HARVEY SIGNS WITH THE UNIVERSITY OF MINNESOTA


The University of Minnesota track & field program has announced the signing of Tye Harvey of Sonora (Calif.) High School to a national letter of intent.

Harvey has a personal-best of 16 feet, 7 inches to his credit in the pole vault. That is the best prep mark in the nation thus far this spring. He was also ranked in the top five in the country in his age group as a junior last year. An honor roll student with a 3.6 GPA, he is interested in studying engineering at the U of M.

"Tye will be a great addition to our program," said Assistant Coach Phil Lundin, who works with the Golden Gopher vaulters. "Martin Eriksson (1993 NCAA indoor champion) will be a senior next year, and Tye will help keep our success in the vault alive and thriving. He is also a fine student and an outstanding individual."

Harvey joins Scott Beadle, a long sprinter from Moorhead (Minn.) High School, Mike Coppola, a javelin thrower from Kingsville, Ontario, Canada, Rick Obelman, a distance runner from Regina, Saskatchewan, Canada, and Tim Van Voorhis, a sprinter from Apple Valley (Minn.) High School, as signees thus far for the Golden Gophers.

GOLDEN GOPHER BASEBALL TEAM ANNOUNCES DARREN SCHWANKL DAY

The University of Minnesota baseball office announced today that the May 11, game against Minnesota-Duluth at Siebert Field will be known as Darren Schwankl Day. The senior player from Burnsville, Minn., will receive a very special honor. Schwankl will play one inning at each of the nine positions in the field starting with pitcher. He will become the first recorded player in Minnesota history to accomplish this. The versatile Schwankl has played both infield and outfield for the Golden Gophers in his three-year career, but the trip to the hill and behind the plate will be a first for him.

A Big Ten post-season awards candidate who is hitting .327 in the Big Ten, Schwankl is also a candidate for Academic All-America honors. He is nearing graduation in the field of Civil Engineering. The Minnesota-Duluth game is slated for a 7:00 p.m. start at Siebert Field.

GOLDEN GOPHER MEN'S GOLF TEAM RECEIVES FIRST NCAA TOURNAMENT BID SINCE 1972

The University of Minnesota announced today that the men's golf team has been extended an invitation to compete in the NCAA Golf Tournament Central Regional on May 19-21 in Columbus, Ohio. The invitation comes on the heels of an impressive third place finish at the Wolverine Invitational in Ann Arbor, Mich., last weekend where the Maroon and Gold climbed over six teams on the final day to finish in third. Pre-season All-American Joe Gullion won the tournament with a blistering 66 on the final day, for his third first place finish of the year and the eighth of his career.

The Golden Gophers last appeared in the NCAA Tournament as a team in 1972 when they competed in Miami, Fla., following the team's Big Ten championship in Iowa City, Iowa. That team was led by Big Ten medalist Jim Bergeson, and teammates John Harris and Rick Ehrmanntraut. The last two years, the men's team has narrowly missed an invitation to the tournament, missing by just a few strokes in the final qualifying tournament.

Head Coach John Means' squad will compete this weekend in the Big Ten Championship at Bloomington, Ind. (Ironically, the last time the Golden Gophers won the Big Ten team championship was in 1972). Twenty-three teams will compete, with 10 teams and two individuals advancing to the finals in Lexington, Ky., on June 2-5.

GOLDEN GOPHERS FINISH REGULAR SEASON AGAINST ILLINOIS AT SIEBERT FIELD THIS WEEKEND

The league-leading University of Minnesota Golden Gophers will host the University of Illinois this weekend in a pair of double-headers on Saturday and Sunday at 1:00 p.m. that will mark the conclusion of the 1993 regular season. The Golden Gophers have a one game plus percentage points lead over Ohio State in the standings after splitting four games last weekend with the Buckeyes.

The Golden Gophers will enter the series with the Big Ten title on the line. The Golden Gophers can claim the title outright by winning three games, regardless of what Ohio State does in their four-game series at Penn State. Illinois comes into the series with a 10-14 conference record and a 30-21 overall mark. The Golden Gophers have a 15-7 conference mark and a 37-13 overall mark.

Weekend Recap: The Golden Gophers overcame some excellent pitching by Ohio State and quiet bats to gain a split and maintain their lead over the Buckeyes. OSU won the series opener 3-2 with a strong performance by starter Matt Beaumont. Kerry Ligtenberg (Cottage Grove, Minn.) and Jason Karrmann (Platteville, Wis.) pitched well for the Golden Gophers, but each of them was victimized by a solo homer by Matt Jones. Saturday's game was OSU most of the way as the Buckeyes beat the Gophers 6-1 in the rain-delayed and rain-suspended game that was completed Sunday morning. The victory put the Buckeyes in first place momentarily.

Back On Top: The Maroon and Gold rebounded from the two setbacks to gain a pair of 4-3 victories and regain control of their destiny. It wasn't easy though, as they

came from behind 2-0 in both games to sweep the double-header. Tony Bender (Rock Island, Ill.) hit a one-out base hit in the bottom of the seventh to drive in the winning run in game one. Andy Hammerschmidt (New Ulm, Minn.), pitched six innings, holding the Buckeyes to three runs. Chris Lawler (Milwaukee, Wis.) came into the game in the seventh and gained the victory when Charlie Nelson (Perham, Minn.) scored from third base.

Game Two: In game two of the double-header the Golden Gophers again spotted the Buckeyes a 2-0 lead, but this time they answered in the bottom of the second with a run on an RBI single by Adam Sobocienski (Barrington, Ill.) and with a pair of unearned runs in the third inning. The Maroon and Gold added a run in the fifth on an RBI double by Darren Grass (St. Paul, Minn.). Starter Jim Brower (Minnetonka, Minn.) went three innings before having to leave the game with an elbow problem. Karrmann replaced him and threw three and two-thirds innings without giving up a hit, before Lawler replaced him and got the save.

Next Up: The Fighting Illini are coming off final exams and will be looking to play the spoiler role. Minnesota trails in the series to the Illini 67-64. Last year the teams met five times with the Golden Gophers beating the Illini 2-1, 10-4 and 13-5 in Champaign, and notching a 12-inning, 4-3 victory in the second game of the Big Ten Tournament. The only loss came at Champaign in a slugfest 12-14. The last time Illinois visited Siebert Field was in 1991, when they split a series with Gophers, winning 4-3 and 10-9, but dropping 1-0 and 5-2 decisions. At the time, the Illini were in the thick of the battle for a Big Ten Tournament berth.

LENARD ONE OF 14 FINALISTS FOR USA BASKETBALL'S UNDER 22 TEAM

USA Basketball has named University of Minnesota guard Voshon Lenard (Detroit, Mich.) as one of 14 finalists for its 1993 USA Men's Under 22 Team.

A Closer Look: University of Kansas Head Coach Roy Williams will direct the USA Under 22 Team, and will be assisted by Jim Calhoun (Connecticut), Jerry Green (Oregon) and Mike Jarvis (George Washington). The men's Under 22 competition is a new international competition. Limited to players who are 22 years of age or younger, the USA squad must first qualify in Rosario, Argentina at the June 14-22 COPABA (Pan-American Basketball Federation) Under 22 World Championship Qualifying Tournament. In order to qualify for the July 22-31 FIBA Under 22 World Championships, the USA squad must finish in the top three in the eight-team regional qualifying tournament. The 12-member USA Under 22 Team

will be selected by the coaching staff during the team's training which is scheduled to begin June 7 at the University of Kansas.

Leader Of The Pack: Voshon Lenard turned in an outstanding sophomore season for the Golden Gophers in 1992-93 en route to collecting team MVP honors. He scored a total of 99 points in the five NIT games to help lead the Golden Gophers to the title. He was named NIT MVP in the process. A second-team All-Big Ten selection this past season, he led the team in scoring at 17.1 points a game. He scored in double figures in 26 games, and led or tied for the team high in scoring in 19 games. He had 12, 20-point games to his credit, which included a career-high 32-point effort against Iowa on Feb. 13. He set single-season school records with 58 three-pointers on 158 attempts. In addition, he is already the career record holder with 302 three-point attempts, and is closing in on Kevin Lynch's career record of 117 successful three-pointers. Lenard will enter next season with 109 career three-pointers.

GOPHERS WIN SECOND STRAIGHT BIG TEN CROWN; NAUMOFF INVITED TO NCAA MEET

Golden Gopher senior co-captain Rick Naumoff (Columbus, Ohio) is one of 36 players who have been invited to compete at the NCAA Division I men's individual tennis championships, May 19-23, at Athens, Ga.

Naumoff, who is ranked No. 15 in the ITA rankings, has compiled a 36-11 record for the Golden Gophers this season. He went 11-1 in the Gophers' final 12 matches to up his collegiate career record to 103-48.

Naumoff, the Big Ten Indoor champion and a consolation finalist at the Rolex National Indoor Championships, helped the Golden Gophers to a 28-3 overall record, a 10-0 mark in the Big Ten during the regular season, and their

second consecutive Big Ten championship.

Minnesota, which finished the season with 13 consecutive victories, swept three matches at the Big Ten Championships at Iowa City, Iowa, to claim a second consecutive conference championship.

The conference championship was the 12th overall and the sixth in the past 12 seasons for the Golden Gopher tennis squad. Golden Gopher coach David Geatz has directed Minnesota to three Big Ten titles in five seasons and a 71-13 over the past three seasons.

GOLDEN GOPHERS TRAVEL TO BATTLE CREEK, MICH. FOR BIG TEN TOURNAMENT

The Golden Gopher baseball team will travel to C.O. Brown Stadium in Battle Creek, Michigan this week for the 13th annual Big Ten Tournament.

The Golden Gophers, who are making their 12th appearance in 13 years of the conference post-season tournament, will play Purdue Thursday at 2:30 p.m. CDT in the tournament opener.

The Golden Gophers (41-15) are the No. 2 seed in the tournament. Purdue is the No. 3 seed. Regular-season champion Ohio State is the top seed and will play No. 4 seed Indiana in Thursday's other first-round game.

The double-elimination tournament concludes Sunday. Thursday's winners will play Friday at 7 p.m. EDT, while Thursday's losers will play Friday at 3:30 p.m. EDT. The loser of that game would be eliminated.

Saturday's loser's bracket game is scheduled for 11 a.m. CDT with the winner of that game to play the winner's bracket team at 2:30 p.m. CDT.

If each team has one loss after that game, the final would be Sunday at noon, CDT.

The Golden Gophers finished in second place in the regular-season standings with a 17-9 record. Ohio State won the championship with a 19-9 record.

Last year, the Golden Gophers finished second during the regular season, but swept three games to win the post-season tournament.

The Golden Gophers have won four post-

season tournaments -- 1982, 1985, 1988 and 1992. Minnesota has won a record 22 games at the conference post-season tournament.

Weekend Recap: Minnesota closed the regular-season with a split in a four-game series with Illinois at Siebert Field.

The Illini swept a doubleheader on Saturday -- 4-3 and 4-1 -- to knock the Golden Gophers out of first place. On Sunday, the Golden Gophers rebounded to win 7-4 and 6-5. In the second game, the Golden Gophers trailed 5-1 in the sixth inning, but rallied for the victory. The big blow was a three-run home run by Darren Grass (So., St. Paul, Minn.). That tied the score 5-5. Bill Mobilia (Jr., Ely, Minn.) singled in the seventh to drive in the winning run.

Ohio State, which went into the weekend trailing the Golden Gophers by one game, claimed their third consecutive regular-season championship by sweeping four games at Penn State. On Sunday, the Buckeyes won the opener, 6-0, and then held on for an 8-7 victory in the second game.

Record book: Senior co-captain Ryan Lefebvre (Los Angeles, Calif.) has left his mark on the Golden Gopher record book. Lefebvre had three hits in the series-opener against Illinois, to become the school's all-time career hit leader. The three hits gave Lefebvre 266 -- moving him past Brian Raabe who had 264. Only four players in the history of the Big Ten have had more hits than Lefebvre. Lefebvre also became the school's all-time leader in runs scored. Lefebvre, whose .347 career batting average is the 10th best in school history, has stolen 53 bases in his career -- the third-highest in school history. Earlier this season, Lefebvre became the school's all-time leader in triples.

NAUMOFF TO COMPETE AT NCAA MEET

Senior co-captain **Rick Naumoff** (Columbus, Ohio) of the Golden Gophers' men's tennis team will compete this week at the NCAA Division I men's individual tennis championships at Athens, Ga.

The championships begin Wednesday and run through Sunday.

Naumoff, who is ranked No. 15 in the ITA rankings, has compiled a 36-11 record for the Golden Gophers this season. He went 11-1 in the Gophers' final 12 matches to up his collegiate career record to 103-48.

Naumoff is the first Golden Gopher singles player to compete at the NCAA Championships since **Fredrik**

Pahlett and **Stefan Eriksson** each competed at the 1984 NCAA Championships. Pahlett earned All-American honors in 1983 and 1984, while Eriksson also earned All-American honors in 1984. Pahlett was the 1983 NCAA singles runner-up.

Last season **Brian Uihlein** and **Adam Krafft** competed in doubles at the NCAA meet and earned All-American honors.

Naumoff, the Big Ten indoor champion and a consolation finalist at the Rolex National Indoor Championships, helped the Golden Gophers to a 28-3 overall record, a 10-0 mark in the Big Ten during the regular season, and their second consecutive Big Ten championship. Minnesota finished the season with 13 consecutive victories.

GOPHERS FINISH THIRD AT BIG TEN; HEAD TO COLUMBUS FOR NCAA CENTRAL REGIONAL

The Golden Gopher men's golf team finished third at the Big Ten Championship last weekend in Bloomington, Ind. All-American candidate **Joe Gullion** (San Antonio, Texas) finished eighth with a score of 290, netting the Les Bolstad Award for low stroke average in the conference and All-Big Ten honors for the second straight year. This week the Golden Gophers travel to Columbus, Ohio to participate in the NCAA Central Regional. It is the first time Minnesota has sent a team since 1972, when the Big Ten champions competed in Miami, Fla., and did not qualify for the final rounds.

Big Ten Recap: The Golden Gophers were six strokes back going into the final round, but the Wisconsin Badgers held on to win. **Phil Ebner** (Hudson, Ohio) had his best outing since last fall, when he finished tied for eighth with a 290. **Jeff Nielsen** (Grand Rapids, Minn.) finished tied for 21st with a 296 score and **Mark Hanson** (Cedar Rapids, Iowa) had a 297 score for a 24th-place finish.

Central Regional: The Golden Gophers will face some stiff competition at the Central Regional. Twenty-one teams and six individuals will compete for the chance to advance to the finals in Lexington, Ky., on June 2-5. Ten teams and two individuals will advance out of the Central Regional to the NCAA Championships.

MINNESOTA BIG TEN TOURNAMENT NOTES

At Battle Creek, Michigan

First round -- vs. Purdue, 3:30 p.m. EDT, Thursday

Second round -- vs. TBA, 3:30 or 7 p.m. EDT, Friday

The Big Ten Tournament: The Golden Gophers enter the tournament as the No. 2 seed. Minnesota has appeared at every Big Ten Tournament except one -- 1989. The Golden Gophers have won four tournaments -- 1982, 1985, 1988 and 1992.

1992 Tournament: After finishing in second place in the 1992 regular-season standings, the Golden Gophers swept three games to win the Big Ten Tournament, which was played at Columbus, Ohio. Minnesota defeated Michigan State, 5-0, in the tournament-opener. In the second round, Minnesota edged Illinois, 4-3, in 12 innings. Minnesota defeated Michigan State, 11-5, for the championship.

Record against 1993 Tournament foes: Minnesota is 5-3 against the three other teams in the tournament field -- 3-1 against Purdue and 2-2 against Ohio State. Minnesota and Indiana did not meet in 1993.

The Records: Minnesota, the defending Big Ten Conference champion, brings a 41-15 record into the tournament. The Golden Gophers finished second in the Big Ten regular-season standings with a 17-9 record. Since splitting the first 12 games of the season, the Golden Gophers have gone 35-9.

Minnesota pitching: Minnesota is expected to use lefthander Andy Hammerschmidt (So., New Ulm) and righthander Kerry Ligtenberg (Jr., Cottage Grove, Minn.) in the first two games.

Coach John Anderson: John Anderson is in his 12th season as the Golden Gophers coach. His career record is 425-267-3 (.614 percentage). Anderson has directed the Golden Gophers to a 168-92 mark (.646 percentage) in Big Ten play. Under Anderson's direction, the Golden Gophers have won four Big Ten titles -- 1982 (his first season as Minnesota coach), 1985, 1988 and 1992 -- and have made six NCAA post-season appearances.

In 1992, Anderson directed the Golden Gophers to a school-record 42 victories en route to the school's 17th (15th since 1956) Big Ten title. Minnesota was 2-2 at the NCAA Midwest Regional at Wichita, Kan. -- their 19th postseason appearance since 1956. Anderson has not had a losing season during his tenure at Minnesota -- increasing Minnesota's total to 31 consecutive winning seasons. In fact, Minnesota has had only three losing seasons since 1935 -- one since 1951.

Last month, Anderson became one of the youngest coaches in NCAA Division I history to reach the 400-victory plateau. Anderson's 400th victory came in Minnesota's 4-0 victory over Penn State, in the first game of the April 4 doubleheader. Anderson, who assumed the Minnesota position in the fall of 1981 at the age of 26, will turn 38 later on Sunday.

Going into the 1993 season, 84 active Division I coaches had reached the 400-victory plateau. At least six more, including Anderson, have reached the plateau this season. Of the 90 coaches, only seven were younger than Anderson. Two of those younger than Anderson (Grand Canyon's Gil Stafford and Kansas coach Dave Bingham, who was at Emporia State, an NCAA Division II program) were at non-Division I programs when they reached the mark. Stafford was 34 when he reached the mark. Of the 90 coaches, the average age when the 400th win was achieved was 44.

This summer, Anderson will serve as the head coach of Team USA. Anderson will direct Team USA on its 45-game, summer-long schedule. The schedule includes the World University Games in Buffalo, N.Y., the International Cup in Italy, seven games with Cuba (three in Sancti Spiritus, Cuba) and the World Championship Qualifying Tournament in Nicaragua.

Ryan Lefebvre watch: The Golden Gophers' co-captain, a senior from Los Angeles, Calif., is enjoying his finest season as a Golden Gopher.

The 22-year old outfielder, who brought a .341 career batting average into this season, is batting a career-high .367 with 34 RBI and 14 stolen bases. Lefebvre has raised his career batting average to .348 -- the 10th-best mark in school history.

This season, Lefebvre leads the team with 73 hits. Lefebvre has 18 extra-base hits this season (13 doubles, one triple and four home runs). The 73 hits and 18 extra-base hits are career-highs. He had five extra-base hits as a freshman, 14 as a sophomore and 10 last season as a junior. In his first three seasons at Minnesota, Lefebvre hit three home runs.

In the past 14 games, Lefebvre has 28 for 60 (.467) with two home runs and nine RBI.

Last weekend, in the final home series of his career, Lefebvre left his mark on the Golden Gopher record book.

Lefebvre had three hits in Saturday's first game against Illinois to pass Brian Raabe (who is currently playing for the Minnesota Twins' Nashville farm team in the Double-A Southern League) as the school's all-time leader in hits. The three hits improved Lefebvre's total to 266 hits. Raabe, who played from 1987-1990, had 264 hits. Lefebvre added another hit Sunday to increase his total to 267. Only four players in the history of the Big Ten Conference have had more hits than Lefebvre -- Alex Smith, Indiana, 305; Mickey Morandini, Indiana, 299; Tim Richardson, Illinois, 297; and, Mike Smith, Indiana, 270.

On Sunday Lefebvre became the school's all-time leader in runs scored with 189 -- passing Gary Jost, who had 188, as the all-time leader. Lefebvre is second in games played (224) and in at-bats (768) and should surpass Raabe -- the leader with 228 games played and 773 at-bats -- this weekend. He is third in total bases (340) -- current Oakland A's second baseman Brent Gates, is the school's all-time leader with 385.

Lefebvre's 14 stolen bases this season have moved him into third place with 53 career stolen bases. J.T. Bruett, who opened the season with the Minnesota Twins, is the leader with 77.

Earlier this season, Lefebvre passed Paul Molitor as the school's all-time leader with 12 triples.

Merila update: All-American candidate Mark Merila (Jr., Plymouth, Minn.) leads the Golden Gophers with a .422 batting average. Merila also leads the team with 53 RBI. He is tied for second (with Charlie Nelson) with 70 hits (Lefebvre leads with 73), tied for second (with Charlie Nelson) with 14 doubles and is third with 13 stolen bases. Merila is second on the team with 57 runs scored (Nelson leads with 62). In his past 98 at-bats, Merila has 48 hits (.490). On the season, Merila has walked 54 times and struck out just 11 times in 166 at-bats. In conference games only, Merila leads the Big Ten with a .505 on-base percentage.

With his sensational season Merila has moved up the charts in several Minnesota career categories. Merila, who established a school single-season record in 1992 with 63 walks, brought a .353 career batting average into this season. So far this season, Merila has raised his career batting average to .376 -- which is the second-highest career average in school history. Former Golden Gopher All-American Brent Gates (1989-91) is the all-time career leader with a .387 career average. The school single-season mark for batting average (.443 by John Peterson in 1970) is within reach for Merila.

With the 54 walks, Merila has taken over the top spot in the school's career walks list. In three seasons, Merila has walked 137 times passing former Golden Gopher shortstop Bill

Piwnica, who played four seasons from 1980-83. Piwnica walked 133 times. Merila has 44 doubles -- in third place on the all-time list. Jeff Monson (1988-91) is second with 45. Brent Gates is the leader with 61. And, Merila is tied for 11th with 34 career stolen bases.

Merila is a quarterfinalist for the Smith Award, presented to the college baseball player of the year. Through mid-June, the National Collegiate Baseball Writers Association will be taking calls from fans to help determine the recipient of the award. The final vote will be tabulated by one-third writers, one-third Smith Board and one-third fans. By calling 1-900-976-VOTE, callers can cast ballots for top position player, top pitcher and player of the year.

Merila was one of 19 players who received formal invitations by USA Baseball to try out for the 1993 USA National Baseball Team last month. Eventually about 40 players will be invited to compete for the 22 spots on the team, coached by John Anderson. Tryouts for the team will be conducted in June at Millington, Tennessee.

Golden Gopher update:

Tony Bender (So., Rock Island, Ill.) has 29 hits in his past 84 at-bats to raise his batting average to .319. The switch-hitting Bender leads the team with 16 doubles and is tied with Mark Merila for the team-lead with six game-winning RBI. One of those six game-winning RBI came May 9, when Bender singled with the bases loaded with one out in the bottom of the seventh to lift Minnesota to a 4-3 victory over Ohio State. The Buckeyes had won the first two games of the series. Last Sunday, Bender had a key two-run single to highlight the Golden Gophers' four-run first inning in the first game. Minnesota went on to defeat Illinois, 7-4. Bender batted .284 with 13 RBI (three-game winning) in 26 conference games. Walked 10 times, while striking out just seven times in 84 at-bats.

Darren Grass (So., St. Paul, Minn.) has 46 hits in his last 118 at-bats to improve his batting average to .343. Grass leads the team with 11 home runs and is second on the team (behind Merila) with 52 RBI. Grass has hit 10 home runs in his last 27 games. Grass batted just .192 the first month of this season, since then he is hitting .386 (51 for 132). In 26 conference games, Grass batted .301 with five home runs, six doubles and 25 RBI. In the series finale with Illinois last Sunday, Grass hit a towering three-run home run in the sixth inning to tie the game, 5-5. Minnesota went on to win, 6-5. Last season, Grass hit eight home runs with 47 RBI, and batted .324 while earning Freshman All-American honors.

Shane Gunderson (Fr., Faribault, Minn.), a candidate for Big Ten Freshman of the Year, is hitting .331 with 11 doubles and 18 RBI. Gunderson is playing with a fractured jaw. Gunderson had his jaw wired shut on Tuesday, May 11. Gunderson injured his jaw in the May 8th game against Ohio State. Gunderson collided with the fence while chasing a foul ball from his first base position in the third inning of the game. Gunderson left the game and received 11 stitches. Gunderson returned to the lineup the next day and played in both Minnesota victories over Ohio State. Because of persistent pain, Gunderson had his jaw x-rayed on May 10 and it disclosed a fracture. The next morning, the jaw was wired shut. Gunderson played in all four games against Illinois last weekend -- wearing a face-mask to protect himself. Gunderson went 3 for 7 with two RBI and a stolen base. In Sunday's second game, Gunderson made a spectacular leaping catch at first base to rob the Illini's Josh Klimek of a sure extra-base hit.

Andy Hammerschmidt (So., New Ulm, Minn.) is 7-2 with a 3.68 ERA. In nine Big Ten appearances he is 4-1 with a 2.85 ERA (sixth-best ERA in the conference). Hammerschmidt tossed two back-to-back complete-game victories last month. Hammerschmidt pitched a complete-game five-hitter in the 12-1 victory over Iowa, April 18. That was Hammerschmidt's first complete game in a Minnesota uniform. Hammerschmidt followed that up with a complete game in Minnesota's 19-5 victory over Dayton. In 33 career appearances, Hammerschmidt has a 10-3 record.

Chris Lawler (Sr., Milwaukee, Wis.) has made 19 appearances to take over the top spot in the school's all-time career appearance list. Lawler now has made 79 appearances in his Minnesota career -- passing John Lowery (1989-92), who had 77. This season, Lawler is 4-1 with three saves. The 6-2 righthander has struck out 28 in 30 innings. For his career, Lawler is 16-8 with six saves. Last Sunday, Lawler retired the final seven hitters to earn the victory in the Golden Gophers' 6-5 come-from-behind victory over the Illini. Two weekends ago, Lawler earned the victory in the Golden Gophers' 4-3 victory over Ohio State in the first game, and then picked up a save in the second game (also a 4-3 victory). The two victories

helped the Golden Gophers earn a split in the four-game series with the second-place Buckeyes and helped Minnesota maintain its hold on first place.

Bill Mobilia (Jr., Ely, Minn.) is batting .367 in Big Ten games (seventh in the conference) and .319 overall. Mobilia has 22 hits and 15 RBI in 60 at-bats. Last season, as a sophomore, Mobilia batted .249. Mobilia missed two weeks earlier this season with a rib-cage injury.

Charlie Nelson (Jr., Perham, Minn.) is hitting .338 (fourth on the team) and is second with ten home runs. Nelson has shown steady improvement as a Golden Gopher. He batted .277 as a freshman, and .330 last season as a sophomore. The 5-11, 180-pound outfielder hit just two home runs in his first two seasons at Minnesota. Nelson has stolen 18 bases this season to pace the team and, to move into sixth place on the Golden Gophers' all-time stolen base chart with 49. Nelson's 33 walks have left him with 116 in his career -- third (behind Merila and Piwnica) on the all-time list. Only 11 players in school history have hit more than 10 home runs (including Darren Grass this season) in a single season. His 116 total bases is tied for 11th on the school single-season chart. His 18 stolen bases is 14th on the all-time single season list. Last year, Nelson stole 21 bases -- tied for ninth (with Bobby Fenwick) on the single-season list. Batted .310 with 27 hits and a conference-leading 27 runs in 26 games. Walked 16 times. Was flawless in 38 chances in the field during conference play. Overall, did not committ an error in 83 chances.

Darren Schwankl (Sr., Burnsville, Minn.) has 38 hits in his last 102 at-bats (.373) to raise his average to .301. Schwankl has struck out just 14 times this season (in 163 at-bats). In his career, Schwankl has struck out just 45 times while walking 86 times in 424 official at-bats.

In the Golden Gophers' 9-6 victory over Minnesota-Duluth, May 11, at Siebert Field, Schwankl became the first player in school history to play all nine positions in one game. The versatile infielder/outfielder started the game at catcher and then moved (in order) to third, shortstop, second base, first base, left field, center field, pitcher and right field. Defensively, Schwankl handled four chances flawlessly -- a putout at catcher in the first, an assist at second base in the fourth, a putout at first in the fifth and a putout in centerfield in the seventh. Schwankl started the eighth inning on the mound, with a 6-1 lead, but the Bulldogs tied the score with five runs. Schwankl retired two hitters, but Chris Lawler retired the final four hitters to earn the victory.

Was flawless in right field for the Golden Gophers during conference play -- handling 47 chances perfectly. In Sunday's second game against Illinois, he robbed the Illini's Scott Spiezio of a home run with a leaping catch at the fence.

Adam Sobocienski (Sr., Barrington, Ill.) has 18 hits in his past 48 at-bats to raise his batting average to .261. On the season, Sobocienski has 34 RBI (tied for fifth-best on the team) on just 37 hits. Sobocienski batted .350 last season with 31 RBI in 135 at-bats. In 262 RBI over the past two seasons, Sobocienski has 65 RBI.

Joe Westfall (Fr., Marathon, Wis.) has made eight starts -- third on the team behind Andy Hammerschmidt and Kerry Ligtenberg. Westfall is 3-2 with a save and a 4.50 ERA in 54 innings. Westfall is second on the team with 53 strikeouts (one behind Hammerschmidt, who has pitched 73 1/3 innings). Westfall leads the team with three complete games. On April 4, Westfall no-hit Penn State at Siebert Field. That was the first no-hitter by a Minnesota pitcher since three pitchers combined on a no-hitter in 1971. At Northwestern on May 2, Westfall tossed a two-hitter (allowing just one hit after the first), but suffered a heart-breaking, 2-1, loss. Westfall is a candidate for Big Ten Freshman of the Year.

Kerry Ligtenberg (Jr., Cottage Grove, Minn.) is tied for second on the team with six victories. Ligtenberg, who has made 18 appearances, leads the team with 14 starts and 76 1/3 innings pitched. Ligtenberg is 6-5 with a 3.66 ERA. In Big Ten games, Ligtenberg is 4-3 with a 2.31 ERA (fourth-best in the conference) -- including a complete-game 8-0 shutout of Northwestern on May 1.

Jim Brower (Soph., Minnetonka, Minn.) is considered day-to-day because of tendonitis in his right arm. The problem was first noticed April 28. Brower has made three appearances since then, but the problem flared up again last Sunday in his start against Ohio State. Brower pitched three innings against the Buckeyes. Brower is tied for the team-lead

(with Jason Karrmann) with 20 appearances. Brower is 4-5 with two saves and a 5.74 ERA. Brower has struck out 46 in 53 and 1/3 innings. Brower did not pitch last weekend.

Brad Kearin (Freshman, Minnetonka, Minn.) is tied for second on the team with six wins and is tied for the team-lead (with Chris Lawler and Jason Karrmann) with three saves. Kearin is 6-0 with three saves and a 3.06 ERA in 20 appearances.

Jason Karrmann (Junior, Platteville, Wis.) is 4-0 with three saves and a 1.95 ERA in a team-leading 22 appearances. In 42 career appearances, the lefthander is 4-0 with three saves and a 1.80 ERA. Last Sunday, Karrmann pitched two perfect innings of relief to earn a save in the Golden Gophers' 7-4 victory over Illinois. Two weekends ago, against the Buckeyes, Karrmann pitched brilliantly. Karrmann entered in relief of Brower in the fourth with two runners on and the Golden Gophers clinging to a 3-2 lead. Karrmann retired all 10 hitters he faced and picked a runner off for 3 2/3 innings of hitless relief. Karrmann was the winning pitcher in the Golden Gophers' 4-3 victory, which gave them a split in the four-game series.

Pitching update: One key to the Golden Gophers' success this season has been the steady improvement and development shown by the young pitching staff. The Golden Gophers allowed 48 earned runs in the first 52 innings this season (an 8.31 ERA). Since then, Minnesota has allowed 155 earned runs in 385 2/3 innings -- a 3.62 ERA over the past 50 games. In 26 conference games, Minnesota had a 3.81 ERA -- second-best (to Ohio State) in the conference. On the season, Minnesota has a 4.17 ERA. Last season, Minnesota had a 4.16 ERA en route to the school-record 42 victories.

The 25 club: The victory over Iowa State on April 21 was the 25th of the season for the Golden Gophers -- making 1993 the 18th consecutive season Minnesota has won at least 25 games. The 25th victory came in the 33rd game -- the fastest 25 wins since 1976 (the sixth-fastest 25 wins in the 110-season history of the program). The five teams to reach the 25-win mark faster were 1967 and 1976 (30th game), 1968 (31st game) and 1958 and 1960 (32nd game).

Minnesota's best record after 33 games was a 28-5 mark in 1967. That team finished with a 32-10 record. In 1960, Minnesota was 26-6-1 after 33 games. That team went on to win the College World Series. In 1958, 1968 and 1976, the Golden Gophers were 26-7 after 33 games. Since 1950, the Golden Gophers' average mark after 33 games is 21-12.

The 30 club: The Golden Gophers' victory over St. John's, April 25, was the 30th of the season -- the 10th consecutive (and 13 of the last 14) season that the Golden Gophers have won at least 30 games. The Golden Gophers have reached the 30-victory plateau faster in a season only twice in the 110-season history of the program.

In 1960, the 30th victory came in the Gophers' 37th game (30-6-1). The Golden Gophers won the College World Series that season. In 1968, the 30th victory again came in the 37th game (30-7). Minnesota finished 35-9 that season and advanced to the NCAA Midwest Regional. On two other occasions (1956 and 1976), the Golden Gophers reached the 30-win plateau in the 38th game. Minnesota won the College World Series in 1956 and advanced to the NCAA Rocky Mountain Regional in 1976.

The 40 club: The 41 victories mark the third time in the 110-season history of the program, that the Golden Gophers have won 40 or more games. Last season, the Golden Gophers won a school-record 42 games. In 1986, Minnesota won 40 games.

Lies, damned lies and statistics: The Golden Gophers have won seven games in their final at-bat of the game. Opponents have won two games in their final at-bat.

Park Ridge, Ill. — A total of 466 spring sports student-athletes at Big Ten schools have been accorded 1992-93 academic all-Conference honors. The total includes 61 baseball players, 32 softball players, 32 men's and 27 women's golfers, 28 men's and 36 women's tennis players, and 78 men's and 87 women's track and field athletes. Those student-athletes who participate in sports that do not compete for a Big Ten championship and meet academic all-Conference requirements are placed on at-large lists and are announced in the spring. There are 59 men and 26 women all-academic at-large selections. To be eligible for academic all-Big Ten selection, an athlete must be a non-freshman letterwinner and carry at least a career B grade-point average (GPA).

Three women's track athletes and one men's track athlete carried perfect GPAs. Illinois had two representatives in sophomore Jennifer Schwab, who owns a 5.0 (on a five-point scale) in her kinesiology major and senior Laura Simmering who has a career 5.0 GPA in graduate school. Purdue women's track athlete, sophomore Katy Koonz carries a 6.0 (on a six-point scale) in English. Illinois men's track athlete Marcus Jarobe has posted a career 5.0 GPA in biology. Other notable all-academic honorees include Purdue tennis player Ryan Maggart (5.93 in biology) and Boilermaker men's track athlete Roger Salmonser (5.80 in Law & Society), Northwestern fencer Gale Wichman (3.77 in biological sciences), Michigan women's golfer Wendy Bigler (3.90 in cellular and molecular biology), Penn State baseball player Martin Walsh (3.58 in philosophy), Ohio State women's tennis player Michelle Busch (3.47 in psychology), Michigan State hockey player Eric Kruse (3.45 in general business administration), Northwestern softball player Angie Alessandrini (3.44 in mathematics) and Iowa women's golf player Judy Bornholdt (3.66 in exercise science).

A number of first-team all-Big Ten athletes also earned all-academic laurels in their respective sports. From men's golf, Indiana's Jody Roudebush and Ohio State's Curt Sanders are both all-Conference and all-academic as are women's golfers, Illinois' Becky Biehl and Indiana's Courtney Cox. Six all-Big Ten women's tennis players, including Big Ten Player of the Year, Lindsey Nimmo of Illinois (4.31 of 5.00 GPA in accounting), made the scholar-athlete list. They include Deb Edelman and Jody Yin of Indiana, Abigail Villena of Ohio State and Amanda Gregory and Marija Neubauer of Wisconsin.

The Michigan softball starting pitcher duo of Kelly Kovach and Big Ten Pitcher of the Year Kelly Forbis were named academic all-Big Ten. In men's track, indoor champions and all-Big Ten selections Eric Henson of Illinois, Matt Burns and Martin Eriksson of Minnesota and Brian Kelley are academic all-Conference, while from women's track, three indoor all-Big Ten honorees come from Illinois: Carmel Corbett, Tama Tochiyama and Kathy Williams; and three come from Wisconsin: Julie Coté, Kim Sherman and Amy Wickus. Baseball and outdoor track all-Big Ten teams will be chosen this week at their championships.

VOELZ REAPPOINTED TO NEW 5-YEAR TERM AS U OF M WOMEN'S A.D.

Chris Voelz, University of Minnesota women's athletic director since 1988, has been reappointed to the post for five more years, President Nils Hasselmo announced Tuesday (May 18).

Voelz recently had a routine five-year performance evaluation by a review committee, which, Hasselmo said, found Voelz has "provided excellent leadership to women's intercollegiate athletics." In the review, a committee received written and oral comments from more than 100 people, including coaches, faculty, staff, student-athletes and the general public.

"Chris Voelz has been instrumental in advancing the participation level, visibility, resources and success of women's athletics both locally and nationwide," Hasselmo said.

In announcing Voelz's reappointment, Hasselmo cited Women's Intercollegiate Athletics' (WICA) academic and athletic records. "Chris Voelz merits our appreciation and support and so do her coaches, staff and student athletes."

Hasselmo noted the 69 percent graduation rate and a 3.05 fall quarter grade point average for WICA student-athletes plus three Big Ten championships and eight NCAA Top 20 finishes as major accomplishments of Voelz's tenure. Continued academic achievement and athletic success at the national level will be on-going goals, Hasselmo said.

Improvements in departmental communication and cohesiveness and diversity top the list of WICA goals Hasselmo and Voelz set for 1993-94. Hasselmo met with coaches and staff Tuesday to discuss the goals and to announce the appointment of a facilitator to help accomplish those goals.

"The continued success of the women's program requires a team effort," Hasselmo said. "Director Voelz is looking to her coaches and staff for participation in finding new ways to expand the effort. I strongly support her initiative for greater staff involvement as well as her leadership goals. Progress will continue to be monitored on the university's standard annual and five-year cycle."

"I look forward, with renewed commitment and enthusiasm, to serving the department, the university and the community," Voelz said.

1993 ALL-BIG TEN BASEBALL HONOREES ANNOUNCED

BATTLE CREEK, Mich. - Northwestern's Mark Loretta, (Sr., Arcadia, CA) who put together a 20-game hit streak to reach a .408 season average, was named 1993 Player of the Year yesterday by the Big Ten baseball coaches.

Loretta was one of three Wildcats selected to the 1993 All-Big Ten First Team. Minnesota led the field with four selections, followed by NU. Purdue, Michigan and Ohio State each had two players selected, while Indiana rounded out the team with one selection.

Indiana coach Bob Morgan (Ohio U., '69) was voted the 1993 Coach of the Year. Morgan piloted the Hoosiers to a 37-19 record, 15-12 in the Big Ten, and their first Big Ten Championship appearance since 1991. IU's Big Ten mark was identical to its 1991 record, which was the school's best since 1976, when the Hoosiers went 10-7 (.588).

Michigan outfielder Scott Weaver (Fr., Sault Ste. Marie, MI) is the 1993 Freshman of the Year. Weaver was second in the Big Ten in conference batting, with a .406 average, and a Big-Ten-best nine doubles. In overall games, he led the Wolverines with a .378 average, three triples and a .622 slugging percentage.

The Player, Coach and Freshman of the Year will be honored along with the All-Big Ten First Team today at the 1993 Big Ten Baseball Championship, immediately after the first game. The All-Big Ten First Team is as follows:

CATCHER: Minnesota's Darren Grass (So., St. Paul, MN) hit .343 overall this season, with a team-leading 11 home runs. In conference play, he hit .301 with five home runs and 25 RBI. Grass is one of only 11 Golden Gophers to hit over 10 home runs in a season. He was selected to the Big Ten All-Tournament team last season, and was a Freshman All-America selection.

FIRST BASE: Northwestern's Sloan Smith (Jr., Evanston, IL) hit .337 for the Wildcats in Big Ten play, and tied NU's Matt Huff for the most conference home runs, with eight. He also saw action on the mound, posting a 3-2 Big Ten record with a 3.51 ERA and four complete games. Smith was the Big Ten's Pitcher of the Week on April 27, and was the Player of the Week the following week.

SECOND BASE: Minnesota's Matt Merila (Jr., Plymouth, MN) led the Gophers and the Big Ten with a .422 average and 53 RBI in overall action. The All America candidate struck out just 11 times in 166 at-bats while boasting his career batting average to .376, the second-highest in Minnesota history. He also established a school record for career walks with 137. Merila was a first team selection in 1991, and was Freshman of the Year that season.

THIRD BASE: Michigan's Matt Copp (Sr., Portage, MI) finished fifth in Big Ten batting with a .384 average, and second in hits with 33. He added 20 runs and six home runs, and posted a conference slugging percentage of .640.

SHORTSTOP: Northwestern's Mark Loretta (Sr., Arcadia, CA) was second in overall average (.408), but led the Big Ten in hits in both overall and conference games, with 75 and 37, respectively. Loretta put together a 20-game hit streak, the longest in the Big Ten in recent memory, and NU's longest ever.

OUTFIELD: Minnesota's Ryan Lefebvre (Sr., Los Angeles) was the only unanimous selection to the All-Big Ten First Team. The Gopher co-captain hit .367 with 34 RBI and 14 stolen bases, and led his team with 73 hits. Lefebvre established Minnesota career records in hits (266), runs (189) and triples (12).

Northwestern's Matt Huff (Sr., Wilmette, IL) tied fellow Wildcat Sloan Smith for the most Big Ten home runs, with eight. Huff hit .333 in Big Ten action this season, with 20 runs scored and a .690 slugging percentage.

Purdue's Jermaine Allensworth (Jr. Anderson, IN) is the only returnee from the 1992 All-Big Ten First Team. Allensworth hit .296 overall this season, with eight doubles, four triples and nine home runs, and led the Boilermakers in walks with 36. He stole 18 bases in 22 attempts, and was superb in the field, making only four errors in 110 chances (.963 percentage).

PITCHERS: Minnesota's Andy Hammerschmidt (So., New Ulm, MN) was 4-1 with a 2.85 ERA in nine Big Ten appearances. In overall action, he was 7-2 with a 3.68 ERA. Hammerschmidt struck out 54 batters during the season, averaging 6.63 per nine innings, and is a projected starter in one of Minnesota's first two playoff games.

Indiana's Bob Scafa (Jr., Park Ridge, IL) has been Big Ten Pitcher of the Week the past two weeks, and is the first player ever to capture weekly honors three times in a season. Scafa was 4-2 with a 2.08 ERA in Big Ten play. Each of his conference victories were complete-game shutouts, establishing a conference record. Scafa brings a 14-inning scoreless streak into the Big Ten Championship.

Purdue's Jeff Isom (Jr., Lafayette, IN) tied the school record for single-season victories with 10, and the Big Ten records for conference wins and complete games, with seven each. Isom led the conference in innings pitched, with 50.2, and struck out 45 in Big Ten games, averaging 7.99 per nine innings.

Ohio State's Matt Beaumont (So. Kirtman, Ohio) led the Big Ten in ERA in both overall (1.72) and conference games (1.18). Beaumont gave up only six earned runs in Big Ten play this season, and led the conference in strikeouts (47), K's per nine innings (9.26) and fewest hits per nine innings (4.93). He was the 1992 Big Ten Freshman of the Year, as he went 5-0 with a 3.21 ERA in Big Ten play.

RELIEF PITCHER: Michigan's Todd Marion (Sr., Canton, MI) led the Big Ten in overall appearances (30) and saves, with eight. He expanded his career saves record to 32, tying him for fifth in the nation.

DESIGNATED HITTER: Ohio State's Brian Mannino hit .343 overall this season, with a team-leading 44 RBI and 10 home runs, nine of which have come on the road. Although he made the All-Big Ten team as a DH, he has been an exceptional first baseman, with only two errors in 189 chances (.990).

The Golden Gophers have won the College World Series on three occasions -- in 1956 (their first-ever post-season appearance), 1960 and 1964. Minnesota has made two other appearances at the College World Series -- finishing third in 1973 and sixth in 1977.

John Anderson has directed the Golden Gophers to seven NCAA post-season appearances in his 12 seasons as head coach.

Since the NCAA offered its first baseball championship in 1947 -- 215 schools have made appearances (through 1992) in the post-season tournament. Only 10 of the 215 have made more appearances than the Golden Gophers.

This is the third time that the Golden Gophers have made three consecutive post-season appearances. The other two occasions were 1958-60 and 1968-70.

Last year, the Golden Gophers went 2-2 and finished third at the Midwest Regional at Wichita, Kan. In 1991, the Golden Gophers went 1-2 at the West I Regional at Los Angeles (hosted by USC).

This is the second time that the Golden Gophers have traveled to Tempe for a post-season appearance. In 1976, Minnesota went 2-2 at the Rocky Mountain Regional, hosted by Arizona State.

The Records: Minnesota brings a 43-16 record into the tournament. The Golden Gophers finished second in the Big Ten regular-season standings with a 17-9 record. Since splitting the first 12 games of the season, the Golden Gophers have gone 37-10. The 43 victories are a school single-season record -- breaking the record of 42 victories, which was set in 1992.

On the air: KFAN (1130/AM) will carry every Golden Gopher post-season game. Eric Nelson serves as the play-by-play announcer and Larry Fitzgerald provides the color commentary. Nelson and Fitzgerald are hosts of the popular "On the Line" show, weekday afternoons on KFAN.

How the Golden Gophers got here: Minnesota, the Big Ten Conference regular-season runner-up, received the conference's automatic bid into the 48-team field.

The Big Ten post-season tournament, which determines the conference's automatic bid, was not completed because of rain on the final day (Sunday, May 23). The 13th annual conference tournament was held in Battle Creek, Mich. (the first time the conference tournament had been held at a neutral site).

Minnesota had defeated Ohio State, 11-2, in Friday's second round. On Saturday, Ohio State avoided elimination from the double-elimination tournament with a 15-3 victory over Indiana, and then forced a second championship game by rallying for a 7-6, 10-inning victory over Minnesota. Sunday's deciding game, between Ohio State and Minnesota, was cancelled because of wet grounds.

When the tournament could not be completed it forced the conference to determine the automatic bid on a tie-breaker.

According to the 1993 Big Ten Conference baseball handbook (which was adopted last fall at the annual baseball coaches meeting and published in February), "in the event the tournament

can not be completed, the automatic qualifier will be the team which had won the most games in round one and two."

Minnesota was 2-0 in the first two rounds (having defeated Purdue, 8-3, in the first round and Ohio State, 11-2), while Ohio State was 1-1 (having defeated Indiana, 3-2, and lost to Minnesota).

Ohio State, the Big Ten regular-season champion, also received an NCAA post-season bid. The Buckeyes were seeded No. 4 in the Atlantic Regional, hosted by Georgia Tech.

Ohio State has finished first and Minnesota has finished second in the Big Ten regular-season standings, in each of the past three seasons.

Minnesota vs. Pepperdine: The Golden Gophers and the Waves have met only one previous time. On March 22, 1989, the Golden Gophers defeated the Waves, in Malibu, 9-8. Catcher **Joe Wallraf** drove in four runs to power Minnesota to the victory. Current major-leaguers **Dan Wilson**, a catcher with the Cincinnati Reds, **Brent Gates**, a second baseman with the Oakland A's and **Denny Neagle**, a pitcher with the Pittsburgh Pirates, played in that game for the Golden Gophers. That game was part of an eight-game, seven-day visit of Southern California for the Golden Gophers. Minnesota also played UCLA, Long Beach State, USC, UC Irvine, Chapman and Loyola Marymount on the trip. Minnesota went 6-2 on the trip.

Minnesota vs. Arizona State: Minnesota and the Sun Devils have met four times, with the Sun Devils winning all four meetings. Both teams were participants at the Midwest Regional in Wichita, Kan. last year, but did not meet. The last time these two teams met was on March 23, 1988 in Tempe. The Sun Devils won 7-5 in the only regular-season meeting ever between the two schools. The teams have met twice in the College World Series (1973 and 1977) and also at the Rocky Mountain Regional in Tempe in 1976. The Sun Devils won the 1977 meeting in Omaha, 8-4, and the 1973 meeting in Omaha, 3-0. In 1976, the Sun Devils won, 12-5, to eliminate the Golden Gophers from the Rocky Mountain Regional. Minnesota was 2-2 at that regional --losing to Memphis State, before beating Gonzaga and Memphis State.

Minnesota vs. Cal State Northridge: The Golden Gophers and Matadors have met just once -- last year at the Midwest Regional at Wichita, Kan. In that game, Minnesota rallied from a 6-0 deficit for a 7-6 victory, in the elimination game. **Mark Vandersall** hit a three-run home run in the bottom of the seventh, to tie the game, 6-6. **Chris Lawler**, the program's all-time leader in appearances, earned the victory in relief by retiring the final four hitters.

Minnesota vs. George Mason: The two teams have never met.

Minnesota vs. St. John's: The two teams have never met. The St. John's listed in the all-time opponent section of the Minnesota media guide, is a NCAA Division III school from Colledgeville, Minn.

Coach John Anderson: John Anderson is in his 12th season as the Golden Gophers coach. His career record is 427-268-3 (.614 percentage). Anderson has directed the Golden Gophers to a 168-92 mark (.646 percentage) in Big Ten regular-season play. Under Anderson's direction, the Golden Gophers have won four Big Ten titles -- 1982 (his first season as Minnesota coach), 1985, 1988 and 1992 -- and have made six NCAA post-season appearances.

Anderson, a 1977 graduate of the University of Minnesota, directed the Golden Gophers to 42 victories, the school's 17th Big Ten title (15th since 1956) and their 19th postseason last season. Anderson has not had a losing season during his tenure at Minnesota -- increasing Minnesota's total to 31 consecutive winning seasons. In fact, Minnesota has had only three losing seasons since 1935 -- one since 1951.

Last month, Anderson became one of the youngest coaches in NCAA Division I history to reach the 400-victory plateau. Anderson's 400th victory came in Minnesota's 4-0 victory over Penn State, in the first game of the April 4 doubleheader. Anderson, who assumed the Minnesota position in the fall of 1981 at the age of 26, turned 38 on May 16.

Going into the 1993 season, 84 active Division I coaches had reached the 400-victory plateau. At least six more, including Anderson, have reached the plateau this season. Of the 90

coaches, only seven were younger than Anderson. Two of those younger than Anderson (Grand Canyon's Gil Stafford and Kansas coach Dave Bingham, who was at Emporia State, an NCAA Division II program) were at non-Division I programs when they reached the mark. Stafford was 34 when he reached the mark. Of the 90 coaches, the average age when the 400th win was achieved was 44.

The Golden Gophers' second game at this regional will be the 700th in Anderson's 12-year career. The 427 victories make Anderson the second-winningest coach in Minnesota history. Dick Siebert directed Minnesota to a 754-361-10 record in 31 seasons from 1948-1978.

This summer, Anderson will serve as the head coach of Team USA. Anderson will direct Team USA on its 45-game, summer-long schedule. The schedule includes the World University Games in Buffalo, N.Y., the International Cup in Italy, seven games with Cuba (three in Sancti Spiritus, Cuba) and the World Championship Qualifying Tournament in Nicaragua.

Minnesota pitching: Minnesota is expected to use lefthander **Andy Hammerschmidt** (So., New Ulm) and righthander **Kerry Ligtenberg** (Jr., Cottage Grove, Minn.) in the first two games.

All-Big Ten: Four Golden Gophers were named to the first-team All-Big Ten Conference team -- outfielder **Ryan Lefebvre**, catcher **Darren Grass**, second baseman **Mark Merila** and pitcher **Andy Hammerschmidt**. The four first-team selections was the most for a conference school and was the most first-team members Minnesota has had since 1983, when five Golden Gophers were selected. Outfielder **Charlie Nelson** and pitcher **Kerry Ligtenberg** were named third-team all-Big Ten.

All-Big Ten Tournament: Five Golden Gophers were named to the All-Big Ten Tournament team -- catcher **Darren Grass**, outfielders **Ryan Lefebvre** and **Charlie Nelson**, shortstop **Bill Mobilia** and pitcher **Andy Hammerschmidt**.

All-Academic Big Ten: Seven Minnesota student-athletes were named to the All-Academic Big Ten baseball team -- third baseman **Tony Bender** (3.16 GPA in Kinesiology); pitcher **Jason Karrmann** (3.15 GPA in Individualized Studies); pitcher **Kerry Ligtenberg** (3.16 GPA in Chemical Engineering); pitcher/first baseman **Shane McCarthy** (3.17 GPA in pre-Medicine); infielder **Mike Oster** (3.00 in Inter-College Program studies); outfielder **Darren Schwankl** (3.31 GPA in Civil Engineering); and, outfielder **Mark Vandersall** (3.39 GPA in business/pre-Medicine).

Ryan Lefebvre watch: The Golden Gophers' co-captain, a senior from Los Angeles, Calif., is enjoying his finest season as a Golden Gopher.

The 22-year old outfielder, who brought a .341 career batting average into this season, is batting a career-high .358 with 34 RBI and 14 stolen bases. Lefebvre has raised his career batting average to .346 -- the 10th-best mark in school history.

This season, Lefebvre leads the team with 76 hits. Lefebvre has 20 extra-base hits this season (14 doubles, one triple and five home runs). The 76 hits, 20 extra-base hits, 14 doubles and five home runs are each career-highs. He had five extra-base hits as a freshman, 14 as a sophomore and 10 last season as a junior. In his first three seasons at Minnesota, Lefebvre hit three home runs.

In the past 17 games, Lefebvre has 31 for 73 (.425) with three home runs and 11 RBI. Lefebvre led off the Golden Gophers' 11-2 victory over Ohio State last Friday with a home run.

The four-year starter has left an indelible mark on the Golden Gopher record book.

Lefebvre's three hits at the Big Ten Tournament improved his career total to a school-record 270 hits. Only three players in the history of the Big Ten Conference have had more hits than Lefebvre -- **Alex Smith**, Indiana, 305; **Mickey Morandini**, Indiana, 299; **Tim Richardson**, Illinois, 297. Lefebvre is tied with **Mike Smith**, Indiana, with 270.

Lefebvre has also become the school's all-time leader in at-bats (781) and runs scored (193). Lefebvre is second in games played (227) and will equal the mark of all-time leader Brian Raabe, who played in 228 games from 1987-1990, in Thursday's game against Pepperdine. He is third in total bases (347) -- current Oakland A's second baseman Brent Gates, is the school's all-time leader with 385. Tom Steinbach is second with 362.

Lefebvre's 14 stolen bases this season have moved him into third place with 53 career stolen bases. J.T. Bruett, who opened the season with the Minnesota Twins, is the leader with 77.

Earlier this season, Lefebvre passed Paul Mollitor as the school's all-time leader with 12 triples.

In post-season play the past two seasons, Lefebvre has been outstanding. In 1991 at the West I Regional in Los Angeles, Lefebvre batted .615 and was the only Golden Gopher named to the all-regional team. Last year he batted .474 at the Midwest Regional and again was named all-tournament.

Lefebvre is one of four Golden Gophers who have appeared in all 59 games this season. Lefebvre has started 97 consecutive games for the Golden Gophers. Lefebvre's last non-start was in the first game of a doubleheader April 4, 1992 against Purdue. Lefebvre pinch-hit in that game.

Merila update: All-American candidate Mark Merila (Jr., Plymouth, Minn.) leads the Golden Gophers with a .410 batting average. Merila also leads the team with 55 RBI. He is third with 73 hits (behind Lefebvre, who has 76 and Charlie Nelson, who has 75), tied for third with 14 doubles (behind Tony Bender, who has 16 and Nelson, who has 15) and is fourth with 13 stolen bases. Merila is second on the team with 59 runs scored (Nelson leads with 64). In his past 110 at-bats, Merila has 51 hits (.464). On the season, Merila has walked 57 times and struck out just 15 times in 178 at-bats. Merila leads the team with a .555 on-base percentage.

With his sensational season Merila has moved up the charts in several Minnesota career categories. Merila, who established a school single-season record in 1992 with 63 walks, brought a .353 career batting average into this season. So far this season, Merila has raised his career batting average to .373 -- which is the fourth-highest career average in school history. Former Golden Gopher All-American Brent Gates (1989-91) is the all-time career leader with a .387 career average. Current major-leaguers Terry Steinbach and Greg Olson, are tied for second with .375 career averages.

With the 57 walks, Merila has taken over the top spot in the school's career walks list. In three seasons, Merila has walked 140 times. Merila has 44 doubles -- in third place on the all-time list. Jeff Monson (1988-91) is second with 45. Brent Gates is the leader with 61. And, Merila is tied for 11th with 34 career stolen bases.

Merila is a quarterfinalist for the Smith Award, presented to the college baseball player of the year. Through mid-June, the National Collegiate Baseball Writers Association will be taking calls from fans to help determine the recipient of the award. The final vote will be tabulated by one-third writers, one-third Smith Board and one-third fans. By calling 1-900-976-VOTE, callers can cast ballots for top position player, top pitcher and player of the year.

Merila was one of 19 players who received formal invitations by USA Baseball to try out for the 1993 USA National Baseball Team last month. Eventually about 40 players will be invited to compete for the 22 spots on the team, coached by John Anderson. Tryouts for the team will be conducted in June at Millington, Tennessee.

Golden Gopher update:

Tony Bender (So., Rock Island, Ill.) has 34 hits in his past 98 at-bats to raise his batting average to .322. The switch-hitting Bender leads the team with 16 doubles and is second with six game-winning RBI (Mark Merila has seven). In three games at the Big Ten tournament, Bender went 5 for 14 with five RBI. In the Golden Gophers' 8-3 victory over Purdue in the tournament opener, Bender singled in a run in Minnesota's six-run third inning and then singled in two more runs in the sixth. In 26 conference games, Bender batted .284 with 13 RBI (three-game winning) while walking 10 times and striking out just seven times in 84 at-bats.

Bryce Darnell (Fr., Brooklyn Center, Minn.) has seen action in 25 games -- primarily behind the plate. Has seven hits and five RBI in 36 at-bats. Four of his seven hits are doubles. Had two hits and the game-winning RBI in the Golden Gophers' 14-2 victory over Concordia (St. Paul).

Darren Grass (So., St. Paul, Minn.) has 47 hits in his last 127 at-bats to improve his batting average to .331 (fourth on the team). Grass leads the team with 12 home runs and is second on the team with 54 RBI (Merila leads with 55). Grass has hit 11 home runs in his last 30 games. Grass batted just .192 the first month of this season, since then he is hitting .369 (52 for 141). In 26 conference games, Grass batted .301 with five home runs, six doubles and 25 RBI. His 12 home runs in one season has been topped only six times in school history. Has 20 career home runs --tying him for eighth on the school's all-time chart. Last season, Grass hit eight home runs with 47 RBI, and batted .324 while earning Freshman All-American honors.

Shane Gunderson (Fr., Faribault, Minn.) is hitting .328 with 11 doubles and 20 RBI. Gunderson is playing with a fractured jaw. Gunderson had his jaw wired shut on Tuesday, May 11. Gunderson injured his jaw in the May 8th game against Ohio State. Gunderson collided with the fence while chasing a foul ball from his first base position in the third inning of the game. Gunderson left the game and received 11 stitches. Gunderson returned to the lineup the next day and played in both Minnesota victories over Ohio State. Because of persistent pain, Gunderson had his jaw x-rayed on May 10 and it disclosed a fracture. The next morning, the jaw was wired shut. He has played in seven games with his jaw wired shut -- in those games he has gone 6 for 17 (.353) with four RBI and a stolen base. Came to the program as a catcher and outfielder. Was moved to first base 12 games into the season.

Andy Hammerschmidt (So., New Ulm, Minn.) is 8-2 with a 3.32 ERA. Has appeared in 20 games. Has started 14 games and has a team-high (along with Joe Westfall) three complete games. Pitched eight shutout innings (his longest outing of the season) against Ohio State in the Big Ten tournament. Allowed just three hits while walking one and striking out five in Minnesota's 11-2 victory. In nine Big Ten regular-season appearances he was 4-1 with a 2.85 ERA (sixth-best ERA in the conference). Hammerschmidt tossed back-to-back complete-game victories last month. Hammerschmidt pitched a complete-game five-hitter in the 12-1 victory over Iowa, April 18. That was Hammerschmidt's first complete game in a Minnesota uniform. Hammerschmidt followed that up with a complete game in Minnesota's 19-5 victory over Dayton. In 34 career appearances, Hammerschmidt has a 11-3 record with a 3.45 ERA.

Chris Lawler (Sr., Milwaukee, Wis.) has made 20 appearances to take over the top spot in the school's all-time career appearance list. Lawler now has made 80 appearances in his Minnesota career. This season, Lawler is 4-2 with three saves. The 6-2 righthander has struck out 32 in 32 1/3 innings. For his career, Lawler is 16-9 with six saves. Had two victories and a save in the final two weekends of conference play.

Shane McCarthy (So., Billings, Mont.) has appeared in 18 games as a pitcher and nine games in the outfield and at first base for the Golden Gophers. Has six hits in 15 at-bats (.400). Had a pinch-hit in the ninth inning of Saturday's Big Ten tournament game against Ohio State -- his lone appearance of the tournament. Has made seven starts on the mound for the Golden Gophers. Is 4-0 with a save and a 5.68 ERA. Last season as a freshman went 5 for 14 in 17 games, and was 2-0 with a save and a 4.85 ERA in seven appearances. For his career, is 6-0 with two saves in 25 pitching appearances, and 11 for 29 (.379) at the plate.

Brian Mensink (Fr., Rochester, Minn.) is 3-0 with two saves and a 4.35 ERA in 17 appearances. Mensink has struck out 25 in 31 innings. The 6-5 righthander was the 1992 Minnesota State High School Player of the Year.

Bill Mobilia (Jr., Ely, Minn.) is hitting .327 with 29 RBI and five-game winning RBI. Mobilia was a unanimous selection to the Big Ten All-Tournament team last weekend. Mobilia was 5 for 12 with four RBI in the three games. Mobilia hit a dramatic three-run home run in the Golden Gophers' six-run inning against Purdue in the tournament opener. It was just his second home run of the season. In conference regular-season games, Mobilia batted .367 (seventh in the conference). Mobilia missed two weeks earlier this season with a rib-cage injury. Last season, as a sophomore, Mobilia batted .249.

Charlie Nelson (Jr., Perham, Minn.) is hitting .341 (third on the team) and is second with ten home runs. Nelson has shown steady improvement as a Golden Gopher. He batted

.277 as a freshman, and .330 last season as a sophomore. The 5-11, 180-pound outfielder hit just two home runs in his first two seasons at Minnesota. Nelson has stolen a team-high 19 bases this season (in 28 attempts) to move into a tie for fifth place (with former major-leaguer **Bobby Fenwick**) on the Golden Gophers' all-time stolen base chart with 50. Nelson's 35 walks have left him with 118 in his career -- third (behind **Merila** and **Bill Piwnica**, who walked 133 times from 1980-83) on the all-time list. Only 11 players in school history have hit more than 10 home runs (including **Darren Grass** this season) in a single season. His 122 total bases is tied for seventh on the school single-season chart. His 19 stolen bases is tied for 13th on the all-time single season list. Last year, Nelson stole 21 bases -- tied for ninth (with **Fenwick**) on the single-season list. Batted .310 with 27 hits and a conference-leading 27 runs in 26 games. Walked 16 times. Was flawless in 38 chances in the field during conference play. Overall, has not committ an error in 91 chances.

Mike Oster (Jr., **Richfield, Minn.**) has filled a valuable utility role for the Golden Gophers. Has appeared in 38 games -- going 14 for 43 (.326). Played sparingly in his first two seasons -- appearing in just 10 games. Had three hits in nine at-bats. Ability to play any infield position and also catch has made him a late-inning defensive replacement this season. Has started 10 games this season -- seven at shortstop while starting shortstop **Bill Mobilia** was injured. Had two hits and three RBI in the Golden Gophers' 12-1 victory over Iowa. Went 6 for 11 with five RBI (two game-winning) in the Golden Gophers' three-game sweep of Dayton. Went 1 for 2 at the Big Ten tournament. Had 12 hits in his first 26 at-bats this season.

Darren Schwankl (Sr., **Burnsville, Minn.**) has 40 hits in his last 115 at-bats to raise his average to .290. Schwankl has struck out just 16 times this season (in 176 at-bats). In his career, Schwankl has struck out just 47 times while walking 86 times in 437 official at-bats.

In the Golden Gophers' 9-6 victory over Minnesota-Duluth, May 11, at Siebert Field, Schwankl became the first player in school history to play all nine positions in one game. The versatile infielder/outfielder started the game at catcher and then moved (in order) to third, shortstop, second base, first base, left field, center field, pitcher and right field. Defensively, Schwankl handled four chances flawlessly -- a putout at catcher in the first, an assist at second base in the fourth, a putout at first in the fifth and a putout in centerfield in the seventh. Schwankl started the eighth inning on the mound, with a 6-1 lead, but the Bulldogs tied the score with five runs. Schwankl retired two hitters, but **Chris Lawler** retired the final four hitters to earn the victory.

Was flawless in right field for the Golden Gophers during conference play -- handling 47 chances perfectly.

Adam Sobocienski (Sr., **Barrington, Ill.**), a left-handed hitter, has platooned in the designated-hitter role with the right-handed hitting **Mark Vandersall**. Has 20 hits in his past 56 at-bats to raise his batting average to .260. On the season, Sobocienski has 34 RBI (sixth-best on the team) on just 39 hits. Is fifth on the team with 12 doubles. In the Golden Gophers' three-game season-opening series against Arizona, in Tucson, Sobocienski went 7 for 12 with eight RBI. In one stretch earlier this season, had three consecutive games with four RBI. Sobocienski batted .350 last season with 31 RBI in 135 at-bats. In 270 at-bats over the past two seasons, Sobocienski has 65 RBI.

Mark Vandersall (So., **Plymouth, Minn.**) has platooned with Adam Sobocienski in the designated-hitter role and has also played in the outfield. Vandersall is hitting .244 with 16 RBI in only 90 at-bats. In the outfield, Vandersall has handled 24 chances flawlessly. Batted .324 in 25 games last season as a freshman. Had two home runs and 17 RBI in just 37 at-bats. Was named a Freshman All-American by *Collegiate Baseball*.

Eric Welter (Fr., **Chaska, Minn.**) has appeared in 19 games. Has four hits and an RBI in 17 at-bats. Has four hits in his last 11 at-bats after starting the season 0 for 6. Had two hits and an RBI in the Golden Gophers' 14-6 victory over St. Thomas.

Joe Westfall (Fr., **Marathon, Wis.**) has made nine starts -- third on the team behind **Andy Hammerschmidt** and **Kerry Ligtenberg**. Westfall is 3-2 with a save and a 4.98 ERA in 56 innings. Westfall is second on the team with 55 strikeouts. Westfall is tied for the team-lead (with **Hammerschmidt**) with three complete games. On April 4, Westfall no-hit Penn State at Siebert Field. That was the first no-hitter by a Minnesota pitcher since three pitchers combined on a no-hitter in 1971. At Northwestern on May 2, Westfall tossed a two-hitter

(allowing just one hit after the first), but suffered a heart-breaking, 2-1, loss. Westfall is a candidate for Big Ten Freshman of the Year.

Kerry Ligtenberg (Jr., Cottage Grove, Minn.) is second on the team with seven victories. Ligtenberg, who has made 19 appearances, leads the team with 15 starts and 84 2/3 innings pitched. Ligtenberg is 7-5 with a 3.40 ERA. Allowed just seven hits and one earned run in 8 1/3 innings in the Golden Gophers' 8-3 victory over Purdue at the Big Ten tournament. Struck out seven in that game. In Big Ten regular-season games, Ligtenberg was 4-3 with a 2.31 ERA (fourth-best in the conference) -- including a complete-game 8-0 shutout of Northwestern on May 1.

Jim Brower (Soph., Minnetonka, Minn.) has not pitched since May 9 because of tendonitis in his right arm. The problem was first noticed April 28. Brower made three appearances after April 28, but the problem flared up again in his May 9 start against Ohio State. Brower pitched three innings against the Buckeyes. Brower is tied for second with 20 appearances. Brower is 4-5 with two saves and a 5.74 ERA. Brower has struck out 46 in 53 and 1/3 innings.

Brad Kearin (Freshman, Minnetonka, Minn.) is third on the team with six wins and is tied for the team-lead (with **Chris Lawler** and **Jason Karrmann**) with three saves. Kearin is 6-0 with three saves and a 3.06 ERA in 20 appearances.

Jason Karrmann (Junior, Platteville, Wis.) is 4-0 with three saves and a 1.90 ERA in a team-leading 23 appearances. Has struck out 32 in 42 2/3 innings. Had pitched just 38 innings (in 20 appearances) in his first two seasons. In 43 career appearances, the lefthander is 4-0 with three saves and a 1.79 ERA. Has been outstanding over the last month for the Golden Gophers. Coming off a brilliant relief effort against Ohio State last Saturday. Allowed just two hits and one run in 5 2/3 innings of relief -- his longest stint of the season. He had entered the game in the third inning with Minnesota trailing 4-2 with the bases loaded and nobody out. Got out of that jam (with a home-to-first double play, which he started, and another ground out) without any further damage. On May 16, Karrman pitched two perfect innings of relief to earn a save in the Golden Gophers' 7-4 victory over Illinois. On May 9, against the Buckeyes, Karrmann pitched brilliantly. Karrmann entered in relief of Brower in the fourth with two runners on and the Golden Gophers clinging to a 3-2 lead. Karrmann retired all 10 hitters he faced and picked a runner off for 3 2/3 innings of hitless relief. Karrmann was the winning pitcher in the Golden Gophers' 4-3 victory, which gave them a split in the four-game series.

Pitching update: One key to the Golden Gophers' success this season has been the steady improvement and development shown by the young pitching staff. The Golden Gophers allowed 48 earned runs in the first 52 innings this season (an 8.31 ERA). Since then, Minnesota has allowed 165 earned runs in 413 2/3 innings -- a 3.59 ERA over the past 53 games. In 26 conference games, Minnesota had a 3.81 ERA -- second-best (to Ohio State) in the conference. On the season, Minnesota has a 4.12 ERA. Last season, Minnesota had a 4.16 ERA en route to a 42-21 record.

The 25 club: The victory over Iowa State on April 21 was the 25th of the season for the Golden Gophers -- making 1993 the 18th consecutive season Minnesota has won at least 25 games. The 25th victory came in the 33rd game -- the fastest 25 wins since 1976 (the sixth-fastest 25 wins in the 110-season history of the program). The five teams to reach the 25-win mark faster were 1967 and 1976 (30th game), 1968 (31st game) and 1958 and 1960 (32nd game).

Minnesota's best record after 33 games was a 28-5 mark in 1967. That team finished with a 32-10 record. In 1960, Minnesota was 26-6-1 after 33 games. That team went on to win the College World Series. In 1958, 1968 and 1976, the Golden Gophers were 26-7 after 33 games. Since 1950, the Golden Gophers' average mark after 33 games is 21-12.

The 30 club: The Golden Gophers' victory over St. John's, April 25, was the 30th of the season -- the 10th consecutive (and 13 of the last 14) season that the Golden Gophers have won at least 30 games. The Golden Gophers have reached the 30-victory plateau faster in a season only twice in the 110-season history of the program.

In 1960, the 30th victory came in the Gophers' 37th game (30-6-1). The Golden Gophers won the College World Series that season. In 1968, the 30th victory again came in the 37th game (30-7). Minnesota finished 35-9 that season and advanced to the NCAA Mideast Regional. On two other occasions (1956 and 1976), the Golden Gophers reached the 30-win plateau in the 38th game. Minnesota won the College World Series in 1956 and advanced to the NCAA Rocky Mountain Regional in 1976.

The 40 club: The 43 victories mark the third time in the 110-season history of the program, that the Golden Gophers have won 40 or more games. Last season, the Golden Gophers won 42 games. In 1986, Minnesota won 40 games.

Seniors Chad Goldstein and Chris Murrell captured individual events to help propel the Golden Gopher men's track & field team to a third-place finish at the Big Ten Championships which concluded on Sunday at East Lansing, Mich. That is the program's best finish at the outdoor conference meet since winning the team crown back in 1968.

Ohio State claimed its second straight Big Ten title with 142.50 points. Illinois was second with 110 points, followed by the Golden Gophers with a school record 102.50 points. Wisconsin and Indiana rounded out the top five with 81.50 and 78 points, respectively.

After finishing second in the discus Saturday, Goldstein came back to win Sunday's shot put competition with a toss of 59-0 3/4 on his final throw. That effort enabled the All-American from St. Louis Park to edge Jeff Teach of Illinois who placed second with a heave of 58-8 1/2. Minnesota freshman Mark Murdock finished fifth in the event with a personal-best mark of 55-6 1/4.

Murrell and junior Matt Burns gave Minnesota a one-two finish in the high jump for the second straight year at the league outdoor meet. Murrell, a three-time All-American during his illustrious career, cleared 7-3 1/4 on his final jump to claim his fourth Big Ten title (two outdoors, two indoors). Burns placed second with a leap of 7-2 1/4. Freshman Craig Hanscom, the 1992 Minnesota AA champion from Rosemount, tied for sixth with a leap of 6-9.

Jason Boon, a two-time Minnesota AA 800 meter champion from Park High School in Cottage Grove, finished second in his specialty with a clocking of 1:51.21 en route to being honored as the Big Ten Freshman of the Year. Marko Koers of Illinois, who represented the Netherlands at last summer's Olympic Games in Barcelona, won the event with a time of 1:50.89.

The Golden Gophers received another runner-up finish in the triple jump. Sophomore Adrian Ellis leaped 49-8 1/2 to place second behind Antonio Davis of Penn State who won easily with a jump of 51-1 3/4. Freshman Chip Mosely was seventh at 47-10.

Freshman J.J. Beckstrand finished third in the decathlon, a new event at the Big Ten meet this year, with a school record score of 6,496. Indiana's Terry Simpson captured the top spot with a score of 7,276, followed by Sean Clancy of Michigan in second with 7,126 points.

Senior Tyrone Minor finished second in the 100 meters with a time of 10.67, and then ran a leg on the 4 x 100 meter relay which placed seventh in 41.55. Junior Mark Narveson was seventh in the 1500 meters with a time of 3:53.15, while fellow junior Curt Kotsonas, third in Saturday's 10,000 meters, came back strong to take eighth in the 5,000 meters in 14:43.80.

The Golden Gophers will host the co-ed Minnesota Twilight meet at Bierman Stadium Wednesday. The first event begins at 5:00 p.m.

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

GOLDEN GOPHERS MAKE FIRST NCAA APPEARANCE IN 21 YEARS

Mission Accomplished!

The University of Minnesota men's golf team will make its first NCAA post-season appearance as a team since the '72 Big Ten championship team competed in Miami, Fla. The Golden Gophers' appearance is the culmination of a three-year plan that was installed by Head Coach John Means when he took over the program in the summer 1990. Means has been the chief architect in the rebuilding process of the program. In the three seasons he has worked with the players, he has reduced the team's stroke average by over 15 strokes and in each of the last two years the Golden Gophers came within two strokes of gaining an NCAA post-season berth.

1992-93 Season In Review

The tale of the Golden Gophers' trip through the 1992-93 season is a turbulent one that has had many ups and downs. The season started impressively with a first place victory at the Yale Invitational, with Joe Gullion and Mark Hanson finishing two-three, respectively. At the Midwestern Invitational the team finished fifth. Gullion again finished in the top five with a 226 score and a fourth place finish. Freshmen Scott Richardson and Graham Davidson were the Maroon and Gold's next two highest finishers at 230 and 235. These two newcomers were to play a big part in the fall success and winter blues. The third tournament of the year was the Northern Intercollegiate Championship held in Bloomington, Ind.. The Maroon and Gold were second after the first day, but came out storming on the final day with junior Phil Ebner leading the way as he tied for first place leading the team to its second victory in three tournaments.

Two weeks later, the team traveled to Long Island to compete in the Walter McGlaughlin Collegiate Tournament as the defending champions from 1991. The Golden Gophers were surprised by the Army Cadets as they took the title and the Golden Gophers finished fourth. That completed the fall season, and although it had ended on a down note, the future looked very bright with two victories and four top five finishes the Maroon and Gold even appeared in the national polls in the top 20. The team lost their two talented freshmen over the Christmas break due to personal problems. The Golden Gophers schedule had changed due to their fall success and a calendar of very tough competition faced them.

Gullion, an All-American candidate, showed why he is rated as highly as he is by storming through the American University of Puerto Rico Classic and winning medalist honors over some of the top golfers in the south. His 215 score was his best of the year at that point, and he led the team to a 10th place finish in the strong field. At the South Florida Invitational, Gullion again finished first, this time in a tie with Heath Slocum and Eric Frishette. Slocum won the tournament with a birdie on the first play-off hole, but Gullion's first place finish and Hanson's 16th place finish led the team to sixth place in the final team standings. Two weeks later, the Golden Gophers tied North Carolina for the team title at the University of Central Florida Classic. Ebner and Hanson led the team with 222's and sixth place finishes overall. The team continued its hectic travel pace with a trip to Santa Barbara for the Pacific Coast Intercollegiate. The Maroon and Gold suffered their worst appearance of the year with an 11th place finish in the rain-shortened tournament. Gullion finished tied for fourth with a 142 score.

After three weeks off for final exams, the Golden Gophers resumed play at the All-American Intercollegiate Invitational. Hard luck hit again as Hanson was hospitalized with hepatitis on the day of the practice rounds and the Maroon and Gold were forced to use only four players for the tournament. The team finished a dismal last with a 942 score for three rounds. It was then that Means made a critical decision. The fourth and fifth spots in the lineup had been a weakness ever since the loss of the two freshmen. If the Golden Gophers were to hang onto their number two ranking in the district and advance to the NCAA's, they needed more help in those spots. Villanova transfer Jonathon Kelly had been competing at one of the two spots and was steadily improving. For the fifth spot, Means decided to go with a complete wild card. Jeff Nielsen was a junior on the hockey team and had not competed in golf since his freshman year when he played in some junior varsity tournaments. Nielsen was coming off a great year on the ice where he had been second in scoring for the Golden Gophers, but what help he would be on the golf course was still up in the air. He answered that quickly by helping the Golden Gophers pick up some strokes in the rain-shortened Kepler Intercollegiate when he fired a team-best 73 in terrible weather on the second round. That score, coupled with Gullion's 76, put the Maroon and Gold seventh, but it offered hope for the future as Nielsen had demonstrated that he had the ability to contribute at the varsity level.

The Golden Gophers went into the Wolverine Invitational knowing that an NCAA berth was on the line. The team's district ranking had slipped to third, but their lead over some of the other teams was gone, so a strong performance was needed. The team didn't come out of the blocks strong as they were ninth after two rounds, 12 strokes off the lead. But on the final day the help came from everyone. Gullion led the way with a tournament-low score of 66 which brought him medalist honors. Hanson and Nielsen each fired final day 71's. Those three scores, coupled with a 74 by Kelly, had catapulted the Golden Gophers over six teams to a third place finish in the tournament. The next day the Maroon and Gold received word that they had been the third team from the district invited to compete in the NCAA Central Regional.

The story is not completed yet. The Golden Gophers struggled early, but battled back to take third place at the Big Ten Championships, where upstart Wisconsin surprised all three NCAA Qualifiers and won the title, with OSU taking second and Michigan State finishing ninth. Gullion won All-Big Ten honors and the Les Bolstad Award for the low stroke average in the conference with a 72.375 mark in district tournaments. The Maroon and Gold, once again led by Gullion, stormed to a fifth-place finish at the NCAA Central Regional. Gullion fired a 215 to tie for second at the regional, just one stroke off the lead. Nielsen was the second highest finisher, placing 18th with a score of 221. Ebner followed at 224, good for 27th place.

Minnesota & NCAA Golf Championships

* Although not a frequent visitor, the University of Minnesota is not a stranger to NCAA Golf Championships.

* The last time a Golden Gopher team qualified for the tourney was in 1972 when it wound up in 30th place. The first time was in 1944 when it finished second by one stroke behind Notre Dame. Louis Lick won individual honors to pace Minnesota that year.

* In all, Minnesota teams have appeared in the NCAA Tournament six times prior to 1993, and that runner-up spot in '44 ranks as the Golden Gophers' best effort.

* Minnesota was "Well back in the field" in 1953 at Colorado Springs, Colo., in 1955 at Knoxville, Tenn., and again at Colorado Springs in 1960 before Rolf Deming, Carson Herron and Henry Newby helped the Golden Gophers to a ninth place finish at West Lafayette, Ind., in 1961.

* The U of M matched that effort in 1962 at Durham, N.C., when Les Peterson shot a 148, Deming a 154, Newby a 156 and Jim Pfleider a 162 for a team total of 620.

* Minnesota has had a number of individuals qualify for the NCAA Championships. Since Lick's individual title in 1944, the best individual finish by a Golden Gopher has been third by Bill Brask in 1968 at Albuquerque, N.M. Tom Lehman played in three (1979, 1980, 1981) NCAA Championships with 20th (tie) his best finish in 1980 at Columbus, Ohio.

Arizona State went on to win the regional and advance to the College World Series.

All-Big Ten: Sophomore catcher Darren Grass (St. Paul, Minn.), junior second baseman Mark Merila (Plymouth, Minn.), senior outfielder Ryan Lefebvre (Los Angeles, Calif.) and pitcher Andy Hammerschmidt (New Ulm, Minn.) were honored as first-team All-Big Ten selections. Senior shortstop Bill Mobilia (Ely, Minn.) and junior outfielder Charlie Nelson (Perham, Minn.) joined Grass, Lefebvre and Hammerschmidt on the Big Ten All-Tournament Team.

Academic All-Big Ten: Seven Golden Gopher players were picked to the Academic All-Big Ten Team. Tony Bender (Rock Island, Ill.), Jason Karrmann (Platteville, Wis.), Kerry Ligtenberg (Cottage Grove, Minn.), Shane McCarthy (Billings, Mont.), Mike Oster (Richfield, Minn.), Darren Schwankl (Burnsville, Minn.) and Mark Vandersall (Plymouth, Minn.) were

all chosen for this prestigious honor.

Schwankl Honored On GTE District 5 All-Academic Team: Darren Schwankl was honored recently when he was named to the GTE District 5 All-Academic Team. Schwankl is a senior who is majoring in civil engineering with a 3.30 GPA. He played in 59 games with a .287 average, 52 hits and 29 RBIs. The Academic All-America Team will be announced on June 8.

Merila Third Team All-American: Mark Merila was honored by *College Baseball Magazine* last week when he was named to the All-America Third Team at second base. Merila batted .408 for the Maroon and Gold this season, making him only the seventh player to achieve that honor. He also broke a school-record for walks in a career with 142, eclipsing the previous record of 133.

Record Breaker: Senior co-captain Ryan Lefebvre virtually rewrote the Golden Gopher career batting record department during his illustrious four-year career. He now holds the all-time record for at-bats (787), hits (272), runs (195), games played (229) and triples (12).

Anderson Set To Coach Team USA: Golden Gopher Head Coach John Anderson will not be off the diamond long as he will begin his duties as head coach of Team USA next week as the tryouts for the national team take place in Millington, Tenn. Anderson will guide the team on a tour that will take them to such places as Cuba, Italy, Nicaragua and the World University Games in Buffalo, N.Y. Anderson may be joined by a few familiar faces on the tour. Merila, Nelson and Grass have all been extended invitations to the tryouts in Millington which begin on June 9.

GOLF TEAM SET TO COMPETE AT NCAA CHAMPIONSHIPS FOR THE FIRST TIME SINCE 1972

The University of Minnesota men's golf team will make its first NCAA post-season appearance as a team since 1972 when Head Coach John Means' Golden Gophers compete in the NCAA Championships this Wednesday thru Saturday at Lexington, Ky.

Do You Remember?: Minnesota last appeared in the NCAA Championships back in 1972. That team, which won the Big Ten title and finished 30th at the NCAA's in Miami, Fla., was led by Jim Bergeson, John Harris and Rick Ehrmantraut.

Central Regional Championships: The Golden Gophers advanced to the NCAA Championships with a fifth-place finish in the 21-team field at the Central Regionals held

May 19-21 in Columbus, Ohio. Minnesota finished with a 54-hole total of 887. Kent captured the team title with a score of 870.

Gullion Leads The Way: Senior All-America candidate Joe Gullion (San Antonio, Texas) once again led the way for the Golden Gophers at the Central Regionals. A two-time All-Big Ten performer and winner of this year's Les Bolstad Award for low stroke average in the league, he finished in a tie for second at the regional with a three-day total of 215. Heath Fell of Michigan State won the individual title with a score of 214. Gullion was followed by junior Jeff Nielsen (Grand Rapids, Minn.) who finished in a tie for 18th with a score of 221. Junior Phil Ebner (Hudson, Ohio) tied for 27th with a score of 224, sophomore Mark Hanson (Cedar Rapids, Iowa) tied for 51st with a score of 227, and sophomore Jon Kelly (Mankato, Minn.) was tied for 70th with a score of 230.

TRACK & FIELD

FOUR GOLDEN GOPHERS QUALIFY FOR NCAA TRACK & FIELD CHAMPIONSHIPS

Four University of Minnesota Golden Gophers have qualified to compete at the NCAA Men's Outdoor Track & Field Championships to be held this Wednesday thru Saturday at New Orleans, La.

Fearsome Foursome: Seniors Chad Goldstein (St. Louis Park, Minn.), Chris Murrell (Grand Island, Neb.), and Chad Rodvold (Williston, N.D.), along with junior Martin Eriksson (Stockholm, Sweden), have qualified for this week's NCAA Championships. Murrell is a three-time All-American during his career in Gold Country. He finished second in the high jump with a school record leap of 7-4 1/4 at the NCAA Indoor Championships in Indianapolis back in March, and won the fourth Big Ten title of his career at the conference meet two weeks ago with a jump of 7-3 1/4. Eriksson, who won the NCAA indoor pole vault title with a school record mark of 18-0 1/2, will look to add the outdoor crown to his resume. Rodvold, who set the school record in the javelin with a toss of 231-0 earlier this season, finished fourth at the recent Big Ten Championships. He will be competing in his first NCAA Championships. Goldstein, who won the Big Ten shot put crown with a mark of 59-0 3/4 on his last throw, placed 11th at the NCAA Indoor Championships. He collected All-America honors at the '92 indoor national meet with an eighth-place finish.

NCAA Notes: Minnesota has won one NCAA Outdoor Championships team title. Head Coach Jim Kelly's Golden Gophers scored 46 points to outdistance runner-up USC, which scored 41 points, in the 1948 national meet held in Minneapolis. Minnesota also finished third in 1932 and 1947. The program's best finish since the 1948 national title was eighth in 1971. Five Golden Gophers have won a total of eight individual national outdoor crowns. Garry Bjorklund's victory in the six mile run (27:43.1) in 1971 is the last Golden Gopher NCAA outdoor title.

1993 NCAA Indoor Championships: Martin Eriksson won the pole vault title (18-0 1/2) and Chris Murrell placed second in the high jump (7-4 1/4), to pace the Golden Gophers to a sixth-place finish at the NCAA Indoor Championships held March 12-13 at the Hoosier Dome in Indianapolis. Sixth is the best finish ever at the indoor national meet for the Golden Gophers. Eriksson became only the second University of Minnesota track & field athlete to ever win an indoor national title. Ron Backes won the indoor shot put national crown in 1986.

1993 Big Ten Outdoor Championships: Chad Goldstein (shot put) and Chris Murrell (high jump) captured individual events to propel the Golden Gophers to a third-place finish at the Big Ten Outdoor Championships held May 22-23 at East Lansing, Mich. Third is the program's best finish at the outdoor league meet since winning the team crown back in 1968.

FORMER GOLDEN GOPHERS TO BE INDUCTED INTO MINNESOTA TENNIS HALL OF FAME

Former University of Minnesota men's tennis players Chuck Britzius, who lettered three times in the early 1930s, and David Healey, who lettered three times in the late 1950s, are among a group of four who will be inducted into the Minnesota Tennis Hall of Fame. The induction ceremonies will be part of the Minnesota Tennis Hall of Fame Dinner on July 8 at the Flagship Athletic Club in Eden Prairie.

A Select Group: Chuck Britzius and David Healey will join Edina resident Bob Larson, who founded the Minnesota Tennis Hall of Fame and also publishes seven tennis publications, and former University of Minnesota women's tennis standout Marnie Wheaton, as inductees into the Hall of Fame.

A Closer Look: As a senior at Rochester High School in

1929, Britzius competed in the first Minnesota State High School Tennis Tournament. As a sophomore at the University of Minnesota in 1931, he won a Big Ten Conference doubles title. In 1933, he captured the conference singles crown. An active competitor in seniors play, the 81-year old Britzius, who resides in Deephaven, was runner-up at the National Public Parks Tournament several years ago at the 70s level. In the fall of 1955, Healey, who also attended Rochester High School, received the first full tennis scholarship ever awarded by the University of Minnesota. He played No. 1 singles for the Golden Gophers for three straight years. A resident of Minnetonka, he was instrumental in bringing the Davis Cup to the Twin Cities last fall.

THREE GOLDEN GOPHERS HONORED ON GTE/COSIDA DISTRICT 5 ALL-ACADEMIC TEAM

Matt Burns (Cedar Rapids, Iowa) and Martin Eriksson (Stockholm, Sweden) from the track & field team, and gymnast John Roethlisberger (St. Paul, Minn.), have been honored on the GTE/CoSIDA Men's District 5 At-Large All-Academic Team. The trio will now be eligible for the Academic All-America Team. Voted upon by the College Sports Information Directors of America, the national team will be announced on June 21.

Talented Threesome: The 1993 Big Ten indoor high jump champion and the runner-up in the event outdoors, Matt Burns is a junior in the Institute of Technology majoring in electrical engineering. He has recorded four perfect 4.0 quarters and has been named to the Dean's List six times. He has a cumulative GPA of 3.87. A junior majoring in

computer science in the Institute of Technology with a 3.81 cumulative GPA, Martin Eriksson capped an undefeated indoor season by winning the NCAA title in the pole vault in March with a school record mark of 18-0 1/2. He also captured the Big Ten indoor crown this season and placed second in the conference meet outdoors. Eriksson, who will compete at the NCAA Outdoor Championships in New Orleans this Friday, plans to eventually earn a Ph.D. in either computer science or astrophysics. A member of the 1992 U.S. Olympic Team, John Roethlisberger won his fourth consecutive Big Ten all-around title and Big Ten Gymnast of the Year Award this season. 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NCAA MEN'S OUTDOOR TRACK & FIELD CHAMPIONSHIPS New Orleans, La. June 2-5, 1993

Four University of Minnesota Golden Gophers have qualified to compete at the NCAA Men's Outdoor Track & Field Championships in New Orleans, La., June 2-5.

1993 NCAA Indoor Championships: Junior Martin Eriksson won the pole vault title with a school record mark of 18-0 1/2, and senior co-captain Chris Murrell placed second in the high jump with a school record leap of 7-4 1/4, to pace Head Coach Roy Griak's Golden Gophers to a sixth-place finish at the NCAA Indoor Championships held March 12-13 at the Hoosier Dome in Indianapolis. Sixth is the best finish ever at the indoor national meet for the Golden Gophers. Eriksson became only the second University of Minnesota track & field athlete to ever win an indoor national title. Ron Backes won the indoor shot put national crown in 1986.

1993 Big Ten Outdoor Championships: Seniors Chad Goldstein and Chris Murrell captured individual events to propel the Golden Gophers to a third-place finish at the Big Ten Outdoor Championships held May 22-23 at East Lansing, Mich. Third is the program's best finish at the outdoor league meet since winning the team crown back in 1968. After finishing second in the discus with a toss of 169-7 1/4, Goldstein came back to win the shot put with a mark of 59-0 3/4 on his last throw. Murrell won the fourth (two outdoors, two indoors) Big Ten high jump crown of his career with a leap of 7-3 1/4.

1992 NCAA Outdoor Championships: Minnesota came away with two All-America certificates at the 1992 NCAA Outdoor Championships at Austin, Texas. The top eight American competitors are honored as All-Americans. Mark Lacy finished 11th in the shot put with a throw of 58-9 1/2 and earned All-America honors when four foreign competitors finished ahead of him in the standings. Chris Murrell placed ninth in the high jump with a leap of 7-0 1/2 and collected All-America honors when one foreign competitor finished in front of him. The third member of the Golden Gopher trio, pole vaulter Martin Eriksson, finished ninth with a mark of 17-8 1/2.

CORPORATE 100 & EDUCATION PROGRAM UNDERWAY AT U OF M

The University of Minnesota Men's Athletic Department has introduced a new program designed to develop a partnership between the corporate community, local school systems and men's athletics at the U of M.

Primary goal of the program is to improve student class participation and academic achievement with a reward system that would include tickets for 1993 Golden Gopher football games at the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome.

Under the partnership plan, corporations would purchase 100 tickets for a U of M football game and contribute those tickets to a school of their choice. The school then would award the tickets to students who have gained academic achievement.

"CORPORATE 100" SEASON

The "Corporate 100" program will focus on a corporate and University of Minnesota partnership. The primary beneficiary will be the schools that participate in the student reward program. The program is directed at corporations committing \$7,800 to the U of M's Men's Athletic Department. Men's athletics will distribute 100 season tickets to the school of the corporation's choice. These tickets will be awarded to students who have achieved an "A" grade for class work or improved class participation during that week.

"CORPORATE 100" SINGLE GAME

The "Corporate 100" Single Game program will focus on a corporate and University of Minnesota partnership. The primary beneficiary will be the schools that participate in the student reward program. The program is directed at corporations committing \$1,600 to the U of M's Men's Athletic Department. Men's Athletics will distribute 100 single game tickets to the school of the corporation's choice. These tickets then will be awarded to students that have achieved an "A" grade for class work or improved class participation during that week.
