MUSSELMAN AND KNIGHT MEET AGAIN

A decade or more ago Bill Musselman and Bob Knight were constant companions and in constant competition. The latter remains solid Saturday when Musselman's Minnesota Gophers play host to Knight's Indiana Hoosiers in the Big Ten basketball opener for both schools. Musselman and Knight grew up seven miles from each other in Ohio: Musselman in Wooster and Knight in Orville. Competition started in high school during football, basketball and baseball seasons. During summer months the two played basketball together constantly. Both a deep friendship and a friendly rivalry grew strong between these men and their careers have seen a similar parallel. Musselman spent his college days at Wittenberg, Ohio while Knight went on to Ohio State. Both coached six years of college ball before gaining their present jobs less than a month apart last spring. Musselman ran up a 129-30 record at Ashland College while Knight was 102-50 at the U.S. Military Academy (Army).

The similarity continues through their coaching philosophies. To both the name of the game is defense! ! ! Musselman's Ashland teams led the NCAA college division in defense five consecutive years, including a record limit of 33.9 points per game in 1968-69. Knight's Army squads led the major college defense listings three straight years. So regardless of how hot the competition will be on the floor Saturday, the main show could be at the sidelines between the coaches. "I know (Bob) Knight wants this game every bit as much as I do, and brother that's an awful lot," says Musselman. "Our backgrounds, offensive and defensive coaching philosophies are extremely similar. . .so the teams mirror each other in their respective approach to this game."

Regardless of the defensive prowess of Minnesota and Indiana, both teams have proved they can score with the best. In fact, Minnesota has gone over 80 points each of its last three games. But defense will be the key Saturday and players from both teams can expect to come out of this battle a bit mangled.

Yackel is still undecided as to which men will skate on which lines, but did announce his defensive pairings. Jack Thoenke and Doug Falls form up the first unit with Bill Butters and Dixon Shelstad the second. Brad Buetow will skate as the fifth defenseman. Yackel said he will skate four complete lines at Wisconsin. The Badgers lead the WCHA with a 10-2 record and 28 points while Minnesota is last at 2-8 and four points. Minneapolis. One down and thirteen to go. An old and trite lead, but somehow it just seems to fit coach Bill Musselman and his Minnesota basketball team.

Last Saturday before the second largest crowd in Williams Arena history—19,121—Musselman was presented with his first Big Ten win, a 52-51 thriller over sixth ranked Indiana. But that was only one game.

Minnesota has been termed a challenger; a dark horse, a shot in the dark by those around the Big Ten. Maybe last Saturday the Gophers bore witness for many.

Any team that shoots only .361 percent from the floor and still wins can't be all bad. Maybe a press that forced 26 Indiana turnovers had something to do with it.

All of a sudden Minnesota fans, particularly students, seem to have noticed the Gophers, too. An estimated 4,000 fans stood outside Williams Arena waiting for 3,000 general admission tickets to go on sale just before the Minnesota-Indiana game. "I knew we would have a fine crowd but expected nothing quite like this," said weary ticket manager Bob Geary.

And the interest is mounting. On Monday huge lines were stacked up outside Cooke Hall ticket windows and the traffic kept up a steady pace all day.

A combination of many things . . .but mostly winning. . .has gone into this rebirth of interest. One of the keys is Musselman's wide open approach to the game.

"I sincerely believe that basketball is pure entertainment for the fans, so why not do your utmost to entertain," the coach offers. Most of the pure entertainment starts at 7:30 p.m. when the Gophers are at home.

At that time the team comes on the floor to the tune of solid rock music and puts on a dazzling Globetrotter-style pre-game warmup. Last Saturday most of the crowd clapped along in unison with the team as the squad went through their elaborate routines.

One fan was heard to say; "I don't care if I see the game or not. Just watching the pre-game warmup is worth the price of admission."

Indiana made its contribution to the festivities before game time when the Hurrryn' Hoosiers came on the floor decked out in white warmup pants with red vertical stripes. Or was that white on red?

Granted, the show was great, but what really sent the 19,121 into a frenzy was two foul shots by guard Bob Nix with 17 seconds remaining that gave Minnesota its one point win.

A fan even presented Musselman and the team with a small but impressive trophy on Monday appropriately inscribed in honor of their first Big Ten win.

Even though it's a long time until the usual March madness connected with prep basketball hits Williams Arena, for the University March may already be here.

As of late Tuesday (1/11), talk of another sellout was being heard around Cooke Hall.

Minnesota plays host to Northwestern Saturday and another huge house should be on hand. The Wildcats at one time led heavily favored Illinois by 13 points before losing 67-63 last week.

Yup, one down and thirteen to go isn't much. But everybody's got to be somewhere!

Minneapolis. For the first time since 1954, the University of Minnesota athletic ticket office put into use for the Northwestern game on 1/15 a plan of ticket exchange for student-staff members who had purchased season athletic passes.

The immediate result, according to ticket manager Bob Geary, was one of instant dissatisfaction. "At first the students, staff and employees believed they were being short-changed, but that was far from the truth," Geary told us.

"To get this all explained I had best start from the beginning. First of all we have three athletic ticket plans in basketball that affect members of the University community.

"Students have the option in the spring or fall to purchase for \$17 an all-events pass for area reserved seating—not individual reserved seats—at all athletic events. Most of those purchases, of course, concern football.

"Or, the student can purchase for \$8 an athletic pass good for attendance to all events except football. Then there is the \$20 season pass to all events for staff and employees. These, too, are for area reserved seating.

"The total purchase of these three plans this year amounted to 10,905 athletic passes.

"Now is basketball, student-staff-employee attendance has not been a major factor in our seating allocations for several years. But this goes hand in hand with our total basketball attendance, too. Historically the general public has supported Gopher basketball teams well and deserves to be protected, too.

"Now here in table form is how seating allocations at Williams Arena are divided:"

Reserved seats @ \$2.50 -	6,347
Student-Staff -	8,148
General Admission (including high school squads, etc., or all other seats except student-staff) -	<u>3,381</u>
Total -	17,876

"Then the question is asked why only 8,148 student-staff seats when you sold 10,905 season athletic passes? The answer lies in attendance figures over recent years.

"Last year the average student-staff attendance proved to be 35.8 percent of the total attendance. Through our first six home games this season the student-staff average is 33 percent.

"But even in light of the drop in percentage, we are upping the student-staff reserved area seating to more than 9,000 for the Ohio State game on January 25. Also, there will be no exchange plan put into operation.

(MORE)

"However, we do ask that any students or staff members who plan to attend be in their seats by 7:30 p.m., in time for the pre-game warmup show, so that in the event less than 9,000 exercise their privilege, we can then admit general admission patrons from the public to any unoccupied seats in these areas.

"The Indiana game was the biggest crowd in recent years, in fact the second biggest crowd ever. We were forced to close Williams Arena doors at tipoff time, 8 p.m., and 7,521 student-staff athletic pass holders attended.

"For the Northwestern game we set up only 7,000 student-staff exchange tickets due to more than 1,000 tickets being purchased last December by members of high school teams attending the winter all-sports day events. However, only 5,600 student-staff pass holders asked for the exchange.

"We put the exchange plan into use because we would rather tell a student or staff member on Thursday or Friday that their allocation of seats was depleted rather than turn them away from the gate at game time after they have parked their cars. I am sincere in my belief that it is not fair to anyone to hold back large blocks of seating until the final minute when there are others waiting to purchase tickets at the box office."

Geary also said that at the rate we are going a new attendance record for one season could be realized. The largest single season attendance was during 1947-48 when 136,692 fans viewed 11 home games. The Gophers play the same number of home games this year and are averaging 12,907. At this rate the 1971-72 figure would reach 141,977.

As a final statement, Geary said: "When you realize that we are setting aside slightly more than half our seating capacity for students, staff and employees for the Ohio State game next Tuesday night, I just can't see how members of the University community can feel offended. All we are really hoping for is the Gophers continue to win and as many fans student, staff and public as we can accommodate come to our games."

GOPHER SPORT SHORTS

GYMNASTICS: Minnesota got off to a winning start in its Big Ten dual-meet season last Saturday, upsetting Illinois 157.50-153.60. Key men were Jeff Rock who won the all-around, Craig Carlson who defeated Big Ten champion Paul Hunt in the floor exercise and Rick Blesi who looked impressive in winning the vaulting. Gophers' only action this week is dual meet with St. Cloud State at St. Cloud Thursday.

From Coach Fred Roethlisberger: "I was thrilled with our win over Illinois, not just because we won but because we went into the meet with confidence that we would win. In the past our guys always seemed a little unsure of themselves against Big Ten powers. I feel more than ever now that we have a real shot at second place in the Conference."

SWIMMING: Gophers lost 63-60 to Michigan State last Saturday at Cooke Hall to run dual meet record to 0-3. Craig Lincoln won both diving events. Minnesota will be favored over both Iowa State at Ames Friday and Northwestern at Cooke Hall Saturday (2 p.m.) although both meets could be close.

From Coach Bob Mowerson: "The Michigan State meet was both encouraging and disappointing. If we could only have taken one more second place, we would have won 62-61, and there were several cases where the margin between second and third was very narrow. On the plus side, we are making good progress and several of our men turned in their best times. We'll have our hands full with Iowa State and especially the Wildcats who are tremendously improved this year."

YACKEL NAMES ROSTER FOR NOTRE DAME SERIES

University of Minnesota hockey coach Ken Yackel Thursday named a tentative roster for his Friday-Saturday evening series against Notre Dame in Williams Arena. Yackel will use five, maybe six, defensemen, including Jack Thoenke, Brad Buetow, Dixon Shelstad, Doug Falls and Les Auge. He said that freshman Tim Schroeder may skate here Friday with Bill Butters returning Saturday after sitting out a one game suspension due to a fighting penalty last weekend. Yackel also said Doug Hastings would play in goal Friday, but would wait to see the results before naming Saturday's goal tender. The forward lines will skate this way: C-Doug Peltier, LW-Dean Blais and RW-Pete Anderson; C-Jim Gambucci, LW-Cal Cossalter and RW-John Matschke; C-Mike Polich, LW-Bruce Carlson and RW-Tim Carlson. Tom Dahlheim will skate as an extra forward Friday.

YACKEL ON NOTRE DAME

"I know very little about their style of play, but am certain they will come in here with guns blazing. They, too, are seeking consistency, and as these games are both worth four points in the WCHA, we both have to double our efforts. In addition, they are bringing in 12 former Minnesota boys and that in itself will peak Notre Dame even higher. I look for a great series."

CAGERS AT MICHIGAN STATE

After winning its first Big Ten road game at Wisconsin (65-59) Tuesday, the University of Minnesota basketball team goes back on the road Saturday (1/22) facing Michigan State at East Lansing. (The game will be broadcast live on WCCO FM and replayed later on AM). The Gophers are now in sole possession of first place in the Big Ten with a 3-0 record.

MUSSELMAN FEARS LET DOWN

"Being on top is one thing. Staying there is another. It's as much a mental problem as anything else. And seeing that Michigan State dropped an overtime decision at Northwestern (66-59) Tuesday after we defeated Northwestern easily here, I'm concerned that our players might believe they are just going on a pleasure trip this weekend. Nothing could be farther from the truth. Any team in the Big Ten that takes another Conference member for granted is in for the surprise of its life. This is a dog-eat-dog league and no one lies down for anybody. I fully expect Michigan State to play its best game of this season against us. We will have to be prepared to meet the challenge." Musselman also said he does not plan any lineup changes. Michigan State is led in scoring by 5-11 sophomore guard Mike Robinson (21.0) and 6-7 junior center Bill Kilgore (15.3). Kilgore also leads the Spartans in rebounding, 11.2 per game. Michigan State is 7-5 on the season and 1-3 in the Big Ten. Its lone Big Ten victory came against Wisconsin, 83-76 at home.

Close to 50 teams with more than 500 individual entries will begin competition Friday at 3 p.m. in the University Field House for the Northwest Open track and field meet. Coach Roy Griak, meet director, expects this field to be the strongest ever. Only one event, the long jump, will be concluded Friday. All other events include preliminary heats only. The finals begin Saturday at 11:30 a.m.

BASEBALL STARTS DRILLS

Minnesota baseball coach Dick Siebert, heading into his 25th season at the University, greeted 31 varsity candidates for the opening of winter drills Monday. Minneapolis. Two of the world's mightiest wrestling powers, Russia and the United States, will meet in a 10-bout exhibition match Monday, March 20 in the new Anoka High School gymnasium.

Wally Johnson, wrestling coach at the University of Minnesota and president of the United States Wrestling Federation (USWF), made the announcement adding that the dual meet will serve as a preview to the 1972 Summer Olympics in Munich, Germany.

"This meet, coupled with the U.S. Olympic wrestling selection tournament in June, also at Anoka, and the Olympic training camp in August here at the University will stamp our State as the capital of wrestling in the U.S. this year," Johnson said.

Admission to the dual meet in March is set at \$3 for adults and \$2 for all students.

Johnson said that at least five defending world champions will be in the U.S.—Russian meet. For the U.S. Dan Gable (149 pounds) from Iowa State and Wayne Wells (163) from Oklahoma are expected to spearhead the 1972 Olympic team.

Leading the Russians to the Anoka gym will be Alexander Medved (Hwt.), Olympic goal medalist in 1964 and 1968, Gennadi Stachov (198) and Yoiry Shamhuradow (180).

Johnson and Garth Lappin of the Anoka-Hennepin School District, have been named co-directors for the dual meet.

FOUR UM TEAMS ON ROAD

Four University of Minnesota teams see road action this week with one squad, wrestling, heading for a Big Ten meet Friday and Saturday at Indiana. Basketball is at Michigan Saturday (1 p.m. CST), track at Northwestern (1 p.m. CST) and hockey at North Dakota Friday and Saturday (both games 8 p.m. CST).

MAT SQUAD HOPES FOR 1st DIVISION FINISH

Minnesota wrestling coach Wally Johnson believes that if the Gophers wrestle up to their potential, a fourth place finish in this year's Big Ten meet Friday and Saturday at Indiana could be the prize. Johnson said he has been extremely pleased with UM's performance over the last month, but still has his fingers crossed considering the injury bug which has plagued his squad all year. "We are healthier now than at any previous time. I'm just asking for a few more days of the same," Johnson says.

MICH. STATE PROHIBITIVE MAT FAVORITE

Michigan State University, the UCLA of Big Ten wrestling, is considered a prohibitive favorite to annex its seventh straight Conference team championship, according to UM coach Wally Johnson. Johnson also considers Michigan and Iowa as the main challengers, but will probably end up in a battle for second place. Michigan State has won every Conference team title since 1966 and took the NCAA crown in 1967.

GAGERS FACE GIANT TEST IN BIG TEN STRETCH RUN

The first key Big Ten test for Minnesota this year was the Conference opener against Indiana (UM won 52-51). Then came the first road contest at Wisconsin (UM won 65-59). Then came the challenge from mighty Ohio State (UM lost 50-44). A second meeting at Indiana ended in a big loss (42-61), but another key was the win at Northwestern in the next outing (78-55). Now comes another giant task, taking on Michigan in Ann Arbor Saturday (1 p.m. CST). Minnesota is 8-2 in the Big Ten and Michigan 7-2. A loss could snarl the race even further with Ohio State expected to win at Northwestern and move its record to 8-3.

UM COACH FEARS MICH. STRENGTH BOTH WAYS-OFF.-DEF.

According to Minnesota coach Bill Musselman, his Gophers are in for a rugged battle at Michigan. "They (Michigan) may be the strongest rebounding team we have faced, and they are also the highest scoring team in our league," Musselman says. "To counter we will have to play exceptionally well in every phase of the game if we expect to win. One thing is for certain. ...we will have to play a far superior defensive game than we showed last week against Wisconsin. We gave them the good percentage shot and they hit 52 percent of their attempts. We will not be able to afford that against Michigan.

GOPHER DROP

Minnesota lost its first dual meet of the year to Purdue, 66-74, last week at home. "Even though Purdue is a vastly improved team, I believe we could have won that event if everyone had been healthy," says Griak. "Distance runner Garry Bjorklund, high jumper Brad Buetow and triple jumper Charles Moss were out with injuries. It appears now that both Buetow and Moss will miss this week, too."

Coach Roy Griak said Tuesday that running ace Garry Bjorklund is expected to enter the 2-mile run Saturday for Minnesota at Northwestern. Bjorklund has been out for several weeks with a foot injury. The Gopher junior is ranked as one of the premium college distance stars in the nation. Bjorklund is the Big Ten's defending indoor 2-mile champion being timed in a record 8:49.0 last winter.

CAL STOLL

Minnesota's New Football Coach

Back in 1950 when Cal Stoll and his family were driving out of the Twin Cities enroute to Logan, Utah, and his first college coaching job at Utah State, he told his wife, June, that "it would be a dream come true" if they "could ever come back to Minnesota." That dream came true in a big way last January when Cal became the 21st man to serve as head football coach at the University of Minnesota.

It wasn't that Cal disliked Utah or the University at Logan, it was just that he loved Minnesota. Since his return, it has become a mutual love affair because the people of Minnesota have accepted Cal with wholehearted enthusiasm, hoping that he will lead the Gophers back to the glory of their golden past.

Stoll, 48, returned to Minnesota after three years as head coach at Wake Forest where he revived the Deacons' football fortunes, bringing them their first Conference title in history and their first back-to-back winning seasons in 20 years. The task won't be quite that formidable at Minnesota but the Gophers have not had a winning season since 1968 and last tied for the Big Ten title in '67. Stoll's overall record for his three years at Wake Forest was 15-17.

A native of Page, North Dakota, Cal played fullback on a six-man high school team at Tower City, also in North Dakota. He served in the U.S. Navy from 1941-47, spending much of the time in the South Pacific, and enrolled at the University of Minnesota shortly after being discharged.

Stoll had visions of being a fullback on the order of Bronko Nagurski when he was a lad back in North Dakota but he settled for the role of a reserve end playing behind the likes of Bud Grant and Gordy Soltau at Minnesota. He was strongly influenced by his coach, Bernie Bierman, and still has great respect for the man who coached five national championship football teams at Minnesota.

His first job after receiving his physical education degree in 1950 was as head coach at Mound High in suburban Minneapolis where he produced a conference champion with an 8-1 record that fall.

The following year Stoll moved to Utah State as assistant to John Roning, a former member of Bierman's staff at Minnesota, and remained there until 1954 when he accompanied Roning to the University of Denver. He went to Georgia in 1957 and spent two seasons as an assistant to Wally Butts before moving in 1959 to Michigan State where he served as assistant coach and defensive coordinator under Duffy Daugherty until taking over at Wake Forest in '68.

While Stoll was at Michigan State the Spartans won 60, lost 32 and tied three. They won undisputed Big Ten titles in 1965 and '66.

Cal met the future Mrs. Stoll while they were attending the University. They were married in 1949 and have two children, both currently enrolled at Michigan State - Mark, a senior, and Jill, a junior.

PRE-SPRING PRACTICE FOOTBALL OUTLOOK

The University of Minnesota's new football coach, Cal Stoll, allows that he has been on the job for two short a time (he was appointed Jan. 8) to assess his first Gopher team's prospects for 1972 with any degree of authority.

"I'll be able to tell you more after spring practice," he says. "We have two questions to answer during spring drills: (1) Who wants to play? (2) What can they do best? It will probably take us most of the spring to answer these questions. When we do, we will have to determine what kind of team we are going to be and who will play where."

At Wake Forest, where he brought the Deacons their first football title in history two years ago, Stoll employed a "Veer" or Triple-Option offense and a pro-type defense. His system at Minnesota will depend on the type of personnel he has and his evaluation of it after spring practice.

Sixteen lettermen from Murray Warmath's last Gopher team which finished 4-7-0 overall and 3-5-0 in the Big Ten will not be back. Included in this group are six offensive regulars and two others who were part-time starters. Among them were such standouts as quarterback Craig Curry, fullback Ernie Cook and tackles Bart Buetow and Jack Babcock. Curry was the Big Ten's total offense leader the past two years and Cook was the Gophers' top rusher.

Four defensive starters have also departed, including All-Big Ten linebacker Bill Light and end Tom Chandler.

Thirty-two lettermen return. Of these the most notable are offensive end Doug Kingsriter, an All-Big Ten selection and an AP All-American in 1971, defensive middle guard and tackle Clayton Scheuer who tied Light for most tackles last year with 108 and led in unassisted stops with 61, defensive backs Tim Alderson and Mike White who were both injured last year (White for the entire season), flanker George Honza, defensive tackle John Krol, defensive end Steve Neils and quarterback Bob Morgan. Morgan, the 1972 captain, played in Curry's shadow for two years but is a good runner and adequate passer.

Help must come from the 1971 freshman squad if the Gophers are to fill the many key holes. Among the most promising newcomers are tackle Dave Appleyard (6-3, 235, Northfield), a rugged performer who can go both ways but missed part of last fall because of knee and ankle injuries, quarterback-linebacker Ollie Bakken (6-1, 230, St. Paul Harding), flanker Dale Henricksen (6-3, 200, Barrington, Ill.) ends Herb Buelow (6-2, 185, Rockford, Ill.) end Roger Plath (6-3, 215, Hastings), defensive end Frank Byrne (6-3, 205, Ardsley, N.Y.), and quarterback Frank Rhodes (6-1, 185, Neptune Beach, Fla.).

Although the Gophers have 32 lettermen returning, a number of them have seen relatively little action. For example, the Gopher secondary was hit by a wave of injuries last fall which required extensive use of replacements. This resulted in the awarding of letters to no fewer than eight defensive backs. Seven of this group will be back while two other defensive backs, White and Dick Humleker, return after being out with injuries last season.

If Minnesota is to improve on the sixth-place position it shared with Purdue and Wisconsin in 1971, it will need especially to find suitable replacements for Curry and Cook in the backfield. This will be difficult since they accounted for the bulk of the offensive punch the past two seasons. Although two lettermen—Jim Henry and Tom Waltower—return at offensive left half, they gained only 284 yards between them in 1971. The sole returning letterman fullback, John King, was used sparingly last fall.

Minnesota must also bolster its defense which was one of the weakest in the Big Ten last year, ranking eighth against rushing and ninth against passing and in total points surrendered in Conference play.

The Gophers also must find a replacement for Mike Perfetti who set a team record in punting with a 41.6 average in 1971, best in the Big Ten for all games. The best bets are senior Jim Herman and junior Todd Randall. Mel Anderson, last year's placement kicker, also has departed but Lou Clare who did most of the placements in 1970 is expected back.

Minnesota has seen eight straight scheduled games frozen out in the past six days.

The teams were frozen out on Tuesday, April 14.

ALL GAINED IN TEXAS NOW LOST

"Everything we gained during our spring trip is all but gone in terms of individual development and progress," Siebert said Wednesday. "And it is our thin pitching staff who is suffering the most. Working out in the batting cage is fine, but it is in no way a substitute for game competition. No matter how you look at it, we are hurting. . .hurting bad! ! !"

"In fact, I believe pitcher David Winfield, the Big Ten's best last spring, is hurting the most. He was not with us during the winter and only pitched once (4 innings) in Texas. So if we don't get outdoors and see some foreign opposition quick, well, the Big Ten trip may be long and painful for us this spring."

The Minnesota track team will be represented by five hopefuls this weekend at Austin, Texas for the giant Texas Relays. However, the latter's physical condition is still up in the air due to a slow healing foot injury.

Buell and his wife, the former Linda Heckenlively of Sioux Falls, South Dakota, met in college and were married in 1969. They presently reside in Brooklyn Center.

UNIVERSITY OF MINNESOTA MOVES FORWARD TO STUDY THE FEASIBILITY OF DOMING MEMORIAL STADIUM

Receipt of a grant of \$15,000 from the Educational Facilities Laboratory of the Ford Foundation and matching funds from the University has provided \$30,000 for the Athletic Department to finance a feasibility study of doming Memorial Stadium.

The consulting engineering firm of David Geiger-Horst Berger, New York City has been retained to program and direct the study expected to be completed by July 1, 1972.

Dr. David Geiger, internationally recognized authority on light-weight spans, who engineered the air-supported dome over the U.S. Pavilion at Expo '70 at Osaka, Japan, will personally direct the design exploration. Other consultants will be Robert H. Browne, Memphis, Tenn., architect-planner of sports facilities renovation; P. H. (Dick) Theibert, Director of Athletics Hofstra University and Special Consultant to the Ford Foundation on athletic facilities planning and program; Robert W. Brantingham, St. Paul Consulting Architect and Oliver D. Billings & Assoc. Inc., mechanical engineering firm of St. Paul.

The purpose of the study will be to determine the feasibility of doming Memorial Stadium and planning how the stadium should be altered under the roof to accommodate the Life-Time Sports Program without losing its function as a stadium.

The consultants have been charged with the responsibility to study all systems of roofing (air-supported fabric structures, cable restrained roofs, steel framed domes, and pre-stressed fabric membranes) as well as stadium alterations and improvements.

Included in the study will be renovation and additional seating; improved spectator sight lines; new press box and scoreboard; lighting and sound systems. Changes in design of the present structure to make it more compact will be explored as well as the possibility of extending seating to within 25 feet of the sidelines. Translucent roof cover possibilities will be studied to reduce the need for artificial illumination during daylight hours.

An enclosed stadium seating approximately 65,000 (present capacity 57,000) will be needed to accommodate anticipated increases in Gopher football attendance. In

addition, a covered facility adjacent to Cooke Hall will be an outstanding asset and adjunct to the programs in men's and women's physical education, intramurals and recreation. If the feasibility study proves practical and functional program-wise and economically possible, it will provide Minnesota students, staff, community and public with the most comprehensive and multi-purpose sports and fitness facility in modern collegiate institutions.

The area being studied covers approximately 3 acres and will increase the playing and sports areas within the enclosure to over 125,000 sq. feet of multiple-use without conflict with football. The facility equipped with lighting, air conditioning and playing fields for touch football, basketball, soccer, rugby, lacross, softball, tennis, volleyball, badminton, field hockey as well as regular class use, will permit programming on a 24 hour daily, year-round basis. Expanded use beyond intercollegiate football games will make a strong case for subsidization from legislative funds.

A major objective in the stadium remodeling and doming is expansion and improvement of the Life-Time Sports Program for Minnesota's student body of over 43,000 and faculty and staff of over 10,000, some 53,000 people whose physical needs require a "participant oriented" as well as improved "spectator" facility.

This pilot study can point the way for several hundred other educational institutions in providing greater flexibility and multiplicity of use of existing athletic facilities. Synthetic playing surfaces will increase the multi-purpose possibilities and will reduce the mounting maintenance costs plaguing "special purpose" facilities today.

This study with its inherent community use implications is not a competitive approach to similar concepts currently being explored in the Twin Cities. Nor are the proposed improvements programmed into the study geared directly to standards acceptable to the Vikings.

Locally the study is being coordinated thru the University's Physical Planning office, headed by Hugh Peacock and in the Athletic Department by Marsh Ryman. Results of the study will be forwarded to President Moos and the Board of Regents by mid-summer.

In the final evaluation and analysis of the domed stadium concept, its function and practicality for implementation will be in its "usage by people" and whether the University's total program can be benefited.

Coach Siebert declined to name his pitching rotation for the weekend. But it is possible he could use the same rotation as last week. That would mean David Winfield and Bob Turnbull Friday with Ken Schultz and Dennis Allar or Bill Lange Saturday. "There is just no way I can tell who can pitch as we are so low at this position," says Siebert. "Why, do you know I used infielder Gary Morgan against Ohio State Saturday, and that's the first time in my 25 years at Minnesota I have ever used an infielder to pitch in a Big Ten game. That should prove what trouble we face when it comes to our pitching staff and its various ailments. As I said before, we are hurting!!!"

GOPHER SPORT SHORTS

EBBITT MEETS CHALLENGER FOR BIG TEN HONORS

Minnesota tennis fans can view a super match Friday at 2 p.m. on the University courts for free when the Gophers take on Indiana. Key match of the meet comes in number one singles between UM's Jim Ebbitt and Indiana's Mark Bishop. Ebbitt and Bishop are both undefeated in Big Ten matches to date and each sees himself as the new Conference singles champion.

EBBITT AND BISHOP HOLD WINS OVER MICH'S ROSS

Last year Michigan's Joel Ross, then a junior, copped the individual Big Ten title, but this spring both Ebbitt and Bishop have defeated the defending champion. In addition, Ebbitt edged Bishop 6-3, 6-4 in a dual meet last spring. "But I have to say I had an exceptional day and Bishop was definitely off his game," Ebbitt offered. "I know I'll have to be letter perfect to win this time."

SOUND GROUND GAME BIGGEST LIFT THIS YEAR

According to UM coach John Santrock, Ebbitt put in extra hours adjusting his ground game during the winter and spring months. "If Jim is vollying well Friday I know he can beat Bishop," Santrock says. "Jim is very sound from the base line now. I believe he is vastly improved over last year. His strength is also a vital factor as he often overpowers an opponent. I believe tennis fans are in for one great match."

OSU COMES IN SATURDAY FOR NET MATCH

Minnesota has a 6-8 dual meet record this year but stands only 1-4 against Big Ten opponents. Overall Ebbitt is 9-3 and has won all five against Conference players. However, Santrock believes Indiana is a solid challenger to Michigan supremacy this year and the Gophers will have to have some superhuman performances to win. But Santrock also believes the Gophers are favored to take Ohio State Saturday at 1 p.m. There is no admission charge to UM home dual meets.

BASEBALL TEAM BACK ON ROAD

Minnesota's baseball team, now in second place with a 5-1 record behind Big Ten leader Northwestern (2-0), heads for doubleheaders at Purdue Friday and Illinois Saturday. Gophers coach Dick Siebert says Purdue has an excellent pitcher in Carl Smith who only lost 1-0 to Michigan State. Smith is a certainty to pitch against Minnesota. And Illinois came to the front by sweeping two from Ohio State last week. Siebert also said it was known at the start that Illinois, with a solid veteran lineup, would be a contender this year. The Illini are 3-2 in the Big Ten and Purdue 1-1.

MORE PITCH WOES BESET SIEBERT

Coach Siebert's already thin pitching staff was all but decimated while the Gophers were sweeping two from Michigan State 5-0 and 3-1 last Sunday. Ace David Winfield went out of the first game with a sore elbow and soph starter Bob Turnbull, while in a relief appearance, split open a finger on his pitching hand while batting in the same inning. Hopefully Winfield, if his arm comes around, could be ready by Saturday to go against Illinois. But Siebert believes Turnbull may be lost for the season.

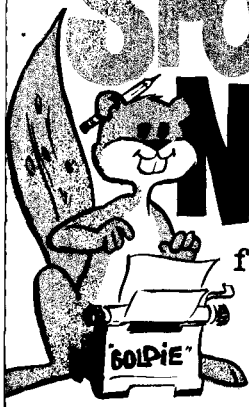

Senior Jim Ebbitt became Minnesota's first number one Big Ten singles champion since Bill Schommer turned the trick in 1935. Ebbitt, the big Canadian southpaw, whipped defending champion Joel Ross of Michigan in straight sets Sunday at Madison, Wisconsin to claim the title. Ebbitt had turned the same trick on Ross in a dual meet earlier in the season. However, his leadership was not enough as the Gophers failed to crack the first division finishing sixth. But a major reason for that came when number two singles star Carter DeLaittre (de-LATE) suffered an appendectomy early last week and missed the championships. Two additional injuries also slowed Gopher players. Ebbitt's next assignment will be the NCAA tournament June 12-17 at Athens, Georgia.

MINNEAPOLIS. The University of Minnesota plays host to the 53rd annual Big Ten Golf Championships Friday and Saturday at the University Golf Course. The tournament will feature 36 holes of medal play each day with tee-off times at 8 a.m. and noon. Admission is free.

Indiana is favored to capture the team title on the basis of its superior balance with defending champion Purdue, Ohio State, Michigan State and Iowa all closely-bunched behind the Hoosiers. Gopher coach Les Bolstad rates his Minnesota squad as a first-division contender. The Gophers last won the team title in 1963 but two individuals have won medalist honors in recent years—Bill Brask in 1968 and Dave Haberle last year.

"The home course is always an advantage to the host school," Bolstad points out, "and we have some players who do very well on this course while having difficulties elsewhere. We definitely plan to move up from our disappointing eighth-place finish of a year ago."

Bolstad expects the Gophers' Rick Ehrmantraut, a junior from St. Paul Gretin, to challenge for the individual title in a field which has plenty of talent but lacks a clear favorite. According to Bolstad, any of at least a dozen men have a crack at medalist honors. He feels that the leading scores will hover around par (71 for 18 holes).

Among the outstanding golfers are John VanderMeiden of Michigan State who was runnerup to Haberle for the championship last year, Ohio State's Ray Sovick who finished third a year ago and Steve Groves, Indiana's Gary Biddinger and Kelley Roberts, Gary Gant of Purdue, Joe Heinz of Iowa and Joe Burden of Illinois. Biddinger
(MORE)

won the Northern Intercollegiate Invitational title this spring and Roberts is the Canadian junior champion.

As of Monday, the only Gophers definitely named to Minnesota's six-man tournament squad are Ehrmantraut, sophomore John Harris from Roseau and senior John Carr from St. Paul Park.

Candidates for the other three spots are seniors Jon Stephenson, Austin; Capt. Gary Wert, Minneapolis (Southwest) and Charles Risdall, Mounds View; juniors Jim Bergeson, Barnesville, and Gary McDonald, Hermantown; and freshman Robbie Harris, Roseau.

Minnesota last hosted the Big Ten tourney in 1964 when the Gophers finished fourth and Dave Gumlia was runnerup to champion Byron Comstock of Indiana for the individual title.

Minneapolis—The magic of the Big Ten championships brings the 1972 track season to a head for the University of Minnesota team Friday and Saturday (May 26-27) at the University of Illinois.

Gopher coach Roy Griak said Monday he will carry a squad of 21 men to the Conference meet with outside hopes of cracking the top five for the first time since 1968 when Minnesota won its second Big Ten track title. The other league championship came in 1949, a year after Minnesota won the NCAA track title.

"I'm not about to kid myself or anyone else saying we are going to gain a high finish," says Griak. "We would have to see every one of our men peak at their very best just to gain a spot among the top five.

"Michigan State is the odds-on favorite at this time, but strong challenges are expected from host Illinois, Indiana, plus Michigan and Wisconsin. But we won't be counted out, either."

The latter statement is in tune with several individual Gopher performers who could win blue ribbons. Tops among those are junior Colin Anderson (Golden Valley) in the shot put, junior Garry Bjorklund (Proctor) in the 3-mile, and senior brothers Bart and Brad Buetow (Mounds View) in the discus and high jump, respectively.

Anderson became the first Big Ten competitor to ever break the 60-foot barrier and has reached 62 feet, 1 inch this spring. Griak believes Anderson will have to best 61 feet to win, but will be heavily challenged by Steve Adams of Michigan.

Out much of the season with an injured foot, Bjorklund was a specially built-up shoe and went out to post the best Conference time in the 3-mile, 3:33.8 vs. Wisconsin in his last race. "Garry will have to equal or better that time to win," Griak offered. "We have rested him the last two weeks and believe he is in much better condition than in earlier events."

Bart Buetow, now up to 245 pounds while getting ready to join the Minnesota Vikings as a tackle candidate, has gone over 175 feet in the discuss toss, but each throw of that distance has been wiped out by a foul. His best recorded toss to date is 165 feet, 5 inches, fifth best in the Big Ten this spring.

Griak believes Bart will have to go over 170 feet if he expects to become a winner. . . maybe more than 175 feet.

Brother Brad defeated world champion Pat Matzdorf in a dual meet and could do it again this week if Matzdorf's back injury is not healed. Buetow has gone over the bar at 6 feet, 10 inches in direct competition, but has cleared the bar at 7 feet in practice. The latter height is almost certain to be reached at Champaign, Illinois.

Other Gopher stars Griak believes could make a breakthrough include sophomore Jim Lee (Austin) in the pole vault, senior Charles Moss (Nassau, Bahamas) in the triple jump and sophomore Steve Eklund (Braham) in the 88-yard run.

"There very well could be some other men break through in their specialities," says Griak, "but I believe the men I have mentioned have the best chances. Even though Bjorklund is our only defending champion (3-mile in the record time of 13:20.9), I honestly believe Minnesota will have one or two more names in the record book when the weekend is over."

BASKETBALL SCHEDULE

Minneapolis—Athletic Director Paul Giel has announced a 24-game schedule for next year's University of Minnesota's basketball team which includes, besides the usual 14 Big Ten Conference games, six home dates in non-Conference play.

Another feature for head coach Bill Musselman's 1972-73 team is a trip to the Far West Classic Tournament December 27-30 at Portland, Oregon. Others in the tourney include Baylor, Columbia, Oregon, Oregon St., Texas Christian, Washington State and Wyoming.

Minnesota opens its schedule November 25 at home against the University of California at Irvine, and follows with home dates against Western Illinois and the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee. A trip to Chicago Loyola marks the only away non-Conference date before the Gophers return home to play San Francisco State University and Corpus Christi before Christmas.

Minnesota will open defense of its 1971-72 Big Ten championship, the school's first outright title in 53 years, January 6, 1973 at Iowa. The first home Conference affair is January 13 vs. Wisconsin.

The next game continues the great rivalry established between Minnesota and Marquette when the Warriors visit Williams Arena Tuesday, January 16.

The entire Big Ten schedule, split evenly at seven games each home and away, finds the Gophers hosting Wisconsin, Michigan State, Purdue, Indiana, Michigan, Northwestern and Iowa. Besides Iowa on the road, UM travels to Indiana, Wisconsin, Ohio State, Illinois, Purdue and Northwestern. Big Ten games this season will be played on Saturdays and Mondays.

Minnesota was 18-7 in 1971-72, and won the Big Ten with a 11-3 record.

Included in UM's regular season non-Conference schedule last year was a consolation championship at the Rainbow Classic Tournament in Hawaii. The Gophers capped their season by taking third place in the NCAA Mideast Regional tourney at Dayton, Ohio. The final game of the year saw UM edge Marquette 77-72.

With every starter returning from last season's championship squad, coach Musselman and the players predict another exciting season for Gopher fans, the latter establishing a new Big Ten attendance record of 16,192 per game. Minnesota fans also set a new school single season attendance mark of 157,209 for 11 home dates, an average of 14,292 per game.

The U.S. Olympic committee in New York has announced the official appointment of Dr. Harvey O'Phelan, Minneapolis, as one of four doctors to accompany the 1972 Summer Olympic Team. The announcement was made by Dr. Dan Hanley, doctor in charge of the Olympic team.

Dr. O'Phelan is the only orthopedic surgeon among the four doctors assigned to the Olympic team. Two are general practitioners and one is an internist.

The 800 athletes will gather in Washington, D.C. August 7 to receive their final exams. They will leave August 17 for Munich, Germany where the Olympics will be held from August 26-September 10. Dr. O'Phelan will be quartered right with the team throughout the Olympic games.

O'Phelan first became active as a doctor for the track and field activities during the Pan-American trials held in Minneapolis in 1967.

O'Phelan is presently a clinical associate professor in orthopedic surgery at the University of Minnesota. He has been at the University the past 10 years serving as doctor in charge of all athletic teams. He has been the orthopedic doctor for the Minnesota Twins Baseball Team for the past five years, and he maintained a private practice as well.

University Athletic Director Paul Giel said, "I am happy and proud to learn of Dr. O'Phelan's appointment to the Olympic team. O'Phelan has long been regarded as one of the top orthopedic surgeons in this area, and as such has contributed a great deal to the overall success of our athletic teams."

Calvin Griffith, president of the Minnesota Twins, was equally enthusiastic upon learning of Dr. O'Phelan's appointment. "Dr. O'Phelan is an important cog in our ball club," said Griffith, "and I know the players and coaches join me in congratulating him on this outstanding recognition."

Another University representative, track coach Roy Griak, will also be at the Games. Griak will serve as a track manager and coach the shot putters and discus throwers in Munich. Griak is rated as one of the top college track and field coaches in the nation.

Minneapolis—How does one summarize an athletic year which contained more slam-bang, surprising elements than any previous year in University of Minnesota sports history?

Well, one could do it month by month. But that would be copping out. Maybe it could be done by listing items in order of importance. But who is the one who can determine the order? So let's just start reminiscing and see what comes.

For starters the personnel directory on the wall of Cooke Hall lobby underwent major surgery this past year. Paul Giel became our new athletic director in December replacing Marsh Ryman. Then in January Cal Stoll (as in STALL) replaced Murray Warmath as head football coach. Both Ryman and Warmath, who between them totaled 55 years service to the University, changed assignments but remained with the athletic department.

Fred Roethlisberger took over the gymnastic coaching reins from Pat Bird while John Santrock did the same in tennis from Joe Walsh. Then after a hockey season that saw two head coaches—Glen Sonmor and Ken Yackel—give up their jobs, former Gopher star Herb Brooks took over.

Bob Geary moved to assistant athletic director under Giel and Ken Buell took over as athletic ticket manager.

Two Minnesota teams won Big Ten championships this season, both in a highly dramatic fashion. The first came when rookie coach Bill Musselman's basketball team overcame suspensions to two of its starters following the Ohio State game incident and went on to pull out the school's first outright cage title in 53 years dating back to 1919.

Minnesota finished the torrid stretch run to the championship playing its famed "Iron Five" of Jim Brewer, Clyde Turner, Bob Nix, Keith Young and David Winfield. This unit played almost every minute of every game near the end thus earning its nickname.

The Gophers finally won it all with a dramatic 49-48 victory at Purdue in the Conference final. Minnesota then went to its first NCAA Regional Tournament finishing third behind eventual NCAA runner-up Florida State.

Brewer, a 6-8½ junior center, was named MVP by his teammates and then after only receiving honorable mention on both wire service All-Big Ten teams, was named the MVP of the Big Ten by the Chicago Tribune, official pollsters of that coveted award. Turner was named to one All-Big Ten first team. Brewer was also selected to attend the Olympic tryout camp later this summer. Both Brewer and Turner were also named to the NCAA Midwest Regional All-Tournament team. Turner recently left for the South Pacific with an all-star Big Ten touring team. Minnesota finished 10th in one national wire service ranking poll, 11th in the other. Musselman was later presented the Outstanding Achievement of the Year by the Minneapolis Chamber of Commerce. His team had a season record of 18-7 and ended 11-3 in the Big Ten.

The other title came as even more of a surprise when the Gopher golf team, which hosted this year's Big Ten Championship event, rode a hot final round to its first team links title since 1963. Senior Jim Bergeson, playing in his only Conference meet, was the last Gopher to qualify, but ended the meet as the medalist shooting a three under par 281 for 72 holes.

Other members of the championship team included Rick Ehrmantraut, John Harris, Gary Wert, Jon Stephenson and John Carr. Coach Les Bolstad, too, was later honored for leading his team to the championship. The Gophers totaled 1440 strokes beating the previous Big Ten low by 24 strokes.

Several other Gopher athletes distinguished themselves by winning individual Big Ten championships. Senior diver Craig Lincoln capped the year by being named winner of the University Big Ten Conference Medal of Honor. Craig earned All-American honors three years running and included, among numerous titles, three Big Ten, one NCAA and two AAU championships. He also won a silver medal at the 1971 Pan American Games.

Others who won Big Ten speciality events, even though their teams did not come out on top, include: Colin Anderson (track), indoor and outdoor record setting performances in the shot put; Garry Bjorklund with his third straight cross-country title and the indoor three-mile run; Jim Ebbitt (tennis), number one singles; and Bergeson in golf.

Other Minnesota teams came through with less than hoped for season records, but as usual every Gopher team distinguished itself in the true spirit of intercollegiate athletics.

A very thin football squad, hit heavily by crippling injuries, finished 4-7 on the season but saw several men come to the top. Doug Kingsriter, junior tight end, received All-American honors from the Associated Press. He was also, along with linebacker Bill Light, named to the All-Big Ten first honor team. Light made the AP's All-American third team. Quarterback Craig Curry, for a second year the Conference total offense leader, fullback Ernie Cook and tackle Jack Babcock were named to the Big Ten second team. Senior defensive end Tom Chandler was voted MVP.

The football team's brightest hour came in the final two minutes of the last game of the season against Wisconsin. The Gophers traveled 80 yards with Curry throwing a 12 yard touchdown pass to Mel Anderson and only nine seconds remaining to give Minnesota a 23-21 victory. It was a just and proper ending for the seniors who had battled heavy odds the past three years, and to coach Warmath who completed his 18th season as head coach.

After the cross-country team finished an unhappy second to Michigan State, the wrestling, swimming, gymnastics and indoor track winter sports teams could do no better. Roethlisberger's gymnasts ended third in the Big Ten following a 6-3 dual meet record.

The track squad, even with Anderson and Bjorklund leading the way, ended eighth while the swimmers, with Lincoln on top, finished sixth. Lincoln later won the NCAA three-meter board competition. However, several men in each of the above mentioned sports again distinguished themselves with their best individual performances ever. Unfortunately, they were up against far superior odds and could not get into the winner's circle.

The wrestling squad ended fourth in the Conference but one man, junior John Panning, nearly made it to the top. After finishing runner-up at 177-pounds in the Big Ten, Panning lost his first match at the NCAA meet, but then pinned every other man he met to win consolation honors. He was presented with a coveted NCAA trophy given each year to the wrestler that scores the most pins in the least amount of time.

Spring sports went through a dismal period of snow, cold and rain which cut deeply into their respective schedules. But when it was over, only the golf team came out a Conference winner.

Ehrmanntraut, a junior, took one individual meet championship during the season at Illinois leading the Gophers to a surprising second place finish. It was the only season title won by UM leading up to the Conference championship.

Dick "Chief" Siebert had little to celebrate during his 25th year as head coach of the Gopher baseball program. First Siebert had 18 scheduled games cancelled due to adverse weather, and then saw his pitching corps devastated by one injury after another. But UM finished the regular season with a 15-13 won-lost record, and was 9-5 and tied for third in the Big Ten.

Junior catcher Tim Grice led the regulars in hitting with a .350 batting average while another junior, Ken Schultz, was UM's best pitcher with a 6-2 record and a 1.41 earned run average. Senior second baseman Jim Wallace was named to the All-Big Ten second team while Schultz and senior outfielder Mark Flanders made the third team.

Despite Anderson's record shot put heave at the outdoor Big Ten track meet, and a third by Brad Buetow in the high jump and brother Bart Buetow's fourth in the discus, the Gophers finished seventh.

But one of the grittiest UM performances was by Bjorklund when he ended second in the three-mile run. Garry was severely hampered by a foot injury that all but curtailed his training schedule, but he somehow managed to gut out the race finishing a strong second to a runner he had already defeated earlier in a dual meet.

Big Jim Ebbitt, the Canadian prospect from Montreal, Que. who had already lettered in hockey, came on with a great spring to give UM its first net singles champion since 1935. Ebbitt devoured the defending number one singles champ Joel Ross of Michigan in the finals. Jim only lost one dual meet match during the regular season.

However, the tennis squad, too, was beset with injuries and illness and finished sixth in team standings. Senior Dave Mathews made the second best showing by winning the number two singles playback title.

Two team championships, a host of individual winners, a rash of regional and national awards, and a whole crop of new faces joining the staff. These were highlights of the 1971-72 athletic year at Minnesota. The year was, to say the least, one filled with extreme highs and lows.

The highs were well labeled by the title of the basketball season highlight film: "How Sweet It Is".

But what about 1972-73? Can more of the same be expected? You bet your seat in any stadium or arena it can.

Football interest statewide has already begun to jell, mostly by the efforts of Giel, Stoll and the rest of the staff who have traveled to every corner of Minnesota. And the interest stirred up was not only for football, either. . .but rather the whole athletic program at Minnesota which has undergone some heavy transplants.

Even the athletic department itself is moving. . .over to the new Bierman Field Athletic Building. The entire area includes excellent facilities for intramural and physical education events, plus the baseball stadium, outdoor track, varsity tennis courts and proposed space for new football practice fields.

Everything is GO for Minnesota athletics at this time. Stoll's gridders will have an all-new look returning to the all-gold uniforms of yesteryear while the basketball team has everyone back, plus some outstanding recruits. Hockey and other sports have also found great success in recruiting, so 1972-73 could actually surpass this past season for thrills and individual performances.

Pity the avid sports fan who doesn't believe in getting his or her tickets early. They may be left out in the cold as were many who tried at the last minute to get into Williams Arena for some basketball games.

But as director Giel says: "Don't expect overnight miracles, but given enough time Minnesota will be right back on top in every way. We have just started to walk and soon hope to be running."

Minneapolis—Ticket sales for the 1972 University of Minnesota football season are running slightly ahead of last year at this time, says athletic ticket manager Ken Buell.

"More than 90 percent of those who held season tickets last year have reordered again this season," Buell said recently. "To date we have received orders for more than 15,000 season tickets from the general public. This figure does not include student ticket orders or sales."

Although June 30 was the deadline for past season ticket holders to use their option to renew, Buell was quick to point out that season tickets are still on sale for new purchases and will remain on sale right up to the home opener September 23 vs. Colorado. Incidentally, Colorado has been ranked the number one team in the nation in several pre-season polls.

Buell also said that single game tickets go on sale beginning August 1st at the Cooke Hall ticket office on campus. But in the near future the ticket office will be moved to new quarters in the Bierman Field Athletic Building.

"We are very optimistic that when the single game ticket sale opens, combined with the new season ticket orders, an additional increase over last year's total will become evident," Buell continued. "Even though I am heading into my rookie season as ticket manager, everyone around here can feel an increased interest from both the student body and staff, and the general public. We are not about to fill Memorial Stadium right off the bat but I'm confident that larger crowds will attend this year's six home games."

There are numerous ticket plans available for 1972. A regular single game reserved seat ticket costs \$6.50 while a season ticket is \$39.00 for six home games. The ticket office will begin accepting mail orders for single game tickets August 1. Season tickets may also be purchased through the mail. MINNEAPOLIS. The long-awaited move of the University of Minnesota Department of Intercollegiate Athletics into the new Bierman Field Athletic Building will start Friday (July 28).

The Athletic Ticket Office and Sports Information Office will move into their new quarters Friday and the remainder of the administrative offices will be moved during the following week. Completion of the move is expected by Friday, August 4. Originally scheduled for June 26, the move was delayed for over a month by the recently settled strike of construction workers.

Total cost of the modern, air-conditioned building, including equipment and furnishings, is \$3.3 million. Ground was broken for the structure in December, 1970. In addition to offices, the building will include a gymnasium containing two regulation-size basketball courts and three tennis courts, a large wrestling room, the main athletic equipment room, an intramural equipment room, intramural locker facilities for men and women and locker rooms for various intercollegiate teams. The gymnasium will be used for intramural games and physical education classes as well as freshman basketball.

The building is the latest portion of the Bierman Field complex to reach completion. The area also includes a 2,200-seat capacity baseball stadium, a nine-lane artificial-surface running track complete with field-event facilities and bleachers, and six lighted intramural fields for football and softball.

Still on the docket are completion of six outdoor tennis courts and three football practice fields as well as remodelling of the old baseball clubhouse. The courts should be ready soon but the practice fields are not expected to be in use before next year.

Cooke Hall, which has been headquarters for the Athletic Department since 1935, will house the School of Physical Education and the Department of Leisure Education. The latter department includes recreation and park administration as well as intramurals and extramurals. The Athletic Department will continue to use the Cooke Hall pool and gymnastics room.

FOOTBALL INVITATIONS

Minneapolis—Invitations have been sent to 112 University of Minnesota varsity football candidates for 1972, new head coach Cal Stoll announced Sunday.

Stoll said the squad will report Friday evening, August 25, do their thing for the media on picture day Saturday, August 26, and begin twice a day practice sessions Monday, August 28 leading up to the season opener September 16 at Indiana.

Included among the 112 candidates are 75 upperclassmen and 37 freshman. Three junior college transfers are in the first group.

For the first time in many years freshmen are eligible for varsity competition in the Big Ten so Stoll has decided to have the rookies practice with the varsity right from the start.

"We are not deep at several positions and I hope some of our freshmen learn quickly and are able to help us out in their first year at Minnesota," says Stoll.

Those freshmen who do not make the varsity traveling squad, along with some sophomores and juniors, will form a varsity reserve team and hop to play six games this fall under the new Big Ten ruling. Only three games are scheduled at this time.

Leading the varsity returnees are captain and quarterback Bob Morgan and All-American end Doug Kingsriter. A total of 30 lettermen are listed on the roster, but many of these winners last year were varsity reserves who played a minimum of time as injury replacements. In other words, experience is not Minnesota's strong suit.

Not only do Stoll and his staff face a rebuilding program in 1972 at Minnesota, but they, along with the squad, are looking at an awesome schedule.

After the Big Ten opener at Indiana, the Gophers come home to host Colorado September 23 and travel to mighty Nebraska the next Saturday. Colorado and Nebraska have shared 1 and 2 ratings in every pre-season poll released to date.

Later on the Gophers play back to back games at Michigan October 28 and Ohio State November 4. Both these teams have also earned top ten pre-season ratings. Ohio State has been made the early Conference favorite.

As expected Stoll will use every means to prepare his team mentally. One step is outfitting the squad in all-new "Old Gold" uniforms, the colors worn by the great

Minneapolis—The names Paul Giel, Cal Stoll and Bill Musselman have become household words around the State of Minnesota since last January when they became teammates on the University of Minnesota athletic department staff.

Giel is UM's director of athletics, Stoll the new head football coach and Musselman the youthful miracle coach who led the 1971-72 basketball Gophers to Minnesota's first outright Big Ten title in 53 years.

I am deeply indebted to these gentlemen and awfully proud to know they are members of our team. Working with men like these two, plus all the others here at the University, is a genuine pleasure for me. They are all great and each will play a strong role in helping us reshape our entire program. In the long run it will be the fans who reap the real benefit."

For instance, the Gophers, after playing the season opener at Indiana September 16, play back to back games against the two top ranked teams in pre-season polls. . . Colorado here and Nebraska there. Later comes a home date against highly rated Purdue, and then back to back road dates at Michigan and Ohio State.

At one time or another every one of the above opponents has appeared in the top ten of a pre-season poll, which bears out the above answer. Stoll and his team are in a rebuilding process but will have to come fast just to stay alive in 1972.

Below is a thumbnail sketch on each of Minnesota's home opponents for 1972.

COLORADO, 1:30 p.m. Saturday, September 23:

The Golden Buffs (for Buffaloes) ended third in 1971 national rankings behind Big Eight brothers Nebraska and Oklahoma. . .many believe this is Colorado's year to reach the top as it plays both above teams at home this season. . .CU was 10-2 last year including a 29-17 win over host Houston at the Astro-Bluebonnet Bowl. . .13 starters return, and Coach Eddie Crowder has lettermen at every position. . .two men, HB CHARLIE DAVIS and QB KEN JOHNSON, are being heavily touted for all-american honors. . .DAVIS was national Sophomore of the Year, rushed for 1,386 yards and 10 TD's, and gained 202 yards in the Bowl game win. . .at FB will be 6-3, 240 BO MATTHEWS with 6-5, 230 JON KEYWORTH at flanker. . .QB JOHNSON accounted for 1,500 yards rushing and passing last fall. . .on defense CU will use the pro 4-4 geared around all-american LB BUD MAGRUM. . .CU uses the option play to perfection with DAVIS gaining huge chunks of yardage on the pitch play. . .CU has speed to burn, maybe as much as Oklahoma had last year. . .Minnesota could easily have picked a better home opener for coach Stoll's debut.

KANSAS UNIVERSITY, 1:30 p.m. Saturday, October 7:

Last year UM knocked off KU 38-20 in the Gophers highest point show of the year, so coach Don Fambrough won't have any trouble getting his 1972 team up for Minnesota. . .the Jayhawks will come through the air this fall on the strong arms of QB's DAVID JAYNES AND BOB BRUEGGING. . .these two threw 107 passes in the KU spring game good for more than 700 yards gained. . .their main target will be All-Big Eight

tight end JOHN SCHROLL, plus sophomore flankers MARVIN FOSTER, EMMETT EDWARDS, BRUCE ADAMS AND KEN SEATHOFF. . .all four have sprinter speed. . .JAYNES completed more than 50% of his passes last year for 748 yards and 7 TD's. . .top ball carriers back are HB's DELVIN WILLIAMS AND JEROME NELLOMS. . .WILLIAMS averaged 5.0 yards per carry gaining 509 while Nelloms rushed for 442 yards. . .the KU defense is built around All-Conference LB KENNY PAGE. . .speed and experience make KU a much improved team this year. . .UM will have to be tough to repeat.

PURDUE, 1:30 p.m., Saturday, October 14:

Many believe Purdue is the Big Ten darkhorse of 1972. . .those same people believe Purdue has one of its best teams in many years. . .just say HB OTIS ARMSTRONG, QB GARY DANIELSON, receivers DARRYL STRINGER and RICK SAYERS, plus DT DAVE BUTZ (6-7, 279 all-american) and you have to join the ranks of Boilermaker promoters. . . ARMSTRONG goes 4.3 in the 40 and has gained 1,954 yards in two years. . .no wonder he's called "Mr. Excitement". . .DANIELSON was tops in Big Ten passing last fall while ARMSTRONG ended 5th in rushing. . .DANIELSON completed 61.7% of his pass attempts. . . and strangely enough coach Bob DeMoss will install the Wishbone offense at Purdue this year, but promises to keep the vaunted Purdue passing attack up to par and make it a complete part of his game. . .in other words, Purdue will come at the Gophers both ways and make UM's Big Ten home opener one rugged afternoon.

IOWA, 1:30 p.m., Saturday, October 21 (HOMECOMING):

The Hawkeyes, like Minnesota, are rebuilding their football fortunes under 2nd year coach Frank Lauterbur (LAW-ter-bur). . .Iowa comes off a 1-10 1971 season with nothing but optimism for this fall. . .to quote their coach, "Our backs are stronger, the line is bigger, the receivers look fine and the quarterbacks are coming". . . CRAIG JOHNSON and DAVE HARRIS are dangerous running backs while veteran KYLE SKOGMAN appears set to lead IU at quarterback. . .but two other factors key this annual battle: it's Minnesota's Homecoming game and past history lets us know that a slam-bang afternoon of Big Ten football is on tap whenever these two neighbors meet. . . 1972 should be no different from past grudge matches.

NORTHWESTERN, 1:00 p.m., Saturday, November 11:

The Wildcats are off two straight Conference runner-up seasons, which included 28-14 and 41-20 wins over our good guys. . .so a winning attitude has been established at the Evanston, Illinois campus. . .but gone are most of the stars who led NU, and coach Alex Agase, too, must concentrate on rebuilding. . .much of his vastly improved defensive unit is gone, but the offensive gang looks tough again. . .veteran scrambler TODD SOMERS and a rookie "thrower" MITCH ANDERSON are neck and neck in a race to replace All-Conference QB MAURIE DAIGNEAU. . .at halfback Agase can call on six men of near equal ability and speed, the leaders being senior JOHNNY COOK at HB and senior HAROLD SMITH at FB. . .the best thing going for UM is that Northwestern used to run out of depth and necessary manpower by November. . .maybe the Gophers can start a tough November run.

MICHIGAN STATE, 1:00 p.m., Saturday, November 18:

As usual, Duffy Daugherty is full of optimism and says his 1972 squad will again be a Big Ten contender. . .maybe the next to the last game of the season for both clubs will give UM a chance to be a spoiler. . .leading the Spartans will be co-captains BILLY DuPREE, a TE, and BRAD VAN PELT, the safety. . .both are solid all-american candidates. . .but fortunately for UM ERIC "THE FLEA" ALLEN is gone at HB. . .the flea wrecked UM last fall. . .however, Duffy again has a host of top ranked talent and his squad will be both strong and fast. . .but when UM seniors line up for their final home appearance in Memorial Stadium anything can happen. . . remember the Wisconsin game last fall? (UM won its final home game 23-21 with 9 seconds remaining).

If a rather dismal picture has been produced by the above thumbnail sketches, that was not the intent. We just wanted to preview the great teams and individuals headed for the Tartan Turf of Memorial Stadium this fall.

No, no one is predicting Minnesota to walk away with six home wins. But then, no one is predicting Stoll's gang to walk away empty, either. And therein lies the excitement. . .which games are the Gophers going to win? Whoever has a working crystal ball please come forward.

That Minnesota football '72 will be exciting, there is no doubt. There is also a gathering storm of feeling that somewhere along the way Minnesota is going to zap a biggie, if on nothing more than emotion and desire.

As former Minnesota and Oklahoma great Bud Wilkinson said recently in print: "College football is more exciting than ever." We are certain Wilkinson knows what was going to happen at Memorial Stadium this fall, too.

Oh by the way, both season and single game tickets are now on sale at the all-new Bierman Field Athletic Building ticket office.

UM AT THE OLYMPICS

The University of Minnesota athletic department is well represented at the 1972 Olympics in Munich, Germany with both athletes and coaches named to their respective rosters.

On the competitive front Jim Brewer, a senior from Maywood, Illinois is a member of the basketball team while another senior, diving sensation Craig Lincoln from Hopkins, Minnesota, is a swim team member.

Staff members include head track coach Roy Griak and head wrestling coach Wally Johnson.

Brewer earned a spot on the cage team during the trials held at the Air Force Academy and has been one of the team's top players throughout the exhibition schedule. He led the 1971-72 Gopher varsity to the school's first Big Ten outright championship in 53 years as Minnesota recorded a 11-3 Conference record and was 18-7 overall.

For his performance Brewer was named Most Valuable Player of the Big Ten by the Chicago Tribune.

Lincoln, an All-American the past two years, won the 3-meter dive competition held at Chicago, Ill. by recording the highest point total (602) ever at an Olympic trials meet. He is now reaching for a peak in his career which has already included several Conference, national and international diving titles.

Bob Mowerson, U. of M. head swimming coach, was director of the Olympic trials meet in Chicago.

Griak is listed as a manager of the Olympic track and field team, but will assist in coaching some weightmen and distance runners. Johnson was director of the Olympic wrestling trials and training camp, the latter held at the University of Minnesota. Johnson is also an active member of the U.S. Olympic Committee and president of the U.S. Wrestling Federation.

DEFENSIVE SECONDARY

Minneapolis—If there is one area new head coach Cal Stoll (as in STALL) can call experienced on his 1972 Minnesota football team it's the defensive secondary.

No fewer than eight of the candidates are lettermen, which makes assistant coach Dick Moseley just as pleased as Stoll. Moseley is defensive coordinator as well as secondary coach.

But one major concern hovers over the secondary in memory of what happened last year. . . wholesale injuries. Every man who started at least one game was at one time or another struck down by a major or minor injury.

Needless to say Minnesota was hurt often by the pass. But without the chance to form a unit and have the players work side by side over a period of time, no teamwork can develop to make them into an effective unit.

Senior Mike White was lost for 10 games in 1971 going out in the season opener. Senior Tim Alderson missed four games. Seniors Steve Politano, Jim Herman, Paul Wright and Farrell Sheridan, plus juniors Tom Pribyl and Todd Randall also sat out one or more games. Actually, Randall was switched from offense in midseason to help out.

Last spring the above named players, plus sophomores Greg Engebos and Jerry Slater, showed improved play as units. So Moseley has the hard corps to start with and will be adding in several good looking freshmen candidates. But with everything being new at Minnesota, it will be difficult for this group to be fully prepared by the September 16 opener at Indiana.

Let's hope the secondary can stay healthy this time around.

LINEBACKERS

Minneapolis—When football coaches start throwing around terms like "Sam, Will, Wide, Weak, Inside, Nose, Middle, etc." it can only mean one thing. . .they're talking about linebackers.

New Gopher head coach Cal Stoll (STALL) has the unenviable job of replacing all of last year's starters—Bill Light, Ron King, Mike Perfetti. But not all is dim for Stoll and linebacker coach Bob (Woody) Widenhofer.

For the most part Minnesota will play with two linebackers this year, with another man, the rover, classified halfway between a linebacker and a defensive back. This position was covered in the first of this series.

Only one linebacker candidate, junior Mike Steidl, has any game experience at this position, and Mike showed it during spring drills with some excellent play.

However, Stoll and Widenhofer may have come up with a diamond in the rough when they moved senior Tom MacLeod from defensive end to linebacker. Both coaches agree that MacLeod was the most impressive performer in the spring game. And that was after only one week of practice at LB.

"I believe this young man (MacLeod) has all the equipment and attitude needed to become one of the very best men in his position in the entire Big Ten this year," Stoll says. "I only wish we had him for another season."

Two juniors expected to press MacLeod and Steidl for duty are Rick Volkman and Steve Goldberg. Behind this foursome are five freshman candidates, but it's still too early to evaluate their potential. But all five enjoyed fine high school careers and are expected to provide excellent depth to the position and be ready to step in once they have learned the ground rules.

QUARTERBACKS & FLANKERBACKS

Minneapolis—If nothing else the 1972 Minnesota football team is loaded with quarterbacks—10 of them the first day of practice.

However, the sad note is that only one, senior captain Bob Morgan, is a candidate who has any game experience. Morgan played behind the now departed Craig Curry, Big Ten pass leader the past two seasons.

According to head coach Cal Stoll (STALL) and backfield assistant Tom Moore, Morgan quickly caught on to Stoll's veer-T offense in the spring and is expected to be UM's leader in more ways than one.

"Bob took to the veer-T in the spring like he had played it for years," Stoll offers. "He has the quick feet, hands and thinking ability that go hand in hand for quarterback's at this spot. Both coach Moore and myself believe Bob can do the job for Minnesota this fall. He is a fine leader."

Listed behind Morgan at the start is sophomore Kim Becker who played both QB and safety with last year's freshman team. Next in line are two varsity returnees, senior Mike Mason and junior Gil Fash. But neither has played in a varsity game.

A total of six freshman recruits are behind the upperclassmen in hopes of moving up the ladder into a key reserve position. In fact, both Stoll and Moore have high hopes for the newcomers and believe there is great future potential in the group. So the battle now is who will come to the front the quickest.

A sophomore high school all-american with great hands, Dale Henrickson, has the inside track as the starting flanker. Henrickson had a fine spring and will be tough to beat out. Senior George Honza, who played regular here last year but was moved to halfback in the spring, could be a swing man.

The same holds true for junior college transfer Steve Caiazzo. Both he and Honza may switch back and forth. Three sophomore candidates round out the flanker-back position.

Minneapolis---"The biggest change I expect to see is in the final score. It's as simple as that."

So says University of Minnesota assistant coach Mo Forte as he gets his varsity reserve team ready to meet the Iowa varsity reserve squad Friday, October 13 at 12:30 p.m. in UM's Memorial Stadium. These same two teams played September 22 with Iowa winning 14-0 at home.

"We did little if anything right in that game and I expect about 1000 per cent improvement Friday," Forte continued. "Iowa has a very strong backfield that we must stop this time.

"But I also expect us to open up a lot more and give them some problems they didn't see in the first game. We were far from being ready last time. We'll be ready this game, and that's a fact."

The biggest difficulty in preparation for Forte's squad is that the first and foremost objective is to aid the varsity in getting ready to repel Purdue on Saturday.

"Now this is not an excuse," Forte was quick to add. "But we do not have that big a varsity team and our reserve squad spends the entire week working as a scouting team helping the top club. By that we do not have time to prepare ourselves for Iowa or any other opponent.

"But I know just how our boys feel about losing that opener and they want another shot at those junior Hawkeyes. I believe our men are also a lot more confident in themselves and will come to play tough football."

Forte said he will open with freshman Mike Carroll (White Bear Lake) at quarterback as another freshman, Chuck McGrew (Edina), started the first game. "I decided before the season opened these two would alternate starting roles so this is nothing new," Forte explained.

But missing from the backfield will be freshman running back Dave Fritze (Hayfield) who is out with an injured ankle. So filling out the backfield will be Dick Stromwell (Eau Claire, Wis.) at running back, John Bolinger (Tulsa, Okla.) at fullback and Pat Kehr (Hopkins) the flanker.

Minneapolis---Whew. Glad that's over. I mean, let the Big Eight play among their own. Minnesota has had its fill.

However, last week was one of those could have been Saturday's. After dropping decisive decisions to Big Eight powers Colorado and Nebraska, the Gophers came within a fumble or two of catching and defeating Kansas last week before bowing 34-28. Minnesota turned over the ball six times losing four of eight fumbles and having two passes stolen by KU defenders.

But that is thankfully past and now the Gophers can turn to what the football season is really all about. . .the Big Ten race. Unfortunately a sleeping giant has awakened, says Purdue University sports information director Ted Haracz (as is Harris), and comes to Minnesota Saturday with an unspoiled 1-0 Conference record.

Picked to be one of the premium teams in the Big Ten this fall, Purdue faltered against some powerful non Conference opponents of its own losing to Bowling Green, Washington and Notre Dame (all three still undefeated) before shutting the door on Iowa last week 24-0. The Hawkeyes were allowed but 84 yards total offense, 34 of that coming on a broken play scramble.

What many believe to be Purdue's early season problem appears to be solved. . . a shucking of its new wishbone-T offense. Always known for passing prowess, Purdue coach Bob DeMoss last spring decided to use the new formation to gain maximum use of its great halfbacks Otis Armstrong and Darryl Stingley, both crack speedsters.

Not so, said opposing teams who immediately cut off Purdue's outside game. The only real success DeMoss had was in the running of its quarterbacks. "You can only defense three of four backs against the wishbone," Haracz said in Minneapolis Monday, "so they chose to let our quarterback go it alone. But it still didn't produce any wins so coach DeMoss made the change last week at Iowa. It paid off."

Against Iowa Armstrong gained 89 yards on 26 carries and a previously unheralded fullback named Jack Spellman got 80 in 17 trips. Just about all this running came from Purdue's previous offensive sets, the power-I and pro set, both with heavy use of the belly series.

But the biggest improvement came in the passing game where last year's Big Ten aerial leader Gary Danielson finally got untracked. He connected for 11 completions in 23 attempts for 150 yards. One of his on target strikes went for a 40 yard score. Last year Danielson had already passed for 300 yards on 15 of 20 and two scores before leaving the game late in the third period with a shoulder separation. The injury came as the result of a safety blitz by UM's Mike Perfetti.

"It has taken Purdue considerable time for its offense to get the feel of the game," says Minnesota coach Cal Stoll (STALL). "Unfortunately for us they seem to have found it. And that does nothing less than give its defense additional confidence. So I have to say we are in for a very rugged battle Saturday."

But Stoll was far from throwing in the towel. "There is no question in my mind that we played well enough to win last week," he continued. "But six turnovers. That's just plain murder. And that late penalty certainly killed our last chance.

"Here we would have been first and ten on the Kansas 17 with more than a minute to play and three time outs remaining. I just know we would have scored then and won 35-34. But the offensive interference call cost us the 13 yard gain, a 15 yard penalty and loss of down. It was too much to overcome.

"But I'm again genuinely proud of the way our men continued to battle back as they have all year long. Again we were the victims of our slowness afoot. I can't ask our secondary to out run receivers who are a full second faster in a 40 yard dash. And if we drop way off to protect against the long bomb, they will kill us by completing passes underneath our secondary. So I hope you can sympathize with the problems facing our pass defenders."

There is little question Minnesota showed improvement on offense, both on the ground and through the air. But putting these two components together again and stopping Armstrong-Danielson-Stingly-Spellman and company is a mighty tall order.

As in last week's game UM may again be called on to simply outscore the opposition, so another touchdown-filled game may be the order of the day.

Only one change in the UM lineup is expected. Senior defensive right end Bob Bailey is ailing and will probably be replaced by junior Dave Christensen from Rochester. The rest of the Gopher lineup should remain intact.

THE RUNNING BACKS

Minneapolis—Speed in the offensive backfield is an item long sought after by the University of Minnesota football coaches. New Gopher head coach Cal Stoll (STALL) and assistant Tom Moore are seeking the same thing.

"We don't have the real outside speed we would like to see, nothing like a Pruitt of Oklahoma or a Davis of Colorado, but it is better than we originally believed," says Moore. "So our biggest challenge is to teach our running backs to make maximum use of what speed they have. And the way the kids are working we just may surprise some people."

Jim Henry and Tom Waltower, senior halfbacks, plus junior John King and senior Lou Clare at fullback are the leading veterans. Clare, UM's top place kicker, lettered at fullback as a sophomore but played linebacker last fall.

King was the leading ground gainer during spring drills and could be the quickest back on the roster at getting to the hold. Junior Paul Rudolph will also push for duty at fullback.

Several other rookies, mostly freshmen, are running at both positions to give Minnesota good depth here. Now if Moore can coax some more speed out of this group, well. . .let's wait and see what happens.

Minneapolis—For the first time in nine years the University of Minnesota athletic ticket office has announced an increase in season ticket sales.

INTERIOR OFFENSIVE LINE

Minneapolis—Four of the five interior offensive line positions on the 1972 Minnesota football team are presently manned by returning lettermen. But as far as head coach Cal Stoll (STALL) and assistant Ron Stark are concerned, nothing is set as yet.

"We have several men in contention for the center, guard and tackle positions and probably won't know until our first game just who will be our starters," says Stark. "But I can say the competition is extremely spirited with the players giving all they've got."

Two men, senior Bob Veldman and junior Dale Hegland (HEG-land), will split most of the action at center. Both are lettermen who combined to give Minnesota great strength here last season.

Senior Paul Tollefson and junior Darrell Bunge (BUN-gee) are the leaders at guard. Each started most of Minnesota's 1971 games. Tollefson has won two letters.

Senior Dennis Maloney is the most experienced returning tackle and could get the nod on the right side. At left tackle a giant battle is being waged between senior Matt Herkenhoff and junior Dave Simonson. Herkenhoff missed last season due to injuries while Simonson saw limited action as a sophomore.

However, several other men could at any time come to the front and change the entire outlook of the interior line, says Stark. "The main thing now is to keep everyone healthy and continue to polish what they already know," the young assistant added. "Our opener is September 16 at Indiana and that's not very far away."

Minneapolis—Last fall on September 11 at Minnesota's Memorial Stadium, Indiana gave up the ball six times on fumbles, interceptions and a blocked kick. Minnesota converted four of those turnovers into touchdowns and won 28-0.

But Cal Stoll (STALL), Minnesota's 9th head football coach since the school first began competing in 1900, knows very well that coach John Pont's charges aren't likely to be as generous this year.

"I believe our team will have to play a near perfect, mistake free game if it expects to have a chance to win at Bloomington Saturday," says Stoll. The kickoff is set for 1:30 p.m. EST (12:30 p.m. Minnesota time).

"Although I was far from Minnesota at the time (Stoll was head coach at Wake Forest University last year), I have to believe Indiana is going to be a lot stronger this time around," Stoll said.

"There is no way any coach wants to lose to a rookie in his first game. That goes double for a conference game. I'm certain I am not alone in wishing we did not play a conference opponent in the first game."

That Minnesota will enter the Indiana game as both an underdog and a very, very green team is already known. Stoll further confirmed that when he announced Monday he will carry five or six freshmen on his first 48-man traveling squad.

In fact, one freshman, 6 foot 4, 232-pound defensive tackle Keith Simons from Belleville, Mich., may get a starting nod for the Golden Gophers. "I don't really want to open with unproven freshmen," Stoll said, "but a combination of injuries, position shifts and a rapid learning by Keith Simons of the style of football Minnesota will play may put him into our opening lineup. There is no question that this youngster is going to be a great one some day. I hope having to start him right off the bat won't be too big a jump for Keith."

Stoll further pointed out Minnesota's inexperience by saying "about 60 percent of the men on our first traveling squad have never played in a Big Ten football game. In fact, about 15 or 16 have never flown to a Big Ten game on the team plane.

"But I'll tell you something: I've never had a team that worked harder, learned quicker or showed more enthusiasm and desire these kids have in the past three weeks. If those latter two points mean anything, Minnesota will be OK."

Stoll also admitted this is the most nervous week of his life. "Last Saturday we simulated as near a full game condition scrimmage as possible, including the clock, officials, public address announcer, and even a continuous tape of crowd noise," the coach continued. "I tell you it was something else.

"We were aiming at getting their adrenalin flowing, to get our players up and ready. I don't really know if it worked on them but brother it sure worked on me. I was ready to play right then."

Something must have worked on the players as Stoll's varsity regulars swamped the varsity reserves 64-7.

How Minnesota fares Saturday, and the rest of the season for that matter, lies mainly in the hands of senior captain and quarterback Bob Morgan (5-11, 191). After sitting on the bench two seasons behind Craig Curry, the Big Ten's total offense leader in 1970 and 1971, Morgan will finally get his chance.

A very rugged player, a quarterback who seems to go looking for contact rather than ducking from it, Morgan has grasped Stoll's veer-T offense quicker than anyone. Owing quick feet and hands to go along with a quick mind, Morgan is ideal to lead the veer-T. "On top of that his passing seems to improve every day," Stoll pointed out.

Morgan scored three touchdowns in a scrimmage last Wednesday and then ran in three more in Saturday's game simulation day workout.

A senior, runningback Jim Henry (6-0, 195), and a junior, fullback John King (6-0 $\frac{1}{2}$, 210), should carry the rest of the running attack for the Golden Gophers. Both have game experience and have looked strong throughout camp, even though Henry was slowed by an ankle sprain.

Sophomore Kevin Keller (5-9 $\frac{1}{2}$, 195) is a real scooter and will see duty behind Henry while rugged junior Paul Rudolph (6-2, 216) will spell King.

George Honza (6-0, 185), a senior, and soph Dale Henrickson (6-3 $\frac{1}{2}$, 213) head up the flanker backs. But Morgan will have two more excellent pass targets in a pair of potentially great ends: All-American returning senior Doug Kingsriter (6-2 $\frac{1}{2}$, 220) and a young giant in junior Keith Fahnhorst (6-6, 235). All four have proven excellent receivers in every Gopher scrimmage.

Although the defensive line is still not set, it will be backed up by a pair of fine looking linebackers in senior Tom MacLeod (6-4, 217) and junior Mike Steidl (5-10, 209). Both men continue to hit with authority and Stoll believes MacLeod has the potential to be Minnesota's best football player.

"Oh what I'd give to coach Tom MacLeod for one or two more years," the coach offered. "We moved him from defensive end to linebacker the final three days of spring practice and he was the best performer we had in our spring game. He is an extremely fast learner and does everything as well as any coach can ask. I foresee a great football future for him."

The defensive secondary may be Minnesota's deepest position with no less than eight lettermen battling for starting berths. Right now it appears that two seniors—Mike White (6-0, 192) and Tim Alderson (6-1, 205)—junior Todd Randall (6-0 $\frac{1}{2}$, 195) and soph Greg Engebos (5-11, 186) have the inside track. Only Engebos has not lettered.

"Indiana returns nine of last years defensive starters and has top vets at every offensive skill position," Stoll closed Monday. "That means we are really up against it in the experience area. But I believe in our men and know they will give it their best shot. I hope it's enough."

Minneapolis--"There was a man right behind me and all that was going through my mind as we raced for the ball was last year's Ohio State game when I let a fumbled kickoff go right through my legs in the Buckeye end zone."

That's how University of Minnesota junior linebacker Mike Steidl felt after blocking a punt last week against Indiana. At first he couldn't spot the ball, but when he did Mike made a beeline for the end zone and recovered for a Minnesota touchdown.

"That has to be the biggest single sports thrill of my life," Mike said Monday. "But it would have meant much more if we had won." Indiana came from behind to edge the young Gophers 27-23 in the season opener.

A native of Alexandria where he was an all-state player, Mike has already enjoyed a bundle of thrills in athletics. "I'll never forget running into the Nebraska Stadium just before last year's game and seeing 66,000 wild fans all at once," Mike continued. "For a guy who never before played before more than 4,000 it was quite a shock. I think I knew then how those Roman gladiators must have felt.

"I was glad to be understudying captain Bill Light at the time and did not have to start the game. I'm not sure I could have made it I was so nervous." But Mike did play enough last fall to earn a letter.

Asked if starting this year's first game was rough, Mike answered: "Actually, I was more worried about the four or five rookies around me than I was about starting. I had played before but several of our defensive starters had never even made a road trip. So I guess I considered myself an old vet, kind of a big brother to the others. Besides, I call defensive signals and that added responsibility gives me more confidence."

The distance from Alexandria to the Twin Cities is not all that far, but to Steidl it's been a long, hard journey "Everyone else considered me too small (5-10, 209) and too slow to play major college football," Mike says. "But not Minnesota. They gave me a chance and I'm not going to let them down. We have the potential to become a fine, fine football team, one that is going to surprise a lot of Minnesota fans. I just can't wait for the next game, and the one after that on down through the schedule. Some day we are going to blow somebody right off the field. I hope it's this Saturday against Colorado even though they expect to knock us off easily. We have different ideas."

Mike Steidl. Another outstanding product of Minnesota high school football.

Minneapolis—So close. So very, very close. But just not quite close enough. That pretty well summarizes the University of Minnesota's 1972 debut under head coach Cal Stoll when the Gophers were edged at Indiana last Saturday 27-23.

But Stoll's gang more than proved that wild, exciting football is in store for the home fans this fall, starting when the quick striking Gophers host number two ranked Colorado in Memorial Stadium Saturday.

Sure, the young and eager Gophers are decided underdogs, but they were last week, too, and barely lost. However, Colorado is out to prove its national ranking and will come at the Gophers with all guns loaded. Last week the Buffaloes, or Golden Buffs, buried a good Cincinnati team 56-14 after a rather sluggish opening win over California, 20-10.

Speed, speed, speed. . . and then more speed is what makes Colorado one of the nation's best, attesting to that is Colorado's 561 yards total offense last week, which included eight touchdowns and two more called back. Even at that coach Eddie Crowder, the former all-american quarterback at Oklahoma under Bud Wilkinson, still wasn't satisfied.

"We were behind 7-0 at the first quarter and only ahead 21-14 at halftime," Crowder said. "Brother, that's not enough. We can't afford another slow start like that if we expect to keep on winning, especially against an explosive team like Minnesota."

Kind words from a coach who is aiming his veteran 1972 team at the national collegiate championship. But considering his top personnel and all that team speed, Colorado ranks a heavy favorite.

Leading the Buffalo attack are tailback Charlie Davis and quarterback Ken Johnson, both juniors. Davis was the nation's leading sophomore rusher in 1971 with 1,368 yards and a 6.8 per carry average. His 9.8 clocking in 100 yards helped him set a school record of 342 yards against Oklahoma State last fall, and another 202 yards on 37 carries gained him MVP honors in the Buffs 29-17 win over Houston in the Astro-Bluebonnet Bowl.

Davis ranked second only to the sensational Greg Pruitt in the final Big Eight rushing statistics, Pruitt averaged 151 yards per game, Davis 126, all on the ground.

Johnson is mainly remembered in these parts as the man who almost personally led Colorado to an at the time surprising 20-14 early season win over Ohio State. As a sophomore he became the third leading total offense producer for CU. For the season Johnson rushed 349 yards, passed for 1,126, scored 4 TD's rushing and threw eight TD passes. Davis scored 10 touchdowns, all rushing.

And if that isn't bad enough, some Gopher coaches consider CU fullback Bo Matthews (6-3,235) CU's best athlete. Playing injured much of last season, Matthews still gained 131 yards in 40 carries for a 4.0 average. As a power runner he has few equals in college football.

Colorado's stingy defense returns almost intact, the same defense that allowed opponents less than 200 yards rushing per game.

But enough about the visitors. How about a courageous band of young Gophers that nearly upset all the predictions at Indiana last week? As far as coach Stoll is concerned Minnesota played well enough to win.

"We actually carried the momentum after Indiana's first score right up until that fumble midway into the fourth quarter," says Stoll. "But then we may have become too conservative defensively. I place much of the latter with our being so young.

"But our men still came back after Indiana went ahead 27-23 and given one more minute on the clock there is no doubt we would have scored again.

"Right now I can promise you one thing. . .if we ever get ahead like that again we're going to hold onto the lead."

Stoll took all the blame for Jim Henry's fumble that halted a UM drive when the Gophers were still leading 23-20 in the final quarter.

"I put Henry in for Kevin Keller when Keller came up with a charleyhorse, and Jim hadn't practiced at all for more than a week with a sprained ankle and certainly wasn't up to the challenge. So I'll take the blame for that. Don't blame Henry."

About Colorado, Stoll says: "What you see Saturday may be a team with the most highly skilled men we will face all year.

"But I can also tell you another thing. . .I believe Minnesota fans are in for a hell-of-a football game. We may have lost a game last week, but we didn't lose anything else.

"We needed that game badly to get ourselves together, both the coaches and the players. Now that we have gotten the first one under our belts I just know we are going to be a better team each week out."

Stoll informed us that everyone who played at Indiana will be ready to go again this week. Aside from the usual hard bumps and bruises no player sustained a serious injury.

Captain Bobby Morgan, along with several other players, came in for special praise from coach Stoll. Morgan gained 127 yards rushing scoring UM's first touchdown on a 46-yard keeper and also ran the veer-T offense with precision.

"Bobby Morgan did have a very fine day, make no mistake about that," commented Stoll. "But it will be far from his best game of the year. He is still learning and perfecting our veer-T which will make him a better quarterback next week, and the week after, and the week after. . ."

The only area where UM needs picking up on offense is the pass game where Morgan completed but two of nine for 25 yards. But with its ground game going so well, Stoll stayed away from the pass until the final desperation drive which ended at the IU 23 yard line.

The answer is still out as to whether senior offensive guard Paul Tollefson will be able to suit up against Colorado. Tollefson missed the Indiana game with a sore back. He is a two-year starter.

Minneapolis---The biggest gate sale in the last 12 to 15 years, nearly 6,000, were included among more than 42,000 who came to watch head coach Cal Stoll's first home game at Memorial Stadium on the University of Minnesota campus last Saturday.

However, even with a greatly improved interest (last year's opening game crowd was 28,000 on a very early date, Sept. 11), the new old gold Gopher uniforms came off a bit tarnished as Minnesota dropped a 38-6 decision to Colorado, the nation's third ranked team.

Now all coach Stoll has to do is get his club back up and ready to tackle defending national champion Nebraska at Lincoln, Neb. (1:30 p.m. CDT Sat., Sept. 30) who last week annihilated an expected good Army team, 77-7.

"I don't really believe Nebraska is the soft spot on our schedule we were looking for," Stoll said Monday. "But we'll go after them with all we have. I expect to see continued improvement from our team and maybe get a few more breaks than last week."

Even in losing to Colorado Stoll believes his squad played much better than in the season-opening loss at Indiana 27-23. "We got whipped at the line mainly because of physical mismatches and made several key mistakes that an excellent team like Colorado turned into quick scores," Stoll continued.

"Colorado has as fine a group of individual athletes I ever want to coach against, but our kids gave it their best shot and played them even up in the first and third quarters. Colorado dominated the second and fourth when we made the majority of our bad mistakes.

"I'm not the least bit downhearted. Why in the first quarter we twice moved into the four down area, but a holding penalty really killed our momentum. And then we lost all of it when we fumbled at midfield on the next series. These are two examples of what can kill the fine efforts of a very young team. But we'll be back and we'll continue to improve. You can count on that."

If Stoll didn't have enough to worry about having to play at Nebraska, the trainer's report wasn't much brighter. Defensive signal caller Mike Steidl (Alexandria) has been ruled out from four to six weeks with a shoulder separation.

In addition, running backs Kevin Keller (Austin) and Jim Henry (St. Cloud) are also doubtful this week. Henry suffered a strained knee while Keller has a hip injury. Both are considered day to day members of the walking wounded and their final status will not be known until game time.

Add to that the fact that Minnesota has not defeated a Nebraska team since 1960 and the Cornhuskers are working on a seven game win streak. Nebraska coach Bob Devaney, now in his final year, has never lost to a Minnesota team. His teams are responsible for all seven wins in the present streak since he joined the UN staff in 1962.

At one time this season Stoll believed that winning his three non Conference encounters would give Minnesota the Big Eight championship. But after the loss to Colorado all has changed. Following Nebraska UM is home to meet Kansas.

"If we can live through the Big Eight portion of our schedule and have anybody left Minnesota will be in good shape to go back to playing in our own Conference," Stoll also said Monday.

"But before then I have to come up with some more running backs. Af halftime of the Colorado game we found ourselves without an experienced man at this position. So I chose to move flankerback George Honza (Montgomery) to running back as he had practiced some at this position in the spring. We may just have to keep him there at Nebraska.

"But during the week we will look at some other candidates. Two I am thinking about right now are sophomore Mike Derickson (Garrett, Ind.) and freshman (Doug Beaudoin (bu-DOIN) (Jamestown, N.D.). And maybe senior Tom Waltower (Augusta, Ga.) will be healthy by Saturday. If so I imagine he would be our starter."

Minneapolis---How does it feel for an 18 year old freshman quarterback to suddenly enter a game before more than 40,000 fans?

"Scary as hell," says University of Minnesota player John Lawing. With Minnesota trailing 31-0 to third ranked Colorado, Lawing, who is back-up quarterback to Minnesota captain Bob Morgan, was sent in with 3:07 remaining.

He proceeded to complete four of five passes with the last one going 13 yards for a touchdown to finish a 67 yard drive and account for the only score Minnesota could muster in losing 38-6.

"I still can't honestly say I remember everything that happened," Lawing continued. "My first recollection was that I had to convince the players on the field at the time that I wasn't scared, that I had the confidence and poise to move the club. I had to make them believe in me or it could have been disastrous.

"Well, maybe I'm a pretty good actor because they must have believed. The team gave me great protection which had a lot to do with the pass completions.

"But mostly what I did in the game came from hours and hours of practicing every play. It was almost rote reaction on my part, because all of a sudden there I was after seven plays lying flat on my back and 42,000 people were screaming. It was then I knew we had scored.

"I actually had to wait until seeing the films on Sunday to find out what happened. This giant, and I mean really a giant Colorado lineman got to me just as I threw and all I could see was his white jersey and gold helmet on top of me. But it was a great thrill."

The biggest high school crowd John played in front of was 7,000 back in Lincolnton, N.C., his hometown. "But there I knew so many people, the students and townsfolk," John added. "I just can't explain the difference I felt Saturday before all those people in Memorial Stadium. There is no way to compare it. You really feel like you're in a fish bowl and you really have to produce. I mean 42,000, WOW!!

Coach Cal Stoll tells a humorous story on John that happened prior to the season opener at Indiana. Stoll and athletic director Paul Giel were standing in the motel corridor when John walked by.

"How do you feel, John, are you ready to go?" asked Giel. "Do you want me to throw up here or wait 'til I get to my room," the freshman replied.

Right now Lawing is second string quarterback, and Bob Morgan is a senior. A lot is going to be heard from this talented youngster the next three seasons. He has all the makings of a great one.

Minneapolis---University of Minnesota cross-country coach Roy Griak greeted 20 varsity candidates when he returned from working with the U.S. Olympic track & field team in Munich, Germany, but the biggest name of all was missing. . .co-captain Garry Bjorklund.

Bjorklund, a senior from Proctor who has won three straight Big Ten individual cross-country titles, is scheduled to undergo surgery in early October to correct a foot defect.

"This is a genuine blow to Garry (Bjorklund), not to mention the hopes we had for our 1972 team," Griak said Monday. "He has not only won three straight Conference titles but finished second at the NCAA meet last December. And he has only lost one dual meet since enrolling at Minnesota in 1969. He is a great one."

Only three returning lettermen dot Griak's youngest and greenest squad since he came to the University in 1963. Senior co-captain Mike Lawless (Racine, Wis.), and sophomores Steven Hall (Minnetonka) and Bill Smith (Lombard, Ill.) are the only men with an appreciable experience.

This trio, along with a sophomore and several freshmen open the season Friday (Sept. 29) against Drake University on the U. of M. Golf Course layout.

The only other sophomore candidate is John Purves (Rochester), while Griak says the following freshmen show the most potential: Randy Beebe (Glen Ellyn, Ill.); Ade Degerstrom (Askov); Dennis Fee (White Bear Lake); Steve Johnson (Two Harbors); and Tim Oliver (Proctor).

Griak says his varsity candidates have worked out all summer, but only as a group about the last 10 days after the coach returned from Munich. "Although we haven't had a lot of preparation time I am convinced this inexperienced group is ready to go out and prove themselves Friday against Drake," Griak concluded. "I only hope we don't get blown off the course."

CROSS-COUNTRY

Minneapolis---"I think the excitement of our 15-45 shut out win over Drake last week has finally subsided and we are back to earth preparing for an important meet at Wisconsin Saturday," says University of Minnesota cross-country coach Roy Griak.

His youthful Gopher squad took the top five places in its opening meet in beating Drake. "I would have given you 1000 to 1 odds before the meet against that happening," Griak said Monday. "I am even more certain it will not happen again this week.

"Wisconsin has a strong, veteran club and must be considered a contender for the Big Ten championship. And if we should have a close meet I would have to say they would rate an edge based on having a more experienced squad. They also have possibly the number one runner in the Conference in Glen Harold. He took first place in the outdoor three-mile race at the Conference meet last spring."

Griak said he will take eight men to Madison, Wis. for the dual meet, but that one competitor, freshman Tim Oliver (Proctor), has a leg injury and may not be up to par.

Others making the trip include: senior co-captain Mike Lawless (Racine, Wis.), sophomores John Purves (Rochester) and Bill Smith (Lombard, Ill.), and freshmen Dennis Fee (White Bear Lake), Ade Degerstrom (Askov), Steve Johnson (Two Harbors) and Randy Beebe (Glen Ellyn, Ill.). Fee was the individual winner last week against Drake running the five mile course in 25:25.6.

However, this week's dual meet will be run over a six mile course and the added distance may be difficult for the Gopher rookies to handle.

Minneapolis--Last week University of Minnesota sophomore right cornerback Greg Engebos had the unenviable assignment of covering Nebraska great Johnny Rodgers most of the afternoon when the latter was running pass routes from his flanker position.

Asked how it feels to be over with the assignment, Engebos simply said "Great!! He has so much quickness and balance he is nearly impossible to tackle. I just hope never to see a better receiver and runner than Johnny Rodgers come into my coverage area, even though I know this week against Kansas we are facing a superior passing attack."

But Greg's day was not all that bad as Rodgers did not score any touchdowns on passes. He did run one in from two yards and scored another on a 64 yard punt return. For the day Rodgers caught seven passes for 127 yards.

"Thankfully not all his receptions were on my side," Greg continued. "But I honestly believe he could catch all he wanted on anybody's side."

Greg's biggest play came near the end of the first half when he ran stride for stride with Rodgers on a deep flag pattern and went up at the last minute to wrestle away the ball and return the interception 25 yards and prevent another Big Red score. Nebraska won 49-0.

"I honestly hope Rodgers wins the Heisman Trophy this year so someday I can tell my grandchildren I took one away from the great one," Engebos added. "It's a play I'll always remember."

A native of Green Bay, Wisconsin, Greg originally went to the U.S. Air Force Academy prep school, but transferred to Minnesota and played on the freshman team as a running back last year. In the spring he was moved to the secondary and this fall won the starting role at right cornerback.

He attended Premontre High School and was twice named captain of the football team. He was also voted the MVP award as a senior. In one game he scored four touchdowns, one on a 80 yard punt return, leading his team to a 72-0 win.

"If nothing else I, along with my teammates, gained valuable experience playing against a great, great team like Nebraska," Greg continued. "I believe a rookie always matures according to his opposition. Needless to say we all matured quite a bit last week."

Minneapolis---The University of Minnesota football team completes the Big Eight portion of its schedule at home Saturday when the Golden Gophers meet the Kansas Jayhawks at 1:30 p.m. CDT.

For coach Cal Stoll (STALL) and his Minnesota squad the game can't come any too soon in light of what has already transpired in meetings with other Big Eight powers. The last two Saturdays saw UM drop 30-6 and 49-0 decisions to Colorado and Nebraska, respectively.

"Our present situation is quite obvious in that we are using a lot of young, inexperienced people who are just not ready to play the kind of competition we have faced," Stoll said Monday.

"We opened against Nebraska last week with five rookies on the right side of our defense. Now I'm not criticizing our people for what happened, but there is just no way we can play teams like Colorado and Nebraska on an even par. Both the physical and experience mismatch situations were way too much for our boys to overcome.

"But that is all past and we are eagerly looking ahead to Saturday's game with Kansas. Although they, too, are a very fine football team, but I honestly believe we can win. We never approach a game with any other idea. We will continue to show improvement and maybe all our youngsters are maturing fast enough to begin narrowing that experience margin down to where they can handle their own.

"I have not wanted to play as many youngsters as we have to date, but it's been a matter of necessity. The combination of injuries and other reasons have all but forced us into moving freshmen and several untried sophomores into immediate action. I hope they don't get discouraged."

Stoll said he took nine freshmen to Nebraska and played seven.

"The only good thing about this is that these men, through experience gained this year, will be fine sophomores and great juniors and seniors," the coach added. "Another solid factor is that these youngsters just don't know how or when to quit. And that goes for our entire squad. Even in the face of giant losses our boys have battled it out to the last play of each game. I know this is going to pay off handsomely for Minnesota before the season is over."

Injuries further decimated Gopher ranks when junior defensive tackle Jeff Gunderson (Minneapolis Washburn) underwent knee surgery Sunday and is lost for the season. Gunderson was considered the anchor of Minnesota's defensive line and will be sorely missed. He lettered last year at defensive guard but was moved to tackle in the spring.

It is hoped that sophomore running back Kevin Keller (Austin) will be ready to go against Kansas as he missed the Nebraska game with a hip pointer. Another running back, senior Jim Henry (St. Cloud), is not expected to be ready. He is having knee problems.

Stoll said it is possible that a pair of freshmen may line up behind Keller Saturday. They are Doug Beaudoin (boo-DOIN) (Jamestown, N.D.) and Vince Fuller (Philadelphia, Pa.).

"I honestly don't want to put these boys in at running back so early, but it's now a matter of who is healthy," Stoll continued. "They have the speed we need to get outside."

Kansas is expected to bring a wide open pass attack into Memorial Stadium triggered by the accurate arm of junior quarterback David Jaynes. After three games Jaynes is ranked third in the nation in total offense and sixth nationally in passing. As a team Kansas is 10th in total offense on a per game basis. To date Jaynes has completed 52 of 96 pass attempts good for 742 yards and three touchdowns. His total offense figure is less as he has lost 36 yards rushing, mostly while attempting to pass.

But to go with its air attack, Kansas coach Don Fambrough will trot out a trio of speedsters who are each averaging more than five and a half yards per carry. Senior Jerome Nelloms and junior Delvin Williams are the running backs while Robert Miller is the fullback.

Williams is the fastest having been timed in 4.2 seconds for 40 yards. Kansas sports information director Jay Simons said Monday that he knows of only one man who has ever been timed faster as the great Bob Hayes of Olympic and pro football fame owns a clocking of 4.1 seconds for the same distance.

"That again points out one of our most critical problems. . .lack of team speed," Stoll added. "There is just no way you can catch a 4.2 man with a teamful of 5.2, or slower, players. So our defense will really have to keep Williams and those others from getting outside."

And don't forget. Minnesota's veer-T is coming fast and could more than offset the vaunted Kansas passing and speed game. A computer may be needed to add up the final score. This looks like a wild one.

Minneapolis---University of Minnesota athletic department officials have announced plans for the sale of season tickets to the 1972-73 home basketball games (13).

Applications for season tickets will first be accepted Monday, October 9. The total ticket sales plan schedule is as follows:

1 - STUDENTS:

To accommodate an expected rush, the University will use the ticket lobby of Williams Arena on University Avenue across from Memorial Stadium for student season ticket purchases beginning Monday, October 9. The lobby selling hours for next week are: Monday-Wednesday-Friday 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. and Tuesday-Thursday 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. at all 10 ticket windows. Following next week (Oct. 9 through Oct. 13) students may purchase season tickets at the new Bierman Field Athletic Building ticket offices at 15th Ave. and 5th St. S.E. Students have up until November 4 to purchase season tickets. The cost is \$6 per ticket.

2 - UNIVERSITY STAFF

Staff members may begin purchasing season tickets Monday, October 9 at the Bierman Field Athletic Building. Office hours are 9 a.m. until 4 p.m. each weekday. Cost for staff season basketball tickets is \$9 per ticket. Staff members also have until November 4 to purchase their season tickets.

3 - GENERAL PUBLIC

Ticket applications ONLY will be accepted by the University from the general public beginning Monday, Oct. 9 at the Bierman Field Building. At time of receipt-- either by mail or in person: at the ticket office windows---each application will be given a priority number on the calendar date it is received. Remember, only

applications will be taken. No actual tickets will be given out to the general public at this time. Cost for each season ticket to the public is \$32.50 and must accompany each application.

4 - PRIORITY

University students, staff members, and those individuals among the general public who purchased season tickets last year, will be given first priority on 1972-73 season basketball tickets. The latter group, last year's season ticket holders, has until October 27 to exercise their option to renew their orders for the same seats this year.

Now, after the completion of all the above options by November 4, including the reordering of last year's season tickets, then applications from the general public will be processed in the same order they are received. The latter statement means no guarantee will be given when applications are received from the general public. The number of season tickets available at that time (November 4) will be determined by how many students, staff and last year's season ticket holders have made purchase this year.

"Our first obligations are to the students, staff members and last year's season ticket holders," says athletic ticket manager Ken Buell. "And that in itself could lead to some misunderstandings.

"For example, let's say that all of last year's 2,500 general public season ticket holders exercise their option to renew before their deadline of October 27, and a total of 12,000 students and staff buy season tickets before their deadline of November 4. That would mean there would be only 3,000 season tickets available to the general public as our total seating capacity is 17,500. That also means the first 3,000 who filed paid applications by mail or in person beginning October 9 would receive season tickets. We would have to refund any remaining paid applications."

The sale of single game tickets, if available, will be announced at a later date, says Buell.

Minneapolis---There is a special seating area in University of Minnesota's Memorial Stadium that has become more popular with each game, actually more popular than there are seats.

The seats in question are called the Economy Plan and are located in sections 15 and 16 directly behind the goal posts in the bowl end of the stadium. Tickets in this area are sold to the general public at the reduced rate of \$4.50 for adults, and \$2 for those 18 years of age and under, plus those 62 years of age and older.

As there are only 3,142 Economy Plan tickets and seats available for each home Minnesota game, a total sellout here by Friday preceeding each home game has become the rule rather than the exception.

But for some reason fans coming to the stadium just before game time on Saturday's can't seem to understand why there aren't any of these Economy Plan tickets available for sale.

"For one thing the Big Ten Conference puts strict limits on how many seats we may sell at a reduced rate," athletic ticket manager Ken Buell informs us. "We are at our maximum number of these seats and cannot expand this area. But even if we could make more room it certainly wouldn't be fair to those who have already purchased tickets for \$6.50 in adjoining sections."

Buell makes the following suggestion to anyone interested in getting Economy Plan tickets for remaining Gopher home games. "These tickets may be purchased in advance either by mail, providing your check is sent in at least one week before the game in question," Buell said, "or coming to our ticket office at the new Bierman Field Athletic Building.

"So please don't wait until the last minute and hope to buy your Economy Plan ticket at the gate. Interest is really up for Gopher football this year and these special tickets are always the first ones to go."

"Now this is not an excuse," Forte was quick to add. "But we do not have that big a varsity team and our reserve squad spends the entire week working as a scouting team helping the top club. By that we do not have time to prepare ourselves for Iowa or any other opponent.

"But I know just how our boys feel about losing that opener and they want another shot at those junior Hawkeyes. I believe our men are also a lot more confident in themselves and will come to play tough football."

Forte said he will open with freshman Mike Carroll (White Bear Lake) at quarterback as another freshman, Chuck McGrew (Edina), started the first game. "I decided before the season opened these two would alternate starting roles so this is nothing new," Forte explained.

But missing from the backfield will be freshman running back Dave Fritze (Hayfield) who is out with an injured ankle. So filling out the backfield will be Dick Stromwell (Eau Claire, Wis.) at running back, John Bolinger (Tulsa, Okla.) at fullback and Pat Kehr (Hopkins) the flanker.

Minneapolis---Whew. Glad that's over. I mean, let the Big Eight play among their own. Minnesota has had its fill.

However, last week was one of those could have been Saturday's. After dropping decisive decisions to Big Eight powers Colorado and Nebraska, the Gophers came within a fumble or two of catching and defeating Kansas last week before bowing 34-28. Minnesota turned over the ball six times losing four of eight fumbles and having two passes stolen by KU defenders.

But that is thankfully past and now the Gophers can turn to what the football season is really all about. . .the Big Ten race. Unfortunately a sleeping giant has awakened, says Purdue University sports information director Ted Haracz (as is Harris), and comes to Minnesota Saturday with an unspoiled 1-0 Conference record.

Picked to be one of the premium teams in the Big Ten this fall, Purdue faltered against some powerful non Conference opponents of its own losing to Bowling Green, Washington and Notre Dame (all three still undefeated) before shutting the door on Iowa last week 24-0. The Hawkeyes were allowed but 84 yards total offense, 34 of that coming on a broken play scramble.

What many believe to be Purdue's early season problem appears to be solved. . . a shucking of its new wishbone-T offense. Always known for passing prowess, Purdue coach Bob DeMoss last spring decided to use the new formation to gain maximum use of its great halfbacks Otis Armstrong and Darryl Stingley, both crack speedsters.

Not so, said opposing teams who immediately cut off Purdue's outside game. The only real success DeMoss had was in the running of its quarterbacks. "You can only defense three of four backs against the wishbone," Haracz said in Minneapolis Monday, "so they chose to let our quarterback go it alone. But it still didn't produce any wins so coach DeMoss made the change last week at Iowa. It paid off."

Against Iowa Armstrong gained 89 yards on 26 carries and a previously unheralded fullback named Jack Spellman got 80 in 17 trips. Just about all this running came from Purdue's previous offensive sets, the power-I and pro set, both with heavy use of the belly series.

But the biggest improvement came in the passing game where last year's Big Ten aerial leader Gary Danielson finally got untracked. He connected for 11 completions in 23 attempts for 150 yards. One of his on target strikes went for a 40 yard score. Last year Danielson had already passed for 300 yards on 15 of 20 and two scores before leaving the game late in the third period with a shoulder separation. The injury came as the result of a safety blitz by UM's Mike Perfetti.

"It has taken Purdue considerable time for its offense to get the feel of the game," says Minnesota coach Cal Stoll (STALL). "Unfortunately for us they seem to have found it. And that does nothing less than give its defense additional confidence. So I have to say we are in for a very rugged battle Saturday."

(MORE)

But Stoll was far from throwing in the towel. "There is no question in my mind that we played well enough to win last week," he continued. "But six turnovers. That's just plain murder. And that late penalty certainly killed our last chance.

"Here we would have been first and ten on the Kansas 17 with more than a minute to play and three time outs remaining. I just know we would have scored then and won 35-34. But the offensive interference call cost us the 13 yard gain, a 15 yard penalty and loss of down. It was too much to overcome.

"But I'm again genuinely proud of the way our men continued to battle back as they have all year long. Again we were the victims of our slowness afoot. I can't ask our secondary to out run receivers who are a full second faster in a 40 yard dash. And if we drop way off to protect against the long bomb, they will kill us by completing passes underneath our secondary. So I hope you can sympathize with the problems facing our pass defenders."

There is little question Minnesota showed improvement on offense, both on the ground and through the air. But putting these two components together again and stopping Armstrong-Danielson-Stingly-Spellman and company is a mighty tall order.

As in last week's game UM may again be called on to simply outscore the opposition, so another touchdown-filled game may be the order of the day.

Only one change in the UM lineup is expected. Senior defensive right end Bob Bailey is ailing and will probably be replaced by junior Dave Christensen from Rochester. The rest of the Gopher lineup should remain intact.

WRESTLING HALL OF FAME

Minneapolis---Walter "Wally" Johnson, wrestling coach at the University of Minnesota and immediate past president of the U.S. Wrestling Federation (USWF), announced that preliminary plans were completed September 30 to build a Wrestling Hall of Fame.

Johnson said the executive council of the USWF and others selected Stillwater, Oklahoma as the site and that the planned \$400,000 building will be erected on the campus of Oklahoma State University. The University has donated the land.

Contracts are expected to be awarded by December 1 with construction beginning January 1, 1973.

In addition to the Hall of Fame room, executive offices for the USWF will also be housed in the new building.

"Our aim in building this structure is to insure a permanent shrine honoring past and future individuals who have made and will make outstanding contributions to all forms of amateur wrestling in the United States," says Johnson. "The USWF was formed in 1968 and has since sought a permanent site for these ideas, and for its executive offices. In a period of four years this organization has made tremendous strides."

Johnson was charter president of the USWF serving consecutive two-year terms. The newly inducted president is Ken Kraft, wrestling coach at Northwestern University.

Johnson is now a member of the USWF governing council.

Minneapolis---Coach Mo Forte and his University of Minnesota varsity reserve football team are glad to be done with the Iowa football team are glad to be done with the Iowa reserve squad as the Hawkeyes made it two in a row over the junior Gophers last week winning 43-0 at Minneapolis. Iowa won earlier at home 14-0.

Now Forte and his gang play two in a row against Wisconsin beginning next Monday, October 23, at Memorial Stadium, and then travel to Madison November 12. The game here next week begins at 1:30 p.m.

Speaking about his team's successive losses, Forte said: "We haven't lost confidence and know we can bounce back. But we'll have to eliminate the numerous mistakes and show a lot of improvement in our execution."

Last week against Iowa, Minnesota fumbled 12 times, lost six of the bobbles and saw the Hawkeye secondary pick off five passes.

"There is just no way we can stay with any opponent when we make that many mistakes and turnovers," Forte continued. "But again it falls back to our lack of time in preparation. We have to spend more time with the varsity than working by ourselves and that keeps us from becoming a sharp unit.

"But there is a possibility we may get some help this week as the game is being played on Monday instead of Friday. This means that any player who does not get into the varsity game Saturday against Iowa can play with the reserves here on Monday, and still be eligible to play the following Saturday (Oct. 28) at Michigan with the varsity."

Forte said Tuesday there probably will be some lineup changes for the Wisconsin game Monday but that he was undecided as to what they would be at this time. "I'll tell you one thing though," the coach added, "there is no defeatist attitude on our club. We've just gotten off to a slow start and I know we'll be better. These boys want to win badly. Maybe this game is our turn."

The Wisconsin varsity reserves have played one game defeating Northwestern 21-0.

CROSS-COUNTRY

Minneapolis---The University of Minnesota's freshman dominated cross-country team returns home for the first time in three weeks in hopes of bringing its record up to an even .500 (2-2). Providing the opposition for the Saturday, October 21 meet at the University Golf Course will be the University of Iowa. The race begins at 10:30 a.m.

After winning its season opening dual meet against Drake, the Gophers lost on the road at Wisconsin and Michigan State. But in the latter meet coach Roy Griak believes his young squad may have come of age.

"On paper Michigan State is a shade stronger than Wisconsin for top ranking in the Big Ten this season," Griak says, "and we only lost 25-30 a week after Wisconsin drubbed us 18-41. (Low score wins in cross-country.) We ran a much better race at State as our freshmen, in particular, continue to show improvement."

Frosh Dennis Fee (White Bear Lake) won his second individual title in the three outings last week when he set a new Michigan State-Minnesota dual meet record of 31:04.7 on the six-mile Spartan course.

"I was also very pleased with the improved performances of senior Mike Lawless (Racine, Wis.) and sophomore Bill Smith (Glenbard, Ill.)," Griak added. "They finished second and third, respectively, among our men gaining fifth and sixth spots in the meet. I'm also glad to report that another freshman, Tim Oliver (Proctor), has recovered from a pulled leg muscle and will be ready to run for us Saturday."

Griak believes that Iowa is a stronger team this year. The Hawkeyes have already scored wins against Purdue and Illinois, and lost to Wisconsin by a narrower margin than did the Gophers. Griak predicts a very close meet with possibly the fourth and fifth men on each team deciding the outcome.

"Having two road meets in succession has to be a big help to us at this stage," Griak closed. "I believe our kids are ready to run a first class race against Iowa. But it will still be close."

HOCKEY

Minneapolis---New University of Minnesota hockey coach Herb Brooks will put his 1972-73 varsity candidates on view for the first time this weekend.

Coach Brooks has scheduled inter-squad games Saturday (7:30 p.m.) at the Graham Arena in Rochester, and Sunday (8 p.m.) at the Bloomington Ice Gardens. Both scrimmage games are open to the public with adults being charged \$1 and students 50 cents.

Proceeds from both scrimmage games will be directed to both the amateur hockey associations in Rochester and Bloomington respectively, and the University's Williams Scholarship Fund.

Brooks also said a portion of the proceeds from the game at Bloomington will also go into the Bill Masterton Memorial Scholarship Fund. Directors of amateur hockey associations in each city are handling all details for the weekend scrimmage games.

Brooks said Tuesday he does not have any idea who will play on what team or what his lines, defense pairs or goalie rotations will be.

"We have separated players who returned from last year and incoming rookies during all our practice sessions to date," Brooks added Tuesday, "but I hope to split the teams this weekend down the middle as much as possible and include boys from both groups on each team.

"We will put the vets and rookies against each other in scrimmages later this week and hope to get a better idea of who our players will be this year. We still have more than 50 candidates out so the picture is still cloudy. But I've been impressed with the attitude and willingness to work being shown by each player. I'm certain we will see some very highly spirited games this weekend and I will use these performances as a yardstick to measure each players capabilities."

Brooks also said he has some more scrimmage games planned in the next two weeks but details have yet to be completed.

Minneapolis—Many think today the best thing Minnesota football coach Cal Stoll (STALL) could use is some snake bite oil as his youthful Gopher team is certainly snake bit at this stage of the season.

No, the Gophers couldn't have won all five of their games played. But maybe if a snake had missed with his wicked, misfortunate bite here and there, Minnesota's season record wouldn't be 0-5 and 0-2 in the Big Ten.

A fumble killed a winning drive at Indiana. A penalty stopped a last second drive against Kansas. A missed tackle on a kickoff return and an intercepted fumble for a TD return killed UM against Purdue.

No, maybe Minnesota wouldn't have won, but you would have a hard time convincing Stoll, His staff and players any differently.

But down through the years a young team has always been expected to make key mistakes. That theory has been right on the nose for UM. But the season isn't even half done and the Minnesota players still believe they can be winners.

The next chance they get is Saturday, October 21 during Homecoming festivities when Iowa invades Memorial Stadium.

"Even though Iowa was very impressive in beating Northwestern 23-12 on the road last week I still believe our young men can do it," Stoll says. "Sure, it will take total elimination of the mistakes we have made. Sure, we will have to play it perfect. But we've got that kind of game coming and it could just as well happen this week.

"Our defense played its best game of the season even in losing 28-3 to Purdue. We stopped their attack cold on several occasions but Purdue came up with the big plays on the kickoff return and fumble interception to take the game away from us.

"And I'm not about to criticise our offense. Just look at what our kids did with an 18 year old freshman at quarterback (John Lawing) and an 18 year old freshman at running back (Doug Beaudoin) (buh-DOIN). Now how many major college teams are using a lineup like that? Not very many, I can tell you that.

"But they learned. They performed. It can't do anything less than make them better. We continued to show improvement. We are young and a young team doesn't get down. No, we haven't given up. None of us. We'll be back Saturday and it just may be OUR day for a change."

That could sound like false optimism or whistling in the dark to some. But not to Stoll or his players. Every man believes in this organization. . . new or young as it is. "Just let us eliminate these stupid mistakes and we're going to beat the hell out of some body," one player said after last Saturday's loss to Purdue.

Minnesota went at Purdue without three regulars on defense (tackle Jeff Gunderson knee operation, linebacker Mike Steidl dislocated shoulder, and strong safety Tim Alderson a broken blood vessel) besides missing captain Bob Morgan at quarterback. Morgan injured his knee early last week, but is expected back against Iowa. It is also hoped Alderson will be ready, but Gunderson is gone for the season and Steidl is still extremely doubtful.

But what about the bright spots. "We said before the season started that if (Bob) Morgan goes out we are dead," Stoll continued. "This is no longer true. In fact, I'll not again hesitate to put (John) Lawing in for Morgan if Bobby is having a bad day. John proved to one and all Saturday he is both mature enough and good enough to play quarterback for Minnesota.

"Oh, sure, he is not a world beater yet and makes the mistakes that belie his inexperience, but he still proved to us he is a good one that can make the team go.

"Then at halfback I really liked what I saw from (Doug) Beaudoin. He almost broke a couple of plays open and gives us additional speed to the outside. He, too, will continue to play a lot. However, I would imagine we will again start sophomore Kevin Keller at running back against Iowa.

"What these points mean is that we are gaining depth and experience. You just can't go into a Big Ten football game without a healthy measure of each.

Yes, we are coming. We are improving, and with all that I have to believe we will soon put it all together. I hope it's this Saturday.

"I offer two challenges. The first is to our alumni. We would give anything to see 55,000 packed into Memorial Stadium on Homecoming Day. The second challenge is to us. . .that we give you one whale of a treat by playing a slam-bang, hard-hitting Big Ten football game and come up with our first win of the year.

"We accept the second challenge. Will you alumni accept the first one?"

Junior fullback John King continues to be Minnesota's steadiest runner averaging 5.6 yards on 77 carries for 431 net yards gained. If King continues to maintain his per game average of 86.2 yards gained, he could surpass the single season UM net rushing mark of 881 yards set by fullback Ernie Cook last year. But both King and the Gophers are up against some rugged defenses the rest of the way. It won't be easy for John.

Another Gopher star bearing down on a record is all-american senior end Doug Kingsriter. To date he leads UM in pass receptions with 14 for 159 yards. If he catches 14 more and gains 228 more yards, Doug will surpass the career reception record of 82 for 1,127 yards set by Ken Last in 1964-65-66.

King also leads the Gophers in scoring with 24 points on four touchdown runs, including three in one game against Kansas.

On defense senior linebacker Tom MacLeod has taken the tackling lead from sophomore corner back Greg Engebos. MacLeod has totaled 28 solo tackles and 17 assists good for 45 points while Engebos's figures read 32-14-44. His 32 solo tackles tops all Gopher defensive players while sophomore linebacker Ollie Bakken has the most assists, 18. MacLeod also leads in interceptions with twok.

MINNEAPOLIS. Jubilation in the University of Minnesota football camp over Saturday's 43-14 conquest of Iowa turned Monday to the sobering realization that just a very few days away looms the task of facing up to arch-rival Michigan at Ann Arbor.

The Big Ten champion Wolverines are off to a start which points them up as one of the nation's mightiest machines, offensively and defensively. The Maize and Blue defense has allowed only four touchdowns in six games to date while shutting out Northwestern and Michigan State. Prior to the 31-7 conquest of Illinois last Saturday Michigan was ranked sixth in the nation in total defense.

The Michigan offense is not geared to running up large scores for the sake of national ratings. It clicks well enough to win and has averaged 19.8 points per game to date.

Cal Stoll's Veer-T offense came of age last Saturday against Iowa. A healthy quarterback, Captain Bobby Morgan, ran the offense to near-perfection excepting a couple of fumbles. A major factor in the surprising offensive display was the running of freshman Doug Beaudoin at left halfback or running back as it is known in the Veer offense. Hampered by a pulled hamstring from the second day of fall practice, the highly recruited 6-1, 195 rookie out of Jamestown, N.D. was ready to run full speed last week for the first time. He provided the outside and off-tackle running that has been missing in the Gopher attack as he rushed 18 times for a net of 135 yards--a 7.5 per carry average. A series of injuries to Minnesota's experienced running backs put this backfield post in the status of non-producer until Beaudoin got healthy and turned in a highly encouraging performance.

Whereas Morgan and junior fullback John King had born the brunt of the Gopher attack previously this fall, the wide threat posed by Beaudoin took the pressure off Morgan and King with the result that each had a big day against the Hawkeyes. Morgan kept the ball 12 times for 91 yards in gains while King bulled ahead 29 times for 173 yards and 4 touchdowns to tie an all-time UM record for most TD's in one game. If the Gopher offense can continue to "hit on all three" as it did against Iowa it could pose some interesting problems for the iron-clad Michigan defenses.

Michigan scouts didn't learn much about the Minnesota passing attack last Saturday. Morgan put the ball in the air only four times, each without success as two

were batted down by onrushing Iowa linemen. This posed the question: "Could anyone remember the Gophers winning a game in modern times without completing a pass?"

Despite the one-sided score, Coach Cal Stoll was critical of the UM kicking game against the Hawkeyes. He promised at Monday's press conference to devote considerable attention to this phase of the game; also to defense against kickoff returns. Iowa returned eight kickoffs for a total of 193 yards and frequently put the Minnesota defense in the hole with bad field position.

After a shaky first half against Iowa the Gopher defense settled down and held the opposition without a first down through the second half until the closing moments of the game. This stand gave Stoll hope that at last the defensive unit had jelled enough to test Michigan's offense. The secondary will be bolstered by the return of Tim Alderson, victim of a freak accident that kept him out of the last two games. This means the only three "regulars" who will miss the Brown Jug battle are linebacking demon Mike Steidl, defensive end Bob Bailey, and defensive tackle Jeff Gunderson who is out for the season.

FACT SHEET FOR MINNESOTA at MICHIGAN

THE SERIES: One of the oldest and most heated rivalries in all college football resumes its chase for the famed "Little Brown Jug" Saturday in Ann Arbor. The "Jug" came into being in 1903 when Michigan visited Minneapolis and the teams tied 6-6. Michigan left a large stone water jug behind and later asked to have it sent home. Minnesota replied by saying "come and win it back." Although the teams did not play again until 1909, someone remembered the water jug and produced it as a prize to the winner. Michigan won it back 15-6 and the rivalry for an innocent piece of crockery was on.

To date Michigan holds a wide edge in series wins, 38 to 21. There have been three ties. Michigan is presently on a six game win streak against Gopher elevens. The last Minnesota win was a 14-13 decision in 1965.

MINNESOTA LAST WEEK: The youthful Gophers last Saturday presented Cal Stoll (STALL) with his first win as head coach at Minnesota when UM ran all over Iowa 43-14. Minnesota stacked up 402 yards total offense—all rushing. Minnesota was 0 for 4 in passing. Fullback John King tied a school record by scoring 4 TD's and gained 173 net yards on 29 carries. Freshman halfback Doug Beaudoin (buh-DOIN) was also impressive gaining 135 yards in 18 trips and scoring his first college TD. Beaudoin appears to have won a starting role. Again Minnesota's defense was keyed by LB Tom MacLeod, DT's Keith Simons, a freshman, and Clayton Scheuer, DE Steve Neils and DB's Mike White, Greg Engebos and Paul Wright.

UM INJURY REPORT: Although three original starters (DT Jeff Gunderson, LB Mike Steidl, DE Bob Bailey) are still out, the rest of the squad is in good shape. It is hoped that SS Tim Alderson will be back after missing the last two games via a freak non-football injury. QB Bob Morgan was out of the Purdue game but played the entire route against Iowa. He had a twisted knee injury suffered in practice. He will start. The Gopher 2-deep is the same as last week except for Beaudoin moving up ahead of Kevin Keller at running back.

UM RECORDS IN DANGER: Junior fullback John King has gained 604 net yards rushing in 106 attempts for a 5.7 average. At his present rate of 100.7 yards per game he is certain to break the UM single season rushing mark of 881 net yards set by FB Ernie Cook last year. The UM record for most gross yards rushing is 925 set by UM athletic Director Paul Giel in 1953. With 609 yards to date here, King could break that mark, too.

GOPHERS VS. BUCKEYES

Minneapolis---For the fourth time this season Minnesota's young but game Golden Gophers gear up to meet another team ranked all year long among the nation's elite, the top ten.

After meeting Colorado and Nebraska back to back, Minnesota goes into the final Saturday of another back to back assignment. Last week U.M. was at Michigan. Saturday the Gophers visit Ohio State.

"Some say it's too much to ask of a new program, a young and inexperienced team," says Minnesota head coach Cal Stoll (STALL). "But neither I nor my players believe in that. We haven't gone into any game this year thinking we were going to lose, much less get blown out of the ball park.

"We have approached each opponent in the same positive manner. We will do the same this week. True, coach Woody Hayes has another great Buckeye team, but they aren't superhuman. They, just like every other team, can be beaten, and you can bet your bottom dollar we will do everything in our power to make it happen.

"But to do that we must stop killing ourselves. We must stop the murderous mistakes that have both stopped good drives and also given our opponents the ball in four down territory. We did the latter last week and it cost us four touchdowns.

"Michigan is truly a great football team. They are very opportunistic, and their defense has as much speed and quickness as anyone. But I see where Ohio State has lost some key defenders and this may work to our advantage. But at the same time I'm not naive enough to believe coach Hayes does not have plenty of top reserves ready to step in and do just as good a job. Depth has always been a plus factor for Ohio State teams. This year is no exception."

Someone asked Stoll after the Michigan game if he was dejected over this year's 1-6 record (1-3 in the Big Ten). "Disappointed maybe, and angry, but mostly frustrated, not defected," the coach answered.

"And that goes for our players, too. We honestly believe we are a better team than 1-6. Sure, we have played some tough opponents and sure, we are way too young. But other teams have had tough schedules, too. It's just that we believe so hard in ourselves that it's difficult to accept what has happened.

"One time this year we really put it all together and the ball bounced our way all afternoon. That came when we defeated Iowa 43-14. Both my players and I strongly believe this can happen again. When we don't know, but we certainly would like to see everything fall into place this Saturday.

"I honestly believe our young players were somewhat overwhelmed at Michigan last week. Only a handful of our men had ever played there before. It's a different kind of world going into Michigan or Ohio stadiums. But now we have had the experience and should react better to that situation this week."

Stoll said every man who played against Michigan should be ready to go again Saturday. A couple of players received minor injuries, but nothing serious.

Also, it is hoped that junior linebacker Mike Steidl can return to duty after missing the last five games with a shoulder injury. Mike was Minnesota's defensive signal caller and emotional leader. He has been missed.

It is also hoped that junior fullback John King can have another good day as he only needs 99 yards to tie the school single season net rushing record of 881 yards set by fullback Ernie Cook last year. King has rushed for 682 net yards in seven games, an average of 97.6 yards per outing.

GOPHER HOCKEY OPENS

Minneapolis---It doesn't seem possible that college hockey can be upon us already, but it is.

Rookie head coach Herb Brooks and the Golden Gopher varsity open at home Friday and Saturday against the University of Manitoba. Both games began at 8 p.m. following preliminary scrimmage games between members of the varsity reserve team.

After more than three weeks of camp, coach Brooks is still not certain who will do most of the playing for Minnesota this year. But he expects to get a better grip on this problem following the Manitoba series.

"I know little about our opponents this week, except that they are always older, better experienced and very physical," Brooks said Tuesday. "I believe this series is an excellent chance to get a better look at what our men can do.

Our players are getting awfully tired of hitting each other every day and welcome the chance for some strange faces and uniforms to aid at."

Like most other recent teams at Minnesota, the 1972-73 hockey team will also be a very youthful organization. In discussing the possible line, defensive and goalie combinations for this week, Brooks mentioned several freshmen who have come to the front and could gain starting jobs before the Gophers open Western Collegiate Hockey Association (WCHA) play next weekend at Denver.

"I have to say I'm very pleased with the performance of several newcomers to the varsity ranks," Brooks continued. "Unfortunately, I also have to say I'm somewhat disappointed in a number of returning veterans. But right now we are looking for the men who can do the best job, and I don't care what grade their in. I demand results, and the ones that produce are the ones that play. It's as simple as that."

Although Brooks would not name a definite lineup for the Manitoba games, he did indicate several players expected to see duty.

Two lines who have recently been most effective could line up this way: C-Jim Gambucci (Grand Forks, N.D. Sr.), LW-Robbie Harris (Roseau Soph.), RW-John Matschke (White Bear Lake Jr.); and C-Tom O'Brien (Minneapolis Benilde Fr.), LW-Dean Blais (International Falls Sr.), RW-Warren Miller (South St. Paul Fr.),

Two more lines who could team up, says Brooks, may be these combinations: C-Mike Polich (Hibbing Soph.), LW-Tom Sundberg (St. Paul Harding Fr.), RW-Buzz Schnieder (Babbitt Fr.); and C-John Harris (Roseau Jr.), LW-Cal Cossalter (Eveleth Jr.), RW-Brad Buetow (St. Paul Mounds View Sr.). Buetow is a converted defenseman from last year's varsity.

Brooks also named other forwards who may play, including LW-Bruce Carlson (Edina Jr.), C-Tim Carlson (Edina Soph.), and RW-Tim Schroeder (E. Grand Forks So.).

On defense Brooks has named two pairs to open Friday night. They are Bill Butters (White Bear Lake Sr.) and Brad Morrow (Anoka Fr.), plus Les Auge (St. Paul Johnson Soph.) and Dick Spanbauer (St. Paul Hill, Fr.). Other defensemen expected to see immediate duty include Doug Falls (Minneapolis Southwest Jr.), John Perpich (Hibbing Jr.), Tim Anderson (St. Paul Ramsey So.) and Jim Knutson (Edina Sr.).

Brooks said he will use three varsity goalies over the weekend with Doug Hastings (Edina Sr.) probably getting the starting call Friday. Also expected to play are Brad Shelstad (Minneapolis Southwest Jr.) and Eric Lockwood (Regina, Sask., Can. Fr.).

"We are not at the peak of physical conditioning as yet but I am pleased with the overall results of our pre season camp," Brooks concluded. "Now it's up to all of us to get off on the right foot and get hockey back to its winning ways at Minnesota. Only don't be too anxious. We are very young, very inexperienced.

"Winning may take time, but I can assure you it will come. Once we get our legs and the younger players find out what WCHA hockey is all about, I believe this team will begin to jell and make itself known. This is the start. We can go in no other direction but straight up."

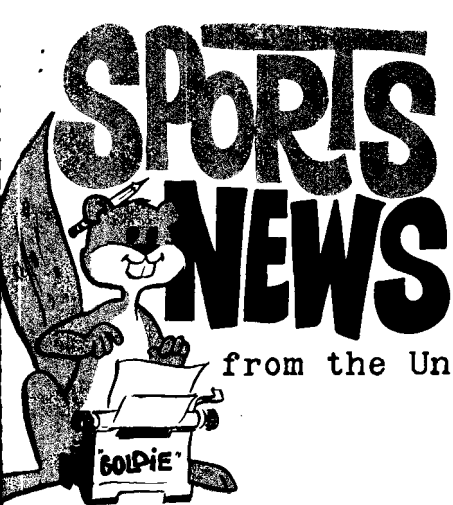

HOCKEY TEAM AT DENVER

Minneapolis--"Winning both ends of our opening series (4-1 and 9-2 over U. of Manitoba has to be a great psychological booster to our team, particularly the younger players," says rookie head hockey coach Herb Brooks of the University of Minnesota.

"I'm not certain you can measure the full weight of plus factors a pair of wins like that can have. But I do know the true value of confidence to freshmen and sophomores just getting started. It's something you can't gain any other way. It has to come from competing.

"I was more than just pleased with several phases of our play. The men showed they want to pay the price by skating hard at both ends of the rink. We had hustle and good team play. Both parts are vital to success.

"We also received consistent goal tending, another vital part of any hockey team. Doug Hastings (Fri.) and Brad Shelstad (Sat) did fine jobs. I had hoped to also use freshman goalie Eric Lockwood Saturday, but when I went to put him in Eric asked me to leave Shelstad in as Brad had a shutout going. It's that kind of 'we' and 'us' attitude that has rallied this team. . .not the 'I' attitude found so often. I have every hope that Minnesota hockey is on its way back."

But Brooks and Co. have picked a mighty rough way to open Western Collegiate Hockey Association (WCHA) play. Denver, as always, is again loaded. "True, they have a wide experience over us," Brooks continued, "but by Denver standards coach Murray Armstrong has one of the youngest teams in several years.

"They are the defending WCHA champs and until proven otherwise are still considered the best. We are going out there with every intention of winning. We respect Denver, but do not fear them. We are all new and Denver will have to prove they are the best to us."

Brooks was undecided as of Tuesday exactly how he would line his squad up Friday. However, he said it will either be Hastings or Shelstad in goal with the other playing Saturday.

The coach was also undecided whether to carry four lines or six defensemen. In the WCHA you can only dress 19 players, which means with two goalies, there are only 17 spots left.

Junior right winger John Matschke missed last week's series but will be ready to skate with center Jim Gambucci and left winger Robbie Harris this week. The next two lines should go this way: center Tom O'Brien between Dean Blais and Warren Miller, and Mike Polich between Tom Sundberg and Buzz Schneider.

A fourth line, if picked, could see Cal Cossalter moving from left wing to center between Brad Buetow on the left and Tom Dahlheim the right. Dahlheim subbed for Matschke last week and turned in two fine games. He scored UM's first two goals Friday.

On defense the top four remains intact. That means Bill Butters will skate with Jeff Morrow, and Les Auge with Dick Spanbauer. If Brooks decides to go with six defensemen, the next two will be chosen from Tim Anderson, John Perpich or Doug Falls.

"I'm not blinded by our 6.5 goal scoring average in the first two games," Brooks added, "but I do know we will have to get on the board quickly if we expect to challenge Denver. They own a long history of prolific scoring and can run you out of the rink if you're not ready to come at them early.

"I can promise one thing. . .our men are ready to accept any challenge. We are young and will make mistakes, but if desire to succeed means anything Minnesota will take the initiative against anyone. In other words, we will play exciting hockey in 1972-73. You can count on that."

Minneapolis---"I'm certain many coaches stand taller than me this year concerning their winning records. But no coach anywhere stands any taller than me when it comes to pride about his players."

So says Minnesota football coach Cal Stoll (STALL) while preparing his squad for the invasion of Northwestern Saturday, November 11. Game time has been moved up one-half hour from the normal starting time and the kickoff is set for 1:00 p.m. CST.

"This young and inexperienced team of ours could have folded up long ago," Stoll continued. "But it hasn't. Considering the frustration, and even anger, brought about by our losses (6 in 7 games), all of us, coaches included, could have thrown in the towel.

"But I honestly believe we coaches have been more inspired by the 'we won't quit' attitude of our players than the other way around. Our men have accepted the challenge and continue to strive towards victory. It is now our aim to win the final three games of 1972. It's not easy to ask of our men, but I believe we, together, can do it."

The pride and stay-with-it ideas Stoll speaks of came out last week at Ohio State. Although considered a four to five touchdown underdog, a break or two along the way could have turned things around and kept the Buckeyes from gaining their 27-19 win.

"But that's past and we can't dwell upon last week," Stoll continued. "Now we are directing our thoughts to again playing at home against Northwestern. They (NW) are in the same boat as us, reaching for the same goals.

"But right here I can't help but remember three weeks ago when we played our last home game and whipped Iowa 43-14. The vocal support given by our fans was a big part of that win and I hope we receive the same support this Saturday."

Both teams offer many similarities from excessive use of freshmen and sophomores right down to their respective records. Northwestern is 2-6 on the year against UM's 1-7 mark.

Leading offensive players for the Wildcats include freshman fullback Greg Boykin with 415 yards rushing, and sophomore quarterback Mitch Anderson with 763 yards

passing and four TD bombs included.

On defense only one returning regular is in the lineup, tackle Jim Anderson. Coach Alex Agase calls him one of the very best at his position in the Big Ten.

"Like Minnesota we are also in a rebuilding program," the coach offers. "But this Saturday, like all Saturdays, we are both looking for immediate results rather than just the development of future potential.

"I foresee two teams meeting head on with the same objective--to get back on the win side after suffering some unhappy losses--which has to result in a great emotional battle. I'm certain both teams will be sky high at Minneapolis this weekend."

Gopher fullback John King inched closer to setting a new school standard for net rushing yards gained in a single season. Last week he gained 34 yards against Ohio State and now has 766 on the season. The latter figure leaves him just 105 yards short of tying the mark of 881 set last year by fullback Ernie Cook.

King is also closing in on an older mark in scoring. Back in 1954 all-american halfback Bob MacNamara crossed the goal line 11 times for 66 points. King has scored 10 times this season for 60 points.

As a team Minnesota could set a new rushing standard this year. The Gopher squad of 1956 ended with 2009 net yards rushing while Stoll's rookie club has already amassed 1671 net yards on the ground. The Gophers need only 339 more to break the record.

BASKETBALL SELLOUT

University of Minnesota Athletic Director Paul Giel, currently faced with the problem of trying to bolster Gopher football attendance, finds that ticket demand exceeding supply can likewise be a headache.

With the close of the University student-staff basketball season ticket sale November 4 Athletic Manager Ken Buell tallied orders for slightly less than 14,000 orders on hand against a total Williams Arena capacity of 17,435. Also at hand were 2,500 season ticket orders from 1971-72 UM basketball patrons who had been assured their re-order would be honored. This left less than 1,000 season tickets available for the flood of mail and ticket office orders that greeted Buell on October 9, first day of the public sale. The athletic ticket office announced on October 17 that it was accepting no more season ticket applications from the general public, but by that date the 1,000 available upon completion of the student-staff sale had been oversubscribed many times over.

Commenting on the basketball ticket situation Giel noted that "We are delighted to have a sellout in basketball at a time when we are trying so hard to turn things around and increase attendance at our athletic events. It is apparent that the first outright Big Ten basketball championship in 53 years has stimulated student-staff interest to an all-time high. As a matter of long-established University policy we are obliged to give first priority in athletic ticket sales to students and staff. Their response this year far exceeded our expectations. While we are immensely pleased with this situation, it has created many problems."

As it has turned out, the athletic ticket office is able to honor only about one half of the new season ticket applications received from the general public on October 9. Giel emphasizes that absolutely no priorities or exceptions are exercised in filling the less than 1,000 ticket orders of the fortunate new patrons. They are being filled strictly at random and will be mailed out about November 15. Unfilled orders will be returned as soon as possible.

Giel listed the following among the specific problems arising from the complete sellout of basketball tickets on a season basis:

Inability to accommodate "M" Men wanting season basketball tickets for the first time.

Inability to accommodate high school basketball squads in special sections at UM home games.

No tickets available for youth groups.

No tickets available for public general admission patrons.

No tickets available for alumni groups of visiting schools.

No tickets available for loyal football fans who have purchased season tickets for years past and now want to see Gopher basketball.

No tickets for Williams Fund donors and other friends of The University.

No tickets for fan clubs and various organizations.

In an attempt to at least partially offset the disappointment and frustration of those fans who will be unable to attend games at Williams Arena this season Giel is trying to work out details whereby at least a portion of the Minnesota games at home and away will be televised locally. He is also studying the situation at other Big Ten schools such as Illinois, Indiana, and Purdue which have experienced similar sellout problems in the hope an arrangement more favorable to the public may be worked out for the 1973-74 season.

"Like any other first-time experience," says Giel, "we are not sure at this time that we have all the right answers to the problem. We only hope our disappointed fans and friends will not turn their backs on us. We highly value their goodwill and need their continuing interest and support."

BREWER NAMED CAGE CAPTAIN - PREVIEW NOV. 20

Minneapolis---The only chance many University of Minnesota basketball fans have to see their favorite team in live action may come Monday, November 20 when coach Bill Musselman stages his annual varsity intra-squad game at Williams Arena.

The reason it's the only chance is that the entire 1972-73 Minnesota home season (13 games) has already been sold out and no additional tickets remain for public sale, either on a season or single game basis. So every Gopher game in Williams Arena this winter will be played before 17,500 fans, a packed house.

Game time is 8 p.m. and all seats are general admission. There are no reserved seats, and season tickets already purchased do not cover this game, either. Tickets are adults at \$1.50 and those under 18 years at 50 cents will be sold at the gate only.

Adding more interest to this annual game was the naming of senior center Jim Brewer as captain for the 1972-73 season by Musselman.

"I can see benefits on both sides, that of players voting and that of the coaching staff appointing a captain, but I have long followed the latter idea," Musselman offers. "I very strongly believe that a captain must be the very best leader you can find on any team.

"I have often seen where a player vote comes out nothing more than a popularity contest and a team may have to suffer from lack of potential leadership. And if a coach doesn't know better than anyone who his best leader is, then the coach shouldn't be in the game. I don't think we have made a bad choice this year, either."

Brewer is ready to begin his third year as a stater for Minnesota. The 6-9 center has already encompassed a career that is the envy of most college players around the nation.

He was one of the most sought after high school players in the nation back in 1969 when he led Proviso East High School in Maywood, Illinois to the State schoolboy championship. Following the season Jim was naturally awarded all-state honors, but then topped it off by being named "Mr. Basketball" by the Chicago Tribune.

During his freshman season at Minnesota (1969-70) Jim averaged 21 points and 15 rebounds a game. As a sophomore (1970-71) he scored at a 16.6 a game clip while pulling down 14 rebounds each outing. The team that year posted an 11-13 record.

Jim's high output was 30 points vs. Purdue.

Then last year Brewer led Minnesota down the Cinderella trail to the school's first Big Ten championship in 53 years. Although his scoring (9.8) and rebounding (11) totals were not as high, his leadership and defensive play was unequalled anywhere.

All the above combined to his being named the Most Valuable Player in the Big Ten. . .after being passed over for a berth on either wire service post season All-Conference team.

During the latter stages of the season when Musselman was forced to go with his "Iron Five" lineup for 40 minutes each game after two starters were suspended, Brewer became a pillar around which the rest of the players rallied.

Following the Conference season Jim was then named to the NCAA Mideast Regional Tournament All-Star team where the Gophers placed third. The Gophers ended 11-3 in the Big Ten and 18-7 on the entire season.

Then came a trip west to the Olympic tryout camp and Brewer won a berth on the U.S Olympic squad. At Munich he displayed steady play at both ends of the court only to suffer a slight concussion in the championship battle and miss the exciting and controversial finish. If Brewer could have remained in the lineup, well. . . .

But now the 1972-73 season looms ahead and Brewer is actually the only player on the squad, says Musselman, who is set at his position.

"And that's the most amazing part of it all," says the coach. "There is no question of who our number one center is, yet Jim has worked harder than any other two men in camp. He averages about 35 minutes after each practice either working out alone or getting a teammate to go one on one with him. And all this after he has played basketball for 12 straight months. He is one of the most amazing young men I have ever encountered in college basketball.

"I do not know of any better inside defensive player in the nation. He is worth at least 20 points a game to us no matter how many points he scores. I have seen Jim totally negate the inside game of an opponent just by being there. He averaged about seven blocked shots a game last year and people just simply refuse to drive on him.

"He plays the game like a seven-footer when he goes up after a rebound. Jim is also an extremely unselfish ball player who maybe passes off more than he should.

"Maybe the finest compliment I can pay Jim Brewer is to say that he is both a coach's player and a player's player. There aren't many of those around." Asked if his pre season camp was on course after three weeks of work, Musselman replied, "Yes, I think so, but we still have a whale of a lot of work left before the opener November 25th. I hope we will be ready.

"But I can say this about practice. . .just about every one has been a good one so far. The players have really put out. The main reason for that is that unlike

last year we now have some furious competition for starting positions. Any coach likes that."

Up front four men, all senior lettermen, are competing for forward spots. Included are 6-10 Ron Behagen, 6-8 Clyde Turner, 6-6 David Winfield and 6-9 Corky Taylor.

The same formula holds at the guard slots where returning lettermen 6-5 Keith Young and 6-3 Bob Nix are being pressed by 6-5 J.C. transfer Bob Larsen, a JUCO All-American last year, and 6-5 sophomore sharpshooter Greg Olson.

Playing behind Brewer may be the sleeper of them all--7-0 freshman Tommy Barker. "Barker may not be ready right now but he is going to be a truly great one. You may quote me on that," Musselman closed.

GOPHER-SPARTAN FOOTBALL 11/18/72

Minneapolis---Last Sunday the Minnesota Vikings beat Michigan's Detroit Lions in Minneapolis for the 10th straight time.

This coming Saturday (11/11) the Minnesota Gophers hope to extend its mastery over another Michigan club, the Spartans of Michigan State, to eight straight wins in its own Memorial Stadium. The kickoff for Minnesota's final home game of the season is 1 p.m. CST.

Not since 1953 when now retiring coach Duffy Daugherty was an assistant coach in Spartanland has Michigan State won here. Former UM All-American and recently retired MSU athletic director Biggie Munn was State's head coach that day and the Spartans won 21-0.

So Saturday is the last chance Daugherty has to record a win in the Twin Cities as the ever popular man with the Irish wit has decided to hang up his cleats when this season ends.

But what has occurred to the Spartans since Duffy made his announcement made Cal Stoll hope Daugherty may change his mind this week about retiring. "His players have gone overboard to win the rest for Duffy since he made the decision three weeks ago, but maybe we would have a chance if he decides to stay on," Stoll said tongue in cheek.

In the last two weeks Michigan State has whalloped a pair of previously unbeaten teams in the Big Ten standings, Purdue 22-12 and Ohio State 19-12. So there is little question Daugherty's players will be up in hopes of presenting their great coach with something he has never been able to attain. . . a win in Minnesota.

But if any coach in the nation has a good line on how Daugherty gets one of his teams ready to play, it would have to be Stoll. The UM rookie coach was an assistant under Duffy from 1959 through 1968 coaching the ends both ways and heading up the recruiting program. Stoll coached three years at Wake Forest before joining the Gopher staff this year.

Regardless of what Michigan State has done the past two weeks to even its season record at 4-4-1, Minnesota showed it is ready to meet the challenge as the Golden Gophers ran up 478 yards total offense--all rushing--in defeating Northwestern 35-28. UM is now 2-7 on the year.

"Michigan State will present one of the toughest defenses we have seen all year," Stoll said Monday. "They are big, mobile, and hit with power. But we have faced tough defenses before and gained a lot of yards only to drop the ball and lose all momentum.

"I honestly believe we could have put the game away a lot easier last week if we hadn't again hurt ourselves so badly by fumbling six times and losing four. But our men played over their mistakes and that has to be a big plus for a young team

like ours.

"But we won't be able to afford that many mistakes against Michigan State. Ohio State lost four fumbles and the Spartans beat them. So we must concentrate harder on minimizing the turnovers."

Stoll said he will continue to play senior Tom MacLeod at defensive end with the return of linebacker Mike Steidl. MacLeod had been impressive all season at linebacker, but returned to his former position last week when Steidl came back from a shoulder injury suffered September 23 in the Colorado game.

"It really wasn't fair to (Tom) MacLeod to ask him to move last week," Stoll continued, "but he turned in a good game and we expect him to be 100 per cent better this time out. It's tough to relearn a position with just a few days practice. But MacLeod is a great athlete and should be at full steam Saturday. Steidl, too, played a heck of a game."

Daugherty has beaten the Gophers three times, but never here. He lost seven in a row during one stretch. On Saturday his players will pull out every stop in the book to send him off a winner. But Stoll's boys have other ideas.

Add to that Duffy's desire to remind Stoll that Daugherty was the teacher and Stoll the pupil. This one is really electrified.

Minneapolis--University of Minnesota basketball coach Bill Musselman debuts his 1972-73 varsity basketball team Monday, November 20 at Williams Arena when his team plays its annual Williams Fund intrasquad game.

Game time is 8 p.m. with the Arena ticket offices opening at 6:30 p.m. There are no reserved seats. All seats on a first come, first serve general admission basis. GAGERS WIN FIRST THREE--BREAK FOR EXAMS

Off to a better start than last year at this time, the U. of Minnesota basketball team, now 3-0, is off for almost two weeks due to final exam period. The Gophers, ranked fourth nationally, next action December 16 at Chicago Loyola. UM returns home for games December 19 (San Francisco St.) and December 21 (Corpus Christi) before heading to the Far West Classic Tournament at Portland, Oregon December 27-30. Last year at this time Minnesota was 2-1 with wins over North Dakota and Iowa State, and a loss to Bradley in overtime.

SO FAR IT'S OFFENSE OVER DEFENSE

During 1971-72 Minnesota led the nation in defense yielding just 58 points a game. But after three outings this year it's offense is more prominent for the Gophers. Last year coach Bill Musselman Big Ten champions scored at a 64.5 per game clip, but after three games this year are averaging 94.3. On defense the Gophers are allowing 65.7 points per trip. Against Western Illinois Minnesota tied a school record by scoring 111 points, the same total reached 2/1/64 against Wisconsin.

WINFIELD MAY CRACK STARTING LINEUP

Last year junior forward David Winfield (6'6) was recruited from the intramural ranks and was a solid performer during the stretch drive to UM's first Big Ten outright title in 53 years. But this year he has yet to start a game. However, Dave has come off the bench each time out to spark the Gopher offense and crested with an amazing 23 point, 11 rebound performance against Wisconsin-Milwaukee. And now it appears Winfield could be called on to start at forward when the Gophers next play. That would give Minnesota a starting "front four" of 6'6 Winfield, 6-10 Ron Behagen, 6-9 Jim Brewer and 6-8 Clyde Turner. If Winfield does go, then 6-3 Bob Nix would run the Gopher single-guard offense with sophomore standout 6-5 guard Greg Olson becoming a reserve. But coach Musselman has yet to announce who will start for UM the next time out.

FRONT FOUR LEADS GOPHER CAGE ATTACK & DEF.

Minnesota's big "front four" lead the offensive stats for the Gophers after three games. (see attached statistic sheet) Sleek forward Ron Behagen tops all scorers with 67 points, a 22.3 average, and is followed by forward Clyde Turner (59-19.7), center Jim Brewer (51-17.0) and forward David Winfield (43-16.0). Brewer leads in rebounds with 46, an avg. of 15.3. It's the latter category, rebounding, where UM owns it's biggest edge. In three games the Gophers have pulled down 163 rebounds, 54.3 per game, while the opponents have grabbed only 107, or 35.7 per game. That includes 17 team rebounds for UM, too.

At Michigan this unit scored 9 of UM's 13 goals with Polich getting four, Blais three and Cossalter two. Polich got his first hat trick Friday with Blais knocking in three Saturday. A week earlier at Notre Dame Cossalter turned the same trick in one game. "I believe right now this line may be the hottest in the WCHA," says coach Brooks. "I hope they don't cool off. We need their punch and leadership."

TWO DEFENERS
CITED FOR TOP
PLAY, BUT FIGHT
STILL ON TO
START

Coach Brooks cited the play of defensemen Bill Butters, a senior, and freshman Dick Spannbauer at Michigan last week. Although neither scored many points (Spannbauer got two assists), both played a smart checking game at the Minnesota line, says Brooks. Butters usually teams with another freshman, Brad Morrow, while Spannbauer skates with sophomore Les Auge at the blueline. However, Brooks was quick to point out that four more candidates-- juniors Doug Falls and John Perpich, sophomore Doug Dillon and freshman Tom Anderson--are not that far away and will continue to press for the fifth spot, or even move up to one of the regular starting pairs on defense. "We need this type of competition for positions every day if we hope to improve and move up in the WCHA standings," Brooks added.

BLAIS TAKES OVER
SCORING LEAD

Forward Dean Blais, who scored seven points in the Michigan series last week, upped his team scoring leadership with the Minnesota Gophers to four points over center Mike Polich. See attached statistics sheet. Blais now has 16 points on six goals and 10 assists in 10 games. Polich's totals read 3-5-12 in the same number of games. Center Jim Gambucci and winger Cal Cossalter are tied for third with nine points each.

KING SETS MOST OF
NEW GOPHER GRID
RECORDS

Minnesota fullback John King, recently named to a wire service All-Big Ten first team, set ten new school single season and Big Ten records for the Gophers in 1972. King erased all the single season rushing marks held by former UM greats Paul Giel, now the school's athletic director, Barry Mayer and Ernie Cook. King became the first UM player to rush for more than 1,000 yards in a single season totaling 1,164 in 11 games. He also set a new high for number of rushes (237), and most gross yards rushed (1,172). In Big Ten play only his school record marks were: 196 rushes, 938 gross yards, 980 net yards. King finished second to Purdue's Otis Armstrong in Conference rushing tables. King

also set new scoring records with 76 points on 12 touchdowns and a pair of two-point conversions.

VEER-T SETS UP
MOST OTHER
GRID RECORDS

Using the new veer-T offense installed by rookie head coach Cal Stoll in 1972, Minnesota's football team rewrote the rushing portion of the school's record book. The Gophers, led by senior QB Bob Morgan, junior FB John King and sophomore RB Doug Beaudoin (boo-DOIN), amassed a new school rushing total of 2,927 yards. The old record was 2,230 set in 1954. The team also set a new average yards rushing per game of 237.0. The biggest single day came against Northwestern when Minnesota set a new school mark for a Big Ten game gaining 478 yards on the ground. Morgan, King and Beaudoin each broke the 100-yard barrier that day as the Gophers won 35-29. Minnesota ended the season 4-7 for all games, and 4-4 in the Conference good for fifth place.
