GOPHER CAGERS OPEN DEFENSE OF BIG TEN CROWN

Minnesota opens defense of its Big Ten Conference championship this week with a pair of Williams Arena assignments against the University of Illinois and Purdue University.

Coach Jim Dutcher's Golden Gophers are slated to entertain the Fighting Illini Thursday in an 8:05 p.m. encounter before playing host to the Boilermakers on Saturday at 3:05 p.m.

In Dutcher's scheme of things, Minnesota is now entering phase three of its 1982-83 season. "The first phase was the pre-season preparation," Dutcher explained, "and the second phase was the non-conference part of the schedule. Now things are for real."

Dutcher told his squad after it had nudged Montana State 62-45 and run its non-loop record to 8-1 that it had better get ready for a different kind of opponent in Illinois and Purdue.

"As far as we are concerned our record is 0-0," he stressed. "We've got two home games the first week of the conference season, and we are in a position to get off to a good start. But we will be facing a different kind of opponent than the one we played Monday night. We'll have to be ready."

Exactly what kind of foe is Dutcher looking for in the Fighting Illini and the Boilermakers? "They'll come after us on the boards," Dutcher

predicted. "They'll come after us like nobody we've seen so far this year. They'll bang us around, and we've got to be prepared."

The Gophers did not seem to be prepared for invading Montana State Monday night. Host Minnesota led by only one at the half (26-25) and did not gain a comfortable lead until the closing moments of the game.

"It wasn't pretty," Dutcher admitted, "but I didn't really expect it to be. I figured we would be looking ahead to Illinois and Purdue, and that probably is what happened. But we did play better as the game progressed, and our defense allowed them only 20 points in that second half. That's not bad against anybody."

Dutcher also felt that going through much of the non-conference part of the season with a lot of new faces was a major task, and he considered the 8-1 record an acceptable one considering the rebuilding that was taking place.

But now that's over, and as he stressed to his Golden Gophers... "Everybody in the Big Ten is starting even." Minnesota ranks as the defending champion, and they'll find out how good they are against Illinois and Purdue.

COPHER TALES---Randy Breuer, Minnesota's 7-3 center, led the Gophers against Montana State with 23 points and now has 1,370 as a U of M cager. That puts him fifth on the career scoring list at Minnesota behind fourth place Chuck Mencil who has 1,391.

Breuer also collected 10 rebounds against the Bobcats Monday, and he now has 551 as a Golden Gopher to hold down 10th place on the UM list. He trails Lou Hudson who has 575.

Dutcher talked about Minnesota's defense only giving up 20 points in the second half against Montana State, and he also pointed out that the Golden Gophers continued to force opponents into bad shooting nights. Against Marquette, Minnesota allowed a .370 night by the Warriors. At Jacksonville, it was .373 for the opposition. Indiana State managed only .440 from the floor, and Montana State registered a .380 night.

Part of the reason for those low figures may be the fact that Minnesota is continuing to block an amazing number of opponent shots...and those all count as misses. Against Montana State, for example, the Golden Gophers registered nine blocks...seven by Breuer. The Brew already has 33 blocks on the season.

Marc Wilson notched only four points against Montana State, and it was the first time in nine games that he had failed to get into double figures. But just as important to Minnesota's scheme was the fact that the freshman guard registered five assists. He leads the Gophers on the season with 30.

ICERS HOST COLORADO COLLEGE

Minneapolis, MN---After completing the non-conference portion of its 1982-83 schedule with eight consecutive wins over the holiday period, the Minnesota hockey Gophers return to league play this weekend hosting Colorado College Friday and Saturday at Williams Arena. Both games begin at 7:30 p.m. CST and will be carried locally by KKSS-AM 980 radio.

Minnesota, after winning its last nine outings, shows a record of 19-3-1 as it returns to WCHA action. The Gophers remained in first place among league teams with an 8-3-1 record good for 17 points. But hot on the Gopher heels are Minnesota-Duluth (8-4-0, 16 points) and North Dakota (7-5-0, 14 points). This weekend finds Minnesota-Duluth at Wisconsin, and North Dakota at Denver.

Minnesota swept two games in November out at Colorado College 12-3 and 9-4. However, according to head coach Brad Buetow, who last Sunday enjoyed his 100th career victory as boss of the Gopher ice program, this week's task will be much stiffer.

"Colorado College came on very strong over the holiday period and will certainly not be the same team we faced out there in November," the coach offers. "It's certain they are still smarting from that series and will come out flying.

"But it's always good to get back to WCHA competition. It was great to see our men come through with those non-conference victories, especially since we were playing with a patched up lineup.

"But we got a good look and also some answers on several of our varsity reserve players. On the whole I was pleased with the performances of Roger Bowe, Eric Lempe, Mike Vacanti and Steve Schoen. I wouldn't be surprised to see all of them make contributions the remainder of this season."

GOPHER LINEUP

Buetow said Monday he plans to play both center Rick Erdall and defenseman Tony Kellin against Colorado College even though they will not return from the World Junior Games until about midnight Wednesday. He added he expects to keep most of his varsity lineup intact.

Steve Griffith and Butsy Erickson will again flank center Scott Bjugstad on what has become Minnesota's top scoring line this season. Bjugstad leads the Gophers in scoring with 54 points (28-26) while Erickson is next at 45 points (17-28). Griffith is third in team assists with 21 to go with two goals.

Erdall is expected to center wings Jim Malwitz and Pat Micheletti. The latter played his first two games last weekend vs. Yale since November 13 when he went out with a knee injury.

A third line should see Jeff Larson, one of UM's hot scorers of late, centering Mike Anderson and Billy Yon, with Bowe and Mike Harrer flanking Wally Chapman. Wing Dave Preuss is expected to miss this series with a cut foot.

On defense Kurt Larson will pair with Tom Hirsch, and Dave Jensen with Steve Guentzel. The other pair is up for grabs. One of four candidates--Brian Zins, Tom Parenteau, Gino Peluso or Schoen--is expected to skate with Kellin.

Senior Paul Butters is scheduled to be in the Gopher nets Friday with rookie Frank Pietrangelo working Saturday's contest.

GOPHERS #1 IN POLL

The weekly College Hockey Statistics Bureau poll has voted Minnesota the top team in the nation this week. The Gophers lead Minnesota-Duluth by six points, 96-90. Also in the top ten from the WCHA are North Dakota eighth, and Wisconsin 10th. Minnesota-Duluth led the poll through most of 1982.

Coach Paul Stearns was pleased with the performance of sophomore Jeff Shea, junior Scott Swisher, junior diver Randy Lien and the progress the team made as a whole.

On January 14 and 15 the team will compete in the Nebraska Invitational.

O'Dell comes to Minnesota from Iowa State University where he has functioned as a member of the Cyclone's defensive staff for the past four years.

Prior to that, O'Dell was on the staff at the University of Oklahoma for four years as a defensive coach and recruiting coordinator. He also coached at Mississippi State in 1978 and at the high school level in Oklahoma from 1973 through 1977.

A native of Michigan, the 44-year old O'Dell grew up in Wichita Falls, TX, and attended Southeastern State College in Durant, OK. He received his B.S. Degree from that institution in 1971 and then went on to receive his M.S. degree from Oklahoma in 1973.

His coaching trail has seen O'Dell tutor football teams that have been Big Eight champions four times, in the Orange Bowl three times and the Fiesta Bowl once.

As a gridder at Southeastern, O'Dell was a three-year letterman and then a team captain in both his junior and senior seasons. He was named to Who's Who Among Students in American Colleges and Universities and is single.

With O'Dell's addition, Head Coach Joe Salem has brought his staff size to within one of being completed. Salem still must name a replacement for Charlie Baggett on the offensive staff, and that is expected to be done by next week.

GOPHER CAGERS HEAD FOR MICHIGAN

Just as coaches worry about their first road trip of every season, so worries Jim Dutcher about the first Big Ten Conference road trip of the year which this week sends his University of Minnesota cagers into Michigan.

The Golden Gophers are slated to invade Ann Arbor on Wednesday for a Big Ten TV Game of the Week assignment against the Wolverines at 8:05 p.m. (EST) before moving over to East Lansing to face Michigan State at 7:35 p.m. (EST) on Saturday. Michigan comes into Wednesday's encounter with an overall record of 9-3, but the Wolves are 0-2 in Big Ten play after falling 69-64 at Northwestern and 79-72 at Iowa last week.

The Spartans, meanwhile, will get ready for Minnesota by hosting Wisconsin on Wednesday, and they entered the week 8-4 and 1-1 following their split (winning at Iowa and losing at Northwestern) in the opening week of conference play. Defending champion Minnesota heads for Michigan with an overall season record of 10-1 and a 2-0 Big Ten mark after posting two encouraging triumphs at Williams Arena last week.

In the conference opener, the Golden Gophers drilled Illinois 75-49 and then nudged Purdue 54-48 to grab an early tie for the lead with Northwestern in the Big Ten standings.

"Defense continued to be the key for us in those two games," Dutcher pointed out. "We limited Illinois to 22 points in the first half and Purdue to 19. We held both opponents to under 50 points, and that took some key efforts on our part."

In addition to those low point totals, Minnesota's defense continued to cause shooting problems for its foes. Illinois, for example, hit only .407 from the field while Purdue hit .421.

Dutcher knows, however that those two wins came at home, and this week his surprising but youthful Golden Gophers must go on the road. "We had the best road record (7-2) in the Big Ten when we won the title a year ago," Dutcher recalled, "but we won with experience. It will be even tougher with all our new faces this year."

But Dutcher doesn't plan to change any of those faces this week which means 7-3 senior Randy Breuer will open at center with 6-7 Zebedee Howell and 6-10 Jim Petersen, both juniors, at the forwards. In the backcourt Dutcher will start 6-4 sophomore Tommy Davis and 6-1 freshman Marc Wilson.

Breuer continues to lead Minnesota in scoring and rebounding with 216 points (19.6 average) and 90 rebounds (8.2). He also leads the Gophers with 37 blocked shots. But defense remains the key to Minnesota's winning nine straight and statistics show the Gophers have 80 steals to 48 for their opponents and 70 blocked shots to 22 for their foes.

Dutcher hopes those trends continue at Michigan and Michigan State this week.

1ST PLACE ICERS TO DULUTH

Minneapolis, MN—Minnesota's hockey Gophers, first in both the WCHA standings and the national weekly poll, face a stiff challenge this weekend with two games at Minnesota-Duluth. The Gophers and Bulldogs face off at 8 p.m. CST Friday, and 7:30 p.m. Saturday.

Both games are to be aired on KKSS 980 AM radio, with Saturday's contest marking the first of six such nights when WFBT-TV, UHF Ch. 29, will telecast Gopher hockey games.

Minnesota-Duluth, who has vied with the Gophers for the top spots mentioned above all season long, last weekend dropped a pair at Wisconsin while the Gophers derailed Colorado College twice at home.

As a result the Bulldogs dropped from second to third place in the WCHA and now trail the league-leading Gophers by five points. Minnesota is 10-3-1 for 21 WCHA points while the Bulldogs are 8-6-0 for 16 points. North Dakota moved ahead of UM-D by winning twice at home against Denver. The defending WCHA and NCAA champions are now 9-5-0 for 18 WCHA points.

The Gophers destroyed an undermanned Colorado College six 13-5 last Friday as senior wing Steve Griffith, for the second time this year, equalled at UM record by recording five assists. His weekend totals of two goals and seven assists earned him co-WCHA Player of the Week honors.

The next night saw the Gophers take a 6-2 decision against the Tigers. The twin killings raised the UM season record to 21-3-1.

Team and WCHA scoring leaders Scott Bjugstad and Butsy Erickson each scored five points on the weekend while freshman wing Pat Micheletti, playing in his first WCHA series since being injured November 13, scored three goals.

Minnesota scored seven goals in the first period of Friday's game, and came back with four more in the first 20 minutes Saturday to easily outdistance the Tigers. For the weekend Minnesota outshot Colorado College 82-54.

BUEIOW ON THE GOPHERS

"To be truthful I'm quite surprised that Minnesota-Duluth dropped both games last weekend," Gopher coach Brad Buetow offered Monday. "But at the same time Madison, Wisconsin is not the easiest place to try and win on the road.

"I do know the Bulldogs will be mad as hornets this weekend, and that's all we need. It's bad enough that they always get sky high to play us. The added incentive certainly will not help our cause.

"But we have come this far and are not about to roll over just because we are going into a tough road contest. If that were the case we could throw it all in right now as eight of our last 12 WCHA games are on the road.

"We have already won one game at Duluth (the teams split in November with UM winning 4-2 and UM-D taking a 4-1 decision) and our men have already found they can win at other road sites. So for us to maintain our present position, we'll simply have to suck it up and do the job we know we can do.

"I'm awfully proud of the way our men have played this season. Every single player has been giving us all we ask. We are playing as a team and not, for the major part, as individuals.

"But I can say that the toughest times are ahead. Whenever you reach first place, every team you play comes at you playing its very best. Everyone wants to knock off the leader. How we handle those pressures will tell the whole story. It's in our own hands, and I believe our men are ready for the challenge."

FROM THE TRAINING ROOM

Minnesota has lost another starter for at least 2-4 weeks as sophomore wing Billy Yon went out of last Friday's game with a separated shoulder. Buetow has called Yon the best shorthanded player in the nation while killing penalties. Yon has also been on a good scoring pace lately.

It appears at this time that freshman Eric Lempe will take Yon's spot at right wing. Another, senior Mike Harrer, may also miss this week's games. Harrer suffered a mild concussion Saturday and his status is questionable.

GOPHER CAGERS TO HOST IOWA & NORTHWESTERN THIS WEEK

It's only the third week of the Big Ten Conference basketball season, but already the University of Minnesota is involved in one of those "crucial" situations with a pair of 8:05 p.m. assignments in Williams Arena Thursday and Saturday.

On Thursday Minnesota is slated to host the Iowa Hawkeyes before entertaining the Northwestern Wildcats on Saturday, and both games are expected to be difficult assignments for the host contingent.

Coach Jim Dutcher's defending Big Ten champions will go into that initial shootout against red-hot Iowa nursing a one-half game lead in the loop race over Indiana, Northwestern and the Hawkeyes.

The Golden Gophers currently stand at 3-1 in Big Ten play and 11-2 overall. Iowa comes into Thursday's confrontation 2-1 and 11-2 while Northwestern, which will play at Wisconsin Thursday before invading Minnesota Saturday, boasts an identical 2-1 and 11-2 log.

Minnesota gained its current standing by splitting honors in a pair of road games last week. First the Gophers fell 63-58 at Michigan on Thursday but then bounced back Saturday with a 69-67 triumph at Michigan State.

"We felt that we had our chances to win both of those games," Coach Dutcher said, "but we're satisfied to get out of there with a split. It's a goofy game. The shots that didn't go in at Michigan went in at Michigan State,
(MORE)

and that was the difference."

Against the Wolverines, Minnesota had a nine-point lead mid-way through the second half and, after relenquishing the lead to Michigan, had a chance to tie the game but lost the decision when a Gopher field goal attempt missed the mark with six seconds remaining.

Then at Michigan State sophomore guard Barry Wohler hit a similar try with just three seconds showing on the clock and the verdict went to the travel-weary Golden Gophers.

"In both situations we had hoped to get the ball inside to Randy Breuer," Dutcher explained, "but in both cases we were denied that opportunity and had to settle for a second option. We missed one and made one. We lost one and won one. That's the way it's going to be all season long in the Big Ten."

So now the Golden Gophers return to the friendly confines of Williams Arena for those two "crucial" contests with the Hawkeyes and the Wildcats, and Dutcher figures his club will be ready, mentally at least, to play.

"We're coming home on top of the pack," Dutcher explained, "and we'll be playing before a standing-room-only crowd at Williams Arena against our biggest rival Thursday night. The players who have been around for a while know what we are talking about, but our freshmen are in for a new kind of experience. But I'm sure that our veterans and newcomers will be prepared."

Biggest concern for Coach Dutcher may be the physical status of freshman guard Marc Wilson who suffered a strained hamstring muscle in his right leg at Michigan State and remains questionable.

Assuming that Wilson, who has been a starter since the early non-conference game at Drake and who is averaging 12.0 points per contest, is not available, Dutcher will start either Alonzo Skanes, a 6-2 freshman, or Wohler, a 6-2 sophomore.

GOPHER TALES---Minnesota and Iowa have met 132 times in basketball and the Golden Gophers will take a 73-59 lead into Thursday's game. A year ago Minnesota won 61-56 at Williams Arena and 57-55 in three overtimes at Iowa City.

The Hawkeyes and Indiana Hoosiers were picked as favorites to win the 1983 Big Ten championship, and Coach Lute Olson's charges have lived up to their advance billing in impressive fashion thus far. Many feel Iowa has the most talent of any team in the league with returning starters Steve Carfino, Mark Gannon, Bob Hansen, Michael Payne and Greg Stokes.

Looking ahead to the Northwestern game on Saturday, Minnesota and the Cats have played 104 times and the Gophers lead 62-42. A year ago the Minnesota Gophers won both meetings 61-53 and 77-66.

Randy Breuer, Minnesota's 7-3 All-America center candidate, had a good week in Michigan with 20 and 25 point efforts against Michigan and Michigan State respectively. He's now third on the UM all-time scoring list with 1,445 points behind Kevin McHale (1,704) and Mychal Thompson (1,992). Breuer, with 13 rebounds last week, now is ninth on the Gopher career rebounding list with 576.

Ken Buell, University of Minnesota ticket manager, reports that the Iowa game has been a sellout since late November but there still are tickets available for the Northwestern game on Saturday.

Coach Dutcher's 14-year career record now stands at 264-119 (.689). In eight seasons at Minnesota, he's 142-69 (.673). Dutcher is 7-7 against the Hawkeyes and 12-2 against Northwestern. In fact his Gophers haven't lost to the Cats since 1975....his first season in Gold Country!

A year ago this dynamic group of young athletes held a combined CBS television audience and an "in person" crowd of 22,000 in awe and appreciation as they dazzled viewers during the NBA All-Star game in New Jersey.

In its 11 years as an organized team, the Fargo-Moorhead Acro troupe has performed from coast to coast and this year again will do its stuff at the NBA All-Star game in Los Angeles in February and for the Kansas City Kings in March.

ICERS BACK ON ROAD AT DENVER

Minneapolis, MN--After seeing its WCHA lead shaved to one point while splitting last week's series at Minnesota-Duluth, the Minnesota hockey Gophers head back out on the road again this week for a league pair at the University of Denver Friday and Saturday.

Both games begin at 8:35 p.m. Twin Cities time and will be aired via KKSS 980 AM radio, with Saturday's game also carried on WFBT-TV, Ch. 29.

The Gophers were victims of a torrid Minnesota-Duluth attack and defense last Friday as the Bulldogs whipped Minnesota 9-3. In the words of Minnesota co-captain Butsy Erickson, "I guess we found out in a hurry we're not as good as we think we are. I believe Duluth woke us up and brought us back to reality."

Evidently Erickson and his teammates got the message as Minnesota came back to win 5-2 Saturday with four first period goals, two of them shorthanded.

Minnesota now stands 22-4-1 as the winningest team in the nation and still ranks #1 in the weekly national poll. But the Gopher WCHA record of 11-4-1 good for 23 points is only one point better than defending WCHA and NCAA champion North Dakota. The Sioux swept Colorado College at home last weekend and now own 22 league points on an 11-5-0 record.

Wisconsin moved into third ahead of Duluth with two wins at Denver. The Badgers are 9-5-1 for 19 points.

"I guess the best thing that happened is that our men bounced back from a devastating defeat the first night," head coach Brad Buetow said after Saturday's win. "I mean, Duluth turned us inside out Friday. They played a great, great hockey game that night.

"But I have to credit our men, too. They could have thrown it in, but didn't. We really got the jump on them Saturday and won with pure, hard work.

"But this could prove to be another costly series. The injury bug simply will not let go. On Friday (Butsy) Erickson suffered a badly bruised wrist and (Jeff) Larson a hip pointer. Both missed Saturday's game and could be questionable for this week at Denver. We'll have to wait and see.

"I was, however, pleased with the performance of two reserves, Sean Campion and Larry Housley, who drove up Saturday and filled in well. They did an outstanding job in a pressure situation.

"Goalie Frank Pietrangelo, who relieved when the score was 6-0 Friday, also played a great game for us Saturday. He made some swfully big saves to keep us in the lead.

"But more than anything else I'm concerned about the physical condition of our men. We are getting awfully banged up and it could catch up with us before too long.

"Denver has been having some problems, too, but I'm certain they will be ready for us. I just hope we have enough healthy bodies to take out there."

Senior center Scott Bjugstad picked up a goal in Saturday's win at Duluth to keep pace with Erickson in both the Gopher and WCHA scoring races. For the weekend, however, both men scored three points and continued one-two in both races. Bjugstad now has 62 points in 26 Gopher games, Erickson 53 points.

In the WCHA race, Bjugstad has 36 points (16-20) and Erickson 32 (13-19). Next in line is Wisconsin wing Pat Flatley at 27 points, one notch ahead of Minnesota's Steve Griffith who has 26 (3-23).

ICERS HOST BULLDOGS

Minneapolis, MN---The Minnesota-Duluth hockey Bulldogs pay their lone visit to Williams Arena this Friday and Saturday in a key WCHA series for both teams. The U. of Minnesota Gophers have already played four games at Duluth with each school winning twice.

Minnesota remained in first in the WCHA by splitting a pair at Denver. The Gophers won a wild shootout Friday 10-8, but dropped a 5-4 overtime decision Saturday to the fifth place Pioneers.

Duluth maintained pace with the Gophers by gaining a split at home against second place North Dakota last weekend. The Bulldogs, lead by the stingy goal tending of Bob Mason, shut out the Sioux 3-0 Friday before losing 3-2 Saturday. Duluth is in fourth place in the league standigs.

The other two challengers, North Dakota and third place Wisconsin, play twice in madison, WI., this weekend.

Minnesota's trip to Denver last week didn't exactly start out on the right foot. The Gophers left for the west early Thursday afternoon, but couldn't land at Denver as the Mile High City was fogged in. UM finally set down at Grand Junction and sat around for more than 6 hours. The idea then was to return the squad to the Twin Cites and try to make it into Denver Friday a.m.

But as the team began its return the Denver airport opened and the team finally reached its destination about midnight. It was a weary gang that faced Denver Friday night, but somehow the Gophers hung on to win 10-8. They were not as fortunate the next evening.

"We had the opportunity to open the gap over North Dakota an Wisconsin just a bit, but I guess it just wasn't to be," sighed Gopher head coach Brad Buetow. "They both lost a game over the weekend, too, so we missed a good chance to see some daylight in the league standings."

Right now the first place Gophers are only one point ahead of North Dakota, 25-24, in the WCHA, and but two ahead of third place Wisconsin. Minnesota-Duluth has 20 points for fourth place.

"I hope our players learned you can't take anyone lightly in the WCHA," Buetow continued. "But it's not that we didn't try. Our men skated awfully hard but just couldn't turn the corner. The chances were there but one thing or another happened and, well, you know the result.

"But maybe, just maybe, we are going to start getting healthy. It would be an excellent time for that to happen, too. When you reach the stretch drive you must have all guns ready and firing.

"We could see three injured players return to action against Duluth. It's possible that junior wing Tom Rothstein, who hasn't played since last October after knee surgery, plus junior center Jeff Larson and sophomore Billy Yon could be ready to play. Yon has been out two weeks with a slight shoulder separation while Larson missed last weekend with a hip pointer.

"I'm not certain about the physical conditioning of these men, but if they are ready we'll welcome them back gladly. We've been hit pretty hard by the injury bug and I think it's about our turn to get healthy all at once."

The line of Scott Bjugstad, Butsy Erickson and Steve Griffith, in that order, is now 1-2-3 in the WCHA scoring derby. Bjugstad still leads the WCHA with 39 points on a league-leading 16 goals to go with 23 assists. Erickson is 14-21 for 35 points, while Griffith moved into third place at 29 (2-24). His 24 assists are also the best in the WCHA.

Sophomore center Rick Erdall had his biggest series ever against Denver by scoring five goals, including his first collegiate hat trick Friday. Erdall is 7th in the WCHA with 26 points, and 4th for the Gophers with 38 points for all games.

Buetow said Sunday he was not certain about his goalie rotation this weekend against Minnesota-Duluth, but will probably split the games between senior Paul Butters and freshman Frank Pietrangelo just as he has all season.

"But I am certain about one point on goal tending," Buetow added. "We will be seeing one of the top goal tenders in the nation in Bob Mason. He is the only goalie in the WCHA to have played every single game for his team. He can be awesome at times. We have been lucky to beat him twice. That could be it for us this season, too."

MINNESOTA CAGERS HIT THE ROAD

Three straight road assignments....at Wisconsin Saturday, at Ohio State next Wednesday and then at Indiana a week from Saturday....are next in line for the University of Minnesota.

Those three contests signify the end of the first half of this year's Big Ten Conference chase, and the outcome of those challenging shootouts will tell a great deal about Minnesota's chances in 1983.

Coach Jim Dutcher's quintet will go into the Wisconsin battle at Madison on Saturday with an overall record of 12-3 and a Big Ten log of 4-2 after splitting honors at home last week.

The Golden Gophers fell to arch-rival Iowa 68-52 last Thursday in what has to be termed a sub-par performance but then bounced back to stop Northwestern 68-53 on Saturday.

"It's no good losing at home," Dutcher said, "and I told our squad after the Iowa game that a similar effort against Northwestern would get them another humiliating loss in front of their home crowd. Fortunately we played better on Saturday than we did on Thursday."

Against the Hawkeyes, Minnesota had its poorest shooting night of the season and finished with a .368 mark from the field. The Gophers weren't much better from the free throw line with a .417 average.

But against the Wildcats, Minnesota came to life with .632 and .760 efforts. "We were too tentative in the first half," Dutcher pointed out, "but in the second half we rebounded the way we should, especially on the defensive end. That got us some fast break baskets, and we were able to make a pretty good spurt."

Roland Brooks, 6-7 junior forward, got his first start of the season against Northwestern, and he responded with his best game as a Gopher. He finished with 14 points and five rebounds and was credited with getting the Gophers moving in the second half. "Roland gets from base line to base line in a hurry," Dutcher said.

Another major factor in the game....and perhaps the difference between the loss to Iowa and the win over Northwestern....was the return to Minnesota's lineup of Marc Wilson. The 6-1 freshman guard missed the Hawkeye contest with a pulled hamstring muscle, and his presence Saturday night when he was on the floor running Minnesota's offense was completely obvious. Wilson wound up with 10 points and four rebounds, but he also had five assists and in general controlled the tempo for the Gophers.

The Gophers are tied for second in the Big Ten just one-half game behind Indiana. They don't want to lose any ground in that 1:05 p.m. dual at Wisconsin on Saturday.

NORTHWEST OPEN AT THE FIELDHOUSE FRIDAY AND SATURDAY

The University of Minnesota track and field team will compete in the Northwest Open Friday and Saturday at the U of M Fieldhouse. The meet, featuring top area collegiate teams and individuals, will begin on Friday at 2:00 p.m. and on Saturday at 10:00 a.m.

Coach Roy Griak's team took part in The Athletes Congress of Minnesota all-comers meet last Saturday at the Fieldhouse and competed earlier this season in a meet at Iowa.

On Saturday, February 5 the team travels to Wisconsin for a triangular meet with the Badgers and the Chicago Track Club.

GOPHER CAGERS FACE CHALLENGING ROAD TRIP

This week's action in the Big Ten Conference marks the conclusion of the first half of the 1983 league season, and defending champion Minnesota finds itself in an extremely precarious situation.

Coach Jim Dutcher's Golden Gophers share first place in the conference standings with Indiana....both clubs have Big Ten marks of 5-2....but Minnesota now must hit the road for what could be its two toughest assignments of the current campaign.

On Wednesday the Gophers, 13-3 overall, must invade Columbus, Ohio, to take on the highly-talented Ohio State University Buckeyes. That host contingent is 12-5 on the year and 4-3 in league play deadlocked for third with Illinois, Iowa and Purdue.

Then on Saturday Minnesota faces the unenviable task of moving over to Bloomington, IND, to take on the Indiana University Hoosiers, a team that is 15-2 on the year and ranked number one in the nation for much of the 1983 season.

"We're in the same place we were a year ago when we won the title," Dutcher pointed out last weekend after his club nudged Wisconsin 63-58 at Wisconsin. "Our season record is the same and our Big Ten record is the same."

Now, however, the Golden Gophers must hit the road, and winning on the road can be a difficult task in the Big Ten. And when you are going against first division teams like Ohio State and Indiana, the job is all the more challenging.

"It will be a tough week for us," Dutcher said, "maybe the toughest back-to-back games on the road in the Big Ten. But I told our players that we were right where we wanted to be at this point in the season. Now it's up to us."

Thus far this season Minnesota has played six games on the road, and its record away from home is 4-2....2-1 against Big Ten opponents. It is 8-1 at Williams Arena, 3-1 in conference play.

Dutcher does not plan any lineup changes for either the Buckeyes or the Hoosiers, and that means that 7-3 senior All-America candidate Randy Breuer will open at center along with a pair of juniors....6-10 Jim Petersen and 6-7 Roland Brooks.... at the forwards.

Starting guards for the Gophers will be 6-2 Tommy Davis, a sophomore, and 6-1 Marc Wilson, a freshman. Barry Wohler, a 6-2 sophomore, also is ticketed for duty at guard while 6-7 senior Zebedee Howell is expected to see action at forward. John Shasky, a 6-11 freshman, also is available to spell Breuer at center.

Breuer was the top man for Minnesota last Saturday at Wisconsin where he scored 20 points and had 11 rebounds. Brooks added 14 points and Davis had 11 while Petersen garnered eight rebounds. Wilson led the Gophers in assists against the Badgers with five.

"Wohler came off the bench and sparked us in the second half," Dutcher analyzed. "And our ability to dominate the boards (Minnesota had a 32-17 edge in rebounds) enabled us to get some transition baskets that helped."

While the Gophers were getting by the Badgers in Madison, Ohio State was falling 66-64 at Northwestern and Indiana was losing 63-48 at Iowa....showing how tough it is to win on the road in the Big Ten.

Minnesota with that road win at Wisconsin neatly tucked away, however, hopes it can continue to register the exception in that department....just as it did a year ago when it was 7-2 away from home enroute to the Big Ten crown.

GOPHER TALES--Wednesday's game at Ohio State is ticketed for an 8:10 (EST) tip-off while the Saturday assignment at Indiana is set to start at 3:30 (EST). Both games will be aired over WCCO Radio. The Buckeye contest is a Big Ten TV Game of the week over Metro Communications seen locally on KXLI (41) and KMSP (9). Saturday's game is another Big Ten TV Game of the Week on TVS seen locally on WTCN (11).

Minnesota and Ohio State have met 87 times in basketball and the Buckeyes lead the series 50-37. A year ago those two teams split, OSU winning at Columbus 49-47 and Minnesota winning at Williams Arena 87-75. The Gophers and Hoosiers have played 106 times with Indiana leading 61-45. Last season Minnesota won 69-62 at Indiana but lost at home 58-55.

It appeared to be playoff hockey both nights as each team fired tons of rubber towards the goalies. But all three men mentioned were exceptional from start to finish. In the two games Minnesota fired 86 shots on goal while the Bulldogs placed 67 shots on Butters and Pietrangelo. Simply stated, it was a goalies' weekend.

By winning twice, Minnesota gained a single point on WCHA runner-up North Dakota. The Sioux tied and won at Wisconsin. Minnesota is now 14-5-1 for 29 points in the WCHA race while the Sioux are 13-6-1 for 27 points. The teams meet Feb. 11-12 in Grand Forks. Minnesota is 25-5-1 overall.

At the same time Minnesota widened its lead to five points over third place Wisconsin (11-7-2, 24 pts.). The Badgers are Minnesota's final regular season opponent Feb. 18-19 at home.

In their personal duel for Gopher scoring honors, Erickson, with four points on two goals and two assists, gained one point on his linemate Scott Bjugstad. Bjugstad now has 68 points for the Gophers on 33 goals and 35 assists. Erickson's totals read 22-38-60.

This duo reads the same way atop the WCHA scoring derby. Bjugstad now has 42 points (16-26) in league play to Erickson's 39 points (16-23). The third member of that potent line, Griffith, is also third in the WCHA race with 32 points (6-26). Griffith has 42 points in all games (8-34).

In goalie figures, Pietrangelo ran his season record to 12-1-1 and lowered his goals allowed average to 3.25. Butters is now 10-4-0 and has a 3.79 goals average for all games played.

GOPHER CAGERS GET REMATCH THURSDAY

It's re-match time in the Big Ten Conference as this week marks the start of the second half of the 1983 basketball season, and Minnesota finds itself playing host to the same two opponents it met on the road just a few days ago.

Thursday at 8:05 p.m. in the friendly confines of Williams Arena Coach Jim Dutcher's quintet will get another shot at front-running Indiana. Then Saturday in another 8:05 p.m. confrontation the Gophers play host to Ohio State.

Last week Minnesota posted a thrill-packed 89-80 double overtime victory over those same Buckeyes in Columbus but then on Saturday dropped a humiliating 76-51 nationally-televvised decision to the Hoosiers in Bloomington.

"We said when we started last week's road trip that we need a split," Dutcher analyzed, "and that's what we got. Now we are saying we need a split in our series with Indiana. If we don't get it, Minnesota and everybody else in the Big Ten will be playing for second place."

Can the Gophers, now tied for second in the conference with Illinois,

(MORE)

Purdue and Ohio State at 6-3, bounce back and gain that split with the league-leading 7-2 Hoosiers? Can Minnesota, 14-4 on the year, regroup just five days after that shelacking in Bloomington reverse the decision against a team that is 17-2?

"We told our players that we lost at Indiana because we made too many errors in too many different phases of the game," Dutcher said. "Our shot selection was atrocious, and we didn't get any second shots because our rebounding was bad. On the other end of the floor we gave up too many easy baskets because our defensive positioning was terrible."

Dutcher seemed even more disappointed with the mental aspect of Minnesota's loss. "When we got down," he explained, "we started hanging our heads instead of gutting it out. In a span of eight minutes we lost the lead and got outscored 22-2. It was like trying to use a band aid to fix an axe wound. We didn't have a chance."

So the question now remains: Do the Golden Gophers have a chance Thursday? "Maybe they are 25 points better than we are," Dutcher taunted his players after the loss. "There's no doubt about the fact that we got blown out. It's embarrassing. But now we have to put that to rest. Now we have to correct the mistakes that beat us. A split on the road might be acceptable, but we're coming home. A split in Williams Arena is not acceptable."

Despite the disappointment of that one-sided loss at Indiana, Dutcher does not plan any lineup changes for this week's second go-round with the Hoosiers and Buckeyes. "We went 6-3 in the first half of the conference season with these people," Dutcher pointed out, and losing one game on a three-game road swing does not make it panic time. We'll stick with them and hope they do no worse than 6-3 in the second half of the Big Ten race."

All of which means Minnesota will open with 7-3 senior Randy Breuer at center and 6-10 Jim Petersen and 6-7 Roland Brooks, both juniors, at the forwards. The guards will be 6-4 sophomore Tommy Davis and 6-1 freshman Marc Wilson.

GOPHER TALES---After three straight road assignments (at Wisconsin, at Ohio State and at Indiana), the Golden Gophers open a four-game home stand. Then, following the OSU duel Saturday, Minnesota will host Cincinnati in a non-conference game next Wednesday before returning to Big Ten play when entertaining Wisconsin a week from Saturday.

Minnesota's series record with Indiana now reads 45 wins for the Golden Gophers and 6-2 for the Hoosiers. Against Ohio State, the log shows the Buckeyes in command by a 50-38 margin. Coach Dutcher, now in his eighth year at Minnesota, is 6-9 against the Hoosiers and 8-7 against the Buckeyes.

UM-ND TIED, MEET FRI-SAT AT GRAND FORKS

Minneapolis, MN—By losing at Denver 5-4 last Saturday, the University of Minnesota hockey Gophers fell into a first place tie with North Dakota in the WCHA standings with two weeks remaining in regular season play.

While the Gophers were splitting at Denver (UM won 6-2 Friday), North Dakota took two from Colorado College at home. The Result? . . . both UM and ND sport 15-6-1 WCHA records for 31 points and a first place deadlock.

However, that deadlock could be broken this weekend as Minnesota travels to Grand Forks for a giant series Friday and Saturday. Both 7:30 p.m. CST games will be aired locally by KKSS-AM radio, with Saturday's contest telecast by WFBT-TV, Ch. 29.

Minnesota has owned first place in the WCHA since last November 26-27 when the Gophers moved ahead of Minnesota-Duluth by sweeping two games at Colorado College. But a loss here and a loss there gave defending champion North Dakota its chance and the Sioux have been the hottest team in the league recently.

BUTTERS OUT

The series at Denver proved costlier than just the loss of a game. During the second period Friday, Gopher senior goalie Paul Butters got caught in traffic behind his net and the result was he broke his left forearm meaning he is lost to UM for the remainder of the season.

Butters had been playing awfully well as of late and had a season record of 11 wins, 4 losses and no ties. He had a strong 3.72 goals allowed average.

"Losing (Paul) Butters means a lot more than just losing a goalie," head coach Brad Buetow said Sunday. "He was a team leader and I believe his loss affects every man on our team. But like other hurdles, it's another thing we, as a team, will have to overcome. I really feel for Paul because he battled his way back into the lineup this year after he suffered a subpar season last winter. He is an outstanding competitor and student. He has already been missed by all of us."

FROM BUETOW

"Well, I guess all you can say about this weekend is that if we expect to be champions we have to beat the best, and North Dakota certainly has been playing great hockey as of late," Buetow said Monday. "We split with them here in December winning 5-2 after losing a 5-4 decision, so there is nothing that says we can't beat them. It's just a helluva lot harder up there."

"However, to do that at this point we'll have to play at our absolute best. North Dakota simply doesn't lose many games at home. It should be a great, great series. But then, I guess that's what our league is all about."

BJUGSTAD-ERICKSON STILL 1-2

Senior center Scott Bjugstad and linemate, senior Butsy Erickson, still lead both their teammates and all WCHA scorers with just two weeks of the regular season remaining. Bjugstad picked up five assists in the series at Denver and now has 73 points in all games on 33 goals and 40 assists.

The latter figure matches Erickson's assist mark. Butsy has 24 goals for 64 points. A third member of that line, Steve Griffith, is next with 43 points (9-34), just two ahead of sophomore center Rick Erdall's 41-point total (16-25).

In league play Bjugstad has 47 WCHA points (16-31) while Erickson has the most goals in the league, 18, and is second at 43 points. Pat Flatley of Wisconsin moved into the third position with a 4-point weekend at 34 points, one ahead of Griffith and Paul Houck, also of Wisconsin.

Minneapolis, MN—After turning the U.S. college hockey world on its ear last weekend, the Minnesota hockey Gophers try and do it again this week hosting arch rival Wisconsin at Williams Friday night (7:35 p.m.) and Saturday afternoon (2:05 p.m.). Both games are already sold out, but will be carried live on KKSS-AM 980 radio. Saturday's contest is also on WFBI-TV Ch. 29.

Last week the Gophers scored an unheard of sweep of two games at Grand Forks, ND. Minnesota edged the Sioux 5-2 and 2-1 in a pair of tight, close checking games that literally belonged to the goal tenders.

By scoring the sweep, Minnesota clinched at least a tie for the 1982-83 WCHA regular season championship. To win the title outright, which would be Minnesota's second WCHA crown in three years, the Gophers would have to score at least a tie in one of the two games against Wisconsin.

Or, the Gophers could still lose twice to the Badgers, but back into the championship if North Dakota does not sweep its final two road games Friday and Saturday nights at Minnesota-Duluth.

So it's all there for the asking. The Gophers, a unanimous first place selection in the national collegiate hockey poll this week, are 17-6-1 good for 35 points and sole possession of first place in the WCHA.

North Dakota, tied with UM in first place going into last week's series, fell to second with 31 points on a 15-8-1 league record. But Wisconsin, which picked up four points in sweeping Denver 4-1 and 5-3 at home, is one point out of second at 30 on a 14-6-2 record.

So the Badgers, too, are hot to win this weekend in hopes of ending up second in the final standings. The top two WCHA clubs receive a first round bye when the league playoffs begin Feb. 25-26.

PIETRANGELO WCHA PLAYER OF THE WEEK

The weekend at Grand Forks actually belonged to the goal tenders. In particular, Minnesota freshman Frank Pietrangelo was singled out as WCHA Player of the Week for winning both contests. Pietrangelo ran his season record to 14 wins against 2 losses and 1 tie, and lowered his goals allowed average to 3.12.

But he wasn't alone. Both Darren Jensen (Friday) and Jon Casey (Saturday) turned in excellent performances, too, for ND. In fact, Casey made 44 saves in keeping the Sioux in the game to the finish.

"I don't believe anyone could say enough about the work turned in by all three goal tenders in that series," Gopher coach Brad Buetow said Sunday. "Each man deserved to be singled out, but we are awfully proud and glad that (Frank) Pietrangelo received the special recognition.

"He has certainly proved to us that a freshman can step into heavy pressure and not wilt. He keyed us the entire weekend and it seemed the better he played the better our skaters played on defense. In other words, it was team wins."

BUETOW ON THE WCHA RACE

"It appears at this time our team is peaking, and what a perfect time for it, too. But that doesn't mean a thing when you go up against Wisconsin. They, too, are really playing well and are not about to come into Williams Arena and lie down. They are battling to reach second place and will throw the sink at us.

"But if our men can play like they did last weekend, well, let's just say we are in for one helluva series.

"The series at Grand Forks was easily our best two games of the year. It had to be. North Dakota is playing at the peak of their form, too. That goalie, Jon Casey, was something else. I sure hope he goes with the U.S. Olympic Team next year. He and Frank put on as good a battle as I have seen, just as good at the night Frank defeated Minnesota-Duluth's Bob Mason 3-2 in overtime here.

"But you can't count on past wins. It was great to see our men take on the adversity of playing that well away from home. In terms of discipline and total concentration, they gave me all a coach could ask for. Now all we have to do is go out and do it all over again. The race isn't over as far as we are concerned. We do not want to share the championship with anyone.

"But the only way we can insure that is to go up against Wisconsin with everything we have."

Asked if he plans any lineup changes this weekend, Buetow replied, "We would like, if he is totally ready, to try and get freshman Corey Millen in the lineup. The only problem is who does he replace? Heck, every man played his tail off up at Grand Forks, so at this time I'm not certain which way we will go."

MINNESOTA RETURNS TO BIG TEN ACTION AGAINST WISCONSIN SATURDAY

After stepping out of the Big Ten Conference to play host to Cincinnati Wednesday, the University of Minnesota returns to league wars by entertaining Wisconsin in Williams Arena at 8:05 p.m. Saturday.

The Golden Gophers, now losers of three straight Big Ten assignments, brought an overall record of 16-6 and a conference standard of 6-5 into this week's action, and they are tied for third place in the loop standings with Illinois, Iowa and Purdue three games off the pace.

This past week...in fact the past two weeks...have been disastrous for Coach Jim Dutcher's contingent which dropped a pair to front-running Indiana and last Saturday a disappointing decision to second-place Ohio State.

"We wanted no worse than a split in last week's two home games," Dutcher admitted, "and we didn't get it. We played hard against Indiana on Thursday and gave it a good shot. Maybe that took too much out of us. But for whatever reason, we were not ready to play against Ohio State on Saturday, and we dug ourselves a hole that we could not get out of for the rest of the game."

Dutcher was referring to the fact that Minnesota spotted Ohio State a 10-point bulge in the first six minutes of play...and although the Gophers battled back to 40-36 at the half, that was as close as they could get as the Buckeyes won 74-69.

"Before we ever took the floor we were concerned about our being flat," Dutcher revealed. "We needed to get off to a good start, and we didn't do it. We battled back, but we could never get over the top. The game was decided in the early going."

Two nights earlier against Indiana, the Hoosiers wound up with a 63-59 verdict over the Golden Gophers but that decision was contested by the host contingent from start to finish.

One major point concerned Dutcher in both setbacks, however, and that was Minnesota's shooting...especially at the free throw line. Against Indiana, the Gophers were three-of-ten from the charity stripe and finished with a .418 field goal mark. Against the Buckeyes, Minnesota was 16-of-27 from the free throw line and shot only .433 from the field in the first half.

"We were zero-for-six from the free throw line against Indiana," Dutcher pointed out, "and we missed four straight late in the game when we trailed by three. Then against Ohio State we missed seven free throws in the first half and four more in the second half. It's difficult to explain why we miss those free throws, but when you are behind like we were against Ohio State early in the game, it makes it an impossible task to try getting back into things when you can't make free throws."

So what will the Gophers do now? "Maybe we needed a break from things," Dutcher analyzed, "and maybe the non-conference game with Cincinnati will be just what the doctor ordered. Maybe we can get ready for Wisconsin Saturday."

And where do those three straight losses put the Golden Gophers in terms of the Big Ten title chase and a post season tournament bid? "Indiana is in the driver's seat," Dutcher admitted, but hopefully the race is not over. We're still shooting for an NCAA tournament berth."

With seven Big Ten Conference games remaining on their schedule, the Golden Gophers must realize that they face a tough road ahead with four of those games....at Northwestern, at Iowa, at Purdue and at Illinois....on the road.

All of which makes Minnesota's three home games all the more important. And that importance starts Saturday against the Wisconsin Badgers.

GOPHER TALES--Wisconsin tunes up for its assignment against Minnesota in Williams Arena by playing host to Marquette Thursday night in a game which determines "bragging rights" in Wisconsin for 1983.

The Badgers, under first-year Coach Steve Yoder, came into this week's action with an overall record of 7-13 and a Big Ten mark of 2-9. They are in last place in the Big Ten standings.

Minnesota and Wisconsin have met 137 times on the hardwood and the Golden Gophers hold a commanding 74-63 lead in the series going into Saturday's shootout. Earlier this year in Madison, Minnesota posted a 63-58 triumph over Wisconsin.

Randy Breuer, Minnesota's 7-3 All-America center candidate, led the Gophers to that win with 20 points and 11 rebounds. On the season Breuer has 411 points (20.6 average) and 170 rebounds (8.5 per game). And during his career, Breuer now has 1,595 as a Gopher, and he ranks third behind Mychal Thompson (1,192) and Kevin McHale (1,704) on the all-time U of M scoring list. Breuer also has 643 career rebounds to stand ninth on the all-time Gopher list.

Coach Jim Dutcher, now in his eighth year at Minnesota, is 145-73 as a Gopher coach (.665). His 14-year career record is 267-123 (.685). Against Wisconsin Dutcher is 12-3 (.800).

Minnesota drew 17,323 fans for last Thursday's duel with Indiana and another 17,028 against Ohio State. Total Williams Arena attendance for 1982-83 stood at 175,577 for an average of 15,962 in 11 home appearances.

Dutcher made a lineup change last week, and no decision has been made regarding his starters for the Wisconsin shootout. Breuer will open at center and Tommy Davis (6-4 sophomore) will be joined by Marc Wilson (6-2 freshman) at guard. Minnesota's two starting forwards will come from Zebedee Howell (6-7 senior), Jim Petersen (6-10 junior) and Roland Brooks (6-7 junior).

Pahlett, the first freshman to play number one singles at Minnesota, enters the tournament as one of the favorites. Eriksson and Kolaric are close behind.

Last weekend at the Republic Airlines Minnesota Tennis Showcase at the Burnsville Racquet and Swim Club Eriksson claimed the number two singles title and the team finished fourth with nine points. Harvard won the tournament with 25, Texas had 23 and Arizona 13.

Kolaric won his first match then lost to a player from Texas in the finals. Pahlett lost his opening match to Texas' Jonnie Levine, the nation's 10th ranked player, and quickly disposed of Arizona's Paul Chamberlin, ranked 30th, 6-0, 6-4 in their consolation match.

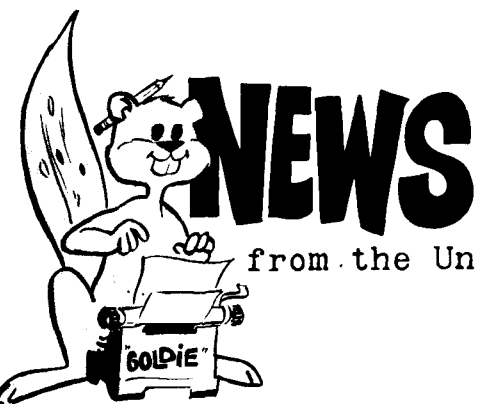
SWIMMERS BATTLE CLOCK AND BEMIDJI

MINNESOTA CAGERS GET TWO ROAD ASSIGNMENTS

Minnesota's Golden Gophers hit the road again this week hoping to clear two major hurdles... at Northwestern on Thursday and at Iowa on Sunday. The Thursday clash with the Wildcats is set for 7:30 p.m. in DePaul's Alumni Gym while Sunday's shootout with the Hawkeyes will tip off at 1:05 p.m. in the new Carver-Hawkeye Arena.

Coach Jim Dutcher's contingent comes into this week's Big Ten Conference basketball action with an overall record of 16-6 and a Big Ten log of 7-5. Northwestern is 14-9 and 5-8 while Iowa is 16-7 and 7-6.

Conference standings show that Minnesota currently holds fifth place one-half game behind third-place Illinois and Purdue. Iowa is sixth, one-half game behind the Gophers while Northwestern is seventh two games back of the Hawkeyes.

This past week Minnesota stepped out of circuit play to nip Cincinnati 49-46 in a game that saw the Gophers trail nearly every second of the game before pulling out the decision in the closing moments.

Then last Saturday Dutcher's quintet returned to Big Ten wars by downing stubborn Wisconsin 78-71. The Gophers trailed by as much as 13 points in the first half of that contest before outscoring the visiting Badgers 41-29 after intermission.

"We played much better in the second half of both of those game," Dutcher said. "We contiune to get off to a bad start and put ourselves in a situation where we have to play catch-up basketball the rest of the way."

But the Gophers were able to catch up in both cases last week and in the process play 20 minutes of outstanding basketball (in the second half) against both Cincinnati and Wisconsin.

"It was obvious that we played much harder, with much more intensity, in the second half against Wisconsin," Dutcher admitted. "If we can just figure out how to bottle that stuff and give it to our players at the beginning of the game we'll be much better off."

Cincinnati used a control, slow-down type of offense in hopes of upsetting the Gophers and those tactics nearly worked as it held 7-3 All-America center candidate Randy Breuer to just four points. Wisconsin tried out-shooting Minnesota and did so in the early going. But in the end, Breuer had 31 points (and 16 rebounds), and the host club won going away.

This week's assignments will be much tougher, and Coach Dutcher knows it. "We're going back on the road," he points out, "and both Northwestern and Iowa are playing well. It will be another difficult week for us."

The Golden Gophers know there are several keys in those games... rebounding and free throw shooting just to name a couple. But they also know that they have to get off to good starts in Chicago and Iowa City. They know they can't fall too behind against either the Wildcats or Hawkeyes.

Hopefully Dutcher has found a way to "bottle" that second half enthusiasm and is able to prime his Gophers with it before the opening tipoff in both road encounters this week.

GOPHER TALES—Earlier this season Minnesota nudged Northwestern 68-52 at Williams Arena as Breuer tossed in 19 points while forward Roland Brooks added 14, Guard Tommy Davis 12 and his backcourt running mate Marc Wilson 10. That verdict gave Minnesota a 63-42 edge in the series.

In the Iowa clash five weeks ago at Williams Arena the Hawkeyes prevailed 68-52 when Bob Hansen scored 19 from his guard position to pace the Hawks. Breuer and Davis led Minnesota with 16 each, but the Golden Gophers played that game without the services of Wilson who was sidelined with a pulled hamstring muscle. Despite that win by the Hawks, Minnesota still leads in the series 73-60.

An oddity in Minnesota's most-recent win over Wisconsin... Breuer fouled out! The last time Breuer fouled out of a game was February 13, 1982 at Purdue. In his four years at Minnesota, Breuer now has fouled out just three times... the first during his sophomore season against Iowa.

This week marks another one of those extra-long trips for the Gophers... their third of the season. They will have four treks before the year ends where they play either Wednesday and Saturday or, as is the case this week, Thursday and Sunday. No other team in the Big Ten had more than one such extra-long travel schedule.

GOPHERS WCHA CHAMPS. . .AGAIN!

Mirneapolis, MN—For the second time in three years, and the third time since 1975, Minnesota wears the championship crown of the Western Collegiate Hockey Association (WCHA).

The Gophers actually earned the title outright last Friday while losing a 7-3 home decision to Wisconsin. That same night second place North Dakota lost a 5-2 game at Minnesota-Duluth removing any chance of the Sioux catching the Gophers.

But Minnesota made certain the title belonged here by defeating Wisconsin 5-1 Saturday as junior goalie Mike Vacanti, making his first WCHA start, stunned the Badgers 5-1 with a spectacular performance. He turned away three breakaway attempts by Badger skaters.

The latter win gave Minnesota a final league record of 18-7-1 good for 37 points, four better than runner-up North Dakota with 33 points (16-9-1). Wisconsin, by losing Saturday, lost out on its bid to overtake North Dakota for second place. The Badgers finished third at 15-9-2 and 32 points.

Minnesota and North Dakota receive first round playoff byes this weekend, while sixth place Colorado College travels to Wisconsin, and fourth place Minnesota-Duluth hosts fifth place Denver for two-game, total-goal series.

For Minnesota the 1983 title is an accomplishment some believed was a sure thing. But as any sane hockey observer will tell you, there is no such thing as a sure thing in the WCHA. In fact, the annual pre-season coaches poll predicted North Dakota would repeat as champion.

But the entire race boiled down to a head to head meeting between UM and UND two weeks ago, a meeting which saw Minnesota break a tie with North Dakota by winning twice at Grand Forks, 5-2 and 2-1. The rest came last weekend.

Now Minnesota takes a week off for R&R with a 29-7-1 all-games record and a solid hold on first place in the weekly national college hockey poll. The Gophers will be home to probably Minnesota-Duluth or Denver in a second round playoff series Feb. 4-5. Tickets for playoff games are now on sale at Bierman Building.

BJUGSTAD WINS SCORE TITLE

Senior center Scott Bjugstad became the third Minnesota skater in the last four years to win the WCHA scoring championship. Bjugstad slammed home four goals and added one assist against Wisconsin running his WCHA totals to a league high 21 goals, 35 assists and 56 points. Tim Harrer won the scoring championship for UM in 1980 with Steve Ulseth taking the same honors in 1981.

Bjugstad's nearest competitor this season is linemate Butsy Erickson who ended with 47 WCHA points (20-27), while a third member of what may be the highest scoring line in the nation, winger Steve Griffith, finish fifth in the WCHA scoring derby with 38 points (9-29).

Erickson picked up two points last Friday, but sat out Saturday's game with a thigh bruise. However, he is expected to be a full speed the next time Minnesota takes the ice at Williams Arena.

VACANTI SURPRISES

Making his first appearance ever in a WCHA contest, Gopher goalie Mike Vacanti played exceptionally well in turning away the Wisconsin Badgers last Saturday. A transfer to UM two years ago from Colorado College, Vacanti sat out last season, and then had just three non-conference starts, all wins, this year.

He was pressed into recent duty replacing senior Paul Butters who went out of action with a broken arm suffered at Denver Feb. 4.

Vacanti has now won all four of his starts and sports an impressive 1.87 goals allowed average in 257 minutes (4.28 games) playing time. However, in all probability he will remain as the backup to freshman regular Frank Pietrangelo.

Asked if there is any significant difference between 1980-81, when that team won his first WCHA crown, and this year, head coach Brad Buetow replied, "I believe this team faced more adversity in terms of injuries, and because of that possibly proved it was deeper in raw talent.

"We called up an awful lot of young men to step into the lineup when several regulars were forced out with injuries. And I cannot think of a single individual who let us down. That's a pressure situation for a player who has not had the chance to ease into playing in the toughest hockey league in the country.

"So depth, quality depth, may in the long run have been our salvation. Also, in '80-'81 we were picked to win the league championship. This year the coaches' poll picked North Dakota to repeat.

"Another point of difference is seen in that this year's Minnesota squad is younger overall than our 1980-81 team. But all in all it came down to the same thing. We were fortunate to win for our school."

Asked about key games, series or other factors during the season, Buetow said, "Naturally everyone remembers the series we won up at North Dakota.

"But I believe equally as important was the series two weeks earlier we took at home from Minnesota-Duluth. We were coming off a tough overtime loss at Denver the week before, and the series against UM-D was every bit as close, if not closer, than the one at North Dakota. We won 4-3, and 3-2 in overtime. So I would have to say both those weekends carry equal importance."

Buetow declined to single out individuals for special mention, except to congratulate Scott Bjugstad for winning the scoring championship.

"I would like to add that possibly the most positive point I can make about this team is the way they came together this season," the coach continued. "This is a very, very close team emotionally. Probably a closer knit team than any I have coached. That is something you always strive for, but do not come up with every time out.

"We all preach the mental aspect of the game, but sometimes the message falls on deaf ears. This group, I believe a lot because of its youth, got it together early and stayed that way. In one respect I believe this is the main reason we did not suffer any prolonged slump during the season. In fact, we only lost two games in a row once this year. In this league that's a major accomplishment."

Another question put to Buetow had to do with his present goalie situation. "Mike Vacanti played awfully well against Wisconsin Saturday," the coach offered. "But we were not all that surprised.

"We've had confidence in him right along. It's just too bad it took the injury to (Paul) Butters to give Mike his chance. But at the same time Frank Pietrangelo has played awfully well down the stretch. So at this time we will stay with the experienced goalie, but also not hesitate to play Vacanti should the occasion arise. In other words, it's a game by game thing."

Buetow also said having this weekend off is the best thing possible for two of his forwards, Erickson and freshman Corey Millen. Erickson's thigh bruise is expected to mend quickly with the extra time off.

Millen saw his first action last Saturday since undergoing knee surgery last November. He had missed 24 straight games after sparking the Gophers in early season play with a hot scoring hand. Millen should be able to bring his conditioning and endurance up to par with two weeks of hard skating.

WRESTLERS AT THE BIG TEN CHAMPIONSHIP MEET

Second the last two seasons, the University of Minnesota wrestling team will compete in the 69th Big Ten Championship Meet Friday, Saturday and Sunday at the University of Iowa's Carver-Hawkeye Sports Arena.

Wally Johnson's team, which defeated Ohio State 20-17 last Saturday at Williams Arena to finish with a 9-8 overall record and 4-2 Big Ten mark, is again expected to lead the challengers as favorite Iowa seeks its 110th consecutive Big Ten team title.

The Golden Gophers will likely fare better in the team competition than they have during the dual season based on the individual strength of team leaders Mike Foy and Jim Trudeau.

Other top Gophers are Ed Giese, 118-pound sophomore from Wood Dale, Illinois (29-7 overall and 5-1 in the Big Ten), Darrell Gholar, 158-pound junior from Chicago, Illinois (22-8-2 and 3-1-2), Steve Martinez, 150-pound senior from Osseo (21-9 and 4-1) and Al Jensen, junior heavyweight from Foley (17-8 and 4-2).

The top four place winners in each weight class in the Big Ten meet will advance to the NCAA meet March 10-12 in Oklahoma City.

GOPHER CAGERS HOST TWO BIG TEN FOES THIS WEEK

Two Big Ten Conference basketball shootouts at Williams Arena are this week's crucial assignments for Coach Jim Dutcher and his University of Minnesota Golden Gophers.

Thursday Minnesota will entertain Michigan State University in an 8:05 p.m. confrontation before playing host to the University of Michigan in a 2:05 p.m. Big Ten TV Game of the Week extravaganza on Saturday.

Coach Dutcher's quintet split conference honors this past week, and as disheartened as the 83-66 loss at Northwestern was, last Thursday, the 71-69 win at Iowa before a national television audience more than made up for it.

As a result of that split, Minnesota comes into this week's action with an overall record of 17-7. The Golden Gophers are 8-6 in the Big Ten standings, currently tied with Illinois for fourth place.

Indiana and Ohio State still lead the pack at 10-5 just 1½ games ahead of the Gophers, and Purdue is third at 9-5. But, according to Coach Dutcher, "The title is still up for grabs, and any one of six teams, including Minnesota, can still win it."

Nobody from Minnesota was thinking title last Thursday night when the Gophers fell at Northwestern. "It was a below par effort on our part," Dutcher admitted. "We did not handle the Northwestern press well, and we did not play well defensively. We

simply did not get good guard play, and that was the difference.

On Sunday at Iowa, however, it was a different story entirely as guards Wilson and Tommy Davis more than did their share. Wilson, turning in what Dutcher called "his best game as a Golden Gopher," finished with 10 points, five rebounds and six assists while taking total control of the Minnesota offense. Davis had nine points and 12 rebounds, and it was his three-pointer with five seconds that provided the margin of victory.

Randy Breuer, Minnesota's 7-3 senior center and All-America candidate who now looms as a solid bet to reap the Big Ten's 1983 Most Valuable Player award, was superb in the win over Iowa.....just as he was in the loss at Northwestern.

He had 22 points and eight rebounds before fouling out against the Wildcats last Thursday and then treated national TV viewers, as well as that sellout crowd in Iowa City, to an aggressive display of 24 points, 13 rebounds, five assists and four blocked shots.

Minnesota's forwards, who have been up-and-down much of the season, also drew a tip-of-the-hat from Dutcher after the Iowa verdict for their efforts. "We hadn't been aggressive lately," Dutcher said, "but against Iowa we controlled the boards and got some blocked shots for a change."

Roland Brooks finished with 14 points, six boards and a blocked shot while Jim Petersen had eight points, three rebounds and two blocks. Zebedee Howell and John Shasky relieved those starters in capable fashion to make it something Wilson told reporters was "A team victory."

That surprising win at Iowa City, a place where Minnesota has won three straight, was no sooner over, however, than Dutcher warned, "We can't cherish this one too long. We've got to get our players thinking about Michigan State in a hurry!"

The Golden Gophers have four games left in this year's race.....two at home this week and then at Purdue and Illinois the following week.....as they strive to make it a successful defense of their Big Ten championship.

Minnesota fans would love to see that happen, but they remember that six seniors departed from the squad which won the crown a year ago. They remember that Dutcher started out this rebuilding year with only one returning starter. Those people figure Dutcher already has won "Coach-of-the-Year" honors for Minnesota's accomplishments already.

But the Gophers vow that they are not done yet. Sure, they are shooting for the championship....just like five other teams that remain in the title race. In addition, Minnesota is battling for an NCAA post-season tournament berth.

They hope the friendly confines of Williams Arena will help them take two more giant steps in that direction this week.

Elsewhere in the Big Ten this week Michigan is at Wisconsin on Wednesday while Thursday's slate shows Purdue at Indiana and Illinois at Ohio State in two big showdown confrontations. Saturday Illinois is at Indiana and Purdue is at Ohio State. Those games will tell a great deal about who will remain in title contention.

ICERS HOST UM-D IN PLAYOFFS

Minneapolis, MN---As any coach will tell you, a brand new season begins this weekend at Williams Arena when the Minnesota hockey Gophers enter the 1983 Western Collegiate Hockey Association (WCHA) playoffs.

Minnesota, off last weekend due to winning the regular season WCHA championship and gaining a first round bye, hosts Minnesota-Duluth at 7:30 p.m. Friday and Saturday in a two-game, total-goal series.

The Bulldogs, fourth place WCHA finisher, come to town fresh off a 13-4, two-game series win against Denver at home last weekend. Minnesota-Duluth scored convincing 7-2 and 6-2 wins against the Pioneers to keep its hopes alive.

Naturally being from the same league, this weekend is not the first time these schools have met this season. In fact, Minnesota and UM-D have played six league games with the Gophers coming out on top 4-2 to win in-state bragging rights for the regular season and possession of the Taconite Trophy, the award given to the victorious school each year.

Back in November, the Gophers and Bulldogs split a series in Duluth with UM winning the first game 4-2, and UM-D taking the next match 4-1.

Minnesota again traveled to the Port City in January where it suffered its most lopsided loss of this campaign as the Bulldogs poured it on 9-3. But the Gophers regrouped and came back to win 5-2 the next night.

The final series, held here in Williams Arena the last week in January, provided UM with a springboard in its stretch drive to capture the regular season league championship. The Gophers won by the narrowest of margins, 4-3 the first night, and 3-2 in overtime the second time around.

So the difference between these schools this season really amounts to an overtime goal by Gopher wing Steve Griffith in their most recent meeting. One can easily see how the series could be even at 3-3, or just as easily see how UM-D could have come out on top.

But then, down through the years some of the best hockey played in the WCHA results when these schools faceoff. This playoff series should offer nothing new.

BUETOW ON THE PLAYOFFS

"I am not at all surprised that we will be meeting Minnesota-Duluth this weekend," Gopher head coach Brad Buetow said Monday. "I believe that by seeing them six times this year I should qualify as some kind of an expert on what type of team they have.

"To begin with they are very sound. They rely heavily on a defensive style, and probably have the most consistent goal tender in the WCHA in Bob Mason. When he is right, and he always seems to play his best against us, Duluth is awfully tough to beat. If we expect to go on any further this season, we'll have to play our very best this weekend."

Asked if the week off from competition is a plus or minus for his team, Buetow answered, "Only time will tell. I do know we used the time to help mend some injuries. As of right now I predict we should be as healthy as any time this season when we face Duluth.

"Eutsy Erickson is still on the mend from his thigh injury, but he, too, should be fully recovered by this weekend. At least I hope he is.

"We should also see freshman Corey Miller back in full stride. He played the final regular season game against Wisconsin and that helped him a lot. Then last week and all this week his concentration is in returning to prime physical condition, getting his legs and wind capacity back on par.

"As of right now we expect to skate Miller at center and move another freshman, Pat Micheletti, to right wing. We are short at the latter position as sophomore Dave Preuss must sit out both games because of major penalties.

"As far as goal tending is concerned, we'll go with experience. Frank Pietrangelo will be in the nets Friday, and then we'll see about Saturday. In the playoffs everything is a game by game situation."

Asked about the other second round series, Wisconsin at North Dakota, Buetow said, "I have enough to worry about right here. That series will take care of itself. My only concern right now is Minnesota-Duluth. That's enough!"

Minnesota earned its way into the WCHA title games by defeating Minnesota-Duluth 11-6 in a two-game, total-goal series on home ice last weekend. The Gophers, using a 5-goal outburst in the third period, won Friday 8-2 only to see the Bulldogs bounce back to take a 4-3 decision Saturday. Thus, the 11-6 final total in goals scored for both games.

Wisconsin did it the hard way. The Badgers, playing at Grand Forks, ND, had to go into the ninth period before pulling out their win. The teams tied 1-1 in the first game Friday, and were still tied 5-5 (6-6 for the series) at the end of regulation time Saturday. It then took until the third overtime period before Wisconsin tallied on a shorthanded goal to win the game, 6-5, and the series, 7-6.

Never considered strangers to each other, Minnesota and Wisconsin have long waged title battles against one another. As stated, they have already met six times during regular season play, a season which saw Minnesota capture the 1982-83 WCHA championship while the Badgers finished third, one point behind runner-up North Dakota.

In the head to head meetings, Minnesota came out on top by the slim margin of 3-2-1. The schools opened the WCHA season against each other here in the Twin Cities playing to a 4-4 overtime tie the first game, and Minnesota squeezing out a 9-8 overtime win the next night.

Two weeks later in Madison, the Badgers took the first encounter 4-3, but UM bounced back to gain a split with a 5-1 decision.

(OVER)

The final series was again in Williams Arena with Minnesota needing at least a tie in one of the two games to win the WCHA crown outright. But Wisconsin bust loose with five third period goals to take a 7-3 win the first game. So, as has been the trend, Minnesota came right back to win 5-1 the next afternoon.

And so the scene is set. The Gophers own an overall record of 30-8-1 while Wisconsin brings in a mark of 27-10-4 for all games played. But, as is usually stated, past records mean little, if anything, when it comes to hockey playoffs.

ERICKSON LED GOPHERS

Senior right wing and co-captain Butsy Erickson was the big gun for Minnesota against the Duluth Bulldogs. Erickson, second in scoring only to his line center, senior alternate captain Scott Bjugstad in both team scoring and in the WCHA, can't score five goals and two assists to lead his teammates.

On Friday Butsy put the Gophers ahead to stay with his 27th goal of the year late in the second period, and then scored two more in the final period as UM broke a tight game into a comfortable walk with three goals in the first 2:26. Billy Yon canned the first third period marker at 0:05 and Corey Millen followed Erickson's score with one of his own.

Erickson then hit another marker giving him a second hat trick on the season and Yon added his second, a shorthanded goal, to complete the 8-2 victory. Minnesota outshot the Bulldogs 54-26 Friday.

Credit must be given to an excellent Bulldog effort Saturday. Facing a 6-goal deficit in the total-goal series, UM-D could have folded up. But the Bulldogs stormed back to win a 4-3 decision even though Erickson scored his 30th and 31st goals of the season. Bjugstad, with one marker Friday, has 39 for the year.

Rookie netminder Frank Pietrangelo was in goal both nights for Minnesota and handled himself with class. He made 24 saves Friday and 26 more Saturday. It is expected he will play both games this weekend.

FOR THE WINNER

The winner of this week's series at Williams Arena gains automatic entry into the first round of the NCAA championship series. The same goes for the CCHA and ECA playoff winners.

Then the NCAA selection committee selects five at-large teams, two in the west and three in the east, and seeds four in each geographical division.

GOPHER CAGERS CLOSE BIG TEN SEASON ON THE ROAD

Still nursing hopes for a high finish in the Big Ten Conference and an NCAA post season tournament bid, Minnesota's Golden Gophers take to the road this week for their final two assignments of the 1982-83 basketball season.

Minnesota will invade Purdue University to duel the Boilermakers at 7:30 p.m. (EST) on Thursday and then move over to the University of Illinois to take on the Fighting Illini Sunday at 1 p.m. (CST).

The Golden Gophers will go into Thursday's clash against the Boilermakers with an overall record of 18-8 and a Big Ten mark of 9-7 deadlocked for third place with those same Boilers as well as Illinois and Iowa.

A year ago Minnesota won its first game at Purdue in nine years, and Illinois is always a difficult place for visiting teams to play....all of which means it will be a tough road trip for the Golden Gophers.

But as tough as it seems, it could be just what the doctor ordered. "We're right where we want to be," Coach Jim Dutcher of Minnesota proclaimed. "We're going to play the two teams we have to move ahead of to get an NCAA bid. If we beat them, we're in the tournament. If we can't beat them....."

Dutcher's contingent gained its current deadlock for third when splitting honors at home a week ago. First the Golden Gophers dropped a 79-67 decision to Michigan State but then came back to whip Michigan 88-75 in the home finale last Saturday.

"Against Michigan State we played a little inconsistently," Dutcher admitted. "We played well in some areas, but we did not rebound as well as we should have, and we did not play as well defensively as we had earlier. We could not contain the Michigan State guards, and when that happened late in the second half, we lost ground."

In Saturday's final assignment in Williams Arena it was a different story as the host club got the job done in all departments as another well-balanced, team effort made the difference.

Minnesota's starting forwards, Zebedee Howell and Roland Brooks, collected 13 and 14 points respectively. The Golden Gopher guards were at their best as Tommy Davis tossed in 22 points while Marc Wilson had nine and added six assists.

But the BIG standout was Randy Breuer, Minnesota's 7-3 All-America candidate who concluded four years of Williams Arena heroics with 17 points, 10 rebounds and nine blocked shots. His efforts earned him several minutes of standing-ovation thanks from Minnesota's faithful.

That was last week, however, and now the Golden Gophers pack their bags for a gruelling five-day road trip that will decide the post-season fate of Minnesota's cagers for 1983.

Indiana leads the Big Ten at 12-5 and appears set for a Big Ten bid. Some feel second-place Ohio State (11-6) also is assured a spot. Beyond that, it is anyone's guess. "Last year three teams tied for second, and all three got into the tournament," Dutcher said. "In other years, teams have tied for third and none of them got in. But we feel our fate is in our own hands. We'll just do our best to win both games this week and hope for the best."

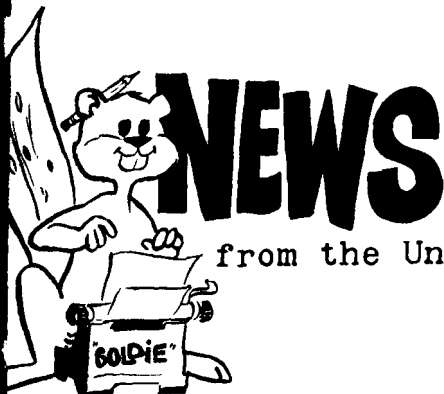
Standout performances were recorded by Gerry Rupp, junior from Hastings, and Bob Barrett, sophomore from Arlington Heights, Illinois.

Minnesota took the first round over Minnesota-Duluth by scores of 8-2 and 3-4 for an 11-6 series total. However, Minnesota had to depend on a 5-goal outburst in the third period of the first game of the series for its margin.

That, coupled with Wisconsin's wins totaling an 8-3 margin, means the Gophers have dropped three of their last four outings.

But it's not that Minnesota has not been playing well. It's more a combination of not being able to put the puck in the net when the chances come, its opponents playing super hockey, and, let's face it, the last two goal tenders UM has come up against rank with the very best in the nation. . .Minnesota-Duluth's Bob Mason and Wisconsin's Marc Behrend.

So maybe, just maybe, Minnesota should be awfully happy to be where it is at this time. But there is always another opponent right around the corner waiting to knock off the champs.

New Hampshire brings in a season record of 22-9-2. The Wildcats finished third in the ECAC playoffs held last weekend in Boston winning the third place game against St. Lawrence U. to ensure themselves a spot in the quarter-finals.

New Hampshire and Minnesota have only met once before in hockey. The game came in the first round of the NCAA championships at Detroit, MI, in 1979. Minnesota came out on top 4-3, the same score the Gophers defeated North Dakota by to win the 1979 NCAA title two nights later.

ERDALL OUT

Gopher sophomore center Rick Erdall from Minneapolis Washburn last weekend became the fifth Gopher player this season to be sidelined by a knee injury.

In the second period in Sunday's game against Wisconsin, Erdall and a Badger player both slid into the enemy net with Erdall slamming his knee against the right goal post.

The result. . . a partially torn ligament which will sideline Erdall for this week's series at home against New Hampshire, and any more game the Gophers would play if they are victorious this weekend.

"Rick Erdall has been one of our most consistent performers this season, especially on the power play," says Gopher head coach Brad Buetow. "To say he will be missed is an understatement.

"I particularly feel sorry for Rick as he is such a hard working player. Nobody tries harder. Maybe some day someone can tell me how those who give every ounce of effort they own are so often struck down with injuries."

Erdall, in 35 games this season, scored 17 goals and 29 assists for 46 points, fourth best on the Gopher varsity. He has also cashed in on 11 power play goals echoing his coach's statement on how much Erdall will be missed.

As of Monday Buetow said he was not certain who would take Erdall's place in the Gopher lineup. However, he did say that both junior Jeff Larson and freshman Pat Micheletti would be given solid looks.

As to goal tending, Buetow again said he is not certain as to who will start between junior Mike Vacanti or freshman Frank Pietrangelo. Pietrangelo injured a shoulder in the pre-game warmup last Saturday and only played the first period giving up three goals. Vacanti relieved for the last two periods Saturday, and played the entire game Sunday.

MINNESOTA CAGERS IN NIT

For the third time in four years, the University of Minnesota has been selected as one of 32 collegiate basketball teams to compete for championship honors in the National Invitation Tournament.

Coach Jim Dutcher's Golden Gophers are scheduled to tip things off in the 1983 NIT by playing DePaul University at the Rosemount Horizon Arena in suburban Chicago on Wednesday at 8:05 p.m.

Minnesota ended regular season play at 18-10 overall and 9-9 in the Big Ten Conference tied for sixth place with Michigan State when dropping two tough road decisions during the final week of the 1982-83 campaign.

Last Thursday the Golden Gophers fell 68-62 at Purdue and then Sunday lost a heartbreaking 70-67 double overtime decision at Illinois. Minnesota went into those games knowing they had to win to gain an NCAA post season tournament berth, but they missed by an eyelash in both assignments.

"Nobody can fault our effort at Illinois," Dutcher maintained. "We deserved to win that one. We deserved a better fate. I wasn't happy with the way we played at Purdue, but I was proud of the way we battled on Sunday."

Dutcher had a right to be proud of his cagers who, in the face of adversity and in a game where Murphy's Law prevailed, they battled back from a seven-point halftime deficit only to fall in the second extra session on a final-second shot from well outside the three-point range.

"We had our chances to win that one," Dutcher admitted, "but in both overtimes bad judgement on our part let the game get away from us. We had leads and possession but took shots we shouldn't have."

Despite that disappointment Dutcher had good things to say about many of his Golden Gophers, but special accolades went to Randy Breuer, Minnesota's 7-3 senior center, who finished the season as the Big Ten's leading scorer.

Breuer had 16 points at Purdue and 24 at Illinois to wind up the season with 567 points...373 in loop play. He also wound up as Minnesota's top rebounder (248) and leading shot blocker (83).

"Breuer has had an excellent season and an excellent career at the University of Minnesota," Dutcher said. "He's certainly been a valuable part of our program for the past four years.

Those four years aren't over yet, however, as Minnesota now heads for Chicago and a shot at the DePaul Blue Demons, 17-11 on the year and a perennial national basketball power.

"It's a tough first-round assignment," Dutcher admitted. "DePaul is the most recognizable name in the field, and I can't visualize a first-round game being any tougher for us than having to play DePaul on its home floor at the Horizon."

Possible dates for second and/or third round games...either at Minnesota or on the road...tentatively are scheduled for March 20 or 21 and March 24 or 25 respectively. Eventually the "Final Four" of the NIT field will advance to New York City for the semi-finals and finals in Madison Square Garden March 28 and 30.

GOLDEN GOPHER CAGERS RECEIVE HONORS

Randy Breuer, Minnesota's outstanding 7-3 senior center who this year became the second leading scorer in U of M history, has been named the Golden Gophers' Most Valuable Player for 1982-83.

That coveted award was presented to Breuer at the University of Minnesota's Honors Banquet Monday night when Coach Jim Dutcher also announced several other 1982-83 honors winners.

Named Minnesota's Most Improved player of the year was Tommy Davis, sophomore guard. Davis also won the Free Throw Champion award for having the highest free throw shooting percentage (.794) of the year while Breuer was the Rebound Champion after leading the Golden Gophers with 248 boards.

Breuer also earned the Take Charge Award, an honor bestowed upon a Golden Gopher who draws the most opponent charging fouls during the season. Minnesota's final award, the "Mr. Hustle Award" went to senior guard Kelly Scott.

Breuer finished regular season play with 567 points for an average of 20.3 points per game. He was the top scorer in the Big Ten Conference with 373 points, an average of 20.7 per assignment.

DIAMOND TEAM TO TEXAS

Minneapolis, MN---The University of Minnesota baseball Gophers head for Texas Saturday where the defending Big Ten champions are scheduled to play 12 games in 7 days beginning with a double header Sunday against Texas Lutheran at Sequin, TX.

Second-year team boss John Anderson, who was named NCAA Division IV Coach of the Year last season, has an experienced squad with which to open the 1983 campaign. However, several newcomers may gain the most attention in Texas to see if they can fit in and help the Gophers right away.

"All our winter indoor goals have been accomplished," Anderson said Sunday. "Now we are ready to play against somebody else rather than among ourselves. How our new people do should tell us the story of who we can expect to contribute to our Big Ten efforts this season.

"Overall we are relatively healthy. A few people are slowed, including freshman pitcher Mark Kleinschmidt (St. Paul Hill-Murray). He will not make the trip due to some elbow problems with his pitching arm.

"Also, sophomore center fielder Pat Pohl (Hastings) is not at full strength being bothered by some nagging illness. But he will make the trip and probably start our first game. We'll just have to see how he feels.

"Another sophomore, left fielder Jack Schlichting (Brooklyn Center), has been slowed a bit by a sore ankle, the same one he had surgery on last fall.

"But aside from those guys, we are physically fit and ready to go. I just hope all the work we did last fall and winter pays off. It's tough playing these Texas teams who already have played as much as 30 games by the time we face them. But at the same time that's how we gain experience.

"For starters we face Texas Lutheran in two games Sunday. Would you believe they just knocked off the University of Texas last weekend. Texas is ranked number one in the nation.

"We'll also play one 9-inning game at the U. of Houston, four games against Texas A&M, and close with five games against Sam Houston State. We are hoping for the best, but don't be surprised if we lose a few by big scores. Heck, we haven't even been outside yet, and these teams are always outside."

Anderson said he will probably use four pitchers the first day against Texas Lutheran. Included are junior Bill Thompson (Bloomington Jefferson), plus sophomores Doug Kampsen (Roseville Kellogg), Gregg Mau (Stillwater), and Jay Olson (Coon Rapids).

On Monday at Houston junior Jim Francour (Marinette, WI) and sophomore Bill Cutshall (Rochester Mayo) will split the single game, with senior co-captain Bob Meyer (Richfield Holy Angels) and freshman Bryan Hickerson (Bemidji) going against Texas A&M Tuesday. From that point on the rotation will be juggled daily.

Junior footballer Paul Blanchard (Wayzata) and junior Mark Weber (LeSueur) are scheduled to split the catching duties on this trip in hopes that one or the other will come to the front.

Senior shortstop Bill Piwnica (Minnetonka) plus junior third baseman and co-captain Terry Steinback (New Ulm) are expected to anchor the Gopher infield this spring. Both are proven vets and all-conference pics last year. Kampsen and sophomore Dan VanDehey (Crystal Robbinsdale) will platoon at second base with sophomore Bryan Bowlin (St. Paul Cretin) and transfer Alex Bauer (Robbinsdale) doing the same at first base.

If Pohl is ready he will open in center field, the same for Schlichting in left field. Sophomores Bill Lentsch (St. Paul Cretin) and Scott Schuveiller (Richfield) are expected to split much of the spring trip in right field.

Following the Texas swing, the Gophers take a week off, then head to Oklahoma and Arkansas for four weekend games against Oral Roberts and the U. of Arkansas. Then it's back to Siebert Field and the home opening doubleheader against Augsburg College Tuesday, April 5.

The Gophers have scheduled 14 home doubleheaders this spring, including eight Big Ten games against Illinois and Wisconsin. Illinois is the defending Big Ten West Division champ.

GOPHERS REACH NCAA ICE CHAMPIONSHIPS

Minneapolis, MN---Minnesota earned its way to the 1983 NCAA hockey championships scheduled Thursday-Friday-Saturday at Grand Forks, ND, by sweeping two home games from New Hampshire in the NCAA first round last weekend.

Minnesota ran its season record to 32-10-1 by defeating the Wildcats 9-6 and 7-2 at Williams Arena, and now must face red-hot Harvard Crimson (22-7-2) on Friday at the Winter Sports Center on the campus of the University of North Dakota.

The other semi-final pairing Thursday finds Wisconsin (31-10-4) playing Providence (32-9-0). Losers of these games play for third place Saturday afternoon at 1 p.m., with the winners meeting for all the marbles at 7:30 p.m. that night.

This marks Minnesota's 10th trip to the final four of collegiate hockey elite. The last Gopher trip came in coach Brad Buetow's second year at Minnesota, 1980-81, which saw UM lose the championship game to Wisconsin, 6-3. That same year, just like this season, Minnesota also captured the regular season Western Collegiate Hockey Association (WCHA) championship.

However, unlike 1980-81, Minnesota did not come away with the WCHA playoff title. This year Wisconsin took that honor from the Gophers winning two straight at Williams Arena two weeks go.

3RD TIME VS HARVARD

Minnesota and Harvard have met twice before in NCAA championship series. Back in 1971 at Syracuse, NY, when Glen Sonmor was coaching UM, the Gophers won 6-5 in overtime against Harvard. The next night Minnesota lost to Boston university 4-2 in the championship game.

The same pattern evolved when next the schools met in 1975 at St. Louis, MO. That year the Gophers again edged the Crimson 6-4, but again lost the title game, this time 6-1 to Michigan Tech. Herb Brooks was the Gopher ice boss that year.

AGAINST NEW HAMPSHIRE

Minnesota and New Hampshire threw team defeat to the winds in their first game last Friday. Each team scored three times in the opening period, always Minnesota first. In fact, through the middle of the second period the game was tied five times with the score standing 5-5.

At that point Gopher head coach Brad Buetow, for the first time in his four years at UM, pulled goalie Frand Pietrangelo after 31 minutes of action. Junior Mike Vacanti went in and the Gophers responded with goals by Scott Bjugstad and a third in the second period from Mike Harrer to take a 7-5 lead.

Butsy Erickson and Dave Jensen added third period scores for UM and the Gophers sailed off with a football-like 9-6 victory.

On Saturday, with Vacanti again in the nets, the teams skated out to a 1-1 first period tie before UM unloaded with four second period tallies to salt away the victory. Two came from Bjugstad, who then added his third of the night in the final minute of play to record his third hat trick of the season. Steve Griffith laid in his fifth shorthanded goal of the season in the third period, also.

So Minnesota easily won the series 16-8 (two-games, total-goals) and the right to meet Harvard at Grand Forks Friday. All Gophers games at the NCAA will be aired by KKSS 980 AM Radio in the Twin Cities.

BJUGSTAD, ERICKSON STILL 1-2

Seniors Scott Bjugstad and Butsy Erickson remained 1-2 in Gopher scoring, the same as they did in leading all WCHA scorers this season, after last week's games vs. New Hampshire.

Bjugstad scored four goals against the Wildcats, three on Saturday, while Butsy had two goals and as many assists. For the season Bjugstad's totals read 89 points on 43 goals and 46 assists. The point total is the third highest in Minnesota ice history behind the 106 points scored by Aaron Brotenin 1980-81, and the 93 by Steve Ulseth the same year.

Erickson, already Minnesota's second all-time time career scorer with 236 points, has 80 this season on 34 goals and 46 assists. Steve Griffith is third at 12-42-53.

BUETOW ON THE GOPHERS

"Naturally we are all pleased to have reached the final four again this year," Minnesota ice boss Brad Buetow said Sunday. "It was one of our goals before the season began.

"We have now reached just about every goal we established, except for winning the WCHA playoffs and gaining the number one West seed. But we can't cry about that.

"It seemed we regained a lot of our style of play last weekend, except for the horrid team defense we showed the first night. But our men bounced back with a fine game Saturday. I hope this week they can remember what they did to get us to Grand Forks.

"As far as Harvard goes, scouting reports inform me they were the best team in the East during the last month. They feature a pair of brothers who are both All-Americans and they play a swift, fast-skating checking game.

"They also feature two freshmen goal tenders who have carried them to more success than anticipated before the season opened. I can guarantee you that Harvard wants us more than anything in the whole world right now. They have an excellent coach in Bill Cleary, and he will bring in his club primed to the hilt."

Asked if he plans any lineup changes, Buetow said, "I would find it hard to make any line or defensive personnel changes after last weekend. The men skated well and played together.

"Oh, we may change some people from one line to another, but the only man I can see at this point who has a chance to break into the lineup is sophomore wing Dave Preuss. We'll just have to see how things go in practice before that decision is made.

"As to the goalies, well, that's another problem. (Frank) Pietrangelo has the most experience and is the man who played great during the regular season stretch drive. But, then, (Mike) Vacanti has been terrific in relief roles the last few weeks. So who do you go with? Experience or a hot hand. We'll not decide the answer to that question until probably Thursday in Grand Forks."

GOPHERS END BASKETBALL SEASON AT 18-11

Minnesota's basketball season ended on a abrupt and disappointing note when DePaul University noded Coach Jim Dutcher's Golden Gophers 76-73 in the first round of the 1983 National Invitation Tournament at the Rosemont Horizon Arena in suburban Chicago.

That setback brought Minnesota's final record for 1982-83 to 18-11. The Golden Gophers previously had finished Big Ten Conference play 9-9 tied for sixth place in the standings with Michigan State.

"The loss to DePaul was a tough and disappointing way to end the season," Coach Dutcher admitted, "but once again it was a case of nobody being able to fault our effort. We gave it a good try."

Looking back at the season, Dutcher's eighth at Minnesota which brought his record with the Gophers to 149-79 (.654) and his 13-year college coaching log to 271-129 (.678), the Minnesota tutor points to two factors which became major concerns: 1) the inability of the Golden Gophers to win at home, and 2) the lack of improvement shown by the Gophers from the beginning of the season to the end.

"We went on the road and played people like Indiana, Purdue, Illinois and even DePaul where the home team has lost only one game, or hasn't lost any home games, all year long. We didn't protect our home floor like that and we lost BIG games at home to Indiana, Ohio State, Iowa and Michigan State."

According to Dutcher, "Those are games a team has to win if it wants to be a championship team. This year those losses cost us a trip to the NCAA tournament and maybe even a conference title."

Dutcher's concern over improvement seems just as valid. "We had players who were making the same mistakes in our last game against DePaul that they made on the day we started practice back in October. The only a team can win championships," he said, "is if it can be a better team this week than it was last week. A team is a good team only if each individual gets better."

The DePaul loss ended the Gold Country careers of three seniors....guard Kelly Scott, forward and co-captain Zebadee Howell and center and co-captain Randy Breuer. While they will be missed, most of the 1982-83 squad is expected to return, so the big question becomes what does the future hold for Minnesota basketball?

"Between now and next October," Dutcher says, "we need to have an excellent off season program. Our players have to get on the weights. They need to get stronger. They've got to strive for getting better in all phases of the game. They need to work on individual improvement."

In a final look back, Dutcher emphasized the good points of the 1982-83 season. "We have some high spots to remember," he pointed out. "It would be impossible to overlook the season-long brilliance of Breuer. You also have to recall the emergence of a freshman like Marc Wilson as a quality Big Ten guard. And you have to look at the promise shown by another freshman John Shasky as an up-and-coming big man."

Overall Dutcher was pleased with his club's achievements and pointed out, "We had a new team this year, a group of student-athletes who were together for the first time. To get Minnesota into a post-season tournament for the fourth straight year was a tremendous accomplishment."

GOPHER TALES---Minnesota's loss to DePaul in the season finale evens the series between the Golden Gophers and the Blue Demons at 7-7. In the National Invitation Tournament, Minnesota's record now stands at 7-4.

Honors continue to pile up for the Gophers, and this year's Awards banquet found Scott being named the team's Mr. Hustle, Tommy Davis the Free Throw Champion and the Most Improved Player. Breuer was tabbed the Take Charge award winner, the Rebound Champion and the 1982-83 Most Valuable Player.

Breuer also was named to both the AP and the UPI All-Big Ten team for the second straight year. In fact he was the only unanimous choice. Davis and Wilson gained Honorable Mention honors on those units while Wilson earned a spot on the Basketball Times All-America Freshman Team.

Final Big Ten Statistics show that Breuer led the league in scoring (377 points for a 20.9 average) in blocked shots (54 for 3.0), was second in rebounds (167 for 9.3) third in field goal shooting percentage (139 of 238 for .584) and ninth in free throw shooting percentage (99 of 125 for .792). He was the only Big Ten cager who finished among the leaders in as many as five categories.

A final look at the U of M statistics show that Breuer wound up as the team leader in scoring with 593 points, in field goal shooting with a .586 mark and in rebounds with 257. He also paced the Golden Gophers with 87 blocked shots.

Those efforts enabled Breuer to finish his tour of duty at Minnesota second on the all-time U of M scoring list with 1,777 points (behind Mychal Thompson's 1,992). On Minnesota's all-time rebounding list, Breuer finished seventh with 730. His 593 points this year stand as the fourth best single-season effort in Minnesota history.

In other 1982-83 statistical categories, Davis finished with the best free throw mark (50 of 63 for .794) while Wilson was the Golden Gophers' best assist man with 108 and steal leader with 37.

Recruiting now becomes the big issue for Coach Dutcher as he attempts to add a handful of newcomers who can help offset the loss of his seniors from the 1982-83 continent.

In the first recruiting go-round of the year, Dutcher signed three cagers to National Letters of Intent for Minnesota. That trio of high school seniors included 6-11 Paul Van Den Bide of Willmar, MN; 6-7 Kevin Smith of East Lansing, MI; and 6-2 Gerald Williams of Arlington, VA.

Underclassmen on the 1982-83 U of M basketball team who are expected to be back next year...in addition to Wilson, Davis and Shasky who already have been mentioned... are Jim Petersen, A. Roland Brooks, and Dave Dahlke at forward and Bruce Kaupa, Barry Wohler and Alonso Skanes at guard.

A GREAT HOCKEY SEASON ENDS

Minneapolis, MN---The 1982-83 Minnesota hockey Gophers, the second winningest club in the school's hockey history, completed its season on the downside last week bowing out of the NCAA championship tournament at Grand Forks, ND.

After winning 32 game this season, second only to the 33 victories posted by the 1980-81 club. Minnesota dropped both its games at the national, 5-3 to NCAA runner-up Harvard, and the third place game to Providence, 4-3.

But not all was lost. Far from it.

During the course of the season, Minnesota's charges overcame more obstacles than sfaced by most players during their four-year tour of collegiate duty. Injuries and illness took a heavy toll.

But still the Gophers managed to win the Western Collegiate Hockey Association (WCHA) regular season title for the second time in three seasons. Minnesota then finished runner-up to Wisconsin in the WCHA playoffs, and qualified for the national tourney by whipping New Hampshire twice.

The final season record reads 32 wins against 12 losses (5th least ever) and one tie.

Up in Grand Forks it was a case of Minnesota not converting its chances, and the opposition quickly jumping on breakdowns in Gopher team defensive play. Goalies Mike Vacanti, Friday, and Frank Pietrangelo, Saturday, played extremely well, but were often left at the mercy of opposing forwards firing from point blank range and other forwards converting uncovered rebounds.

BUETOW ON THE GOPHERS

"The worst part about our lack of success up there was that we didn't play all that badly," Gopher head coach Brad Buetow offered Monday.

"However, we simply did not convert when we had 2 on 1 and 3 on 2 breaks. Had we scored on some of those chances we could have turned things around. Yes, there were some moments when we didn't play the kind of team defense we normally exhibit, but overall I really was not upset with the efforts given by our men.

(OVER)

"I'm not disappointed in the performance of our men this year. We came long, long way from the start back in October. Some picked us to win the league title, so I guess we didn't disappoint that group.

"It seems no matter how well you do, what people remember is the final game of year. In this sense I guess we did disappoint our followers.

"But to realise what our varsity players had to overcome in terms of more than 150-man games lost to injury, well, it's quite a tribute to our players to have come through and win the regular season league championship. It may sound like sour grapes having lost last weekend, but I still believe it's harder to win the regular season WCHA championship because of the long season which includes 26 league games.

"But in that respect I'm really happy that Wisconsin held up the West by winning the NCAA championship. We, the WCHA members, take a lot of pride in that our league has won 10 of the last 11 NCAA crowns. So all of us salute Wisconsin.

"During the entire playoffs they were the hottest team in all hockey. I only wish we could have defeated Harvard and had the opportunity to face Wisconsin in the championship game. The way they (Wisconsin) were playing, I'm not certain anyone could have beaten them. But we sure wanted to try. I guess it just wasn't our turn.

"But now it's over and we are already planning ahead to next season. Naturally, we have some mighty big holes to fill with eight seniors departing. And it is for these men I personally felt the worst up at Grand Forks. They had given so much of themselves, made so many great contributions to our program and their teammates that it really hurt seeing them go out on a low point. I just hope each of them remember all the good days they spent at Minnesota."

ERICKSON, BJUGSTAD & OTHERS

Although they did not finish their collegiate careers in a blaze of scoring glory at the NCAA tournament, senior linemates Butsy Erickson and Scott Bjugstad earned their own spots in the Gopher record book, spots from which they will be hard to dislodge.

Erickson ended his four years at Minnesota as the second leading career scorer in Gopher history. In 144 games he scored 109 goals which ties him for third on the list with Dick Daugherty (1951-54). He added 129 assists, second only to 154 run up by All-American John Mayasich (1951-55), and also finished second to Mayasich's 298 career points with 238.

Bjugstad, who this season led the entire WCHA in scoring with 57 points in 26 league games, ended with the third highest single season point total ever. This year, in 44 games, he accounted for a team high 43 goals and 48 assists for 91 points. The school record for a season is 106 points by Aaron Broten in 1980-81, and second is the 93 points scored by Steve Ulseth the same year.

Both Erickson and Bjugstad were named to the 1982-83 All-WCHA first team for their efforts during the league season. But somehow, through a mail error, neither player's name was included on the All-American ballot mailed out to the coaches who do the voting. Thus, both were denied a spot on this year's All-American Western team, a spot either may have earned had they been on the ballot.

Several others, both seniors and underclassmen, also had outstanding seasons. But no one else made their way into the record books at Minnesota.

As a team this Gopher edition was something else. Besides winning the second highest number of games ever, the players also scored the second highest number of goals (253), assists (409), and total points (662). The squad also accounted for the second highest number of penalties (385) and tied for second in the most penalty minutes ever (799).

This year's team also set a new school mark by scoring 18 shorthanded goals. The previous high was nine scored in three different years.

So overall the success was there. The bad taste left by the final two losses prevails at this time. But in the long run, many will remember the exploits of the 1982-83 Minnesota hockey Gophers. They were champions all.

DIAMOND TEAM ON ROAD AGAIN

Minneapolis, MN--- After posting a disappointing 2-9 record during its spring trip to Texas last week, the Minnesota baseball Gophers head back on the road this weekend to Oklahoma and Arkansas.

Minnesota plays three games against Oral Roberts University at Tulsa, OK, Friday and Saturday, and a single contest at the U. of Arkansas in Fayetteville Sunday.

Then it's back to good old Siebert Field on the U. of M. Twin Cities campus for the home opener Tuesday, April 5, with two games against Augsburg College. The Gophers then meet Hamline University in two games Wednesday, also at Siebert Field.

According to second-year head coach John "Walt" Anderson, the 2-9 record in Texas was not at all indicative of the way Minnesota played.

"In many areas we actually played better than anticipated," Anderson offered Monday. "Our defense was, for the most part, very sharp and our hitting was pretty crisp considering it was our first times outdoors all spring.

"Our biggest disappointment was that we did not receive consistent pitching. Our veterans did not come through as expected and that hurt us a lot.

"On the other hand, some of our younger pitchers looked awfully good at times, so I guess in the long run we should be all right on the mound once our key returnees get their act together.

"However, we may or may not have lost the services of senior co-captain and pitcher Bob Meyer. Meyer hurt his left knee and the diagnosis is still up in the air. It is not known if he only has some muscle problems, has a recurrence of bone chip problems, or may have torn a ligament. As of right now he feels much better and is expected to pitch for us this weekend. If the trouble comes back, then it may mean our team physicians will go into his knee and take a look. If so, it would be a heavy blow for us to suffer.

"As usual, we found that many of our newer players need a lot more work, but at the same time found some who are about ready to push those ahead of them and could be in our lineup for before long.

"Among the latter who were impressive last week were second baseman Joe Vigil and first baseman Alex Bauer, both transfers, plus outfielders Joe Lentsch and Tom Ward.

Lentsch hit better than .500 for the week while Ward was really impressive in the power areas. Both hit a couple home runs and were meeting the ball consistently.

"Veteran Jack Schlichting also carried a heavy bat in Texas, but may have found a new defensive position, too. Besides being our starting left fielder, Jack may have to share some time behind the plate as a catcher. As of this time it appears he and Mark Weber will handle most catching chores with Paul Blanchard the third man here.

"Another encouraging point for us this weekend will be the return of outfielder Tom Steinbach to the lineup. Tom was unable to be with us in Texas, but is now ready and willing to get it on. His experience and all-around abilities both at the plate and on defense should help us a ton.

"As far as our pitching corps go, I would have to say the men who impressed me the most last week were freshman Bryan Hickerson, sophomores Jay Olson and Greg Mau, plus junior Bill Thompson. At times each of these lads came through in clutch situations. Hickerson was strong twice against #3 nationally ranked Houston in a 3-2 loss, and in winning 13-2 against Sam Houston State. In the latter game he struck out nine batters.

"So overall we are not disappointed. Frustrated, maybe, but not all that disappointed. Hopefully we can pick up a win or two this weekend and get ready for our home opener next Tuesday."

SPRING FOOTBALL GETS UNDERWAY AT MINNESOTA NEXT WEEK

Joe Salem kicks off preparations for his fifth season as head football coach at the University of Minnesota with 20 days of spring practice beginning next Monday (April 4) and drawing to a close with the annual Spring Game on May 7.

Minnesota did a little skidding in 1982, and spring drills are expected to find Coach Salem trying to pinpoint the reasons for that decline and make the appropriate corrections before opening the '83 season against Rice in Houston, TX on September 10.

Injuries and a lack of depth killed Minnesota's chances a year ago when it won its first three starts but then lost eight straight to wind up 3-8. Salem knows there were other deficiencies, however, and those are the areas in which he will begin his work with 80 candidates next week.

Salem's 1983 entry into the Big Ten Conference race will have a new look. There were a ton of seniors on last year's team, and that means he'll have a lot of rebuilding to do. But that's not all. Salem also has replaced seven members of his coaching staff....an indication that 1983 will bring a new look to football in Gold Country.

Minnesota's offensive line needs a total rebuilding job following the departure of center Ed Olson, guard Bill Humphries and tackle Todd Hallstrom. And, if tackle Mark VonderHaar is not recovered from knee surgery, Salem will have only one returning starter in his offensive line....senior captain and guard Randy Rasmussen.

Salem also needs to find help for Dwayne McMullen in the wide receiving corps, but the running back spot looks ok, especially if Tony Hunter is able to stay healthy. Other vets include Valdez Baylor, Demetrius Chism, Manny Henry, Alan Reid and David Puk.

That leaves the quarterback spot, and Salem admits his first task will be finding a replacement for Mike Hohensee who for the past two years performed in record-setting fashion for the Golden Gophers.

As big a job as Salem appears to have ahead of him rebuilding his offense, the task he faces on the defensive side of things could be even greater. Salem must totally rebuild a unit which lost six starters and which drew much of the criticism for Minnesota's downfall a year ago.

The defensive front four must be re-stocked following the loss of such stalwarts as Fred Orgas, John Wood, Anthony Davis and Jimmie James at end and Kevin Kellin, Rene' Capo and Karl Mecklenburg at tackle.

Also gone are linebackers Glen Cieslewicz and Todd Petersen, so only in the secondary where such seasoned returnees as Kerry Glenn, Craig White, Melvin Ferguson, Kevin Taylor, Phil Sutton and Andy Hare, does Salem have numbers.

In that linebacking department, Peter Najarian, Eric Johnson, Joe Christopherson, Tony Horton, Andre Gilbert and Scott Tessier will give Salem a foundation, and up front the re-building will start with the likes of Craig Graffunder, Craig Paulson and Ivan Zubar.

Salem won't have to spend much time worrying about his kicking game this spring since Jim Gallery, Minnesota's PAT, field goal and kickoff specialist for the past three seasons, and punter Paul Blanchard who averaged 41 yards a kick last fall, both will be back in 1983.

GOPHER NETTERS OPEN BIG TEN SLATE

Road-weary Minnesota continues its travels this weekend when opening the 1983 Big Ten Conference tennis season with dual meets at Michigan State on Friday and at Michigan on Saturday.

The Golden Gophers were 8-1 in Big Ten dual meets a year ago when they wound up second in the conference championship meet at the conclusion of the '82 campaign, and Coach Jerry Noyce hopes his current contingent can fare as well if not better this time around.

Minnesota just returned from a gruelling week-long tour through Southern California where the Gophers posted a 3-2 record against what Noyce termed top-notch competition to even their 1983 record at 6-6.

First Minnesota downed Notre Dame 7-2, then fell 7-2 to the University of California at Irvine, dropped a tough 5-1 decision to talented Pepperdine, nudged San Diego 5-4 and wound things up with an 8-1 verdict over Dartmouth.

High spot for Minnesota on that trek was the play of Fredrik Pahlett, number one singles player for the Golden Gophers, who went unbeaten in five assignments on the West Coast including at Pepperdine where he topped the nation's number five-ranked player, Glenn Michibata, 7-6, 4-6, 6-3.

"It was one of the greatest wins ever for a University of Minnesota tennis player," Noyce said after the match. "Michibata definitely is a world class player, and the win establishes Pahlett as one of college tennis' top newcomers."

Noyce is expected to use the same netters this week that he relied upon in California, and that means that, in addition to Pahlett, the Golden Gophers challenging Michigan State and Michigan this weekend will include Stefan Eriksson, Peter Kolaric, Dave Morin, Lou McKee, Mark Silverman and Jim Paley.

BSB IN HOME OPENER

Minneapolis, MN---After struggling mightily through 14 games in Texas, Oklahoma and Arkansas, Minnesota's baseball Gophers, sporting a 2-12 record, hopefully can play some games on its home turf this week.

Minnesota is scheduled to play its home openers Tuesday, April 5, at Siebert Field against Augsburg College. The doubleheader begins at 1 p.m.

On Wednesday the Gophers host Hamline University also for two games, and then plan to meet three Wisconsin colleges this weekend. . Eau Claire Friday, Stout Saturday, and River Falls Sunday. All doubleheaders also begin at 1 p.m.

Minnesota's latest adventure into the cold and windy southland came last weekend when the Gophers lost three times. After being rained out Friday in Tulsa, OK, UM dropped a pair to Oral Roberts Saturday 6-5 and 12-7. What hurt most of all was that Minnesota, at one time, led 7-0 in the second game.

Then on Sunday the Gophers dropped another battle, this time 8-5 to the U. of Arkansas at Fayetteville.

However, not all is cast in the same dark shadows the Gophers have played in so far this spring, according to head coach John Anderson.

"A few pitches here and there and we could have a much, much better record," Anderson said Monday morning after returning from Fayetteville

"Overall we haven't played all that badly, but every single mistake we have made is coming back to kill us. Of course, the level of competition we played down there had a lot to do with our record, too. Those clubs have been outside all winter and spring and are in mid-season form. But that is not an excuse.

"It's all those little things that are really killing us. We seem to get an early lead and then stop hitting. We are making excellent contact with the ball, but in the later innings are not coming through at the plate with men on base.

"Actually our overall hitting has somewhat surprised me. We are batting at a .296 team percentage with 36 extra base hits. Now that's not bad at all in 14 games against the opposition we have met.

"But as soon as the hitting stops, our pitchers begin to falter. We have been in several situations where just one smartly thrown pitch can stop an enemy rally and give us a win. But those pitches have not been thrown for us.

"I can't put all the blame on our pitchers, but at the same time it is this area we believed would be our strength, the area that would carry us in the early going until the hitting caught up. It has not been the case.

"However, last weekend every man pitched better than he did in Texas the previous week..So that's heartning, at least.

"As far as our batters go, one thing that has really hurt is the lack of pre-game bat practice. Would you believe that because of the bad weather we were able to take batting practice just once in 14 games down there? It's true.

"Maybe playing at home will be just what is needed for our younger players. Inexperience can hurt you, particularly on the road. I hope playing at Siebert Field will help our younger men settle down, inclding the pitchers.

"If we can cut out all those walks and begin driving in a few more runs in the later innings, I believe we can win a few more games.

"If the weatherman cooperates and we can get these next 10 games in, it could turn our whole season around."

Rookie outfielder Bill Lentsch, a sophomore from St. Paul Cretin, is off to some kind of start for the Gophers. Through his first 13 games, Lentsch is hitting at a .454 clip and also leads the Gophers with four home runs. He hit a pair of 2-run homers in the first game against Oral Roberts Saturday. Lentsch is tied with sophomore Jack Schlichting of Brooklyn Center for the most Gopher hits at 20.

Another sophomore, Jay Olson from Coon Rapids, leads the pitching corps at this time. He owns a 1-1 record and has allowed but three earned runs in 9.1 innings pitched for a 2.90 earned run average. Olson is the only Gopher hurler at this time with an ERA under 5.00.

GOPHERS PLAN FIRST SPRING SCRIMMAGE SATURDAY

With the first scrimmage of the 1983 spring football practice session at the University of Minnesota scheduled for Saturday, fifth-year Coach Joe Salem still finds himself concentrating on a couple of priorities.

While Salem admits that finding a quarterback to replace the departed Mike Hohensee is pretty important, he maintains that his biggest job this spring is to rebuild both the offensive and defensive lines.

"We lost a lot of starters off both of those units," Salem points out, "and we think our biggest job the first 10 days of spring practice is to find the best people we have at each position and get them onto our first teams."

That process has prompted Salem to make some position changes from a year ago when the Golden Gophers were 3-8....but it also has necessitated his looking at a lot of new people.

On the offensive side of things, Salem's first big move was to switch Captain Randy Rasmussen, a senior who has been a starter at guard for the past two seasons, to offensive center.

The position is not a new one to Rasmussen, a 6-2, 260-pounder who has worked extremely hard in the weight room during the off season, since he played the center spot during his first year at Minnesota.

But the remaining four spots on the offensive line have an even greater new look. One tackle position may be manned by Brian Quinn, a 6-6, 260-pound junior college transfer while the other tackle post could go to Jim Hobbins, a 6-6, 249-pound sophomore who won a letter last season in a reserve role.

At guard, Jon Lilleberg, a 6-5, 241-pound sophomore who was redshirted a year ago and who won a letter as a tackle in 1981, will get a look while the other guard spot could go to another redshirt....junior Bob Anderson (6-2, 241).... although Randy Pelphrey, a 6-3, 254-pound redshirt freshman, and Gary Schiano, a 6-4, 265-pound junior college transfer, also are in the picture.

Defensively Minnesota will have four newcomers across the front line. "Our immediate goals," Salem explained, "are to find the three best tackles and the three best ends and go with them. We hope to do that as quickly as possible this spring."

Top candidates at tackle are Craig Paulson, a 6-4, 250-pound junior letterman, and Ivan Zubar, a 6-2, 215-pound sophomore who lettered last fall at linebacker. Leading the way at defensive end are Terrance Roberson, a 6-5, 254-pound sophomore, and Craig Graffunder, a 6-4, 234-pound junior who lettered in a reserve role last fall.

Saturday's scrimmage, then, will see Salem looking at his newcomers, redshirts and holdovers in hopes of finding Minnesota's best performers on those two lines and....if hopes and prayers are answered....find some depth to solve a problem which plagued the Golden Gophers a year ago. --UM--

BASEBALLERS FIGHT WEATHER

"Unless it warms up I'm not certain our pitchers and batters will ever get loose," was the lament of Minnesota Gopher head baseball coach John Anderson Monday.

Minnesota had scheduled ten home games last week, but only got in four contests due to less than ideal playing conditions. . . snow, rain and cold.

This week Minnesota has six regularly scheduled games, two at home Tuesday against Mankato State, and four more on the weekend against Creighton University at Omana, NE. But four games postponed last weekend were reset, two Monday against Wisconsin River-Falls, and two Wednesday vs. Wisconsin-Stout St.

One good thing last week was that Minnesota won the four outings it played. The Gophers took Augsburg College 7-2, 11-2 last Tuesday, and then defeated the University of Wisconsin at Eau Claire 8-0 and 7-4 Friday. Saturday and Sunday's contests against Wisconsin-Stout and Wisconsin-River Falls were cancelled due to bad poor weather conditions.

Against Augsburg senior shortstop Bill Piwnica (PWIN-ih-cah) had a field day picking up five hits in eight at bats and driving in five teammates in the twin bill. Then on Friday against Eau Claire he went three for five with three more RBIs. On the week Piwnica raised his batting average more than 100 points and is now hitting a torrid .387, second best on the Gopher varsity.

Sophomore outfielder Bill Lentsch is the only Gopher still hitting above the .400 mark with a .404 average. In the four games he picked up another three hits, including his fifth home run of the campaign, tops for the Gophers.

Doug Kampsen (1-1), in relief, and starter Barry Wohler (1-0) won the decisions against Augsburg, while starters Bob Meyer (1-1) and Bill Thompson (1-1) each pitched four innings of shutout ball to win against Eau Claire.

Sophomore infielder Mike Pehrson cracked his first home run of the year in the first game against Eau Claire, but it came in the opening inning of the first game with the bases loaded. Lentsch and Tom Steinbach got their home runs back to back in the nightcap. It was only Steinbach's second at bat this season.

"I can easily say one thing," Anderson added. "Our men need much, much more work. We are not anywhere near our playing potential at this time. But that comes with games played.

"Losing six games to bad weather hurts us more than playing all games and losing. At least we would be getting in playing time. We never even got a chance to see Bill Cutshall throw a wingle ball last week and that really hurt.

"A player cannot get his rhythm down when he only goes to the mound or the plate that seldom. So I guess we'll have to somehow appease the weatherman if we hope to get in some more games before the Big Ten season opens."

Anderson said he plans to use every pitcher on his staff that is healthy in the six scheduled games this week. He added that he is also getting closer to a set lineup for the Big Ten portion of the schedule, but that even then he may platoon a few players in the field.

Minnesota's Big Ten openers include four games at Northwestern April 23-24.

WEATHER HAMPERS GOPHER SPRING DRILLS

Minnesota's Golden Gophers will hold their second scrimmage of the 1983 spring practice session on Saturday, IF the weatherman cooperates and gives Coach Joe Salem a break.

Last weekend Salem had hoped to send his gridgers through their paces only to find Bierman Field covered with snow. It was the second time during the first week of drills that Minnesota had to call off one of its workouts.

The sun was shining on Monday, however, so Salem put the Gophers through a gruelling two hour scrimmage that finally gave Smokey Joe and his staff a chance to evaluate the current squad.

"We hadn't had a chance to look at anybody," Salem complained. "We only got in three days of practice the first week, and then we lost that scrimmage day. But things are looking better now, and hopefully we'll be able to roll along."

In the Monday afternoon session, Alan Reid led a bevy of runningbacks who got a taste of action. Reid had 105 yards in eight carries and scored one of four touchdowns registered during the workout.

Other TD's came from Tony Hunter (he had 44 yards in nine carries), Valdez Baylor (on a four yard scamper) and Clark Johnson (on a nine-yard pass from quarterback Greg Murphy). David Fuk also had a good afternoon with 92 yards in six tries.

Murphy did much of the quarterbacking for Minnesota and apparently satisfied Salem with six completions for 52 yards (and that one tally) in 12 attempts. He did, however, throw one interception.

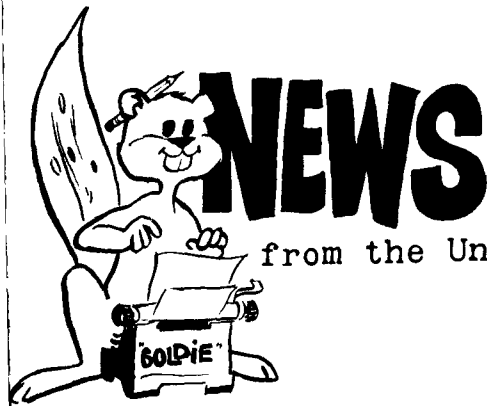
"I felt that offensively our backs ran pretty well," Salem said. Fuk and Reid were especially effective, but we got a chance to look at 11 different people at the tailback and fullback positions, and that really helps."

On the defensive side of things Salem wasn't quite as pleased with his Gophers who gave up 379 yards on the ground and 147 more through the air during a scrimmage that saw the offensive unit chalk up a total of 24 first downs.

"We have to get more done on defense," Salem said. "We have to get tougher. We have to start moving more on defense. And we have to be able to do more things. We kept things pretty simple the first time around, and that has to change."

Salem admitted, however, that a lot still could happen in the remaining weeks of spring practice. "Our first unit may be ok by the time the spring game rolls around," he analyzed, "but we need to develop some depth. We still need to find a lot more people."

So far spring practice has shown that his new squad is willing to work, and Salem regards that as a good sign. "We still have a long way to go," he pointed out, "but our people are working hard. If we can keep working, we can accomplish our goal of getting better every week."

BASEBALL OPENS BIG TEN

Minneapolis, MN---Minnesota's baseball Gophers, after playing four more non-conference games this week, will carry a less than .500 record into the Big Ten portion of its schedule this weekend.

Going into this week with a surprising 9-16 log, the Gophers play twice against St. Cloud State at home Tuesday, and two more against Bemidji State at Siebert Field Wednesday.

Then it's on to Evanston, IL, and a four-game set vs. the Northwestern Wildcats in the opening weekend of conference action for the Gophers. The schools meet on the NU campus in doubleheaders at 1 p.m. Saturday and Sunday.

Minnesota ended up second to Illinois in the Big Ten's West Division last season, but went on to capture the Big Ten championship in the playoff tournament held at Champaign, IL. Minnesota qualified for the NCAA Midwest Regional, but lost two of three outings and was eliminated.

Last weekend at cold and windy Omaha, NE, the Gophers dropped four straight to nationally ranked Creighton University. Minnesota lost 11-10 in the first game Saturday after Alex Bauer had tied the score 10-all with a grand slam home run, his first round tripper, in the last inning. But reliever Bill Thompson game up a one out home run for Creighton's win. Minnesota dropped the nightcap 10-0 which was called after six innings. Barry Wohler took the loss as Minnesota only had one hit, a single by Mark Hess in the third inning.

On Sunday Creighton again took advantage of UM pitching wildness and won the first outing 12-2, also called after six innings. Bill Cutshall dropped this game giving up seven walks and eight earned runs in 2.2 innings. Reliever Doug Kampsen walked four more. Tom Steinbach cracked his fourth homer of the year.

Minnesota made a battle of it in the second game, but a three-run homer by Scott Schuveiller (SHOE-vi-ler) in the last inning wasn't enough as UM lost 10-8. Freshman Bryan Hickerson was the victim of 9 runs, 8 earned, 5 walks and 6 hits in 1.1 innings and suffered the loss.

Northwestern opened the Big Ten portion of its season by winning two of three from Wisconsin last weekend. The schools were scheduled to play the final game of the set today (Monday) in Evanston. Iowa did the same to Illinois at home, winning two of three. They, too, are playing another game today.

"I really don't know all that much about Northwestern's strengths or weaknesses, except that their program is in full gear and they are vastly improved over last season," Gopher coach John Anderson said Monday. "But it's not Northwestern I'm concerned about. It's Minnesota that worries me.

"We simply have not jelled. We are struggling in every area. Unless our pitching does a quick about face, we'll have a tough time competing in the conference this season.

"In all fairness to our pitchers, we have not played a single game this season in what anyone would call decent baseball weather. Last weekend at Creighton we almost froze.

"There is no way in the world pitchers can get loose and into any kind of rhythm throwing under these conditions. But at least we've got to start finding the plate. Do you realize we walked 26 batters in 26 innings last weekend? We simply can't continue on like this."

Anderson believed he was certain about only one starter, senior co-captain Bob Meyer, this weekend. "We'll simply have to play it by ear and hope whoever we choose is ready to do the job," the coach closed.

HOCKEY AWARDS ANNOUNCED

Nine varsity players were singled out for special honors at the Gopher Blueline Club's annual Awards Banquet Monday, April 18, at the Sheraton-Ritz Hotel before an enthusiastic audience. Most awards are decided by balloting among members of the varsity team which won the 1983 WCHA championship.

Scott Bjugstad, senior center from New Brighton, was named the team's Most Valuable Player for his scoring exploits this past season. Bjugstad led the Gophers with 91 points, and also won the WCHA scoring championship with 57 points in 26 league games.

Two juniors on this year's squad---wing Tom Rothstein from Grand Rapids, and center Jeff Larson from White Bear Lake---were named co-captains of the 1983-84 Gopher varsity. Rothstein sat out all but three games this season after undergoing knee surgery, while Larson had his best year as a Gopher scoring 34 points, sixth highest on the varsity. In addition, sophomore wing Jim Malwitz, also from Grand Rapids, was voted alternate captain for next season. Malwitz ended two points higher than Larson with 36.

Other award winners included senior Mike Harrer from Bloomington who was named the Most Determined Player; freshman goalie Frank Pietrangelo from Niagara Falls, ONT, the Rookie of the Year; senior goalie Paul Butters of Rochester, for the second straight year, the team's Outstanding Student-Athlete; senior wing Steve Griffith from Roseville the Unsung Hero; and senior Bryan "Butsy" Erickson from Roseau the Leadership-Sportsmanship trophy. Erickson ended his career as the second highest scorer in Gopher history with 238 career points.

This year's Gopher team, beset by a huge number of injuries, still went on to record the second highest number of wins, 32, in Gopher ice history. UM won the WCHA regular season title with an 18-7-1 record, and qualified for the NCAA Championships at Grand Forks, ND. But there the Gophers dropped both games ending their season with a 33-12-1 record. Eight seniors completed their eligibility, and some underclassmen could also take next year off to play with the U.S. Olympic team. So rebuilding will be the word for head coach Brad Buetow and his staff next season.

BSB TIES FOR WEST 1ST

Minneapolis, MN---Minnesota's baseball Gophers, after struggling mightily all season, erupted for 43 runs in four games at Northwestern last weekend and now find themselves in a first place tie in the Big Ten's Western Division at 3-1.

But the spot at the top may be short lived as defending division champion Illinois invades Siebert Field for double headers at 1 p.m. Saturday and Sunday.

Saturday is GOPHER PLAYGROUND DAY at Siebert Field and all tickets have been reduced to \$1. Normally the general public pays \$3, and UM students and youth \$2 to attend. But everyone comes in for \$1 Saturday only.

Youngsters from the playgrounds of the Twin Cities have been invited as the Gopher coaches have been working with the area recreation departments. In addition, an autograph session on the field with the Gopher players has been scheduled between games Saturday.

According to head coach John Anderson, Minnesota was one double play away from taking all four games last weekend, instead of winning three times.

"We were leading 5-2 in the first game and pitcher Bob Meyer got a one-hopper on the mound," Anderson said Monday. "But his throw to second was in the dirt and gave Northwestern new life. So they went on to score eight runs in the inning and it was too big a lead (10-5) for us to overcome. But we almost made it and only lost 10-9.

"From that point on we owned the weekend. It was the combination of timely hitting and solid pitching, two things we have been short of this year, that won the next three games. Several players excelled.

"I honestly believe it was two days of practice on our own field last week that turned things around for us. We were able to work the kinks out, view some video tapes, and discuss in great detail the things that had been hurting us the most.

"Considering the kind of spring weather we have faced, just getting the

opportunity to work out in good weather can do wonders for any team. Maybe now our men have found what it takes to win. I certainly hope so.

"Excellent team defense also contributed a ton to our wins. We only made three errors, two by pitchers, in four games. Several men made big league plays to kill Northwestern's hopes.

"It was great to see sophomore Bill Cutshall (2-4) regain much of his form. He did not allow a hit the first five innings. The only runs scored off him came from three walks and a ground ball.

"Junior Bill thompson (2-2) continued his steady pitching and got the win in game one Sunday. And sophomores Barry Wohler (3-2) and Jay Olson (1-1) came up with some sparkling relief performances, too. But the main thing was strikes. We threw the ball over the plate and let our defense do the rest.

"As for the hitting, well, I'm not sure where to start. It seemed everyone was hitting nothing but ropes. Bill Piwnica and Terry Steinback each banded out 10 hits shile Scott Schuveiller got nine.

"Terry was nominated as Minnesota's candidate for Big Ten Player of the Week. He had four extra base hits and drove in eight runs. And can you imagine anyone going 9 for 12 like Schuveiller did? That's incredible. He scored seven runs. I just hope our batters didn't use up all their hit quota down there."

After losing the first game Saturday, and Gophers bounced back behind Cutshall to win 12-1. Tom Steinbach drove in four runs with a double and his 5th home run. Terry Steinbach and Bill Lentsch each had three hits and Jack Schlichting got an inside the park homer.

In Sunday's first game the Gophers handed Thompson a big lead by scoring six runs in the second inning. Alex Bauer laced a two-run homer while Piwnica and Schuveiller had three hits each. Schuveiller also scored four times. Terry Steinback drove in three runs on two hits. Lentsch also had 2 RBIs.

In the nightcap Wohler relieved starter Bryan Hickerson (1-3) with the bases loaded and one out in the fourth inning. But Wohler blew a called third strike past the first man he faced, and got the next one on a pop up to protect UM's 5-2 lead.

The Gophers won the game coming from a 2-1 deficit with four runs in the top of the fourth. Terry Steinback drove in the tying score, and Schuveiller knocked in two more with a line double down the left field line. In the sixth inning Terry stroked a two-run homer, his fourth of the year.

Jay Olson finished up both games Sunday striking out four men and allowing one hit in 2 1/3 innings. Wohler got the win in the second game Sunday.

Anderson said Monday he will probably stay with the same starters he used last weekend, but is undecided about the order. That means Meyer (2-2), Cutshall, Hickerson and Thompson will probably go to the hill. But Anderson was quick to add that he will not hesitate to use the remaining members of his staff, too.

"Earlier in the year I left starters in way too long just in hopes of getting them as much work as possible," Anderson added. "We can no longer afford that luxury.

"When you're playing in the Big Ten you must have every pitcher ready to step in at any time. I don't care if he is normally a starter or reliever. Our season is so short that every man has to go with his best when called."

Illinois won the West Diuvison Big Ten title last year going away based on a strong pitching staff. But the Illini lost three starters to pro signings and have had some pitching problems this year.

However, they return almost every player in the field from last season and can hit with any team. So the four games this weekend could produce a ton of fireworks hitting-wise.

MINNESOTA GRIDDERS PLAN SATURDAY SCRIMMAGE

Minnesota's youthful 1983 football team plans to run through its fourth full-scale scrimmage of the spring session on Saturday with a host of area prep coaches (all attending this year's Golden Gopher clinic) on hand.

"Hopefully we will be able to put on a show for them," Head Coach Joe Salem said. "We certainly hope that we can do a better job this time out of the blocks than we did last Saturday."

That "last Saturday" scrimmage was anything but impressive to Salem who complained about the same old mistakes and errors that plagued his Golden Gopher throughout the '82 campaign.

Especially frustrating to Salem was the fact that his offensive unit committed six fumbles. They lost four of them to an alert defensive eleven. The offense also turned the ball over twice on pass interceptions, had three penalties for 35 yards and mustered only 140 yards on the ground and another 54 through the air.

"I guess we shouldn't have expected any more productivity than we got considering the fact that it really was the first time this spring that we went through a full scrimmage under game conditions," Salem analyzed, "but I would hope that we could continue to get better as the spring goes along."

Salem ticked off a number of things that were not pleasing to him after the morning workout. "Our offensive line play was poor," he said, "and consequently our pass protection was not adequate. Those things definitely have to improve if we hope to be adequate offensively."

In addition, Salem said, "We must get better as an offensive unit. We must find some linemen who can come off the ball. And we need to find some backs who will run hard with the ball."

Defensively Salem felt that some improvement already was apparent. "We got more turnovers in that scrimmage than our defense got all last fall," he said. "Our defensive people were really hitting for a change."

Among the Golden Gophers singled out for top-notch efforts in last Saturday's scrimmage were junior linebacker Peter Najarian and sophomore defensive tackle Ivan Zubar. But Salem figured those were only two of several defenders who played well in the rugged workout.

Offensively, as Salem was quick to point out, there were not many bright spots. The Golden Gophers got only one touchdown, that from senior runningback Alan Reid on a three-yard run. Reid finished as the squad's top rusher by collecting 81 yards on 15 carries. David Puk was next in line with 45 yards in seven tries.

In the passing department, Greg Murphy hit only five of 12 for 37 yards (and a pair of interceptions), but Salem was quick to point out that he had to throw under tremendous pressure all morning. Lungen Howard led the receivers with two grabs for 23 yards.

FOOTBALL CLINIC ON TAP AT U OF M THIS WEEKEND

Area high school and college football coaches are expected to converge on the University of Minnesota campus this weekend for the annual Golden Gopher Spring Football clinic.

This year's two-day conclave opens with registration and lunch beginning at 12:30 p.m. on Friday at Williams Arena. Coach Joe Salem's welcome is slated for 2 p.m., a lecture session on defense at 2:15 and a lecture session on offense at 3:45. The evening's social events begin at 6 p.m.

Saturday the clinic resumes with an on-the-field offensive demonstration involving Minnesota's coaches and players at 9 a.m. and a similar session with defensive personnel at 10:30.

Following a break for lunch at noon, all coaches who have registered for the clinic will be invited to view the Golden Gophers' intra-squad scrimmage at 2 p.m. at the Bierman Field facilities.

Earlier Minnesota signed Gerald Jackson, a 6-4 guard from Flint Hill Prep in Oakton, VA; Kevin Smith, a 6-7 forward from Everett High School in Lansing, MI; and Paul Van Den Einde, a 7-0 center from Willmar, MN.

Coach Dutcher still has two tenders available, and he admits that he "might sign another player or two" before the end of the 1983 basketball recruiting season. --UM--

WCHA SENDS PROPOSAL TO CCHA

Minneapolis, MN—Officials of the Western Collegiate Hockey Association (WCHA), of which the U. of Minnesota is charter member, last week made proposals to the Central Collegiate Hockey Association (CCHA) about the possibility of interleague play during the regular season, and combined post season tournament play for the 1983-84 season only. Athletic directors and faculty representatives from each member school were present.

Meeting at Grand Forks, ND, the WCHA committee, chaired by Dean Robert A. Stein, U. of M. Faculty Representative, was answering original dialogue presented by a committee from the CCHA a week earlier. The latter group at a meeting in East Lansing, MI, opened the door to negotiations by stating they (CCHA) would like to discuss the possibilities of some form of merger with the WCHA.

In its written proposal, released in Grand Forks last Thursday, the WCHA made the following proposals for 1983-84:

- that each conference would retain its own identity,
- that two CCHA teams, to be agreed upon by the two conferences, would join the WCHA,
- that interconference competition during regular season play be scheduled,
- that a joint playoff tournament, including a final four tournament to determine the playoff champion of western collegiate hockey, would be held at a neutral site,
- that the two conferences would jointly recommend to the NCAA Ice Hockey Committee a procedure to select western representatives to compete in the NCAA Championship Tournament,
- and that a joint committee be established to evaluate results of this interconference cooperation and further consider areas of additional cooperation, including the possibility of a merger between the two Associations.

In announcing these proposals, Stein stated: "We believe the WCHA is an outstanding collegiate conference and we desire to preserve the great traditions of excellence developed through the years.

"However, we further believe we should explore ways of strengthening the conference and western collegiate hockey as a whole. This proposal to the CCHA is designed with these points in mind."

This entire matter could come to a head as early as May 4 when the CCHA meets at East Lansing. In fact, the WCHA requested that because scheduling for next season is at a critical point, a response from the CCHA is needed no later than mid-May.

Stein also said that a telephone conversation was held last Thursday with Doug Weaver, athletic director at Michigan State acting as a representative for his Association, in which Stein covered all the above proposal points. It was said that Weaver delivered a positive response to all the proposals, and Stein stated "we hope that reaction prevails throughout the entire CCHA."

More dialogue is expected between the respective Association representatives prior to the May 4 CCHA meetings.

All six WCHA head coaches also met at Grand Forks last week and made several proposals to the Association regarding minor rule clarifications and other game points.

Brad Buetow, head hockey coach at Minnesota, said Friday, "We, the six WCHA coaches, are unified in a positive approach to the proposals in hopes of first retaining our own league identity, and second adding two teams to our Association for 1983-84.

"As a group we are totally behind the actions taken by our (WCHA) committee and hope everything works out in the best favor for both the WCHA and the CCHA, which in reality means western collegiate hockey as a whole."

BSB SWEEPS ILLINI, WIS HERE SAT-SUN

Minneapolis, MN---The University of Minnesota baseball Gophers, by taking all four games from Illinois at home last weekend, ran their conference winning streak to seven and took over sole possession first place in the Big Ten's West Division.

The Gophers are now 7-1 in conference play, 17-18 overall, but will have to dig deeper to hold onto first place this weekend when they host Wisconsin for doubleheaders Saturday and Sunday at Siebert Field. Games both days are at 1 p.m.

Sunday has been designated HIGH SCHOOL DAY at Siebert Field when a large number of Minnesota prep teams are expected to attend. In recognition of the event, an across the board ticket charge of \$1 will be offered to all fans attending.

Minnesota will also play Wednesday at 2 p.m. against stout State of Wisconsin in a makeup doubleheader of games rained out earlier in the season.

Minnesota's four-game sweep of the Illini did not come all that easy. It started out easy as sophomore Bill Cutshall (3-4) one-hit the Illini in winning 13-0 in Saturday's opener. He struck out nine and gave up a ground ball single to Jim Orsag in the third inning. Tom Steinbach and Pat Pohl each knocked in three runs while Big Ten bat leader Scott Schuveiller chipped in with three hits and scored four times.

In the nightcap the Gophers eeked out a 3-1 decision behind the combined five-hit pitching of Bill Thompson (3-2) and Barry Wohler. Wohler entered in the seventh with one out and a man on, and preceeded to strike out both men he faced.

The latter contest coupled with Sunday's first game were, according to head coach John Anderson, vital keys to the weekend. "We pulled out two tough games against Illinois," Anderson said Monday. "Those are the ones you must have to become a winner. We won the others two in easier fashion, but it was the close ones that really made our weekend."

(OVER)

On Sunday the Gophers fell behind 3-0 in the first game, but rallied with four runs in the fourth inning to take the lead for good. But the game-winner came in the sixth when Tom Steinbach blasted his seventh home run of the year and the Gophers prevailed 5-4. It was Wohler who relieved in the seventh under the same conditions as Saturday and again struck out the two men he faced to preserve the win for starter Bob Meyer (3-2).

In the weekend final UM jumped out to a 7-0 margin in the first two innings as Tom Steinbach and Pat Pohl belted out a pair of two-run homers. Freshman Bryan Hickerson (2-3) was breezing along on a three-hitter going into the sixth, but the Illini jumped on him for three runs to narrow the gap.

Minnesota answered with three of its own in the last of the sixth, two on Terry Steinbach's fifth round tripper this season. Jim Francour came on to gain his first save on the year by retiring three batters in the seventh after Illinois had scored two more off reliever Doug Kampsen.

The Gophers maintained their torrid hitting pace in conference play and now are batting .392 as a team. In addition, after getting off to a miserable start, the Gopher pitching corps shows a more than respectable combined 2.78 ERA.

Schuveiller, after going 6 for 14 on the weekend, is batting .577 in conference play. Others with high league marks include Terry Steinbach at .519, Bill Piwnica (PWIN-ih-ca) at .461, Bill Lentsch .458, Jack Schlichting .448, Pohl .364 and Tom Steinbach .346. The latter player saw his league average climb from .263 over the weekend as he banged out 6 hits in 12 trips and drove in six runs.

Another good weekend by the Gophers against Wisconsin could all but sew up a spot in this year's Big Ten tournament. Both the first and second place West Division teams qualify. This year's tourney will be at the site of the East Division winner, probably the U. of Michigan which is 5-1 going into a game today at Ohio State.

Second place Iowa (5-3) is at third place Northwestern (4-4) for four games this week. A split there would really aid the Gopher cause, providing Minnesota does not fall by the wayside to the Badgers.

"Anyone who is conceding us a high finish does not understand Big Ten baseball," Anderson offered Monday. "We could get our ears pinned this weekend and be right back in the pack fighting for a spot in the conference tournament."

Last year Minnesota finished runner-up to Illinois in the West Division, but went on to take the conference crown in the tourney played at Champaign, IL.

Anderson said he will probably stick with his same starters for a third consecutive week when the Gophers host Wisconsin. That would find Cutshall, Thompson, Meyer and Hickerson going to the hill, but not necessarily in that order.

GOPHERS TO END SPRING FOOTBALL PRACTICE THIS WEEK

Minnesota's Golden Gophers will wind up their 1983 session of spring football practice this week, and they will do it without the fanfare of their traditional "spring game."

Coach Joe Salem indicated Monday that the spring game, scheduled for this Saturday, was called off. "We are just too thin," he explained. "We've lost some people, through injuries among other things, and we just don't have the depth to conduct a full scale game. So we will wind things up without it."

Salem sent his squad through a brief scrimmage last Wednesday and then did the same thing last Saturday afternoon. He anticipates following a similar pattern during the final week of drills.

"We've gone to a plan of holding scrimmages more frequently," he said, "and just making them shorter. Now that we know we won't be holding a spring game on Saturday, we'll finish up with a couple of abbreviated scrimmages this week."

After last Saturday's workout, conducted in front of area prep coaches on hand for the annual Golden Gopher Clinic, Salem told his squad, "You've come a long way in just one week's time."

Salem was especially pleased with the offensive effort put forth in that one-hour workout. His Golden Gophers had only two flags thrown against them (both for offside), and best of all they had no turnovers....they did not fumble and they threw no interceptions.

Quarterback Greg Murphy was especially effective. The junior college transfer finished with 11 completions in 16 attempts (he hit 11 straight through the middle of the workout) for 116 yards and one touchdown.

Lungen Howard had three receptions for 43 yards while Clark Johnson had three for 22. Darryl Castile had two catches for 22 (and the TD) while Kevin Sparks had two for 28 and Dwayne McMullen, Minnesota's top receiver in 1982, two for 14.

Among Minnesota's rushers in that most-recent scrimmage, Alan Reid led the way with 84 yards in 11 carries. Valdez Baylor chipped in with 59 in 12 while David Puk was next in line with 39 yards in two carries.

In addition to the Castile touchdown (from Murphy), Malcolm Nelson got one on a 28-yard run, Reid managed one on a 12-yard scamper and Baylor collected the fourth tally on a one-yard smash. Jim Gallery botched all four extra points.

With all of that offense, it might be safe to assume that Salem was not as pleased with his defenders as he had been the previous week. "We have to get a lot better on that side of the ball," he said. "We have to play harder. It looked like we were in position to make a play, but we did not get the job done."

So Salem's overall assessment, coming into the final week of practice for his spring of '83 was that "We still have some work to do. We must continue to get better every day, to improve with each workout. Hopefully we can apply a little polish our final week of practice and finish up the spring well."

TENNIS TEAM AT BIG TEN TOURNAMENT

Despite a 13-13 overall and 3-6 Big Ten record, the University of Minnesota tennis team enters this weekend's 73rd annual Big Ten tournament at Wisconsin, listed among the favorites. The flighted tournament, being played at Wisconsin's Nielson Tennis Stadium, begins Friday and concludes Sunday.

With outstanding individual ability and little depth the Golden Gophers struggled through an injury-plagued dual season, but appear healthy following last Friday's 8-1 victory over Illinois. Sometimes a team can overcome depth problems in a tournament setting and coach Jerry Noyce's squad is a likely candidate.

Although another showdown with arch-rival Michigan is always a possibility, Northwestern, Ohio State and Indiana also are expected to challenge for top spots.

Noyce, who calls the field the most competitive in a decade, believes the victor also will gain a trip to Athens, Georgia and the NCAA tournament.

"The NCAA District IV berth rests on the Big Ten Championship," Noyce said. "With the balance and all of the upsets in the dual season, the tournament is the deciding factor."

Swedish freshmen Fredrik Pahlett and Stefan Eriksson coupled with three 1982 Big Ten champions lend optimism to the Golden Gophers chances of claiming their second ever Big Ten title and second in the last three seasons.

Pahlett, ranked 17th nationally with a 34-4 overall and 5-0 Big Ten record at number one singles, has emerged as the Big Ten's top player. He is back at full strength after being slowed by an ankle injury that sidelined him for two weeks near the end of the season when the team dropped five Big Ten duals.

If Pahlett is the Big Ten's best player and few argue the point, Eriksson is his leading challenger. The Big Ten Indoor Singles champion, Eriksson is 37-5 and 9-0, with victories over the likes of Michigan's Mark Mees as well as other highly regarded players.

The Swedes, also doubles partners at the number one position, can insure themselves of NCAA competition with a strong showing this weekend.

Minnesota's returning 1982 Big Ten champions are sophomore Pete Kolaric, 22-16 and 3-6, who captured the number five crown; senior Dave Morin, 17-17 and 4-5, who topped the number six position; and senior Brace Helgeson, 3-9 and 2-4 in a season in which he has battled groin, back and foot injuries, who teamed with Kolaric for the number three doubles title.

Kolaric is slated for the number three position, Morin will likely play at four and Helgeson is listed at six, but could play elsewhere depending on his health. Junior Lou McKee, 12-16 and 4-5, will probably play at number five.

Along with Pahlett and Eriksson at number one, Noyce will use the doubles pairings of Kolaric and McKee at two and Morin and Helgeson at three.

Coach Roy Griak's University of Minnesota track and field team expects to entertain more than a dozen area schools in Saturday's Minnesota Invitational scheduled to begin at 9:30 a.m. at the Bierman Track.

The Invitational is the first home meet of the outdoor season and is a non-socring competition.

Last weekend at the Drake Relays John Keohen turned in his best performance of the season when he finished third in the 5,000-meters with a time of 13:57.47. He previously ranked second in the Big Ten in the race and may have taken over the lead with that time.

Other top efforts were recorded by the distance medley relay team of Mike Gebeke, Emmanuel Onyia, Mike Moran and Don Hurley which lowered its previous best with a 9:37.24 clocking and a fourth-place finish. John Kromer also placed ninth in the 3,000-meter steeplechase with a time of 8:59.5.

The team will again be home one week from Saturday for the GBS-Golden Gopher Last Chance meet also scheduled at the Bierman Track.

BSB CLINCHES 2ND IN BIG 10 WEST

Minneapolis, MN---Minnesota and Wisconsin played four Big Ten baseball games at Siebert Field on the UM campus last weekend that ranged from unreal to a thing of beauty.

But by winning three of the four contests, Minnesota has, for the third consecutive year, won its way into the Big Ten playoffs set May 20-21-22 at Ann Arbor, MI. Michigan clinched the Big Ten East Division title by sweeping Michigan State last weekend.

The Gophers, now 10-2 in conference play, can win the West Division title outright this weekend by taking just one of four games against Iowa at Iowa City Saturday and Sunday. The Hawkeyes are in second place with a 7-5 league mark.

Both the champion and runner-up from the East and West divisions meet in a double elimination tournament to decide the Big Ten championship. Last year Minnesota won it all at Illinois after finishing second to the Illini in the West during regular season play.

"It's a great feeling to know we are in the playoffs regardless of what happens this week at Iowa," Gopher sophomore head coach John Anderson said Monday. "But as far as we are concerned the Big Ten season is still alive.

"To come this far and not win the West Division title would be a shame. I'm certain our men plan to play as hard as ever in the series at Iowa. We want that division championship in the worst way.

"Then, if we are successful, we'll begin thinking about the playoffs."

Anderson just sighed and rolled his eyes skyward when asked about the series with Wisconsin last weekend. He then mumbled some intelligible comment and headed out to practice.

In other words, that kind of series was enough to make any coach have second thoughts about his profession.

On Saturday is was like playing in a wind title. With a strong breeze heading towards the outfield fences, the teams combined for nine hime runs in the first game with Minnesota banging out six in an 11-7 victory. Jack Schlichting and Tom Steinbach each connected twice while Terry Steinbach and Scott Schuveiller hit one each.

But the second contest was wilder. The Gophers got three more homers, one each from Tom and Terry Steinbach, plus Bill Pivnica's first of the year. But in the end Wisconsin prevailed 15-14. Minnesota scored five times and had the bases loaded with two out in its last time at bat, but couldn't pull off the miracle.

The scene regained some normalcy on Sunday as aparkling defensive play by both teams took over. With only a slight breeze blowing, Minnesota came from behind twice to take both ends of the doubleheader, 5-4 in eight innings, and 4-2.

In the first game Schlichting banged out a leadoff homer in the seventh inning to tie the game at 4-4, and then drove in the game winner in the eight inning.

With runners on first and third and one out, Wisconsin elected to walk Schlichting intentionally. But Jack reached out and hit the second pitch to the right of the mound. Wisconsin pitcher Scott Sabo fielded the ball and promptly threw it into centerfield attempting to convert a double play.

In the second game Terry Steinbach belted his third homer of the weekend with Schlichting on in the fifth inning to give UM a 3-2 lead. Alex Bauer singled in an insurance run later in the same inning to give freshman Bryan Hickerson his first Big Ten win. Hickerson went the distance giving up seven hits and one earned run.

Senior right fielder Tom Steinbach's three homers Saturday gives him seven in Big Ten play this year which equals the conference record for home runs in a single season of league play. He was held in check Sunday by Wisconsin's pitchers, but can set an all-time season mark by connecting for one more at Iowa this weekend.

In all Tom has blasted 12 homers in 24 games this year bringing his school record career total to 43 round trippers. He also owns the school career record for runs batted in with 164. But the latter figure is only seven more than brother Terry who has driven in 157.

Terry is second in Gopher RBIs this season with 41. Schlichting leads UM in this catagory with 46 in 41 games.

In the Big Ten, Terry Steinbach is batting at a torrid .537 clip in 12 games with 22 hits in 41 at bats. But right behind Terry are teammates Schlichting (22 of 43, .512) and Schuveiller (21 of 41, .512). Terry has knocked in 20 runs in conference games.

Against Wisconsin Schlichting went 9 for 14 with 3 HR and 7 RBI. Terry Steinbach was 8 for 14 with the same HR and RBI figures, while Bauer finally got untracked at the plate and collected 8 hits in 13 trips and drove in 4 runs.

As a team the Gophers are batting .394 in the Big Ten and .346 in all games played. Minnesota sports a 22-19 season record.

This week finds Minnesota going on the road to aid junior baseball programs at Rochester and New Ulm. The Gophers will play single 9-inning games against Winona State Tuesday at Rochester, and Mankato State Wednesday at New Ulm. Then Thursday marks the final home games of the season, a doubleheader against St. Olaf at Siebert Field. The latter day begins at 2 p.m.

GOPHER GRIDDEES END SPRING PRACTICE

With spring practice now history, fifth-year coach Joe Salem already is looking ahead to next August and those final preparations for the 1983 college football season.

Last Thursday, in fact, after Salem had sent his Golden Gophers through their final scrimmage of this year's spring session, Smokey Joe told his squad to start thinking about the '83 campaign.

"You've come a long way this spring," Salem said. "You are a much better football team today than you were the day we started spring practice. Now you have to keep improving. You can't lose what you have worked so hard to get. You've got to work on the weights and on your physical condition. You've got to start thinking about our season opener against Rice."

Minnesota will open its 1983 season on September 10 in Houston against the Owls, and the Golden Gophers hope to get off to a fast start in their quest to improve upon last year's 3-8 record.....and, in fact, snap an eight game losing streak.

Salem must do so with a new look, a look which includes eight new assistant coaches and both an offensive and a defensive platoon that will include new faces at nearly every position.

Can such a young and inexperienced squad do what last year's senior-dominated team couldn't? "This club worked extremely hard this spring," Salem said. "There was an unbelievable amount of improvement at every position. We are encouraged."

The final scrimmage verified that sentiment as the Golden Gophers looked vastly improved over the squad which had its initial intra-squad affair just over a month earlier.

Greg Murphy had another impressive day at quarterback, hitting 10 of 15 passing attempts for 95 yards. And for the second week in a row, Murphy went through the entire workout without throwing an interception.

Valdez Baylor led the U of M rushers in the finale with 73 yards in 13 carries. He also registered one touchdown. Alan Reid and Calvin Fowler each chipped in with 30 yards....Reid on seven carries and Fowler on five.

In the receiving department, Bruce Holmes led the way with three catches for 26 yards and one touchdown while Greg McCoy, Joe Weipert, Fowler and Lungen Howard had two grabs each. Most electrifying pass of the day, however, was a 56 yarder hauled in by Gregg Eskridge.

Even with all the offensive display, the day belonged to the defense. "Our first unit played extremely well," Salem pointed out. "They didn't allow a score, and the one time that we put the number one offense against the number one defense, the defense shut them off without a first down."

Chuck Dickerson, Minnesota's new defensive coordinator, was just as pleased. "We played well," he said. "We hustled. This spring saw us come a long way. We are starting to develop some comraderie, some pride. We are starting to come together as a unit. Now we know what it takes to get the job done, and by next September 10 we hope to be able to do so."

PAHLETT AND ERIKSSON TO PLAY IN NCAA TENNIS TOURNAMENT

Freshman Swedes Fredrik Pahlett and Stefan Eriksson will represent the University of Minnesota in the NCAA tennis tournament May 19-22 at Athens, Georgia.

Pahlett, a native of Vaxjo, Sweden, became the first Gopher since Jim Ebbitt in 1972 to capture the Big Ten number one singles title Sunday in Madison, Wisconsin. Pahlett is 37-4 overall and finished 8-0 in the Big Ten.

Eriksson, from Enkoping, Sweden, topped the Big Ten number two singles ranks raising his overall record to 40-5 and concluding with a 12-0 Big Ten mark.

Also selected for doubles competition, Pahlett and Eriksson are 11-9 overall and 4-2 in the Big Ten.

Big Ten champion Michigan will represent Region IV in the team competition. Purdue's Adam Abele and Michigan's Mark Mees round out the region's singles selections with Mees and partner Tom Haney slated for doubles.

Minneapolis, MN---The Minnesota baseball Gophers last weekend picked up one jewel in their quest for a 1983 diamond triple crown.

Like carrots on a stick, the next two jewels dangle this weekend in Ann Arbor, MI, site of the Big Ten championship tournament. Winner of the second jewel (the tourney) automatically gains the third gem, a bid to the NCAA regionals.

Minnesota, champions of the West Division at 12-2 after sweeping Iowa twice Sunday at Iowa City, 13-5 and 6-4, faces Michigan State in its first tourney game Friday at Fisher Stadium on the U. of Michigan campus.

East Division champ Michigan plays Iowa in the first round. The tourney format is double elimination with games scheduled through Sunday.

Last year Minnesota, after finishing second to Illinois in the West, surprised everyone by winning the conference championship. UM lost its first game in the tournament held at Illinois, and then won four straight to claim the 1982 crown.

But this time Minnesota will not be able to sneak up on anyone. The Gophers ended regular season league play with a torrid .374 team batting average.

However, Michigan, like Minnesota a qualifier for the Big Ten tourney a third consecutive year, is almost unbeatable at home and has been installed as a heavy tournament favorite.

"I suppose our winning the West Division championship is mostly gratifying because of the way we started the season," sophomore head coach John Anderson said Monday. "We simply got off to a horrible beginning and could have folded up our tent

"At that time everyone was struggling. I honestly believed we were either going in the tank, or would fire up and do a complete turnaround. Thank goodness the latter happened.

"I also believe strong leadership from our seniors and captains played a key

role in our turnaround. At the same time the weather broke and we got outside. From that point on things began to happen.

"Top notch defense, improved relief pitching, key hits with men on base and smart base running. . . all these things came together. Also, getting Tom Steinbach back into the lineup, the improved catching of Jack Schlichting, and being able to play relatively healthy and injury free were contributing factors to our success, too.

"Based on the way we have played the last month, winning 16 of our last 18 games, I believe we have a realistic chance of an at-large NCAA bid if we finish second this weekend. Naturally, the automatic bid that goes to the tournament champion would be awfully nice, too.

"I believe we have more balance and power on this year's club as compared to last season. We are also deeper in pitching and our defense is playing super. Now it's a matter of continuing to do the things that got us into the tournament. What happens there, well, it happens."

GOPHER INDIVIDUALS

The brothers Steinbach, senior RF Tom and junior Co-Captain and 3B Terry, along with Jack Schlichting combined to lead the Gophers in several Big Ten batting categories. Terry Steinbach, conference batting leader heading into games last Sunday, ended up second with a .490 plate average. Michigan outfielder Fred Erdmann won the 1983 title hitting an even .500. Jack Schlichting ended third at .471, and Scott Schuveiller fifth at .468.

Tom Steinbach, by hitting a home run in each game at Iowa, ended up the league campaign as the all-time single season record holder with 9 round trippers in league play. He had been tied with four others at seven entering the weekend.

Schlichting and Tom Steinbach ended 1-2 in runs scored with 22 and 21, respectively. Also, Schlichting and Terry Steinbach tied for the most hits by all Big Ten players with 24 each in conference play.

Terry and Purdue SS Elam Rossy tied for first in runs batted in with 23 each while Tom was next at 21. In total bases Terry was second with 47 and Tom 3rd with 46. And would you believe that Tom Steinbach ended his final Big Ten campaign with an unheard of slugging percentage of .1045%.

Additionally, Terry Steinbach finished tied for second to brother Tom in Big Ten home runs with six, and also tied for first in game winning RBIs with four.

On the entire season (all games played), Tom Steinbach has equalled the school record 14 home runs he cracked out as a sophomore in 1981. His career home run total, also a UM record, has reached 45 while his RBI record is at 171.

For all games played senior SS Bill Piwnica leads all Gopher hitters with a .397 average. In Big Ten play this season Piwnica handled 62 chances while committing just one error for a fielding percentage of .984. Bill Lentsch is second in hitting at .385 while Schlichting is hitting .381, Terry Steinbach .379, Schuveiller .365, Alex Bauer .351 and Tom Steinbach .349.

On the mound, senior Co-Captain Bob Meyer has the most wins with a 5-2 record while Barry Wohler is 4-3 and Bill Cutshall 4-4. Jay Olson owns the best earned run average at 2.81, but has only pitched 16 innings.

ANDERSON ON OPPONENTS

"All I know about Michigan State is that they are a better hitting than pitching team," coach Anderson adds, "but they also led the Big Ten in fielding. And I'm certain we will see their pitching ace Friday.

"One thing I do know about State is they never quit. It seems they came from behind to win just about every game they took in the Big Ten.

"Michigan's strength lies with their pitching staff and a solid defense. And recently they have come on to hit with increased power, too. But it is still their pitching staff that gives them the edge on everyone. In front of huge home crowds, Michigan is nearly unbeatable. But we'll give it a strong go. Count on it."

Freshman Dave Nordeen (77.76) and John Brellenthin (78.59) along with junior Stu Oftelie (78.59) and senior Jeff Richards (78.72) join Barber, while either seniors Jim Dolan (80.31) and Paul Luchau (81.30) or junior Jay Axelson (82.17) will round out the lineup.

Ohio State, defending champion and winner of six of the last seven Big Ten titles, is the favorite. --UM--

TRACK TEAM AT BIG TEN MEET

The University of Minnesota track and field team will compete in the 83rd annual Big Ten meet Friday and Saturday at Purdue University in West Lafayette, Indiana.

Minnesota finished seventh indoors and coach Roy Griak believes it will take a solid effort to maintain that position in the outdoor competition.

The Golden Gophers' team leaders are John Keohen, Mike Gebeke and Don Hurley. Keohen leads the Big Ten with a season best of 13:56.47 in the 5,000-meters, Gebeke is a member of numerous relay teams and a top 1,500-meter runner with a season best of 3:48.24, while Hurley turned in the top performance at last Saturday's GBS-Golden Gopher Last Chance meet with a 8:43.19 steeplechase clocking. Hurley's mark betters the NCAA qualifying standard of 8:45.80.

Other likely point contributors are middle distance runners Brian Maas and Mike Moran, distance runner Dave Morrison, sprinter Francis Ude and John Kromer in the steeplechase.

Additional possibilities for the Gophers are intermediate hurdlers Kirk Johnson and Brian Halvorsen, high jumper Brett Bohanon and pole vaulter Eugene Boissenin.

Michigan and Indiana are again the favorites having finished first and second for the last five years with Michigan claiming four titles. Griak gives Michigan a slim pre-meet edge.

"Indiana won indoors," Griak said, "but without (Jim) Spivey I give Michigan a slight edge."

Spivey, winner of 11 Big Ten and two NCAA titles in the middle distances, concluded his collegiate eligibility this past indoor season during which he scored 20 Big Ten team points with victories in the mile and two-mile, Indiana's margin of victory over Michigan was only 16 points.

While Griak favors Michigan, he notes that Indiana's strength in the field events may salvage a Hoosier victory. Weakened by the loss of All-America pole vaulter Dave Volz, who recently underwent surgery, Indiana still boasts a quality field events squad.

The NCAA meet is May 30-June 4 at the University of Houston.

LES BOLSTAD UNIVERSITY OF MINNESOTA GOLF COURSE DEDICATION SET

Les Bolstad, former University of Minnesota golf coach and one of the most prominent individuals in Minnesota golfing history, will be honored June 1 when the U of M officially will name its golf facility the Les Bolstad University of Minnesota Golf Course.

The re-naming of that course to honor Bolstad was recommended by the U of M's Honors and Recognition Committee, and that recommendation received total approval from the University of Minnesota's Board of Regents.

Paul Giel, U of M athletic director, designated June 1 as the official day for the dedication because, "We traditionally invited our graduate "M" men to return on the day of our M Club Awards banquet for a round of golf, and we felt it would be appropriate to have as many former letter winners as possible on hand for those special ceremonies."

A reception is planned at the course beginning at 4:30 p.m. Then at 5 p.m. the actual dedication ceremonies will take place. The additional M Club festivities at the Leamington Hotel begin with a social hour at 5 p.m. and continue with the dinner at 6:30 and program at 7:30.

The dedication ceremonies will include presentations by a representative of the University, a representative of the Men's Intercollegiate Athletic Department and by a former U of M golfer who played for Bolstad.

Invitations to the dedication ceremonies have been sent to Bolstad's former players, to "M" winners, to friends of the University and to friends of the Bolstad family. The event also is open to the public.

As an undergraduate at the U of M, Bolstad twice was Big Ten champion in the late 1920's, and even prior to that had received wide acclaim as the first teenager to win the National Public Links golf championship.

Following his graduation from the U of M, Bolstad entered and won several amateur tournaments including the Minnesota Open four times. He also got a taste of teaching the game when serving as a professional at various local golf clubs before returning to his alma mater as head coach.

Bolstad coached at Minnesota from 1947 to 1976, and his 30 years at the helm of Golden Gopher golf were marked with Big Ten team champions, individual champions and with a reputation for teaching his proteges that golf was a science of body movements and mechanics.

In addition to naming the U of M's golf facility the Les Bolstad University of Minnesota Golf Course, Bolstad will be honored with the establishment of the Bolstad Fund which will be used for "worthwhile U of M golf projects and for a Les Bolstad golf scholarship," according to fund chairman Robert Tickle.

MIKE BELL TO SERVE AS INSTRUCTOR AT SUMMER WORKSHOP

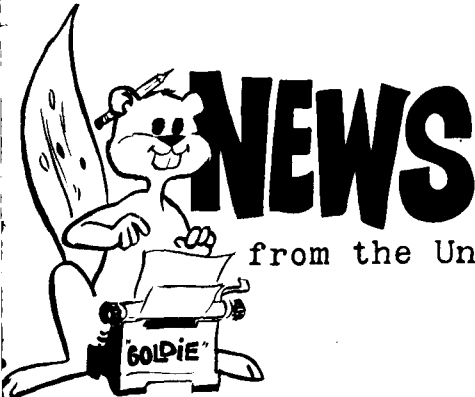

"This team became an awfully close group, and that's what may have saved us. Back in mid-April we could have totally fallen apart after losing four straight at Creighton and seeing our record drop to 9-17.

"But these kids began to scrap hard, play aggressive, smart baseball and won 18 of their next 21 games before losing the last two at Ann Arbor.

"I'm possibly more proud of this club than I was of the team that won last year's Big Ten championship. I guess it's simply because of the way they battled back from almost going in the tank this season.

"I must give a lot of credit to our three seniors--Bob Meyer, Bill Piwnica and Tom Steinbach--plus co-captains Meyer and Terry Steinbach. All four of these men helped lead us out of our problems and back to winning baseball.

"There were a lot of others, too, who helped in many ways. So overall, yes, I'm a proud coach today. It's just too bad we couldn't have continued on to play more game in an NCAA regional this weekend, but I guess you can't always have everything."

SCHLICHTING LEADS HITTERS

Sophomore catcher Jack Schlichting ended his second campaign with the highest batting average on the Gopher varsity. Schlichting, who originally came to the U. of M. on football aid, hit .391 for the season. He also owned a .592 slugging percentage as 19 of his team-leading 66 hits were for extra bases.

Jack also finished in a tie for top runs batted in honors with junior third baseman Terry Steinbach. Each drove in 49 teammates.

Senior right fielder Tom Steinbach tied his own school record for home runs in a season with 14. But even more important was his setting an all-time single season Big Ten record for homers with 9. The latter came in just 14 games.

Tom Steinbach ended his Gopher career owning three single season and three career records as a Minnesota player. In the former is his season home run total (14), runs scored (57) and most total bases (126).

His career marks include most home runs (45), total bases (362) and runs batted in (175). This season he had an amazing 1.045 slugging percentage in the Big Ten, and a .859 mark for all games. His career slugging percentage in four years at Minnesota ended at .667.

Terry Steinbach, Tom's younger brother, was second only to Schlichting in bat average this year at .383. However, he was also second in the Big Ten with a whopping .490 average, highest ever for a Gopher regular in conference play, and slapped out 12 home runs, second only to brother Tom's 14.

Terry, along with Schlichting, was also named to all-tournament team selected after play last weekend at Ann Arbor. In the tournament Terry slapped out 6 hits in 13 at bats and drove in five runs. He had one of Minnesota's two home runs. He hit safely in Minnesota's last 14 games of the season.

Schlichting also went 6 for 13 at Ann Arbor and ended the 1983 Gopher campaign by hitting safely in the last 17 games. As a catcher Schlichting only committed one error in 199 fielding chances on the entire season.

Another who had his best season ever is senior shortstop Bill Piwnica. Named to all-Big Ten teams (3rd, 2nd or 1st) in each of his four years, Bill ended third in hitting for the Gophers this year at .377. His career bat mark stands at .325 and he set a school career record for the most walks by a Gopher with 132 free passes.

His glove also won many a game for UM the last four years. This past season he only committed nine errors while handling 185 chances.

Others who finished 1983 with lofty bat marks include sophomore designated hitter Scott Schuveiller at .368 with 8 home runs, sophomore left fielder Bill Lentsch at .362, Tom Steinbach .343, sophomore first baseman Alex Bauer .331, and sophomore utility infielder Mike Pehrson .302.

As a team Minnesota's 1983 squad set an all-time bat mark with a team hit average of .337. This included the top bat average of all Big Ten teams of .374 in league play.

Tops among the Gopher pitchers who threw at least 30 innings is junior right hander Bill Thompson who compiled a 3.91 earned run average. Sophomore Jay Olson was lower at 2.84, but only pitched 19 innings. Thompson owned a 4-3 record and was the winner in UM's only victory last weekend.

Senior co-captain Bob Meyer, another righty, had the most wins with a 5-2 season record and set three new career highs in Gopher baseball. Meyer ended his collegiate career by making the most appearances, 58, the most starts, 48, and pitched the most innings, 257, of any past Gopher hurler. All Meyer's marks broke standards set by former Gopher pitcher Steve Comer (1973-76). Meyer's career record at UM ended at 24 wins and 13 losses.

In his two seasons as head coach of the Gopher diamond program, Anderson now owns a combined record of 60 wins against 49 losses and one tie. He is also author of one Big Ten championship (1982), a West Division title (1983), and an NCAA Regional appearance (1982). He was named Big Ten Coach of the Year in his rookie season when the Gophers captured the conference crown.

The Big Ten's number one singles champion and the first-ever Minnesota All-America selection, Pahlett joins Jimmy Connors, John McEnroe, Eliot Teltscher and Bill Martin as the only freshmen to reach the finals in the tournament's 99-year history.

Stefan Eriksson, freshman from Enköping, Sweden, lost his round of 64 match to Trinity's Tomm Warneke 6-2, 6-3. The Texas Christian doubles team of David Pate and Corey Wittenberg defeated Pahlett and Eriksson 7-6 (7-0), 6-3 in their round of 16 match.

Holmgren played all but his last year of prep basketball for Minneapolis Central High School. But with the closing of Central last summer, he moved to Prior Lake and completed his prep career in excellent fashion.

He was named to the Minnesota all-state squad and played in the annual summer All-Star series against a team of Iowa high school standouts.

"David (Holmgren) appears that he will possibly grow some more," Dutcher said, "but with his excellent shooting touch my staff and I believe he can play forward in college. We feel very fortunate to gain another talented young prospect."

"This completes an outstanding recruiting year for the Gophers. I'm not certain how good our 1983-84 team will be with so much youth on the squad, but we'll certainly be impressive in airports."

Besides Holmgren, two other towering prep stars who signed last spring include 7-0 center Paul Van Den Einde from Willmar, MN, and 7-2 center Mike Carpenter from Farragut High School in Knoxville, TN.

The other two Gopher recruits this year include 6-3 guard Gerald Jackson from Flint Hill Prep School in Oakton, VA, and 6-7 forward Kevin Smith from Everett High School in Lansing, MI, the latter school which spawned famed "Magic" Johnson now of L.A. Laker NBA fame.

Holmgren, who previously made visits to Arizona, Bradley and Houston, could only sign a Big Ten letter of intent at Minnesota since the deadline for signing a national letter of intent has already passed.

WITH GOLDEN GOPHERS DURING THE SUMMER MONTHS

. . .Minnesota's Randy Breuer, 7-3 basketball center who last season was Co-MVP of the Big Ten besides being league scoring leader, is one of ten final nominees for the Big Ten Male Athlete of the Year Award to be announced July 29, day of the annual Big Ten Kickoff Luncheon at the Chicago Marriott Hotel. Breuer recently was a first round choice of the Milwaukee Bucks in the annual NBA draft.

. . .Dean Talafous, assistant hockey coach at the U. of Minnesota, heads for Colorado Springs the last week in July where he will serve as one of four head coaches at an AHAUS national midget hockey camp. Talafous, an All-American at Wisconsin and for eight years a standout in the NHL, recently completed one week of coaching at Herb Brook's camps near Brainerd, MN. Talafous joined the U. of Minnesota staff last summer as assistant to Brad Buetow with the Gopher ice program.

. . .Three members of last year's University of Minnesota varsity hockey team have been named to the 1984 U.S. Olympic Team. Chosen were senior center Scott Bjugstad (New Brighton), senior left wing Steve Griffith (Roseville), and junior-to-be defenseman Tom Hirsch (Minneapolis).

. . .In all, 12 former and present Gopher varsity players were at the National Sports Festival in Colorado Springs, site of the Olympic Hockey tryout camp. Former Gophers Phil Verchota (Duluth) and Buzz Schneider (Babbitt), also members of the famed 1980 Gold Medal Olympic team, plus Mike Knoke (Minneapolis), were present. Verchota was named to the 1984 squad, but Schneider withdrew from consideration because of lower back problems. Besides the three members of the 1983-84 WCHA championship Gopher team mentioned in the paragraph above, other members of that club at the tryouts included Dave Jensen (Crystal), Tony Kellin (Grand Rapids), Jim Malwitz (Grand Rapids), Rick Erdall (Minneapolis), Corey Millen (Cloquet), and Mike Anderson (Maplewood).

. . .Peter Kolaric (Cleveland), junior-to-be at the U. of Minnesota next fall, won the Minnesota Men's Tennis Open singles championship the last week in June in a tournament held in Minneapolis.

. . .Brad Buetow, head hockey coach at the University of Minnesota, directed the West Team to the Gold Medal in the U.S. Olympic hockey tryout tournament held at the National Sports Festival in Colorado Springs this summer. Last winter Buetow saw his 4th edition of Golden Gopher hockey win a second WCHA championship and make a second trip to the NCAA finals under his leadership.

. . .Gopher football 1983 kicks off Wednesday, August 15, when incoming freshmen and junior college transfers report early to fall camp on the U. of Minnesota campus in Minneapolis. Then it's all hands aboard on Saturday, August 20, when the entire squad gathers at 10 a.m. in the Metrodome for media day. The official first day of practice is Monday, August 22, at Bierman Field, three weeks before the season opener September 10 vs. Rice University at Houston, TX.

. . .The 1983 University of Minnesota football media guide is now on sale at Bierman Building ticket offices for \$2.50.

. . .Minnesota's football team plays five home games at the Metrodome in '83. Included are Nebraska, Sept. 17, Purdue, Sept. 24, Wisconsin, Oct. 15, Illinois, Nov. 5, and Michigan, Nov. 12. The Wisconsin date is Minnesota's Homecoming game. All home games in 1983 begin at 7 p.m. Central time.

. . .According to University of Minnesota ticket director Ken Buell, "Our football sale this summer has remained at last year's pace when we sold 17,500 public season tickets (27,000 overall), and went on to average 58,883 at six home games in the Metrodome Stadium. And, I might add, contrary to rumors, tickets still remain for our home game with Nebraska on September 17. As of this date we have nearly 10,000 left. However, until August 1, only Minnesota residents may purchase tickets to the Nebraska game, and each individual is limited to four tickets. But restrictions of residence and number of tickets purchased will be lifted after August 1 if tickets are still available.

"Purpose of the restrictions is to accomodate as many of our Minnesota backers as possible. You already know about the mass migrations that occur whenever the 'Big Red Machine' plays a road game. If we find this format is successful, we plan to make further use of the same plan in future years when we play at home against Iowa, Penn State, Oklahoma, Texas and some other schools." Both season and individual game tickets for the 1983 season remain on sale at Bierman Building on the main U. of M. campus. Call 612-373-3181.

. . .Four of Minnesota's 1983 baseball starters are playing in summer leagues away from home fields this year. Three of them--catcher Jack Schlichting (Brooklyn Center), and pitchers Bill Cutshall (Rochester) and Bill Thompson (Bloomington)--are competing the the Cape Cod Summer League. The other is pitcher Barry Wohler (Bird Island) who is throwing for Peoria of the Illinois State Summer League.

. . .On the home front, the Gopher summer baseball team is red hot playing an independent schedule against amateur teams from Minnesota and surrounding states. To date the summer Gophers are 12-1. Schomore-to-be pitcher Bryan Hickerson (Bemidji) leads the hurlers with a 5-0 record while junior-to-be outfielder Scott Schuveiller (Richfield) has banged out six home runs, and, according to Gopher head coach John Anderson, sophomore-to-be shortstop Mark Hess (St. Anthony) is playing "excellent ball both in the field and at the plate."

. . .Varsity baseball coach John Anderson says he is delighted with the quality high school seniors and one junior college transfer that have signed letters of intent to enroll at the University of Minnesota next fall. The transfer is Jon Beckman (Jordan), and outfielder who was named All-America for Normandale J.C. in Bloomington, MN. He batted an even .500 last spring. The high school signees include: Pete Bauer-RHP (South St. Paul); David Chelesnik-RHP (Ely); Jeff Gergen-INF (Owatonna); Mike Halloran-C (Edina); Mark Hunzinger-OF (St. Paul St. Agnes); Tim McIntosh-C and Mike Pavelka-LHP (Hopkins).

. . .Two Gopher diamond stars of the last few years signed professional contracts after being drafted this spring. Brothers Tom and Terry Steinbach (New Ulm) are in pro ball this summer. Outfielder Tom is playing for Bellingham, WA, in the Seattle Mariner chain, while third baseman Terry is with Medford, OR, in the Okland A's farm system. Both teams are in the same Class A league. Stats were not available at this writing for Tom, but Terry, in his first 11 games, was batting .243 with one home run and seven runs batted in.

. . .It has often been expressed that assistant football coaches take summers off to loaf around and fish or play golf. WRONG! For instance, new defensive coordinator for the Minnesota Golden Gophers, Chuck Dickerson, used 15 of his summer vacation days in the following manner: 4 days at the NFL Chicago Bears training camp; 4 days with the St. Louis football Cardinals; 2 days each at clinics in Brainerd, MN, and Cedar Rapids, IA, plus 3 more days at a clinic in Canton, OH. Minnesota's varsity hockey Gophers, defending Western Collegiate Hockey Association (WCHA) champions, have announced a 38-game schedule for the 1983-84 season.

Included are exhibition games against a U. of M. Alumni team, and another against the 1984 U.S. Olympic Team at the Met Center October 11.

FOOTBALL DRILLS OPEN NEXT WEEK

Nearly 100 gridiron hopefuls listed on the University of Minnesota's 1983 varsity football roster are expected to be on hand.....either with the early arrivals or with the return of veterans.....when pre-season practice gets underway for the Golden Gophers next week.

Head Coach Joe Salem will greet his new freshmen on Wednesday, August 17, and those yearlings will work through an orientation period of three days before being joined by the old timers for Press Day on Saturday, August 20.

Full-scale practice, with veterans and freshmen in "sweats" for the first few days, will begin on Monday, August 22.....and it's all part of Salem's preparations for the 1983 season opener in Houston, TX on September 10 against Rice University.

Salem expects to have 27 lettermen in camp for pre-season drills, but he still faces a major rebuilding job trying to replace 15 starters who were among the 34 lettermen who have departed.

Injuries, an unbelievable number of them, and a lack of depth proved to be Minnesota's downfall a year ago when it finished 3-8, and Salem spent his 20 days of spring practice moving some players to new positions, looking closely at a handful of junior college transfers and scrutinizing 20 redshirts in hopes of correcting those problems.

Consequently, Minnesota's entry into the 1983 Big Ten Conference race will have a new look. The rebuilding job Salem faces will be part of that scene, and the Golden Gopher staff will be running a parallel course since eight new assistants have joined the Minnesota football program.

Early practice is expected to find Salem continuing his search for a quarterback to replace the graduating Mike Hohensee. Greg Murphy, a junior college transfer, won the top spot in spring drills but now he must fight off the challenge of several highly-touted incoming freshmen.

Salem's other top priorities include the rebuilding of an offensive line which could have only one starter....captain and center Randy Rasmussen..... returning as well as shoring up a defense which allowed 3,888 yards in total offense and gave up 295 points last fall.

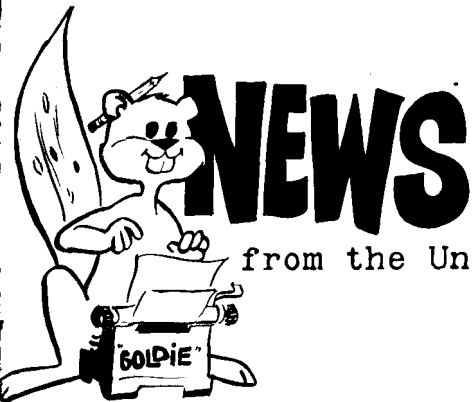

GRIDDERS PREP FOR FIRST SCRIMMAGE

After donning pads for the first time on Thursday, the University of Minnesota football team will be put through its initial scrimmage of the 1983 pre-season practice session on Saturday.

Coach Joe Salem, about to kick off his fifth year as head man of the Golden Gophers, brought in the freshmen last Wednesday and started the veterans on Monday. The entire squad went through three days of practice this week without pads before contact work started on Thursday.

Saturday's first intra-squad affair is expected to find Salem scrutinizing several areas in hopes of finding some help for his 1983 squad. He made some position changes in spring drills and is expected to continue that trend before facing Rice in Houston in the '83 opener on September 10.

One of the big areas of concern has to be the quarterback position following the departure of Mike Hohensee a year ago. When the smoke cleared following the competition of the 1982 campaign, Salem looked at his roster and found zero quarterback candidates listed.

Then in practice last spring, Greg Murphy, a transfer from Sacramento City College in California, emerged as a top prospect, and he was listed as the number one gun coming into drills this week.

"Murphy made excellent progress in spring practice," Salem said. "He's a very accurate passer, and it just took him a little time to learn our system and how to read various defenses. But by the time spring practice had ended, he was doing a good job."

Listed as number two is Andy Hare, a junior from Appleton, WI, who had been expected to play in Minnesota's defensive secondary this fall. Hare, who was named to his All-State team as both a quarterback and defensive back, was used on offense when he first came to Minnesota. But last fall when the defense was torn apart with injuries, Hare made the switch and played extensively at free safety. Now, however, Salem has moved Hare back to the signal-calling post and figures he could help the Golden Gophers at that spot.

"We had to hold Andy out of contact work last spring while he recovered from that arm injury he had in the 1982 closing game at Wisconsin," Salem pointed out, "and in the process we let him work a little bit at quarterback. It gave him the opportunity to show us how much he has improved as a passer. He'll get a good shot this fall."

Behind Murphy and Hare, Salem will continue to look at his incoming freshmen prospects for quarterback help, and two of the early leaders appear to be Brett Sadek from Rosemount, MN, and Brad Howe from Santa Barbara, CA.

Sadek was an All-State selection in Minnesota last fall and has been described as the best football prospect to come out of the state in many years. "he's an excellent passer, and he has good feet," Salem says.

Howe was a four-sport letterman at Santa Barbara and cleaned up in the honors department there. "He is a good looking athlete," Salem said. "He showed great dexterity in some of our physical tests, and he looks like he can throw the ball."

Two additional gridgers, Jeff Kyle from Middlesboro, KY, and Rich Reed from Toledo, OH, by way of Western Arizona Community College, had been listed as quarterbacks on the pre-season roster but already have been moved to defensive backfield positions.

Saturday's scrimmage should see Salem give his four top quarterback candidates chances to run the Golden Gopher offense, and while one workout probably won't give Smokey Joe the total answer, it will give him one more measurement in his quest to find a replacement for the record-setting Hohensee.

GOPHER EXTRA POINTS --- Salem has been putting his charges through three practice sessions each day...one in the morning, one in the afternoon and then one more light workout in the evening. He expects to continue that schedule until the week of the opener against Rice.

In all, Salem has 96 gridgers in camp. That delegation includes 20 new freshmen and nine walk-on players. There also are 20 Golden Gophers in that group who were red-shirted a year ago.

Salem has said the 1983 squad will go into the opener at Rice as a young and inexperienced team. That point is exemplified by the fact that only 11 seniors are listed on the current roster.

Those final-year players, headed by Captain Randy Rasmussen, include Paul Blanchard, Jay Carroll, Darryl Castile, Jim Gallery, Fred Hartwig, Alan Reid, Phil Sutton, Kevin Taylor, Joe Weipert and Craig White.

Valdez Baylor, sophomore runningback from Harrisburg, PA, won the mile run "exam" given the Golden Gophers early this week with a time of 5:00 flat. Larry Joyner, a redshirt freshman defensive back for Memphis, TN, was next in line at 5:01 while Anthony Burke topped the linemen with a 5:26 effort. Burke is a freshman defensive tackle from Hopkins.

Salem's staff this year will include Chuck Dickerson as his defensive coordinator and Clarence Hudson as his offensive coordinator. Other assistants are Lawrence Cooley and Dennis Dixon as offensive line coaches, Gerald O'Dell as linebacker coach, Bob Rankin as tight end coach, Jime Sherman as defensive line coach, Roger Thomas as backfield coach and Lou West as defensive secondary coach.

FINAL TUNE-UP ON TAP FOR GOPHERS SATURDAY

Coach Joe Salem plans to put his University of Minnesota Big Gold Machine through its final fall check-up....sort of a pre-season tune-up....Saturday as preparations for the September 10 opener at Rice University move into high gear.

"We may have another passing scrimmage sometime next week," Salem said, "but it is anticipated that Saturday's full-scale affair will be the last real head-knocker before the Golden Gophers gridders take on the Owls next week.

Minnesota got its first taste of combat last Saturday when Salem sent his 1983 charges...despite only two days of practice in pads...through a 96-play, one-and-one-half hour headknocker that raised some eyebrows.

"There was some real hitting going on," Salem beamed. "We have to be encouraged with the way our players went at it. Sure, we made some mistakes. But it was hot, and we got tired. Still we saw some encouraging things."

Earlier in practice Salem admitted that one of his first priorities was to find a quarterback replacement for Mike Hohensee. Greg Murphy came into fall drills listed as number one, Andy Hare as number two and a pair of freshmen... Brett Sadek and Brad Howe...fighting for the number three spot.

Salem must have liked what he saw from those four signal-callers. Murphy was three-of-five in the first scrimmage for 45 yards and a touchdown. Hare was four-of-nine for 53 yards, Sadek three-of-four for 43 and Howe one-of-three for 15. None of those quarterbacks threw an interception.

"Murphy still is the leader," Salem admitted, "but Hare is close. And we were very pleased with what we saw from the freshmen. We'll get another good look at those people this week."

So if the quarterbacking is beginning to show some signs of life, then Salem's next concern could be in the receiving department, and onlookers are convinced that Minnesota will be much better in that department than it was a year ago when it finished with a 3-8 record.

Dwayne McMullen, a junior from Harrisburg, PA, led the Golden Gophers in receiving last season with 41 catches for 640 yards and five touchdowns. He's expected to be a top pass grabber for Minnesota again in '83.

Which players will provide some help remains to be seen, but Coach Salem hopes such candidates as Lungen Howard, a sophomore from Detroit, MI; Greg McCoy, a red-shirt freshman from Chicago, IL; Clark Johnson, a sophomore from Roseville, MN; Fred Hartwig, a senior from St. Paul; Grady Appleton, a red-shirt freshman from Park Forest, IL; or Darryl Castile, a senior from Culver City, CA; can fill the bill.

-OVER-

Howard showed the most in last weekend's shootout with a pair of catches for 30 yards, while McMullen had the only touchdown grab of the gruelling duel in the sun.

Salem also figures his tight end corps will figure heavily in the pass receiving department, and Jay Carroll, a senior from Winona, MN, ranks as one of the best in the Big Ten Conference.

Two years ago Carroll had 18 grabs for 320 yards and six touchdowns (including three in Minnesota's 35-31 win over Ohio State). Last year, despite being hampered with injuries, Carroll had 15 more catches for 104 yards and a pair of TD's.

Last Saturday Carroll made a couple of grabs for a total of 42 yards while his back-up, Joe Weipert, a senior from Cloquet, had one catch. Those efforts were enough to give Salem some hope for the future.

"It was a typical first scrimmage," Salem pointed out. "It was a typical first time experience after only a few days of practice. We made some mistakes, but we did not lack enthusiasm."

Salem figured the offense and the defense came out about even. "We scored four times and the defense came up with three fumble recoveries," he explained. "We were very pleased with a couple of goal line stands, a couple of short yardage efforts by the defense, but we were disappointed in our pass protection."

So where does that put the Golden Gophers? "Looking at the film should help us learn which of our inside people are ready to help," Salem analyzed. "We are going to have to get some early help from new people. Maybe this weekend will help us determine which of those players are ready to contribute."

GOPHER TALES --- David Puk, sophomore fullback from Des Moines, IA, was the top rusher in last Saturday's first scrimmage. He had 56 yards and one touchdown in five carries, and it appears that he has sewn up the number one fullback spot.

There were 11 players held out of last weekend's workout because of injuries...including such notables as Tony Hunter on offense and Jerry Keeble on defense. Hunter, a junior from Memphis, TN, figures heavily in Minnesota's tailback plans while Keeble, a junior from St. Louis, MO, has been running at a first team linebacker spot.

Salem still is pushing his squad through three workouts daily, but after the upcoming scrimmage is expected to cut back a bit during the final week of drills prior to the Rice encounter.

The Owls will get an early jump on Minnesota by kicking off their '83 campaign a week from Thursday (Sept. 1) at home against cross-town rival Houston.

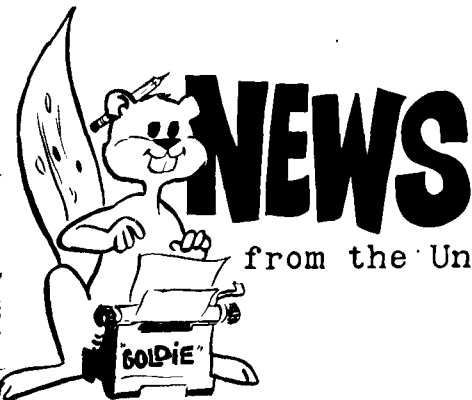

MINNESOTA TO KICK OFF 1983 FOOTBALL SEASON AT RICE

For the first time in history, the University of Minnesota takes on Rice University in the 1983 collegiate football opener for the Golden Gophers in Houston, TX, on Saturday at 7:00 p.m.

Coach Joe Salem, kicking off his fifth year as head man of the Minnesota contingent, will send a young and inexperienced team into the confrontation with the Owls in hopes of snapping an eight-game losing streak that extends back to the Illinois game last October.

"It's a game we really want to win," Salem emphasized. "We simply have to go down there and get after it and in the process get that eight-game monkey off of our backs."

Rice, meanwhile, is carrying an even bigger monkey into Saturday night's clash. The Owls opened the '83 campaign a week ago by falling to cross-town rival Houston 45-14. Rice lost the season finale to those same Cougars in 1981 and then dropped all 11 contests a year ago. That means the host club will be out to snap a 13-game losing streak against the Golden Gophers.

"We really don't know how good we are or what to expect from our team," Salem has admitted. "We know we lack experience, and we know we lack depth. And while Rice may feel the same way, the fact that they opened a week ahead of us gives them a distinct advantage."

Minnesota came into its final week of pre-season practice with a number of uncertainties, and that could mean that Salem still might be making some changes in his starting lineups for Rice.

"We probably are as healthy as we could expect to be at this stage of things," Salem said, "but we do have some health problems that make a few of our players questionable. And we've been hanging on a couple of eligibility questions, but hopefully everything will be ok before we leave for Houston."

The biggest question around the Minnesota camp has been over Salem's decision about a starting quarterback, and following last Saturday's scrimmage Smokey Joe indicated that Greg Murphy, a junior college transfer from California, would get the nod against Rice.

"Murphy hit five of eight attempts in that scrimmage," Salem pointed out, "and he has been running our offense fairly consistently. With the progress he made last spring and the continued improvement he has shown this fall, he deserves to start the season for us."

Andy Hare, the junior from Appleton, WI, who earned a letter last season as a member of Minnesota's defensive secondary but was moved back to quarterback this fall, also has had a productive fall practice and remains very much in the Golden Gophers' signal-calling picture.

Salem also has indicated that Alan Reid, a senior who played his high school football in El Paso, TX, would return to his home state as Minnesota's starter at tailback Saturday night.

(OVER)

Valdez Baylor, a sophomore from Harrisburg, PA, is listed as Reid's backup, but Salem has indicated that Donovan Small, a freshman from Wheeling, IL, also could see action.

And the significance of that is that Salem has listed three tailbacks for the Rice opener, and last year's leading ground gainer.....junior Tony Hunter... was not among them. Hunter, between academic uncertainties and injuries and illness, has not been a major part of Minnesota's preparations for the opener. Hunter still hopes, however, to be ready for the Owls.

David Puk, a sophomore from Cedar Rapids, IA, will get his first collegiate start against the Rice contingent at fullback Saturday while Dwayne McMullen, a junior from Harrisburg, and Lungen Howard, a sophomore from Detroit, will open at the wide receiver spots.

Senior Jay Carroll from Winona will start at tight end while Randy Rasmussen, senior captain, gets the nod at center. The rest of Minnesota's offensive line will be made up of newcomers.

Defensively, the Golden Gophers front four of Craig Graffunder (6-4, 242, Jr), Ivan Zubar (6-3, 244, So), Craig Paulson (6-4, 247, Jr) and Bruce Holmes (6-2, 215, Fr) may lack experience, but Salem has been pleased with their progress.

"Our defensive unit, including that front four, played very well....very aggressively....in our scrimmage last Saturday," Salem said. I hope they can give us the same kind of effort against Rice."

The linebackers will be Jerry Keeble, a junior college transfer from Arizona Western; letterman Peter Najarian (he was Minnesota's leading tackler last season) a junior from Minneapolis, MN; and Scott Tessier, a sophomore from White Bear Lake, MN.

Salem figures his deep secondary should be solid with four veterans listed as starters. They include Phil Sutton, senior from Inglewood, CA; Craig White, senior from Miami, FL; Andre Harris, junior from Chicago, IL; and Kerry Glenn, junior from East St. Louis, IL.

Minnesota's kicking assignments won't be any surprise in the opener. A pair of seniors....Paul Blanchard of Minnetonka, MN, (punter) and Jim Gallery of Morton, MN, (KO-PAT-FG)....should make that an excellent part of the Golden Gopher game this year.

GOPHER TALES --- Minnesota is scheduled to arrive in Houston (via charter aircraft) mid-afternoon on Friday and then work out at 8:00 p.m. at the Rice University stadium (70,000-seat capacity and with Astro-turf).

Alan Reid and Fred Hartwig, a senior from St. Paul, MN, are listed as punt return specialists for Minnesota while Greg McCoy, a freshman from Chicago, IL, and Clark Johnson, a sophomore from Roseville, MN, loom as the kickoff return specialists. Greg Murphy will be the FG & PAT holder while John Kelly, junior from Roseville, will handle the long snaps.

RANDOM NOTES ON GOPHER FOOTBALL OPENING LINEUP

. . .As mentioned earlier in this release, Minnesota and Rice University are meeting for the first time. However, another Minnesota team, the NFL Vikings, once played in Rice Stadium, site of Super Bowl VIII in 1974.

. . .Of Minnesota's top 24 players named for the Rice contest by head coach Joe Salem (which includes the kickers), eight men named were considered starters in 1982, four each on offense and defense. On offense returning are TE Jay Carroll, captain and C Randy Rasmussen (a guard last year), TB Alan Reid (a fullback last year), and FL Dwayne McMullen. Defensive starters back include MLB Peter Najarian, LCB Phil Sutton, SS Craig White (a free safety last year), and RCB Kerry Glenn.

. . .Most football teams today line up with bigger behmoths in the defensive line than among their counterparts, the offensive unit. But Minnesota is going the other way. The starting unit for the Rice game Saturday evening shows the offensive line averaging 248 pounds from tight end through right tackle, with Minnesota's front four on defense averaging 237.

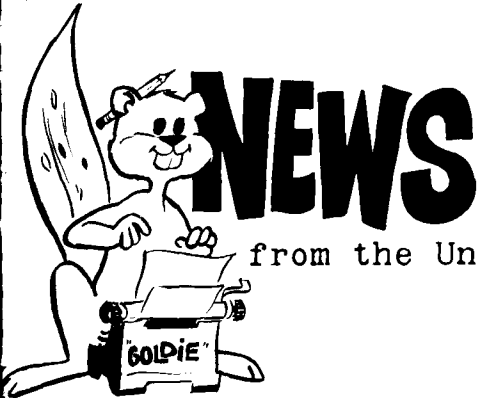
. . .When head coach Joe Salem said his 1983 squad features youth, he wasn't just blowing smoke. Only four seniors are included in the starting lineup this Saturday among the top 22. And in the second units on offense and defense, only one more senior player is found. The only spot that knocks this average off kilter comes in the kicking department where both punter Paul Blanchard and place kicker Jim Gallery are seniors.

. . .To further illustrate the youth factor, among Minnesota's 44 men named to the first two units this week are nine freshmen. One, Bruce Holmes, will start at right end on defense, while two more are linemen on the second offensive unit, and a whopping six are second unit defensive players.

. . .Jim Gallery is working on a streak of 31 consecutive conversion kicks. The streak began in the final game of 1981 when he booted his last three through the uprights, and continued as he connected on all 28 tries last fall. The school record for consecutive conversions is 56 set by Paul Rogind. Gallery's career totals read 78 of 86 conversion attempts, and 29 of 48 field goal tries.

GOLDEN GOPHERS TO HOST TOP-RANKED NEBRASKA SATURDAY

While the University of Minnesota should be able to savor its 21-17 victory over Rice University in the 1983 season opener for a little while, thoughts instead focused on the University of Nebraska and this week's assignment in the Metrodome.

Coach Joe Salem's youthful Golden Gophers, in typical out of the frying pan and into the fire fashion, are slated to entertain the nation's top-ranked Cornhuskers at 7:00 p.m. on Saturday.

And Salem found it somewhat difficult to turn his attention to the 2-0 invaders. After last Saturday's come-from-behind verdict in Houston, Salem was asked for his thoughts about this week's awesome opponent.

Salem quipped, "Let me enjoy the win over Rice for at least a few hours, will you? We haven't won a game since last September. We've had to think about losing eight straight games for a year. Don't force me to think about Nebraska just yet."

So despite the fact that Minnesota rallied from a 17-7 deficit in the second half, and despite the fact that the inexperienced Golden Gophers had to overcome the home-standing Owls on a rain-soaked gridiron to win their first game since beating Washington State a year ago, Salem's contingent came back to reality on Sunday when they began working on their game plan for the Cornhuskers.

Nebraska, rated as the number one team in the nation, has been impressive in its first two starts. First Coach Tom Osborne's team drilled Penn State (ranked fourth at the time) 44-6 in the season opener. Then this past weekend the Huskers overwhelmed Wyoming 56-20.

Salem knows his Golden Gophers will be facing their biggest challenge of the season. "They have better people than we do," he admitted. "We can't line up man for man with them on paper. If they are at the top of their game, they will win. We've got to have some good things happen for us if we hope to beat them."

And that's what Minnesota is hoping for....that Nebraska is not at the top of its game, and that some good things happen for the Golden Gophers in the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome Saturday night.

Some good things, for example, like the three fumbles they recovered at Rice last weekend. Two of those recoveries were credited to senior strong safety Craig White, and his second of those turnovers may have been the biggest play of the game.

"Rice was moving in on us," Salem recalled, "and if they had scored there it could have been all over. Instead our defense made a big play and White got the ball for us on our own three yard line."

Then junior quarterback Greg Murphy marched Minnesota 97 yards to score and give the Golden Gophers the win....with senior tailback Alan Reid notching the tally on a gummy 20-yard scamper.

(OVER)

"We worked for that win for a year," Salem said. "We drove our squad very hard during our practice in August. It was extremely hot and humid in Houston, and it would have been very easy to give up, to wilt, when we were down by 10 points. But all of that hard work, especially the conditioning, paid off. We were strong enough in the fourth quarter to get the job done. It may not have been pretty, but we showed a lot of courage."

The lack of beauty to which Salem eluded had something to do with the fact that Minnesota was whistled for 15 penalties, a new school record, (the old mark was 14 against Wisconsin in 1962), and six fumbles (the Gophers lost three of them).

"We obviously still have a lot of things to work on before we see Nebraska on Saturday," Salem admitted, "but the mistakes we made against Rice are things that can be corrected."

In addition to the fumbles and penalties, Salem also expressed displeasure with the work of Minnesota's special teams which made gifts of two scoring opportunities for the Rice delegation.

Salem was pleased, however, with the work of his defensive unit. "Our defensive team played super," he proclaimed. "They were put in the hole a number of times, but they made several big plays. They accounted for three turnovers, and they made the play of the game when it had to be made. That meant the ball game."

But now it's Nebraska in the '83 home opener and the non-conference finale before Minnesota gets ready to move into the Big Ten Conference schedule in another week against Purdue in the Metrodome.

GOPHER TALES - Coach Salem does not expect to make any drastic alterations in either his offensive or defensive starters for the Cornhuskers....except that Tony Hunter, Minnesota's top ground-gainer a year ago, may be ranked higher than his fourth-team status of last week.

Hunter, slowed this fall with a bruised knee and then a virus, worked hard in practice last week and then came off the bench in the second half at Rice to score one touchdown and account for 70 yards in 15 carries.

David Puk, Minnesota's sophomore fullback, finished as the top ground-gainer against the Owls as he notched 94 yard in 12 carries. It was Puk's first starting assignment.

Murphy, credited by Salem with having a good first game, finished with 10 completions in 22 attempts for one TD and 165 yards. He did not throw an interception. "Murphy played well under poor conditions," Salem said. "He threw well and read the defenses well. It was a good first effort for him."

Minnesota and Nebraska have met 44 times in football and the Golden Gophers will go into Saturday night's contest holding a winning edge of 29-16-2. Those figures are somewhat deceiving, however, since the Cornhuskers have won the last 10 games including 54-0 in 1974. Minnesota's last win in the series was 26-14 in 1960....when Smokey Joe Salem was a senior quarterback for the Maroon and Gold.

A sellout crowd of over 63,000 has been assumed for Saturday night's contest which also will be televised locally by KSTP-TV. The game will be broadcast over WCCO radio and over the Media Broadcast Services statewide network.

. . .Nebraska head coach Tom Osborne owns two wins against past Minnesota teams. The victories came in his first two years as boss of the Husker program, a 48-7 win at Memorial Stadium in 1973, and a 54-0 shutout at Lincoln in 1974.

. . .FOR THE RECORD -- Minnesota set a new mark in its recordbook last weekend in the 21-17 win at Rice. The Gophers were penalized 15 times, one more than the previous school high of 14 penalties whistled down against Wisconsin in 1962. However, the yardage figure at Rice, 96, was far from the UM mark of 143 yards in penalties against Michigan State in 1977.

. . .So you think you have troubles. Consider the plight of 10 men known as head football coaches in the Big Ten this Saturday. This weekend marks the final trip against non-conference foes for Big Ten schools. But what a weekend. Last Saturday conference schools posted a healthy 7-3 won-loss record against outsiders. This Saturday may produce a complete turnaround. Let's take a look at the opposition using a national poll from last week.

- NEBRASKA (2-0) ranked #1 at MINNESOTA (1-0).
- OHIO STATE (1-0) #12 at Oklahoma (1-0) #2 which won 27-14 at Stanford.
- MICHIGAN (1-0) #17 at Washington (1-0) #22 which won 34-0 at Northwestern.
- PURDUE (0-1) at Miami (FL.) (1-1) which won 29-7 at Houston.
- INDIANA (1-0) at Kentucky (2-0) which beat Kansas State 31-12.
- Missouri (1-0) at WISCONSIN (1-0). Misou beat Illinois 28-18.
- NORTHWESTERN (0-1) at Syracuse (1-1) which beat Kent St. 22-10.
- NOTRE DAME (1-0) # 7 at MICHIGAN STATE (1-0). ND won at Purdue 52-6.
- Stanford (0-1) at ILLINOIS (0-1). Stanford lost to Oklahome 14-27 at home.
- Iowa (1-0) #19 at Penn State (0-2). Penn State lost to Cincinnati 3-14, but is still the defending national champion.

Now, that's not to say that all the above Big Ten opponents are unbeatable, but the results could certainly put a crimp in the final results against outside foes this year. Beginning Sept. 24, the Big Ten goes into a full round robin schedule of nine games each ending all games against outsiders.

GOLDEN GOPHERS TO HOST PURDUE IN BIG TEN OPENER SATURDAY

Attempting to rebound from its most decisive setback in history is a difficult assignment, but that's exactly what the University of Minnesota must do Saturday when entertaining Purdue in the Big Ten Conference opener at the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome.

Kickoff for that assignment is 7:00 p.m., and it will find Coach Joe Salem's battered contingent hoping to bounce back from that humiliating 84-13 loss suffered at the hands of top-ranked Nebraska last weekend.

"The worst thing we could do now is hang our heads," Salem said after the Cornhusker shelling. "We can't get down on ourselves. We have to forget about Nebraska and think about Purdue. We plan to go at it hard in practice, and we think our players will be ready on Saturday."

Forgetting about the Cornhuskers won't be easy, however, as the memory of the nation's best college football team rolling to the largest point total ever amassed against the University of Minnesota may have left some indelible scars.

And those scars are physical as well as mental. Salem learned after the game that he has lost the services of starting tailback Alan Reid maybe for the season, with a broken arm. He also found that defensive free safety Andre Harris will be out indefinitely with a separated shoulder. And the list of players.....battered and bruised.....who range from questionable to probable caused Minnesota's fifth-year coach to shudder.

"Obviously we feel badly," Salem admitted, "We thought we were ready to play mentally against Nebraska, but we knew that we had to gamble on defense, to take some chances. It just caught up with us."

Despite Nebraska's supremacy, and despite getting "caught" by the Huskers, Salem seemed most disturbed by the final score. "No matter how good a team is," he proclaimed, "you can't give up 84 points. Nebraska is a superb football team, but we have to learn that we can't give up points that easily to anybody."

But now the Golden Gophers must turn their thoughts to the invading Boilermakers and the start of the 1983 Big Ten season. With the non-conference preliminaries out of the way, the Gophers will risk a 1-1 record against the 0-2 Boilermakers.

Purdue opened the season against up-state rival Notre Dame and suffered a one-sided 52-6 loss to the Irish. Then this past weekend the Boilers dropped a 35-0 decision to Miami of Florida.

Some have said that Purdue is a lot like Minnesota. If that is the case, does it mean that the Golden Gophers have a chance of getting back into the win column? "We feel that Purdue is a Big Ten team that we can play with," Salem said. "We hope we are ready to go after them. You never know how players are going to react, but we feel that they will do what is asked of them. Hopefully it will be easier to come back from this than it would be from losing a close game. They just have to suck it up and be ready."

So how do the Golden Gophers get ready? How do they improve after losing a game by the decisive kind of margin inflicted upon them by the high-scoring Nebraska Cornhuskers?

Minnesota knows that it got outclassed last Saturday, but it also knows that it did not perform as well as it could have, that it made mistakes andjust as obviously....left plenty of room for improving its game.

That improvement might be called, "getting its act together" and the upgrading of its performance level will have to include better efforts by both the offensive and defensive platoons.

On offense, Minnesota must get more than the 281 yards it recorded against the Huskers. While the Golden Gophers netted 166 yards rushing, it could muster only 115 through the air....with two quarterbacks, Greg Murphy and Andy Hare, accounting for only eight completions in 33 attempts.

Defensively the Golden Gophers know they have to do better than allow over 700 yards to an opponent, but they also know that they won't be facing an offensive machine like Nebraska the rest of the way.

Obviously there will be some changes in the host club's lineup this week. The unfortunate thing is that some of those changes will take place because injured Golden Gophers will not be ready to play.

It would appear that Valdez Baylor may get the call at tailback after accounting for 56 yards in six carries last week. Beyond that, Salem must wait for a report from the training room before making any decisions on his players.

Purdue's disappointing start has been blamed on "critical turnovers" and a lack of consistency. The Boilermakers feel both of those problems are correctable, and they aim to have things straightened out by the time they take the field against Minnesota.

In the correctable department, Salem had to be pleased with this club's improvement between the Rice and Nebraska assignments in the fumble department (reduced from five against the Owls to two against Nebraska) and in penalties (cut from 15 to five).

Some areas where Minnesota hopes to improve this week are in third down conversions where it achieved success only once in 15 tries last weekend and in quarterback sacks where the U of M defense didn't record any but let the Huskers get to Murphy and Hare four times.

GOPHER TALES --- While Nebraska's 84 points set a U of M record for most points allowed, Paul Blanchard tied another Golden Gopher standard when he punted 13 times. That mark was established by Walter Bowser in 1969 against Michigan State.

Donovan Small also set a new mark for most kickoff returns with nine. The old standard was seven established by Bob Thompson against Purdue in 1950 and tied by Rick Upchurch against Northwestern in 1973.

Minnesota and Purdue have met 41 times in football, and after winning 36-10 at Purdue a year ago, the Golden Gophers will take an edge of 22-16-3 in the series into Saturday night's encounter.

ROAD GETS TOUGHER FOR GOPHERS AT OSU THIS WEEKEND

Nobody said it would be easy, but nobody anticipated that the road about to be traveled this week by the University of Minnesota would become as difficult as it now appears.

This past weekend Coach Joe Salem's Golden Gophers dropped a disappointing 32-20 decision to Purdue at the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome. It was a game on the 1983 schedule that Salem felt Minnesota had a chance to win.

Now Salem's Golden Gophers must travel to Columbus, Ohio, to take on the Ohio State University Buckeyes in a Big Ten Conference assignment on Saturday at 1:30 p.m. (EDT).

Under normal circumstances that would be a difficult task. The Buckeyes had been tabbed in pre-season polls as the top choice to win this year's Big Ten crown. But now Minnesota must face an Ohio State team that was upset 20-14 by the Iowa Hawkeyes in Iowa City last Saturday.

Minnesota's loss to Purdue was the second of the season for the Golden Gophers after they topped Rice in the '83 opener, so Salem's contingent will take a 1-2 record and a two-game losing streak with it to Columbus.

"If you think it was tough against Purdue," Salem told his charges after last Saturday night's setback, "then you'll find out that it will be even tougher against Ohio State."

There doesn't seem to be any argument against that case, but the question remains, how can the Golden Gophers prepare for the highly touted and now angry Bucks? What can Salem hope for from his demoralized gridgers this time out of the blocks.

"We can't fault our players for not trying," he maintained. "They didn't quit against Nebraska, and they didn't lay down against Purdue. They gave everything they had. They simply got beat by better people. We would expect that they will play just as hard again this week against Ohio State."

The Purdue loss was a tough one for Salem to figure. His squad mustered 325 yard in offense (226 through the air and 99 on the ground). The Golden Gophers did not fumble, and they had only four penalties. Nevertheless, Salem pointed to critical mistakes at crucial times as being very costly to the Minnesota cause.

"We made mistakes that really hurt," Salem said. "In every key situation, we had a penalty, or we threw an interception, or we missed an assignment. It seemed like every time Purdue had to make a big play, they made it. But every time we faced a big play situation, we failed."

Salem knows that for Minnesota to win this season, to improve as the season progresses, that his players must get better with every week of practice and that includes this week as the Golden Gophers get ready to face the talented Buckeyes.

"We got beat at the line of scrimmage against Purdue," Salem analyzed. "They just whipped us physically up front. For us to improve, we must get tougher mentally. We must become more physical."

(OVER)

Were there any good signs for Minnesota against Purdue, any areas where Salem was pleased with what he saw against the Boilermakers? The fifth-year Golden Gopher tutor probably would single out the defensive effort of junior linebacker Peter Najarian who was credited with 26 tackles....13 assists and 13 solo efforts. "He had to be doing something right," Salem said.

There weren't many other pegs to hang any defensive hats on, however, as breakdowns and missed tackles enabled the Boilermakers to chalk up 424 yards (279 rushing and 145 passing) while scoring 32 points in the final three periods of play.

Offensively sophomore Valdez Baylor got the call at tailback in place of the injured Alan Reid and Tony Hunter, and he responded with 55 yards in 17 carries. He also notched one of Minnesota's touchdowns.

Greg Murphy, facing a tremendous Purdue rush all night (he was sacked three times), still managed to complete 17 of 31 attempts. But Purdue did pick off a pair of his aerial attempts.

Jay Carroll, senior tight end, had a spectacular night for Minnesota and may have been the offensive standout for the Golden Gophers. He had six grabs for 95 yards and made several key third-and-long situation grabs.

Jim Gallery, senior kicking specialist, also lit things up for Minnesota fans. Gallery was perfect with two placements in two attempts and hit both of his field goal tries (from 25 and 40 yards away).

Salem expects all of those Golden Gophers to perform at maximum efficiency again Saturday at Ohio State. He just hopes that handful of gridders will get some additional help against the Bucks.

"It's just going to get tougher and tougher," Salem admits, "and we know that our people are just going to have to suck it up. We know that we've got our work cut out for us."

GOPHER TALES --- Ohio State will take a 2-1 overall record and a 0-1 Big Ten log into Saturday's confrontation. Prior to last Saturday's setback at Iowa City, the Bucks had beaten Oregon 31-6 and Oklahoma 24-14.

Minnesota and Ohio State have met 26 times on the gridiron, and the Buckeyes hold a commanding 20-6-0 edge in the series which got its start with a 27-0 victory there in 1949.

Although Minnesota seemed to come out of the Purdue contest without any major injuries, there were several bumps and bruises which still cause Salem some concern. And he knows he will still be without Hunter, Reid and defensive end Craig Graffunder at OSU. Beyond that, Salem looks at the day-to-day healing process and hopes.

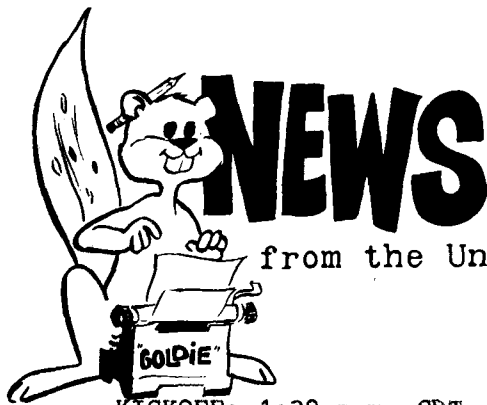

INJURY-RIDDLED GOPHERS PLAY AT INDIANA SATURDAY

Still seeking that elusive first Big Ten victory of the 1983 season, Minnesota heads for Bloomington, Indiana, on Saturday for a 1:30 p.m. conference assignment against the Hoosiers.

Coach Joe Salem's injury-riddled Golden Gophers dropped their third straight contest and second consecutive Big Ten decision 69-18 at Ohio State this past weekend and consequently will be risking an overall mark of 1-3 and a conference log of 0-2 this time out of the blocks.

Host Indiana has identical credentials. The Hoosiers beat Duke in their season opener but since then have fallen to Kentucky, Northwestern and this past weekend Michigan to stand at 1-3 and 0-2.

"This is a game we should be in," Salem said last week. "Indiana is an opponent we should be able to beat. But with our physical condition the way it is, I don't know if we'll have enough players to fill out a travel roster."

Last weekend's confrontation with the Buckeyes was especially devastating. Not only were those 69 points the most ever scored against the Golden Gophers by a Big Ten opponent, the setback was the 10th straight conference loss....the most consecutive loop games ever lost by a Minnesota contingent.

And on top of that the list of injured players scanned by Salem following last Saturday's game reached a dozen....the most serious being to defensive back Andre Harris and linebacker Jerry Keeble who were scheduled for knee surgery Tuesday.

In addition wide receiver Lungen Howard suffered cracked vertebrae and will be sidelined for at least a couple of weeks. The extent of the rest of Minnesota's injuries won't be known for a few days, but it is expected that fullback David Puk, running back Donovan Small and offensive guard Steve Puk will miss at least the Indiana game this week.

"We'll have to use more inexperienced people this week," Salem admitted, "but hopefully we will have some of our players back for Indiana who missed the Ohio State game last week."

Biggest name on that soon-to-return list would be tailback Tony Hunter who sprained an ankle against Nebraska and was shelved for both the Purdue and Buckeye contests. His return would be a real boost to Minnesota's offensive game plan for the Hoosier assignment.

Minnesota also hoped to have defensive end Steve Graffunder back this week, but his availability now seems in doubt. Graffunder has been out of action for three weeks with a stress fracture in his foot.

All of which means Salem's task of getting the Gophers ready for this weekend's challenge will be severe. "We're coming into the part of our schedule where we felt we would have a chance to win some games," Salem said, "but it will take a different physical and mental appearance than we now are showing."

Visibly upset with Minnesota's effort at Ohio State, Salem called it "the worst a team has ever played for me." Salem also said, "We were so bad fundamentally that it became an embarrassment. I can't remember any team ever playing that poorly in so many areas."

Salem was referring to the six fumbles (Minnesota lost three of them), four interceptions, a blocked punt for a touchdown, four dropped passes, six penalties and a number of additional errors sited by Minnesota's fifth-year coach as missed assignments and mental errors.

"We're at rock bottom," Salem told his squad after the Ohio State game. "Now you can stay there, or you can pull yourselves together and come off the floor against Indiana. It is up to you."

As Salem attempted to analyze the OSU game, he found that Minnesota had been in a position to hurt the Buckeyes but instead wound up hurting itself at critical points in the game.

"We took the opening kickoff and marched the length of the field only to get a delay-of-game penalty at the Ohio State one yard line and then have to settle for a field goal," Salem said.

"Then when we score a safety and seem to be in the thick of things we get an offensive pass interference penalty," he pointed out, "and then on the next play throw an interception. We just took ourselves out of the game."

So the question remains, can the Gophers, as depleted as their ranks are because of injuries, come back this week? "We had our chances early at Ohio State," Salem maintained, "we just blew them. If we can eliminate our mistakes, if we can play fundamentally sound football, we can still come out of this ok. Ohio State was a good football team, but not as good as we made them look. Now we are playing somebody at our level. It is up to us."

GOPHER TALES --- Minnesota and Indiana have met 44 times in football, and the Golden Gophers will take an edge of 27-14-3 into Saturday's game at Bloomington despite the fact that the Hoosiers won 40-21 at the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome just one year ago. In fact Indiana has a two-game streak going against Minnesota after also winning 17-16 at Bloomington two years ago. The Golden Gopher have not won at Indiana since 1968 when Murray Warmath's contingent posted a 20-6 verdict.

If there was a bright spot for Minnesota against Ohio State, it might have been at tight end where senior Jay Carroll had another fine day. Carroll grabbed eight passes for 84 yards and a touchdown.

Jim Gallery missed his final extra point try of the day at OSU and in the process saw his streak snapped at 38 straight spanning three seasons. He made his first kick of the day last Saturday and in the process tied him with Paul Rogind for most PAT's at 85.

ICERS BEGIN, PLAY SQUAD GAMES

Minneapolis, MN---The University of Minnesota's defending Western Collegiate Hockey Association (WCHA) champions began official practice Saturday morning at Williams Arena following two weeks of "captain's practices".

The official starting date of Oct. 1 was set this year by the NCAA. In previous years Minnesota, like other schools, began practice whenever fall quarter opened.

Head coach Brad Buetow carries a 113-51-3 record into his fifth year at Minnesota and had 50 players on hand Saturday. The squad totaled 81 candidates back on Sept. 17, the first day of unofficial workouts.

Buetow and his staff did not waste any time getting the players into action as the first intrasquad game of the season was held Sunday evening at North St. Paul.

Two more games are scheduled this week, at Columbia Arena in Fridley Tuesday, Oct. 4, and at West St. Paul Thursday, Oct. 6.

Then on Saturday, Oct. 8, at Williams Arena, a doubleheader is scheduled. In the first contest the Gopher "Old Timers" will play a game at 6 p.m., with the Gopher varsity facing an alumni team made up of active players at 7:30 p.m. There is no advance sale of tickets for the Saturday contests. Tickets are \$3 per person at the door and there are no reserved seats. The alumni contest IS NOT a part of the season ticket plan. Former head coaches John Mariucci and Glen Sonmor will coach the Old Timer teams.

Buetow and his assistant coaches were allowed to view each ice practice from the stands in Williams and make their judgements in cutting the squad down to a workable size. In addition, daily dry land training sessions were held in the University Fieldhouse followed by weight programs before each practice.

"Dry land training is good in terms of teaching formations and patterns, but it's not nearly as effective as working with your players on the ice," Buetow said Monday. "It was good to get right in there with them Saturday."

Minnesota returns 15 lettermen from last year's squad that reached the final four of the NCAA championships held in Grand Forks, ND. But two familiar names are missing this season.

Junior-to-be defenseman Tom Hirsch (Minneapolis Henry) and sophomore-to-be center Corey Millen (Cloquet) are both with the U.S. Olympic Team. In fact, Minnesota plays the Olympic squad Tuesday, Oct. 11, at the Met Center in Bloomington.

Leading the way for UM this season is one of two seniors on the varsity, co-captain Jeff Larson (White Bear Lake), plus junior co-captain Tom Rothstein and junior alternate captain Jim Malwitz, both from Grand Rapids.

Buetow also returns two solid veterans in goal with sophomore Frank Pietrangelo (Niagara Falls, ONT) and senior Mike Vacanti (Edina) on hand.

Several vets also grace the lineup at both defense and forward, but with so many skaters on hand at this time it's hard to figure out who is who until a program is printed.

Minnesota plays 20 home games this season, including 14 against WCHA foes. Outside the WCHA visitors include Harvard, Dec. 17-18, U.S. International, Dec. 20-21, and Miami of Ohio, Dec. 30-31.

Minnesota, following the Olympic exhibition Oct. 11, officially opens its seasons Oct. 14-15 at the U. of Illinois-Chicago.

Another exhibition game vs. the Olympians is set for Jan. 1 at the Met.

Dean Talafous and Mike Foley return as Buetow's assistant coaches this season, with two new part-timers also on hand to help out. Former NHL and WHA vet Carl Wetzell will coach the goalies with Bob Shier, last year an assistant coach at Woodbury (MN) High School, will coach the varsity reserve team.

Season tickets are still on sale at Bierman Building for all Gopher home games, and single game tickets went on sale this morning (Monday) at the same sight.

SCHLICHTING CAPT, TO OLYMPIC TRIALS

Minneapolis, MN---Jack Schlichting, catcher-outfielder on the University of Minnesota baseball team, received double honors last weekend.

Schlichting was named captain of the 1984 Gopher varsity squad, and also selected as the top player among more than 30 candidates at an Olympic baseball tryout camp held over the weekend at Siebert Field on the U. of M. campus.

This means Schlichting will advance to Louisville, KY, and the national Olympic tryout camp October 22-23 for further evaluation by the U.S. Baseball Federation.

Baseball has been designated a demonstration sport at the 1984 Olympic Games scheduled for Los Angeles July 31-August 7, 1984. Six countries will compete in a round robin tournament.

Schlichting, a junior from Brooklyn Center, has been a two-year regular with the Gophers and last spring topped his teammates with a .391 batting average and 49 runs batted in in 47 games. Last summer he again excelled playing in the Cape Cod League where he batted over .300 and led the league in doubles. He is expected to go high in the next major league draft.

Two more candidates from the weekend camp were named as alternates. Included are junior outfielder Pat Pohl from Hastings and the U. of Minnesota, and senior first baseman Daryl Deneke from Huron, SD, and South Dakota State U.

Schlichting and Pohl are working out daily with their teammates during fall practice at the U. of M.

BATTERED GOPHERS HOST WISCONSIN IN HOMECOMING BATTLE SATURDAY

If Joe Salem has had a tougher assignment in his 18 seasons as a college head football coach, he isn't able to recall when it was or where it was. It certainly has not taken place in the five years he's been at Minnesota.

And what is that major task he's about to undertake? Only to get his battered Golden Gophers ready....mentally and physically....to host the University of Wisconsin Saturday at 7:00 p.m. in the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome.

Minnesota dropped its fourth straight decision of the 1983 campaign and 11th consecutive Big Ten Conference assignment in the past two years last weekend 38-31 to Indiana University at Bloomington.

The Golden Gophers spotted the home-standing Hoosiers to a 21-0 lead in the first half of that shootout before coming to life with a pair of second quarter touchdowns. But they fell behind again 38-17 in the fourth quarter before staging a gutty last-ditch rally only to fall short.

"It was a very disappointing loss," Salem admitted. "I told our players all week long that Indiana was a team we could beat. I still think so, but we put ourselves in an impossible hole by falling so far behind early in the game."

How could it happen? Salem is the first to admit that it is all but impossible to win in the Big Ten with inexperienced players, and not only did the Golden Gophers start four freshmen at Indiana, several additional first-year performers were pressed into duty when injuries piled up during the course of the game.

"Yes, we're very young," Salem admitted. "Our offensive line, for example, had only one experienced senior (Captain Randy Rasmussen at center) on it, but generally speaking those people have done a good job. They have been especially good protecting our passer. We threw the ball 53 times at Indiana, and Greg Murphy was sacked only once. The line keeps getting better."

The youth on the defensive side of things was....and is....a different story, however. It got especially tough when senior strong safety Craig White left the game in the first period with an injury and newcomer Rich Reed was pressed into service in a defensive secondary already weakened by the loss of Andre Harris.

"We made some mistakes reading Indiana's motion, and we got caught in some wrong coverages," Salem explained. "Those mental mistakes always seemed to come at the worst times. It seemed every time we had them in a third down and long yardage situation, we'd make an error and let them off the hook."

With all of the disappointments in the game, Salem might be hard pressed to find something good to talk about, but whether he would admit it or not, he had to be pleased with the way his squad came back.

A week ago he praised the Golden Gophers for not quitting, for playing as hard as they could throughout the game at Ohio State. The same situation seemed to prevail at Indiana as Minnesota gave the Hoosiers their best shot. It was just a shot that fell short.

(OVER)

"Yes, we gave it a good effort at the end," Salem admitted, but we just should not have been that far in the hole to start with. To win it is necessary to make the big plays, both offensively and defensively. We couldn't make the big play on third down defensively (the Hoosiers had six of 13 third down conversions) and on offense when we were in crucial third-and-long situations we failed (Minnesota converted only eight of 16 times)."

So now Salem and his Golden Gophers face that big job of playing host to arch-rival Wisconsin in Minnesota's Homecoming '83 assignment Saturday night.

"Wisconsin is a lot better football team than Indiana," Salem told his players after the setback to the Hoosiers. "That means that for us to win we will have to be a better football team than we were this week."

At the start of the 1983 season, Salem asked his squad to vow that they would make improvement, get better with each week of practice. And now, although the losses are stacking up, it would seem that Minnesota is a better football team than it was in August.

"With a young football team," Salem analyzed, "the one thing it is necessary to accomplish is for players to improve...as individuals and as a team. That has happened. Now it is necessary to find ourselves. Indiana was a team that we should have beaten, a team that we should have found a way to defeat. Now we have to hope that we can put it together this week at home against Wisconsin."

GOPHER TALES --- Minnesota and Wisconsin have met 92 times in football in a series dating back to 1890. Coming into Saturday's confrontation, Minnesota has won 49 of those games, lost 35 and settled for a tie eight times.

Coach Dave McClain's Badgers will bring an overall record of 3-2 and a Big Ten log of 1-2 into Saturday night's duel after falling 27-14 to Illinois last weekend. Minnesota is 1-4 and 0-3 on the season.

For many seasons Minnesota and Wisconsin traditionally met in the final game of the season. In fact that was the case every year since 1944. The Golden Gophers and Badgers have managed to square off in homecoming clashes twice before. In 1922, Wisconsin prevailed 14-0 and in 1931 Minnesota won by that same margin.

Although Murphy was intercepted three times at Indiana last week, he did register 23 completions in those 53 attempts for 357 yards and four touchdowns. Fred Hartwig was Murphy's favorite target with six grabs for 97 yards and one TD. Dwayne McMullen had five for 77 and a touchdown while Valdez Baylor had four for 26 and a TD, Jay Carroll three for 4 and a TD, and Lungen Howard three for 83.

Baylor also finished as Minnesota's top rusher against the Hoosiers with 66 yards in 16 carries. Freshman Kevin Wilson, seeing his most extensive service as a Gopher, was next in line with 46 yards in nine carries.

Linebacker Peter Najarian had another spectacular day for Minnesota. He registered 17 tackles against the Hoosiers and now has 35 solo tackles and 40 assisted tackles for a total of 75 hits on the season.

Minneapolis, MN---"This team can be a good one, but it will take time before it can jell because of so many new players on the roster."

So says University of Minnesota head hockey coach Brad Buetow as his 1983-84 Gopher edition prepares to open its season this week.

The Gophers go unprepared into an exhibition contest Tuesday (Oct. 11) at the Met Center in Bloomington against the 1984 U.S. Olympic Team.

Then comes a pair of road games Friday and Saturday against the U. of Illinois-Chicago in the Windy City. Illinois-Chicago is a member of the Central Collegiate Hockey Association (CCHA) and this series marks the first games ever between the schools.

The Gophers, Buetow's fifth team at Minnesota (he has a 4-year record of 113-51-3), head into the season as defending champions of the Western Collegiate Hockey Association (WCHA). In fact, Buetow has won the league title twice since taking over the Gopher reigns in 1979-80.

"I am certain we will not be ready for the Olympic Team Tuesday because of such short preparation time," Buetow says. "Because of a new NCAA rule this year we coaches, were not allowed to get on the ice with our players until October 1. That is simply not enough time to prepare for our opener."

"At the same time the lessons we learn Tuesday should help us a great deal to be better prepared for the weekend series. If not, we are really in trouble.

"The people we expect will skate for us this week include only one senior and nine juniors. Of the latter group, one is a transfer and another did not play last season. So we are short on experience. In addition, our depth consists mainly of untried freshmen. So we don't expect this club to break fast from the gate.

"At the same time I believe the talent is there for our team to become a solid entry by January and be ready to run with the challengers at that time. In the long run we could be in for a complex season starting out with so many new people we are counting on to play for us."

Buetow says he will split the Olympic game with goalies Frank Pietrangelo and Mike Vacanti. Pietrangelo carried UM through its stretch drive to the WCHA title last year while Vacanti came on late in the season and was impressive. They will probably split the series in Chicago, too.

On defense two new names have crept into the lineup. Sean Regan, who transferred here from Notre Dame after the Irish dropped the sport, and Gary Shoepck, a freshman walk-on from Minneapolis Henry, will dress Tuesday. Both could be in the lineup this weekend. Shoepck played Junior A hockey last year.

The rest of the defense should feature juniors Kurt Larson and Mike Guentzel, plus sophomores Tom Kellin, Tom Ward and Tom Parenteau.

Senior Jeff Larson and Junior Rick Erdall are the key returnees at center and expected to carry a large portion of the Gopher scoring load this winter. Also skating at center this week are sophomores Pat Micheletti, Scott Knutson and possibly Eric Lempe.

On left wing is junior Tom Rothstein, who had to sit out last year with a knee injury, plus junior Jim Malwitz and sophomores Wally Chapman and Mike Anderson. According to Buetow, Chapman has possibly been the most impressive performer in camp to date.

On the right side are three juniors in Billy Yon, Dave Preuss and Roger Bowe, plus freshman Steve MacSwain who last year led the U.S. Junior A league in scoring.

Buetow was quick to add that the above lineup is subject to a lot of changes as time goes on. "We have a lot of good looking freshmen and men who played on on varsity reserve team last year who are itching to see action, too," Buetow offered. "I'm certain several of them will play soon."

After the Illinois-Chicago series, Minnesota returns home to open defense of its league championship against Denver, Oct. 21-22, and Wisconsin, Oct. 28-29.

GOLDEN GOPHER CAGERS TO OPEN DRILLS

Jim Dutcher will whistle the start of basketball practice for his 1983-84 University of Minnesota cagers Saturday (October 15) as he prepares for his ninth season at the helm of the Golden Gophers.

Press Day activities are slated for Friday, and then on Saturday Dutcher will send his squad through an intra-squad scrimmage....open to the public and with no admission charge....at 4:00 p.m. in Williams Arena.

"We hope that some of the football fans who are in town for our Homecoming game with Wisconsin will come over to see this year's basketball team Saturday afternoon," Dutcher said. "It will give our fans a preview of what's in store this season."

Dutcher plans to divide his squad on the merits of size, experience and talent for Saturday's show. "We will try to get the two squads as even as possible," he explained.

Then next Monday Minnesota will move its practice into high gear as it looks ahead to the November 26 opener against South Dakota State University. Two additional intra-squad scrimmages are on tap for the Golden Gophers before that opener, however, one in Faribault on November 3 and another in Chaska on November 10.

Six lettermen will be on hand for the start of drills this week, and they include four starters off last year's squad which finished 18-11 and qualified for post season play for the fourth consecutive year.

Heading the list will be Jim Petersen, 6-10 senior forward from St. Louis Park, MN, who will serve as captain of the 1983-84 Golden Gophers. Petersen was a member of the NIT All-Star team selected for a tour in the Far East this past summer.

Also returning is Roland Brooks, 6-7 senior forward from Detroit, MI, who started opposite Petersen a year ago after joining the Golden Gophers following a two-year stint in the California junior college circuit.

Tommy Davis, Minnesota's second-leading scorer a year ago and the top outside shooting threat for the Golden Gophers in 1982-83, returns to head UM's talented and experienced guard corps. Davis is a 6-4 junior from Aberdeen, MD.

Teaming with Davis once again will be Marc Wilson, a 6-1 sophomore guard from Baltimore, MD. A year ago Wilson was the third leading scorer on the Minnesota squad, and he was selected to play in the National Sports Festival last summer at Colorado Springs, COLO.

John Shasky, a 7-0 sophomore who played in relief of Randy Breuer a year ago, is the heir apparent at center. Shasky is from Birmingham, MI. Alonzo Skanes, a 6-2 sophomore letterman from Chicago, returns as a solid guard candidate as does Dave Dahlke, a 6-5 sophomore forward from Chaska, MN.

Newcomers include six freshmen: Mike Carpenter, 7-2 center from Knoxville, TN; David Holmgren, 7-0 center from Prior Lake, MN; Gerald Jackson, 6-4 guard from Arlington, VA; Kevin Smith, 6-7 forward from Lansing, MI; Per Tetzlaff, a 6-2 guard from Oslo, Norway; and Paul VanDenEinde, 7-0 center from Willmar, MN.

SADEK TO QUARTERBACK GOPHERS AT NORTHWESTERN

Brett Sadek will start at quarterback for the University of Minnesota on Saturday when Coach Joe Salem's Golden Gophers invade Evanston, IL, to take on the Northwestern University Wildcats at 1:00 p.m.

It will be the first start of Sadek's collegiate career after the 6-2 freshman from Rosemount, MN, got his initial taste of action in the second half of last weekend's loss to Wisconsin.

Salem had planned to redshirt the first-year quarterback, and he had held the promising signal-caller out of action for the first five games of the season. And for the first half of the sixth assignment.

But at the half of the Wisconsin game, Salem changed his mind. "We threw three more interceptions in the first half," Salem pointed out, "and we just weren't getting anything done offensively. We know that Brett is going to be an outstanding quarterback, and we feel that all he needs is experience. So we decided he might as well start getting some against Wisconsin."

In the second half, Sadek attempted 19 passes and completed seven for 116 yards. He had one intercepted, but he also threw a couple of scoring strikes and rushed for eight yards on five carries.

Despite his second-half efforts, Minnesota lost that decision to the Badgers (their 12th straight Big Ten setback and fifth consecutive loss of the '83 campaign) 56-17.

Consequently the Sadek-led Golden Gophers will go into the Northwestern clash on Saturday with an overall record of 1-5 and a Big Ten log of 0-4 which puts them squarely in the conference cellar.

Home-standing Northwestern, meanwhile will come into the Saturday confrontation with a 1-5 overall record....just like Minnesota....but it is 1-3 in the conference after upending Indiana 10-8 earlier this season.

This past weekend the Wildcats fell 35-0 to Michigan and earlier had suffered losses of 34-0 to Washington, 35-0 to Syracuse, 49-0 to Wisconsin and 61-21 to the University of Iowa.

Northwestern falls into that category of another team the University of Minnesota could beat, but Coach Salem admits that if the Golden Gophers don't pull themselves together they will have another tough time of it.

If Salem sounds somewhat discouraged, it could be understandable. He thought Minnesota was ready to play well against Wisconsin, and he felt that the Golden Gophers might be in a position to pull an upset. But he was wrong.

"It was another pathetic performance on our part," he told his squad after the game. "We should be ashamed of the effort we put forth against Wisconsin. It was a game of missed assignments, breakdowns and mental errors. I'm tired of saying the same thing week after week, but if we don't start making the plays when they have to be made we won't ever get any better."

Against the Badgers Minnesota had six penalties for 72 yards. The Golden Gophers had one fumble, and they turned the ball over four times on pass interceptions.

(OVER)

"All of those mistakes seem to come at the worst possible time," Salem said, "so that every time something bad happens, it seems to take us out of a good situation. Against Wisconsin, we had some opportunities, but we just couldn't capitalize on them."

Salem admitted that part of Minnesota's problem is its lack of depth. He knew when the 1983 season started that the Golden Gophers would be young, but now he is forced to play a lot of new people that he had hoped to hold out of action this season.

"We're very, very thin," he admitted, "and the way the injuries are hitting us it just makes us even thinner. But our fans don't want to hear excuses, and we're not using our injuries as alibis."

Latest on that list of casualties are defensive back Craig White and linebacker Steve Gibbons, both of whom underwent knee surgery following injuries in the Wisconsin game. They'll be lost for the remainder of the campaign.

But Salem says the Golden Gophers will show up in Evanston on Saturday, and he says his rookie quarterback will get the starting assignment. "Maybe we can start putting some things together," Salem says. "We know Brett can make things happen."

Minnesota fans hope those things, some good ones for a change, start happening Saturday afternoon against Northwestern.

GOPHER TALES --- Minnesota and Northwestern have met 54 times in football in a series that dates back to 1892. Going into Saturday's game Minnesota, despite losing 31-21 at Evanston a year ago, holds a 39-21-4 edge in the series.

The Golden Gophers had reeled off seven straight wins over Northwestern before falling a year ago. The Wildcats had prevailed 21-13 in 1974 before that Minnesota streak had started.

Salem was not happy that Minnesota did not make the defensive plays "when they had to be made" against Wisconsin and as a result the Golden Gophers gave up 56 more points. In six games Minnesota has allowed 296 points. The most ever surrendered by a Golden Gopher team was 332 in 1974.

Valdez Baylor turned in a better-than-average night against the Badgers last weekend. Although netting only 21 yards on seven rushes, he caught three passes for 60 more yards and two touchdowns.

Kevin Wilson, another freshman pressed into service early, wound up as Minnesota's leading rusher against Wisconsin. He had 46 yards in 16 carries. In the pass receiving department, tight end Jay Carroll had five grabs for 61 yards and wide receiver Fred Hartwig had five for 52.

On the defensive side of things, Peter Najarian led Minnesota again. He had seven solo tackles and six assisted tackles for a total of 13 hits. One of those tackles resulted in a loss of two yards. On the year, Najarian, a junior linebacker, has 42 solo tackles and 46 assists for a total of 88. Four have been for losses of six yards. He also has a fumble recovery to his credit and looms as Minnesota's best bet for post season honors. "He's an All-Big Ten performer," Salem proclaims.

ICERS TAKE 2, HOST DENVER

Minneapolis, MN---So much for exhibitions and non-conference games. Now the real fun begins.

After sweeping two road games from the U. of Illinois-Chicago, 12-2 and 5-1 down in the Windy City, the Minnesota hockey Gophers open defense of their 1982-83 Western Collegiate Hockey Association (WCHA) championship at home this weekend with games Friday and Saturday against the Denver Pioneers.

Both 7:30 contests at Williams Arena (Cap. 7,625) will be aired live by KKSS-AM, 980 in the Twin Cities.

The Gophers scored in five of the six periods against UIC, but when it was all over Minnesota head coach Brad Buetow wasn't certain what his charges had accomplished.

"I really believed Illinois-Chicago would provide a stronger test," Buetow said Monday. "But they played an awful lot of first year men, so based on that I'm simply not certain how strong we are. But we'll find that out in a hurry this weekend against Denver.

"It's always good to get a season off on the right foot. So two wins against the Flames get's us in the right frame of mind. We skated quite well and both goalies, Frank Pietrangelo (peter-AN-gelo) and Mike Vacanti (vah-CAHN-tee), were very solid.

"However, I was disappointed in both team defense and, for the most part, the play of our defensemen. We'll have to shore up considerably on both counts if we expect to challenge for a top spot in the WCHA.

"I was pleased to see three of our rookies score their first collegiate goals. Sophomore Scott Knutson played in only four games last year, so is still considered untried. He and freshmen Steve MacSwain and Gary Shopek each scored a goal. But we expect a lot more from each of them.

"As to this weekend, well, I believe at least three men who did not make the trip to Chicago will play against Denver. Freshmen forwards Steve Orth (St. Cloud) and Todd Okerlund (Burnsville) plus junior defenseman Tom Parenteau (North St. Paul) should play at least one game. All three have looked good in camp and in the varsity reserve game played last week.

"As for Denver, I'm always very concerned about their teams. They beat us twice last year during the stretch drive. Both were key losses that made us go right down to the wire before winning the WCHA championship.

"And even though they lost two key players to the Olympics the same as us, defensemen Craig Redmond and Kevin Dineen, they had a good recruiting year and are always a fast skating team. The latter fact makes them even better when they skate on the large ice sheet at Williams Arena.

"Denver goalie Pat Tierney worries me, too. Being a local lad from Edina, he always plays his best against us. And you know what can happen whenever you run into a hot goaltender.

"We'll probably rotate (Frank) Pietrangelo and (Mike) Vacanti again this weekend, but as of now I'm not certain who will play the first game."

ROTHSTEIN RETURNS TO FORM

Tom Rothstein, junior wing and co-captain from Grand Rapids, returned to the scoring form that won him rookie of the year honors as a freshman. After sitting out last year following knee surgery, Rothstein came back to score a goal and five assists against Illinois-Chicago. Five Gophers scored two goals apiece. Minnesota connected on four of nine power play chances, and gave up just one goal in 11 extra-man opportunities to the Flames.

GOLDEN GOPHERS FACE ANOTHER TOUGH ROAD ASSIGNMENT

For the second week in a row, the University of Minnesota faces the unenviable task of playing on the road....this time taking on Michigan State University in a 1:00 p.m. Big Ten Conference football assignment in East Lansing on Saturday.

Coach Joe Salem's battered Golden Gophers fell on the road 19-8 at Northwestern this past weekend. It was Minnesota's sixth straight loss this season, fifth straight Big Ten setback of 1983 and ran the Golden Gophers' conference losing streak to 13.

"It was another disappointing loss for us," Salem lamented, "and it seemed like the same old story. Mistakes killed us. We continued to be a self-destruct football team."

In the Northwestern loss, a bad center snap went over punter Paul Blanchard's head and through the endzone for a safety. Another Blanchard attempt was blocked to set up one Wildcat score, and a fumbled Northwestern punt gave the host club great field position for another tally.

"Our special teams let us down," Salem said. "We missed a field goal attempt, we let them return one of our kicks for a touchdown and we made every mistake possible on our own punting situations."

Take out those errors, and Minnesota's effort wasn't a bad one. "Our defense did a pretty good job," Salem proclaimed. "It was a shame we had to lose, because the defense played well enough to win. If our entire team effort would have been as good as the one we got from the defense, we would have come out of Evanston with a win."

So now how does Salem get his squad ready to invade East Lansing where Minnesota has not won since 1976? In fact, how does he get the Golden Gophers ready to face a team that it has lost to six straight times?

"We're a very young team," Salem points out, "and young teams make mistakes. We started seven freshmen at Northwestern, and freshmen need time to mature. With a young team, the one thing you have to strive for is improvement, and I feel that we are improving."

Is Minnesota improving enough to hope for a win over the Spartans? "We had terrible field position all day long against Northwestern," Salem pointed out, "and if we can find a way to correct that situation we would put ourselves in a much better situation against any opponent."

Were there any bright spots against the Wildcats, any areas that might give Golden Gopher fans hope against Michigan State this weekend? Peter Najarian again led Minnesota's defense, this time with 16 tackles, from his middle line-backing position, and he remains one of the Big Ten's premier players at that spot.

Jay Carroll caught seven passes from his tight end post and led Minnesota with 84 yards receiving. He, too, looms as one of the Big Ten's best. And the same holds true for offensive center and captain Randy Rasmussen who continues to anchor an offensive line that has been one of the solid parts of the game for the Golden Gophers throughout 1983.

Griak calls this year's squad the most inexperienced in his 21 years as head coach. "We do not have the personnel with experience to move up and pick up the slack," Griak said.

The unseasoned cast includes junior Dan Thole, sophomores Dave Duvick, Brian Schmidt, Balise Schweitzer, and freshman Paul Gisselquist and Robert Miller.

Kromer and Gisselquist rank as the team's top performers to date.

ICERS SWEEP DU, HOST BADGERS

Minneapolis, MN---A pair of home wins to open defense of its 1982-83 WCHA title was nice for the Minnesota hockey Gophers. But the enjoyment may not last long.

After sweeping Denver 7-2 and 8-4 at Williams Arena last weekend, Minnesota plays host to defending NCAA champion Wisconsin Friday and Saturday at Williams Arena. Both games have a 7:35 p.m. CDT starting time.

Wisconsin got off on the wrong foot losing a pair of defensive struggles to North Dakota at Madison, 5-2 and 3-2, even though the Badgers outshot the Sioux both nights. So Minnesota had best be prepared.

"Let's not forget that Wisconsin got off to a slow start last season, but came on to be the best in the nation at the end of the year," Gopher head coach Brad Buetow said Monday. "I believe they lost only once in their last 15 games.

"I believe we exhibited more good than bad last weekend, but to take on Wisconsin we'll have to jack it up a notch in every department, particularly on defense.

"True, they lost some offensive power to graduation and the Olympics, but Wisconsin still has some potent forwards and defensemen who can take it to any team. We are in for, as usual, a tough, tough series with them this weekend."

The Gophers came through healthy against Denver and Buetow had the chance to look at a lot of different people and lineup combinations.

"I believe we'll probably stay pretty close to the same lineup we used last weekend," Buetow continued. "This includes our goal tenders. Frank Pietrangelo and Mike Vacanti both played solid, steady hockey. We'll probably use the same rotation, too, with Pietrangelo starting Friday.

"I was most pleased with the performance of several players up from last year's JV team, including Wally Chapman, Scott Knutson and Roger Bowe. All three handled themselves well up front.

"In addition we got the chance to see some newcomers in action, too. I considered the play of freshmen Steve Orth, Todd Okerlund and Craig Mack to be better than expected for their first time out.

"Now this is not to say we do not have any problems. But I can say I was proud of the way our men appeared to get stronger as the game went on. We controlled much of each third period, and this gives a plus to our conditioning program."

Chapman led the Gophers with three goals on the weekend, including two in Saturday's 8-4 decision. His second score was a brilliant solo dash from center ice. Co-captains Jeff Larson and Tom Rothstein added two goals each. On the weekend, 11 different Gophers scored at least one goal. Larson and Rothstein each added three assists to give them a team-leading five points.

Pietrangelo played Friday and allowed two goals while stopping 27 shots. Vacanti allowed two late goals on Saturday after the outcome was decided, and also came up with several spectacular saves on Denver breaks. He had 32 stops. The Gophers outshot Denver 81-65 for the weekend.

Minnesota's defense allowed Denver but one power play goal in eight tries while Minnesota connected on three of eight chances.

GOLDEN GOPHERS WARNED TO "GET READY" FOR ILLINOIS

A subtle warning has been issued by Head Coach Joe Salem to his University of Minnesota football team as it heads into the final three weeks of the 1983 season "Suck it up."

After the Golden Gophers dropped a 34-10 Big Ten Conference decision at Michigan State last weekend, Salem warned his club that the next three assignments would be a lot tougher than the last three.

And that means that Saturday when the Golden Gophers entertain red-hot Illinois at 7 p.m. in the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome, they can expect to have their hands full.

"Illinois will come into our place flying high and headed for the Rose Bowl after beating Michigan 16-6," Salem told his weary charges. "They will show no mercy."

Salem also pointed out that it won't get any easier after the Illini shootout. "All three teams that we must face," he said (Michigan next week and Iowa in the '83 finale) will be fighting for bowl games and at the top of their games. It's a tough road from here on out, and we just better be ready."

That "tough road" assignment gets its start when the Fighting Illini invade the Metrodome Saturday night with an overall record of 7-1 and a Big Ten log of 6-0 as well as sole possession of first place in the conference standings with just three games to go.

Home-standing Minnesota, meanwhile, is at the bottom of the Big Ten ladder with a league mark of 0-6 and an overall record of 1-7. The Golden Gophers' only victory of the season came over Rice in the '83 opener.

Minnesota's most-recent setback at Michigan State was another bitter pill to swallow for Salem and his snake-bit Golden Gophers who once again destroyed themselves with mistakes.

"Sure, we made mistakes on offense that prevented us from showing any kind of consistency," Salem admitted. "We had lousy field position throughout the game, and every time we seemed to get something going, we would throw an interception."

Despite Minnesota's ineptness on offense against the Spartans, it was the Golden Gophers' kicking game that proved to be the downfall for a team which now has lost 14 straight Big Ten games.

"For the second straight week the play of our special teams was a major factor in the outcome of the game," Salem said after Paul Blanchard had two more punts blocked. "We gave them 10 points on those blocked kicks. Michigan State didn't do anything we weren't expecting, and we had practiced against that kind of rush all week. We just didn't execute."

Minnesota and Michigan State were deadlocked 7-7 when the Spartans blocked Blanchard's first attempt, and it led to a home-team field goal and a 10-7 MSU margin. Moments later they got another block and it gave Michigan State possession of the ball on the Minnesota two.....from here it scored in one play and led to a 17-10 halftime advantage.

"Those plays really killed us," Salem said. "In general we played decently on defense, and we had one tremendous goal line stand. But overall Michigan State outplayed us. They made the big plays when they had to, and it is as simple as that."

So once again downtrodden Minnesota is in a position where it will be facing a highly-favored opponent, perhaps the toughest opponent since Nebraska invaded the Metrodome the second week of the 1983 season.

How can the Golden Gophers get ready? How can they "suck it up" as Salem has urged them in order to be ready for the "stretch drive" of the rapidly concluding '83 season.

"I told our squad after the Michigan State game," Salem explained, "that we must look at ourselves. I said that each player has to examine himself as an individual. This is a young team, and the only thing that can be asked of an inexperienced team is that it improve each week. That improvement has to come from individuals. So I told our players again that they have to improve with every effort. That includes this week getting ready for Illinois."

GOPHER TALES --- Minnesota and Illinois have met in football 44 times since the series got its start in 1898. Although the Illini have won the two most-recent meetings (including 42-24 right here in the Metrodome a year ago), Minnesota leads 24-18-2.

Last year's setback to the Fighting Illini was the beginning of the end for Minnesota. The Golden Gophers had breezed to three impressive wins over Ohio, Purdue and Washington State before hosting Illinois. Minnesota led 24-20 after three periods, but on the first play of the fourth quarter, quarterback Tony Eason threw an 80-yard touchdown pass and the visitors went on to outscore the Golden Gophers by 22-0 in the final stanza. It has been downhill ever since.

Injuries continue to plague Salem as he prepares for Illinois. Tony Hunter went down against Michigan State, and might not be available. Defensive stand-out Peter Najarian severely strained a knee late in the game (after being given credit for 14 more tackles) and could be lost for the rest of the year.

Craig Graffunder, 6-4, 240-pound junior defensive lineman from Fridley, MN, got the first touchdown of this collegiate career at Michigan State when he gathered in a deflected Spartan pass and rambled 45 yards into the endzone. It gave Minnesota an early 7-0 lead.

Salem used both Brett Sadek (he started) and Greg Murphy at quarterback against Michigan State. "We put Murphy in at the end of the first half because we felt he was better prepared to run the two-minute offense," Salem explained. "Then we just went with him in the second half hoping that his experience would help us get something going."

In the passing department, Sadek was nine of 19 for 67 yards with no interceptions while Murphy was nine of 20 for 92 yards and three interceptions. Jay Carroll again led Minnesota's receivers with five grabs for 51 yards.

SALEM RESIGNS AS FOOTBALL COACH AT U OF M

Joe Salem announced today (Tuesday) that he has resigned, effective at the completion of the 1983 season, his position as head football coach at the University of Minnesota.

Although Salem had one year remaining on his current contract, he apparently felt that with his Golden Gophers winning only one of seven games this season it would be better for the Minnesota football program if he stepped down.

"It was a difficult decision for me to make," Salem said. "I don't like quitting, and I don't like admitting that I didn't get the job done at Minnesota. But I'm a Golden Gopher, and I'm loyal to the University. I feel that it would be better for everyone involved if I resigned now."

Paul Giel, director of athletics at Minnesota, indicated his dismay over the current situation. "I have great respect for Joe Salem as a person and as a coach," Giel said, "and I'm truly sorry he didn't have greater success at Minnesota. He gave us some great memories in his five years here, and there were times, like in 1981 when he beat Ohio State 35-31, that we all thought we had the program on the right track. I'm just sorry that things did not work out."

Giel also said that he would begin immediately to look for Salem's successor. "We'll appoint a search committee right away," Giel said. "We want to move as soon as possible in search of a replacement so there is no great interruption in our recruiting program."

Salem indicated that he did not have any definite plans for the future although he did admit that he was a candidate for the position of athletic director at Northern Arizona and that he did have the option of remaining on the University of Minnesota staff as an assistant to Giel.

Currently in his fifth season as head coach at Minnesota, Salem posted records of 4-6-1, 5-6, 6-5 and 3-8 prior to 1983. This year, after beating Rice in the opener, Minnesota has lost six straight and is scheduled to meet Michigan State Saturday before closing against Illinois, Michigan and Iowa...the Big Ten's top three teams.

Before coming back to his alma mater as head coach in 1979, Salem had spent nine seasons as head coach at South Dakota (52-38-2) and four more at Northern Arizona (26-17-0). His career record, going into the Michigan State game Saturday, is 98-86-3, and his Minnesota record is 18-31-1. --UM--

COMMITTEE TO RECOMMEND SALEM'S
REPLACEMENT BY DECEMBER 1

A 10-member search committee has been asked to recommend by December 1 "respected, first-class prospects" to replace University of Minnesota football coach Joe Salem, who resigned Tuesday (Oct. 25).

"There are those who say that it is impossible to have a winning program without cheating or, one way or another, bending or breaking the rules," university President C. Peter Magrath said in announcing the formation of the committee Friday. "I regard that kind of 'winning' as losing."

In a letter to student affairs vice president Frank Wilderson, who will chair the committee, Magrath outlined the major qualities he wants in the new head coach: the commitment to run a "clean" program and the commitment "to care about players as students who can earn their degrees on time."

The committee should not limit itself to considering only those who apply or who are nominated, but should look at all "respected, first-class prospects whom we might persuade to join us," Magrath said. The committee is to interview candidates and then recommend at least five to Paul Giel, director of men's intercollegiate athletics, by December 1.

The other committee members are: Merrily Dean Baker, director of women's intercollegiate athletics at the university; Robert Stein, dean of the university's Law School and faculty representative to the Big Ten; Lillian Williams, director of the university's office of Equal Opportunity and Affirmative Action; Alan Page, lawyer and former football player for the Minnesota Vikings and the Chicago Bears; Billy Bye, football commentator and former university football player; Mike Wright, president of Super Valu, former university football player and member of the University of Minnesota Foundation; Jim Anderson, president of the Minnesota Student Association and member of the Assembly Committee on Intercollegiate Athletics; and Bob Stein, president of the "M" Club and former university football player.

ICERS REMAIN TIED, HEAD FOR DULUTH

Minneapolis, MN---For the first time this season, Minnesota's hockey Gophers will not enjoy the comfortable ice of Williams Arena for a WCHA game.

After remaining tied for first place with North Dakota, each 4-0-0, following a home sweep against Wisconsin (5-3, 7-6), Minnesota heads north to play in-state rival Minnesota-Duluth Friday and Saturday. Both games will be aired by KKSS-980 AM radio and WFBT-TV Ch. 29. Friday's game is set for 8:05 p.m. with Saturday's starting at 7:35.

A sweep by the Duluth Bulldogs would tie the Port City team with Minnesota in the WCHA standings. UM-D is in third place at 2-2-0 following road losses last weekend at North Dakota (6-4, 7-2). In past years Minnesota-Duluth has won more than its share of home outings against Gopher clubs.

"Going up there to play is never an easy task for us," Gopher head coach Brad Buetow said Monday. "It sometime seems their entire season is based on games against us. But we play there every year so there is no getting around it. I'm just glad we only go up to Duluth once this season.

"Coach Mike Sertich had an exceptional recruiting year and will more than be ready to meet us head on. They also may have their new goal tender, Rick Kostic, available. He had to sit out his school's first five games after making some appearances in Tier I Junior A hockey in Canada. But Jon Downing has played very well in goal for Duluth in the first four games.

"As far as we are concerned it was great to gain four points last weekend. I look upon that series as a confidence and character builder for the men on our club.

"We had to ride some super goal tending by Frank Pietrangelo to win Friday, and then hold on late to take the next game. I believe Pietrangelo and Pat Micheletti, another sophomore, are coming of age.

"I was very pleased to see Micheletti gain WCHA player of the week honors for his contributions. The fact that he scored five goals, including the game winner both nights, certainly had a lot to do with our winning twice.

"But I believe I can speak for both myself and Wisconsin coach Jeff Sauer when I say that was not a coaches' series. Those were exciting games for the fans, but not a sound defensive series by any means. And that is the area we must shore up.

"We can't expect our goal tenders to carry us every night. Our entire team defensive concept must improve if we expect to challenge in this league."

Buetow said Monday he may have to keep Micheletti at center if the knee bruise suffered by freshman Steve Orth does not come around. Micheletti was originally slated for duty at right wing.

The coach added he will probably remain with pretty much the same lineup that skated last Saturday against Wisconsin.

Micheletti scored two goals Friday against the Badgers, then came back with his first career hat trick Saturday. His last goal broke a 6-6 tie with about half the third period remaining. He also added an assist and is now fourth in WCHA scoring with eight points (6-2).

Junior co-captain and left wing Tom Rothstein is tied for the league scoring lead with Denver wing Ian Ramsay at 10 points apiece. Rothstein, who had two goals and three assists against Wisconsin, is 6-4 in four league games. Ramsay tied a WCHA single game record Friday against Colorado College when he racked up six assists. He had eight assists for the weekend and is now 1-9.

In all games played this season (six), Rothstein leads his teammates in scoring with 16 points (5-11). Micheletti is next at 13 (8-5) while junior center Rick Erdall is third at 11 (5-6). Erdall chipped in with two goals and two assists against Wisconsin.

In Friday's 5-3 Gopher win, the line of Rothstein, Orth and another freshman, right wing Todd Okerlund, accounted for three goals and four assists.

GOLDEN GOPHERS CLOSE 1983 HOME FOOTBALL SEASON

It's time to bring down the curtain on the 1983 home football season, and that's exactly what the University of Minnesota will do Saturday when entertaining Michigan in a Big Ten Conference assignment in the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome at 7:00 p.m.

That event also will mark the final appearance in the Metrodome for Joe Salem as coach of the Golden Gophers. Salem has tendered his resignation at Minnesota effective at the end of the current campaign.

Minnesota will go into Saturday's confrontation with the Wolverines seeking the Little Brown Jug, a "prized piece of crockery" which has not been in the possession of the Golden Gophers since they won 16-0 in 1977.

The host contingent also will be seeking its initial Big Ten triumph of the season after it fell 50-23 to first-place and Rose Bowl bound Illinois in the Metrodome last weekend.

"It was a shame that Illinois got those last 16 points in the fourth quarter," Salem said. "The game was much closer than the final score, and we played much better than that score indicates. We deserved something better."

Minnesota, although falling behind 10-0 in the first period as a result of a couple of fumbles, played well through the middle half of the game. The Golden Gophers had pulled to within 20-7 by halftime, and they trailed only 34-23 after three periods when outscoring the powerful Illini 16-14 in the third stanza.

"Our people went out and played hard against a very good Illinois team," Salem proclaimed. "Illinois is a super club. It will represent the Big Ten well in the Rose Bowl. But we played them very tough. We played well."

"Just like Illinois," Salem pointed out, "Michigan (as well as Iowa next week in the 1983 finale at Iowa City) is headed for a post season bowl game. It will be out to do as well as possible and land an invitation to the best bowl game it can. It all means we'll be in for another tough one."

Michigan dropped a disappointing decision to Illinois two weeks ago to put the Fighting Illini in the drivers' seat for the Rose Bowl special. Some prognosticators figured that might mean Bo Schembechler's Michigan contingent could be in for a letdown against the Boilermakers last Saturday. That wasn't the case as the Wolverines turned in a standout effort and built up a 35-3 half-time lead before coasting to the win.

When the Wolves lost to the Illini, Coach Schembechler pointed to Michigan quarterback Steve Smith's sore shoulder as the reason. Against Purdue, Smith apparently was healthy.

"I thought Smith was good (he passed for four touchdowns against the Boilers!)" Schembechler was quoted as saying after last Saturday's game. "His arm felt the best this week that it has all season. He had more zip on the ball. It helped his confidence. Smith was outstanding."

And that (a healthy and confident Smith) spells even more trouble for Minnesota. Against Illinois, the Golden Gopher defense shut down the powerful Illini ground game with just 34 yards. But quarterback Jack Trudeau, forced to the air, hit 25 of 38 passing attempts for 342 yards and three touchdowns. It was enough to subdue the gutty Gophers.

So what's in store for Minnesota in its home finale at the Metrodome Saturday night? "Our kids haven't quit all year," Coach Salem has said many times, "and we wouldn't expect them to quit now." Hopefully that kind of courageous effort will give invading Michigan trouble.

GOPHER TALES --- Injuries continue to plague Salem. He lost some more starters against Illinois, and at least two of them...maybe more...will not return this season.

Jay Carroll, Minnesota senior tight end who has been the top Golden Gopher receiver all season long, suffered a shoulder separation and is shelved for the final two games. The same holds true for David Puk, sophomore fullback and leading ground gainer.

Brett Sadek was injured early in the fourth quarter of the Illinois game (contusion of his left shoulder), but he hopes to be ready to play against Michigan.

"I felt that Brett really came of age against Illinois," Salem said. "People started to see some signs of what he really can do. Give Brett a couple of years and he will be an outstanding quarterback. He still needs more experience, and he needs to learn how to read defenses better, but he demonstrated against Illinois that he really can wing the ball."

It obviously was Sadek's best performance of the season after taking over the number one quarterback spot in the second half of the Wisconsin game. Against Illinois, Sadek hit 17 of 24 passing attempts (with NO interceptions) for 197 yards and three touchdowns.

Minnesota and Michigan have met 73 times in a series dating back to 1892. Coming into Saturday's meeting, the Wolverines hold a commanding 48-22-3 edge in the series. In addition, Michigan has won five straight including a 52-14 decision last year in Ann Arbor.

Malcolm Nelson, making his first start for the Golden Gophers, finished as Minnesota's top ground gainer against the Illini. A freshman, Nelson had 69 yards in 17 carries.

Darryl Castle, a senior wide-receiver, got his initial chance to return kicks against Illinois and he responded with 149 yards in four tries....the longest being for 58 yards.

Adam Kelly, a walk-on sophomore, got his first test as a punter for Minnesota, and he averaged 42.5 yards on four tries. His longest went for 55 yards.

ICERS SKATE AT WISCONSIN

Minneapolis, MN---The Minnesota hockey Gophers "escaped" with three points from the series at Minnesota-Duluth last weekend, but may not be so fortunate this weekend with two games scheduled at Madison, WI, Friday and Saturday.

Playing well below expectations, the Gophers rallied from a 4-0 deficit to win 5-4 in overtime last Friday at Duluth, then lost a 3-0 lead and tied 3-3 in OT the next night.

Two weeks ago Minnesota won a pair of tight games at home from Wisconsin, 5-3 and 7-6. But this time will be different. Wisconsin was winless in league play at the time.

Now the Badgers have broken through winning a road pair at Denver last weekend, 6-4 and 7-4, and jumped from last to fourth place in the early standings.

"There is little question that if we play like we did last weekend we'll be in a ton of trouble at Wisconsin," head coach Brad Buetow said Monday.

"Now I'm not taking anything away from Minnesota-Duluth. Hey, they have a darned good, young club, one that's going to get nothing but better. But honestly, we did not play well up there.

"It was simply a case of our getting a few good chances and taking advantage of anything they gave us. Then we sat back and let goalies Frank Pietrangelo and Mike Vacanti do the rest of the work. If they had not turned in another weekend of excellent play, we may have come out of there with no points.

"Hopefully we can learn from the experience. There was a lack of intensity in our team defense."

And speaking of defense, more troubles came up for Buetow here over the weekend. It's questionable at this point whether sophomore Tony Kellin will be ready for the Badger series. Kellin suffered a hip pointer Friday and did play Saturday at Duluth. Freshman Craig Mack skated in his place.

"As far as Wisconsin is concerned, those wins at Denver have to be a big confidence builder for their club," Buetow continued. "They showed us when they played at our rink they can play with anyone. Coach Jim Dutcher will put his University of Minnesota cagers through their final 1983-84 pre-season on-the-road tuneup Thursday at 7:30 p.m. in the Chaska Senior High School Gymnasium.

The Golden Gophers put their wares on display last week at Faribault where senior captain Jim Petersen led the way with 35 points and 11 rebounds as Dutcher stepped up preparations for this year's season opener.

Minnesota will tip off the '83-'84 campaign on Saturday, November 26 when playing host to South Dakota State University at 8:00 p.m. in Williams Arena. The Golden Gophers open Big Ten Conference play January 5 at Illinois.

Although Minnesota returns four starters from last year's club which posted an 13-11 record, Dutcher maintains that his club will enter the upcoming campaign with a great deal of uncertainty.

"We'll start off with more questions than we have answers," he maintains. "We lost our top scorer and rebounder in Randy Breuer, and we will have to find a replacement for him at center."

Topping the list of candidates for Breuer's vacated spot is 7-0 sophomore John Shasky who had 21 points last Thursday at Faribault. Other hopefuls are 7-2 Mike Carpenter, 7-0 David Holmgren and 7-0 Paul Van Den Einde. All three are freshmen.

"We also need to have Petersen and Roland Brooks demonstrate that they are consistent Big Ten forwards," Dutcher says. "Without Breuer inside, we will have to get more scoring and more rebounding from our forwards. We hope Petersen and Roland can do that for us."

Also in the picture at forward is Dave Dahlke, a 6-6 sophomore from Chaska who will strive Thursday night to show his hometown fans that he's ready to contribute to the Golden Gopher basketball scene after being sidelined much of his freshman season with mononucleosis. Kevin Smith, a 6-7 freshman, has indicated that he also may be ready to contribute at the forward spot.

In the backcourt, Dutcher could wind up with the best guard duo in the Big Ten. Tommy Davis, a 6-4 junior, and Marc Wilson, a 6-1 guard, both were starters a year ago (they were second and third in scoring for Minnesota last season) and should be even better this time out of the blocks.

Add Alonzo Skanes, a 6-2 sophomore letterman, to that picture along with two more newcomers....6-4 Gerald Jackson and 6-2 Per Tetzlaff....and the Gopher cage scene could become golden.

Following Thursday night's affair in Chaska, Dutcher will put his charges through their paces in intra-squad workouts....open to the public....on Saturday, November 12 and on Saturday, November 19 at 10 a.m. in Williams Arena.

Inexperience is expected to play a crucial role in the team's fortunes in 1983-84. Freshmen could compete at half the weights for the squad that returns eight lettermen and lost four.

"This is the youngest team I've ever had," Head Coach Wally Johnson said entering his 32nd season at Minnesota. "The main thing is to get a lot of young freshmen ready to wrestle at the varsity level."

Johnson lost 167-pound Jim Trudeau, a two-time Big Ten champion, and heavyweight Evan Bernstein, who is serving as an assistant coach this season. Also lost is 158-pound Darrell Gholar, a three year letterman who is being red-shirted following ankle surgery.

This season's team is headed by 177-pound All-America candidate Mike Foy. The senior co-captain compiled a 23-5 record last season with 18 pins.

"Foy can be as good as any wrestler in the country," Johnson said. "He's an exciting wrestler, but must be more consistent."

The rest of the veteran corps includes Steve Martinez, Al Jenson and Ed Giese, Martinez is a 158-pound senior co-captain who was 24-12 last season. Jenson, also a senior co-captain, was 20-10 at heavyweight last season. Giese is a junior 118-pounder who registered a 33-9 record last season.

"Martinez is as tough as they come," Johnson said. "Giese could go all the way and Jenson is a consistent competitor."

Senior Chris Terrell provides depth at 118, while freshmen Blake Bonjean and Bruce Beghart will battle with junior Todd Guse for a spot at 126.

Junior two-year letterman Scott Hanna is slated at 134 with freshman Jerry Pritchett in the wings. Junior Jeff Anhut and freshman Greg Nelson are 142 pound candidates, while senior Mike Holmes and freshman Eugene Green top the list of reserves at 150.

Junior Greg Evans, who red-shirted last season with a knee injury, returns at 158. Sophomore Eric Lehrke and freshman Darren Knight are also in the picture.

Freshman Rod Sande takes over for Trudeau at 167 and could be a key this season.

Freshmen Dennis Moore and junior Paul Webster join Foy at 177. All three could compete at 190 along with freshman Mark Ferrin.

Senior John Wood, a three-year football letterman, and freshman Bryan Holmes are heavyweights.

In the Johnson tradition, the schedule is among the toughest in the country. Iowa, Northern Iowa and Mankato State join Minnesota in next Saturday's Gopher Quadrangular and Iowa returns for the "Wrestling Showcase" on January 21. The team travels to competitions in Arizona, Colorado and Wyoming in addition to stops at Northwestern's Midlands and Las Vegas' Caesars Palace Invitational.

The schedule is brutally tough," Johnson said, "but that is the only way to improve."

GOLDEN GOPHERS CONCLUDE 1983 GRID SEASON AT IOWA SATURDAY

Minnesota concludes its 1983 football season on Saturday when invading Iowa City to take on the University of Iowa Hawkeyes in a 1 p.m. Big Ten Conference assignment.

It will be Joe Salem's final game as head coach of the Golden Gophers, and the end of the current campaign might seem merciful as Minnesota will go into that Iowa contest seeking its first Big Ten win of the year.

The Golden Gophers are 1-9 on the season and 0-8 in conference play....their only victory a non-loop affair over Rice in the '83 opener. On top of that, Minnesota has lost 16 straight Big Ten games and is 1-17 in its last 18 outings.

Iowa, meanwhile, will bring an impressive overall record of 8-2 into Saturday's finale. It is 6-2 in the Big Ten and shooting for its third straight post-season bowl assignment.

Does all of that add up to another tough afternoon for the Golden Gophers? If it doesn't, then Salem's warning to the University of Minnesota football team should be the convincer.

"I told our squad after the Michigan game that they better start getting ready for Iowa right away," he revealed. "I said that they better be prepared to strap on their helmets, that if they had never been to Iowa City.... especially the freshmen....that they were going to experience something they had never seen before."

Does that sound ominous? "I have great respect for the Iowa football team," Salem said. "I have great respect for the success that their program has achieved, and I have great respect for the loyal Iowa fans. But I told our players that there is no rivalry in America to match this one, there is no place in the world to play a game like Iowa City. I said they better be ready."

Injury-wise, Minnesota came out of the 58-10 loss to Michigan better than Salem might have dared hope. While Craig Graffunder suffered a deep thigh bruise and might not be available, the remainder of Minnesota's two-deep....as it was listed for the Wolverines....could be the same.

But that was the only thing unscathed by Michigan. "On the night we played them," Salem analyzed, "Michigan might have been the best team we faced all year. Nebraska was totally awesome offensively, but Michigan had such great quickness and speed on defense that we just could not handle them. They were in our offensive backfield all night, and we just couldn't get anything going."

Can the Golden Gophers get anything going in their finale at Iowa? "They've got a heck-of-a ball club," Salem admitted, "and we'll go down there short-handed and banged up and inexperienced. That doesn't give us much hope. But our people haven't quit all year, and I don't expect them to quit at Iowa City. And they know I'd give almost anything to beat the Hawks."

THREE PREP CAGERS SIGN TENDERS WITH MINNESOTA

Three highly-touted high school seniors have signed national letters of intent to attend the University of Minnesota next year and play basketball for Coach Jim Dutcher's Golden Gophers.

First to sign was George Williams, a talented student-athlete at Skyline High School in Oakland, CA. A 6-8 forward, Williams was regarded as one of the premier performers in California prep cage circles.

"Williams is a classic player," Dutcher said. "He has all the physical tools. He is quick for his size, has the ability to jump well and is a tremendous outside shooter."

Elmer Robinson, one of the top high school players in Illinois, also signed with the University of Minnesota. A former all-state football player who gave up that sport to concentrate on basketball this year at Lyon Township High School in LaGrange, IL, Robinson is a 6-5 cager who can swing between guard and forward.

"Robinson has tremendous athletic ability," Dutcher said. "He's just a very gifted athlete and is developing into an outstanding offensive basketball player. He's done well in several summer basketball camps and was selected to McDonald's Prep All-America Camp."

The final signee during this year's early signing period was Mitchell Lee from American High School in Carol City, FL, a prep senior who is regarded as the top college prospect in Florida this year.

A 6-8, 212-pound forward, Lee has been tabbed as a sure-fire college prospect. "He has a solid reputation as a defensive player and as a shot-blocker," Dutcher said. "We feel he can come in and help us right away."

Williams, now in his third season at Skyline High School, averaged 16.3 points and 9.4 rebounds a game last year while shooting 64% from the field. His best efforts as a junior were 38 points against rival Dublin and 18 rebounds vs. Freemont.

Robinson posted a 19 point scoring average at Lyon Township High School a year ago. He also averaged 7.1 rebounds a game for a team that finished 25-4 and was ranked among the top three clubs in Illinois.

Lee averaged 17 points, 18 rebounds and seven blocked shots a game during his junior season at American High School. He dished out an average of four assists per assignment when leading American to a 24-8 season and the semi-finals of the Florida high school tournament.

"We are very pleased that these three high school student-athletes selected the University of Minnesota," Dutcher said. "They are promising players with good ability, and we feel that they can develop into quality players in the Big Ten."

ICERS HOST #1 NORTH DAKOTA

Minneapolis, MN---A week ago the WCHA series scheduled this weekend at Williams Arena between Minnesota and North Dakota appeared to be the biggest thing since packaged bread.

But after what happened last weekend, it now appears more like a test of survival for the Minnesota hockey Gophers.

Going into its series at Wisconsin only one point behind North Dakota, and with a six-point buldge on third place Minnesota-Duluth, the Gophers are suddenly looking up with the rest of the pack at the surging North Dakota Sioux.

While UND was sweeping Denver at home, 9-0 and 4-3 in overtime, Minnesota was suffering the same fate in its series at Madison.

On Friday Gopher goalie Frank Pietrangelo's super play was still not enough as Minnesota lost 3-1, the last goal coming into an empty net when the UND goalie was pulled for an extra attacker in the final minute.

Then came Saturday. Trailing only 1-0 after the first period, the Gophers then saw Wisconsin bang home four goals in the second period, and add a whopping five more in the final stanza to take a crushing 9-0 decision.

So now North Dakota leads Minnesota by five points, 16-11, with a perfect 8-0-0 WCHA record. The Gophers are 5-2-1, only three points ahead of surging Wisconsin. The Badgers are 4-4-0 for eight points having won their last four games.

"I guess all you can say is that it was one of those games, the kind you dread but know are going to happen every once in awhile," says Gopher ice boss Brad Duetow. "Minnesota had not lost two games at Wisconsin since November, 1977, six years ago. So we felt good about going down there.

"But give Wisconsin credit. They played excellent hockey and their goal tender (Gary Baxter) was awfully strong.

"I do not believe we played anywhere near our potential. Now if we expect to stay in the race, we have to pick it back up right away. North Dakota is simply playing superb hockey. When their goalie Jon Casey is on, they are almost impossible to beat.

"But we've faced tough odds before and will again, so it's simply up to us to bounce back and play the type of hockey we know best, skating and checking."

ERDALL OUT

Possibly more disastrous than the twin losses at Wisconsin is the loss of junior center Rick Erdall (Minneapolis Washburn) for up to three or four weeks. Erdall, possibly Minnesota's most consistent inside scoring threat, was injured in Friday's game and did not play Saturday at Madison.

A preliminary diagnosis showed stretched knee ligaments, but no surgery is predicted. Erdall had scored 12 points in nine games on five goals and seven assists. His point total is third highest on the Gopher varsity.

As of today it is not known who will replace Erdall, but look for sophomore center Scott Knutson from Marroad High School to get a full turn.

CROSS COUNTRY TEAM CONCLUDES SEASON

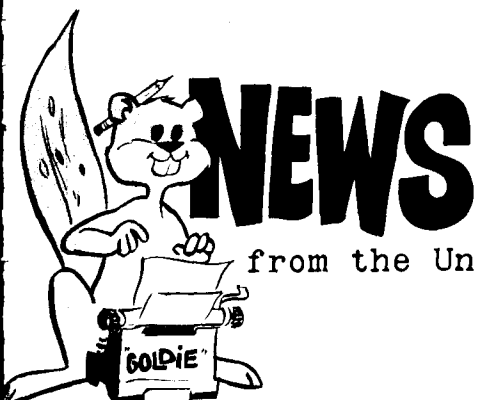
The University of Minnesota cross country team ended its season last Saturday in the 10,000-meter NCAA District IV meet at East Lansing, Michigan.

MINNESOTA CAGERS OPEN 1983-84 SEASON SATURDAY

Jim Dutcher, head basketball coach at the University of Minnesota, tips off his ninth season with the Golden Gophers Saturday at 8 p.m. by sending his 1983-84 charges into Williams Arena to entertain South Dakota State University.

Minnesota enters the current campaign with a squad that some feel has good potential...but Dutcher tempers that optimism by maintaining that the Golden Gophers currently are an uncertain commodity.

"We go into the year with more questions than answers," Dutcher maintains. "We know we lost our leading scorer and rebounder from the last two years in Randy Breuer, and we don't know if we can adequately replace him. We also know that we have strength, experience and maybe even depth at guard. But we don't know if we will get consistent Big Ten level play from our forwards."

For the South Dakota State assignment Saturday night, Dutcher has indicated that he will open with John Shasky, a 7-0 sophomore letterman at center. "Shasky played in back of Breuer a year ago," Dutcher said, "and we still don't know what to expect from him. If we get an average of 10 points a game from him, and we'd expect a lot of those to be rebound baskets, we would be pleasantly surprised."

Right now Paul Van Den Einde, a 7-0 freshman, is playing behind Shasky, and he is expected to get a taste of action against the invading Jackrabbits. The

same had been true for Mike Carpenter, a 7-2 freshman, but a badly sprained ankle may keep that newcomer on the shelf for a couple of weeks.

At forward, Dutcher will open with Roland Brooks and Jim Petersen, a pair of seniors who carried the load for Minnesota at those spots one year ago. Brooks is 6-7 and Petersen 6-10.

"How much they have improved," Dutcher maintains, "and how consistently they are able to play will be a key for us. We won't be looking inside for the big man this year the way we have through the past eight seasons when people like Mychal Thompson, Kevin McHale and Breuer were available. That means we'll have to get both rebounding and scoring help from our forwards."

Also in the picture at that position are Dave Dahlke, a 6-6 sophomore who missed much of last year with mononucleosis, and Kevin Smith, a 6-7 freshman who is ticketed for extensive playing time this season.

A strength, and perhaps another key, for Minnesota is at guard where Dutcher will open against South Dakota State with the same pair of backcourt aces as was the case last year...Tommy Davis, a 6-4 junior, and Marc Wilson a 6-1 sophomore.

Davis was Minnesota's second-leading scorer a year ago when he tallied 372 points and averaged 12.8 per assignment. He may loom as the Golden Gophers top outside shooter in 1983-84.

Wilson finished as Minnesota's third-leading scorer one season ago when he dropped in 294 points and averaged 10.5 points a game. More important, Wilson lead the Golden Gophers in steals with 37 and in assists with 108.

"Those are two different types of players," Dutcher says, "and will play different roles for us. Davis is a shooter, a scorer while Wilson is a penetrator, a playmaker. Their effectiveness will be critical for us this year."

Dutcher also says that Alonzo Skanes, a 6-2 sophomore letterman will get playing time and figures Gerald Jackson, a 6-4 freshman, has given early indications that he will be able to help.

In addition, Minnesota has Per Tetzlaff, a 6-2 freshman from Oslo, Norway on the squad. He's been a member of the Norwegian National team the past three seasons and will get his first taste of American collegiate basketball after testing the waters in the Pillsbury Summer League earlier this year.

"We will have some idea of what to expect Saturday after watching South Dakota State open its season Tuesday night," Dutcher said, "but we'll still go into the game not knowing how good we're going to be."

Following Saturday's shootout, Minnesota returns to Williams Arena next Monday at 8 p.m. to entertain the Indiana State Sycamores before hitting the road for another non-conference assignment against Marquette in Milwaukee, Wisconsin December 3.

GOLDEN GOPHERS WIND UP 1983 FOOTBALL SEASON

Minnesota's 1983 football season came to a disappointing end last weekend when the University of Iowa subdued the Golden Gophers 61-10 in the Big Ten Conference finale at Iowa City.

As a result of that loss....the 10th straight for Minnesota....the Golden Gophers wound up the year with a 1-10 overall record and a 0-9 Big Ten log which put them in the conference cellar.

For Joe Salem that assignment at Iowa signaled the end of his five year reign as head coach of the University of Minnesota. Salem had tendered his resignation several weeks ago, and school officials currently are searching for a replacement.

The setback to the bowl-bound Hawkeyes was a tough one for Salem and his undermanned Golden Gophers to take, and it meant that Iowa retained possession of Floyd of Rosedale for one more year.

"Offensively Iowa did whatever it wanted to against us," Salem analyzed after the loss. "They knocked us off the line of scrimmage, and after that happened their backs literally ran rampant through our defense. Iowa is a good, strong, physical football team that will represent the Big Ten well in post season play."

For Minnesota, the finale had few bright spots but Salem did single out senior fullback Alan Reid for a good effort. Reid started the season opener at Rice....Minnesota's only win of the year....but suffered a broken arm in the process and had been sidelined until the Iowa shootout.

"Alan ran well," Salem proclaimed, "and he showed you what we missed by not having him available all year long. He would have been our starter throughout the season, had he not been hurt."

Reid finished with 95 yards in 24 carries against Iowa, while the only other Minnesota back to wind up with plus yardage was Tony Hunter who mustered 16 yards in eight carries.

Brett Sadek, the promising Golden Gopher freshman quarterback, faced a tremendous Iowa rush all afternoon but still hit 12 of 23 attempts for 211 yards and one Minnesota touchdown to Kevin Starks.

Jim Gallery, who already had established a new U of M record for most extra points in a career, added to that mark with one more against Iowa and leaves a new standard of 96 (in 106 attempts). In the finale, Gallery also added another field goal (he finished with 40 of 63), so his four-year point put him at 216.

A total of 11 seniors were listed on the Minnesota roster for the finale at Iowa and now have donned Golden Gopher football uniforms for the last time. They included Paul Blanchard, Jay Carroll, Darryl Castile, Fred Hartwig, Phil Sutton, Kevin Taylor, Joe Weipert, Captain Randy Rasmussen, Craig White, Gallery and Reid.

ICERS SWEEP N.D., TRAVEL WEST

Minneapolis, MN---A giant home sweep of WCHA leader North Dakota last weekend was tempered by the fact that the Minnesota hockey Gophers, in the space of eight days, have lost three starters due to knee injuries.

The Gophers last weekend played a tight, tight, tight checking game to survive a great hockey series. Minnesota scored last and late Friday to win 4-3, and then got the lone goal of the game early Saturday to win 0

The shut out was authored by senior goalie Mike Vacanti who stopped all 26 North Dakota shots. It was his first WCHA whitewashing. For his exceptional efforts, Vacanti was named WCHA Player of the Week.

On Friday sophomore Frank Pietrangelo was in the Gopher nets and only had to make 6 stops as UM outshot North Dakota 33-19.

But the joy was distilled by the loss of three excellent players. A week ago Friday at Wisconsin, junior center Rick Erdall suffered a knee injury calling for surgery. He has been ruled out for 10-12 weeks.

Then in practice Monday, sophomore wing Wally Chapman reinjured a knee and is expected out for at least a month.

In last Friday's 4-3 win over North Dakota, freshman center Steve Orth scored the Gopher game winner on a rebound shot with 1:57 remaining. But less than a minute later Orth was felled by a check at center ice. He suffered the same injury as Erdall, was operated on Sunday morning and is also expected to be out at least 10-12 weeks.

"Our first concern is naturally for these young men," Gopher coach Brad Buetow said Monday. "All three were coming strong and playing excellent hockey for us. Their recovery is of major importance to us, not only for the betterment of our hockey team, but for their personal well being.

"The biggest factor we have lost is the outstanding playmaking ability of both centers, (Rick) Erdall and (Steve) Orth. I'm not certain we can replace this factor on offense, so tight checking like our men displayed last weekend will have to be our key right now.

"Those wins have to serve as a huge confidence builder for our men considering what happened the week before when we lost two games at Wisconsin. They may have turned in the best six straight periods of hockey we have seen from a Minnesota team in some time.

"I guess our players finally realized that tight checking can pay off and that you do not have to score a ton of goals to win. Oh, we got some great bounces and our goalies, besides turning in two excellent games, had their share of luck, too. But it was the all over the ice checking that did it.

"Another area I must cite for excellence was the play of our specialty units. Do you realize that we held North Dakota scoreless on 12 power play chances over the weekend? To me that is sensational defensive play. I just hope we can keep the same level of checking and defensive play together."

Four different Gophers scored on Friday. After UM went up 2-0 in the first period, the Sioux first tied the score, and then went ahead 3-2 in the second period on Rand Maxwell's goal. But Pat Micheletti scored his ninth of the season to even matters at 3-all setting the stage for Orth's game winner.

On Saturday junior Tom Rothstein converted a perfect goal-mouth feed from freshman Gary Shopek in the first period and UM made the goal stand up. It marked the first time UM had won a 1-0 game since taking a like decision at Grand Forks against North Dakota on February 21, 1970. The only other time Minnesota gained a 1-0 victory in Williams Arena was December 29, 1956, against Yale University.

This weekend Minnesota steps out of the WCHA to play two games in San Diego, CA, against U.S. International. Minnesota has defeated the Gulls five times in six meetings.

"I would rather we were facing a league opponent this week because of the momentum we gained in the North Dakota series," Buetow added.

It is expected the same threesome that skated for the injured players will play again for UM this weekend, including center Eric Lempe and wings Roger Bowe and Tim Bergland. Micheletti will again move to center.

GYMNASTS MEET JAPANESE COLLEGIATE ALL-STARS SATURDAY, DECEMBER 3

Coach Fred Roethlisberger's University of Minnesota gymnastic team duals the Japanese Collegiate All-Stars Saturday, December 3 at 2:00 p.m. in an exhibition at Williams Arena. Tickets are \$4.00 for adults and \$2.00 for students and children 18 and under. Advance tickets are available at the Bierman Building Ticket Office.

The Japanese team, making its fourth consecutive visit to Minnesota, consists of the top eight individuals in Japan's collegiate championships. Some are also members of the Japanese National Team that finished third in the recent World Championship.

A veteran of international gymnastics as both a coach and competitor, Roethlisberger calls the meet educational. "It is a great learning experience," Roethlisberger said, "especially for the kids who do not get a chance to compete internationally."

Roethlisberger, in his 13th season at Minnesota, credits others with the meet's success. "We are fortunate to be one of the few schools in the country with fan and athletic department support necessary to have a meet like this," Roethlisberger said.

Paul Giel, Minnesota's Athletic Director is proud of the efforts that brought the Japanese here. "The meet is a credit to Fred Roethlisberger," Giel said, "He has the team and program that can attract a great foreign team like the Japanese."

The meet is conducted under international rules allowing Brian Meeker, a 1982 graduate and three-time U.S. National Team member from Edina, to compete. Unlike the NCAA, international rules do not limit the number of years of participation.

Another international rule prevents Meeker from bumping a member of the current team from the lineup. Under NCAA rules five individuals compete in each event and their scores count in the team score. In international meets the top five scores among six individuals in each event figure into the team score.

Meeker, who will compete in the Coca-Cola Invitational in London later in December, is meeting the Japanese for the fourth time. "This is always a great meet for me," Meeker said. "There is a high caliber of competition and its low key."

Joe Ray, a senior and defending Big Ten all-around and parallel bars champion from Morton Grove, Illinois, is a candidate for the 1984 U.S. Olympic Team and frequent international competitor.

"It's an exciting competition," Ray said. "The Japanese are great. Every time you compete internationally it's a big thrill."

Other Golden Gopher all-arounders are sophomores Rob Brown, Dave Menke plus freshmen Jamie Garardo, Colin Godkin and Ed Melichar.

Specialists include seniors Tom Groechel and Tim Ryan, rings; junior Joe Brough, parallel bars; freshmen Steve Braun, pommel horse; and junior Kevin Cochran, floor exercise and vault.

Roethlisberger's team placed 11th last weekend in Illinois-Chicago's Windy City Invitational with a score of 263.95.

U OF M CAGERS FACE FIRST ROAD TEST

After winning its first two assignments of the 1983-84 basketball season in friendly Williams Arena, the University of Minnesota hits the road Saturday to take on Marquette University in Milwaukee. Tip-off is set for 8:05 p.m.

Coach Jim Dutcher's free-wheeling Golden Gophers know that they will be facing a much more severe challenge than seen thus far while disposing of South Dakota State 93-77 and Indiana State 96-70.

"We'll be facing a very disciplined team at Marquette," Dutcher explained. "They will play a very tough man-to-man defense and will have quickness, experience and size to throw at us."

Dutcher also expressed concern over how his club would react to its initial assignment away from home. "The first road game of any season is always difficult," he analyzed. Two years ago we had a very tough time winning 60-60 at Loyola on our first road trip and last year we lost 80-78 in overtime at Iowa State in our first game away from Williams Arena. It's different on the road, and the first time out is always tougher."

All of which means Minnesota will have to put together an improved effort if it hopes to keep its winning streak alive at the expense of the Marquette Warriors on Saturday.

Improvement, however, is what the Golden Gophers displayed in their first two tests of the current campaign against the South Dakota State Jackrabbits and the visitors from Indiana State.

Admittedly Minnesota struggled....for stretches, at least....against both of those non-conference opponents. "We gave up too many points, and much too easily, in the first half of the opener," Dutcher said. "We did a little better job in the second half, but we still left a lot of room for improvement."

That improvement came against Indiana State where the Golden Gophers limited that club to 36 first-half points....a team that finished 10th in the nation in offensive productivity a year ago.

"We played better defensively in our second game," Dutcher analyzed. "We tried mixing a man-to-man defense with a zone in the first half and then stayed more with one defense in the second half. It worked pretty well."

Against South Dakota State, Minnesota used balanced scoring to get its 93 points. Tommy Davis led the way with 29 while Marc Wilson had 18, Roland Brooks 13 and Captain Jim Petersen and John Shasky 11 each.

"We got two good performances from Davis and Shasky," Dutcher said, "but we didn't get from the other what we are going to need during the remainder of the season if we hope to be a winner."

Then against Indiana State that same kind of balance, deeper in fact, again made the difference. Davis again set the pace with 21 points while Wilson again was second with 16. Petersen had 15, Shasky 10 and Brooks eight. In addition, Alonzo Skanes came off the bench to score 10 while Dave Dahlke did the same to register eight more.

"Tommy is playing with a lot of confidence right now," Dutcher said after the junior guard finished with 10 baskets in 15 attempts. "He's been shooting the ball well since we started practice in October, and his game appears to be much improved over a year ago."

It's that improvement that Dutcher has told his squad it will need Saturday night when taking on Marquette and he knows it will take similar improvement from all of his Golden Gophers to get the job done.

ICERS RETURN TO WCHA

Minneapolis, MN---After winning twice against U.S. International out in sunny San Diego, CA, the Minnesota hockey Gophers return to the "real" world with WCHA games against Colorado College. Both 7:30 p.m. CST contests Friday and Saturday at Williams Arena will be aired by KKSS-980 AM locally.

The Gophers, after a pair of slow starts, came from behind both nights to take the USIU Gulls 9-3 and 7-3 last weekend. Minnesota scored 13 of its 16 weekend goals in the second and third periods.

Junior co-captain Tom Rothstein (Grand Rapids) had the biggest weekend of any Gopher. Rothstein counted five goals, including four Saturday, and two assists on the weekend and now leads UM in scoring with 27 points (12-15) in 14 games.

Senior co-captain Jeff Larson (White Bear Lake) and sophomore Eric Lempe (Grand Rapids), both centers, chipped in with two goals apiece while another center, soph Pat Micheletti (Hibbing), had a goal and four assists.

Sophomore Frank Pietrangelo (Niagara Falls, ONT) was in the Gopher nets Friday and made only 18 saves, while senior Mike Vacanti (Edina) worked Saturday's game and stopped 29 Gull attempts.

The twin wins brings Minnesota's season record to 11-2-1. The Gophers are 7-2-1 for 15 points and second place in the WCHA behind North Dakota (8-2-0, 16).

FROM COACH BUETOW

"Going out there to play is mentally refreshing for our men," Coach Brad Buetow said Tuesday. "In its own way it's good to get away from the WCHA pressures once in awhile. But at the same time I'm glad we are back in league action this weekend.

"Another big plus for us against U.S. International was that we came out of there with no injuries. The usual bumps and bruises were there. but nothing heavy. I was beginning to believe we were going to lose someone every weekend.

"As for Colorado College, I can honestly say they worry me to death. Any team that is struggling is always dangerous. They are trying like mad to get a few wins under their belt and will come at us with everything.

"Two weeks ago they outshot Wisconsin in a home series, but lost a pair of one-goal games, 3-2 and 2-1. In goalie Marty Wakelyn they have a man who has proven himself in the WCHA and can get awfully hot.

"So don't let the fact that Colorado College has only won one league game fool you. I believe they have more talent than that. And if we're not careful, they can begin winning this weekend."

Buetow added that sophomore Wally Chapman, who missed the last two weekends with knee problems, will not be ready for Colorado College, but is expected back for the Harvard series Dec. 17-18 after the exam break.

The coach also said he will probably skate the same lineup that played against U.S. International, which includes alternating Pietrangelo and Vacanti.

Other WCHA action this weekend finds North Dakota playing two at Denver, providing the Sioux can get in to the Mile High City, and Minnesota-Duluth going to Wisconsin for a pair, providing the Bulldogs can escape the Port City.

GYMNASTS FACE JAPANESE COLLEGIATE ALL-STARS

Coach Fred Roethlisberger's University of Minnesota gymnastics team duals the Japanese Collegiate All-Stars Saturday at 2:00 p.m. in an exhibition at Williams Arena.

Tickets are \$4.00 for adults and \$2.00 for students and children 18 and under. Advance tickets are available at the Bierman Building Ticket Office.

The Japanese team, making its fourth consecutive visit to Minnesota, consists of the top eight individuals in Japan's collegiate championships. Some are also members of the Japanese National Team that finished third in the recent World Championship.

A veteran of international gymnastics as both a coach and competitor, Roethlisberger calls the meet educational. "It is a great learning experience," Roethlisberger said, "especially for the kids who do not get a chance to compete internationally." Roethlisberger, in his 13th season at Minnesota, credits others with the meet's success. "We are fortunate to be one of the few schools in the country with fan and athletic department support necessary to have a meet like this," Roethlisberger said.

Paul Giel, Minnesota's Athletic Director is proud of the efforts that brought the Japanese here. "The meet is a credit to Fred Roethlisberger," Giel said. "He has the team and program that can attract a great foreign team like the Japanese."

The meet is conducted under international rules allowing Brian Meeker, a 1982 graduate and three-time U.S. National Team member from Edina, to compete. Unlike the NCAA, international rules do not limit the number of years of participation. Another international rule prevents Meeker from bumping a member of the current team from the lineup. Under NCAA rules five individuals compete in each event and their scores count in the team score. In international meets the top five scores among six individuals in each event figure into the team score.

Meeker, who will compete in the Coca-Cola Invitational in London later in December, is meeting the Japanese for the fourth time. "This is always a great meet for me," Meeker said. "There is a high caliber of competition and it's low key."

Joe Ray, a senior and defending Big Ten all-around and parallel bars champion from Morton Grove, Illinois, is a candidate for the 1984 U.S. Olympic Team and frequent international competitor. "It's an exciting competition," Ray said. "The Japanese are great. Everytime you compete internationally it's a big thrill."

Other Golden Gopher all-arounders are sophomores Rob Brown, Dave Menke and Pat Houde plus freshmen Jamie Garardo, Colin Godkin and Ed Melichar.

Specialists include seniors Tom Groechel and Tim Ryan, Rings; junior Joe Brough, parallel bars; freshman Steve Braun, pommel horse; and junior Kevin Cochran, floor exercise and vault.

ICERS IN 1ST, EXAM BREAK, THEN HARVARD

Minneapolis, MN---Minnesota's hockey Gophers reached one their major goals last weekend by gaining first place in the WCHA before going into the Christmas break period.

The Gophers won two tight games at home from a vastly improved Colorado College team 4-2 and 4-3 last weekend. At the same time North Dakota, going into the weekend with a one-point buldge over the Gophers in the standings, was surprised 3-2 Friday at Denver before winning 6-2 Saturday.

That means that Minnesota owns first place for at least a week. The Gophers, 13-2-1 overall, are 9-2-1 for 19 points in the WCHA. North Dakota is one point behind with a 9-3-0 league record.

"We are naturally happy to reach first place before the exam break," Gopher coach Brad Buetow said Monday. "We were equally happy to gain four points against Colorado College.

"I believe we played better Saturday than we did Friday even though we had to come from a 3-1 deficit to win the second game. Let me tell you, Colorado College is the best 1-9 team I've coached against. Goalie Marty Wakelyn had a heck-of-a series. We were fortunate to beat him twice."

Buetow added he believes being off for two weeks has to be a bonus for Minnesota, if for nothing else than the healing of injuries. Freshman defender Gary Shopek suffered a badly sprained ankle Saturday, but could be ready for the Gopher games against Harvard University Dec. 17-18 at home.

Also expected back is sophomore wing Wally Chapman who has been out the last three weeks with a bum knee.

Buetow also expressed pleasure that he will gain the opportunity to bring up some players from the varsity reserve squad for non-conference series against U.S. International Dec. 20-21, and Miami of Ohio Dec. 30-31. But against Harvard the Gophers will go with the varsity all the way.

"We will certainly be motivated enough when it comes to playing Harvard," the coach added. "They knocked us out of contention at the NCAA tournament last year. Of course there is always East-West pride at stake, so we expect a very fine series against Harvard.

"Possibly the key thing we are concerned about is maintaining the momentum gained the past three weeks. We have won six straight, four in the WCHA, and hope to keep it going. Harvard could well decide that for us."

In addition to losing practice time during the exam period, Minnesota will lose the service of three more players following the Harvard series.

Chapman, plus freshmen Todd Okerlund, a right wing, a defenseman Craig Mack will join the U.S. National Junior Team for the World Cup Games in Sweden. The tournament there runs Dec. 25 through Jan. 3. At least they will be back and ready to play in Minnesota's next WCHA series Jan. 6-7 at home against Minnesota-Duluth.

ON THE WCHA-SUPER 7 ALIGNMENT

Last Friday the WCHA and a newly formed association of eastern colleges and universities (at this time known as the Super Seven) signed a scheduling agreement that begins with the 1984-85 season.

Teams in the two conferences will play both a round robin schedule within their own ranks, and then meet each team twice in the opposite conference. That means Minnesota will play 20 WCHA games next season, and 14 more against Super Seven schools.

Now, the key to this agreement is that all of the above games count in the respective conference standings. So Minnesota and its fellow WCHA schools play a 34-game league schedule next winter. The schedules for both associations are expected to be completed in about a month.

"There is no question that 34 games means a long, tough, grinding regular season schedule," Buetow said Friday at a news conference. "It will eliminate the chance for us to use varsity reserve players as there will only be four games for us to play outside the WCHA. The NCAA limit is 38 games.

"At the same time it will be good to have a locked in schedule, travel to new areas for games, and the chance to establish some interesting new rivalries.

"On the other hand I do not believe this move will provide any recruiting advantage for us, but it could mean good things for other schools. We seldom venture outside Minnesota in recruiting. So the high school products in this area should be receiving a lot more scholarship offers from both other WCHA schools and the eastern schools.

"In the long run this concept has to be a large bonus for all collegiate hockey. We should receive increased national exposure for the game as it is now intersectional in regular season play. I believe this is the first time any conferences have joined together on a national basis during a regular season."

Next year the Gophers could play four home series against Super Seven schools, and three on the road, besides five series home and away against WCHA squads.

GOPHER CAGERS GET WELL-EARNED REST

Minnesota's Golden Gophers get a well-deserved rest this week after splitting non-conference basketball honors over the weekend, falling 77-60 at Marquette last Saturday but bouncing back on Monday to whip Oregon 65-49 at Williams Arena.

In the process Coach Jim Dutcher's contingent upped its 1983-84 record to 3-1, and now will get a break from the hardwood to concentrate on fall-quarter examinations.

Next assignment for the Golden Gophers will be on Monday, December 19 when they entertain Jacksonville before playing host to the University of North Dakota on Thursday, December 22.

"We've been working every day since practice opened on October 15," Dutcher pointed out. "Our players deserve a little rest, and they need some time off to study for finals. Our practices for the next few days will depend upon that examination schedule, but we'll try to get together as often as we can."

Hard work is nothing new to Minnesota. The Golden Gophers used that element to dispose of highly-regarded Oregon in their most recent assignment after suffering their only loss of the current campaign last weekend in Milwaukee.

"We did not execute against Marquette," Dutcher said. "Even more important, we did not seem ready to work hard, to break a sweat. That was not the case against Oregon. We played with much more intensity, and it paid off."

At Marquette, Minnesota fell behind 17-2 early in the game and never really got untracked. Marc Wilson was the only Golden Gopher to finish in double figures (he had 22) and Captain Jim Petersen chipped in with seven points as well as 13 rebounds.

"That bad start killed us," Dutcher admitted. "Monday against Oregon we played much harder, especially on defense, and we were able to get off to a good start. That made a big difference."

Minnesota never trailed against the invading Ducks, and although they led by only seven at intermission, were able to explode impressively in the second half to win going away.

"We were pleased with our transition game against Oregon," Dutcher admitted. "We felt we could use our edge in quickness to an advantage, and our goal was to run as much as possible. Our ability to push the ball up the floor really paid off."

In that department, the five assists registered by Wilson all came on fast-break baskets and resulted from that transition game, from the Golden Gophers working hard at pushing the ball up the floor.

Equally impressive was the scoring punch provided against Oregon by Tommy Davis. At Marquette, Davis failed to score in the second half. Then, against the Ducks, Davis did not score in the first half. But in the final 20 minutes of play, Minnesota's junior guard hit eight of 13 attempts and finished with a game high of 16. Roland Brooks was next with 15 while Wilson had 13. Brooks also led the Golden Gophers with 10 boards.

But now those cagers break from their basketball routine to hit the books. More hard work!

TENNIS TEAM AND INDIVIDUALS TO COMPETE IN NATIONAL COMPETITIONS

The University of Minnesota tennis team has been selected to compete in the 16-team Intercollegiate Tennis Coaches Association Tournament February 2-5 at UCLA.

Sophomore Swedes Fredrik Pahlett and Stefan Eriksson and junior Pete Kolaric will represent Minnesota in the National Indoor Championships February 16-19 at Kohler, Wisconsin. Pahlett, the nation's top ranked singles player qualified automatically. Eriksson earned a berth in the field last weekend when he captured the Midwest Indoor Singles Championship at Chicago, Illinois. Kolaric will team with Eriksson in the doubles competition. --UM--

GOPHER HOLIDAY NOTES --

HOCKEY. . . The Gophers play six non-conference games at Williams Arena the next three weeks, plus a second match Jan. 2 at the Met Center vs. the U.S. Olympic Team. Team USA defeated UM 9-5 back in October. The Gophers will be minus three players following the Harvard series as left wing Wally Chapman, defenseman Craig Mack and right wing Todd Okerlund will skate with the U.S. National Junior Team at the Junior World Cup Games in Sweden Dec. 25 through Jan. 3. After last weekend the Gophers are in second place in the WCHA standings following North Dakota's sweep at home of Colorado College. North Dakota is 11-3-0 for 22 points in league play while the Gophers are 9-2-1 for 19 points. Coach Brad Buetow is expected to skate several varsity reserve players in the series against U.S. International Dec. 20-21, and Miami of Ohio Dec. 30-31. It is also possible that junior defenseman Sean Regan may be able to rejoin the Gophers soon. He has been out since Oct. 22 with a broken wrist. Starting time of the Harvard game Sunday, December 18, has been moved from 2 p.m. to 1 p.m. CST.

BASKETBALL. . . Coach Jim Dutcher's cagers come off exam break with the rest of their fellow student-athletes in other sports to play two home games in four days against Jacksonville Dec. 19, and U. of North Dakota Dec. 22. Following are two road games after X-Mas at Detroit and Montana State. The final non-conference outing is set for Williams Arena Jan. 2 against Iowa State. The Gophers carry a 3-1 record into the holiday games hoping to raise that mark to 8-1 before opening the Big Ten campaign the first week in January at Illinois and Purdue. Dutcher is expected to remain with his same starting lineup of Jim Petersen and Roland Brooks at forward, John Shasky at center, plus Tommy Davis and Marc Wilson at guard. However, Dutcher also expects to give a lot of playing time to his bench in these remaining non-conference games in hopes of getting others ready for the 1983-84 Big Ten season.

WRESTLING -- Gopher coach Wally Johnson will take two teams to the Northern Illinois Dual Tournament this weekend to help fill out the field. "I was told they only had seven teams, including us, so we'll take 20 men and make up two squads to help fill them out," Johnson says. The Gophers, 1-1-1 in dual meets this year, will split the team again for two meets Dec. 29-30. Johnson will take his "A" squad to the giant Midlands Tournament at Northwestern University, and send his "B" squad to the Iowa State Cyclone Tournament at Ames, IA. It is hoped that Mike Foy, at 177- or 190-pounds, can repeat as a Midlands champion. Last year he won the title for most falls in the least amount of time. Steve Martinez, who finished second at the Caesars Palace Invitational recently, is also given a solid chance to win the 158-pound Midlands title. Foy and Martinez are Gopher co-captains.

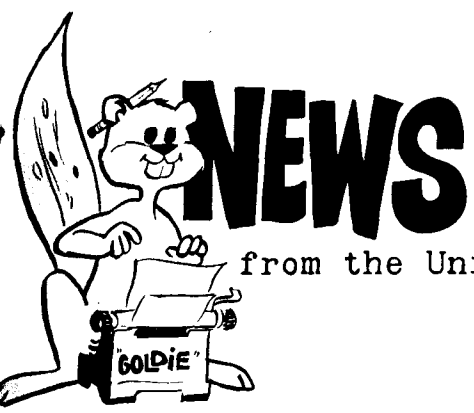

ICERS FACE MIAMI OF OHIO, OLYMPIANS

Minneapolis, MN---The U. of Minnesota hockey Gophers continue their non-conference holiday trek this week playing three games in as many nights.

The Gophers, 17-2-1 after winning four at home before Christmas, play games Friday and Saturday at Williams Arena against the U. of Miami (Ohio) from the Central Collegiate Hockey Association (CCHA), and then Sunday travel to the Met Center in Bloomington for a rematch with the U.S. Olympic Team. Team USA took the Gophers 9-5 in a season-opening exhibition match back in October.

All three games this weekend will be aired by KKSS-980 AM radio.

Minnesota ran its winning streak to 10 by taking two from Harvard by identical 6-4 scores, and then defeated U.S. International for the third and fourth times this season, 8-3 and 4-2. All four games were at home last week

As in the recent series against U.S. International, Gopher head coach Brad Buetow again plans on playing several members of the varsity reserve team to help these individuals gain varsity experience.

However, it may not be, in terms of numbers, as many as played against Harvard and U.S. International.

"Because we are playing a brand new opponent in Miami," Buetow said, "I might hold back on too many new players this weekend. I guess we'll have to see how the first game goes.

"I already know the Redskins are a better team than their record indicates. They defeated Ohio State when the Buckeyes were still undefeated and ranked number one in the nation. And Miami also lost twice by just one goal to a powerful Bowling Green team. So we are not taking this series lightly by any means."

To further emphasise the latter statement, Buetow said he plans tentatively to start sophomore Frank Pietrangelo Friday and senior Mike Vacanti Saturday in goal against Miami. However, he added that freshman Mike Sauer and junior transfer Steve Kudebeh, who played against U.S. International, will also dress this weekend. Both could see action if things turn out the right way for Minnesota.

"Both (Mike) Sauer and (Steve) Kudebveh played well in goal even though they were not tested too much," Buetow continued. "But they stood up well under pressure and showed us what they can do.

"The same goes for the men who skated at forward and on defense. But the main thing is that we were able to gain four wins and keep our momentum intact.

"Going against Miami and then the Olympic team without our three men who are in Europe with the U.S. Junior National Team is not the best for us, either. Missing the local games are forwards Wally Chapman and Todd Okerlund, plus defenseman Craig Mack.

Following games this weekend, Minnesota returns to league action at home January 6-7 against the U. of Minnesota-Duluth. After that it's all WCHA games through mid-February when the playoffs begin.

HOLTZ NAMED HEAD FOOTBALL COACH AT MINNESOTA

Lou Holtz, one of the most successful and highly respected football coaches in the nation, has taken over the reins of the Golden Gophers and succeeds Joe Salem who resigned with the conclusion of the 1983 season.

A veteran of the coaching profession, the 47-year old Holtz comes to the University of Minnesota from the University of Arkansas where he was the head coach for the past seven seasons.

Despite the below zero temperatures hovering over the U of M campus on the day Holtz announced his decision to accept a five-year pact in Gold Country, he proclaimed he was "Happy to be in Minnesota!"

His task at the U of M will be a big one after back-to-back losing seasons registered by the Golden Gophers. But Holtz made no promises. "I'm no miracle worker," he said. "I'm not going to be able to wave a magic wand and turn Minnesota into a winner. Our job of building a team that can challenge for the Big Ten championship will take time, and it will take a cooperative effort on the part of the University and the people of this state....literally everyone that shovels snow. But together, we can get the job done."

Dr. C. Peter Magrath, president of the University of Minnesota, was totally pleased with Holtz's decision to join the Golden Gophers. "This is a good day....a Gold and Maroon Day....for the University of Minnesota and the State we serve," he said when introducing Holtz.

Even more enthusiastic was Paul Giel, men's athletic director at the U of M. "I can't tell you how pleased I am that one of the truly outstanding men and coaches in college athletics has chosen to direct our football program," Giel said. "Lou Holtz has accepted the challenge at a very critical time in the history of the University of Minnesota. There is no doubt in my mind that, given time, patience of our fans and the tools to be competitive, it won't be too many years before the Golden Gophers will move from respectability to competitiveness to contenders and then Big Ten and National Champions."

At Arkansas, Holtz piloted the Razorbacks to 54 wins against only 16 losses and two ties, and he took his club to six consecutive post-season bowl games. Prior to his tour of duty at Arkansas, Holtz was the head coach of the New York Jets for one year and also was head coach at North Carolina State for four seasons (33-13) and at William and Mary for three.

Additional stops for Holtz as an assistant were at the University of Connecticut, the University of South Carolina, at William and Mary and at Ohio State University.

Married with four children, Holtz has his B.S. degree from Kent State University and his M.A. degree from the University of Iowa.

GOPHER CAGERS TO HOST IOWA STATE NEXT MONDAY

After two road games at Detroit and at Montana State, the University of Minnesota returns home next Monday to entertain Iowa State University in another 8 p.m. non-conference basketball assignment.

Coach Jim Dutcher's quintet came into this week's confrontation at Detroit with an overall record of 5-1 after posting a pair of triumphs at home in Williams Arena just prior to taking a short Christmas break.

First the Golden Gophers nipped stubborn Jacksonville 52-50 and then downed the University of North Dakota 78-73. Dutcher didn't think either victory was a work of art as far as Minnesota was concerned.

"They weren't pretty," he admitted after the North Dakota shootout, "but we never guaranteed pretty. We just hope the wins will become better looking as our concentration improves."

There was little doubt that Minnesota lacked some concentration against both Jacksonville and North Dakota, but it might have been understandable since the Golden Gophers were returning to action following a two-week layoff for fall-quarter final exams.

In the Jacksonville assignment, Minnesota let the visitors jump off to a quick 12-4 lead, and that meant the host club had to fight uphill all night long to subdue the upstart Dolphins. Then against the Sioux, Minnesota got off to the good start Dutcher wanted, but after building a 27-point lead mid-way through the second half, let things fall apart.

"The North Dakota game was another example of us becoming our own worst enemy," Dutcher complained. "We built a comfortable lead because we played a decent first half. But then we forgot how we got there. We lost our patience, and it left a bad taste in our mouths. We know that we won't win many games with an effort like that."

Following that confrontation with the Sioux, Dutcher sent his charges home for a three-day Christmas break with the warning that they had better come back in shape and mentally prepared for a tough road trip.

And now he's telling them to get ready for the return home and a big match with the Iowa State Cyclones before tipping off the 1984 Big Ten Conference season next week at Illinois and at Purdue.

Minnesota will go into the Iowa State contest thinking "get even" after falling to the Cyclones in Ames 80-78 in overtime last December. It turned out to be the Golden Gophers' only non-conference loss of the 1982-83 campaign.

In all Minnesota and Iowa State have met 21 times on the hardwood, and the Golden Gophers will take an edge of 14-7 into next Monday's contest. Of additional interest is the fact that Iowa State is coached by John Orr, former head coach at Michigan.....when Jim Dutcher was an assistant there!

After six games, junior guard Tommy Davis was Minnesota's leading scorer with an 18.0 point average. Marc Wilson was next at 14.3, and he led the club in assists with 21 and in steals with nine. Captain Jim Petersen was Minnesota's top rebounder with a 9.2 average.

ASSISTANT GRID COACHES RECOMMENDED BY HOLTZ

Minneapolis, MN---Lou Holtz, new head football coach at the University of Minnesota, today (Tuesday) recommended to Gopher Athletic Director Paul Giel the names of four new assistant coaches expected to join his staff immediately. All four names are, of course, subject to approval by the University Board of Regents.

Recommended are Pete Cordelli, Langhorne, PA, Phil Elmassian, Cambridge, MA, George Stewart, Little Rock, AR, and Jim Strong, Abbeyville, KS.

Three of the four--Cordelli, Stewart and Strong--were members of Holtz' staff at the U. of Arkansas this past season.

Cordelli will coach the wide receivers at Minnesota. He played quarterback four years for Holtz who was then head coach at North Carolina State. Cordelli graduated from NCS in 1976 with a B.S. degree in Education.

He then served as a graduate assistant coach under Holtz at Arkansas in 1977-78, and held the same position at Texas Christian in 1979. The next two years found Cordelli as an assistant coach at Memphis State, and in 1982 served as a scout for the NFL Dallas Cowboys. Last fall he returned to Arkansas as an assistant coach under Holtz. Cordelli, 30, is single.

Elmassian played one year under Holtz at William & Mary. He graduated from there in 1973 with a B.A. degree in Physical Education. He began his coaching career the same year as a graduate assistant under Holtz, and in 1974-75 coached the offensive backfield at W&M.

He served as an assistant coach at the U. of Richmond in 1976-78, and later returned to a school he once attended, Ferrum Junior College, as defensive coordinator from 1979-82. In 1983 he coached the defensive backs at East Carolina University, the same duties he will assume here.

Elmassian, 32, and his wife Deborah have yet to begin their family.

Stewart, 25, was an All-American and captain of the 1980 Razorback varsity football team under Holtz. He played four years and was a member of the first class Holtz recruited at Arkansas.

Knee surgery midway through his senior year curtailed his playing career even though he spent the 1981 season on the injured reserve list with the Kansas City Chiefs of the NFL. In 1982 he entered private business, but last fall served as a graduate assistant at Arkansas coaching the tight ends. At Minnesota he is slated to become the offensive line coach.

George and his wife, Cindy, are expecting their first child in February.

Strong played football at Hutchinson (KS) Junior College and Missouri Southern as a defensive back. He graduated from the latter school in 1975 with a B.S.E. degree in Education, and received his masters degree in education from the U. of Arkansas in 1977. That year he was a graduate assistant under Holtz, and the next two years served first as a part-time assistant and then head coach of the junior varsity team.

In 1980-82 he was an assistant coach at the U. of Tulsa, and last fall coached the tight ends at Arkansas.

Strong, 29, and his wife Carrie have yet to start raising a family.

"Each of these gentlemen are fine, fine coaches," Holtz said today. Tongue in cheek, he added, "I just hope the ones that played for me turn out to be better coaches.

"You don't have a chance in this business without the proper staff. We hope the chemistry develops among a fine group of individuals, the kind that will set the example needed for a winning combination. Each has enjoyed success in his chosen field. Hopefully that will continue here at Minnesota.

"Would you believe that one of our new men asked me if there were any palm trees on campus? Now that's dedication."

Holtz said he hopes to complete his staff by January 3.
