RE: Oscar Mayer Baseball Classic and Big Ten Opener vs. Michigan

The University of Minnesota has two very special baseball events coming up in March. The Oscar Mayer Baseball Classic and, for the first time in school history, the baseball team will open its Big Ten slate at home versus the Michigan Wolverines at the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome. You have been very helpful in the coverage of our Metrodome events in the past, and I hope you will consider these special events in making your upcoming assignments.

The 1993 Oscar Mayer Baseball Classic is scheduled for March 5-7. This spring baseball tournament, which was started in 1985, has developed into one of the finest collegiate baseball tournaments in the country. In its short history, this spring classic has showcased some of the country's finest collegiate baseball talent. There are as many as 26 recent major league players who have participated in the tournament. In 1992 there were 156 players still competing at some level of professional baseball who have laced up their shoes on the Metrodome carpet. This year's field once again contains some of the finest competition available. Second-ranked Georgia Tech, sixth-ranked Cal-State Fullerton and the Arkansas Razorbacks, ranked 37th in the pre-season polls, will all try to take the tournament trophy away from the 21st-ranked Golden Gophers.


The second event is the Big Ten opening series with the Michigan Wolverines. Never in the history of University of Minnesota baseball have the Golden Gophers opened their Big Ten schedule at home. This year the Golden Gophers will do just that when they play a pair of doubleheaders against the Wolverines on March 27-28 at the Metrodome. The defending Big Ten Champion Golden Gophers will be looking to be the first baseball team to repeat as conference champions since the Dave Winfield-led teams in 1973 and 1974.

These two events are of major importance to us at the University of Minnesota. It is our aim to make them a success and actively promote their growth, but we need your help. With all of the sporting events that go on in our Twin Cities metropolitan area, it is difficult to get coverage like our competitors in their smaller markets. We need your help in filling the seats of the Metrodome and ensuring the continued success of these events.

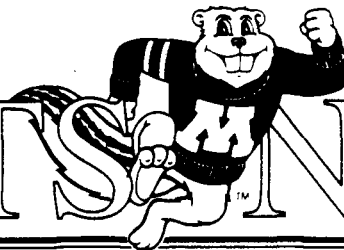
WILLIAMS ARENA CEREMONY TO TAKE PLACE AT HOME FINALE

GOLDEN GOPHERS HOST ILLINOIS IN HOME FINALE; TRAVEL TO PENN STATE

With three games remaining, Clem Haskins' Golden Gopher basketball team (15-9, 7-8) has a big week ahead of them as they continue their quest for an NCAA Tournament bid. The Golden Gophers play host to Illinois (17-9, 10-4) in the home finale at 7:00 p.m. Wednesday, and then travel to Penn State (6-17, 1-13) to meet the Nittany Lions at 7:00 p.m. (Central) Saturday.

Broadcast Coverage: Both games this week will be televised on the Midwest Sports Channel, with Dick Bremer handling the play-by-play and Jim Dutcher as the analyst. WCCO-AM 830 is the exclusive radio voice of Golden Gopher basketball with Ray Christensen calling the action.

Coach Haskins: Clem Haskins is in his seventh season at the helm of the University of Minnesota basketball program. After rebuilding the program in his first two seasons, he has now directed the Golden Gophers to post-season tournament action in three of the past four seasons. He has registered a record of 104-99 at Minnesota. In his 13th season overall, he has logged a 205-172 record.

Illinois: Head Coach Lou Henson's Illinois Fighting Illini have been one of the surprise teams in the Big Ten this season. Despite a 74-66 defeat at Wisconsin Sunday, Illinois is alone in third-place in the Big Ten standings with a 10-4 league record (17-9 overall). Leading the way for the Fighting Illini this season has been Deon Thomas, a 6-9, 232-pound junior center/forward. A second-team All-Big Ten selection last season, he once again ranks among the conference leaders in scoring, rebounding, blocked shots and field goal percentage. One of the big keys to the success of the Fighting Illini this season has been the return of outside sharpshooter Andy Kaufmann. The 6-6 senior missed all of last season due to academic difficulties. Rennie Clemons, a 6-0 junior guard, leads the team in both assists and steals. In his 18th season at Illinois, Henson has a record of 367-184. He is 607-291 in his 31st season overall.

Penn State: Idle since a 58-38 defeat at Iowa last Wednesday, Penn State enters the week 6-17 overall and 1-13 in the Big Ten. Prior to meeting the Golden Gophers Saturday, Head Coach Bruce Parkhill's squad will play at

Wisconsin Wednesday. John Amaechi, a 6-10, 260-pound sophomore center, leads the Nittany Lions in both scoring and rebounding in Big Ten play. A force in the middle, he leads the conference in blocked shots with an average of 2.57 rejections a game. In his 10th season at Penn State, Parkhill has logged a 146-141 record. He is 235-216 in his 16th season overall.

The First Time Around: Voshon Lenard scored 22 points to lead the Golden Gophers to a 95-67 victory over Penn State at Williams Arena on Feb. 3. Randy Carter (16), Jayson Walton (13), Arriel McDonald (11) and Townsend Orr (11) joined Lenard in double figures. DeRon Hayes scored 25 points, and John Amaechi added 17 to pace the Nittany Lions. With the new scheduling format, Wednesday will be the only meeting of the season between Minnesota and Illinois.

Series Records: Illinois leads the all-time series 89-54, but the Golden Gophers do hold a 38-32 edge in games played in Minneapolis. The Golden Gophers and Fighting Illini split the season series last year. Dana Jackson's free throw with no time left on the clock gave the Golden Gophers a dramatic 54-53 win at Williams Arena. Behind 22 points from Rennie Clemons, the Fighting Illini won the rematch 74-58 at Assembly Hall. Minnesota leads 2-0 in the series with Penn State. In addition to the victory earlier this season, the Golden Gophers also defeated the Nittany Lions 86-70 in the first round of the Pillsbury Classic at the Met Sports Center in Bloomington back on Dec. 26, 1975.

Lenard Lights It Up: Voshon Lenard has scored 123 points in the past five games, an average of 24.6 points a game. In the five games, he shot 58.7 percent (44 of 75) from the field, including 52.9 percent (18 of 34) on three-pointers. He is ranked first on the team in scoring at 17.4 points a game, and has scored in double figures in 19 games. He has led or tied for the team-high in scoring in 15 games, and has 10 20-point games to his credit, which includes a career-high 32-points against Iowa on Feb. 13.

Injury Woes: The Golden Gophers have battled injuries all season long, and remarkably, are still in the hunt for a post-season tournament berth. In fact, due to injuries the team's regular lineup (Carter, Walton, Kolander, Lenard and McDonald) has been healthy enough to start together as a full group in just eight of 24 games this season. The Golden Gophers have been forced to go with seven different starting lineups this season.

Williams Arena: The Golden Gophers have registered an impressive 60-17 record (.779) over the past four-plus seasons within the hallowed halls of Williams Arena, including a 13-2 mark (.867) this season.

GOLDEN GOPHERS TAKE THREE OF FOUR POINTS FROM WISCONSIN; CLINCH HOME ICE IN THE PLAYOFFS

The University of Minnesota Golden Gophers took three of four possible points from the Wisconsin Badgers last weekend to clinch home ice in the first round of the WCHA playoffs. Minnesota (16-11-7, 15-9-6), battled back from a two-goal deficit on Friday night to tie the Badgers 4-4 in overtime. On Saturday, the Golden Gophers jumped out to a 3-0 lead after one period and held on to win 4-2.

Minnesota has now won six of its last eight games and is 6-2-2 in its last 10 games. The three points, coupled with the Michigan Tech/North Dakota split, have assured the Golden Gophers of at least third place, with second place still a possibility. The Golden Gophers will finish off the regular season schedule with a two-game home-and-home series with St. Cloud State.

Fit To Be Tied: The Minnesota/Wisconsin 4-4 overtime tie was the seventh tie of the year for the Maroon and Gold. That broke the school record of six set in 1973-74. The Golden Gophers have now had nine games go into the extra stanza, which is also a school record.

Number 100: The victory on Saturday night gave the Golden Gophers their 100th victory over the Badgers. The overall record stands at 100-60-13.

Richards Report: All-American candidate Travis Richards (Plymouth, Minn.) had one of his finest weekends of the year against the Badgers. On Friday night, he had a power play goal for the Golden Gophers that pulled them within one. He was also instrumental in the Minnesota penalty killing units' success, holding the Badgers without a goal in five attempts. On Saturday, he scored two goals and was the most dominant player on the ice. His first goal came just 38 seconds into the game and took the crowd out of it. His second goal was the game-winner. Once again, he was dominant on the penalty kill and at bringing the puck out of the zone. He is now fourth in career goals for a blueliner with 32, and second in assists with 93.

Callinan Steps Forward: Sophomore goaltender Jeff Callinan (Minnetonka, Minn.) stepped forward last weekend and had five periods of outstanding play, limiting the Badgers to three goals over that span and gaining a win and a tie to raise his record to 6-4-4. He lowered his goals against average to 3.98 with a save percentage of .861. Callinan has had an up and down season, but his performance against Wisconsin should help bolster his confidence.

Johnson Leads Golden Gophers: All-American and All-WCHA candidate Craig Johnson (St. Paul, Minn.) continues to lead the Golden Gophers in scoring with 19 goals and 20 assists. His eight power play goals and two short-handed goals are tops on the team as well. Johnson's line of Andy Brink (Bemidji, Minn.) and Darby Hendrickson (Richfield, Minn.) is coming on strong and could be one of the top lines in the WCHA during the play-off run.

Next Up: The Golden Gophers series with the St. Cloud State Huskies is developing into a strong emotional rivalry. The Maroon and Gold hold a 11-0-2 edge in the all-time series. Minnesota won both games earlier this season, winning 4-3 at St. Cloud and 5-2 at Mariucci Arena. This time around the Huskies home game, and the final game of the regular season, will be held at the Target Center on Sunday at 2:00 p.m., in the first-ever WCHA game in that building. St. Cloud State is coming off a two-game sweep at the hands of the regular season champion UMD Bulldogs. The Bulldogs beat the Huskies 6-4 and 4-0 to clinch the MacNaughton Cup with the help of the Golden Gophers.

Special Ceremony: The final regular season home game for the Golden Gophers on Friday night will have some special ceremonies. During the pre-game warm-ups, the seniors and their parents will be honored for their contributions to the program. The post-game will feature a very special ceremony that will involve captains of all the championship teams as they take part in the lowering of the championship banners from the east wall of the arena.

Mac Attack: Golden Gopher junior defenseman Chris McAlpine (Roseville, Minn) got back on track offensively with a big goal on Saturday. It was his 13th of the season and keeps him tied with Jon Rohloff of UMD for the WCHA lead from the blueline. His 13 goals gives him an outside chance of surpassing Randy Skarda's school record of 19 in 1987-88. He currently ranks fourth on that list.

Bonin Breaks Out: Freshman center Brian Bonin (White Bear Lake, Minn.) broke out of a goal-scoring slump by stealing a pass in the Wisconsin end and scoring an unassisted goal on Friday night. Bonin has 10 goals and 27 assists for the year and increased offensive production from him couldn't have come at a better time.

Broadcast Coverage: Friday's game with St. Cloud State will be broadcast on MSC with Doug McLeod, Dick Bremer and Tom Reid calling the action. Saturday's television status is undecided by St. Cloud State. On the radio dial, Friday and Sunday's game will be live on KFAN-AM 1130. Greg Harrington, Lou Nanne and Pat Micheletti will call all of the action.

Next: Following the Washington Invitational, the Golden Gophers will return home to play host to Iowa on Friday, March 12 in their Big Ten home opener. The Golden Gophers are 1-0 in the Big Ten. Minnesota has won 14 consecutive Big Ten matches.

WRESTLING

GOPHERS LOOK TO BIG TEN MEET

The Golden Gopher wrestling squad will take part this weekend at the Big Ten Championships, March 5-6, at Columbus, Ohio.

The Big Ten meet is a qualifying meet for the NCAA Championships, which will be held, March 18-20, at Ames, Iowa. The top five wrestlers in each weight class qualify for the NCAA meet. Two-time defending NCAA champion Iowa has won 19 consecutive Big Ten championships.

At last year's Big Ten Championships at Madison, Wis. the Golden Gophers finished fourth and qualified six wrestlers for the NCAA meet. Michael Marzetta was the only Golden Gopher to place. Marzetta finished seventh at the NCAA meet, to earn All-American honors.

The Golden Gophers go into the Big Ten meet with seven of their 10 starters ranked in the top 20 nationally -- Michael Marzetta (Sr., Liberty Lake, Wash.), is second at 158 pounds; Willy Short (Jr., Inver Grove Heights, Minn.), third at 150; Billy Pierce (Fr., Minneapolis,

Minn.), fifth at heavyweight; Brad Gibson (Jr., Chokio, Minn.), seventh at 177; Brett Colombini (So., Redwood Valley, Calif.), 13th at 167; Tim Harris (So., St. Louis, Mo.), 11th at 126; and, Steve Baer (So., Agoura Hills, Calif.) 16th at 118.

Pierce leads the Golden Gophers with 39 victories and 12 pins in 41 matches. Marzetta is 37-5. Short is 22-1 -- his only loss is to top-ranked Terry Steiner, of Iowa, 5-4, in overtime. Colombini, who has wrestled at 167 and 177, is 33-3 with just two losses in his last 29 matches. Harris, who was 29-13 last season as a freshman, is 34-11. Gibson, who missed part of the season due to mononucleosis, is 18-3 after winning his first 10 matches.

The Golden Gophers finished the regular season with a 21-3-1 record. The Golden Gophers had a 6-2-1 Big Ten dual record. The Golden Gophers won their first 12 matches of the season -- the best season start in school history. In January, the Golden Gophers captured the championship of the 16-team Virginia Duals -- the first tournament championship under coach J Robinson.

GOLDEN GOPHERS READY FOR BIG TEN INDOOR CHAMPIONSHIPS THIS WEEKEND

Head Coach Roy Griak's Golden Gopher track & field team will compete at the Big Ten Indoor Championships on Friday and Saturday at Madison, Wis. The pentathlon competition kicks off the schedule at 9:00 a.m. Friday. Saturday's first event is at 11:45 a.m.

Great Finish: The Golden Gophers finished fourth at the indoor league meet a year ago...the program's best finish since placing third back in 1968. Minnesota has never won a Big Ten indoor team title.

Back For More: The Golden Gophers return 45 of the 59 points they scored at the 1992 Big Ten meet. Senior co-captain Chris Murrell (Grand Island, Neb.) and sophomore Keita Cline (Gainesville, Fla.) are defending champions in the high jump and triple jump, respectively. Murrell, who also captured the league indoor title in 1990 and the outdoor

crown last spring, won the event last year with a jump of 7-0 1/2. Cline won the triple jump with a leap of 50-7 1/2 en route to being named Big Ten Indoor Freshman of the Year. Junior Norris Williams (Milwaukee, Wis.) in the 600 meters (1:19.00), and senior Chad Goldstein (St. Louis Park, Minn.) in the shot put (57-9 3/4) finished second last year. Senior co-captain Tyrone Minor (St. Paul, Minn.) placed in four different events last year. He finished fifth in the triple jump (49-4 1/2), and sixth in both the 55 meters (6.42) and long jump (24-2 1/4). Junior Matt Burns (Cedar Rapids, Iowa), whose status for this weekend is in doubt after a freak injury last Friday in which he was hit by a shot put that went out of the sector, placed fourth in the high jump (6-10 1/4) last year. Sophomore Adrian Ellis (Racine, Wis.), sixth in the triple jump (47-11 1/4), rounds out the returning placewinners from a year ago.

NCAA Indoor Championships: Junior Martin Eriksson (Stockholm, Sweden), with a school record mark of 17-11 3/4 in the pole vault, is an automatic qualifier for the NCAA Indoor Championships to be held at the Hoosier Dome in Indianapolis on March 12-13. Chad Goldstein in the shot put (60-8 1/2) and Chris Murrell (7-3, tied his own school record), surpassed provisional standards at last Friday's Gold Country Snowshoe Twilight Open.

GOLDEN GOPHER DOLPHINS HEADED TO BIG TEN CHAMPIONSHIPS

The 13th-ranked Golden Gopher (6-1) swimming & diving team heads to Indianapolis for the 83rd Annual Big Ten Swimming & Diving Championships, to be held at the IUPUI Natatorium on March 4-6. This will be the ninth Big Ten Championship held at the IUPUI facility since 1983.

Last season, Minnesota finished second to the Michigan Wolverines for the third straight season as the Maroon & Gold scored a school record 613 points.

Headlining the returnees for Minnesota will be juniors Can Ergenekan (Beverton, Ore.), Eric Jorgensen (Rochester, Minn.), and Matt Brown (Beaverton, Ore.),

who is the returning Big Ten Champion in the 200 individual medley. Minnesota will also try to defend its titles in the 200 free and 200 medley relay races. Senior Steve Busse (Cincinnati, Ohio) should also help the Maroon & Gold in sprint events.

The Michigan Wolverines have dominated the Big Ten in the swimming pool having won seven straight Big Ten Championships and 26 Big Ten titles. The 'Wolves are then followed by Indiana with 23 titles, Ohio State 11, Northwestern 10, Iowa, Illinois and Minnesota 2, Michigan State 1 and Penn State, Purdue and Wisconsin 0.

Competition gets underway Thursday March 4, with preliminaries beginning at noon and finals starting at 7:00 p.m.

GOPHERS HOST TO OSCAR MAYER CLASSIC

The Golden Gopher baseball squad, ranked No. 21 in last week's *Baseball America* Top 25, return to the Metrodome this week to play host to the Oscar Mayer Classic.

This is the ninth consecutive year the Golden Gophers have hosted the spring classic (previously called the Wheaties and Pillsbury Classic) at the Metrodome.

This year's tournament features No. 2-ranked Georgia Tech, No. 6 Cal State Fullerton and Arkansas, which was ranked No. 37 in preseason polls. Cal State Fullerton, coached by former University of Illinois coach Augie Garrido, was the runnerup at the 1992 College World Series. Minnesota takes a 5-4 record into the Classic.

Georgia Tech and Cal State Fullerton will kick off the tournament Friday afternoon at 2 p.m. at the Metrodome. The Golden Gophers will play Arkansas at 7:30 p.m.

On Saturday, Minnesota coach John Anderson will conduct a youth baseball clinic at 11 a.m. as part of the Oscar Mayer Classic. On Sunday, Minnesota will play Georgia Tech at 1:15 p.m. Arkansas and Cal State Fullerton will play at 5 p.m. in the Classic's final game.

Established in 1985, the Classic is regarded as the finest in-season tournament in college baseball. As many as 26 recent major leaguers have competed in the spring tournament. In 1992, there were 156 players, who had competed in the tournament, who were still active in professional baseball.

Last week: The Golden Gophers won one of three games at the Service Academies Classic, played in Millington, Tenn. The tournament was played at USA Stadium, which is the training site for the US Olympic Baseball Team.

The Golden Gophers opened the tournament with a 6-5 loss to Navy. That loss snapped a three-game Minnesota's three-game winning streak. On Saturday, the Golden Gophers were limited to three hits in a 3-0 loss to Air Force. The Golden Gophers pulled out a 2-1, 12-inning victory on Sunday over Army. Bill Mobilia's RBI-single off the fence with one out in the bottom of the twelfth scored Darren Grass and lifted the Golden Gophers to the victory. Minnesota pitchers Kerry Ligtenberg, Jason Karmann, Chris Lawler and Brad Kearin shut out Army over the final nine innings. Kearin, who pitched out of bases-loaded jams in the 11th and 12th, earned the victory.

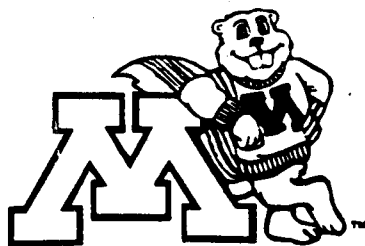

GOLDEN GOPHERS FACE OHIO STATE WEDNESDAY; NCAA SELECTION SHOW SET FOR SUNDAY

Clem Haskins' Golden Gopher basketball team (17-9, 9-8) will wrap up the regular season when they meet Ohio State (13-12, 6-10) in Columbus Wednesday. Game time is at 7:00 p.m. (Central). The Golden Gophers took two major steps forward in their quest for an NCAA tournament bid by defeating Illinois (67-65) at home last Wednesday, and Penn State (67-41) on the road Saturday.

Broadcast Coverage: Wednesday's game will be televised on the Midwest Sports Channel, with Dick Bremer handling the play-by-play and Jim Dutcher as the analyst. WCCO-AM 830 is the exclusive radio voice of Golden Gopher basketball with Ray Christensen calling the action.

Coach Haskins: Clem Haskins is in his seventh season at the helm of the University of Minnesota basketball program. After rebuilding the program in his first two seasons, he has now directed the Golden Gophers to post-season tournament action in three of the past four seasons. He has registered a record of 106-99 at Minnesota. In his 13th season overall, he has logged a 207-172 record.

Ohio State: Ohio State lost 85-73 at Illinois Saturday to fall to 13-12 overall and 6-10 in the Big Ten heading into Wednesday's confrontation with the Golden Gophers. Lawrence Funderburke, a 6-9 junior forward, leads the team in both scoring (16.9) and rebounding (6.8). Jamie Skelton, a 6-2 junior guard who leads the team in both three-pointers (50) and assists (2.7) this season, is ranked second in scoring (14.2). After winning back-to-back Big Ten titles, the Buckeyes are one of the youngest teams in the conference this season. Greg Simpson, a 6-1 guard, and Derek Anderson, a 6-6 guard, highlight the newcomers for the Buckeyes. In his fourth season as head coach after spending the previous six years as an assistant for the Buckeyes, Randy Ayers will bring a record of 83-35 into Wednesday's game.

Hi Stranger: With the new scheduling format, Wednesday will be the first, and only, meeting of the season between Minnesota and Ohio State.

Series Record: Ohio State leads the all-time series 64-43. The Buckeyes also hold a 39-15 advantage in games

played in Columbus. The Buckeyes swept the season series a year ago, winning 72-69 at St. John Arena, and then 94-63 at Williams Arena, and have won five straight over the Golden Gophers. Minnesota's last victory over Ohio State was an 83-78 decision over the Buckeyes at Williams Arena in 1990.

NCAA Selection Show: The NCAA Championship Selection Show will be televised live on CBS at 5:30 p.m. (Central) Sunday.

On A Roll: The Golden Gophers are playing their best ball of the season as tournament time draws ever closer. Following Saturday's win at Penn State, the Golden Gophers have now won five of their past seven games, including two in a row on the road.

Injury Woes: The Golden Gophers have battled injuries all season long, and remarkably, are on the verge of securing their fourth post-season tournament berth in the past five seasons. Due to injuries, the team's regular lineup (Carter, Walton, Kolander, Lenard and McDonald) has been healthy enough to start together as a full group in just nine of 26 games this season. The Golden Gophers have been forced to go with eight different starting lineups this season.

Lenard Lights It Up: Voshon Lenard has scored 148 points in the past seven games, an average of 21.1 points a game. In the seven games, he has shot 55.1 percent (54 of 98) from the field, including 50 percent (21 of 42) on three-pointers. He is ranked first on the team in scoring at 17.0 points a game, and has scored in double figures in 21 games. He has led or tied for the team-high in scoring in 15 games, and has 10 20-point games to his credit, which includes a career-high 32-points against Iowa on Feb. 13. Lenard has made 45 three-pointers and attempted 123 this season. His career totals are 96 and 267, respectively. Willie Burton set the single-season school record in 1989-90 with 52 three-pointers. As a freshman last season, Lenard set the school record with 144 attempts. Kevin Lynch (1987-91) holds the school career records of 117 successful three-pointers and 298 attempts.

McDonald Watch: Arriel McDonald is ranked second on the all-time school career assists list with 347. Marc Wilson (1983-86) is the leader with 375. McDonald is also ranked sixth in all-time steals with 112. Melvin Newbern (1987-90) is the leader with 215 career steals.

A Force Inside: It's no secret that a healthy Randy Carter is the key to a successful inside game for the Golden Gophers. Ranked first on the team in rebounding (6.9) and third in scoring (12.2), he led the way in the win over Penn State Saturday with 17 points and nine rebounds.

GOLDEN GOPHERS TAKE THREE OF FOUR POINTS FROM ST. CLOUD STATE; FINISH TIED FOR SECOND WITH WISCONSIN

The University of Minnesota Golden Gophers took three of four possible points from St. Cloud State last weekend to finish tied for second place in the WCHA regular season standings. Minnesota (17-11-6, 16-9-7), continued Head Coach Doug Woog's streak of never having finished any lower than second in the WCHA in his eight years of collegiate coaching. The Golden Gophers will open the post-season by hosting the North Dakota Sioux in best-of-three WCHA First Round Playoff action this weekend at Mariucci Arena. Game time is 7:05 p.m. for Friday, Saturday and Sunday (if necessary).

On A Roll: The Golden Gophers have been on a roll as of late. They are unbeaten in their last six games with a 4-0-2 mark and they have won seven of their last 10 games with only one loss in that span. They enter the playoffs with a five-game home winning streak.

DeJa Vu: The Minnesota/North Dakota playoff series will be a repeat of last year's first round action when the Sioux came in and surprised the MacNaughton Cup winners with a 5-3 victory on the opening night, only to be overpowered 9-2 and 3-1 in the next two games.

About Woog: Doug Woog and the Golden Gophers kept their streak of eight consecutive regular season finishes of second or better in the WCHA alive by taking six out of eight tough points from Wisconsin and St. Cloud State the final two weeks. The Golden Gophers would have finished in second outright if Wisconsin had not rallied to tie Michigan Tech 3-3 in overtime in Madison. Woog's career mark now stands at 245-96-19, with a .707 winning percentage.

Fit To Be Tied: The Minnesota/St. Cloud State 2-2 overtime tie was the eighth tie of the year for the Maroon and Gold. That equals the NCAA mark for ties in a season that is also held by Michigan State. The Golden Gophers have now had 10 games go into the extra stanza, which is a school record.

Richards Report: All-American candidate Travis Richards (Plymouth, Minn.) had another outstanding weekend for the Maroon and Gold. The senior captain was the finest player on the ice for either team during the series. He is third on the team in scoring with nine goals and a team-high 22 assists. He is now fourth in career goals for a blueliner with 32, and second in assists with 94. Richards has turned on the offense just in time for the Golden Gophers' playoff run and he will be in the middle of any success the team has the rest of the way.

Callinan Steps Forward: Sophomore goaltender Jeff Callinan (Minnetonka, Minn.) has stepped forward in the past two weeks notching a win and two ties and limiting the opponents to five goals in three games. In the process he lowered his GAA to 3.84 with a 6-4-5 record. His consistent play, coupled with the outstanding play of Tom Newman (Blaine, Minn.), has solidified the team's goaltending situation.

Johnson Leads Golden Gophers: All-American and All-WCHA candidate Craig Johnson (St. Paul, Minn.) continues to lead the Golden Gophers in scoring with 19 goals and 20 assists. His eight power play goals and two short-handed goals are tops on the team as well.

Next Up: The Golden Gophers' series with the North Dakota Sioux is tied at 2-2 for the season with each team splitting in the other's arena. The Maroon and Gold hold a 111-91-4 edge in the all-time series. The Sioux were idle this past weekend and will be well-rested coming into the series. They are led by All-American and Hobey Baker candidate Greg Johnson.

Special Ceremony: The final regular season home game for the Golden Gophers last Friday night was a tremendous success as a season-high 7,735 fans jammed into the "Old Barn" for a special ceremonial closing. The championship banners were lowered and given to the respective team captains for safe keeping until the new Mariucci Arena opens up next season.

Mac Attack: Golden Gopher junior defenseman Chris McAlpine (Roseville, Minn) has been a big contributor on offense this year. He has 13 goals and nine assists which leaves him tied with Jon Rohloff of UMD for the WCHA lead from the blueline. His 13 goals gives him an outside chance of surpassing Randy Skarda's school record of 19 in 1987-88. He currently ranks fourth on that list.

Newman Records Third Shutout of the Season: Senior goaltender Tom Newman recorded his third shutout of the season last Friday night when he won the final regular season game in Mariucci Arena with a 1-0 victory. He raised his record to 11-4-1 with a 3.31 GAA which is second in the WCHA. He has now won three straight Friday night starts at Mariucci Arena and will probably get the nod this Friday. Newman was honored last week when he was picked as one of three goaltenders on the West Shrine Team that will compete in the Shrine All-Star Classic on April 10.

Broadcast Coverage: The entire Minnesota/Sioux first round playoff series will be live on KFAN-AM 1130 with Greg Harrington, Lou Nanne and Pat Micheletti calling all of the action. There is no television coverage slated for the series.

Two Golden Gophers set records on the first day of the meet as freshman **Bernie Zeruhn (Hamburg, Germany)** set a new varsity and freshman record in the 500 freestyle with a time of 4:22.97 (4:24.81 old record); freshman **Derek Williams (Lansdale, Pa.)** also set a new freshman record with a time of :20.37 in the 50 freestyle. Zeruhn also added an NCAA qualifying time in the 200 butterfly by finishing fourth with a time of 1:46.32.

Two more Golden Gophers qualified for the NCAA meet

as individuals. Junior **Matt Brown (Beaverton, Ore.)** qualified in the 100-200 breaststroke by finishing third in both events and junior **Can Ergenekan (Aloha, Ore.)** qualified by finishing fifth in the 200 butterfly. The 200 freestyle relay team of senior **Steve Busse (Cincinnati, Ohio)**, junior **Eric Jorgensen (Rochester, Minn.)**, Williams and sophomore **Scott Walker (Lansdale, Pa.)** also qualified for the NCAA Swimming & Diving Championship.

The Maroon & Gold will also receive NCAA considerations in the 200-400 medley relay s. The NCAA Swimming & Diving Championship will be held March 25-27, in Indianapolis, Ind.

GOPHERS BREAK FOR FINALS

After playing six games in the last 10 days, the Golden Gopher baseball squad will take a 15-day break for final exams. The Golden Gophers will return to action on March 22.

The Golden Gophers are 6-6 after losing two of three games last weekend in the Oscar Mayer Classic.

Offensively, the Golden Gophers have been led by All-American candidate **Mark Merila (Jr., Plymouth, Minn.)**. Merila, who will be a candidate for Team USA this summer, is hitting .400 (18 for 45). **Ryan Lefebvre (Sr., Los Angeles, Calif.)** is hitting .341. **Adam Sobocienski (Sr., Barrington, Ill.)** leads the Golden Gophers, who are hitting .290 as a team, with 15 RBI.

Oscar Mayer Classic Recap: The ninth annual spring classic hosted by the Golden Gophers featured two teams that are legitimate contenders for the national championship -- No. 1-ranked Georgia Tech and Cal State Fullerton, the runnerup at the 1992 College World Series. Arkansas, which is ranked in the Top 30 in several polls, rounded out the four-team field.

Arkansas handed the Golden Gophers an 11-4 loss in Friday's first round. Trailing 3-2, the Razorbacks took the lead for good on a two-run home run in the fifth by Bob Hughes.

Saturday afternoon, the Golden Gophers erupted for seven runs in the first inning and went on to defeat No. 7-ranked Cal State Fullerton, 11-3. Merila went 5-for-5 to pace the Golden Gophers' 13-hit attack. Three Minnesota pitchers limited the Razorbacks to four hits.

On Sunday, top-ranked Georgia Tech handed the Golden Gophers an 11-3 loss. The Yellow Jackets hit three home runs -- including a third-inning grand slam by **Nomar Garciaparra**, a member of the 1992 US Olympic Team -- to beat the Golden Gophers.

Merila, Lefebvre and **Charlie Nelson (Jr., Perham, Minn.)** were named to the all-tournament team. Lefebvre, who was named to the team for the third consecutive year, went 5 for 10, while Nelson hit a home run in each of the first two games. Nelson, who hit two home runs last season in 58 games, leads the Golden Gophers with three home runs this season.

Next Up: On March 22, the Golden Gophers will travel to Manhattan, Kansas for a three-game nonconference series against Kansas State. It will be the first meeting ever between the two schools. The Golden Gophers will then return home to play host to Michigan, March 27-28, at the Metrodome, in their Big Ten opener. The Golden Gophers are the defending Big Ten champions.

GOLDEN GOPHERS IN BIG TEN HOME OPENER

The Golden Gophers will be trying to extend their 14-match Big Ten winning streak when they play host to Iowa, in their Big Ten home opener, Friday, at the 98th Street Racquet Club.

The Golden Gophers, who went undefeated in 13 conference matches last season en route to the Big Ten championship, last lost a conference match at the 1991 Big Ten tournament. The Golden Gophers defeated Iowa, 5-3, in 1992.

The 14-match conference winning streak is the second-longest in school history. The Golden Gophers had a 16-match conference winning streak, which was snapped in 1987.

The Golden Gophers have been led by Rick Naumoff (Sr., Columbus, Ohio), who is 21-7. Dean Hlushko (Sr., Arden Hills, Minn.) is 13-3. In doubles, Hlushko has teamed with Roger Anderson (Sr., New Hope, Minn.) for a 12-6 record.

Next: Following Friday, the Golden Gopher tennis squad will be idle for 10 days for final exams. From March 22-28, the Golden Gophers will compete at the Hawaii Tournament at Honolulu, Hawaii. Among the teams competing at Hawaii are Tennessee, Washington, Chaminade, Ohio State and Brigham Young. The Golden Gophers defeated Washington, 4-3, and swept three matches to claim first place at the Washington Invitational.

WRESTLING

SEVEN GOPHERS ADVANCE TO NCAA MEET

Big Ten heavyweight champion Billy Pierce (Fr., Minneapolis) and six other Golden Gophers wrestlers have qualified for the NCAA Division I Wrestling Championships, which will be held, March 18-20, at Ames, Iowa.

Pierce, the first Golden Gopher heavyweight to win a Big Ten Championship since Willis Wood won in 1953, helped the Golden Gophers to a fourth-place finish at the Big Ten Championships, which were held in Columbus, Ohio.

The other Minnesota wrestlers to qualify last weekend for the NCAA meet were 167-pounder Brett Colombini (So., Redwood Valley, Calif.), a runnerup; 158-pounder Michael Marzetta (Sr., Liberty Lake, Wash.) and 126-pounder Tim Harris (So., St. Louis, Mo.), who each finished third at the Big Ten; 150-pounder Willy Short (Jr., Inver Grove Heights, Mn.), who finished fifth; 177-pounder Brad Gibson (Jr., Chokio, Mn.), who finished

fourth; and, Chad Carlson (So., Pennock, Mn.), who finished seventh, but qualified as a wild-card entry.

Carlson, Harris, Marzetta and Short qualified for the NCAA meet for the second time. Marzetta finished seventh at last year's meet to earn All-American honors. Marzetta was the only of six Golden Gopher qualifiers to place at the meet. Harris did not place last year at 134 pounds and Carlson did not place at 142, while Short did not place in 1991. Short redshirted last season.

Pierce leads the Golden Gophers with 43 victories and 12 pins in 45 matches. Marzetta is 40-6 this season and 104-47-1 in his career. Short is 28-3. Colombini, who has wrestled at 167 and 177, is 36-4 after going 16-15-1 last season. Harris, who was 29-13 last season as a freshman, is 38-12. Gibson, who missed part of the season due to mononucleosis, is 21-5 after winning his first 10 matches.

The Golden Gophers finished in a tie for 21st place (with 14.5 points) at the 1992 NCAA meet.

GYMNASTICS

GYMNASTS DEFEAT IOWA STATE & MICHIGAN STATE; HAWKEYES UPSET GOLDEN GOPHERS IN IOWA CITY OVER WEEKEND

The University of Minnesota gymnastics team had a busy week of action. The fifth-ranked Golden Gophers traveled twice to Iowa for dual meet matchups against the Iowa State Cyclones and the Iowa Hawkeyes. They also had a home match in between trips to Iowa, as the tumblers hosted the Michigan State Spartans in dual meet competition.

Minnesota scored a season low 266.85 points as they defeated the Iowa State Cyclones 266.85 to 236.25 in Ames, Iowa. Minnesota won all six individual events including the all-around competition. Sophomore **Brian Yee (Houston, Texas)** led the way for Minnesota as he won the all-around event with a score of 54.90 and the vault competition with a score of 9.25. Junior **Bo Haun (Tulsa, Okla.)** was second with a score of 53.40 and Rob Hanson was third with a score 53.40. Senior **John Roethlisberger (Afton, Minn.)** added three individual event victories for the Maroon & Gold on the pommel horse (9.60), still rings (9.50) and the floor exercise (9.65).

The Golden Gophers then defeated Big Ten rival Michigan State 281.85-274.85 in Williams Arena, as seniors John Roethlisberger and Rob Hanson were competing in their last regular season home meet. Roethlisberger won three individual events (floor exercise, pommel horse, high bar) and the all-around, and Hanson captured the still rings event with a 9.75. Haun won the parallel bars with a score of 9.70, and posted a best-ever score in the all-around with 56.05 to finish second behind Roethlisberger.

The 13th-ranked Iowa Hawkeyes spoiled Minnesota's week by upsetting the Golden Gophers 278.80-276.60 in Iowa City, in their final dual meet of the season. The Hawkeyes won the top three all-around spots, as they also won six of seven events on the day from the defending Big Ten Champions.

John Roethlisberger was the lone Golden Gopher who captured an individual event title on the day as he won the horizontal bar with a score of 9.75. With the loss, Minnesota's record goes to 4-2 overall and 2-1 Big Ten.

Minnesota will be off this weekend, as they will host the 1993 Big Ten Championships in the Bierman Fieldhouse, on March 20-21.

Coach Haskins: Clem Haskins is in his seventh season at the helm of the University of Minnesota basketball program. After rebuilding the program in his first two seasons, he has now directed the Golden Gophers to post-season tournament action in four of the past five seasons. He has registered a record of 106-100 at Minnesota. In his 13th season overall, he has logged a 207-173 record. He is 0-1 at Minnesota, and 0-2 overall, in NIT games.

Florida: Florida comes into Wednesday's game against the Golden Gophers with a 16-11 overall record. The Gators finished 9-7 in the Southeastern Conference, good enough for a third-place finish in the Eastern Division. Stacey Poole, a 6-6 senior forward, leads the team in scoring at 16.6 points a game. He is ranked second on the team in rebounding with 6.3 boards a game. Andrew DeClercq, a 6-10 sophomore center, leads the team with 7.1 rebounds a game. In his third season at Florida, Head Coach Lon Kruger has a 46-42 record. He is 179-147 in his 11th season overall.

Minnesota & The NIT: This is Minnesota's sixth appearance (1973, 1980, 1981, 1983, 1992, 1993) in the NIT and the Golden Gophers go into Wednesday's game with an overall record of 7-5 in the tournament. Led by Kevin McHale, the Golden Gophers advanced to the NIT championship game in 1980 where they lost 58-55 to the Ralph Sampson-led Virginia Cavaliers.

Hi Stranger: Minnesota and Florida will meet for the first time on the basketball court when they face each other in

Wednesday's first round NIT game.

Common Opponent: Minnesota and Florida have one common opponent this season...Purdue. The Gators dropped a 67-63 decision to the Boilermakers at the Sun Carnival Classic in El Paso, Texas, back on Dec. 28. The Golden Gophers defeated Purdue, 81-60, at Williams Arena on Jan. 9, but then the Boilermakers won the rematch, 75-69, in West Lafayette on Feb. 10.

Injury Woes: The Golden Gophers have battled injuries all season long, and remarkably, bounced back to secure their fourth post-season tournament berth in the past five seasons. Due to injuries, the team's regular lineup (Carter, Walton, Kolander, Lenard and McDonald) has been healthy enough to start together as a full group in just 10 of 27 games this season. The Golden Gophers have been forced to go with eight different starting lineups this season.

Lenard Lights It Up: Voshon Lenard is ranked first on the team in scoring at 16.6 points a game. He has scored in double figures in 21 games this season, and has led or tied for the team-high in scoring in 15 games. He has 10, 20-point games to his credit, which includes a career-high 32-points against Iowa on Feb. 13. Going into the NIT, Lenard has made 45 three-pointers and attempted 129 this season. His career totals are 96 and 273, respectively. Willie Burton set the single-season school record in 1989-90 with 52 three-pointers. As a freshman last season, Lenard set the school record with 144 attempts. Kevin Lynch (1987-91) holds the school career records of 117 successful three-pointers and 298 attempts. In addition, Lenard is already ranked 10th on the school's all-time list with 86 steals.

McDonald Watch: Arriel McDonald is ranked second on the all-time school career assists list with 349. Marc Wilson (1983-86) is the leader with 375. McDonald is also ranked sixth in all-time steals with 113. Melvin Newbern (1987-90) is the leader with 215 career steals.

A Force Inside: It's no secret that a healthy Randy Carter is the key to a successful inside game for the Golden Gophers. He is ranked first on the team in rebounding (6.9) and third in scoring (11.9) this season.

Walton Comes Into His Own: Jayson Walton is ranked second on the team in scoring at 12.2 points a game. He has scored in double figures in 20 games, and is ranked second on the team in rebounds with 6.3 boards a game. He has led or tied for the team high in scoring in seven games, and on the boards in 12 contests. Recognized as one of the most improved players in the Big Ten, he also has five

GOLDEN GOPHERS CLOSE MARIUCCI ARENA IN STYLE; TWO STRAIGHT WINS OVER SIOUX SEND GOPHERS TO WCHA CHAMPIONSHIP TOURNAMENT ON A ROLL

The University of Minnesota Golden Gopher hockey team brought a fitting end to 43 years of hockey at Mariucci Arena, with a pair of tightly-fought victories over the North Dakota Fighting Sioux 6-4, 5-4 (OT) to open the 1993 WCHA Playoffs last weekend. The Golden Gophers (19-11-8), will play the Wisconsin Badgers (23-12-3) on Friday, March 19, at the St. Paul Civic Center at 2:00 p.m., with the winner advancing to the championship game. Minnesota's late-season charge, coupled with Wisconsin's two ties and two losses in their final four games, pulled the two teams even in the WCHA standings. Wisconsin will be the number two seed based on their larger number of conference wins. The Golden Gophers and Badgers join regular season champion Minnesota-Duluth, fourth-place Michigan Tech and fifth-place Northern Michigan in the field. MTU and NMU will face off on Thursday night at 7:00 p.m., with the winner playing the Bulldogs on Friday night at 7:00 p.m.

A Fitting End: It was appropriate that the final series played in Mariucci Arena was such an exciting one, and that the final game was decided in overtime. On Saturday, the Golden Gophers came from a behind for the second straight night as they battled back from a 2-0 deficit to take a 4-3 lead in the third period. North Dakota, who had played possibly their best hockey of the year in the series, was not done. The Sioux tied the game with just over two minutes remaining to force the overtime. Both teams had good scoring chances in the extra session before junior Craig Johnson (St. Paul, Minn.) notched his 20th goal of the season, from his knees on a rebound of Darby Hendrickson's (Richfield, Minn.) shot at 4:48 of the overtime. The series marked the end of one of the finest collegiate hockey careers in the history as the Sioux's Greg Johnson played his last game. He leaves the WCHA as the top assist man and the fifth-leading scorer in the leagues' history.

On A Roll: The Maroon and Gold will enter the WCHA Final Five Championship as the hottest team in the tournament. Minnesota has won nine of their last 12 games and have posted a sterling 9-2-1 record in that span. The Golden Gophers have held their opponents to an average of 2.5 goals per-game, while scoring at a 4.25 goals per-game clip during that time period. They have strengthened their chances of an NCAA post-season berth by not losing in their last eight games. The first choice of the team would be two win two game in St. Paul, thus earning the WCHA's automatic NCAA bid and winning a championship trophy that has eluded them.

Golden Gophers in St. Paul: The Golden Gophers under Head Coach Doug Woog have earned a spot in the WCHA tournament all six years that it has been in St. Paul. Woog has a 4-6 record in the previous five WCHA tournaments in the Civic Center. He has 1-3 record versus the Badgers including two championship game defeats. The only time the teams met in the first game was in 1990-91 when the Maroon and Gold defeated the Badgers 3-2 to advance to the championship game. The Golden Gophers are 0-4 in the championship game of the tournament, including the last two. Minnesota defeated the UMD Bulldogs 6-0 in 1987-88, in their only tournament meeting. Northern Michigan holds a 2-0 record vs. Minnesota, with wins in the last two consecutive championship games, while Michigan Tech has never been in the championship tournament.

About Woog: Doug Woog and the Golden Gophers kept their streak of eight consecutive regular season finishes of second or better in the WCHA alive by taking six out of eight tough points from Wisconsin and St. Cloud State in the final two weeks of the regular season. The Golden Gophers would have finished in second outright if Wisconsin had not rallied to tie Michigan Tech 3-3 in overtime in Madison. With the two wins over North Dakota, Woog's career mark now stands at 247-96-19, with a .709 winning percentage. Woog has a 23-12 (.657) WCHA post-season mark and a 38-24 (.613) overall mark in post-season play. Woog and the Golden Gophers are 4-1 in the first game of the St. Paul tournament, including the 3-2 win over Wisconsin in 1990-91.

Richards Report: All-American candidate Travis Richards (Plymouth, Minn.) had another outstanding weekend for the Maroon and Gold against the Sioux. The senior captain notched a pair of power play goals and an assist. His goal on Friday night tied the game at 4-4 and his goal on Saturday cut the North Dakota lead to one goal. He is third on the team in scoring with 11 goals and 23 assists. He is now third in career goals for a blueliner with 34, and second in assists with 95. He is just three goals back of Tony Kellin (1982-86) on the goals list for defensemen and trails his older brother Todd (1985-89) on the assists lists. Richards has turned on the offense just in time for the Golden Gophers' playoff run. He has five goals and two assists in his last six games.

Newman Records Ninth Friday Night Win: Senior goaltender Tom Newman (Blaine, Minn.) recorded his ninth Friday night win last weekend when he won the opening game of the playoffs 6-4. The victory raised his record to 12-4-2 with a 3.35 GAA which is second in the WCHA. He has now won four straight Friday night starts at Mariucci Arena and will probably get the nod this Friday at the Civic Center. For the year, Newman is 9-1-2 on

Friday's and 3-3 on other days. Two weeks ago, Newman received a special honor when he was picked as one of three goalies on the West Shrine Team that will compete in the National Collegiate Hockey Coaches Association Shrine All-Star Classic on April 10 at the University of Maine. Newman has a 48-20-6 career record at Minnesota with a 3.51 career GAA (7th all-time), and he is fifth in games played with 88.

Callinan Steps Forward: Sophomore goaltender Jeff Callinan (Minnetonka, Minn.) has stepped forward in the past three weeks notching two wins and two ties and limiting the opponents to nine goals in four games. In the process he lowered his GAA to 3.83 with a 7-4-5 record. His consistent play has solidified the team's goaltending situation.

Johnson Leads Golden Gophers: All-American and All-WCHA candidate Craig Johnson continues to lead the Golden Gophers in scoring with 20 goals and 24 assists. His eight power play goals and two short-handed goals are tops on the team as well. Johnson had an outstanding weekend against the Sioux when he had four assists and the game-winning goal in overtime on Saturday night. The reunited line of Johnson, Darby Hendrickson and Scott Bell (St. Paul, Minn.), was very effective notching three even strength goals. With Bell and Hendrickson healthy, this line could be a big factor in the playoffs.

Nielsen Notches his 20th Goal: Junior wing Jeff Nielsen (Grand Rapids, Minn.) notched his 20th goal of the season on Saturday and it looked to be the game-winner until Darcy Mitani tied the game with just over two minutes left. Nielsen is having a banner year for the Maroon and Gold with 20 goals and 18 assists. The 20 goals ties him for the team lead with Craig Johnson. The fast skating Nielsen is also a big player on the Golden Gopher specialty teams. Nielsen had the game-winner on Friday night and has tallied seven goals against the Sioux this year.

The Series: The Golden Gophers' series with the Wisconsin Badgers is one of the finest in collegiate hockey. Minnesota leads the all-time series 100-60-13. The Badgers took three points from the Golden Gophers in November in Minneapolis, and the Maroon and Gold answered by taking three points in Madison three weeks ago. There have been countless WCHA and NCAA playoff games between these teams, including the infamous 1981 NCAA title game which the Badgers won over a heavily-favored Minnesota team. The Badgers hold the edge 12-10 in post-season games all-time, with Doug Woog holding a 6-4 career record against the Badgers in

post-season play. The all-time records listed by the two schools differ due to the fact that the UW does not recognize the games played in the 1920's between the two teams.

Brink Adds Spark: Freshman Andy Brink (Bemidji, Minn.) has been a big addition to the Minnesota lineup since he joined the team's lineup for the Minnesota-Duluth series in Duluth. He has played in 16 games and has four goals and eight assists. He is centering a line that consists of three players from Northern Minnesota, in John Brill (Grand Rapids, Minn.) and Jeff Nielsen. This past weekend they had four goals and were instrumental in the two comebacks. Brink's speed and passing ability make him a very exciting player to watch. Since he started playing the team has a 9-4-3 record.

Brill Leads the Way: Senior John Brill had one of his finest weekends as a Golden Gopher and probably his best game as a collegiate player on Friday night. Brill was the player who ignited the Minnesota rally that led to the come-from-behind victory over the Sioux. With the Golden Gophers trailing 4-2 late in the second period, Brill took a pass from Nielsen and danced around the North Dakota defender and putting the shot high in the corner of the net to cut the Sioux lead and breath life into the team. His play as a fore checker and on the penalty-killing unit was outstanding. Mid-way through the third period he stole a pass and helped set up Jeff Nielsen with the game-winner. He has four goals in his last four games and is playing inspired hockey.

McAlpine on the Attack: Junior Chris McAlpine (Roseville, Minn.) is having his finest year as a Golden Gopher. The hard-hitting defenseman has been outstanding defending his own zone all year and has also added an explosive offensive attack to his game. He has 13 goals to lead Minnesota blueliners and was first in the WCHA in goals in that category as well. He has an outside shot at Randy Skarda's single-season goal record of 19 (1987-88). He currently is tied with Reed Larson (1975-76). He is eighth on the team in scoring with 13 goals and nine assists, and is third in power play goals with six.

Broadcast Coverage: The entire Minnesota/Wisconsin WCHA playoff game will be live on KFAN-AM 1130 with Greg Harrington, Lou Nanne and Pat Micheletti calling all of the action. Friday and Saturday's playoff action can be seen locally on a pay-per-view basis on local cable television outlets. The cost is \$9.95 for single games and \$19.95 for the entire four-game package. Wally Shaver, Frank Mazzocco and Jim Rich will call all of the action, with Marsh Ness and Tom Mee Jr. producing.

GOPHERS BREAK FOR FINALS

The Golden Gopher baseball squad is idle this week because of final exams before returning to action next Monday (March 22), when they begin a three-game non-conference series at Kansas State.

The series will be the first meeting ever between the two schools.

Offensively, the Golden Gophers (6-6) have been led by All-American candidate Mark Merila (Jr., Plymouth, Minn.). Merila, who will be a candidate for Team USA this summer, is hitting .400 (18 for 45). Ryan Lefebvre (Sr., Los Angeles, Calif.) is hitting .341. Adam Sobocienski (Sr., Barrington, Ill.) leads the Golden Gophers, who are hitting .290 as a team, with 15 RBI. Charlie Nelson (Jr., Perham, Minn.), who hit two home runs in 58 games last season, leads the Golden Gophers with three home runs.

Coach John Anderson: Anderson, who is in his 12th season as the Golden Gophers' coach, is nearing a milestone. Anderson has directed the Golden Gophers to a record of 390-258-3. Early next month Anderson should become one of the youngest coaches in NCAA history to win 400 games. Anderson assumed his position in the fall of 1981 -- at the age of 26.

This summer, Anderson will serve as the head coach of Team USA. Anderson, who was a Team USA assistant in 1991, will direct Team USA on its 45-game schedule, which will include competition at the World University Games in Buffalo, International Cup in Italy and a trip to Cuba.

Big Ten Opener: Following the series at Kansas State, the Golden Gophers will return home to play host to Michigan, March 27-28, at the Metrodome, in their Big Ten opener. The Golden Gophers, the defending Big Ten champions, played their first 16 conference games on the road in 1992.

The Golden Gophers finished in second place (behind Ohio State) with an 18-10 Big Ten record in 1992 before capturing the Big Ten championship in the conference's playoffs at Columbus, Ohio.

The Big Ten title was Minnesota's fourth under coach Anderson's direction. The Big Ten title -- the 17th overall -- was the 15th for the Golden Gophers since 1956.

Minnesota last won back-to-back conference titles in 1973 and 1974. Current Minnesota Twin and future Hall of Famer Dave Winfield was a member of the 1973 squad, which finished third at the College World Series.

GOLDEN GOPHERS BREAK FOR FINALS

The Golden Gopher tennis squad, ranked No. 20 in the nation, is idle this week before returning to action next Monday in Hawaii.

From March 22-28, the Golden Gophers, who are 12-2, will compete at the Hawaii Tournament, at Honolulu, Hawaii. Among the teams competing at Hawaii are Tennessee (ranked No. 5), Washington, Chaminade, Ohio State and Brigham Young. Last month, the Golden Gophers defeated Washington, 4-3, en route to a 3-0 record and first place at the Washington Invitational.

The Golden Gophers have been led by a trio of seniors. Rick Naumoff (Sr., Columbus, Ohio), who is ranked No. 41 in the ITA individual rankings, leads Minnesota with a

24-8 record. Mehdi Benyebka (Sr., Oran, Algeria) is 17-7 and Dean Hlushko (Sr. Arden Hills, Minn.) is 15-5.

Last week: The Golden Gophers defeated Iowa, 7-0, Friday night at the 98th Street Racquet Club in their Big Ten home opener. The victory extended the Golden Gophers' Big Ten winning streak to 15 matches and equalled the longest conference winning streak in school history. Minnesota is 2-0 in the Big Ten this season. The other 15-match conference winning streak was 13 straight matches in 1986 and the first two of 1987.

Last Monday, the Golden Gophers were edged by No. 16 TCU, 4-3, in the championship match of the Corpus Christi Tournament. The Golden Gophers won three matches -- including a 6-0 victory over No. 6 North Carolina -- to reach the championship match.

WRESTLING

SEVEN GOPHERS COMPETE AT NCAA MEET

Big Ten heavyweight champion Billy Pierce (Fr., Minneapolis) and six other Golden Gophers wrestlers will compete this week at the NCAA Wrestling Championships.

The NCAA's 63rd annual meet will be held Thursday through Sunday at Iowa State's Hilton Coliseum, in Ames, Iowa.

The seven wrestlers that have qualified for the NCAA meet is the second most in school history. In 1979, eight Golden Gophers qualified for the NCAA meet. Minnesota, which was ranked No. 8 in the final regular-season poll, had a school-record 21 victories this season, while compiling a 21-3-1 record.

The other Minnesota wrestlers who will compete at the NCAA meet are 167-pounder Brett Colombini (So., Redwood Valley, Calif.), a Big Ten runnerup; 158-pounder Michael Marzetta (Sr., Liberty Lake, Wash.); 126-pounder Tim Harris (So., St. Louis, Mo.); 150-pounder Willy Short (Jr., Inver Grove Heights, Minn.); 177-pounder Brad Gibson (Jr., Chokio, Minn.); and, Chad Carlson (So., Pennock, Minn.). 190-pounder Jason Klohs (So., Maple Grove, Minn.) is an NCAA alternate.

Carlson, Harris, Marzetta and Short qualified for the NCAA meet for the second time. Marzetta finished seventh

at last year's meet to earn All-American honors. Marzetta was the only one of six Golden Gopher qualifiers to place at the meet (Minnesota finished in a tie for 21st place with 14.5 points). Harris did not place at 134 pounds and Carlson did not place at 142, while Short, who redshirted last season, did not place in 1991.

Pierce, who was ranked No. 2 in the final individual poll, leads the Golden Gophers with 43 victories and 12 pins in 45 matches. Pierce is the first Golden Gopher heavyweight since 1953 (Willis Wood) to win a Big Ten championship and just the third Golden Gopher wrestler to win a Big Ten championship as a freshman. Keith Nix won at 118 pounds in 1988, while Verne Gagne won in 1944.

Marzetta, who was ranked No. 3, is 40-6 this season and 104-47-1 in his career. Short, ranked No. 4, is 28-3. Colombini, who has wrestled at 167 and 177, is 36-4 after going 16-15-1 last season. Harris, who was 29-13 last season as a freshman, is 38-12. Gibson, who missed part of the season due to mononucleosis, is 21-5 after winning his first 10 matches. Colombini and Gibson are ranked No. 6 in their respective weight classes while Harris is ranked No. 9.

The Golden Gophers finished in a tie for 21st place (with 14.5 points) at the 1992 NCAA meet.

BIG TEN GYMNASTICS CHAMPIONSHIPS SET FOR THIS WEEKEND

The University of Minnesota Athletic Department will be hosting the 85th Annual Big Ten Gymnastics Championships this weekend in the Bierman Field Athletic Building, as the Golden Gophers seek their fourth conference title in as many seasons.

As has been the case in recent years with the conference men's gymnastics championship, the competition features teams in the top 20 in the nation - Ohio State is No. 1, Minnesota is No. 4, Michigan State is No. 9, Penn State is No. 11, Illinois is No. 12, Iowa is No. 13, and Michigan is No. 17.

The 1993 championships will feature Olympian and two-time NCAA all-around champion **John Roethlisberger** (Afton, Minn.) as he competes in his final Big Ten meet, and **Kerry Huston** (Spring, Texas), last

Ohio State returns two members who were individual event champions at the Big Ten Championships last season in Kip Simons on still rings and parallel bars, and Jim Knopp on the horizontal bar.

Team competition begins Saturday at 7:30 p.m. Compulsories for the all-around competition start Sunday at noon, and individual event finals begin at 6:00 p.m.

ERIKSSON & MURRELL LEAD GOLDEN GOPHERS TO SIXTH-PLACE FINISH AT NCAA INDOOR CHAMPIONSHIPS

Junior **Martin Eriksson** (Stockholm, Sweden) won the pole vault title with a school record mark of 18-0 1/2 at the NCAA Indoor Track & Field Championships on Saturday at the Hoosier Dome in Indianapolis.

Coupled with senior **Chris Murrell's** (Grand Island, Neb.) runner-up finish with a school record leap of 7-4 1/4 in Friday's high jump competition, the Golden Gophers scored 18 points and finished sixth overall in the final team standings.

at 18-0 1/2, but Martin Eriksson won the title based on fewer misses. Lawrence Johnson and Justin Daler of Tennessee finished second and third, respectively. Nick Hysong of Arizona State was fourth, and David Cox of Fresno State was fifth.

An Elite Group: Martin Eriksson becomes only the second Golden Gopher to ever win an indoor track & field national title. Ron Backes, a member of the U.S. Olympic Team in Barcelona last summer, won the shot put crown in 1986. Eriksson is also only the second Golden Gopher to ever win a national pole vault crown. Jack DeField won back-to-back NCAA outdoor pole vault titles in 1942 and 1943 with identical vaults of 14-1.

Murrell Shines: Chris Murrell broke his own indoor school record with his runner-up leap of 7-4 1/4 at the NCAA meet. He had set the previous record of 7-3 as a freshman at the 1990 Big Ten Championships. A three-time Big Ten champion, he has now collected three All-America certificates as well during his brilliant career.

Goldstein Finishes 11th: Senior **Chad Goldstein** (St. Louis Park, Minn.) turned in a fine effort as well for the Golden Gophers at the NCAA Championships. He finished 11th in the shot put on Friday with a throw of 58-8 3/4.

Clem Haskins' Golden Gopher basketball team (18-10, 9-9 Big Ten) will play host to Oklahoma (20-11, 7-7 Big Eight) in a second round National Invitation Tournament (NIT) game at 6:30 p.m. Monday at Target Center in Minneapolis.

Broadcast Coverage: Monday's game will be televised nationally on ESPN. WCCO-AM 830 is the exclusive radio voice of Golden Gopher basketball with Ray Christensen calling the action.

Coach Haskins: Clem Haskins is in his seventh season at the helm of the University of Minnesota basketball program. After rebuilding the program in his first two seasons, he has now directed the Golden Gophers to post-season tournament action in four of the past five seasons. He has registered a record of 107-100 at Minnesota. In his 13th season overall, he has logged a 208-173 record. He is 1-1 at Minnesota, and 1-2 overall, in NIT games.

A Closer Look: Voshon Lenard scored a game-high 15 points to pace Minnesota to a 74-66 win over Florida in a first round NIT game before 11,944 fans at Target Center last Wednesday. It marked the Golden Gophers' first-ever appearance at Target Center. Randy Carter (14), Arriel McDonald (12) and Dana Jackson (11) joined Lenard in double figures as the Golden Gophers rallied from an early 9-1 deficit to advance to the second round. Behind 22 points from Ryan Minor, Oklahoma came away with a thrilling 88-86 victory over Michigan State in a first round contest at Norman last Wednesday.

Minnesota & The NIT: This is Minnesota's sixth appearance (1973, 1980, 1981, 1983, 1992, 1993) in the NIT, and following last Wednesday's win over Florida, the Golden Gophers go into Monday's second round game against Oklahoma with an overall record of 8-5 in the tournament. Led by Kevin McHale, the Golden Gophers advanced to the NIT championship game in 1980 where they lost 58-55 to the Ralph Sampson-led Virginia Cavaliers.

Series Record: Oklahoma holds a 3-2 edge in the all-time series, but Minnesota leads 2-1 in games played in

Minneapolis. The Sooners won the last game between the two schools, a 60-56 decision over the Golden Gophers in Norman back on Dec. 3, 1960.

Common Opponents: Minnesota and Florida have two common opponents this season...Iowa State and Michigan State. The Sooners defeated Michigan State 88-86 at home last Wednesday in the first round of the NIT. The Golden Gophers split the season series with Michigan State, winning 64-57 in the Big Ten opener at Williams Arena, and then falling 75-63 to the Spartans in the rematch at East Lansing. Playing without two injured starters (Arriel McDonald and Randy Carter), the Golden Gopher were routed 99-65 by Iowa State in Ames. The Sooners split the season series with Iowa State, falling 81-74 in overtime in Ames, and then taking the rematch 81-77 in Norman.

Injury Woes: The Golden Gophers have battled injuries all season long, and remarkably, bounced back to secure their fourth post-season tournament berth in the past five seasons. Due to injuries, the team's regular lineup (Carter, Walton, Kolander, Lenard and McDonald) has been healthy enough to start together as a full group in just 11 of 28 games this season. The Golden Gophers have been forced to go with eight different starting lineups this season.

Lenard Lights It Up: A second-team All-Big Ten selection this season, Voshon Lenard is ranked first on the team in scoring at 16.6 points a game. He has scored in double figures in 22 games, and has led or tied for the team-high in scoring in 16 games. He has 10, 20-point games to his credit, which includes a career-high 32-points against Iowa on Feb. 13. Going into the Oklahoma game, Lenard has made 46 three-pointers and attempted 136 this season. His career totals are 97 and 280, respectively. Willie Burton set the single-season school record in 1989-90 with 52 three-pointers. As a freshman last season, Lenard set the school record with 144 attempts. Kevin Lynch (1987-91) holds the school career records of 117 successful three-pointers and 298 attempts. In addition, Lenard is already ranked 10th on the school's all-time list with 90 steals.

McDonald Watch: Arriel McDonald is ranked second on the all-time school career assists list with 350. Marc Wilson (1983-86) is the leader with 375. McDonald is also ranked sixth in all-time steals with 114. Melvin Newbern (1987-90) is the leader with 215 career steals.

Looking Ahead: Third round NIT games will be held either Wednesday or Thursday (sites and game times TBA). The semifinals (Monday, March 29) and finals (Wednesday, March 31) will be held at Madison Square Garden in New York.

GOLDEN GOPHERS WIN WCHA FINAL FIVE TOURNAMENT; ADVANCE TO NCAA EAST REGIONAL VS. CLARKSON

The University of Minnesota hockey team continued its late-season surge by winning the WCHA Final Five Championship at the St. Paul Civic Center and earning the league's automatic bid to the NCAA Tournament. The tournament victory was the first for Head Coach Doug Woog and his charges in five appearances in the championship game. With their NCAA post-season chances in jeopardy despite defeating the Wisconsin Badgers 3-2 in overtime in the first round, the Golden Gophers faced the difficult task of playing the two-time defending champions of the tournament, the Northern Michigan Wildcats.

The Wildcats had won eight straight games at the Civic Center and had beaten Minnesota 4-2 in the last two consecutive championship games. But this time it was the Golden Gophers who prevailed, as they held on to win 5-3. The Golden Gophers were named the number six seed in the West and will travel to Worcester, Mass., to compete in the NCAA East Regional. The Golden Gophers were named the number five seed in the West, so they will play number four seed Clarkson, Friday, March 26, at the Centrum in Worcester. Minnesota leads all teams in the tournament with 20 appearances and nine consecutive appearances.

Four WCHA Teams In NCAA Tournament: The big surprise of the NCAA Tournament pairings was the fact that the WCHA got four teams into the tournament. There was some speculation that as few as two would get in, due to Wisconsin's woes the past few weeks and the fact that Northern Michigan was a fifth-place team during the regular season. UMD received the highest bid with the fourth seed in the West, they will play Brown. Wisconsin was named the sixth seed in the East and will play Miami of Ohio, while Northern Michigan was named the sixth seed in the West and will play Harvard.

On a Roll: The Golden Gophers will enter the NCAA Tournament on a four-game winning streak and a 10-game unbeaten streak. The Maroon and Gold has posted an impressive 11-1-2 record in the last 14 games, including two overtime victories in the WCHA playoffs. That record means that this year's edition of "Minnesota's Pride on Ice" will enter the NCAA tournament as the hottest team ever during Woog's tenure.

About the Wooger: Head Coach Doug Woog is in his eighth year at the helm of the Golden Gophers. He has taken his team to eight consecutive NCAA Tournaments, including four championship round appearances. In addition, Woog has led the Golden Gophers to three MacNaughton Cup championships and his teams have never finished any lower than second in the WCHA. His

career record at Minnesota is 249-96-19, with a .710 winning percentage. Woog has a 40-24 overall post-season record and a 15-12 record in NCAA Tournament games. He is 5-2 in the first game of the NCAA Playoffs with two of those victories coming at Mariucci Arena. The first two year's of Woog's tenure saw him traveling to the Boston area for the first NCAA playoff game and coming away with victories (6-4 over B.U. in 1985-86, and 4-1 over B.C. in 1986-87).

Vindication in St. Paul: The Golden Gophers two victories in St. Paul not only locked up the automatic bid to the NCAA Tournament, it also ended a losing streak of five games in tournament championships and evened Woog's record at the Civic Center to 6-6.

Richards Report: All-American candidate Travis Richards (Plymouth, Minn.) had another outstanding weekend for the Maroon and Gold. The senior captain was named the MVP of the WCHA Tournament. He is third on the team in scoring with 12 goals and a team-high 25 assists. He is now second in career goals for a blueliner with 35, and second in assists with 97. He is just two goals back of Tony Kellin's record of 37. Richards has turned on the offense just in time for the Golden Gophers' playoff run and he will be in the middle of any success the team has the rest of the way.

Johnson Leads Golden Gophers: All-American and All-WCHA candidate Craig Johnson (St. Paul, Minn.) continues to lead the Golden Gophers in scoring with 21 goals and 24 assists. His eight power play goals and two short-handed goals are tops on the team as well. He was named to the WCHA Final Five All-Tournament Team.

Next Up: The Golden Gophers' series with Clarkson is limited to two games. The two teams met in the first round of the NCAA Tournament in 1989-90 at Mariucci Arena when the Maroon and Gold swept two games from the Golden Knights, 6-1, 5-1. Clarkson (20-9-5), won the ECAC post-season tournament.

Mac Attack: Golden Gopher junior defenseman Chris McAlpine (Roseville, Minn) has been a big contributor on offense this year. He has 14 goals and nine assists which leaves him tied with Barry Richter of Wisconsin for the WCHA lead from the blueline. His 14 goals gives him a chance of surpassing Randy Skarda's school record of 19 in 1987-88. He currently ranks fourth on that list.

Newman Beats Badgers: Senior goaltender Tom Newman recorded his 13th win of the season and his first over the Badgers when he held them to two goals in the Golden Gophers 3-2 overtime victory in the first round of the tournament. Newman has lowered his GAA to 3.24 and is 6-0 in his last seven starts.

GOLDEN GOPHERS AT HAWAII TOURNAMENT

After ten days off for final exams, the Golden Gopher tennis team, ranked No. 20 in the nation, returns to action Monday at the Hawaii Invitational.

Monday's match against Chaminade will be the first of five matches in Hawaii for the Golden Gophers. On Tuesday, Minnesota will play BYU-Hawaii, followed by Ohio State on Wednesday, Tennessee on Friday after a day off and, Washington on Saturday in the week-long round-robin tournament.

Minnesota will take a 12-2 record into the tournament. The Golden Gophers have already met Washington once this season -- beating the Huskies, 4-3, last month in Seattle en route to the championship at the Washington

Invitational.

Minnesota last saw action on March 12 against Big Ten rival Iowa, at the 98th Street Racquet Club. The Golden Gophers won 7-0 to improve to 2-0 in the Big Ten so far this season. The victory was the 15th consecutive conference victory for the defending Big Ten Champion Golden Gophers.

The Golden Gophers have been led by Rick Naumoff (Sr., Columbus, Ohio). Naumoff, who is ranked No. 41 in the ITA rankings, is 24-8.

Next: Following the Hawaii Tournament, the Golden Gophers will return home April 9 for four consecutive Big Ten home matches -- Michigan, Michigan St., Northwestern and Wisconsin (April 9, 10, 16 and 17).

WRESTLING

HIGHLY-SUCCESSFUL SEASON OVER

The University of Minnesota wrestling team concluded one of its most successful seasons ever, with a ninth-place finish this past weekend at the NCAA Championships, hosted by Iowa State, at Ames, Iowa.

Four Golden Gopher wrestlers earned All-American status (by finishing in the top eight of their respective weight classes) for Minnesota, which scored 36.5 points. Iowa earned its third consecutive NCAA Championship by scoring 123.75 points.

The ninth-place finish (1.25 points behind eighth-place Fresno State and just two points behind seventh-place North Carolina State) is the fourth Top Ten finish at the NCAA meet in the past five seasons.

Willy Short (Jr., Inver Grove Heights, Minn.) placed third at 150 pounds to pace the Minnesota wrestlers. Billy Pierce (Fr., Minneapolis, Minn.) finished fifth at heavy-weight. Brad Gibson (Jr., Chokio, Minn.) placed fifth at 177 pounds, while Tim Harris (So., St. Louis, Mo.) placed eighth at 128 pounds.

The four All-Americans gives Minnesota coach J Robinson 16 All-Americans in his seven seasons with the Golden Gophers. The Golden Gophers also had four All-Americans in 1989.

Three other Golden Gopher wrestlers competed at the NCAA meet (the seven qualifiers is the second-most in school history), but did not place: 167-pounder Brett Colombini (So., Redwood Valley, Calif.); 158-pounder Michael Marzetta (Sr., Liberty Lake, Wash.) and Chad Carlson (So., Pennock, Mn.).

Six of the seven NCAA qualifiers for the Golden Gophers were underclassmen.

Pierce, who won the Big Ten heavyweight championship, finished the season with a 47-4 record and 13 pins. The team-high 47 wins is the fourth-highest single-season victory total in school history.

Harris finished the season with a 41-15 record to improve his career record to 70-28. Marzetta finished the season with a 40-7 record and a career record of 104-48-1. Marzetta's 104 wins are the 10th most in school history. After going 16-15-1 last season as a freshman, Colombini finished the season with a 38-6 record. Short's 33-4 record improved his three-year career mark of 83-28-2. Gibson finished 25-8, while Carlson finished 21-13.

The Golden Gophers, who won a school-record 21 duals in 1992-93, finished in a tie for 21st place (with 14.5 points) at the 1992 NCAA meet.

GOLDEN GOPHERS SWIMMING & DIVING TEAM HEADED TO NCAA CHAMPIONSHIP

The Golden Gopher swimming & diving team is headed for Indianapolis, Ind., this weekend (March 25-27) to take part in the 1993 Swimming & Diving Championships. Minnesota will try to improve on their sixth-place finish last season with five point scorers returning.

BASEBALL

GOLDEN GOPHERS BEGIN BUSY STRETCH

After a 15-day layoff, the Golden Gopher baseball team returns to action this week with seven games in the next seven days. On Monday, the Golden Gophers will begin a three-game nonconference series at Kansas State. The series will be the first meeting ever between the two schools.

The Golden Gophers (6-6) have not played since a 11-3 loss to top-ranked Georgia Tech, March 7, at the Metrodome, in the Oscar Mayer Classic.

Offensively, the Golden Gophers have been led by All-American candidate **Mark Merila** (Jr., Plymouth, Minn.). Merila, who will be a candidate for Team USA this summer, is hitting .400 (18 for 45). **Ryan Lefebvre** (Sr., Los Angeles, Calif.) is hitting .341. **Adam Sobocienski** (Sr., Barrington, Ill.) leads the Golden Gophers, who are hitting .290 as a team, with 15 RBI. **Charlie Nelson** (Jr., Perham, Minn.), who hit two home runs in 58 games last season, leads the Golden Gophers with three home runs.

Coach John Anderson: Anderson, who is in his 12th season as the Golden Gophers' coach, is nearing a milestone. Anderson has directed the Golden Gophers to a record of 390-258-3. Early next month, the 37-year old Anderson should become one of the youngest coaches in NCAA history to win 400 games. Anderson assumed the Minnesota position in the fall of 1981 -- at the age of 26.

This summer, Anderson will serve as the head coach of Team USA. Anderson, who was a Team USA assistant in 1991, will direct Team USA on its 45-game schedule,

which will include competition at the World University Games in Buffalo, the International Cup in Italy and games against Cuba.

Big Ten Opener: Following the series at Kansas State, the Golden Gophers will return home to play host to Michigan, Saturday and Sunday at the Metrodome, in their Big Ten opener. The Golden Gophers and Michigan will play a doubleheader each day at 1 p.m.

The Golden Gophers finished in second place (behind Ohio State) with an 18-10 Big Ten record in 1992 before capturing the Big Ten championship at the conference playoffs at Columbus, Ohio. The Big Ten title was Minnesota's fourth (1982, 1985, 1988 and 1992) under Anderson's direction. The Big Ten title -- the school's 17th overall -- was the 15th for the Golden Gophers since 1956.

The Opponents: Kansas State, coached by Mike Clark, has 12 returning lettermen from a squad which compiled a 28-28 record in 1992. The Wildcats are led by catcher/outfielder **Brian Culp** and pitcher **Dan Driskill**. Culp and Driskill were second-team all-Big Eight in 1992.

Michigan, coached by former major-leaguer **Bill Freehan**, won just three of its first 13 games this season. The Wolverines were 21-32 overall and 11-17 in the conference (tie for 8th place) last season. The Wolverines' top returning player is first baseman **Scott Winterlee**, who batted .351 last season.

Michigan leads the all-time series between the two schools, 56-45, but the Golden Gophers won three of four games last year in Ann Arbor.

**GOLDEN GOPHERS FINISH SECOND AT GYM-
NASTICS CHAMPIONSHIPS; ROETHLISBERGER
WINS FOURTH STRAIGHT ALL-AROUND TITLE**

For the first time in four years the Golden Gophers are not atop the Big Ten in gymnastics, as the Ohio State Buckeyes dethroned the three-time defending Big Ten Champions in the annual conference championship, in the Bierman Field Complex. Ohio State last claimed the Big Ten title in gymnastics in 1987.

The Buckeyes scored a team high 283.825 points, Minnesota finished second with a score of 282.15, Michigan State was third with 276.55, followed by Illinois with 275.75, Michigan with 275.05, Penn State with 275.025, and Iowa with 274.45. The Buckeyes never trailed in the meet as they were paced by James Knopp who won the parallel bars and horizontal bar during the team finals.

Senior John Roethlisberger (Afton, Minn.) won the all-around competition in championship for the fourth straight season, as well as the Big Ten Gymnast of the Year award. It marked the first time in the 91 year history of Big Ten gymnastics that an individual has won the all-around title for four straight seasons. Roethlisberger was in third-place after scoring 57.025 (55.25 compulsaries) in the optionals portion of the all-around competition. Fellow teammate Kerry Huston (Spring, Texas) slipped to fourth-place with a score of 109.05 (51.70 compulsaries)


after leading competition after the first day. Ohio State's Kip Simons and James Knopp finished second and third respectively for the Buckeyes. Simons scored a 110.35 (53.25 compulsaries) and Knopp added a 110.225 (53.30 compulsaries). Golden Gopher Brian Yee (Houston, Texas) rounded out the top five by finishing fifth with a score of 107.60 (52.85 compulsaries).

In other event finals Kerry Huston captured the floor exercise with a score of 9.60, as the Golden Gophers finished 1-2-3 in the event with Yee finishing second and Roethlisberger third. On the pommel horse Roethlisberger tied with Ohio State's Jim Knopp to claim top honors in that event and won the vault. Iowa's Adrian Besancon won the still rings with a score of 9.85.



The 20-Win Mark: With Wednesday's win over USC at the Met Center, Minnesota secured its sixth 20-win season in school history. The Golden Gophers also won 20 or more games in 1972-73 (21-5), 1976-77 (24-3), 1979-80 (21-11), 1981-82 (23-6) and 1989-90 (23-9).

The Homecourt Advantage: Recognized as some of the finest fans in all of college basketball, Minnesota fans came out in full force once again to support their Golden Gophers in the NIT. Attendance for the three home NIT games was a combined 45,591...an average of 15,197 a game. Including the three post-season games, the Golden Gophers finished the season with a sparkling 17-2 (14-2 at Williams Arena) record at home. The only two losses at home were to Indiana and Michigan.

GOLDEN GOPHERS CLOSE OUT SEASON WITH LOSS TO NUMBER-RANKED MAINE

The University of Minnesota hockey team closed out its 1992-93 season with a disappointing 6-2 loss to the Maine Black Bears at the NCAA East Regional in Worcester, Mass. The Golden Gophers finished the year with a 22-12-8 record and their ninth consecutive appearance in the NCAA Quarterfinals. The Golden Gophers have appeared in the NCAA Tournament 20 times which was the most of any team in the tournament.

Worcester Recap: The Golden Gophers started their NCAA post-season drive with a tightly contested 2-1 victory over the Clarkson Golden Knights. Clarkson was one of the hottest teams in the country and was a pre-season favorite to make the NCAA Tournament. Tom Newman (Blaine, Minn.) finished out his career in style winning his 50th victory as a Golden Gopher and giving the Maroon and Gold a shot at the Black Bears. Newman stopped 28 of 29 shots, including 10 in a scoreless second period when the Golden Knights outshot the Golden Gophers 10 to 6. Minnesota's scoring was limited to a pair of beautiful top shelfers by Tony Bianchi (Bloomington, Minn.) and Craig Johnson (St. Paul, Minn.). Bianchi nailed his on the power play in the first period, while Johnson netted the game winner at 2:47 of the third period.

The Finale: The final game of the year vs. Maine was a typical post-season battle. Minnesota narrowly missed a goal in the opening moments when the puck went off the post and wide. Maine took charge on a pair of power play goals. Minnesota battled the top-ranked Black Bears to the wire, but couldn't find the twine. The Maroon and Gold fired 22 shots at former Olympian Mike Dunham, but the veteran proved too much as he limited the Golden Gophers to two goals, and in doing so, brought a halt to the season.

On a Roll: The Golden Gophers finished the season on a roll, winning 12 of their last 16 games and losing only two in that stretch. That fine rebound from a tough January put the Golden Gophers into the playoffs. The charge was led by the three seniors on the team; Newman, Travis Richards (Plymouth, Minn.) and John Brill (Grand Rapids, Minn.). Those three players will be sorely missed, but the leadership, determination and heart they demonstrated down the stretch will provide the model that the younger players on the team must follow.

About the Wooger: Head Coach Doug Woog finished his eighth season at the helm of the Golden Gopher program with another winning season. He has taken his team to eight consecutive NCAA Tournaments, including four championship round appearances. In addition, Woog has led the Golden Gophers to three MacNaughton Cup championships and his teams have never finished any lower than second in the WCHA. His career record at Minnesota is 250-97-19. Woog has a 41-25 overall post-season record and a 16-13 record in NCAA Tournament games. He is 6-2 in the first game of the NCAA Playoffs with two of those victories coming at Mariucci Arena. The Golden Gophers two victories in St. Paul gave the team's its first WCHA Tournament Championship under Woog. It also ended a losing streak of five games in tournament championships and evened Woog's record at the Civic Center to 6-6.

Richards Report: All-American candidate finished his career with the Golden Gophers as only the captain should. He put his heart and body on the line every game this season and the numbers that he produced only begin to tell the story of this fine player. The senior captain finished his career with 35 goals and 97 assists. He was named the MVP of the WCHA Tournament for his efforts in helping the Golden Gophers win the Broadmoor Cup. This year he finished third on the team in scoring with 12 goals and a team-high 26 assists. He is now second in career goals for a blueliner with 35, and second in assists with 98. He finished his career just two goals back of Tony Kellin's record of 37.

Johnson Leads Golden Gophers: All-American Craig Johnson finished the season as the team's leading scorer with 22 goals and 24 assists. His eight power play goals and two short-handed goals are tops on the team as well. He was named to the WCHA Final Five All-Tournament Team and was an Honorable Mention All-WCHA pick.

Hockey Banquet: The 1993 Golden Gopher Blueline Hockey Banquet is slated for April 18, at the Minneapolis, Metrodome Hilton. Reservations are due in by April 14. For more information call the Golden Gopher hockey office at 625-2886.

While in Hawaii, the Golden Gophers defeated Chaminade, 6-0, Brigham Young-Hawaii, 6-1, Ohio State,

6-1, and Washington, 6-1. The Golden Gophers lost to Tennessee, 6-1.

The Golden Gophers have been led by Rick Naumoff (Sr., Columbus, Ohio). Naumoff, who has moved up to No. 15 in the ITA rankings, is 25-9. Naumoff captured the title at the Spartan Invitational (the Big Ten Indoors) earlier this year.

Mehdi Benyebka (Sr., Oran, Algeria), who is ranked No. 71 in the ITA rankings, is second on the team with 18 victories.

The doubles team of Roger Anderson (Sr., New Hope, Minn.) and Dean Hlushko (Sr., Arden Hills, Minn.) is ranked No. 25 in the ITA rankings. Anderson and Hlushko have a 14-6 record. Hlushko also has 18 singles victories.

SPRING PRACTICE UNDERWAY

Spring football practice-----15 days of it-----are underway at the University of Minnesota where Jim Wacker is getting ready for his second season as head coach of the Golden Gophers.

The 1993 spring session will draw to a close with the annual Spring Game on April 24 at the Bierman Athletic Complex. A photograph-autograph session begins that day from 11:00 a.m. until noon, the football game is at 1:00 p.m. and a baseball doubleheader against Dayton follows at Siebert Field beginning at 4:00 p.m.

In addition, this year's Golden Gopher Spring Football Clinic is scheduled Friday and Saturday, April 23 and 24th during the final two days of spring practice.

Minnesota finished 2-9 in Wacker's first year at the helm of the Golden Gophers, and he knows that there is only one place to go. That's up, and he means from the 1992 last-place finish in the Big Ten Conference standings.

He'll attempt to do so with a squad build around 40 returning lettermen and another 15 redshirts from the '92 campaign. He'll try some of those gridders at new positions during the current spring drills, and all of them should make the U of M more effective in 1993.

"We'll be a much improved football team," Wacker maintains. "It will be the second time around in our system for our veterans, and that alone will make us better. But we were very young last fall, and that year has enabled our people to grow and improve."

To gain that "improved" status, Wacker's contingent will need to eliminate both physical and mental errors, gain consistency on offense and put more speed and quickness on the field defensively.

Fourteen lettermen are gone from last year's club, and that group includes seven on offense and seven more on defense. Hardest hit were the offensive line, the defensive secondary and the kicking game, but Wacker's delegation of returning lettermen includes 19 on offense and 21 on defense.

Wacker has a host of players who sat out 1992 and will get extensive trials in spring practice. Included are Jerome Davis (Jacksonville, Fla.) and Chris Bergstrom (Warroad, Minn.) at defensive end, Ogu'Nseye Akbar (Dallas, Texas) and Kevin Holmes (Detroit) at linebacker, Mark Tangen (Roseville, Minn.) at tight end., Gann Brooks (Alvarado, Texas) at offensive tackle, Rishon Early (Bellaire, Texas) at Flanker and Don Williams (New Orleans, La.) at corner-back.

Prime post-season honors candidates appear to be Dennis Cappella (Sr., DE, Miller Place, N.Y.), Antonio Carter (Sr., RB, Columbus, Ohio), Chris Darkins (So., RB, Houston, Texas), Omar Douglas (Sr., SB, New Orleans, La.), Russ Heath (Sr., LB., Aurora, Colo.), Andy Kratochvil (Sr., DE, New Prague, Minn.), and Rob Rogers (Sr., OG, St. Louis, Mo.)

GOLDEN GOPHER GYMNASTS TO COMPETE IN NCAA REGIONALS

Minnesota will compete in the East Regionals on April 3, in Champaign, Ill., at 2:00 p.m. A total of six teams and two groups of individuals qualified for East and West regionals. One group at each site consists of six all-around competitors who are not members of a selected team, and the other group consists of six individuals per event who are not members of a selected team or have not already been selected in the all-around group.

Three teams and the top three all-around competitors not on one of the qualifying teams, plus the top three individuals on each event not already qualified on a team or as an all-around competitor, will advance from each regional competition to the championship.

Last season, the number two-seeded Golden Gopher gymnasts finished third at the Eastern Regional Championships held in Iowa City, Iowa.

Roethlisberger won the vault title and tied with Ohio State's Jim Knopp on the pommel horse to claim top honors.

Fresh from a sixth-place finish at the recent NCAA Indoor Championships - the best finish in the history of the program at the indoor national meet - Head Coach Roy Griak's Golden Gopher track & field team will open their outdoor season this weekend at the Texas Relays in Austin, Texas.

Just The Facts: The 66th annual Texas Relays will be held all day on Friday and Saturday at Memorial Stadium in Austin, Texas. The meet annually features many of the

nation's outstanding college and high school competitors.

Returning Placewinners: Senior co-captain Chris Murrell (Grand Island, Neb.) finished second in the high jump at the 1992 Texas Relays with a leap of 7-3 3/4. Senior Chad Goldstein (St. Louis Park, Minn.) also returns this season after finishing sixth in the shot put a year ago with a toss of 58-9 1/2. Sophomore Keita Cline (Gainesville, Fla.), junior Norris Williams (Milwaukee, Wis.), and sophomore Jason Max (Minnetonka, Minn.) ran on the sprint medley relay team which finished sixth in the finals, after running a school record time of 3:20.74 in the prelims.

GOPHERS FINISH STRONG AT NCAAs

P.J. Bogart (Fr., Mesa, Ariz.) capped a strong Golden Gophers' showing at the NCAA Swimming and Diving Championships by capturing the national 10-meter platform diving title Saturday, at Indianapolis, Ind.

Bogart accumulated 752.65 points to become Minnesota's first men's champion in swimming or diving since Craig Lincoln won the three-meter diving title in 1972. Bogart also placed second in the three-meter springboard competition and third in the one-meter event earlier in the three-day tournament.

Bogart's performance helped the Golden Gophers to an

11th-place finish with 137.5 points. Minnesota finished sixth at the 1992 championships. Stanford easily won the team title with 520.5 points. Michigan was second with 396.

Matt Brown (Beaverton, Ore.) finished just .04 seconds off the school record in the 200-yard breaststroke with a time of 1:59.25, good for eighth place. Brown also finished 11th in the 100 breaststroke.

Bernie Zeruhn (Hamburg, Germany) finished eighth in the 200 butterfly (1:45.80). Earlier in the meet, Zeruhn set school records in the 200 freestyle (finishing 11th in 1:36.62) and in the 500 freestyle (finishing seventh in 4:21.59). **David Zarns (New Brighton, Minn.)** finished 11th in the one-meter diving.

MINNESOTA OFF TO GREAT START IN BIG 10

After opening the conference portion of their schedule in spectacular fashion, the Golden Gopher baseball squad will entertain nonconference foe Creighton, Wednesday night at the Metrodome, before travelling to Penn State for a four-game conference series next weekend.

The Golden Gophers, the defending Big Ten Conference champions, capped their four-game sweep of Michigan with a stunning come-from-behind victory in Sunday's second game. Michigan took an 8-1 lead in the series finale, but the Golden Gophers stormed back for an 11-9 victory. The Golden Gophers won Sunday's first game, 3-2, in eight innings. On Saturday, Minnesota won, 7-3, and, 5-0.

The four victories ran their winning streak to seven games and improved the Golden Gophers' record to 13-6 overall, 4-0 in the Big Ten. The Golden Gophers also swept a three-game nonconference series from Kansas State, in Manhattan, Kansas, last week. The Golden Gophers completed that series sweep with a 6-1 victory on Wednesday. Later that day, Kansas State rebounded to defeat Creighton, in Manhattan, 4-1.

Offensively, the Golden Gophers have been led by All-American candidate **Mark Merila (Jr., Plymouth, Minn.)**. Merila, who will be a candidate for Team USA this summer, is hitting .369 (24 for 65). **Shane Gunderson (Fr., Faribault, Minn.)** is second with a .333 average.

Ryan Lefebvre (Sr., Los Angeles, Calif.) is hitting .324. It was Lefebvre's two-run triple that completed Sunday's comeback for the Golden Gophers. Lefebvre's triple, with

two out in the fifth, broke a 9-9 tie. The triple was the 12th of Lefebvre's career making him the school's all-time leader in that category. Lefebvre was tied with Paul Molitor.

Adam Sobocienski (Sr., Barrington, Ill.) leads the Golden Gophers, who are hitting .299 as a team, with 17 RBI. Sobocienski had a crucial two-run double in the comeback Sunday.

Kerry Ligtenberg (Jr., Cottage Grove, Minn.) gave the Golden Gophers a big lift with a one-hit shutout in the second game of Saturday's doubleheader. It was the first complete game by a Minnesota pitcher this season.

Coach John Anderson: Anderson, who is in his 12th season as the Golden Gophers' coach, is nearing a milestone. Anderson has directed the Golden Gophers to a record of 397-258-3. As early as this week, the 37-year old Anderson should become one of the youngest coaches in NCAA history to win 400 games. Anderson assumed the Minnesota position in the fall of 1981 -- at the age of 26. against Cuba.

Anderson will coach Team USA this summer.

Penn State: Penn State brings a 1-3 conference record into this weekend's series. Penn State won its conference opener at Indiana, but the Hoosiers came back to win the next three games. Penn State is 7-6 overall. Last season, the Nittany Lions finished in a tie for eighth place in the conference standings -- their first in the Big Ten. The Nittany Lions (24-24, 11-17 in 1992) split four games with the Golden Gophers at Siebert Field.

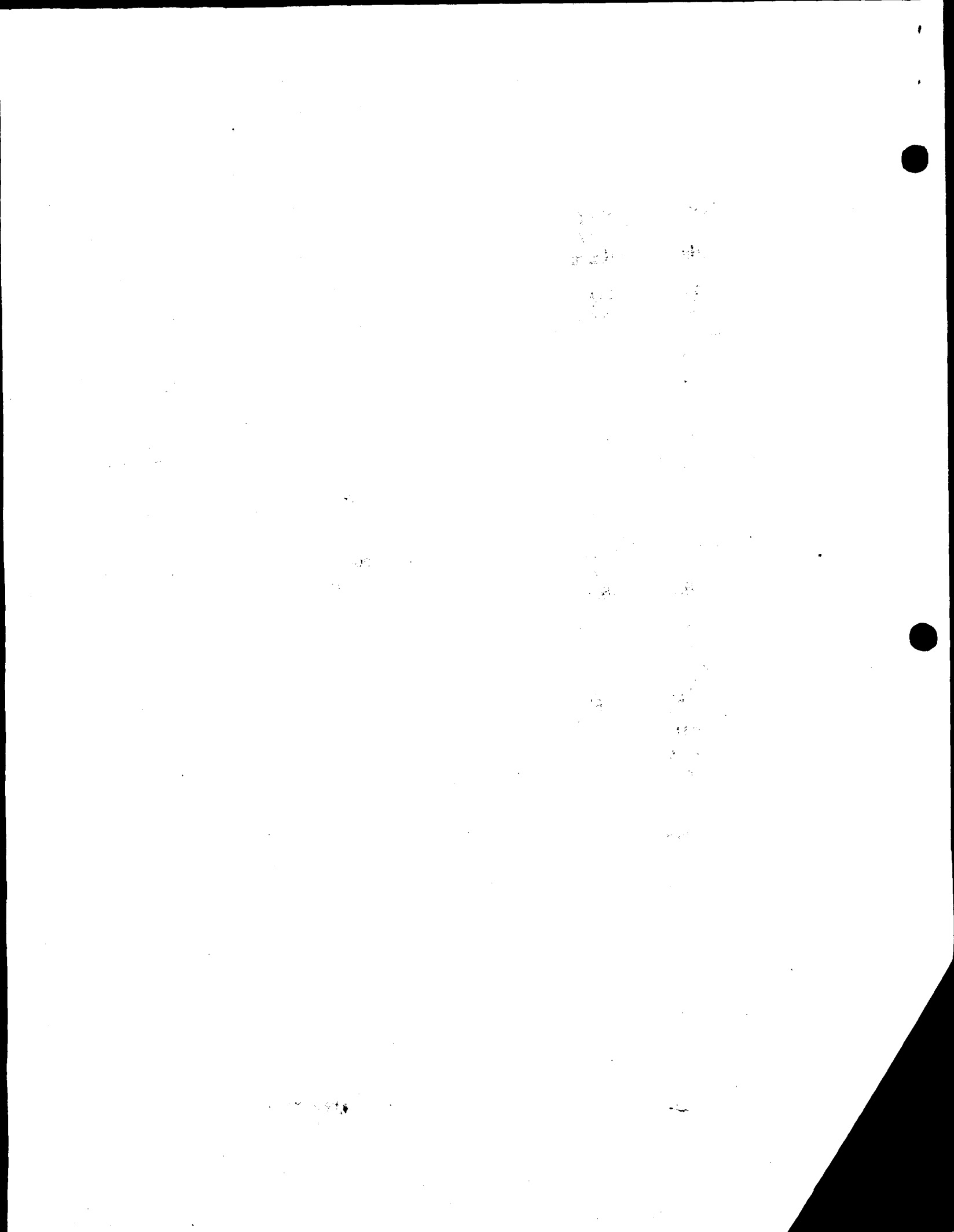

GOLDEN GOPHERS CAPTURE FIRST-EVER NIT TITLE; LENARD NAMED TOURNEY MVP

Clem Haskins' Golden Gopher basketball team (22-10, 9-9 Big Ten) ended the season in style by capturing the school's first-ever National Invitation Tournament (NIT) title last week. The Golden Gophers edged Georgetown 62-61 in the championship game Wednesday at Madison Square Garden in New York to claim the crown.

A Closer Look: Minnesota defeated Florida (74-66), Oklahoma (86-72) and USC (76-58) to reach the NIT Final Four in New York. In Monday's semifinals, sophomore **Voshon Lenard (Detroit, Mich.)** scored 25 points, including 17 in the second half, to lead the Golden Gophers to a 76-70 victory over Providence. Sophomore **Jayson Walton (Dallas, Texas)** added 16 points and seven rebounds, and junior **Randy Carter (Memphis, Tenn.)** tossed in 10 points and collected seven rebounds for the Golden Gophers. In the title game against Georgetown, junior **Arriel McDonald (Raleigh, N.C.)** scored a game-high 20 points to pace the Golden Gophers to the tight one point win over the Hoyas. Lenard added 17 points in the victory.

Coach Haskins: Clem Haskins put the appropriate finishing touches on his seventh season at the helm of the University of Minnesota basketball program by leading the Golden Gophers to the NIT title. After rebuilding the program in his first two seasons, he has now directed the Golden Gophers to post-season tournament action in four of the past five seasons. He has registered a record of 111-100 at Minnesota. In his 13th season overall, he has logged a 212-173 record. Coach Haskins' success in post-season play is certainly no secret. He has an impressive 10-3 (5-2 NCAA; 5-1 NIT) overall record in post-season tournament action at Minnesota.

Haskins Says: "We set goals when I came to Minnesota, and one of those was to someday win a national title. We will cherish this like it is an NCAA championship, and hopefully use it as a springboard for next season."

Lenard Named MVP: Voshon Lenard scored 42 points in the two games at Madison Square Garden, and a total of 99 points overall in the five tournament games, en route to being honored as the NIT MVP. In the tourney, he averaged 19.8 points a game, shot 55.6 percent (35 of 63) overall from the field, and 44.8 percent (13 of 29) from three-point range. A second-team All-Big Ten selection this season, he led the team in scoring at 17.1 points a game. He scored in double figures in 26 games, and led or tied for the

team high in scoring in 19 games. He had 12, 20-point games to his credit, which included a 32-point effort against Iowa on Feb. 13. He set single-season school records with 58 three-pointers on 158 attempts. Willie Burton set the previous single-season school record in 1989-90 with 52 three-pointers. As a freshman last season, Lenard set the previous mark in attempts with 144. Lenard has also eclipsed Kevin Lynch's (1987-91, 298) career school mark with 302 three-point attempts, and is closing in on Lynch's career record of 117. Lenard will enter next season with 109 successful three-pointers. In addition, he is also ranked eighth on the all-time school steals list with 100 thefts.

McDonald Named To All-Tournament Team: Arriel McDonald joined Voshon Lenard on the NIT all-tournament team. He scored a game-high 20 points in the victory over Georgetown. McDonald, who missed four games earlier this season following surgery to his left foot, is ranked second on the all-time school career assists list with 368. Marc Wilson (1983-86) is the career leader with 375. He is also ranked sixth on the all-time steals list with 116. An honorable mention All-Big Ten selection this season, he finished fourth on the team in scoring at 11.0 points a game, and led the team in assists (4.4) for the third straight year. He finished the season with outstanding assist-to-turnover ratios of 122-49 overall, 74-33 in conference play, and 19-8 in the five NIT games.

Minnesota & The NIT: Minnesota capped its sixth appearance (1973, 1980, 1981, 1983, 1992, 1993) in the NIT with the tournament title, and the Golden Gophers have now racked up an overall record of 12-5 in the tournament. Led by Kevin McHale, the Golden Gophers also advanced to the NIT championship game in 1980 where they lost 58-55 to the Ralph Sampson-led Virginia Cavaliers.

The 20-Win Mark: Minnesota finished 22-10 overall this year...the program's sixth season with 20 or more victories. The Golden Gophers also won 20 or more games in 1972-73 (21-5), 1976-77 (24-3), 1979-80 (21-11), 1981-82 (23-6) and 1989-90 (23-9).

Looking Ahead: The Golden Gophers certainly hope to use the NIT title as a springboard as they look ahead to the 1993-94 season. Seniors **Dana Jackson (Chicago, Ill.)** and **Nate Tubbs (Fort Wayne, Ind.)** were key performers in Gold Country throughout their careers and they will no doubt be sorely missed next season. The Golden Gophers, however, do return 88 percent of their scoring and 83 percent of their rebounding next season. Minnesota will open the 1993-94 season in the always-tough pre-season NIT.

GOLDEN GOPHERS ADVANCE TO NCAA

The Golden Gopher gymnastics squad will begin preparations for the NCAA Championships to be held April 15-17 at Albuquerque, N.M.

The Golden Gophers, who have finished in the top four at the last four NCAA Championships, qualified for this year's championships with a second-place finish at the NCAA East Regional, at Champaign, Ill., last Saturday.

Led by senior **John Roethlisberger** (Afton, Minn.) and sophomore **Kerry Huston** (Spring, Texas), the Golden Gophers finished with 280.20 points at the East Regional. Ohio State, which had edged the Golden Gophers for the Big Ten title last month, finished first with 281.80 points.

Host Illinois also qualified for the NCAA meet with a third-place score of 279.32.

Roethlisberger, the two-time defending NCAA All-Around champion, captured the All-Around title with a 57.125 score. **Roethlisberger** won the pommel horse (9.725) and still rings (9.850) competition and finished third in the floor exercise (9.650) and fourth in the parallel bars (9.500).

Huston finished second in the All-Around competition with a 56.600 score. **Huston** won the floor exercise (9.700) and finished third in the vault (9.350).

Senior **Rob Hanson** (Anoka, Minn.) finished sixth in the All-Around with a 56.125 score. **Hanson** was second in the horizontal bar with a 9.775.

The Golden Gopher tennis squad returns to Big Ten action this week with a pair of home duals.

On Friday, the Golden Gophers, ranked No. 17, will play host to Michigan, at 6:30 p.m. at the 98th Street Racquet Club. On Saturday, the Golden Gophers will play host to Michigan State, at 6:30 p.m. at the 98th Street Racquet Club.

The Golden Gophers will take a 16-3 overall record and a 2-0 Big Ten record into Friday's dual. The Golden Gophers have won 15 consecutive Big Ten matches.

The Golden Gophers have been led by **Rick Naumoff** (Sr., Columbus, Ohio). **Naumoff**, who has moved up to

No. 15 in the ITA rankings, is 25-9. **Naumoff** captured the title at the Spartan Invitational (the Big Ten Indoors) earlier this year.

Mehdi Benyebka (Sr., Oran, Algeria), who is ranked No. 71 in the ITA rankings, is second on the team with 18 victories.

The doubles team of **Roger Anderson** (Sr., New Hope, Minn.) and **Dean Hlushko** (Sr., Arden Hills, Minn.) is ranked No. 25 in the ITA rankings. **Anderson** and **Hlushko** have a 14-6 record. **Hlushko** also has 18 singles victories.

Next: On April 16, Northwestern will visit Minnesota, followed by Wisconsin the next night.

BEST BIG TEN START IN 26 YEARS

Off to their best start in the Big Ten since 1967, the Golden Gophers will play host to Purdue in a four-game conference series this weekend. The teams will play doubleheaders Saturday and Sunday.

On Wednesday, the Golden Gophers will tune up for the Purdue series with a nonconference game against St. Cloud State, at Siebert Field.

The Golden Gophers have opened their conference schedule with eight consecutive victories. The Golden Gophers have swept four-game series from Michigan and Penn State. The 8-0 mark equals the start of 1967. The best start ever by the Golden Gophers in conference play was a 9-0-1 mark in 1966.

Minnesota will take a 12-game winning streak into Wednesday's game against the Huskies. The winning streak is the longest since the 1990 season (the Golden Gophers won 12 straight from April 21 to May 2). The Golden Gophers had an 18-game winning streak in 1986 (April 5 to April 20).

Last week: Last Wednesday, the Golden Gophers tuned up for their conference series with Penn State, with a 4-2 non-conference victory over Creighton at the Metrodome.

The Penn State series, originally scheduled to be played at Penn State, was moved to Minneapolis because of the mammoth blizzard which hit the East Coast recently. The Nittany Lions' field in University Park, Pa. received over 30 inches of snow from that storm.

The Golden Gophers opened the series with a 5-0 victory over the Nittany Lions on Saturday afternoon.

On Sunday, the Golden Gophers swept a doubleheader from the Nittany Lions behind two strong pitching performances. The Golden Gophers completed the sweep with a victory on Monday afternoon.

In the first game, **Kerry Ligtenberg (Jr., Cottage Grove, Minn.)** and two relievers limited the Nittany Lions to five hits in the Golden Gophers' 4-0 victory. Ligtenberg allowed just four hits in the first 5 1/3 innings to earn the victory. Ligtenberg (3-2) threw a one-hitter against Michigan in his previous start. Catcher **Darren Grass (Soph., St. Paul, Minn.)** continued his clutch hitting with two hits and three RBI.

In Sunday's second game, pitcher **Joe Westfall (Fr., Marathon, Wis.)** threw the first Minnesota no-hitter in 22 years, when he struck out 10 and defeated the Nittany Lions, 5-1.

Westfall, a 6-4 righthander making just his second collegiate start, allowed an unearned run in the sixth.

The last Minnesota no-hitter was on April 13, 1971 when Jeff Ward, Ken Schultz and Glenn Novack combined to no-hit Macalester, 4-0, in seven innings.

In the series finale, the Golden Gophers broke the game open with seven runs in the third inning and went on to defeat the Nittany Lions, 15-6. Shortstop **Bill Mobilia (Jr., Ely, Minn.)** drove in four runs and left-fielder **Charlie Nelson (Jr., Perham, Minn.)** had four hits and three RBI to pace Minnesota's 16-hit attack. **Jim Brower (Soph., Minnetonka, Minn.)** pitched four innings to earn the victory. Minnesota pitchers allowed just one earned run in the four-game series.

Coach John Anderson: Sunday's first-game victory was the 400th for Minnesota coach John Anderson. Anderson is believed to be the third youngest in NCAA history to reach the 400-victory plateau. Anderson, 37, has a career mark of 402-258-3. Anderson, who is in his 12th season, has directed the Golden Gophers to four Big Ten Championships.

This summer, Anderson will coach Team USA.

Rankings: Riding their 12-game winning streak, the Golden Gophers moved back into *Baseball America's* Top 25 this week. The Golden Gophers, who were ranked as high as 18th earlier, are ranked No. 22.

This week's opponents: St. Cloud State will bring a 6-11 mark into Wednesday's game. The Huskies split a pair of doubleheaders with Briar Cliff and Morningside this past weekend.

The Golden Gophers and the Huskies met once in 1992. Minnesota defeated the Huskies, 18-2, April 9 at Siebert Field. Brower was the winning pitcher for Minnesota.

Minnesota owns a 41-7 edge in the series.

Purdue will bring a 21-5 overall and 5-3 Big Ten record into this weekend's series. The Boilermakers are coming off a four-game sweep of Michigan. On Saturday, the Boilermakers won 11-1 and 8-3. On Sunday, the Wolverines won 3-2 and 14-0. The Boilermakers had opened the Big Ten schedule by dropping three of four games to Michigan State.

Last year, Purdue won three of four from the Golden Gophers at West Lafayette. The Boilermakers won the opener 9-3. Minnesota took the second game 11-2. The Boilermakers then won 4-2 and 0-3. That series left the Golden Gophers with a 2-6 conference mark, but the Golden Gophers rebounded to 16 of their last 20 conference games to finish with an 18-10 regular-season record.

Minnesota owns a 60-26 advantage in the series.

Upcoming: Following next weekend's series with Purdue, the Golden Gophers will play host to St. Thomas on April 13 and St. Olaf on April 14, before travelling to Iowa City for a four-game conference series with the Hawkeyes, April 17 and 18.

FIRST-PLACE GOLDEN GOPHERS HEAD TO IOWA

After three weekends at home, the Golden Gopher baseball team will play its first conference road games of the season this week when it ventures to Iowa, Saturday and Sunday, for a four-game series with the Hawkeyes.

Before travelling to Iowa, the Golden Gophers will play a pair of nonconference games at Siebert Field. On Tuesday, the Golden Gophers will play host to St. Thomas, at 4 p.m. On Wednesday, Minnesota will entertain St. Olaf, at 3 p.m.

After the first three weekends of the conference schedule, the Golden Gophers, the defending Big Ten Champions, are on top of the Big Ten Conference standings with an 11-1 record. After Sunday's games, Michigan State (6-4) and Indiana (7-5) were tied for second place in the conference standings.

Minnesota, ranked No. 22 in the nation in last week's poll, has swept four-game series from Michigan and Penn State and won three of four games from Purdue this past weekend.

The 11 consecutive victories to start the conference schedule was the best start in the Big Ten for the Golden Gophers in school history.

The loss to Purdue in Sunday's series final snapped Minnesota's 15-game winning streak (Minnesota's longest since 1986). The streak began March 22 against Kansas State. The loss also ended a 19-game winning streak -- dating back to last season -- in the conference for the Golden Gophers.

After Sunday's conference games,

the Hawkeyes were among three teams tied for fourth place in the conference standings with a 6-6 record. Iowa has an 18-8 overall record after dropping three of four games last weekend to Indiana, at Iowa City.

The Golden Gophers swept a four-game series from the Hawkeyes at Siebert Field in 1992.

In last weekend's series against Purdue, the Golden Gophers continued their recent trend of timely hitting and clutch pitching.

Minnesota won Saturday's first game, 6-4, behind two home runs from catcher **Darren Grass (So., St. Paul, Minn.)** and a clutch relief effort from **Brad Kearin (Fr., Minnetonka, Minn.)**. Kearin entered the game in the seventh inning with two runs in and two runners on, and got the final out to earn in the save.

In the second game, Minnesota took an 8-3 lead into the seventh, but Purdue got a lead-off home run and loaded the bases with nobody out. Again with two out, Kearin entered the game and picked a Purdue baserunner off first base to end the game and save the Golden Gophers' victory.

On Sunday, the teams moved indoors to the Metrodome because of the rain and wet grounds at Siebert Field.

Minnesota pounded out a 14-7 victory in the first game, but Purdue bounced back in the series finale, 4-0.

All-American candidate **Mark Merila (Jr., Plymouth, Minn.)** leads Minnesota with a .400 batting average. Minnesota is hitting .308 as a team.

There was improvement from the first scrimmage of the spring session to last weekend, and he hopes for more of the same before his Golden Gophers collide again on Saturday. And then it will be time for the Spring Game!

MINNESOTA VS. IOWA

At Iowa Field, Iowa City, Iowa

Saturday, April 17 -- Doubleheader, 1 p.m.

Sunday, April 18 -- Doubleheader, 1 p.m.

The Series: This is one of the oldest rivalries in college baseball -- the first game of the series marks the 208th time the teams have met. The teams met for the first time almost 101 years ago -- June 9, 1892 at Iowa City. The Hawkeyes won that meeting, 10-3. But the Golden Gophers lead the all-time series 119-87, with one tie. Minnesota has won the last seven meetings between the two -- including a four-game sweep in 1992.

The Records: Minnesota, the defending Big Ten Conference champion, brings a 23-7 overall record and a conference-leading 11-1 record into the series. Iowa brings a 19-8 overall record and a 6-6 record in the Big Ten (tied with three other teams for fourth place in the conference).

Minnesota has won 17 of its last 18 games. The Golden Gophers opened the conference portion of their schedule with 11 victories -- their best start in the Big Ten in school history (Minnesota's previous best starts was 8-0 in 1967 and 9-0-1 in 1966). Minnesota started conference play with four-game sweeps of Michigan and Penn State, before winning three of four from then-second place Purdue last weekend. Purdue's victory in the series finale, which snapped the Golden Gophers' 15-game overall winning streak, also snapped Minnesota's 19-game conference winning streak (final five during the 1992 regular season, three at the 1992 Big Ten Playoffs and 11 this season). The Golden Gophers had not lost in conference play since May 2, 1992 to Penn State.

The Rankings: Minnesota is ranked in three collegiate baseball polls. In the *Baseball America* poll, the Golden Gophers are ranked No. 20. In *Collegiate Baseball*, the Golden Gophers are ranked No. 22. Minnesota is ranked No. 23 in the *USA Today/Baseball Weekly* poll. Four of the teams Minnesota has played so far in 1993 are ranked in the Top 25 -- Georgia Tech, Cal State Fullerton, Arizona and Arkansas.

The Schedule: After 12 home games, this is Minnesota's first conference series on the road. Minnesota was scheduled to open the 1993 Big Ten schedule on the road at Penn State, April 2-4, but that series was switched to Minneapolis because of the major winter storm which dumped almost 30 inches of snow on University Park, Pa.

This year was the first time that the Golden Gophers had opened the Big Ten season at home since 1989 (and only the second time since 1987). Last year, Minnesota played its first 16 conference games on the road. In 1991, the Golden Gophers played their first eight conference games on the road. In 1990, the Golden Gophers played their first 10 on the road. After two conference home games, the Golden Gophers then played four more on the road. In 1989, the Golden Gophers opened the conference schedule with three home games against Michigan. After that series, the Golden Gophers played their next 10 conference games on the road. In 1988, the Golden Gophers played their first six on the road.

Last Weekend: The Golden Gophers won three of four games from visiting Purdue. On Saturday, Minnesota swept a doubleheader at Siebert Field, 6-4, and, 8-4. Righthanded pitcher **Brad Kearin** (Fr., Minnetonka, Minn.) had saves in each game. In the second game, Kearin entered the game with two out and the bases loaded. Kearin picked a Purdue runner off first base to end the game and earn a save without throwing a pitch.

On Sunday, the series moved indoors to the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome because of the rain, snow showers and wet conditions outside. The Golden Gophers outslugged the Boilermakers in the first game, 14-7, but the Boilermakers rebounded to claim the series finale, 4-0.

This week: Minnesota won a pair of nonconference games this week. On Tuesday afternoon at Siebert Field, Minnesota defeated St. Thomas, 14-6, behind **Darren Schwankl (Sr., Burnsville, Minn.)**. Schwankl hit a three-run home run and drove in five runs. On Wednesday night, Minnesota defeated St. Olaf, 8-2, at the Metrodome (the Hawkeyes defeated St. Olaf, 11-4, earlier this month). All-American candidate **Mark Merila (Jr., Plymouth, Minn.)** went 5 for 5 to pace the Golden Gophers, who had a season-high 18 hits. Merila, who went into the game hitting .402, raised his batting average to .433.

Coach John Anderson: John Anderson is in his 12th season as the Golden Gophers coach. His career record is 407-259-3. Anderson has directed the Golden Gophers to a 162-84 mark in Big Ten play. Under Anderson's direction, the Golden Gophers have won four Big Ten titles -- 1982 (his first season as Minnesota coach), 1985, 1988 and 1992 -- and have made six NCAA post-season appearances.

In 1992, Anderson directed the Golden Gophers to a school-record 42 victories en route to the school's 17th (15th since 1956) Big Ten title. Minnesota was 2-2 at the NCAA Midwest Regional at Wichita, Kan. -- their 19th postseason appearance since 1956. Anderson has not had a losing season during his tenure at Minnesota. The 11 consecutive seasons under Anderson have increased Minnesota's total to 30 consecutive winning seasons. In fact, Minnesota has had only three losing seasons since 1935 -- one since 1951.

Earlier this month, Anderson became one of the youngest coaches in NCAA Division I history to reach the 400-victory plateau. Anderson's 400th victory came in Minnesota's 4-0 victory over Penn State, in the first game of the April 4 doubleheader.

Anderson, who assumed the Minnesota position in the fall of 1981 at the age of 26, will turn 38 next month.

Going into the 1993 season, 84 active Division I coaches had reached the 400-victory plateau. At least six more, including Anderson, have reached the plateau this season. Of the 90 coaches, only seven were younger than Anderson. Two of those younger than Anderson (Grand Canyon's Gil Stafford and Kansas coach Dave Bingham, who was at Emporia State, an NCAA Division II program) were at non-Division I programs when they reached the mark. Stafford was 34 when he reached the mark.

Anderson has been selected as the coach for Team USA for 1993. This summer, Anderson will direct Team USA on its 45-game, summer-long schedule. The schedule includes the World University Games in Buffalo, N.Y., the International Cup in Italy and competition with Cuba.

Minnesota pitching: Minnesota is expected to use lefthander **Andy Hammerschmidt (So., New Ulm)**; righthander **Kerry Ligtenberg (Jr., Cottage Grove, Minn.)**; righthander **Joe Westfall (Fr., Marathon, Wis.)** and, righthander **Jim Brower (So., Minnetonka, Minn.)**.

The 20 club: The Golden Gophers' 20th victory of 1993 came in their 26th game -- the fastest 20 victories since 1976, when Minnesota earned its 20th victory in its 25th game. The 1976 club, which included Paul Molitor, finished the season with a 38-11 record and was the Big Ten runnerup. The Golden Gophers went 2-2 at the Rocky Mountain Regional (at Tempe, Ariz.) in 1976. In 1991 and 1992, the Golden Gophers reached the 20-victory plateau in the 36th game. Minnesota was 15-15 after 30 games in 1991 and 1992. The previous fastest 20 victories under John Anderson was 1986 (the 30th game).

The right combination: During the past 18 games, the Golden Gophers have gotten timely hitting and solid pitching. The Golden Gophers have batted .334 with 180 hits (an average of 10 per game). Golden Gopher pitchers have compiled a 3.04 ERA during the stretch -- allowing just 122 hits in 139 innings.

Since dropping two of three games in the season-opening series at Arizona, the Golden Gophers have compiled a 22-5 record. In the Arizona series, the Wildcats, the defending Pac-10 South Division champion, scored 42 runs (39 earned) in 25 innings (a 14.04 ERA).

In the 22 games since that series, the Golden Gopher pitching staff has compiled a 3.55 ERA and limited opponents to a .235 batting average. The Minnesota pitching staff has held opponents to three or fewer runs in 14 of the past 26 games.

Other key stats to consider: In 12 conference games, Minnesota is hitting .319, while its opponents are batting just .243. And, Minnesota has stolen 27 bases in 29 attempts in conference games.

Merila update: All-American candidate **Mark Merila (Jr., Plymouth, Minn.)** leads the Golden Gophers with a .433 batting average. Merila, who will be a candidate for Team USA this summer, also leads the Golden Gophers with 42 hits, 33 runs scored, 31 walks and 25 RBI. Merila, who established a school single-season record in 1992 with 63 walks, brought a .353 career batting average into this season. Merila is third in the Big Ten in batting average, first in on-base percentage (.541), third in runs scored, second in walks and is sixth in hits. Merila has been sensational during the Golden Gophers' winning streak. In the past 18 games, Merila is 22 for 48. In that span, Merila has also walked 20 times while striking out just once. In the field, Merila has committed just two errors.

Golden Gopher update: Many Minnesota players have played crucial roles in the Golden Gophers' surge:

Darren Schwankl (Sr., Burnsville, Minn.) has 20 hits in his last 42 at-bats to raise his average to .319. Schwankl has also walked 10 times during the span, while striking out just twice. Schwankl has struck out just eight times this season (in 91 at-bats). In 12 conference games, Schwankl is batting .375. Schwankl leads Minnesota with 11 stolen bases (in 12 attempts). For his career, Schwankl is 24 of 29 in the stolen base department. Last season, Schwankl batted .331 and earned all-Tournament honors at the NCAA Midwest Regional.

Darren Grass (So., St. Paul, Minn.) has 16 hits in his last 47 at-bats. Grass hit two home runs to spark Minnesota to a 6-4 victory in the series opener against Purdue last weekend. Last season, Grass hit eight home runs while earning Freshman All-American honors. In 12 conference games, Grass is hitting .323 with 12 RBI.

Shane Gunderson (Fr., Faribault, Minn.) has 19 hits in his last 51 at-bats to raise his batting average to .338. Gunderson has six doubles and driven in 10 runs during that span. Gunderson leads the Golden Gophers with eight doubles.

Bill Mobilia (Jr., Ely, Minn.) is batting .433 in Big Ten games and .367 overall. Mobilia has 13 hits and 11 RBI in 30 at-bats. Last season, as a sophomore, Mobilia batted .249.

Charlie Nelson (Jr., Perham, Minn.) is batting .390 in Big Ten games and .357 overall. Nelson leads the Golden Gophers with four home runs and is second on the club with 10 stolen bases. Nelson has shown steady improvement as a Golden Gopher. He batted .277 as a freshman, and .330 last season as a sophomore. Nelson is tied for seventh on the Golden Gophers' all-time stolen base chart with 41.

Ryan Lefebvre (Sr., Los Angeles, Calif.) is hitting .341 in conference games and .318 overall for the Golden Gophers. Lefebvre leads the Golden Gophers in stolen bases percentage (8 in 9 attempts). The eight stolen bases have increased Lefebvre's career total to 47 -- fifth on the all-time list. Former major-leaguer Bobby Fenwick is fourth with 50 career stolen bases, while current major-league Paul Molitor is third with 52. Lefebvre recently became the school's all-time leader in triples (12). Molitor is second with 11. Lefebvre is fifth on the school's all-time games played list (198), third on the all-time at-bats list (679), third in hits (229) and seventh in walks (101). In the field, Lefebvre has been flawless in 59 chances this season. Lefebvre has made just one error in the past two seasons.

Kerry Ligtenberg (Jr., Cottage Grove, Minn.) is 3-0 with a 1.96 ERA in his three Big Ten starts, while **Andy Hammerschmidt (So., New Ulm, Minn.)** is 3-0 with a 2.45 ERA in his three Big Ten starts. In Big Ten games, the Minnesota pitching staff has a 3.39 ERA and has allowed just 78 hits in 85 innings. **Jim Brower (So., Minnetonka, Minn.)** is 2-1 with a 2.12 ERA in four Big Ten appearances. Brower has struck out 17 in 17 innings in conference action. **Joe Westfall (Fr., Marathon, Wis.)** is 2-0 with a 4.42 ERA and two complete games in his two Big Ten starts. Westfall has struck out 18 in 18 1/3 innings. Against Penn State on April 4, Westfall became the second Big Ten freshman to throw a no-hitter this season. Westfall's masterpiece (10 strikeouts) was the first Minnesota no-hitter in 22 years.



LENARD NAMED GOLDEN GOPHER BASKETBALL MVP

Sophomore guard Voshon Lenard was honored as the most valuable player of the NIT champion University of Minnesota basketball squad at the team's award banquet held on Sunday at the Marriott City Center in Minneapolis.

Lenard was named NIT MVP after scoring a total of 99 points overall in the five tournament games to lead the Golden Gophers to the title. In the tournament, he averaged 19.8 points a game, shot 55.6 percent (35 of 63) overall from the field, and 44.8 percent (13 of 29) from three-point range.

A second-team All-Big Ten selection this season, Lenard led the team in scoring at 17.1 points a game. He scored in double figures in 26 games, and led or tied for the team high in scoring in 19 games. He had 12, 20-point games to his credit, which included a career-high 32-point effort against Iowa on Feb. 13.

Lenard set single-season school records with 58 three-pointers on 158 attempts. Willie Burton set the previous single-season school record in 1989-90 with 52 three-pointers. As a freshman last season, Lenard set the previous mark in attempts with 144. In just two seasons, he has already eclipsed Kevin Lynch's (1987-91, 298) career school mark with 302 attempts, and is closing in on Lynch's career record of 117. Lenard will enter next season with 109 successful three-pointers. In addition, he is also ranked eighth on the all-time school steals list with 100.



GOLDEN GOPHERS TAKE BREAK FROM BIG TEN

Halfway through their conference schedule, the Golden Gopher baseball squad will take a break from conference action this week.

The Golden Gophers, who lead the Big Ten Conference with a 12-2 record, will play five nonconference games this week.

On Wednesday, Minnesota will play host to Iowa State, 3 p.m., at Siebert Field. On Thursday, Minnesota will entertain Concordia at 2 p.m. at Siebert Field.

On Saturday and Sunday, the Golden Gophers will take on Dayton in a three-game series at Siebert Field. On Saturday, the teams will play a doubleheader at 3 p.m. (following the Golden Gopher spring football game). On Sunday, the teams will play a single game at noon.

The Golden Gophers will take a 24-8 overall record into Wednesday's game. Minnesota has won 18 of its past 20 games.

The Golden Gophers are coming off a doubleheader split with Big Ten rival Iowa, Sunday at Iowa City. Minnesota won the first game, 12-1, behind Andy Hammerschmidt (So., New Ulm), who tossed his first complete game as a Golden Gopher.

The Hawkeyes rebounded to win the second game, 17-4. Darren Grass (So., St. Paul, Minn.) continued his clutch hitting for the Golden Gophers with a two-run home run in each game. Grass has four home runs in the past eight games.

The two teams were originally sched-

uled to play a pair of doubleheaders on Saturday and Sunday.

But the start of the series was pushed back one day because of snow in Iowa City two days before the scheduled start of the series.

After playing in nice weather on Sunday, the teams were scheduled for another doubleheader on Monday, but rain forced the cancellation of the twin-bill.

The Golden Gophers, who are hitting .318 as a team, have been led by All-American candidate Mark Merila (Jr., Plymouth, Minn.). Merila leads the team with a .419 batting average and 27 RBI. And, Merila has walked 32 times, while striking out just eight times (in 105 at-bats). Merila is second on the team with 10 stolen bases.

Grass, who hit eight home runs last season as a freshman, leads the team with five home runs. Grass is second on the team with 26 RBI.

Bill Mobilia (Jr., Ely, Minn.) is second on the club with a .367 batting average.

On the mound, the left-handed Hammerschmidt leads the team with five victories. Hammerschmidt is 5-1 with a 3.51 ERA. Jason Karrmann (Jr., Platteville, Wis.) is 2-0 with one save and a 2.30 ERA, while Brad Kearin (Fr., Minnetonka, Minn.) is 3-0 with two saves and a 3.00 ERA.

Minnesota will take a 13-game winning streak (dating back to 1992) at Siebert Field into Wednesday's games. Minnesota is 7-0 at Siebert Field so far this season.

Three quarterbacks accounted for 39 completions in 59 attempts, but it was Robert Jones (QB, Fr., Cincinnati, Ohio) who got Minnesota's only touchdown through the air with a one-yard strike to Eric Dalen (TE, Jr., Minnetonka, Minn.).

Thirteen different Golden Gophers caught passes in the lengthy scrimmage. Aaron Osterman (SE, Jr., Elk River, Minn.), led the way with seven grabs for 61 yards.

The defense also had its moments. There were six quarterback sacks, and Andy Kratochvil (Sr., DE, New Prague, Minn.), helped set the pace with a couple of those as well as a behind-the-line tackle that caused a fumble.

Vincent Hypolite (So., SS, LaMarque, Texas), recovered that fumble and notched one of the defense's four interceptions while Don Williams (Fr., CB, New Orleans, La.), registered another blocked kick -- this one a field goal attempt.

"We weren't perfect," Wacker admitted, "but there were some good plays on both sides of the ball. The offense certainly was better. We just have to keep working and keep getting better every day."

Wacker hopes the best will come Saturday in the spring finale.

GYMNASTS FINISH FIFTH AT NCAA; ROETHLISBERGER CLAIMS NISSEN AWARD AND WINS THIRD ALL-AROUND TITLE

For the third straight season, the Golden Gophers tumblers did not qualify for the team finals at the NCAA Gymnastics Championships held in Albuquerque, New Mexico. Minnesota scored 281.30 points during the preliminaries of the team championship to finish fifth. Stanford, Ohio State and Nebraska all qualified for the team finals, with the Cardinal winning their second straight team title with a score of 276.50. The Cornhuskers were second (275.50) and the Buckeyes finished third (274.05). The Oklahoma Sooners finished fourth (281.425) and Illinois rounded out the six team field by finishing sixth (277.80).

Senior John Roethlisberger capped off his career by winning his third NCAA all-around title with a score of 58.075. He became only the third gymnast to accomplish

such a feat in gymnastics history. Joe Giallombardo (Illinois) 1938-40 and Steve Hug (Stanford) 1972-74 also completed the triple. Roethlisberger then went on to collect his 14th and 15th All-American certificates as he won the pommel horse event (9.50) and finished fourth on the parallel bars (9.10). During his four-year collegiate career, Roethlisberger has been an All-American on every event. Fellow senior teammate Rob Hanson ended his career with another All-American certificate as well, as he finished fourth on the pommel horse (9.30). It was Hanson's second All-American certificate during his four-year career (still rings in 1992) at Minnesota.

Roethlisberger was also honored as the 1993 Nissen Award winner, named in the honor of George Nissen, a three-time NCAA champion at the University of Iowa. This award is the gymnastics equivalent to football's Heisman Trophy. He joins Tim LaFleur (1978) as the only University of Minnesota gymnast to collect this prestigious honor.

LES BOLSTAD GOLF COURSE RENOVATION UNDERWAY

Planned improvements of the University of Minnesota's Les Bolstad Golf Course are underway, with the major change involving conversion of the existing par three course into a teaching center and public driving range.


Existing demand for golf instruction and practice areas for the general public, the departments of recreation, kinesiology and men's and women's athletics was cited as the primary reason for the change by golf course management and an advisory board of users approved the conversion.

In addition, the need to improve and better maintain the 18-hole course itself through additional revenues generated by the new teaching center and public driving range was an important consideration. The old par three course received relatively little play and was operating for the last several years at a loss. Projections are that the new teaching facility and driving range will generate significant revenues for future improvements of the 18-hole course.

A new rate structure, also designed to generate additional revenue but keep the course moderately priced, has been established. In general, there will be a moderate increase of daily fees for students, faculty, staff, retired faculty and staff, alumni and public. Seasonal fees in those same categories also will increase proportionately.

Daily greens fees for the public will remain at \$17.00 for play on weekdays but will increase to \$20.00 on weekends under the new rate structure.

GOLDEN GOPHERS RESUME BIG TEN PLAY AT NORTHWESTERN THIS WEEKEND

Sporting a 30-8 overall record and a 12-2 conference mark, the defending Big Ten champion Golden Gopher baseball team will go on the road this weekend for a four-game series at Northwestern.

Minnesota was idle in the Big Ten this past week, but pounded out six non-conference wins at Siebert Field to raise its home mark at Siebert Field to 13-0 this year. They have an overall 24-3 home mark.

Over the weekend, the Golden Gophers swept three games from the University of Dayton by pounding out 41 runs in three games. Offensively, just about every starter contributed to the barrage, but a pair of veterans led the way. All-American candidate **Mark Merila** (Plymouth, Minn.), who was recently named a Smith Award semifinalist, went 6-for-9 with five RBIs. He leads the Big Ten with a .433 average, and is the team leader in RBIs (34) and hits (52). Co-captain **Ryan Lefebvre** (Los Angeles, Calif.) had an outstanding weekend as well, batting 7-for-13 with six RBIs and a pair of homers. Lefebvre is batting at a .333 pace and is the team leader in total bases with 67.

Outfielder **Charlie Nelson** (Perham, Minn.) had a solid weekend as well going 5-for-12 with six RBIs and a pair of home runs to raise his team-leading total to seven. Nelson's counterpart in right field, **Darren Schwankl** (Burnsville, Minn.), was 3-for-8 with five RBIs against Dayton, including a grand slam homer in game two of the series. Nelson is batting .342, while Schwankl is batting .319. **Darren Grass** (St. Paul, Minn.) had another excellent weekend knocking in four runners with his 5-for-10 performance, while freshman **Shane Gunderson** (Faribault, Minn.) was 3-for-6 to raise his average to .356.

The weekend's four victories (three over

Dayton, one over St. John's), were possible due to some fine pitching performances. **Andy Hammerschmidt** (New Ulm, Minn.) pitched his second consecutive complete game against Dayton on Saturday and raised his record to 6-1 with a 3.75 ERA. The Gophers' hurlers followed that performance with a solid four and two-thirds of an inning outing by junior **Jason Karrmann** (Platteville, Wis.) that gained him his first victory this year as a starter and raised his record to 3-0. On Sunday, **Brad Kearin** (Minnetonka, Minn.) and **Kerry Ligtenberg** (Cottage Grove, Minn.) picked up their fourth and fifth victories, respectively.

This weekend, the Golden Gophers will face a tough foe in Northwestern. The Wildcats are coming off a four-game sweep of the Penn State Nittany Lions that has catapulted the Wildcats into the race for a play-off spot. They are currently in fifth-place in the Big Ten with a 9-7 conference mark. They defeated Penn State, 3-2 and 1-0, last Friday, with Sloan Smith throwing a no-hitter in the shutout. On Saturday, they defeated the Nittany Lions, 11-9 and 11-7, to gain the sweep. Minnesota leads the all-time series with the Wildcats 105-50-1. The last time the two teams met was last year when the Golden Gophers swept a four-game series at Siebert Field.

The Big Ten standings have tightened up a bit in the past two weeks. The Golden Gophers have a two-game lead over Ohio State, with the Buckeyes scheduled to play two games versus Indiana Monday. The three and four spots are completely up for grabs with seven teams battling for them. In other conference action this weekend, Ohio State hosts Michigan, Penn State hosts Illinois, and Purdue travels to Iowa.

LES BOLSTAD GOLF COURSE RENOVATION UNDERWAY

Planned improvements of the University of Minnesota's Les Bolstad Golf Course are underway, with the major change involving conversion of the existing par three course into a teaching center and public driving range.


Existing demand for golf instruction and practice areas for the general public, the departments of recreation, kinesiology and men's and women's athletics was cited as the primary reason for the change by golf course management and an advisory board of users approved the conversion.

In addition, the need to improve and better maintain the 18-hole course itself through additional revenues generated by the new teaching center and public driving range was an important consideration. The old par three course received relatively little play and was operating for the last several years at a loss. Projections are that the new teaching facility and driving range will generate significant revenues for future improvements of the 18-hole course.

A new rate structure, also designed to generate additional revenue but keep the course moderately priced, has been established. In general, there will be a moderate increase of daily fees for students, faculty, staff, retired faculty and staff, alumni and public. Seasonal fees in those same categories also will increase proportionately.

Daily greens fees for the public will remain at \$17.00 for play on weekdays but will increase to \$20.00 on weekends under the new rate structure.

GOLDEN GOPHERS HAVE SHOWDOWN WITH BUCKEYES AT SIEBERT FIELD THIS WEEKEND

The league-leading University of Minnesota Golden Gophers will play host to the Ohio State Buckeyes in a four-game series at Siebert Field this weekend with first place in the conference on the line. The Golden Gophers will take a one game plus lead into Friday night's series opener. The last three years these two teams have finished one-two in the conference and this year probably won't be any different. Minnesota (33-11, 13-5), is coming off a disappointing series at Northwestern that saw the Maroon and Gold drop three of four games to the Wildcats. Ohio State (29-12, 13-7), split a four-game series at home with Michigan last weekend. The game times for the series are 7:00 p.m. Friday night, with a 4:00 p.m. doubleheader on Saturday and the series finale on Sunday at 1:00 p.m.

Last Time: The last time these two teams met was in the Golden Gophers' Big Ten opening series at Columbus last year when the Buckeyes took three of four games from the Maroon and Gold. Scott Bakkum got the only win for the Golden Gophers when he threw a complete game 9-6 victory. The Buckeyes won the regular season title last year and hosted the Big Ten Tournament, but they were eliminated in two straight games and never played eventual Big Ten Tournament champion Minnesota.

Last time at Siebert: The last time these two teams met at Siebert Field was in 1991 when the Golden Gophers won three of four from the Buckeyes 15-6, 7-6, 12-5 and 0-6. Overall, the Gophers have a 22-10 mark vs. the Buckeyes in Minneapolis. Once again the clear path to the Big Ten title goes through Siebert Field, and the Golden Gophers will be putting their 20-game Siebert Field win streak on the line.

Siebert Field Magic: The Golden Gophers have an impressive record within the friendly confines of Siebert Field over the years and this year is no different. The winning streak there stands at 15 games this season, and the record is 32-2 over the past two seasons. With all of the scheduled games remaining this year slated for Siebert Field, the Golden Gophers could break the 40-win mark before post-season play begins. On Saturday, the Golden Gophers will play host to Rosemount Days as over 1,500 employees and friends of Rosemount Inc., will be at the game for the festivities.

The Series: The Minnesota/Ohio State series has been a very competitive one, especially in recent years. The Maroon and Gold holds a 46-39-1 edge in the all-time series. The Gophers have a 13-8 edge in the series since Head Coach John Anderson took over the reins of the program in 1982.

Evanston Recap: The Northwestern series could be characterized as a weekend of missed opportunities. The Golden Gophers had four solid pitching performances by their starters, including three sterling ones. Andy Hammerschmidt (New Ulm, Minn.) pitched six innings, giving up three earned runs in the first game. Kerry Ligtenberg (Cottage Grove, Minn.) pitched a six-hit, complete game shutout in game two of the series and Joe Westfall (Marathon, Wis.) threw a two-hitter in game three of the series. The fine pitching was not backed up by typical Minnesota defense. The Golden Gophers committed eight errors in the four games. The Minnesota bats were also silenced in Evanston as the Maroon and Gold batted .259 (28-108), after coming into the series with a sizzling .335 mark. The Maroon and Gold managed just four extra-base hits after averaging over three per game coming into the series.

GOPHERS SET TO DEFEND BIG 10 TITLE

After completing their second consecutive undefeated Big Ten regular season, the Golden Gophers will be at the Big Ten Championships, Friday through Sunday at Iowa City, Iowa.

The Golden Gophers (25-3 overall, 10-0 Big Ten) will meet an undetermined opponent Friday afternoon. The four lowest seeds will play a qualifying round on Thursday with the survivor earning the right to play the Golden Gophers on Friday.

The Golden Gophers, who are ranked No. 19 in the ITA Top 25, have won 23 consecutive conference matches -- including 6-1 over Ohio State and 4-3 over Indiana in the

final two regular-season matches. The Golden Gophers' last loss to a Big Ten team was against Ohio State in the championship match of the 1991 Big Ten playoffs.

The Golden Gophers have five players with at least 20 victories.

Rick Naumoff (Sr., Columbus, Ohio), who is ranked No. 17 in the ITA rankings, is 35-10. **Mehdi Benyebka** (Sr., Oran, Algeria), is 28-9. Naumoff and Benyebka have each won 10 consecutive matches.

Paul Pridmore (Jr., North Aurora, Ill.), who is ranked No. 74 in the ITA rankings, is 27-4. Pridmore has won 22 of his last 23 matches. **Dean Hlushko** (Sr., Arden Hills, Minn.) is 25-7, while **Dominic Roderiguez** (Sr., Albuquerque, N.M.) is 24-7.
