In addition 17 employees of the University representing various classifications and departments on the campus and in downtown buildings were present.

Mr. Norman E. Carle

- (1) read the statement from the Labor Negotiating Committee on the proposed negotiated settlement, which proposal was rejected by his membership;

- (2) requested acceptance of the Fact-Finding Commission's proposal of \$14 across-the-board;
- (3) stated that although the Regents had accepted the Fact-Finding Commission's report with the exception of the across-the-board adjustment, certain recommendations of the Commission had not been carried out by the University; and
- (4) indicated that since a settlement was effected in the 1947 negotiations without reference to the legislature and since comparability had not then governed, and further, since changes had been made by the Regents in 82 classifications, the Regents could and should accept the Fact-Finding Commission proposal.

Chairman Lobb explained that the Legislative proviso for comparability had been declared legal and binding and that the negotiated proposal rejected by the Union was intended to effect comparability.

Mr. Middlebrook explained that the 1947 settlement was in itself merely an expression of willingness on the part of the University to recommend to the Legislature changes involved in the settlement and that the changes in the 82 classifications referred to had as their objective comparability with State civil service.

Each member of the Union committee, all of whom were University employees, was given an opportunity to make a statement. Many complained of their own classifications, many indicated that they were at the maximum of their class, and some spoke for the \$14 across-the-board adjustment as well as their own particular classification.

Chairman Lobb indicated complete willingness of the Civil Service Office upon application to consider the grievances about which there was complaint by members of the Committee.

Mr. Carle asked for an expression of committee and individual attitudes. Regent Lobb for the Committee and individual members indicated that they were expected to report only to the Board.

MINUTES

April 24, 1950

A meeting of the Labor Committee of the Board of Regents was held in the Regents' Room on Monday, April 24, 1950, at three o'clock.

Present: Regent Lobb, Acting Chairman; Regents Jones, Lawson, Olson, and Snyder, and Messrs. R. M. Amberg, H. C. Anderson, Ralph Comaford, and Academic Vice President M. M. Willey.

Voted to approve the following report:

April 24, 1950

To The Honorable Board of Regents:

Your Special Committee on Labor recommends:

1. That the following proposal, resulting from a study of the comparability of the University civil service plan with that of the State civil service plan, as proposed by the Board of Regents on January 13, 1950 and made by the State Labor Conciliator in cooperation with Public Building Service Employees Union Local 113, AFL, and the University, be approved effective January 1, 1950:

- a) Civil Service employees in those classes which are in pay ranges one and two who are not at the maximum rate for their class and who started in their present class on or before April 1, 1949 will receive a one step merit increase effective January 1, 1950.
- b) Civil Service employees in pay ranges three through seven whose monthly rate is less than \$184.00 (maximum salary of range two) and who are not at the maximum rate for their class and who started in their present class on or before April 1, 1949, will be eligible to receive a merit increase on recommendation by the department head and approval of the Director of Civil Service Personnel, effective January 1, 1950.
- c) To make the following changes in University civil service rates in order to conform to State civil service rates:

2. That the Director of Civil Service Personnel be instructed, upon presentation by the employee through his or her union, to consider carefully and handle promptly those grievances presented by members of the Employee Committee representing Public Building Service Employees Union Local 113, AFL, at the meeting of the Committee on Labor on April 17, 1950.

3. That the Director of Civil Service Personnel continue to work with the Union in seeking to carry out the following recommendation of the Fact-Finding Commission, contained in report dated November 11, 1949:

"Your commission recommends that the Five (5) consecutive eight (8) hour day work week shall apply, with the proviso, that at the request of either party exceptions may be made on the basis of negotiations between the parties, but that these exceptions should not be based on mere convenience of the University, but only when a compelling public need can be demonstrated."

4. That the recommendation of the Fact-Finding Commission for a \$14 across-the-board adjustment, recommendation of which was requested by the Union at the Labor Committee meeting of April 17, 1950, be not approved for the following reasons:

- a) It would destroy comparability between University and State civil service salary ranges and rates of pay, which comparability is in accord with the understanding of the University with the Legislature and is required by law.
- b) It would require funds which were not requested nor granted by the 1949 Legislature and are not available.
- c) It would destroy internal pay relationships between the classes in the several salary ranges.

The Fact-Finding Commission itself recognized the validity of this position in a letter to the Governor dated November 29, 1949 in the following language:

"Our recommendations with reference to wages as found in the report were made without being advised of the legal significance of the above mentioned proviso. We, as a commission, do not feel that we are in a position to, nor do we desire to make a legal interpretation of the effect of this specific legislation. When and if this legislation is by proper legal authority or judicial determination found to constitute a mandate, then our recommendations in relation to the matter of wages must be limited to the extent of such determination."

The Attorney General ruled on December 16, 1949, that the following proviso requiring comparability is valid and binding on the University: (Session Laws of Minnesota for 1949, Chapter 743, Section 2, Item 1 and Section 3, Item 1)

"Provided, that from the above appropriations, all non-academic employees shall be paid a salary comparable to the salaries paid to state employees in the classified state civil service."

5. That the Director of Civil Service Personnel again invite Public Building Employees Local 13, in accordance with civil service rules and regulations, to submit and negotiate their proposals on wage changes for the biennium 1951-53 on or before July 1, 1950, so that the Regents may consider any such proposals in the preparation of the University's legislative civil service requests for the biennium 1951-53.
