GOLDEN GOPHERS

1994-1995 preseason outlook

When Minnesota's edition of "Pride on Ice" hits the ice in Mariucci Arena this season they will bring with them two straight WCHA Tournament Championships and five NCAA Final Four appearances in the last nine seasons. In 1994-95, the Maroon & Gold return 21 lettermen, including 13 forwards, six defensemen and two goalies, from a team that finished 25-14-4 — good for second place in the regular season of the WCHA. That marked the ninth

Headlining the corps of returnees are All-America and All-WCHA candidates junior Brian Bonin and senior Justin McHugh, both of whom will be counted upon heavily as the the top two returning scorers. Bonin, an All-WCHA honorable mention selection last season finished the year with 44 points (20 goals and 24 assists). McHugh finished third in scoring with 36 points (15 goals and 21 assists) a year ago.

Other keys to the success of 1994-95 will be the play of the goalies

consecutive season that the Golden Gophers have finished either first or second in the league. These accomplishments came despite a horrendous first month (0-5-1) of the regular season that found Minnesota in the cellar of the league — an unfamiliar location. Fortunately, things changed quickly for the Maroon & Gold; confidence started to build, players started to become more familiar with each other and the offense started clicking. Much of the credit goes to Head Coach Doug Woog, who stood behind the players and did not panic, guiding them back to national prominence. After the shaky start, Minnesota went on to win 15 of its next 18 games and climbed out of last place to win the WCHA Tournament Trophy.

and a solid defense. Throughout the season Minnesota will have to create offense and score goals on a consistent basis in order to be successful.

"We will still focus on and emphasize defense in our program, but we need to find a way to have consistent goal scoring throughout the season," said Woog. "Bonin and McHugh will be the two whom we look to help provide that consistency."

"We certainly started off on a rocky note," said Woog. "But our players never got down on themselves and they picked each other up. The team battled and clawed its way into the Final Four and that's what the Minnesota tradition of 'Pride On Ice' is all about."

CENTER/FORWARD

One key word that Woog uses to describe his team for this season is "depth." Usually when coaches talk of depth, they talk in terms of a senior-dominated team, which is not the case this year in Gold Country. Of the 21 lettermen returning, only five are in the senior class. This team will be loaded with experienced underclassmen and talent, especially from a large junior class, which has gained valuable experience the past two seasons.

The Golden Gophers have lost three senior forwards who tallied 97 points and scored a third of Minnesota's power play goals last season. This trio will be sorely missed for the upcoming season from a point production standpoint. Jeff Nielsen (leading scorer last season 29-16=45), an All-WCHA second-team member, tied for seventh in the league in scoring and finished sixth in the nation in goals scored. Tony Bianchi put up impressive numbers last season by scoring 35 points. Joe Dziedzic who tallied only 17 points in an injury-plagued senior season, will be missed as well. These losses will have to be filled if Minnesota is to return to its traditional spot atop the WCHA. In addition, 1994 Olympian Craig Johnson returns to the fold. Johnson, whose rights belong to the St. Louis Blues, tallied 55 points (including pre-Olympic Tour) and played in a total of 62 games, for Team USA. His skills will be an added plus to the lineup. An alternate captain in 1992-93, he led the Golden Gophers in scoring as he tallied 46 points (22 goals and 24 assists).

"With the number of veterans we have coming back, competition for playing time is going to be tight," said Woog. "We also have six incoming freshmen who we strongly feel will contribute a great deal to our program in the next four years and will earn their share of ice time this season."

1994-1995 preseason outlook

To go along with Johnson, McHugh and Bonin, junior Andy Brink, who has played forward/defense for the Gophers, has all the tools necessary from a forward position to help offensively. Sophomore Bobby Dustin has progressed nicely and, with continued progress, his numbers should be very impressive.

Sophomore Nick Checco will also add some experience to the lineup as well as scoring punch. If he starts this season the way he finished 1993-94, he will have a very productive year. He scored five goals during the playoff run, including the overtime game-winner in the WCHA Championship versus St. Cloud State. Junior David Larson has the size to be effective up front and will be a key ingredient in the lineup with the loss of Dzedzic and McAlpine. Larson will use his dominant physical style to assume the role of "the enforcer," making his presence known, and felt, on the ice. Scott Bell's return from a redshirt season, after successfully recovering from back surgery, will also add a physical presence to the lineup. Bell is a feisty player who can put the puck in the net. He was an alternate captain two seasons ago, and his leadership will inspire the younger players. Also, junior Brandon Steege and sophomore Dan Woog will add depth to the offense. Steege is returning to the lineup after sitting out last season, while Woog filled in a year ago when injuries mounted, and tallied 19 points in 38 games. Senior Jed Fiebelkorn, and sophomores Dan Hendrickson, and John Hillman are all returning letterwinners from last season who could also figure into the offensive picture.

The Golden Gophers will be looking for great things from their freshmen class of forwards. Woog looks for production from Ryan Kraft, an exciting player with great speed and scoring ability. He impressed all of Minnesota with his skills at the 1994 State High School Tournament. Joe Pankratz has played the past two seasons in the USHL with the Omaha Lancers and St. Paul Vulcans, and was ranked the third best center in North America for his age last fall by *Redline Report*. He is an outstanding shooter and has explosive skating ability and quickness. South St. Paul native Jason Seils, an aggressive player who was a prolific scorer in high school, is looking to continue that trend in Gold Country. A pair of big forwards, Casey Hankinson and Clint Johnson, will help add muscle to the offense. Hankinson is a heady player and has great vision on the ice. He is the younger sibling of former Golden Gopher captains Ben and Peter Hankinson. Johnson is a fast and rugged winger who is not afraid to use his body in the corners.

DEFENSE

Second-team All-America and WCHA first-team defenseman Chris McAlpine, and steady performer Eric Means are gone. But this is the area on the ice that Minnesota is confident will once again be a strength this season.

The Golden Gophers have depth and size on the blue line. Five juniors return to the lineup, including Charlie Wasley, Dan Trebil, Mike McAlpine, Greg Zwakman and St. Cloud State trans-

fer Jay Moser, who sat out last season. Trebil, Zwakman and Wasley have seen extensive playing time throughout their careers, and all will be dominant in different ways. Trebil is a smart hockey player who is an excellent passer, as his assists total demonstrates. Wasley and Zwakman both will have to play physical roles, while sophomore Brian LeFleur, who was the team's rookie of the year in 1994, will add depth to the defensive lineup. Incoming freshmen Mike Crowley and Jason Godbout are two phenomenal athletes who will vie for playing time this season. Crowley earned "Mr. Hockey" honors in Minnesota last season as he led Bloomington Jefferson to its third consecutive state high school hockey title. He was a fifth-round pick in the 1993 NHL draft by the Philadelphia Flyers, and will be an immediate contributor on the power-play unit. Godbout was a ninth-round pick by the Pittsburgh Penguins, and will bring a vast array of offensive skills as well as good size to the blue line corps. *Redline Report* scouting service rated Crowley and Godbout as two of the top three defenseman eligible to enter college this year in North America.

GOALTENDING

The "Jeffs" (senior Jeff Callinan and junior Jeff Moen) both had solid years in 1993-94, and will be joined this season by sophomore Steve DeBus in the nets in 1994-95. The talented DeBus will push for ice time, which will give Coach Woog a trio of quality netminders. Callinan probably possesses the most athletic ability of the three and relies mostly on quickness. Moen, on the other hand, has developed a more technical approach and has a more typical goalie demeanor. Debus is the most prototype of the three goaltenders.

The Golden Gophers' 1994-95 schedule is a challenging one. Minnesota's schedule includes 32 regular season WCHA games. They open the season with perennial intra-state rival Minnesota-Duluth and close out the season at home with their newest conference rival St. Cloud State.

Minnesota will also play host to two holiday tournaments during the season. The College Hockey Showcase will be played over the Thanksgiving weekend and will feature four frequent top 10 teams (Michigan, Michigan State, Minnesota and Wisconsin). The Mariucci Classic over the Christmas Holidays will feature the 1994 USA Olympic Hockey Team Head Coach Tim Taylor's Yale squad and three teams from the 1994 NCAA Tournament field: Western Michigan, Boston University and Minnesota. All of that adds up to a great year of hockey viewing for Minnesotans as the Maroon & Gold hope to win back the MacNaughton Cup and make it to the NCAA Championships at Providence, R.I.

head coach

Doug Woog is the leader of the Golden Gopher ice hockey program and it is a job he is ideally suited for. The former All-American returned to his alma mater in 1985 to take over a hockey program with a long history of success. Since that time he has taken Minnesota's Pride on Ice to an even higher level of consistent championship caliber play.

Last season's appearance in the NCAA Tournament was the ninth consecutive during his tenure. In addition, he has taken the team to NCAA Final Four appearances five times and his teams have finished first or second in the WCHA for nine consecutive years. Last year, Woog's charges won their second straight WCHA playoff title with a thrilling 3-2 overtime win over the St. Cloud State Huskies in Milwaukee, Wis.

In Woog's nine years at the helm, the Golden Gophers have recorded a 275-110-23 record, giving Woog one of the highest winning percentages (.702) of any collegiate coach in the country.

Woog is a 1962 graduate of South St. Paul (Minn.) High School, where he garnered all-state hockey honors three consecutive years. He then accepted a scholarship to attend the University of Minnesota and play under then head coach John Mariucci. Woog had a stellar collegiate career at the U of M and was named to the All-American team his junior year when he led the team in scoring. He returned for his senior season to captain the squad to a 16-12-0 record and was named the team's MVP.

After graduating from Minnesota with honors in 1967 with a B.S. degree in Education, Woog played for the 1967 U.S. National Team and was a candidate for the 1968 Olympic Team. After not making the '68 Olympic squad, he decided to pursue a career in education. In 1973 he earned his Master's Degree in Guidance and Counseling from the College of St. Thomas.

Woog began his teaching and coaching career at Hopkins West Junior High School in 1968. While there, he taught geography and coached football and hockey. In the fall of 1968 he took a job at his high school alma mater, South St. Paul, where he became head

soccer coach and an assistant in hockey and baseball. During his tenure there, the soccer program won six conference crowns and was runner-up for the state title twice.

In 1971 his coaching career branched out to Junior Hockey when he took a position with the St. Paul Vulcans. From 1971 through 1977 he coached the Vulcans and the Minnesota Junior Stars, who he directed to two U.S. Junior National titles. In 1978 he was chosen as coach of the West Team in the U.S. Olympic Festival in Colorado Springs, Colo., where his squad won the gold medal. He again coached a team to the gold medal in the 1989 Olympic Festival in Oklahoma City.

In 1978 he returned to South St. Paul to take over the head hockey coaching position. From 1978 through 1985, with a 1984 leave of absence to be an assistant for the '84 Olympic team, his Packer teams won two conference titles and advanced to the state tournament four times.

Coach Woog has been involved with amateur hockey at all levels. He has been a national committee member for AHAUS. He was chairman of the National Skating Committee for USA Hockey. He was the head coach of the U.S. National Junior team in 1985 and the U.S. Select 17 team in 1989 that toured Czechoslovakia.

Woog is an active member of the community, and is a member of the St. Paul Chamber of Commerce. He has been the chairperson for the Wakota Arena Board for the South St. Paul area. He is a past president of the South St. Paul Coaches Association, and has been instrumental in initiating and maintaining youth athletic organizations in his community. In addition he is very active in local charities, including the Make-A-Wish Foundation.

He and his wife, Janice, reside in South St. Paul. They have three children, Amy a Gustavus Adolphus graduate, Steve a recent Northern Michigan graduate, who lettered three seasons in hockey, and Dan is a member of the Golden Gophers.

1993-1994 season in review

The University of Minnesota ice hockey team capped off one of the most amazing seasons ever with a dramatic late-season rush that put them into the Final Four for the fifth time in the last nine years. The story of this team started in the summer of 1993 when Darby Hendrickson and Craig Johnson made the U.S. Olympic Team. These two players were to be the cornerstones of the Golden Gophers' offense. Earlier in the spring, Scott Bell had opted to sit out the 1993-94 season to have surgery on his back. Bell had played the previous two seasons with a great deal of pain. With two alternate captains and the WCHA Freshman of the Year in 1992 gone from the lineup, Head Coach Doug Woog looked to a pair of ironmen to lead the charge. Seniors Chris McAlpine and Jeff Nielsen were both impressive physical figures who loved to take out opponents almost as they much as loved scoring goals.

McAlpine was a pre-season All-America selection who had a reputation as a tough, physical player who put fear into opponents. Nielsen was a speedy forward who could shoot the puck as quick and hard as anyone in college hockey. These two co-captains did an outstanding job of leading the team out of its early season doldrums. The young Golden Gophers started 0-5-1, the second worst start in the history of the program. But Woog and his charges did not panic. They rattled off a 6-2-2 record to end the 1993 portion of the campaign and bring the team back to respectability.

After the New Year, the real action began. The Golden Gophers posted a 14-4-1 second half record in the WCHA, finishing just a half game away from the coveted MacNaughton Cup. They then rattled off five consecutive playoff wins, notching their second consecutive WCHA Tournament Championship and an NCAA Final Four berth along the way. The team finished the season with a 25-13-4 record. They posted a 25-8-3 record after that tough 0-5-1 start, making the turnaround one of the most remarkable in NCAA hockey history. Doug Woog maintained calm throughout the dismal start and capped off one of his finest coaching jobs with his fifth NCAA Championship appearance.

Nielsen and McAlpine led the way individually, but it was a total team effort that led to these accomplishments. This squad, more than any, epitomized the "team" principle as somebody new came forward every game to help the team to victory. The old cliches of taking it one game at a time and giving 110 percent were very much a reality in this group. The senior class led the way as Nielsen had his finest year as a Golden Gopher with 29 goals and 18 assists. McAlpine also had his best year with 12 goals and 18 assists. Eric Means had career highs with five goals and 11 assists from the blue line and played consistently strong defense all year. Joe Dziedzic had nearly a point a game in a frustrating season that saw him miss 26 of 44 games with two separate fractures of his right arm. Tony Bianchi came out of nowhere to lead the Minnesota power play and notch eight goals and a team-high 27 assists.

Junior Justin McHugh had a solid year with a strong run at the end of the season, giving him 15 goals and 20 assists, good for third on the team. Sophomore Brian Bonin played on a line with McHugh and proved he will be a key offensive force in the league next year with 24 goals and 20 assists. Sophomore Bobby Dustin is the only other player to notch more than 10 goals with the 10th coming in the final game of the year.

The defensive corps was once again a strength of the team as McAlpine and Means held together a group of veterans that will be a force for the future. The names of Dan Trebil, Greg Zwakman, Charlie Wasley, and Brian LaFleur are already penciled in for next year. Between the pipes, a pair of Jeffs had very good years. Jeff Callinan proved that he could win the big games as he rattled off 12 victories in his last 15 starts, including the overtime and a big double overtime win over Lowell that put the Maroon and Gold back into the Final Four. Callinan finished with

a 14-5-3 record and a 3.22 GAA. Jeff Moen won the WCHA Championship game and finished with an 11-8-1 record and a 3.33 GAA. With both of these two fine goalies returning, the defensive future for Minnesota looks very bright.

The 1993-94 season will go down as a memorable one. This group of overachievers battled back from adversity and returned Minnesota hockey to the top of the national collegiate hockey scene. With 17 letterwinners returning from this year's squad, Scott Bell coming off his red-shirt year, and the highest-rated recruiting class in over a decade coming in, the future of Golden Gopher hockey looks very bright indeed.
