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Raspberry Diseases

Cane blights, leaf spots, fruit rots, root diseases and viruses are the diseases that afflict raspberries grown in Minnesota. These diseases can be controlled with fungicides, insecticides and various cultural practices. Control measures are listed in Plant Pathology Fact Sheet No. 8, revised for 1974. 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Petunias

Petunias grow best in full sun and thrive in beds where the sun is direct for eight hours or more. There are several classes of petunias, including Grandiflora Doubles, California Giants and Single Multifloras. 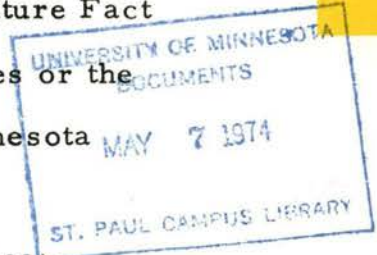
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Weed-Feed Fertilizer
