Biennial Report 1959-60, 1960-61

The University of Minnesota Hospitals was established to furnish a means for the University of Minnesota to train students in the multiple fields of medical care. Training is given in the hospitals under the direct supervision and guidance of a competent staff made up of a full-time and part-time faculty. The staff is responsible to the State through the University for both the instruction of the students and the care of the patients. This arrangement has proved satisfactory not only in the training of students but also as an economical means for the State to care for many of its indigent sick.

The University of Minnesota Hospitals provides many different medical services within its many units and makes available facilities and services which enable physicians to provide the best possible care consistent with the progress in medical sciences.

UNIVERSITY OF MINNESOTA HOSPITALS ADMISSION POLICY

In applying for admission to the Hospitals, the patient must be referred by his family physician or by a physician in his local community. This rule prevents the criticism that the Hospitals and its clinics are taking patients who should be seen by private practitioners. This policy applies to patients admitted to the Variety Club Heart Hospital or to any other unit of the Hospitals.

Patients are classified according to their ability to pay as County, Per Diem, Teaching and Research, Sixty Fund, Sixty-four Fund, Eustis, Rehabilitation, Private, or, in the case of the Heart Hospital, the Variety Club of the Northwest Fund. There is no distinction made among the various classes in treatment or privileges.

COUNTY patients are those who are totally unable to pay. Their expenses are shared equally by their county and the state. When applying for either outpatient or hospital care, each patient must present county papers containing a medical report by his physician and approval by his county commissioner or his representative.

PER DIEM patients are those who cannot afford to pay for the services of both a

private physician and a private hospital. When applying for either outpatient or hospital care, these patients must present a note of referral or a special form signed by their family physician and by themselves. They are required to pay their clinic or hospital expenses only, no charge being made for the professional services of the staff. From the standpoint of money received by the Hospitals, there is no difference between a county patient and a per diem patient.

TEACHING AND RESEARCH PATIENTS are primarily destitute unmarried obstetrical patients who are unable to obtain county papers.

The **SIXTY FUND** and the **SIXTY-FOUR FUND** are special grants from the State Legislature used to hospitalize indigent psychiatric patients (adults and children) for treatment, teaching, and research purposes.

The **EUSTIS FUND** was set up by William Henry Eustis to care for indigent children under sixteen years of age.

The **REHABILITATION FUND** is provided by the legislature for the use of the Hospitals, through the Department of Rehabilitation and Physical Medicine, to aid in the physical rehabilitation of patients. Referral by a physician is required.

The **MULTIPLE SCLEROSIS DIAGNOSTIC FUND** was provided for each year of the past biennium to assist in financing the multiple sclerosis clinic. Referral by a physician is required.

PRIVATE patients, admitted only upon referral from a practicing physician, are utilized in conjunction with the teaching program just as other patients are. They are afforded treatment and privileges comparable to those afforded private patients in any private hospital.

The **VARJETTY CLUB OF THE NORTHWEST FUND** is a special annual gift from the Variety Club to assist in the care of patients from communities in the Club area, which includes Minnesota, North Dakota, South Dakota, and parts of Wisconsin, or from any other area indicated by the Club. Patients may be admitted for care on this fund on the usual recommendation of a physician. The Variety Club itself may at times request service for certain patients in which it has a special interest; such care is paid for through this fund. No charge is made for the professional services of the

staff--only for clinic or hospital expenses.

STUDENT HEALTH SERVICE patients are not considered Hospitals patients even though a Hospitals intern is assigned to this service. The Student Health Service has its hospital infirmary on the fourth floor in the west wing of the University Hospitals but is not a part of the University Hospitals. It is a service institution maintained by the University with a director, staff, and budget of its own. The Student Health Service, located on Church Street west of the Hospitals, provides outpatient care only.

INPATIENT DEPARTMENT

The number of patients admitted during the year 1960-61 was 15,561, and in 1959-60 the number was 16,096. The total number of days of hospital treatment aggregated 217,071 in 1960-61 as against 214,320 in 1959-60, an increase of 2,751 patient days. The average length of stay in the Hospitals was 13.9 days in 1960-61 and 13.3 days in 1959-60. The daily average census was 594.7 in 1960-61 and 585.6 in 1959-60.

A primary reason for the decrease in the number of admissions and the increase in length of stay on the inpatient services, including Psychiatry and Child Psychiatry, is that this year patients went home for weekends on passes rather than being discharged and readmitted as in previous years.

Surgical operations performed during the year 1960-61 numbered 10,953 as compared with 10,550 during 1959-60.

Deaths in the Hospitals for the year numbered 871. Of this number 111 occurred within 48 hours after admission; 140 deaths occurred in the Heart Hospital and 160 in the Masonic Hospital. Autopsies for the year 1960-61 numbered 717, an overall rate of 83.8 per cent; in 1959-60 the number of autopsies was 683, at an overall rate of 85.9 per cent.

PSYCHOPATHIC HOSPITAL

The Psychopathic Department of the Hospitals admitted 583 adult patients during the year as compared with 710 in 1959-60. The total number of patient days of hospital care was 21,109 in 1960-61 as against 20,030 in 1959-60. The average length

of stay was 36.2 days in 1960-61 and 28.2 days in 1959-60.

Child Psychiatry admitted 136 patients in 1960-61 as compared with 246 in 1959-60. The total number of patient days aggregated 5,970 in 1960-61 as against 5,447 in 1959-60.

VARIETY CLUB HEART HOSPITAL

The Variety Club Heart Hospital admitted 1,610 patients in 1960-61 as compared with 1,844 in 1959-60. The total number of patient days of hospital care was 21,483 in 1960-61 and in 1959-60 the number was 22,904. The average length of stay on both adult and pediatric stations was 13 days in 1960-61, and in 1959-60 the average length of stay was 12 days. The average daily census during 1960-61 was 59 (28 pediatrics, 31 adults), and in 1959-60 it was 63 (32 pediatrics, 31 adults).

MASONIC MEMORIAL HOSPITAL

The Masonic Memorial Hospital receives all of its patients by transfer from the general hospital. Patients treated in 1960-61 numbered 906 as against 730 in 1959-60. The total number of patient days of hospital care was 21,878 during 1960-61 as compared with 23,456 in 1959-60. The average length of stay in the Masonic Hospital was 21.9 days in 1960-61 and 27.4 in 1959-60. The daily average census was 59.9 in 1960-61 and 64 in 1959-60.

OUTPATIENT DEPARTMENT

The number of new patient visits in 1960-61 was 19,088, and in 1959-60 it was 20,285. Total patient visits made in 1960-61 were 121,830, and in 1959-60 the number was 119,602.

X-RAY DEPARTMENT

The X-Ray Department reported 71,409 procedures for the year 1960-61 as compared with 66,851 for the year 1959-60.

The Department of X-Ray Therapy gave 19,326 deep therapy treatments in 1960-61 as compared with 20,840 in 1959-60. There were 13,962 treatments given on the cobalt machines in 1960-61, and in 1959-60 the number was 13,442. Superficial therapy treatments in 1960-61 numbered 581 as compared with 1,055 in 1959-60.

HOSPITAL LABORATORIES

The Hospital Laboratories made 745,349 determinations during 1960-61 as compared with 769,502 in 1959-60.

PHARMACY

The Pharmacy filled 269,283 prescriptions in 1960-61 as compared with 251,206 in 1959-60.

REHABILITATION CENTER

There were 55,912 patient visits to the Rehabilitation Center by 3,889 patients during the past year. In 1959-60 there were 55,642 patient visits by 3,612 patients.

OTHER DEPARTMENTS

The services of the Social Service, Medical Record, and Nutrition departments are all shown statistically on separate tables in this report.

The Nursing Service has prepared a complete report of its operations for the year which will be presented to the staff at a Staff Meeting during the current year.

The reports of Powell Hall and Volunteer Service have been prepared and are on file in the Office of the Administrator.

COST OF OPERATION

The overall cost of running the Hospitals was \$39.05 per patient day in 1960-61 and \$37.45 in 1959-60, an increase of \$1.60 per patient day. The cost per out-patient visit was \$8.38 in 1960-61, and in 1959-60 the cost was \$8.07, an increase of \$0.31 per patient visit.

THE OUTLOOK

Next year's Hospitals' operations will continue to be at about the same level as those of the previous biennium. While legislative funds were increased for adjustment in the civil service pay and academic salary increases, only small sums were made available for additional service. It is hoped that no restrictions on admissions will have to be made during the coming biennium. The cost of operations continues to rise and will have to be met by an appropriate increase in charges.

The Comprehensive Clinic has been a real contribution to the improvement of patient care and teaching of undergraduates, and it is the hope of the Hospitals that

It will continue to prosper and improve even further.

Anticipated changes in the curriculum of the School of Nursing will necessitate many changes in the operations of the teaching program of nursing. Adjustments will have to be made in the operation of Powell Hall, the cafeteria, et cetera, to accommodate a new nursing education program. All in all changes that have been made in the past have been for the improvement of care of the patient, the education of the student, and the Hospital's is willing to cooperate.

Increases in the program of medical research put the Hospital's in a very difficult position in order to try to accommodate new programs and maintain the present ongoing services. No relief is in sight for changes in the physical plant at least until 1963.

ADDITIONAL SUPPORT

Hospital funds alone cannot provide for all the needs of an institution, satisfying the technical demands and the demands of day-to-day operation. One paramount need of a hospital is public understanding of its aims. To achieve this it needs the assistance of many people in addition to the paid staff--people who are willing to give their time or financial support. The continued interest of devoted friends contributes immeasurably to telling the hospital's story.

The University of Minnesota Hospitals is fortunate in having individuals and groups of individuals who show this interest and devotion. It is fitting that we thank the Masons of Minnesota and their affiliated organizations for their liberal donations and the Variety Club of the Northwest for their continued generosity in providing funds for patient care.

We also wish to thank the Masonic Hospital Auxiliary and the Auxiliary of the Variety Club for their gifts of both money and hours of service for patients in the Masonic Memorial Hospital and the Variety Club Heart Hospital; the University Hospitals Auxiliary--along with other sections of the Faculty Women's Club--for generous efforts on behalf of our patients; the Robinson School of Beauty Culture for their contribution to the well-being of our patients by their hair-dressing services; the directors

and staffs and members of the County Welfare Departments; the Minnesota State Department of Welfare; the Minneapolis Department of Relief; Miss Rosa Staden, Hennepin County Commissioner's Office; the Minnesota Society for Crippled Children and Adults; Travelers Aid; the Greater Minneapolis Council of Churches; the Hennepin County Chapter of the American Red Cross; the State Division of Vocational Rehabilitation; the Lutheran Welfare Society; the Family and Children's Service of St. Paul and Minneapolis; the Combined Nursing Service of Minneapolis; the Family Nursing Service of St. Paul; the Hennepin and Ramsey County Nursing Services; the State Board of Health; the Community Information Service; the Minneapolis Society for the Blind; Booth Memorial Hospital; Phillips 66 Men's Club; the Alpha Lambda Air Line Hostesses; and the many other organizations and individuals who have contributed to our patients' welfare, including, of course, the chaplains who minister so devotedly to the spiritual needs of our patients.

We of the Hospitals wish to express our appreciation to our volunteer workers who have generously given their time in performing services for our patients and in assisting our staff. We also wish to thank the many people who have contributed to service and research funds during the year.

The Administration desires finally to express its gratitude to the members of the professional and service staffs for their loyalty, helpfulness, and considerate care of our patients.

Chart Service

Approximately 205,654 records were handled by the Medical Record Department during the year 1960-61. This averages about 800 records withdrawn from and returned to file each day. This figure does not include records pulled for patients who failed their clinic appointments nor does it include the many records pulled each day for the purpose of placing lab reports, x-ray reports, correspondence, etc. on them. In addition, several thousand records have been changed over to new color control folders during the year. A breakdown of the uses made of the records follows:

Research Projects

Twenty-five thousand, seven hundred fifty records were pulled for studies and follow-up during the past year. Ninety-four studies were completed and 24 were temporarily discontinued. Four long-term studies were completed and 3 were temporarily discontinued. There were 1,342 records pulled for comprehensive clinic during June of 1961.

DEPARTMENT OF NURSING SERVICES

Staffing department of nursing services with professional nurses has been one of the major concerns of hospitals throughout the country as well as at the University of Minnesota. During the past few years, therefore, efforts have been made to attract nurses to our Hospitals. This has been accomplished by:

1. Sending illustrated brochures to all persons making inquiries regarding employment, hospitals, schools of nursing, and nursing organizations.
2. Advertising in professional journals and newspapers in six states.
3. Writing personal letters and conferring with all members of the University of Minnesota graduating classes.

As a result, we have been able to fill the majority of our positions in the fall of the year. From July, 1960 to July, 1961 we recruited 228 staff nurses. It is interesting to note that 18% were recruited through the efforts of present and past employees, 15% through the recommendation of friends, and 15% were former employees seeking re-employment. It is obvious that our present and past employees are our best recruiters.

Our main problem, then, is not in attracting staff, but rather in keeping them. How long do our nurses stay in their jobs? Last year, twenty-five per cent remained from one to five months; thirty per cent stayed one to two years; and thirty-one per cent remained from six to eleven months.

Why do nurses say they leave the University of Minnesota? A study on why nurses say they leave our Hospitals was made, covering the period from July, 1958 to April, 1961. The results were as follows:

29%	leaving the city
20%	new position
10%	marriage
9%	pregnancy
7%	attend school
6%	home responsibilities
3%	extended vacation
2%	dissatisfied with work

In summary, the University of Minnesota has little difficulty in recruiting nurses. One major problem seems to be in keeping our staff. We need the assistance and suggestions of the medical staff as well as our own employees and members of other departments in the Hospitals.

DEPARTMENT OF PHYSICAL MEDICINE & REHABILITATION

1960-1961

During the past year the number of patients who were treated in the Rehabilitation Center again showed an increase over that of the previous year. Table I summarizes the statistics for the past year and provides the comparative figures for 1959-60 and for the year 1954-55 when the Center was first opened. During the six year period since the Center opened, the patient load has increased 92 per cent and the number of treatments 101 per cent. The most striking increase in the services provided patients by the Center has again been in pre-occupational therapy where services were 1,543 per cent greater than that provided in 1954. Since the Center opened, the treatment load of physical therapy has increased 120 per cent, rehabilitative occupational therapy 52 per cent, speech therapy 182 per cent, and vocational counseling 44 per cent. Tables IV and V present the detailed statistical information of the Rehabilitation Center operations and of the Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation Service. Table II presents the occupational status of patients discharged from the Rehabilitation Center during the past year. Approximately 65 per cent either returned to their previous occupation or activity or were placed in training or new positions. Eight per cent had retired, 11 per cent required further Rehabilitation Center services, and 16 per cent did not appear to have the potential for employment or need the Rehabilitation Center services. Table III summarizes the statistics relative to the rehabilitation ward. It is to be noted that about 28 per cent of the patients were hemiplegics and 20 per cent were quadriplegics or paraplegics. The average number of treatment days for discharged patients was 37 days, and the average charge per rehabilitation services, exclusive of room, board, and laboratory charges, was \$8.40 a day or about \$310.00 for the period of hospitalization.
