30 p.m. match at No. 16 Ohio State. Indiana is led by Brian Dolph, ranked No. 2 at 150 and Scott Holman, No. 8 at heavyweight. The Golden Gophers scored a 35-6 victory over the Hoosiers at the Great American

Classic last season. At the Big Ten Championships, Minnesota was second with 113.75 points, while the Hoosiers were fifth with 66.25. At the NCAA Championships, the Golden Gophers were seventh with 45.75 points and the Hoosiers 20th with 24.75. The highlight of Saturday night's Purdue match will be the confrontation between No. 2 Marty Morgan and Purdue's Mike McHenry, ranked No. 3, at 177 pounds. A year ago, the Golden Gophers topped Purdue 39-3 in regular season action. The Boilermakers went on to finish eighth at the Big Ten (49.25) and 36th at the NCAA (6.50) Championships. The Buckeye's, who placed fourth at the Big Ten (70.75) and 43rd at the NCAA (4.25) Championships in '89, are led by Adam DiSabato, ranked No. 6 at 126 pounds.

National Rankings: The Golden Gophers have been ranked 11th in the latest Amateur Wrestling News national poll, released on February 8. Sophomore **Ben Morris** (Wooddale, IL), Zuniga, Heise, Morgan and Balcom also appeared in the individual rankings as well. A total of six Big Ten Conference teams appeared in the top 16. The conference meet will be held on March 10-11 in Evanston, IL.

The 14th-ranked Golden Gopher swimming & diving team captured all 17 events on the schedule en route to a 422-71 victory over Bemidji State in the Minnesota Invitational held last Friday and Saturday at the Cooke Hall Pool.

The Records Fall: Three pool records and one school record fell over the weekend. Leading the way was sophomore **Scott Hart** (Rochester, MN), who set a pool record of 4:03.03 in the 400 IM and also a pool and school record with a 1000 split of 9:18.31 on his way to finishing second behind freshman **Paul Schmeling** (Burnsville, MN) in the 1650 freestyle. Schmeling won the race in 16:43.35, while Hart touched just behind in 16:43.76. Sophomore **Sean Quackenbush** (Rochester, MN), sophomore **Del Cerney** (Staples, MN), freshman **Mark Letwica** (Staples, MN) and senior tri-captain **Bill Asmus** (Lakeville, MN) set the third pool record in the competition with a winning time of 6:48.84 in Friday's 800 freestyle relay.

Big Ten Championships: Head coach Dennis Dale's squad will now begin final preparations for the Big Ten Championships to be held March 1-3 at the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor. The host Wolverines have won four straight league titles and will be the favorites once again this year. The Golden Gophers finished third at the '89 conference meet, a lofty position that the program hadn't attained since the '63 season.

7 GOPHER MEN'S TEAMS NATIONALLY RANKED

Minneapolis, MN---This week finds seven University of Minnesota men's athletic teams among the leaders in the national polls released by various outlets.

Leading the way is the Gopher gymnastic team which is ranked third nationally. What's doubly important for coach Fred Roethlisberger's athletes is that Minnesota will host the NCAA Gymnastics Championships April 19-21 in Williams Arena on the UM campus.

Minnesota's hockey Gophers dropped to 9th in the national polls following its four consecutive losses prior to its 4-2 win Saturday at home against WCHA leader Wisconsin. Minnesota hopes to gain at least a share on an unprecedented third straight WCHA championship by winning twice at Michigan Tech this weekend. The Gophers do, however, need some help from third place North Dakota which plays at Wisconsin Friday and Saturday.

The basketball Gophers, who host Wisconsin Thursday and travel to Iowa Saturday, are ranked in three national polls: 15th by THE SPORTING NEWS, 17th by UPI and 18th by AP. The Gophers, with an outside shot in the remaining Big Ten championship race, are mainly keying up for a berth in the NCAA tournament. Leader Purdue is 11-2 while Minnesota is 8-5 in the Big Ten.

The baseball Gophers found themselves ranked in two national polls this week.....22nd by BASEBALL AMERICA and 25th by COLLEGIATE BASEBALL/ESPN. But that's where the good news ends.

This weekend finds Minnesota playing three games at #5 Texas. Looking further down the line, Minnesota's three opponents for this year's PILLSBURY BASEBALL CLASSIC March 30-31, April 1 at the Metrodome, include teams ranked #1 (Stanford), #2 (defending NCAA champion Wichita State), and #5 (Miami, Fl.) by COLLEGIATE BASEBALL/ESPN. Last weekend saw Miami sweep a three-game home series against Texas. The Longhorns may be in a nasty mood this weekend.

Other Minnesota teams appearing in the national rankings this week include wrestling (11th), swimming and diving (14th) and tennis (25th).

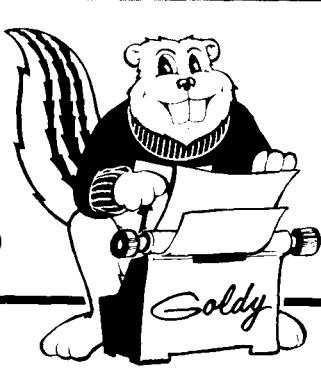

The University of Minnesota wrestling team has cancelled their last three regular season meets in order to comply with NCAA rules that limit dates of competition.

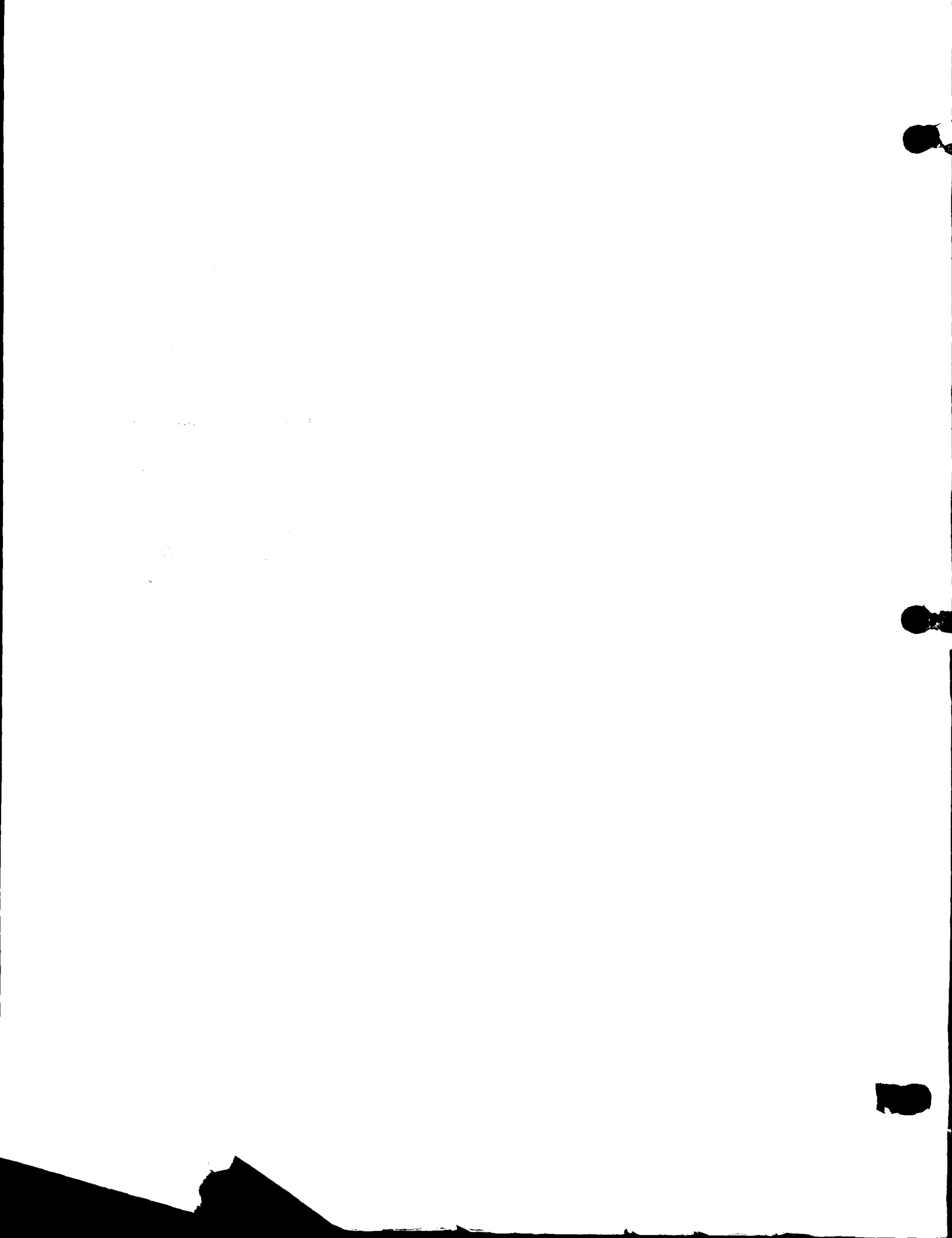
The Golden Gophers were scheduled to face Indiana in Bloomington at 2:00 p.m. and Purdue in West Lafayette at 7:30 p.m. tomorrow and then Ohio State at 2:30 p.m. on Sunday. The problem arose when it was discovered last week that Minnesota had allowed two other college teams to practice with the Golden Gopher squad on five different occasions. According to an NCAA interpretation received earlier today, those five practices must count as dates of competition.

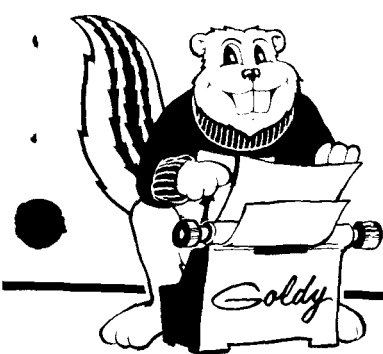
Since the Big Ten Championships on March 10-11 in Evanston, IL and the NCAA Championships on March 22-24 in College Park, MD are exempt from the allowable number of competitive dates, the Golden Gopher squad will be able to compete in those events.

The allowable number of dates for competition in wrestling is 21. The limit does not include competitions in which wrestlers compete unattached in open tournaments. Counting the five practice dates, Minnesota is currently at the limit of 21.

The College of St. Thomas practiced with the Golden Gophers on January 11, 24 and February 6. Cal State Fullerton wrestled a dual meet against Minnesota on January 13 and then stayed over and practiced with the Golden Gophers on January 14 and 15.

Athletic director, Rick Bay, said that while the coaching staff acted unintentionally and did not believe that such practices would count as competition, that does not absolve the University of its responsibility to uphold both the spirit and intent of NCAA rules.

MINNESOTA SET FOR HOME FINALE WITH MICHIGAN STATE SATURDAY

After invading Indiana for an 8:05 p.m.(EST) Big Ten Conference basketball assignment Thursday, the University of Minnesota will return to Williams Arena Saturday to close its 1989-90 home slate by hosting Michigan State at 1:05 p.m.

Coach Clem Haskins' contingent will put an overall record of 19-6 and a Big Ten log of 10-5 on the line against the Hoosiers on Thursday while Indiana came into the week at 16-8 and 6-8. Michigan State, 22-5 and 11-3, will prepare for Saturday's confrontation by hosting Michigan Thursday.

Minnesota and Indiana have shot it out 111 times over the years, and the Hoosiers will bring a commanding edge of 75-46 in the series into Thursday's game at Bloomington. Minnesota leads in wins at Minneapolis 34-26, but Indiana has won 49 and lost only 12 to the Golden Gophers in Bloomington.

A year ago Indiana swept, winning 75-62 at Williams Arena and 66-62 down in Bloomington. Earlier this year, however, Minnesota notched a 108-89 victory at Minnesota, so the Golden Gophers will be

going for a sweep on Thursday.

Michigan State and Minnesota have met 76 times in basketball in the past, and the Golden Gophers will take an edge of 45-31 in the series into Saturday's home finale.

A year ago the two teams split, Michigan State winning at home 73-64 and the Golden Gophers coming out on top 77-61 in Williams Arena. Earlier this year, Haskins' contingent notched a 79-74 verdict at MSU's new Breslin Center, so once again Minnesota will be going for a sweep.

The Golden Gophers will be shooting for their 20th win of the current campaign this week, and Minnesota has had only four seasons of 20 wins or more in its history (1972-73 under Bill Musselman and 1976-77, 1979-80 and 1981-82 all under Jim Dutcher).

Minnesota notched numbers 18 and 19 last week in hectic fashion. First the Golden Gophers hung on to edge Wisconsin 68-67 at Williams Arena and then invaded Iowa to belt the Hawkeyes 102-80 on Saturday.

"Those were great wins for

us," Coach Haskins said. "The win over Wisconsin certainly wasn't pretty, but it was a win. We did not play as well as we are capable, but we got some real help from our home crowd. At Iowa, excellent preparation played a key part, and we got great balance with six players scoring in double figures."

All of which sets the stage for Thursday's game at Indiana and that final home appearance for six seniors..... Willie Burton, Richard Coffey, Mario Green, Connell Lewis, Melvin Newbern and Jim Shikenjanski.....against Michigan State Saturday.

"We feel we are in position to get an NCAA bid," Haskins admitted, "but we know that we still have to work hard in our three remaining regular-season games. We're trying to get ready for post-season play, but we know we must stay healthy and continue to show improvement down the stretch."

There isn't much left to that stretch.....but Haskins would like another road win at Indiana Thursday. And, of course, the seniors want to end their stay at Minnesota in similar fashion Saturday afternoon.

ICERS END 2ND IN WCHA, HOST C.C. IN PLAYOFFS

Minneapolis, MN---Things don't always end the way you want....even when a maximum effort is produced over a long period of time.

That was the story for the U. of Minnesota hockey Gophers last weekend. A last ditch effort fell short and Minnesota lost out on a chance to surprise a lot of people in its attempt to win an unprecedented third straight WCHA championship.

Minnesota went into its series at Michigan Tech trailing first place Wisconsin in points, 36-34. On Friday the Gophers came from a 3-1 deficit to defeat Tech 4-3 in overtime. At the same time Wisconsin was playing to a home 5-5 overtime tie against North Dakota. That narrowed the point margin to 36-37.

But that was as far as UM's challenge went. The Gophers dropped an 8-3 decision to the Huskies Saturday which, in the long run, made no difference. Wisconsin overcome a 4-2 North Dakota lead Saturday to win 5-4 in overtime and clinch the schools second WCHA championship. Wisconsin's other league title came in 1977.

So the Gophers settle for a regular season WCHA record of 17-9-2, with an overall mark of 22-13-2, and now look forward to their second season, the WCHA playoffs.

Minnesota plays host to 7th place finisher Colorado College (18-18-2, 10-17-1) in a best of three series Friday and Saturday, and Sunday if needed. All three 7:05 p.m. CST games will be aired locally by KITN-TV, Ch. 29.

Minnesota won three of four games from the Tigers this season. Colorado College took the opening match in Colorado Springs, 7-5, before Minnesota won the second game, 3-2 in overtime. Minnesota won both games played at Mariucci Arena, 8-4 and 4-2.

This year's second place finish keeps Gopher head coach Doug Woog's five-year string intact. His teams have never finished lower than second place in the WCHA. Woog saw his last two teams win back to back league titles for the first time in our school's history. His first two teams ended up second to Denver in 1985-86, and to eventual NCAA champion North Dakota the next season.

Woog's overall record at Minnesota reads 159 wins against 61 losses and six ties for a winning mark of .717%. His league record is 121-41-5 for a whopping .740% success ratio.

Senior center **Scott Bloom (Burnsville)** provided Minnesota with its winning goal just 31 seconds into overtime Friday at Michigan Tech. Seniors **Jon Anderson (White Bear Lake)** and **Peter Hankinson (Edina)** scored goals late in the third period to send the game into overtime tied 3-3. Minnesota outshot the Huskies 46-34. **Ken Gernander (Coleraine)** accounted for Minnesota's first goal.

Anderson, freshman **Trent Klatt (Osseo)** and Bloom scored Minnesota's goals Saturday. Michigan Tech scored its last two goals into an empty net after freshman goalie **Tom Newman (Blaine)** was pulled for a sixth attacker. Friday's win was Newman's 13th of the year.

Peter Hankinson led Minnesota in scoring on the weekend with a goal and three assists. He now has a team-leading 56 points on 23 goals and 33 assists. Gernander's goal Friday was his 26th of the season, also a team high. Anderson ended the weekend with four points (2-2) while Bloom had three points (2-1).

"Mark has been a valued member of our staff during the four years that he has been with the department," Bay said. "Since my arrival at Minnesota, he has helped introduce a number of new programs to network with key donors. I have been aware of his plans to begin a fundraising consulting business. Although the athletic department will miss his leadership, we wish him success with his new venture."

Davy's new firm, Mark Davy & Associates, will specialize in conducting capital campaigns for schools, churches and hospitals. In addition, his firm will provide hiring and training services for non-profit organizations.

Davy & Associates will be located in Edina and will focus its services on the Twin Cities and Greater Minnesota areas.

FINAL THREE REGULAR SEASON WRESTLING MEETS CANCELLED

The University of Minnesota wrestling team has cancelled their last three regular season meets in order to comply with NCAA rules that limit dates of competition.

The Golden Gophers were scheduled to face Indiana in Bloomington and Purdue in West Lafayette last Saturday and then Ohio State on Sunday. The problem arose when it was discovered last week that Minnesota had allowed two other college teams to practice with the Golden Gopher squad on five different occasions. According to an NCAA interpretation received last Friday, those five practices must count as dates of competition.

Since the Big Ten Championships on March 10-11 in Evanston, IL and the NCAA Championships on March 22-24 in College Park, MD are exempt from the allowable number of competitive dates, the Golden Gopher squad will be able to compete in those events.

The allowable number of dates for competition in wrestling is 21. The limit does not include competitions in which wrestlers compete unattached in open tournaments. Counting the five practice dates, Minnesota, 10-6 overall on the season, is currently at the limit of 21.

The College of St. Thomas practiced with the Golden Gophers on January 11, 24 and February 6. Cal State Fullerton wrestled a dual meet against Minnesota on January 13 and then stayed over and practiced with the Golden Gophers on January 14 and 15.

Athletic director, Rick Bay, said that while the coaching staff acted unintentionally and did not believe that such practices would count as competition, that does not absolve the University of its responsibility to uphold both the spirit and intent of NCAA rules.

We will be strong in the strokes and the IM's and expect to score points in those events. But where we need to score points is in the freestyle events. Our divers will be fine. They'll be right in there."

A Year To Remember: Records fell by the wayside at the 1989 Big Ten Championships as the Golden Gophers churned up the waters of the IUPUI Natatorium in Indianapolis, IN in dramatic fashion. When everything had settled, the Golden Gophers found themselves in third-place in the final team standings, a lofty position that the program had not attained since the 1963 season. Amazingly, the team broke school records in all but one race in the meet.

Taking Home the Hardware: Minnesota's "All-Everything", Dan Egeland went out in style in the final Big Ten Championships of his illustrious career a year ago. All he did over the three days of the competition was set seven school records, four individual and three on relays, set two Big Ten meet records on the Golden Gopher 400 (2:56.18) and 800 (6:32.00) freestyle relay units and set a new all-time Big Ten record in the 200 IM with a clocking of 1:47.48. For his efforts, he was honored as the Swimmer of the Championship. Sean Quackenbush exploded on the scene at the first league meet of his career en route to being honored as the Freshman of the Championship. He qualified for the NCAA Championships and set new school records in both the 100 (48.90) and 200 (1:46.42) butterfly events, as well as a member of the 400 medley relay (3:17.10) unit. On top of that, he chipped in valuable points by going out of his specialty and finishing 14th in the 200 IM in 1:52.42. Head coach Dennis Dale was also honored as the Big Ten Coach of the Year, after leading the Golden Gophers to their third-place finish, a 26-year highwater mark for the program.

National Rankings: The Golden Gophers, who remained 14th, were one of five Big Ten Conference teams that appeared in the final College Swimming Coaches Association of America national poll. Defending conference champion Michigan is tied for 4th, Iowa is 8th, the Golden Gophers 14th, Indiana 19th and Michigan State 20th.

Sean Quackenbush, Del Cerney, freshman **Mark Lelwica** (Staples, MN) and Bill Asmus set the third pool record in the competition with a winning time of 6:48.84 in Friday's 800 freestyle relay.

GOLDEN GOPHER GYMNASTS SET FOR BIG TEN CHAMPIONSHIPS THIS WEEKEND; ROUT UW-OSHKOSH LAST FRIDAY (7-1/3-1 Big Ten)

Head coach Fred Roethlisberger's fourth-ranked Golden Gopher gymnastics team will head to the University of Iowa in Iowa City for the 82nd annual Big Ten Championships on Friday and Saturday. The team finals will be held on Friday and the individual event finals on Saturday.

The Showdown: The competition for the team crown on Friday is expected to come down to a battle between the No. 4 Golden Gophers and No. 2 Ohio State. The two teams certainly are no strangers to each other, with the Buckeyes having beaten the Golden Gophers 274.50-272.90 in East Lansing back on January 12, before the Golden Gophers bounced back the following weekend to win the 12-team Windy City Invitational in Chicago with a score of 274.65. The Buckeyes were right on their heels with a score of 274.15. The Buckeyes are led by Mike Racanelli, second at the NCAA and third at the Big Ten Championships in the all-around in '89. Jeff Dow, '89 Big Ten runner-up in the all-around, will lead No. 5 Iowa.

Coach Roethlisberger: "We finally have all of our people in the spots we want them except that (Dan) Zimpfer still will not compete on the rings this weekend. Some of our guys still need some refining, but with the conference meet being held so much earlier this year, Ohio State is probably in the same boat. Now it's just a matter of the guys concentrating and hitting their routines. It's going to be a battle right down to the wire. Friday night should be dynamite."

A Strong Returning Cast: Senior Mark McKiernan (Darien, CT) became the 22nd gymnast in school history to claim the all-around title with a score of 110.10 (56.75 optional) at the '89 Big Ten Championships. He also collected top honors on the pommel horse with a score of 9.75, finished second on the parallel bars with a score of 9.65 and was sixth on the still rings with a 9.50, en route to being honored as the league's Gymnast of the Year. Junior Mike Farina (Mundelein, IL), sixth in the all-around with a score of 107.40 (54.95 optional), senior Mike Graham (Green Bay, WI), sixth on the pommel horse with a 9.30, senior Dan Zimpfer (Kent, OH) tied with McKiernan for sixth on the still rings with a 9.50, and sophomore Leif Carlson (Bloomington, MN), tied for second on the high bar with a 9.75 and fifth on the parallel bars with a 9.30, are also returning placewinners from a year ago for the Golden Gophers. Senior rings specialist Jeff Weltzin (Libertyville, IL), junior Jay Caputo (Longwood, FL) and freshmen standouts John Roethlisberger (Afton, MN) and Rob Hanson (Ramsey, MN) give the Golden Gophers' a solid nine-man lineup.

Freshman **Chris Murrell** (Grand Island, NE) won the Big Ten Conference indoor high jump title with a personal-best and school indoor record leap of 7'3" at the league indoor track & field championships held last Friday and Saturday in Bloomington, IN. His efforts helped pace head coach Roy Griak's Golden Gophers to a seventh-place finish in the final team standings.

His leap of 7'3" on Saturday broke former Golden Gopher great Mike Vukovich's school indoor record of 7'2 1/2" set in 1988 and improved his chances of earning a spot in the NCAA Indoor Championships to be held on March 9-10 at the Indiana Hoosier Dome in Indianapolis. The NCAA provisional qualifying mark is 7'1", but the automatic qualifying standard is 7'4 1/2", a height which Murrell failed to clear in three attempts on Saturday. Oh So Close for Hoeft: Senior tri-captain **Carson Hoeft** (Plymouth, MN) finished second to Indiana's Bob Kennedy in the mile. In a tactical race, Kennedy crossed the line in 4:11.34, with Hoeft in hot pursuit in 4:11.84. The first five runners in the race finished within just over two seconds of each other.

More Placewinners: Sophomore **Sean Fitzgerald** (Ottawa, Ontario, Canada), senior **Matt Ferry** (Maple Grove, MN), Carson Hoeft and senior tri-captain **Dan Hebl** (Menomonie, WI) placed third in Saturday's 4 x 800 relay with a clocking of 7:35.75. Illinois won the race in 7:32.52, followed by Wisconsin in 7:34.29. Senior **Jeff Svedahl** (Cloquet, MN) finished fifth in Friday's 3000 meter final with a clocking of 8:20.03. Finishing sixth on Saturday were sophomore **Mark Lacy** (Oak Brook, IL) in the shot put with a heave of 53'2 1/4" and freshman **Justin Daler** (Toledo, OH) in the pole vault with a mark of 16'1 3/4". Another noteworthy performance would be that of Dan Hebl in Friday's 800 meter preliminaries. He blazed to a 1:52.54 clocking, but just missed advancing to Saturday's finals by .09 seconds.

Notre Dame won four tough three-set matches en route to a 6-3 victory over the defending Big Ten champion Golden Gopher tennis team last Saturday at the 98th Street Racquet Club in Bloomington.

A Real Nailbiter: Senior **Rafer Leach** (Lexington, KY) topped Notre Dame's Chuck Coleman 7-6, 1-6, 7-5 at No. 2 and sophomore **Philippe LeBlanc** (St. Bruno, Quebec, Canada) defeated Walter Dolhare 7-6, 6-4 at No. 4 for the Golden Gophers' singles victories on the evening. Leach joined junior **Anthony Cruz** (Medinah, IL) for a 6-4, 6-3 victory over the Fighting Irish's Chuck Coleman and Mark Schmidt at No. 2 doubles. The three-setters proved to be the downfall of the Golden Gophers. Junior **Kevin Werwie** (Sheboygan, WI) at No. 3, freshman **Rick Naumoff** (Columbus, OH) at No. 5 and Cruz at No. 6 all lost heartbreaking three-set singles matches, while LeBlanc and freshman **Dominic Roderiguez** (Albuquerque, NM) fell in the same manner at No. 3 doubles.

Big One: Saturday's match was undoubtedly an important one as far as the Region IV rankings go. The Golden Gophers, ranked No. 2 in the region, had already lost to No. 3 Ball State (6-3) earlier this season. Notre Dame is ranked No. 4 in the region and has now beaten both Minnesota and Ball State this season. Wisconsin is the region's No. 1 ranked team. The region's top team automatically receives an NCAA Tournament berth in May.

Host Drake on Saturday: The Golden Gophers will host the Drake Bulldogs from the Missouri Valley Conference on Saturday at 6:30 p.m. at the 98th Street Racquet Club.

Pre-Season National Rankings: The Golden Gophers, who finished 23rd in the final national rankings last season, open up the 1990 season in a four-way logjam in the 25th spot. The next national rankings will be released on March 6.

Coach of the Year: Golden Gopher head mentor J Robinson was honored as the 1989 Big Ten Conference Coach of the Year after leading the squad to a runner-up finish at the league championships.

Returning Placemen: Junior **Marty Morgan** (Bloomington, MN) and senior **Jeff Balcom** (Fairmont, MN) both placed at the 1989 Big Ten Championships. Morgan, who is at 177 pounds this season, finished third at 167 pounds a year ago and then went on to garner All-America honors by placing sixth at the NCAA Championships in Oklahoma City two weeks later. Balcom was the runner-up at heavyweight a year ago and a quarterfinalist at the NCAA's. He missed collecting All-America honors by just one victory.

Fearsome Foursome: Junior **Dave Zuniga** (Worland, WY) at 134 (18-1), senior **Chuck Heise** (Mosinee, WI) at 142 (33-3-1), Marty Morgan at 177 (32-1) and Jeff Balcom at heavyweight (27-4-3) have led the Golden Gophers all season long. They have compiled an overall record of 110-9-4. In dual meets, the fearsome foursome is 51-4-4, including a 17-2-1 mark in Big Ten action.

Morgan Chases Record: Marty Morgan has registered 18 pins thus far this season, just one shy of the single-season school record of 19 set by Mike McArthur during the 1976-77 season. His only setback this season was a 4-1 loss to top-ranked Chris Barnes from Oklahoma State in the 177-pound final at the Cowboy Wrestling Classic in Stillwater, OK back on January 27. Honored as the Big Ten Conference Wrestling Athlete of the Month for December, he defeated No. 5 John Kohls from Brigham Young at the East-West All-Star Classic in Portland, OR on Feb. 5. He has won individual titles at the Bison Open (Fargo, ND), Nebraska-Omaha Open, Northern Open (Madison, WI) and the Oregon Classic (Portland, OR). A year ago he charted an overall record of 32-10 with 12 pins, finishing sixth at the NCAA Championships at 167 pounds to earn All-America honors. He transferred to Gold Country from North Dakota State University where he won the NCAA Division II national title at 167 pounds in 1987 for the Bison.

National Rankings: The Golden Gophers have been ranked 14th in the latest Amateur Wrestling News national poll, released on February 22. Sophomore **Ben Morris** (Wooddale, IL), Zuniga, Heise, Morgan and Balcom also appeared in the individual rankings as well. A total of seven Big Ten Conference teams appeared in the top 25.

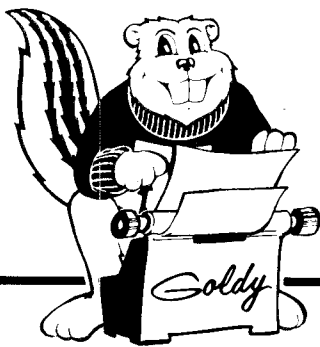

A History Lesson: The Golden Gophers have won two team titles at the Big Ten Championships, in 1922 and 1926. Head coach Dennis Dale's young, but talented squad will look to repeat last year's third-place team finish.

Coach Dale: "We view this as a rebuilding year after graduating over 50 percent of our points from last year. If we could hold on to third-place, we'd be ecstatic. Michigan is the prohibitive favorite and Iowa should hold on to the runner-up spot. We see ourselves battling Michigan State and Indiana for third, fourth and fifth. We will be strong in the strokes and the IM's and expect to score points in those events. But where we need to score points is in the freestyle events. Our divers will be fine. They'll be right in there."

A Year To Remember: Records fell by the wayside at the 1989 Big Ten Championships as the Golden Gophers churned up the waters of the IUPUI Natatorium in Indianapolis, IN in dramatic fashion. When everything had settled, the Golden Gophers found themselves in third-place in the final team standings, a lofty position that the program had not attained since the 1963 season. Amazingly, the team broke school records in all but one race in the meet.

Taking Home the Hardware: Minnesota's "All-Everything", Dan Egeland went out in style in the final Big Ten Championships of his illustrious career a year ago. All he did over the three days of the competition was set seven school records, four individual and three on relays, set two Big Ten meet records on the Golden Gopher 400 (2:56.18) and 800 (6:32.00) freestyle relay units and set a new all-time Big Ten record in the 200 IM with a clocking of 1:47.48. For his efforts, he was honored as the Swimmer of the Championship. Sean Quackenbush exploded on the scene at the first league meet of his career en route to being honored as the Freshman of the Championship. He qualified for the NCAA Championships and set new school records in both the 100 (48.90) and 200 (1:46.42) butterfly events, as well as a member of the 400 medley relay (3:17.10) unit. On top of that, he chipped in valuable points by going out of his specialty and finishing 14th in the 200 IM in 1:52.42. Head coach Dennis Dale was also honored as the Big Ten Coach of the Year, after leading the Golden Gophers to their third-place finish, a 26-year highwater mark for the program.

National Rankings: The Golden Gophers, who remained 14th, were one of five Big Ten Conference teams that appeared in the final College Swimming Coaches Association of America national poll. Defending conference champion Michigan is tied for 4th, Iowa is 8th, the Golden Gophers 14th, Indiana 19th and Michigan State 20th.

Schmeling won the race in 16:43.35, while Hart touched just behind in 16:43.76. Sean Quackenbush, Del Cerney, freshman **Mark Letwica** (Staples, MN) and Bill Asmus set the third pool record in the competition with a winning time of 6:48.84 in Friday's 800 freestyle relay.

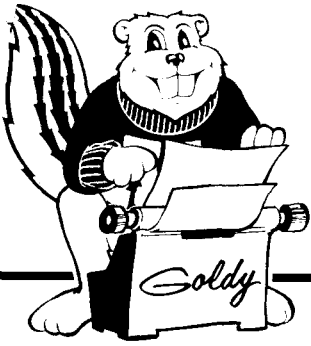

82ND ANNUAL BIG TEN GYMNASTICS CHAMPIONSHIPS Carver-Hawkeye Arena University of Iowa March 2-3, 1990

Head coach Fred Roethlisberger's second-ranked Golden Gopher gymnastics team will head to the University of Iowa in Iowa City for the 82nd annual Big Ten Championships on Friday and Saturday. The team finals will be held on Friday, with the all-around and individual event finals slated for Saturday.

The Showdown: The competition for the team crown on Friday is expected to come down to a battle between the No. 2 Golden Gophers and No. 3 Ohio State. The two teams certainly are no strangers to each other, with the Buckeyes having beaten the Golden Gophers 274.50-272.90 in East Lansing back on January 12, before the Golden Gophers bounced back the following weekend to win the 12-team Windy City Invitational in Chicago with a score of 274.65. The Buckeyes were right on their heels with a score of 274.15. The Buckeyes are led by Mike Racanelli, second at the NCAA and third at the Big Ten Championships in the all-around in '89. Jeff Dow, '89 Big Ten runner-up in the all-around, will lead No. 5 Iowa.

Coach Roethlisberger: "We finally have all of our people in the spots we want them except that (Dan) Zimpfer still will not compete on the rings this weekend. Some of our guys still need some refining, but with the conference meet being held so much earlier this year, Ohio State is probably in the same boat. Now it's just a matter of the guys concentrating and hitting their routines. It's going to be a battle right down to the wire. Friday night should be dynamite."

He also collected top honors on the pommel horse with a score of 9.75, finished second on the parallel bars with a score of 9.65 and was sixth on the still rings with a 9.50, en route to being honored as the league's Gymnast of the Year. Junior Mike Farina (Mundelein, IL), sixth in the all-around with a score of 107.40 (54.95 optional), senior Mike Graham (Green Bay, WI), sixth on the pommel horse with a 9.30, senior Dan Zimpfer (Kent, OH) tied with McKiernan for sixth on the still rings with a 9.50, and sophomore Leif Carlson (Bloomington, MN), tied for second on the high bar with a 9.75 and fifth on the parallel bars with a 9.30, are also returning placemen from a year ago for the Golden Gophers. Senior rings specialist Jeff Weltzin (Libertyville, IL), junior Jay Caputo (Longwood, FL) and freshmen standouts John Roethlisberger (Afton, MN) and Rob Hanson (Ramsey, MN) give the Golden Gophers' a solid nine-man lineup.

Roethlisberger Shines: Golden Gopher rookie John Roethlisberger was honored as the Big Ten Conference Gymnast of the Month for both December and January. The son of head coach Fred Roethlisberger, John finished third at the U.S. Winter National Championships held on December 1-2 in Colorado Springs, qualifying for the U.S. National Team in the process. Sitting eighth after the first day, he moved up with a strong performance on the final day to finish third with a score of 108.78. He then led the Golden Gophers to the team title at the prestigious Windy City Invitational in Chicago on January 19-20 by claiming top honors in the all-around competition with a score of 109.05. He also won the all-around in a meet against Kent State, Western Michigan and host Michigan in Ann Arbor on January 13 with a score of 55.50.

The Top 10: The Golden Gophers are ranked second in the latest national rankings by NCAA average. No. 3 Ohio State and No. 5 Iowa give the Big Ten Conference three of the top five teams in the nation.

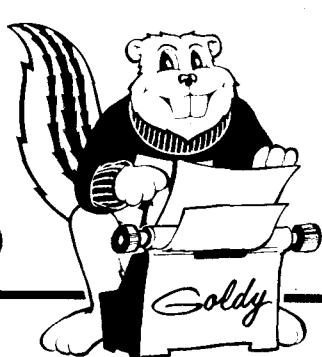

GOPHERS TO CLOSE CAGE SEASON AT OHIO STATE

Minnesota's Golden Gophers will bring down the curtain on regular-season play Saturday when taking on The Ohio State University Buckeyes at Columbus in a 1:07 p.m. (EST.) Big Ten Conference basketball assignment.

It will be the second meeting of the 1989-90 campaign between these two clubs, and Coach Clem Haskins' quintet would like to make it a series sweep with another conquest after nudging OSU 83-78 at Williams Arena earlier in the year. In all these two clubs have met 102 times in basketball over the years and the home-standing Bucks will take a commanding 61-41 edge in the series into Saturday afternoon's finale. In games played in Minneapolis, the Golden Gophers are on top 27-24, but in games played in Columbus, OSU leads 37-14.

A year ago Minnesota swept the series. The Golden Gophers won at home 76-73 and then posted a difficult 78-70 verdict at St. John Arena. Duplicating that feat will be a difficult task for Minnesota.

The Golden Gophers will take an overall record of 20-7 and a Big Ten mark of 11-6 into Saturday's game after splitting honors last week.

First Minnesota posted a 75-70 win at Indiana to nail down that 20-win season, but then they returned home to friendly Williams Arena only to fall 75-73 in overtime to league-leading Michigan State.

"Those were two outstanding college basketball games," Coach Haskins said. "It was great to get a road win at Indiana, and it enabled us to reach one of our goals (20 wins). The loss to Michigan State was a tough one, but it was a tremendous game between two fine teams. It was just too bad that someone had to lose."

Minnesota used great balance to down the Hoosiers and sweep that 1989-90 two-game series as five Golden Gophers (Willie Burton, Kevin Lynch, Melvin Newbern, Walter Bond and Richard Coffey) finished in double figures. Against the Spartans, that balance failed them and only Burton and Newbern reached that cherished circle (20 each).

"Experienced players make the plays," Haskins said of his cagers after those games. "Our people have been around for four years, and they have shown tremendous improvement. That was evident

against both Indiana and Michigan State. We won a big one, and we lost a big one....the loss in a very emotional situation with our seniors playing in their final home game. We had our chances to win it, even at the end, but we just could not finish it off."

The Golden Gophers lost their shooting eye and that home finale. In winning at Indiana, Minnesota hit 49% but in the loss to MSU they connected on only 41% of their shots....and they were only five-of-18 from three-point range.

But, Haskins emphasized, the season isn't over. "We know we have a tough game coming up at Ohio State Saturday," he said, "but we just have to go down there with the idea of getting back on track, finish the regular season on a winning note and getting ready for the NCAA Tournament."

The host Buckeyes came into this week's action with an overall record of 15-11 and a Big Ten mark of 9-7. After whipping Northwestern over the weekend, Ohio State tuned up for the Saturday afternoon finale by playing at Indiana Thursday.

ICERS REACH WCHA CHAMPIONSHIP PLAYOFFS IN SAINT PAUL

Minneapolis, MN---For the third consecutive year, the Minnesota hockey Gophers have reached the WCHA Championship Playoff Tournament in Saint Paul.

The tournament, staged and sponsored by the WCHA and the Saint Paul Chamber of Commerce, takes place Sunday and Monday, March 11-12, in the spacious Civic Center Arena. Semifinal games are scheduled for 2 p.m. and 7 p.m. Sunday, with a third place game at 2 p.m. Monday afternoon followed by the 7 p.m. championship clash.

Minnesota, 24-13-2 after eliminating Colorado College for this year's playoffs, meets surging North Dakota (26-9-4) in the 2 p.m. game Sunday. North Dakota eliminated Minnesota-Duluth in two games last weekend, 11-3 and 2-1.

The Gophers edged North Dakota for regular season honors by winning twice and recording one tie in four games against the Sioux. The Gophers won 6-5 and tied 4-4 in the Grand Forks series back in October. The schools split the pair at Mariucci Arena with UM winning 5-4 and North Dakota taking the final match, 7-4.

The other semifinal game finds regular season champion Wisconsin (30-9-1) facing Northern Michigan (22-17-1). Wisconsin dispatched Michigan Tech in two games while Northern Michigan did the same to Denver during the first round playoffs.

When this playoff gathering was first held at the end of the 1987-88 season, there were fears that Minnesota would receive a home ice advantage. Someone forgot to tell that to the last two UM teams. Minnesota is 1-3 in these Saint Paul playoff rounds.

Going in as the favorite each time as regular season champion, the Gophers lost the title game 3-2 to Wisconsin in 1988, then dropped a pair of games to Denver (2-1) and Wisconsin (4-3) last March. Maybe finishing second in this year's regular season WCHA race could supply a change of pace for coach Doug Woog's charges.

Minnesota rediscovered its scoring touch last weekend in beating Colorado College 9-3 and 9-2 at Mariucci Arena. The Gophers had dropped five of seven games preceding that series averaging just 3.4 goals per outing.

Senior **Jon Anderson (White Bear Lake)** and junior **Ben Hankinson (Edina)** led the Gopher scoring parade against the Tigers. Anderson hit for a pure hat trick in Friday's game, and even saw an apparent fourth scored disallowed. He added another goal Saturday that counted.

Hankinson matched Anderson's output by counting two goals in each game giving him 17 for the season, two more than Anderson.

Junior defenseman **Luke Johnson (Brooklyn Park)** came up with his biggest career weekend by notching five assists in the series. He counted one Friday and four more Saturday. Most came when the Gophers scored five power play goals the second night. UM connected nine times on 15 advantage chances in the two-game series.

Junior center **Ken Gernander (Coleraine)** came up with three series goals while senior center **Scott Bloom (Burnsville)** scored a goal each night.

Senior wing **Peter Hankinson (Edina)** upped his team scoring lead to 59 points in 39 games by totaling three series assists. Gernander continues to lead in goals scored with 29.

GOLDEN GOPHER GYMNASTS STEAL THE SHOW AT THE BIG TEN CHAMPIONSHIPS; HOST NO. 1 NEBRASKA SATURDAY (7-1/3-1 Big Ten)

The second-ranked Golden Gopher gymnastics team turned in a sizzling performance at the 82nd annual Big Ten Championships held last Friday and Saturday at the University of Iowa in Iowa City. When the dust had settled, head coach Fred Roethlisberger's squad had won the team title with a season-high score of 282.60, son **John Roethlisberger** (Afton, MN) had been honored as both the league's Gymnast and Freshman of the Year and the Golden Gopher head mentor had been named by his colleague to receive Coach of the Year honors.

A Sweet Victory: The Big Ten team title was the Golden Gophers' first since 1984 and the eighth under Fred Roethlisberger. Overall, Minnesota has collected 18 league crowns. With three teams in the top five in the country (No. 3 Ohio State & No. 5 Iowa) going into the meet, the battle for the top was as intense as expected. The top three teams finished within 1.05 of each other.

Coach Roethlisberger: "It's been six years since the last one so we're pleased, but it wasn't our maximum performance by any means. We're not anywhere near where we hope to be. This year the guys know that it's just the first step towards the NCAA Championship. We need to stay healthy and drill, drill, drill for the next six weeks."

All in the Family: The Roethlisbergers swept the honors at the Big Ten meet. John claimed the all-around crown on Saturday afternoon with a score of 113.35 and then in the individual finals that night he also won the horizontal bar with a score of 9.75, finished second on the parallel bars with a 9.675, was fifth in the floor exercise with a 9.25 and was seventh on the pommel horse with a 9.050. Making it a sweep for the Roethlisberger family, Fred Roethlisberger collected Coach of the Year honors. Marie Roethlisberger, a senior on the Golden Gopher women's team, has won two Big Ten all-around titles during her career and will be going for her third on March 23-24 in Ann Arbor, MI.

That Winning Feeling: Seniors **Dan Zimpfer** (Kent, OH) and **Mark McKiernan** (Darien, CT), along with junior **Jay Caputo** (Longwood, FL), joined John Roethlisberger atop the individual awards stand on Saturday. Zimpfer won the floor exercise title with a score of 9.575, McKiernan the pommel horse with a 9.80 and Caputo led a 1-2-3 Golden Gopher sweep on the parallel bars with a winning score of 9.70, followed by Roethlisberger and McKiernan (9.60).

The Top 10: The Golden Gophers were ranked second in the latest national rankings by NCAA average. No. 3 Ohio State and No. 5 Iowa give the Big Ten Conference three of the top five teams in the nation. The next national computer poll will be released on Tuesday, March 6.

SWIMMING & DIVING TEAM RECORDS BEST BIG TEN FINISH SINCE '27; NELSEN HONORED AS FRESHMAN OF THE YEAR (11-2 Overall/5-2 Big Ten)

With sophomore **Sean Quackenbush** (Rochester, MN) and freshman **Paul Nelsen** (Lincoln, NE) showing the way, the Golden Gopher swimming & diving team blazed to a runner-up finish at the Big Ten Championships held last Thursday thru Saturday at the Donald B. Canham Natatorium on the campus of the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor.

A Little History: The Golden Gophers' runner-up finish is the program's best at the Big Ten Championships since 1927 when they also placed second. Overall, the University of Minnesota has won two team titles at the Big Ten Championships...in 1922 and 1926.

Coach Dale: "We're ecstatic. We never dreamed that we could finish second, because realistically this was a rebuilding year for us. But this team really came together during the course of the meet, probably more so than any team I've had here at Minnesota. Our guys swam tough when it counted."

Nelsen Shines: Paul Nelsen was honored as the Big Ten Freshman of the Year following the meet. He won the 400 IM with an NCAA qualifying and new school record time of 3:51.50. He also qualified for the national meet in the 200 IM, finishing second with a clocking of 1:49.43, the 100 breaststroke, finishing second in 55.23, the 200 breaststroke, which he swam as an exhibition and clocked a 2:00.80 and as a member of the Golden Gopher 400 medley relay unit which placed second in 3:17.53. On top of that, he was a member of the 800 freestyle relay foursome that just missed the NCAA standard of 6:36.96, finishing fourth in the race with a time of 6:37.08.

"Paul had a great meet," Dale said. "He swam like a real veteran for us throughout the competition."

Quackenbush Sets All-Time Big Ten Mark: Honored as the Big Ten Freshman of the Year in '89, Sean Quackenbush turned in another outstanding conference meet for the Golden Gophers. He swept the butterfly events in the competition, setting a new all-time Big Ten record in the 200 butterfly with a winning clocking of 1:44.33 and also taking the 100 version of the stroke with an impressive time of 47.93. Both times erased school records that he had set during his rookie season a year ago. He also qualified for the NCAA Championships as a member of the Golden Gopher 400 freestyle (2:58.62) and medley (3:17.53) relay units, while just missing the standard of 6:36.96 in the 800 freestyle relay unit after finishing fourth in 6:37.08. In addition, he clocked a 1:50.89 in the 200 individual medley final to place sixth, after going 1:50.54 in the morning prelims.

"If by chance there was anyone who wasn't impressed with Sean last year, they certainly became convinced of his ability this time around," Dale said. "He was sensational. In fact, his relay performances were as good, or possibly even better if that's possible, than those in his individual events."

Coach of the Year: Golden Gopher head mentor J Robinson was honored as the 1989 Big Ten Conference Coach of the Year after leading the squad to a runner-up finish at the league championships.

Returning Placemen: Marty Morgan and Jeff Balcom both placed at the 1989 Big Ten Championships. Morgan, who is at 177 pounds this season, finished third at 167 pounds a year ago and then went on to garner All-America honors by placing sixth at the NCAA Championships in Oklahoma City two weeks later. His only setback this season was a 4-1 loss to top-ranked Chris Barnes from Oklahoma State in the 177-pound final at the Cowboy Wrestling Classic in Stillwater, OK back on January 27. Honored as the Big Ten Conference Wrestling Athlete of the Month for December, he defeated No. 5 John Kohls from Brigham Young at the East-West All-Star Classic in Portland, OR on Feb. 5. He has won individual titles at the Bison Open (Fargo, ND), Nebraska-Omaha Open, Northern Open (Madison, WI) and the Oregon Classic (Portland, OR). A year ago he charted an overall record of 32-10 with 12 pins, finishing sixth at the NCAA Championships at 167 pounds to earn All-America honors. He transferred to Gold Country from North Dakota State University where he won the NCAA Division II national title at 167 pounds in 1987 for the Bison.

National Rankings: The Golden Gophers have been ranked 14th in the latest Amateur Wrestling News national poll, released on February 22. Ben Morris, Dave Zuniga, Chuck Heise, Marty Morgan and Jeff Balcom also appeared in the individual rankings as well. A total of seven Big Ten Conference teams appeared in the top 25.

MURRELL LOOKS TO COMPETE IN NCAA TRACK & FIELD CHAMPIONSHIPS ON FRIDAY

Freshman Chris Murrell (Grand Island, NE), who won the Big Ten Conference high jump title with a personal-best and school indoor record leap of 7'3" at the league indoor track & field championships held in Bloomington, IN on February 23-24, will look to represent the Golden Gophers at the NCAA Indoor Championships in Indianapolis this week. The high jump will be held on Friday night in the spacious Indiana Hoosier Dome.

The Waiting Game: The NCAA provisional qualifying mark is 7'1", but the automatic qualifying standard is 7'4 1/2", a height which Chris Murrell failed to clear in three attempts at the Big Ten Championships. If a total of 16 performers do not meet the automatic standard, performances meeting provisional standards will be used to develop a descending order list to fill the field. The final field will be announced on Tuesday, March 6.

Murrell the Magnificent: Recognized as one of the finest prep high jumpers in the country a year ago when he won the Nebraska state high school crown for Grand Island with a state record jump of 7'1 1/4", Chris Murrell has continued to shine in Gold Country. His winning leap of 7'3" at the conference meet broke former Golden Gopher great Mike Vukovich's school indoor record of 7'2 1/2" set in 1988. He was honored on the All-Big Ten Team for his efforts and also finished fifth in the Athlete of the Year and third in the Freshman of the Year voting following the competition.

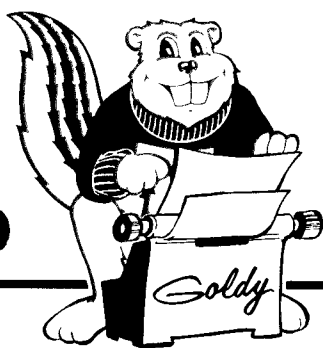

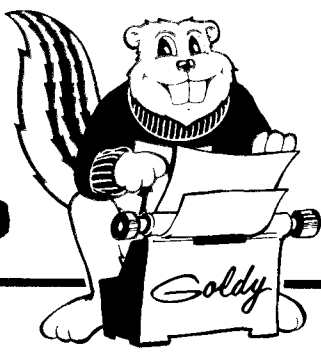

ROETHLISBERGER & MORGAN HONORED AS BIG TEN ATHLETES OF THE MONTH

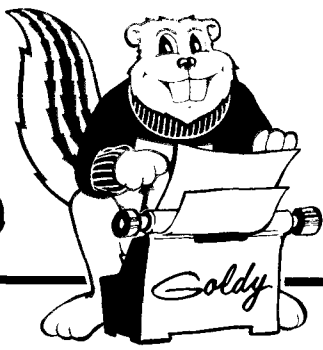
Freshman gymnast John Roethlisberger (Afton, MN) and junior wrestler Marty Morgan (Bloomington, MN) have been honored as the Big Ten Conference February Athlete of the Month in their respective sports.

John Roethlisberger and sister Marie, a senior for the Golden Gophers who collected Athlete of the Month honors in women's gymnastics, thus become the first brother-sister combination in league history to win the award in the same month.

John led the second-ranked Golden Gophers to their first Big Ten team title since 1984 and 18th overall at last weekend's conference championships held in Iowa City. He won the all-around title with a score of 113.35 (57.40 optional, 55.95 compulsory) and the horizontal bar crown with a 9.75. In addition, he finished second on the parallel bars (9.675), fifth in the floor exercise (9.25) and seventh on the pommel horse (9.050) en route to being honored as the Big Ten Gymnast and Freshman of the Year. It marks the third consecutive month that he has won the award.

Marie, who has won two Big Ten all-around titles during her career and will be going for her third later this month, recorded the Big Ten's top all-around score with a 38.05 against Iowa State on February 11, the 16th all-around victory in her career in Gold Country. She was also honored at the recent Shanico Invitational held at Oregon State University for having the meet's outstanding individual performance, after registering a 9.75 on the balance beam. Keeping things in the family, John and Marie's father, Fred, was honored as the Big Ten men's gymnastics Coach of the Year after directing the Golden Gophers to the title last weekend.

All-American Marty Morgan went undefeated during the month of February to raise his overall record to 32-1 on the season with 18 pins, one shy of the single-season school record of 19 set by Mike McArthur during the 1976-77 season. 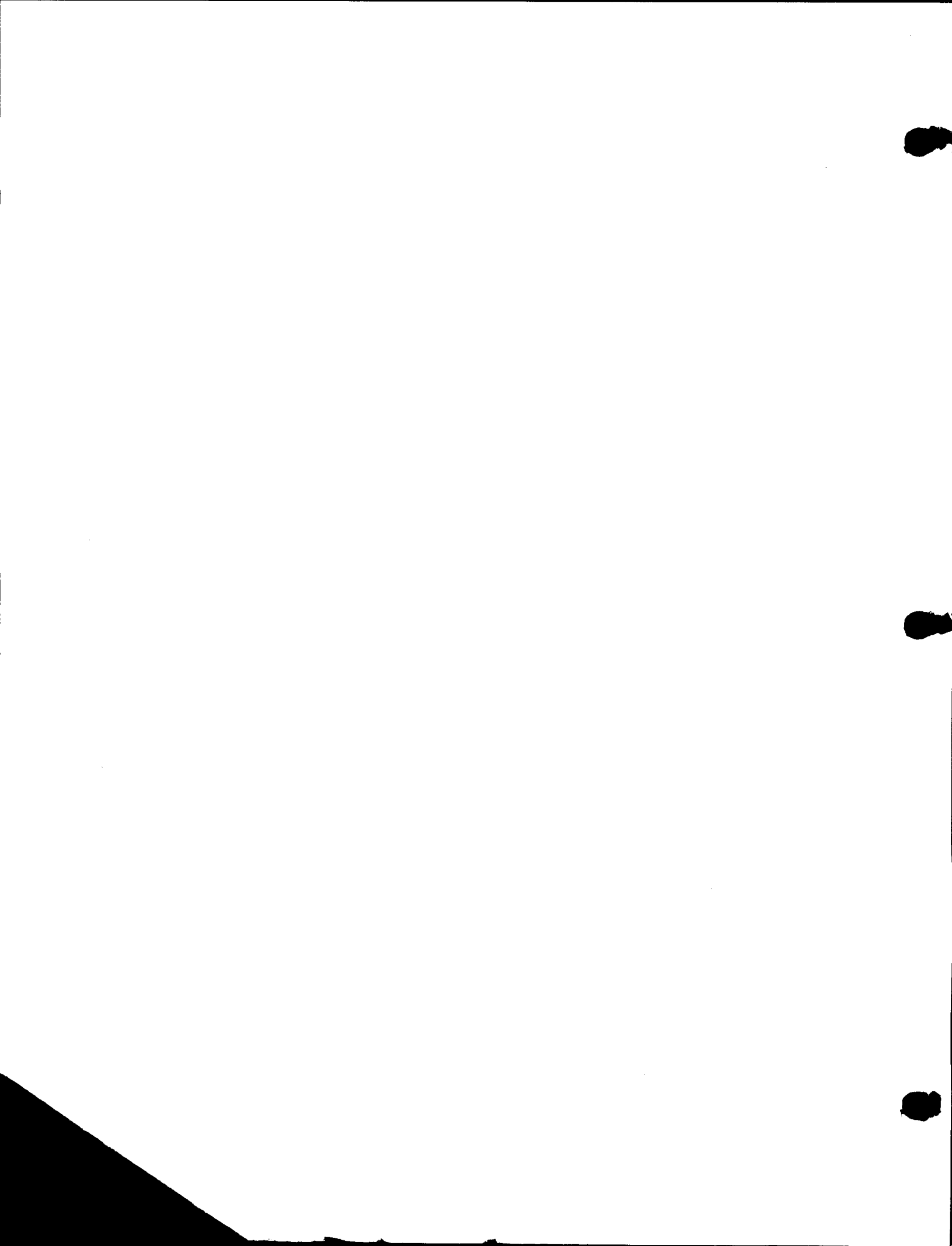

One change will find Dan Meinert, now the department's Associate Director, being elevated to the position of Senior Associate Director and continuing to function as Bay's top aide.

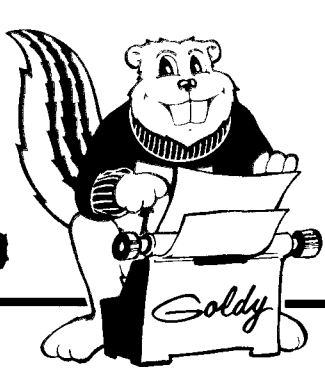

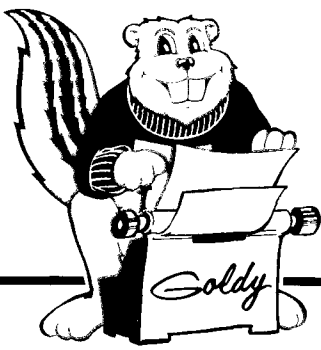

Coach of the Year: Golden Gopher head mentor J Robinson was honored as the 1989 Big Ten Conference Coach of the Year after leading the squad to a runner-up finish at the league championships.

Coach Robinson: "We have to go there with the idea of winning it, but the main idea is to qualify as many people for the NCAA Tournament as possible. That's our main goal and that's where our emphasis has to be. It's a critical tournament for us as far as going forward. You could have a 28-2 record going in, but if you lose two matches, you may be done for the season. Our intensity must be there and we must realize where we're going and what we're going to try to accomplish this weekend."

Returning Placewinners: Marty Morgan and Jeff Balcom both placed at the 1989 Big Ten Championships. Morgan, who is at 177 pounds this season, finished third at 167 pounds a year ago and then went on to garner All-America honors by placing sixth at the NCAA Championships in Oklahoma City two weeks later. Balcom was the runner-up at heavyweight a year ago and a quarterfinalist at the NCAA's. He missed collecting All-America honors by just one victory.

Fearsome Foursome: Dave Zuniga at 134 (18-1), Chuck Heise at 142 (33-3-1), Marty Morgan at 177 (32-1) and Jeff Balcom at heavyweight (27-4-3) have led the Golden Gophers all season long. They have compiled an overall record of 110-9-4. In dual meets, the fearsome foursome is 51-4-4, including a 17-2-1 mark in Big Ten action.

Morgan Chases Record: Marty Morgan has registered 18 pins thus far this season, just one shy of the single-season school record of 19 set by Mike McArthur during the 1976-77 season. His only setback this season was a 4-1 loss to top-ranked Chris Barnes from Oklahoma State in the 177-pound final at the Cowboy Wrestling Classic in Stillwater, OK back on January 27. Honored as the Big Ten Conference Wrestling Athlete of the Month for December, he defeated No. 5 John Kohls from Brigham Young at the East-West All-Star Classic in Portland, OR on Feb. 5. He has won individual titles at the Bison Open (Fargo, ND), Nebraska-Omaha Open, Northern Open (Madison, WI) and the Oregon Classic (Portland, OR). A year ago he charted an overall record of 32-10 with 12 pins, finishing sixth at the NCAA Championships at 167 pounds to earn All-America honors. He transferred to Gold Country from North Dakota State University where he won the NCAA Division II national title at 167 pounds in 1987 for the Bison.

National Rankings: The Golden Gophers have been ranked 14th in the latest Amateur Wrestling News national poll, released on February 22. Ben Morris, Dave Zuniga, Chuck Heise, Marty Morgan and Jeff Balcom also appeared in the individual rankings as well. A total of seven Big Ten Conference teams appeared in the top 25.

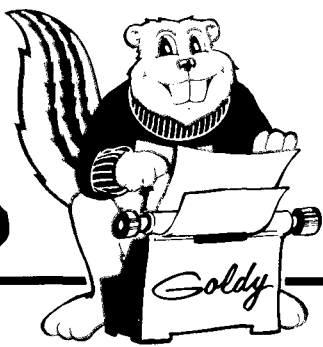

NCAA Qualifiers: The top four finishers in each weight class, along with nine wild-card selections, will advance to the NCAA Championships to be held March 22-24 at the University of Maryland in College Park.

Coach of the Year: Golden Gopher head mentor J Robinson was honored as the 1989 Big Ten Conference Coach of the Year after leading the squad to a runner-up finish at the league championships.

Coach Robinson: "We have to go there with the idea of winning it, but the main idea is to qualify as many people for the NCAA Tournament as possible. That's our main goal and that's where our emphasis has to be. It's a critical tournament for us as far as going forward. You could have a 28-2 record going in, but if you lose two matches, you may be done for the season. Our intensity must be there and we must realize where we're going and what we're going to try to accomplish this weekend."

Returning Placewinners: Marty Morgan and Jeff Balcom both placed at the 1989 Big Ten Championships. Morgan, who is at 177 pounds this season, finished third at 167 pounds a year ago and then went on to garner All-America honors by placing sixth at the NCAA Championships in Oklahoma City two weeks later. Balcom was the runner-up at heavyweight a year ago and a quarterfinalist at the NCAA's. He missed collecting All-America honors by just one victory.

Fearsome Foursome: Dave Zuniga at 134 (18-1), Chuck Heise at 142 (33-3-1), Marty Morgan at 177 (32-1) and Jeff Balcom at heavyweight (27-4-3) have led the Golden Gophers all season long. They have compiled an overall record of 110-9-4. In dual meets, the fearsome foursome is 51-4-4, including a 17-2-1 mark in Big Ten action.

Morgan Chases Record: Marty Morgan has registered 18 pins thus far this season, just one shy of the single-season school record of 19 set by Mike McArthur during the 1976-77 season. His only setback this season was a 4-1 loss to top-ranked Chris Barnes from Oklahoma State in the 177-pound final at the Cowboy Wrestling Classic in Stillwater, OK back on January 27. Honored as the Big Ten Conference Wrestling Athlete of the Month for December, he defeated No. 5 John Kohls from Brigham Young at the East-West All-Star Classic in Portland, OR on Feb. 5. He has won individual titles at the Bison Open (Fargo, ND), Nebraska-Omaha Open, Northern Open (Madison, WI) and the Oregon Classic (Portland, OR). A year ago he charted an overall record of 32-10 with 12 pins, finishing sixth at the NCAA Championships at 167 pounds to earn All-America honors. He transferred to Gold Country from North Dakota State University where he won the NCAA Division II national title at 167 pounds in 1987 for the Bison.

National Rankings: The Golden Gophers have been ranked 14th in the latest Amateur Wrestling News national poll, released on February 22. Ben Morris, Dave Zuniga, Chuck Heise, Marty Morgan and Jeff Balcom also appeared in the individual rankings as well. A total of seven Big Ten Conference teams appeared in the top 25.

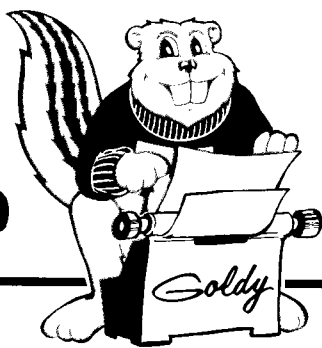

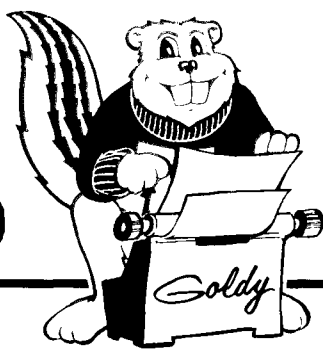

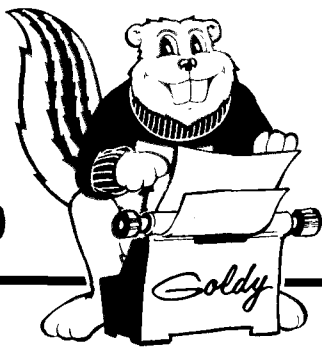

GOLDEN GOPHERS GAIN NCAA TOURNAMENT BID

Minnesota's Golden Gophers, for the second straight year, have received a bid to participate in the NCAA post-season basketball tournament, and they'll be among the nation's 64 elite collegiate teams competing for the 1990 national championship.

A year ago Coach Clem Haskins' contingent received a similar invitation, and they made it to the "Sweet Sixteen" before falling to Duke in the East Region. This time the Golden Gophers will take on Texas-El Paso at 2:37 p.m. (EST) on Friday in the first round of the Southeast Region at Richmond, VA.

If Minnesota prevails in its opener, it would advance to the second round and meet the winner of the Missouri - Northern Iowa contest Sunday afternoon. The Winner of that contest then will move on to the Southeast Region semi-finals and finals March 23 & 25 in New Orleans, LA.

"We're very pleased to be back in the tournament again," Coach Haskins said. "We feel that we've had a good season,

but now that season is over. Now we start another season, the NCAA Tournament."

The Golden Gophers also know they face a rugged assignment in the opener when they will take on the Miners, champions of the Western Athletic Conference, who finished regular-season play with a 21-10 record.

"UTEP is a very, very good basketball team," Haskins proclaimed. "They are extremely big and physical. They probably will be the biggest team we will face this season. They are a total package kind of ball club."

Minnesota players are aware of Friday's opponents.....at least one of them. He's Marlon Maxey, a 6-8, 220-pound redshirt sophomore who started his collegiate basketball career at the U of M before transferring to Texas-El Paso after one season.

"Maxie is a tremendous force inside," Haskins said of the Miner who leads UTEP in both scoring and rebounding, "and our players remember him beating up on them in practice two years ago."

The Golden Gophers will take an overall record of 20-8 and a Big Ten mark of 11-7, good for a fourth-place tie in the final standings, into Friday's first round NCAA Tournament assignment.

And, if there is a down side to Minnesota's festive mood, it may be that they go into the tourney with a two-game losing streak after falling 93-83 at Ohio State in the regular-season finale last weekend. It will not provide the kind of momentum Coach Haskins had hoped for.

"Yes, we're disappointed with our final two losses," Haskins explained, "but I'm very proud of our basketball team. We need to be more consistent if we hope to advance in the tournament, however, and we know we'll just have to be ready to play from the outset against Texas El Paso."

Haskins won't change his lineup for the Miners, and he'll again go with his veteran unit of Jim Shikenjanski at center, Richard Coffey and Willie Burton (he had a career high of 31 points at Ohio State) at forward and Kevin Lynch and Melvin Newbern at guard.

ZUNIGA PACES GOLDEN GOPHER WRESTLERS TO THIRD-PLACE FINISH AT BIG TEN CHAMPIONSHIPS; FIVE QUALIFY FOR NCAA'S (10-6/2-3 Big Ten)

Junior **Dave Zuniga** (Worland, WY) led a trio of Golden Gophers that won individual titles to pace head coach J Robinson's 14th-ranked squad to a tie for third-place at the Big Ten Championships held last Saturday and Sunday at Evanston, IL.

Zuniga Named Athlete-of-the-Championship: Dave Zuniga, ranked No. 2 in the nation, topped No. 1 Tom Brands from Iowa 6-5 in the championship match at 134 pounds en route to being honored as the Athlete-of-the-Championship. A transfer from Utah State University where he was a two-time NCAA qualifier, he raised his record to 22-1 on the season with the victory over Brands. In the process, he avenged two earlier defeats to Brands, a 5-1 setback in the championship match of the Northern Open at Madison, WI on November 24 while wrestling unattached and a 5-3 defeat in the Hawkeyes' 31-7 dual meet victory over the Golden Gophers at Williams Arena on January 24.

Leading The Way: Senior **Chuck Heise** (Mosinee, WI) and junior **Marty Morgan** (Bloomington, MN) also collected individual titles for the Golden Gophers. The three individual championships were more than any other school in the league. Heise, ranked No. 6 in the nation, upped his overall mark to 37-3-1 on the season with a 6-4 victory over No. 7 Troy Steiner from Iowa at 142 pounds. Morgan, ranked No. 2, scored a 9-7 win over No. 4 Mike Funk from Northwestern at 177 pounds to raise his record to 35-1 on the season.

NCAA Qualifiers: The Golden Gophers qualified five competitors for the NCAA Championships to be held at College Park, MD on March 22-24. The top four finishers in each weight class, plus a total of nine wild cards as selected by the league's coaches advanced to the national meet. Joining Dave Zuniga, Chuck Heise and Marty Morgan, will be Jeff Balcom, who finished third, and Ben Morris, a wild card selection.

Fearsome Foursome: Dave Zuniga at 134 (22-1), Chuck Heise at 142 (37-3-1), Marty Morgan at 177 (35-1) and Jeff Balcom at heavyweight (30-5-3) have led the Golden Gophers all season long. They have compiled an overall record of 124-10-4. In dual meets, the fearsome foursome finished with a sterling 51-4-4 record, including a 17-2-1 mark in Big Ten action.

Morgan Sets Pin Record: Marty Morgan has registered 20 pins thus far this season, breaking the old single-season school record of 19 set by Mike McArthur during the 1976-77 season. His only setback this season was a 4-1 loss to top-ranked Chris Barnes from Oklahoma State in the 177-pound final at the Cowboy Wrestling Classic in Stillwater, OK back on January 27. Honored as the Big Ten Conference Wrestling Athlete-of-the-Month in both December and February, he defeated No. 5 John Kohls from Brigham Young at the East-West All-Star Classic in Portland, OR on Feb. 5. In addition to his Big Ten 177-pound title, he has won individual titles at the Bison Open (Fargo, ND), Nebraska-Omaha Open, Northern Open (Madison, WI) and the Oregon Classic (Portland, OR). A year ago he charted an overall record of 32-10 with 12 pins, finishing sixth at the NCAA Championships at 167 pounds to earn All-America honors. He transferred to Gold Country from North Dakota State University where he won the NCAA Division II national title at 167 pounds in 1987 for the Bison.

Looking Back: Dave Dean, Gordy Morgan, Marty Morgan and Chris Short garnered All-America honors in 1989 to lead the Golden Gophers to their best showing at the NCAA meet since 1979, when they also finished seventh. Dean and Short finished third at 177 and 190 pounds respectively, while the Morgan brothers also got into the All-America act. Marty finished sixth at 167 pounds, while Gordy was eighth at 158 pounds. The four All-Americans are the most ever for the Golden Gophers in one season.

Gopher Champions: The University of Minnesota has had a total of seven individuals win eight NCAA titles for the Golden Gophers through the years. Vern Gagne holds the distinction of being the school's only two-time national champion, winning the 191-pound class in 1948 and then the heavyweight division the following year. The Golden Gophers who have won national crowns are as follows: 1937 - John Whitaker, 175 pounds; 1939 - Dale Hanson, 128 pounds; 1941 - Leonard Levy, heavyweight; 1948 - Vern Gagne, 191 pounds; 1949 - Vern Gagne, heavyweight; 1953 - Dick Mueller, 123 pounds; 1976 - Evan Johnson, 190 pounds; 1977 - Pat Neu, 134 pounds.

National Rankings: The Golden Gophers have been ranked 14th in the latest Amateur Wrestling News national poll, released on February 22. Ben Morris, Dave Zuniga, Chuck Heise, Marty Morgan and Jeff Balcom also appeared in the individual rankings as well. A total of seven Big Ten Conference teams appeared in the top 25.

SECOND-RANKED GYMNASTS BATTLE TO TIE WITH TOP-RANKED NEBRASKA (7-1-1/3-1 Big Ten)

It was a meet that lived up to its billing...and then some. The showdown between the nation's top two gymnastics teams, the No. 2 Golden Gophers and No. 1 Nebraska, ended in an amazing tie with both teams scoring 281.65 on Saturday night in Williams Arena.

The Winners: Senior Mark McKiernan (Darien, CT) turned in an outstanding performance en route to winning the parallel bars competition. Flawless from the start, he recorded a score of 9.85. Senior Dan Zimpfer (Kent, OH) and freshmen John Roethlisberger (Afton, MN) and Rob Hanson (Ramsey, MN), joined Nebraska's Bob Stelter in a four-way logjam for top honors on the vault with identical scores of 9.35

The Rings: With Mark McKiernan's 9.60 showing the way, the Golden Gophers registered a season-high score of 47.70 on the still rings against the Cornhuskers. Rob Hanson, John Roethlisberger and senior **Jeff Weltzin** (Libertyville, IL) all recorded 9.55's, while junior **Mike Farina** (Mundelein, IL) rounded out the scoring on the routine with a 9.45.

All In The Family: For the third consecutive month (December, January, February), John Roethlisberger has been named Big Ten Conference Gymnastics Athlete-of-the-Month. John and his sister Marie, a senior for the Golden Gophers who collected Athlete-of-the-Month honors in women's gymnastics, thus become the first brother-sister combination in league history to win the award in the same month. John led the Golden Gophes to their first Big Ten team title since 1984 and 18th overall at the league championships held in Iowa City on March 2-3 (included in February voting). He won the all-around title with a score of 113.35 (57.40 optional, 55.95 compulsory) and the horizontal bar crown with a 9.75. In addition, he finished second on the parallel bars (9.675), fifth in the floor exercise (9.25) and seventh on the pommel horse (9.050) en route to being honored as the Big Ten Gymnast and Freshman-of-the-Year. On top of that, Golden Gopher men's coach Fred Roethlisberger was honored as the Big Ten Coach-of-the-Year after directing his squad to the conference title.

Time To Study: Head coach Fred Roethlisberger's Golden Gophers will be off from competition this week because of finals. They will be in action next on Saturday, March 24 in Madison, WI, where they'll face the host Wisconsin Badgers, No. 3 Ohio State and No. 6 Iowa.

The Top 10: The Golden Gophers were ranked second in the latest national rankings by NCAA average. No. 3 Ohio State and No. 6 Iowa give the Big Ten Conference three of the top six teams in the nation. The next national computer rankings will be released on Tuesday, March 13.

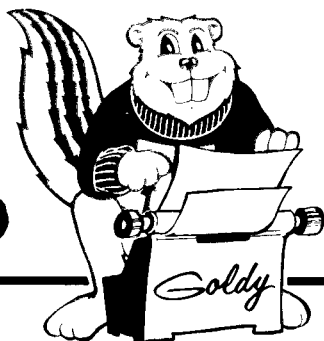

The Golden Gophers currently have five games scheduled for television on the Midwest Sports Channel for the 1990 season.

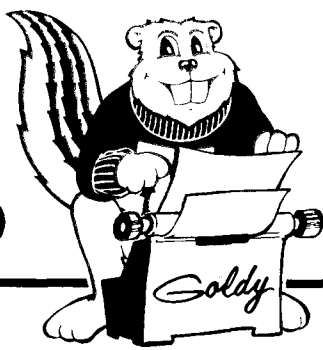

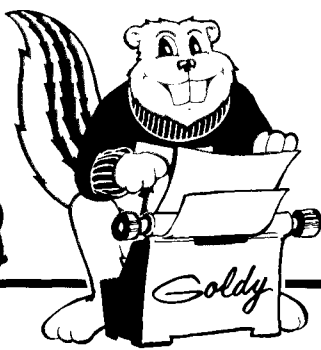

Minnesota fans could be in a quandry next Friday...whether to watch NCAA hockey or NCAA basketball on television. Both the Gopher ice and cage team games will be carried locally. The pucksters qualified for the NCAA Second Round series, best of three, against Boston College in Chestnut Hill, MA. KITN-TV (Ch. 29) will be there for games Friday, Saturday and Sunday if necessary. The basketball team reached the "Sweet 16" and go up against mighty Syracuse at the Superdome in New Orleans Friday with WCCO-TV (Ch. 4) on the scene. A win would put UM in the Regional Final Sunday afternoon. WAYL-980 AM and KSTP-1500 AM radio will be in Boston to carry hockey, while WCCO-830 AM will air all the basketball action.

SWEET SIXTEEN NEXT FOR GOLDEN GOPHERS

How sweet it is! For the second consecutive year, the University of Minnesota basketball team has battled its way into the NCAA's Sweet Sixteen, and for the Golden Gophers, the taste couldn't be sweeter.

Coach Clem Haskins charges became one of the 16 survivors by winning a pair of heart-stopping assignments in first and second round play of the Southeast Region tournament at Richmond, VA, last weekend.

Now they move on to the Southeast Region semi-finals to take on highly-touted Syracuse Friday evening. In the other Southeast Region contest Friday night, fellow Big-Tener Michigan State squares off with Georgia Tech. The two winners then meet Sunday afternoon for the regional championship and the right to advance to the Final Four.

But back to Minnesota's two most-recent triumphs. In the tournament opener, the Golden Gophers fought for their lives before eliminating the University of Texas-El Paso 64-61 in overtime. Then in the second round Minnesota outlasted the University of Northern Iowa 81-78.

"Our win over UTEP certainly wasn't pretty," Coach Haskins admitted. "We didn't execute the way we should have. We got out-rebounded. And we shot horribly. But we won. We stayed alive."

Kevin Lynch was Minnesota's top gun as he collected 18 points and hit four three-point baskets. Melvin Newbern added 15 and Willie Burton 14. But as a team the U of M hit only 33% of its shots. Richard Coffey garnered 11 rebounds to keep UM alive.

Against Northern Iowa, the Golden Gophers did a better job in all departments. They shot 51%, had a 37-32 rebound advantage, registered seven steals and had three blocked shots.

Burton set the scoring pace with a career high 36 points while Lynch and Walter Bond chipped in with 12 each. Burton also collared 12 rebounds, and Newbern tied a UM record with nine assists.

"It was a great win for us," Haskins said. "We didn't get the balanced scoring we like, but we had people contribute in other ways, and we got more quality minutes from our people off the bench."

So now it is on to New Orleans and Minnesota's first basketball meeting ever with the Syracuse Orangemen. In the process, the Golden Gophers are registering some significant statistics. This is, for example, the first time in history that Minnesota has played in two consecutive NCAA post-season cage tourneys. It obviously, then, marks the first time it's reached the Sweet Sixteen two years in a row. In addition, the Golden Gophers will take an overall record of 22-8 into Friday night's clash. Only twice in history has Minnesota won more games in a single season.....23 in 1981-82 and 24 in 1976-77.

"This club has come a long way," Haskins proclaims. "They have shown great improvement. And they remember getting to the Sweet Sixteen a year ago only to get whipped by Duke in the semi-finals. They remember that. And they'll carry that memory into the Syracuse game in New Orleans Friday night."

ICERS HEAD FOR B.C. & 2ND ROUND NCAA CLASH

Minneapolis, MN---For the third time in his five years as head coach of the U. of Minnesota Golden Gopher hockey program, head coach Doug Woog and his players must face the top seeded team in the East during an NCAA preliminary round.

This weekend finds Minnesota (27-14-2) at Boston College (25-11-1), the East's #1 seed, for games Friday, Saturday, and Sunday, if necessary, in a best two of three NCAA Second Round series. The winner heads for Detroit and the NCAA Championships March 30-April 1.

In 1986, Woog's first entry into the NCAA tournament in his rookie season behind the UM bench, Minnesota, after finishing second in the WCHA, had to play at Boston University, the top eastern seed that year. Minnesota won 6-4 and 5-3 in a total-goal series to advance.

The next year UM again ended second in regular season play, and again headed East. This time the Gophers edged Boston College 6-4 in a total-goal series played, strangely enough, in the Boston U. ice rink. The top seeded Eagles were a road team that year due to construction of a new home rink.

This year Minnesota qualified for the same set of circumstances by defeating Clarkson at home 6-1 and 5-1 last weekend in a best two of three series. Boston College drew a bye last weekend.

Minnesota and Boston College met once this season with the Eagles winning 7-4 on their home ice back in November. Minnesota owns an 8-5-1 series edge against B.C., but Eagles teams have recorded a 4-3-1 record against Woog-coached Gopher squads.

Gopher senior wing **Peter Hankinson (Edina)** regained his scoring touch against Clarkson leading Minnesota with six points against the Golden Knights. His goals were his first in the playoffs as he scored one in each game and added four assists, three in Friday's 6-1 win. The points tie Hankinson with wing **Grant Bischoff (Grand Rapids)** for team leadership in playoff scoring. Each has nine points in six games. Hankinson is 2-7 and Bischoff 3-6 in goals-assists.

Hankinson continues to lead the U of M in scoring for all games with 65 points in 43 games. Saturday's game vs. Clarkson was his 173rd career outing which tied him for most game appearances by a Minnesota player with Gary Shopek. Shopek's streak ran from 1984 through 1987.

Bischoff produced two goals and two assists vs. Clarkson, but it was freshman wing **Trent Klatt (Osseo)** who returned to his earlier scoring ways with three goals in the series. Klatt, before injuring an ankle in late January, had been scoring at a terrific clip only to see his touch fade after returning to action. He also added one assist Friday. Hankinson has 25 goals on the season, Klatt 22 and Bischoff 20. His final goal Saturday was an empty-netter.

Junior center **Ken Gernander (Coleraine)** was the only other Gopher to have multiple goals against Clarkson. In fact, he scored Minnesota's first two tallies Friday and now has a steam-high 32 on the season. The only other Gopher with 20 or more scores is senior center **Scott Bloom (Burnsville)**. Bloom has lit the lamp 24 times this season, but was held to one assist last weekend.

Freshman goalie **Tom Newman (Blaine)** ran his season record to 18-11-2 by gaining both wins against Clarkson. He lowered his season goals allowed average to 3.86, but shows a terrific 3.15 average in six playoff starts where his record reads 5-1-0.

The twin wins upped Woog's five-year record to 163 victories against 62 losses and six ties for a winning mark of .719 percent. Only John Mariucci (215), Herb Brooks (175) and Brad Buetow (171) have gained more UM coaching victories than Woog.

Last weekend marked the sixth straight year and the 10th time since 1979 that Minnesota has reached the NCAA playoffs. Gopher teams have played in the last four NCAA Championship Tournaments.

The sixth-ranked Golden Gopher wrestling team will compete at the NCAA Championships this Thursday thru Saturday at the the University of Maryland in College Park.

Looking Back: Dave Dean, Gordy Morgan, Marty Morgan and Chris Short garnered All-America honors in 1989 to lead the Golden Gophers to their best showing at the NCAA meet since 1979, when they also finished seventh. Dean and Short finished third at 177 and 190 pounds respectively, while the Morgan brothers also got into the All-America act. Marty finished sixth at 167 pounds, while Gordy was eighth at 158 pounds. The four All-Americans are the most ever for the Golden Gophers in one season.

Gopher Champions: The University of Minnesota has had a total of seven individuals win eight NCAA titles for the Golden Gophers through the years. Vern Gagne holds the distinction of being the school's only two-time national champion, winning the 191-pound class in 1948 and then the heavyweight division the following year. The Golden Gophers who have won national crowns are as follows: 1937 - John Whitaker, 175 pounds; 1939 - Dale Hanson, 128 pounds; 1941 - Leonard Levy, heavyweight; 1948 - Vern Gagne, 191 pounds; 1949 - Vern Gagne, heavyweight; 1953 - Dick Mueller, 123 pounds; 1976 - Evan Johnson, 190 pounds; 1977 - Pat Neu, 134 pounds.

NCAA Qualifiers: The Golden Gophers qualified five competitors for the NCAA Championships. The top four finishers in each weight class at the Big Ten Championships held on March 10-11 at Northwestern University in Evanston, IL, plus a total of nine wild cards as selected by the league's coaches advanced to the national meet. Seniors Chuck Heise and Jeff Balcom, juniors Marty Morgan and Dave Zuniga, and sophomore Ben Morris will compete at the nationals for the Golden Gophers.

Head Coach J Robinson: "Right now probably the two teams to beat are Arizona State and Oklahoma State. Iowa has a lot of depth, but they have a lot of wrestlers who'll likely finish somewhere from fifth through eighth place. If they do well and get some breaks, they could be third. If we have two in the finals and we have two champions, and two others who finish in the top six, we could finish fourth, third or even second. We'll likely finish somewhere in the top five."

Zuniga Named Athlete-of-the-Championship: Dave Zuniga, ranked No. 2 in the nation, topped No. 1 Tom Brands from Iowa 6-5 in the championship match at 134 pounds en route to being honored as the Athlete-of-the-Championship. A transfer from Utah State University where he was a two-time NCAA qualifier, he raised his record to 22-1 on the season with the victory over Brands. In the process, he avenged two earlier defeats to Brands, a 5-1 setback in the championship match of the Northern Open at Madison, WI on November 24 while wrestling unattached and a 5-3 defeat in the Hawkeyes' 31-7 dual meet victory over the Golden Gophers at Williams Arena on January 24.

Leading The Way: Chuck Heise and Marty Morgan also collected individual titles for the Golden Gophers. The three individual championships were more than any other school in the league. Heise, ranked No. 8 in the nation, upped his overall mark to 37-3-1 on the season with a 6-4 victory over No. 10 Troy Steiner from Iowa at 142 pounds. Morgan, ranked No. 2, scored a 9-7 win over No. 3 Mike Funk from Northwestern at 177 pounds to raise his record to 35-1 on the season.

Fearsome Foursome: Dave Zuniga at 134 (22-1), Chuck Heise at 142 (37-3-1), Marty Morgan at 177 (35-1) and Jeff Balcom at heavyweight (30-5-3) have led the Golden Gophers all season long. They have compiled an overall record of 124-10-4. In dual meets, the fearsome foursome finished with a sterling 51-4-4 record, including a 17-2-1 mark in Big Ten action.

Morgan Sets Pin Record: Marty Morgan has registered 20 pins thus far this season, breaking the old single-season school record of 19 set by Mike McArthur during the 1976-77 season. His only setback this season was a 4-1 loss to top-ranked Chris Barnes from Oklahoma State in the 177-pound final at the Cowboy Wrestling Classic in Stillwater, OK back on January 27. Honored as the Big Ten Conference Wrestling Athlete-of-the-Month in both December and February, he defeated John Kohls from Brigham Young at the East-West All-Star Classic in Portland, OR on Feb. 5. In addition to his Big Ten 177-pound title, he has won individual titles at the Bison Open (Fargo, ND), Nebraska-Omaha Open, Northern Open (Madison, WI) and the Oregon Classic (Portland, OR). A year ago he

charted an overall record of 32-10 with 12 pins, finishing sixth at the NCAA Championships at 167 pounds to earn All-America honors. He transferred to Gold Country from North Dakota State University where he won the NCAA Division II national title at 167 pounds in 1987 for the Bison.

A Little History: The Golden Gophers' runner-up finish is the program's best at the Big Ten Championships since 1927 when they also placed second. Overall, the University of Minnesota has won two team titles at the Big Ten Championships...in 1922 and 1926.

Coach Dale: "We're ecstatic. We never dreamed that we could finish second, because realistically this was a rebuilding year for us. But this team really came together during the course of the meet, probably more so than any team I've had here at Minnesota. Our guys swam tough when it counted."

Nelsen Shines: Paul Nelsen was honored as the Big Ten Freshman of the Year following the meet. He won the 400 IM with an NCAA qualifying and new school record time of 3:51.50. He also qualified for the national meet in the 200 IM, finishing second with a clocking of 1:49.43, the 100 breaststroke, finishing second in 55.23, the 200 breaststroke, which he swam as an exhibition and clocked a 2:00.80 and as a member of the Golden Gopher 400 medley relay unit which placed second in 3:17.53. On top of that, he was a member of the 800 freestyle relay foursome that just missed the NCAA standard of 6:36.96, finishing fourth in the race with a time of 6:37.08.

"Paul had a great meet," Dale said. "He swam like a real veteran for us throughout the competition."

Quackenbush Sets All-Time Big Ten Mark: Honored as the Big Ten Freshman of the Year in '89, Sean Quackenbush turned in another outstanding conference meet for the Golden Gophers. He swept the butterfly events in the competition, setting a new all-time Big Ten record in the 200 butterfly with a winning clocking of 1:44.33 and also taking the 100 version of the stroke with an impressive time of 47.93. Both times erased school records that he had set during his rookie season a year ago. He also qualified for the NCAA Championships as a member of the Golden Gopher 400 freestyle (2:58.62) and medley (3:17.53) relay units, while just missing the standard of 6:36.96 in the 800 freestyle relay unit after finishing fourth in 6:37.08. In addition, he clocked a 1:50.89 in the 200 individual medley final to place sixth, after going 1:50.54 in the morning prelims.

"If by chance there was anyone who wasn't impressed with Sean last year, they certainly became convinced of his ability this time around," Dale said. "He was sensational. In fact, his relay performances were as good, or possibly even better if that's possible, than those in his individual events."

Final 1990 Big Ten Standings: The Golden Gophers won the Big Ten team crown held on March 2-3 in Iowa City with a season-high score of 282.60. Iowa was second with 281.70, Ohio State third with 281.55 and Wisconsin sixth with 268.20.

Last Time Out: It was a meet that lived up to its billing...and then some. The showdown between the nation's top two gymnastics teams on March 10 at Williams Arena, the No. 2 Golden Gophers and No. 1 Nebraska, ended in an amazing tie with both teams scoring 281.65 in the competition.

The Winners: Senior Mark McKiernan (Darien, CT) turned in an outstanding performance en route to winning the parallel bars competition against the Cornhuskers. Flawless from the start, he recorded a score of 9.85. Senior Dan Zimpfer (Kent, OH) and freshmen John Roethlisberger (Afton, MN) and Rob Hanson (Ramsey, MN), joined Nebraska's Bob Stelter in a four-way logjam for top honors on the vault with identical scores of 9.35.

The Rings: With Mark McKiernan's 9.60 showing the way, the Golden Gophers registered a season-high score of 47.70 on the still rings against the Cornhuskers. Rob Hanson, John Roethlisberger and senior Jeff Weltzin (Libertyville, IL) all recorded 9.55's, while junior Mike Farina (Mundelein, IL) rounded out the scoring on the routine with a 9.45.

All In The Family: For the third consecutive month (December, January, February), John Roethlisberger has been named Big Ten Conference Gymnastics Athlete-of-the-Month. John and his sister Marie, a senior for the Golden Gophers who collected Athlete-of-the-Month honors in women's gymnastics, thus become the first brother-sister combination in league history to win the award in the same month. John led the Golden Gophers to their first Big Ten team title since 1984 and 18th overall at the league championships held in Iowa City on March 2-3 (included in February voting). He won the all-around title with a score of 113.35 (57.40 optional, 55.95 compulsory) and the horizontal bar crown with a 9.75. In addition, he finished second on the parallel bars (9.675), fifth in the floor exercise (9.25) and seventh on the pommel horse (9.050) en route to being honored as the Big Ten Gymnast and Freshman-of-the-Year. On top of that, Golden Gopher men's coach Fred Roethlisberger was honored as the Big Ten Coach-of-the-Year after directing his squad to the conference title.

GOLDEN GOPHERS FINISH WITH 23-9 CAGE RECORD

Minnesota's dreams for a first-ever appearance in the NCAA "Final Four" ended in frustration and disappointment last weekend when Georgia Tech nudged the Golden Gophers 93-91 in the championship round of the Southeast Region at New Orleans, LA.

Coach Clem Haskins' underdog charges had beaten Texas El Paso 64-61 in overtime in the 1990 NCAA tournament opener and Northern Iowa 81-78 in the second round at Richmond, VA. In the Sweet Sixteen at the Superdome in New Orleans, Minnesota then knocked off Syracuse 82-75 to gain the finals.

The scant two-point setback to Georgia Tech gave Minnesota a final season record of 23-9, equalling the second-highest win total ever recorded by a Golden Gopher basketball contingent. Gaining the Elite Eight also marked the furthest that the U of M has ever advanced in NCAA competition.

"It has been a tremendous year for University of Minnesota basketball," Coach Haskins said. "I'm extremely proud to have been associated with these young men and to have had the oppor-

tunity to coach them at such a great institution."

Haskins also paid special tribute to the senior members of the 1989-90 contingent.....Willie Burton, Richard Coffey, Connell Lewis, Melvin Newbern and Jim Shikenjanski.

"I will always be thankful for the experiences that we have shared together," Haskins said. "It has been gratifying to watch these young men mature physically, emotionally and mentally and academically during their four years at the University of Minnesota. In the beginning, it was difficult, and we suffered together. But we have grown together, and I will always be proud of the way they played and of the effort they gave."

The achievements recorded by the 1989-90 contingent were many, and the Golden Gophers were saluted for those accomplishments everywhere they went.....including the Minneapolis-St. Paul International airport Sunday night where they were greeted by thousands of partisan fans when they arrived home from New Orleans.

Those accomplishments were achieved by a team, a together-team that shared and cared. But

there were individual accomplishments as well, and they will be documented in the U of M basketball record book.

Burton, for example, finished his career as Minnesota's second all-time leading scorer with 1,800 points after notching 35 against George Tech in the season finale. Coffey finished his career as the Golden Gopher's fourth-leading rebounder with 904. Newbern wound up as the career record holder in steals with 216 and the single game leader with nine. He finished second on the career assist list with 367, and he equalled the single-game assist mark of 13.

Now all eyes are on the future, and Minnesota's basketball future looks bright. Despite having to replace five seniors, Coach Haskins will begin his "re-loading" process with such returnees as Kevin Lynch, Bob Martin, Nate Tubbs, Mario Green, Rob Metcalf and Junior Graves. He'll mix in two promising red-shirts in Arriel McDonald and Ernest Nzigamasabo. He'll also add three or four incoming freshman.

All of which means, as good as '89-'90 was, even more could be on the horizon.

ICERS END SEASON 28-16-2, MISS NCAA 1ST TIME IN 5 YEARS

Minneapolis, MN

For the first time in five seasons, the odds finally caught up with the University of Minnesota Golden Gopher hockey program.

After reaching the NCAA Final Four hockey championships each of the last four seasons, head coach Doug Woog's fifth Gopher edition was denied another chance of trying for the school's fourth national title at Joe Louis Arena in Detroit this weekend.

Boston College skated off with two wins in three home games against Minnesota last weekend to qualify for the Final Four. Beautiful Kelley Rink in Conte Forum on the B.C. campus erupted in bedlam for the Eagles, but became a house of disappointment for the Gophers.

Ending the 1989-90 season with a 28-16-2 record, a second place finish in the WCHA, a spot in the WCHA playoff championship game and reaching the NCAA quarterfinals offers a great source of pride for Woog and his players.

What's even more important is that this year's Gopher squad, when you consider the seven super players lost from last season, was not expected to challenge for WCHA honors, and certainly not go as far as it did in the playoffs.

Last weekend saw completely different performances by Minnesota. For the most part, the biggest thing missing was a scoring punch. But outstanding performances by two Boston College goalies had a lot to do with the Gophers only scoring five goals in three outings.

Friday's first game saw B.C. get an early power play goal and a 2-0 lead after one period. After sophomore defenseman **Larry Olimb (Warroad)** scored for UM, it was a shorthand goal by Eagle scoring ace **David Emma** that all but killed any Gopher chance of coming from behind. Goalie **Scott LaGrand** stopped 40 of 42 Minnesota shots repeatedly robbing the Gophers of several scores with his magic glove. Junior wing **Grant Bischoff (Grand Rapids)** got the other Gopher score in the third period as Minnesota dropped a 4-2 decision.

The next night saw Minnesota freshman goalie **Tom Newman (Blaine)** possibly turn in his best performance of the season. He stopped 29 shots, many of them second and third rebounds, in gaining his 19th win of the season by a 2-1 score.

Sophomore defender **Tom Pederson (Bloomington)** scored a power play goal for Minnesota in the first period, a goal that stood up for more than 55 minutes. Boston College got its lone score on a rebound with 4:48 left to play. As things progressed, it appeared the game was going into overtime.

But senior **Brett Strot (Brooklyn Park)** simply didn't want to skate any longer and snapped in a long rebound shot with just 51 seconds remaining in regulation to give UM its win.

The last night was a shocker. Emma scored his school-record-tying 38th goal after only 0:06 seconds had elapsed and Minnesota never recovered. The Eagles scored twice in each period to gain its series clincher on a 6-1 score. Junior wing **Ben Hankinson (Edina)** got Minnesota's lone goal unassisted early in the third period. Newman again played well but simply couldn't hold off the speedy Eagle skaters all by himself. He had 27 saves while the Gophers threw 43 shots at LaGrand.

Olimb was the only UM player to score more than one point on the weekend. Besides his goal Friday, he assisted on both Gopher goals in Saturday's 2-1 victory.

After five full seasons, Coach Woog's teams have presented him with a record of 164-64-6 which figures out to a winning mark of .714%. This year's team finished its league slate at 17-9-2 good for second place behind the lone WCHA representative to the Final Four, Wisconsin.

GOPHER GRIDDERS RETURN TO THE PRACTICE FIELD

The Golden Gopher Football team returns to the practice field this week after two weeks off for final exams and spring quarter break.

Gutey's gridders will strap the pads on Tuesday, March 27, for eight more practice sessions which will complete spring football for the year. The remaining practice days are: March 27-28, 30-31, and April 3-6.

The schedule includes the Minnesota High School Coaches Clinic on March 30-31. The clinic consists of two days of lectures and coaching technique demonstrations by the Gopher coaching staff to the area youth coaches.

The first segment of the spring practice session saw intense hitting and overall aggressive play on both

sides of the ball as many newcomers fought for starting positions.

On offense the quarterback position is still in the hands of two-year starter Scott Schaffner. He is being pressured for playing time by sophomore Marquel Fleetwood who has looked good in scrimmages.

The big hole that needs to be filled is the one left by outgoing senior tailback Darrell Thompson. At the halfway point of spring ball it looks like a corp of runners will do battle for the Golden Gophers next season.

The frontrunner in the competition is senior Marcus Evans who has one more year of eligibility left. Also contending for backfield positions are redshirt freshman Mark Smith and sophomores James Snyder and Percy Willingham.

On defense the Gopher charges are being led by tackle Mike Sunvold who was having an excellent spring until he went down with a minor ankle injury.

The defense returns five defensive backs who have started games and although the starters aren't set, all five will contribute next year.

The linebacker positions are another area of concern with three starters leaving. Joel Staats returns as the only linebacker with starting experience. Converted end Skeeter Akre and Ricky Williams round out the linebacker position.

The Golden Gophers open up the 1990 football season against Utah at the Metrodome on September 8th at 7:00 pm.

The Metrodome opens up its 1990 baseball schedule by playing host to the **PILLSBURY BASEBALL CLASSIC**. The host Golden Gophers entertain some of the finest talent in the country when Wichita State, Stanford and Miami come into town for the tourney.

The tournament's six-game round-robin format pits #2 ranked Miami against #1 ranked Wichita State in the opening game on Friday, March 30, at 2:07 p.m. That game will be followed by Minnesota vs. #5 ranked Stanford in a 7:35 p.m. contest.

Saturday's action starts with Wichita State vs. Stanford at 11:07 a.m. Following that game the Golden Gophers take on Miami starting at 2:35 p.m.

Sunday, April 1, is the final day of the tournament with Minnesota taking on Wichita State at 1:05 p.m., followed by Stanford vs. Miami at 4:05 p.m. in the tournament finale.

The team and individual talent on display in the tournament is the best of any collegiate tourney in the country.

Four pre-season All-American picks will be on hand. Defending national champions and Wichita State brings in All-American shortstop Mike Lansing (.329, 23 RBI, 7 2B's, 11-14 SB).

Stanford brings in two All-Americans in pitcher Mike Mussina (2-3, 3.55 ERA), and outfielder Paul Carey (.302, 7 HR, 18 RBI).

The Golden Gophers will showcase All-American catcher Dan Wilson (.424, 4HR, 22 RBI, .773 Slg.) on the Metrodome carpet.

The Miami Hurricanes didn't collect any pre-season All-American picks, but the way that they are playing almost ensures some post-season honors.

The three visiting teams in the tournament represent the winners of four of the last five national crowns. All three are currently ranked in the top five in the country.

The teams fly into the Twin Cities on Thursday, March 29, and will be staying at the Metrodome Hilton which is the tournament headquarters.

A news conference will be held Friday, March 30, in Salon A of the Metrodome Hilton. It will showcase the four head coaches, John Anderson-Minnesota (269-180-2.599), Ron Fraser-Miami (1,118-398-9.736), Mark Marquess-Stanford(527-279-5.653), and Gene Stephenson-Wichita State(681-216-3.759), along with the four pre-season All-Americans playing in the tourney.

Zuniga Shines: Dave Zuniga, ranked No. 2 in the nation at 134 pounds by Amateur Wrestling News heading into the national meet, reeled off five straight victories before falling 9-7 to top-ranked Tom Brands from Iowa in the title match. It was the fourth time that the two had met this season. Zuniga, a transfer from Utah State University, topped Brands 6-5 in the championship match at 134 pounds en route to being honored as the 1990 Big Ten Athlete-of-the-Championship. In their other confrontations, Brands scored a 5-1 victory in the championship match of the Northern Open at

Madison, WI on November 24 while Zuniga was wrestling unattached and a 5-3 win over the Golden Gopher in the Hawkeyes' 31-7 dual meet victory over Minnesota at Williams Arena back on January 24.

Morgan Registers Record-Breaking Season: Despite falling to Oklahoma State's Chris Barnes in the NCAA 177-pound final, Marty Morgan turned in yet another outstanding campaign for the Golden Gophers this season. He led the squad in victories, finishing with an overall record of 39-2 on the year. The two-time All-American registered 20 pins on the season, breaking the old single-season school record of 19 set by Mike McArthur during the 1976-77 season. His only other setback this season was also at the hands of Barnes, a 4-1 defeat in the 177-pound final at the Cowboy Wrestling Classic in Stillwater, OK back on January 27. Honored as the Big Ten Conference Wrestling Athlete-of-the-Month in both December and February, he scored a 9-7 victory over No. 3 Mike Funk from Northwestern in the 177-pound Big Ten final. At the East-West All-Star Classic in Portland, OR on Feb. 5, he defeated John Kohls from Brigham Young. In addition to his Big Ten crown, he also won individual titles this season at the Bison Open (Fargo, ND), Nebraska-Omaha Open, Northern Open (Madison, WI) and the Oregon Classic (Portland, OR). A year ago he charted an overall record of 32-10 with 12 pins, finishing sixth at the NCAA Championships at 167 pounds to earn All-America honors. He transferred to Gold Country from North Dakota State University where he won the NCAA Division II national title at 167 pounds in 1987 for the Bison.

A Look Back At The Big Ten Championships: Dave Zuniga, Chuck Heise and Marty Morgan collected individual titles to lead the Golden Gophers to a third-place tie with Northwestern in the final team standings at the Big Ten Championships held on March 10-11 at Northwestern University in Evanston, IL. The three individual championships were more than any other school in the league.

Fearsome Foursome: Dave Zuniga at 134 (27-2), Chuck Heise at 142 (37-4-1), Marty Morgan at 177 (39-2) and Jeff Balcom at heavyweight (33-7-3) have led the Golden Gophers all season long. They have compiled an overall record of 136-15-4. In dual meets, the fearsome foursome finished with a sterling 51-4-4 record, including a 17-2-1 mark in Big Ten action.

National Rankings: The Golden Gophers were ranked sixth in the final Amateur Wrestling News national poll. Dave Zuniga, Chuck Heise, Marty Morgan and Jeff Balcom also appeared in the final individual national rankings.

A Little History: The Golden Gophers' runner-up finish at the Big Ten Championships was the program's best since 1927 when they also placed second. Overall, the University of Minnesota has won two team titles at the Big Ten Championships...in 1922 and 1926.

Nelsen Shines: Paul Nelsen was honored as the Big Ten Freshman of the Year following the conference meet. He won the 400 IM with an NCAA qualifying and new school record time of 3:51.50. He also qualified for the national meet in the 200 IM, finishing second with a clocking of 1:49.43, the 100 breaststroke, finishing second in 55.23, the 200 breaststroke, which he swam as an exhibition and clocked a 2:00.80 and as a member of the Golden Gopher 400 medley relay unit which placed second in 3:17.53. On top of that, he was a member of the 800 freestyle relay foursome that just missed the NCAA standard of 6:36.96, finishing fourth in the race with a time of 6:37.08.

Quackenbush Sets All-Time Big Ten Mark: Sean Quackenbush recorded the Golden Gophers' best finish at the NCAA Championships by placing ninth in the 200 butterfly final with a clocking of 1:45.61. Honored as the Big Ten Freshman of the Year in 1989, he turned in another outstanding conference meet for the Golden Gophers in 1990. He swept the butterfly events in the competition, setting a new all-time Big Ten record in the 200 butterfly with a winning clocking of 1:44.33 and also taking the 100 version of the stroke with an impressive time of 47.93. Both times erased school records that he had set during his rookie season a year ago. He also qualified for the NCAA Championships as a member of the Golden Gopher 400 freestyle (2:58.62) and medley (3:17.53) relay units, while just missing the standard of 6:36.96 in the 800 freestyle relay unit after finishing fourth in 6:37.08. In addition, he clocked a 1:50.89 in the 200 individual medley final to place sixth, after going 1:50.54 in the morning prelims.

After a week away from competition due to finals, the second-ranked Golden Gopher gymnastics team wrapped up their regular season last Saturday in Madison, WI by registering a score of 281.30 to top No. 6 Iowa (277.80) and No. 20 Wisconsin (263.15). No. 3 Ohio State was originally scheduled to compete but they could not get out of Columbus due to a snowstorm.

The Winners: Senior Mark McKiernan (Darien, CT), juniors Jay Caputo (Longwood, FL) and Mike Farina (Mundelein, IL) and freshmen John Roethlisberger (Afton, MN) and Rob Hanson (Ramsey, MN) each won an individual event for the Golden Gophers in the competition. McKiernan won the pommel horse with a score of 9.75, Caputo the still rings with a 9.70 and Farina

the parallel bars with a 9.60. Roethlisberger with a 9.75 on the floor exercise and Hanson with a 9.75 on the high bar, tied for top honors on the evening.

Call It "C" For Consistency: After Saturday's competition, the Golden Gophers have registered five straight scores of 281.15 or better, with a winning score of 282.60 at the Big Ten Championships in Iowa City on March 2 leading the way.

All In The Family: For the third consecutive month (December, January, February), John Roethlisberger has been named Big Ten Conference Gymnastics Athlete-of-the-Month. John and his sister Marie, a senior for the Golden Gophers who collected Athlete-of-the-Month honors in women's gymnastics for the month of February, thus become the first brother-sister combination in league history to win the award in the same month. John led the Golden Gophers to their first Big Ten team title since 1984 and 18th overall at the league championships held in Iowa City on March 2-3 (included in February voting). He won the all-around title with a score of 113.35 (57.40 optional, 55.95 compulsory) and the horizontal bar crown with a 9.75. In addition, he finished second on the parallel bars (9.675), fifth in the floor exercise (9.25) and seventh on the pommel horse (9.050) en route to being honored as the Big Ten Gymnast and Freshman-of-the-Year. On top of that, Golden Gopher men's coach Fred Roethlisberger was honored as the Big Ten Coach-of-the-Year after directing his squad to the conference title.

East Regionals Up Next: The Golden Gophers will compete in the East Regional Championships to be held on April 7 at Penn State University in University Park, PA. The top four teams and 12 individuals in each event will advance to the NCAA Championships to be held April 19-21 at Williams Arena. No. 3 Ohio State and No. 7 Penn State are expected to battle the Golden Gophers for the regional title.

The Top 10: The Golden Gophers were ranked second in the latest national rankings by NCAA average. No. 3 Ohio State and No. 6 Iowa give the Big Ten Conference three of the top six teams in the nation. The next national computer rankings will be released on Wednesday, March 28.

That Winning Feeling: Winning was contagious for head coach Roy Griak's team on Saturday. In the distance events, junior **Chris Harder** (Austin, MN) won the 3000 meter steeplechase with a clocking of 9:30.41, and sophomore **Sean Fitzgerald** (Ottawa, Ontario, Canada), junior **Chris York** (Dubuque, IA) and seniors **Carson Hoeft** (Plymouth, MN) and **Dan Hebl** (Menomonie, WI) took top honors in the distance medley relay with a time of 10:05.75. In the sprints, sophomore **Tim Arinze** (Festic Town, Lagos, Nigeria) took the 100 meter dash with a time of 10.62. In the field events, junior **Ross Thompson** (Esko, MN) won the pole vault with a mark of 16'0", while freshman **Chris Murrell** (Grand Island, NE) continued his winning ways with a leap of 6'11".

Murrell the Magnificent: Recognized as one of the finest prep high jumpers in the country a year ago when he won the Nebraska state high school crown for Grand Island with a state record jump of 7'1 1/4", freshman **Chris Murrell** (Grand Island, NE) has continued to shine in Gold Country. After an amazing indoor season, he kept things rolling along with Saturday's victory in the first outdoor collegiate competition of his career. His winning leap of 7'3" at the Big Ten Indoor Championships held at Bloomington, IN on February 24 broke former Golden Gopher great Mike Vukovich's school indoor record of 7'2 1/2" set in 1988. 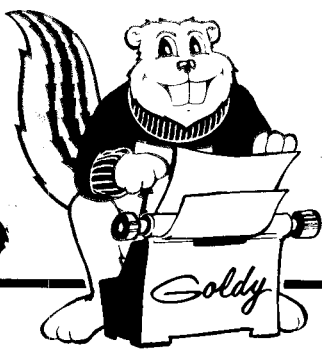

FIVE NOMINEES FOR IBM/GEORGE NISSEN AWARD ANNOUNCED

The five finalists for the prestigious IBM/George Nissen Award which is presented annually to the outstanding senior in men's collegiate gymnastics have been announced.

Jeff Dow from Iowa, Patrick Kirksey from Nebraska, Mark McKiernan from Minnesota, Mike Racanelli from Ohio State and Chris Waller from UCLA are the five finalists. The gymnastic equivalent of college football's Heisman Trophy, the winner will be announced at the National Association of College Gymnastics Coaches (NACGC) annual awards dinner on April 18 at the Radisson University Hotel in Minneapolis. The University of Minnesota will host the NCAA Championships on April 19-21 at Williams Arena.

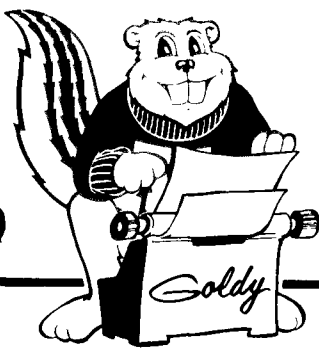
Dow, a member of the U.S. National Team, has been the Big Ten Conference runner-up in the all-around the past two years. He collected All-America honors in 1988 after finishing second at the NCAA Championships on the high bar with a score of 9.90. A co-captain for the Hawkeyes this season, he was honored as the team's most valuable performer a year ago. Presently ranked ninth in the nation in the all-around, he is a finance major with a cumulative 3.0 GPA.

The 1989 NCAA all-around champion, Kirksey also collected All-American honors at the national meet by tying for second on the parallel bars, finishing fifth on the high bar and sixth on the pommel horse. He finished in a tie for sixth on the vault at the 1988 NCAA Championships. 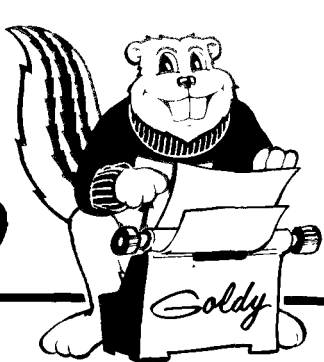

ROBINSON REAPPOINTED AS WRESTLING COACH

University of Minnesota wrestling coach, J Robinson, will be reappointed for the 1990-91 school year but has been placed on probation for that period by athletic director, Rick Bay. Robinson has also accepted specific penalties for the 1991 season as a condition for reappointment.

In addition to his own probationary status, the wrestling program will lose two scholarships for the 1991 season (from 11 to 9) and his salary will be frozen at the 1989-90 level. Other penalties include no off-campus, in-person recruiting contacts by any Gopher wrestling coach until the completion of the 1991 NCAA tournament. Also, the entire wrestling coaching staff will be required to undergo an educational review of NCAA and Big Ten Conference legislation, including testing.

In a personal letter from Bay to Robinson outlining the conditions of employment for next season, Bay referred to a number of alleged Big Ten and NCAA rules infractions uncovered in a recent investigation of the Gopher athletics program by Chicago attorney, Mike Slive. The allegations included the provision of transportation and meals for athletes still considered to be prospects, practice between coaches and members of the University of Minnesota wrestling team with athletes still considered prospects, the provision of practice opportunities for University student-athletes still not certified as eligible to practice or compete and allowing other institutions' teams the opportunity to practice with the University team without the intent of counting such practices as dates of competition. The latter situation resulted in the U of M having to cancel the last three regular season dual meets in the 1990 season.

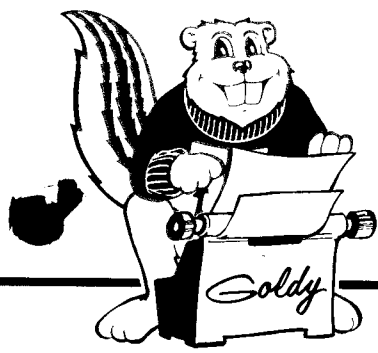
The letter from Bay also stated, "While I do not view these alleged infractions as necessarily willful or malicious, I do consider the accusations serious and unacceptable to the University of Minnesota. While it is possible for inadvertent rules violations to occur within the athletic department and its various sports programs, there is a pattern in wrestling that indicates that you have not been diligent in making every effort to ensure violations do not occur. There has been general inattention to the rules and, in some cases, an unacceptable attitude that it is permissible to interpret the rules for your own convenience and that certain practices and procedures are justifiable regardless of the regulations because they reflect the culture of the sport and may occur at other institutions."

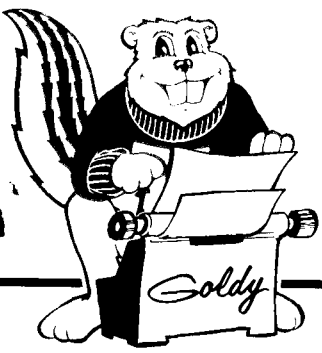
