## Partnership to Address Violence Through Education to Host Institute

Perhaps one of the most pressing issues of our time is that of violence. Be it violence in the family or on the street, this is an issue that touches nearly everyone. But the age group that is perhaps most affected by violence is young children: in Minneapolis, for example, the age group most likely to die from homicide is children under one year old. Those who work in the field of early childhood education are often not properly trained to address issues of violence. A new program, Partnership to Address Violence through Education (PAVE), is working to address these problems by providing training to the people who work with young children so they can lessen the negative effects of violence.

PAVE's primary goal is to address the growing need to prepare residents from the economically disadvantaged central city neighborhoods of Minneapolis and St. Paul to work as child care professionals within their neighborhoods. The PAVE project has seven objectives in addressing the needs of residents in these neighborhoods: (1) recruit and retain low-income participants as child care workers; (2) provide these students with field experience in their neighborhoods; (3) provide postsecondary training with a focus on violence prevention and violence counseling to those who are prepared for advanced education; (4) assure them employment in early childhood education and development or violence counseling; (5) develop and disseminate training materials that address violence prevention or counseling; (6) provide ongoing communication among students, staff, faculty, community providers, and families about current research and information through community seminars and a comprehensive resource library; (7) and conduct ongoing evaluation.

The original grant for PAVE from the U.S. Department of Education was for five years. But pending funding cuts have required project staff to creatively explore what can be accomplished in only one year. One of the ways staff felt they could create the greatest impact with the least amount of time was by hosting the upcoming Violence Prevention and Intervention Institute for early childhood educators. Part One, "Prevention" will be held on September 21 and 22; and Part Two, "Intervention" will be held on November 16 and 17. This interactive institute will harness the skills and experience of teachers in the field to plan new strategies for developing more "peaceful classrooms." Applications are being accepted from teams of two people who work at the same child care center in the Twin Cities.

PAVE is funded through the University of Minnesota's Center for Early Education and Development (CEED) and will soon be housed in Pattee Hall. This is a collaborative project that also involves the St. Paul Technical College and the Minneapolis Technical College. The Principal Investigators for this project who are affiliated with the Institute on Community Integration are Mary McEvoy and Sandy Christenson. - **Fee Plan for ICI Printer**
- The Institute has a new printer that is available for general use by ICI. It is located in Room 110 and can be printed from any Mac or PC that is connected to the network. In order to cover the costs of consumables and depreciation, users need to pay for the use of the printer. Rather than try to keep track of who is printing how many pages, the following flat rate plan has been proposed: Any project can print as many pages as it likes for \$15/month (or \$180/year). In order to begin this, send a memo to Megan Dushin (Rm. 110) providing her with a project name, CUFS number, and the name of your budget account manager in Administration. PLEASE check with your budget account manager to be sure that you have funds available which can be used for this purpose BEFORE you contact Megan.
