MINNESOTA TO INVADUE PURDUE SATURDAY

Coach Jim Wacker takes his "air it out" show back on the road Saturday when the University of Minnesota is scheduled to invade Purdue for a 1:00 p.m. (EST) Big Ten Conference football assignment.

The Golden Gophers will go into that contest at 1-3 overall after dropping three-straight non-conference decisions.....but tied for the Big Ten lead at 1-0 after outlasting Illinois 18-17 in the league opener at the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome last Saturday.

"It may not have been perfect, and it may not have been pretty," Wacker admitted after registering his first Big Ten win as a coach, "but it was a great one. I can't remember when a win felt any better."

Minnesota appeared on the verge of losing its fourth straight as they trailed 17-3 in the fourth quarter. But then Marquel Fleetwood (Sr. QB, Decatur, Ga.) rallied his mates with two touchdown passes and a gutsy two-point conversion for 15 points in the final stanza.

Omar Douglas (Jr., SB, New Orleans, La.) got the first TD and backed that up with the two-point conversion reception. Chris Darkins (Fr., RB, Houston, Texas), accounted for the second touchdown with a catch and brilliant run.

"We made the big plays in the fourth quarter," Wacker pointed out. "Words can't describe Marquel's performance. He didn't have a great game for three quarters, but he really turned it on when it counted. Omar made some big catches (he had five for 36 yards), but none bigger than his two-point conversion."

And while Wacker was passing out accolades to his offensive unit for its fourth-quarter rally, he also paid tribute to Minnesota's defense. "For three quarters it was the defense that was making the plays and keeping us close," Wacker analyzed, "and then in the fourth quarter it was the defense that put the stop on Illinois to give us our chance to win. It's tough to single out any one player on that unit, but Jeff Rosga (Jr., 6-1, 195, Roseville, Minn.) got an interception and played well in his first start.

Wacker would allow his club the satisfaction of enjoying its first win of the season only until Sunday when preparations for the Purdue game began. "I'm really thrilled for our squad," Wacker said. "They never quit, they never gave up, and they never stopped believing. But now we've got to turn our thoughts to Purdue."

Historically, Minnesota has not been overpowering on the road. In fact, the Golden Gophers have won only four times in 14 tries at West Lafayette. To make the jaunt even more risky, the Boilermakers lost their Big Ten opener 28-14 to Northwestern on their home turf last weekend, and they may not be in the best of moods. On the year, Purdue is, like UM, 1-3.

"It will be tough," Wacker admits. "They'll be madder than hornets. You always hate going in someplace to play a team that just suffered a tough loss. It happened to us two weeks ago going into Pittsburgh, and Purdue has shown that it can win. Purdue beat California, which beat San Jose State, which beat us! But the win over Illinois should help us. Everbody stayed together, and it should be something we can build on. We've got to make the win over Illinois our starting point and go on from there."

Golden Gopher fans hope the "go on" part includes a second straight Big Ten Conference win at Purdue on Saturday.

QUICKIE FACTS.....

THE GAME: Minnesota vs Purdue
 at West Lafayette, Ind.
 1:00 p.m. (EST), Sat., Oct. 10, 1992

THE SERIES: Minnesota and Purdue have met 50 times in a series that dates back to 1894. The Golden Gophers will take a 28-19-3 edge in the series into Saturday afternoon's game after winning 6-3 at the Metrodome a year ago. Minnesota leads 24-9-3 in games played in Minneapolis but trails 10-4 in games played in West Lafayette. The last time the Golden Gophers prevailed at

Purdue was in 1990 when Coach John Gutekunst's charges posted a 19-7 triumph. Minnesota actually has a three-game winning streak in the series. The most-recent Boilermaker triumph was 14-10 at Purdue in 1988.

THE OPPONENT: Purdue, a school of 36,163, is located in West Lafayette, Ind. It was founded in 1869 and has more than 260,000 living alumni. Purdue's colors are Old Gold and Black, and its teams are known as the Boilermakers. A year ago Purdue finished 4-7 overall and 3-5 in the Big Ten. On the season, Purdue is 1-3 on the season and 0-1 in conference play.

THE RECORDS: After dropping three straight in non-conference play, Minnesota opened Big Ten action last week by nudging Illinois 18-17 and will take a 1-3 record with them to Purdue. The Boilermakers will put an identical 1-3 record on the line. Purdue beat California 41-14 in the opener, and then lost non-conference shootouts 33-29 to Toledo and 48-0 to Notre Dame, before being upset 28-14 by Northwestern in Big Ten play the last time out of the blocks.

THE GAMES LAST WEEK: Minnesota broke into the win column last weekend with its come-from-behind 18-17 verdict over the Fighting Illini. The Golden Gophers trailed 17-3 in the fourth quarter before Marquel Fleetwood rallied his squad to a pair of touchdowns and a critical two-point conversion in the fourth period to gain the decisions and snap a nine-game U of M losing streak. The Boilermakers fell behind in the second period and once trailed 28-7 before scoring once in the final stanza. Purdue replaced Matt Pike at quarterback after he was intercepted twice in the third quarter. Arlee Conners led the Boilermakers in rushing with 112 yards on 15 carries.

THE COACHES: Minnesota's Jim Wacker is in his first year as head coach of the Golden Gophers, and he's 1-3 in Gold Country. His 21-year college head coaching record four-games into the 1992 season is 145-94-3. Jim Colletto is 22-48-1 in his seventh season as a collegiate head coach and 5-10 in his second season as Purdue's 32nd head football coach. He was the Boilermaker's offensive coordinator from 1982-1984, Arizona State's offensive coordinator from 1985-1987 and Ohio State's offensive coordinator from 1988-1990. His previous head coaching experience (1975-1979) was at Cal State Fullerton.

THE INJURY REPORT: Interim Head Football Trainer Doug Locy plans on another busy week. His list of "dinged" Golden Gophers was up to 15 after the Illinois confrontation. Ken Sebree missed last Saturday's game with the flu, but he's fully recovered. Keith Ballard was bothered with back spasms again, but he should be OK with some rest. Most serious of the others on Minnesota's injury list were Lewis Garrison, who had a tender hamstring, and Dan Li Santi, who bruised a hip.

GOLDEN GOPHERS TO WATCH: Rated as possible U of M choices for post-season honors in 1992 are Marquel Fleetwood (QB, Sr., Decatur, Ga.); Andre Davis (LB, Sr., Jacksonville, Fla.); Russ Heath (LB, Jr., Aurora, Colo.); Keith Ballard (OT, Sr., Detroit, Mich.); Dennis Cappella (DE, Jr., Miller Place, NY); Omar Douglas (SB, Jr., New Orleans, La.); John Lewis (FL, Sr., Miami, Fla.); and Dean Kaufman (P, Sr., Sauk Centre, Minn.)..

THE FINAL WORD: Coach Jim Wacker says, "Purdue will be another big challenge for us, especially down there. But we're getting close, and we're getting better all the time. The thing we need is more consistency, and we have to prove that we can put it all together for a full game and then from one week to the next. The win over Illinois should help us a great deal. We made a lot of mistakes against Illinois, and we still were able to get the win. Sometimes a team needs to do that and it will help us. We hope to build on it."

IN THE BIG TEN: Minnesota finished 2-7 in the Big Ten a year ago and 5-3 in conference play the year before. The Golden Gophers last won the conference title at 6-1 in 1967 under Murray Warmath, and their best Big Ten mark since then was 6-2 under Cal Stoll in 1973 (3rd). Right now they are tied for first with Michigan, Michigan State, Northwestern and Wisconsin at 1-0.

TURNOVERS: Minnesota turned the ball over only once against Illinois, and its turnover ratio continues to look better through four games. The Golden Gophers lost one fumble to the Fighting Illini, and that was its only turnover of the game. Minnesota's defense got one back when Jeff Rosga notched a pass interception for the winners. On the year, the Golden Gophers have 7 turnovers (five passes intercepted and two fumbles lost), but they have intercepted three opponent passes and recovered five fumbles....so UM is +1 in the turnover department.

TRADING CARDS AVAILABLE: The University of Minnesota is in the midst of an aggressive trading card sale. The cards feature 1992-93 Golden Gopher men's basketball and hockey teams. A mail order form is being distributed and is available through the Williams Scholarship Fund Office. Proceeds from the sale of the trading cards will go to the U of M's Williams Scholarship Fund. Coach Clem Haskins, his staff and team members are featured in the 17-card basketball set which sells for \$5.95 plus tax, shipping and handling. Coach Doug Woog and his squad are featured on the 26-card hockey set which sells for \$7.95 plus tax, shipping and handling. For complete information, phone (612) 625-1001.

HARRIERS FINISH 12TH AT MINNESOTA/PEPSI INVITATIONAL

Head Coach Roy Griak's Golden Gopher men's cross country team finished 12th in the final team standings at the prestigious Minnesota/Pepsi Invitational meet held last Saturday at the Les Bolstad/University of Minnesota Golf Course.

Great Field: The Minnesota/Pepsi Invitational is annually recognized as one of the finest collegiate cross country meets in the nation, and last Saturday's 30-team race wrote yet another chapter in this tradition-laden competition. Adams State, ranked No. 1 in NCAA Division II, placed five individuals in the top 10 en route to the team title with 32 points. Wisconsin, ranked No. 2 in Division I, placed second with 59 points, followed by Western State (No. 2 Division II) in third with 133, Iowa State (No. 4 Division I), fourth with 157, and Penn State (No. 14 Division I) fifth with 167. Iowa State junior Ian Robinson copped individual honors by touring the 8,000 meter course in a blazing time of

24:26. He was followed by Adams State senior Paul Stoneham in second with a clocking of 24:33, and Colgate's Ray Appenheimer in third at 24:34.

Milkowski Leads The Way: Senior co-captain Doug Milkowski (Stevens Point, Wis.) paced the Golden Gophers last Saturday by finishing 45th overall in a time of 25:49. Junior Chris Berg (Excelsior, Minn.) was close behind in 53rd-place with a clocking of 25:59. Sophomores Mark Gonzales (La Habra, Calif.) and Jason Rathe (Maple Grove, Minn.) finished 58th and 59th, respectively, with identical times of 26:05 to round out the team's top foursome.

Indiana Invitational: The Golden Gophers will compete in the Indiana Invitational at Bloomington, Ind., on Saturday. The 8,000 meter competition is scheduled to get underway at 10:45 a.m.

GOLF TEAM WINS NORTHERN INTERCOLLEGIATE Junior Phil Ebner loses tie-breaker on first play-off hole

The University of Minnesota men's golf team continued their recent success by winning the Northern Intercollegiate Golf Championship at Bloomington, Ind., this past weekend. The Gophers won the tournament with a three-round team score of 878, with their nearest competitor being Ohio State with an 886 score. Golden Gopher junior Phil Ebner (Hudson, Ohio), lost medalist honors on the first hole of sudden-death play-off to Jody Roudebush of Indiana University. Ebner fired a 75-67-74=216 tournament for a 216 score.

Big Win: The Golden Gophers finished with all five of their golfers in the top 25 spots. Following Ebner for the Maroon and Gold was pre-season All-American Joe Gullion (San Antonio, Tex.), who fired rounds of 73-75-72, to finish tied for eighth with 220. Mark Hanson (Cedar Rapids, Iowa) had a 73-77-72=222 (15th) score and freshmen Graham Davidson (Langholm, Scotland) and Scott Richardson (Laguna Niguel, Calif.) had scores of 73-75-76=224, and 74-74-76=224 (24th) respectively.

On a Roll: The victory is the second for the Gophers in three tournaments. They opened the season with a victory in the Yale Invitational and finished fifth in the Midwestern Invitational. Next up for the team is the Walter McGlaughlin Invitational on October 17-18. Last fall the Gophers won the Walter McGlaughlin by six strokes over Penn State.

WCHA CHAMPION GOLDEN GOPHER HOCKEY TEAM BEGINS PRACTICE OCTOBER 5

The Golden Gopher hockey team begins the 1992-93 season on October, 5, when they open their fall camp. The defending WCHA Champions will return 14 lettermen from last year's team. Graduation and professional signings have decimated the roster again, but the Gophers still expect to be in the hunt for their fourth WCHA Championship in the past eight years.

New Captain: All-America candidate Travis Richards (Crystal, Minn.) has been chosen by his teammates to wear the captain's monogram this year. Richards was the leading scorer amongst the defensemen a year ago, and will be following in the footsteps of his older brother Todd, who was a Gopher captain in 1988-89.

Veteran Netminder: Veteran goalie Tom Newman (Blaine, Minn.) returns for his final campaign as a Gopher, and will be the leading candidate for the netminding duties. He will be challenged by a pair of talented underclassmen in sophomore Jeff Callinan (Minnetonka, Minn.) and freshman Jeff Moen (Roseville, Minn.).

Johnson and Hendrickson Combo Returns: The talented duo of junior Craig Johnson (St. Paul, Minn.) and sophomore Darby Hendrickson (Richfield, Minn.) are expected to lead the Golden Gopher offensive assault this year. Last season, the two players combined for 44 goals and 69 assists and were the third and fourth leading scorers on the team respectively. Hendrickson had a phenomenal freshman year, scoring 25 goals and 30 assists, and garnering WCHA Freshman of the Year honors along the way.

Gophers open with Fighting Sioux: The Golden Gophers open the 1992-93 season at home this year with a two-game set with the North Dakota Fighting Sioux on October 23-24 at Mariucci Arena. The last time the two teams met was in round one of the WCHA playoffs when the Sioux surprised the Maroon and Gold at home and beat them in the first game 5-3, forcing the Gophers to win two in a row, which they did 9-2 and 3-1.

Ticket Update: The Golden Gopher ticket office has cut off the sale of season hockey tickets. The only remaining tickets are for student ticket sales. High demand for the final season in Mariucci Arena, coupled with excitement about the new facility, have caused the increase in sales.

The Golden Gopher tennis team opened its 1992-93 season last week with a conference dual victory at Penn State, and by winning three individual championships at the West Virginia Invitational.

Winning streak: The Gophers, ranked No. 22 in the ITA preseason polls, began the 1992-93 season with a 5-2 victory Thursday at Penn State. The victory was the team's 14th consecutive Big Ten dual victory (dating to 1990).

Donley and Benyebka win titles: Eric Donley (Fr., Duluth, Minn.) began his collegiate career in spectacular fashion by winning a singles championship (at No. 7) and combining (with Paul Pridmore at No. 4) for a doubles championship at West Virginia. Donley also teamed with

Mehdi Benyebka (Sr., Oran, Algeria) for a win at No. 3 doubles in the victory over Penn State.

Benyebka captured the No. 2 singles championship at West Virginia. Against Penn State, besides the doubles victory with Donley, Benyebka earned a victory at No. 2 singles.

Roger Anderson (Sr., New Hope) Dean Hlushko (Sr., Arden Hills) and Rick Naumoff (Sr., Columbus, Ohio) each captured third-place in their respective divisions at West Virginia.

Next: The next action for the Gophers will be Nov. 6-9 at the ITCA Regionals at Madison, Wis. That will be the final action for the Gophers in 1992. On Jan 16, the Gophers will return to action against Kansas and Tulsa at Lawrence, Kan.

MOBILIA AND GRASS NAMED RECIPIENTS OF MOLITOR AND GRIFFITH SCHOLARSHIPS

University of Minnesota Head Baseball Coach John Anderson announced last Thursday that junior shortstop Bill Mobilia of Ely, Minn., and sophomore catcher Darren Grass of St. Paul, Minn., have been named recipients of scholarships from the "Dick Siebert Memorial Endowment Fund."

The 6-2, 190-pound Mobilia is the first recipient of the Paul Molitor Scholarship, named after the former Golden Gopher All-American shortstop who now plays for the Milwaukee Brewers. Molitor remembers Coach Siebert's commitment to the Golden Gopher baseball program and his way of enhancing the longevity of the program was through a scholarship enhancement. His generous contribution of \$100,000 enables the athletic department to cover the scholarship costs of one of the top infielders this season.

Mobilia turned down an offer to play professional baseball with the New York Mets organization to return for his junior season with the Golden Gophers. A key to the Gophers middle infield defense, he is a sterling fielder with an excellent arm.

Grass is a 6-2, 210-pound sophomore catcher. He is the first recipient of the Calvin Griffith Scholarship, which is named after the former Minnesota Twins owner and life-long friend of the late Dick Siebert. Griffith's generous donation of \$100,000 is designated to cover the scholarship costs of a catcher in the program.

Last year Grass took over the Golden Gopher catching duties after senior Brian Hartman went down with a shoulder injury. He responded with an outstanding freshman season batting .325 with eight home runs and 47 RBIs, garnering Freshman All-American honors along the way.

"This is the first full year of our scholarship endowment program," said Anderson. "We feel that it has tremendous potential for growth and that it is living testimony to the way in which Dick Siebert touched so many lives. Our goal is to eventually endow all of our scholarships and guarantee the future of Minnesota baseball and the tradition that Dick Siebert built."

MINNESOTA HOSTS MICHIGAN ST. ON SATURDAY

It will be Homecoming 1992 for the University of Minnesota on Saturday when the Golden Gophers play host to Michigan State University in a 6:05 p.m. Big Ten Conference football game at the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome.

Coach Jim Wacker's host club and Coach George Perles' visitors will be hoping to bounce back from tough losses suffered last weekend. The Golden Gophers fell 24-20 at Purdue while the Spartans were dropping a 35-10 decision at Michigan.

As a result, both Minnesota and Michigan State will put overall records of 1-4 and Big Ten logs of 1-1 on the line in Saturday's Homecoming battle.

"It will be another tough one for us," Coach Wacker admitted. "Michigan State has really been moving the ball well this season, which they did again against Michigan, possibly the best team in the country. We certainly know that despite their record, they are one of the top offensive teams in our conference."

Wacker was visibly disappointed, as were his charges, with the results of last week's shootout at Purdue....especially after Minnesota had come from behind to take a 20-17 lead with just over four minutes remaining in the game, only to give up another touchdown to the Boilermakers and lose the decision.

Turnovers made the difference in the outcome. The Golden Gophers had four passes intercepted, and they lost one fumble. In direct contrast, Purdue did not turn the ball over once in the game.

"I hate turnovers, and I especially hate fumbled center snaps," Wacker lamented, "and it certainly made the difference last Saturday. Turnovers are the most important statistic in any football game. Purdue simply protected the ball better than we did, and as a result they came out winners."

Wacker wasn't ready to point any fingers, however. "There is no one individual to blame for our loss at Purdue," he stressed. "The offense had chances to win it and just couldn't get it done. The defense had a chance to win it and couldn't do it, either."

So now the Golden Gophers come home to host a team that probably is of a similar mold. "Our season isn't over," Wacker told his squad. And he also pointed out that there were some good things that happened for Minnesota at Purdue which can carry over this week.

"We moved the ball well again," he said. "We had another 421 yards of total offense. And we rushed for 176 yards. That's no surprise. We have maintained all along that if the offense we are using is going to work, we have to be able to move the ball on the ground. Both Anthony Carter (RB, Jr., Columbus, Ohio) (100 yards on 23 carries) and Chris Darkins (RB, Fr., Houston, Texas) (48 yards on eight carries) did good jobs in that department for us. We did enough things right, but you just can't turn the ball over and expect to win. We need look no further than turnovers to see why we lost."

Wacker also stressed the need to eliminate those "little mistakes" which continue to plague his Golden Gophers. "We've got to put all parts of our game together," he said. "We've had games where the offense played well, or the defense played well, or the kicking teams played well. But we have not yet had a game where all three of those elements played well. We've got to do that if we hope to win."

Can Minnesota win against Michigan State Saturday? "It's Homecoming, and it's a big one for us," Wacker says. "You know we will give it a good effort."

THE GAME: Minnesota vs Michigan State
 (HOMECOMING) at Minneapolis, Minn.
 6:05 p.m. (CDT), Sat., October 17, 1992

THE SERIES: Minnesota and Michigan State have met 30 times in a series that dates back to 1950. The Spartans hold a 19-11 edge going into Saturday's game after winning 20-12 at East Lansing a year ago. MSU has, in fact, won 13 straight in the series, with Minnesota's most recent

victory a 14-10 decision at East Lansing in 1976. MSU is 4-0 in the Metrodome.

THE OPPONENT: Michigan State, a school of 42,088 students, is located in East Lansing, Mich. It is led by Tico Duckett who is among the Big Ten's (and nation's) leading rushers. He had 85 yards on 19 carries against the top-ranked Wolverines last Saturday, and he's a legitimate All-America candidate.

THE RECORDS: Minnesota is 1-4 overall and 1-1 in the Big Ten after falling 24-20 at Purdue last week. Michigan

State dropped three straight non-conference games to Central Michigan, Notre Dame and Boston College before downing Indiana in Big Ten play. Then the Spartans fell 35-10 at Michigan and thus will bring identical 1-4 and 1-1 records into Saturday night's game.

THE GAMES LAST WEEK: Minnesota had its chances at Purdue, but fell short. After trailing most of the way, the Golden Gophers went up 20-17 with just over four minutes to play. Then, however, Purdue mustered a good kickoff return and hit a couple of long passes to pull out the decision. Michigan State fell behind in the first quarter at Ann Arbor and just could not hold off the powerful Wolves despite Duckett's individual heroics.

THE COACHES: Minnesota's Jim Wacker is in his first year as head coach of the Golden Gophers, and he's 1-4 in Gold Country. His 21-year college head coaching record four games into the 1992 season is 145-95-3. George Perles is in his 10th year as the head coach at Michigan State and has a career record of 58-48-4. He once served as an assistant coach at MSU, but gained even greater acclaim as a member of the coaching staff with the Pittsburgh Steelers.

THE INJURY REPORT: Interim Head Football Trainer Doug Locy says the Golden Gophers came out of the Purdue contest in "pretty good" physical condition, and he had no shelving injuries to report. "If there was anything good about the trip to Purdue, that was it," Coach Jim Wacker said.

GOLDEN GOPHERS TO WATCH: Rated as possible U of M choices for post-season honors in 1992 are Marquel Fleetwood (QB, Sr., Decatur, Ga.); Omar Douglas (SB, Jr., New Orleans, La.); John Lewis (FL, Sr., Miami, Fla.); Russ Heath (LB, Jr., Aurora, Colo.); Andre Davis (LB, Sr., Jacksonville, Fla.); Keith Ballard (OT, Sr., Detroit, Mich.); Dennis Cappella (DE, Jr., Miller Place, NY); and Dean Kaufman (P, Sr., Sauk Centre, Minn.).

THE FINAL WORD: "It's Homecoming, and that's good!" Coach Jim Wacker said this week. "We need a win badly, and maybe the crowd and the excitement can help us get it. Michigan State is another tough opponent, and their offensive statistics are really impressive. Duckett is at the top of the list, but they have a lot of offensive people playing well. They moved the ball impressively against Michigan, and to do that you have to be pretty darn good. We were deeply disappointed in the loss at Purdue, but we've got to put that behind us. We did some good things, but we killed ourselves with mistakes. We have to eliminate those little errors, and we have to become tough enough to overcome those adversities. Obviously we still

have a lot of room for improvement, and we have a lot of areas where we have to get better. But we still believe in ourselves, and we still feel that we can become a good football team. Our season isn't over."

IN THE BIG TEN: Minnesota finished 1-7 in the Big Ten a year ago and 5-3 in conference play the year before. The Golden Gophers last won the conference title at 6-1 in 1967 under Murray Warmath, and their best Big Ten mark since then was 6-2 under Cal Stoll in 1973 (3rd). Right now they are tied for second at 1-1 with seven other schools.

TURNOVERS: Minnesota turned the ball over five times at Purdue and got zero back. It cost the Golden Gophers the decision. "It is the most critical statistic in football," Coach Jim Wacker maintains. Going into the Purdue contest, Minnesota was plus one in the turnover department. Now it will go into the Michigan State assignment minus four.

GOLDEN GOPHER BASEBALL TEAM ANNOUNCES 1993 CAPTAINS

Head Coach John Anderson and the University of Minnesota baseball team announced today that seniors Ryan Lefebvre and Chris Lawler would be the team captains for the 1993 season.

Lefebvre, is a career .340 hitter who is in the top 10 in six career batting categories going into the season. Currently tied with former Gopher Paul Molitor for the career triples mark with 11, a repeat of last year's numbers would put him over the top in at least three records. A computer science major, Lawler also had a 3.00 GPA in spring quarter and will be one of the top pitchers back next year.

"Chris and Ryan have both made great contributions to our program, both on the field and in the classroom," said Head Coach John Anderson. "I think that they have the experience and respect necessary to be fine captains and will represent our program with distinction."

Playing one team from Michigan may seem like enough for the University of Minnesota, but now the Golden Gophers must face another one. Out of the frying pan, and into the fire.

After dropping another heartbreaking 20-15 loss to Michigan State in Homecoming 1992 at the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome last weekend, Minnesota now takes to the road to face nationally-ranked Michigan at Ann Arbor in a Big Ten Conference football game at 1:00 p.m. (EDT) on Saturday.

It will be Jim Wacker's first taste of Ann Arbor as a college head coach, and he doesn't relish the assignment. "It will be a real challenge," he says in what modestly could be described as an understatement.

"We've got to think of it as being a great opportunity to be meeting a team that is ranked at the top," Wacker maintains. "Sure Michigan is a great team, but we'll play well because this team has courage. It has shown that."

Unfortunately for the Golden Gophers, their courage didn't show up on the scoreboard against Michigan State last weekend. Minnesota led most of the way, but fell behind 13-12 momentarily late in the game before fighting back to retake the lead at 15-13 with just over two minutes to play when Aaron Piepkorn (K, Sr., Austin, Texas) hit a 36-yard field goal which seemingly gave Minnesota the win.

But it was not to be as...just like the previous week at Purdue...the Golden Gopher defense could not shut down the opponent pass, and Michigan State pulled out the five-point decision.

No fingers were pointed by Coach Wacker. "We're all in this together," he stressed. "We can look at ourselves individually, but we'll learn from it and go forward. We were in control early, and we did a lot of things well. We were ready to play, but we missed too many scoring opportunities, we had too many turnovers and we made too many mental mistakes. We'll just work harder on the areas where we need to improve and hope we can go on from there."

Among the good points were Marquel Fleetwood (QB, Sr., Decatur, Ga.) who hit 21 of 40 passes. That gives him 136 completions on the season and 399 as a Golden Gopher, which breaks Mike Hohensee's old U of M career mark of 392 set in 1981-82.

Fleetwood had 42 yards rushing and 198 yards passing for 240 yards of total offense, but his three interceptions took some of the luster off his performance. "We can't lay any blame on any one player," Wacker was quick to point out. "Fleetwood got us there. He had two great scrambles on our last drive, and he put us in a position to win it."

The same was said about the defense which allowed MSU to score and win in the final seconds after giving up two costly pass completions. "Sure we've got to defend the pass better, but Ken Sebree (FS, Sr., Detroit, Mich.) and Derek Fisher (CB, Sr., Miami, Fla.) got interceptions for us. And Dennis Cappella (Jr., DE, Miller Place, N.Y.) got us a sack. Andre Davis (Sr., LB, Jacksonville, Fla.) came back in on a sprained ankle and made some big hits. No finger pointing. We share it all together."

So now, with the dream of sharing in an improbable upset, Minnesota heads for Michigan. "We're not a good football team yet," Wacker admits, "but we're making things exciting, and we're moving the ball, and we're continuing to improve. We may be a hurting football team right now, but our kids have heart. We'll give it a shot."

THE SERIES: Minnesota and Michigan have met 81 times in a series that dates back to 1892, and the Wolverines will take a commanding 55-23-3 edge in the series into Saturday's Little Brown Jug game. Michigan leads 2-0-0 in games played at neutral sites, 25-12-2 at Minneapolis and 28-11-1 at Ann Arbor. The Wolves prevailed 52-6 a year ago in the Metrodome and 35-18 in 1990 at Ann Arbor. Minnesota's last win in the series was 20-17 at Ann Arbor in 1986. The Wolves have won five straight

in the series.

THE OPPONENT: Michigan, a school of 36,306 students, is located in Ann Arbor, Mich. The Wolverines are nationally ranked again this season with 43 lettermen and 17 starters returning from a team that was 10-2 overall a year ago, won the Big Ten title at 8-0 and played in the Rose Bowl. Michigan is led by Elvis Grbac at quarterback and Tyrone Wheatley at tailback...but giving an indication of the Wolverine's depth and talent is the fact that Coach Gary Moeller lists FOUR tailbacks on his "two-deep" chart.

THE RECORDS: Minnesota is 1-5 overall and 1-2 in the Big Ten after falling 20-15 to Michigan State in last weekend's Homecoming 1992 confrontation. Michigan remained unbeaten by overwhelming the Hoosiers 31-3 at Indiana. The Wolves opened the '92 season by deadlocking Notre Dame 17-17 and since then have reeled off five straight wins including 35-3 over Oklahoma State, 61-7 over Houston, 52-28 over Iowa and 35-10 over Michigan State before downing the Hoosiers last weekend. The Wolves are 5-0-1 overall and 3-0 in the Big Ten.

THE GAMES LAST WEEK: Once again Minnesota had its chances against Michigan State but fell short. After leading most of the way, the Golden Gophers fell behind 13-12 late in the game but rallied...just as they did the previous week at Purdue...to take a lead (15-13) with just 2:57 remaining in the game. Then, like UM did against the Boilermakers, it let the verdict get away by allowing Michigan State to score one more time with just 18 seconds left on the clock. Michigan had a better time of it. The Wolves hammered Indiana 31-3 as Grbac threw two touchdown passes and was 13-of-17 with no interceptions for 132 yards.

THE COACHES: Minnesota's Jim Wacker is in his first year as head coach of the Golden Gophers, and he's 1-3 in Gold Country. His 21-year college head coaching record six-games into the 1992 season is 145-96-3. Gary Moeller is in his third year as Michigan's head coach, and he's 24-5-1. In five years as a collegiate head coach, Moeller is 30-29-4.

THE INJURY REPORT: Interim Head Football Trainer Doug Locy feels that for the second straight week Minnesota came out of its Big Ten assignment without any major injuries although his list of "bumps and bruises" was extensive. Most seriously injured may have been Andre Davis who suffered an ankle injury but did return to action late in the Michigan State encounter. Chris Darkins suffered a slight hamstring pull in Friday's brief practice session and was held out of the MSU game as a precaution. Both should be 100 percent for Michigan.

GOLDEN GOPHERS TO WATCH: Rated as possible U of M choices for post-season honors in 1992 are Marquel Fleetwood (QB, Sr., Decatur, Ga.); Omar Douglas (SB, Jr., New Orleans, La.); John Lewis (FL, Sr., Miami, Fla.); Russ Heath (LB, Jr., Aurora, Colo.); Andre Davis (LB, Sr., Jacksonville, Fla.); Keith Ballard (OT, Sr., Detroit, Mich.); Dennis Cappella (DE, Jr., Miller Place, NY); and Dean Kaufman (P, Sr., Sauk Centre, Minn.).

THE FINAL WORD: "Wow. We're really going into a lion's den this week. If I were on the voting committee, I'd

make Michigan the number one ranked team in the country. They are awesome. They've got great team speed, and they are hitting on all three cylinders (offense, defense and the kicking game). It's just a super football team."

IN THE BIG TEN: Minnesota finished 2-7 in the Big Ten a year ago and 5-3 in conference play the year before. The Golden Gophers last won the conference title at 6-1 in 1967 under Murray Warmath, and their best Big Ten mark since then was 6-2 under Cal Stoll in 1973 (3rd). Going to Michigan, Minnesota is tied with five other teams for fifth place at 1-2. In direct contrast, the Wolverines won the title a year ago and are 3-0 this year firmly entrenched in first place and the solid favorite to repeat as champions and go to the Rose Bowl.

TURNOVERS: Minnesota turned the ball over five times at Purdue two weeks ago and four more times at the Metrodome in the 1992 Homecoming game against Michigan State last Saturday night. It cost the Golden Gophers both decisions. "It is the most critical statistic in football," Coach Jim Wacker maintains. Minnesota now is minus six in the turnover department.

The Golden Gopher hockey team will open the 1992-93 season this weekend with a two-game series versus North Dakota at Mariucci Arena at 7:05 p.m., Friday and Saturday.

Anxious to Begin: After two weeks of practice, the Golden Gophers are anxious to play someone other than themselves. Ironically, they will open this season with the same team that they finished the 1991-92 regular season against, the North Dakota Fighting Sioux. This will be a vastly different Gopher team from the one that opposed Gino Gasparini's squad last spring. Twelve freshmen join a team that returns 14 lettermen from last year. The Golden Gophers lost five seniors to graduation and three underclassmen to professional signings (Trent Klatt/North Stars, Doug Zmolek/San Jose Sharks, Mike Muller/Winnipeg Jets). Those eight players were all starters and accounted for 83 goals, including 14 game-winners and 137 assists, as well as 26 wins from departed goalie Jeff Stolp. Those numbers will be very difficult to replace.

Richards Returns: All-American candidate Travis Richards (Crystal, Minn.) has returned for his senior season and has been chosen by his teammates to wear the captain's monogram this year. Richards was the leading scorer amongst the defensemen a year ago with 10 goals and 23 assists. He will be the anchor of the Minnesota defense and a key offensive figure as well.

Veteran Netminder: Veteran goalie Tom Newman (Blaine, Minn.) returns for his final campaign as a Gopher, and he will be the leading candidate for the netminding duties. Last year, Newman posted a 5-1-0 record with a 2.44 GAA. That raised his career numbers to 36-16-4, with a 3.54 GAA. He will be challenged by a pair of talented underclassmen in sophomore Jeff Callinan (Minnetonka, Minn.) and freshman Jeff Moen (Roseville, Minn.).

Johnson and Hendrickson Combo Returns: The talented duo of junior Craig Johnson (St. Paul, Minn.) and sophomore Darby Hendrickson (Richfield, Minn.) are expected to lead the Golden Gopher offensive assault this year. Last season, the two players combined for 44 goals and 69 assists and were the third and fourth leading scorers on the team, respectively. Newcomers will see action in this area. Freshmen Dan Trebil (Bloomington, Minn.), Mike McAlpine (So. St. Paul, Minn.) and Charlie Wasley (Edina, Minn.) have looked impressive, as has sophomore Brandon Steege (Burnsville, Minn.), who was converted from left wing this fall after playing some time on the blueline in high school. Last year this was a strong area for the team and the development of these young players will be crucial in the overall success of the team.

Ticket Update: The Golden Gophers have sold out all of the general public regular season tickets, with about 300 student season tickets remaining as of last Friday. The final season in the old Mariucci Arena and increased excitement about the new arena, have combined for the strongest season ticket sales in years.

Television Schedule Set to Kick Off: The Golden Gophers will have a minimum of 26 games on television this season beginning with both games of the opening series with North Dakota. Midwest Sports Channel will broadcast 20 games, while KMSP Channel 9 will broadcast six games. MSC will handle production for all 26 games. The talented lineup includes veteran Golden Gopher announcer Doug McLeod calling the action, while Tom Reid and Dick Bremer will provide the color and interviews. The season opener on Friday will be on MSC, with Saturday's game slated for KMSP.

MEN'S ATHLETICS ANNOUNCES MAJOR GIFT TO FOOTBALL FACILITY

George R. Gibson, a former Golden Gopher All-America football player and teammate of Bronko Nagurski, recently announced his intention to donate \$500,000 toward retiring the debt on the University of Minnesota football practice facility. As a result, Men's Athletics and the University Foundation will propose to an All-University Honors Committee next week that the facility be named in honor of Gibson, who also donated \$1 million to the University for a chair in hydrogeology in 1987, and the legendary Nagurski.

"We are certainly grateful to George Gibson," said McKinley Boston. "When we receive the gift it will be the largest single gift ever given to the department. We are also extremely excited about the names of two such important figures in the history of Gopher football being on the building. George wanted to see Bronko honored, and we are excited about seeing George honored along with him."

The cost of the football practice facility was \$5 million. The department continues to pay debt service on \$2.9 million of that total. According to Boston, another \$200,000 has been pledged to the facility if the naming opportunity is realized.

Naming of facilities at the University occurs as a result of a recommendation by the All-University Honors Committee and the approval of the Board of Regents.

George R. Gibson

George Gibson attended the University of Minnesota. He received his BA in geology in 1930 and was the first student athlete in many years to receive his Ph.D. (also in geology) from the university in 1934. Gibson was both a student athlete and faculty member at the university until he went on to Carleton College.

At Carleton College, Gibson served as both a faculty member and head football coach. He also taught at The Ohio State University in the early 1940's. Gibson went on to work for several different oil companies as a geologist until 1952 when he settled in Texas and started his own business as an geologist consulting to oil companies.

Gibson was as successful on the playing field as in the oil field. Born in New York and raised in Oklahoma, Gibson came to the University of Minnesota in 1925. He played football from 1926-1928 and was an All-American for the Golden Gophers in 1928. He captained the team that same year. Gibson also wrestled for the Golden Gophers in 1927 and 1928.

A highly successful businessman, Gibson has supported the Department of Men's Intercollegiate Athletics for many years through his contributions to the Williams Scholarship Fund. During the Minnesota Campaign, Gibson and his wife, Orpha, endowed a chair in hydro-geology at the Institute of Technology with a \$1 million gift.

Gibson continues his support of the University of Minnesota today with his latest gift of \$500,000 to name the football practice facility in honor of himself and his revered teammate, Bronko Nagurski.

Truly, George Gibson is one of the most outstanding alumni the University of Minnesota will ever be able to claim.

Bronko Nagurski

Born on November 3, 1908 in Rainy River, Ontario, Bronko Nagurski and his family moved to International Falls, Minnesota shortly after his birth. Raised in International Falls, Bronko was recruited to the University of Minnesota in 1925 by Dr. Clarence Spears who was then head football coach.

Described by many as the greatest football player of all time, "the Bronk" is the only college football player ever to be named All-America at two positions in the same year (1929). After a highly successful Gopher career, Bronko went on to play for the Chicago Bears.

Under coach George Halas, Bronko led the team to the first NFL championship in 1933. He played with the Bears until 1937, when he retired after a salary dispute. He then went on to wrestle professionally during the 1930s, '40s and '50s with the exception of 1943. In 1943, his old coach, George Halas, hailed Nagurski from the north to play for a season while our American troops were at war. At age 35, Nagurski again led his team to a national championship.

Nagurski was inducted into the NFL Hall of Fame in its charter class as well as being a member of the National Football Foundation College Hall of Fame. In 1979 the University of Minnesota officially retired Nagurski's number, 72. Noted for his brute strength and speed, legends about Nagurski abound throughout football circles. Even today, Nagurski is a household name.

Nagurski retired to Rainy Lake, just outside International Falls. He spent his last years fishing and enjoying the peace of the country until his death in 1990.

ANDERSON TO BE INDUCTED INTO UNIVERSITY OF OREGON ATHLETIC HALL OF FAME

Lynne Anderson (Winbigler), a member of the University of Minnesota women's and men's track & field coaching staffs, will be inducted as a charter member into the University of Oregon Athletic Hall of Fame during the Ducks homecoming weekend on November 6-7.

The initial induction class will include 27 former athletes, coaches and administrators, and three teams. The Athletic Hall of Fame was started in conjunction with the construction of the Casanova Center. Former director of athletics Bill Byrne appointed the committee to select the first group. The inductees will be honored at a banquet on Friday night and at a special halftime ceremony Saturday when Oregon hosts California at Autzen Stadium.

"I'm excited and honored," Anderson said. "My dad (Tom Winbigler) coached (football) with Len Casanova at the University of Oregon and now, not only is Len being inducted as well, but the new athletic center is named after him. It's a real thrill to be honored along with such a great group of inductees."

After finishing third in the discus at the 1975 AIAW national meet for Oregon, Anderson went on to win the event at the 1976 U.S. Olympic Trials to become the Ducks first-ever female Olympian. She also finished second at the 1980 U.S. Olympic Trials, but was denied the opportunity to compete in Moscow because of the U.S. boycott of the Games.


Anderson, who was the American record holder in the discus from 1977-79, recorded a personal-best of 189-6 in the event. In addition, she was a three-time (1976, 1978, 1979) TAC champion, a member of the U.S. squad at the 1979 Pan American Games, and a World Cup participant in 1977 and 1979. Oregon's most prestigious women's track & field award, the "Winbigler Performer of the Year Award," is annually given to honor the school's best performance on the national or international level.

Recognized as one of the finest throwing coaches in the country, Anderson is in her 13th season at the University of Minnesota. In addition to serving as the throwing coach for the women's team during that time, she also was the women's strength and conditioning coach from 1981-90. She has also joined husband Colin Anderson, a former Golden Gopher All-American and fellow 1980 U.S. Olympian, as a member of the men's track & field coaching staff for the past five years.

MINNESOTA TO HOST INDIANA SATURDAY

Minnesota, bloody but unbowed, returns to the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome Saturday to host Indiana in a Big Ten Conference Halloween football extravaganza at 6:05 p.m.

Coach Jim Wacker's Golden Gophers, after dropping a 63-13 decision at Michigan last Saturday, will take their overall record of 1-6 and their Big Ten mark of 1-3 into Saturday night's Monster Bash.

The invading Hoosiers, following their 10-3 win over Wisconsin at home last weekend, will risk an overall record of 4-3 and a conference log of 2-2 when challenging the Golden Gophers.

Minnesota's assignment this time out of the blocks seems like a big one, but it shouldn't be as overwhelming as last week's trip into Ann Arbor. "Give Michigan credit. That is a great football team. They whipped us every way possible. But we've just got to forget about it and get on with the rest of our season. And that starts with Indiana on Saturday."

He knows the Hoosiers will be a severe challenge for his Golden Gophers. "They just had a great win over the Badgers," he points out, "so they will be coming in here on a high. They have been doing extremely well on defense as they showed against Wisconsin, and they sure as heck played Michigan a lot tougher than we did. It will be a big one for us."

While Wacker was willing to acknowledge Michigan's greatness, he wondered if the Wolverines might not be quite as good as Minnesota made them look. "For whatever reason, we did not play," he said. "With one or two exceptions when our special teams did some things right, we just did not perform. If we are ever going to challenge, we've got to play people like Michigan better."

John Lewis (FL, Sr., Miami, Fla.) drew Wacker's praise for his individual efforts, but beyond that not many accolades were distributed from Ann Arbor. John had a couple of really big plays for us," Wacker said. "He did what he could to keep us in things."

Lewis electrified the crowd by returning Michigan's first kickoff 88 yards for a touchdown that knotted the score at 7-7. Then in the third period he teamed up with Marquel Fleetwood (QB, Sr., Decatur, Ga.) on a 94 yard touchdown pass, the longest in Golden Gopher history. The previous record was 91 yards and was set in 1988 (Scott Schaffner to Jason Bruce).

Outside of those two plays, however, it was all Wolverines. "They whipped us every way possible," Wacker admitted, "and that's it. But it is over. It is done with. We can't change a thing. We can't go back and make tackles we missed (Wacker said after the game that Minnesota performed so poorly on defense it could not have made a tackle if it had the guy trapped in a phone booth!), make the passes or catches we missed. A loss like that is tough on everyone, but it is over, and we can't let it be the end of our world."

So Wacker is thinking Indiana. Can he get his Golden Gophers to do the same? "This will be a real test for us," he stressed. "It will test our courage and our resiliency. We've got four games left, and none of them will be like Michigan. We've got to believe we can do it. We've got to practice hard and prepare hard for Indiana. We'll find out what we are made out of this week. We'll find out how tough we really are."

THE GAME: Minnesota vs Indiana
 at Minneapolis, Minn.
 6:05 p.m. (CST), Sat., October 31, 1992

THE SERIES: Minnesota's Golden Gophers and Indiana's Hoosiers have met 53 times in a football series that dates back to 1906, and the Golden Gophers will take an edge of 31-19-3 into Saturday's game. Minnesota leads 28-7-1 in games played in Minneapolis, and the Hoosiers after winning 34-8 last fall, lead 12-3-2 in games played in Bloomington. The Golden Gophers are ahead 3-2 in games played in the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome and shut the Hoosiers out 12-0 the last time they played there.

THE OPPONENT: Indiana, a school of 35,000 students, is located in Bloomington, Ind. The Hoosiers are coached by Bill Mallory and entered the 1992 season with 38 lettermen and 11 starters back from a team that finished 7-4-1 overall and 5-3 in the Big Ten a year ago. They whipped Baylor of the Southwest Conference 24-0 in the Copper Bowl in 1991. Indiana is led by Trent Green at quarterback who passed for 159 yards AND the winning touchdown for the Hoosiers over Wisconsin last weekend.

THE RECORDS: Minnesota is 1-6 overall and 1-3 in the Big Ten after suffering through its 50-point loss at Ann Arbor last weekend. Indiana fared much better. It held off

the Wisconsin Badgers 10-3 at Bloomington last Saturday and thus will risk an overall mark of 4-3 and a Big Ten log of 2-2 Saturday night. Earlier this year, the Hoosiers beat Miami of Ohio 16-0, Missouri 20-10 and Northwestern 28-3. They have suffered setbacks at the hands of Kentucky 37-25, Michigan State 42-31 and Michigan 31-3.

THE GAMES LAST WEEK: Minnesota found the Michigan Wolverines too tough to handle in the annual battle for the Little Brown Jug at Ann Arbor last Saturday and fell 63-13. The Golden Gophers simply could not stop the potent Michigan offense that amassed 621 total yards compared to only 227 for Minnesota. Indiana hosted Wisconsin and prevailed in a defensive-minded struggle that saw the Hoosiers stop the Badgers at their own two yard line with just a minute to go in the contest.

THE COACHES: Minnesota's Jim Wacker is in his first year as head coach of the Golden Gophers, and he's 1-6 in Gold Country. His 21-year college head coaching record seven games into the 1992 season is 145-97-3. Mallory, now in his ninth season at Indiana, is 48-48-2 with the Hoosiers. In 23 years overall, he is 146-100-3 with previous stints (all successful!) at Miami of Ohio, Colorado and Northern Illinois.

THE INJURY REPORT: Interim Head Football Trainer Doug Locy seemed a bit more concerned this week. Minnesota took a physical beating on the field as well as on the scoreboard at Michigan. Art Layton re-injured his shoulder. Mark Smith pulled a hamstring muscle, Juan Hunter sprained a knee and Russ Heath suffered a concussion. According to Locy, all will be monitored closely this week, and their status will range from questionable to probable. "We hope to have all of them ready for Indiana," he said.

GOLDEN GOPHERS TO WATCH: Rated as possible U of M choices for post-season honors in 1992 are Marquel Fleetwood (QB, Sr., Decatur, Ga.); Omar Douglas (SB, Jr., New Orleans, La.); John Lewis (FL, Sr., Miami, Fla.); Russ Heath (LB, Jr., Aurora, Colo.); Andre Davis (LB, Sr., Jacksonville, Fla.); Keith Ballard (OT, Sr., Detroit, Mich.); Dennis Cappella (DE, Jr., Miller Place, NY); and Dean Kaufman (P, Sr., Sauk Centre, Minn.).

THE FINAL WORD: "Without question, Michigan is the best college football team I've coached against. They just plain kicked us. But it is OVER. We've got to go on from here. We've got to believe in ourselves, and we've got to think about and get ready to face Indiana. They really played great defense against Wisconsin last week, so we know our execution has to be better than it was at Michigan. We also know they can put points on the board.

They started another new freshman, Michael Batts, at tailback last Saturday, and he rushed for 111 yards. On top of that we will be facing another fine quarterback in Trent Green who threw for the winning touchdown in the fourth quarter against Wisconsin. It will be a tough game for us, but with four games to go, anything can happen. We've just got to get our act together."

IN THE BIG TEN: Minnesota finished 1-7 in the Big Ten a year ago and 5-3 in conference play the year before. The Golden Gophers last won the conference title at 6-1 in 1967 under Murray Warmath, and their best Big Ten mark since then was 6-2 under Cal Stoll in 1973 (3rd). They now are 1-3 in the conference and have lost three straight. Minnesota lost their last six Big Ten games a year ago, and Coach Wacker hopes to avoid duplicating that dubious distinction.

TURNOVERS: Minnesota only turned the ball over once at Michigan last Saturday as compared to five times at Purdue three weeks ago and four more times at the Metrodome in the 1992 Homecoming game against Michigan State a week later. Those critical giveaways cost the Golden Gophers both of those decisions. "It is the most critical statistic in football," Coach Wacker maintains. And, since the Golden Gophers did not get any turnovers back from the Wolverines, they now are minus seven in that department.

FOOTBALL LUNCHEONS SCHEDULED: Weekly football luncheons, featuring Minnesota's Coach Jim Wacker, are scheduled both Fridays before the final two home football games of the 1992 football season at the Minneapolis Athletic Club. A social hour kicks things off for each gathering at 11:30 a.m. The luncheon will begin at 12:00 and the program at 12:30 p.m. Each luncheon also will feature a celebrity emcee and additional special guests. GOPHERS SPLIT SERIES WITH SIOUX; TRAVEL TO COLORADO COLLEGE THIS WEEKEND

The University of Minnesota Golden Gophers opened their 1992-93 hockey season with a split in a hard-fought series with North Dakota this past weekend. The Maroon and Gold will travel to Colorado Springs, Colo., this Friday and Saturday to take on the Colorado College Tigers in a two-game series. Both games of the series will be televised on Midwest Sports Channel. Friday's game is at 7:35 MDT, while Saturday's is at 7:05 MDT.

Split With the Sioux: The Golden Gophers opened their 1992-93 season the same way as they ended the previous season, by giving up eight goals. The Fighting Sioux surprised a young Golden Gopher team with their work effort and offensive output. There were some highlights in this otherwise dismal showing. Junior right wing **Jeff Nielsen (Grand Rapids, Minn.)** had a solid night with a goal and two assists and he added three assists on Saturday night. Freshman center **Brian Bonin (White Bear Lake, Minn.)** had his first collegiate goal and added two assists for the weekend. He was the quarterback of the second power play unit and looked very poised on the ice throughout the weekend.

Saturday Night Turnaround: On Saturday night, the Golden Gophers turned the tables on the Sioux by playing their style of hockey and beating them at it. In a penalty-filled marathon that lasted three hours and fifteen minutes, Minnesota prevailed by the identical score of 8-4. The Golden Gophers set the tone from the first shift by attacking the Sioux and hitting anyone that moved. North Dakota jumped out to an early two goal lead, but it would not hold up to the Minnesota barrage. The Golden Gophers fired 52 shots at the opposing goalie with the first one finding its mark at the 10:54 mark of the first period when freshman wing **Bobby Dustin (Roseville, Minn.)** notched his first career goal to cut the Sioux lead to one goal. Eight minutes later senior alternate captain **John Brill (Grand Rapids, Minn.)** tied the game with the first of his two goals of the night. Brill and fellow alternate captain **Scott Bell (St. Paul, Minn.)** set the tone of the game with their tenacious forechecking in the North Dakota zone. The Golden Gophers held the Sioux to 11 shots on goal in the final two periods, while firing in six goals of their own.

Freshman Shine: Brian Bonin and Bobby Dustin were not the only freshmen to have solid performances in the series. Defensemen **Danny Trebil (Bloomington, Minn.)**, **Greg Zwakman (Edina, Minn.)** and **Charlie Wasley (Edina, Minn.)** all played well. With experience, this group will develop into an outstanding unit. Freshmen for-

wards **Jesse Bertogliat (Esko, Minn.)**, **Dan Woog (So. St. Paul, Minn.)** and **Dave Larson (So. St. Paul, Minn.)** all saw ice time. Larson picked up his first goal as a Golden Gopher on an assist from Woog on Saturday night. This class of freshmen have the talent to contribute right away and with a little seasoning, will develop into a great group of players.

Richards Report: All-American candidate **Travis Richards (Crystal, Minn.)** was the one consistently outstanding player for the Golden Gophers over the weekend. Whether it was coming back to cut off a break-away, or poke-checking the puck off of Greg Johnson's stick, or bringing the puck up the ice and out of the zone, he did it all. Hendrickson, last year's WCHA Freshman of the year, is a key part of the Minnesota attack. Luckily, he only suffered a bruised thigh and is listed as probable for the Colorado College series.

About the Tigers: Colorado College was swept on the road at Michigan Tech this past weekend by scores of 4-2 and 6-1. The Tigers struggled on the power play and could not hold the Tech offense down. Going into the season, Colorado College was picked for the middle of the pack in the WCHA because of their veteran defense and great performance down the stretch last year. The Tigers will still be without Head Coach Brad Buetow, who is serving a suspension for violation of NCAA rules.

ANDERSON TO BE INDUCTED INTO UNIVERSITY OF OREGON ATHLETIC HALL OF FAME

Lynne Anderson (Winbigler), a member of the University of Minnesota women's and men's track & field coaching staffs, will be inducted as a charter member into the University of Oregon Athletic Hall of Fame during the Ducks homecoming weekend on November 6-7.

The initial induction class will include 27 former athletes, coaches and administrators, and three teams. The Athletic Hall of Fame was started in conjunction with the construction of the Casanova Center. Former director of athletics Bill Byrne appointed the committee to select the first group. The inductees will be honored at a banquet on Friday night and at a special halftime ceremony Saturday when Oregon hosts California at Autzen Stadium.

"I'm excited and honored," Anderson said. "My dad (Tom Winbigler) coached (football) with Len Casanova at the University of Oregon and now, not only is Len being inducted as well, but the new athletic center is named after him. It's a real thrill to be honored along with such a great group of inductees."

After finishing third in the discus at the 1975 AIAW national meet for Oregon, Anderson went on to win the event at the 1976 U.S. Olympic Trials to become the Ducks first-ever female Olympian. She also finished second at the 1980 U.S. Olympic Trials, but was denied the opportunity to compete in Moscow because of the U.S. boycott of the Games.

Anderson, who was the American record holder in the discus from 1977-79, recorded a personal-best of 189-6 in the event. In addition, she was a three-time (1976, 1978, 1979) TAC champion, a member of the U.S. squad at the 1979 Pan American Games, and a World Cup participant in 1977 and 1979. Oregon's most prestigious women's track & field award, the "Winbigler Performer of the Year Award," is annually given to honor the school's best performance on the national or international level.

Recognized as one of the finest throwing coaches in the country, Anderson is in her 13th season at the University of Minnesota. In addition to serving as the throwing coach for the women's team during that time, she also was the women's strength and conditioning coach from 1981-90. She has also joined husband Colin Anderson, a former Golden Gopher All-American and fellow 1980 U.S. Olympian, as a member of the men's track & field coaching staff for the past five years.

MINNESOTA TO INVADE OHIO STATE SATURDAY

Minnesota's Golden Gophers begin a two-week road trip Saturday when invading Ohio State University for a 1:30 p.m. (EST) Big Ten Conference football assignment.

A week later Coach Jim Wacker's charges are slated to play at Wisconsin, before closing the 1992 season in the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome on Nov. 21 at 6:05 p.m. (CST) against Iowa.

Minnesota will go into Saturday's game at Columbus with an overall record of 1-7 and a Big Ten mark of 1-4 after dropping another heartbreaker---this time a 24-17 decision at home to Indiana.

The Buckeyes, meanwhile, will risk an overall 6-2 standard and a conference log of 3-2---good for a tie for second place in the standings with Indiana and Michigan State---on Saturday.

"Incredible. I don't know how else to describe it," Coach Wacker said after Minnesota's fourth straight setback. "For the most part, we played well enough to win, and it certainly wasn't for a lack of wanting. In 33 years of coaching I've never seen a group of young men who have suffered like this."

Ironically, last Saturday night's game was a Halloween event, and Wacker wound up describing the results. "Haunting. We gave it away. At times, especially in the second half, it got ugly. It certainly was a very disappointing loss for us. It boiled down to Indiana making the plays when it counted, and we could not."

Actually the Golden Gophers held the upper hand through the

first two periods, and part way through the third, before the roof began to fall in.

"A lot of our guys did some things very well," Wacker stressed, but he also admitted that some was not enough. "We've got to learn that we can't give up a lead like we did Saturday night. In the second half, our tackling again became terrible, and mistakes continue to beat us. Interceptions continue to hurt us."

In the positive area, Wacker praised his punt return team---specifically Lewis Garrison (SE, Sr., West Des Moines, Iowa) -- for netting 115 yards on five plays.

Wacker also tipped his hat to Minnesota's offensive line of Keith Ballard (LT, Sr., Detroit, Mich.), Robert Rogers (LG, Jr., St. Louis, Mo.), Neil Fredenburg (C, Jr., Fargo, N.D.), Prince Pearson (RG, Sr., Ft. Lauderdale, Fla.), and Chris Fowlkes (RT, Fr., Brown Deer, Wis.) for its work against the Hoosiers.

But again, that game is in the past, and the Golden Gophers now must look ahead, and that means going into Columbus where the Buckeyes will rank as solid favorites after posting three consecutive triumphs.

"We aren't conceding anything," Wacker maintains. "We will come back fighting, and somehow maybe we can find a way to get the breaks to go our way. If we can continue to believe, we still have a chance to win some games."

Quick Facts

THE GAME: Minnesota vs Ohio State
at Columbus, Ohio
1:30 p.m. (EST), Sat., November 7, 1992

THE SERIES: Minnesota's Golden Gophers and Ohio State's Buckeyes have met 35 times in a football series that dates back to 1921, and OSU holds a commanding 29-6 lead in the series. The Bucks lead 14-4 in games played in Minneapolis and 15-2 in games played in Columbus. Minnesota last beat Ohio State in 1981 when prevailing 35-31 at Memorial Stadium. The Golden Gophers have not won in Columbus since Bernie Bierman's 1949 club posted a 27-0 shutout. A year ago OSU won 35-6 at the Metrodome.

THE LAST WIN: When Minnesota scored that 27 point verdict at Columbus in 1949, Dave Skrien, a U of M Administrative Assistant in charge of the Golden Gophers' recruiting, played a key role for the winners. While credited with 20 yards on six carries, his contributions apparently were even more pronounced on defense where he functioned as the left-side linebacker and was singled out as a key in Minnesota's shutting out the Buckeyes.

THE OPPONENT: Ohio State, a school of 54,000 students, is located in Columbus, Ohio. The Buckeyes are coached by John Cooper and entered the 1992 season with 37 lettermen and 14 starters back from a team that finished 8-4 overall and 5-3 in the Big Ten a year ago.

THE RECORDS: Minnesota is 1-7 overall and 1-4 in the Big Ten after dropping its fourth consecutive Big Ten decision to Indiana last week. Ohio State made it three wins in a row by overpowering Iowa in Iowa City, 38-15 in miserable weather conditions last Saturday.

THE GAMES LAST WEEK: Minnesota appeared to be on its way to its second Big Ten win of the year last time weekend, when it scored 10 points in the second quarter to go up 17-3 with 11:06 remaining in the third period, only to give up 21 unanswered points the rest of the way. Ohio State was in complete control from start to finish at Iowa City where quarterback Kirk Herbstreit was seven-of-nine for 81 yards without an interception, and tailback Robert Smith rushed 18 times for 129 yards and two touchdowns. The Buckeyes outrushed the Hawkeyes by a 259-37 margin.

THE COACHES: Minnesota's Jim Wacker is in his first year as head coach of the Golden Gophers, and he's 1-7 in Gold Country. His 21-year college head coaching record eight games into the 1992 season is 145-98-3. Cooper, in his

fifth year at OSU, is 33-20-2 with the Buckeyes. His collegiate record as a head coach after 16 seasons is 115-60-4.

THE INJURY REPORT: Interim Head Football Trainer Doug Locy has some questions and concerns as Minnesota prepares for Ohio State this week, the most critical being Marquel Fleetwood's left ankle. Fleetwood suffered a sprain in the first half but returned to play. How he responds during practice this week remains to be seen. Locy also is not sure if Juan Hunter, a backup at corner who missed the Indiana game with a sprained knee, will be available. His status remains day-to-day.

GOLDEN GOPHERS TO WATCH: Rated as possible U of M choices for post-season honors and candidates for the All-Big Ten team in 1992 are Marquel Fleetwood (QB, Sr., Decatur, Ga.); Omar Douglas (SB, Jr., New Orleans, La.); John Lewis (FL, Sr., Miami, Fla.); Keith Ballard (OT, Sr., Detroit, Mich.); Dennis Cappella (DE, Jr., Miller Place, NY); and Dean Kaufman (P, Sr., Sauk Centre, Minn.).

THE FINAL WORD: "There isn't any doubt that our people are hurting right now," Coach Wacker admitted, "and we could really use a win. We've just got to get better. Going into Ohio State will be a big challenge for us. We'll be coming off a very tough loss, and Ohio State will be coming off a big, big win at Iowa City. They've won a bunch in a row, they have a number of people on both offense and defense that really are playing well, and they seem to have put things together at the right time of their season. But somehow we need to find a way to turn things around."

IN THE BIG TEN: Minnesota finished 1-7 in the Big Ten a year ago and 5-3 in conference play the year before. The Golden Gophers last won the conference title at 6-1 in 1967 under Murray Warmath, and their best Big Ten mark since then was 6-2 under Cal Stoll in 1973 (3rd). They now are 1-4 in the conference and have lost four straight. Minnesota lost its last six Big Ten games a year ago, and Coach Wacker hopes to avoid duplicating that dubious distinction in 1992.

TURNOVERS: Minnesota turned the ball over three times against Indiana and did not get any back, and it was one of the main factors in the heartbreaking setback. "It's the most critical statistic in football," Coach Wacker continues to maintain. Those giveaways, all on interceptions, means the Golden Gophers are minus 10 in the turnover department this season.

GOPHER NETTERS RETURN TO ACTION

The Golden Gopher tennis team, which has been idle since Oct. 4, returns to action Friday when it travels to Madison, Wis., for the Rolex Regional tennis tournament. The four-day tournament concludes on Monday.

The Golden Gophers, ranked No. 22 in the ITA preseason poll, opened their 1992-93 on Oct. 1 with a 5-2 Big Ten Conference victory at Penn State.

That victory was the 14th consecutive Big Ten dual victory (dating to 1990) for the defending Big Ten champions. The Golden Gophers went 10-0 in the conference during the regular season last year en route to their fifth conference crown in the past 11 years.

After the Penn State victory, the Golden Gophers spent the next three days at the West Virginia Invitational at Morgantown, W. Va. Two Golden Gophers won singles titles at West Virginia, while three others claimed third

place, and the Golden Gophers claimed a doubles title as they began the 1992-93 season in tremendous fashion.

Donley and Benyebka win titles: Eric Donley (Fr., Duluth, Minn.) got his collegiate career off to a tremendous start by winning a singles title (at No. 7) and combining with Paul Pridmore (Jr., North Aurora, Ill.) for a doubles title at the West Virginia Invitational. Donley also teamed with Mehdi Benyebka (Sr., Oran, Algeria) for a win at No. 3 doubles in the victory over Penn State.

Benyebka captured the No. 2 singles championship at West Virginia. Roger Anderson (Sr., New Hope), Dean Hlushko (Sr., Arden Hills) and Rick Naumoff (Sr., Columbus, Ohio) each claimed third place at West Virginia. Anderson and Naumoff are the Golden Gopher co-captains.

Next: This weekend's tournament in Madison is the final action of 1992 for the Golden Gophers. On Jan. 16, the Golden Gophers will return to action at Kansas.

**GOPHERS SPLIT WITH COLORADO COLLEGE;
AT NORTHERN MICHIGAN THIS WEEKEND**

The University of Minnesota Golden Gophers split a two-game series at Colorado College this past weekend, winning the opener 4-3 before losing a heart-breaker 7-6 in overtime. The Golden Gophers (2-2) continue their road slate with a two-game series at Northern Michigan this weekend with both games slated for 7:05 p.m. (EST). Following the Northern Michigan series, the Golden Gophers return home for a two-game set with Wisconsin on November 13-14.

Tough On the Road: The Gophers young team found out that it is very difficult to win two games on the road. They opened the series strong with a hard-fought 4-3 victory on Friday night. Senior goalie Tom Newman (Blaine, Minn.) rebounded from a tough start the week before and held the Tigers to three goals on 44 shots. He kept the Gophers in the game early when the Tigers fired 18 shots on goal to the Gophers 6. On Saturday, the Golden Gophers hurt themselves with mental mistakes. They played a stronger game overall, but some key miscues cost them the game 7-6 in overtime. The two teams were tied after one period 1-1. The Gophers climbed on top 2-1 on a power play goal by Craig Johnson (St. Paul, Minn.) just 28 seconds into the second period. Minnesota went on the power play again at the 11:18 mark and that is where their troubles began. The Gophers came down a four-on-two break, but the Tiger defensemen turned the tables stealing the puck and scoring a short-handed goal to take a 3-2 lead. On the next Minnesota power play they did it again, scoring another short-handed goal to take a 4-2 lead into the intermission. Early in the third period they widened that lead with an even strength goal at 4:17.

Comeback Time: The Golden Gophers could have rolled over at this time, but they battled back scoring three straight goals to tie the game at 5-5. Johnson had his second of the game, while Chris McAlpine (Roseville, Minn.) and Darby Hendrickson (Richfield, Minn.) notched the others. Another defensive miscue just 34 seconds later gave the Tigers the lead again 6-5, but the Golden Gophers came back again evening the game 6-6 on Justin McHugh's - (Minnetonka, Minn.) goal at the 16:58 mark. The team's battled to the wire but the game went into overtime tied at six. The turning point of the extra period was at 3:10, when a hooking penalty was called against the Golden Gophers. Minnesota controlled three straight faceoffs on the penalty kill, but gave up the game-winning goal with 22 seconds left in overtime. Richards Report: All-American candidate Travis Richards (Crystal, Minn.) was once again the one consistently outstanding player for the Golden Gophers over the weekend. He saw a lot of ice time and picked up three assists for the weekend. His offensive numbers of five assists don't reflect the impact he had on the games. His stellar play in both ends of the rink demonstrated to the younger players the type of effort necessary to win in the WCHA.

Johnson Cranks it up a Notch Junior Craig Johnson continued his fine play with a solid weekend against the Tigers. He posted two goals and two assists to climb to second on the Gopher scoring charts behind junior Jeff Nielsen (Grand Rapids, Minn.) The Johnson/Hendrickson/Bell line had another good weekend with four goals and five assists. This line is one of the best in the league.

Newman Bounces Back: After a disappointing opening game against North Dakota when he gave up eight goals, senior goalie Tom Newman had a stellar performance on Friday night against the Tigers. He stopped 41 shots and held the Golden Gophers in the game in the first two periods when the Tigers outshot the Gophers 34-16. Newman picked up the 37th win of his career and lowered his GAA for the year to 5.30. Newman must be a steady force for the Maroon and Gold if they are to contend for the MacNaughton Cup.

Next Up: The Golden Gophers will invade Lakeview Arena this weekend to take on the Northern Michigan Wildcats (0-4). The Wildcats are winless so far this year, with the last two setbacks coming at the hands of the Wisconsin Badgers 9-2, 11-0 last weekend. Northern Michigan lost a lot of scoring power due to graduation and have struggled offensively so far this season.

MINNESOTA TO INVADE WISCONSIN SATURDAY

Minnesota's Golden Gophers conclude a two-week road trip Saturday when invading the University of Wisconsin for a 1:05 p.m. Big Ten Conference football assignment.

It will be the final journey of the 1992 season for Coach Jim Wacker's club. Minnesota then will close the current campaign at home on Nov. 21 against Iowa.

The Golden Gophers will be playing for Paul Bunyan's Axe at Wisconsin, and they'll go after Floyd of Rosedale in the finale at home. "If you can't get excited playing for an axe and a hog," Coach Wacker quipped, "what can you get excited about?"

But Wacker hopes his club will be more than excited despite taking a disappointing 1-8 overall record and a 1-5 Big Ten mark into the Wisconsin shootout after falling 17-0 at Ohio State last weekend.

It was Minnesota's 13th consecutive loss at Columbus (the Golden Gophers have not won there since 1949), and it was their fifth straight conference loss this season.

"It was another almost for us," Wacker lamented. "We came so, so close," and he cited numerous examples of how football remains a game of inches.

"Aaron Piepkorn (K, Sr., Austin, Texas) misses a chip-shot field goal by inches," Wacker said. "John Lewis (WR, Sr., Miami, Fla.) catches a pass on our fake field goal and is GONE, but he steps on the white line by an inch."

And he cited additional "so close" instances, such as Anthony

Carter's (RB, Jr., Columbus, Ohio) reception on a screen pass where he slipped and fell or would have been off to the races. And too many dropped passes to list.

"It was another frustrating afternoon for us," Wacker admitted, "but I'm proud of our players. They never quit, and they gave us a good effort."

Wacker singled out a number of Golden Gophers for their individual efforts including Carter who finished with 63 yards on 15 carries, and Aaron Osterman (SE, So., Elk River, Minn.) who had four catches for 37 yards, and Dennis Cappella (DE, Jr., Miller Place, N.Y.) who had nine tackles including two for losses of 12 yards and two-and-one-half sacks.

"Our defense played well enough for us to win," Wacker stressed. "They made some big plays for us, but we just could not capitalize. We missed some scoring opportunities."

Now there are two weeks and two games left on the 1992 season, and Wacker hopes his Golden Gophers can salvage the remainder of the season.

"We've got a couple of border wars on our hands," Wacker admitted, "but rest assured that we will put everything we have into our last two games, and that starts Saturday at Wisconsin."

Will "everything" be enough? The Badgers, who fell 26-10 at Michigan State this past weekend, will risk an overall mark of 4-5 and a conference record of 2-4.

It will be another tough assignment for Minnesota.

THE SERIES: Minnesota's Golden Gophers and Wisconsin's Badgers have met 101 times in a series that has been interrupted only once since the first game was played in 1890. The Golden Gophers lead 55-38-8 in the series, and they have a 33-16-2 edge in games played in Minneapolis. In games played in Madison, it's all even at 22-22-6. A year ago in the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome, the Badgers prevailed 19-16. Two years ago in Madison, Minnesota won 21-3.

PAUL BUNYAN'S AXE: Minnesota and Wisconsin will be playing for Paul Bunyan's Axe on Saturday. In 1948, the national "W" Club from the University of Wisconsin deemed it proper that a trophy symbolic of the rivalry between the two neighboring states of Wisconsin and Minnesota would be fitting. What better symbol than the axe allegedly used by the greatest Upper Midwest giant of them all, Paul Bunyan? And so it was. That colorful axe went to the Golden Gophers after their 16-0 victory in 1948, and it's been passed to the winner of the Minnesota-Wisconsin game each fall since then.

THE OPPONENT: Wisconsin, located in Madison, Wisconsin, has an enrollment of 43,000. A year ago the Badgers were 5-6 overall and 2-6 in the conference. Coach Barry Alvarez opened fall camp with 50 lettermen and 19 starters returning.

THE RECORDS: Minnesota is 1-8 overall and 1-5 in the Big Ten after falling 17-0 at Ohio State last Saturday. Wisconsin is 4-5 overall and 2-4 in the Big Ten following its 26-10 setback at Michigan State in its most-recent outing. Prior to that, the Badgers had beaten Bowling Green 39-18, Northern Illinois 18-17, Ohio State 20-16 and Purdue 19-16. Its losses were 27-10 to Washington, 23-22 to Iowa, 10-3 to Indiana and 13-12 to Illinois.

THE GAMES LAST WEEK: Minnesota's defense kept it in the game until the end, and the offense had some chances but just could not get the job done and fell for the 10th straight time on the road. Wisconsin had similar travel problems, although the Badgers did lead early 3-0. "It was a case where we made too many mistakes," Coach Barry Alvarez said. "Michigan State did something nobody's been able to do to us this year---run the football." The Spartans netted 310 yards on the ground. Tico Duckett had 108 of those (he had only 38 against Minnesota).

THE COACHES: Minnesota's Jim Wacker is in his first year as head coach of the Golden Gophers, and he's 1-8 in Gold Country. His 21-year college head coaching record nine games into the 1992 season is 145-99-3. Alvarez, now in his third season at Wisconsin and third season as a collegiate head coach, enters Saturday's game 10-21.

THE INJURY REPORT: Interim Head Football Trainer Doug Locy had a long list of casualties after the OSU battle, and the most serious was the knee injury to comeback Derek Fisher who appears to be on the shelf for the remainder of the season. Marquel Fleetwood, already "gimpy" with an ankle sprain, suffered some bruised ribs, Doyle Cockrell had a knee sprain and Steve Cambrice sprained an ankle, but Locy figures all will be available for the Badgers.

GOLDEN GOPHERS TO WATCH: Rated as possible U of M choices for post-season honors and already nominated for the All-Big Ten team in 1992 are Marquel Fleetwood (QB, Sr., Decatur, Ga.); Omar Douglas (SB, Jr., New Orleans, La.); John Lewis (FL, Sr., Miami, Fla.); Keith Ballard (OT, Sr., Detroit, Mich.); Dennis Cappella (DE, Jr., Miller Place, NY); Russ Heath (LB, Jr., Aurora, Colo.); and Dean Kaufman (P, Sr., Sauk Centre, Minn.).

THE FINAL WORD: "Same song, different verse," was the way Coach Wacker described the loss at OSU. "But I promise we will play our hearts out in the last two games. We will work hard and we will practice hard. Wisconsin had a good running back in Brent Moss who has been very steady, and they have shown steady improvement in three years under Alvarez. They have been especially good defensively, and they have two fine linebackers in Aaron Norvell and Gary Casper who lead them in tackles.

IN THE BIG TEN: Minnesota finished 1-7 in the Big Ten a year ago and 5-3 in conference play the year before. The Golden Gophers last won the conference title at 6-1 in 1967 under Murray Warmath, and their best Big Ten mark since then was 6-2 under Cal Stoll in 1973 (third place). They now are 1-5 in the conference and have lost five straight. Minnesota lost its last six Big Ten games a year ago, and Coach Wacker hopes to avoid duplicating that dubious distinction in 1992.

FOOTBALL LUNCHEON SCHEDULED: The final weekly football luncheon of the 1992 season, featuring Minnesota's Coach Jim Wacker, is scheduled Friday, Nov. 20, before the final home football game of the season (against Iowa) at the Minneapolis Athletic Club. A social hour kicks things off at 11:30 a.m. The luncheon will begin

at noon and the program at 12:30 p.m. The luncheon also will feature a celebrity emcee and additional special guests. Phone 612/339-3655 for reservations.

Slated to be inducted from the pioneer group are Verne Gagne (wrestling and football), Herb Joesting (football), Newt Loken (gymnastics, gymnast and coach), George "Butch" Nash (football, player and coach), Martin Rolek (basketball) and Bud Wilkinson (football). Honorees from the contemporary group are Garry Bjorklund (cross country and track), Carl Eller (football), Jack McCartan (hockey), Lloyd "Snapper" Stein (trainer), Clayton Tonnemaker (football) and Murray Warmath (football coach).

GOLDEN GOPHERS SWIMMING & DIVING TEAM TO OPEN SEASON IN IOWA CITY

Coming off their third straight second-place finish to Michigan at the 1992 Big Ten Championships, and sixth-place finish (best since 1965) at the NCAA Championships last season (held in Indianapolis), the Golden Gophers must open the 1992-93 season in a challenging fashion versus the Iowa Hawkeyes, at Iowa City, Saturday. Iowa finished fifth at last season's Big Ten Championships and is looking forward to challenging Michigan for the title this season. The two teams did not meet in dual meet competition last season.

Minnesota lost a large portion of its scoring from the last two seasons with the graduation of Del Cerney, Sean Quackenbush, Scott Tripps, Jay Fischer, Omar Boyd and Scott Hart, all of whom scored points at last season's Big Ten and NCAA championship meets. Minnesota brought home 19 first-team All-America certificates and 13 honorable mention awards, and two individual Big Ten records.

The Golden Gophers expect junior Can Ergenekan to be a big contributor in the butterfly races this season. Ergenekan returns after participating on the Turkish

Olympic Team in Barcelona. Junior Matt Brown was the Big Ten champion in the 200 individual medley last season and he also was a Big Ten finalist in both breaststroke events. Minnesota has a fine sprinter returning in junior Eric Jorgensen. Besides, Jorgensen and Ergenekan, the Maroon & Gold have seven other returning lettermen who scored at the Big Ten Championships last season -- Dave Zarns (30 points), Chris Carlisle (17), Paul Kaump (17), Andy Kurtz (14), Darren Heydanek (13), Alan Boelk (3) and Paul Domer (1).

Minnesota also signed eight freshmen, P. J. Bogart, Leo Gomes, Derek Williams, Bernd Zeruhn, Lance Hoff, Kenji Suduh, Matt Connolly, and Jeff Bloomer all of whom hope to contribute this season.

GOPHERS HOST WISCONSIN IN BORDER BATTLE

The University of Minnesota Golden Gophers tied both games of a series with Northern Michigan this past weekend. The Golden Gophers and Wildcats battled to a 3-3 tie the first night and a 5-5 tie the second night. The Golden Gophers (2-2-2) return home for a two-game series with Wisconsin this weekend with both games slated for 7:05 p.m. (CST) starts. The second game of the series will be played at the Met Center in the second annual Border Battle. Minnesota is in fourth place behind Denver, Wisconsin and Michigan Tech, but only four points out of first place. This year more than ever, the WCHA is very balanced and any team is capable of beating the other on a given weekend.

Tough On the Road: The Gophers young team found out that it is very difficult to win games on the road in the WCHA. They opened the series strong with a hard-fought 3-3 tie on Friday night. Senior goalie Tom Newman (Blaine, Minn.) again led the way, holding the Wildcats to three goals. The Golden Gophers outshot the Wildcats 37-17, but once again had difficulty putting the puck past Wildcat goalie Corwin Saurdiff.

Game Two: Minnesota stormed out to a 4-1 lead early in the second period in the second game of the series, but were goaded into some dumb penalties and gave up three consecutive power play goals to allow the Wildcats to tie the game and force the overtime. Minnesota has now played three consecutive overtime games and has yet to win one of them.

Richards Report: All-American candidate Travis Richards (Crystal, Minn.) had a strong weekend again with excellent defensive play. He is the leader of a young blue line corps and leads the Gophers defensemen in scoring with seven assists.

Johnson Comes Through: Junior Craig Johnson (St. Paul, MN) continued his fine play with a solid weekend against the Wildcats. He posted a goal and two assists to climb to second on the Gopher scoring charts behind junior Jeff Nielsen (Grand Rapids, Minn.), who has four goals and seven assists to lead the team in scoring.

Hendrickson Hurt: All-WCHA candidate Darby Hendrickson (Richfield, Minn.) suffered a severe shoulder separation in Friday night's game and did not play on Saturday. Initial reports indicate that Hendrickson will miss at least six weeks. More detailed information will be available later in the week after he is examined again. Hendrickson was the WCHA Freshman of the Year last season and was the quarterback of the team's top power play unit. His services will be sorely missed.

Bonin Emerges: Heralded freshman center Brian Bonin (White Bear Lake, Minn.) is starting to come on. With the injury to Hendrickson he was moved up to the top power play unit. Extremely poised for a freshman, Bonin scored a goal and two assists on Saturday to put him fourth on the scoring chart. Last year's Mr. Hockey for Minnesota, Bonin's ability to contribute right away is very important.

Young Defense: The young Minnesota defense continues to improve with each game and players like Danny Trebil (Bloomington, Minn.), Mike McAlpine (So. St. Paul, Minn.), Greg Zwakman (Edina, Minn.) and Charlie Wasley (Edina, Minn.) are a big reason why.

Next Up: The Golden Gophers will host the Wisconsin Badgers this weekend in the second annual Border Battle. Wisconsin is in second place in the WCHA with a 4-2 record after splitting a two game set at Michigan Tech, this past weekend. Last year the Gophers won both games at home -- 5-4 at Mariucci Arena and 4-1 at the Met Center.

About The Badgers: Wisconsin returned 20 lettermen from a team that lost the NCAA Championship game to Lake Superior State last season. A consensus pick in the top ten and the top two in the WCHA, they are demonstrating that they will be a force to contend with. The only major loss they suffered to graduation was to WCHA MVP Duane Derksen, who had been the goaltender for the past four seasons. Senior Jon Michelizzi and freshman Jim Carey have played well with a team 3.31 GAA. Offensively the Badgers are led by senior defenseman Barry Richter, who has four goals and nine assists. Kelly Fairchild is the leading goal scorer with six goals to go with five assists.

Broadcast Coverage: Friday's Minnesota/Wisconsin game will be broadcast on MSC with Doug Mcleod and Dick Bremer bringing you all of the action. On Saturday, KMSP/Channel 9 will broadcast the game with the same talent crew. On the radio airwaves, KFAN-AM 1130 will be providing live coverage on Friday night and delayed on Saturday following the Timberwolves game with Greg Harrington calling the action. The Golden Gophers can be heard live on KJJO-AM 950 on Saturday night.

MINNESOTA TO HOST IOWA HAWKEYES ON SATURDAY

Minnesota's Golden Gophers will be playing for two things Saturday when they host Iowa in the 1992 season finale at 6:05 p.m. in the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome.

First, Coach Jim Wacker's charges will be playing for Floyd of Rosedale, the bronze hog trophy that goes to the winner of the Iowa-Minnesota clash each fall.

Second they will be playing for pride, nearly the only thing the Golden Gophers can salvage from the '92 campaign after suffering a 34-6 loss at Wisconsin last weekend.

"It was ugly," Coach Wacker admitted. "We did not play worth a darn. We had too many breakdowns, and we didn't execute---either on offense or defense. It was the most disappointing loss of the season."

The most significant observations from the setback at Wisconsin, which dropped Minnesota to 1-9 on the season and 1-6 in the Big Ten, were that Marquel Fleetwood (QB, Sr., Decatur, Ga.) was sacked six times and the Golden Gopher offense failed to score a touchdown for the ninth consecutive quarter.

Minnesota's last TD was by Antonio Carter (RB, Jr., Columbus, Ohio) in the third quarter of the Indiana game. The Golden Gophers were blanked in the fourth period of that outing, they did not score two weeks ago against Ohio State, and they garnered only a pair of field goals by Aaron Piepkorn (K, Sr., Austin, Texas) against the Badgers.

"We were horrendous on offense and we were horrendous on defense. We got beat in the trenches on both sides of the ball, and we certainly didn't protect our quarterback," Wacker said.

Wacker tried to salvage some bright spots from the devastating loss at Wisconsin, but he didn't get far beyond Piepkorn's two 47-yard field goals and the play of Roderick Narcisse (CB, Fr., Sugarland, Texas), who got the first start of his collegiate career. Wacker also pointed out that Minnesota played a lot of people, a lot of YOUNG people at Wisconsin.

Things could be just as tough for the Golden Gophers in the finale on Saturday when they take on the 5-6 and 4-3 Hawkeyes.

"We've got one more chance, and that's Saturday against Iowa," Wacker said. "This team has been through some tough losses, and that includes the game at Wisconsin. We've just got to hope we can learn from it."

Against the Badgers, as has been the case all season long, Minnesota had its chances but couldn't get the job done. "We had receivers open and couldn't get the ball to them," Wacker pointed out, "and we did a poor job picking up the Wisconsin blitzes. We just made too many errors."

The question, then, is: Can Minnesota eliminate those mistakes and muster enough strength to upset Iowa in the finale to reclaim Floyd of Rosedale?

"We'll find out what we are made of," Coach Wacker concluded.

THE GAME: Minnesota vs Iowa
at the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome

THE SERIES: Minnesota's Golden Gophers and the Iowa Hawkeyes have met 85 times in a series that dates back to 1891, and the Golden Gophers will take an edge of 54-29-2 into Saturday night's shootout. Minnesota leads 32-11-1 in games played in Minneapolis and 22-18-1 in games played in Iowa City. A year ago at Iowa, the Hawks won 23-8. Coach Hayden Fry's club leads 3-2 in games played in the Metrodome.

THE OPPONENT: Iowa, located in Iowa City, has an enrollment of 28,000. Last season the Hawkeyes were 10-1-1 overall and 7-1 in the Big Ten. They tied Brigham Young 13-13 in the Holiday Bowl.

THE RECORDS: Minnesota is 1-9 overall and 1-6 in the Big Ten after falling 34-6 at Wisconsin last Saturday. Iowa is 5-6 overall and 4-3 in the conference following its 56-14 win over Northwestern last weekend. Iowa's other wins this season were over Iowa State, Wisconsin, Illinois and Indiana. Its losses were to North Carolina State, Miami (Fla.), Colorado, Michigan, Purdue, and Ohio State.

THE GAMES LAST WEEK: Minnesota was out of it from the start at Wisconsin last Saturday. The Badgers scored the first time they had the ball, and despite trailing only 7-6 at the end of the first quarter, the Golden Gophers never seemed to be in contention. Iowa, on the other hand, got a four-touchdown effort out of quarterback Paul Burmeister who hit 17-of-28 passes for 283 yards without an interception. After finding itself in a 7-7 deadlock at the end of the opening quarter, Coach Fry's contingent exploded for 21 points in the second stanza and won going away. "We finally exploded," Fry said. "It was a very satisfying game."

THE COACHES: Minnesota's Jim Wacker is in his first year as head coach of the Golden Gophers, and he's 1-9 in Gold Country. His 21-year college head coaching record 10 games into the 1992 season is 145-100-3. Fry, now in his 13th year at Iowa and 30th season overall as a head coach, has 194 wins against 146 losses and nine ties in his career. He's 105-57-5 with the Hawks.

THE INJURY REPORT: Interim Head Football Trainer Doug Locy has more concerns this week. Marquel Fleetwood remains "gimpy" with his bad ankle and bruised ribs, but of even greater concern is the status of Antonio Carter, who suffered a sprained left knee at Wisconsin. He's

regarded as doubtful for the Hawkeyes and has been removed from the two-deep. Also lost is defensive lineman Shawn Ehrich who also injured his left knee and definitely will not play in the finale. Tight end Steve Cambrice, who has suffered two sprained ankles in the last two weeks and did not make the trip to Wisconsin, could be back this Saturday for the finale.

SENIORS END CAREERS: A dozen Golden Golden Gophers---14 if Ted Harrison and Derek Fisher (already on the shelf with injuries) are included--will end their collegiate careers at the Metrodome Saturday night. They are Keith Ballard, Andre Davis, Marquel Fleetwood, Dean Kaufman, Arthur Layton, John Lewis, Marty Mathis, Ken McClintock, Prince Pearson, Aaron Piepkorn, Ken Sebree and Nick Peterson.

GOLDEN GOPHERS TO WATCH: Rated as possible U of M choices for post-season honors and already nominated for the All-Big Ten team in 1992 are Marquel Fleetwood (QB, Sr., Decatur, Ga.); Omar Douglas (SB, Jr., New Orleans, La.); John Lewis (FL, Sr., Miami, Fla.); Keith Ballard (OT, Sr., Detroit, Mich.); Dennis Cappella (DE, Jr., Miller Place, NY); Russ Heath (LB, Jr., Aurora, Colo.); Rob Rogers (OG, Jr., St. Louis, MO); and Dean Kaufman (P, Sr., Sauk Centre, Minn.).

WACKERS FINAL WORD: "We neither blocked nor tackled at Wisconsin, and that was really disappointing. We couldn't stop Wisconsin's running game, and we couldn't get ours started. But now we've got to think about Iowa. They will be tough. They have won two in a row, and they are coming off a very big and impressive win over Northwestern. They have things together, and they really are playing well right now. They've started Paul Burmeister at quarterback the last two weeks, and he has been super. He threw extremely well (four touchdown passes) against Northwestern. It will be a real challenge for us, but we've just got to put everything on the line."

IN THE BIG TEN: Minnesota finished 1-7 in the Big Ten a year ago and 5-3 in conference play the year before. The Golden Gophers last won the conference title at 6-1 in 1967 under Murray Warmath, and their best Big Ten mark since then was 6-2 under Cal Stoll in 1973 (third place). They now are 1-6 in the conference and have lost six straight just as Minnesota did a year ago. The Golden Gophers have not lost seven in a row since 1983 when they went 0-9 in conference play during Joe Salem's last season as coach.

FOOTBALL LUNCHEON SCHEDULED: The final weekly football luncheon of the 1992 season, featuring Minnesota's Coach Jim Wacker, is scheduled for Friday, Nov. 20, before the final home football game of the season (against Iowa) at the Minneapolis Athletic Club. A social hour kicks things off at 11:30 a.m. The luncheon will begin at noon and the program at 12:30 p.m. The luncheon also will feature a celebrity emcee and additional special guests. The Golden Gopher swimming & diving team opened the 1992-93 campaign in Iowa City last Saturday with a loss to the Hawkeyes 136-107. The Golden Gophers were led by junior **Matt Brown (Beaverton, Ore.)** who paced Minnesota with two individual victories (200 IM - 1:52.70 and the 200 breaststroke - 2:06.42). Iowa had three triple event winners on the day (Dan Stoppenhagen, Mike Johnson and Rafal Szukala) as they moved to 2-0 on the season.

Other winners for the Golden Gophers were sophomore **Can Ergenekan (Beaverton, Ore)** in the 1000 freestyle (9:37.50), and freshman **P.J. Bogart (Mesa, Ariz.)** earning his first collegiate victory in the three-meter diving event (210.70).

GOPHERS TRAVEL TO DENVER TO PLAY WCHA-LEADING PIONEERS

The University of Minnesota Golden Gophers will attempt to bounce back from a tough series with Wisconsin this past weekend and end their five-game winless streak when they travel to Denver to take on the Pioneers in a pair of games slated for 7:00 p.m. (MST) starts. The Golden Gophers (2-3-3), haven't won a game since their 4-3 victory over Colorado College on October 30. Since that game the Gophers have played five games coming away with three overtime ties, one overtime loss and the 3-2 loss on Saturday night. Although this is not a typical start for the Maroon and Gold, the games have all been very hard fought and the team has had their chances to win, but has not been able to put the puck in the net. This week the Golden Gophers will face the surprise team of the year in Denver, who finished in last place a year ago but have turned it around and have jumped out to a 7-1 record and a three point lead in the standings.

Gopher Notes: The Wisconsin series was as usual a very good series. Both teams played very good hockey, with Wisconsin getting some breaks on the power play in Saturday's game that gave them the edge on the scoreboard. The 2-3-3 start is the slowest start by a Golden Gopher team since the 1973-74 team started 3-4-1. That team rebounded and went on to finish second in the WCHA and win the school's first NCAA Championship in hockey. The 1989-90 Gopher team started 3-3-2, but rebounded to finish second in the WCHA with a 17-9-2 record and reached the quarterfinals of the NCAA playoffs.

Key Series: The Minnesota/Denver series is a big one for both teams. The Pioneers are looking to open up some room between them and the rest of the league, while the Golden Gophers aim to put an end to their woes and get back into the hunt. Ironically, when the Pioneers were having trouble beating anyone in the league last year, they did defeat the Gophers twice, including a 4-2 victory in the first game of the series at Denver in the fall of 1991. Following the Denver series, the Golden Gophers return home to play the Michigan Tech Huskies in another key matchup. Michigan Tech is currently 5-3 and in third place in the WCHA.

Johnson Line Stymied: Junior Craig Johnson (St. Paul, MN) and his linemates junior Jeff Nielsen (Grand Rapids, Minn.) and senior John Brill (Grand Rapids, Minn.) were stymied over the weekend. Wisconsin held Johnson and Brill without a point for the weekend, while Nielsen was limited to a power play goal. These three veteran players need to get things going offensively, especially in even strength situations for the team to have success.

Bonin Line Emerges: Heralded freshman center Brian Bonin (White Bear Lake, Minn.) continues to improve. With the injury to Darby Hendrickson (Richfield, Minn.) he has moved up to the top power play unit. Extremely poised for a freshman, Bonin is third in scoring for the Gophers with three goals and seven assists. Last year's Mr. Hockey for Minnesota, he is centering a line with Joe Dzedzic (Minneapolis, Minn.) and Justin McHugh (Minnetonka, Minn.) on the wings. That line has been the top unit for the Maroon and Gold all year. McHugh is tied for the team lead with five goals to go with two assists, while Dzedzic has three goals and five assists, and is developing into a dominating presence on the ice. Last weekend, this line had three goals and three assists to lead the team.

Young Defense: The young Minnesota defense continues to improve with each game and players like Danny Trebil (Bloomington, Minn.), Mike McAlpine (So. St. Paul, Minn.), Greg Zwakman (Edina, Minn.) and Charlie Wasley (Edina, Minn.) are a big reason why. Each game this group looks better and they will provide the backbone of the Minnesota defense for years to come.

About the Pioneers: Denver is coached by second-year coach Frank Serratore, who has turned around the Denver program. An energetic coach who gets the most out of his players, he has the Pioneers on top of the WCHA playing with poise and confidence. Denver is 5-0 at home this year. Last weekend they dominated North Dakota, winning both games 6-3, 7-3. The Pioneers are led by Angelo Ricci who has nine goals and 13 assists for a WCHA-leading 22 points. His left wing, Jason Elders, is second on the team in scoring with a WCHA-leading 10 goals and seven assists for 17 assists. The Pioneers have scored 47 goals as a team and held their opponents to 28. Ironically, their power play has only produced five of those goals and is at .120 percent for the year.

Broadcast Coverage: The Friday night game is televised on Prime Sports Network. On the radio airwaves, KFAN-AM 1130 will be providing delayed coverage on both Friday and Saturday following the Timberwolves' games with Greg Harrington calling the action. The Golden Gophers can be heard live on KJJO-AM 950 on both nights.

GOPHER BASEBALL TEAM SIGNS FOUR TOP MINNESOTA PLAYERS

The University of Minnesota baseball team announced today that they have signed four top Minnesota recruits to national letters of intent. Outfielder Wes Denning of St. Paul, pitcher Tony Felling of Roseville, and infielders Bryan Guse of New Brighton and Steve Huls of Cold Spring have all signed on with the defending Big Ten champions.

"All four of these individuals are outstanding student-athletes and they have great potential to help us continue our 40 year tradition of winning at Minnesota," said Head Coach John Anderson. "I'm excited that they have decided to stay at home and join the Golden Gopher family."

Denning is the son of Cretin-Derham Hall coach Dennis Denning. The 5-10, 172-pound center fielder competed at Arizona Western Junior College last year. He batted .319 with 68 hits, 25 stolen bases and 32 RBIs. He is expected to fill the shoes of center fielder Ryan Lefebvre after he graduates this spring.

"Wes has been recruited to fill the center field spot next season," said Anderson. "He is a great defensive player and a prototype lead-off man with his speed. We feel that his junior college experience will allow him to step into our lineup and contribute immediately."

Felling is a 6-3, 180-pound pitcher who has tremendous control of his pitches. Last year he pitched 78 innings for Rosetown Legion team with 83 strikeouts, 21 walks and a 1.62 ERA.

"Tony is a pitcher with outstanding control," said Anderson. "As he matures physically, he will develop into a solid Division I player."

The 5-10, 175-pound Guse is a three-sport standout at Irondale High School. He is an outstanding high school shortstop who will probably play at third base for the Golden Gophers. Last year he batted .393 with six home runs and 16 stolen bases.


"Bryan is a left-handed hitting infielder with power who is an outstanding three-sport athlete," said Anderson. "He has very polished baseball skills and can play any of the infield positions."

Huls is a 6-1, 165-pound shortstop who comes from a great baseball background at Cold Spring-Rocori High School. Last year he batted .506 with 11 doubles, 28 RBIs and 14 stolen bases.

"Steve is an outstanding high school shortstop, which is a position he will play for the Golden Gophers," said Anderson. "He has great range, a strong throwing arm and is a good hitter."

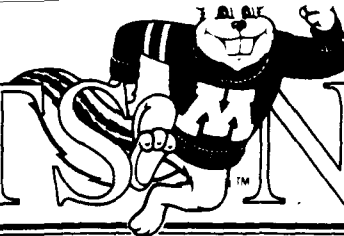

GIBSON TO BE HONORED SATURDAY

George R. Gibson, a former Golden Gopher football All-American and teammate of Bronko Nagurski, will be honored in a special pre-game ceremony at the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome Saturday night prior to the University of Minnesota 1992 football season finale against Iowa.

Gibson, who now resides in Midland, Texas, will participate in the formal announcement of the naming of the George R. Gibson-Bronko Nagurski Football Practice Facility. This action follows formal approval from the University of Minnesota Board of Regents and a recommendation for such action from President Nils Hasselmo and the All-University Honors Committee.

The University of Minnesota will receive a contribution of \$500,000 from Gibson toward retirement of the building's debt. Following the U of M's Board of Regent's action, another \$200,000 also has been pledged from other sources in honor of the building's new name.

Special Note to Editors & Directors:

Mr. Gibson will be available for pictures/filming on the Metrodome playing field prior to Saturday night's game.

Biographical sketches of both Gibson & Nagurski are attached. Photographs also are available upon request.

Bronko Nagurski

Born on November 3, 1908 in Rainy River, Ontario, Bronko Nagurski and his family moved to International Falls, Minnesota shortly after his birth. Raised in International Falls, Bronko was recruited to the University of Minnesota in 1925 by Dr. Clarence Spears who was then head football coach.

Described by many as the greatest football player of all time, "the Bronk" is the only college football player ever to be named All-America at two positions in the same year (1929). After a highly successful Gopher career, Bronko went on to play for the Chicago Bears.

Under coach George Halas, Bronko led the team to the first NFL championship in 1933. He played with the Bears until 1937, when he retired after a salary dispute. He then went on to wrestle professionally during the 1930s, '40s and '50s with the exception of 1943. In 1943, his old coach, George Halas, hailed Nagurski from the north to play for a season while our American troops were at war. At age 35, Nagurski again led his team to a national championship.

Nagurski was inducted into the NFL Hall of Fame in its charter class as well as being a member of the National Football Foundation College Hall of Fame. In 1979 the University of Minnesota officially retired Nagurski's number, 72. Noted for his brute strength and speed, legends about Nagurski abound throughout football circles. Even today, Nagurski is a household name.

Nagurski retired to Rainy Lake, just outside International Falls. He spent his last years fishing and enjoying the peace of the country until his death in 1990.

George R. Gibson

George Gibson attended the University of Minnesota. He received his BA in geology in 1930 and was the first student athlete in many years to receive his Ph.D. (also in geology) from the university in 1934. Gibson was both a student athlete and faculty member at the university until he went on to Carleton College.

At Carleton College, Gibson served as both a faculty member and head football coach. He also taught at The Ohio State University in the early 1940's. Gibson went on to work for several different oil companies as a geologist until 1952 when he settled in Texas and started his own business as an geologist consulting to oil companies.

Gibson was as successful on the playing field as in the oil field. Born in New York and raised in Oklahoma, Gibson came to the University of Minnesota in 1925. He played football from 1926-1928 and was an All-American for the Golden Gophers in 1928. He captained the team that same year. Gibson also wrestled for the Golden Gophers in 1927 and 1928.

A highly successful businessman, Gibson has supported the Department of Men's Intercollegiate Athletics for many years through his contributions to the Williams Scholarship Fund. During the Minnesota Campaign, Gibson and his wife, Orpha, endowed a chair in hydro-geology at the Institute of Technology with a \$1 million gift.

Gibson continues his support of the University of Minnesota today with his latest gift of \$500,000 to name the football practice facility in honor of himself and his revered teammate, Bronko Nagurski.

Truly, George Gibson is one of the most outstanding alumni the University of Minnesota will ever be able to claim.

Buhler was an outstanding Windom High School athlete in the 1930's. He went on to attend the University of Minnesota and played for the Gophers when they ruled the gridiron. He was called the Windom Warhorse and brought fame to his hometown and the state at that time. In 1936, Buhler took part in a 47-19 victory over Texas and ran 153 yards in 14 carries. GOLDEN GOPHERS END SEASON ON WINNING NOTE

Floyd of Rosedale came home Saturday night after the University of Minnesota surprised Iowa 28-13 in the 1992 season finale at the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome.

The win snapped a six-game losing streak for the Golden Gophers and salvaged a 2-9 season for first-year coach Jim Wacker.

"There are big wins in football," Coach Wacker analyzed, "but none are bigger than this one. It has to be one of the biggest and sweetest wins I've ever tasted."

The game was tied 10-10 at the half, and with Marquel Fleetwood (QB, Sr., Decatur, Ga.) on the sidelines after re-injuring his left ankle, not many of the more than 57,000 Metrodome fans were predicting a Minnesota victory.

But, although the Hawkeyes went up 13-10 with a field goal in the third period, it was all Golden Gophers after that as Minnesota scored three touchdowns in the final stanza to win going away.

"I couldn't be prouder of this team," Wacker proclaimed. "They never stopped fighting. They never stopped believing. All season long they had something bad happen. Something always went wrong. But against Iowa, something finally good happened, and I'm really happy for them. I'm especially happy for the seniors."

There were a lot of accolades---and game balls---passed out after the win, Minnesota's third over the Hawks in four years. Rob St. Sauver (QB, So., St. Paul, Minn.) who came off the bench in relief of Fleetwood to complete 21-of-32 passing attempts for 261 yards and two touchdowns without an interception, drew his share of praise.

So did Aaron Osterman (WR, So., Elk River, Minn.) who registered eight receptions for 158 yards (a long of 59) and one TD.

And Omar Douglas (WR, Jr., New Orleans, LA) who had seven catches for 59 yards and in the process upped his 1992 total to 61 which established a new U of M single season record (the old mark was 58 set by Chester Cooper in 1981).

But not all of that tipping-of-the hats was done towards the offensive side of the ball. "Our defense made big play after big play," Wacker pointed out, and he was referring to the blocked punt by Trevor Walker (DE, Jr., Lancaster, Ohio) and the recovery by Dennis Cappella (DE, Jr., Miller Place, N.Y.). And the interception by Jeff Rosga (FS, Jr., Roseville, Minn.) And the team-high 11 tackles garnered by Andre Davis (LB, Sr., Jacksonville, Fla.).

And there were other big plays, like the fake field goal that saw holder Dean Kaufman (P, Sr., Sauk Centre, Minn.), shovel a pass to Ken McClintock (RB, Sr., Changrin Falls, Ohio), for five yards and a first down on Minnesota's first touchdown drive of the final stanza.

"It was just a great effort and a super win," Wacker concluded. "It helps take away the bad taste from all those close, but bitter losses we've suffered through this season. It will make the winter a lot shorter and a lot warmer. It shows us again the true meaning of 'the thrill of victory and the agony of defeat.'"

Fourteen seniors said farewell to their Maroon and Gold in the Saturday night finale. Two, Ted Harrison (OG, Sr., Crystal, Minn.), and Derek Fisher (CB, Sr., Miami, Fla.) were already on the shelf with injuries, but the remaining dozen drew the crowd's applause.

Included were Keith Ballard (OT, Detroit), Davis, Fleetwood, Kaufman, Arthur Layton (DE, Chester, Pa.), John Lewis (WR, Miami, Fla.), Marty Mathis (RB, Cincinnati, Ohio), McClintock, Prince Pearson (OG, Ft. Lauderdale, Fla.), Nick Peterson (DT, Coon Rapids, Minn.) Aaron Piepkorn (K, Austin, Texas), and Ken Sebree (SS, Detroit).

"We'll miss every one of them," Wacker admitted, "and going out winners is great. Now we look at the win as the beginning, something to build on, and we look to the people we have coming back. We'll have a fine nucleus returning, and we'll have the makings of a good football team. I promise you that."

Those words were spoken with convincing dedication.

Junior point guard Townsend Orr (Dolton, Ill.) dished out a game-high seven assists in the victory. Led by Walton's eight rebounds, the Golden Gophers outrebounded AIA by a decisive 47-31 margin. The Northern Open is the final action for the Golden Gophers until they open the official dual-meet portion of their schedule, Dec. 13, at the California Duals at Fresno, Calif.

Earlier this month, Gopher wrestlers competed unattached at the Bison Open at Fargo, N.D., the Ryan Kaufman Open Wrestling Tournament at Omaha, Neb., and the St. Louis Open Tournament at St. Louis, Mo.

Taylor wins at Kaufman Open: Zach Taylor (Fr., Sandpoint, Idaho), wrestling unattached, won the 167-pound championship in the Under-20 division of the Ryan Kaufman Open, last Saturday, at Omaha, Neb.

Also wrestling unattached and placing at Omaha were Brandon Paulson (Fr., Coon Rapids, Minn.), who placed

fourth in the 118-pound division and D.J. Choate (Fr., Midway City, Okla.), who placed fifth at 142.

Nationally-Ranked: The Golden Gophers were ranked 15th in *Amateur Wrestling News'* Division I Top 40, which was released last week.

Four Golden Gopher wrestlers were ranked in the top 10 in their individual weight classes in *Amateur Wrestling News'* preseason individual rankings.

Returning All-American Michael Marzetta (Sr., Liberty Lake, Wash.) was ranked 4th at 158 pounds. Willy Short (Jr., Inver Grove Heights, Minn.), who red-shirted last season, is ranked 6th at 150; Tim Harris (So., St. Louis, Mo.) is 10th at 126; and Damon Johnson (Jr., Mustang, Okla.) is 12th at 142.

Goeden Signs Letter of Intent: Jeremy Goeden, a senior at Grand Rapids, (Minn.) High School, has signed a letter of intent to wrestle at Minnesota. Goeden, a standout student with a 3.8 GPA, placed fifth at 189 pounds at the Minnesota State Class AA meet last season as a junior.

GOLDEN GOPHERS HOST MICHIGAN TECH

The University of Minnesota hockey team returns home after a successful trip to Denver where the Golden Gophers took three of four points from the league-leading Pioneers and put themselves into a three-way tie for third place in the WCHA. This weekend the Golden Gophers (3-3-4), host the Michigan Tech Huskies (5-5-0), who are tied with the Gophers and UMD for third place. The two games are scheduled for 7:05 p.m. starts at Mariucci Arena on Friday and Saturday. Michigan Tech is trying to rebound from the two losses they suffered at UMD this past weekend. While the Golden Gophers are trying to go back over the .500 mark for the second time this season.

Mac Attack: Junior defenseman Chris McAlpine (Roseville, Minn.) had already established himself as one of the top defenseman in the WCHA because of his strong defensive play, but he has added a new facet to his game. He is developing into a goal scorer. In the last three games he has scored five goals and is tied with Craig Johnson (St. Paul, Minn.) for the team lead in goals with seven. McAlpine had three goals and an assist at Denver and is a strong candidate for WCHA Player of the Week honors.

Richards Finds the Mark: All-American candidate Travis Richards (Plymouth, Minn.) broke out of a scoring slump when he netted a pair of goals against the Pioneers this past weekend. He added a pair of assists to raise his totals for the year to two goals and a team-high nine assists, which puts him fourth on the team in scoring. The smooth skating blueliner had an outstanding weekend on offense and defense as the Golden Gophers shut down the high-scoring Pioneers.

Gopher Notes: The Denver series was a very good series. Both teams played very fast, wide-open hockey. On Friday, the Golden Gophers offense cranked it up and poured in five goals in the first period and added a pair in the second to cruise to a 7-4 victory. In the second game, both teams battled hard, with the Golden Gophers dominating the second period. The third period was very exciting with both teams having great scoring chances in the last minutes of the game and in the overtime period.

Goal or Not: The second game of the Minnesota/Denver series was marred by a very controversial call by the officials. It started when Denver took a shot at the Minnesota goal and the goal judge flashed the goal light on very quickly and then off. The puck appeared to bounce off the pipe to the left of the goal. Minnesota went the length of the ice and Brian Bonin (White Bear Lake, Minn.) scored on his own rebound. At the whistle, the officials huddled and then met with the goal judge. They then took away the Minnesota goal and added the goal for Denver, even though the video replay showed that the puck did not cross the goal line.

Young Defense Stymies Pioneer Offense: The young Minnesota defense continues to improve with each game. They may have had their best outing of the year on Saturday, when they held the Pioneers to two goals on the scoreboard and shut down Angelo Ricci and Jason Elders, while playing without Chris McAlpine who was injured in the first period. Players like Danny Trebil (Bloomington, Minn.), Mike McAlpine (So. St. Paul, Minn.), Greg Zwakman (Edina, Minn.) and Charlie Wasley (Edina, Minn.) are really coming into their own. With each game this group looks better and they will provide the backbone of the Minnesota defense for years to come.

Next Up: The Golden Gophers and Huskies of Michigan Tech will face off this weekend with a share of third place in the WCHA on the line. The Huskies are coached by first-year coach Bob Mancini, who was hired from Ferris State in September to replace Newell Brown who left to coach in the professional ranks. Last year the Huskies lost all four games to the Golden Gophers and the Maroon and Gold holds a 128-66-8 edge in the all-time series. These two teams have battled it out for numerous WCHA and national titles during the history of this series. The improvement that the Huskies have shown means it should be a very competitive series.

Broadcast Coverage: Both games of the Michigan Tech series are slated for broadcast on Midwest Sports Channel with Doug McLeod and Dick Bremer calling the action. On the radio dial the Golden Gophers can be heard on a delayed basis following the Timberwolves games on KFAN-AM 1130 with Greg Harrington and Pat Micheletti calling the action. The games can be heard live on KJJO-AM 950 with Harrington and Micheletti.

Hockey Milk Break Clinic Set: The Gopher hockey milk break clinic is set for Tuesday, November 24, at Mariucci Arena at 3:15 p.m. Head Coach Doug Woog and his staff will join local youth hockey players in a skills clinic sponsored by the American Dairy Assoc., KITN-FOX 29 and the U of M.

UMD Series Time Change: The Minnesota/Minnesota-Duluth series at Mariucci Arena will be played Friday, January 8, at 7:05 p.m. and Saturday, January 9, at 2:00 p.m. The Golden Gopher Blueline luncheon is set for Friday, January 9, at JAX Cafe at noon.

Gopher Special Teams: The Minnesota power play is leading the league with a .303 percent success ratio. Last weekend the Golden Gophers were four for 16 on the power play. The penalty killing unit is killing off penalties at a .820 percent rate which is improving each week after a slow start.

freestyle relay captured first place with a winning time of 3:06.33, the team was made up of Boelk, senior Steve Busse (Cincinnati, Ohio), sophomore Travis Fischer (Souix Falls, S.D.) and freshman Derek Williams (Lansdale, Pa.).


"It was a great meet for us and it's nice to be back on the winning track," said Head Coach Dennis Dale, "we won 13 out of 13 events."

Minnesota is home next Saturday and Sunday, as they host the annual Minnesota Invitational in the University Aquatic Center. The meet is coed and will feature teams from the University of Manitoba, University of Nebraska, University of North Dakota, St. Olaf College, and Gustavus Adolphus College. Meet time is scheduled for 11 a.m. for the first session on Saturday with the second session beginning at 7 p.m. On Sunday, competition is slated to start at 11 a.m.

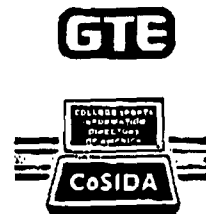

**GOLDEN GOPHERS HOST SIU-EDWARDSVILLE
IN SEASON OPENER WEDNESDAY**

Head Coach Clem Haskins' Golden Gopher basketball team will host Southern Illinois-Edwardsville (1-1) in the 1992-93 season opener at 7:00 p.m. Wednesday at Williams Arena.

Broadcast Coverage: The SIU-Edwardsville game will be broadcast on the Midwest Sports Channel (MSC) with Ted Robinson on the play-by-play and Jim Dutcher as the analyst. WCCO-AM 830 is the exclusive radio voice of Golden Gopher basketball with Ray Christensen calling all the action.

Coach Haskins: Clem Haskins is entering his seventh season at the helm of the University of Minnesota basketball program. Known as "Clem the Gem," he was a consensus All-American choice after charting a standout collegiate career at Western Kentucky. The third overall player selected in the 1967 NBA draft, he went on to play nine outstanding seasons with the Chicago Bulls (1967-70), Phoenix Suns (1970-74) and Washington Bullets (1974-76). He was named to the head job at Minnesota on April 2, 1986, after six outstanding seasons as head coach at his alma mater, where he led the Hilltoppers to two NCAA Tournaments and one NIT appearance. After rebuilding the program in his first two seasons, he has now directed the Golden Gophers to post-season tournament action in three of the past four seasons. He has recorded a record of 89-90 at Minnesota, and an overall mark of 190-163 in 12 seasons.

Southern Illinois-Edwardsville: Head Coach Jack Margenthaler's Southern Illinois-Edwardsville Cougars (Edwardsville, Ill.; NCAA Division II) dropped a 100-89 decision at Lincoln University in Jefferson City, Mo., Saturday, to fall to 1-1 on the season heading into Wednesday's clash with the Golden Gophers. Juniors Matt Fridley (6-0, 175) and Ty Margenthaler (6-5, 205), the coach's son, paced the Cougars in the defeat with 20 and 19 points, respectively. Behind 22 points from senior Antwan Stallworth (6-5, 245), the Cougars opened the season with a 78-71 win at Missouri-St. Louis on Nov. 24. Margenthaler is in his first season at SIUE after a 15-year stint at Western Illinois where he recorded a 221-202 overall mark.

On The Road Again: Wednesday's game at Williams Arena will be the third consecutive road contest for Southern Illinois-Edwardsville. In fact, the Cougars open the season with six straight road games, before finally playing a home game on Dec. 12 against Southern Indiana.

Series Record: Minnesota and Southern Illinois-Edwardsville will meet for the first time on the basketball court when they face each other Wednesday.

Season Openers: The University of Minnesota has registered an overall record of 71-26 (.732) in season openers through 97 seasons of intercollegiate basketball competition. Head Coach Clem Haskins is 2-4 in season openers at Minnesota. He is 4-2, however, in home season openers, which includes a streak of three straight home opener wins going into Wednesday's game.

Williams Arena: The Golden Gophers have become very tough to beat at home in front of their loyal home fans. They have registered an impressive 47-15 record (.758) over the past four seasons within the hallowed halls of Williams Arena.

Two-For-Two: Voshon Lenard scored 24 points to pace the Golden Gophers to a 93-88 victory over the Central Sports Klub of Army (Moscow, Russia) before 10,153 at Williams Arena last Wednesday. Randy Carter added 15 points and a game-high 12 rebounds as the team finished the exhibition season with a perfect 2-0 record. Junior Townsend Orr (Dolton, Ill.) and sophomore David Washington (Albion, Mich.) tallied 11 points apiece in the victory. Trailing 88-86, Orr drained a three-pointer from the corner with one minute remaining to give the Golden Gophers a lead that they would never relinquish. Behind 18 points from Carter and 16 from Jayson Walton, the Golden Gophers defeated Athleten in Action, 77-57, in the team's first exhibition game at Williams Arena on Nov. 21.

GOLDEN GOPHERS WIN MINNESOTA INVITATIONAL

The Golden Gopher swimming & diving team captured the Minnesota Invitational title over the weekend, as they outdistanced second-place Nebraska by 352 points. Following the contest against the Wildcats, the Golden Gophers will also host Tennessee-Martin at 7:00 p.m. Monday, and then travel to Santa Clara to meet the Broncos at 9:30 p.m. (Central) Wednesday.

Broadcast Coverage: All three games this week will be broadcast on the Midwest Sports Channel (MSC). Ted Robinson will handle the play-by-play for the Bethune-Cookman and Tennessee-Martin games, and Dick Bremer will take over for the Santa Clara game. Jim Dutcher will be the analyst for all three games. WCCO-AM 830 is the exclusive radio voice of Golden Gopher basketball with Ray Christensen calling all the action.

Coach Haskins: Clem Haskins is in his seventh season at the helm of the University of Minnesota basketball program. Known as "Clem the Gem," he was a consensus All-American choice after charting a standout collegiate career at Western Kentucky. The third overall player selected in the 1967 NBA draft, he went on to play nine outstanding seasons with the Chicago Bulls (1967-70), Phoenix Suns (1970-74) and Washington Bullets (1974-76). He was named to the head job at Minnesota on April 2, 1986, after six outstanding seasons as head coach at his alma mater, where he led the Hilltoppers to two NCAA Tournaments and one NIT appearance. After rebuilding the program in his first two seasons, he has now directed the Golden Gophers to post-season tournament action in three of the past four seasons. He has recorded a record of 92-90 at Minnesota, which includes a 73-53 mark the past four-plus seasons. In his 13th season overall, he has registered a 193-163 record.

Bethune-Cookman: Bethune-Cookman Head Coach Jack "Cy" McClairen was well aware heading into the 1992-93 season that filling the shoes of Reggie Cunningham would be a formidable task for his young squad. When Cunningham graduated, he took with him a 25.6 points per game average that was the best in the Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference and a total of 15 school records. Junior Jeff

Robinson (7.7 ppg/5.3 rpg) is the only returning player who has been with the program for at least two years. Latroy Strong, a 6-1 sophomore guard, leads the 1-5 Wildcats in scoring at 15.3 points an outing. Minnesota holds a 1-0 edge in the all-time series, a 94-50 win over the Wildcats on Dec. 28, 1987, at Williams Arena. In his 31st year at Bethune-Cookman, McClairen comes into Saturday's game with a 381-401 career record.

Tennessee-Martin: A new era began this season for Tennessee-Martin as the basketball program started its NCAA Division I affiliation and membership in the Ohio Valley Conference. Cal Luther, who led Murray State to three OVC titles and a pair of NCAA Tournament appearances from 1958-74, is in his second season at the helm of the Pacers. Tim Britt, a 6-8 senior forward/center, leads a very young team. He leads the team both in scoring (15.0) and rebounding (10.4) this season. The Pacers, who lost a hard-fought 69-60 road decision to powerful Arkansas and a heartbeaking 75-67, two-overtime setback to TCU, are 3-3 on the season heading into a Wednesday assignment at Arkansas State. After finishing 9-19 a year ago, Luther is 12-22 overall at UT-Martin, and 439-336 overall in his 32nd season.

Santa Clara: Santa Clara, which will play three games prior to playing host to the Golden Gophers on Dec. 23, is 2-2 on the season following an 85-76 victory over Southern Utah in the third-place game at the Cougar Classic on Dec. 12. Mark Schmitz, a 6-4 senior guard, and DeWayne Lewis, a 6-5 junior forward, lead the Broncos in scoring with identical 18.0 per game averages through four games. Dick Davey is in his first season as head coach after being an assistant coach to Carroll Williams since 1977. Minnesota won the only previous meeting between the two, a 73-63 decision at Williams Arena on Dec. 13, 1990.

Shooting Eye: The Golden Gophers, who have shot over 50 percent in each of their first three games, are connecting on a sizzling 56.2 percent from the floor so far this season. The team shot 50 percent or better from the floor in just seven of 32 games last season, and in just six of 28 games in 1990-91. In fact, the last time that the Golden Gophers shot 50 percent or better from the field in three straight games was in the 1990 NCAA Tournament (Northern Iowa, Syracuse, Georgia Tech). Earlier that same season, Coach Haskins' squad put together a string of seven straight 50 percent-plus games.

GOLDEN GOPHERS MEET ST. CLOUD STATE

The University of Minnesota hockey team returns to action this weekend after a two-week layoff for final exams. The Golden Gophers will face off with a two-game home-and-home series with the St. Cloud State Huskies. The Huskies are 8-5-1 in the WCHA and are tied for third place with Denver. One of the hottest teams in the conference, they are unbeaten in their last five games and have won six of their last eight games. The Golden Gophers will play the Huskies for the first time in the history of the series with the Huskies ahead of them in the WCHA standings.

Gophers Healing: Junior All-American candidate Craig Johnson (St. Paul, Minn.) is healing nicely from a minor shoulder separation he suffered in the Michigan Tech series. His status is listed as probable for this weekend. All-WCHA candidate Chris McAlpine (Roseville, Minn.) is also listed as probable for this weekend. He is coming off a hip flexor injury. Darby Hendrickson (Richfield, Minn.) has begun skating with the team, but will not be available for the St. Cloud State series. The two weeks off for finals could not have come at a better time for the Gophers and they should be operating at 100 percent following the holidays.

Richards Finds the Mark: All-American candidate Travis Richards (Plymouth, Minn.) is beginning to put up the offensive numbers that he is capable of. He is the third leading scorer in the WCHA amongst defensemen, despite being off for two weeks. The senior captain was the key player in the Golden Gophers' home sweep of Michigan Tech.

Gophers on Streak: The Golden Gophers have not lost in their last four games and have just one loss in their last eight games. With three losses for the season, they have the fewest number of losses in the WCHA, but lead the league in ties with four. The next four WCHA games for the Maroon and Gold are crucial. The two games with St. Cloud State this weekend are very important, followed by the opening series with UMD on January 8-9 at Mariucci Arena. Those four games will decide if the Gophers will have a chance to win the MacNaughton Cup.

Broadcast Coverage: The Friday night game at St. Cloud will be broadcast on Midwest Sports Channel and Saturday's game from Mariucci Arena will be broadcast on KMSP-Channel 9. Doug McLeod, Dick Bremer and Tom Reid will bring you all of the action on the telecasts. The radio coverage has both games delayed on KFAN-AM 1130 until after the completion of the Timberwolves games, although the games will be carried live on KJJO-AM 950. Greg Harrington and Lou Nanne will bring you all of the action on both of those stations.

UMD Series Time Change: The Minnesota/Minnesota-Duluth series at Mariucci Arena will be played Friday, January 8 at 7:05 p.m., and Saturday, January 9 at 2:00 p.m. The Golden Gopher Blue-line luncheon for the UMD series is set for Friday, January 9, at Noon at JAX Cafe.

GOPHERS AT MIDWEST CHAMPIONSHIPS MEET, DEC. 30

The Golden Gopher wrestling team will compete at the Midwest Championships at Des Moines, Iowa, on Dec. 30.

The non-scoring meet will be held at the Drake Fieldhouse and is the final individual meet for the Golden Gophers until the Big Ten Championships in March.

Two Golden Gopher wrestlers (Damon Johnson and Willy Short) won championships at last year's Midwest Championships, while Michael Marzetta and Chad Carlson finished second.

Golden Gophers Open With Four Dual Victories: The Golden Gophers, ranked 15th in the nation in *Amateur Wrestling News'* Dual Top 40, opened the dual portion of their 1992-93 schedule with four victories in one day.

The Golden Gophers, who were 8-14 in duals last season, won three matches at the Fresno State Quad on Dec. 13. The Golden Gophers defeated San Francisco State, 29-6; UC Davis, 38-6 and host Fresno State, ranked No. 17 in the nation, 21-14.

Following the Fresno dual, the Golden Gophers traveled to Bakersfield, Calif. (about 135 miles away), where they wrestled Cal State Bakersfield later that night. The Golden Gophers capped the day with a 24-10 victory over the Roadrunners.

Four Gophers Stand Out: Coming off a two-week break for finals, four Golden Gophers -- Michael Marzetta, Tim Harris, Brett Colombini and Billy Pierce -- each won all four of the matches on Dec. 13.

Brett Colombini (So., Redwood Valley, Calif.) improved his record to 10-4 with four victories at 177 for the Golden Gophers. Included in Colombini's wins were an impressive 2-0 win over Fresno State's Al Martell and a 6-5 win over Bakersfield's Dan Corpstein.

Mike Marzetta (Sr., Liberty Lake, Wash.) is ranked second in the nation at 158 pounds. Marzetta, who earned All-American honors by placing seventh at the NCAA Championships last year, is 15-2 so far this season.

Tim Harris (So., St. Louis, Mo.) improved to 18-4 with the four victories.

Billy Pierce (Fr., Minneapolis), who is ranked 11th in the nation after a red-shirt season last year, was especially impressive in California. Three of Pierce's four victories were by pins. Pierce is 17-2 with five pins on the season.

Home Opener: The Golden Gophers' first home dual will be Jan. 16, when they host Wisconsin at 7:30 p.m. at Williams Arena.

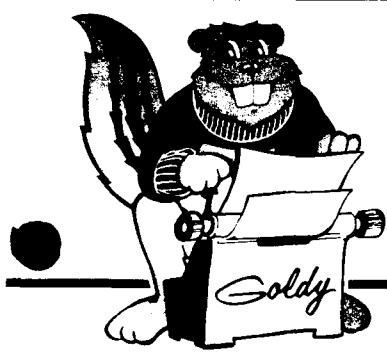
