1993-94 OUTLOOK

Fueled by the disappointment of not being selected for the NCAA Tournament, Head Coach Clem Haskins' Golden Gophers ended the 1992-93 in style by capturing the school's first-ever National Invitation Tournament (NIT) title.

Seventeen days after watching in disbelief when they were not included in the NCAA Tournament's field of 64, the Golden Gophers proudly held the NIT championship trophy aloft in New York's Madison Square Garden after defeating Georgetown 62-61 in the title game.

"It was a storybook finish for a group of young people that hung tough all season long," Haskins said. "We were very disappointed to not get into the NCAA's field of 64, but we turned around and defeated five outstanding teams, with every game on national television. They were disappointed one day, but 17 days later they were NIT champions. It was not only great for our players and staff, but it was also great for the University of Minnesota and the entire state of Minnesota. Winning the NIT title will certainly give us a lot of momentum as we head into the 1993-94 season."

With all five starters and a total of 10 letterwinners returning to the fold for the 1993-94 season, the Golden Gophers have their sights set on landing one of those elusive 64 spots in the NCAA Tournament come March. It's no secret that staying away from the injury bug will be the key. A year ago, Haskins' injury-riddled club was able to start its regular lineup together as a full unit in only eight of the team's first 25 contests. With everyone back in the lineup down the stretch, the Golden Gophers made their spirited run to the NIT title.

"Staying healthy is our number one goal heading into the season," Haskins said. "Last year we were able to overcome a lot of injuries to key people, but we know that we're not going to sneak up on anybody this year. That's the key for us right off the bat. Secondly, we want to work hard to get into the NCAA Tournament. Once you get into the field of 64, anything can happen. We feel that if we can stay healthy, we will have a chance to accomplish that goal."

Backcourt

The Golden Gopher backcourt is certainly in good hands. Senior Arriel McDonald (6-2, 170) and junior Voshon Lenard (6-4, 200) are entering their third full season together in the starting lineup, while senior Townsend Orr (6-1, 165) is viewed as a third starter by Haskins.

"I would like to think that Voshon, Arriel and Townsend give us three quality guards that will stack up with any other backcourt, not only in the Big Ten, but also in the country," Haskins said.

A pre-season All-America selection, Lenard firmly established himself as one of the finest players in the country with an outstanding sophomore season that culminated with him being honored as the NIT MVP. A second-team All-Big Ten selection, the clutch performer scored a team-leading 99 points (19.8) in the five tournament contests. Honored as team MVP, he led the Golden Gophers in scoring for the season at 17.1 points a game. He scored in double figures in 26 games, and led or tied for the team high in scoring in 19 games. He had 12, 20 point games to his credit, and set single-season school records with 58 three-pointers on 158 attempts.

"Voshon Lenard is coming off a very good year for us," Haskins said. "He not only shot the ball well, but he also played great defense and did a good job of distributing the basketball. Above all, he is a team player. He is more concerned about helping the team win than he is with his own individual goals. When you're a great player and you play within the team concept, good things happen."

McDonald, an honorable mention All-Big Ten choice, joined Lenard on the NIT all-tournament team. Heading into the 1993-94 season, he is ranked second on the all-time career assists list with 368, despite missing four games a year ago after suffering an incomplete fracture of the fifth metatarsal of his left foot. He had arthroscopic surgery done on the foot again this past spring and is expected to be 100 percent by the start of the season. By season's end, he should shatter Marc Wilson's (1983-86) school career assists record of 375. McDonald is also ranked sixth on the all-time steals list with 116. A year ago, he finished fourth on the team in scoring (11.0), and led the team in assists (4.4) for the third straight season. He finished the season with outstanding assist-to-turnover ratios of 122-49 overall, 74-33 in conference play, and 19-8 in the five NIT games.

Orr, equally effective as a starter or as the first guard off the bench, is a seasoned backcourt performer for the Golden Gophers. He started 10 games last season and averaged 6.6 points a game. In addition, he ranked second on the team with 48 steals, 2.8 assists and 28 three-pointers. When McDonald went down with the foot injury prior to the game at Santa Clara, Orr stepped right into the starting lineup and scored eight points and dished out a career high nine assists in 33 minutes of action to lead the Golden Gophers to the win over the NCAA-bound Broncos.

A solid outside shooter, junior Ryan Wolf (6-3, 183) played in 24 games a year ago and ranked fourth on the team with 16 three-pointers. When both McDonald and Lenard were sidelined with injuries, Wolf responded with a career high 11 points in the victory over UAB. A Williams Arena crowd favorite, walk-on Hosea Crittenden (5-9, 175) returns for his sophomore season. Freshman Sean Whitlock (6-0, 175), who averaged 30.6 points a game during his final prep campaign, is a talented newcomer.

MINNESOTA BASKETBALL

Frontcourt

Senior Randy Carter (6-8, 235), and juniors Chad Kolander (6-9, 225) and Jayson Walton (6-6, 212), return as starters in the frontcourt for the Golden Gophers.

A proven performer in the paint, Carter relishes playing traditional, hard-nosed Big Ten basketball. He has led the team in rebounding in each of his three seasons in Gold Country. Last season, he averaged 11.4 points and 6.9 boards a game. Injuries, however, have been his biggest enemy throughout his career. As a sophomore in 1991-92, he missed eight games after undergoing surgery to remove bone spurs from both ankles. A year ago, he missed three games with a first degree left shoulder separation, and one game with a sprained left ankle. He also had arthroscopic surgery on his left knee this past spring, but the battle-tested veteran is expected to be ready to go full tilt this season.

An outstanding all-around athlete, Walton was recognized as one of the most improved players in the Big Ten last season when he ranked second on the team in both scoring (11.9) and rebounding (6.3). He scored in double figures in 23 games and led the team in rebounding 15 times. The honorable mention All-Big Ten selection is an exceptional inside-outside performer who appears to just be coming into his own as a player.

Kolander is an outstanding defensive player who did a fine job on the inside a year ago to help keep in check some of the Big Ten's best low post players. He averaged 5.9 points and 4.3 rebounds a game last season, and led the team with 25 blocks. In addition, he shot a team-leading 59.5 percent (72 of 121) from the field. Haskins has said that the former Minnesota Mr. Basketball will probably see ample time this season at the big forward position, as well as in the low post.

Senior Ernest Nzigamasabo (6-9, 235) is another veteran returnee up front for the Golden Gophers. A talented athlete who can play either the big forward position or at center, he has only been playing basketball since 1987. He averaged 3.1 points and 2.1 rebounds a game last season.

Junior David Washington (6-10, 215) and sophomore David Grim (6-7, 200) both received their first taste of Big Ten basketball last season. A transfer from Hutchinson Community College, Washington averaged 2.0 points and 1.8 rebounds for the Golden Gophers. Grim, who missed the entire 1991-92 campaign after undergoing surgery to his lower back, showed some of the rustiness from the long layoff from competitive action. He averaged 1.3 points a game. Both Washington and Grim should be that much better this season with a year of seasoning under their belts.

Senior Robert Roe (6-7, 212), who appeared in nine games last season, and sophomore Kevin Baker (6-6, 205), who played in 12 contests, will look for increased playing time this season. Redshirt freshman Trevor Winter (7-0, 250) and true freshman John Thomas (6-9, 245) will also compete for playing time in the Golden Gophers' crowded frontcourt. Winter and Thomas both possess the size and strength to be factors inside immediately.

"We really feel good about our frontcourt," Haskins said. "Jayson can fulfill the role we're looking for at the small forward. He has the ability to give us 15 to 16 points and seven to eight rebounds a night. Chad has already proven that he's a very good defensive player, now he needs to look to score more for us this season. Randy is a guy that we need to keep a close eye on. He can be one of the top rebounders in the Big Ten this year providing that he can stay healthy. We have some flexibility up front in that we can play a number of our people in a variety of positions."

The Schedule

The Golden Gophers will open the season against Rice on Nov. 18 in a first round pre-season NIT game at Williams Arena. A star-studded 16-team field, led by NCAA champion North Carolina, has been assembled for the prestigious tournament. The rest of the Golden Gophers' non-conference schedule is highlighted by road contests against 1993 NCAA Tournament teams Virginia and St. John's, and home games against fellow 1993 NIT qualifiers Clemson and James Madison. As far as the conference race is concerned, everyone knows it's a war every time you take the court in a league as strong as the Big Ten.

"The Pre-Season NIT will be a big challenge for us," Haskins said. "We open with Rice at home and they have a very fine team. We welcome the opportunity to play in the tournament, particularly after winning the post-season NIT last spring. It's going to be a real test for our club right away.

"Once again, from top to bottom the Big Ten will be one of the best league's in the country this season," he added. "I don't see any one team dominating the conference this year. Whoever gets out of the gate the quickest will probably win the Big Ten championship."

HEAD COACH CLEM HASKINS

Winning basketball and integrity, both on and off the court, have become trademarks of Clem Haskins' program at the University of Minnesota. Entering his eighth season at the helm, he has directed the Golden Gophers to post-season play in four of the past five seasons, including the NIT title this past season.

Coach Haskins' success in post-season play is no secret. After two rebuilding seasons, he directed the Golden Gopher program to national prominence with back-to-back storybook runs through the NCAA Tournament bracket. His 1988-89 squad earned a spot in the national tourney's 64-team field and proceeded to surprise all of the experts. The team advanced to the Sweet 16 before being eliminated by Final Four participant Duke. The Golden Gophers finished with an overall 19-12 record, which included tournament victories over Kansas State and Siena.

That set the stage for the 1989-90 season, when Haskins led the Golden Gophers to a 23-9 overall record, equalling the second highest victory total in school history. They earned a fourth-place tie in the final Big Ten standings with an 11-7 league mark. The Golden Gophers advanced to the NCAA Tournament's Final Eight, defeating UTEP, Northern Iowa and Syracuse, before dropping a heartbreaking 93-91 decision to Georgia Tech in the Southeast Regional Final in New Orleans.

Four of five starters departed from the team that captured the heart and imagination of the entire state of Minnesota and firmly entrenched Haskins' program as one of the nation's finest. Haskins' youthful squad finished 12-16 in 1990-91, but the lessons learned that season certainly paid dividends down the road as the Golden Gophers have bounced back to make two straight National Invitation Tournament appearances.

Haskins' 1991-92 squad finished with a 16-16 overall record and upset eventual Final Four teams Michigan and Indiana along the way en route to being selected to play in the NIT. With a starting lineup that consisted of three sophomores and two juniors in 1992-93, Haskins and his staff once again did a marvelous job in directing the injury-riddled Golden Gophers to the NIT crown.

A native of Campbellsville, Ky., Haskins led small Taylor County to the state tournament during a stellar prep career. Known as "Clem the Gem," he is still recognized as one of the most dominant players ever in the Ohio Valley Conference after a standout collegiate career at Western Kentucky. A consensus All-American as a senior after being named to various All-America teams throughout his career, he is the only player in league history to be named Player of the Year three consecutive seasons. He led the conference in scoring in 1965 and 1967

with averages of 24.0 and 23.4, respectively, and is ranked second on the school's all-time three-year list with 1,680 career points.

Haskins was the third player selected in the National Basketball Association draft in 1967. He went on to play nine outstanding seasons with the Chicago Bulls (1967-70), the Phoenix Suns (1970-74) and Washington Bullets (1974-76).

In 1977, Haskins returned to his alma mater as an assistant coach to Gene Keady, now head coach at Purdue. The three Hilltopper teams that he worked with registered a combined 54-33 overall record, won one league title, and made two appearances in the NCAA Tournament.

Haskins was named head coach of the Hilltoppers in the spring of 1980. He promptly led his first squad to a 21-8 record, the regular season conference crown, and a berth in the NCAA Tournament. He subsequently was honored as Rookie Coach of the Year by the Ohio Valley Conference and by NBC-TV. The following season in 1981-82, his team went 19-10, was conference co-champion, and made an NIT appearance. In 1982, Western Kentucky joined the rugged Sun Belt Conference. After three seasons of building the program to that level of competition, his 1985-86 team went 23-8 and advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament.

Haskins was named to the head job at Minnesota on April 2, 1986. A member of the NCAA Basketball Rules and Recruiting Committees, he served as head coach of the

Midwest team at the 1991 Orlando All-Star Classic. He directed the North squad to an unbeaten record and the gold medal at the 1991 U.S. Olympic Festival in Los Angeles.

Honors and accolades continue to roll in for Haskins. In April, 1992, he was named to the National Association of Basketball Coaches (NABC) Balfour Silver Anniversary All-America Team. Selected for his outstanding basketball and career achievements, the presentation is annually held in conjunction with the NABC annual convention at the Final Four.

On Sept. 13, 1991, he was an inaugural inductee into the Western Kentucky University Hall of Fame. On Aug. 27, 1990, he was inducted into the Kentucky Athletic Hall of Fame, joining an elite membership that includes such names as Adolph Rupp, Muhammad Ali, "Pee Wee" Reese and Paul Hornung. He was also inducted as a member of the Kentucky High School Athletic Association Hall of Fame on March 15, 1988.

Haskins, who remains active in charitable organizations, holds bachelor of science (1967) and master of arts (1971) degrees from Western Kentucky. He is married to the former Yvette Penick. They have three children, Clemmie, Lori and Brent.

ASSISTANT COACHES

MILTON BARNES Assistant Coach

Milton Barnes is entering his third consecutive year, and fifth season overall, as an assistant coach at the University of Minnesota.

Barnes, who was as an assistant coach on Coach Haskins' staff during the 1986-87 and 1987-88 seasons, returned to Gold Country after registering an impressive 65-11 overall record during his tenure as head coach/athletic director at Albion (Mich.) High School. Under his direction, Albion finished second at the Michigan State Class B Tournament in his final season at the helm after claiming league, district and regional titles along the way. He also led the school to the district championship in 1990, and the league and district crowns in 1989.

During the 1985-86 season, Barnes served as the top assistant coach at the University of Detroit. Prior to that, he was an assistant coach at Eastern Michigan (1983-85), part-time assistant coach and head softball coach at Detroit (1982-83), assistant coach at Kent State (1980-82) and volunteer coach at Albion College (1979-80).

Barnes charted an outstanding prep basketball career of his own at Saginaw (Mich.) High School, before going on to play four years at Albion College, where he earned a bachelor's degree in physical education in 1979. He is a member of the National Association of Basketball Coaches and the Black Coaches Association.

DAN KOSMOSKI Assistant Coach

Dan Kosmoski is entering his ninth year as a member of the University of Minnesota coaching staff, and he'll be in his eighth campaign under Head Coach Clem Haskins.

A 1980 graduate of the University of Minnesota, Kosmoski played basketball for the Golden Gophers during the 1975-76 and 1976-77 campaigns. The highlight of his career was being part of the 1976-77 U of M contingent that set a school record in victories when posting a 24-3 record. He served as the team's fourth guard behind eventual first-round draft pick Ray Williams, Osborne Lockhart and four-year starter Phil Saunders. The team finished the season ranked eighth in the final national poll and is remembered as one of the finest in school history.

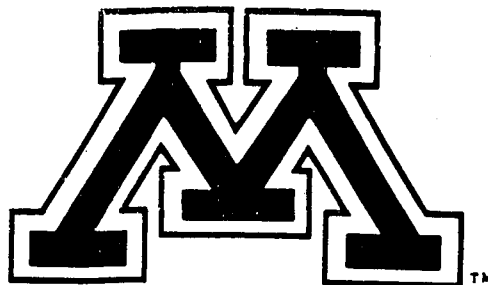
