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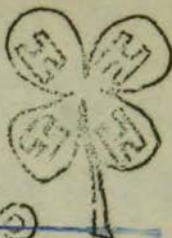

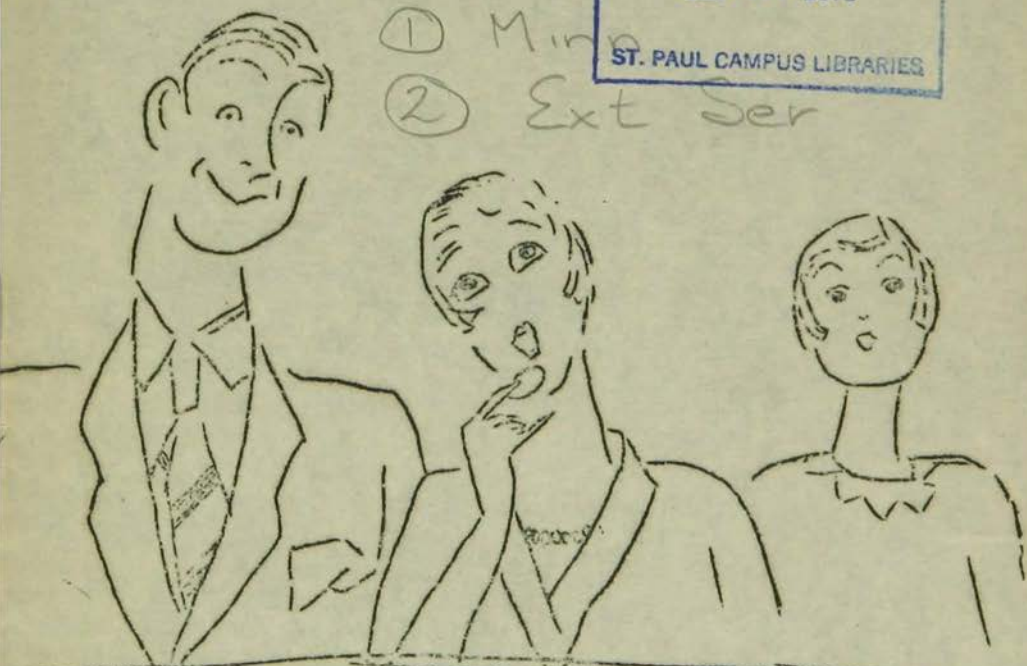

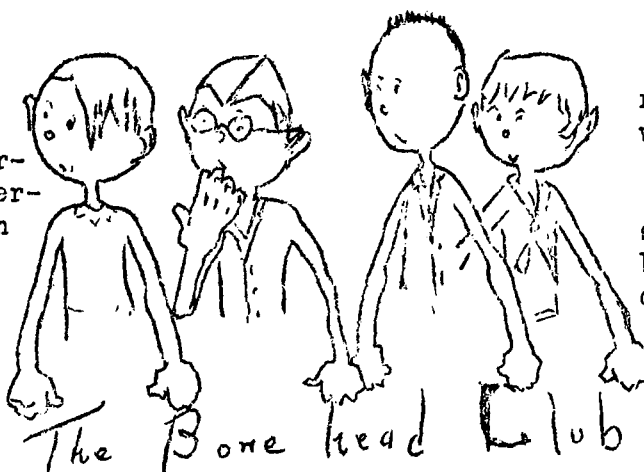

GIRLS STAGE STYLE SHOW

THE third annual style show given by 4-H garment club members at State Fair was staged at the Club Building yesterday at 3:30 P.M. A large crowd of visitors and other club members crowded about the platform on which the style show was given and frequent bursts of applause showed the appreciation of the spectators of the attractive dresses which the girls wore.

DRESSES of all types were shown, dresses for school and for home wear, dresses for afternoon club meetings and for parties. Mr. Erickson in introducing the girls announced that they had made their dresses themselves to suit their own eyes, and hair--- and smile!

THE style show will be given again on Friday afternoon in the Club Building at the Fair Grounds. It will begin at

3:00 P.M. and will be staged on the platform which has been used this week for the bread baking demonstrations.

PARADE BEFORE GRANDSTAND

GREAT banners of green and white, emblazoned with many four leaf clovers, emblems of 4-H club work, waving streamers and huge signs announcing the purposes and accomplishments of 4-H club members in Minnesota made the club parade before the Grandstand crowd last night a gala affair.

MORE than 800 club members and leaders marched in the parade. Mr. Erickson, Miss Schenck, Mr. Giberson and Mr. Pflughoeft led the way followed by the Scottish Kilties girls' band. County delegations followed in alphabetical order. Three awards were made for parade appearance. Mr. Bradford, who judged the parade, selected Fillmore county for first place, Lyon county second, Redwood county third, and Houston county fourth. In making the selections Mr. Bradford considered the effectiveness of the story told by the banners and streamers carried by the group, their originality and attractiveness.

IN order that visitors could best see the parade, club members formed a great "S" before the Grandstand. After the parade they took the places reserved for them in the Grandstand and remained for the entire program.

THE pageant and fire works, picturing the old story of "The Fall of Troy" headlined the evening's program. These were preceded, however, by a number of interesting features, including a concert by the band of John Philip Sousa, acrobatic stunts, tight wire walking, a series of living statues in bronze, stilt walkers, and the parade of the 6 horse teams from the horse show.

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
