Voted to approve the legislative requests as set forth in the "Needs for the Biennium 1927-29." Special consideration was given by the Board to the appropriation for the North Central School and Station, Grand Rapids, Minnesota, and to the special land and building requirements for the several substations.

A comparison of the collegiate enrollments for 1926-27 and 1925-26 was reported by the President of the University for the information of the Board of Regents.

Voted to authorize the payment to instructors in the Department of Music on the fee basis, in accordance with the following schedule:

Two thirds of the fees collected each quarter.

For instruction on special instruments off the campus, \$33 of the \$40 fee collected for one lesson a week for one quarter; \$66 of the \$75 fee collected for two lessons a week for one quarter.

The resolution adopted by the Alumnae Club of Minneapolis calling attention to the members of the Board of Regents to the need of dormitories at the University of Minnesota was presented, considered, and filed.

Voted to authorize the increase of the registration fee at the University Dispensary and the return visit fee from twenty to twenty-five cents, effective December 1, 1926.

Voted to authorize the College of Education to make an educational survey of the Albert Lea Public Schools

at a maximum cost of \$1,500 to be paid by the Board of Education of the Albert Lea Public Schools.

Voted to accept with thanks the gift of \$100 from the Advertising Club of Minneapolis for a scholarship to be awarded annually in June to a senior student in the School of Business on vote of a committee consisting of the Dean of the School of Business, two other faculty members appointed by the Dean, and the President and Secretary of the Minneapolis Advertising Club.

Voted to authorize the acceptance of the bids for the Physics building in accordance with reduced plan "A" outlined by Consulting Architect Mann, with the understanding that such service connections, grading and walks as were needed would be provided from the Campus Improvements fund.

Voted to approve the report of the Comptroller to the Chairman of the Salaries and Finance Committee, filed supplement to the minutes, page 489.

Voted to approve transfers of funds No. 245 to No. 282.

Voted to approve requisitions No. 4912 to No. 5530; \$86,487.08.

Voted to adjourn.
