MINUTES

December 14, 1915

A meeting of the Agricultural Committee was held in the President's office, Tuesday, December 14, 1915, at nine o'clock.

Present: Regent Rice presiding, Regents Williams, J. G., Williams, M. M., Vincent and Dean Woods.

Voted to approve the following appointments:

Frank Robotka as Assistant in Marketing and Agricultural Economics from December 1, 1915, to July 31, 1916, at a salary of \$100 a month.

Leroy C. Holm as Gymnasium Assistant for six months beginning November 1, 1915, at a salary of \$60 a month.

F. C. Clapp as Laboratory and Field Assistant in the Division of Soils from January 1, 1916, to May 15, 1916, at a salary of \$45 a month.

Paul M. Harmer to continue as Laboratory Assistant in the Division of Soils from January 1 to July 31, 1916, at a salary of \$45 a month.

Mrs. Vera Williams as Assistant in the Library for three months beginning January 1, 1916, at a salary of \$70 a month.

Ralph Craigo as Instructor in the Dairy School for one week beginning November 22, 1915, at a salary of \$40 for half time.

Ralph De Coudre as Dairy School Instructor for one week beginning December 4, 1915, at a salary of \$25.

Voted to approve the granting to George J. Baker of leave of absence without salary one year beginning November 15, 1915.

Voted to authorize the following trip outside the State:

M. J. Dorsey from Columbus, Ohio, where he is going at

his own expense to attend scientific meetings, to Washington, D. C., and return to Columbus, to make a study of the freezing apparatus which it is desired to use in experiments on the resistance of fruits to cold, the expenses not to exceed \$45, to be charged to Budget 270.

Voted to refer to a special committee consisting of Regents Rice and Williams, J. G., the further consideration of the proposed plan for reorganization of the Registrar's Office at the University Farm.

Voted to approve the recommendation of the Department of Agriculture that in recognition of services to agriculture and horticulture, certificates of honor be granted to:

BOARD OF REGENTS

MINUTES

December 14, 1915

The annual meeting of the Board of Regents was held in the President's office, Tuesday, December 14, 1915, at 10 o'clock.

Present: Regent Snyder, presiding; Regents Butler, Mayo, Nelson, Partridge, Rice, Schulz, Sommers, Vincent, Williams, J. G., and Williams, M. M.

Voted to approve the minutes of the meeting of the Agricultural Committee of November 3; the minutes of the meeting of the Board of Regents of November 3, and the minutes of the Executive Committee of November 16, 1915.

Voted to approve the report of the Agricultural Committee of December 14, 1915.

Mary W. Clark as Technician in the Department of Pathology, Bacteriology, and Public Health, beginning November 18, 1915, at a salary of \$35 a month, with the understanding that this will be increased to \$40 on February 1, 1916, and to \$45 on August 1, 1916, if services are satisfactory.

Leon Folke as Service Man in the Department of Pathology beginning November 1, 1915, at a salary of \$30 a month.

Bror E. Dahlgren as Associate Professor in the Theory and Practice of Dentistry from January 1, 1916, to July 31, 1916, at a salary of \$700 for services of four half days a week.

Laura Rutherford as Nurse in the College of Dentistry for five months beginning January 1, 1916, at a salary of \$250.

Rewey Belle Inglis as Instructor in Methods in English and Rhetoric in the College of Education for the first semester of the academic year 1915-16 at a salary of \$250.

George A. McGarvey as Instructor in Manual Training in the University High School beginning November 1, 1916, for the remainder of the academic year, at a salary of \$100 a month.

F. H. McDougall as Instructor in Chemistry from November 18, 1915, to July 31, 1916, at a salary of \$1,000.

Elsa Krauch as Assistant in the Editorial Department beginning December 1, 1915, at a salary of \$60 a month.

Ethel Robertson as Assistant in the Registrar's Office beginning December 1, 1915, at a salary of \$50 a month.

Elizabeth Barton as Stenographic Assistant in the Registrar's Office beginning December 1, 1915, at a salary of \$45 a month.

Voted to approve the following salary adjustments:

Earl Pettijohn, School of Chemistry, who resigned, effective November 1, 1915, to accept a position with the Government at an increased salary rate but upon request continued in the service until November 15, an allowance of \$25 was granted.

F. C. Frary, School of Chemistry, employed for the teaching year and paid on a twelve-month basis, resigned to take effect October 1, 1915, but on account of services during the summer

vacation this year and previous years, the payments as made were allowed to stand.

Dr. E. L. Newcomb, College of Pharmacy, on account of assuming editorial work in a druggist publication proposed a reduction in salary of \$200 per year from January 1, 1916, which was approved.

Voted to accept the gift of furnishings from the Minnesota Alumnae Club for the Charlotte S. Winchell Cottage, used by women students of the University of Minnesota in a system of coöperative housekeeping and to express the thanks of the University and to approve the proposed plan of coöperation between the Faculty Woman's Club and the Alumnae Club.

Voted to accept the gift of \$500 from James Ford Bell for the Zoological Museum, and to express the appreciation of the Board to Mr. Bell.

Voted to accept the gift from the Haynes Memorial Committee of a bronze memorial tablet in honor of

Professor Arthur E. Haynes for his efforts on behalf of the University boys who enlisted in the various regiments during the Spanish-American War and to express appreciation to the Haynes Memorial Committee for its generosity.

On motion, the President and Vice-President of the Board and the President of the University were appointed a committee to determine a proper location for the Haynes Memorial Tablet.

The special committee composed of Regents Snyder and Williams, J. G., empowered to negotiate and draw up formal documents in connection with the magnetic ore separator, invented by E. W. Davis, Instructor in the School of Mines, submitted trust conveyances and formal contracts, which were approved and execution by the proper officials of the University authorized, and it was

Voted to express to Mr. Davis the appreciation of the University for his high sense of honor and fairness in granting to the State so liberal an interest in his invention.

Voted to refer to the President of the Board and Regent Williams, J. G., the question of adoption of University text-books written by members of the Faculty of the University.

Voted to approve the establishment of the rank of Assistant for Internes at the University Hospital.

Voted to receive and file Supplement to the Minutes, page 83, the report of Theodore H. Sweetzer, student delegate to the Military Instruction Camp at Ludington, Michigan.

Voted to amend the minutes of the meeting of July 28, 1915, authorizing the attendance of student cadets at the Military Instruction Camp at Ludington, Michigan, to read, "for services (including all expenses) at \$60 each."

Voted to approve and file Supplement to the Minutes, page 84, the schedule of charges for use of machinery in the Ore Testing Works for private professional work, subject to the adopted regulations controlling "outside" work.

Voted to approve and file Supplement to the Minutes,

page 85, a resolution pledging the support of the University of Minnesota to the Municipal Electric Company in its efforts to secure for the University of Minnesota and the cities of Minneapolis and St. Paul the water power of the High Dam and to instruct the Secretary to forward certified copies as set forth in the resolution.

Inasmuch as Dr. S. Marx White, Associate Professor (on part time) has since June 9, 1915, been acting as Chairman of the Division of Medicine and will so continue to act until January 15, 1916, necessitating additional time and added responsibilities, on the recommendation of the Dean of the Medical School and the President of the University, it was

Voted to grant an additional sum of \$500 in recognition of this additional service. To be charged to the salary of the Head of the Department of Medicine in the budget of the Medical School.

Voted on the recommendation of the Administrative Board of the Medical School to extend invitations to the American Scientific Societies to hold their meetings of either 1916 or 1917 at the University of Minnesota.

It was voted to approve and file Supplement to the Minutes, page 86, the report of Chairman Snyder on the Riverside (Colorado) Irrigation Bonds and to instruct the Comptroller to forward the unpaid coupons to the County Treasurer as recommended, the bonds to remain on file with the State Treasurer.

The committee appointed in the matter of adjusting title to land at Grand Rapids reported the result of negotiations and it was

Voted to let the title rest as it now stands.

Some years ago Mr. Burt L. Newkirk, Assistant Professor in Mathematics and Mechanics, developed a gyroscope, in part on his own time and at an expense to the University approximating \$375, paid from appropriations for "University Weeks." The equipment is now obsolete and of no value except that parts may be used in developing a new instrument. The Extension Department is desirous of continuing Mr. Newkirk's demonstrative lectures, but the Director considers it unwise to assume the outlay for the redevelopment of the gyroscope and recommends that the equipment be sold to Mr. New-

kirk at its present value, appraised at \$100, with the understanding that the new instrument will be available for University purposes without charge. It was

Voted to authorize the sale of the gyroscope equipment to B. L. Newkirk for \$100.

Voted to continue the Albert Howard Scholarship, to be paid from the Ludden Real Estate Lease Fund.

Voted to instruct the comptroller to arrange for bonds for the University depositories as directed by the Attorney General and Public Examiner. It was agreed that bonds with individuals as sureties would be acceptable.

Voted to approve the purchase of an embossing press for the Department of Mechanical Engineering.

Voted to approve the lease of the Free Dispensary Building to Henry Broder for a period of 15 years at \$100 per month, the rent to commence April 1, 1916.

Voted to request the Attorney General if possible to delegate one of his Assistants to handle University minor legal matters. In the event he prefers to appoint an Assistant to be paid by the University, the appointment of John A. McGovern is recommended.
