

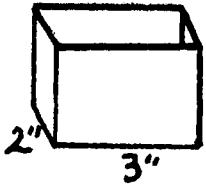
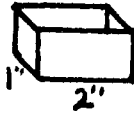
TO MAKE YOUR OWN CONTAINERS

or

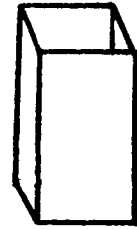
small



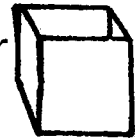
This is the base.

Tall



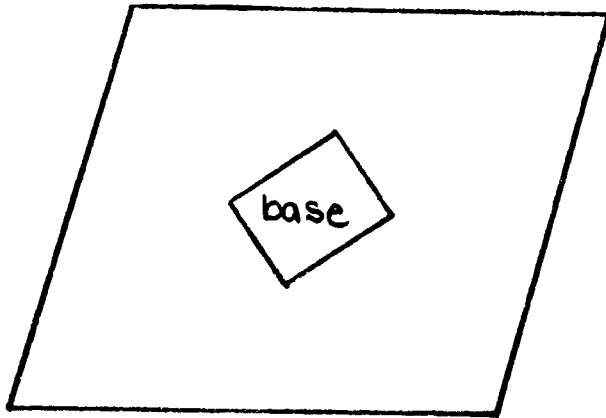
or



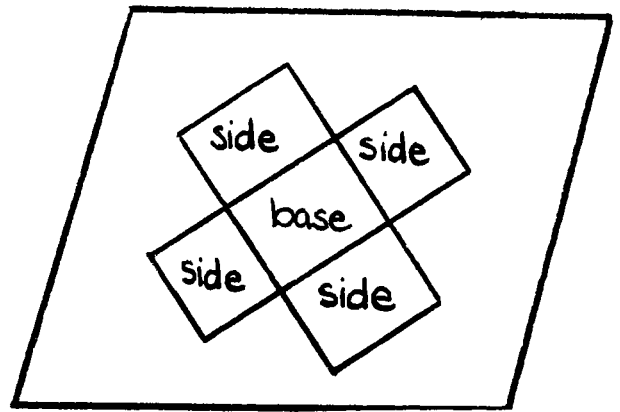
short

These are the sides.

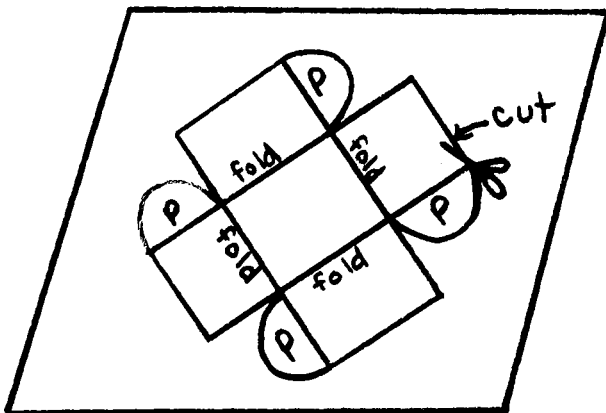
3. On heavy cardboard draw the base.



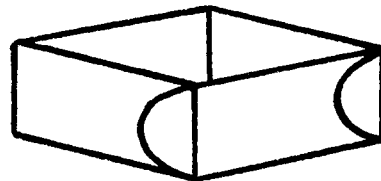
4. Then draw the sides
