PETERSON TO RETIRE AS U OF M SID JANUARY 1ST

Bob Peterson, sports information director for men's athletics at the University of Minnesota for the past 18 years, will retire January 1, 1994. He will continue to oversee football operations for the sports information office until his retirement.

Marc Ryan, the number one assistant under Peterson since 1989, will serve as interim director while a search is conducted by the men's department and an appointment made January 1, 1994.

"Bob has been an integral part of this department for nearly two decades," said Men's Director of Athletics Dr. McKinley Boston. "His many contributions during challenging times for this department have been significant and much appreciated. Bob is a real professional and will be missed."

Peterson, 62, came to the University of Minnesota in 1975 after 10 years as the sports information director at St. Cloud State University. Prior to that, he taught English and Journalism for nine years at the high school level and also was a sports writer and sports editor.

During his 28 years in the sports information profession, Peterson has received more than 20 citations for excellence in the field of publications from the College Sports Information Directors of America. A past president of CoSIDA, he was elected to that organization's Hall of Fame in 1983.

While a high school teacher, Peterson received two Newspaper Fund Fellowships from the Wall Street Journal for excellence in teaching. He also won three Minnesota Newspaper Association awards when in that field in Greater Minnesota.


Peterson attended Hamline University, received his B.S. degree from St. Cloud State University and his M.S. degree from the University of North Dakota. He also did post graduate work at Syracuse University under his Newspaper Fund Fellowship.

He has been an active member of CoSIDA, the Football Writers of America and the Basketball Writers of America. Peterson also has been involved with the U.S. Olympic Committee as a press liaison officer during several Summer Olympic Festivals and the Pan American Games.

Peterson is only the third full-time men's sports information director in University of Minnesota history. Les Etter became the first in 1930. Otis Dypwick assumed those duties in 1944 and held that position until Peterson joined the staff in 1975.

Ryan came to Minnesota in '89 after two years on the staff at Villanova. Prior to that, he served as sports information director at Macalester College for two years. In addition, he worked as a press liaison at the 1987, 1990 and 1991 U.S. Olympic Festivals, the 1990 Goodwill Games, and the 1992 Olympic Games in Barcelona. He is a 1984 graduate of Moorhead State University where he was a two-time All-American in track.



HOCKEY "BORDER BATTLE" SERIES TO CONTINUE AT TARGET CENTER

The University of Minnesota in conjunction with the Target Center announced today an agreement to continue the "Border Battle" Minnesota-Wisconsin hockey series at the Target Center. The agreement fulfills a five-year agreement that was originally struck with North Stars owner Norm Green.

The "Border Battle" game was created to help generate revenue for the On-Campus Sports Facilities Campaign. The capital campaign is the private donation portion of the \$41 million on-campus sports facilities improvement project that involves the remodeling of Williams Arena, the conversion of the old Mariucci Arena into the Sports Pavilion, designed primarily for women's sports, and the construction of the new Mariucci Arena facility. The agreement with the Target Center will generate a minimum of \$1 million in revenue towards the fundraising campaign and will put it at just over \$5 million towards its \$5.5 million goal.

"We are extremely grateful to Marv Wolfenson and Harvey Ratner for their commitment to this agreement," said Director of Men's Athletics McKinley Boston. "We also want to thank Dana Warg and the entire Target Center staff for their part in bringing this agreement together. The five-year deal with the Target Center and the revenue it will generate will put us very close to our fundraising goal of \$5.5 million."

MEN'S BASKETBALL AND HOCKEY TICKET INFORMATION RELEASED

The University of Minnesota Athletic Ticket Sales Office has announced the timetable for men's basketball and hockey 1993-94 season and single-game ticket sales.

Hockey season ticket reorder applications will be mailed the second week of August. Season ticket holders will have until Tuesday, August 31 to renew their season tickets.

Applications for new public hockey season tickets and single-game tickets will be accepted beginning Monday, August 23. All orders received between August 23 and September 17 will be given equal consideration. If orders exceed ticket supply, a lottery selection system will be implemented. Approximately 250 tickets will be available for new public season ticket sales, including 200 reserved standing room spaces. All 200 single-game tickets will be reserved standing room. Orders must be limited to two tickets per customer. The 22-game season ticket package, which includes the first round of the WCHA playoffs and the Border Battle against Wisconsin at the Target Center on January 9, is \$330. Single-game tickets are \$15.

A limited number of assured seating options still remain for the 1993-94 hockey season. For more information, contact the Williams Fund Office at (612) 625-1001.

Basketball season ticket reorder applications will be mailed the third week of August. Season ticket holders will have until Friday, September 3 to renew their season tickets.


Applications for new public season and single-game basketball tickets will be accepted beginning Monday, August 23. All order received between August 23 and September 17 will be given equal consideration. A total of 200 limited view tickets are available for the new public season ticket sale and about 100 limited view tickets will be available on a single-game basis. If orders exceed ticket supply, a lottery selection system will be implemented. Single-game orders for the Indiana (Feb. 27) and Iowa (March 5) games are limited to two tickets per customer. The 18-game season ticket package, which includes the first round pre-season NIT game against Rice on Nov. 18 and a possible second round contest, is \$288. Single-game tickets are \$16.

All basketball assured seating options for the 1993-94 season have been sold.





MARIUCCI ARENA TRIVIA

The New Mariucci Arena is truly a state-of-the-art hockey facility. The arena, constructed by the OPUS Corporation, will not only house Golden Gopher Hockey for years to come, but will also be the new home to the University of Minnesota Men's Athletics Marketing and Ticket Sales Offices. To help you get to know the Golden Gophers' new home we have compiled a list of 10 of the less obvious facts about the New Mariucci and even some comparisons with the historic Mariucci Arena.

- The new arena is made with 256,580 bricks, 2,000 of which come from Memorial stadium.
- 850 tons of steel and 1,917,754 pounds of reinforcing steel were used during the construction period.
- In the new arena you will be 18'-6" above the ice if you are sitting in Row 12, in the old arena you would have been 8' above the ice in the same row.
- The opening capacity for the new arena will be 9,130 compared to 7,572 in the old Mariucci Arena (many of which were obstructed seats)
- The New Mariucci Arena covers an area of approximately 175,000 square feet, the Old Mariucci Arena was approximately 90,000 square feet.
- The ice sheet in the new arena is 100' x 200' (Olympic sized), the old sheet was 85' x 200'.
- The new center hung scoreboard is 20' wide and 15' high.
- The New Mariucci Arena has eight locker rooms, the old arena had two.
- The new building has a 200 ton ice making capacity.
- There is enough refrigeration piping to stretch 11.36 miles or 60,000 feet under the new ice sheet.

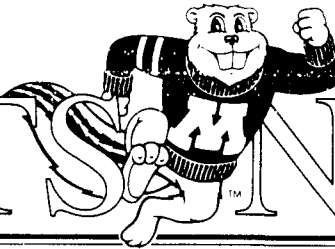

WACKER'S GRID TEAM OPENS FALL CAMP

Second-year Head Football Coach Jim Wacker brought his veterans into camp for their first day of pre-season football practice last Saturday at the University of Minnesota.

Newcomers already had four days of drills under their belts when the old timers arrived, and together they will put on pads for the first time Wednesday.

Nearly 120 candidates are on hand, and that delegation includes just under 40 first-year performers. The squad also boasts 39 lettermen.

"We're excited," Wacker told members of the press at Media Day on Friday. "We feel we are going to be a much improved football team, and we are anxious to get going."

The Golden Gophers were 2-9 in 1992, Wacker's first year at Minnesota, and everyone in camp is confident that the U of M will move up the ladder in 1993.

"Defense is the name of the game," Wacker stressed, "and that's one area where we need to get better."

Wacker called the defensive line the strength of Minnesota's club on that side of the ball.

"We've got some solid veterans there," he said, "people like Dennis Cappella (Sr., DE, Miller Place, N.Y.), Andy Kratochvil (Sr., DE, New Prague, Minn.), Ed Hawthorne (Jr., DT, St. Louis, Mo.) and Doyle Cockrell (Jr., DT, Evanston, Ill.), all of whom were starters last season."

The same holds true at linebacker, and Wacker feels just as good about the Golden Gophers who will line up there in 1993.

"Andy Veit (Sr., OLB, Palm Harbor, Fla.), Russ Heath (Sr., ILB, Aurora, Colo.), and Lance Wolkow (Sr., OLB, Lakeville, Minn.), all are experienced players," Wacker says, "and we have some good people behind them."

The top concern for Wacker defensively is in the secondary where two starters have

graduated from a unit that had a sub-par season in 1992.

"We must do a much better job in the defensive secondary in 1993 if we hope to make the kind of improvement we feel is necessary to win consistently," Wacker says.

The need to stop allowing the big plays is one concern Wacker has, and he'll attack that problem by attempting to eliminate allowing the long pass.

"We're going to be better," he maintains, "and we hope to get some improvement in our pass coverage with a better rush from our front four."

Drinon Mays (Sr., LC, Brandenton, Fla.) and Rod Narcisse (So., RC, Sugarland, Texas) are experienced cornerbacks. The same is true of Dan Li Santi (Jr., SS, Manalapan, N.J.) and Jeff Rosga (Sr., FS, Roseville, Minn.) at the safeties.

LiSanti's status remains in doubt, however, after he suffered a severed tendon in his right hand in an off-the-field mishap involving a glass porch door over the weekend.

He could be lost for a month or more and probably will be replaced in the secondary by Vincent Hypolite (So., SS, LaMarque, Texas).

The Golden Gophers will continue to run through two drills daily for the next two weeks. They will cut back to one session each day on Aug. 30 when they begin final preparations for the 1993 kickoff.

Minnesota opens its 1993 season at Penn State, the Big Ten Conference newcomer, at University Park, Pa., on Saturday, Sept. 4.

The first home game for the Golden Gophers is against non-conference foe Indiana State on Saturday, Sept. 11.

NEW MARIUCCI ARENA LOBBY TO BE NAMED FOR GEORGE LYON

The University of Minnesota announced today a significant gift to the new Mariucci Arena. The gift, the second largest received by the \$5.5 million on-campus sports facilities campaign since it began in 1991, will help fund the overall \$41 million sports facilities project. Receipt of the gift puts the campaign at more than \$5.3 million toward its goal.

The gift was received from the estate of George Lyon and will result in the naming of the main two-story east entrance lobby in honor of George Lyon. The lobby will be known as "Lyon Lobby."

Lyon, a 1953 graduate of the University of Minnesota, had been involved with Golden Gopher hockey since the late 1950's. He was an integral part of the Balcony Club, a hockey booster club established to support the hockey program.


Soon after Lyon's untimely death in the fall of 1992, it was learned that he had made arrangements for the new Mariucci Arena in his will. His son, Steve Lyon said, "Dad would have loved this building. He could get a hot dog and never miss a thing. Dad lived and died for the Gopher hockey program."

Head coach Doug Woog commented, "I don't remember ever knowing Gopher hockey without George. He was a caretaker of the program."

The Lyon family, through George Lyon's estate, chose to acknowledge the lifelong importance of the school and the game of hockey in George's life by accepting the university's offer to name the Mariucci Arena lobby in his honor.

GOLDEN GOPHERS READY FOR FINAL SCRIMMAGE

Second-year Head Football Coach Jim Wacker stepped up the pace for his 1993 University of Minnesota football team this week as preparations for the Sept. 4 season opener at Penn State continue.

Two-a-days are planned for the remainder of the week, and the final tune-up scrimmage is on tap Saturday.

The Golden Gophers went through a demanding two-and-one-half hour skirmish last Saturday, and Wacker saw his defensive unit dominate.

There were five interceptions, two by Michael Gist (So., CB, Daytona, Fla.), and nine sacks recorded by the defenders who held the offensive unit to a minus 16 yards rushing.

"There were some great defensive plays made in the scrimmage," Wacker said. "It was as good an effort as we've had from a defensive unit."

Among those big plays was a 55-yard interception return turned in by Russ Heath (Sr., LB, Aurora, Colo.).

Before the workout, Wacker stressed the need for Minnesota to get tougher----not only physically but mentally. He was urging the Golden Gophers to eliminate the mental mistakes----the offside penalties, fumbled center snaps and missed assignments. "We can't win playing dumb," he said. "We need to stay focused mentally."

And, while Minnesota was whistled for a couple of illegal procedure violations and one offside, there were no fumbled center snaps. In fact the Golden Gophers didn't fumble at all during the scrimmage.

However, Minnesota did not perform up to par offensively. "We have a long way to go," Wacker admitted. "We know that we have a lot of work to do. But we did do some good things. Now we just have to build on it."

Wacker continues to maintain that the

strength of the offensive unit will be at the skill positions, and much of the work that has to be done is with the offensive line.

Those concerns seemed justified during the scrimmage, especially when checking the minus yardage figures and the number of sacks recorded.

Even so, Tim Schade (Jr., QB, Pekin, Ill.) had nine completions and threw for a touchdown. Cory Sauter (Fr., QB, Hutchinson, Minn.) had the most yards passing----104, and Scott Eckers (Jr., QB, St. Louis Park, Minn.) also hit for a touchdown.

On the receiving end of those TD passes were Lewis Garrison (Jr., SE, Burnsville, Minn.), and Omar Douglas (Sr., SB, New Orleans, La.).

"We didn't get all of the offensive production out of the scrimmage we would have liked," Wacker conceded, "but seeing the defense dominate things this time of year is kind of typical. We know we have to get better. We need to work on improving every day and improving every week. We just need to stay focused."

Regarding the injury report, it appears the surgery on Dan LiSanti's (Jr., SS, Manalapan, N.J.), right hand was more extensive than anticipated, and LiSanti could be lost for the season instead of a few weeks. In addition, Andy Kratochvil (Sr., DE, New Prague, Minn.), broke the thumb on his right hand, the same injury he sustained last fall, and is on the shelf, but he is expected to return to practice this week.

After the opener at Penn State, Minnesota returns home to host Indiana State on Saturday, Sept. 11 at 6:00 p.m.



GOPHERS & NITTANY LIONS TO PLAY FOR GOVERNOR'S VICTORY BELL

Acting Governor Mark Singel of Pennsylvania and Governor Arne Carlson of Minnesota today jointly announced the establishment of an annual award to be presented to the winner of the Penn State-Minnesota football game, one of the new rivalries that is blossoming from the Nittany Lions' move to the Big Ten Conference.

Minnesota will be Penn State's first-ever conference foe when the Golden Gophers visit Beaver Stadium to kick off the Lions' inaugural Big Ten season on Saturday, September 4th.

To commemorate the occasion, the governors have commissioned the establishment of the "Governor's Victory Bell," which will go to the winner on an annual basis.

"We are delighted to mark the occasion of Penn State's first Big Ten football game by creating an award to celebrate the beginning of a new and significant rivalry," Pennsylvania acting governor Singel, a Penn State graduate and member of the Board of Trustees, said. "As the Nittany Lions' initial conference opponent, Minnesota always will occupy a special place in Penn State football history and we think it appropriate to mark the occasion in this distinctive fashion.

"Governor Robert Casey was an early supporter of Penn State's move to the Big Ten Conference," Singel continued, "and I know he looks forward to future conference games involving the Nittany Lions."

Minnesota governor Arne Carlson said "Big Ten athletics has been a tremendously positive experience in the life of our state. Minnesota's football matchup against Penn State is an historic welcome to a school that will further enrich that experience for all of us. This trophy marks a very special occasion and will allow us to remember it for years to come."

An artist's conception of the "Governor's Victory Bell" will be presented by Lt. Gov. Singel, acting in behalf of Governor Casey who is recovering from

major surgery, and either Governor Carlson or his representative to the respective presidents of the two schools, Dr. Joab Thomas of Penn State and Dr. Nile Hasselmo of Minnesota, prior to the kickoff of the September 4th game here.

The preliminary design shows a brass bell, bearing the medallion of the Big Ten Conference, suspended from a wooden frame. At the top of the frame is a plaque, which features the state seals of Pennsylvania and Minnesota, along with the following inscription:

Governor's Victory Bell

Presented annually to the winner of the
Penn State-Minnesota Football Game
Established September 4, 1993
Governor Robert Casey, Pennsylvania
Governor Arne Carlson, Minnesota

At the bottom of the base, the Minnesota and Penn State athletic logos appear along with individual brass plaques for inscription of the scores of the annual games between the two teams.

"The participation of the governors in the establishment of this award is particularly meaningful to the commemoration of a very historic moment," athletic director Terman said. "All of us associated with Penn State are anxiously awaiting the start of this unique football season. We have been working since the summer of 1990 to finally complete the process of integration into the conference. The Minnesota game represents the culmination of that process."

McKinley Boston, the Minnesota AD, noted "Penn State is a great addition to the Big Ten. The strength and integrity of its football program under Coach Paterno speaks for itself. We anticipate our games with the Nittany Lions in all sports to be exciting and challenging for years to come."

The Big Ten Conference is noted for its abundance of distinctive trophy games. Minnesota already plays for the Little Brown Jug (vs. Michigan), the Floyd of Roedale trophy (vs. Iowa) and the Paul Bunyan Axe (vs. Wisconsin).

GOLDEN GOPHERS OPEN AT PENN STATE SATURDAY

Minnesota's Golden Gophers kick off their second season under Head Coach Jim Wacker Saturday at Penn State University.

It will be a game of firsts. It will be the first game of the season for both teams. It marks the initial time that Minnesota and Penn State have met on the gridiron. It will be the first confrontation for the new Governor's Victory Bell, and it will be the first Big Ten Conference game in history for the Nittany Lions.

"We are well aware of the honor we have to be Penn State's first conference opponent," Coach Wacker said, "and we also know what a big challenge we are facing. Minnesota must be hitting on all cylinders, and we must be much further along than we were at this stage a year ago. We have to be at the top of our game mentally and physically."

If the Golden Gophers can perform as well as they did in their final tune-up scrimmage last weekend, the odds might not be as overwhelming.

"We know we have to play extremely well," Wacker stressed. "That means we have to eliminate our mental mistakes. But we demonstrated our ability to do that in our scrimmage last Saturday, and now we just have to work on staying focused this week in practice."

That dress rehearsal last weekend saw Minnesota cut its number of penalties drastically, and it did not fumble the ball until late in the skirmish when reserves had taken over.

It also saw the top three quarterbacks complete 24-of-45 passing attempts for 481 yards and seven touchdowns without an interception.

Tim Schade (Jr., QB, Pekin, Ill.), will get the starting call for the Golden Gophers at Penn State Saturday, and he tuned up with a 10-of-12 day, good for 141 yards and three TD's.

Wacker also liked what he saw of his running game, and he hopes for similar efforts against the Nittany Lions.

Chris Darkins (So., RB, Houston, Texas) led the assault with 88 yards on 11 carries, and he scored a pair of touchdowns.

Top receiver in the final scrimmage was Mike Long (Jr., SB, St. James, Minn.), who had eight catches for 136 yards and four touchdowns.

The kicking game, which was inconsistent a year ago, looked impressive last Saturday.

Mike Chalberg (So., PK, Auckland, New Zealand), and Omar Salas (Jr., PK, Fridley, Minn.), apparently will share those duties against Penn State after splitting those assignments—and the uprights—Saturday.

Andy Kratochvil (Sr., DE, New Prague), and Roderick Narcisse (So., CB, Sugarland, Texas), were among the defensive standouts in the scrimmage.

Kratochvil led all defenders with four solo tackles and three assists while Narcisse accounted for the only interception (which he returned 49 yards for a score).

"Our offense executed well," Wacker said, "much better than we did a year ago just one week before our opener. But we still have plenty of improving to do before we face Penn State. Our two-a-days are over, and all of us are happy about that. Now we just have to work hard in our final week of practice to get ready for the Nittany Lions. We need to focus on Penn State."

After the road opener, Minnesota returns home to host Indiana State on Saturday, Sept. 11, at 6:00 p.m.

GOLDEN GOPHER TALES.....

THE GAME: Minnesota vs Penn State
at University Park, Pa.
1:00 p.m. (EDT), Saturday, Sept. 4

THE SERIES: Minnesota and Penn State have never met in football. While the two schools have competed in other sports over the years, Saturday's game marks the first gridiron shootout in history between the Nittany Lions and the Golden Gophers. The game also marks Penn State's first Big Ten Conference football outing. The Nittany Lions were admitted to the Big Ten in 1990, and they first began competing in other conference sports two years ago.

THE OPPONENT: Penn State finished 7-5 a year ago and lost 24-3 to Stanford in the Blockbuster Bowl. The Nittany Lions return 40 lettermen and 12 starters from that team and are expected to be among the Big Ten's elite at the end of the 1993 season. There was only one common opponent on last year's slate. Minnesota fell to Pittsburgh 41-33, while Penn State hammered the Panthers 57-13.

THE COACHES: Jim Wacker is in his 23rd year as a head coach at the collegiate level. His career record is 146-100-3. In nine seasons at Texas Christian University, Wacker was 40-58-2. He is in his second year at Minnesota, and his record with the Golden Gophers is 2-9. Joe Paterno is in his 28th season at Penn State and as a collegiate head coach. His record is 246-67-3.

HAPPY VALLEY: Minnesota makes its first appearance ever in Beaver Stadium Saturday. Enlarged to a capacity of 93,967 in 1991, it is the second largest on-campus facility in the nation and is sold out for every home game.

WACKER VS. PATERNO: These two prominent football coaches have never crossed paths on the gridiron. Ironically, they "shared" Coach of the Year honors in 1982 when Paterno was named the Division I award winner after his Nittany Lions won the national title and Wacker reaped similar accolades in Division II as Southwest Texas State reigned at that level.

INJURY REPORT: The U of M's most serious loss thus far has been **Dan LiSanti (Jr., SS, Manalapan, N.J.)** who had surgery on his right hand and appears shelved for the season. **Andy Kratochvil (SR., DE, New Prague, Minn.)** also broke the thumb on his right hand (the same injury suffered by Kratochvil last fall), but he is expected to be in the lineup Saturday.

PLAYERS TO WATCH: Several Golden Gophers could be in line for post-season honors in 1993. Most prominent are: **Dennis Cappella (Sr., DE, Miller Place, N.Y.)**, **Antonio Carter (Sr., RB, Columbus, Ohio)**, **Chris Darkins (So., RB, Houston, Texas)**, **Omar Douglas (Sr., WR, New Orleans, La.)**, **Ed Hawthorne (Jr., DT, St. Louis, Mo.)**, **Russ Heath (Sr., LB, Aurora, Colo.)**, **Andy Kratochvil (Sr., DE, New Prague, Minn.)**, and **Rob Rogers (Sr., OG, St. Louis, Mo.)**.

STATISTICAL LEADERS: A year ago Antonio Carter led the Golden Gophers in rushing with 572 yards. He also set the pace in 1991 with 660 yards. Carter had 134 yards as a freshman, and thus comes into the season with a career rushing total of 1,387 yards. Omar Douglas was Minnesota's top receiver in '92 with 669 yards. He registered 108 in 1991 and has a career total of 777. Douglas looms as an equally dangerous threat as a kick returner. Last year he brought back 10 for 220 yards. Defensively Russ Heath led the Golden Gophers in tackles last fall with 108. Dennis Cappella had 66, and he paced Minnesota in sacks with 7.5.

WHAT'S NEXT: After hosting Minnesota, Penn State remains at home next week to entertain Southern Cal. The Golden Gophers return to the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome next Saturday to open their home slate against Indiana State at 6:00 p.m.

WACKER'S FINAL WORD: "It is tough enough to play on the road, but opening the season on the road makes it even more difficult. Penn State may be new to the conference, but it is a typical Big Ten team. They are big, strong and physical. Our players know it will be a real test for them. We believe Penn State will make every effort to be at the top of its game for its first Big Ten appearance in history. We must be physically, mentally and emotionally prepared. We know what a big challenge it is for us, but we will just have to be ready to tee it up and take our best shot."

An artist's conception of the "Governor's Victory Bell" will be presented by Lt. Governor Singel, acting in behalf of Governor Casey who is recovering from major surgery, and either Governor Carlson or his representative to the respective presidents of the two schools, Dr. Joab Thomas of Penn State and Dr. Nils Hasselmo of Minnesota, prior to the kickoff of Saturday's game at Beaver Stadium.

The preliminary design shows a brass bell, bearing the medallion of the Big Ten Conference, suspended

from a wooden frame. At the top of the frame is a plaque, which features the state seals of Pennsylvania and Minnesota, along with the following inscription:

**Governor's Victory Bell
Presented annually to the winner of the
Penn State-Minnesota Football Game
Established September 4, 1993
Governor Robert Casey, Pennsylvania
Governor Arne Carlson, Minnesota**

At the bottom of the base, the Minnesota and Penn State athletic logos appear along with individual brass plaques for inscription of the scores of the annual games between the two teams.

"The participation of the governors in the establishment of this award is particularly meaningful to the commemoration of a very historic moment," Athletic Director Jim Tarman of Penn State said. "All of us associated with Penn State are anxiously awaiting the start of this unique football season. We have been working since the summer of 1990 to finally complete the process of integration into the conference. The Minnesota game represents the culmination of that process."

McKinley Boston, Director of Men's Athletics at Minnesota, noted, "Penn State is a great addition to the Big Ten. The strength and integrity of its football program under Coach Joe Paterno speaks for itself. We anticipate our games with the Nittany Lions in all sports to be exciting and challenging for years to come."

The Big Ten Conference is noted for its distinctive trophy games. Minnesota already plays for the Little Brown Jug with Michigan, Floyd of Rosedale with Iowa and Paul Bunyan's Axe with Wisconsin.

Penn State has been involved in previous trophy games but only intermittently. The Nittany Lions, West Virginia and Pittsburgh once competed for an award christened "Old Ironsides" and games against Temple and Maryland in more recent years have been played for a bronzed "Milk Can Trophy."

Minnesota has been playing for the Little Brown Jug since 1909, the Floyd of Rosedale trophy since 1935 and Paul Bunyan's Axe since 1949.

GOLDEN GOPHERS OPEN HOME SLATE SATURDAY

Minnesota's Golden Gophers kick off the home portion of their '93 football slate Saturday when hosting Indiana State University in a non-conference assignment.

Both clubs will be in quest of their first win of the current campaign. While Minnesota was falling 38-20 in a Big Ten game at Penn State last weekend, Indiana State was dropping a 63-21 decision at the Air Force Academy.

"We aren't happy about losing at Penn State," Wacker acknowledged, "but we feel there are plenty of things to build on. It wasn't a great effort on our part, but it certainly was a good one."

As was the case so often a year ago, mistakes cost Minnesota dearly. At Penn State, those mistakes came early in the form of fumbles, turnovers and penalties.

"We let Penn State get the momentum in the first quarter," Wacker admitted, "much of it because of our turnovers and because of the ineffective play of our special teams."

The turnovers were obvious. Minnesota threw four interceptions, although two of them were late in the game after the outcome had been decided and the host club knew the Golden Gophers were in a desperation mode offensively. But the difficulties on special teams mounted up and continued from beginning to end. Minnesota, for example, fumbled its first two kickoffs. Its coverage teams also allowed long returns which gave the Nittany Lions excellent field position. In addition, the U of M missed an extra point attempt and had a field goal blocked.

"The play of our specialty teams was a disaster," Coach Wacker lamented. "It is an area that is going to get a lot of work. Maybe we will have to consider some personnel changes, but we certainly are going to have to show a great deal of improvement if we hope to get on the right track. We need to become more aggressive in that area and find a way to

get better."

All was not a disaster last week, however. Even in defeat, there were bright spots, there were school records set and there were reasons for hope for the future.

"Our people never quit," Wacker stressed. "We may have been in shock early when we spotted them those two quick touchdowns, but we kept playing hard. We played a very good team, and we played them well. In fact, we outplayed them in the second half."

Among Minnesota's record-setters were **Tim Schade (Jr., QB, Pekin, Ill.)**, who hit 34 of 66 passing attempts for 478 yards (a new mark). He also established a new single game total offense mark with 536 yards. **Omar Douglas (Sr., SB, New Orleans, La.)**, established a new U of M single game record for yards receiving with 193. And the Golden Gopher offense set a new record with 22 first downs passing. "Douglas is a great player," Wacker proclaimed. "He's as fine a receiver as I've ever coached."

Wacker also tipped his hat to Minnesota's offensive line, led by captain **Rob Rogers (Sr., OG, St. Louis, Mo.)**, which did not allow a sack at Penn State.

"But I'm proud of every one of our players," Wacker said. "We are going to get better, and hopefully that will start this week against Indiana State. Our offense was very close last Saturday. We are not far from being very good. We know that Indiana State is going to be competitive, and we know that history has shown that they can play. We respect them just as we respect every opponent. We also know that we made too many mistakes at Penn State, and we need to eliminate those mistakes. If we can do that, we will have a chance to win. But we must start winning the first quarter!"

The Golden Gophers hope to do that against ISU on Saturday.

GOLDEN GOPHER TALES.....

THE GAME: Minnesota vs Indiana State
at the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome
6:00 p.m. (CDT) Saturday, September 11, 1993

THE SERIES: Minnesota and Indiana State have met once before in football, that in 1989 when the Golden Gophers posted a 34-14 triumph in the Metrodome. It was the third game of the season and found record-setting Darrell Thompson leading the way for Minnesota with three touchdowns on runs of 19, 27 and eight yards. Thompson rushed for 231 yards against the Sycamores. Scott Schaffner and Marquel Fleetwod shared the quarterbacking duties for the Golden Gophers.

THE OPPONENT: Indiana State finished 4-7 overall a year ago and 2-4 in the Gateway Conference. They are led by David Wright who rushed for 1,313 yards last fall as a freshman. The Sycamores also have a two-year starter returning at quarterback in Kip Hennesly who has accounted for 3,148 yards in total offense over the past two seasons.

THE COACHES: Jim Wacker is in his 23rd year as a head coach at the collegiate level. His career record is 146-101-3. In nine seasons at Texas Christian University, Wacker was 40-58-2. He is in his second year at Minnesota, and his record with the Golden Gophers is 2-10. Dennis Raetz is in his 14th season as head coach at Indiana State, and his record is 68-76-1. His best seasons at ISU were in 1983 and 1984 when he went 9-4 and 9-3, respectively. His best finish in the Gateway Conference was in 1988 when ISU was 4-2.

THE LAST TIME OUT: Minnesota found Happy Valley an unhappy site for visitors last Saturday as it dropped a 38-20 decision at Penn State despite passing for 478 yards and netting 591 yards of total offense---87 more yards than the victorious Nittany Lions. Ironically, the Golden Gophers ran two more plays than Penn State (90-88), but trailed in time of possession by 14:58. While that was taking place in Pennsylvania, Indiana State was having an even more unpleasant experience in Colorado where the Sycamores fell 63-21 at the Air Force Academy. As a result, Minnesota and Indiana State will come into Saturday's game with 0-1 records.

THE INJURY REPORT: The U of M suffered some bumps and bruises at Penn State Saturday, but none appeared serious enough to put any of the Golden Gophers on the shelf. Omar Douglas (Sr., SB, New Orleans, La.), suffered a pulled groin muscle, Aaron Osterman (Jr., SE, Elk River, Minn.), has a bruised back and slight hip pointer, and Eric Dalen (Jr., TE, Minnetonka, Minn.), bruised his upper leg, but all three are listed as probable for the Sycamores on Saturday by Head Trainer Doug Locy. Chris Bergstrom (Fr., DT, Warroad, Minn.), who suffered a sprained foot two weeks ago and did not make the trip to Penn State, also could be available. The same is true for Lewis Garrison (Jr., SE, Burnsville, Minn.). Vincent Hypolite (So., SS, LaMarque, Texas), who is hampered by an injured toe and did not make the trip to Penn State, remains on the shelf and probably will be for at least two more weeks.

PLAYERS TO WATCH: Several Golden Gophers could be in line for post-season honors in 1993. Most prominent are: Dennis Cappella (Sr., DE, Miller Place, N.Y.), Antonio Carter (Sr., RB, Columbus, Ohio), Chris Darkins (So., RB, Houston, Texas), Omar Douglas (Sr., WR, New Orleans, La.), Ed Hawthorne (Jr., DT, St. Louis, Mo.), Russ Heath (Sr., LB, Aurora, Colo.), Andy Kratochvil (Sr., DE, New Prague, Minn.), and Rob Rogers (Sr., OG, St. Louis, Mo.).

THE STATISTICAL LEADERS: Tim Schade (Jr., QB, Pekin, Ill.), goes into week two of the Golden Gopher season as Minnesota's statistical leader. He completed 34 of 66 passing attempts at Penn State (missing the number of attempts school record by one) for 478 yards which set a new U of M record for most yards passing in a single game. The old mark was 444 established by Mike Hohensee in 1981 against Ohio State. Schade also established a new single game total offense standard with 536 yards. The old record was 423 also set by Hohensee against the Buckeyes in 1981. Omar Douglas (Sr., SB, New Orleans, La.) also set a new single game record for most yards receiving with 193 yards. He missed the mark for most receptions in a game (12) by one. Russ Heath (Sr., LB, Aurora, Colo.), is Minnesota's statistical leader defensively. He was credited with four solo tackles and eight assists for a total of 12 hits. One was for minus yardage.

WHAT'S NEXT: After hosting Indiana State Saturday, the University of Minnesota remains in the Metrodome to entertain Kansas State University of the Big Eight Conference Sept. 18., at 7:00 p.m. (CDT). The Sycamores continue on the road for the third straight week when playing at Southwest Missouri State University.

LUNCHEONS SET: The Friday "Lunch With Wacker" schedule for 1993 includes gatherings Friday before each home football game at the Minneapolis Athletic Club (615 2nd Ave. So.) beginning at noon, and those events kick off this week as a prelude to the Indiana State encounter. Reservations are requested and may be made by phoning 339-3655 (extension 440).

HOTLINE: Minnesota's telephone hotline is available to the media 24-hours daily. Phone 1-900-884-UOFM for access. Taped interviews with players and coaches are changed daily, and portions of Coach Wacker's news conferences also will be available on the Hotline.

WACKER'S FINAL WORD: "It will be good to be playing at home on Saturday. Penn State was an ideal setting for a college football game, but it was a difficult trip. The Penn State fans were really into the game, and we hope the Minnesota fans will give us that kind of edge on Saturday. We aren't taking Indiana State lightly, even with their loss at Air Force. We know about those road games, and we remember all those upsets by teams like Indiana State against Big Ten teams a year ago. Indiana State has a great running back in David Wright, and he's also a threat as a kick returner. But right now we have to worry about ourselves, and we know we have to eliminate the mistakes which cost us at Penn State. And we certainly can't afford any letdown emotionally after losing last week."

GOLDEN GOPHERS HOST KANSAS STATE SATURDAY

Minnesota's Golden Gophers get their second straight home start Saturday when hosting Kansas State of the Big Eight Conference at 7:00 p.m. in the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome.

The invading Wildcats will bring a perfect 2-0 record into Saturday's confrontation after downing New Mexico State 34-10 in the season opener two weeks ago and then besting Western Kentucky 38-13 last weekend.

Coach Jim Wacker's Minnesota club, meanwhile, will put a 1-1 mark on the line after the Golden Gophers posted a 27-10 triumph over Indiana State last Saturday. A week earlier the U of M had fallen 38-20 at Penn State.

"It sure feels better to win," Wacker admitted. "It may not have been pretty. It may even have been ugly. But a win is a win is a win, and right now we need wins."

Obviously there was, even while gaining a victory, reason for concern in the Minnesota camp.

"We certainly did not play very well," Wacker admitted. "We certainly are not elated about the way we played, but we are pleased that our people kept fighting, and they did what they had to do to get the win."

Among the chief concerns were the turnovers (Minnesota lost a fumble and threw two interceptions), had eight penalties for 78 yards (all of them seemingly at the worst possible times), and the defense gave up a long, scoring drive in the second half just at a point when it seemed the Golden Gophers were about to break the game wide open.

Despite those problems, Wacker continues to believe that his club is making progress, that some good strides were made between the first and second games. And, he felt there were some real strong points in Minnesota's game against the Sycamores last Saturday.

"The most disturbing thing about the turnover ratio is that we are giving up the ball but not getting any back," Wacker pointed out. "We have to correct that, and we need to see our defense start coming up with some fumbles and interceptions. But on offense, we threw for 383 yards, our third-down conversion rate was better, and the play of our specialty teams was vastly improved."

Specifically, Wacker was tipping his hat to **Tim Schade (Jr., QB, Pekin, Ill.)** who hit 26-of-39 passing attempts for 345 yards and a touchdown and now has 823 passing yards on the season.

Wacker also was singing the praises of **Mike Chalberg (So., PK, Auckland, New Zealand)**, who converted three extra points and added a 42-yard field goal.

"Tim was really throwing well," Wacker said. "Both of his interceptions were tipped balls. Mike really kicked well. It looks like he has his rhythm back, and that is good to see."

And while Wacker thinks his club is making progress, he also admits that a lot more progress has to be made if the Golden Gophers are to come out winners this weekend.

"Coach Snyder really has Kansas State playing well right now," Wacker says. "They are playing with confidence. Their defense has been playing especially well, and they have given up 13 points or less in their first two games."

Does Wacker think Minnesota has a chance to make it two in a row at home in the Metrodome?

"This really becomes a critical game for us," Wacker says. "But to win, we have to run the ball better, and we have to take advantage of scoring opportunities when they present themselves. If we can just keep getting better, we will be all right."

GOLDEN GOPHER TALES.....

THE GAME: Minnesota vs. Kansas State
September 18, 1993, 7:05 p.m. (CDT)
Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome
Minneapolis, Minnesota

THE SERIES: Minnesota and Kansas State have met only once before in football, that in 1960 when the Golden Gophers posted a 48-7 triumph in old Memorial Stadium. It was the sixth game of the season for the U of M which was undefeated and enroute to a Big Ten and national championship. All-America selection Sandy Stephens was Minnesota's starting quarterback in 1960, but he was held out of the KSU game in anticipation of the show-down game with Iowa the next week. Stephens was limited to punting chores against the Wildcats, and Smokey Joe Salem took over to lead the Golden Gophers with a 4-of-9 day for 52 yards. Jim Rogers had 92 yards rushing for the winners.

THE OPPONENT: Kansas State finished with an overall record of 5-6 last season. It was 2-5 in the Big Eight Conference, and while it was 5-0 at home, it was 0-5 on the road. This year the Wildcats have jumped off to a fast start by whipping New Mexico State 34-10 in the opener and then downing Western Kentucky 38-13 last weekend. Both victories were at home. J.J. Smith, who rushed for 232 yards last fall, has 138 with a 5.1 yards per carry thus far this season. Chad May, a redshirt junior, was taken over the quarterback spot and thus far has thrown for 461 yards in two games, and he has added two passing touchdowns (both in the second half of last weekend's win over Western Kentucky).

THE COACHES: Jim Wacker is in his 23rd year as a head coach at the collegiate level. His career record is 147-101-3. In nine seasons at Texas Christian University, Wacker was 40-58-2. He is in his second year at Minnesota, and his record with the Golden Gophers is 3-10 after besting Indiana State last Saturday. Bill Snyder is in his fifth season as a collegiate head coach and coach of the Wildcats. His record, including the two 1993 victories is 20-26-0.

THE INJURY REPORT: Head Football Trainer Doug Locy had a long list of Golden Gophers who suffered some bumps and bruises against Indiana State Saturday. Most serious seems to be **Rob Lewis (Sr., CB, Dubuque, Ia.)**, who suffered an injury to his right knee and will miss the Kansas State game for certain and probably three to four weeks. **Russ Heath (Sr., LB, Aurora, Colo.)**, sprained his knee in the second quarter and missed most of the second half. He is, at best, questionable for the Wildcats but remains listed as a starter on the two deep. **Todd Wolkow (Jr., LB, Lakeville, Minn.)**, bruised his left hand but is probable. **Aaron Osterman (Jr., SE, Elk River, Minn.)**, twisted his left ankle but also is listed as probable. **Omar Douglas (Sr., SB, New Orleans, La.)**, suffered a pulled groin muscle at Penn State and missed the ISU game. He should be ready for the Wildcats. **Eric Dalen (Jr., TE, Minnetonka, Minn.)**, also bruised a leg at Penn State but played against the Sycamores only to aggravate the injury. He's listed as probable for the Cats. **Vincent Hypolite (So., SS, LaMarque, Texas)**, who has been hampered by an injured toe since before the opener, returned to practice last week and could return to action soon---if not against KSU perhaps at San Diego.

PLAYERS TO WATCH: Several Golden Gophers could be in line for post-season honors in 1993. Most prominent are: **Dennis Cappella (Sr., DE, Miller Place, N.Y.)**, **Antonio Carter (Sr., RB, Columbus, Ohio)**, **Chris Darkins (So., RB, Houston, Texas)**, **Omar Douglas (Sr., WR, New Orleans, La.)**, **Ed Hawthorne (Jr., DT, St. Louis, Mo.)**, **Russ Heath (Sr., LB, Aurora, Colo.)**, **Andy Kratochvil (Sr., DE, New Prague, Minn.)**, **Rob Rogers (Sr., OG, St. Louis, Mo.)** and **Tim Schade (Jr., QB, Pekin, Ill.)**.

THE STATISTICAL LEADERS: **Tim Schade (Jr., QB, Pekin, Ill.)**, comes into week three of the Golden Gopher season as Minnesota's statistical leader. He hit 26-of-39 attempts against Indiana State for 345 yards and now has connected on 60-of-105 attempts (57.1 percent) for 823 yards and three touchdowns. **Chris Darkins (Fr., RB, Houston, Texas)** has taken over the team rushing lead with 90 yards and 4.1 average after two games. **Omar Douglas**, despite not playing against Indiana State, has the most pass catches (11) and the most yards (193) but **Tony Levine (So., SB, Highland Park, Minn.)**, is close in yards with 180 and **Aaron Osterman** is not far behind in number of catches with 10.

TV HIGHLIGHT SHOW: Midwest Sports Channel will air a two-hour game highlight show in a new magazine format three times each week throughout the season. Gopher Football '93 will be shown each Saturday evening after the game (11:00 p.m. following the Kansas State game), again on Sunday at 6:00 p.m., and on Tuesday at 1:00 p.m. **Mike Woodley** and **Dave Huffman** again will do the play-by-play and the color commentary work for the show. The airing also will include sideline work from **Mike Max** and **Sandy Stephens**.

WHAT'S NEXT: After hosting Kansas State Saturday night, Minnesota returns to the road for its final non-conference assignment of the year at San Diego State. That shows a 6:00 p.m. (PDT) kickoff. Kansas State, meanwhile, will return home to entertain UNLV in a 1:10 p.m. (CDT) contest. Golden Gopher fans may remember **Jim Strong**, an assistant under **Lou Holtz** at Minnesota in the middle 1980's, who now is the UNLV head man.

LUNCHEONS SET: The Friday "Lunch With Wacker" schedule for 1993 includes gatherings Friday before each home football game at the Minneapolis Athletic Club (615 2nd Ave. So.) beginning at noon, and those events will continue Friday as a prelude to the Kansas State encounter. Coach Wacker, members of his staff and selected players will be part of each week's program. The cost is \$11 per person, and that includes a buffet lunch. Reservations are requested and may be made by phoning 339-3655 (extension 440).

WACKER'S FINAL WORD: "The win may not have been the prettiest, but we will take them any way we can get them and hope we can build on it. What the heck: we better take our 17-point win and count our blessings. Two wins in a row would really help, but we know it is going to be difficult. We simply have to tell ourselves that we know we can play better and try to do it this week against Kansas State. And we are happy we are home again in the Metrodome."

GOLDEN GOPHERS SET TO OPEN SEASON



Other returning Gophers include Aaron Barber (Jr., New London, Minn.), Mark Halverson (So., Fargo, N.D.), Charlie Casci (Jr., Stillwater, Minn.) and Rob Otterson (So, Bismark, N.D.). The roster is rounded out by talented incoming freshmen Bart Sime (Britton, S.D.), Scott Keeping (Duncan, British Columbia, Canada), Rob Kerr (Pointe Claire, Quebec, Canada), Troy Schroeder (Medford, Wis.), Brad James (Brisbane, Australia) and Ryan Woytassek (Breckenridge, Minn.).

1992-93 Recap: The Golden Gophers are coming off their best season since 1972. During the 1992-93 season, the Maroon and Gold won three team titles and placed in the top five in eight of the 13 tournaments in which they competed. A third place finish at the Big Ten Championships, and a fifth place finish at the NCAA regional tournament, earned the Golden Gophers a trip to the NCAA tournament where they finished in a tie for 20th, their best finish since 1972.

The Means Report: Head Coach John Means took over the Golden Gopher program in June, 1990, and in three short years has brought back the Minnesota golf tradition of the past and instilled it in his players. GOLDEN GOPHERS AT SAN DIEGO STATE SATURDAY

Minnesota's Golden Gophers go back on the road Saturday to take on San Diego State in a 6:00 p.m. (PDT) assignment.

It will be Minnesota's final non-conference outing of the 1993 season, and it marks the first time the Golden Gophers have clashed with San Diego State.

Coach Jim Wacker's invaders will be hoping to improve their 1-2 overall record against the Aztecs after suffering a heartbreaking 30-25 loss to Kansas State in the Metrodome last weekend.

San Diego State, meanwhile, will put a 2-1 record on the line. The Aztecs opened the 1993 campaign with a 34-17 triumph over Cal State Northridge. Then they fell 45-25 at California, but last weekend SDSU bounced back with an impressive come-from-behind 38-31 triumph at Air Force.

Marshall Faulk, San Diego's highly-touted running back, rushed for 106 yards on 24 carries and scored three touchdowns to help spark the Aztecs to their impressive win.

"We have got our work cut out for us," Wacker warned his charges. "Faulk was the runner-up in the Heisman Trophy voting a year ago, and he's the top candidate for that award this year. We will have to know where he is on every play."

Wacker also knows, however, that Minnesota won't be able to concentrate all its efforts on Faulk.

"San Diego is a tremendously explosive football team," Wacker said, and he points to the fact that Tim Gutierrez came off the bench in the fourth quarter and rallied the Aztecs to the win with a 13-of-21 stanza, good for 217 yards and two touchdowns in just over 10 minutes.

"We will need a better defensive effort than we had against Kansas State last week," Wacker proclaimed, "if we hope to have any chance of turning things around and getting a win at San Diego."

Wacker was particularly upset with the fact that Minnesota had fought its way back from a 17-point deficit to gain the lead with just over five minutes remaining in the game only to give up another big play to the opposition.

"We had the darn thing won," Wacker lamented. "Our defense gives us two touchdowns, and all we have to do is cover the kickoff. We can't make the play when we have to, and Kansas State comes up with a 72-yard kickoff return."

Wacker was devastated with the setback. "It was a lousy, stinking loss," he stated emphatically.

But even in the disappointment, Wacker found some rays of hope. "Some of our people really played hard," he said. "They never quit. I am really proud of the defense. They came up with big play after big play, and they scored twice for us, on an interception by Jeff Rosga (Sr., FS, Roseville, Minn.) and a sack by Andy Kratochvil (Sr., DE, New Prague, Minn.) which caused a fumble that Craig Sauer (So., LB, Sartell, Minn.) recovered in the end zone. Those were big plays for us"

Wacker also was pleased with the efforts of Chris Darkins (So., RB, Houston, Texas), Antonio Carter (Sr., RB, Columbus, Ohio) and Chuck Rios (Jr., RB, Little Canada, Minn.). "They all ran hard for us," Wacker said. "Our passing game was not up to par, however, because Omar Douglas (Sr., SB, New Orleans, La.) was not 100 percent, and that took away our deep threat. And we did not give Tim Schade (Jr., QB, Pekin, Ill.) adequate protection. He was under pressure all night."

The bottom line, however, was mistakes. "We must eliminate those critical errors," Wacker said. "We must execute better, and we must improve our mental toughness." He hopes it starts against SDSU.

GOLDEN GOPHER TALES.....

THE GAME: Minnesota vs San Diego State
September 25, 1993, 6:05 p.m. (PDT)
Jack Murphy Stadium
San Diego, Calif.

THE SERIES: Minnesota and San Diego State have never met. The Golden Gophers have, however, faced Western Athletic Conference opponents on three occasions in the past. In 1946, Minnesota beat Wyoming 46-0 at Memorial Stadium. In 1967, Coach Murray Warmath's contingent, with current Men's Athletic Director McKinley Boston in the lineup, came away with a 13-12 verdict over Utah. That contest also was played at Memorial Stadium. More recently, Minnesota dropped a stunning 35-29 decision to Utah at the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome when the visitors blocked a field goal attempt on the final play of the game and ran it back 91 yards for a TD to break a 29-29 tie and gain the decision. San Diego also has three previous starts against teams from the Big Ten Conference and is 1-2 coming into Saturday night's game. The Aztecs fell 39-38 to Iowa in the 1986 Holiday Bowl. They are 1-1 against Wisconsin, winning 24-17 in San Diego in 1979 and losing 36-12 in Madison in 1980.

THE OPPONENT: San Diego State finished with an overall record of 5-5-1 last season. They were 5-3 in the WAC. The Aztecs returned 16-of-22 starters, including the incomparable Marshall Faulk, runner-up in the Heisman Trophy balloting a year ago. In 1992, San Diego State scored at least 40 points in five of its games. Thus far this season the Aztecs have posted a 2-1 record. They won their opener 34-17 over Cal State Northridge, then fell 45-25 to California of the Pac 10, and last week in their WAC opener, beat Air Force 38-31.

THE COACHES: Jim Wacker is in his 23rd year as a head coach at the collegiate level. His career record is 147-102-3. In nine seasons at Texas Christian University, Wacker was 40-58-2. He is in his second year at Minnesota, and his record with the Golden Gophers is 3-11 after losing to Kansas State 30-25 last Saturday. Al Luginbill is in his fifth year as the head coach at San Diego. His career record is 27-20-3.

THE INJURY REPORT: Head Football Trainer Doug Locy will have another busy week in the U of M training room. **Russ Heath (Sr., LB, Aurora, Colo.)**, sprained his knee in the second quarter of the Indiana State game and watched the KSU assignment from the sidelines last week. He remains questionable for San Diego. **Omar Douglas (Sr., SB, New Orleans, La.)**, suffered a pulled groin muscle at Penn State and missed the ISU game. He played against KSU, but was far below 100 percent. He hopes to reach that level this week. **Vincent Hypolite (So., SS, LaMarque, Texas)**, who has been hampered by an injured toe since before the opener, has not yet played but is getting closer to being ready. It may be at SDSU. **Lance Wolkow (Sr., LB, Lakeville)** suffered a slight shoulder separation against KSU and is listed as questionable. **Eric Dalen (Jr., TE, Minnetonka, Minn.)** aggravated his pulled right thigh muscle, but he could be available. **Aaron Osterman (Jr., SE, Elk River, Minn.)** sprained his thumb and bruised his right thigh against KSU, but he is expected to be in the starting lineup at SDSU.

PLAYERS TO WATCH: Several Golden Gophers could be in line for post-season honors in 1993. Most prominent are: **Dennis Cappella (Sr., DE, Miller Place, N.Y.)**, **Antonio Carter (Sr., RB, Columbus, Ohio)**, **Chris Darkins (So., RB, Houston, Texas)**, **Omar Douglas (Sr., SB, New Orleans, La.)**, **Ed Hawthorne (Jr., DT, St. Louis, Mo.)**, **Russ Heath (Sr., LB, Aurora, Colo.)**, **Andy Kratochvil (Sr., DE, New Prague, Minn.)**, **Rob Rogers (Sr., OG, St. Louis, Mo.)** and **Tim Schade (Jr., QB, Pekin, Ill.)**.

THE STATISTICAL LEADERS: **Tim Schade (Jr., QB, Pekin, Ill.)**, heads into week four of the Golden Gopher season as Minnesota's statistical leader. He has 1,066 yards of total offense despite a sub-par night (20-of-45 for 198 yards passing and minus 15 yards rushing) against Kansas State. **Chris Darkins (So., RB, Houston, Texas)** tops Minnesota's rushers after three games with 169 yards. **Tony Levine (So., SB, Highland Park, Minn.)**, is the leading receiver with 210 yards on 12 catches. **Andrew Veit (Sr., LB, Palm Harbor, Fla.)** is the top Golden Gopher tackler with 22. **Chuck Rios (Jr., RB, Little Canada, Minn.)** leads the team in scoring with 12 points on the strength of two touchdowns, and, ironically, two defenders are tied for third on the U of M scoring list. **Craig Sauer (So., LB, Sartell, Minn.)** and **Jeff Rosga (Sr., FS, Roseville, Minn.)** each have six points on TD's scored against the Wildcats last Saturday.

TV SATURDAY: Kmsp-TV will do the SDSU game live Saturday beginning at 8:00 p.m. (CDT). Doug Macleod and Jim Gilleland will do the play-by-play and color respectively, while Dave Huffman of Midwest Sports Channel will do sideline commentary. MSC then will air a rebroadcast of the game three times during the week. GOPHER HOCKEY NEARLY SOLD OUT FOR 1993-94

“We are nearly sold out of all tickets for the 1993-94 hockey season,” University of Minnesota Assistant Athletic Director Ken Buell announced today. “There is approximately 200 reserved standing room tickets that are being sold on an individual game basis. The North Dakota game on December 11, the Wisconsin game on January 8, and the Minnesota-Duluth game on February 6 are sold out,” said Buell.


“The public reorder sale for season tickets was very successful with nearly a 100 percent renewal rate from previous ticket holders,” Buell said. For fans applying for new public season tickets, a lottery sale will be conducted to distribute the approximately 250 remaining season tickets, 200 of which are reserved standing room locations. The deadline to enter the lottery was September 17, and over 1,100 ticket requests were received for that lottery.

The lottery to establish who will receive new season tickets will be held on October 13. Those who do not receive tickets will be placed on a waiting list for future seasons. That waiting list will only include those who did not receive season tickets, according to Buell.

The deadline for purchasing student season tickets is October 15. Approximately 1,700 tickets have been set aside for University student sales. If all of the student tickets are not sold, the remainder will be made available to those on the public waiting list through a second lottery on a non-renewable basis.

Buell also announced that the assured seating locations in the arena are virtually sold out. “There are a few seats left at the Mariucci Club level, but over 90 percent of those are sold,” he said. Club seats require the donation of \$1,000 per seat plus the cost of the ticket. Proceeds from assured seating and club seating go towards helping pay the debt on the new facility. For more information on club seating, call Jan Unstad at 625-4569.

The capacity of the new Mariucci Arena is 9,130. That is an increase in capacity of 1,558 (the 9,130 capacity figure for the new Mariucci Arena includes approximately 600 reserved standing room spaces) over the old Mariucci Arena.

GOLDEN GOPHERS TO HOST INDIANA SATURDAY

Minnesota's Golden Gophers return home Saturday to entertain Indiana in a 7:05 p.m. (CDT) Big Ten Conference football game at the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome.

Coach Jim Wacker's host team will be attempting to snap a two-game losing streak in that assignment after losing a 48-17 decision at San Diego last weekend.

The loss drops Minnesota's overall record to 1-3 while the Hoosiers are 3-1. Like IU, the Golden Gophers are 0-1 in the Big Ten.

"It was ugly," Coach Wacker said after the Aztecs had demolished Minnesota. "San Diego State just whipped us every way possible."

And the game's statistics bear out Wacker's analysis. San Diego State had 11 more first downs than the Gophers. It out-passed UM by 170 yards, and it had 152 more total yards than the Golden Gophers.

"There wasn't any doubt about which team was better," Wacker admitted. "San Diego State certainly deserved to win."

Wacker lamented Minnesota's offensive and defensive ineptness, but again felt San Diego's excellent play was the reason.

"That was a very good football team that played an excellent game," Wacker said. "Give them credit. But the bottom line is that we did not execute, and they did. We didn't throw well and we didn't catch well. We were dropping balls all over the place. And on the other side of the ball, Darnay Scott was doing a great job for San Diego."

Wacker was referring to the fact that the Aztec junior split end caught nine passes for 139 yards and two touchdowns against Minnesota's faltering defenders.

Even in defeat, however, Wacker was able to find some bright spots in the play of his U of M contingent.

"We did a decent job of holding down Marshall Faulk (San Diego's premier All-America running back and Heisman Trophy

candidate who was limited to just 81 yards).

"And our people never quit," Wacker maintained. "Even when we fell behind, our players kept fighting back. We just could not maintain any momentum."

The falling behind, ironically, did not come until the second quarter, something that was in direct contrast to the early deficits in the Penn State and Kansas State losses.

Minnesota had jumped out to a 10-0 lead on a 46-yard field goal by Mike Chalberg (So., K, Auckland, New Zealand) and a 24-yard pass from Tim Schade (Jr., QB, Pekin, Ill.) to Chris Darkins (So., RB, Houston, Texas). But the lead was short lived as San Diego retaliated with 34 unanswered points.

Two areas of grave concern, both coming into the game and when looking to the future, are Minnesota's kicking game and its disastrous penalties.

In the kicking department, Minnesota punted seven times and averaged only 24.9 yards a try. Ron Holty (Sr., P, Spring Grove, Minn.) and Mike Kimbell (So., P, Hot Springs, Ark.) shared those duties in the San Diego loss, and it now appears the latter will get the call against invading Indiana.

In the penalty department, Wacker is totally bewildered, and he has no explanation for Minnesota's drawing 13 flags for 118 yards.

He does know, however, that Minnesota must eliminate those mistakes and improve drastically if it is to maintain any chance of winning against the Hoosiers this weekend.

"The only thing we can do is get that loss at San Diego out of our system," Wacker said. "We must put it behind us, keep believing in ourselves and make the improvements we need to make in order to become a good football team. All we can do after a beating like that is get back home, lick our wounds a little bit and try to go forward. That's what we will try to do against Indiana Saturday night."

GOLDEN GOPHER TALES.....

THE GAME: Minnesota vs Indiana
October 2, 1993, 7:05 p.m. (CDT)
Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome
Minneapolis, Minnesota

THE SERIES: Minnesota and Indiana have met 54 times in football in a series dating back to 1906. The Golden Gophers will carry a 31-20-3 lead in the series into Saturday night's game despite the fact that the Hoosiers posted a 24-17 win at the Metrodome a year ago. Indiana, in fact, has won two games in a row in the series and is ahead 4-2 in games played in the Metrodome.

THE OPPONENT: Indiana was 5-6 a year ago in what was described as a disappointing year. The Hoosiers got off to a blistering start in 1993, however, by winning three straight non-conference decisions (Toledo 27-0, Northern Illinois 28-10 and Kentucky 24-8), before falling to Wisconsin 27-15 last Saturday in its conference opener. As a result, the Hoosiers come into Saturday's game with a 3-1 record. They are 0-1 in the Big Ten. Indiana boasts 43 returning lettermen, and that delegation includes eight returning starters on offense and eight more on defense. The Hoosier quarterback is John Paci, most-remembered from 1992 as the reserve signal caller pressed into action against Minnesota when IU great, Trent Green, was injured. Paci responded by throwing for over 200 yards and directing a come-from-behind victory over the Golden Gophers.

THE COACHES: Jim Wacker is in his 23rd year as a head coach at the collegiate level. His career record is 147-103-3. In nine seasons at Texas Christian University, Wacker was 40-58-2. He is in his second year at Minnesota, and his record with the Golden Gophers is 3-12. Bill Mallory is in his 23rd year as a head coach at the collegiate level, and his record is 151-105-4. He is in his 10th year with the Hoosiers, and he is 52-53-3 IU.

THE INJURY REPORT: Head Football Trainer Doug Locy could be facing a better situation this week than has been the case recently. **Russ Heath (Sr., LB, Aurora, Colo.)** sprained his knee in the second quarter of the Indiana State game and watched the KSU assignments from the sidelines. He returned to action at San Diego State, and now is expected to start against the Hoosiers. **Lance Wolkow (Sr., LB, Lakeville, Minn.)** suffered a slight shoulder separation against KSU and did not play at SDSU, but he could return for the IU duel. **Eric Dalen (Jr., TE, Minnetonka, Minn.)** sat out the San Diego game with a pulled right thigh muscle, and he also could be available for Indiana. **Chris Darkins (So., RB, Houston, Texas)** may be causing the greatest concern after he suffered a mild concussion last weekend. He is expected to be ready, and he has not been taken off the depth chart. **Antonio Carter (Sr., RB, Columbus, Ohio)** continues to have trouble with his recurring left shoulder strain, but he should play. **Doyle Cockrell (Jr., DT, Evanston, Ill.)** suffered a bruised right shin, and **Chuck Rios (Jr., RB, Little Canada, Minn.)** came up with a muscle strain in his left hip as well as a low back bruise. Both are expected to play against the Hoosiers.

PLAYERS TO WATCH: Several Golden Gophers could be in line for post-season honors in 1993. Most prominent are: **Dennis**

Cappella (Sr., DE, Miller Place, N.Y.), Antonio Carter (Sr., RB, Columbus, Ohio), Chris Darkins (So., RB, Houston, Texas), Omar Douglas (Sr., SB, New Orleans, La.), Ed Hawthorne (Jr., DT, St. Louis, Mo.), Russ Heath (Sr., LB, Aurora, Colo.), Andy Kratochvil (Sr., DE, New Prague, Minn.), Rob Rogers (Sr., OG, St. Louis, Mo.) and Tim Schade (Jr., QB, Pekin, Ill.)

THE STATISTICAL LEADERS: **Tim Schade (Jr., QB, Pekin, Ill.)**, heads into week five of the Golden Gopher season as Minnesota's statistical leader. He has 1,197 yards of total offense despite a sub-par night (18-of-43 for 176 yards passing and minus 5 yards rushing) against San Diego State. **Chris Darkins (So., RB, Houston, Texas)** tops Minnesota's rushers after four games with 191 yards. **Omar Douglas (Sr., SB, New Orleans, La.)** is the leading receiver with 256 yards on 17 catches. **Andrew Veit (Sr., LB, Palm Harbor, Fla.)** is the top Golden Gopher tackler with 26. Three players are tied for the scoring lead with 12 points. They are **Chuck Rios, Chris Darkins** and **Mike Chalberg**.

TV HIGHLIGHT SHOW: Minnesota Sports Channel returns to its normal 1993 format this week and will do a two-hour game highlight show which will be on Saturday at 11:00 p.m.. MSC then will air a rebroadcast of the game three times during the week. "Gopher Football '93" will be shown, in addition to its airing Saturday evening after the game, on Sunday at 6:00 p.m., and again on Tuesday at 1:00 p.m. Mike Woodley will do the play-by-play and Dave Huffman the expert analysis. Mike Max and Sandy Stephens will share sideline commentary duties.

WHAT'S NEXT: After hosting Indiana Saturday, Minnesota remains at home in the Metrodome next week to entertain Purdue in another Big Ten contest at 6:00 p.m. (CDT). The Hoosiers return to Bloomington next Saturday to play host to the Iowa Hawkeyes in a 1:05 p.m. homecoming assignment at Memorial Stadium.

LUNCHEONS SET: The Friday "Lunch With Wacker" schedule for 1993 includes gatherings Friday before each home football game at the Minneapolis Athletic Club (615 2nd Ave. So.) beginning at noon, and those events will continue one week from Friday as a prelude to the Indiana encounter. Coach Wacker, members of his staff and selected players will be part of each week's program. The cost is \$11 per person, and that includes a buffet lunch. Reservations are requested and may be made by phoning 339-3655 (extension 440).

WACKER'S FINAL WORD: "Indiana had gotten off to a fast start before losing to Wisconsin in the rain last week, but it was getting up momentum. Now it is in a position like Minnesota and must rebound from a tough loss. Coach Bill Mallory does a super job at Indiana. He took over a program that was in bad shape and rebuilt it completely. I have tremendous respect for the job that Bill and his staff have done. John Paci is a very good quarterback and Thomas Lewis is one of the best wide receivers in the conference. On top of that, Indiana has an outstanding defense. We are in a position where we have to show the ability to rebound from a devastating experience at San Diego. The challenge for our people will be to forget San Diego and get ready for Indiana. That is what we intend to do."

The final member of the trifecta is the popular Mike Oster, a four-year utility player who can play any of the infield positions as well as catcher. He boasts a career batting average of .327.

"These three players have all made great contributions to our program," said Head Coach John Anderson. "They are talented baseball players and class individuals and will represent the University of Minnesota with distinction."

This Saturday the Golden Gophers will have their annual Parents Day. An intrasquad game is scheduled for 1:00 p.m. at Siebert Field with a reception for the parents following the scrimmage.

The 1994 Golden Gophers schedule has 27 home games split between the Metrodome and Siebert Field. The team opens the 1994 schedule on the road at Georgia Tech February 11-13, but returns for the home opener on March 4, against Arizona State at the Metrodome in the Oscar Mayer Classic. The Siebert Field opener is set for April 6 vs. Mankato State. The Gophers Pro-Alumni games is set for February 1, at the Metrodome.

U OF M SET FOR SECOND STRAIGHT HOME START

Minnesota's Golden Gophers remain at home Saturday to entertain Purdue in a 6:05 p.m. (CDT) Big Ten Conference football game at the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome.

Coach Jim Wacker's host team will be attempting to snap a three-game losing streak in the Purdue assignment after dropping a heartbreaking 23-19 decision to Indiana at home last weekend.

The loss dropped Minnesota's overall record to 1-3 and its Big Ten mark to 0-2 while the Boilermakers, who fell 28-10 at home to Illinois last Saturday, also are 1-3 overall but only 0-1 in league play.

Purdue gave Illinois all it wanted in that game until two consecutive fumbles enabled the Fighting Illini to snap a 7-7 tie and gain the upper hand.

Jim Colletto, Purdue Head Coach, called the loss "discouraging." He has nothing on Wacker.

"Yes, we came close, but I am sick of coming close," Wacker told his battered Golden Gophers after the Indiana loss. "I am sick of saying we played hard, and we never quit, and we came back and all of those things. Coming close and getting moral victories is for losers, and I am sick of losing."

Now Wacker can only hope his team was listening and will learn something from it. He can also hope they will implement what they learned against Purdue.

"We had some people that played hard against Indiana," Wacker said, "and we had some people come off the bench and give us a real good effort. And after another terrible start, we came back well in the second half. But we have to learn that we need to play a full game. We need to play with enthusiasm and emotion for a full 60 minutes."

The 50 percent effort Wacker eluded to was in reference to Minnesota's falling behind 20-3 in the first half before outscoring

the Hoosiers 16-3 after the intermission and then almost pulling out the decision with a gallant rally in the final stages.

Among the individuals drawing Wacker's praise were Russ Heath (Sr., LB, Aurora, Colo.) Craig Sauer (So., LB, Sartell, Minn.) and Juan Hunter (Jr., CB, Asheville, N.C.) on the defensive side of things along with Scott Eckers (Jr., QB, St. Louis Park, Minn.), Antonio Carter (Sr., RB, Columbus, Ohio) and Omar Douglas (Sr., SB, New Orleans, La.) offensively.

"Defensively we still have to learn how to stop giving up the long gainer," Wacker admitted, "but we did come up with some big plays when we had to against Indiana. Heath (15 tackles) and Sauer (nine tackles including three for losses of 10 yards) gave us some excellent linebacking. And Hunter came up with a critical interception for us."

And, while the offense sputtered through the first two periods, it came to life in the third when Wacker changed quarterbacks.

"Eckers (19-of-31 for 216 yards and two touchdowns) came in and did a great job for us in the second half," Wacker said. "He showed a lot of poise, and he almost pulled the game out for us."

Carter carried only nine times but netted 37 tough yards in critical situations for the Golden Gophers.

And Douglas, finally healthy after missing one game and limping through two more, had an all-star night with nine catches for 106 yards and two TD's.

Despite those individual heroics, Minnesota's second-half efforts fell short, and now they must look ahead to Purdue.

"We are not quite there," Wacker admitted, "but we will get there. I still believe we are good enough to win, and we have the character to win. We will work hard in practice this week, and we will be ready to play four quarters against Purdue on Saturday."

GOLDEN GOPHER TALES.....

THE GAME: Minnesota vs Purdue
October 9, 1993, 6:05 p.m. (CDT)
Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome
Minneapolis, Minnesota

THE SERIES: Minnesota and Purdue have met 51 times in football in a series dating back to 1894. The Golden Gophers will carry a 28-20-3 lead in the series into Saturday night's game despite the fact that the Boilermakers posted a 24-20 win at West Lafayette a year ago. In games played in Minneapolis, the Golden Gophers lead 24-9-3. In games played in West Lafayette, Purdue is ahead 11-4. In the Metrodome, Minnesota is out in front 4-1.

THE OPPONENT: Purdue finished 4-7 overall a year ago and was 3-5 in the Big Ten Conference. It will come into Saturday night's game with an overall record of 1-3. The Boilermakers are 0-1 in the Big Ten after losing at home 28-10 to Illinois last Saturday. Matt Pike is a junior quarterback who is having a solid season but was sacked five times by the Illini.

THE COACHES: Jim Wacker is in his 23rd year as a head coach at the collegiate level. His career record is 147-104-3. In nine seasons at Texas Christian University, Wacker was 40-58-2. He is in his second year at Minnesota, and his record with the Golden Gophers is 3-13. Jim Colletto is in his eighth season as a head coach at the collegiate level, and his record is 26-55-1. Now in his third season as the head man at Purdue, Colletto is 9-17-0 with the Boilermakers.

THE INJURY REPORT: Lance Wolkow (Sr., LB, Lakeville, Minn.) suffered a concussion early in the Indiana game last week and did not return. He is listed as doubtful for the Purdue contest and was removed from the depth chart. Chris Darkins (So., RB, Houston, Texas) who received a concussion two weeks ago at San Diego State and was held out of the Indiana game, has not been returned to the two-deep and is listed somewhere between probable and questionable for the Boilermakers. Dennis Cappella (Sr. DE, Miller Place, N.Y.) suffered a severe left thigh bruise, but Head Trainer Doug Locy does not feel the injury will keep Cappella out of the Purdue game Saturday.

PLAYERS TO WATCH: Several Golden Gophers could be in line for post-season honors in 1993. Most prominent are: Dennis Cappella (Sr., DE, Miller Place, N.Y.), Antonio Carter (Sr., RB, Columbus, Ohio), Chris Darkins (So., RB, Houston, Texas), Omar Douglas (Sr., SB, New Orleans, La.), Ed Hawthorne (Jr., DT, St. Louis, Mo.), Russ Heath (Sr., LB, Aurora, Colo.), Andy Kratochvil (Sr., DE, New Prague, Minn.), Rob Rogers (Sr., OG, St. Louis, Mo.) and Tim Schade (Jr., QB, Pekin, Ill.).

THE STATISTICAL LEADERS: Tim Schade (Jr., QB, Pekin, Ill.), despite playing only one series of the second half against Indiana, heads into week six of the Golden Gopher season as Minnesota's statistical leader. He has 1,305 yards of total offense. Antonio Carter (Sr., RB, Columbus, Ohio) tops Minnesota's rushers with 206 yards and an average of 4.8 per carry. Omar Douglas (Sr., SB, New Orleans, La.) is the leading receiver with 362 yards on 26 catches. Andrew Veit (Sr., LB, Palm Harbor,

Fla.) is the top Golden Gopher tackler with 39 although Russ Heath (Sr., LB, Aurora, Colo.) is a close second with 35. Mike Chalberg (So., PK, Auckland, New Zealand) tops the Golden Gophers in scoring with 19 points. Douglas is second with 18 (he had two TD's against the Hoosiers).

TV HIGHLIGHT SHOW: Minnesota Sports Channel returns to its normal 1993 format this week and will do a two-hour game highlight show which will be on Saturday at 10:00 p.m. MSC then will air a rebroadcast of the game three times during the week. "Gopher Football '93" will be shown, in addition to its airing Saturday evening after the game, on Sunday at 6:00 p.m., and again on Tuesday at 1:00 p.m. Mike Woodley will do the play-by-play and Dave Huffman the expert analysis. Mike Max and Sandy Stephens will share sideline commentary duties.

WHAT'S NEXT: After hosting Purdue Saturday, Minnesota goes on the road next week to take on the Northwestern Wildcats in another Big Ten contest at 1:00 p.m. (CDT) at Evanston. The Boilermakers return to West Lafayette next Saturday to play host to the Wisconsin Badgers in a 1:05 p.m. assignment.

LUNCHEONS SET: The Friday "Lunch With Wacker" schedule for 1993 includes gatherings Friday before each home football game at the Minneapolis Athletic Club (615 2nd Ave. So.) beginning at noon, and those events will continue Friday as a prelude to the Purdue encounter. Coach Wacker, members of his staff and selected players will be part of each week's program. The cost is \$13 per person, and that includes a buffet lunch. Reservations are requested and may be made by phoning 339-3655 (extension 440).

DOUGLAS SETS RECORD: Omar Douglas had nine receptions for 106 yards and two touchdowns against Indiana. That gives him 96 as a Golden Gopher and sets a new U of M career record for pass receptions. He caught one pass as a freshman in 1990, eight in 1991, 61 last season, and he has 26 in 1993. The record was 95 set by Dwayne McMullen (1982-84). His 1,163 yards put him in fifth place in yards receiving (McMullen has 1,627).

WACKER'S FINAL WORD: "When our people realize that football is a 60-minute game, maybe we will start winning. Right now we need some people on our squad to get excited, to play with some emotion. We need some leadership. We have to learn to be ready to play when the game starts and not wake up at halftime. If those things will happen for us, we will put ourselves in a position to win. When we do get into the game, we play hard, and we do play with emotion, and we do come back. We don't ever quit. Those are positive things, but we must learn that we have to do them for four quarters instead of two. Look at our Penn State game where we gave up 21 points in the first quarter. Look at the Kansas State game where we fell behind 17-0. And then look at the Indiana game where we trail 20-3 at the half. Yes, we came back in the second half against Indiana, but if we had played with that same emotion from the very beginning, we could have been winners. That's what we want to do against Purdue. We know it will be difficult, and we know they are coming off a tough loss just like us. They, too, have played well at times and took Notre Dame to the wall. We've got our work cut out for us."
