Minneapolis, MN---For the sports purest who follows University of Minnesota athletic teams, this weekend brings the opportunity for one and all to "OD" on their favorite subject.

Beginning Thursday evening when the Gopher basketball team hosts Wisconsin at Williams Arena, every Gopher winter sports club is in action through Sunday.

Basketball comes back to Williams to meet Illinois at 1 p.m. CST Saturday, with two more events boasting the same starting time.

Across the street from Williams, the Gopher swing team hosts Nebraska in the Cooke Hall Pool while the varsity indoor track intrasquad meet is also set for 1 p.m. in the University Fieldhouse.

At 3:30 following the basketball game, the Gopher gymnastics team meet Wisconsin-Oshkosh on the same surface in Williams.

Add in a pair of WCHA hockey games at 7:30 p.m. Friday and Saturday against powerful Michigan Tech and it should be enough. But there is more.

Members of the Gopher tennis squad will compete in the annual NWPTA tennis championships at Phalen Tennis Club in St. Paul Friday, Saturday and Sunday. The only Gopher squad on the road is Wally Johnson's wrestling team which travels to Madison, WI, to meet the top ranked Badgers on Saturday.

## GOPHER CAGERS FACE TO HOME ASSIGNMENTS THIS WEEK

Two extremely challenging Big Ten Conference basketball assignments, both at Williams Arena, are next in line for Coach Jim Dutcher and his still youthful University of Minnesota cage team.

The Gophers are slated to entertain high-flying Wisconsin in an 8:05 p.m. encounter on Thursday before playing host to an equally strong Illinois contingent at 1:05 on Saturday.

It will be another difficult week for Minnesota, but at least Dutcher's squad will have the home court advantage. And after last week's gruelling trek through Michigan, Williams Arena will seem mighty friendly.

Last week Minnesota opened its Big Ten season at Michigan for the third straight year and dropped a disappointing 71-67 decision. The Gophers came back two days later in impressive fashion and stunned Michigan State 93-50 to salvage a split on that demanding journey.

"We have had our troubles over there in recent years," Dutcher admitted, "and while we felt we should have won at Michigan, we'll settle for the split. Losing one game certainly does not take us out of the race."

By dividing those opening-week honors, Minnesota will take an overall record of 8-3 and a Big Ten log of 1-1 into Thursday's game with Wisconsin.

The Badgers, meanwhile, stunned Indiana 52-50 over the weekend and will come into this week's contest at Williams Arena tied for first place in the league standings with a 2-0 mark. They are 10-3 overall.

Illinois, which matched Minnesota's efforts by splitting games last Thursday and Saturday, is 1-1 in the Big Ten and 11-3 on the year. Illinois will play at Purdue on Thursday prior to heading for Minnesota.

Senior Captain Kevin McHale was the "main man" for Minnesota against last week as he scored 14 points against Michigan and 19 against Michigan State. He also had 10 and 11 rebounds respectively in those two assignments and leads the Gophers in both categories with averages of 21.9 points and 9.8 rebounds per game.

Trent Tucker who also had 19 against Michigan State, is second in scoring for the Gophers with a 12.7 average while Mark Hall is right on his heels with a 12.5 average.

But the big surprise for the Minnesota fans last week was the "arrival" of 7-2 freshman Randy Brewer who scored 17 points and garnered 11 rebounds against the Wolverines and then was rewarded

(9.65) took first in the vault, Minnesota's Meeker (9.60) and Price (9.40) grabbed second and third to score more for the Gophers.

The Buckeyes returned the 1-2-3 favor to Gophers in the parallel bars as Goldetsky's 8.35 wasn't enough to place.

Ohio State narrowed the gap and threatened to make it another sweep, but Meeker saved the Gophers by scoring 9.50 in the high bar for third place.

Hairston's 55.10 outdualled two Gophers for the all-around title. Meeker scored 54.30 for second and Price added to a 53.70 and third place.

Minnesota, four-time Big Ten gym champ, raised its record to 2-1 in dual meet competition. The Buckeyes, on the other hand, fell to 0-2. OSU had been one on the preseason picks to challenge the Gophers.

Next on the agenda for the Einsteins -- er, Gophers is a home meet with Division II powerhouse Wisconsin-Oshkosh, 3:30, Saturday, January 12 in Williams Arena.

### GYMNASTS TO OPEN NEW PRACTICE FACILITY

Fred Roethlisberger, head gymnastics coach at the University of Minnesota, has a big day on tap Saturday.

First Roethlisberger will lead his U of M gymnasts through a dual meet against UW Wisconsin at Williams Arena. That event will get underway at 3:30 p.m., right after the Gopher basketball clash against Illinois.

Then Roethlisberger will join U of M Athletic Director Paul Giel at the official "ribbon cutting" ceremonies for the Gophers' newly refurbished practice and training facility in Cooke Hall.

"We really are pleased with our new addition," Roethlisberger beams. "It has to rank with the best facilities in the country. We look forward to the official opening on Saturday."

Roethlisberger points out that the public is invited to visit the new site and take part in the ceremonies this weekend.

## ICERS HOST MICHIGAN TECH

Minneapolis, MN---After splitting two at home against Notre Dame last weekend, the Gopher hockey team this weekend plays host to red-hot Michigan Tech at Williams Arena. Both games boast a 7:30 p.m. CST starting time.

Minnesota remained at .500 in the WCHA wars after the N.D. split. The Gophers came from a 5-2 deficit to win 6-5 in overtime Friday on Tim Harrer's goal at 4:30 of the extra period, but the Irish roared back to win 6-3 Saturday.

"Notre Dame showed me why they were picked second in the pre-season polls," Gopher coach Brad Buetow said Monday. "They could have folded after our comeback win Friday, but they outplayed us in every category Saturday. Coach Lefty Smith has a good, big, strong club. They'll be tough to stop now."

And Buetow echoed the same comments about Michigan Tech. The Huskies, under the dean of WCHA coaches, John MacInnes, field the same kind of big, strong, fast skating aggregation. But, then, that's not unusual for Tech.

"Michigan Tech is coming off a great great tournament series at Detroit where they won the Greak Lakes Invitational before more than 30,000 over two nights," Buetow adds. "Then they had last weekend off, so they will be coming in here fresh."

"Tech has always been known as a strong second half team. We expect they have high hopes of improving their fourth place WCHA record of 6-5-1. It should be another great series between our schools."

MacInnes can't reach a milestone here, but he can close the gap on his 500th career win at MTU. Now in his 24th year there, MacInnes' record stands at 497 wins against 256 losses and 34 ties making him the winningest active coach in the WCHA.

One thing Buetow hopes for is something that happened to Notre Dame coach Smith last weekend. A healthy squad. One player, alternate captain Steve Ulseth, returned to duty for the Gophers against N.D., but several are still out.

"Both our senior captain Don Micheletti and sophomore defenseman Brian Zins have been skating for a week now, but it is highly doubtful either will play against Michigan Tech," Buetow says. "Hopefully both this pair, plus freshman goalie Paul Butters will be ready for duty next week when we travel to Denver. Butters underwent an appendectomy while in Europe with the U. S. National Junior Team. He has not tanded goal since December 14 at Colorado College."

## RAPPLERS TAKE 10th AT MIDLANDS

Following a third place finish at the Washington University Invitational, Minnesota's wrestlers disposed of Oregon and Oregon State and then impressed a few folks in placing tenth at the Midlands Tournament.

The Gophers finished their swing through the Northwest with wins over Oregon (22-17) and Oregon State (31-18). With a dual meet record of 6-0, Minnesota is ranked sixth in the nation by Amateur Wrestling News.

After Oregon jumped out to a 12-3 lead after the 150 class, the Gophers settled down and stewed the Ducks, permitting Oregon only five points the rest of the match.

Against Oregon State, the scene was set right with the first match. At 118, Minnesota's Brad Huckle earned a forfeit victory and the Gophers were on their way. Pins sparked the win. Dan Zilverberg, ranked first in the nation at 158, got one. He was followed by George Bowman, another ranked wrestler. Bowman is rated fourth at 190.

Between getting ready for the Midlands Tourney and wiping the Northwest clean, Minnesota's reserves found time to finish third in the Huskie Tournament, sponsored by Northern Illinois University.

The Gophers defeated Bowling Green 30-11 before falling to Nebraska 22-16. Minnesota then humbled Illinois State (22-12) and Marquette (25-16).

Wrestling against athletes that would make a Russian arsenal look like a toy store, Minnesota's grapplers came away with a tenth place finish in the Midlands Tournament sponsored by Northwestern University December 29-30.

As far as the NCAA is concerned, though, the Gophers were sixth. Sixth place, that is, among universities that entered with the jillions of clubs and other teams.

Iowa won going away with 87 1/4, besting arch-rival Hawkeye Wrestling Club which had 71 3/4. Wisconsin (61 1/2), Sunkist Kids (60), Iowa State (50 3/4), New York Athletic Club (46 1/2), Oklahoma (44), Oklahoma State (40), Cyclone Wrestling Club (33) and Minnesota (30 1/4) rounded out the total top ten. A record crowd of 5,138 watched the finals.

Minnesota's top man at 118, Brad Huckle, lost in the semi-finals to ex-Gopher and defending and future champ Mike McArthur 6-0. McArthur is also the all-time Midlands win leader with 28.

Gary Lefebvre of the Gophers made the quarter finals before losing to Mark Mangianti of the Sunkist Kids. Mangianti squeezed Lefebvre 7-3.

Gopher fortunes took a bad turn at 142, when usual big point man Jim Martinez lost in the second round to Bill Walsh of Cleveland State 3-2. It's about time Cleveland did something right, but too bad it happened to Minnesota.

As they say, strange things will happen when hell freezes. The word is that Satan just ordered a fur coat because Dan Zilverberg finally lost his first match of the season. Zilverberg, entering the Midlands with a 24-0 record, lost to Oklahoma's Dave Schultz in the semi-finals 4-3. Schultz's win erased the chance for the long awaited "dream match" of the country's two top ranked wrestlers. Wade Schalles, an Olympic hopeful is rated first over everybody and Zilverberg is the top collegian. Well, until he met Dave Schultz in a dark alley. Zilverberg then beat Mike Terry of Wisconsin 6-0 to capture third place.

George Bowman of the Gophers made a stab at the 190 title but fell short, losing in the quarterfinals to Willie Gadson of the Cyclone Wrestling Club 13-3.

## GYMNASTS STAVE-OFF BUCKEYES

Forever let it be said that gymnastics is a thinking man's sport. At least UM head gymnastics coach Fred Roethlisberger will tell you that after the Gophers held-off Ohio State 266.00 to 263.25 Saturday in Williams Arena.

"We have the gears going mentally," said Roethlisberger. "We had the intensity and concentration to do well."

Reid Goldetsky (9.50) and Brian Meeker (9.25) sandwiched around OSU's Randy Hairston (9.45) to give Minnesota an early lead after the floor exercise. The Buckeyes' Mike Schanberger nipped UM's Dean Hinitz in the pommel horse. Schanberger's 9.10 was just enough to beat Hinitz' 9.05.

The Gophers made it 1-2-3 in the still rings with specialist Pete Velguth (9.60), Dan Price (9.45) and Goldetsky (9.20) completing the sweep. After Hairston's

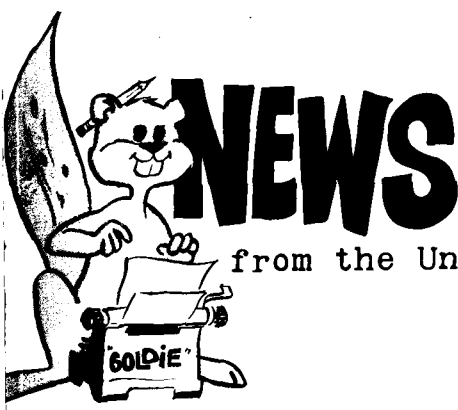

ICERS HOST 2ND PLACE MICHIGAN

Minneapolis, MN---One year ago Minnesota warmly welcomed Michigan to Williams Arena for a WCHA hockey series. The reason. . .Michigan was crippled with injuries which took out its top three scorers, all centers. It meant four points for the Gophers.

But how things can change in one season. Minnesota's guest this weekend is Michigan for 7:30 p.m. CST games Friday and Saturday at Williams Arena. Only this time the Wolverines are flying high and in second place in the WCHA standings.

And they are healthy. Not only are the centers all playing, but several Wolverine skaters are among the WCHA scoring leaders. On top of that freshman goalie Paul Fricker comes in with a 9-3-1 record, including two wins (5-2 and 3-2) over Minnesota.

Michigan is 9-4-1 (.679%) and second only to North Dakota (12-4-0, .750) in the league chase, while the Gophers, by winning twice at Denver last weekend (7-3, 6-4), moved back into third place with an 11-9-0 (.550) WCHA record.

A series sweep by Minnesota this weekend would not move the Gophers ahead of Michigan, but would certainly narrow the gap. Should UM take two, the Gophers would be at 13-9-0 for .591 percent, while Michigan would fall to 9-6-1 and .594 percent. A Michigan sweep would seriously harm any hopes the Gophers hold for a high WCHA finish.

## MINNESOTA CAGERS HOST INDIANA THURSDAY

Another one of those demanding 'split' weekends of basketball....a home game Thursday and a road assignment Saturday, are next in line for Coach Jim Dutcher and his University of Minnesota Golden Gophers.

And just like a week ago, the upcoming shootouts loom as major challenges for the still young but rapidly improving U of M cagers as they get ready to host Indiana at Williams Arena Thursday and then invade Iowa City to take on the Iowa Hawkeyes Saturday. Tip-offs are 8:05 p.m. and 3:05 respectively.

'We're playing pretty well,' Coach Dutcher concedes, 'but we'll have to continue to do so....maybe play even better, if we hope to remain in the Big Ten Conference race.'

The Gophers will go into Thursday's confrontation with the Hoosiers sporting an overall record of 11-4 and a Big Ten log of 4-2. Indiana shows identical ranking, and those two rivals are tied for second (along with Purdue) in the Big Ten standings.

Minnesota upped its stock with a strong showing last week even though it had to settle for a division of honors. First the Gophers fell 75-70 in overtime at Ohio State. But Saturday afternoon in a televised Big Ten game of the week, Minnesota bounced back to edge powerful Purdue 67-61 at Williams Arena.

'We had our chances to win at Ohio State,' Dutcher admitted. 'In fact we blew a 12-point lead against the Buckeyes. I was concerned how we would react after that heartbreaking loss....concerned about whether our young players would be able to come back against Purdue. But they responded very well, and we had a super team effort in beating the Boilermakers.'

Senior Captain Kevin McHale was limited to only 10 points in that win over the Boilers, but he still was credited with an outstanding effort as he registered seven rebounds to lead Minnesota in that department, and he added five blocked shots.

Trent Tucker was the top scorer against Purdue with 19 while Mark Hall had 12 and Randy Breuer chipped in with 10. Breuer also had five rebounds as the Gophers edged Purdue 27-26 in that critical department.

'Now we'll just have to keep things going,' Dutcher emphasized. 'It will take a great effort on our part to beat Indiana Thursday, and an even better effort to win at Iowa City. The Hawkeyes have been playing without their fine guard, Ronnie Lester, but he saw a little action over the weekend and should be ready for us. It will give them a big lift.'

A year ago Minnesota split with Indiana, winning at Williams Arena 60-63 but losing at Bloomington 71-46. Indiana leads the series 55-45. Iowa won twice from the Gophers last season....97-71 at Minnesota and 31-64 at Iowa City. The Gophers are ahead in that series 72-54.

In another week the Gophers will be starting their second half of the 1980 Big Ten season, and they hope to still be in the title chase. The Indiana and Iowa clashes will tell a lot.

#### BUETOW ON DU SERIES

"I'm not certain if I can fully measure it, but those two road wins at Denver last weekend may be the biggest thing that's happened to us all year," says Minnesota coach Brad Buetow.

"Those are only our second and third road wins all season. That alone should point out the importance of the victories. And they didn't come easy. It was a very physical series, and let me say that when Denver regains the services of their top goal tender, they are going to be a factor in the WCHA race. We feel very fortunate to get four points out there.

"I honestly believe our depth wore Denver down. For the first time this season, because of so many injuries, we were able to skate four full lines. In the long run that made the difference. Combined with crack goal tending by Jim Jetland, it kept us fresh and in command.

"The return of our captain, Don Micheletti, didn't hurt us, either. It was great to see him back on the ice. His play was surprisingly good considering he had missed our last 11 games. And when his full conditioning returns, Donny will be even that much better.

"As for Michigan, well, they are really flying. Coach Dan Farrell has his team playing excellent hockey. They feature the best trio of centers in the WCHA with Dan Lerg, Murray Eaves and Bruno Baseotto (bah-SOTT-oh).

"And that goalie (Paul) Fricker, man, his performance down there against us was the best I have seen. He stole both games from us. Our men peppered him with an incredible array of shots, but he turned us away. When he is hot he is simply amazing. I hope we have better luck this time."

#### HARRER ATOP WCHA

Senior right wing Tim Harrer picked up five points at Denver to retain his slim edge in the WCHA scoring race. Harrer now has 41 points on 24 goals and 17 assists in 20 league games.

But right behind the Bloomington, MN, ace is Michigan's Murray Eaves with 40 points and North Dakota's Mark Taylor with 39. Gopher freshman center Aaron Broten is fourth with 35 points (12-23-35).

#### HARRER ON OLYMPIC TRIP

This marks a busy week for Harrer. On Monday he played with the U. S. Olympic Team in Milwaukee, WI, and on Tuesday with the same club at Madison vs. the University of Wisconsin. Harrer was invited for this look-see by his former boss, coach Herb Brooks, the Olympic coach this season. However, Harrer will be back in his Gopher uniform for the Michigan series this weekend.

Should Harrer receive an invitation to join the Olympians, his decision whether to stay with the Gophers or go to Lake Placid must be made by early next week.

Last weekend, the Gophers fell the Hawkeyes 21-20 on a controversial match at heavyweight when UM's Jim Becker drew Iowa's Dean Phinney 4-4. Iowa upped their record to 10-1 in duals while the Gophers dropped to 5-2 and 0-2 in the Big Ten.

For the most part, it was business as usual in the Minnesota-Iowa match. Hawkeye superstar Dan Glenn whipped UM's Brad Huckle (113) 7-3, while Gopher stud Gary Lefebvre (126) decisioned Iowa's Tim Riley 11-10. At 134 Dalen Wasmund of Minnesota and Jeff Kerber of Iowa had a staredown for a 1-1 draw. Jim Martinez of the Gophers had a little trouble before finally putting down Lenny Zalesky (142) 13-6.

King Mueller ruled over Steve Martinez at 150 and a 13-3 win for Iowa. There was no surprise at 158 as Dan Zilverberg of the Gophers raised his record to 23-1 with a 12-0 win over Mark Stevenson.

Iowa took a 14-13 lead in team totals when Doug Anderson decisioned Jim Trudeau (167) 17-5. Ed Banach bombed Minnesota's Mark Miller 22-7 at 177, but then George Bowman returned the favor to Iowa by shelling Pete Bush (190) 21-2. It all came down to the heavyweight match between Beck and Phinney, with Iowa holding a slim 19-13 lead. The draw gave both teams two points and a 21-10 decision to the Hawkeyes.

Noyce added that the all-important ranking of number 1 conference singles player will come of the meet for the NCAA championships May 19-26 at Georgia.

Following the tourney, the Gophers will play in the Arden Hills Winter Open in St. Paul, MN. Minnesota will start its dual play March 16 when the Gophers travel to Clemson.

Steve Martinez (150) was drubbed by Wisconsin's Andy Rein 28-9. Rein, the "grizzled veteran" of the Badgers, would have had a better time at a practice session. Dan Zilverberg increased his grip on the title of "Captain Wonderful" with a 12-0 win over the Badgers' Mike Terry. Zilverberg's record now stands at 27-1, his best at this date for his career.

Minnesota was brought back to earth when Jim Trudeau (167) lost a tough one to Dave Evans 6-3. Wisconsin atoned for Terry's one-sided loss when Jim Kleinhans scalped UM's Mark Miller (177) with a 16-0 score. George Bowman (190) was tagged with two penalty points and had to settle with a 2-2 draw with UW's Mitch Hull. The day wasn't a total loss, though, as Jim Becker (HWT) decisioned UW's Mike Euker 7-1.

"Our kids did a real terrific job," said UM coach Wally Johnson. "But we kinda got the green banana."

Next meet for the Gophers is at 7:30, Saturday, January 19 in Williams Arena when number one-ranked Iowa invades Gold Country. The Hawkeyes recently won the Midlands Wrestling Tournament and then came from behind to beat arch-rival Iowa State.

One scheduling change for the Gophers: the February 4 meet with Iowa State, being billed as the Minnesota "wrestling showcase special," has been moved back to 2 p.m., Sunday, February 3 in Williams Arena. Advance tickets are available.

## GOPHERS INVADE OHIO STATE ON THURSDAY

Minnesota had just won its second Big Ten Basketball assignment in three days. In fact the Gophers had posted their third straight conference victory, but Coach Jim Dutcher wasn't afforded the luxury of savoring that happy moment very long.

"All we have to do now is go to Ohio State," Dutcher moaned. "Actually we have to play the three teams regarded as the best in the Big Ten in our next three assignments. It just gets tougher and tougher."

Dutcher was looking ahead to what was in store for his youthful University of Minnesota basketball team after it had nudged Wisconsin 82-76 in overtime and raced past Illinois 79-75 this past weekend.

First the Gophers journey to Columbus, Ohio, to take on the first place Buckeyes in an 8:05 p.m. encounter Thursday. Then Minnesota returns home to entertain Purdue at 12:35 p.m. on Saturday. And all of that before Indiana invades Williams Arena one week from Thursday.

"We need to win at least two of these next three to remain in the race," Dutcher maintains, "and that will be difficult. We'll have to play our best ball of the season to win at Ohio State. The Bucks may have the best team in the country right now, and they are flying high."

Ohio State will put a lofty 4-0 league mark and an overall record of 11-1 on the line in Thursday's confrontation. The Gophers, meanwhile, thanks to their three-game streak, will risk a 3-1 Big Ten log and overall record of 10-3 in that duel.

Purdue, another Gopher opponent ranked among the nation's best, came into this week's competition with an overall record of 10-3 and was tied for second in the loop standings with the Gophers at 3-1. The Boilermakers are slated to host Northwestern Thursday night before coming into Williams Arena Saturday afternoon.

A year ago both Ohio State and Purdue swept their two-game shootouts with Minnesota. The Buckeyes won at Columbus 83-80 and 74-68 in Minneapolis. Purdue won at home 80-56 and 64-61 in Minneapolis.

Over the years, Ohio State had built up a commanding 47-34 edge in its series with Minnesota while the Gophers currently hold a slim 56-55 edge in their series with the Boilermakers.

Minnesota posted its two home court wins last week with some of its most gummy play of the year. Against Wisconsin, the Gophers trailed by nine points late in the second half but came back to tie the contest 70-70 before copping the decision in overtime. Against Illinois, Minnesota was never headed but had to fight off a brilliant shooting night by the Illini (67 percent) to gain the verdict.

Senior forward and captain Kevin McHale continues to lead Minnesota in scoring and rebounding with averages of 22.5 and 9.8 respectively. Mark Hall is second in scoring with a 13.4 average while Trent Tucker is right on his heels with a 12.5 mark. Both are guards.

Expected to join those three Gophers in the starting lineup at Ohio State Thursday are Gary Holmes at center and Zebedee Howell at forward. --UM--

"I have to be awfully pleased with the way our men bounced back Saturday to win against Michigan," Gopher hockey coach Brad Buetow said Monday. "We were taken out of Friday's game even though we didn't play all that badly, at least not as bad as that 7-3 score would indicate. Michigan proved opportunist.

But Saturday's performance was a positive affair for us. Probably the catalyst was the return of freshman Paul Butters (Rochester) in goal. He had an outstanding game and stopped three breakaways. The fact that we scored some goals for him didn't hurt, either.

"But I believe our overall performance at both ends of the rink was better than recent series. The fact that Michigan's goal tender, freshman Paul Fricker, was again unreal had something to do with the series, too.

"When we played at Ann Arbor earlier, he personally won both games which were mighty tight affairs (2-5, 2-3). This past weekend he came up with 89 stops in the two games. He must love to play against Minnesota.

"As for this weekend, I'm really concerned. We're fighting to remain in the first division, and to stay among the leaders you have to win on the road.

"Granted, we won a pair two weeks ago at Denver, but they are in last place. But Michigan State is playing better and better, and meeting them at East Lansing is going to be tough.

"I believed all along they would find themselves sooner or later, and it appears now that State is beginning to make its move. Heck, they have won eight league games, only four less than ourselves.

"Don't think for a minute they are not looking ahead to gaining a better position for the playoffs. Michigan State, like ourselves, has been suffering through goalie injuries but appear to have that solved by now.

"Our position looks better in this area, too. Jim Jetland has been carrying the whole load recently. But last Saturday when Butters returned to action, it seemed he gave everyone a lift. I imagine at this time he'll be in the nets Friday at MSU. We'll decide who plays Saturday on Saturday."

The Gopher grapplers prepped-up for the Iowa State dual this Sunday with two dual meet wins. Minnesota's dual record stands at 7-2 following a 33-10 win over Northern Michigan and a record-setting 44-3 pinning of Drake.

Before the Gophers get to worry too much about Iowa State, though, they must do something about Michigan. The Wolverines invade Gold Country this Saturday, (7:30, Wayzata High School), and UI coach Wally Johnson isn't about to let his team look past them.

"Michigan is a mixture of young players and veterans," said Johnson. "They beat Penn State, they're a good wrestling team and we'll have to hustle to beat 'em."

Alright, fine -- but how about this Iowa State team that comes to Williams Arena Sunday for a 2 p.m. date with Minnesota?

"Iowa State is coming on like a bunch of gangbusters," said Johnson. "They are ranked second in the nation right now but they might be No. 1 -- they are really coming along."

The Cyclones lost a tough one to No. 1-rated Iowa earlier in the year for one of their two losses in duals, the other being to Cal-Poly. Not too shabby for a team that only recently has had their starting lineup together at one time.

"Now that they are full strength, they'll be plenty tough," said Johnson.

"They'll be harder to score against than Iowa and we'll just have to get tougher with them. It'll be interesting to see."

Last weekend saw the Gophers dispose of Northern Michigan 33-10. Minnesota had a 17-0 lead before NU could score and only that was when Johnson brought up JVer Dave Henry to grapple at 150. Henry suffered a 9-0 lashing from NU ace Steve Spangenberg. Other than that, it was business as usual with Brad Huckle (113), Gary Lefebvre (126), Dalen Wasmund (134), Jim Martinez (142), Dan Zilverberg (153), Jim Trudeau (167) and George Bowman (190) earned their usual wins.

Minnesota's seventh win came against Drake and it was the job of the UI reserves that earned the special attention in a 44-3 win. The Gophers had four straight pins (Wasmund, Ross Redman at 142, Steve Martinez at 150 and Zilverberg) to set a school record and then added a fifth (Chuck Vavrosky -- NFE) later in the match.

Something not so close was UI's swamping of Northwestern. Ericksen swam people in "odd events" and people like Brian Mortensen swam to a personal best of 1:47.3 in the 200-yd freestyle, as did Scott Halm with a 1:55.3 in the 200-yd breaststroke.

Roethlisberger hopes that Goldetsky and his sprained wrist will be well again for this Friday's 8 p.m. date with Iowa in Williams Arena.

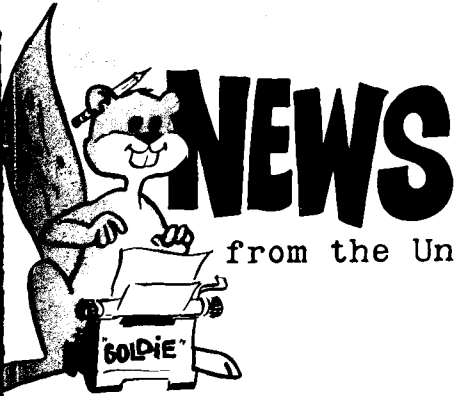
"Iowa is a much improved team that'll score in the mid-50's," said Roethlisberger. "It'll be a good meet."

Minneapolis, MN---Minnesota takes its traveling hockey show back on the WCHA road this weekend when the Gophers play at Wisconsin Friday and Saturday evenings.

After splitting at Michigan State (6-7, 7-1) last weekend, Minnesota remains in fourth place with a league record of 13-11-0. Overall rookie coach Brad Buetow's charges are 17-11-0.

"It almost seems as if no one wants to take command and run away with this year's title," Buetow said after the series at MSU. "Split series seem to be the key this year. At the same time the leaders are finding troubles on the road just like everyone else.

"I can see where Michigan Tech could gain a tie and a win at home against North Dakota during Tech's Winter Carnival series, but all of us were shocked to learn that Michigan dropped two at last place Denver. I'm certain that being forced to play without center Murray Eaves hurt Michigan in that series. I'm told he has mononucleosis.

"I mention the above only to make a solid point for Minnesota. We can't worry about what the other teams are doing. We've got to be concerned only with our own games.

"As I look at our remaining schedule, I see we still have series remaining with

the top clubs. We play North Dakota here (February 15-16) and are at Notre Dame (February 29-March 1), the last series before the playoffs.

"Then there is this weekend. Both Wisconsin and ourselves are fighting to stay in the race, fighting to gain a first division finish and get home ice for the playoffs. Wisconsin is 11-11-0 and primed to make a run for fourth place, our spot. It's up to no one but us to hang on to what we've earned. And it will not be easy. Remember, they just split a pair on the road at Notre Dame (3-4, 7-5).

"We took two from Wisconsin (6-5, 7-2) back in November, but that doesn't mean a darned thing this week. The Badgers are playing better hockey and are always sky high to beat Minnesota. It should be another great series in our excellent rivalry.

"And in closing, may I offer congratulations to Michigan Tech coach John MacInnes on his 500th career victory. That's a hard accomplishment for me to vision seeing that my career shows just 17 wins."

#### HARRER BACK IN 1ST

By scoring five goals and one assist in the series at Michigan State, senior right wing Tim Harrer of Minnesota has regained the WCHA scoring leadership with 49 points on 30 goals and 19 assists.

On Friday at MSU he scored four goals in the 6-7 loss. It was the second time this season he scored four in one game, and this time all his goals came on power plays. In Saturday's contest he added another goal, also a power play score, and an assist as UM won 7-1.

For all games this season the Bloemington Lincoln high school product has connected for 35 goals and 22 assists giving him 57 points. The goal figure ties him with Dick Daugherty for the 5th highest single season output in Minnesota hockey history. Daugherty got his total in the 1952-53 season. The school record for goals in one campaign is 42 by both Daugherty (1953-54) and John Mayasich (1954-55).

Harrer, called by some the best right wing in college hockey this year, now has 99 career goals and 77 assists for 176 career points. His 99 goals are the third most in UM ice history.

## GOPHERS TO INVADE PURDUE ON THURSDAY

Stunned and reeling, the University of Minnesota basketball team will try to re-group this week when facing another rugged pair of Big Ten Conference assignments.

First the Golden Gophers must travel to Purdue for a 7:30 p.m. encounter with the front-running Boilermakers on Thursday. Then Coach Jim Dutcher's quintet will return home to entertain Northwestern at 8 p.m. Saturday.

Minnesota had hoped to journey to Purdue with a share of the conference lead all tucked away. Instead they will challenge the Boilermakers while hoping to re-gain a share of the top spot after falling to Iowa 73-63 last weekend.

Making that setback especially difficult to accept for the Gophers was the fact that it came at Williams Arena and was Minnesota's first home court loss of the 1979-80 basketball season.

"Iowa wanted it more than we did," Coach Dutcher analyzed. "They outfought us for every rebound and every loose ball. We can't play without intensity again if we want to stay in the title race."

That seems especially true for Minnesota this week as they take on the team which has propelled itself into the league lead since losing to Minnesota in Williams Arena 67-61 a couple of weeks ago.

The Boilermakers knocked off cross-state rival Indiana 56-51 last Saturday and now finds itself perched above all Big Ten squads with a record of 7-3. Purdue is 14-5 overall.

Minnesota, as a result of that 10-point loss to Iowa (and a 74-64 triumph at Northwestern last Thursday) comes into this week's action with an overall mark of 13-6 and Big Ten record of 6-4 good enough for a tie with Indiana and Ohio State for second place in the standings.

"It still boils down to a team making a run for it," Dutcher maintains. "The team that can put a few wins together can move out in front. That will take the ability to win on the road, so if we want to stay in contention, we will have to win away from home."

But to win at Purdue, Minnesota will have to turn around a few things which proved to be troublesome against Iowa. For example, senior Captain Kevin McHale scored only four points. It wasn't all his fault, however, since he got only three shots in the second half as the Hawkeye defense callapsed around him.

More significant may have been the fact that Minnesota's starting guards did not register an assist, (The Gophers only had a total of four all night) and Darryl Mitchell's two assists were the only ones registered by a member of Minnesota's backcourt delegation in the entire contest.

"We've got to play like a team again if we hope to win," Dutcher stressed. "But we have shown in the past that we can do it. We're not out of it. We're still in second place. A couple of wins and we could be back on top."

Gopher fans hope those "couple" can come this week at Purdue Thursday and at home against Northwestern Saturday.

### GRAPPLERS FALL TO IOWA STATE

Both Iowa State and Minnesota earned their salt Sunday, showing 9,225 fans in Williams Arena what national wrestling powerhouses look like.

The Cyclones took a 19-18 decision over the Gophers in Minnesota's first "Wrestling Showcase." Normally averaging about 400 fans per meet, through a lot of hype, the Gophers drew astoundingly well.

The big question now is if Minnesota can bring the fans back next weekend when Northwestern comes to town for a dual with the Gophers, who are 8-3 on the year. The Wildcats, unlike the rest of their NU sports counterparts, are a quality team with good wrestlers at 118, 150, 177, 190 and heavyweight.

Although there was so much promotion about the "showcase," the Gophers didn't look past Michigan Saturday night. Minnesota prevailed 25-13. The Wolverines were rated 18th nationally entering the bout with the Gophers.

Minnesota had the Cyclones on the ropes in the early part of the meet and had a 9-0 lead thanks to wins at 118 (Brad Huckle) and 126 (Gary Lefebvre -- a pin of Steve Carr at 7:23).

After Dalen Wasmund was decisioned by ISU's Jim Gibbons 7-2, Jim Martinez (142) got the Gophers back on the track. Steve Martinez swallowed a 20-1 decision and ISU was back in the thick of things at 12-8. Dan Zilverberg (158) raised his season record to 32-1 with a win, but Jim Trudeau (167), Mark Luby (177) and usually-consistent George Bowman (190) suffered losses. Jim Becker swamped John Forshee 6-2 at heavyweight, but the three-point decision wasn't enough as the Gophers fell short at 19-18. Minnesota lost by a similar score, 21-20, to Iowa earlier in the season.

### TRACKERS STEAL THE SHOW

Minnesota's men indoor track team stole the show at the Northwest Open Saturday in the Field House, earning six firsts, two seconds, four thirds and a fourth-place finish. Terry Haythe ran to two of the firsts, one in the 60-yard dash and the other in the 300-yard dash.

Larry Berkner won the 1000-yd run in 2:13.99, Haythe's 60-yd time was :06.61 and his 300-yd time was :31.74. Don Hurley had a personal best of 8:58.69 in the two-mile to win. John Idstrom captured the three-mile in 13:52.58. Tim Doolin won the long jump with a leap of 22-9½ and came in second in the triple jump with 46-2½.

This weekend, the Gophers will travel to the Husker Invitational at Nebraska. The meet will feature most of the top ranked teams in the country.

### GYMNASTS EARN BIG TEN WIN

Iowa isn't exactly the strongest gymnastics team in the country, but the Hawks did put on a good show of it before falling to Minnesota Friday night 269.45 - 249.25 in Williams Arena.

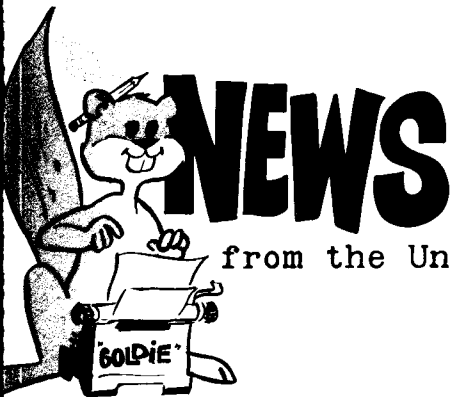
It was the final home meet of the year for the Gophers, who will travel to Northern Illinois this Saturday and then to No. 1-rated Iowa State February 16. The Cyclones have defeated the Gophers already, handing Minnesota one of its two losses.

Out of 21 placers total, Iowa had only four placers as the Gophers turned in a better than average performance.

Brian Meeker won the floor exercise, scoring 9.60 in the absence of Reid Goldetsky who is still nursing a bad wrist and was limited to three events Friday.

Tom Anderson won pommel horse with 9.05, Pete Velguth won his specialty, the rings with 9.45. But that wasn't before Brian Meeker was stunned after one of the rings broke in mid-routine and Meeker was saved only by the layers of padding on the floor.

Iowa's Chuck Graham won the parallel bars with 9.55 and Meeker showed he isn't a timid soul by winning the high bar with 9.65 and then capturing the all around with 55.60. He was followed by Dan Price, who is finally back from an arm injury, and Joe Wickert as the Gophers swept through the all around.

Coach Jim Dutcher's quintet opens a challenging two-week span by entertaining talented Ohio State at Williams Arena Thursday night. Tip-off is 8:05 p.m. Then the Gophers hit the road...to play at Indiana Saturday, at Illinois next Thursday and at Wisconsin a week from Saturday.

"If we can get through that stretch in decent shape," Dutcher maintains, "we'll be in contention for the title and a post season tournament. It's going to be very difficult for us, but it has been that kind of season."

Minnesota comes into this week's competition with an overall record of 14-7. In the Big Ten, the Gophers stand at 7-5 and are deadlocked with Iowa and Indiana for third place in the standings.

"Only one game separates the top seven teams in those standings," Dutcher points out. "It looks like a team could still get a share of the championship with six losses. That means that for us to get a part of the title, we could only lose one more time. It won't be easy, but we'll have a shot at it."

Last week Minnesota split honors, losing a heartbreaking 58-56 decision at Purdue on Thursday but then coming back to whip Northwestern 72-55 in Williams Arena on Saturday.

Captain Kevin McHale broke out of his scoring slump with 16 points while

Andy Thompson drew his first starting assignment of his collegiate career and responded with 10 points.

"It was good to see Kevin back in the groove," Dutcher admitted, "and we were especially pleased with Andy's contributions. He was four-for-four from the field, two-for-two from the free throw line and most important did not have a turnover. That makes for a pretty good first-time effort."

Thursday's contest will mark the second time this season that the Gophers have faced the Buckeyes. Three weeks ago these two teams squared off in Columbus and Ohio State prevailed 75-70 in overtime.

#### ICERS HOST N. DAKOTA

Minneapolis, MN--It was primarily the Tim Herrer show last weekend at Madison, WI, that led the Minnesota hockey Gophers back to third place in the WCHA with a 6-4 and 7-6 sweep of the Badgers. He scored a hat trick each night.

But having Herrer and linemate Aaron Broten released from any worries about making the U. S. Olympic squad and concentrating only on Gopher hockey may not be enough this weekend. Minnesota undergoes the ultimate trial at home when the Gophers host first place North Dakota in a WCHA series Friday and Saturday at Williams Arena. Both games start at 7:30 p.m. CST.

Minnesota raised its WCHA record to 15-11-0 and are 19-11-0 overall. But the torrid Sioux sit atop the league standings, a place they have held almost the entire season, with a 15-6-1 mark following a home sweep of Denver.

Not only is North Dakota the defending WCHA champion as it clinched possession of the MacNaughton Cup at Williams Arena in the final game last season, but the Sioux also owe the Gophers a big one.

It was the Gophers and Sioux who met in the NCAA championship final at Detroit last March, only this time Minnesota won 4-3 for the national crown.

"You've got to give a great deal of credit to North Dakota coach Gino Gasparini," says Gopher ice boss Brad Buetow. "He won the league title in his rookie year, and is running solid at the top again this season.

When North Dakota is on, they can be awesome. Having lost only six games at this stage of the season is quite an accomplishment. I have to take my hat off to them, but at the same time let everybody know we are not about to bow down and just give token opposition this weekend.

"A lot of strange things have happened to the league standings the last few weeks. But I'm trying hard to impress upon my men that we can't sit and worry about how the other teams are doing.

"Every WCHA squad is charging hard right now to gain the best possible position for the playoffs. So we can't worry about anyone else. We must simply do what we have to do ourselves.

In five games against Big Ten opposition, Harrer has connected for 13 goals and two assists for 15 points. He scored four power play goals a week ago in one outing at Michigan State, and then connected for back to back hat tricks at Wisconsin last weekend.

A couple of weeks ago it was believed Harrer would be invited to join the U. S. Hockey Team for the 1980 Winter Olympics at Lake Placid, NY. He played four exhibition games with the national squad, but the decision to keep the Olympic Team intact brought plenty of smiles from Gopher followers.

Harrer has now accounted for 41 of Minnesota's 180 goals this season, which is just short of 25 percent of the team's output. That figure, 41, is only one shy of the school record 42 goals in a single season scored by All-American John Mayasich in 1952-53, and duplicated by linemate Dick Dougherty in 1953-54.

Harrer also maintained his lead atop the WCHA scoring race over the weekend. He now has 36 goals and 20 assists for 56 league points, but is only a few points ahead of crack North Dakota forward Mark Taylor who visits Harrer and Co. this weekend. Harrer's career totals now read 105 goals and 78 assists in 146 games for 183 points. He is listed third in the all-time UM career records for goals and total points. His all-games figures this year read 41-23-64.

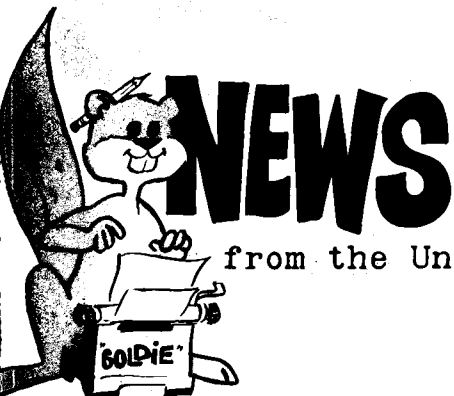

Minneapolis, MN---After dropping a pair to the league leading North Dakota Sioux (3-5, 2-6) at home last weekend, the Minnesota Hockey Gophers prepare to host another red-hot club this weekend in their final regular season home series.

Minnesota's neighbor to the north, the University of Minnesota-Duluth Bulldogs, invade Williams Friday and Saturday for 7:30 p.m. games. The Bulldogs are hot off a pair of WCHA sweeps: two weeks ago on the road at Notre Dame and last weekend at home against Wisconsin. UMD has worked its way into sixth place in the WCHA standings with a 14-15-0 record. The Gophers are 15-13-0 and still third.

Earlier this season the Gophers and Bulldogs split in a pair at Duluth. Minnesota took the opener 5-4 with captain Don Micheletti getting the game winner. UMD bounced back to win the second match 6-3.

"Minnesota-Duluth is working its tail off to gain its best possible position for the playoffs, so we are catching another tiger by the tail this weekend," Gopher coach Brad Buetow says.

"Last weekend we were beaten soundly by the best. North Dakota is in a class by itself. The title is already conceded to them. Now it's up to us to finish the season strong and get home ice for the playoffs.

"We have no one to lean on. We must do it ourselves. After this weekend we play two more games at Notre Dame. It's not an easy task, but then, I've asked our players to do the impossible most of the season."

Four Gopher seniors will be introduced and given special honors prior to Saturday's contest. Included are captain Don Micheletti, alternate-captain Tim Harrer, plus Peter Hayek and Joim Meredith. Each will be making his final regular season appearance in Williams Arena with the Minnesota Gophers.

## GOPHER CAGERS FACE TWO MORE ROAD ASSIGNMENTS THIS WEEK

After invading Indiana last weekend, Minnesota's Golden Gophers now face two more rugged road assignments this week as the 1980 Big Ten Conference season draws to an end.

First Coach Jim Dutcher's contingent must journey to Illinois for a 7:05 p.m. encounter against the Illini on Thursday. Then Minnesota moves over to Wisconsin to take on the Badgers at 1:35 p.m. Saturday.

"Both will be big games for us," Coach Dutcher admits, "and both will be very difficult. I have felt all along that six losses could get a share of the title this year, but if I'm right, that means we have to win our final four."

Minnesota comes into this week's action with a Big Ten mark of 8-6 after splitting honors last week. First the Gophers ripped talented Ohio State 74-70 at Williams Arena, but then they fell at Indiana 67-54 to drop their overall season log to 15-8.

Currently tied with Iowa for fourth place in the Big Ten (there is a three-way deadlock between Purdue, Indiana and Ohio State for the top spot) Minnesota must make a strong move now if it is to remain in contention for either a share of the '80 championship or a post season tournament bid.

"Our two games this week are critical," Dutcher says, "and they come against very good opponents. Illinois may have personnel that is equal to anyone in the league. And they have depth. In fact they have three players who were starters a year ago that now have to come off the bench. We had a tough time winning 79-75 at Williams Arena a month ago, and Illinois is a lot tougher at home."

The Wisconsin game will be just as challenging for the Gophers, Dutcher maintains. "The Badgers have been an up-and-down team this year," he points out, "but when they are up, they are as tough as any team around. They are extremely physical, and they own two wins over Ohio State. You have to be very good to accomplish that."

Minnesota's lineup for this week's action is expected to remain the same, but exactly which cagers start doesn't really become a factor in Coach Dutcher's opinion.

"At this time of year, a team that is in the race normally will use eight or nine players. A team competing for a championship has to have depth. We feel that we fit into that category right now."

Against Illinois, Dutcher will probably open with Andy Thompson and Captain Kevin McHale at the forwards, but Zebadiah Howell also is expected to play extensively. "We've also been using Ben Coleman more lately," Dutcher points out, "and that could be the case this week."

At center, Gary Holmes will get the nod, but again Randy Bruer is expected to see plenty of action. In the backcourt, Mark Hall and Darryl Mitchell probably will start, but both Trent Tucker and Carl Dale also will be available.

It's not so bad that a team gets psyched for a big meet, but why must they get always more psyched-up for the Gophers? Ask Iowa State, the No. 1-ranked team in the country.

The Cyclones handed Minnesota a 279.45-263.40 defeat. But the thing is that of ISU's two highest scores of the season, both of them have come against Minnesota.

According to UM coach Fred Roethlisberger, the only redeeming soul on the Gophers was Brian Meeker. He took second in the floor exercise, tied for first in the parallel bars with a 9.35, earned a third in the high bar and then captured second in the all around with 55.35.

Although Minnesota will have the next three weeks off from competition, Roethlisberger and his crew won't have any such holiday. The Big Ten Championships are in Indiana March 7-8.

"It'll take some effort to get some confidence back," said Roethlisberger.

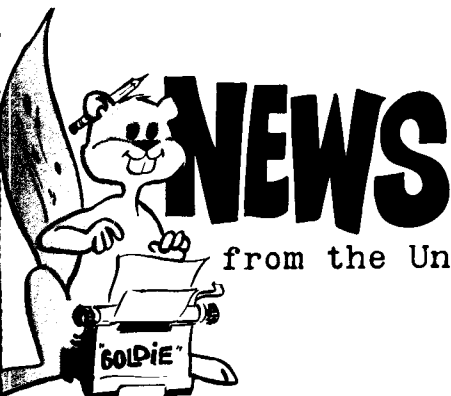

#### GOPHER CAGERS WIND UP SEASON WITH TWO HOME ASSIGNMENTS

With their backs pressed firmly to the wall, the University of Minnesota basketball team returns to friendly Williams Arena this week for two crucial Big Ten Conference assignments.

First Coach Jim Dutcher's squad will entertain Michigan State on Thursday. Then on Saturday the Gophers will end regular season play by hosting the University of Michigan. Both games show 8:05 p.m. starts.

The Gophers hope to snap a three-game losing streak in Thursday night's confrontation against Michigan State. After stunning Ohio State 74-70 at home two weeks ago, Minnesota went on the road nursing hopes for a share of the 1980 Big Ten championship.

Disaster hit the youthful Gophers, however, as they were downed 67-54 at Indiana, 60-53 in overtime at Illinois and then fell apart in a 70-55 shelling at Wisconsin last Saturday afternoon.

Now Minnesota stands 15-10 on the season and 3-3 in the Big Ten. And the Gophers are in a three-way tie with Michigan and Iowa for fourth place in the loop standings.

"We still have a chance for a post season tournament bid," Dutcher maintains, "but we have to win our final two games. The overtime loss at Illinois hurt us badly....both mentally and physically....and we were not able to bounce back from that loss when we had to go in to Wisconsin two days later."

Will the Gophers be able to "bounce back" this week against Michigan and Michigan State? "We'll just have to wait and see," Dutcher says. "A post season

bid is there for the taking. Hopefully we will want it badly enough to get it."

On the season, Michigan State stands at 11-14. The Spartans are in ninth place in the Big Ten standings with a 6-10 log....a far cry from a year ago when Michigan State won both the Big Ten and NCAA championships.

Earlier this year Minnesota downed the Spartans 93-00 in East Lansing. It was one of the Gophers' two road wins this year, and it was a strange kind of contest. Minnesota exploded for a 40-15 lead at the half, only to see the host club score 65 points after the intermission to make the game anything but a rout.

Michigan came into the final week of the Big Ten season looking a great deal like the Gophers. The Wolverines have been up and down. They were 15-10. And they were tied with the Hawks and Minnesota for fourth place at 0-3. Michigan nudged Dutcher's club 71-67 in the conference opener at Ann Arbor early in January.

This week marks the end of regular season play in Williams Arena, and it also brings to a close the regular season career of senior captain Kevin McHale. The 6-11 forward will go into the Michigan State contest with 1,599 career points and 397 rebounds. He's second on the all-time scoring list behind Mychal Thompson who had 1,992.

#### TRACKERS SET BESTS AT ILLINOIS

Seeing as the Big Ten championships are only a week away, Minnesota's indoor track team didn't hold off Saturday at the Illinois Invitational and take a break.

The Gophers set eight new personal bests in the non-scoring meet. Mike Gebeke led off the parade by setting a freshman and personal record by running 2:11.2 in the 1000, good enough for a sixth-place finish out of 35 runners. Minnesota qualified a miler in Tom Polisenio for the NCAA finals as Polisenio ran 4:05.89, another team and personal record. Polisenio finished fifth. Larry Berkner ran 4:03.78 for another personal best in the mile.

Minnesota's two-mile relay team finished seventh and chopped four seconds off the varsity record. With a time of 7:36.46, the team of Gebeke, Mike Warre, Colby Verdegan and Berkner just barely missed qualifying for the NCAA's. Qualifying time in the two-mile relay is 7:33.

Don Hurley ran to a personal best in the two-mile run at 8:55.73, and finished sixth from 41 runners. Former Gopher Steve Plasencia won the race at 8:47.11. Plasencia, running unattached, also qualified for the NCAA.

Ike Okolue ran to a time of 1:11.21 in the 600 and finished fifth along with a personal record and varsity record. Okolue only topped that by running a :49.77 in the 440 for another personal and Minnesota record.

Yet another personal recorder was Verdegan, who ran a 2:13.3 in the 1000. Terry Haythe also set a personal record, setting a third-best for Minnesota in the 440 with a :51.03.

GOPHERS SIGN 24 FOOTBALL PROSPECTS

Twenty-four prospective student-athletes signed national letters of intent to play football at the University of Minnesota last week, and Coach Joe Salem is expected to ink a half-dozen more before this year's recruiting draws to an end.

Recruiting Coordinator Jerry Fishbain termed it a good recruiting year. "We were able to sign some quality players," Fishbain explained, "some people who can play for us right away. We went head-to-head with a lot of powerful schools to get some of these student-athletes, and that means we are headed in the right direction.

Five of the Gold Country hopefuls are community (junior) college transfers, and all five will be in school at Minnesota during the spring quarter...meaning Coach Salem will get a look at them during spring drills.

That delegation includes Wally Kersten, 6-6, 272 pound offensive tackle from Normandale Community College out of Minneapolis Roosevelt High School, and Tim Olson, 6-5, 236 pound defensive lineman from Mesabi Community College and Orr High School.

Other Juco transfers are Eric Peterson, 6-4, 241 offensive guard from Mesa Community College in San Diego, CA, DeWayne Walker, 5-10½, 176 pound defensive back from Pasadena, CA, Community College, and Ron Weckbacker, 5-11, 174 pound wide receiver from Glendale Community College in Burbank, CA.

The Gophers also signed eight candidates who will graduate from Minnesota high schools this spring and three more from Wisconsin which brings the number of "area" products coming to Gold Country to 13.

Topping that list is Jeff Moritko, 6-3½, 235 linebacker from Minneapolis Edison who is classified as a "blue chip athlete" who could help the Gophers as soon as the 1990 season.

Robert Anderson from Fridley Grace and Jim Gallery from Morton also signed with Minnesota. Anderson is a down lineman and Gallery a kicking specialist. Jay Carroll a tight end and defensive end from Winona Cotter, is another state product signing with Minnesota as was defensive lineman David Kuchar of Mora and down lineman Mark Vonderhaar of Hibbing.

Not to be forgotten among the Minnesota products headed for Gopherville is Tim Salem, All-State quarterback from St. Thomas Academy in St. Paul. He's the son of Coach Joe Salem.

Minneapolis, MN---Only one series remains for the Minnesota hockey Gophers, but the outcome of the weekend WCHA pair at Notre Dame is as important as any this season.

Should the Gophers win one more game this week than Michigan, the latter playing home and home against Michigan State, then Minnesota will have pulled off a major coup by finishing second in the final WCHA standings.

Three more WCHA teams are also in the bottle for top positions in the final standings, and all could pass the Gophers would Minnesota falter at Notre Dame.

"Let's face the simple facts, our destiny is still up to ourselves," says Gopher head coach Brad Buetow. "As I have said before, we can't count on anyone else. We have to do it ourselves."

However, Notre Dame is gearing up for a possible last hurrah at home. There are rumors that the school could drop hockey after this season, so a strong show of force at our games this weekend is expected. Their arena should be rocking. Some times I have to ask myself, "why us?"

## HARRER REACHES FOR WCHA MARK

Senior right wing at alternate captain Tim Harrer of the Gophers could complete a record-shattering year this weekend by scoring one goal at Notre Dame.

Already possessor of the Minnesota record for most goals in a single season with 46, the Bloomington flash could now break the WCHA standard for most goals in a league campaign.

Last weekend Harrer tallied four times against Minnesota-Duluth to give him 41 goals in WCHA record of 41 in 1975-76. Harrer has also recaptured the WCHA record lead with 63 points, but is only two ahead of North Dakota's senior center Mark Taylor.

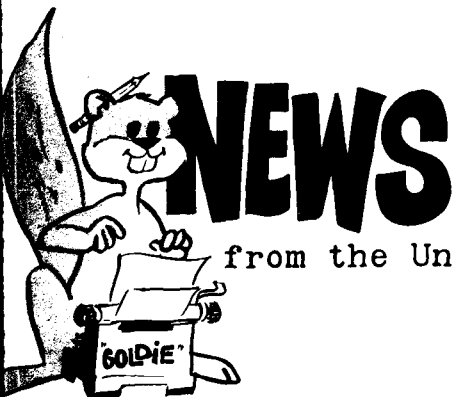

#### TWO TEAMS IN PLAYOFFS

Minneapolis, MN---University of Minnesota's varsity basketball and hockey teams both struck paydirt last weekend when they qualified for post season play.

The Gophers basketball squad was chosen to play in the National Invitational Tournament (NIT) along with 31 other squads named from coast to coast.

Minnesota hosts a first round game at 8:05 p.m. CST Wednesday, March 5, at Williams Arena against Bowling Green State University, Bowling Green, OH. The Falcons are members of the strong Mid-America Conference (MAC) where they finished second to league champion Toledo. Bowling Green compiled a 20-9 season record.

The Gophers, who ended tied for fourth with Iowa in the final Big Ten standings, completed their regular season by defeating Michigan 68-67 at home last Saturday. Minnesota ended 10-5 in the rugged Big Ten Conference, 17-10 overall.

This marks Minnesota's second NIT appearance. The Gopher squad of 1973 split two games back when the entire tournament was played at Madison Square Garden in New York City. UM defeated Rutgers 60-59 before losing to Alabama 69-65.

Minnesota's amazing hockey Gophers, like the basketball squad picked to finish well down in the regular season standings, came home with a second place finish in the final WCHA standings by completing a sweep at Notre Dame last weekend.

The Gophers took the Irish 3-2, and 3-7 in overtime. Minnesota ended with an 18-14-0 league record, and was 22-14-0 overall. The top of the final standings are exactly the same as last year when the Gophers finished second to North Dakota. The Sioux won this year's WCHA title with a mark of 21-6-1.

The Gophers host seventh place Michigan Tech in a two game, total goal series at Williams Arena this weekend. Both games begin at 7:30 p.m. CST. Minnesota and Tech split a regular season series here in January with the Huskies taking the opener 6-5 and UM the second game 3-2.

## MINNESOTA TO HOST NIT OPENER ON WEDNESDAY

Upstart Minnesota, a youthful basketball team that prognosticators said would finish at the bottom of the Big Ten this year, a team that was written off as doomed just two weeks ago, has been invited to participate in the 1980 National Invitational Tournament.

Coach Jim Dutcher's squad will entertain Bowling Green of Ohio in the first round of this year's tourney on Wednesday (March 5) at Williams Arena. Tip-off is set for 8:05 p.m.

The Gophers finished regular season play with two straight wins....37-73 over Michigan State and 63-67 over Michigan....at home last weekend and in the process posted a 17-10 overall record and a 10-3 mark in the Big Ten.

Those two victories enabled Minnesota to end the season tied for fourth place in the loop standings with Iowa. Indiana, the defending NIT champion, won Big Ten honors with a 76-73 overtime verdict over Ohio State on Sunday. The Buckeyes were second and Purdue third in the final standings.

"It was a super way to wind up the regular season," Coach Dutcher admitted, "especially after we had lost those three straight road games. But we never lost faith in ourselves, and it showed in our final game against Michigan."

Now, for the first time since 1972-73, the Gophers are in post-season play. In fact on that most recent occasion, Minnesota also played in the NIT, beating Rutgers 63-59 in the opening round before losing to Alabama 69-65 in the quarter-finals.

This year's second-round action is on tap next Monday (March 10) with the third round set for a week from Thursday (March 13). Then the four teams from the initial field of 32 that survive those early games will move to New York City and the final showdown in Madison Square Garden March 17 & 19.

"We're happy to be included in the NIT field," Dutcher said. "We're also pleased to be playing at home in the first round. Bowling Green will be a tough representative of the Mid-America Conference, and we hope that we are ready for them."

Minnesota's lineup for the NIT opener against Bowling Green on Wednesday remains uncertain, but neither Dutcher nor his players seem to be concerned about who gets the opening nod.

In the backcourt, the Gophers probably will open with Darryl Mitchell and Mark Hall. Up front, Gary Holmes appears set at center while Andy Thompson looks like a good bet to open at one forward opposite Captain Kevin McHale.

But Trent Tucker could open at either guard or forward, and if he doesn't start, it's a cinch he'll be in the game early. The same holds true for Zebedee Howell at forward and Randy Breuer at center.

McHale grabbed 12 rebounds in the finals against Michigan and consequently finished regular-season play as the second leading rebounder....as well as the second leading scorer....in U of M history. He'll go into the Bowling Green battle with 1,644 career points and 915 career rebounds.

## WRESTLERS THIRD, ZILVERBERG FIRST

With five wrestlers advancing to the NCAA finals in Corvallis, Oregon, Minnesota's grapplers finished third in the Big Ten tourney held at Michigan State last weekend.

Oregon State University will be hosting the tournament, which will be held March 13-15. Dan Zilverberg, wrestling at 150, won his second straight conference title and will be one of five Gophers to move on to Oregon State. Zilverberg defeated Fred Worthem of Michigan State 11-0 to climax a weekend of matches that saw Zilverberg shut-out every opponent. He also shared "Outstanding Wrestler" honors with Iowa's Ed Banach. Zilverberg finished second in the NCAA's last season. He is a senior and rated first in the country.

Other Gophers to qualify for the NCAA's are Dalen Wasmund, a 134-pounder who advanced by winning the consolation bracket by default. Gary Lefebvre will be making the trip to Corvallis, courtesy of his second-place finish. Lefebvre, at 126, lost to Jeff Thomas of Michigan State 15-5. Jim Martinez (142) will be making his second NCAA trip. Martinez, who was Big Ten champ last year at 134, lost to Lenny Zalesky of Iowa 5-2 in the finals. Jim Trudeau (167) also advanced for his first taste of NCAA tourney competition.

As a team, the Gophers scored 47 points, good enough for a third-place finish. Iowa won their seventh straight conference title with 99 points and Wisconsin was second with 80 3/4 points.

## TRACKMEN EIGHTH AT BIG TEN MEET

Although the team showed lots of improvement from last winter and throughout this season, Minnesota's indoor track team still didn't have the horses to score higher in the Big Ten conference meet. The Gophers still qualified Tom Polisenio for the NCAA meet March 14-15 at Detroit.

Polisenio, a miler, ran to a qualifying time of 4:05.39 at the Illinois Classic last week at Champaign and will be the lone Gopher at the NCAA's. This weekend, Polisenio ran the mile in 4:07.96 in the semi-finals for his best of the two-day meet held at Wisconsin.

Minnesota scored nine points, still a far cry from the 30 that UM head coach Roy Griak had hoped for. Indiana led the parade with 113 points.

"We just don't have the horses," said Griak. "We don't have enough people -- you can't do a job with a b-b gun if it's expected with a cannon."

Minnesota had five bests at the meet, but "we didn't do as well as we could to score," said Griak.

Griak said that the Gophers had hoped to score well in the 1- and 2-mile and the 600, "but just didn't get it."

Don Hurley ran to a fourth-place finish in the 2-mile with a time of 9:56.25. Mike Gebeke was fourth in the 1000 with 2:11.07 as his best and Terry Haythe, who ran well, was sixth in the 300 with 1:31.00. That was a personal best, as was his 1:06.33 in the 60.

Lavin's resignation means that Salem has two openings on the offensive side of his coaching staff. Mike Shanahan resigned early in January to accept a post at the University of Florida.

## IGERS 2ND, MOST MTU FOR PLAYOFFS

Minneapolis, MN---Minnesota last weekend completed an amazing season by finishing the same as last year, second, in the final Western Collegiate Hockey Association (WCHA) standings by sweeping a road series at Notre Dame. The Gophers took the opener 3-2, and came from a 7-5 deficit to win the second game 3-7 in overtime.

At the beginning nobody even gave Minnesota a look at the first division. The defending NCAA champion roster was decimated by graduation and defections to the pro ranks and the U. S. Olympic squad. It was expected to be, in a sense, a rebuilding year.

Even the coach, Herb Brooks, left to pilot the Olympic Team to the Gold Medal at Lake Placid. So stepping in for one season was acting head coach Brad Buetow, the past four years an assistant to Brooks.

At best the Gophers went through a season representing a roller coaster ride. At times they were devastating. At other times they couldn't put the puck in the ocean.

But somehow the squad all came together and, combined with tremendous balance in the WCHA, the kind of balance that didn't allow anyone but North Dakota to run away and hide, stayed with the leaders.

Going into last weekend the Gophers could have finished anywhere from second to sixth. But enough series splits combined with the sweep at Notre Dame allowed the Gophers to finish right where they did last season, just behind North Dakota in the final standings.

Now comes the playoffs. Minnesota plays host to Michigan Tech Friday and Saturday at Williams Arena in a two game, total goal series. Both games begin at 7:30 p.m. The schools split in a regular season series here in January. Tech took the opener 6-5, UM the next one 3-2.

"I'm scared of Michigan Tech," Buetow said Monday. "They can be awfully good. I'm also sorry that their outstanding head coach John MacInnes can't be with them. He is undergoing medical tests in a Minneapolis hospital. We all hope he undergoes a quick recovery.

Yes, the playoffs constitute a whole new season. And for us to be successful we'll have to tighten up our defensive play, stay out of the penalty box, get solid goal tending and our share of the breaks along the way.

"As to the entire season, our men overcame a lot of adversity to finish second in the strongest amateur hockey league in the U.S. I have to take my hat off to our players.

"No one gave us a chance when it all started. But our men believe in themselves. In addition, we suffered more injuries to front line personnel than in the last five years. Maybe it was that kind of adversity that brought them closer together. That kind of effect does strange things to young athletes. In our case it was all plusses.

"We accomplished two very big objectives this season. . .gaining home ice for the playoffs and winning a second straight Big Ten championship. Now it's up to no one but ourselves as to how we fare in the playoffs.

## HARRER WINS SCORING TITLE

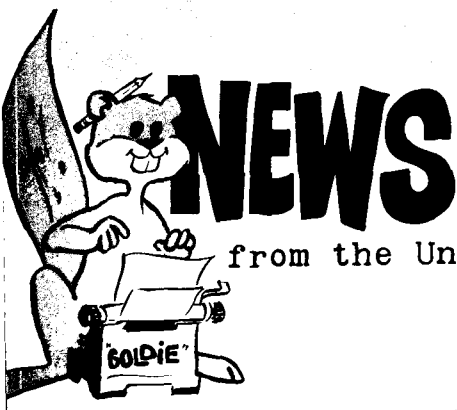
Senior right wing Tim Harrer from Bloomington, MN, captured the WCHA scoring title with four goals and two assists in last weekend's series at Notre Dame. In the process, Harrer set a WCHA record for league goals scored with 45, and added 24 assists for 69 total points. Second was North Dakota's outstanding center Mark Taylor who totaled 64 points. Third was UM freshman center Aaron Broten of Roseau, MN, with 55 points.

Harrer has already smashed the Minnesota record of 42 goals in a single season as his all-games total has reached 50.

He is the first Minnesota Gopher to win the WCHA scoring title since Billy Klatt turned the trick with 31 points in 1967-68. John Mayasich (1954 and 1955) and Lou Wanne (1963) are the only other Minnesota players who have won this coveted crown.

As far as it is known at this time, the record for most goals scored in a single season is 56 by Jerry Walker of Denver in 1960-61.

ICERS HOST C.C. IN PLAYOFFS

Minneapolis, MN---The second round WCHA playoffs mark the next post season action for the University of Minnesota hockey Gophers this weekend. Minnesota hosts Colorado College in a two-game, total-goal series Friday and Saturday at Williams Arena. Both games begin at 2 p.m. CST.

Minnesota won its way into the second round by defeating Michigan Tech 7-2 and 6-3 to take the series 13-5. Colorado College earned its trip to the Twin Cities by taking a pair of close ones from Minnesota-Duluth at home 4-3 and 7-6 for an 11-9 series margin.

Winner of the Minnesota-C.C. series is expected to meet the Central Collegiate Hockey Association (CCHA) playoff winner in a single NCAA qualifying game Saturday, March 22, at a site to be determined, providing North Dakota remains alive in its second round series.

The N.D. Sioux, regular season WCHA champion, took their first round series at home against Michigan State, and this weekend entertain Notre Dame, winners at Michigan.

If North Dakota wins, it gains an automatic seed to the NCAA tourney March 27-29 at Providence, RI, and the local winner has to play the extra game.

But should fifth place Notre Dame upset the Sioux, then the Minnesota-C.C. winner would gain the seed and the Irish must play the CCHA champion based on final regular season standings. Minnesota ended second in the WCHA and Colorado College third.

UM AND C.C. SPLIT 4

During the 1979-80 campaign, both Minnesota and Colorado College swept home series. The Gophers took a pair at Williams Arena back in November 8-3 and 7-4. But the Tigers turned the tables at Colorado Springs in December winning 6-3 and 6-4 at (MORE)

home.

So one would gather that home court, er. . . ice, advantage lies with the Gophers.

"That's simply not true," says Minnesota head coach Brad Buetow. "When you come down to the playoffs, nothing that went before counts." It's a brand new season.

"What you did yesterday means little if anything. Emotion, desire to continue on, these and other factors mean much, much more. I am certain Colorado College will come in here fired up to take it to us. They have a fine, fine team that finished the season red hot. They earned third place by winning down the stretch. We'll have to play even better than last weekend if we expect to see any more games this season.

"In goalie Tom Frame they have one of the best. When he's hot he is murder. And they can score goals in bunches, too. We've already found that out. So I predict an excellent playoff series, one that should get our fans up off their seats in a hurry. I just hope we have packed houses to back our players.

"Our men have earned the support of our great fans. Nobody gave us a chance prior to the season to get where we are today. I'm awfully proud of these kids. They bit down on a lot of bullets this year. I can only hope they have some teeth left."

#### HARRER CHASES ANOTHER RECORD

After already smashing the school record for goals in a season, and the WCHA mark in the same category, Gopher senior right wing Tim Harrer is on the verge of setting another UM standard.

Last weekend he counted three points against Michigan Tech with two goals and one assist. His season totals for all games read a record 52 goals, plus 23 assists for 80 points.

The latter figure places him in a tie with John Mayasich who scored an all-time UM high of 80 in 1954-55. One more point would give the Bloomington flash another school mark.

"Naturally it feels great to set the records and all that," Harrer says, "but I wish there was some way to include my teammates in all this. Hey, I can't score a goal unless I get the puck, and the guys I play with keep feeding me and feeding me all the time.

"I can't count the number of times teammates have passed up a good shot and given me the puck. This is the greatest bunch of guys anyone could play with. I'm just luckier than anyone to have the luck in scoring this season, to be playing with a contending team, and to be associated with just a great, great bunch of guys."

Just doesn't sound like a potential superstar.

## GOPHER CAGERS TO HOST SOUTHWESTERN LOUISIANA THURSDAY IN NIT

Minnesota will entertain Southwestern Louisiana University Thursday at 8:05 p.m. in the quarter-finals of the 1960 National Invitational Tournament (NIT) at Williams Arena.

The Gophers gained the right to advance...one of eight teams still alive in this year's NIT...by virtue of its 53-56 victory over the University of Mississippi at home on Monday.

Winners of those four contests on Thursday then will move into New York City where they will take part in the semi-finals of the tourney at Madison Square Garden on Monday. Finals of the 43rd annual tourney are scheduled Wednesday.

Invading Southwestern Louisiana will be another tough opponent for the Gophers. The Rajin' Cajuns will enter Thursday's confrontation with an overall record of 21-3. They earned the right to meet Minnesota with a stunning 77-76 win over Texas (AT Texas) Monday. And that win followed a 74-72 first-round verdict over Alabama-Birmingham.

"It will be another tough one for us," Coach Jim Dutcher of the Gophers admits, "but this time of year you don't expect any easy ones. Any team that still is alive in tournament play has to be good. Consequently there are not any pushovers.... not any easy opponents. But when you win on the road like Southwestern has, it makes you all the tougher."

To imagine anything more different than Monday night's two-point victory over Mississippi would be hard. The Gophers had a five point lead with just over a minute to play and appeared to have the decision wrapped up. But Ole Miss raced back into contention with a three-point play and had the ball with five seconds left in the game only to see its' desperation shot at the buzzer zoom off target.

Sound defense won it for Minnesota, and Coach Dutcher praised Captain Kevin McMales for doing the best defensive job of any of his Gophers. "Mississippi's John Stroud had been averaging over 25 points a game over the past two seasons," Dutcher points out, "and he got 10 in a hurry against us when we were in a zone defense. But then we went man-to-man and put Kevin on him. Stroud finished with 13, (his lowest total in two years), and that's a real tribute to Kevin. But we've said it before....Kevin is the guy who has to win it for us."

Against Mississippi, McMales had 15 points (as did Darryl Mitchell from his guard spot) to go with his five rebounds and four assists. He also had three blocked shots to literally lead the winners at both ends of the court.

Dutcher opened with a new and "surprising" lineup against Mississippi. He had Gary Holmes at a forward opposite McMales, Trent Tucker in the backcourt with Mitchell and Randy Breuer at center.

But Mark Hall, Andy Thompson, Zebedee Howell and Ben Coleman also got a taste of action, so there is no way of guessing which Gophers will get the opening call against Southwestern Louisiana Thursday night.

## FIVE GRAPPLERS AT THE NCAA'S

Even with a sub-par performance at the Big Ten meet last weekend, Minnesota's wrestling team will send five grapplers to the NCAA meet this Thursday, Friday and Saturday (March 13-15) at Oregon State University at Corvallis, Oregon.

Dan Zilverberg will lead the parade from Minnesota. Zilverberg is a 153-pounder who is rated first in the nation by both the Amateur Wrestling News and National Mat News polls. He finished the regular dual season with a 37-1 record with 11 pins (a UI single-season record), and swept through his three matches at the conference championships. Zilverberg is a senior in search for the Zilverberg family's first NCAA title. Older brother Larry was a Gopher wrestler from 1973-77 and finished second in the country twice. Last season, Dan was also second in the nation, losing in the finals to Kelly Ward of Iowa State 7-2.

Another Gopher who could make some noise at the tourney is 126-er Gary Lefebvre. Lefebvre, a junior, had a 29-6-1 ledger with 7 pins second only to Zilverberg for the team high. Finishing second in the conference finals enables Lefebvre to make his second trip to NCAA championship rounds. He was at Iowa State last year, losing in the first round.

Jim Martinez could figure -- if he wants to -- in scoring some points for the Gophers. Martinez was a third-placer in the NCAA's last year at 134, but this year has wrestled at 142 and wound up with a 29-6-1 record with four falls and was second in the Big Ten, falling to Iowa's Lenny Zalesky 5-2. Martinez, though, has had a bad habit this year of taking lesser opponents lightly and having to pay for it. If he can get past the opening rounds, Jim has the potential to go all the way for Minnesota's first NCAA champ since Pat Neu in 1977.

Jim Trudeau at 167 came on during the latter part of the 1979-80 campaign like a gang-buster and will be making his first NCAA trip. He is a sophomore from Inver Grove Heights, MN who finished with a 19-9-1 ledger with four falls. Trudeau made his NCAA trip possible by winning his way through the wrestle-backs at the conference championships last week. Trudeau won eight of his last nine duals this season.

Minnesota's most unlikely candidate for the NCAA title is 134-er Dalen Wasmund. He is a junior transfer from the Naval Academy who struggled home with a 13-7-2 record and three falls. After opening up the season with an 8-2 ledger, Wasmund sustained a back injury that forced him out of action for a month and Wasmund only recently has regained his early-season form. He advanced to the NCAA rounds by winning the consolation bracket by default.

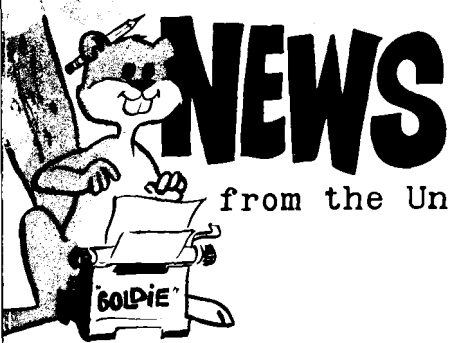
Nothing like last year when Minnesota qualified eight members for the tourney, but with having such a young squad the Gophers fared pretty well. Last year, Minnesota was seventh overall with 43 3/4 points and was third out of Big Ten teams behind national champ Iowa and fifth-place Wisconsin.

The Gophers will be without regular-season standouts Brad Huckle and George Bowman. Huckle was 23-9-1 in duals at 113 but came down with the flu bug that had been haunting the team for the past two weeks and missed the Big Ten tourney. Bowman separated his shoulder in the next-to-last week of the season and barely was able to sign his name to the lineup sheet at the Big Ten. He made it past the first round last week, but after that couldn't go any further.

All in all, Minnesota's best bets will be Zilverberg and Martinez. But if some money would be on a dark horse, Trudeau will surprise some people.

The hockey Gophers qualified for Saturday's game by taking two from Colorado last weekend at home 5-3 and 8-1 in the second round WCHA playoffs.

Northern Michigan earned its way to the qualifying game by taking it to Ferris State University 7-3 and 8-6 to win the CCHA playoffs.

For Minnesota it would mark, with a win Saturday, the fifth trip in seven years to the final four. UM won the NCAA title last year in Detroit, and previously (MORE)

captured the top trophy in 1974 at Boston and 1976 at Denver.

A win by Northern could mark the quickest trip to the finals ever. NMU's hockey program is only in its fourth year, but shows an impressive 02-42-8 record all under one head coach, Rick Comley.

Cornell defeated Dartmouth 5-1 in last week's ECAC playoff final, and both advance to the nationals. Dartmouth meets WCHA champion in the first NCAA game Thursday, March 27, at the Providence Civic Center, with Cornell awaiting the UM-NMU victor for a Friday, March 23 faceoff.

Although the schools have never met in hockey, both the Gophers and Wildcats bring impressive records in Saturday's affair. Minnesota is 26-14-0 on the year, but NMU owns the best record in the nation, 32-5-1.

At home UM is 13-6-0 while the Wildcats posted a 21-2-1 home log, and were 11-3-0 on the road. The Wildcats won the regular season CCHA title with a 17-3-0 record, while Minnesota went 13-14-0 good for second place in the WCHA.

Both teams boast potent offensive machines. Minnesota is scoring at 5.30 goals per game clip while NMU is hitting 5.97 per outing. However, it's on defense where NMU really excels.

The Wildcats are giving up a miserly 3.04 goals to the enemy and Minnesota 4.30. Coach Comley believes his goal tender, Steve Weeks, who has played 33 games this season and this week was named CCHA Player of the Year and has a 2.85 goals allowed average, may be the best in the nation.

Minnesota head coach Brad Buetow agrees with Comley about Weeks, but also says his top goalie, freshman Paul Butters, is no slouch himself. Butters has played 21 games and sports a 3.99 goals average.

But down the stretch drive, Butters has been hot. In the playoffs he has allowed only six goals in his last three starts.

At the other end of the rink Minnesota has the top goal scorer in the nation in senior right wing Tim Harrer. Harrer has rung up a school record 53 scores and 81 total points. He also captured the regular season WCHA scoring crown with 69 league points.

But again NMU counters with one of the highest scorers in the nation, right wing Bill Joyce, who has 91 points on 37 goals and 54 assists.

Adding up the plusses and minuses, only one thing comes clear. . .no favorite. Oh, those in a certain profession might give UM a tiny edge based on home ice, but when it's playoff time all ice comes out the same, smooth and fast.

Northern is young and new. It wants to crash the final four in just four short seasons. Minnesota is just as eager, but for different reasons. The Gophers, before the season, were not given a chance to go anywhere. A league finish of eighth, ninth or last was predicted.

Now the UM players really want to stick it to the so-called predictors. The Gophers want to back up what their former teammates did last spring at Detroit, and did (MORE)

later, with a ton of help, at Lake Placid, NY.

Saturday's game at Williams Arena is the last major event there this season. And it could be the last major event there period, unless major corrections are made to bring the facility up to safety codes.

So Saturday could be the last chance for Minnesota fans to cheer their heroes in familiar surroundings. But regardless of whether its the last game there or not, the "old barn" will rock and roar when the first puck is dropped.

Seems like Minnesota has been in this spot once or twice before.

Head coach George Thomas takes his second University of Minnesota baseball team to Texas this weekend for a full week of action against some of the best clubs in that area.

"We've got cabin fever, or in this case fieldhouse fever, from working out indoors all winter," Thomas says. "So we are really anxious to get outdoors and see if all the practice and planning works.

"But we've had a good winter camp. Our men are eager to meet the best and find out just what we can do. I believe the potential is there for a very good ball club, but until we prove ourselves against outside opposition, well, let's just wait until next week is over and by then we may be able to tell just how good this team can be."

Thomas' first squad finished 25-14 on the season and ended fourth in the Big Ten with a 12-6 mark. But several key returnees, particularly on the mound, give Thomas and Co. high hopes about the 1980 campaign.

## WRESTLERS 19th AT NCAA'S

Wrestling far from snuff, Minnesota's wrestling team finished 19th at the NCAA championships last weekend at Oregon State in Corvallis. The Gophers scored 14 points. Thus wraps up a roller-coaster season for coach Wally Johnson's team that finished 12-4 in duals and the rankings of sixth (NAN) and ninth (AMN).

Even with No. 1 rated Dan Zilverberg at 158, Minnesota saw its hopes for NCAA gold melt away in either the first or second rounds.

Zilverberg finished fifth overall, but a far cry from the top ranking that he had held all season long.

"The poor guy--he just wasn't himself," said Johnson. "He was strong every match but couldn't get the job done. It was emotional -- it all got to him."

Zilverberg cruised into the semis before losing to Iowa State's Tom Pickard 9-6 in overtime. Dan then beat Mike Terry of Wisconsin 2-0 to capture the fifth place laurels.

Gary Lefebvre at 126 won his first two matches before losing in the quarterfinals. Lefebvre had been wrestling on an ankle that he had injured in the Big Ten championships and "just wasn't ready," said Johnson. Lefebvre joined Jim Martinez, Jim Trudeau and Dalen Wasmund in the non-placing bracket.

Martinez was pinned in the first round. He had been rated third in the country for most of the season. Also losing in the first round was Trudeau. Wasmund, the most unlikely candidate for a Minnesota title, won his first match before losing in the second round.

"We had a terrific dual meet season," said Johnson. "We were rated high all season and had surprisingly good season."

But it is at the NCAA championships where a team shows its stuff if it had a good season or not. Well. . .

"We stunk," said Johnson. "We didn't wrestle well. There are no excuses--everything just went haywire."

"I really can't figure it out," said Johnson. "But we did have an outstanding season and I feel bad for the kids."

Well, as they always say in Brooklyn, "Wait till next year!"

ICERS END SEASON 26-15-0

Minneapolis, MN---Minnesota's own hockey version of an impossible dream failed to materialize Saturday as the Gophers lost out in their bid for a fifth trip to the national tournament in the last seven years.

Northern Michigan spoiled the Gopher dream by defeating Minnesota 4-3 Saturday before 7,606 at Williams Arena. The Wildcats thus travel to Providence, R.I. and the NCAA championships this weekend. . .a spot Minnesota wanted badly.

But in the words of one Gopher player following the heart-breaking loss, "Hey, ending up fifth in the nation ain't all that bad, 'eh?'"

Considering what was expected of the 1979-80 Gopher sextet before the season opened, ending up fifth nationally almost IS the completion of an impossible dream.

The predictors figured Minnesota, considering the loss of four seniors, another regular to the pro ranks and five underclassmen to the U. S. Olympic Team, to finish eighth, ninth or last in the regular season Western Collegiate Hockey Association standings. Nobody even gave Ull a sniff at making the final four, much less repeating as NCAA champions. But it almost happened.

Even with a stack of injuries that felled no less than seven regulars for periods up to 11 games, the Gophers broke fast from the blocks and won nine of their first 12 WCHA games. Things cooled down in December and January, but once the entire team

got healthy, Minnesota made an amazing run during the stretch drive.

Led by the torrid scoring of senior wing and All-America Tim Harrer, Minnesota, on the final weekend of regular season play, grabbed second place in the standings by winning twice at Notre Dame.

The Gophers then swept the first two rounds of the playoffs at home against Michigan Tech and Colorado College. That set up the one-game qualifying match against Northern Michigan, champions of the CCHA season and playoffs.

But it just wasn't Minnesota's turn. After battling back from 2-0 and 3-2 deficits Minnesota freshman Aaron Broten appeared to score a third Gopher goal in the last minute of the second period.

It appeared to be a goal as the puck, according to video tape replay, went through the net. Although the goal judge concurred, it was disallowed. Minnesota scored early in the final period to tie, but amazing forward Steve Bozek completed a hat trick 29 seconds later for the winning MJU marker. The Gophers pressed for the equalizer, but goalie Steve Weeks stood fast to gain the win.

But just to get as far as they did is a tremendous accomplishment for this year's UM squad. Stripped of 85 percent of last year's scoring punch, nothing was expected. But someone forgot to tell acting head coach Brad Buetow and his players.

The 26 wins represents the fourth highest total in UM history. And the 236 goals scored are just three shy of last year's school record 239.

And what a season Harrer had. He set a school record for most goals (53) and most total points (82), and while winning the WCHA scoring title with 69 points also set a new league standard for most goals with 45. His All-America selection was not a total surprise. He is the 22nd Minnesota product to gain that acclaim while skating for the Maroon and Gold.

"About all I can add to what these men accomplished is to say I'm probably the proudest man in the coaching ranks today," Buetow offered.

"Everybody wrote us off. Nobody gave us a chance. And these men had to overcome more adversity than most student athletes face in their entire four-year careers. I take my hat off to every single man on our squad.

"And that includes men on the varsity reserve team, too. Several of these men were thrown into the breach when regulars were down with injury or illness. They performed like champions, both the regulars and the reserves.

"I could not have asked for any more than these men gave. This team became very close because of adversity it faced. They did everything I asked of them, and then gave some more.

"This is a proud moment in the rich traditions of Minnesota hockey history. It would have been much prouder for all of us had we gone on to the national tournament. But I'm not bemoaning the fact that we didn't make it. I'm just as proud as possible of the men who played for Minnesota in 1979-80."

## HARRER, BUETOW, BROTEN SWEEP HONORS

It's an all-Minnesota show among individual awards voted in this year's Denver Post All-WCHA team and special honors.

Tim Harrer, last week named All-America first team, not only made the All-WCHA first team, but was named WCHA Player Of The Year for his outstanding contributions to the 1979-80 Gopher squad.

Other individual league honors went to acting head coach Brad Buetow who was named WCHA Coach Of The Year in his rookie season, while center Aaron Broten was voted the Outstanding WCHA Freshman award by his peers.

Harrer received 26 votes to edge out fellow All-America Mark Taylor of North Dakota for the highest individual honor. In voting for spots on the All-WCHA team, both Harrer and Taylor received the top number, 151 votes.

Harrer, senior right wing from Bloomington, won the WCHA scoring title with 69 points and en route broke the league record of 41 goals scored by Tom Ross of Michigan State (1976-76) by hitting for 45 goals.

He also broke Minnesota's records for goals and total points in a single season with 53 and 32, respectively. His 53 goals are the most in the nation this season. Harrer ended up second in scoring in Minnesota history only to John Mayasich (1951-55) with 117 career goals and 201 points.

Buetow, the previous four years an assistant to Herb Brooks who last season coached the U. S. Olympic Team, was serving his first year as a head coach at any level. Considering Minnesota was picked to finish near the bottom of this year's WCHA race, his job of bringing the Gophers home second and finishing just one game away from making it to the national championships earned him the coach of the year award by a wide margin.

Buetow played his senior year (1974) under Brooks and returned a year later after one season of play in professional hockey.

Broten, younger brother of Olympian Neal who last year was runner-up to Keith Maxwell of North Dakota for WCHA rookie honors, ended second only to Harrer in scoring for the Gophers with 72 points (25-47). His playmaking was instrumental in setting up most of Harrer's scores as both toiled on the same line all season.

Although records do not prove it completely, Broten's 25 goals may be the most ever by a Minnesota freshman. And next season he is expected to be rejoined by brother Neal to again skate on the same line that terrorized the prep ranks for Roseau high school during their prep days. --UM--

GOPHER SIGN TWO MORE FOOTBALL PROSPECTS--Two more prep standouts have signed national letters of intent to enroll at the University of Minnesota next fall and play football for Coach Joe Salem's Golden Gophers. The duo includes DeWayne Eldridge, a 6-0, 175-pound runningback from Culver City High School in Los Angeles, CAL., and Dwayne McMullen, a 5-11, 165-pound wide receiver-defensive back from John Harris High School in Harrisburg, PA.

"Both of those players have quickness," Salem pointed out. "We are happy to have them. So far we have signed 27 student athletes. We still have a few more open, but we are close to winding up our recruiting for this season." --UM--

## GOPHERS WIN 21 GAMES IN 1979-80

Only three University of Minnesota basketball teams ever won 20 or more games in any one season....the 1972-73 Gophers were 21-5, the 1976-77 club was 24-3 and the 1979-80 cagers finished 21-11....and that fact alone made it a good year for Coach Jim Dutcher.

Prior to the start of the season, Minnesota had been picked to finish ninth in the Big Ten. Instead the Gophers tied with Iowa for fourth place in the conference and received their second bid ever to play in the National Invitation Tournament (NIT).

While Minnesota suffered a heartbreaking 58-55 loss to Virginia in the championship game, it did notch four straight NIT triumphs enroute to the finals. And with four sophomores in the starting lineup, Dutcher's quintet established itself as a team of the future.

"Obviously we were disappointed in not winning the NIT championship," Dutcher admitted, "but the season was a good one for us, and we have plenty of things about which we can be proud. We won over 20 games, we had a six-game winning streak going late in the season and we played in a post-season tournament."

Two Gophers, 7-2 freshman Randy Breuer, and 6-4 Darryl Mitchell, were named to the 1980 All-NIT team and will form the nucleus for the Minnesota contingent a year from now. Mitchell finished the year with 335 points while Breuer had 240.

Other underclassmen who are expected to be around next season are 6-5 sophomore Trent Tucker, 6-2 sophomore Mark Hall, 6-10 sophomore Gary Holmes, 6-6 sophomore Andy Thompson, 6-1 freshman Bruce Kaupa, 6-7 freshman Zeb Howell, 6-0 junior Carl Dale and 6-9 freshman Ben Coleman.

All of which means the Gophers will lose only one senior, 6-11 captain Kevin McHale. But that loss will be a significant one, as McHale has been a fixture in Minnesota's starting lineup for the past four seasons.

During his first two years with the Gophers, McHale had the benefit of playing with such standouts as Mychal Thompson, Ray Williams and Osborne Lockhart. But during his junior and senior years, McHale found the defenses aimed at stopping him while the Gophers rebuilt their fortunes around freshmen and sophomores.

In spite of that, McHale wound up his career as the second leading scorer in history with 1,704 career points. He also established himself as the second leading rebounder with 950 boards during his four years with the Gophers.

As a senior, McHale scored 557....the fifth best single-season effort in UI history. His 281 rebounds this past season also figure as the eighth best effort ever recorded by a Gopher.

But Minnesota had other high spots this year. Like winning the sixth straight Pillsbury Classic championship. Like beating such powers as Ohio State, Indiana and Purdue. Like showing the prognosticators that they weren't a second division Big Ten entry. And the future looks even better!

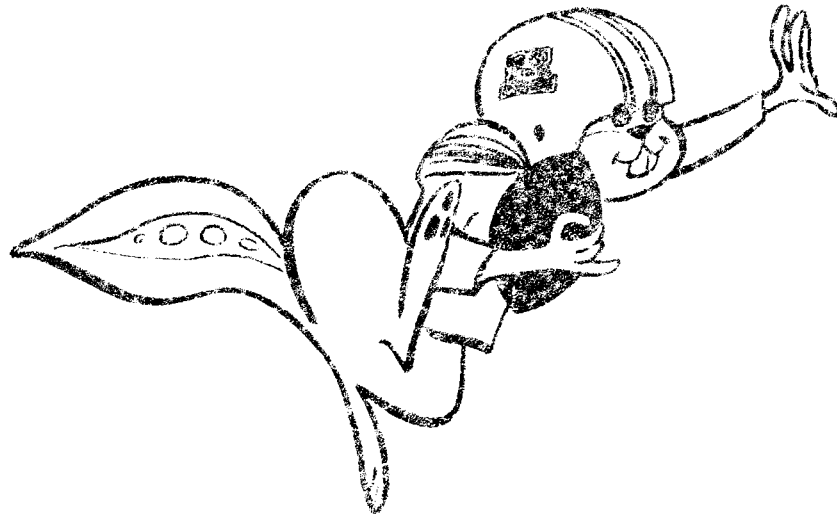

Twenty days of spring football practice get underway next week at the University of Minnesota, and second-year coach Joe Salem appears anxious to begin preparations for the 1990 season.

"We have a lot to accomplish in a short period of time," Coach Salem admits, "especially if we hope to improve on the 4-6-1 record we finished up with last fall. Three-fourths of our '90 squad will be freshmen and sophomores, so we obviously will be very young. But we have some talent. A good spring practice will help."

Exactly what does Salem hope to accomplish in workouts this spring? "We need to shore up our defensive unit," he points out, "and to do that we are going to make some changes, some personnel switches. We also have to rebuild our offensive line where five of our six starters are gone. And we have to find a quarterback to replace Mark Carlson."

Salem retains a "wait and see" attitude about the defensive position changes, but he does point to a couple of players who will form the nucleus for this year's squad. They include 250-pound sophomore defensive tackle Kevin Kellin and 175-pound senior cornerback Dana Noel.

"We'll also get Jim Fahnhorst and Ken Foxworth back this year," Salem points out, "and that will help." Fahnhorst is a 225-pound junior linebacker while Foxworth is a 175-pound senior cornerback. Both missed the '79 season with injuries.

Offensively Ken Dallafior, a 260-pound junior tackle, will be the start of Salem's rebuilding program. And Minnesota's "run-and-shoot" offense will center around such rushing stalwarts as Marion Barber, Garry White and Glen Lewis.

Salem also feels that the receiving corps expected back this year will be capable with speedster Roy Artis, a 175-pound senior, leading the way. Kelvin Jenkins also returns as does tight end Randy Sonnenfeld.

That leaves the quarterback spot, where holdovers <sup>TOM</sup> ~~Tom~~ Pence a sophomore, and Greg Pylatiuk, a junior, will "get a shot" in spring drills. Transfer Bruce Olson also expects to get a look from Coach Salem.

The kicking game also needs some attention, but Salem admits that spring practice may not provide the time to accomplish that task. "We need a kicker to replace Paul Rogind," Salem admits, "but the young man we recruited won't be in camp until next fall. Tom Smith, our punter, has another year left, but he will be out for baseball this spring."

Minnesota expects to hold workouts every Monday, Wednesday and Friday with a scrimmage on tap each Saturday. The spring game will wind up this year's drills on Saturday, May 10.

The Gophers open their 1990 season at home against Ohio University on September 13. Then they play at Ohio State the following Saturday before returning home to entertain Southern California on September 20. Other home games next fall include Michigan October 13, Iowa October 25, Indiana November 3 and Michigan State November 15.

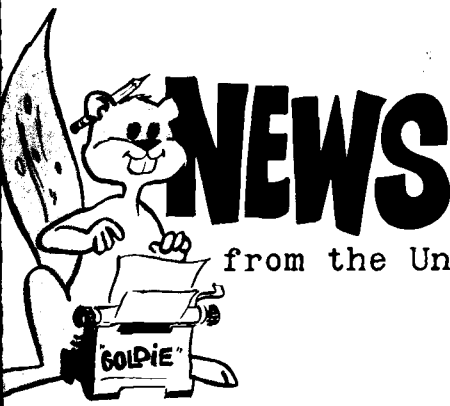

Minneapolis, MN---"This could be the most important week of spring for us concerning our Big Ten preparations," Minnesota baseball coach George Thomas said Sunday.

The Gophers face the following schedule this week: Mankato State and Gustavus Adolphus at Siebert Field Monday and Wednesday, respectively, for 2 p.m. double headers, single nine inning games Friday and Saturday at Tulsa, OK, against Oral Roberts U.; and two games Sunday against Tulsa University.

"We have only played ten games thus far and I really hope we can get all eight in this week," Thomas continued. "We need these games badly.

"We can't tell as yet how far this team has come. The only way we'll find out is to play other teams. I'm glad we are over .500 (6-4) at this point, but I also believe we threw two or three games away, games we should have won.

Our hitting has at times pleasantly surprised me, but we need more consistency at the plate. The same goes for our pitching. And that's why games this week are vital to us. We've got to get the picture of this team in focus.

"We are fairly close to determining our lineup, but more input would help. We need to know all we can about the players on this club and how they hit and pitch against teams from other schools."

Thomas planned to pitch juniors Tom Smith (R, 1-1) and Doug Fregin (R, 1-1) against Mankato Monday, and come back with three freshmen Wednesday. That means Bob Meyer (R, 1-0), Mike Sherman (R, 0-0) and Jeff Klein (R, 1-0) will split duty against Gustavus Adolphus.

Junior lefty Ed Rech (2-1) will pitch Friday at Oral Roberts with Smith and Fregin splitting Saturday's action, and the three rookies coming back Sunday against Tulsa.

Among the starters, freshman shortstop Bill Piwnica (POLN-ih-ca) has been the biggest surprise. He tops the club in hitting with a .393 average and is second in runs batted in with nine. Piwnica has started all 10 games.

Junior first baseman Phil Johnson continues to supply the Gopher power this season. He has six hits and all have been for extra bases, including a pair of doubles and four home runs. He leads UM with 10 ribbys.

Surprisingly, eight different Gophers have stroked home runs in the team's first 10 games. But only senior third baseman Dave Francour, like Johnson, has more than one. Francour has connected twice while batting a healthy .324 and also has two triples.

One sour note for the Gophers is that junior hurler Steve Farley (L, 0-1) is down with a sore arm. It is hoped he'll be ready when UM begins Big Ten play. Minnesota hosts Michigan and Michigan State Saturday and Sunday, April 19-20, during the opening weekend of league action. --UM--

## RUNNINGBACKS SOLID AS GOPHERS OPEN SPRING DRILLS

With the University of Minnesota now in its first week of spring football practice, one area of the current squad seems to provide the greatest image of strength....and that's at runningback.

Smokey Joe Salem, embarking on his second season as head coach at Minnesota, admits that if the Gophers have a strong suit going into spring drills it is at the runningback position.

"We have our top three rushers from 1979 back again," he points out, "and all three of those people are quality players. Marion Barber, Garry White and Glenn Lewis have talent and experience. They'll form the nucleus for us as we start to build our offense for 1980."

White, a senior-to-be out of Rockdale, TX., was Minnesota's leading rusher last fall. Despite missing two games with an ankle injury, White finished the season with 861 yards in 135 carries for a 6.4 yards-per-carry average. The fleet-footed full-back also had eight touchdowns.

Barber, another senior-to-be from Chadsey High School in Detroit, MI., wound up as Minnesota's leading scorer last fall with 12 touchdowns. He had 526 yards rushing and another 337 as a pass receiver. The 6-3, 221-pound power runner also became the all-time rushing leader in Minnesota history last fall and will go into his final campaign with a total of 2,318 yards to his credit.

Lewis, a 6-1, 209-pound speedster (he ranked as the fastest Gopher on the '79 squad) from Edina, MN., also will be a senior next fall. Used primarily as a backup for both Barber and White a season ago, Lewis still rushed for 291 yards and a 4.9 yards-per-carry average.

"Any of those players can break a game open for us," Salem said, "and we obviously are pleased to have them with us for another season. But we also have some other candidates that we are anxious to look at this spring."

Included in that category is Marvel Ross, a freshman from Osborn High School in Detroit, MI. "Ross was with us last August," Salem pointed out, "but he suffered a severely pulled hamstring muscle that kept him out of practice all fall. We are hoping that he will show us something this spring."

Bob Stroup, a sophomore-to-be from Fargo, N.D., also will get a close look at tailback this spring. "We tried Stroup at a defensive back position last fall," Salem explained, "but we're moving him back to his old high school spot this spring. We'll see what happens."

Also on hand are a couple of "veterans" who will take another shot at moving up on the depth chart. That duo includes Chuck Lowell, a sophomore from White Bear Lake, and Duane Gregory, a junior from Chicago, IL.

The Gophers are scheduled to work out each Monday, Wednesday and Friday....with a scrimmage on tap each Saturday....until the Spring Game ends practice on May 10 at 1:30 p.m. in Memorial Stadium.

### HOOSIERS DROP UI IN TENNIS

It wasn't exactly the kind of match that one would want to have under his belt before taking to the road. But such is the case of Minnesota's tennis team.

The Gophers take to Michigan State April 11 and then to Michigan on the 12th before finally returning home to face St. Olaf in a 3 p.m. match at Bierman Courts on the 15th. Up at East Lansing, the Gophers will face a foe in their league of middle-of-the-pack Big Ten tennis. At Ann Arbor, though, well--remember the 1969 Mets? Michigan has won 11 of the last 15 conference tennis crowns, the Gophers will have their work cut out for them. And the way Minnesota's tennis fortunes have been falling lately, St. Olaf will pose quite a problem. The Gophers' record fell to 1-3 in dual meets and was their opener in Big Ten competition.

Minnesota squared-off with Indiana last Saturday and fell 5-4 in a thrilling tiebreaker in the last set of No. 1 doubles.

UI's team of Ted Kaufmann and Dave Morin held a 5-2 lead in the last set after going 6-3, 1-6 in the first two. But IU's duo of Randy Druz and Jim Curran came back for the match-winning games.

Minnesota split with Indiana in the six singles matches. Druz beat Kaufmann at No. 1, 7-6, 6-3. Kent Helgeson and Greg Wicklund lost at No's. 2, 3 before Hakan Almstrom, Gene Sperling and Dave Morin won at No's. 4, 5, 6. Sperling's win was over last year's Big Ten champ at No. 4 singles, Tom Rogers.

Helgeson-Almstrom won at No. 2 doubles, but Wicklund-Brian Biernat fell, setting the stage for the Kaufmann-Morin, Druz-Curran battle.

### VELGUTH SPOTLIGHTS FOR GOPHERS

With only four Gophers at the NCAA gymnastics championships, Minnesota had no chance to capture the team title, but the four that did go made the best of it. Senior still ring specialist Pete Velguth earned All-America honors for winding up sixth in the ring competition for Minnesota's best showing.

Another Gopher to show well was Brian Meeker, who was eighth in the all around competition with a score of 109.37, a job well done as compared to Nebraska's John Hartung who scored a winning 115.02.

Thus brought to an end a strange and very different season for coach Fred Roethlisberger's gymnasts. Competing for the first time without a LaFleur in the Minnesota lineup for seven years, Roethlisberger got the most of his young team during the 1979-80 campaign. A series of nagging injuries kept the team from competing as a whole for most of the season, and then by dropping three of their last five meets of the season, the picture didn't look bright for the Gophers.

But Roethlisberger regrouped UI and they won their fifth straight Big Ten gymnastics title--something that hasn't been done since Michigan accomplished that fete from 1962-67. The crown also moved Minnesota within two of Illinois' league lead in titles (13)--something that the Illini haven't done for quite a while either.

All in all, it was definitely a year for the underdog Gophers and for the type of leadership that is expected of seniors and the exuberance of youth.

There is one thing for sure, though, watch out for Minnesota next year--again, with Roethlisberger leading the way. --UI--

## GOPHERS TO START SPRING DRILLS

Twenty days of spring football practice get underway next week at the University of Minnesota, and second-year coach Joe Salem appears anxious to begin preparations for the 1960 season.

"We have a lot to accomplish in a short period of time," Coach Salem admits, "especially if we hope to improve on the 4-6-1 record we finished up with last fall. Three-fourths of our '60 squad will be freshmen and sophomores, so we obviously will be very young. But we have some talent. A good spring practice will help."

Exactly what does Salem hope to accomplish in workouts this spring? "We need to shore up our defensive unit," he points out, "and to do that we are going to make some changes, some personnel switches. We also have to rebuild our offensive line where five of our six starters are gone. And we have to find a quarterback to replace Mark Carlson."

Salem retains a "wait and see" attitude about the defensive position changes, but he does point to a couple of players who will form the nucleus for this year's squad. They include 250-pound sophomore defensive tackle Kevin Kellin and 175-pound senior cornerback Dana Hoel.

"We'll also get Jim Fahnhorst and Ken Foxworth back this year," Salem points out, "and that will help." Fahnhorst is a 225-pound junior linebacker while Foxworth is a 175-pound senior cornerback. Both missed the '59 season with injuries.

Offensively Ken Dallafior, a 260-pound junior tackle, will be the start of Salem's rebuilding program. And Minnesota's "run-and-shoot" offense will center around such rushing stalwarts as Marion Barber, Garry White and Glen Lewis.

Salem also feels that the receiving corps expected back this year will be capable with speedster Roy Artis, a 175-pound senior, leading the way. Kelvin Jenkins also returns as does tight end Randy Sonnenfeld.

That leaves the quarterback spot, where holdovers Todd Pence a sophomore, and Greg Pylatiuk, a junior, will "get a shot" in spring drills. Transfer Bruce Olson also expects to get a look from Coach Salem.

The kicking game also needs some attention, but Salem admits that spring practice may not provide the time to accomplish that task. "We need a kicker to replace Paul Rogind," Salem admits, "but the young man we recruited won't be in camp until next fall. Tom Smith, our punter, has another year left, but he will be out for baseball this spring."

Minnesota expects to hold workouts every Monday, Wednesday and Friday with a scrimmage on tap each Saturday. The spring game will wind up this year's drills on Saturday, May 16.

The Gophers open their 1960 season at home against Ohio University on September 13. Then they play at Ohio State the following Saturday before returning home to entertain Southern California on September 20. Other home games next fall include Michigan October 10, Iowa October 25, Indiana November 3 and Michigan State November 15.

# MITCHELL NAMED MINNESOTA BASKETBALL CAPTAIN

Darryl Mitchell, a 6-4 junior-to-be, has been named captain of the 1980-81 University of Minnesota basketball team according to an announcement this week from head coach Jim Dutcher.

"Mitchell has been a fine player for us the past two years," Dutcher said. "He is improving all the time, and he plays with intelligence. He is a credit to our program on and off the floor, and we feel that he will make an excellent captain."

A guard, Mitchell started a number of games as a freshman for the Gophers and this past season has been a fixture in Minnesota's backcourt.

In two seasons at Minnesota, Mitchell has hit 195 of 433 field goal attempts for a .450 percent mark. From the free throw line, Mitchell is 140 of 181 for a .733 clip. He has grabbed 145 rebounds and registered 101 assists. In fact Mitchell led Minnesota in assists this season with 72. As a Golden Gopher, Mitchell has scored a total of 530 points for an average of 9.3 points per game.

Mitchell's best scoring night of his two-year collegiate career was a 24-point effort against the Michigan Wolverines. His top night point-wise this past season was 21 against Michigan State.

Minnesota finished the season with an overall record of 21-11. The Gophers were 10-3 in the Big Ten Conference and finished in a tie with Iowa for fourth place in the final standings.

Those efforts earned Minnesota a post season berth in the National Invitation Tournament (NIT) where it reeled off successive victories over Bowling Green, Mississippi, Southwest Louisiana and Illinois before falling 53-53 to Virginia in the tournament finals.

"Mitchell played extremely well in the NIT," Dutcher pointed out. "He scored 19 against Bowling Green and 15 against Mississippi. And in the championship game against Virginia, Darryl led all scorers with 13."

In the process, Mitchell was named to the All-NIT as was Minnesota teammate Randy Dreuer. Both of those Gophers now are candidates for the NIT All-Star team which will play in Italy this summer.

When Mitchell enrolled at Minnesota two years ago, he was proclaimed as a future super-star, and it appears that the popular Gopher is on the brink of making that prediction come true.

At North Shore High School in West Palm Beach, FLA, Mitchell averaged 23 points and 12 rebounds a game while leading his team through an outstanding season. He earned All-State honors there and climaxed a brilliant prep career by being selected to Parade's first All-America team.

But those were prep honors. For the past two years Mitchell, who was named Minnesota's "Best Free Thrower" in 1979-80, has been plucking off collegiate accolades. Being named captain at the University of Minnesota is one more such honor.

Besides Iowa State, Illinois Chicago-Circle, Indiana State, Northern Illinois, Penn State and defending national champ Nebraska will throw some clouds and rain on the Gophers.

Even then, when Minnesota's team returns home after the NCAA trials, it can be proud of the fact that it was only one of two UI men's athletic teams to win a conference title--injuries and all. --UI--

SWIMMERS 19th AT NCAA FINALS

With Olympic hopeful Art Griffith pacing the way, Minnesota's swimming team finished in a tie for 19th place at the NCAA swimming finals held at Harvard. UI scored 16 points, tying with Princeton. California won it with 234 points.

Griffith swam to an 11th-place finish in the 100-yd freestyle with a time of :45.16. Scott Malm also chipped-in with a 24th-place finish in the 200-yd backstroke with a time of 1:53.17. Senior diver Brent Bordson helped the Gopher cause by taking a seventh in the 3-meter event with a score of 473.75. Also lending a flipper was the Gopher 400-yd freestyle relay team, who swam to 15th place with a time of 3:01.40.

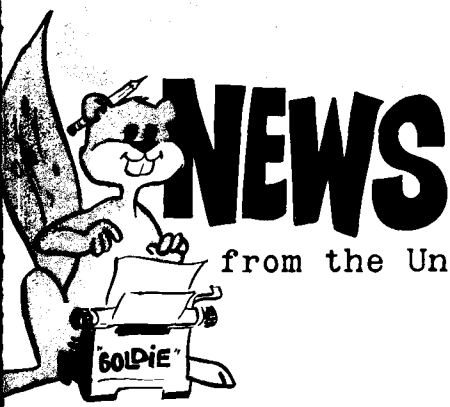
OUTDOOR TRACK DOWN IN THE HEART OF TEXAS

Minnesota is home for double headers at Siebert Field noon Saturday against Michigan, and 1 p.m. Sunday against defending conference champion Michigan State.

Earlier in the week the Gophers are scheduled to host Bemidji State Tuesday and Wisconsin-Stevens Point Wednesday in 2 p.m. double headers.

On the Southern swing Minnesota whipped Oral Roberts University Friday evening 12-4 banging out 17 hits, including back-to-back home runs by captain Mike Lauesen (1) and Phil Johnson (5). But it appeared the Gophers used up all their hits in that outing.

Minnesota dropped 2-1 and 3-1 decisions to ORU on Saturday, and were then shut out 4-0 by the University of Tulsa Sunday.

Junior lefty Ed Rech gave up seven hits Friday in gaining his third win against one loss. Junior Doug Fregin didn't fare as well in the first game Friday as he gave up just four hits in seven innings before tiring. Junior Steve Farley and sophomore Jeff German split the eighth inning with German giving up the winning hit as the Oral Roberts team won 2-1 in the extra frame.

Junior Tom Smith lost the next outing as the Gophers were drubbed 8-1, and freshman Bob Meyer only gave up six hits Sunday but lost 4-0 as the Gopher bats remained dormant.

Minnesota is now 3-3 on the season and faces a giant challenge when league-leader Michigan (2-0, 13-9 overall) and Michigan State (0-2, 5-17) visit Siebert Field.

"If nothing else we've got to find more consistency," Thomas said Monday. "We look like a million dollars one day, and then don't play worth a nickle the next. Our defense has to get much tighter, and our offense must begin producing with men on base.

"This is a tough way for a club as young as ours to start out. Michigan has a great pitching staff and a power lineup that features probably the best player in the conference in shortstop George Foussianes.

"I'm told right now he is hitting .403 on the season. He was a first team all-Big Ten selection last year and led the conference with a .452 average. He also led the league with five home runs and was second in runs batted in.

"As of this time I plan to pitch (Ed) Rech (L, 3-1) and probably (Doug) Fregin (R, 1-1) Saturday against Michigan. On Sunday we'll probably come back with freshman Bob Meyer (R, 1-1) for the first game, but the second pitcher right now is up for grabs.

"Junior Tom Smith (R, 2-2) is struggling a bit, so if he is not ready I could go with either junior Steve Farley (L, 0-1) or freshman Jeff Klein (R, 1-0). We're just not certain on that point."

Junior catcher Mark Carlson suffered a muscle pull in the cold weather at Tulsa Friday, so freshman Greg Olson caught the next three games and proved he can do the job. Olson will be hard pressed by Michigan as the Wolverines have already stolen a ton of bases, including three thefts of home.

Another player who came through looking sharp was freshman outfielder Tom Steinbach. According to Thomas, Steinbach has worked his way into a starting role somewhere in the outfield.

Michigan is expected to pitch its aces against the Gophers Saturday. That means junior Mark Clinton (R, 3-2) and freshman Steve Ontiveros (R, 3-4) will toe the rubber. Clinton has not allowed a run in his last 22 innings pitched, while Ontiveros is averaging 13 strike outs per game. They were the winners last weekend in conference games vs. Michigan State.

Clinton pitches a six-hit shutout as the Wolves won 7-0 Saturday. He struck out 11. Ontiveros won 4-1 Sunday giving up just five hits.

Both Michigan and Michigan State have games scheduled in mid-week like the Gophers, all non-league affairs.

Six outstanding student-athletes signed national letters of intent and will enroll at the University of Minnesota next fall. Two received basketball tenders while the others are hockey standouts.

BASKETBALL: Coach Jim Dutcher announced two signees. . .6-foot-10 prep center Jim Petersen, St. Louis Park, MN, and 6-foot-7 junior college forward John Wiley, Flint, MI.

Petersen was named prep All-America following the 1979-80 season. In three years he led his teams to the Minnesota Class AA tournament and helped compile a record of 61-13 overall. He averaged 20 points, 15 rebounds, five blocked shots and four assists this season. Dutcher says he will try Petersen at both center and forward.

The young giant is a front runner for the prestigious "Mr. Basketball" award in Minnesota.

Wiley comes to UM from Allen County Community College in Iola, KS, where he was named second team JUCO All-America this past season. Wiley averaged 17.5 points and 14.5 rebounds. But more important to Dutcher, he averaged 9.6 assists per game.

"Wiley will provide another dimension to our bringing the ball up the court and breaking the press," Dutcher says. "Also, he can be of big assistance in our fast break. Petersen has the individual skills needed to become a standout.

"Although only a freshman next season, Petersen, I hope, can make the same kind of contribution turned in by 7-foot-2 freshman center Randy Breuer last season. I believe we are very fortunate to gain the services of both new men."

Wiley was an all-stater as a senior for Beecher high school in Flint, MI, the same town that produced junior-to-be Gopher forward Trent Tucker.

HOCKEY: Newly appointed head coach Brad Buetow, who was acting coach for the Gopher hockey team last season, has announced four signings.

Included are four of Minnesota's finest prep stars of 1979-80. . .defenseman Ben Belde (6-0, 180), St. Paul Hill-Murray; goalie John Colombo (5-10, 150), Bloomington Jefferson; defenseman Mark Huglen (6-0, 180), Roseau; and left wing Tom Rothstein (5-9, 175), Grand Rapids.

"I personally believe we were able to sign the top four players in Minnesota," Buetow said Monday. "Each one of these youngsters has all the credentials needed to excell in college hockey. I can't wait to see them in a Gopher uniform. I believe our fans will be pleasantly surprised."

The four men were named all-state this past season. Rothstein was a member of the 1980 state champion Grand Rapids six while Belde's Hill-Murray team was runner-up and Colombo's Jefferson squad was third.

Both Rothstein and Belde played in four state tournaments. Colombo appeared in this year's bash, while Huglen, who played in two previous tourney's with the Broten brothers, Olympian Neal and Aaron, both Gopher squad members, missed much of the 1979-80 campaign with injuries.

Huglen and Belde are offensive defensemen who could, if needed, move up to a forward slot. Rothstein led the rugged Iron Range Conference in scoring this past winter, while Colombo allowed only 22 goals in 19 games and had six shut outs. He was undefeated until losing a tight game in the state tourney.

Buetow, who has been recommended as the new Gopher hockey coach to the UM Board of Regents by Athletic Director Paul Giel, will replace Herb Brooks who last year was on leave of absence to coach the gold medal-winning U.S. Olympic Team. Brooks coached seven years at Minnesota ending with a 175-100-20 career record and three NCAA championships in four trips to the national tourney.

Buetow last season was named WCHA Coach of the Year in leading his young squad to a second place league finish. The Gophers ended 26-15-0 overall, and 18-14-0 in the WCHA. UM was picked to finish eighth or lower before the season started.

Buetow served four years as an assistant coach to Brooks before taking over last winter. He graduated from UM in 1974 and played one year of professional hockey before a knee injury ended his playing days.

## GRIDDERS HOPE TO SCRIMMAGE ON SATURDAY

If the weatherman gives Coach Joe Salem a little bit of cooperation, the University of Minnesota football team will hold its first scrimmage of this year's spring practice session on Saturday.

Now in their second week of drills, Salem's contingent is behind schedule.... because of snow last week....but hopes to make up some ground this week and then get in a scrimmage on Saturday.

"We only worked two days last week," Salem pointed out, "and one of those sessions was inside. And we didn't get to scrimmage at all. We'll go every day this week in hopes of catching up and by the end of the week should be able to go at it."

The lack of work has made it difficult for Salem to analyze Minnesota's progress, but he still feels that the Gophers will be able to put together a solid corps of pass receivers.

"We've got some experienced people and we've got some promising newcomers," Salem said. "As a group, our receivers have more speed at that position than we had a year ago, and that should help."

Leading the way among the receivers will be Roy Artis and Kelvin Jenkins, both of whom won letters last fall. Chester Cooper also returns while Nick Davidson and Lonnie Farrow again will vie for playing time. In addition, Ron Weckbacker, a transfer, is getting a good look from Salem.

Artis was a runningback his first two seasons at Minnesota but was converted to a wide receiver spot last fall. "Artis came on strong in the second half of the season," Salem said, "and we look for even more improvement this spring."

Jenkins transferred to Minnesota a year ago from Long Beach, CA., and saw some service with the Gophers. "He has played for us so we know what he can do," Salem said, "we regard him as an excellent receiver."

Davidson and Farrow are sophomores-to-be-out of Florida. "Both of those people were in new positions last fall," Salem pointed out, "and it took them awhile to adjust from what they had been doing in high school. But they both have speed and both can become good receivers for us. We hope to give them every opportunity this spring."

Cooper will be a junior for Minnesota. "He played some two years ago," Salem said, and hopefully he will do the job this spring. He has some talent, and he could help us."

The newcomer is Weckbacker who arrived for spring practice after two years at Glendale Community College in California. "Weckbacker was an all-conference player at both the high school and junior college level out there," Salem said. "He caught 42 balls last year, so we know he has the ability. He'll get his chance this spring."

## RACQUETEERS TO FACE ST. OLAF BEFORE ROAD TRIP

Following a split in Michigan last weekend, Minnesota's tennis team faces St. Olaf at 3 p.m. on Tuesday at Bierman Courts. The Gophers then take an extended road trip through Purdue, Illinois and Illinois State before returning home April 22 against Wisconsin-Eau Claire.

Coach Jerry Noyce's squad will face the Oles with a 1-2 conference ledger and an overall record of 2-8. The Gophers received a shot in the arm by winning at Michigan State 5-1 last Friday before dropping a 7-2 decision to defending Big Ten champ Michigan on Saturday.

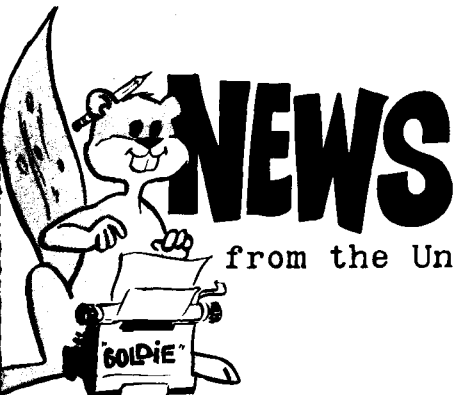

#### BSB TAKES 3 of 4 IN BIG TEN

Minneapolis, MN---The Minnesota baseball Gophers are far from feeling secure after winning three of four in its opening Big Ten series at home last weekend. The Gophers split with Michigan winning 13-2 and losing 2-7 Saturday before taking two from defending champion Michigan State 6-2 and 5-1 Sunday.

"It was great to get off on the right foot before two good crowds at home," Gopher coach George Thomas stated, "but we are not about to get smug about it.

"Our men played 27 innings of solid baseball. Unfortunately we played 23 innings over the weekend. Except for the sixth inning against Michigan in the second game Saturday, I can hardly fault the efforts of my men.

"But even that one bad inning did not turn the weekend sour. Maybe I could have made some different changes when Michigan scored all seven of its runs on two homers. I'm not about to blame anyone. I just hope we all learned, including me, that you have to do everything right to protect a 2-1 lead late in the game."

Now things really begin to tighten up for Minnesota. The next eight Gopher league outings are on the road, beginning with double headers Saturday at Purdue, and Sunday at Illinois.

"Hey, how about that Illinois?" Thomas commented. "They have a new head coach in Tom Dedin and were supposed to be in a rebuilding year. So all they did last weekend was split their first pair at Northwestern, and then edge powerful Iowa twice 10-9 in 9 innings, and 3-2. And all those were on the road.

"It's evident coach Dedin has his club primed and ready. So I expect double trouble this weekend. Purdue lost a pair of tough ones at Iowa Saturday, but (MORE)

rebounded to win twice at Northwestern Sunday.

"Don't tell me there isn't a ton of balance in the Big Ten this season. It appears now that whoever wins on the road has the advantage. We'll certainly find out quickly how good we are with eight straight games away from home."

#### LAUESEN LEADS AT BAT

Gopher senior captain and outfielder Mike Lauesen (LAW-son) led the Gopher attack with an awesome hitting display last weekend. The Morton Grove, IL, product collected eight hits in 14 at bats, including four doubles and his third home run of the season, and drove in eight runs. His output raised his all-season batting average from .200 to .231.

But Lauesen didn't do it alone. Several other Gophers turned in key hits and drove in runs at the right time, including right fielder Tom Steinbach (6 for 12, 6 RBIs), catcher Gary Olson (4 for 5, 2 RBIs), first baseman Phil Johnson (3 for 7, 4 RBIs), and third baseman Dave Francour (4 for 14, 4 runs scored). As a team the Gophers hit for a .375 average with 10 doubles and two home runs in 39 hits.

On the mound both Ed Rech (L, 4-1 and 1-0) and Tom Smith (R, 4-2 and 1-0) turned in complete game victories. Rech allowed Michigan 10 hits but fanned nine in winning 13-2 Saturday. Smith came back to take the second game against MSU 5-1 giving up just seven hits, striking out three and walking none.

Freshman hurler Bob Meyer (R, 2-1 and 1-0) took the other decision in giving MSU just four hits and 2 runs in 4 2/3 innings. Junior Doug Fregin (fra-GEEN as in keen) (R, 1-2 and 0-1) was breezing along on a three-hitter Saturday when Michigan erupted with its seven-run rally in the sixth inning.

For all games, freshman outfielder Steinbach leads Gopher batters with a torrid .462 average. He has appeared in 15 of the 24 games. Another rookie, catcher and infielder Olson, is next at .366 in 17 games.

On the hill Rech and Smith have the most wins, four each, while Rech owns the lowest earned run average, 3.21 in 23 innings.

## GOPHER GRIDDEES LOOK FOR IMPROVEMENT

With only 12 practice days left in this year's spring session, Coach Joe Salem's University of Minnesota football team will be striving for continued improvement.

The Golden Gophers will hold their third scrimmage of the spring session on Saturday, and if Salem's dreams come true, the U of M will be 100% better than it was last weekend.

"We showed some improvement from our first scrimmage," Salem admitted. "After the workout I told our players that I felt we had come along on both sides of the line. We had an extremely hard week of practice, and apparently it paid off. If we continue to work that hard, we will continue to improve. I'd like to think we can just get better and better."

One area in which the Gophers will have to get better is in their offensive line. With only one starter returning from 1979, Salem is faced with a major task of rebuilding.

On top of that, injuries have hampered the attempt to start that reconstruction, and three potential starters....Ken Dallafior, Ed Olson and Todd Hallstrom...were held out of last Saturday's scrimmage.

The bright spot would be, however, that some of Minnesota's other young players were given an opportunity to show their stuff. In that category would be Randy Rasmussen, a sophomore from New Brighton Irondale, who performed well at center in place of Olson after playing linebacker last fall.

Eric Peterson, a junior transfer from San Diego, CA., Mesa CC, also got his turn at guard in place of Hallstrom while Tony Wozniak, a sophomore from Lombard, IL., was one of several candidates getting a shot at tackle in place of Dallafior.

Kent Penovich, a senior from Muskego, WI., a veteran player who was injured midway through the 1979 campaign and had knee surgery, was at the other tackle spot and is looked at as a potential starter for next fall.

The other starting guard position was manned Saturday by Bill Humphries, a sophomore from Detroit, MI. Humphries was tabbed as a starter last year and opened the season with Minnesota's first unit. But an ankle injury put him on the shelf for the entire campaign. Now he's back, healthy and "playing well."

Other offensive interior line candidates are Keith Gehrke, sophomore from Arlington Heights, IL, Wally Kersten, junior (CC transfer) from Minneapolis, MN., Dick Maas, sophomore from St. Louis Park, MN., Mike Orgas, junior from Brooklyn Center, MN., and Terry Thompson, sophomore from Fridley, MN.

Those people helped open the holes for Marion Barber last weekend, and he rushed for 112 yards and two touchdowns in 22 carries. Coach Salem hopes even more progress will be made this Saturday when the Gophers go at it again.

## PAUL STEARNS NAMED NEW GOPHER SWIMMING COACH

Paul Stearns has been named the new University of Minnesota swimming coach to replace Bud Ericksen who resigned at the end of the 1979-80 season. Stearns' appointment is pending final approval of the U of M Board of Regents.

Stearns is a product of Hutchinson, MN. He graduated in 1968 after an outstanding prep career as a sprinter and freestyler. He was the state 50-yard freestyle champion in 1963.

Now 29, Stearns enrolled at the University of Minnesota and, after taking off the 1970-71 year to study at the University of Heidelberg, was graduated in 1973.

His coaching career began as top man at Minnetonka, and for six years Stearns served as head coach for both the boys' and the girls' teams. His girls' team won two state championships and his boys' team captured another.

While at Minnetonka, he worked with 13 high school All-Americans, and his outstanding efforts brought him the Minnesota prep "Coach of the Year" award three times. He also has coached the Lake Swim Club in Minnetonka.

This past year Stearns served as assistant coach under Ericksen at the U of M, and the 1979-80 season has been described as a "tremendous experience" by the new Gopher head coach.

"I came out of the year with a tremendous amount of respect for Bud," Stearns said. "He did a fantastic job with the swimming program at Minnesota. Filling his shoes will be a difficult task, but I'm happy for the opportunity, and I welcome the challenge."

Paul Giel, U of M athletic director, is confident that Stearns can get the job done. "We owe Bud Ericksen a big thanks," Giel said. "He brought Minnesota's program back. He lifted our swimmers from the bottom of the Big Ten to fourth place, and we all know how tough the competition is in our league. We'll miss Bud, but we're pleased to have a quality person like Paul on hand to take over. We feel Paul learned a great deal during his year working with Bud. He brings an outstanding coaching record with him, and we are confident that the University of Minnesota swimming program will remain in good hands."

Ericksen served as the U of M swimming coach for five years and in that short time returned the Gophers to respectability. A three-time All-America selection when a member of the Gopher swim team, Ericksen has tutored the Gophers on a part-time basis while pursuing a full-time career with an architectural firm in the Twin Cities. It was a great demand on his time in that field that necessitated his departure from the U of M staff.

Minnesota's men's tennis team slapped a 7-2 loss on Purdue, a 6-3 defeat on Illinois and then capped the weekend off with a 5-4 win over Illinois State before coming home to play Wisconsin-Eau Claire on Tuesday and then Carleton on Wednesday. Both matches start at 3 p.m. at Bierman Courts. Then on Saturday and Sunday, coach Jerry Noyce's team heads for corn country to face Iowa and Iowa State.

The Gophers, 6-9 overall and 3-2 in Big Ten play entertain two potentially tough foes on Tuesday and Wednesday. Against St. Olaf last week, Minnesota played its reserves and had a hard time before forging out a 5-4 win.

Singly, Kent Helgeson has moved into the No. 1 spot and promptly lost his three matches of the weekend. No. 2 man Ted Kauffmann went 2-1, No. 3 player Greg Wicklund was 2-1, No. 4 singles man Hakan Almstrom went 3-0 to continue his hot play. No. 5 player Gene Sperling was 3-0 also, while No. 6 player and top freshman on the team Dave Morin had his undefeated string broken, but still went 2-1 and is 7-1 overall on the season. The No. 1 doubles team of Kauffmann and Morin was 2-1. No. 2 team of Helgeson-Almstrom went 3-0 while the No. 3 duo of Sperling and Brian Biernat was 1-2.

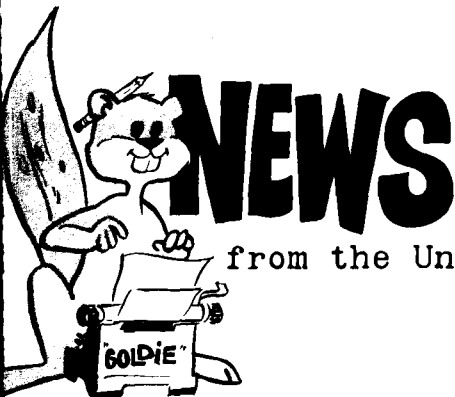
Coach Greg Harvey said Monday he was not all that disappointed in his team's play last weekend. "Our last four men struggled at exactly the wrong times," the coach offered, "but that's to be expected this early in the season.

"Junior Tom Lehman (Alexandria) continues to amaze me. Right now he is playing as well as anyone in the Big Ten from tee to green. It's just that his putts won't drop. But they will. Last Saturday he lined up no less than 13 birdie putts but only canned two. He lipped seven cups."

Lehman ended in a tie for second for individual honors with rounds of 76-71-55--222. Joey Sindelar of the number one Ohio State Scarlet team took top honors with 220 strokes. Indiana won the event at 1,137, three strokes better than the favored OSU scarlet squad. The Gophers totaled 1,190 strokes.

Harvey said Monday that three Gophers, Lehman plus senior captain Gary Gabrielson and junior Bill Folkes, are set for the Drake Relays tourney. But five additional golfers are battling it out for the remaining two spots. The latter will be decided with competitive rounds today and Tuesday.

#### BBB TEAM 2ND IN B-10

Minneapolis, MN—Minnesota had a brief sniff of first place in the Big Ten baseball standings during last weekend, but fell back to second on Sunday while splitting a double header at Illinois.

On Saturday the Gophers won twice at Purdue 6-2 and 13-5. But Sunday saw UI win the opener at Illinois 6-1, but then drop a wild 14-13 decision in the nightcap.

Minnesota has a chance to stay with the leaders this weekend as the Gophers make their final Big Ten road trip of 1959. Friday takes the team to Bloomington, IN, and a pair with the Indiana Hoosiers. On Saturday Minnesota travels to Columbus, OH, and another pair, this time against the Ohio State Buckeyes.

Indiana had been struggling in the conference race until last Sunday when the Hoosiers swept two from Northwestern by identical 5-4 scores. Indiana is now 3-3 in conference action, and 6-15 overall.

Ohio State went all the way from first place (2-0) a week ago to ninth place (2-4) by dropping all four weekend games. The Bucks lost double headers at home to Wisconsin and Iowa and now stand 11-16 for the entire season.

But Gopher coach George Thomas and Co. do not expect either of this week's opponents to roll over and play dead when UI comes to town.

"Last year Ohio State beat us 6-1 to kill any hopes we had of finishing near the top of the Big Ten race, and Indiana always plays us tough in their park," Thomas said Monday. "So we are planning on two very, very tough days. We'll have to play better than last weekend to survive.

"We could have, and to my way of thinking, should have swept all four games last weekend. Any time you have a six run lead going into the sixth inning, that game should give you a W.

"But give credit to Illinois. They scored nine runs with some big hits and took advantage of some untimely walks by our pitchers. I just hope letting that one get away doesn't come back to haunt us."

The other three contests went more to form. Junior Tom Smith (6-3, 2-1) went the distance to win 6-2 in the first game at Purdue. He struck out four and gave up just five hits. Catcher Mark Carlson hit a solo home run, his second of the year, and first baseman Phil Johnson chipped in with three hits, including a double.

In the second game the Gophers banged out 15 hits and scored seven times in the second inning. Big Ten bat leader Mike Lauesen, Gopher captain and left fielder, banged out three hits as did freshman right fielder Tom Steinbach. Each had one double and knocked in three runs. Freshman Bob Meyer (4-1, 2-0) took the win with relief help from Jeff German.

On Sunday junior lefty Ed Rech (5-1, 2-0) put down the Illini on four hits. Lauesen supplied the power with two hits, including his fourth homer, and two runs batted in. But the nightcap was murder.

The Gophers bolted to an 11-5 lead after five innings. Home runs by Steinbach (4) and Lauesen (5) and four singles good for three runs batted in by soph second baseman Gary Jost lead the way. Steinbach had four RBIs.

But the roof fell in on Gopher starter Doug Fregin (1-2, 0-1) in the sixth inning. Neither he nor relievers Jeff Klein (2-0, 0-0), German (0-2, 0-0) or Smith could stem the tide. Smith took the loss. Minnesota scored two runs in the seventh, but fell one short of the Illini.

Lauesen, who went into the weekend as the Big Ten's Athlete of the Week for his performance of one week ago, continued his hot streak by getting seven hits in 14 trips and knocking in seven runs. He is now batting a torrid .530 in conference play and also has 15 RBIs.

Freshman Greg Olson upped his Big Ten average to .474 (9 for 19) while Jost is batting .464 (13 for 28), Steinbach .443 (13 for 29) and Johnson .409 (9 for 22). As a team the Gophers lead the conference with a .392 average after eight games.

Rech is among the pitching leaders with a 1.93 earned run average. He has allowed three earned runs in 14 innings pitched. Smith has a 3.60 ERA giving up six earned runs in 15 innings.

Minnesota is 20-10 on the entire season. Michigan leads the Big Ten at 5-1 while the Gophers are 6-2.

## GOPHER GRIDDETS TO SCRIBPAGE AGAIN SATURDAY

Coach Joe Salem will send his University of Minnesota football team through another intra-squad scrimmage at 1:30 p.m. Saturday in Memorial Stadium. It will be the final "tune-up" for the Gophers as they head for the annual Spring Game on May 10.

Minnesota went through a gruelling two-hour session this past weekend that had both bright spots and moments of frustration for Coach Salem and his staff as well as for the Gophers.

"We're making progress," Salem agreed, "but we still have a lot of areas to strengthen. I think that from an individual standpoint, we are getting better. But from a team concept, we have not made the progress we are looking for. Maybe that's because we have had so many people hurt. But the fact remains we need a lot of improvement if we are to become winners."

One area that needs a great deal of work based on the way Minnesota finished the 1979 season, is on defense, and Smokey Joe remains very concerned about what kind of progress is being made in that area.

"We need to come a long way there," Salem stressed. "The big thing we have to do is find quality Big Ten football players to take over for us at both tackles and at nose guard."

Are the Gophers getting the job done? Defensive line coach Cal Jones maintains that the jury is still out. "We made some position changes this spring," he said, "knowing that we had to gain some quickness up front and fill the holes left by graduation. But we still are not totally satisfied."

One change moved Reed Wiecks, a sophomore, from tight end to nose guard. But he has been injured throughout spring drills. The Gophers added Tim Olson, a transfer from Mesabi Community College, at tackle. But he's been shelved with a broken bone in his foot.

"We haven't been able to evaluate either player," Jones said, "and that has held us back. We've tried a number of people at nose guard...like Brent Harms, John Wood and Rene' Capo. Harms looks like he could be a player in the making, but all of those people need more turns."

On the credit side of the ledger, Jones says the most encouraging signs have been at tackle where Steve Bisch and Kevin Kellin have continued to perform more impressively with each practice.

Both sophomore lettermen, Bisch is 6-5 and 251 while Kellin is 6-2 and 242. "We moved Bisch from nose guard to tackle," Jones pointed out, "and he has come a long way. Kellin is making great progress. They are going to be Big Ten players."

If some of the nuisance injuries which have plagued the Gophers in spring drills thus far begin to mend, Jones could get his "newcomers" back in time for the spring game. "We would like to have them around for at least a few of our remaining practice days," Jones said. "Then maybe we'll know exactly how much progress we have made defensively."

## FOOTBALL COACHES' CLINIC SCHEDULED THIS WEEKEND

The University of Minnesota High School Football Coaches' Clinic is on tap this weekend with sessions scheduled for coaches on both Friday and Saturday at Coffman Memorial Union on the U of M campus.

Clinic staffers will include all members of the Golden Gopher football coaching staff, additional members of the U of M athletic staff and special guest speaker Joe Mayer of Rochester Lourdes.

Registration is scheduled for 8 a.m. to 9:15 in the Great Hall at Coffman on Friday. The clinic will end officially with the U of M intra-squad scrimmage on Saturday.

Friday's first session starts at 9:15 a.m. with Head Coach Joe Salem speaking on the "Run & Shoot" offense. Mayer will discuss the play action passing game at 10:15 and Offensive Line Coach Jim Clements will speak on spring pass protection at 11:15.

At 12 noon a luncheon will be served at Williams Arena with the Minneapolis Chamber of Commerce Sports and Attractions Committee serving as host.

Bob Rankin, Minnesota's receiver coach, will speak on the passing game at 1:15 p.m. and Bob Rhode, Gopher strength coach, will discuss weight training at 2:05 p.m.

Minnesota's golf team led by medalist junior Tom Lehman (Alexandria) swept all honors at the Drake Relays meet in Des Moines, IA, last week.

Lehman's 216 total was four strokes better than Knox Jones of Nebraska who came in at 220.

The Gophers posted an 893 team score to whip Nebraska by 13. The Cornhuskers scored 906 edging out Missouri which took 903 strokes.

Other finishers included Kansas (914), Tulsa (918), N. Iowa (949) and Kansas State (951).

Lehman all but took a day off with a final round of 76. He went into the final 18 holes with a nine stroke lead for individual honors. His first rounds of 71 and 69 had, says coach Greg Harvey, others talking to themselves.

"The course we played on is very demanding, a private course," says Harvey. "It is used as a National Open qualifying course every year. Local golf folks couldn't believe the way Tom Lehman was tearing up their layout. He is really peaking, and once his putts really start to drop, there is no telling how well he can play."

Junior Bill Folkes and sophomore Kirk Snider were second for the Gophers with 225 strokes each. Folkes had rounds of 73-76-76 and Snider was 75-73-77. Senior captain Gary Gabrielson was next with 76-82-75-233 and sophomore Jay Swanson had 79-76-84-239.

This week the Gophers play host to their own Invitational Meet at the University of Minnesota Golf Course. More than 20 of the best college teams from the upper midwest are entered in the two-day event.

Eighteen holes will be played Thursday starting at noon. On Friday the teams play 36 holes with 7:30 a.m. and 12:45 p.m. shotgun starts.

Doug MacLeod, radio voice of the hockey Gophers the past two years, will M.C. the program.

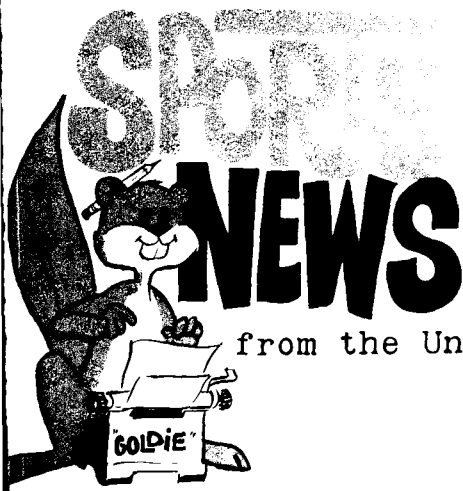
Besides comments and introductions by new head coach Brad Buetow, special awards will be presented to members of the 1979-80 Gopher varsity.

So, what's new? The more things change the more they stay the same.

For the umpteenth time the Minnesota baseball Gophers are charging into the stretch drive with high hopes of winning another Big Ten title. UI has six league games remaining, all at Dick Siebert Field.

The Gophers, 10-2 in the conference and 27-11 overall, first play a pair of non-conference games vs. Wisconsin-La Crosse at 2 p.m. Tuesday, also at Siebert. Then comes the stretch run.

The Gophers host, in order, Northwestern (3-7) Friday at 2 p.m., Iowa (7-3) Saturday at 1 p.m., and Wisconsin (7-5) next Tuesday, May 13, at 2 p.m. All dates call for double headers.

GOPHERS SWEEP 4 ON ROAD

Minnesota enhanced its chances by sweeping four Big Ten road games last weekend with two of those wins coming via final inning rallies. The Gophers won twice at Indiana Friday, 7-4 and 7-6.

In the second game UI trailed 5-2 entering the final inning, but scored five times and held on despite a solo lead off home run by the Hoosiers. The seventh Gopher run came on a wild pickoff throw.

Saturday the Gophers swept Ohio State, 8-1 and 7-4. Again the Maroon and Gold struggled in the nightcap.

Trailing 4-2 in the fourth inning, junior catcher Mark Carlson evened matters by stroking a two-run homer, his third of the season. He later started a three-run rally in the final inning with a lead off single, his third hit of the game.

Once again juniors Tom Smith (3-3, 3-1) and Ed Rech (6-1, 3-0) turned in route-going performances on the mound. Smith allowed 11 hits but beat Indiana 7-4. Rech hurled a five-hitter while striking out seven to whip OSU 3-1.

A pleasant surprise was the return to form of junior Doug Fregin (2-2, 1-1) who held on to defeat OSU 7-6. Fregin allowed eight hits, including singles to the first four batters he faced, but struck out eight and was tough in the clutch. He retired the last two batters with the bases loaded in the final inning. Sophomore Mike German (1-2, 1-0), in relief of freshman Bob Meyer (5-1, 2-0), gained the second game win at Indiana with two innings of one-hit pitching.

Junior first baseman Phil Johnson had four hits and knocked in seven runs last weekend to lead the Gopher attack. Big Ten bat leader Mike Lauesen (.525) went six for 10 at the plate and scored five times. Carlson and Johnson hit the only Gopher round trippers, their 3rd and 7th, respectively.

#### THOMAS ON THE GOPHERS

"My belief at this time is that if we win all six games we can win the Big Ten," head coach George Thomas said Sunday. "But that's a long shot.

"All three opponents have shown a lot of strength and will come at us with guns blazing. And remember, Michigan has only lost once to our twice.

"It's an old cliché, but we really must concentrate on these remaining games one at a time. We can't worry about Michigan or any other team. We must simply concentrate on our own play. It's nice to put pressure on someone else to win, but we can only do that by winning our own games.

"Playing six conference games in five days could place an awful strain on our pitching staff. Two starters, Ed Rech and Doug Fregin, need the most time between starts. Their arms are not all that healthy.

"We'll probably start Tom Smith and Bob Meyer Friday against Northwestern, and come back with Rech and Fregin Saturday against Iowa. Next Tuesday Smith and Meyer will get the call again with, hopefully, Rech and Fregin ready for bullpen duty.

"Smith and Rech have been our mainstays, but I have to say that for a freshman, Bob Meyer has come a long, long way. The Big Ten is really a tough league for rookie pitchers. And sophomore pitcher Jeff German has proved to be solid in relief.

"On offense right fielder Tom Steinbach (Gopher bat leader at .412 for all games) and shortstop Bill Piwnica (PWIN-ih-ka) (.323), both freshmen, have made tremendous contributions. Without them we would not be 10-2 in the Big Ten.

"Captain Mike Lauesen has not only hit often and with authority, but has been a strong leader both in left field and on the bench. His total contributions would be hard to measure."

## GOPHER NETTERS PREP FOR BIG TEN FINALS

The best in collegiate tennis come to Gold Country next Friday, Saturday, and Sunday at the Northwest Racquet Club when Minnesota hosts the 1980 Big Ten tennis championships. Playing host for the first time since 1976 coach Jerry Noyce will try to get his Gophers rolling. The Gophers finished a respectable third in last year's meet, scoring 27 points and tying Ohio State for the show spot.

1980 was to have been the Gophers' year but injuries to Mike Trautner and Mark Wheaton staggered the club. Trautner teamed with Ted Kauffmann to win the No. 1 doubles title for the Gophers last year and was Minnesota's No. 1 singles player.

Michigan is the team to beat -- again. The Wolverines have a stranglehold on the Big Ten that is ironclad. Ohio State appears as a team with a chance to topple Michigan, while Indiana, Wisconsin and Minnesota are outsiders.

One key to Minnesota's chance of scoring high and making some noise about what teams finish where in the upper division is Hakan Almstrom, Noyce's answer to Bjorn Borg. Like Borg, Almstrom is from Sweden and also like Borg, Hakan relies on his extreme quickness. He is a very steady player overall. Almstrom is at No. 4 singles and teams with Kent Helgeson for UM's No. 1 doubles duo.

Another Gopher to watch is freshman Dave Morin. Morin is 7-1 in Big Ten play this year at No. 6 singles and is one of Minnesota's most determined players. One bombshell that Noyce hopes to explode at the right moment is big Kent Helgeson. Helgeson can play first, second or third singles and relies on a cannon shot for a serve.

One must not forget the one who has tasted victory from last year and could provide that experience -- Ted Kauffmann. Ted has won five straight in conference play and knows what to expect come tourney time. He is at No. 2 singles. Gene Sperling with his strong baseline play and Greg Wicklund with his serve and overall shot-making round out the Minnesota hopes in singles.

Meanwhile, Minnesota took two of three during the week to move the ledger up to 10-11 overall and 4-4 in the Big Ten. If UM continues to churn out 5-4 decisions each dual, Noyce will be gray in the scalp long before his time.

The Gophers defeated Gustavus Adolphus 5-4 on Tuesday, lost to Wisconsin 5-4 on Friday and then really tossed a wrench into the conference standings with a 5-4 win over Northwestern on Sunday. The Cats had been cruising right along hoping for second or third place in the dual meet standings.

Before Minnesota can begin the tourney next weekend, they must face Ohio State in a 7:00 p.m. match this Wednesday back at Northwest Racquet Club. The Bucks are only one game behind Michigan in the dual standings so a wild affair may be in store when they hit town.

## GOPHER SPRING FOOTBALL GAME ON TAP SATURDAY

More than a month of gruelling practice will come to a halt Saturday when Coach Joe Salem puts his 1930 University of Minnesota football team through its final scrimmage in the annual Spring Game starting at 1:30 p.m. in Memorial Stadium.

Although there is no advance sale for that climactic showdown, tickets for the Spring Game are priced at \$1 and will be available at the gate.

For the finale, Salem has indicated that he will team up the number one offensive unit and the number one defensive unit and send them against remainder of the squad in a "best against the rest" kind of maroon vs. white scrimmage.

"We know that we have made progress on an individual basis this spring," Salem analyzed, but we still need more continuity and improvement on a team basis. For that reason we won't split our squads up. We'll keep our top units together and hope they can put something together in our final session."

The "best" backfield will feature Garry White and Marion Barber as the runningbacks with transfer Bruce Olson functioning as the trigger. That trio sparkled in last weekend's final tuneup, and Salem hopes they will do so again on Saturday.

White carried only three times, but scored one TD last time out on a 45-yard scamper. Barber carried six times for 40 yards and another TD while Olson tossed a 50-yard scoring strike to fleet-footed receiver Roy Artis. On the day Olson was six of 11 for 103 yards.

Overall it was an offensive kind of scrimmage last Saturday. The Gophers scored six times on "regular" drives as well as scoring twice more during a goal line offense workout where they started with the ball on the 15.

Other players performing impressively last weekend were Marvel Ross who rushed for 54 yards in 11 carries and Bill Swats, quarterbacking the second unit, who rushed for 39 yards himself, scored twice and hit four passes for another 41 yards.

Glenn Lewis had 45 yards in nine carries, Duane Gregory 30 and Bob Strout 28 more during the two hour workout.

Despite that explosion, Salem was far from satisfied with the scrimmage and indicated that the Gophers must be sharper in the future. He hopes the future begins Saturday in the Spring game.

"Our defense has to shore things up," he said. "We've gotten better, but we still are giving up too much ground. We allowed too many long gainers, and we can't do that next fall if we hope to win."

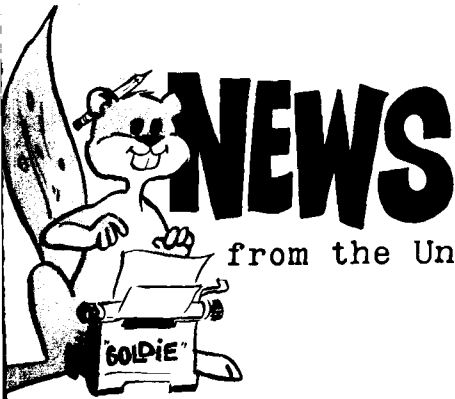
Salem also said there was room for improvement offensively. "We came up short on too many occasions," he told his squad. "We had too many fumbles and we hurt ourselves with too many penalties."

### BSB TEAM FINISHES STRONG. . .NOW WAITS

Minneapolis, MN. . .For the University of Minnesota baseball team and head coach George Thomas, one season has ended. Now a painful waiting period must be endured to see if the Gophers gain an opportunity to play a second season.

Minnesota completed the regular portion of its 1980 schedule with a flourish Tuesday by sweeping a Big Ten double header at home against Wisconsin. The Gophers won 9-1 and 10-5 using five home runs as their chief weapon.

That means Minnesota completes its regular campaign with a 33-13 record for all games, and can finish no worse than second in the Big Ten with a 14-4 mark. But there is, or could be, more.

To begin with, league-leading Michigan (13-1) plays its final four league games on the road this weekend. The hot Wolverines play twice at Iowa Saturday and twice at Northwestern Sunday. Two wins automatically gives the 1980 conference crown to Michigan.

However, should the leaders drop three games, a tie would develop with Minnesota. And should Michigan drop four (the latter two possibilities are quite remote), then the Gophers would become champions.

Whatever, should Michigan win the title this weekend, then the Gophers await decisions by the NCAA selection committee to see if Minnesota gains an at-large berth for a spot in a regional playoff. There are eight sites from Maine to Hawaii with the winners advancing to the College World Series at Omaha, NE, beginning May 30.

A decision on the latter is expected either Sunday evening or early Monday.

But whether Minnesota continues on or not, 1980 has been more than a pleasant surprise to Coach Thomas and others.

Going into the season, Minnesota was picked to finish in the middle of the Big Ten pack. The team was too young and hitting was a big question mark.

The pitching appeared solid with four starters returning. But then, that shows what all we experts know.

For the most part Minnesota's pitching corps struggled from the start. Sore arms and assorted other injuries depleted many vets, so freshmen were brought to the front and turned in fine performances.

(MORE)

But the hitting was what threw everyone off. At the beginning it didn't appear the bat power was there. WRONG!!!

Minnesota completed its Big Ten campaign with an awesome team bat average of .350 and averaged 7.5 runs per game. The Gophers pounded out 13 doubles, four triples and 14 home runs among their 172 hits in 18 games. That figures out to a .528 team slugging percentage.

Leading at the plate in conference action this season is senior captain Mike Lauesen who batted .456 with 16 extra base hits and 24 runs batted in. He, too, finished with a flourish by hitting two home runs good for 5 RBIs in the final against Wisconsin.

Other Gophers who hit extremely well in Big Ten play include junior first baseman Phil Johnson (.423), freshman catcher-DH-infielder Greg Olson (.400), freshman outfielder Tom Steinbach (.386), sophomore second baseman Gary Jost (.361), junior catcher Mark Carlson (.355), sophomore outfielder Ronn Van Krevelen (.340) and freshman shortstop Bill Pivnicka (PWIN-ih-ka) (.326).

On the hill, junior lefty Ed Rech completed his league season undefeated with a 5-0 record and a sparkling 2.46 earned run average. Rech went the distance in his first three outings, but needed relief help the last two. He also led the Gopher mound staff with 25 strike outs in 29.1 innings pitched.

Right behind Rech is junior Tom Smith who picked up a save for his pitching buddy Tuesday vs. Wisconsin, and then won the second game in relief. Smith ended 4-2 with a 4.30 ERA in the Big Ten and tossed four complete games in as many starts and he relieved three times and pitched 37.2 innings.

Freshman Bob Meyer was Minnesota's other bright pitching light in Big Ten play as he finished his first campaign with a 3-0 league mark in five starts.

#### THOMAS ON THE GOPHERS

"It would be a fitting tribute to our young team if they were selected to compete in an NCAA Regional," coach Thomas said Wednesday. "They have scrapped and clawed their way to an impressive league record.

"Nobody gave us a chance to finish with the leaders. But that seems to be the rule rather than the exception around here.

"The Minnesota basketball and hockey teams were also picked to be among the also rans, and look what they did. Maybe their performances had a positive effect on our men.

"Whatever, I'm very, very proud of the way our players performed. I hate to think of how many games we pulled out in the late innings. They simply refused

### NETTERS TIE FOR THIRD IN BIG TEN

After the first day of competition, all that was left was the battle for second place as Michigan was running away with their 13th straight Big Ten tennis title.

And considering Minnesota's fifth-place finish in the regular season, it came as a pleasant surprise when the Gophers scored 32 points in the tourney, tying with pre-tournament favorite Wisconsin for third. Not only that but coach Jerry Noyce's netters fell just one point shy of second place as Northwestern scored 33.

Comparatively, it was a vast improvement over last season for the Gophers. Not only did point totals differ, but UM had more players scoring those points this year. In 1979, Minnesota scored 27 points after finishing second in the regular season race with a 7-2 dual record. This year the Gophers, after finishing 5-4 had their first singles champion since 1972, another doubles champ and had another singles place second.

Ted Kauffmann almost made it two titles in two years, as the sophomore from Toledo lost in the finals at second singles. Greg Wicklund won the consolation playbacks at third singles.

Hakan Almstrom, Minnesota's Swedish import from Stockholm, became UM's first singles champ since 1972. He defeated Don Petrusky of Ohio State 6-3, 6-3 for the title at fourth singles. Freshman sensation Dave Morin won the consolation playbacks at sixth singles.

Kauffmann-Wicklund lost in the finals of the playbacks of first doubles, as Minnesota was defending their title. Kauffmann and Mike Trautner won the crown last year. But another doubles crown came at second doubles as Kent Helgeson and Almstrom beat Rhys Thomas and Andy Ringlien of Wisconsin 6-4, 7-6.

It wasn't a lost weekend for Kauffmann, though. He didn't spend all his time on Second Place Avenue. Kauffmann was named to the All-Big Ten team.

It wasn't a bad day as Minnesota continues preparation for the Big Ten championships which will be held at Illinois in two weeks. Judging from a couple of performances this weekend, the Gophers will have a fighting chance to do a bit better than from past efforts.

Larry Berkner continued his assault on the steeplechase by running 8:53.5. Berkner has already clinched a place at the NCAA's in the steeplechase. Freshman Tom Polisen was fifth in the 1500 meters with a time of 3:47.4 -- a rather sizzling one at that. Lance Marcuson long jumped 20-8 1/4, good for third and Steve Schlanged sprinted to a time of :15.68 in the 110 high hurdles.

Ike Okolue, Tom Coles, Jay Mountain and Steve Everhard finished 2-3-4-5 in the 400 meters. Terry Haythe clocked an :11.04 in the 100 meters and Al Whitesell cleared 15 feet in the pole vault for first. Colby Verdegan ran to a 1:52.5 in the 800 and Steve Hoff a :59.0 in the 400 IM hurdles. Mountain and Everhart were 2-3 in the 200 meter dash, Mountain clocked at :23.3, Everhart at :23.5.

## GOPHERS WIND UP SPRING PRACTICE SESSION

With spring practice completed, second-year coach Joe Salem took time out to reflect on the good things that came out of spring drills....as well as how much remains to be done if the University of Minnesota is to have a winning football team in 1980.

"We had a good session," Salem said after the Spring Game drew to a halt last Saturday. "We had a number of people, a number of individuals who came out of practice better football players. We improved ourselves, team-wise, in some areas. But it is obvious that we have other places that need improvement and help. That will have to come when we open practice next August."

On the credit side of the ledger, Salem points to the improvement made by the Gopher defense. "We found some people who are ready to play," he said. "and most of our first unit looks solid."

Along those lines, Salem listed the defensive secondary as one of the strong points with veterans Ken Foxworth, Glenn Cardelli, Dana Noel, Mike Robb and Rick Witthus leading the way. Mike Peppe and Bill Prairie also improved.

The top two linebackers, Jim Fahnhorst and Glenn Howard, gave Salem "good vibes" but a lack of depth at that post still is a worry.

"Jeff Schuh had a good spring and is solid at one end," Salem said. "We also were pleased with the progress of Kevin Kellin and Steve Bisch at tackles. But we are not satisfied with our situation at nose guard, and we still need more depth at all of those positions."

On the offensive side of things, Salem lists the running backs as the number one asset. "Marion Barber and Garry White will run with anybody," Salem maintained. "We also think Glenn Lewis and Marvell Ross can help." Barber scored twice (once on a 69-yard romp) while leading the Maroons to a 20-win in the Spring Game.

Minnesota's receiving corps, while not boasting a player like All-Big Ten departee Elmer Bailey, "appears adequate" in the eyes of Salem. "Chester Cooper showed vast improvement, and Roy Artis has a world of talent. Kelvin Jenkins also will do the job. At tight end we've got two veterans in Randy Sonnenfeld and Mike Curtis. That makes for a good group."

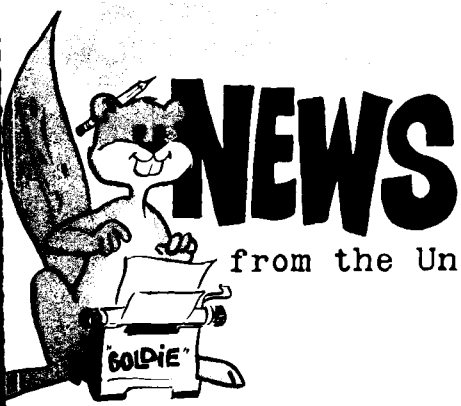
The offensive line, needing a total overhaul, apparently made solid progress. "Ken Dallafior is a good player," Salem said, "and we liked the way Todd Hallstrom, Bill Humphries, Kent Penovich and Randy Rasmussen came along. Again it's a case of a lack of depth."

Which brings Salem's analysis to quarterback. "We are a long way from being ready," Salem maintains. "Greg Pylatiuk was running with the first unit but had knee surgery. Bruce Olson took his place with Bill Swats and Tom Pence next in line. But none of those people did the things that have to be done. None were able to read the defenses properly. None made the right adjustments. Our quarterback situation is far from ready, far from settled."

Salem, only hours after spring ball was over, seemed anxious for August and the start of fall drills!

BSB ENDS 33-13, NO BID

Minneapolis, MN---It can be devastating if a high school teen-age senior is not invited to the senior prom.

Well, it wasn't devastating for the University of Minnesota baseball team, but it hurt a lot. The hurt came Monday when the Gophers learned they were not invited to the NCAA post season playoff party.

Minnesota ended second in the Big Ten with a 14-4 record trailing champion Michigan which posted a 14-2 mark. It marked Michigan's 19th title tying them with Illinois for the most conference crowns.

"It may sound like sour grapes if I complained about not being selected to compete in one of the eight regionals," said head coach George Thomas Monday, "but I am extremely disappointed for the young men on our squad.

"What it boils down to in the final discussions was our record against NCAA Division I schools (13-8). But one must remember two things: that a portion of that was on our spring trips to Texas and Oklahoma, the remainder in Big Ten play.

"Because of budgetary reasons, many Big Ten schools simply cannot play enough Division opponents without traveling to the deep South or West.

"But in stating that I'm not criticizing the selection committee. They face an awfully tough task as evidenced by their four and one-half hour phone conference on Monday. I guess that I'm just dejected for our players, that's all."

The Gophers completed their 1979-80 campaign, Thomas' second, with a handsome 33-13 record. Minnesota was 19-9 against non-conference opponents, but on the two spring trips to the South came home with a 5-7 mark.

RECORDS SET

But not all was a loss. Predicted to finish somewhere in the middle of the Big Ten pack before the season opened, Thomas brought a very young team a long way this season.

To begin with only two seniors, captain and left fielder Mike Lauesen (Morton Grove, IL) and third baseman Dave Francour (Marinette, WI), saw any regular duty this spring. The rest of the squad was mostly sophomores and

freshmen. . .which means Thomas should have a solid, veteran squad returning for 1980-81.

This year's club batted at a pace never equaled at Minnesota. The Gophers compiled a team batting average of .329, and led the Big Ten with a gaudy .350 average.

Leading the way was a freshman, right fielder Tom Steinbach (New Ulm), who hit .389 on the entire season. In the Big Ten Lauesen carried the hottest bat as he stroked opponent pitching for a .456 average.

But the latter mark was only good enough for second place as Iowa first baseman Joe Hoyman ended with a .475 conference average. Hoyman came in with a minimum 40 at bats to qualify. He had 19 hits while Lauesen went 26 for 57 in league play, including 9 doubles, 2 triples and 5 home runs for 54 total bases.

Trailing Steinbach in the all-games average column was junior first baseman Phil Johnson (Sleepy Eye) at .382, freshman catcher-infielder Greg Olson (Edina) .370, sophomore second baseman Gary Jost (St. Paul) .342, Lauesen at .333, sophomore outfielder Doug Collins (Ann Arbor, MI) .323, and freshman shortstop Bill Piwnica (Minnetonka) .319.

Johnson ended the top slugger with 8 home runs and 12 doubles, the latter figure one short of the school record.

As a team the Gophers slammed out a record 80 doubles for all games.

In the pitching department two juniors, Ed Rech (St. Paul) and Tom Smith (Edina), combined for 18 of Minnesota's 33 wins. Rech finished 8-1, 5-0 in the Big Ten, and earned the top earned run average (ERA) on the squad at 2.86.

Smith came within one win of tying the school record as he posted a 10-4 won-lost mark and a 4.08 ERA. Smith appeared in 16 games and had 13 starts while Rech made eight starts and had nine appearances. Each hurled five complete games. Smith ended 4-2 in Big Ten competition.

Freshman Bob Meyer (Richfield) was next in line with a healthy 6-1 record and was 3-0 vs. conference opponents.

Lauesen and Francour received additional tributes this week when it was announced they had been elected to the Big Ten's All-Academic first team. Lauesen owns a 3.02 grade point average (4.0 = A) while majoring in accounting, while Francour, who finished the season batting .293 as the valuable Gopher leadoff hitter, has a 3.2 GPA majoring in physical education.

But with only three seniors completing their baseball eligibility at Minnesota this year, coach Thomas and Co. can rest assured they will have to be looked at favorably when it comes to 1980-81.

GOLFERS 7TH AT BIG TEN, LEHMAN TO NATIONALS

Minneapolis, MN---The 1980 season ended for the University of Minnesota golf team as it finished seventh behind Big Ten champion Ohio State in the title meet at Madison, WI, last weekend.

But for one member of the Gopher varsity, junior Tom Lehman from Alexandria, the season is not over. Named All-Big Ten for his performance this season, Lehman received and accepted a bid Monday morning to compete in the NCAA championship meet on Ohio State's Scarlet Course May 28-31.

Lehman finished a disappointing 15th in the Big Ten finals coming in with an even 300, 12 strokes behind medalist John Morse of Michigan who took 238 swings. But with good reason.

Just prior to leaving for the conference meet, it was learned that Lehman had suffered a stress fracture in his left foot. "For (Tom) Lehman to shoot a 300 with a manufactured swing, it's testimony to how good a player he is," said Gopher coach Greg Harvey Monday.

"He was only hitting with about 60 percent power. I would like to know how many golfers could compete under those conditions. He was not allowed to use a golf cart and had to walk 36-holes Saturday. His round of 80 Saturday morning did him in.

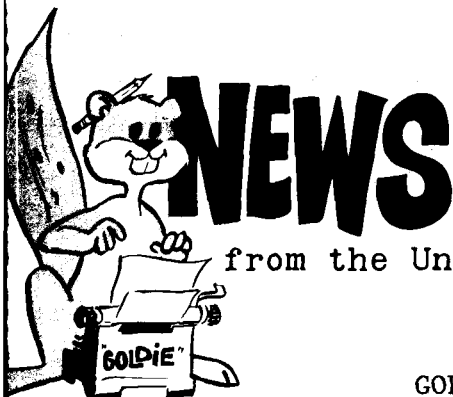
"So it is a tribute that he also had rounds of 73-73-76 to fashion his score of 300.

"I'm certain our other players are a bit disappointed that we didn't finish higher, but we just couldn't put four rounds together to make a run at second or third. Our season wasn't all that bad, but then, there were days we couldn't put a shot in the ocean, either."

Lehman finished the year with a stroke average of less than 74 per round and captured three medalist ribbons.

Other finishing scores for UM at the Big Ten meet included a 302 by sophomore Kirk Snider from Hastings, a 303 by senior captain Gary Gabrielson from Omaha, NE, a 308 by Bill Folkes, a junior from Coon Rapids, a 309 by sophomore Steve Offelie from Waconia, and a 318 by Tom Varty, a senior from Elk River.

## 1980-81 Gopher Hockey Outlook With Coach Brad Buetow:

"I've got to feel nothing but optimism about the coming 1980-91 Gopher hockey season. In fact, I wish we started tomorrow. After working with most of these young men for one season as head coach and realizing the tremendous dedication and effort they put forth collectively, well, like I said, we can hardly wait to get back on the ice.

"We are blessed with the return of 17 lettermen from last year's team which finish extremely well at 26-15-0 on the season, and 18-14-0 for second place in the WCHA. Our men also reached the first round of the NCAA playoffs before being eliminated.

"Our other returning letterman, sophomore center Neal Broten, played for the victorious U.S. Olympic Team last winter after helping lead us to the NCAA championship in 1978-79.

"All in all we appear pretty deep at most positions. Our losses were small in number with only four lettermen gone. However, the quality we lost in wings Tim Harrer (53 goals), captain Don Micheletti (10 goals), John Meredith (12 goals), and defenseman Peter Hayek, our most consistent checker, is huge. Replacing these four has to be our first task.

"We have two proven WCHA goalies back in junior Jim Jetland and soph Paul Butters. Butters ended the 1979-80 campaign awfully strong. In addition, junior Paul Ostby and freshman John Columbo could also play important roles in net for us.

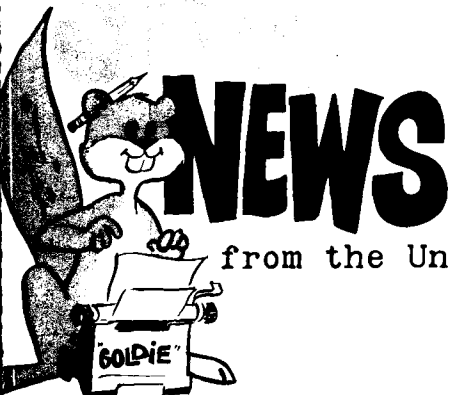
"Five lettermen return on defense including co-captains Mike Knoke, and Bob Bergloff, both seniors. Knoke scored 46 points last season and Bergloff 31. Others returning include senior Bart Larson, who could return to forward, plus sophomores Mike Meadows and David Jensen. Soph Brian Zins, out last season with knee surgery, could be a giant plus along with reserves Dave Dillon and Gino Peluso at the blueline. Newcomers with a chance back here are Mark Huglen, Ben Belde and Scott Richart.

"Up front the Broten Brothers (Aaron & Neal) are expected to be giant keys. Aaron won WCHA Rookie of the Year honors last winter. Both are proven scorers and solid playmakers. Others at center could be Brad Doshan and Scott Bjugstad, and possibly Bart Larson. Kevin Hartzell can go at either center or RW. We are a bit short at the latter slot with only Hartzell, Mike Reilly and Butsy Erickson returning here. But others could be shifted.

"On the left side senior co-captain Steve Ulseth leads the way with Steve Griffith, Jeff Teal and Dave Terwilliger ready to step in, too.

"Add in some fine young forwards who made solid contributions at times last winter, men like Jeff Langevin, Paul Lundeen, Scott Schriefels, Brian Thorson, Tom Mogush and a few others and the picture gets even better. In addition, freshman forward Tom Rothstein could also move his way into the starting lineup.

"However, I do not foresee the WCHA getting any weaker than in past years. It should be another dog fight to the finish. I believe with the same dedication and more freedom from the injury bug, Minnesota could be a factor in the run for the MacNaughton Cup in 1980-81."

The Men's Intercollegiate Athletic Department at the University of Minnesota has ended its attempt to have published a magazine designed specifically for the promotion of Golden Gopher sports and in the process has pledged restitution to all subscribers.

"We believe that about 1,100 people subscribed to the magazine," Athletic Director Paul Giel said. "They are loyal Minnesota boosters, and if the publishers are unable to make those refunds, the U of M will."

Last October the University of Minnesota contracted with LeDuc Enterprises, Inc., a national firm headquartered in Kansas City, MO., to publish "GOLD COUNTRY, Inside Gopher Sports." The magazine was to have begun publication in January and continue each month for the next eight months until it was to become a weekly publication during the 12 weeks of football season.

In February, however, Giel was notified by LeDuc that it had found it financially unfeasible to publish GOLD COUNTRY and advised him that it was offering subscribers the option of a refund or a subscription to a national magazine devoted to college sports.

Then in April Giel was informed that LeDuc had filed for bankruptcy and publications for Minnesota, as well as 25 other universities such as Alabama, Michigan, Nebraska and Penn State, had ceased.

GOLD COUNTRY subscribers had a subscription contract directly with LeDuc Enterprises, although promotional materials and subscription application forms did not clearly indicate that to be the case.

LeDuc Enterprises apparently has not notified GOLD COUNTRY subscribers that it has filed bankruptcy. Despite repeated attempts by the U of M, LeDuc has refused to turn over the GOLD COUNTRY subscription list to Minnesota. University attorneys currently are attempting to obtain a court order directing LeDuc to provide that list to the U of M, and once the list is received, direct contact will be made with each subscriber.

SPRING WRAP-UP & RANDOM GOPHER NOTES

Minneapolis, MN---The rites of spring are all but completed for members of the University of Minnesota Men's Department of Intercollegiate Athletics.

Only two student-athletes face further intercollegiate competition. Senior Larry Berkner (Ely) and freshman Mike Gebeke (White Bear Mariner) run this weekend in the NCAA championships at Austin, TX. Berkner competes in the 3,000-meter steeplechase and Gebeke the 1,500-meter run.

There were mixed results for Minnesota's varsity baseball, golf, tennis and track squads.

Baseball ended with the highest finish, a second place in the Big Ten race at 14-4 behind champion Michigan's 14-2 mark. Percentage points decided the race as Michigan had two games rained out. The Gophers finished their complete schedule with a strong 33-13 record.

It was the latter mark that produced the largest disappointment of spring. Minnesota, under second-year head coach George Thomas, believed it would receive an at large bid to an NCAA regional site. But the Gophers were passed over as teams from the South and West were chosen.

Coach Jerry Noyce saw his Gopher tennis squad post the best finish in the Big Ten, a tie for third, since he took over the Gopher reigns in 1974. Minnesota tied with Wisconsin just one point behind second place Northwestern. All three trailed Michigan which captured its 13th consecutive Big Ten net title. Minnesota hosted the meet.

The Gophers came away with some individual honors in the meet. Sophomore Hakan Almstrom (Stockholm, Sweden) took the number four singles championship, and later teamed with junior Kent Helgeson (St. Cloud) to win the number two doubles title. Sophomore Ted Kauffman (Toledo, OH), runner-up at second singles, was named to the All-Big Ten team.

Junior Tom Lehman (Alexandria) proved to be the brightest spark for coach Greg Harvey's varsity golf squad. Lehman captured three medalist ribbons in tournaments and finished high enough in the Big Ten meet to garner an invite to the NCAA Championships.

In the latter event, even though playing with a stress fracture in his left foot, Lehman finished a credible 20th among national golfers. He was named to the All-Big Ten team a second straight year.

All in all it was a good spring even though devoid of any team championships. But as always, Minnesota was in the thick of things from start to finish.

### THREE THINCLADS GO TO NCAA'S

Minnesota's outdoor track team is sending three times the number of athletes to the NCAA Track and Field finals this weekend at the University of Texas than UM sent to the finals during the indoor season. That brings the amount of Gophers that will be deep in the heart of Texas this weekend to three.

While Haythe and Gebeke are the youngsters of the trio, senior Berkner will tackle the grueling 3000 meter steeplechase. With a time of 8:48.57, Berkner just barely made it under the wire. The NCAA qualifying time is 8:49.0. Berkner had the third-best steeplechase time during the Big Ten season this spring and was just an eyelash ahead of teammate Gordon Weaver and his time of 8:50.2.

The Gophers won't win the team title this spring but three is better than one any time.

'80-'81 GOPHER HOCKEY SCHEDULE

Minneapolis, MN---The University of Minnesota has announced a 37-game varsity hockey schedule for the 1980-81 season.

Included on this year's slate of opponents are 20 home games at William's Arena, 14 against Western Collegiate Hockey Association (WCHA) opponents, and six against Dartmouth, Providence and Ohio State.

Minnesota opens its season with a non-conference game against Michigan Tech October 17 at Eveleth, MN, the Annual Hall of Fame Game.

Besides traveling to seven WCHA cities for 14 league games, this year new head coach Brad Buetow will take his club to San Diego, CA, December 6-7, for games against U.S. International University.

Buetow, acting head coach last season filling in for U.S. Olympic coach Herb Brooks, piloted the Gophers to a surprising 26-15-0 season record, and an equally surprising 18-14-0 WCHA log good for second place in the final league standings.

The 1979-80 Gophers then waltzed through the WCHA playoffs only to be eliminated by Northern Michigan in a first round NCAA playoff contest.

Buetow will greet 17 returning lettermen from last year's club when training camp opens in late September. In addition, welcomed back after a year's absence will be sophomore Neal Broten who lettered in 1978-79 when UM won its third NCAA championship. Broten was a mainstay on the Gold Medal winning Olympic team last winter. He will join younger brother Aaron who was named WCHA Rookie of the Year for 1979-80. Both are expected to play center.

John Perpich has become Buetow's full-time assistant coach while Mike Foley will remain on the staff as part-time assistant.

## GOPHER PRACTICE OPENS ON MONDAY

More than 30 newcomers are expected to be on hand Monday when Coach Joe Salem whistles the start of fall drills for the 1980 University of Minnesota Golden Gopher football team.

Freshmen will work without pads during the first week of practice before the veterans arrive in time for "Press Day" on Saturday, Sept. 23. Full-scale drills for the entire squad are on tap for the following Monday.

"The first week will be a good one for the new people," Salem said. "It gives them a chance to get their feet on the ground, get to meet some of the other players and learn something about our system before the veterans arrive. We like the plan."

And while Salem does not expect to solve all his problems with newcomers, he does hope to find out which of the first-year people will be able to make contributions right away.

That will be the case in a couple of specific areas as Salem attempts to find a replacement for record-setting Mark Carlson at quarterback, to fill the void in Minnesota's kicking game caused by the departure of Paul Rogind, and to find a "big play man" at noseguard while trying to shore up the Gopher defense.

"We got a lot done during practice last spring," Salem points out, "We made some position changes, and we got a look at some new people. All of that will help us in our preparations this fall."

Once the veterans report, Salem knows he will be looking at what already has been described as the "best pair of runningbacks in the Big Ten." That "Dynamic Duo" includes Marion Barber and Garry White, a pair of seniors around whom Salem is expected to build his 1980 offense.

Barber will go into his final campaign ranked as the University of Minnesota's all-time rushing leader. He already has 2,318 yards to his credit and last season broke the old mark set by current U of M Athletic Director Paul Giel in 1951-52-53.

"In spring practice Barber looked like he was bigger, stronger and faster than ever," Salem proclaimed. "He's up to 231 pounds and has worked hard in our weight program. Being named captain has given him even more incentive. If he can stay healthy, Barber should have an excellent season."

White, a speedy if not overpowering runner, will team with Barber to give Minnesota an explosive one-two punch this fall. A year ago White took over the number one fullback position and responded with an 861-yard season.....despite missing almost three full games with an injury.

"Quickness and the added experience should give White the opportunity for another excellent season," Salem said. "A year ago he had 230 yards against Wisconsin and 221 yards against Ohio State. He's capable of giving us that kind of performance."

## BUTCH NASH TO RETIRE

George "Butch" Nash, a fixture as well as a legend in University of Minnesota athletics, has indicated that he will retire from coaching at the end of the 1980 college football season.

"It has been a tough decision for me to make," Nash admits, "but I have been in coaching for almost 40 years. I have enjoyed every minute of it, but there comes a time to step down. Now I want to devote some time to my family."

Nash, fresh out of Minneapolis Edison High School, enrolled at the University of Minnesota in 1935 as a promising all-around athlete. He quickly began living up to that promise and was an end on the 1936 national championship football team as well as the Big Ten championship squads in 1937 and 1938.

In basketball, Nash was a guard on Golden Gopher squads that also became winners and captured a loop championship during the 1936-37 campaign.

"I'll always be grateful for my undergraduate years at Minnesota," Nash said. "It was an honor to be a Gopher, and I'll always be proud of the fact that I was able to play for Bernie Bierman."

Following his graduation from Minnesota, Nash coached at high schools in Anoka and Winona. He led that latter team to a conference championship in 1941 before WW II interrupted his coaching career. In 1946 Nash returned to Winona and took on the additional duties of athletic director.

Then in 1947 Nash "came home" to the University of Minnesota where he became an assistant coach on Bierman's staff. Since then he has toiled under such additional head coaches as Wes Fesler, Murray Warmath and now Joe Salem.

"Coaching has been good to me," Nash said. "It was been a wonderful experience working with young people. There have been some big moments, like beating Michigan 16-0 in 1977 and coming off the field with the Little Brown Jug in my arms. And the two Rose Bowl trips were great. But now it's time to take off the pack."

When practice begins with the arrival of Minnesota's 1980 freshman crop next Monday, Nash will be on the field for his 34th season in Gold Country. And when he steps down following the game at Wisconsin on November 22, there will be some "tough shoes to fill" on the U of M coaching staff.

"The University of Minnesota owes a great deal to Butch Nash," U of M Athletic Director Paul Giel said. "I'll feel the loss personally and as an athletic director. His contributions to our program may never be duplicated. He will remain an inspiration to us all."

Coach Salem expressed similar sentiments. "Butch will be impossible to replace," he said. "He's been a part of Minnesota athletics for as long as anyone can remember. I'll always be personally grateful for what he has done for me....as a player here at Minnesota and when he helped me get my first coaching job at South Dakota through his friendship with John Roning. Butch Nash is one of a kind. All of us are richer for having known him."

## GOPHER CAGERS TO MAKE EUROPEAN TOUR

The University of Minnesota basketball team will get a taste of international competition this fall when heading for Europe and a 10-game, 17-day trip through England and Scotland.

Coach Jim Dutcher and his nine-man squad will begin 10-days of practice at the University of Minnesota on Tuesday, Aug. 26. The U of M delegation will depart for London on Sept. 5 and return on Sept. 21.

During their tour, the Golden Gophers will play two games in Scotland against the Scottish Nationals and eight more games in England against several top-flight teams.

"All of the teams we will be playing will provide excellent competition for us," Dutcher said. "The English teams which we will be facing have a number of Americans on their rosters who played college basketball, so we know it will be a very challenging trip."

Under NCAA rules, an American college or university may make one foreign trip every four years. "With nine underclassmen on our squad who will be with us this year and again next year, this becomes an excellent time for us to make such a tour," Dutcher said.

Historically tours such as this have proven very beneficial. "Michigan State made a tour of South America and came back to win the NCAA championship," Dutcher pointed out. "And Michigan went to the Final Four the year it had played in Egypt. In both cases, those coaches felt that the additional experience and extra practice were contributing factors. Hopefully it will have the same effect for us."

In addition to receiving sanctioning from the NCAA, the Gophers also have had the trip approved by the University of Minnesota, by the Big Ten Conference and by the State Department.

Planned by Universal Sports Accord, the tour was put together through the cooperation of the Basketball Federation of Scotland and England and the Amateur Basketball Association of the United States of America.

The trip will be financed through contributions from Northwest Orient Airlines, Control Data, the Golden Dunkers basketball booster club and from funds which will be raised in pre-season scrimmages next November at such sites as St. Louis Park, Lake City and Rochester.

Gophers making the trip will be Captain Darryl Mitchell, Bruce Kaupa, Ben Coleman, Randy Breuer, Gary Holmes, Zebedee Howell, Mark Hall, Andy Thompson and Trent Tucker. All were members of the 1979-80 U of M contingent that reached the finals of the NIT in New York last March.

## VETERANS TO JOIN ROOKIES IN DRILLS AT U OF M

The old will join the new in football practice at the University of Minnesota next week when Coach Joe Salem brings the veterans into camp to begin getting ready in earnest for his second season as head man of the Gophers.

Freshman arrived early and went through their indoctrination session "in shorts and T shirts" before the veterans were asked to report for Press Day on Saturday.

And now Salem will step up the pace with two-a-day drills beginning next Monday in preparation for the 1980 season opener at Memorial Stadium on Saturday, September 13 against Ohio University.

"It will be good to get the entire group together," Salem said. "The early start for the freshmen really helps. It gives them a chance to get to know each other and to show us what they can do as well as learn something about our system before the veteran players show up. This way they aren't lost in the shuffle. But now it's time to really get to work. We'll be glad to have the old timers in camp."

Leading those late arrivals will be Captain Marion Barber, a senior runningback who comes into his final campaign ranked as the all-time University of Minnesota rusher with 2,318 yards.

Joining Barber in what Big Ten observers have called the "best tandem of runners in the conference" will be Garry White, senior fullback who last year led the Gophers in rushing with 861 yards.

That "Dynamic Duo" will form the nucleus for Minnesota's offense this season, and with senior Glenn Lewis chipping in, could give the Gophers an explosive running game to compliment Salem's already legendary "run-and-shoot" attack in '80.

Defense was Minnesota's problem last fall, and in spring drills the Gophers made some position changes and looked at new people in an attempt to shore up the situation for another go 'round.

"We made progress in the spring," Salem admitted, "but we still have a long way to go. We have a lot to accomplish in a short time this fall before we are ready to play either Ohio or a Big Ten opponent."

And the schedule looks challenging! After opening against Ohio University, Minnesota must journey to Ohio State and then come home to entertain Southern California. But with six assignments on tap in the Brick House, Salem is hoping that the Gophers will be able to improve upon their 4-6-1 mark of a year ago. (MORE)

GRIDDERS SET FINAL SCRIMMAGE ON SATURDAY

It's that time of year when people think about a fall tune-up, and Joe Salem, head football coach at the University of Minnesota, is no exception. He's got one scheduled for his Golden Gophers on Saturday.

"We'll have our final two-a-day session on Friday," Salem said, "and then have the final big scrimmage of our pre-season practices on Saturday. Next week we'll taper off a bit before the opener."

That opener is on tap Saturday, September 13 with Ohio University of the Mid-America Conference providing the opposition at 1:30 p.m. in Memorial Stadium. And with that first duel drawing closer and closer, Salem is anxious to have his club in top-running order.

"We had our first scrimmage last Saturday," Salem pointed out, "and while some things went well, some others didn't. It just pointed out how far we still have to go before we are ready to play Ohio."

The Gophers hope that practice this week...plus a mid-week scrimmage on Wednesday and then that final head-knocker on Saturday...will enable Minnesota to smooth out the rough spots that have surfaced in early drills.

"Offensively, in our first scrimmage, I felt our number one unit did a pretty good job," Salem admitted. "We moved the ball well....mostly on the ground.... with Marion Barber and Garry White doing most of the work."

Salem also had some thoughts about Minnesota's play on the other side of the line. "Defensively, it was encouraging to see them pick off six passes," he said, "but it was not comforting to see the second unit run the ball down the field against our top defensive group."

And while those six interceptions made the defensive people smile, it did nothing for the humor of the offensive coaches. "We were throwing poorly," Salem explained, "because we were throwing to the wrong man. Mentally we just were not ready. We made mistakes offensively that we can't afford to make."

Smokey Joe still felt the first session was productive, however. "We made some progress, and we showed some improvement," he said. "We simply have to face the fact that we are a very young football team that has some growing up to do. We have to work hard this week to improve ourselves as individual football players. If we do so, we'll have a better scrimmage on Saturday."

GOPHER TALES---Bill Swats, freshman quarterback, continued to run with the first unit this week after completing three of three in the scrimmage last weekend. Those passes accounted for 42 yards.

Tim Salem, another freshman quarterback candidate, moved up to the second unit after he hit five of seven for 56 yards and one touchdown.

In the receiving department first-team tight end Mike Curtis had four grabs for 49 yards while White had three for 33 and the touchdown strike from Salem.

Barber and White topped the rushers with 56 yards each. White averaged 11.2 in five carries while Barber averaged 4.7 in 12 and accounted for a pair of touchdowns on short inside blasts.

Defensively the six interceptions came from six different Gophers....Mike Robb, Glenn Howard, Anthony Davis, Rick Witthus, Bill Prairie and Mike Stensrud. The defensive unit also had a fumble recovery.

Salem opened camp knowing he had to find a new kicking game. Saturday Jim Gallery, freshman from Morton, MN, booted three straight PAT's but missed his fourth attempt. He also was wide on a 44-yard field goal attempt. Steve Edling, freshman from St. Croix Falls, WI, punted only once....that one for 39 yards.

While the hitting in the first scrimmage was tenacious, only one major injury occurred. Bill Prairie, junior from Rosemount, MN who missed all of last season with a knee injury, hurt that same knee again. He may require surgery and could be lost for the year.

Salem made another major position change this week. In hopes of bolstering his thin linebacking corps, he moved Glen Cieslewicz from fullback to that defensive post. Cieslewicz is a freshman from Green Bay, WI.

The Gophers still are not satisfied with the nose guard spot defensively. John Wood, a sophomore from Schofield, WI, replaced Brent Harms on the first unit while Jeff Moritko, freshman from Minneapolis, MN, took over the number two spot.

Minnesota's defensive secondary continues to look solid. Ken Foxworth and Dana Noel are the top cornerbacks while Robb is set at rover and Witthus has taken over at safety. The second unit has Glenn Cardelli and Andre Harris at the corners with Mike Peppe at rover and Stensrud at safety.

The offensive line....as young as it is....has been impressive thus far. That unit includes Ken Dallafior and Kent Penovich at the tackles, Todd Hallstrom and Bill Humphries at the guards and Ed Olson at center.

## CAGERS GO ABROAD

Minneapolis, MN---For the first time a University of Minnesota men's basketball team travels to foreign lands for competition.

Friday, September 5, coach Jim Dutcher and nine varsity players depart the Twin Cities for points east. The Gophers play two games in Scotland and nine more in England before returning home Sunday, September 21.

Minnesota plays the Scottish National Team twice, while all games in England are scheduled against club teams.

The Gophers began practice last week and will have worked out 13 times in 10 days prior to leaving for London.

"That's plenty of time to get ready," Dutcher said Monday. "We concentrated on fundamentals of man to man defense and our fast break transition game in the mornings, then scrimmaged each evening.

"The transition game is most important. We will be playing under international rules where the referee doesn't touch the ball in the backcourt. That leads to a lot of running and quick exchanges and we'll have to be ready to play their style of ball."

As to the opposition, Dutcher believes "We won't find out how strong they are until we see how many American players are on each club. We even expect to play against former Gopher Dave Winey in England.

"Last year North Carolina played in a Christmas tournament in London and they were looking for some easy wins. But the clubs they played were loaded with Americans and North Carolina lost both games. So we're not expecting anything easy."

Dutcher also said he believes the biggest single benefit from this trip could result from he and his players being together for 16 consecutive days.

"During the season we are only together for practice and short trips," the coach offered. "Other coaches who have taken their teams abroad believe the togetherness is an awfully important factor.

"The extra practice and games is also a large benefit. We are able to install things we don't usually find time for during a regular pre-season camp."

Players making the trip include: (juniors) 6-2 G Mark Hall, 6-10 F-C Gary Holmes, 6-4 G & Captain Darryl Mitchell, 6-6 F Andy Thompson, 6-5 F-G Trent Tucker, (so phomores) 7-2 C Randy Breuer, 6-9 F Ben Coleman, 6-7 F Zebedee Howell, and 6-1 G bruce Kaupa.

Assistant coaches Jim Williams and Jesse Evans, plus trainer Jeff Monroe complete the travel roster.

Coach Dutcher says a Gopher booster club, the Golden Dunkers, plus Control Data Corp. have made donations to help offset costs of the trip. In addition, Dutcher has scheduled some pre season scrimmage games at Williams Arena with proceeds also going towards covering trip expenses.

Official practice for the 1980-81 season, Dutcher's sixth at Minnesota, begins October 15 with the season opener against North Dakota State at home November 29.

## RE-BUILT GOPHERS HOST OHIO IN OPENER SATURDAY

In pre-season polls, the University of Minnesota was tabbed for a second division finish in the 1980 Big Ten Conference race. In fact some prognosticators figured the Gophers could wind up in eighth place.

That gloomy outlook was based upon the fact that second-year coach Joe Salem came into fall practice facing a mammoth rebuilding job, and chances of bettering a 4-6-1 record of a year ago appeared slim.

Among the priorities on Salem's re-building list were:

- 1-To find a quarterback to replace record-setting Mark Carlson
- 2-To replace five of six starters in the offensive line
- 3-To shore up a defense that collapsed in the second half of the 1979 season
- 4-To find a "Big Play" man for the defensive unit....hopefully at nose guard.
- 5-To come up with a new kicking game.

The Gophers apparently didn't accomplish all they hoped last spring, so when fall drills opened, Salem still was searching for answers in those five major problem areas.

How far along Minnesota has come in reaching those goals may be answered Saturday when the Gophers open their 1980 season against Ohio University of the Mid-America Conference in Memorial Stadium at 1:30 p.m.

"We've made progress this fall," Salem maintains. "We knew when we started that we had some ground to cover. We knew what we had to accomplish. We've come along. Exactly how far we'll find out Saturday."

Looking at the quarterback position, Salem decided after the final scrimmage last Saturday that he would open up with son Tim Salem, a promising freshman from St. Thomas Academy.

"Tim did a good job of moving the ball in that final tune-up" Salem proclaimed, "and he's been around long enough to know the offense. So that's the way we'll start. If things don't go well, we'll come back with Bill Swats."

Another freshman from Ft. Myers, FL., Swats had been listed as the top signal caller when fall drills opened, but he lost that spot last week. Behind Salem and Swats, the Gophers also have Bruce Olson, a sophomore from Reedsburg, WI., available. And providing more depth at that position are Greg Olson, sophomore from Edina, MN.; Jeff Kleinheinz, freshman from Milwaukee, WI.; and Bob Sudler, freshman from Miami, FL.

There doesn't appear to be any problems in the rest of the backfield with Captain Marion Barber, senior from Detroit, and Garry White, senior from Rockdale, TX., leading the way. And they'll get help from Glenn Lewis, senior from Edina, MN.

The offensive line, although young and inexperienced, may be a surprise. "We've got some talent there," Salem maintains. "We are confident that they can get the job done once they get some playing time under their belts."

Topping that group will be Ken Dallafior, junior from Madison Heights, MI., who was a starting tackle last season and at 269 pounds literally looms as a giant for the Gophers this season.

Bill Humphries, sophomore from Detroit, returns to start at one of the guard spots. He was a regular last year until injured in the second game. Other starters include Kent Penovich, senior from Muskego, WI., at tackle, Todd Hallstrom, sophomore from Mora at guard, and Ed Olson, sophomore from Crystal at center. Mike Curtis, sophomore from Eau Claire, WI., will open at tight end.

While the Gophers may not have a game-breaker like Elmer Bailey around this year, they do feel they have a stable of quality receivers available. Included are Kelvin Jenkins, senior from Long Beach, CA.; Chester Cooper, junior from Paulsboro, NJ.; Roy Artis, senior from Lawnside, NJ.; and Nick Davidson, sophomore from Miami, FL.

On the defensive side of things depth now appears to be the major concern for the Gophers. "We knew we had to have more speed on defense," Salem admitted, "and we hope the position changes we made will do the job. But we still don't have the depth we would like, especially at linebacker."

Up front Minnesota will open with Fred Orgas, sophomore from Brooklyn Center, and Jeff Schuh, senior from Crystal, at the ends. The tackles will be a pair of sophomores, Kevin Kellin of Grand Rapids and Steve Bisch of LeSueur. The nose guard will be John Wood, sophomore from Schofield, WI.

Jim Fahnhorst, junior from St. Cloud, MN., and Glenn Howard, junior from Paulsboro, NJ., are set at linebackers. The cornerbacks will be Ken Foxworth, senior from St. Louis, MO., and Dana Noel, senior from Wheaton, IL. Rick Witthus, sophomore from Glencoe, MN., has been tabbed as the starting safety while Mike Robb, sophomore from Cottage Grove, will open at rover.

In the kicking department, Salem is expected to use Jim Gallery, freshman from Morton, MN., on kickoffs, extra points and field goals. His punter will be either Steve Edling, freshman from St. Croix Falls, WI., or Gregg Smith, sophomore from Stewartville.

GOPHER TALES---Minnesota and Ohio University have met four times on the gridiron. The Gophers lead 3-0-1 after posting a 24-10 triumph at Memorial Stadium last fall.

Trailing 10-7 at halftime a year ago, Minnesota came back with a strong second session to gain the triumph as Marion Barber scored one touchdown and passed 35 yards to Roy Artis for another.

Following Saturday's opener, the Gophers must travel to Ohio State to take on the nation's top-ranked Buckeyes next week before returning home to entertain USC on September 27.

Barber will go into Saturday's game against Ohio ranking as the University of Minnesota's all-time rushing leader. The Gopher captain starts his final season with 2,318 yards. He's also Minnesota's all-time leading touchdown maker with 24.

## CROSS COUNTRY OPENS UP 1980 SEASON

Minnesota's cross country team opens up the 1980 campaign this Saturday when the Gophers of Coach Roy Griak travel to the Wichita Invitational. Griak will take a predominately underclass squad as only one senior, Joe Nabbefeld, will perform in the 8,000-meter race.

Nabbefeld, the Gophers' 1980 captain, anchors UM's harriers. Uncommonly injury-prone, Nabbefeld hopes to improve upon 13th, 21st and 28th place conference finishes from 1979. He is a senior from Appleton, Wisconsin.

Junior John Idstrom from Owatonna is a key returnee, as is St. Paul's junior Don Hurley. Idstrom finished 22nd and 23rd in Big Ten meets while Hurley turned in a 50th but then jumped to 29th in conference competition.

Sophs Mike Gebeke and John Keohen, junior Lloyd Ness (a transfer from Kentucky) and freshman Dave Morrison round out the remainder of the Gopher squad traveling to Wichita.

The University of Minnesota Golf Course will be the scene of the 1980 Gopher Invitational on Saturday, September 20 at noon. The 8,000-meter race brings in Wisconsin-Superior, Mankato State, Athletics Northwest from Canada, Wisconsin-River Falls, Macalester, Big Ten rival Iowa, Dakota Wesleyan from Mitchell, SD and North Dakota State.

Minnesota ran away with last year's Invitational by scoring 17 points to runner-up St. Olaf's 60. Hurley and Idstrom paced the Gophers with a 1-2 finish as the Gophers captured six of the top ten places.

The only member of the Olympic squad to return to college hockey, Broten, however, had to undergo some anxious moments before learning his course was set as planned for the coming season.

Following the Olympic Games at Lake Placid, NY, the hockey squad gathered in New York City, and part of their time was spent before the cameras filming an advertisement for a national business firm.

However, unlike his teammates, Broten did not receive any financial compensation for his appearance. But his appearing in said commercial was challenged and it wasn't until last week that the NCAA enforcement committee ruled in his favor. . . ruled that Broten had not violated any NCAA rule.

Thus, the outstanding sophomore-to-be will join the 1980-81 Gopher varsity under new head coach Brad Buetow. Possibly most important of all for Neal is the opportunity to rejoin his high school buddies this year.

For three years at Roseau high school in Minnesota, Broten centered a line between wings Aaron Broten, his younger brother, and Butsy Erickson. It was one of the most prolific scoring lines in Minnesota prep hockey history. However, they may not skate as a unit this year as Aaron, last year's WCHA Rookie of the Year, has become an excellent center himself.

The Gophers were 26-15-0 and finished second in the WCHA last season. A strong nucleus of returnees from that squad is now that much deeper in talented vets with the return of Neal Broten.

## MINNESOTA HOPES TO REBOUND AT HOME AGAINST TROJANS

Last winter, about Rose-Bowl time, Coach Earle Bruce of Ohio State warned Coach John Robinson of the University of Southern California that Minnesota plays differently at home than it does on the road.

If Bruce didn't become legendary as a prognosticator last weekend when his Buckeyes were trouncing the Gophers 47-0 in Columbus, then Coach Joe Salem of the University of Minnesota hopes to complete the task when his youthful gridders host USC in Memorial Stadium at 1:30 p.m. on Saturday.

A year ago the Trojans had no trouble disposing of Minnesota 48-14 in the Los Angeles Coliseum, and Bruce's tale was based on how close the Gophers had come to upsetting Ohio State in the Brick House during the '79 season.

But Salem's dream of getting "over the hump" ended last weekend when his inconsistent Gophers were outmanned by OSU on the road, and now the second-year Minnesota coach can only hope his squad will respond in the friendly confines of Memorial Stadium.

The task will not be an easy one. The highly-ranked invaders will bring an unblemished 2-0 record into Minnesota with them after polishing off South Carolina 23-13 this past week. Earlier the Trojans had beaten Tennessee 20-17.

"Obviously we have to play better than we did against Ohio State," Salem admitted. "You can expect a team to make some mistakes over a season, but we made enough in the first half against the Buckeyes to last all year. To stay with a class team like Ohio State, you have to play error-free football. We didn't and we couldn't."

So where does that put the 1-1 Gophers this week as they get ready for USC? "We learned a lesson.....the hard way.....at Ohio State," Salem said. "We are a young football team that HAS to learn. I told our players that we simply had to have a good week of practice and get our stuff together before Saturday. We know that USC is another excellent football team, so it's going to be another tough job."

But Salem knows that if Minnesota is to rebound this week, it must eliminate the mistakes which led to the OSU romp last Saturday. The Gophers were penalized 10 times, and it seemed like every infraction helped the Bucks to a score. Minnesota also fumbled six times (it lost four of them!) and had three passes intercepted.

"You can't turn the ball over like that and expect to win," Salem said. "We have to eliminate those errors this week against USC or we will be in trouble again. Ohio State has a great football team with great team speed. But so does USC, and that's where we are at right now. Our goal, BECAUSE we are so young, is to get better each week. And I think we can."

Minnesota backers maintain that the score at Ohio State does not give a true

(more)



indication of how the Gophers played. Field position and turnovers, they claim, made the final score more lopsided than it should have been.

"Our defense deserves a lot of credit," Salem maintains. "They played very well considering the field position we gave OSU all afternoon. It seemed like every time we looked up, the Bucks had recovered a fumble or intercepted a pass in four-down territory, yet our defense held several times and forced them to settle for a field goal."

Offensively, Minnesota was blanked, and that is a sore spot with Salem. "Statistics indicate that we were even with Ohio State," he pointed out, "but every time we had something going we wound up hurting ourselves with a penalty or coughing up the ball on a turnover. But now it's over. We have to forget it. We have to get ready for USC."

GOPHER TALES---Minnesota's tale of woe at OSU got even worse on the way home when it's chartered plane had to put down in Central Wisconsin to refuel and wait out a severe storm.... all of which brought the weary Gophers home two-and-one-half hours late. "It was a perfect end to a perfect day," Salem moaned.

Minnesota and USC have shot it out in football five times in an abbreviated inter-sectional rivalry that got started in 1953. The visiting Trojans have won three of those starts while one contest ended in a tie. Minnesota's only win over USC was 25-19 in 1955.

Last fall USC exploded to a 21-0 lead in the first period and went on top 35-0 in the second period before reserves took over for the final two stanzas. "The Humane Society was after us for trying to kill the white horse that USC has gallop around the field after touchdowns," Salem quipped.

Against Ohio State, freshman quarterback Tim Salem completed his first nine passes before the Bucks began to solve Minnesota's run-and-shoot efforts. He finished the day with 12 completions in 22 attempts for 100 yards and will go into Saturday's contest with USC boasting 25 completions in 38 attempts (.657) for 262 yards.

All-America candidate Marion Barber, senior captain from Detroit, never ran harder than he did at Ohio State, but his efforts only netted 46 yards in 15 carries. In two starts, Barber has 172 yards in 37 carries and an average of 4.6 yards per try.

While Minnesota's punting game still keeps Coach Salem awake nights, the Gophers freshman kickoff specialist remains impressive. Jim Gallery only got one chance to show his stuff in the Ohio State stadium last week, but that boomer went out of the endzone.

Trainer Jim Marshall reports that the Gophers suffered a lot of bumps and bruises at OSU to go along with their damaged pride. Causing the most concern seems to be Barber's sprained ankle and Garry White's injured wrist.

## GOPHERS TO INVADE OHIO STATE ON SATURDAY

What's the difference between the Ohio University Bobcats and the Ohio State Buckeyes? The distance between the two Ohio schools is about 60 miles, but the difference in the two football teams probably would be better measured in light years.

Last week Coach Brian Burke of Ohio University said that when he battled Coach Earle Bruce of Ohio State for an area prep athlete in their annual recruiting wars, the Bucks "probably win 10 out of 10."

And that's the difference Coach Joe Salem will see on Saturday when he takes his University of Minnesota football team to Columbus to do battle with the nation's number one ranked Buckeyes in the ABC-TV national game of the week. Kickoff is at 1:50 p.m. (12:50 Twin Cities time).

The Golden Gophers opened their 1980 season impressively this past weekend when breezing past the Ohio Bobcats 38-14 in the familiar confines of Memorial Stadium.

But when Smokey Joe finished his brief celebration after that victory, he found himself facing the sobering fact that the highly-touted Buckeyes were next in line.

"Last season we went out to Los Angeles and were destroyed by Southern California," Salem recalled. "Then in the Rose Bowl Ohio State played that same team down to the wire. And the most impressive thing about it was the way the Ohio State defense handled that USC offense which had rolled through us. Now we look ahead to playing that Ohio State defense....a defense which includes eight starters back again in 1980."

Salem also knows, just as his Gophers do, that Art Schlichter is the OSU quarterback! And he's the same quarterback who singlehandedly pulled out the win for the Buckeyes at Minnesota a year ago.

The Gophers had their chances to win that one....and would have had it not been for a dropped pass in the endzone or a fumble at the goal line....or two brilliant plays by Schlichter (one a crucial third-and-long pass completion and the other a gummy 32 yard run).

After that heartbreaking setback, Salem told his players that Ohio State knew how to win, and if the Gophers were ever to become a good football team, they would have to do the same thing.

Last Saturday after their victory over the Bobcats, Salem told his players that OSU, despite trailing Syracuse for much of the game, had pulled out the win. "Ohio State knows how to win," he reminded the Gophers. "We were in command today, but now we must go down to Columbus. We all know what that will be like. We simply must play our game and see just how much we have learned."

In the opener, Minnesota spotted the visitors seven points early but then stormed back on the strength of a bruising game from All-America candidate Marion Barber and fullback Garry White as well as stellar quarterback play from freshman Tim Salem.

Barber finished the game with 126 yards in 22 carries while White had 24 yards and three touchdowns. Quarterback Salem hit 13 of 16 passing attempts....he had a streak of 13 straight completions in his first college game....and had a hand in two scores by running eight yards for one tally and passing six yards for another.

"Barber is an excellent inside runner," Coach Salem proclaimed. "We simply have to get the ball to him. Today our offensive line got him some running room, and when that happens he will be successful. Ohio gave us the opportunity to trap pretty well, and White gets through there in a hurry. As far as Tim goes, I felt it was a pretty good first effort. He threw well, and he changed plays at the line of scrimmage pretty well. As a coach and as a father, I'd have to say I was pretty proud."

GOPHER TALES--Minnesota and Ohio State have met 23 times on the gridiron in a series that dates back to 1921. The Buckeyes hold a commanding 18-5 edge over the Gophers .....in fact Minnesota has lost 11 straight. The Gophers' last triumph over the Bucks was in 1966 when Coach Murray Warmath turned the trick over Woody Hayes.

While Tim Salem's debut last Saturday was exceptional, the inaugural of freshman kicker Jim Gallery was equally exciting. Gallery was five-of-five in the point-after-touchdown department, hit a 39-yard field goal attempt and put four of his seven kickoffs into or out of the endzone.

Mike Robb, sophomore rover, saw a defensive back's dream turn into a nightmare when his 59 interception return for an apparent touchdown was called back because of a Gopher personal foul.

And penalties plagued Minnesota in the opener, a fact which did not please Coach Salem the least bit. The Gophers were called for 11 infractions totalling 123 yards.

Defense proved to be Minnesota's downfall a year ago, and it was a major concern for Salem coming into the opener. Against Ohio, the Gophers gave up only 194 yards ....a solid improvement over 1979....but they did falter a couple of times against the run when permitting one Ohio drive of 61 yards and a touchdown. "We got a little careless," Salem admitted, "and our tackling became a little sloppy. We still need to get better."

Defensive leaders in the opener included Robb with Minnesota's only interception, Rick Witthus and Mike Peppe each with a fumble recovery and Jeff Schuh with four solo tackles and four assists for a total of eight hits.

After this weekend's assignment at Ohio State, Minnesota will return home to entertain USC next week in the Brick House.

### WRESTLING SHOWCASE DATE SET

Minnesota's wrestling team will welcome the Wisconsin Badgers into Williams Arena at 2:30, Sunday, January 18, 1981 for the second annual Minnesota "Wrestling Showcase."

Gopher coach Wally Johnson, long a promoter of wrestling in Minnesota, tries to bring to Gold Country one of the biggest names in collegiate wrestling each year. University of Minnesota's Williams Arena will be the site for some international fare when the Gopher men's gymnastics team plays host to the Japanese National All Stars.

Made up of Japan's collegiate finest, the team includes many members of the National Team -- a squad that has won the Olympic gold medal each time since 1960. They did not participate in this year's Moscow Olympics.

The meet is set for 2:30, Saturday, December 6, 1980, in UM's Williams Arena.

The Minnesota men's gym team opens up their 1980 season with the annual Alumni Meet at Edina West HS on Friday, October 31, and then get down to business by participating in the Wisconsin Open, Friday and Saturday, November 7-8.

## GOPIERS SET FOR TWO STRAIGHT ROAD TRIPS

Two straight Big Ten Conference football assignments on the road, starting this Saturday against Northwestern at 1:00 p.m. in Evanston, ILL, won't be any picnic for the University of Minnesota, but they couldn't be any tougher than the Gophers' last two starts.

"We won't be taking Northwestern lightly," Coach Joe Salem said. "Those people have struggled some the last couple of years, but we can't take anything for granted. Hopefully, however, it won't be as tough on us as playing two nationally-ranked teams like Ohio State and Southern Cal on back-to-back weekends."

The Gophers lost both of those encounters including a 24-7 decision to USC at Memorial Stadium this past weekend and consequently will take an overall mark of 1-2 and a conference log of 0-1 into Saturday's clash with the Wildcats.

And while Northwestern is 0-4 overall after failing 42-21 at Syracuse this past weekend, Minnesota could have some anxious moments while preparing for its fourth start of the 1980 season.

"We need an intense week of practice," Salem maintains. "If we take them lightly and play poorly, it would destroy our season. We could fall apart. We still are a young football team, and our basic hope is that we mature a little each week, improve a little each week and get better as the season goes along."

Two major concerns Salem has as he looks ahead to the Northwestern contest are that Minnesota has not been a good road team of late and the fact that the Gophers continue to hurt themselves with mistakes.

"Against USC last weekend we made a couple of extremely costly errors," Salem admitted. "We continue to be our own worst enemy. We realize that it is a tough assignment for a young team like ours to have to play successive games against great teams like Ohio State and USC, but we felt we showed 100% improvement during the week between those two games. If we continue to improve like that, we could have a chance to win any of our last remaining eight games."

For the second straight week, Salem maintained that the final score was not a true indicator of how close the game actually was. "We were still in it when we trailed 10-7 with about five or six minutes left in the fourth quarter," he pointed out. "We gave them two easy ones at the end, but until then we played our hearts out. They simply wore us down."

Salem was especially pleased with the defensive unit. "I felt our defense played exceptionally well," Salem proclaimed. They really hit. Except for those final couple of minutes in the game, the defensive people did what they had to do."

Of greater concern was the Minnesota offense. "Mistakes hurt us again," Salem said, "and we threw too many interceptions. We'd get moving a bit and then hurt ourselves somehow. We were especially bad in the third quarter. We really sputtered. We've got to get better."

And the Gophers hope to do just that....knowing that they probably won't face another defense as awesome as USC the rest of the season. "Southern Cal had a great defense," Salem maintained. "They had size, strength and above all quickness. They will be tough to beat."

So what's ahead for the Gophers? Starting this week at Northwestern, the Gophers hope to reverse the trend and put together a string of wins to combat their abbreviated but recent string of losses.

"I don't think we'll be 17½ point underdogs in any of our remaining games," Salem predicted. "But it all comes down to the same thing. We need to eliminate our mistakes. We need to continue to improve. If we do those things, we can finish with a good season."

GOPHER TALES---Saturday's contest will be the 62nd football meeting between Minnesota and Northwestern in a rivalry dating back to 1892. The Gophers hold a 37-20-4 edge going into the 1930 contest, and they have won five straight from the Cats.

Last week Northwestern rolled up plenty of yards despite losing at Syracuse. Quarterback Mike Kerrigan set a NU school record with 25 completions in 39 passing attempts for 269 yards. The Wildcats will be another serious test for Minnesota's youthful but improving defense.

Marion Barber scored Minnesota's only touchdown of the day against USC on a gutty 14-yard run. It was the first TD of the year for the Gopher All-America candidate. The senior captain will go into the Northwestern game ranked as Minnesota's leading rusher. He has 273 yards in 54 carries for a 5.0 average.

Garry White, senior fullback who led Minnesota in rushing a year ago, has 134 in 47 carries for a 3.9 average. White also tops the Gophers in scoring with three touchdowns.

Tim Salem, freshman quarterback, didn't have a "sparkling" day against USC, but the credentials he will take with him to Northwestern remain impressive. He's completed 51 of 57 passes for a .543 mark and he has one scoring strike. His biggest concern is his seven interceptions in three games.

Chester Cooper continues to lead Minnesota's receivers from his flanker post. Cooper has nine catches for 36 yards and an average of 9.5 per grab. In all, 10 Gophers have caught passes this year.

Minnesota used its third punter of the season in the USC contest as Coach Salem continues to try resolving that situation. This time it was Gregg Smith, sophomore from Stewartville, MN. Smith punted six times for an average of 36.0 per try. His longest was 47 yards.

Biggest concern after the USC game was the injury to sophomore defensive tackle Steve Bisch. The promising lineman suffered a chipped vertebrae and apparently will be lost for the season.

That's one area where the Gophers can't afford any injuries. "We already know that we lack depth on that side of the line," Salem admitted, "and we just don't have the people to fill in the holes." ==U1==

## GOPHER CAGERS RETURN FROM EUROPE

The University of Minnesota basketball team returned from a nine-game tour through Scotland and England this week, richer with nine hardwood wins and an enjoyable travel experience.

Coach Jim Dutcher took nine players on the tour, and all played not only extensively but shared starting duties. "We gave everybody a chance to perform in the starting lineup," he said, "and everybody wound up playing about half a game."

Only once on the trip did the Gophers fail to score over 100 points as they completely dominated play over the English and Scottish teams. "Most of those teams had some American college players on their rosters," Dutcher pointed out, "but most of those people were centers and forwards. We dominated play at the guard position where our people were simply too quick for them to handle."

Harry Keats, president of the English Basketball Federation called the Gophers the "best basketball team ever to play in England." He called it a great measuring stick for English basketball enthusiasts.

Gopher scoring and rebounding were on a par with playing time. "Everybody contributed in just about every aspect of play," Dutcher said, "and many of them wound up leading us in one category or another in one or more games."

The Gophers also took advantage of the educational opportunities by visiting such landmarks as Big Ben, Buckingham Palace, Stonehenge, Madame Tussauds House of Wax and the Edinburgh Castle.

Only one injury was reported. Randy Breuer, Minnesota's promising 7-2 sophomore center, suffered a broken toe in the next to the last game of the tour and did not play against the Kelly Girls. He will be sidelined for about four weeks.

Purdue and Minnesota have met 38 times dating back to the first match in 1394 when the Gophers walked off with a 24-0 victory at old Northrup Field on the UM campus. Purdue's first series win came the next year, a 16-4 decision on the Boiler campus. Strangely enough, after meeting four times before the turn of the century, the schools did not again face each other until 1928. Since then the series has, for the most part, maintained numerous breaks in scheduling. Last year was the first meeting since 1974. Purdue's largest margin of victory was a 35-0 win in 1965, while Minnesota's biggest day in the sun came in 1936, a national championship year, when UM triumphed 33-0. However, Purdue may hold the two biggest series victories of all. . . 13-7 in 1949 to spoil a Gopher Rose Bowl bid, and 23-14 in 1960 during the year of Minnesota's last national championship season. Minnesota has taken the last three meetings between the schools: 31-14 last year, 24-20 in 1974 there, and 34-7 in 1973 here. In the latter game Rick Upchurch gained 177 yards on 21 carries and scored 1 TD.

## GOPHERS REMAIN ON ROAD FOR CRUCIAL TEST AT PURDUE

For the second straight week Coach Joe Salem takes his University of Minnesota football show on the road, this time in a crucial 1:30 p.m. Big Ten shootout against Purdue Saturday in West Lafayette, Ind.

The Gophers had an easy time winning on the road last weekend, stomping hapless Northwestern 49-21, but they know the challenge will be much greater this time out against Mark Herrmann and the Boilermakers.

We'll need another good week of practice," Salem stressed, "and we still have areas that need a lot of improvement. I hate to continue harping about how young we are and how many mistakes we are making, but the fact remains that BECAUSE we are playing so many inexperienced people we HAVE to get better each week. That's what we must do if we hope to be ready for Purdue."

The Boilers will go into Saturday's encounter with an overall record of 2-2 and a Big Ten log of 1-0 after breezing past Miami of Ohio 28-3 this past weekend. Minnesota will counter those standards with 2-2 and 1-1 marks thanks to that easy victory over the Wildcats in Evanston last weekend.

"After having to play Ohio State and USC back-to-back," Salem said, "I guess we were due for an easy one. We got some breaks early, and we were able to capitalize on them, and the big lead early made the difference."

Salem was referring to the fact that the Gophers recovered two successive kick-offs....by Glen Cieslewicz and Glenn Gardelli...and wound up scoring three times in a 1:57 span. That burst helped Minnesota jump off to a 28-0 first-period lead, and Northwestern never was able to recover.

"Last week against USC we showed some signs of becoming a good football team," Salem proclaimed. "We knew that we had to put some things together against Northwestern, and I think that for the most part we got done what we had to do."

In that category would have to be the awesome ground game unveiled by the Gophers. All-America candidate Marion Barber played just over one quarter yet totaled 118 yards and three touchdowns. Garry White, the "other" half of Minnesota's Dynamic Duo, had 129 yards and a pair of TD's in less than a half. And Duane Gregory, the Gophers' unheralded senior runningback, contributed his career high of 128 yards.

"We felt we could run against Northwestern," Salem said, "and that was our game plan. We got off to a shaky start when fumbling the opening kickoff and then coughing it up again in our next possession. But we played well up front, and our first defensive unit was equally impressive. They held when they had to, and it gave us a chance to play a lot of people. We're going to need that depth down the road, and the game experience they got at Northwestern will be a big plus."

But there were points of concern at Evanston last weekend, and Smokey Joe let his charges know about his displeasure in the lockerroom immediately after the game had ended.

"You won't beat anybody down the road with play like that," he told his Gophers.

"You still are making too many mistakes. Too many fumbles and too many penalties. Those errors have to be eliminated."

The mistakes Salem eluded to included five fumbles (Minnesota lost four of them) and 11 penalties. Those miscues mean that on the season Minnesota has fumbled 17 times and lost nine of them, and it has been penalized 36 times for 350 yards. That's more than TWICE as many (and as much) as its opponents.

And the "down the road" to which Salem referred begins this weekend when Minnesota heads for West Lafayette and its big match against Purdue. Will the Boilermakers be ready? They don't have to be reminded that their only Big Ten loss last season was that 31-14 setback to the Gophers in the Brickhouse. They don't have to be reminded that it cost them the conference title and a trip to the Rose Bowl. They don't have to be reminded. But they have been. All week long by Purdue Coach Jim Young.

GOPHER TALES---Minnesota and Purdue have met in football 38 times in a series dating back to 1894, and going into Saturday's duel the Gophers hold a 20-15-3 edge. The Gophers also have won three straight from the Boilermakers.

Garry White exploded for a 78-yard touchdown on the first play of the second quarter against Northwestern. It didn't, however, threaten Rick Upchurch's UM record of 86 yards, a mark set against Iowa in 1974.

White still leads Minnesota in scoring with 30 points on the strength of his five touchdowns. Marion Barber is close behind with four touchdowns and 24 points while kicking specialist Jim Gallery has 16.....and he's a perfect 13-for-13 in the PAT department.

Barber, incidentally, now has 28 career touchdowns at Minnesota....the most ever for a Gopher. He'll go into the Purdue assignment ranked as the Gophers' top rusher, boasting 391 yards in 66 carries for an average of 5.9 per try.

In the "dubious" record department, Minnesota's deficiencies in the fumble and penalty department have some people wondering. The Gophers already have those 17 fumbles and the UM single season record is 43. Minnesota also has been penalized 36 times in four games, and the school record is 83. All of which means that if the Gophers don't change their ways, that current rate of mistakes will shatter both marks in easy fashion.

Barber and White were further honored for their exploits Saturday as this week UPI named both Minnesota rushers as co-Midwest Backs of the Week. One would have to dig a long way back to find the last time two runningbacks from the same team were so honored on the same weekend.

## GOPHER GYMNASTS TO HOST JAPANESE ALL STARS

University of Minnesota's Williams Arena will be the site for some international fare when the Gopher men's gymnastics team plays host to the Japanese National All Stars.

Made up of Japan's finest collegiate athletes, the team includes many members of the National Team -- a squad that has won the Olympic gold medal each time since 1960. They did not participate in this year's Summer Games in Moscow.

The meet is set for 2:30, Saturday, December 6, 1980, in UM's Williams Arena.

The Minnesota men's gym team opens up their 1980 season with the annual Alumni Meet at Edina West HS on Friday, October 31. The Gophers get down to business by participating in the Wisconsin Open, Friday and Saturday, November 7-8. Minnesota, Big Ten gymnastics champ five straight years, will open defense of their crown on Saturday, January 10, at Columbus against Ohio State. The Buckeyes have finished second to the Gophers at the Big Ten Championships for the last two years.

## GOPHER CROSS COUNTRY AT PURDUE INVITATIONAL

Minnesota's men's cross country team will travel to Purdue this Friday to run in the 1980 Purdue Invitational. Including the host Boilermakers the meet will feature 22 teams -- four of the Big Ten.

Minnesota will face conference rivals Michigan State, Iowa, Northwestern and Purdue plus the likes of De Paul, Butler and Bradley among others. All told the meet features a strong lineup.

The meet will be run at Purdue's South Golf Course covering 8,000 meters (5 miles) and starts at 4:00 p.m.

## UM 2ND IN GOLF

Even though senior captain Tom Lehman (Alexandria) and junior Jay Swanson (Golden Valley) tied for medalist honors, the University of Minnesota finished second by nine strokes to Michigan State in the 54-hole Minnesota Fall Invitational last week at the U of M Golf Course.

The problem for Gopher coach Greg Harvey in the team standings resulted from Swanson playing for Minnesota's team # 2. The Gophers had three separate squads entered. Had he been assigned to team #1, Minnesota would have won the tourney.

Both Lehman and Swanson posted scores of 214, one over par, for the tourney, edging out Monty James of MSU by one stroke. The Spartans posted a team total of 1,100 to Minnesota's 1,109 to take team honors.

Iowa finished third at 1,115 while Minnesota # 2 was next at 1,125. Other scores in order were Wisconsin, 1,155, Illinois 1,156, Northern Iowa, 1,178, and Minnesota # 3 1,179.

"I was pleased with the tournament, says Harvey, "but I believe it will take an average of 360 per round (1 over par for five players) to win the Big Ten championship next spring when it is played here at Minnesota. Some of our top conference teams like Ohio State, Michigan, Purdue, and Indiana were not here last week, so the entire picture is not certain.

"If one of those teams comes in here and gets hot, like shooting a 350 or 347, then it's lights out for the rest of us. I'm looking forward to an excellent golf outing next May on our own course. And one has to remember that the last time Minnesota won the Big Ten spring title, the meet was held on our own course."

The Gophers closed their fall season playing Sunday and Monday, October 5-6, in the Badger Invitational at Madison, WI.

## ICERS END FIRST WEEK- ROUGH

According to head coach Brad Buetow, the first week of practice for the University of Minnesota hockey Gophers was anything but beautiful.

"I keep trying to remind myself that we have only been on the ice one week," Buetow said Sunday, "but at the same time it's evident that this team has a ton of ice to cover before it is ready to compete.

"Our goal tending looked good overall, but sophomore Paul Butters pulled a groin muscle and will be sidelined awhile. He'll be back soon, though.

"Our overall play was rough and spotty, particularly on defense. It appears all our blueline candidates are more interested in playing offense than defense. And that goes for our forwards, too.

"Oh, I'm not saying it was all bad, but we concentrate hard on position play and overall defense in our style of hockey. When it's not there we tend to look awfully bad.

"But one thing I have to be pleased about is the conditioning and hustle of every man. This club returned to camp in great shape and has worked awfully hard in every drill. It's just that our first big scrimmage on Saturday was somewhat disappointing to our coaching staff.

"But the polish will come. As soon as our men begin to play the kind of defense we know they are capable of, then we can begin to think about our opener.

"In the latter sense, I believe we should have begun practice a week earlier. We have to face Michigan Tech at Eveleth (MN) in the Hall of Fame Game October 18. That's not enough time to get a club ready. And then we open the regular season at defending WCHA and NCAA champion North Dakota the following weekend. I'm not certain we'll be ready."

#### INTRASQUAD GAMES ON TAP

Buetow believes he will begin to get a good look at what his men can do beginning this week when three of five varsity intrasquad scrimmages take place. The Gophers play their first outing at Cook Arena in Coon Rapids Thursday, and follow up with outings Saturday at Austin and Sunday at Columbia Arena in Columbia Heights. All sessions begin at 7 p.m. with a large portion of the proceeds going to the junior hockey programs in each area.

Next week the Gophers finish with intrasquad games at Minnesota, October 14, and Roseville, October 16, also at 7 p.m.

#### PLAYERS CITED

Buetow said his top line centered by Olympic ace Neal Broten with brother Aaron Broten at left wing and Bryan "Butsy" Erickson at right wing looked good in the scrimmage. All three are graduates of Roseau high. However, this line will be broken up early this week.

"We plan to skate Aaron Broten at center for a few days, the position he played last year for us," Buetow added. "We'll pair him with Erickson and another wing, and probably skate Neal Broten with Steve Ulseth and another right wing for a few days.

"A new walk-on goalie, Brad Johnson from Red Wing, looked very good last week and we'll give him a hard look, too. He is extremely steady and has played the angles well so far.

"But I'm mainly interested in our men tightening up in our own end of the rink. Without vast improvement in this area we could be in deep trouble. We have a long way to go and not much time. I hope the improvement comes fast. We should learn this in our first three intrasquad games."

## GOPHERS RETURN HOME TO HOST MICHIGAN SATURDAY

Maybe the friendly scenery will help. Coach Joe Salem certainly hopes so as he brings his University of Minnesota football team back to Memorial Stadium Saturday to host Michigan in a Big Ten Conference assignment at 1:30 p.m.

The Gophers, who played their last two games on the road, will return to the Brick House for Homecoming 1980 against the Wolverines, and the festive Minnesota crowd should provide a slightly different atmosphere for Salem's charges.

This past weekend the Gophers fell 21-7 at Purdue....in the Boilermakers homecoming contest....and the setback was a bitter pill for Minnesota's squad to swallow.

"We said last week that the Purdue game was going to be the pivotal point in our season," Salem explained. "I still feel that way. We lost, and now it would be very easy for us to quit, to fold up our tents. Or we can regroup, make it the turning point in our season and go after Michigan the way we are supposed to."

But the task at hand won't be an easy one. The Wolverines apparently "put it all together" this past weekend when beating cross-state rival Michigan State 27-23 at Ann Arbor to retain territorial braggin' rights.

Michigan will come into Saturday's game at Memorial Stadium with an overall season record of 3-2 and a Big Ten log of 2-0 while the Gophers, as a result of their loss at Purdue, are 2-3 and 1-2.

"Obviously Michigan is a capable football team," Salem said. "Beating them will be difficult. And to do so we have to quit making mistakes. We will need two halves of football like the second half we played at Purdue."

Salem was recalling the fact that critical errors at the worst of times during the first half of play against the Boilermakers enabled the host contingent to build up a commanding 21-0 lead by intermission.

Included in the "mistake" category would be a pass interference penalty, a face mask penalty, an illegal procedure penalty, a fumble and a general lack of alertness on a Purdue on-side kick.....all of which either enabled the Boilers to keep a drive of their own alive or stop one of Minnesota's.

"We not only make errors," Salem moaned, "We also have the knack of making them at the worst times. We gave up too much too early against Purdue, all because of mistakes. We were especially offensively ineffective in the first half. We had several chances, but in every critical situation we came up short. And when you get the ball inside the five yard line, you have to score."

That point of discussion had to do with Minnesota's second-half rally when, after the Gopher defense had shut down the Boilermakers, Minnesota scored on a Marion

Barber blast up the middle. The Gophers got the ball back on a fumble recovery by defensive standout Mike Robb and were moving for what looked like another touchdown with plenty of time remaining. But after having a second-and-three at the Purdue four, the Gophers failed in three attempts and their dreams for an upset ended.

"I was pleased with the way we came back in the second half," Salem said. "We fought our hearts out during the last two periods, and we did some things pretty well. But if we want to beat Michigan, we'll have to learn how to play two halves of football."

GOPHER TALES----Saturday, in addition to all of the normal homecoming hoopala, also will find Minnesota and Michigan staging their annual battle for the Little Brown Jug. That coveted piece of crockery currently rests in the hands of the Wolverines.

Michigan and Minnesota have met 70 times in football and the visitors hold a commanding edge of 45 wins against 22 losses. There also have been three ties in the series which got its start in 1892.

Minnesota's most-recent victory over the Wolverines came in 1977 at Memorial Stadium when the Gophers downed the number-one ranked Michigan contingent 16-0 in one of the season's most stunning upsets.

The past two games between these two old Big Ten rivals have been played at Michigan where the Wolverines were able to post 42-10 and 31-21 victories. Last year's contest was closer than the 10-point verdict indicates. The Gophers had pulled to within 24-21 midway through the final period and had a chance for the win but missed by an eyelash before Michigan got the icer.

Marion Barber, Minnesota's All-America candidate and all-time rushing leader, scored Minnesota's only touchdown in the 1977 win while Paul Rogind got the rest of the Gophers' points on three field goals. Barber had 54 yards at the half against Purdue last week but finished with only 69 when Minnesota, playing catch-up football, went to the air after intermission. He'll go into the Michigan game with 460 yards and an average of 5.5 per carry.

Barber and Garry White stand as Minnesota's top scorers in 1980. They each have scored five touchdowns. And Barber, the top touchdown-maker in U of M history, now has 29 in his career with the Gophers.

Youthful Tim Salem, after hitting only one of five pass attempts in the first half against the Boilermakers, found the range in the third quarter. He wound up getting 15 of 28 attempts for 137 yards without an interception. On the year Salem has completed 48 of 90 attempts for a .533 mark. And he has 463 passing yards to his credit.

Mike Curtis caught four passes for 40 yards at Purdue and currently is Minnesota's top receiver with 11 catches for 114 yards. His longest reception has been 21 yards, and he has one touchdown to his credit.

ICERS OPEN SATURDAY

Minneapolis, MN---It may seem early to some, but intercollegiate hockey is upon us.

The University of Minnesota and Michigan Tech kick off their 1980-81 campaigns Saturday at Eveleth, MN, when the Western Collegiate Hockey Association (WCHA) members meet in a non-league affair. It is billed as the Annual Hall of Fame Game at the Eveleth Hippidrome. Appropriate induction ceremonies will be conducted at the U. S. Hockey Hall of Fame that afternoon.

For Minnesota, as far as head coach Brad Buetow is concerned, the game is a week early. "We started school a week later this year as compared to last season, and we are playing our first game a week earlier," the coach says.

"In that respect we have not had all that much time for preparation. So maybe we'll be a bit short of full preparation for this game.

"But I am certain of one thing. When you play a team coached by a man who has more victories than any other college hockey coach past or present, you know you are in for a tough evening. John MacInnes is in his 25th year, and every time we have played Michigan Tech we have always seen a well prepared hockey club.

"We are also aware they (MTU) are considered one of the favorites to take league honors this year, so I expect Saturday's contest to be a rugged test for each of our players."

And after the Gophers finish the exhibition game against Tech, all they have to look forward to is the opening league series of the season, a pair against defending WCHA and NCAA champion North Dakota October 24-25 at Grand Forks. Minnesota's first home series is October 31-November 1 against Michigan at Williams Arena.

Buetow saw his 1980-81 candidates skate through three intrasquad games at Coon Rapids, Austin and Fridley ice arenas last week and was not totally pleased.

"With scores like 7-7, 6-4 and 6-1, you can look at it two ways," Buetow said Sunday. "We are either scoring awfully well, or playing lousy defense. I'm afraid the latter is the truest cast at this point.

"The first scrimmage game showed a lot of enthusiasm, aggressiveness and our men played the man instead of the puck quite well. But the next two nights showed extremely undisciplined play.

"Right now we are not anywhere near the level of last year's team. Our men at the time are playing outside our limits as a hockey club. There is too much a 'I and Me' rather than 'we' on the ice. We've got to get things in hand, begin to control the pace of play more to our style. Team defense is still not there. Until the latter comes, we could be in for some long, long games."

LINEUP NOT SET

Buetow said Monday that he will not decide on his lines for the opening game Saturday until after Tuesday's practice. However, if the intrasquad game lineups mean anything, we could on Saturday see a reuniting of the famed Roseau (MN) high

school line of the Broten brothers, sophomore Aaron at left wing, sophomore Neal, the U. S. Olympic Team member, at center, and Bryan "Butsy" Erickson at right wing.

This unit played together part of the weekend and was the most effective scoring group. However, Buetow may not be able to afford the luxury of keeping Aaron Broten on a wing. Last year he was named WCHA Rookie of the Year while playing at center ice.

In addition, Buetow was forced to move senior Bart Larson back to defense as another defender, sophomore Brian Zins, suffered a shoulder dislocation in last Thursday's intrasquad game and will be out six to eight weeks. Larson had been playing right wing and center.

Buetow did say he has pretty well decided on five of his six starting defensemen for Saturday. Expected to skate in the opener are seniors Mike Knoke and Bob Bergloff along with Larson, plus sophomore Mike Meadows and David Jensen. The sixth man will be decided upon this week.

In goal, says Buetow, the race for opening game honors is down to three men. . . junior Jim Jetland, sophomore Paul Butters or junior Paul Ostby.

"None of these three goalies has really come to the front thus far," says the coach. "Their play has been almost equal. We certainly hope one begins to show he is ready in a hurry. As a group their play has been pretty good, but they also need a whole lot better defensive play in front of the goal. We can't ask the goalies to do the whole job themselves."

Also entered will be the Good Time Track Club of the Twin Cities featuring several former Gopher racing stars.

## GOPHERS PREPARE FOR INVADING IOWA ON SATURDAY

Still searching for answers, the University of Minnesota football team goes "back to the drawing board" this week while preparing for Iowa's invasion of Memorial Stadium set for 1:30 p.m. on Saturday.

Coach Joe Salem's faltering Gophers have plenty of questions and more problems than they would like to think about after falling to Michigan 37-14 in the 1980 homecoming assignment at the Brick House this past weekend.

That setback drops the Gophers to 2-4 on the season and 1-3 in the Big Ten. Iowa, meanwhile, primed itself for arch-rival Minnesota by whipping Northwestern 25-3 to give the Hawks an identical 2-4 overall log...but they are 2-1 in loop play.

The "self-destruct" Gophers continued to find new ways at even more inopportune times to hurt themselves against the Wolverines, and it remains that area of Minnesota's play that bothers Smokey Joe.

"We are totally frustrated," he admits, "and we don't have any answers. We can't put our finger on a reason why we do the things we do. All I know is that what I have to say has been said too many times already this year: we have to stop beating ourselves."

But the Gophers did against Michigan.....three fumbles (they lost two of them inside their own 10 yard line to set up a pair of Michigan scores), and four penalties which either enabled a Wolverine drive to continue or which halted a Gopher advance.

"We can't continue to say that 'Maybe next week' we'll put it all together. We've got to put it together now. We are running out of weeks. We said before the season started that for us to finish with a good season we would have to split at 3-3 in our first six games. That meant we would have to upset one of those people that was favored to beat us. Michigan was our last chance."

Does that mean Minnesota now will collapse and fall below the .500 mark for the third straight year? "We are just as good as the five remaining teams on our schedule," Salem maintains, "and that includes Iowa. Our biggest task now is getting the players ready mentally, getting them to stop feeling sorry for themselves and start believing in themselves."

And there were plenty of long faces after giving the Little Brown Jug back to Michigan last weekend. "I feel bad, and the players feel bad," Salem said, "but we have to keep our heads up. We just have to end our frustrations and get ready for Iowa."

Two areas where the Gophers might be concentrating their efforts and hopes for improvement in drills this week could be divided equally between the offensive and defensive platoons.

"On offense against Michigan I felt we were moving the ball well," Salem explained. "We were doing exactly what we wanted to do. But then we would make a

mistake, hurt ourselves and our ability to retain possession and keep moving the ball would end. We simply HAVE to stop making errors offensively."

On the defensive side of things, Minnesota has played well in recent weeks and, when compared with a year ago, considers that area as the "most improved" part of its game.

Against Michigan, however, it had some lapses. "We stopped them several times," Salem pointed out, "and once again we were giving them the ball with good field position....really putting the pressure on our defense. But too many times we would hold them on the first two downs, have them third-and-long, and then give up the big play. We have to get better in that department, too."

GOPHER TALES---Floyd of Rosedale is at stake Saturday when Minnesota plays host to Iowa. The "prize hog" has been the trophy going to the winner of the Gopher-Hawk clash since 1935.

Overall Minnesota and Iowa have met 73 times on the gridiron, and the Gophers currently boast an advantage of 49 wins against 22 losses and a pair of ties. Salem's contingent won 24-7 down in Iowa City last year. In fact Minnesota won two years ago 22-20 in a cliff-hanger in the Brick House for a "two straight" Gopher skien.

Clayton Tonnemaker, a former Gopher All-America center and linebacker who starred for Minnesota in 1946-47-48-49, will be honored at halftime as the newest U of M inductee into the College Football Hall of Fame.

Saturday also has been designated as American Legion Day and about 2,000 members of the American Legion, the American Legion Auxilliary and their friends are expected to be on hand.

The crowd, incidentally, will be more than 56,652, the listed capacity for Memorial Stadium. Already announced as a sellout, it will be the largest gathering of fans in the Brick House since Nebraska played at Minnesota before 56,782 in 1973.

Marion Barber, Minnesota's All-America candidate, continues his onslaught on the U of M record book. He carried 28 times for 98 yards against a stacked Michigan defense Saturday and now has 614 carries as a Gopher, the most ever for a Minnesota player. He has 2,876 yards, another U of M standard. And he's scored 31 touchdowns, still another high for a U of M gridder.

Barber, who scored one TD against the Hawks a year ago, would like nothing better than to rush for at least 125 yards while helping Minnesota to a win this weekend so that he can top the coveted 3,000 career rushing mark in front of the home fans.

The Big Ten record book also shows that Barber now ranks 10th on the all-time list of conference rushers. He's jumped ahead of such previous greats as Rufus Ferguson and Scott Dierking and now is just behind Jim Grabowski who notched 2,878.

Following Saturday's contest against the Hawkeyes, Minnesota must take to the road for another Big Ten Conference assignment at Illinois before returning to entertain Indiana and Michigan State on successive weekends.

## ICERS WIN OPENER

Minneapolis, MN--As far as coach Brad Buetow and his University of Minnesota hockey players are concerned, there has to be an easier way to open the regular season portion of the 1980-81 Gopher ice schedule.

After winning 6-4 against Michigan Tech in the Annual Hall of Fame Game at Eveleth, MN, last Saturday, all the Gophers have to face this weekend are a pair of games at defending WCHA and NCAA champion North Dakota University.

"It's a huge challenge, but then, we've got to play them sometime and it might as well be now," Buetow said Monday. "North Dakota took us four times last season and I'm certain our players remember that.

"We have a great, great rivalry built up between the schools in hockey and I expect this weekend to provide some excellent play from both teams. It's early, but both squads want to get off to a good start in league action."

Buetow said there was both good and bad results coming out of last Saturday's game. But the bad may outweigh the good.

"We have four regulars slowed by nagging injuries which may call for some changes in our lineup this weekend," Buetow went on. "Of course, defenseman Brian Zins is out for at least another six weeks with a shoulder dislocation.

"Last week center Kevin Hartzell suffered a shoulder bruise, goalie Paul Butters is battling a groin pull, and wing Steve Griffith has a hip pointer.

"So until we get further into practice this week, we will not really know who will be skating on what line, or in goal."

One line is almost certain to remain intact. . .the "Roseau Line" of brothers Aaron and Neal Broten plus Butsy Erickson. This trio accounted for all six Gopher goals in the Tech clash. Aaron scored a hat trick while Erickson got two goals and Neal the final. Both Aaron and Butsy had power play goals.

All three hail from Roseau, MN, and as prep stars made up one of the highest scoring lines in Minnesota high school history. Neal played last year with the U. S. Olympic Team and is the only one to return to play college hockey.

"Certainly I was pleased with the performance of that line," Buetow says, "but at the same time I hope we'll come up with more balanced scoring in the future.

"The intensity level was very good. Each man began to play hockey within his own limitations and did not try and do it all. However, we were still a bit sloppy on team defense. Our men are a bit overanxious.

"But we played a lot of kids and they gave us a good look. Now we've got to put it all together."

Buetow used three goal tenders against MTU. Butters worked the first period and did not allow any scores. Jim Jetland and Paul Ostby worked the next two periods and allowed two scores each. Buetow said he will not decide on who will be in the nets until later in the week.

### TENNIS TEAM GEARS UP FOR FALL TOURNEY

Tennis anyone? Although it may be too late for thoughts of a casual afternoon of tennis, Minnesota coach Jerry Noyce has other ideas: He's taking his Gopher tennis team to the Southern Illinois-Edwardsville Fall Classic this Friday and Saturday.

An eight-team tournament features two Big Ten teams: Minnesota, who tied for third in the conference last season and Wisconsin. Also appearing in the meet will be Arkansas (ranked sixth in the country last season) and Clemson (finished tenth last season). Other teams are Arkansas-Little Rock, Southern Illinois-Carbondale and Illinois State.

Competing for Minnesota will be Eakan Almstrom (Big Ten champ at #4 singles) and his Big Ten champion-partner at #4 doubles Kent Helgeson. Ted Kauffmann, conference runner-up at #2 singles last season and Big Ten champ at #1 doubles in 1979 will make the trip, as will soph sensation Dave Morin. The other positions will be filled by playoffs later this week. --UM--

## GOPHERS RETURN TO ROAD FOR CONTEST AT ILLINOIS

Minnesota takes its Golden Gopher football team on the road this week for another Big Ten Conference assignment, this one against the University of Illinois at 1 p.m. Saturday in Champaign.

Coach Joe Salem tuned up his squad for the Illinois contest by whipping Iowa 24-6 at Memorial Stadium this past weekend. That should mean the Gophers have righted themselves after losing two in a row and now will be ready to shoot for a strong 1980 finish.

The Gophers remember, however, that just a year ago they had gone down to Iowa City to belt those same Hawkeyes and put themselves in the same kind of position. Only the following week Illinois tied Minnesota in the Brick House and it was the beginning of the end for Minnesota which promptly followed that disaster with three straight losses and the bottom had fallen out of the '79 season.

"We don't want that to happen again," Coach Salem said. "We came into the Iowa game this past weekend with a 2-4 record, and that is exactly what the experts had predicted. Now we feel, however, that we are as good as anybody left on our schedule. That includes Illinois. If we stop making mistakes, we could have a chance against any of those people."

Mistakes still were very evident in Minnesota's win over Iowa and after that contest Salem admitted, "I have to say it again: We have to eliminate our errors. But I guess I will still be saying that on doomsday."

Fortunately for the Gophers, Iowa made as many (or more) errors than Minnesota. And the Gopher defense was able to hold things together.....and in the process Salem's club upped its overall record to 3-4 and its Big Ten mark to 2-3.

While Minnesota's offense was sputtering and mistakes (penalties, fumbles, interceptions, and two blocked kicks) provided Iowa with several good scoring opportunities during the first half of play, the Gopher defensive unit turned back the Hawks time after time and enabled the host club to cling to a 7-6 margin at intermission.

"The first half would be difficult to describe," Salem admitted, "with too many errors committed by both clubs. Thanks to our defense, we were still on top at that stage of things, and in the second half things started to go our way. We made a good scoring drive to get a little better lead, and from that point on the defense was in control. They got us the ball in good field position, and we were able to take advantage of those things."

Overall, Minnesota's defensive unit, led by senior end Jeff Schuh, was able to hold Iowa to 24 yards rushing. That's another "best ever" for a Gopher team. The previous low was 46 yards by Michigan in 1962.

So tough was Minnesota's defense in the second half against Iowa that the visitors were able to net only eight yards on the ground during the final two periods. Three times Iowa ball carriers were thrown for losses (by Schuh), and the Hawks wound up with only two first downs in the second half (both in the fourth quarter).

Fittingly, the game ball went to defensive end coach Butch Nash who faced Iowa for the last time in his illustrious career at Minnesota. "It was a terrific win for us," Nash told the Gophers after the game. "It means a great deal to me, and it means a great deal to our program. But most of all it is a great victory for you. And it's only the beginning."

The "beginning" now resumes with another tough assignment against Illinois. Once again Minnesota has been reminded that it has not been a good road team. And it's been reminded of how the Illini put the Gophers on the skids a year ago. And they've been reminded about their mistakes.

As Coach Salem has said....."We have to stop making those errors".....but hopefully it isn't doomsday.

GOPHER TALES-----Illinois dropped a tough 45-14 decision at Michigan this past weekend and will come into Saturday's game against Minnesota with an overall record of 3-4-1 and a Big Ten mark of 3-2.

Minnesota and Illinois have met in football a total of 41 times since the series got underway in 1898. The Gophers currently hold a 23-16-2 edge in the series and had won three straight prior to last year's 17-17 deadlock in the Brick House.

Dave Wilson, Illinois quarterback, is the big focal point for Minnesota's foe. A capable passer, Wilson is playing with a court injunction against the Big Ten Conference which earlier had declared him academically ineligible.

It will be Homecoming at Illinois this weekend, and that marks the third time this year that Salem's contingent will be involved in such festivities. Others were at Purdue and at home against Michigan.

Marion Barber, Minnesota's All-America candidate, suffered a slight head injury early against Iowa and spent most of the first half either in the lockerroom or on the sidelines.

Nevertheless, Barber scored three times and upped his U of M record to 33 TD's over a four-year span. Barber also netted 49 more yards and his career stats show him as Minnesota's all-time rushing leader with 2,925. Seventy-five more and he will become the eighth player in the Big Ten history to reach the coveted 3,000 yard plateau.

Jim Gallery, Minnesota's freshman kicking specialist, hit a 42 yard field goal against the Hawkeyes in his only attempt of the day. He's two-of-three on the season. Scoring-wise, Gallery also added three extra points against Iowa and is 19-of-19 as a Gopher for a total of 25 points thus far in 1980.

Schuh had three tackles-for-losses against Iowa accounting for 20 yards. On the day he had a total of 10 hits.....five solo tackles and five assists. So far this season he is credited with 72 tackles, and nine of those have accounted for 51 yards in losses.

Minneapolis, MN--So much for road hockey.

After skating 180 minutes and 30 seconds on foreign ice, Minnesota's hockey Gophers bring a 3-0 season record (2-0 in WCHA) to Williams Arena for games Friday and Saturday against Michigan. Both league encounters begin at 7:30 p.m. CST.

Michigan comes in 2-2 for all games having split on consecutive weekends against Bowling Green and Western Michigan of the Central Collegiate Hockey Association. The Wolverines have yet to play a WCHA contest.

Plagued with numerous pre-season problems, including an undefined illness to new head coach Wilf Martin and a hazing incident that caused two players to leave camp, the book on Michigan this season remains unclear. The Wolverines were picked by the coaches to finish last in the annual pre-season poll.

Following its season opening 6-4 exhibition win against Michigan Tech at Eveleth, October 18, the Gophers took two giant strides last weekend by gaining 9-8 and 4-3 victories, the latter in overtime, at North Dakota last weekend.

But, as usual, Minnesota did it the hard way. Against the defending WCHA and NCAA champion Sioux Friday, Minnesota fell behind 6-2 early in the second period before scoring six consecutive goals, four on the power play, to squeeze out a 9-8 victory.

On Saturday Minnesota took a 2-0 lead only to see the Sioux roar back to a 3-2 margin in the final stanza. But co-captain Steve Ulseth scored his second tying goal in as many nights before sophomore Aaron Broten knocked in the winner, off a pass from Ulseth, after just 0:29 of overtime.

#### BUETOW ON THE GOPHERS

"It was certainly great to gain two wins up there," coach Brad Buetow said Sunday, "but if we have to score nine goals to win, then something is wrong. It was a great game for the fans, but I can't say the same for the coaches.

"If we expect similar success in the future, then we've got to tighten up our entire game plan. That means defense by everyone. And we've also got to receive more balanced scoring."

The latter statement has to do with four men who all but carried the entire offensive load for the Gophers at North Dakota. Both Neal Broten and Ulseth came up with nine points while Aaron Broten had eight and Butsy Erickson, who only played Friday, scored four points including a hat trick.

Ulseth moved up to right wing with the Broten brothers Saturday filling in for Erickson. It is not certain at this time if Butsy will be ready for the Michigan series.

Another hero for the weekend was junior goalie Jim Jetland who won both games. "Jet" replaced Paul Butters Friday with the Gophers down 5-2 early in the second period and finished the game allowing just three more scores. "He (Jetland) was exceptional both nights," Buetow commented.

Jetland played the entire game Saturday and totaled 42 stops for the weekend. He could gain the starting nod vs. Michigan, but Butters is still strongly in the picture, too.

Another key for Minnesota against UND was its penalty killing efforts. The Sioux were only able to convert one of seven chances in the two games while Minnesota scored on six of 13 extra man situations.

#### ULSETH WCHA PLAYER OF THE WEEK

For his amazing efforts against North Dakota last weekend, Minnesota senior wing and co-captain Steve Ulseth (Roseville) has been named WCHA Player Of The Week. Ulseth scored four goals in Friday's 9-8 win at Grand Forks with three of them coming in Minnesota's second period rally and all on the power play.

He totaled six points Friday (4-2) and three (1-2) the next night. Ulseth scored the tying goal for UM in each game and set up the game winner by linemate Aaron Broten in Saturday's overtime contest, a 4-3 decision.

Two weeks ago Hurley burned up UM's course in the Gold Country Classic but had Morrison on his heels much of the time. The Gophers have run 8,000 for all but one race this season (they ran 10,000 at Wisconsin in a close match) and have been doing rather well. The hope is high that Minnesota will improve on its fifth-place finish of 1979. Hurley was 29th overall and the fourth Gopher to finish. His time was 24:31.

Other Gophers to help the cause will be Mike Gebeke, Lloyd Ness and John Keohen. Other possibilities are Lee Allinger, John Kromer and Dave Sharp.

### GYMNASTS TO FACE ALUMNI

Minnesota gymnastic coach Fred Roethlisberger will pit his 1980-81 varsity against his past pupils this Saturday at 7:30 at Fridley High School. The defending Big Ten gymnastics champions will face an outstanding group of alumni, many of which were on one of the conference championship teams that Minnesota has turned out for five straight years.

Heading up the list of past Gophers is Reid Goldetsky, an all rounder who set all kinds of scoring records while at Minnesota. Also appearing will be Peter Velguth, who made All American in the still rings last season. Tim LaFleur will make an appearance. He was on the U.S. National Team. Other past stars are Bill Kerchner, Larry Selchow, Russ Fystrom and Reid Gysland.

Roethlisberger and the rest of the varsity will open up the regular campaign of 1980-81 when they travel to Waukesha, WI, for the Wisconsin Open November 7-8. UM gymnastics will make its first appearance in Williams Arena on December 6 against the Japanese National All Stars. Many members of this team are on the Japanese Olympic Team -- a squad that has won the Olympic gold medal every year since 1960. Minnesota will meet these All Stars at 2:30 on December 6.

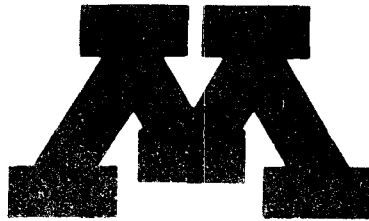

Minnesota and Indiana first met in 1906 when the schools ended in a 6-6 tie. In all, UM and IU have faced each other 41 times with UM owning a 26-12 edge in wins. There have been 3 series ties. The last time this duo met on Minnesota turf provided local fans with one of the most exciting college games ever seen in this vicinity. Trailing 24-7 at halftime, Minnesota came from behind to win on a pair of fourth quarter screen pass-TDs to Roy Artis and Marion Barber, plus the clincher, a 31-yard FG by Paul Rogind with 2 seconds left on the clock. The final score read UM 32, IU 31. But last year, after trailing 10-7 in the first quarter, IU repaid the favor by roaring back to win 42-24. The last IU victory here in Memorial Stadium was a 24-6 decision in 1963. Hoosier teams have lost 7 straight here, which means Lee Corso is still seeking his first win in the "Brick House". The biggest series win for UM was a 34-0 decision in 1957, while IU's largest margin of victory came in 1945 when the Hoosiers scored a lopsided 49-0 victory.

INJURY PLAGUED GOPHERS HOST INDIANA SATURDAY

Battered and bruised, bloodied but unbowed, the University of Minnesota Golden Gophers return home Saturday to entertain the University of Indiana in a 1 p.m. **11:35 CST** Big Ten Conference football confrontation at Memorial Stadium.

For weeks Coach Joe Salem's main concern has been the need to eliminate errors from the Gopher game plan. And while that's still a major worry, the biggest problem facing Smokey Joe as he gets ready for the Hoosiers is putting a healthy squad on the field after seeing a host of players injured in that 21-18 victory last Saturday.

Most critical is the loss of senior tailback Marion Barber, apparently for the season, with a dislocated elbow. Barber, the biggest touchdown maker and rusher in U of M history, was the mainstay in Minnesota's offense this year.

"I don't know how well handle that position yet," Salem said after the game at Illinois last weekend. "We'll just have to see who is healthy. Marvell Ross might be ready after spraining an ankle earlier, and Glenn Lewis might be recovered from his knee surgery. Roy Artis and Duane Gregory played there some after Marion got hurt, so we'll figure out something."

Whatever happens, Minnesota will have its hands full in the Brick House with the invading Hoosiers. Despite the fact that Indiana fell to mighty Michigan 35-0 in its most recent outing, statistics show that the Hoosiers have an explosive offense.

Led by quarterback Tim Clifford, an All-Big Ten selection a year ago, Indiana has worked its way to an overall record of 5-3 and a 2-3 log in the Big Ten Conference thus far this season.

"We know it will be another dogfight for us," Salem said, "especially if we aren't able to play without errors. I'm getting tired of saying the same thing after every game, but it's the truth. We had the Illinois game under control. We had a 14-0 lead and were going in for another touchdown. But we fumbled twice and it's another bursting damn situation for us. After that we had trouble doing anything right."

In all, Minnesota fumbled eight times against Illinois and lost three of them. The Gophers also had 13 penalties for 133 yards. And they had another punt blocked. On the year, Salem's error-prone Gophers have fumbled 36 times and lost 17 of those bobbles. They also have been penalized 65 times for 648 yards.

"I'm sure people are beginning to think that 'This is a Recording' when they hear me talk about one of our games," Salem quipped, "And I wish there were some way to explain what is happening. Or change things. Good football teams can win on off days, but until we stop making mistakes we won't be a good football team. You have to wonder how we can make that many errors and still win. But we did win. We won on the road. And we'll take it."

Despite all the bad things that happened....the injuries, the fumbles, the penalties, the inept kicking game....Salem still found some good things in Minnesota's effort against Illinois.

"Defensively we were magnificent," Salem observed. "Time after time we put the defensive unit on the field with Illinois in four down territory. And time after time our people turned them away. Illinois threw the ball 60 times, but we allowed only 23 completions. We intercepted them twice and batted the ball away countless times. We rushed their passer well and had pressure on him all afternoon. It was a super defensive effort."

If there was a defensive star for Minnesota, it would have to be Dana Noel, senior cornerback, who had one interception, broke up three, was credited with five tackles and capped all efforts by returning a kickoff 93 yards for a touchdown.

That brilliant play proved to be the margin of victory and enabled Minnesota to up its overall season record to 4-4 and lift its mark in the Big Ten to 3-3...even across the board.

Now come the Indiana Hoosiers. Minnesota, with three games left on its schedule, knows it will have its hands full. And the defense knows it will get another severe test. "There isn't much time left," Salem pointed out. "We better put it together quickly if we hope to be ready for Indiana."

GOPHER TALES---In the injury department, Barber was not the only player lost at Illinois. Todd Hallstrom, sophomore offensive guard, suffered a severe ankle injury and also appears to be shelved for the season. Steve Bisch, sophomore defensive tackle who had been on the sidelines with a neck injury since the USC game, aggravated that problem and probably will be kept out of action in Minnesota's final three assignments. And while those are the most severe, there are other problems which have a number of Gophers hobbling.

Minnesota and Indiana have met in football a total of 41 times since the series got its start in 1906. The Gophers will go into Saturday's shootout in Memorial Stadium holding a 26-12-3 edge despite falling 42-24 at Indiana a year ago.

Ken Dallafior, junior offensive tackle, and Jeff Schuh, senior defensive end, posted excellent games again last week at Illinois and loom as solid choices for post season honors.

Assuming Barber is through as a Gopher, his assault on the U of M record book also comes to a halt. The brilliant Gopher captain finished the Illinois game with 162 yards (he reached the 100 yard plateau in the first period) and one touchdown. In four years at Minnesota, Barber rushed 656 times (a U of M record) for 3,087 yards (a U of M record...and made him the eighth player in Big Ten history to top the 3,000 mark), and he scored 35 touchdowns (a U of M record).

With Barber out of the lineup against Indiana, Minnesota's rushing load may fall on the shoulders of senior fullback Garry White. The top ground gainer for the Gophers a year ago, White will go into the Hoosier clash with 582 yards after picking up 103 yards last weekend. The Illinois assignment marked the second time this year that Minnesota had two runners go over 100 yds. (Barber & White). That "Dynamic Duo" also accomplished that feat against Northwestern. --UM--

Minneapolis, MN---Minnesota remained the only undefeated team in the Western Collegiate Hockey Association (WCHA) by taking a pair from Michigan 9-4 and 5-2 at home last weekend.

This week the Gophers, 5-0 on the entire season and 4-0 in league play, host Notre Dame which spent last weekend out East splitting a pair against Clarkson. The Irish are 1-1 in the WCHA and 2-4 overall. Notre Dame plays at Bowling Green Tuesday, November 4.

For the first time this season Gopher coach Brad Buetow received more than the victories he was seeking, and that was better balance in scoring.

Instead of the Aaron Broten-Neal Broten-Butsy Erickson line handling just about all the scoring, which had been the case in Minnesota's first three games, eight different players potted goals against Michigan. However, not to be outdone, the Broten line accounted for five of Minnesota's 14 weekend scores.

Minnesota never trailed in either contest jumping out to 2-1 first period leads each night and going on from there. Minnesota owned a 101 to 58 edge in shots on goal. Had it not been for some incredible net minding by Michigan goalie Paul Fricker, scores both games could have been higher.

Buetow also received excellent performances in the Minnesota nets. Jim Jetland went the distance Friday making 25 saves, with Paul Butters returning to last year's form Saturday stopping 27 Michigan tries.

"Having (Paul) Butters come back with a strong, steady performance after getting off to a horrible start two weeks ago up at North Dakota was awfully important to our entire program," Buetow says.

"We need solid work from both these men to gain consistency and help get our goals allowed average down under three per game. Both will work this weekend, probably in the same order. And we hope to get junior Paul Ostby into action as soon as possible, too.

"All three have shown us they can play in the WCHA and that's a bonus for any team. Now if we can continue to show improved defense by all the rest of our skaters, including our forwards, I believe we can reduce our goals against considerably."

For the second straight weekend senior co-captain and wing Steve Ulseth was Minnesota's scoring leader. After gaining nine points in the series at North Dakota, Ulseth garnered seven points against Michigan. He scored two goals and four assists in Friday's win, and came back with another assist Saturday.

Neal Broten counted five assists for the weekend while co-captain and defenseman Mike Knoke had two goals and four assists. Erickson hit three goals and two assists and was Minnesota's nominee for WCHA Player of the Week.

Neal Broten and Ulseth are tied for the Gopher scoring lead with 17 points each in five games. Aaron Broten has totaled 15 points. Erickson 11 and Knoke ten. (MORE)

Minnesota came up with six power play goals in 16 chances against Michigan while the Wolverines connected for four extra-man goals in 14 tries.

### HARRIERS HOLD "SPECIAL", PREPARE FOR DISTRICTS

Minnesota's cross country team will host the 5,000-meter Special at 11 a.m. at the Bierman Field on Saturday and then will continue to prepare for the NCAA District 4 Championships.

Accustomed to running 8,000 meters for most of the year, Minnesota's harriers may find the 5,000 Special a special break. But then coach Roy Griak's squad will have to gear up for a 10,000 meter race in the Districts, which are being hosted by Illinois on November 15.

Minnesota will be hoping to improve upon its 1979 finish at Districts. The Gophers were seventh as six Big Ten teams comprised most of the top ten. Minnesota scored 166 points in '79 and returns Don Hurley and John Keohen from last season. Hurley was 11th and Keohen was 37th.

Freshman star Dave Morrison will also add to the Minnesota effort. He has been running well all season and the District 4 Championships may be where he really earns his stripes.

The Gophers will have to regroup after the Big Ten championships last weekend as Minnesota repeated its 1979 showing with a fifth-place finish. Minnesota scored 129 points---behind Indiana and Michigan (44), Illinois (70) and Wisconsin (99). Lloyd Ness was the top Gopher runner, finishing tenth in a time of 24:49 over MSU's 8,000 meter course.

### SWIMMERS TO HOST NEBRASKA FRIDAY

University of Minnesota swimming team will open up the 1980-81 campaign Friday with a dual meet with Nebraska at 2:30 in Cooke Hall Pool. For UM's improving team it will be a test to go up against the Cornhuskers, last season's Big Eight champions.

The Huskers boast of a strong diving team while Minnesota will counter with a strong tandem themselves---Jeff Adamson and Scott Shuppert. Both Adamson and Shuppert have Big Ten Championship and NCAA Championship experience behind them. Minnesota will score some points in the sprints and middle distance freestyle events mainly. Art Griffith and Pat Mahoney will carry UM hopes there.

Minnesota beat the Cornhuskers twice last season. Once in a 62-47 dual win in Minneapolis and then by outpointing NU in the Nebraska Invitational in Lincoln.

### GYMNASTS FACE STRONG FIELD AT WISCONSIN OPEN

Fresh from a tuneup against the Minnesota Alumni, UM's gymnastics team travels to Waukasha, WI for the 1980 Wisconsin Open Friday and Saturday.

Although it is an individual competition meet only, Minnesota will see many familiar faces when the 1980-81 Big Ten season opens. Ohio State, which finished second in the conference behind five-time champ Minnesota last year, will be there. Also appearing will be national powers Iowa State and Illinois-Chicago Circle. Big Ten rivals Wisconsin and Michigan will also compete. No team scores will be kept.

Dan Price and Brian Meeker will do most of the work in the all around for Minnesota. The two veterans will carry that job for the 1980-81 season as Minnesota defends its Big Ten title. Prize recruits Justy Reed and Joey Ray will add to the Minnesota effort in a big way in the all around.

Tom Caron (floor exercise and vault), Bob Harrison, Jeff Murray and Dean Hinitz (pommel horse), Tom Groechel (rings), Ron Israelson (parallel bars) and Tom and Al Wall (horizontal bar) are Gopher specialists that will score.

Minnesota owns a slim 11-9-0 series margin in wins over past Spartan teams. The first meeting between the schools came in 1950 when a pair of giants roamed the sidelines as head coaches. . .Bernie Bierman, the "Grey Eagle" for Minnesota, and Clarence "Biggie" Munn, a former Minnesota all-American. MSU has just been admitted to the Big Ten although it did not officially participate in conference grid schedules until 1953. That first meeting resulted in a 27-0 Spartan win. MSU again shut out UM 21-0 in 1953 and the first Gopher series victory was a 19-13 decision in 1954, coach Murray Warmath's first season in Paul Bunyanland. Minnesota's biggest series victory came in 1958 when the Gophers walked away with a 39-12 victory. Michigan State's best day had come one year earlier, 1957, when the Spartans prevailed 42-13. Minnesota has not defeated the Spartans since 1976 when the Gophers held on to win 14-10 at East Lansing. MSU has taken the last three meetings 29-10 here in '77, and the last two meetings there--33-9 in '78 and 31-17 last fall.

## GOPHERS CLOSE HOME SEASON AGAINST MICHIGAN STATE SATURDAY

University of Minnesota football fans will get a last look at this year's Golden Gophers Saturday when Coach Joe Salem's contingent entertains Michigan State University in a 1 p.m. Big Ten contest at Memorial Stadium.

Although Minnesota still will have one more game on its regular 1980 schedule (at Wisconsin November 22), Saturday will mark the final appearance in the Brick House for 10 Gopher seniors.

That delegation of final-year performers includes Captain Marion Barber (still sidelined with an elbow injury), Roy Artis, Ken Foxworth, Kelvin Jenkins, Glenn Lewis, Dana Noel, Kent Penovich, Jeff Schuh, Randy Sonnenfeld, and Garry White.

In addition, George "Butch" Nash, a member of the University of Minnesota football coaching staff since 1947 who will retire at the end of the '80 season, also will be making his final appearance in Memorial Stadium.

Saturday also has been designated as Parents' Day at the Brick House, all of which means that the Gophers could come into the game with a fair amount of emotion.

"We've got two games left," Salem pointed out, "and we want to win them both. After we lost to Michigan, our kids vowed to win their last five games. We got three of them, but now we must beat Michigan State to keep those hopes alive."

The Spartans will come into Memorial Stadium under new coach Muddy Waters with an overall record of 2-7 and a Big Ten mark of 1-5 after whipping lowly Northwestern 42-10 at East Lansing last Saturday.

Michigan State used a devastating ground game....halfback Steve Smith scored four touchdowns and finished with 229 yards....to win its first conference game of the year, and it is that kind of attack that the Gophers must stop this weekend.

"Our defense has been playing very well," Salem analyzed, "and I would hope that we could do it again against Michigan State. The big thing is that our defensive people have been playing well as a unit. They are together. But if we had to single out one person who has been our leader, our big play man, during the past three weeks it would be Jeff Schuh."

A defensive end, Schuh was named Minnesota's player of the game by ABC-TV last Saturday when the Gophers were overwhelming Indiana 31-7. He had four tackles for losses amounting to 43 "minus" yards for the Hoosiers.

It was Schuh's leadership which inspired Minnesota's defensive unit in holding Indiana to only 70 yards rushing. In all, the Gophers gave up only 202 total yards as Minnesota upped its overall record to 5-4 and its Big Ten standing to 4-3.

Playing without Barber for the first time in four seasons, Minnesota turned its ground game over to Garry White, and he responded with 145 yards....his best effort of the season. Roy Artis added 54 yards and Duane Gregory came off the bench to chip in with 52 as Minnesota outrushed the visitors by more than 200 yards.

Plagued by mistakes all season long, the Gophers "put it together" for the Indiana assignment. "Sometimes the bad things that keep happening start to work

themselves out," Salem explained. "All year long we have been hurting ourselves with errors. Against Indiana we seemed to have gotten them out of our system, and things turned in our favor."

Hopefully the Gophers will be able to continue that type of "error-free" football against invading Michigan State in the home finale on Saturday. It's the fourth assignment in Minnesota's pledged "5-0" scheme of things!

GOPHER TALES----Michigan State has won three straight over the Gophers including a 31-17 blistering at East Lansing last fall. In the series Minnesota still leads 11-9-0 in an abbreviated rivalry which got its start in 1950.

Although Barber's dislocated elbow is expected to keep him out of the lineup against the Spartans Saturday, Coach Salem does hope to have Glenn Lewis back in uniform after knee surgery a few weeks ago. "I was pleased with the way that Artis and Gregory filled in for Barber," Salem said, "but it also will help to have Lewis healthy. He also can help us on kickoff returns."

Last Saturday's contest against Indiana was played before an ABC-TV regional television audience. It marked the second time this season that the Gophers had been selected for a TV assignment.

The win over Indiana was the eighth straight in Memorial Stadium for the Gophers. The Hoosiers have not won at Minnesota since 1963. In direct contrast, Michigan State won over the Gophers 29-10 in its most recent appearance in the Brick House in 1977.

Freshman quarterback Tim Salem was praised by many for having what was called "his best game of the year" against Indiana. Salem completed four passes for 76 yards and a touchdown as well as rushing for 22 yards. On the year Salem has completed 71 of 151 attempts for 738 yards and a pair of TD's.

While Minnesota's punting game still is "up in the air" the kickoff, field goal and point-after-touchdown chores remain in capable hands. Jim Gallery hit four more PAT's last weekend and now is 26-of-26 as a Gopher. He also added a 32 yard field goal, his third of the season.

White scored twice last Saturday. He now has eight touchdowns for 48 points.... second on the squad to Barber's 11 for 66. And with Barber shelved, White will go into the Michigan State game as Minnesota's top rusher. He has 727 yards on the season (Barber has 769 in eight games), and could finish as the Gophers' top rusher for the second straight year.

Chester Cooper caught a 61-yard touchdown bomb from Salem this past weekend. It was his first tally of the year AND Minnesota's longest pass completion of 1980..... dispelling the belief that "Salem can't throw long!"

## ICEERS AT UMD

Minneapolis, MN---Minnesota's varsity hockey Gophers proved an old adage Saturday. . . that all good things come to an end.

However, even after seeing a six-game win streak come stopped, the Gophers remain in first place in the WCHA standings as they prepare to meet their neighbors to the North for a pair this weekend.

Minnesota invades the lair of instate rival Minnesota-Duluth in the Harbor City for league encounters Friday (8 p.m.) and Saturday (7:30 p.m.). The Bulldogs, long a Gopher nemesis, are fresh off a resounding 7-3 win over defending champion North Dakota last Saturday in Grand Forks. The Sioux won 5-4 in overtime Friday.

The Gopher split last weekend came at the hands of a big, strong skating Notre Dame six. After winning 4-2 Friday, Minnesota overcame Irish margins of 2-0 and 3-1 to take a 5-3 lead early in the third period Saturday.

However, Notre Dame, received one goal from Dave Poulin and a pair from Kirt Bjork to complete his hat trick, and took a 6-5 decision to halt Minnesota's quest to further its undefeated record.

Minnesota is now 6-1 for the season and 5-1 in the WCHA. The Gophers own a slim edge over Wisconsin and Denver, both 3-1, while Minnesota-Duluth is tied for fourth place at 2-2 in the early going.

Neal Broten and Jeff Teal each scored two goals for Minnesota on the weekend. Neal added four assists and was Minnesota's nominee for WCHA Player of the Week honors. Aaron Broten chipped in with four points (1-3) while Bob Bergloff had three (1-2).

Goalie Jim Jetland authored Minnesota's sixth straight win of the year by making 29 stops in Friday's game, but Paul Butters did not have the same luck Saturday. He was hit with some tough, close in scores as the Irish played heads up hockey both nights. Minnesota outshot Notre Dame 89-60 the two nights but could only gain a split.

## BUETOW ON THE GOPHERS

"It would have been nice to keep the streak alive, but the world doesn't end when you lose," Coach Brad Buetow said Sunday. "We actually played better Saturday than when we won on Friday.

"But I guess a win just wasn't in the cards for us. Notre Dame is the best club we have faced. They will be a factor in the WCHA this season. We had the chance to win Saturday with a two-goal lead, but Notre Dame must receive the credit. They didn't fold.

"We are still improving. We skated strong and for the most part stayed out of the penalty box. We could have done a lot more shooting instead of some extra passing, but I believe that will come with time.

"A lot of our men who didn't get into the scoring column played strong, heady games and gave good leadership. So all in all I believe we are on the right track."

## ABOUT THE BULLDOGS

"Minnesota-Duluth must have played a helluva series last weekend," Buetow continued. "North Dakota had to come from behind to tie late Friday and gain the overtime win. Then Saturday the Bulldogs must have been something else.

"The Bulldogs are flying very high and they never have any trouble getting even higher for us. They have good experience, talent and depth at forward this year, and their goal tenders, Bill Perkle and Ron Erickson, always seem to save their best games for us.

"We'll probably go with Jim Jetland again Friday, and then wait and see how he plays before deciding who will be in the nets Saturday. 'Jet' played awfully well against Notre Dame. We just could go with him both nights. But I'll wait and see on that.

"This should be another great, great series in the tradition of our keen rivalry with Minnesota-Duluth. The fans in their arena always get their monies worth when our schools meet."

#### MINNESOTA CAGERS TO HOLD SCRIMMAGE SATURDAY

Coach Jim Dutcher will unveil his 1980-81 University of Minnesota basketball team in an intra-squad scrimmage at Williams Arena Saturday following the Gopher-Michigan State home football finale.

Tip-off is tentatively slated for 4:15 p.m. in an attempt to permit grid fans an opportunity to move from Memorial Stadium to remodeled Williams Arena for the basketball action.

Tickets will be on sale in the Williams Arena ticket booths Saturday afternoon, and they are priced at \$2.00. All seating for the scrimmage will be general admission.

Dutcher will introduce each squad member as part of the pre-game ceremonies, and the afternoon will be complete with cheerleaders and Gopher Pep Band.

The squad will be split for the scrimmage on the basis of "youngsters against oldtimers" which means Dutcher will pit his seven juniors against his six sophomores and freshmen.

Making up the "veteran" unit will be 6-2 guard Mark Hall, 6-10 forward-center Gary Holmes, 6-5 guard and captain Darryl Mitchell, 6-10 center-forward Brian Pederson, 6-6 forward Andy Thompson, 6-5 guard-forward Trent Tucker and 6-9 forward John Wiley.

All members of that group are lettermen except Wiley who is a junior college transfer. Pederson won his letter two years ago, missed last season with a back injury but is back with the Gophers this season.

The "youth squad" will include 7-2 center Randy Breuer, 6-9 sophomore forward Ben Coleman, 6-4 guard Brian Hansen, 6-7 forward Zebedee Howell, 6-1 guard Bruce Kaupa and 6-10 forward Jim Petersen. Hansen and Petersen are incoming freshmen while the remainder of that group was with Minnesota a year ago when the Gophers finished 21-11 and wound up second in the National Invitational Tournament.

Minnesota opens regular-season play on Saturday, November 29 when North Dakota State invades Williams Arena. Then the Gophers host Florida State University on December 2 before hitting the road.

"The Saturday scrimmage should help us prepare for the upcoming season," Dutcher said, "and it also will give our fans an opportunity to see what kind of a team we will have this season. It also will give them a good opportunity to see our new people get a lot of court time." --UM--

#### TENNIS TEAM WINS CONSOLATION CROWN AT SOUTH CAROLINA

Minnesota's men's tennis team have a three week layoff to prepare for the Neilson Open in Madison, Wisconsin on November 29-30, but the Gophers started this preparation in fine form by winning the consolation title at the South Carolina Fall Invitational Tennis Open.

In winning the consolation title (fifth-place overall) coach Jerry Noyce's squad also defeated Atlantic Coast Conference teams for the first ever and defeated an All-American. Minnesota opened with a 5-4 loss to Duke on Friday then ripped through the rest of the tourney with a 7-2 shellacking of Wake Forest and closed with a 5-4 win over North Carolina State.

Hakan Almstrom, UM's Big Ten champ at No. 4 singles last season, was 2-1 over the weekend. Mike Trautner, coming back after spending last season out with an injury, was 3-0 and included a 4-6, 6-4, 6-4 victory over NC State's Andy Andrews, an All-American and ranked among the top 16 in the country. Greg Wicklund was 2-1, as was Dave Morin. Mike Hoeger was 2-0 in relief of Mark Wheaton after Wheaton suffered a 6-2, 6-4 loss on Friday.

Kent Helgeson and Almstrom, the 1980 Big Ten champs at No. 2 doubles, were 2-1 as were Trautner/Hoeger. --UM--

Series History:

Minnesota owns a comfortable 49-32 edge in wins for this, the longest continuous series in collegiate football. There have also been 8 ties. Minnesota and Wisconsin have met every year but once since the series began in 1890. The only open year was 1906 when U. S. President Theodore Roosevelt called for a halt to all keen college rivalries to help put a stop to excessive roughness in the game. So that means Minnesota and Wisconsin have played football in 89 of the last 90 years. Saturday marks the 90th renewal. Badger coach Dave McClain has yet to lose to a Minnesota squad winning 48-10 at home in 1978 and then taking that wild 42-37 decision here last fall. Many games in this series have helped decide the Big Ten championship or a bowl appearance by one school or the other. To say the least, fan interest has run rampant more than once on the final Saturday of the season. Minnesota has not won in Badgerland since 1972 when the Gophers took home a 14-6 decision. Wisconsin has taken the last 3 home games from Minnesota. . .49-14 in 1974, 26-17 in 1976, and 48-10 in 1978. Saturday's contest marks the final game for George "Butch" Nash to patrol the Gopher sideline. Nash has been an assistant coach at Minnesota the last 34 years dating back to 1947.

## GOPHERS SHOOT FOR WINNING RECORD IN FINALE AT WISCONSIN

The difference between a winning and a losing season will be at stake for Minnesota Saturday when the Gophers close their 1980 football campaign in a 1 p.m. Big Ten Conference assignment at Wisconsin.

Coach Joe Salem's gridders will put their overall record of 5-5 and Big Ten log of 4-4 on the line against the Badgers as they attempt to finish over the .500 mark for the first time since 1977. Wisconsin is 3-7 and 2-5.

"We have maintained all year long that our team had a lot of character," Salem proclaimed. "Now we will really find out what we are made of. We can bounce back and finish winners or fold up our tents."

The bouncing back Salem referred to was after that devastating 30-12 loss suffered by the Gophers last weekend at the hands of Michigan State. Minnesota went into its home finale with a three-game winning streak to its credit, nursing hopes for a post-season bowl bid and heavily favored to beat the invading Spartans.

But Michigan State breezed out of Memorial Stadium with an easy win as the Gophers reverted to their old benevolent ways and literally handed the visitors the decision with eight fumbles, two interceptions, six penalties and a blocked punt.

"It was a miserable performance on our part," Salem admitted. "We are right back where we started. As good as we played against Indiana two weeks ago we were that bad against Michigan State. The team that makes the big plays wins. Michigan State made the big plays and we lost our composure."

If there was a bright spot in Minnesota's loss, it would have to be the day turned in by senior fullback Garry White. In his final appearance in the Brick House, White carried 23 times for 201 yards. It was the third 200-yard day in his career at Minnesota and propelled him into second place on the all-time U of M rushing list.

Only Marion Barber, Minnesota's record holder, has more yards....and Barber missed his second straight game with that elbow injury against Michigan State. Although he maintains he will be ready for the Wisconsin game, the Minnesota medical staff says it's virtually an impossibility.

Ten seniors will be in inform for the final time at Wisconsin. They are Roy Artis, Ken Foxworth, Kelvin Jenkins, Glenn Lewis, Dana Noel, Kent Penovich, Jeff Schuh, Randy Sonnenfeld, Garry White and Captain Barber.

Minnesota and Wisconsin are the owners of one of the oldest rivalries in the nation. The first game was played in 1890 and in all 89 meetings have taken place, and the Gophers will take a 49-32-8 edge into Saturday's season ender. Wisconsin, however, has won two straight including that high-scoring 42-37 affair at Minnesota one year ago.

White appears to have wrapped up his second consecutive "seasonal" rushing crown at Minnesota. On the year White has 953. Barber led with 769 in eight games until shelved at Illinois. A year ago against the Badgers, White netted 230 yards.

## CAGERS PREPARE FOR SEASON OPENER

With less than two weeks remaining before the University of Minnesota tips off its 1980-81 basketball season, Coach Jim Dutcher has moved his practice tempo into high gear.

The Gophers held an intra-squad scrimmage this past weekend, pitting the juniors against the freshmen and sophomores, and as might be expected it was the "veteran" unit which prevailed.

Dutcher's biggest task, as he prepared his cagers for the November 29 opener with North Dakota State at Williams Arena, seems to be picking a starting unit from his current band of candidates.

"We've got the next week or so to decide who will start against North Dakota State," Dutcher said, "and we still have some decisions to make about some of our key personnel."

A year ago, Trent Tucker, Mark Hall, Gary Holmes and Darryl Mitchell were consistent starters along with the now departed Kevin McHale. So it would seem natural that Dutcher's only job was to find someone to replace McHale.

Apparently that's not the case, and the only assumption being made is that the Gophers are involved in a healthy situation if the competition for starting positions is as strong as it now appears.

"It looks like Randy Breuer will take over at center for us," Dutcher says. Breuer is a 7-2 sophomore who came on strong last year and wound up winning All-NIT honors.

"Tucker and Hall also look like they are set in our starting unit," Dutcher continues. "After that, we'll decide which players we will put where. Either Ben Coleman or Holmes will open at one forward, and we probably will open with Mitchell at the small forward."

Mitchell is 6-5 and has played both guard and forward for the Gophers. He's also captain this season. Tucker is also 6-5 and, like Mitchell, has played both guard and forward. Hall is 6-2 and operates strictly in the backcourt. Coleman is 6-9 and a strong rebounding forward while Holmes is 6-10 and has been used both at forward and center.

All of those cagers are lettermen. And other monogram winners on the squad include 6-7 Zebedee Howell, 6-6 Andy Thompson and Brian Pederson, a 6-10 junior who won his letter two years ago but missed last season because of a back injury.

Additional squad members include Kruce Kaupa, a 6-1 sophomore guard who was used primarily with the JV last season, and three newcomers...6-10 freshman Jim Peterson, 6-4 freshman Brian Hansen and 6-9 junior college transfer John Wiley.

Following the opener against the Bison on November 29, Minnesota plays host to Florida State at Williams Arena on December 2. Then the Gophers take to the road to play at Loyola on December 5 before returning home to entertain Marquette December 17.

## ICERS 2ND, HOST #1 DENVER

Minneapolis, MN--For the first time this season, the University of Minnesota hockey Gophers find themselves looking up at the Western Collegiate Hockey Association (WCHA) leader instead of looking down at the rest of the league.

After winning its first five WCHA outings, the Gophers have dropped three straight, including a pair last weekend at in-State rival Minnesota-Duluth. The Bulldogs swept the Gophers 3-0 Friday and 6-5 Saturday before a pair of packed houses. The 8-0 shutout was the first suffered by a UM club in 192 games dating back to February of 1975.

So all the Gophers, who hope to regroup this week, have in store this week is an invasion by the Denver Pioneers, new WCHA leader with a 5-1 record. The Gophers are 5-3 in league play, 6-3 overall.

Denver comes to Williams Arena hot off a home sweep of Michigan State. The Pioneers lost their first WCHA game of the year to Wisconsin, and then swept its last five outings.

"Denver's success lies largely, as far as I can tell, in the return to duty of its excellent goal tender Scott Robinson," says Minnesota head coach Brad Buetow. "That, coupled with excellent defensive play by their entire club has Denver giving up less than three goals a game.

"I wish I could say that about our club. Our entire team defense has not been much to talk about. It appears we simply figured we could outscore any opponent, but found out the last three times that's not the way to play hockey.

"Duluth played an excellent series. On Friday I'm not certain where we were. But it certainly wasn't at the Duluth Arena. But our men came back and played an inspired game Saturday. We just gave up too many easy goals.

"I'm not certain about making changes just for the sake of change, but we will try some new line and defensive combinations this week in practice. In goal we may give junior Paul Ostby a chance, too. He played just one period in the Hall of Fame game this year but has continued to show promise.

"What it comes down to is that we've simply got to pick up our play. We have the men who can do the job, but it's a two-way street out there. We've got to start receiving better defensive play from our forwards, and everyone.

"This league is not all score, score, score. Any team that reaches the top, as evidenced by Denver, must stress defensive play from its goal all the way out to the opponent's end of the rink. We'll concentrate on that point this week.

"I believe our fans are in for one whale of a series this weekend. Denver owns a proud, winning tradition in the WCHA. They are back on top and certainly do not want to see us knock them off. It should be a great series."

Co-Captain Steve Ulseth led the Gophers in Saturday's game with two power play goals in the first period. But two third period scores by the Bulldogs breaking a 4-4 tie made the difference and the Gophers simply couldn't score the equalizer in the final minutes.

Minnesota's top scorers, Ulseth, Neal and Aaron Broten and Butsy Erickson, each had two points Saturday. Neal Broten continues to lead the Gophers with 25 points in nine games. Aaron Broten and Ulseth are next with 21 each.

Sophomore Tom Gallagher probably will get the nod at 118 for UM. Gallagher sports a 7-5 ledger from last season. Brad Huckle, junior, will go at 126 and Huckle, who had a 23-9-1 record in '79-80 and a #3 ranking nationally, added two falls to his ledger. Junior Gary Lefebvre will go at 134. Lefebvre brings into this season a 34-9-1 record from last season and a 9-1-1 record in Big Ten matches. Junior transfer Dalen Wasmund (Naval Academy) will wrestle at 142. Wasmund had a 18-9-2 record last season after being bothered with a bad back for part of the year. He was 7-3-2 in the Big Ten.

Freshman Greg Evans will step into the 150 spot after it was learned that soph Steve Martinez will be lost for the year with cartilage problems in his right knee. Martinez will have surgery today. Evans, though, may be more than capable enough to do the job. He was the Illinois High School champ at 138 and Johnson says that Evans has looked the best of the new recruits.

Craig Wiklund, junior, will go at 158 and step into the shoes vacated by graduated Dan Zilverberg. Used sparingly last season, Wiklund was 4-5-0 with one fall.

Jim Trudeau, junior, has 167 to himself. Trudeau was 22-10-11 last season, 8-3 in the conference matches and had four falls. Jim is one of the smartest wrestlers in Johnson's fold. Mark Luby will start at 177 for the Gophers. Luby, junior, was UM's handy-man last season, wrestling from 167 to 190 and in the meantime earned a 9-6-2 record, 2-1-1 in the Big Ten. A very tough wrestler, Luby also has great speed.

Mark Miller holds down the 190 spot. Miller, senior, was 7-11-1 in '79-80, 3-6 in the Big Ten matches and had one fall. Chuch Vavrosky is the incumbant heavy-weight. Vavrosky is a sophomore who brings into the new campaign a 10-7-1 ledger from last season and two falls.

The Gophers will try to match their 12-4 record of a year ago that went with a third place finish in the Big Ten and 19th in the NCAA Championships.

Johnson and the Gophers have also set the date and team for the 1981 "Wrestling Showcase" -- January 18 against Wisconsin at 2:30. There has also been a schedule change for the Gophers. The February 1 meet with Oregon, originally scheduled for Williams Arena, has been shifted out to Bloomington-Kennedy High School. Time for the meet is 2:00 p.m.

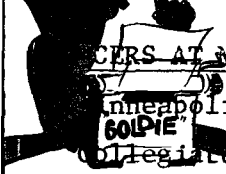

GOPHERS AT MADISON

Minneapolis, MN---After taking a one-week hiatus from the top rung of the Western Collegiate Hockey Association (WCHA) ladder, Minnesota, back in a tie for first, will try and hold onto its rung this weekend when the hockey Gophers travel to always dangerous Wisconsin. Games are set for 7:30 p.m. CST Friday and Saturday at Dane County Coliseum.

Minnesota returned to its winning ways at home last weekend by moving Denver out of the top spot via 4-1 and 7-0 wins. Hot goal tending and opportunistic scoring made the difference for Minnesota.

On Friday junior Paul Ostby (Elk River) made his first league start and was all but letter perfect. He turned away 39 Denver shots and was tough when it counted. He may have earned himself a turn against Wisconsin this weekend.

The next night veteran Jim Jetland (Grand Rapids), who was shelled his last time out, returned to excellent form in gaining his first career shut out for the Gophers. "Jet" faced 41 Denver tries turning in a spectacular performance with numerous dramatic saves. It is almost certain Jetland will be in the Gopher nets Friday at Madison.

On offense a new line of C-Aaron Broten (Roseau), freshman LW-Tom Rothstein (Grand Rapids) and RW-Butsy Erickson (Roseau) led the way for Minnesota. Rothstein scored two goals in Friday's 4-1 win and another Saturday.

Broten pumped in two Saturday and Erickson got one the same night. Broten and Erickson each garnered five assists for the weekend while Rothstein added two giving that line a total of 19 points against Denver.

Another new line, including C-Neal Broten (Roseau), LW-Steve Ulseth (Roseville) and RW-Kevin Hartzell (St. Paul), handled the remainder of the scoring. Ulseth and Hartzell each had two weekend goals while Neal Broten added three assists.

## BUETOW ON THE GOPHERS

"Naturally it was great to get a pair of wins against a strong Denver team," coach Brad Buetow says. "They are the best we have seen in terms of complete personnel.

"But it was a case of our men returning to form, of playing solid team defense and, of course, gaining two outstanding goalie performances.

"We had left our style of hockey the three previous outings and were soundly defeated by two more excellent hockey teams, Notre Dame and Minnesota-Duluth. But it appeared last weekend that our players learned their lessons and realized that defense means everyone, not just the blueliners and goal tenders. It was our best (OVER)

six periods of hockey this season.

"Add in the fact that we were only called for six minor penalties, the same number as Denver, and it spells out doing what's right when it comes to winning.

"But that's now history. So much for winning at home. Now we have to prove we can meet a challenger on their ice and perform up to what is expected of us. We didn't do that at Minnesota-Duluth and were completely outplayed.

"However, we showed early in the season we can win when we took two at North Dakota. But again, that's history.

"Wisconsin, after an off year, is back in the thick of things. They are always extremely tough at home. We'll have to play every bit as good as we did last weekend if we expect any success at Madison.

"Last year we squeaked out a pair of wins there, but we don't have Tim Harrer with us any more. He scored successive hat tricks, including the winning goal each night, in a pair of one goal victories. If we go back in the penalty box at Wisconsin, their power play will kill us.

"I believe our lineup will stay the same this week. We'll just have to go out and prove ourselves again."

Aaron Broten, with eight points over the weekend, moved ahead of brother Neal in the Gopher scoring race. Aaron now has 29 points (11-18) in 11 games while Neal has 28 (4-24). Ulseth is next with 24 points (12-12) while Erickson has 21 (11-10).

## MINNESOTA ENDS SEASON WITH 5-6 RECORD

When Coach Joe Salem attempts to analyze the University of Minnesota's 1980 football season, two thoughts.....or words....immediately come to mind: disappointing and frustrating.

The Golden Gophers lost their season finale 25-7 at Wisconsin last weekend, and that setback dropped their final record to 5-6. But more disappointing than losing to the Badgers was the fact that Minnesota came out on the short end of things in its final two assignments of the '80 campaign and in the process missed ~~it~~ last ditch attempt to wind up over the .500 mark.

"We had a chance to finish the year with five straight wins," Salem pointed out. "Instead we reverted to our old self-destruct ways during the final two weeks of the season. We are disappointed and we are frustrated."

The frustration stems from the fact that the Gophers hurt themselves all season long with errors. Minnesota finished the year with 15 pass interceptions, 49 fumbles (a new U of M record), 83 penalties (ties a U of M record), and had five punts blocked.

"It was no different in the last game against Wisconsin than it was all season long," Salem said. "We didn't make the big plays either on offense or defense. We just hurt ourselves with mistakes."

So as Salem looks ahead to 1981, what does he see? "We had a lot of young people on our squad this year," he indicated, "and that means we are going to have a lot of experience returning next fall."

But Salem is the first to admit that Minnesota will need more than experience if it hopes to establish itself as a winning football team in 1981. "We still have to learn how to win," Salem proclaims. "We have to reach the point where we can win the games we are supposed to win. We have to do that before we can turn our program around. Our hope now is that the players we have returning next year will know how to attack the problem."

The disappointments of '80 also were obvious. Minnesota moved into high gear midway through the season, won three in a row, visualized a 7-4 finish and dreamed of a post season bowl bid.

It didn't work out that way, however. "So many times this year we talked about getting things together on a 'next week' basis. Now our underclassmen can start planning for next year. But for our seniors, there is no next year. There isn't even a next week. I'm disappointed most of all for those people. They deserved better."

Ten seniors were in uniform at Wisconsin. They were Captain Marion Barber, Roy Artis, Ken Foxworth, Kelvin Jenkins, Glenn Lewis, Dana Noel, Kent Penovich, Jeff Schuh, Randy Sonnenfeld and Garry White.

Although netting only 31 yards in the finale against the Badgers, White finished the season as Minnesota's leading rusher with 959 yards. It was the second straight

season the White topped Minnesota in that department.

Captain Barber missed the final three games of the season but wound up with 769 yards and 11 touchdowns. He concludes a brilliant Gopher career as the U of M's all-time rushing leader with 3,087 yards and as Minnesota's best all-time touchdown maker with 35.

White vaulted into second place on the Gophers' all-time rushing list with 2,345 yards in his career. And he missed becoming the third player in U of M history to reach the 1,000-yard level in one season by a mere 41 yards.

Jim Gallery wound up as Minnesota's third-leading scorer this year with 42 points to trail only Barber (66) and White (54) in that department. Gallery was a perfect 27-of-27 in the point-after-touchdown department and he connected on five of nine field goal attempts.

As the 1980 season ground to a halt, Coach Salem and his assistants immediately started on the recruiting trails in hopes of adding the necessary talent to make Minnesota a contender a year from now.

Top priority in that search? "It is obvious that we need runningbacks," Salem said. "With Barber, White and Lewis all graduating, we will have a huge void to fill before next fall."

Unofficially, Minnesota's home-football attendance in 1980 was the best it has been in a number of years. The Gophers drew 265,105 fans to Memorial Stadium in six home appearances. That's an average of 44,185.....the highest since Minnesota averaged 45,093 in 1970. Largest Brick House crowd of 1980 was 58,158 for the Iowa clash.

#### GOPHER GRAPPLERS RETURN TO AIR FORCE TOURNEY

Minnesota's wrestling team will make a command appearance at the Air Force Academy Tournament next Saturday. What makes the Gopher's return to Colorado Springs so special is that in four appearances in the tourney Minnesota has finished first three times and second once.

Minnesota won the 1978-79 tournament with 108.5 points while winning six weight divisions. Hopefully this penchant for winning in the Rockies will continue for coach Wally Johnson's young team. The Air Force Tournament begins a long string of road matches for UM. The Gophers will be on the road the entire month of December and into January before returning to the friendly confines of Williams Arena for a January 9 match against Indiana. Johnson's Kiddie Korps received a baptism of fire last weekend in the Gopher Quad.

After winning five divisions last year, especially against the likes of Iowa and Northern Iowa, Minnesota took only one championship this time around. Chuck Vavrosky won the title at heavyweight with a 2-1 decision of John Kriebs of Northern Iowa. Nevertheless the Gophers did place five other grapplers in the finals -- no small feat with such a young team.

Gary Lefebvre (134), Dalen Wasmund (142), Greg Evans (150), Darrell Gholar (158) and Mark Luby (177) all made it to the final round before falling to Iowa Hawkeyes and an NIU Panther.

The biggest shocker of the tournament was in the semi-finals of 158 when Gholar, a freshman, decisioned Iowa powerhouse King Mueller 3-4. Mueller has been rated among the top six wrestlers in the country for the last three years.

## GOPHER CAGERS OPEN 1980-81 SEASON ON SATURDAY

Basketball takes over the spotlight at the University of Minnesota on Saturday when Coach Jim Dutcher's Golden Gophers open their 1980-81 season by playing host to North Dakota State University at 8:05 p.m.

Minnesota also is slated to entertain highly-touted Florida State University next Tuesday (Dec. 2) before hitting the road to take on Loyola in Chicago a week from Friday (Dec. 5).

"It's an ambitious start for us," Dutcher admitted, "but our players are ready for some game competition. They are tired of playing against each other. They are ready to find out about themselves."

Against the invading Bison on Saturday, Dutcher intends to open with 6-9 sophomore Ben Coleman and 6-5 junior Trent Tucker at the forwards. Randy Breuer, 7-2 sophomore, will get the nod at center. Captain Darryl Mitchell, 6-5 junior, and Mark Hall, 6-2 junior, will open at the guards. All five of those cagers are lettermen.

Dutcher also indicates that 6-10 junior Gary Holmes "probably will be the first player off the bench." According to Dutcher, "He's a two-year starter who can come in for us at either center or forward.

Also ticketed for early duty are 6-7 sophomore Zebedee Howell and 6-9 junior John Wiley. Both are forwards...Howell a returning letterman from last year's 21-11 NIT finalist squad and Wiley a junior college transfer.

Brian Pederson, 6-10 junior who won his letter playing forward and center two seasons ago before sitting out last year with a bad back, still is having some problems.

"We probably will have to use Brian on a spot-duty basis," Dutcher said. "He is having a little trouble, especially if he goes too long. But he will be able to help us at times, and we like to have him in there because he's extremely aggressive, and that really gives us a boost."

Minneapolis, MN--It sounds strange saying it in these parks, but yes, Virginia, the University of Minnesota hockey Gophers play two games in San Diego, California, this weekend.

For the first time ever, Minnesota meets U. S. International in a weekend set Saturday and Sunday, 7:30 p.m. Twin Cities time. The games are scheduled at the Mera Mesa House of Ice.

## CAGERS TO PLAY AT LOYOLA FRIDAY

## U OF M CAGERS RETURN TO ACTION AGAINST MARQUETTE

After a two week layoff from hardwood tests (for fall quarter exams), the University of Minnesota basketball team will return to action Wednesday by entertaining the Marquette Warriors in an 8:05 p.m. non-conference assignment at Williams Arena.

It will be Minnesota's first start since it overwhelmed Loyola 100-33 at the new Horizon Arena in suburban Chicago, and it will find the Gophers risking their unblemished 3-0 record.

"We're happy that we ended phase one of our 1980-81 season unbeaten," Coach Jim Dutcher said, "and I would hope that it's a good sign when you can win by 17 on the road and still not be satisfied with your performance."

But Dutcher wasn't totally pleased with Minnesota's most recent effort. "We got out to a 29 point lead," he explained, "but then we let up and had to scramble in the second half to save the win."

Mark Hall led the Gophers with 22 points on a 10-of-14 field goal shooting night. Hall also tops Minnesota on the season with 55 points in three games for an average of 18.3 per outing.

Other cagers drew Dutcher's praise after the Loyola outing, however, including 7-2 sophomore center Randy Breuer. "Randy needs a little more physical toughness," Dutcher said, "but he is playing well." Dutcher called Breuer's game at Loyola his "best of the season," and he also maintained that "he's getting better every game."

Once again, however, it was a kind of "team effort" that won for Minnesota as Dutcher played 11 Gophers in the game and eight of them worked their way into the scoring column.

With phase one completed, Dutcher and his cagers now look to phase two and invading Marquette. The Warriors, regarded as one of the strongest independents again this season, opened the campaign with two straight wins including an impressive 69-58 triumph over Stanford last weekend.

"Marquette has experience and quickness," Dutcher analyzed. "We know they like to run offensively and they like to press on defense. It will be another tough game for us."

Tough games are getting to be a habit, and they will show up with consistency in the phase two part of the schedule. Following Minnesota's assignment with Marquette, the Gophers head for Louisville and a December 22 contest with the NCAA defending champion Fighting Cardinals.

Then the Gophers return home to entertain Yale, Texas Tech and Washington in the Pillsbury Classic at Williams Arena December 26 and 27 before heading for Los Angeles, CA and the Winston Tire Classic December 29 and 30. Other entries include USC, Louisville and North Carolina.

All of which will set the stage for phase three of this year's cage slate....the Big Ten season. The Gophers, in the eyes of the prognosticators, will finish fifth. Dutcher and his Gophers have set their sights higher. --UM--

### GYMNASTS OFF TIL JANUARY, CLIPPED BY JAPANESE

UM gymnastics coach Fred Roethlisberger had a charged-up bunch of Gophers last Saturday versus the Japanese Collegiate All Stars, but the Japanese were simply too much for Minnesota as the touring All Stars clipped UM 264.10 - 263.35 before 2,000 fans in Williams Arena.

But if facing the Japanese wasn't enough for Minnesota, the Gophers now must face Ohio State, Big Ten runner-up the past two years by slim margins to five-time champ Minnesota. Perhaps fortunately for Minnesota is that they will have until January 10 to prepare to meet the Buckeyes in Columbus.

Following the meet with OSU, the Gophers will have two straight home affairs--with Wisconsin January 17 at 3:30 and then a triangular with conference rival Michigan and--here we go again with another biggie--national power Iowa State on January 24 at 2:30 in Williams Arena.

Brian Meeker put on a fine show in the floor exercise to score 9.70 to win that event last Saturday. Meeker also was a close second in the all-around with 56.50, as compared to Takayuki Asakawa's winning 56.80. Meeker was also third in the vault (9.55), fourth in the parallel bars (9.35) and fifth in the rings (9.25) and horizontal bar (9.45). Besides Minnesota's great showing, the afternoon was high-lighted by Toshiya Muramatsu's 9.90 on the horizontal bar.

### LIMPING GRAPPLERS STAY ON THE ROAD

Fortunately for UM's wrestling team they have until December 19 to rest up, for with the team in as bad shape as a M\*A\*S\*H unit, coach Wally Johnson's grapplers need the time to lick some wounds.

Minnesota's limping squad will perform in the Northern Illinois Tournament at DeKalb, IL December 19-20--but that is hoping Johnson can field ten healthy starters. Also fortunate is that this tourney has always been a chance for the jayvees to gain experience.

All of these health problems came about this past weekend through a tour of the southwest. UM lost to Arizona State 24-9 as co-captain Gary Lefebvre (126) sprained his ankle and freshman standout Greg Evans also was injured. Minnesota then lost the same day to Oregon State 29-13 to add insult to injury. A dejected UM squad then prepared to take on Arizona--one of the top-rated teams in the country.

But like magic UM pulled its act together and stunned the Wildcats 26-15 to put UM's season dual ledger at 1-2. But true to weekend form another Gopher fell to the injury bug as Mark Luby (177) pulled up with muscle spasms in his neck.

Another injury to Jim Trudeau (167) in the Arizona Invitational on Friday threw the Gophers for another spin. One would think that that would be all she wrote for UM--competing against 17 other teams with 11 of them ranked.

But the Gophers proved they can pull a rabbit or two from their hats as six Gophers placed: a surprise with Dave Henry (4th at 126), Dalen Wasmund (2nd at 142) Craig Wiklund (4th at 153), Trudeau wrestling hurt (3rd at 167), another surprise in Mark Mueller (5th at 190) and Chuck Vavrosky (3rd at HWT). They helped UM to a fourth-place finish with 74 points behind Oklahoma (159), Oregon (101) and Arizona State (99).

### SWIMMERS PACKING BAGS FOR HAWAII

Although it may sound like a dream come true--spending two weeks in sunny Hawaii over the Christmas break--UM's swimming team will be doing anything but resting up. If last season is any kind of indication of what swimming in Hawaii can do then maybe the Gophers should spend more time there.

Coach Paul Stearns will be taking his team to Hawaii December 18, competes with the University of Hawaii December 27 in Honolulu and returns to--well, the different climes of Minnesota January 2, 1931. The Gophers then will travel to Lincoln for the Nebraska Invitational January 16-17 in a meet that features the Huskers, Big Eight champs the last two years.

Last season, when Minnesota returned from the training in Hawaii, the Gophers made some waves by upsetting Nebraska in a dual meet 66-47. The cornhuskers evened up the score some with a 69½-45½ win over Minnesota in UM's season-opening match last November.

Whether Hawaii can perform its magic again is to be seen in the cold of a typical Midwestern winter. But then these aren't two typical swim teams either and anything can happen.

## GOPHERS TO ENTER TWO HOLIDAY CAGE TOURNAMENTS

What has been tabbed by Coach Jim Dutcher as "Phase I" of the University of Minnesota's 1980-81 basketball schedule is nearing completion as the Gophers prepare to compete in a pair of holiday tournaments.

First Minnesota hosts its own Pillsbury Classic December 26-27 at Williams Arena and then travels to Los Angeles, CA., to take part in the Winston Tire Classic December 29-30.

"Those four games will wind up our non-conference schedule for this season," Coach Dutcher pointed out, "and when they're over we'll be ready to open our Big Ten Conference schedule. That's Phase Three."

In the Pillsbury Classic, the seventh annual such event, Texas Tech and Washington open up festivities in the 7 p.m. contest on Friday before Yale takes on the host contingent at 9.

Minnesota has never lost a game in Pillsbury Classic competition...putting together an unbelievable streak of 12 straight victories and six consecutive crowns.

First-round losers meet for consolation honors at 7 p.m. Saturday before the two first-round winners meet at 9 for the 1980 title.

Then the Gophers head West for the first annual Winston Tire Classic which will be played amidst the festive atmosphere of the 1981 Rose Bowl. That two-day event is scheduled for the Los Angeles Sports Arena.

Monday's opening round will find North Carolina squaring off with Louisville at 7 p.m. after which host University of Southern California will pits its talent against Minnesota.

Tuesday night again will find first-round losers dueling each other for consolation honors at 7 p.m. and then at 9 the two first-round winners will shoot it out for the championship.

"Both tournaments will be big challenges for us," Dutcher admits. "This year's Pillsbury Classic field is a good one, and it will be difficult for us to repeat. The Winston Tire Classic will be even tougher. Not only is the field a great one, but the same old business of playing on the road will be part of things."

The Gophers opened the 1980-81 season with consecutive victories over North Dakota State (99-64), Florida State (79-66) and Loyola (100-83). That was phase one prior to a two-week layoff for fall quarter exams. Phase two started on a sour note as Marquette whipped Minnesota 92-34, and that set the stage for Monday night's (December 22) assignment at Louisville.

No drastic changes are expected in Dutcher's starting lineup for the classics. Randy Breuer (7-2) is a fixture at center while Trent Tucker (6-5) and Ben Coleman (6-9) probably will open at forward. The same holds true for Mark Hall (6-2) and Captain Darryl Mitchell (6-5) at the guards.

Others, however, could play extensively during the hectic tourney pace and John Wiley (6-9), Gary Holmes (6-10) and Zeb Howell (6-7) all fall into that category.
