## DID U KNOW?

The Golden Gophers and Virginia played in the NIT finals in Madison Square Garden on March 20, 1980. It was the final collegiate game for NBA Hall of Famer Kevin McHale. It was also a matchup of Virginia's freshman center, 7-4 Ralph Sampson and Minnesota's freshman center, 7-2 Randy Breuer. In the battle of the big men, Sampson had 15 points, Breuer had 12 points and the 6-11 McHale tallied only eight points. In the end, it was Sampson's two free throws with 1:31 remaining that gave Virginia the lead for good in a 58-55 win. McHale went on to a Hall of Fame career with the Boston Celtics, while Sampson and Breuer both had lengthy NBA careers.

## THE "BARN"

The Golden Gophers have fashioned an impressive 666-246 record (.730) at Williams Arena since it was opened in 1928. The elevated hardwood floor with the fans right on top of the action is a tremendous home court advantage. Minnesota has an 82-18 (.820) record at home the past five-plus seasons. In the past 11-plus years, that record stands at 142-35 (.802). The Golden Gophers hold a 69-10 mark (.873) at the "Barn" in nonconference games over the past 10-plus seasons and a 34-6 mark (.850) in nonconference games the past five years. Williams Arena is one of the most tradition-rich collegiate basketball environments in the nation.

**Golden Gophers Have Big Week Ahead:** The Golden Gophers (3-0) have a very busy week against some stiff competition. Tuesday, the Maroon and Gold entertain Virginia (4-1). The Cavaliers are picked to challenge for the top three spots in the ACC this season and are coming off a third-place finish in the Puerto Rico Shootout. Saturday, Dec. 4, Minnesota will host Valparaiso (2-2). The Crusaders have won five straight Mid-Continent conference titles and are favored for a sixth. Following this week's game, the Golden Gophers will host Maine (Dec. 11), before traveling to Oregon (12/18) for the Portland Jam at the Rose Garden, in Portland, Ore.

**Minnesota Raises Record To 3-0:** The Golden Gophers raised their record to 3-0 with an 86-67 win over Morehead State (Ky.) last Saturday. The victory was the least satisfying for Head Coach Dan Monson, as he felt the team did not compete at the level necessary to improve, especially in the second half when Minnesota turned the ball over 16 times. On the bright side, Minnesota had great offensive balance with five players scoring in double figures and shot well from three-point range (6-13), especially the starting backcourt of **Terrance Simmons (Haughton, La.)** and **Kevin Burleson (Seattle, Wa.)**. Simmons, who led all scorers with a career-high 18 points, was 4-of-4 from three-point range and dished out five assists. Burleson tallied 11 points on 3-of-5 shooting overall and 2-of-4 from three-point range. He also dished out a career-high seven assists and had three steals. Overall, Minnesota shot a blistering 63 percent, forcing Morehead out of their zone defense. **John-Blair Bickerstaff (Denver, Colo.)** continued his fine play, tallying 10 points, eight rebounds, five assists, three blocks and two steals. The extremely active forward is one of the team's leaders and works very hard at both ends of the court. Rounding out the starters in double figures was **Dusty Rychart (Grand Rapids, Minn.)** who had a workman-like 12-point, seven rebound, three steal game. Rychart leads the Golden Gophers in scoring and rebounding at 18.7 points and 10.7 rebounds per game. He is ranked second in the Big Ten in both categories. He is shooting 63.9 percent from the field and has a team-high eight steals.

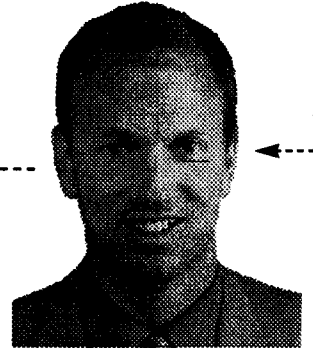
**Shortened Bench:** The Golden Gophers starting five accounted for 58 of Minnesota's 66 points in the win over Marquette. The bench was held to just eight points from **Mitch Ohnstad (Faribault, Minn.)**. Minnesota's bench bounced back vs. Morehead State led by Ohnstad's 17 points and **Nick Sinville (Shreveport, La.)**, who tallied a career-high nine points. The Golden Gophers bench has been shortened all season due to injuries and other issues. Two players (Mike Bauer and Kevin Nathaniel) are out with ankle sprains, and both would be in Minnesota's top eight rotation and might be starters. In addition, Kyle Sanden, a starter as a freshman, is sitting out this semester to get back on track for graduation. An excellent outside shooter and high post passer, the 6-11, 265 pound forward/center will bring some additional scoring, experience and size to the frontcourt when he returns. Freshman **Shane Schilling (Minnetonka, Minn.)** also missed the Morehead State game, and he will be out for the next two games as he serves a one week suspension applied by coach Monson for breaking team rules.

**Rychart Named Big Ten Player of the Week:** Sophomore forward Dusty Rychart was named the Big Ten Player of the Week (11/22/99) following his 22 point, 13 rebound performance vs. Texas-Arlington. Rychart tallied a double-double by halftime (16 pts, 10 reb.) and scored Minnesota's first six points of the game. It was Rychart's first time winning the award.

**Big D Is the Key:** All fall camp coach Monson has pushed the Golden Gophers to be an excellent defensive club. The hard work has paid dividends right away with much of Minnesota's offense created off its defense. The Maroon and Gold held Arlington to 33.3 percent (25-75) shooting and forced 17 turnovers. They followed that by holding Marquette to 44 percent shooting and forced 24 turnovers. Against Morehead State, the Maroon and Gold forced 22 turnovers and held the Eagles to 36.5 percent shooting from the field. Overall, Minnesota's opponents are shooting 38 percent from the field and turning it over 21.0 times per game. Defensively center **Joel Przybilla (Monticello, Minn.)** is a force in the paint and changes the opponent's offense. In the opener, he rejected nine Maverick shots. That was Przybilla's second-highest block total ever and the third-highest total in school history. He is averaging 8.7 points and 5.3 rebounds to go with 4.7 blocks per game.

**It's A Block Party:** Minnesota had 11 blocks vs. Texas-Arlington behind Przybilla's nine rejections. That is the eighth-highest number in school history and two blocks shy of the school record of 13 which Minnesota tied last year vs. Fresno State (12/4/98). Przybilla now has four of the top seven blocked-shot performances in school history. He has 98 blocks in his brief career,

which is sixth all-time. Last year, Przybilla led the nation in blocks for the first half of the season before losing his legs late in the season and finishing eighth in the nation with 84 blocks (3.0 bpg). That was just three blocks short of Randy Breuer's school-record 87 blocks set in 1982-83. Minnesota set a school record for blocks last season with 165 in 1998-99 (5.9 per game). This year the Golden Gophers are averaging 8.3 blocks per game in the first three games. Przybilla leads the team with 14 blocks, followed by Bickerstaff with six.

**Przybilla Power:** Przybilla is one of the top young centers in the nation and will be the focal point of the Golden Gophers on both ends of the court. He is shooting 53 percent from the field and as the young perimeter players develop the middle will open up for him offensively. He started 26 of Minnesota's 28 games last year and averaged 6.7 points and 5.8 rebounds per game and 3.0 blocks. He stepped up and had a big night in the win at Penn State with 15 points on 6-7 shooting and six rebounds. Against Purdue at Williams Arena he had nine points, seven rebounds and three assists. He had his finest game as a Golden Gopher against Penn State at Williams Arena (1/9/99) when he scored 17 points, hauled down 13 rebounds and had six blocks. He followed that with another impressive performance at Michigan State (1/13/99) when he tallied 12 points with a Big Ten season-high eight blocks.

**Burleson Shines:** Redshirt freshman Kevin Burleson exploded off the bench in the season opener, his first game as a Golden Gopher, scoring 16 points and hitting 4-of-7 three-pointers in 19 minutes. Burleson was 5-of-10 overall from the field and also added a pair of free throws and six rebounds to his resumé. The effort earned him a starting role. Burleson is fifth on the team in scoring at 10.7 points per game and is shooting 47 percent from the field and 43 percent (6-14) from three-point range. He is also Minnesota's top free throw shooter at 80 percent (8-10). If he can continue to improve and provide consistent outside shooting for Minnesota, it will help open up the middle for Przybilla and the other Minnesota interior players. Burleson comes from an athletic background. He is the son of former NFL defensive back Al Burleson who played for the L.A. Rams and New Orleans Saints and his brother Alvin was a football player for the Washington Huskies.

**Przybilla Named Freshman All-America:** Joel Przybilla was named to the Freshman All-America team by *College Hoops Insider* magazine last spring. Przybilla joined Erick Barkley/St. John's, Erik Brown/Morehead State, Devin Brown/Texas-San Antonio, Geordie Cullen/High Point, Dan Gadzuric/UCLA, Kris Lang/North Carolina, Corey Magette/Duke, Keith McLeod/Bowling Green, Michael Miller/Florida, Jerome Moiso/UCLA, Troy Murphy/Notre Dame, Quentin Richardson/DePaul, Chris Williams/Virginia and Michael Wright/Arizona.

**Bickerstaff Making His Mark:** Junior swing man John-Blair Bickerstaff has already established himself as a key factor in the Golden Gophers success. The second-leading scorer at 11.7 points per game, he is one of the team leaders. His defense and work ethic on both ends of the court keys Minnesota's transition game. An excellent offensive rebounder, he is averaging 3.3 offensive rebounds per game and led the team in rebounding vs. Morehead State with eight boards. Bickerstaff has scored in double figures in every game. He is an outstanding athlete who can run and jump as well as anybody in the country. He will be another of the sources that head coach Dan Monson looks to for scoring. Bickerstaff sat out last year as a Division I transfer. He is a very good interior passer and can get on the offensive glass with his quickness and leaping ability. The son of former NBA coach Bernie Bickerstaff, he spent two seasons at Oregon State where he averaged 6.9 points and 3.9 rebounds per game. He was the *USA Today* Colorado Player of the year as a prep senior, when he led Denver East to a 23-1 record and the Class 5-A state title.

**Minnesota vs. Teams From The ACC:** Minnesota has an 11-17 all-time record vs. teams from the ACC. The record is 6-2 in Minnesota's favor when the games are played at Williams Arena. Maryland (12/10/60) and Virginia (12/29/89) are the only two ACC teams to win at Williams Arena. Virginia is one of three ACC teams the Golden Gophers have never beaten (Virginia .0-3, Maryland 0-2 and North Carolina State 0-2).

**Minnesota vs. Teams From The Mid-Continent Conference:** Minnesota has an 11-0 record vs. teams from the Mid-Continent Conference. The record is 9-0 at Williams Arena. Valparaiso is the last Mid-Continent Conference team that Minnesota faced when they defeated the Crusaders 70-66 in the Big Island Invitational in 1995, despite 24 points from Bryce Drew.

### Minnesota held an opponent to less than 60 points:

Nov. 23, 1999. Minnesota held Marquette to 57 points in a 66-57 win. Minnesota held the Golden Eagles to 44 percent shooting and forced them into 24 turnovers.

### Minnesota was held to less than 60 points:

Feb. 27, 1999. Minnesota held Northwestern to 51 points in a 58-51 win. Minnesota shot 40 percent for the game.

**Ohnstad Off The Bench:** Sophomore guard Mitch Ohnstad (Faribault, Minn.) was the team's leading scorer off the bench a year ago with 6.1 points per game and is averaging 11.0 points this year. Ohnstad is struggling with his outside shot and has yet to hit his first three-pointer this year. Last year, he tallied 21 treys, shooting 34 percent from long range off the bench. He led the team in assists with 75 (2.7 apg) last year. He had his best game of the year vs. Morehead State when he scored 17 points on 7-13 shooting. The winner of the 1996 "Mr. Basketball Award" in Minnesota, he played one season at Cal-Poly SLO before transferring to Minnesota and sitting out during the 1997-98 season. Ohnstad played in all 30 games for Cal-Poly, starting 24 and averaging 10.9 points and 4.4 assists per game.

**Blue Collar:** Sophomore Dusty Rychart has become a fan favorite at Williams Arena with his work ethic and nose for loose balls. The former walk-on who hails from one of Minnesota's top ice hockey communities has put Grand Rapids on the map for basketball. He emerged late last season with a couple of big performances. He tallied 10 points and had six rebounds off the bench vs. Big Ten Champion Michigan State and had the game of his career vs. Gonzaga when he scored 23 points and had 17 rebounds. The 17 boards equals the 17 Miles Tarver had vs. Indiana last year, and is the most since Richard Coffey had 20 rebounds vs. Grambling on Dec. 30, 1987.

**A New Look:** The changes in the Minnesota coaching staff have given point guard Terrance Simmons a clean slate and he is making the most of it. He was one of Minnesota's top players on the European tour in August, and has performed very well so far this year. Simmons tallied a career-high eight assists and hit 4-of-5 free throw attempts vs. Texas-Arlington. He followed that with an 11-point, three assist, two steal effort vs. Marquette and an 18-point, five assist

performance vs. Morehead State. He shot 4-of-4 from three-point range to raise his trey average to 57 percent (4-7). He is averaging 11.7 points, 5.3 assists per game. He is one of the most athletic players on the team and is doing a good job of running Minnesota's new offensive system. Simmons is an excellent defender, outstanding open court player and has renewed confidence that is showing on the court. A transfer from LSU who played in 25 games as a freshman Tigers, he sat out the 1997-98 season. Simmons got off to a tough start last season, and lost his confidence. He has done an excellent job rebounding and is playing his best basketball for the Golden Gophers right now.

**Like Father; Like Son:** Head Coach Dan Monson and his father Don Monson, the former Idaho and Oregon head coach, form one of the top father-son coaching combinations in NCAA history. The two Monsons combined coaching record for wins (271-203/.572) is the ninth-highest in NCAA history for a father-son combination. The elder Monson was also an assistant to Michigan State's head coach Jud Heathcote (1976-78). The top father/son coaching combination in NCAA history is Ray Meyer and his two sons, Joey and Tom. Between the three of them they have tallied 1,023 wins.

**Monson Helps USA To Gold Medal:** Head Coach Dan Monson was an assistant coach for Oliver Purnell of Dayton, who was the head coach of USA World University games team which won the gold medal in Mallorca, Spain.

**Gophers to Play in Big Ten/ACC Challenge:** The Golden Gophers will participate in the Big Ten/ACC Challenge with a game vs. Virginia on Nov. 30 at Williams Arena. The game will be nationally broadcast on ESPN2.

**Young Team:** Minnesota enters the 1999-2000 season without a senior on its roster. The Golden Gophers feature five juniors, five sophomores and four freshmen. The last time Minnesota entered a season without a senior on the roster was 1980-81, when the team finished 19-11, 9-9. Two starters from 1998-99 return this year in Joel Przybilla and Kevin Nathaniel. In addition, the top bench scorer last year, Mitch Ohnstad returns. A total of seven letterwinners return, that includes junior Kyle Sanden, who is sitting out this semester to get back on pace for graduation. John-Blair Bickerstaff is seeing his first action after sitting out a season as a Division I transfer.

**Bauer Out With Ankle Sprain:** Freshman forward Mike Bauer (Hastings, Minn.) is out with a severe left ankle sprain that occurred on Nov. 6. The original prognosis was that he will be out a minimum of four weeks. He is making progress, but is still listed as doubtful for this week's games.
