JOUBERT SECOND IN BIG TEN REBOUNDING

(Minneapolis, MN) —Minnesota senior Dana Joubert finished up her four-year Gopher career ninth on the all-time rebounding list with 638 career rebounds. The 6-1 St. Martin DePorres High School graduate ended the season second in the Big Ten in rebounding in conference games, averaging 8.7 rebounds per game in conference matchups.

Joubert posted 16 games in double figure scoring, leading or sharing the lead in scoring in seven contests. She posted six games with 20 points or better and eight games with double-figure rebounding. Joubert put together eight games in which she posted double figures in scoring and rebounding. She tied her career-high in rebounding with 15 against Wisconsin on the road, adding 18 points. One of Joubert's finer games came against Indiana at Williams Arena, when she scored 27 points and 14 rebounds.

Joubert led the team in rebounding (8.2 rpg) and blocked shots (.8/game) while finishing the season second in scoring with 13.4 ppg. She ended up ninth in games played (108), 14th in field goals made (323), 12th in field goals attempted and ninth in free throws attempted (310) over her four-year career.

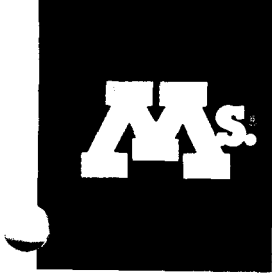

As a prep star at St. Martin DePorres High School, Joubert was co-captain of the 1988 Michigan Class C championship team. She averaged 15 points and 16 rebounds per game as a senior and was an all-state selection while being named to the East All-Star team. Joubert was also a two-time all-league and all-metro selection and played three years for the Michigan AAU championship team, including the 1987 team that finished third in the nation.

A human relationships major at Minnesota, Joubert is the daughter of Sundra and Jerel Joubert.

THOMPSON CONSISTENT FLOOR LEADER

(Minneapolis, MN) —For the third straight year, the University of Minnesota women's basketball team was led by Holly Thompson at the point-guard slot. The former Shaw High graduate has been the Gophers' leader in assists for each of the last three seasons and this year averaged 3.5 assists per game. The winner of the Fastbreak Club Award for sportsmanship, Thompson recorded five or more assists in eight games in 1991-92.

Thompson was also a leader in steals, pacing the team with 43 during the season and tying a career high with six at Marquette on Dec. 21. She recorded her season-high in assists with nine in the second game of the season. Thompson started 25 games this season, missing two games while recovering from a concussion. She missed starting just three games in the last three years and played in 100 games in her Gopher career. A consistent floor leader, Thompson scored a season-high eight points twice, posting an eight point, four rebound and five assist game at Indiana on Feb. 14.

CARVER SHOWCASES SHOOTING ABILITY

(Minneapolis, MN) —Imagine her frustration when former Buffalo High School star Stacy Carver found herself in the hospital with appendicitis on October 15, 1991, the first day of basketball practice. But she was determined that she would not let surgery set her back any longer than necessary. Carver proved her physical setback would not affect her performance when she scored a career-high 22 points and tied the school record for three point goals in a game (6) in just her second game back. Carver shot six-for-six from three-point range as the Gophers nearly upset eighth-ranked North Carolina State on their own court.

The Montrose, Minn. native recorded a career-high 10 rebounds at home against Michigan State while adding 14 points. Carver scored in double figures in 12 contests.

Carver finished the season third in scoring with 9.5 points per game after starting in 25 of the 26 games in which she played. She also finished third in rebounding with 4.6 rebounds per game. Carver was one of the team's leaders in free throw shooting, scoring on 77.3 percent of her shots from the line. She connected on 20 three-point goals for the season, more than any other Gopher.

As a prep star at Buffalo High School, Carver was the 1989 *Star Tribune* Metro Player of the Year and at the time held the all-time scoring record among Class AA girls basketball players with a five-year career total of 1,857 points. Carver started 104 consecutive games at Buffalo and averaged 26.6 points and 14.0 rebounds per game. Carver is the daughter of Jean and Lee Carver.

COATES HAS HOT AND COLD SEASON

(Minneapolis, MN) —Minnesota sophomore Nikki Coates had a hot an cold season for the Gophers in 1991-92, appearing in 17 games and averaging 11.2 minutes of playing time. She scored in double figures once during the season, leading the team with 20 points at Michigan State, shooting 73 percent from the floor. Coates recorded a career-high five steals at Kansas and averaged 2.9 ppg for the season.

As a freshman, Coates averaged 4.9 ppg and scored a career-high 28 points in the final week of the season. She suffered a season-ending knee injury after only four games in 1988-89 and redshirted the season.

SHUDLICK NAMED TO ALL-BIG TEN SECOND TEAM

(Minneapolis, MN) — While former Apple Valley High School star Carol Ann Shudlick posted an impressive freshman season last year, she proved in her sophomore campaign that she is a force to be dealt with. Shudlick earned the respect of opposing teams and coaches, being named to the all-Big Ten second team as a sophomore while also earning the team's most valuable player award.

Shudlick scored 12 points in the season opener, consistent with her 11.9 ppg average from a year ago, then reeled off five straight games of 20 points or better, twice reaching 29 points. On Dec. 21, Shudlick shattered the Minnesota single-game scoring record when she poured in 44 points in a 105-100 victory over Marquette for the sixth best performance of the season among NCAA Division I participants and best performance in the Big Ten. The previous school record had been 42 points, set by Laura Coenen in 1984. Shudlick also set the record for field goals in a single game with 21 against Marquette.

After posting 18 and 20-point performances against top ten teams Iowa and Penn State, Shudlick scored 33 points at home against Ohio State, shooting 80 percent from the field (12-of-15) and 90 percent from the line (9-of-10).

Shudlick wound up her sophomore campaign with double figure scoring in 26 of 27 games, 20-point or better performances in 13 games and better than 30 points twice. She led the team in scoring with 20.3 ppg and finished second in the Big Ten in overall scoring, fifth in field goal percentage (.514) and eighth in free throw percentage (.714). She is the first Gopher to average better than 20 ppg in a season since Laura Coenen averaged 25.3 ppg in 1985. Shudlick's 547 points in the season is third on the single-season list. The sophomore all-America candidate led the team in scoring in 17 contests and finished second on the team in rebounding with 7.0 ppg, leading the team 12 times on the boards.

As a prep star at Apple Valley High School, Shudlick was named Minnesota's 1990 Miss Basketball. She was also the 1990 Gatorade Minnesota Player of the Year and the 1989 *St. Paul Pioneer Press* Athlete of the Year. Shudlick scored 1,558 points and had 1,111 rebounds in her four-year high school career.
