CAGERS BACK TO WCHA, HOST UM-D

Minneapolis, MN---So much for season #1. Now comes season #2 for the University of Minnesota hockey Gophers.

Beginning this weekend when Minnesota plays host to in-state neighbor Minnesota-Duluth, it's nothing but Western Collegiate Hockey Association (WCHA) games from this point on.

Still in second place in the league standings, the Gophers could move back into first place one point ahead of North Dakota with a sweep of the Bulldog six. Games are set for 7:30 p.m. CST Friday and Saturday at Williams Arena. Both contests will be aired live by KKSS-980 AM radio.

Minnesota, after going undefeated in its last 12 games (not counting the 9-2 exhibition loss to the U.S. Olympic Team last Sunday), brings a healthy 18-2-2 record into the Duluth series. The Gophers are 9-2-1 in WCHA play.

In an earlier series at the Port City, Minnesota took the opener from the Bulldogs 5-4 in overtime, and then skated to a 3-3 tie the next night.

But the worst thing facing the Gophers at this time is physical ability. Added to the injury list this week is junior defenseman Mike Guentzel. He suffered a broken hand by blocking a shot against Team USA Sunday and is expected to be out at least four weeks.

Conversely, coach Brad Buetow has regained the services of junior defender Sean Regan who is coming off an extended period of also being out with a broken hand. Regan went out in Minnesota's fourth game of the season and missed the next 17 contests. He has played in the last two games, but is far from ready to play at top form right now.

In addition, three more varsity players--forwards Wally Chapman and Todd Okerlund plus defender Craig Mack--return to campus Thursday after nearly three weeks abroad with the U.S. National Junior Team at the World Cup Games in Sweden.

"I'm far from convinced that those three players coming home from Sweden will be ready to suit up this weekend," head coach Brad Buetow said Tuesday.

"That's a real grind playing in Europe and traveling all over the place.

"As to losing (Mike) Guentzel, well, that simply hurts us all the more. He has been our steadiest performer all season and has also been a solid leader on the ice. Regan has the tools, but he has missed so much playing time it's difficult to ask him to step right back in and turn in a prime performance.

"But hey, not all is black. We saw some new talent emerge over the holidays in our non-conference games and some of these men could do the job for us in our next few games.

"I would have to say at this time that forwards Steve MacSwain, Tim Bergland, Rich Geist and John Labatt could move into our lineup this week, and some just might stay there, too. Each turned in some good games the last two weeks and may have earned a chance to play in the WCHA as well."

Buetow said he believes the biggest factors concerning the non-conference games included maintaining the winning momentum and getting the opportunity to look at several new players.

Minnesota has not been defeated in its last 12 games against college teams. However, there is a tie in that string, a 3-3 standoff Dec. 30 against Miami University. The Gophers bounced back to win 8-3 the next night.

Minnesota included twin 6-4 victories against Harvard and also took the measure of U.S. International twice, 8-3 and 4-2. All games were at home.

Buetow said he will continue to rotate goalies Frank Pietrangelo and Mike Vacanti this weekend against Duluth, but has yet to decide who will play which game.

GOLDEN GOPHERS CONTINUE BASKETBALL TRAVELS

Travel-weary Minnesota continues on the road this week to open the 1984 Big Ten Conference basketball season with challenging assignments against the University of Illinois and Purdue University.

The Golden Gophers tip off this year's conference slate against the Fighting Illini in Champaign at 7:35 p.m. (CST) Thursday, and then move on to West LaFayette for a 4:05 p.m. (EST) confrontation with the Boilermakers on Saturday.

Coach Jim Dutcher's invaders will take an 8-1 non-conference record into Thursday's outing after posting three more triumphs....one at home and two on the road....over the long New Year's weekend.

First Minnesota notched a 60-56 triumph at the University of Detroit behind Captain Jim Petersen's 26-point effort. Next the Golden Gophers survived a 55-52 scare at Montana State when Marc Wilson led the way with 17. Then Monday night at Williams Arena Minnesota outlasted Iowa State 66-64 as John Shasky exploded for a career high 18 points.

"At Detroit we got off to a good start and then did well at the end," Coach Dutcher recalled, "but in between we played 34 minutes of bad basketball. At Montana State we performed well down the stretch when we had to protect the ball and control the tempo. Against Iowa State it was good defense on our part in the closing minutes of the game that didn't give them a shot and forced turnovers to save us the win."

But all of that is history, and it's all in the non-conference category. Now things are for real, and Minnesota knows it will be severely tested this week, not only by solid Big Ten teams but by playing on the road.

"We may be 8-1," Dutcher has said, "but sometimes it is hard to understand how. We have not played consistently, and we have had too many turnovers (24 at Detroit). We must protect the ball better and pass the ball better if we hope to win against conference opponents."

Dutcher, despite his concern, does admit that the tough games encountered by his charges in recent weeks could be a blessing in disguise for Minnesota as it prepares for Illinois and Purdue.

"Our trip to Detroit and Montana State was an extremely tough two-game swing," Dutcher said, "but it should help get us ready for this week. Our game with Iowa State was the kind of game we really needed at that stage of our preparations. It was a close game and it was a tough game. It should help get us ready."

Biggest concern for Dutcher is the physical condition of Captain Petersen who suffered a severe bruise of the calf muscle on his left leg and did not play against either Montana State or Iowa State.

"We don't know if Jimmy will be ready for either Illinois or Purdue this week," Dutcher admitted, "but we certainly hope so. We can't expect Shasky to play 40 minutes against conference opponents, and even some part-time help from Jimmy would help."

Petersen was becoming a key figure for Minnesota both in scoring (12.3) and in rebounding (8.3). Kevin Smith, a 6-7 freshman, and Dave Dahlke, a 6-6 sophomore have been sharing Petersen's forward post and are expected to continue in that role this week.

PAHLETT LEADS MINNESOTA TENNIS SURGE

With Minnesota's Scandinavian heritage, it follows that the University of Minnesota tennis team's bid for national prominence is led by Sweden's Fredrik Pahlett.

Pahlett, a freshman from Vaxjo, Sweden, reached the NCAA singles final last season and finished with a 38-7 record. Currently the nation's top-ranked singles player, Pahlett captured the Nike All-America tournament last fall at UCLA.

The Golden Gophers next home event is the Republic Airlines Tennis Showcase February 11-12 at the Burnsville Racquet and Swim Club. Minnesota, Harvard, Alabama and Miami of Florida comprise the field.

Someone at the NCAA tournament mentioned that Pahlett had arrived from nowhere.

"From Sweden," Pahlett said.

Minnesota coach Jerry Noyce enlisted the help of graduating Swede Hakan Almstrom when two California players turned down his offer to play at Minnesota. Noyce and Almstrom turned their attention to Sweden.

"I decided that if I couldn't get the best in the country," Noyce said, "I'd try to get the best in the world."

Noyce and Almstrom contacted Pahlett, who in turn recruited fellow Swede Stefan Eriksson. Pahlett, ranked sixth among Swedish juniors in 1982, and Eriksson, ranked 10th, were the only players ranked in the top ten not to turn professional. Pahlett's doubles partner and boyhood friend, Matts Wilander, captured the 1982 French Open.

"It only cost about \$30--the price of a couple of phone calls--to recruit Fredrik," Noyce said.

Noyce and Pahlett have developed a unique relationship.

"He's been like a friend and a coach at the same time," Pahlett said.

"We are a good team, coach and I. We work well together."

Noyce credits Pahlett's mental approach with much of his success.

"He plays with so much confidence that he doesn't think he can get beat," Noyce said. "Fredrik can be as good as he wants to be. He hits some shots that leave people speechless."

Pahlett had nearly decided to turn professional when Noyce and Almstrom contacted him and was faced with the same dilemma following the NCAA tournament. At the present time he will remain at Minnesota.

"Everything is fun here and I can improve my tennis," Pahlett said.

Pahlett is looking forward to an eventual professional career.

"I have to try," Pahlett said. "I want to see how good I am. When the time is right I'll make the decision."

Pahlett and Eriksson have become close friends at Minnesota.

"We're two completely different people," Pahlett said. "We're really close. It has worked out better than I expected."

They're working with Noyce to bring more Swedish players to Minnesota.

"I know we can help coach bring some good players here," Pahlett said.

Pahlett and Eriksson join juniors Pete Kolaric and David Blackstone, sophomore Matt Grace and freshman Chuck Merzbacher to give Minnesota one of the nation's best lineups.

"We really have a good team," Pahlett said, "but we need more consistency."

Noyce has forgotten all about the two Californians who got away and is probably thankful they did.

"Fredrik accomplished in one season what most would consider a great college career," Noyce said.

Pahlett is pleased with the way things have worked out at Minnesota.

"This is the best thing that has ever happened to me," Pahlett said.

"I've really developed as a tennis player and as a person."

CAGERS HOST MICHIGAN & MICHIGAN STATE THIS WEEK

Still seeking that elusive first Big Ten victory of the 1983-84 season, the University of Minnesota returns to Williams Arena this week to play host to a pair of conference basketball opponents.

Coach Jim Dutcher's battered Golden Gophers are slated to entertain Michigan at 8:05 p.m. on Thursday and back up that tough assignment by entertaining Michigan State at 8:05 p.m. on Saturday.

Minnesota will take an overall record of 8-3 and a Big Ten mark of 0-2 into the Thursday shootout against the Wolverines after suffering a pair of road losses to Big Ten foes last week.

First the Golden Gophers dropped a one-sided 80-53 decision at Illinois and then closed the two-game conference road trip by losing a tough 72-69 decision to the Boilermakers at Purdue.

"Going into the Illinois game," Dutcher recalled, "we knew that the key would be our ability to rebound. We didn't get the job done (Illinois outrebounded Minnesota 34-20 in that contest) and it made the difference."

Dutcher was especially unhappy over the fact that his Golden Gophers garnered only five offensive rebounds against the Illini. "Our starting front line did not get an offensive rebound," Dutcher pointed out, "and you can't win in the Big Ten when that happens."

It was a different story at Purdue, however, where the Golden Gophers outrebounded the Boilers 32-25....led by John Shasky's nine caroms....and in general turned in a much better effort.

(OVER)

"We are never pleased with a loss," he told his squad after the Purdue game had ended, "but we are pleased with your effort," as Minnesota displayed a great deal of intensity against the Boilermakers.

Despite the fact that the Golden Gophers "played hard" at Purdue, the result was a loss for Minnesota which means that it will be "pay back" time when Illinois and Purdue come to Williams Arena in March....and it also means that Dutcher's quintet is 0-2 going into Thursday's Big Ten game against Michigan.

"It will be a very tough week for us," Dutcher admitted. "Michigan may have the best personnel in the conference, and it may have the most depth. Michigan State was picked with Iowa as a co-favorite for this year's title, so we will be going against two very strong opponents."

Biggest concern for Dutcher as he prepares for Michigan, a team that is 10-2 overall and 2-0 in conference play, is the physical condition of Minnesota's senior captain and forward Jim Petersen.

A 6-10 veteran, Petersen suffered a bruised calf muscle in his left leg during the closing moments of Minnesota's 60-56 victory at Detroit in December. He has not played since....missing non-conference games against Montana and Iowa State and both hoop assignments at Illinois and Purdue last week.

Petersen's condition continues to improve, and Minnesota hopes to have him available against Michigan....or at worst against Michigan State (7-4 and 1-1) on Saturday.

"Our concern now is that Jimmy has been inactive for over two weeks," Dutcher points out, "and the problem becomes more than just his physical condition. The layoff also hurts his conditioning and his timing."

If Petersen is not available, Dutcher is expected to keep Dave Dahlke, a 6-6 sophomore, in the starting lineup. Roland Brooks, a 6-7 senior, will open at the other forward with Shasky, a 7-0 sophomore, at center. The guards will be Tommy Davis, a 6-4 junior, and Marc Wilson, 6-1 guard.

"Our guards played well at Purdue," Dutcher said after Wilson scored 22 points and Davis added 18, "but we've got to get more out of our front line both rebounding and scoring."

GOPHER TALES -- Minnesota and Michigan have met 95 times on the hardwood and Michigan leads in the series 48-47 after those two teams split honors a year ago. Minnesota won 88-75 in Williams Arena but lost 63-58 at Ann Arbor.

The Minnesota vs. Michigan State series is not as old with only 63 games having been played between those two schools. The Golden Gophers lead by a 37-26 margin after splitting last year....Minnesota prevailing 69-67 at East Lansing but losing at home by a 79-67 score.

Davis continues to lead the Golden Gophers with a 14.5 average, but Wilson ranks a close second at 14.3 mark. Brooks is averaging 10.3 while Petersen....playing less games and scoring fewer total points....has a 12.3 average.

Petersen also ranks as Minnesota's top rebounder with an 8.3 average while Shasky is second at 5.9. Wilson leads the Golden Gophers in assists with 39 and in steals with 16.

ICERS TIED FOR 2ND, AT C.C.

Minneapolis, MN---Now that the holidays are over and Minnesota has dropped its first pair of 1984 in WCHA play, it's back to the drawing board for the UM hockey Gophers.

Minnesota missed out on a chance to move even with or pass North Dakota in the WCHA standings when it dropped both ends of a home series, 7-2 and 5-4, to the Bulldogs from Minnesota-Duluth. It marked the first time since 1972-73 that a UMD team has swept the Gophers at Williams Arena.

The twin wins forged a second place tie between the instate rivals. Both own 9-4-1 league records for 19 points, three behind North Dakota (11-3-0, 22).

After playing its last 10 collegiate games on home ice, the Gophers now head out on the road for contests Friday and Saturday against fast improving Colorado College at Colorado Springs. Both 8:30 CST games will be aired locally by KKSS-980 AM radio.

Not counting the loss to Team USA on January 1, Minnesota had not tasted a defeat in its last 12 games. But the Bulldogs ended that streak Friday with a four-goal outburst in the second period.

Tied 1-1 after the first period, UMD bolted in front on four scores while the only change mounted for UM was a goal by Jim Malwitz. The Bulldogs added two more in the final stanza for its 7-2 margin. The Gophers were outshot 39-21 in that contest.

The next night found Minnesota playing much better hockey, but it still wasn't enough. Duluth held period leads of 2-1 and 3-2, and added two more in the final stanza to equal the same output of the Gophers. Eric Lempe, Tom Rothstein, Wally Chapman and John Labatt scored Minnesota's goals.

Goalie Frank Pietrangelo suffered Friday's loss, while on Saturday Mike Vacanti dropped his first WCHA decision since becoming eligible under transfer rules last season.

For Gopher scoring leader Tom Rothstein, Saturday's game lifted a huge weight off his shoulders. In the November series at Duluth, and through Friday's game, he had yet to score a single point against the Bulldogs. But Tom came through with a goal and an assist in Saturday's contest.

He leads all teammates in point production with 20 goals and 24 assists in 24 games. Linemate Pat Micheletti is next with 40 points (16-24) and senior center Jeff Larson is third at 24 points (9-15).

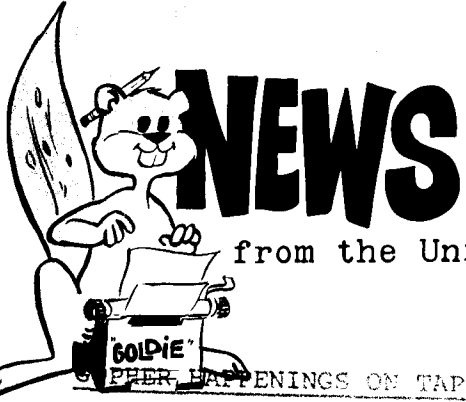

Minneapolis, MN---Every time the North Dakota hockey Fighting Sioux come to Williams Arena, it becomes one of the toughest tickets in town. This weekend is no exception.

Games Friday and Saturday against the top team in the WCHA show 300 general admission tickets remaining Friday, and 100 of the same Saturday. All reserved seats, except for a few singles, have been sold in advance.

Both games will be carried live in the Twin Cities via KKSS-980 AM radio.

North Dakota surged passed Minnesota in the third week of the season when the Gophers were tied in a game at Minnesota-Duluth. North Dakota carries a 13-3-0 WCHA record into the series for 26 points, five better than Minnesota's 10-5-1 league mark. Overall the Sioux are 21-5-0 while Minnesota stands 19-5-2.

Last weekend saw Minnesota finally break a three-game loss string when the Gophers rebounded to defeat Colorado College 4-1 on the road. The Tigers came from a 3-1 third period deficit Friday to win 4-3 in overtime.

Senior Mike Vacanti authored the Saturday win in the Gopher nets, and coach Brad Buetow said Monday he may be leaning towards starting Vacanti in goal Friday against North Dakota. Vacanti defeated the Sioux 1-0 here earlier.

"We could start Mike (Vacanti) Friday, but that's not certain as of this time," Buetow stated. "We'll probably remain with our rotation between he and sophomore Frank Pietrangelo. We are just not certain at this time who will play which game."

Asked about the importance of Saturday's win over Colorado College, Buetow replied, "First of all is the two points we gained. Secondly it was very important to stop the losing streak.

"I believe we played well out there both nights, except for possibly the last half of the third period Friday. But let me tell you that Colorado College has improved as much as any team. They are particularly tough in their own rink.

"We started out January playing poorly in our first game following the holiday break. In games during the latter period we skated an awfully lot of new faces trying to gain our rookies some varsity experience.

"That's good for the new men, but it does take away from our continuity. But I'm happy to say we say we have shown improvement in every game since the first loss (7-2) to Minnesota-Duluth January 6.

"This has to be a crucial weekend for us. Considering there are only five weeks left in league play, I'm not certain we can even afford a split. We were very fortunate to win twice against North Dakota here last time. They, too, are a better team than the one that skated here in November."

Buetow said there could be one or two lineup changes among the forwards who skated last weekend at Colorado College, but would not be pinned down as to who or on which lines.

Gopher scoring leader Tom Rothstein hit on a goal in each game last weekend and now has 46 points on 22 goals and 24 assists. Freshman Wally Chapman also scored once each night.

Sophomore defenseman Tony Kellin hit power play and shorthand goals for Minnesota in Saturday's win. His second goal was the game winner.

The Gopher specialty unit finally broke through with two power play scores Saturday after being blanked in four consecutive league games.

CAGEPS RESUME TRAVELS AFTER NOTCHING FIRST CONFERENCE WIN

Iowa and Northwestern are the next hurdles for Coach Jim Dutcher's University of Minnesota basketball team as it prepares for another demanding Big Ten Conference road trip.

On Thursday the Golden Gophers will invade Iowa City, IA, to take on the University of Iowa before moving over to Evanston, IL, Saturday to square off with the Northwestern Wildcats. Both games show 7:35 (CST) tip-offs.

Minnesota will go into Thursday's clash with an overall record of 9-4 and a Big Ten mark of 1-3 after splitting honors at home last week. The Hawks enter that game 8-5 and 1-2 while the Cats come into this week's action with identical 8-5 and 1-2 logs.

The Golden Gophers had dropped their third straight conference game 66-62 to Michigan last Thursday but finally notched that elusive first Big Ten win 69-61 over Michigan State on Saturday.

"The first olive out of the jar is always the toughest," Dutcher quipped after the victory over the Spartans. "Hopefully more wins, like the rest of the olives in that jar, will come easier now."

Dutcher, while obviously pleased with the outcome of the shootout against Michigan State, was far from happy with the way things went last week against the Wolverines from Michigan.

"We made an effort," Dutcher admitted, "but we had our chances to win and just couldn't pull it off. We couldn't get the basket that would have put us over the hump. We couldn't score when we had to. And all too often we were giving Michigan a second and third chance to score on their end of the floor."

After beating the Spartans, Dutcher admitted that it had been frustrating. "We had shots at beating both Purdue and Michigan," he said, "but didn't get the job done. We've been getting better every game, however, and the Michigan State game had to be our best."

Marc Wilson, 6-1 sophomore guard, was one of Minnesota's heroes against the Spartans as he ripped in 22 points, had four assists and registered two steals. John Shasky, 7-0 sophomore center, had his best night as a Golden Gopher with 10 points and....for the third consecutive game....nine rebounds.

But now Minnesota has to stop celebrating that coveted win and get ready for an extremely tough Big Ten road trip against the smarting Hawkeyes and Wildcats, a pair of talented clubs that want to get back on the winning track after dropping non-conference decisions last weekend (Iowa to Iowa State and Northwestern to George Mason).

And while the Golden Gophers would like to sweep that two-game swing, Dutcher realistically maintains that, "We need at least a split on this trip," knowing that a double loss like Minnesota suffered on its initial trek to Illinois and Purdue would be disastrous.

No changes are anticipated in Minnesota's lineup now that Jim Petersen, 6-10 senior forward and captain is back in the lineup at forward. He'll be joined by 6-7 senior Roland Brooks and Sha^sky up front while Wilson will team with 6-4 junior Tommy Davis in the backcourt.

WRESTLERS FACE IOWA IN SATURDAY'S WRESTLING SHOWCASE

Coach Billy Johnson's University of Minnesota wrestling team entertains powerhouse Iowa Saturday at 3:00 p.m. in the Wrestling Showcase at Williams Arena.

Tickets are available in advance at Bierman Ticket Office and are priced at \$3 for adults and \$2 for children 18 and under.

The Golden Gophers, 5-2-2 following last Saturday's 30-9 victory at Drake, feature senior co-captains Mike Foy (177 or 190), Steve Martinez (150) and Al Jenson (heavyweight). Amateur Wrestling News ranks Foy third at 177, Martinez fifth at 158 and junior Ed Giese fifth at 118.

National Mat News ranks Minnesota 15th nationally, while AWN does not include Johnson's squad in its top twenty. Iowa is first in both polls.

Iowa, coached by Jay Robinson this season while Dan Gable devotes his time to the Olympic Team, has won six consecutive NCAA titles and 10 straight Big Ten championships. Minnesota last defeated Iowa in 1973 and the Hawkeyes have not lost a Big Ten dual since 1974.

The Hawkeyes are led by senior 158-pounder Jim Zalesky, a two-time national champion who enters Iowa's Friday night home meet against Wisconsin with a 73-match winning streak. Pete Bush (190) is a one-time national champion who red-shirted last season. NOTE: Iowa takes a 9-0 record into its Friday match with Wisconsin...Minnesota's wrestling series with Iowa dates back to 1921 with the Hawkeyes holding a 41-14-1 edge over the Gophers.

Rob Brown, a sophomore from Chicago, Illinois, put together the best performance of his college career to lead Minnesota past Iowa 275.85 to 274.80 last Saturday at Williams Arena.

Brown finished first in vault (9.35), tied with teammate Joe Ray for first in high bar (9.65) and was second in both floor exercise (9.4) and parallel bars (9.4) enroute to his meet leading all-around total of 56.30. Ray, the defending Big Ten all-around champion, followed Brown with a 56.25 total.

Fredrik Pahlett, the nation's top ranked collegiate tennis player, and the rest of the University of Minnesota team will compete in a tournament at Kohler, Wisconsin Friday and Saturday.

Pahlett, a sophomore from Vaxjo, Sweden, reached the NCAA singles final last season and finished with a 38-7 record. He joins countryman Stefan Ericksson, a sophomore from Enkoping, Sweden, giving Coach Jerry Noyce the top two players in the Big Ten.

GOLDIE LEAGUE HOCKEY SCHEDULE ANNOUNCED

Boston, MA---At a news conference in Boston Wednesday, a preliminary schedule was released for teams from the WCHA and the newly formed Hockey East Conference of eastern schools concerning the 1984-85 college hockey season.

An interlocking series of games will be played between the eight members of the WCHA and the seven eastern colleges and universities. Each game will count in the respective standings of the two conferences.

WCHA schools will play 20 games among themselves, plus two games against each school from the Hockey East Conference. The eastern clubs play each other three games plus the 16 against WCHA members. So each conference will complete a 34-game league schedule.

Present members of the WCHA include Colorado College, University of Denver, University of Minnesota, University of Minnesota-Duluth, University of North Dakota and University of Wisconsin. Next season two more schools will join the WCHA, including an original charter member, Michigan Tech University, and Northern Michigan University.

Members of the Hockey East Conference include Boston College, Boston University, Lowell University, University of Maine, Northeastern University, University of New Hampshire and Providence College.

As in all preliminary schedules, the one released Wednesday is subject to minor changes.

In the first year of this new agreement, Minnesota will play four of the eastern schools at home, and three on the road. All meetings include two-game series similar to the style used for years by the WCHA.

The Gophers will host Northeastern, Boston College, Lowell and New Hampshire in 1984-85, and play Boston University, Providence and Maine on the road.

In the WCHA, the Gophers are scheduled to play four games (home and home) against Colorado College, North Dakota and Denver. Minnesota will play a single two-games series against Wisconsin, Minnesota-Duluth, Michigan Tech and Northern Michigan. This portion of the schedule works out evenly, 10 games at home and 10 away.

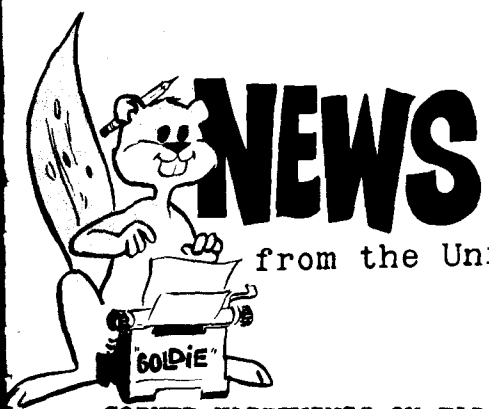
Naturally, the WCHA schedule of meeting some teams four times and others twice will rotate each year between different opponents.

CAGERS HOST BADGERS AT 7:00 P.M. WEDNESDAY

Minnesota, nursing a bruised ego and lamenting its missed opportunities, returns to Williams Arena on Wednesday to entertain the University of Wisconsin in a 7:00 p.m. basketball assignment.

That mid-week date and early starting time (it will be one hour earlier than the normal Williams Arena tip-offs) are a result of the contest being designated as the MetroSports Big Ten Conference television game of the week.

Coach Jim Dutcher hopes that the change, and the return home, will have good effects on his shell-shocked Golden Gophers and perhaps prod them into taking advantage of situations....something they failed to do last week.

Minnesota managed to register a split on the road in Big Ten games at Iowa (a 56-49 victory for the Golden Gophers last Thursday) and at Northwestern (a 52-50 heartbreaking overtime loss on Saturday) this past week.

Despite the fact that Dutcher had indicated a week ago that he was hoping for no worse than a division of honors on that road swing against the Hawkeyes and Wildcats, he now has returned home totally disappointed that his squad did not gain a sweep.

"We missed a golden opportunity to take a step forward in the Big Ten race," he said. "When you win the first one on a two-game swing, you find yourselves in a position where you are looking at a chance to win two. And when you don't, it's a terrible letdown."

But a letdown is what the Golden Gophers had as they let a five point lead slip away in that overtime setback at the hands of the Wildcats. "We had our chances to win it," Dutcher said. "We failed to score on seven straight possessions down the stretch. We had too many turnovers and missed shots. When we needed a big play, we couldn't get it."

It was a totally opposite situation from the one encountered by Minnesota at Iowa City two nights earlier where the Golden Gophers won with big plays in the closing moments of the game.

"We had poise when we needed it," Dutcher said after the win over Iowa. "We didn't get a good offensive effort in the first half, but we used three different zones and a man-to-man defense on them, and it enabled us to make the big plays in the second half."

Now, however, Minnesota hosts Wisconsin, a surprise in the Big Ten, in a mid-week game that will allow the Golden Gophers one less day of preparation and at a time when they literally are licking their wounds.

"We didn't play as well as we can play at Northwestern," Dutcher stressed, "and the outcome proved that any team in the Big Ten can beat any other team on any given night. We missed opportunities to win during the game, and we missed an opportunity to improve our standing in the conference by not winning. But this is a long season, and there will be more opportunities. We just have to be ready to take advantage of them."

GOPHER TALES --- Minnesota goes into Wednesday's game against the Badgers with an overall record of 10-5 and a Big Ten mark of 2-4. Invading Wisconsin, which lost at Iowa last Saturday after dumping the Wildcats at Northwestern last Thursday, is 7-8 on the year and 3-3 against Big Ten foes.

Over the years Minnesota and Wisconsin have met 138 times in basketball, and going into Wednesday's shootout at Williams Arena the Golden Gophers hold a 77-61 lead in the series over the Badgers.

A year ago Dutcher's contingent swept the Badgers, winning 63-58 in the first meeting at Madison and then coming back to register a 78-71 triumph at home in Williams Arena.

In fact Minnesota has won four straight from the Badgers (the Golden Gophers also swept two in 1981-82). Wisconsin's most-recent triumph was in the regular season finale in 1980-81....a 60-58 verdict in overtime at Madison.

Junior guard Tommy Davis will go into Wednesday's game ranked as Minnesota's top scorer. He boasts a 14.4 average. John Shasky is the top Golden Gopher rebounder with 96 (an average of 6.4 per game) while Marc Wilson leads in assists with 56 and steals with 24. Roland Brooks is the top free throw shooter. He's hitting .885 with 23-of-26.

ICERS BACK AT WISCONSIN

Minneapolis, MN---After salvaging a home series split last weekend against the league-leading North Dakota Sioux, Minnesota's hockey Gophers head back on the road this weekend playing Friday and Saturday nights against Wisconsin.

Minnesota dropped a tight checking game Friday to the Sioux, 3-1, but hit on three third period goals Saturday to win 7-4 and keep hopes alive in the WCHA title chase. Minnesota remained five points behind North Dakota, and four behind the surging Minnesota-Duluth Bulldogs in the WCHA standings with four weekends of league action remaining.

Both games this weekend will be aired in the Twin Cities via KKSS-980 AM radio, and WFBT-TV, Ch. 29.

The top goal tender in the WCHA, North Dakota's Jon Casey, held the Gophers at bay Friday making 39 stops to 21 by UM goalie Frank Pietrangelo. The lone Gopher score came on a power play by Tom Rothstein early in the second period after the Sioux had taken a 2-0 first period lead.

But Saturday turned into a wide open affair as both teams opened up on offense. The game was tied 2-2 and 4-4 at the period breaks, but defenseman Tony Kellin and rookie forward Steve MacSwain tallied early third period goals for the Gophers to provide the win.

The final score came with seven seconds remaining and after North Dakota had pulled goalie Greg Strome. Junior defenseman Tom Parenteau scored what may have been the longest goal in college history.

The rink in Williams Arena is 220 feet long, about 20 feet longer than most conventional ice surfaces. Parenteau was standing just behind his own goal line and flipped the puck to center ice. From there it slid untouched into the empty net giving Minnesota its final 7-4 margin. The estimate is that his shot traveled just under 200 feet.

Senior goalie Mike Vacanti gained the win for Minnesota making 25 saves while Strome stopped 36 Gopher tries. For the weekend, Minnesota surpassed North Dakota in shots on goal 83 to 53.

Minnesota's last trip to Madison ended in a disaster for the local lads. The Gophers went to Wisconsin in November with a 7-0-1 record and was just one point behind North Dakota in the WCHA with a 5-0-1 league mark.

But the Badgers unleashed their most proficient attack of the season in taking the Gophers twice, 3-1 and 9-0. Earlier, Minnesota had defeated Wisconsin 5-3 and 7-6 at Williams Arena. So this weekend could well decide the season series for the friendly neighbors.

The Badgers, like the Gophers, have struggled as of late and own a league record of 7-11-0 good for fourth place. Wisconsin is 15-12-0 overall while Minnesota's records read 20-6-2 overall and 13-4-1 in league play.

"We were very pleased to see our men bounce back to win the second game against North Dakota," Gopher head coach Brad Buetow said Monday. "A loss in that game could well have spelled the end of any hopes we had on repeating as WCHA champions. Now it's strictly up to us.

"We have series remaining against both Minnesota-Duluth and North Dakota, so we are not out of it yet. Besides that we have to play at Wisconsin and Denver. All four of those series are going to be very, very tough. But I believe our men are equal to the challenge and will not back away from skating against any of those teams."

Buetow singled out two rookies for solid play last weekend and said that both Steve MacSwain and Tim Bergland will probably play at Wisconsin. He also said he is considering changing his goalie rotation. That could send Vacanti onto the ice Friday with Pietrangelo playing in Saturday's contest.

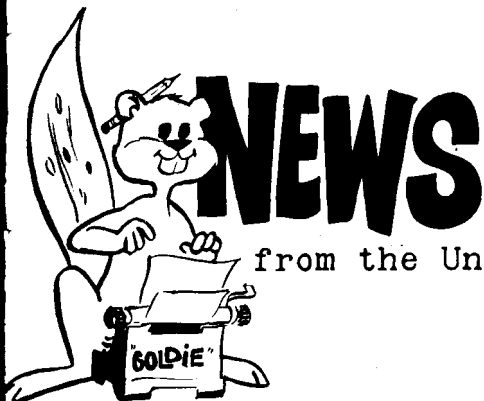
The victories raise the team's dual record to 4-0 this season.

GOPHERS HOST INDIANA & OHIO STATE THIS WEEK

With the first half of the 1984 Big Ten Conference basketball season drawing to a close this week, Coach Jim Dutcher's University of Minnesota contingent finds itself at home for two important assignments.

On Thursday the Golden Gophers are slated to entertain Indiana University. Then on Saturday Minnesota will play host to the Ohio State University. Both contests show 8:05 p.m. tip-off times in Williams Arena.

Minnesota will go into Thursday's confrontation with the Indiana Hoosiers sporting an overall record of 11-5 and a Big Ten Conference mark of 3-4 after downing the University of Wisconsin 75-62 last Wednesday.

It was the only outing of the week for the Golden Gophers who will be getting their first taste of competition in eight days when entertaining the high-flying Hoosiers Thursday night.

Big concern, therefore, for Coach Dutcher may be how much the layoff will hurt his host contingent. Dutcher, while he must have been pleased with that recent win over Wisconsin, had to enjoy it by long distance after being called back to Alpena, MI, due to the death of his father. Dutcher did not return to the Minnesota campus until the weekend, a fact which may have curtailed the Golden Gophers' preparations for this week's competition.

Nevertheless, Minnesota will take on Indiana hoping to get another stellar performance from a continually-improving John Shasky. A 7-0 sophomore, Shasky dropped in 18 points and...even more impressively...garnered 16 rebounds in last week's triumph over the Badgers.

It was the second time this season that Shasky has scored 18 (he first accomplished that feat against Iowa State), but the 16 boards collared against Wisconsin marked a career high for the Minnesota center.

Dutcher also hopes Marc Wilson, 6-1 sophomore guard, continues his streak against Indiana. Wilson, after failing to score in the first half against Wisconsin, moved into high gear after intermission. Wilson got 16 points in the second half and also registered another steal and an assist. He leads the Golden Gophers in those latter two categories with 57 and 25 respectively.

Tommy Davis, a 6-4 junior and Wilson's running-mate at guard, had 13 points against the Badgers and continues to lead Minnesota in scoring with an average of 14.3 per game. Roland Brooks, a 6-7 senior forward, finished with 12 against Wisconsin and has an 11.1 average on the year.

Minnesota's other starter, a 6-10 senior forward and Captain Jim Petersen, scored eight points and had 10 rebounds in last week's assignment and on the year has averages of 10.5 and 7.3 in those categories.

Those five Golden Gophers are expected to get the call from Dutcher for starting assignments against Indiana on Thursday and again against Ohio State on Saturday in hopes of improving Minnesota's standing in the Big Ten.

A year ago Indiana swept the series by 76-51 and 63-59 margins. In all Minnesota and Indiana have met 108 times in basketball, and the invading Hoosiers hold a commanding 63-45 edge.

Against Ohio State last year Minnesota and the Buckeyes split. The Golden Gophers posted an 89-80 triumph in two overtimes at Columbus but dropped a 74-69 decision at home in Williams Arena. In all, there have been 89 basketball confrontations, and the Buckeyes lead 51-38.

Following this week's contests against Indiana and Ohio State, Minnesota will open the second half of the 1984 Big Ten schedule by playing those same two opponents on the road. All of which makes this week's home stand all the more critical.

"We came home from the Iowa-Northwestern swing knowing that we would have three straight home games," Dutcher said, "and we knew we would have an opportunity to move up in the standings. We got one win from Wisconsin last week. Now the rest is up to us."

Jimmy Williams, veteran Minnesota assistant coach who held the reins last week during Dutcher's absence, felt Minnesota played hard and "with intelligence" against Wisconsin. Both Dutcher and Williams know that it will take more of the same if the Golden Gophers hope to gain any success against Indiana and Ohio State this week.

While Minnesota was taking last weekend off, Indiana was winning two. The Hoosiers beat Northwestern 57-44 and Iowa 54-47 to raise their overall record to 12-5 and Big Ten mark to 5-2. Ohio State also won a pair, downing Iowa 65-54 and Northwestern 72-51. The Buckeyes came into this week's action 11-6 and 4-3.

Well, after splitting two games with the Badgers, losing 5-4 and winning 4-1, the Gophers are now five points behind new leader UM-D, and four points behind second place North Dakota.

The latter teams played a giant series last weekend in Duluth with the Bulldogs taking over first place via a 4-1 win Friday. The teams tied 4-4 the following night.

So next up for the Gophers comes a stiff challenge from the high scoring Denver Pioneers. The teams meet Friday and Saturday in the Mile High City with both games being carried in the Twin Cities on KKSS-980 AM radio, and WFBT-TV Ch. 29. Both games begin at 8:35 p.m. Minnesota time.

The Gophers can be masters of their own destiny in terms of defending the WCHA championship won by the 1982-83 Minnesota squad. Following the Denver series, Minnesota's final four games are against Minnesota-Duluth at home, Feb. 10-11, and at North Dakota, Feb. 17-18.

Minnesota started off last weekend as if there were little plans to defend last year's title. In simple terms, the Gophers did not play well for two periods in trailing Wisconsin 5-2.

But UM came back awfully strong in the final period and almost forged a 5-5 tie in the final seconds. Wisconsin garnered a 5-4 victory, a loss that in the stretch drive could prove costly.

But in giving credit where it's due, the next night belonged to the Gophers from start to finish. Minnesota outhustled Wisconsin to every puck and returned to its strong passing game that was missing Friday.

In addition, sophomore goalie Frank Pietrangelo exhibited the classic style of play he turned in during last year's stretch run as the Gophers closed out the series with a 4-1 win. UM led 2-0 after one period on goals by Tom Rothstein (26) and Billy Yon (5), the latter on a breakaway.

After Wisconsin scored on a 4-3 power play, Tony Kellin, playing right wing for the first time since joining UM as a defenseman last season, scored his 9th of the year in the third period with rookie Todd Okerland (5) adding the final Gopher score.

Rothstein, Minnesota's top scorer with 52 points (26-26), hit for two goals Friday while Tim Bergland and Jeff Larson turned in scores during the third period rally that fell one short. Mike Vacanti was in goal Friday.

The Gophers have a shot at possibly catching one, or maybe both the WCHA leaders. However, it is almost certain that to do one or the other, Minnesota would have to win all remaining six conference games, plus gain some help from other teams playing Minnesota-Duluth and North Dakota.

This weekend Minnesota-Duluth is at home to Colorado College while North Dakota hosts Wisconsin.

But whatever happens, Minnesota can still stand tall in knowing that for the seventh straight year, and 10th time in the last 11 seasons, a Gopher team has won more than 20 games. This year's record reads 21-7-2 overall, and 12-7-1 in the WCHA. Last season Minnesota took the WCHA championship with an 18-7-1 league mark and ended 32-12-1 after reachsding the final four of the NCAA championship tournament.

The Golden Gophers, 5-5-2 overall and 0-2 in the Big Ten, wrestle Northwestern Wednesday, February 8 at Williams Arena before closing the dual season on the road at Indiana, Purdue and Ohio State. The scheduled match Wednesday at Wisconsin has been cancelled.

Mike Foy, a 177-pound senior from Markham, Illinois, will compete for the East team Sunday, February 5 in the East-West All-Star dual meet at Iowa. Foy is the team leader with a 30-4 record this season.

Minnesota dropped a 23-15 decision at Iowa State last Friday and suffered a 29-15 loss at home last Saturday to Michigan State.

TRACK AND FIELD TEAM AT WISCONSIN FOR TRIANGULAR MEET

The University of Minnesota track and field team will compete in a triangular meet Saturday at Madison, Wisconsin against the University of Wisconsin and the Chicago Track Club.

Coach Roy Griak's Golden Gophers opened the indoor season last weekend in their own non-scoring Northwest Open at the U of M Fieldhouse.

Senior sprinter Francis Ude claimed one of Minnesota's three individual titles with a victory in the 60 yard dash with a time of 6:39. The other Gopher winners were senior Mike Moran in the 1,000 yard run with a time of 2:16.91 and senior Brian Maas in the 880 yard dash with a clocking of 1:55.24.

Minnesota is on the road again next weekend competing in the Nebraska Invitational on Saturday, February 11.

SWIMMING AND DIVING TEAM AT IOWA STATE

The University of Minnesota swimming and diving team travels to Ames, Iowa this week for a Friday dual against Iowa State. The non-conference meet is scheduled for 5:30 p.m.

The Golden Gophers next home meet is Friday, February 10 against Kansas at Cooke Hall.

Coach Paul Stearns' squad, 4-2 overall and 2-1 in the Big Ten, is coming off an emotional 71-42 victory over rival Wisconsin last Friday at Cooke Hall. Stearns was pleased with the performance against Wisconsin, but warns about the importance of dual meets.

"This was our first big meet since early December and it gave me a good indication of where we are at this stage of the season," Stearns said. "At the end of the season they don't ask you how you did in duals, but how you did in the Big Ten. Last season we did well in duals and finished eighth in the Big Ten."

Coach Craig Lincoln's diving corps outscored Wisconsin 16-2 in the one-meter and three-meter competitions. Senior Randy Lien captured the three-meter title with 584.025 points and finished second in the one-meter event with 493.95 points. Junior Flip Crummer claimed the one-meter title with 511.27 points and finished second in the three-meter competition with 497.85 points.

GYMNASTICS TEAM AT IOWA STATE

With the form that brought the University of Minnesota gymnastics team six of the last eight Big Ten titles, coach Fred Roethlisberger has assembled another highly talented squad. (MORE)

The Golden Gophers, 6-0 overall and 3-0 in the Big Ten, face the season's toughest challenge to date Saturday when they dual Iowa State on the road. The team follows the Iowa State meet with an appearance in the UCLA Invitational on February 10.

Roethlisberger's gymnasts are led by rising all-around star Rob Brown. A sophomore from Chicago, Brown captured his fourth consecutive all-around victory last Saturday in Minnesota's triple-dual victories over Wisconsin-Oshkosh, Eastern Montana and Wisconsin-LaCrosse with a score of 55.60. He claimed individual titles in floor exercise (9.55), rings (9.50) and vault (9.40).

Minnesota scored a season high 274.30 points in the Saturday meet at Williams Arena. Wisconsin-Oshkosh followed with 234.80, Eastern Montana tallied 234.05 and Wisconsin-LaCrosse scored 223.25. The meet is scored as three dual victories for the Gophers.

Other top all-arounders are senior Joe Ray, the defending Big Ten all-around champion and two-time National Team member; sophomore Dave Menke and freshman Collin Godkin.

Specialists play an important role in the team's production. Senior Tom Goechel, rings; junior Kevin Cochran, floor exercise and vault; junior Joe Brough, parallel bars; and freshman Steve Braun, pommel horse; give Roethlisberger a solid lineup in each event.

The next home meet is Saturday, February 18 when the Gophers entertain Northern Illinois at Williams Arena.

TENNIS TEAM AT UCLA FOR THE ITCA NATIONAL INTERCOLLEGIATE TEAM CHAMPIONSHIP

The nation's top 16 college tennis teams are gathered at UCLA this week for the ITCA National Intercollegiate Team Championship. For the first time in the school's history, the University of Minnesota is included in the exclusive field.

Coach Jerry Noyce's Golden Gophers, 4-0 in dual meets this season, open the tournament Thursday against sixth-ranked Clemson. Fourth-ranked Trinity and Utah are in the same four-team bracket as Minnesota and Clemson. The tournament concludes on Sunday.

Noyce's lineup features 1983 NCAA singles runnerup Fredrik Pahlett, a sophomore from Vaxjo, Sweden who captured the Nike All-America tournament last fall at UCLA. Pahlett returns to the squad after missing last weekend's Marriott-Big Ten Indoor Singles Championship at Ohio State with the flu and blisters on his feet.

Sophomore Stefan Eriksson, another Swede who also competed in last season's NCAA tournament, mans the number two spot in the singles lineup. Sophomore Matt Grace gets the nod at third singles, freshman Chuck Merzbacher plays fifth singles and junior David Blackstone completes the lineup in the sixth position.

Likely doubles combinations are Pahlett and Grace at number one, Eriksson and Kolaric at number two along with Merzbacher and senior Lou McKee at number three.

The next home event is the Republic Airlines Tennis Showcase Saturday and Sunday, February 11 and 12 at the Burnsville Racquet and Swim Club. The Golden Gophers join defending champion Harvard, Miami and Alabama in the four-team tournament.

Minneapolis, MN---The Minnesota hockey Gophers scored a 4-2 upset win against WCHA leader Minnesota-Duluth at home last Friday, but Saturday's 6-3 loss to the smooth-skating Bulldogs means the Gophers will finish third in this year's race no matter what happens this weekend.

However, when Minnesota plays at second place North Dakota, the Gophers could help decide who wins the 1984 WCHA championship.

North Dakota stands just two points behind Minnesota-Duluth in the race for top honors. UMD is at home this weekend to fourth place Wisconsin.

Should the Bulldogs stumble, then North Dakota could either rise to the top, or at least gain a tie with UMD. But to do that the Sioux would have to take UM twice, and see UMD falter either once or twice to Wisconsin.

Whatever, both Gopher games will be aired in the Twin Cities by KKSS-980 AM radio and WFBT-TV, Ch. 29, at 7:30 p.m. Friday and Saturday. (OVER)

Minnesota may have played its most complete game of the year Friday in edging the favored Bulldogs. The Gophers put pressure on ace freshman goal tender Rick Kostl from the opening shift, and never let up.

At the same time Gopher goal tender Mike Vacanti was super solid in the Minnesota nets making 35 saves to 38 by Kostl.

Roger Bowe and Todd Okerlund gave the Gophers a 2-0 lead before UMD tied matters in the second period on scores by Tom Kurvers and Jim Johnson.

But with just over one minute remaining in the third period, Pat Micheletti scored the Minnesota game winner, and 14 seconds later Bowe got his second of the game to clinch the victory.

But Saturday was a different story. Minnesota tied the Bulldogs at 1-1 early in the first period, but played catch-up hockey the rest of the way. The Bulldogs led 2-1 after the first period, and then exploded for four goals, two in a row by WCHA Player of the Week Bob Lakso, in the second period to put away the victory. Lakso's goals came 1:26 apart and his second was shorthanded.

The Gophers added scores by Billy Yon and Bowe in the same period, but UMD made its 6-3 lead stand up through a scoreless third session.

Through the weekend Bowe was Minnesota's scoring leader with three goals while Micheletti chipped in with one each night.

The series completed six games between the schools with the Bulldogs laying claim to the Taconite Trophy which goes to the series winner each year. Minnesota-Duluth won three times and the Gophers twice with one contest ending in a 3-3 standoff this season.

The Gophers and North Dakota have already played four games at Williams Arena this season with Minnesota winning 4-3 and 1-0 back in November. The schools split another pair in January with the Sioux taking a 3-1 victory and UM coming back to win 7-4 the next night.

Minnesota stands 23-9-2 overall, and is 14-9-1 good for 29 points in WCHA play. Minnesota-Duluth has 36 points (17-5-2) and North Dakota 34 points (16-6-2).

Results of last weekend moved Minnesota from 10th to 6th place in the weekly national college hockey poll. Minnesota-Duluth is second behind RPI with North Dakota holding down fifth place.

Gopher wing Tom Rothstein continued atop the Minnesota scoring derby by adding two assists bringing his season point total to 56 on 26 goals and 30 assists. Center Pat Micheletti stayed close at 52 points on 22 goals and 30 assists.

Rothstein is tied for seventh in the WCHA scoring race with 33 points (14-19) while Micheletti has 30 points (14-16) in league play.

Among league goal tenders, Vacanti is fourth with a 3.68 goals allowed average, one spot ahead of teammate Frank Pietrangelo who has a 3.83 average.

GOLDEN GOPHERS SIGN PROSPECTIVE GRIDDBERS

Thirty high school senior student-athletes have signed National Letters of Intent as well as Big Ten Conference scholarship tenders in football with the University of Minnesota.

Four additional prospective student-athletes signed National Letters of Intent with the U of M and in the process indicated to Coach Lou Holtz that they also would enroll at Minnesota and become candidates for the Golden Gopher football team.

Earlier one junior college transfer had signed (counting against last year's scholarship limitations) with the University of Minnesota, and he will be enrolled at the U of M in time for spring practice.

Coach Holtz was extremely pleased with his initial class of prospective student-athletes at the U of M. "Our recruiting went better than expected," Holtz admitted. "We came further than we had reason to hope for. I feel good overall about the results."

Holtz, who has named Minnesota's new football coach late in December, regards the delegation of incoming Golden Gophers as a solid one that includes a number of highly-recruited football standouts.

"I don't know if we have signed any future superstars," Holtz said, "but I do believe we have a group of good athletes who have a chance of becoming even better football players. I think they will have good speed, be good students and are people with character."

Especially pleasing to Holtz was the success his first recruiting attempt achieved within the boundaries of Minnesota. "We offered scholarships to 12 high school seniors in Minnesota," he said, "and we signed 11 of them. It's a tribute to the people of the state, the local community and our players who have enough faith in the future to sell our program. We hope next year to score 100% recruiting within Minnesota."

In evaluating his initial corps of recruits, Holtz mentioned speed as exemplified by Jason Bruce, a wide receiver from Burnsville, MN, who runs a 4.38 40, and by Dennis Carter, a wide receiver from North High School in Miami, FLA, who boasts a 4.35 40.

Holtz also stressed academics in his recruiting. Heading the list of STUDENT-athletes signed by Minnesota are Tim Juneau, a tight end and linebacker from Blaine, and Troy Wolkow an offensive guard from Lakeville. Both have logged 4.0 Grade-Point-Averages in high school.

GOLDEN GOPHER CAGERS STAY ON THE ROAD

That old saying about not succeeding but trying again (and again) is playing havoc with Coach Jim Dutcher and his University of Minnesota basketball team, but they'll continue following it with hopes that success is just around the corner.

Last week found the Golden Gophers getting hit with the not succeeding part as they dropped two tough decisions on the road. First they fell 73-62 at Ohio State on Thursday and then dropped a 74-72 overtime decision at Indiana on Saturday.

Now Minnesota will try a third road assignment still hoping to crack into the winner's circle by invading Wisconsin for a 7:00 p.m. Big Ten Conference MetroSports TV game of the week assignment on Wednesday.

Then on Saturday the Golden Gophers will step out of Big Ten play...but remain on the road for the fourth straight time...to take on Cincinnati in Cincinnati on Saturday at 8:05 p.m. (EST).

Minnesota will go into Wednesday's critical Big Ten Conference game against the Badgers with an overall record of 12-8 and a Big Ten mark of 4-7 after losing those two toughies last week.

Wisconsin, meanwhile, will risk an overall season mark of 7-13 against the invading Gophers. The Badgers are 3-8 in the Big Ten after falling 71-65 to Ohio State last weekend.

Coach Dutcher's big concern may be convincing his cagers that they still can be winners after dropping that heartbreaking decision to the Hoosiers in Bloomington last Saturday.

Minnesota led by 15 at one point in the second half and seemed to have the game on ice even in the closing moments of the game, but a series of untimely fouls and costly turnovers (the Golden Gophers offered up the ball 18 times at Indiana) gave the decision to the host contingent.

"You want to get mad at the players for the mistakes they made," Dutcher said after that loss, "but you can't get mad because of the effort they gave. Our players worked their butts off. There were a series of "if" situations involved in the final minutes that just tear your stomach linings. We get any one of those ifs and the game is ours."

Now the if question centers around Minnesota's ability to snap its two-game losing streak...something the Golden Gophers should be able to do after topping the Badgers 75-62 at Williams Arena in January. Dutcher believes Minnesota can win if it is mentally able to rid itself of the memories of last week and concentrate on the task at hand.

"It will be tough for our players to get back up for Wisconsin," Dutcher admitted. "We got fogged in trying to come home Saturday night, and because of the necessity of traveling on Sunday we had to scratch our plans to practice. It's an early game this week, so we really have two less days of preparations."

Dutcher changed his lineup at Indiana, inserting freshman forward Kevin Smith (6-7) into the starting lineup in place of 7-0 sophomore John Shasky. He may do the same at Wisconsin, with that cager joining 6-10 senior Jim Petersen, 6-7 senior Roland Brooks, 6-4 junior Tommy Davis and 6-1 sophomore Marc Wilson.

PAHLETT AND COMPANY AT NATIONAL INTERCOLLEGIATE INDOOR

Fredrik Pahlett, star University of Minnesota sophomore from Sweden along with teammates Pete Kolaric and Stefan Eriksson will compete in the National Intercollegiate Indoors Thursday through Sunday at Indianapolis, Indiana.

The tournament is the second jewel of college tennis' triple crown. Pahlett, the top seed this week, captured the Nike All-America title at UCLA last fall and could become the first player to complete the triple crown with a victory this weekend and at the NCAA tournament this spring.

GOLDEN GOPHER CAGERS RETURN HOME

Following four straight road assignments, the University of Minnesota's Golden Gophers return to Williams Arena....and to the Big Ten....this week for a pair of crucial conference basketball outings.

Thursday Coach Jim Dutcher's quintet plays host to Northwestern University. Then Saturday the Golden Gophers take on arch-rival Iowa. Both of those Big Ten shootouts show 8:05 p.m. tip-off times.

All of that action follows on the heels of a two-week road trek that had Dutcher and his Minnesota basketball team dragging. After dropping two straight in Big Ten play a week ago, the Golden Gophers bounced back to win 68-67 in conference play at Wisconsin last Wednesday and then stepped out of the league to notch a 65-61 triumph at Cincinnati on Saturday.

"Neither of those wins was very pretty," Dutcher admitted, "but they were still wins, and more important they were road wins. We'll count 'em and now try to get ready for a week at home."

That return to Williams Arena is a welcome one for the Golden Gophers, although they know that both Northwestern and Iowa are coming off impressive weeks of their own and will be tough to face at this stage of the season.

Northwestern seems to have hit a peak in its 1983-84 efficiency level as it scored two big wins last week, beating Ohio State on Thursday and then coming back to upset Indiana on Saturday. Iowa, meanwhile, split honors, falling to the Hoosiers on Thursday but rebounding to rip Ohio State on Saturday.

"I prefer to face teams that are coming off wins instead of losses," Dutcher was quoted as saying, "even though it may indicate that they are playing well right now. We just will have to be ready for them."

Dutcher knows that being at home should help after playing four straight on the road. And he knows that of the six Big Ten games left on the '84 slate, four will take place in Williams Arena.

At Wisconsin, Minnesota built up another 15 point lead only to see it slip away. In fact the Golden Gophers trailed by five with 40 seconds left in the contest before pulling out the decision....when Roland Brooks, Minnesota's 6-7 senior forward hit a jumper with two seconds left to provide the margin of victory.

Then at Cincinnati Minnesota led by nine in the first half and by 11 in the second, and again those margins were erased as the Golden Gophers had to fight for their lives in the closing moments.

"We seemed to find new ways of playing leads into ties," Dutcher moaned after the Cincinnati affair. "I'll admit, however, that we didn't approach the Cincinnati game like a conference game, and it showed in our effort."

There were bright spots for Minnesota last week, however, both at Wisconsin and at Cincinnati. Against the Badgers, all five starters finished in double figures, and Tommy Davis, 6-4 junior guard, led things with 19. The Golden Gophers shot 61% from the floor.

Then at Cincinnati, four of the five starters wound up in double figures (6-1 sophomore guard Marc Wilson had nine), and Captain Jim Petersen, 6-10 senior forward, took over the role of pace-setter with 15. AND Minnesota shot 68% from the floor.

Those two wins enabled Minnesota to up its overall season record to 13-8. The Golden Gophers are 5-7 in the Big Ten. Northwestern will risk an overall season record of 11-12 and a Big Ten log of 4-9 while Iowa enters this week's play (the Hawks are at Wisconsin Thursday) with an overall mark of 10-13 and conference record of 3-10.

GOPHER TALES --- Minnesota and Northwestern have met 106 times in history, and the Golden Gophers lead in the series 63-44. Earlier this year, Minnesota fell 52-50 in overtime at Evanston.

The Golden Gophers and Iowa played even more often....135 times to be exact, and Minnesota will carry a 75-60 advantage into Saturday's confrontation. The first time around this season the Golden Gophers registered a 56-49 verdict at Iowa City.

Following this week's two assignments in Williams Arena, Minnesota hits the road again to play at Michigan State and Michigan next week before returning home to close the current campaign against Illinois and Purdue.

In the earlier loss at Northwestern, Davis was Minnesota's top scorer with 15 points while Petersen had 10 points and 10 rebounds. Against the Hawkeyes in January, Davis was tops with 18.

ICERS SWEEP AT ND, HOST CC IN PLAYOFFS

Minneapolis, MN---The Minnesota hockey Gophers finished their 1983-84 regular season schedule by surprising North Dakota twice in Grand Forks last weekend, 5-4 and 6-3.

The twin wins give Minnesota a season record of 25-9-2. In the WCHA, Minnesota finished in third place with a 16-9-1 league record good for 33 points, one behind runner-up North Dakota.

Minnesota's win Friday eliminated any chance North Dakota had of catching the champion Bulldogs. But it became academic the same night when UM-D won 4-2 against Wisconsin at home Friday to clinch its first WCHA title ever.

So the Gophers will be home this weekend for a first round WCHA playoff series, a two-game, total-goal affair, against sixth place Colorado College. Games are scheduled at 2 p.m. Saturday and Sunday, Feb. 25-26, at Williams Arena.

Tickets for the playoff series are priced at \$6.50 adults and \$4 Twin Cities UM students for reserved seats. General admission tickets for adults and students are priced at \$4.

Season ticket holders have already been given the option to purchase their same seats for the playoff games. Any of the latter not already picked up are on sale across the counter at the Bierman Building ticket office.

Last week's series sweep at North Dakota marked the first time Minnesota has taken both ends of a WCHA series in 1984. The last sweep came December 20-21 against U.S. International at home.

One key to last weekend was back-to-back superior performances by goalies Mike Vacanti, Friday, and Frank Pietrangelo, Saturday. Both excelled in keeping North Dakota at bay until the Gopher offense got hot.

Sophomore center Pat Micheletti led the Gopher attack with three goals, all power play scores, and two assists for a 5-point weekend. Sophomore wing Tony Kellin, a converted defenseman, was the only other Gopher to score more than one goal. Kellin got one each night.

Although Gopher scoring leader Tom Rothstein got but one goal on the weekend, it was a giant goal. Rothstein scored with just 1:23 remaining in Friday's game to break a 4-4 tie and give Minnesota a big victory. His goal became a breakaway score when both North Dakota defensemen tripped and fell.

Another big Gopher goal came on the weekend when senior center Jeff Larson scored a shorthanded tally in the second period to put Minnesota ahead to stay 3-2. North Dakota had scored the first two goals of the game in the opening period.

Minnesota finished its regular season play with five wins against North Dakota in six outings. UM took three of four games played in Williams Arena.

The Gophers took three of four from Colorado College this season winning twice at home, 4-2 and 4-3, and splitting a pair in Colorado Springs. C.C. won the first night 4-3 in overtime with the Gophers coming back to take a 4-1 victory the next night.

Colorado College finished 5-21-0 in the WCHA. The Tigers dropped two games to Denver last weekend eliminating any chance of vacating the WCHA cellar. The Tigers are 9-23-1 for all games played this season.

Should Minnesota win its series against C.C, and fourth place Wisconsin defeat visiting Denver the same days, then the Gophers would return to Grand Forks to meet second place WCHA finisher UND in a second round playoff series.

WRESTLERS AT BIG TEN TOURNAMENT

The eighth-ranked University of Minnesota wrestling team will compete in the 70th Annual Big Ten Tournament Friday and Saturday at Michigan State.

Coach Wally Johnson's Golden Gophers closed the dual season with a 23-19 victory at Ohio State last Friday. The team finished with a six-match winning streak and a 11-5-2 record. Johnson's record in 32 seasons at Minnesota is 367-189-11.

Top-ranked Iowa, the overwhelming tournament favorite, has captured the past 10 Big Ten titles and six consecutive NCAA titles.

"We're in the same boat fighting for second with Michigan State, Michigan and Wisconsin," Johnson said. "The team that gets good draws and some luck will finish second."

Minnesota's top title contender is Mike Foy, a 177-pound senior from Markham, Illinois, who is 36-5 overall and 7-0 in the Big Ten. Foy is ranked third nationally. Iowa's top-ranked Duane Goldman has beaten Foy twice this season with a rematch likely.

Senior Steve Martinez, a 150-pound senior from Osseo who is 33-9 overall and 6-1 in the Big Ten, and junior Ed Giese, a 118-pound junior from Wood Dale, Illinois who is 36-8-1 overall and 4-2 in the Big Ten, are both ranked sixth nationally.

Other veteran wrestlers are heavyweight Al Jenson, a senior from Foley; Greg Evans, a 158-pound junior from Rockford, Illinois; and Darrell Gholar, a 167-pound senior from Chicago, Illinois.

Eric Lehrke, normally a 167-pounder, is a sophomore from Rothschild, Wisconsin who has moved up to 190 pounds. Brett Rasmussen, a 142-pounder from Kasson-Mantoville, is the lone freshman in the lineup.

Injuries have cost Johnson the services of 126-pound freshman Blake Bonjean (elbow) and 134-pound junior Scott Hanna (ribs). Johnson will forfeit those weights.

Johnson, who was a senior on Minnesota's 1941 Big Ten champion team and coached the 1957 and 1959 title teams, is proud of his squad's progress this season.

"This team has come from farther back than any team I've ever had to make it to the top ten," Johnson said. "They really hung in there and have done a marvelous job."

The top four placewinners in the tournament advance to the NCAA tournament March 9-11 at East Rutherford, New Jersey.

GYMNASTS AT DOUBLE-DUAL AT WISCONSIN

Coach Fred Roethlisberger's University of Minnesota gymnastics team travels to Wisconsin Saturday for a double-dual with Wisconsin and Illinois.

The Gophers, 8-1 overall and 3-0 in the Big Ten, are led by all-arounders Joe Ray, Rob Brown and Dave Menke. Ray, a senior from Morton Grove, Illinois, is the defending Big Ten all-around champion and a two-time National Team member. Brown is a sophomore from Chicago, Illinois and Menke is a sophomore from Bloomington.

Minnesota scored a 276.30 to 270.95 victory over Northern Iowa last Saturday at Williams Arena. Ray, competing in his last home meet, captured the all-around title with a score of 56.5. Brown was second with a 56.10 and Menke third with a 55.30.

The Big Ten meet is scheduled for March 9-10 at Michigan State and the NCAA meet is April 12-14 at Los Angeles, California.

TRACK TEAM IDLE, AT BIG TEN MEET MARCH 2-3

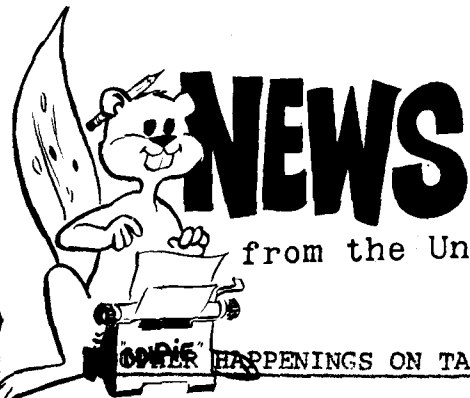
Coach Roy Griak's University of Minnesota track and field team is idle this weekend and will next compete in the Big Ten Indoor meet March 2-3 at Michigan.

ICERS IN 2ND ROUND AT N.D.

Minneapolis, MN---The U. of Minnesota hockey Gophers got through the first round WCHA playoffs last weekend by taking two games from Colorado College at home, 3-1 and 4-1. That gave UM a 7-2 win under the two-game, total-goals format.

But by winning, Minnesota earned the dubious pleasure of having to face the University of North Dakota Fighting Sioux up in Grand Forks, ND, Friday and Saturday.

Again the two-game, total-goal format will be used in the second round WCHA playoffs. Both 8:30 p.m. CST games will be aired in the Twin Cities by KKSS-980 AM radio.

Strangely enough, Minnesota played its final regular season series weekend before last up in Grand Forks and the Gophers were fortunate to come away with a pair of wins, 5-4 and 6-3.

The latter wins were still not enough to allow Minnesota to overtake North Dakota for second place honors in the regular season WCHA standings. The Sioux finished with 34 points on a 16-8-2 record while Minnesota had 33 points and was 16-9-1 in league play.

But the Gophers were able to capture the regular season series from ND winning five of the six matches. Minnesota took three of four from the Sioux at home. The Gophers swept a November series, 4-3 and 1-0, before the schools split another pair in January. North Dakota won the first game, 3-1, with the Gophers taking the second, 7-4.

However, as any coach will tell you, what happens during regular season play more often than not has little if any bearing on post season play.

"It's simply scary going right back up to North Dakota so soon," says Minnesota head coach Brad Buetow. "Although our players certainly gained some confidence by winning twice in Grand Forks, there is another side to that, too.

"North Dakota certainly remembers what happened when we played up there and will be doubly prepared this weekend.

"We are certain we will not see the same North Dakota team we faced two weeks ago. For one thing they will come at us with much more intensity. In addition, two of their players should be much further along physically.

"I'm speaking of wing Gord Sherven and defenseman Rick Zombo. Both saw their first action in six weeks against us when we last played North Dakota. They had been out with injuries. Now they are two weeks stronger and will certainly play better than the last time out.

"And when you look at our long history with North Dakota, there is not much to choose. Through games this season, we only lead them (ND) by six wins. Since the schools first played, Minnesota has won 81 times to 75 by North Dakota. And there have only been three series ties.

"There is a great, great college rivalry between the schools. This weekend will be nothing new to those of us who have participated in the past. The real winners will be the fans who should see another great series between our schools."

Speaking of winners, the team that comes out on top of this series is almost an odds-on bet to be selected to represent the West in the NCAA semi-final round March 16-17. However, there is a little thing called the WCHA championship playoff series March 9-10.

The other half of WCHA second round action pits Wisconsin at league champion Minnesota-Duluth this weekend in another two-game, total-goal series. Wisconsin defeated Denver 13-8 at home last weekend winning 5-3 and 8-5.

Besides the twin wins vs. Colorado College, the other best thing that happened to Minnesota was coming through the series healthy. Everyone that played here last weekend is expected to make the trip to Grand Forks.

"In all probability we will go with the same lineup again this weekend," Buetow added. "These men have led us to four straight wins and I cannot see any reason to change things now.

"We will probably stick with our same goalie rotation, too. We will probably go with sophomore Frank Pietrangelo Friday and Mike Vacanti Saturday if all goes well this entire week."

The above pair have alternated most of the season with each winning two games the last two weekends. Pietrangelo took last Saturday's 3-1 decision over Colorado College making 37 saves. Vacanti only had to stop 18 shots from the Tigers in Sunday's 4-1 victory.

For the entire season, Vacanti has a 3.24 goals allowed average while Pietrangelo's average figures out to 3.44.

Once again it was the one-two scoring punch of linemates Tom Rothstein and Pat Micheletti that led the Gophers over Colorado College. Rothstein, a junior wing, netted two goals, including the game winner in Sunday's come from behind victory. Micheletti had a goal and an assist on the weekend.

In addition, the third member of the above line, freshman right wing Todd Okerlund, cashed in a goal and three assists to lead all scorers.

Rothstein still leads the Minnesota scoring parade with team high 29 goals. He is tied with Micheletti for the lead in assists with 33 for 62 points. Micheletti has 26 goals and 59 total points.

In last Saturday's game the Gophers jumped to a 3-0 lead in the first period on goals by Micheletti, Tony Kellin and Jeff Larson. Colorado College got its lone scored from Doug Clarke in the third period.

But the Tigers jumped to a 1-0 first period lead Sunday when Ken Filbey connected on a power play score. Freshman center Tim Berglund tied the game early in the second period, and Rothstein put Minnesota ahead to stay less than three minutes later.

Rothstein and Okerlund added third period goals to insure the victory.

But that's all in the past. The Gophers take a 27-9-2 season record to Grand Forks this weekend in hopes of making a repeat trip to the WCHA playoff finals, followed by a repeat trip to the NCAA semi-finals. Last year Minnesota finished runner-up to Wisconsin in the WCHA playoffs, and fourth at the NCAA championship tournament held in Grand Forks.

GOLDEN GOPHER CAGERS TO PLAY AT MICHIGAN STATE & AT MICHIGAN

Minnesota's Golden Gopher basketball team makes its final Big Ten Conference road trip of the 1984 season this week and in the process gets two more of those crucial rematch assignments.

On Thursday Coach Jim Dutcher's contingent invades East Lansing, MI, to take on the Michigan State Spartans in a 7:05 p.m. (EST) confrontation. Then on Saturday Minnesota moves over to Ann Arbor for a 4:05 p.m. (EST) shootout with the Michigan Wolverines.

The Golden Gophers will take an overall record of 15-9 and a Big Ten mark of 6-8 on the road with them after having to settle for a split in two conference games at Williams Arena last week.

First Minnesota was able to handle visiting Northwestern by a 63-57 count, but then the Golden Gophers were upset by invading Iowa 62-50 in a disappointing turn-around on Saturday.

Minnesota had won three straight...beating Wisconsin and Cincinnati on the road and the Wildcats at home...and had hoped to make it four in a row before returning to the road this week. But it was not to be.

"We played well for about 30 minutes against Northwestern," Dutcher said, "and in the process built up a 21-point lead. Then we lost our concentration, and we let Northwestern make the final score closer than it should have been. Against Iowa it was a different story. We could not stop their transition game and we could not stop Greg Stokes (he finished with 18). We didn't rebound either end of the floor (Iowa had a 26-23 advantage). Iowa simply played harder and Saturday was the better team."

That means Dutcher faces a major challenge this week as he will have to get his club back on track. "We let things get away from us late in the game against Northwestern," Dutcher recalled, "and then we did not get off to a good start against Iowa. We had a breakdown keeping our attention on the task at hand. To have good results this week against Michigan State and Michigan, we'll have to work hard on remembering how hard we have to play for a full game to win in the Big Ten."

And winning this week against the Spartans and Wolverines will be a major task. Michigan State was picked in pre-season polls as one of the teams favored to capture the Big Ten title. And cage experts continue to maintain that Michigan has the best (and most) talent of any team in the conference.

The Spartans tuned up for Minnesota by stunning Indiana at Indiana 57-54 in a nationally televised game last Sunday. And although Minnesota triumphed over the Spartans earlier this year 69-61 at Williams Arena, Gopher fans have been reminded that Michigan State played that night without the services of ace guard Sam Vincent (he had 14 against the Hoosiers this past weekend). The Spartans are 11-13 and 4-10.

Michigan also is flying high after stunning the Buckeyes 62-59 at Ohio State on Saturday. On top of that the Wolverines whipped Minnesota 66-62 in Williams Arena over a month ago. The host club, which also entertains Wisconsin Thursday, came into this week's Big Ten action 15-9 overall and 7-7 in conference play.

EARLY BIRD FOOTBALL TICKET SALE AT U OF M PLANNED

For the first time in history, the University of Minnesota will conduct an early bird sale of season football tickets, with that special undertaking slated to open March 1.

"When Lou Holtz, one of the most successful and highly respected football coaches in the nation, arrived on our scene," Athletic Director Paul Giel said, "there was an immediate increase in interest in Golden Gopher football. In response to that unusual early demand for 1984 season tickets, we are offering a unique early bird sale."

This special sale is for new or additional public season tickets only. Patrons renewing their season tickets from last year will be billed on May 1. Ken Buell, U of M athletic ticket manager, also points out that additional tickets purchased by the public cannot be located adjacent to currently-held season ticket locations.

The University of Minnesota student and staff sale and the 1984 public season ticket reorder sale will begin on May 1. All public and staff season tickets for the 1984 season will be mailed by the U of M athletic ticket office in August.

Holtz has pledged himself to helping fill the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome. While Holtz knows that the task of rebuilding the Golden Gophers will not be an easy one, he believes it can be done.

"We need the help of all the people in Minnesota," Holtz maintains, "literally everyone who has ever picked up a snow shovel. If we all work together, we can get the job done." And that togetherness includes filling the dome.

SWIMMING AND DIVING TEAM AT BIG TEN MEET THURSDAY THROUGH SATURDAY

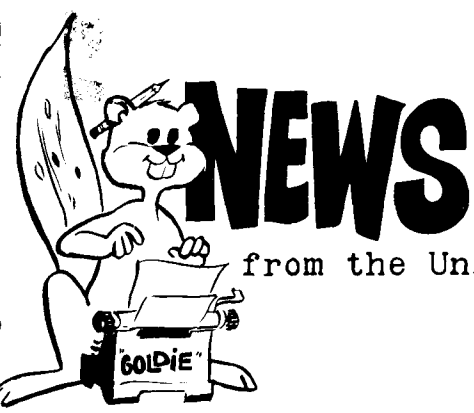

GOPHER CAGERS CLOSE REGULAR SEASON PLAY AT HOME THIS WEEK

With only one week remaining on the regular 1983-84 basketball schedule, the top two teams in the Big Ten standings are Illinois and Purdue. And guess which two conference teams invade Williams Arena this week.

Coach Jim Dutcher's University of Minnesota Golden Gophers close regular season play with two Big Ten assignments at home this week...Illinois at 8:05 p.m. on Thursday and Purdue at 12 noon on Sunday.

Minnesota will go into the Illinois assignment with an overall record of 15-11 and a Big Ten mark of 6-10. The Golden Gophers currently are tied for sixth place in the standings with Iowa and Michigan State.

Those standards resulted when Minnesota dropped two road decisions in Big Ten play last week, falling at Michigan State last Thursday by a decisive 83-62 margin and then letting a 51-50 decision slip away at Michigan on Saturday.

"We got off to a terrible start at Michigan State," Dutcher recalled. "They dominated every phase of the game early, and we wound up digging ourselves into a hole."

At Michigan, the Golden Gophers made the Wolverines work for everything they got, but it still wound up as a Big Ten Conference setback (the third in a row) for the Minnesota contingent.

"We're never pleased with a loss," Dutcher stressed, "but we could not fault our effort against Michigan. They knew they were in a ball game. We worked hard enough to get into a position where we could have won it, but we just could not pull it off."

So now the disheartened Golden Gophers find themselves in a position where they not only have to bounce back from two tough road losses, they find themselves in a position where they have to do that against the league leaders.

"This will be a big week for us," Dutcher said. "We are shooting for an opportunity to get into some kind of post season play, and to do so we'll have to beat some people that beat us earlier this year."

Can it be done? Does Minnesota have a chance of winning against either Illinois or Purdue, two teams who have ranked as the Big Ten's pace-setters all season long and will come after the Golden Gophers with sights set on the 1984 conference crown?

"We'll go into the Illinois and Purdue games with the thought that we are capable of beating them," Dutcher said. "We know we haven't beaten them yet, but feel we'll have the chances."

Biggest concern for Dutcher has to be finding more offensive power as he prepares for the Fighting Illini and the Boilermakers. Junior guard Tommy Davis was top gun for the Golden Gophers last week, scoring 25 at Michigan State and 16 at Michigan. But beyond that, Minnesota's attack has been inconsistent.

"It was Tommy Davis against the world at Michigan State," Dutcher explained, "and only Jim Petersen finished in double figures with Tommy against Michigan. I was pleased with our defensive effort against Michigan, but we've got to get more offense into our lineup if we hope to win this week."

And that Minnesota lineup will be anyone's guess all week long...probably right until tip-off Thursday night. Petersen, a 6-10 senior, will open at one forward, and David is set at guard. John Shasky, a 7-0 sophomore, could again get the nod at center.

In all, Illinois and Minnesota have met 126 times in basketball, and after the Illini won 80-53 in Champaign last January, it upped Illinois' edge in the series to 76-50.

Minnesota and Purdue have squared off 120 times, and coming into Sunday's nationally televised (CBS) high noon assignment, the series is all even at 60 and 60. The boilers won 72-69 at Purdue early in January.

Minneapolis, MN---It was a tough way to end a season being so very, very close, but the 1983-84 U. of Minnesota hockey campaign is now history.

The Gophers were eliminated from the WCHA playoffs by North Dakota last weekend when the Sioux won both ends of a two-game, total-goal series by scores of 4-3 and 5-4 at Grand Forks, ND.

However, one has to realize that this Gopher hockey edition came much, much further than had been expected.

To begin with, the number of wins this season, 27, mark the sixth highest total in Gopher hockey history. On top of that, much was accomplished after the loss of two key centers, sophomore Rick Erdall and freshman Steve Orth by the time Minnesota had played its 9th game.

Several other regulars were sent to the sidelines by an assortment of injuries, too. So there was a lot to overcome. But this relatively young team, which contained only two seniors, hung in there and played with pride.

The Gophers finished third, just one point behind runner-up North Dakota, in the regular season WCHA standings. Then Minnesota reached the second round WCHA playoffs after defeating Colorado College twice.

But victories just were not meant to be last weekend. The Sioux took a 1-0 first period lead Friday on a power play goal by Dean Barsness. The Gophers bounced back with two first period scores by Kurt Larson and Mike Guentzel and owned a 2-1 lead going into the second stanza.

Then it was ND's turn again as Dan Brennan and Rick Zombo for scored a 3-2 Sioux margin. Steve Palmiscno made it 4-2 Sioux in the third before before Tom Rothstein got Minnesota's final goal of the evening.

On Saturday Minnesota freshman Steve MacSwain scored first to tie the total-goals figure at 4-4. But North Dakota got a pair of goal from Dan Brennan and Brian Williams before Roger Bowe tied the game 2-2 to end first period scoring.

In the second period the teams traded goals twice with Brennan and Perry Berezan scoring for North Dakota, and Gary Shopek and Todd Okerlund hit power play scores for Gophers.

That left it at 4-4 in the final period only to see ND's Chris Jensen score the last goal of the weekend at 12:45 and the Gopher doom was sealed. Minnesota repeatedly tried to get back even with several rushes on ND goalie Jon Casey, but the latter was equal to the task and UM's season was over.

According to both coaches, the media and just about every fan there, last weekend produced one of the finest skating series ever turned in at North Dakota's Winter Sports Center.

Both Gopher goal tenders, Frank Pietrangelo Friday and Mike Vacanti Saturday, turned in excellent performances. For Vacanti it was his final appearance for Minnesota. The Edina senior won 12, lost four and tied two games this season leaving his two-year career mark at 18-6-2 with a 2.80 career goals allowed average.

Pietrangelo, from Port Robinson, Ontario, finished with a 13-7-0 record and a 3.47 season average. His two-year career figures read 29-12-1 and 3.17.

Junior wing and co-captain Tom Rothstein from Grand Rapids ended as Minnesota's leading scorer for the year. He totaled a team high 30 goals in 39 games and was tied for the most assists with 34. His 64 points is the 10th highest single season total in Minnesota hockey history.

Sophomore center/wing Pat Micheletti from Hibbing ended second with 60 points, including 34 assists to match Rothstein for team leadership here. Micheletti, who had to sit out last Saturday's game with a sore shoulder, also led the Gophers with 11 power play goals, one more than linemate Rothstein.

As a team Minnesota tallied the 5th highest number of assists ever, 314, and 5th highest total points, 502. The squad also totaled the 5th highest number of penalties in UM history, 339.

Head coach Brad Buetow now owns a five-year record at Minnesota of 140 wins against 62 losses and five ties for a winning percentage of .688%, the third highest win percentage in Gopher hockey history.

Coach Fred Roethlisberger's team finished the dual season 10-1 overall and 5-0 in the Big Ten. Idle last weekend, Minnesota recorded 278.85 points two weeks ago at Wisconsin in a double-dual victory over defending Big Ten champion Illinois and Wisconsin.

Ray, a senior from Morton Grove, Illinois, is a three-time National Team member who competed in last summer's Pan American Games. Joining Ray in the all-around are talented sophomores Rob Brown and Dave Menke. Brown captured the Big Ten horizontal bar championship and finished seventh in the all-around as a freshman, while Menke finished 10th in the all-around.

Minnesota all-arounders have claimed eight consecutive Big Ten titles during a span in which the team collected six of eight championships.

Specialists playing an important role in the Golden Gopher lineup are rings performers Tom Groechel and Tim Ryan, utilityman Kevin Cochran, parallel bars participant Joe Brough, and Steve Braun in the pommel horse.

Pat Houde joins freshmen Collin Godkin in a variety of events.

Minnesota finished fourth in the Big Ten meet last season as only three-fourths of a point separated the top four teams.

The NCAA meet is scheduled for April 12-14 at UCLA.

TWO TRACK TEAM MEMBERS MAY COMPETE IN NCAA INDOOR

Two members of the University of Minnesota track and field team may be selected to compete in the NCAA Indoor Meet Thursday through Saturday at the Carrier Dome in Syracuse, New York.

Ron Backes, a sophomore shot putter from Richmond with a season high of 60'2", and Mike Moran, a senior distance runner from Cottage Grove with a best of 2:09.42 in the 1,000-yard run, are likely choices for the national competition. Backes was sixth in the shot at last weekend's Big Ten meet with a mark of 57'4½", while Moran was fifth in the 1,000 with a time of 2:12.50.

Coach Roy Griak's team, behind eight personal bests, finished seventh in the team portion of the Big Ten meet at Michigan with 19 points. Indiana took the team title with 104 points and Michigan was second with 98 points.

Top Golden Gophers performances were recorded by John Kromer, third in the two-mile with a time of 8:47.07, and Dave Morrison, third in the three-mile with a time of 13:51.22.

WRESTLERS END SEASON

The University of Minnesota wrestling team concluded its season last weekend at the NCAA meet at East Rutherford, New Jersey.

Senior 158-pounder Steve Martinez paced the Golden Gophers advancing to the quarterfinals, while 167-pound senior Darrell Gholar and 177-pound senior Mike Foy were eliminated in the second round. Ed Giese, the 1984 Big Ten 118-pound champion, along with 158-pound Greg Evans and heavyweight Al Jenson lost round matches.

GOLDEN GOPHER CAGERS FINISH SEASON WITH 15-13 RECORD

Oh, so close! That was the story of the University of Minnesota's heartbreaking 63-62 loss to Purdue in the season finale at Williams Arena on Sunday, and it seems to be the story of the entire 1983-84 campaign for the Golden Gopher cagers.

"The Purdue game was typical of our year," Coach Jim Dutcher lamented after the one-point setback to the Boilermakers on national TV (CBS). "We lost in overtime at Indiana, in overtime at Northwestern, by one point at Michigan and now by one point to Purdue. It has been that kind of season."

But it was a loss just the same, and it means that the Golden Gophers finish the year with an overall record of 15 wins against 13 losses. They are tied in the final Big Ten standings with Iowa for seventh place at 6-12.

And for the first time in five years Minnesota did not receive a post-season tournament bid. "It's a tough way for our seniors to end things," Dutcher admitted, "but we owe Jim Petersen and Roland Brooks our thanks for the contributions they have made to our program."

Those seniors made contributions in the finale, too. Petersen scored 13 points and had a game high 10 rebounds. Brooks scored 12 and had six boards. He also added two assists.

It was Tommy Davis, however, who lit up the scoreboard with a game high 20-point effort. The 6-4 junior guard, certainly one Golden Gopher deserving of post-season recognition and honors, hit 10 of 14 field goal attempts and garnered five rebounds.

Marc Wilson, 6-1 sophomore guard, returned to Minnesota's starting lineup for the shootout with the Boilermakers and chipped in with 13 points and three rebounds, and that made it a real team effort for Minnesota.

Earlier in the week the Golden Gophers had fallen 53-41 to Illinois at Williams Arena in a contest that was much closer than the final score tends to indicate. Again it was Davis who led the way with 18 points.

"Illinois was able to get the long rebounds and the loose balls," Dutcher recalled. "They did the things that good basketball teams need to do to win. Against Purdue we gave it a good effort. I was proud of the way we battled back after going 14 points down. But there were a couple of key plays late in the game when Purdue missed free throws and still managed to come up with the rebounds. Those two plays were killers."

With the season drawing to a close, all Golden Gopher eyes look to the future. "We have everybody back except Petersen and Brooks," Dutcher pointed out. "We lost more close games this season than we deserved, and now all our attention will be on getting the rest of our squad ready for next year. Maybe then it will be our turn to win the close ones."

In that close department, records show that of Minnesota's 12 losses in Big Ten play, six came by a total of 13 points....and two took extra periods to determine the outcome.

BSB OPENS SEASON IN TEXAS

Minneapolis, MN---With the basketball and hockey campaigns winding down at the University of Minnesota, what thoughts could young men, and ladies, possibly turn to other than Gopher baseball?

Well, it's upon us. Coach John "Walt" Anderson unveils his third edition of Gopher baseball Sunday when the team opens its 1984 season playing two games against Texas Lutheran at Sequin (sah-GEEN), TX.

Minnesota has scheduled games every day next week in the Lone Star State, including single games against Notre Dame and St. Mary's, plus four games at Texas A&M and five at Sam Houston State.

"What we need desperately is to get outside and face someone other than ourselves," Anderson said Monday. "Our men have been cooped up in the University Fieldhouse all winter and are anxious to get into a 'real' ball park.

"But we have had a lot of solid work for the pitchers and fielders. Our batters have hit daily in the cages, but that doesn't really duplicate the feeling a hitter gets when he is out in the sun aiming at the fences.

"We are excited about our opposition and hope old man weather is on our side. We are only three weeks away from playing our home openers against Creighton University at the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome (March 31-April 1) and want to be as ready as possible.

"So the more games we get in next week in Texas, the better prepared we will be.

"We are also holding a clinic the first day at the Metrodome for young men and ladies of all ages. So it should be quite a show.

"But it will only be a complete show if we are ready to play top notch baseball. We cannot be fully ready unless we get a lot of games under our belt.

"I'm not about to say we are going to go down there (Texas) and whip everyone in sight. Most of those schools already have more than 20 games under their belts. But it's outside competition and getting the opportunity to see our men in live action that is the key to this entire trip. I just hope all goes well."

Anderson said Monday he plans to start eight different pitchers the first four days. On Sunday juniors Doug Kampsen-RHP (Roseville) and Gregg Mau-RHP (Stillwater) have gained the opening call against Texas Lutheran.

On Monday freshman Mike Pavelka-LHP (Fopkins) will go against Notre Dame with senior transfer Rick Hill-RHP (Glyndon) going against St. Mary's in the second contest.

In the first two games at Texas A&M Tuesday, junior Bill Cutshall-RHP (Rochester) and senior transfer Tom Riewer-LHP (Bagley) gain the opening call, with sophomore Bryan Hickerson-LFP (Bemidji) and senior Jim Francour-PHP (Marinette, WI) heading to the mound Wednesday against the same Aggies.

After Wednesday the rotation is up for grabs considering who had to work the longest, or who didn't get enough time on the hill the first times out.

As to the remainder of the lineup, Anderson said he will probably use the following starters the first game Sunday. They are:

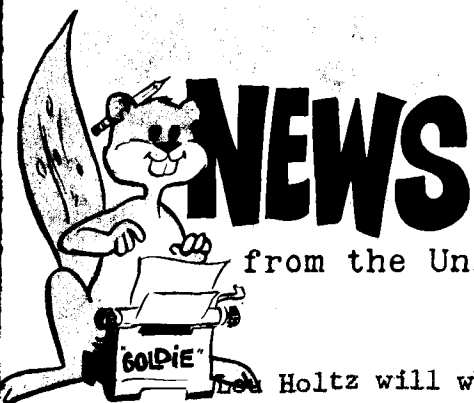

HOLTZ OPENS FIRST SPRING PRACTICE AT MINNESOTA

Holtz will whistle the start of his first spring practice session at the University of Minnesota on Saturday (March 31) and in the process begin preparations for the 1984 Golden Gopher football season.

More than 100 hopefuls, a group that will include no less than 25 walk-ons, is expected to greet Holtz who will run his charges through 20 workouts and three scrimmages before winding things up with the Spring Game at the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome on Saturday, May 5 at 8:00 p.m.

Included in the delegation of gridders reporting Saturday will be 48 lettermen, and those veterans are expected to form the nucleus in Holtz's rebuilding plan, a plan that Minnesota football fans hope will reverse the trend established the past two seasons.

In 1982, the Golden Gophers won their first three games in impressive fashion but then lost their last eight. A year ago Minnesota won its opener at Rice but then fell 10 consecutive times.

The Golden Gophers, therefore, have lost 18 of their last 19 games, and they have won only one Big Ten Conference game in two years....that a 36-10 verdict at Purdue early in the 1982 campaign.

To return Minnesota to its Golden era will be a difficult assignment for Holtz who readily admits that he is not a miracle worker or a magician. He has maintained that getting the Gophers back on track will not be a one-man job but instead, "We'll require the help of everyone who has ever shoveled snow."

Saturday that task moves into high gear, and Holtz's first order of business will be to install completely new offensive and defensive schemes....an option I on offense and a Multiple 50 on defense.

With the change from an offense that stressed the pass to one built around the option will require Holtz taking a careful look at his quarterback candidates, and that's a priority item as spring drills get underway.

Brett Sadek, a 6-2, 191-pound sophomore, established himself as Minnesota's number one quarterback mid-way through the 1983 campaign. Recognized as a fine passer, Sadek threw 130 times and notched 60 completions for 757 yards and seven touchdowns during his freshman season.

Andy Hare, a 6-1, 189-pound red-shirt junior who has been used both at quarterback and as a defensive back during his first two years at Minnesota, also will get a good look at the signal-caller's post in spring drills.

Other quarterback candidates include Mike Moe, a red-shirt sophomore transfer; Jeff Kyle, a sophomore who lettered as a defensive back last season; and Brad Howe, a red-shirt freshman.

At tailback, Holtz is expected to find three lettermen leading the charge in early practice. That trio includes senior Tony Hunter who has rushed 163 times for 806 yards and five touchdowns in three injury-plagued seasons.

Also in the picture are two sophomores, Malcolm Nelson (31 carries for 114 yards in 1983) and Donovan Small (24 carries for 98 yards). The fullback spot has two lettermen involved, junior Valdez Baylor who has rushed 116 times for 462 yards in two seasons, and Kevin Wilson, a sophomore who had 197 yards in 61 carries as a yearling.

One of the big experiments Holtz will conduct in spring drills involves David Puk, a 6-4, 210-pound junior. Puk was a starting fullback at Minnesota a year ago, but a shortage of depth at tight end has prompted Holtz to move Puk to that spot this spring.

Among the wide receivers Holtz will scrutinize are Dwayne McMullen, a senior, and such juniors as Clark Johnson and Lungen Howard. Also in the picture is Mel Anderson, a sophomore. All four are lettermen.

Up front Holtz has a host of veterans on which to build a foundation. Returning lettermen include Jim Hobbins (6-6, 248, Jr), Jon Lilleberg (6-5, 247, Jr), Scott Annexstad (6-3, 248, So), Jeff Moritko (6-3, 261, Sr), Mike Pryor (6-3, 252, Jr), John Kelly (6-4, 243, Sr), Ray Hitchcock (6-2, 245, So), and Randy Pelphrey (6-3, 245, So). In addition, Mark VonderHaar, a 6-5, 246-pound senior who was a starter two years ago but missed all of the '83 season because of a knee injury, has returned.

On the defensive side of things Holtz also faces a major task. Last year Minnesota gave up 4,951 yards and 518 points. The Golden Gophers were ninth in the Big Ten in rushing defense, fourth in passing defense and eighth in total defense. And they were 10th in the league in scoring defense.

Mending those fences will be a major undertaking, but Holtz will start with a promising corps of linebackers. Back is Peter Najarian, a 6-1, 208-pound junior who led the Golden Gophers in tackles last season. Also returning is Glen Cieslewicz, a starter two years ago but shelved in '83 with a knee injury. He is a 6-3, 235-pound senior. Other linebacking returnees include Joe Christopherson, a 6-1, 211-pound junior, and Mark Dusbabek, a 6-3, 217-pound sophomore. All are lettermen.

HOLTZ PLANS FOOTBALL CLINIC

As part of the 1984 spring football practice session at the University of Minnesota, new Head Football Coach Lou Holtz has planned an elaborate two-day football coaches clinic.

Scheduled at the U of M Friday and Saturday, April 6 and 7, the clinic will feature lecture sessions, question and answer periods, on-the-field practice observation sessions and social gatherings.

The workshop conducted through the cooperation of the Minnesota High School Coaches Association, will get underway at 8 a.m. on Friday, April 6, with registration in the Williams Arena lobby. Coach Holtz will welcome clinic participants at 9 a.m. and the lecture periods will begin at 10:05.

Scheduled to speak Friday or Saturday are Ron Scott, Minnesota High School Coach of the Year from Coon Rapids on Cardinal Defense; Butch Nash, assistant coach at the U of M., defensive football; John Gutekunst, U of M defensive coordinator, defensive end play; Phil Elmassian, U of M assistant coach, secondary technique and fundamentals; John Palermo, U of M assistant coach, defensive line drills; Pete Cordelli, U of M assistant coach, wide receiver drills; Jim Strong, U of M assistant coach, running back fundamentals; Larry Beckish, U of M offensive coordinator, schooling the quarterback; Jim Hueber and George Stewart, U of M assistant coaches, development of offensive line.

A luncheon, sponsored by the Minneapolis Chamber of Commerce, will be held in Williams Arena Friday noon, and Friday evening a "snack and fellowship" session will be hosted by G. Heileman Brewing Company at the Schmidt Brewery in St. Paul.

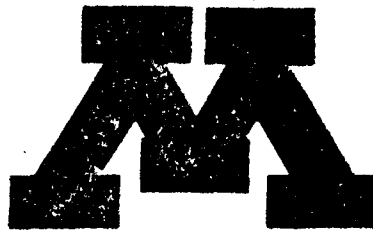

Those visitations will take place in the Bierman Building and are designed to permit coaches from throughout the area an opportunity to observe, participate and exchange ideas with members of the Golden Gopher staff.

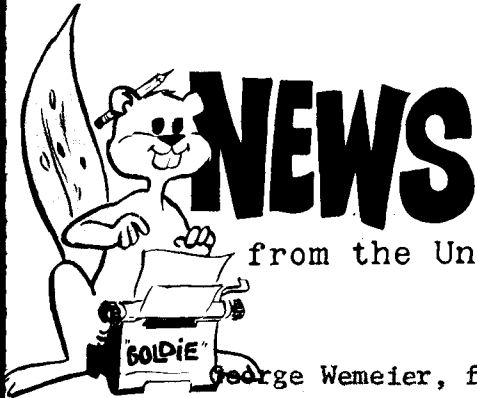

WEMEIER TO JOIN GOLDEN GOPHER GRID STAFF

George Wemeier, for more than two decades a highly-respected fixture in this state's high school coaching circles, has been named to the University of Minnesota football staff, with that appointment pending final approval of the U of M Board of Regents.

Head Coach Lou Holtz tabbed Wemeier to succeed Vince Hoch who had resigned earlier this month to accept a post as defensive coordinator and assistant head coach at the University of Kansas.

"We feel that Wemeier is a highly qualified individual," Holtz said. "he is a man of character who has the respect of his peers. He will be a great addition to our staff."

A 1952 graduate of Macalester College, Wemeier has been the head football coach at Minneapolis Washburn High School since 1966. During that span his teams went 60 games without a loss and in the process registered a string of 48 consecutive wins. His teams won the Minnesota state championships in 1972 and again in 1977.

Wemeier got his start in athletics at Waconia High School where he won letters in football, basketball and baseball during a four-year period before being graduated in 1948.

Then it was on to Macalester where Wemeier earned four letters as a varsity performer in football and was named to the All-Conference team and elected captain of his Scot contingent.

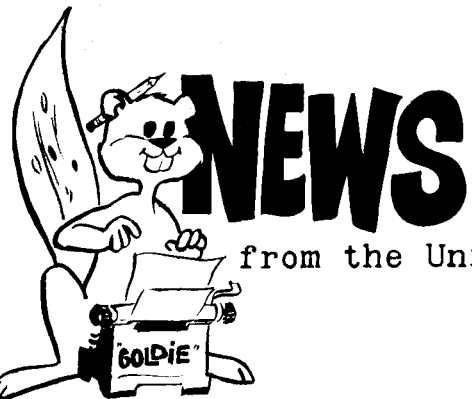
His coaching career started with two seasons at Braham in 1955 and in 1956 before accepting an assistant's post at Minneapolis Henry High School in 1957. He remained there until 1966 when getting the head job at Washburn.

"We made the commitment to hire a high school coach on our staff," Holtz said, "and we interviewed 14 candidates for the job. I can't emphasize enough how impressed I was with the calibre of those people. I have total confidence not only in George to do the job for us at Minnesota but also in the high school program in this state. We can win at the University of Minnesota with student athletes coming from exceptional programs like these."

Wemeier will be assigned the task of working with the Golden Gopher linebackers and he will be on hand when spring practice opens March 31.

DIAMOND TEAM AT THE DOME

Minneapolis, MN---And on to the H.H.H. Metrodome.
After finishing its annual spring trip in Texas-style BANG, BANG fashion, the Minnesota baseball Gophers move to the Metrodome this weekend for a clinic plus a pair of double headers against Creighton University.

The clinic, for all ages from Little League through Babe Ruth, Pony, American Legion, high school on up, begins at 1 p.m. Saturday on the Dome floor. Those attending the clinic are invited to stay for the two games that evening at no extra charge.

Tickets for the clinic must be purchased in advance and cost \$1. Tickets for adults both days are \$3 and are available at the Bierman Building Ticket Office on the U. of M. main campus. There is no reserved seating.

The Gophers completed their spring trip to Texas with a 3-8 record, which is one win better than last year. Minnesota got off to a miserable start winning only once, a 7-4 decision over Notre Dame, in its first nine outings.

But the batting and fielding slumps ended on the final day, Saturday, when the Gophers banged out 23 hits and scored 20 runs in whipping Sam Houston State twice, 15-6 and 5-1. The Gophers went into those last games of the trip hitting a paltry .213, but came out with a team bat mark of .243.

Minnesota still had to overcome Sam Houston State leads of 5-0 and 1-0 in those final wins. But doing so, says third-year head coach John Anderson, probably was the high point of the entire trip.

Overall, Minnesota came up just one hit short of those laced out by the opposition, 73 to 74. But the combination of stranding tons of runners in scoring position, key errors and way, way too many walks given up the Gopher pitchers combined to cost UM several close decisions.

ANDERSON ON THE SPRING TRIP

"We went south to gain experience for the youth on our team and to find out who can play for us this season," Anderson said Sunday. "I believe we gained a lot of knowledge in both areas.

"Our pitching was about as expected, maybe even a little better. But we must cut down on the walks and continually getting so far behind in the count. Our men must have thrown a zillion pitches down there.

"Our biggest fault may have been not winning the close games. We always seemed to be playing from behind. I believe our opponents scored more runs in the first inning than we did the entire trip.

"Our batting slump went on and on and on until the last day when it seemed everyone broke out at once. But I believe a lot of the slump had to do with many of our people watching captain Jack Schlichting (SCHLIC-ting) from Brooklyn Center, and Scott Schuveiller (SHOE-vi-ler) from Richfield, both juniors.

"These men are our leaders at the plate. But when they did not hit as expected, Jack and Scott, plus everyone else, began to press. Team slumps often come from the leaders putting too much pressure on themselves and it becomes contagious.

"But once Schlichting and Schuveiller began to drill the ball, everyone started to hit. I just hope it keeps up.

"We faced some darned good pitching from teams that had already played more than 25 games before we met them. So in that light I guess we didn't do so badly. We were in just about every game until the late innings.

"Possibly the biggest moment of the week came in the next to last game. We fell behind 5-0 in the first three innings, but battled back to gain a tie, and then blew Sam Houston State out 15-6.

"In the last game the three pitchers we used really shut them down allowing just three hits while striking out 11 in six innings.

"So not all we experienced in Texas was bad. Oh sure, we would have liked to do better than three and eight, but the experience we gained can't do anything but help us the rest of the way. And we'll find that out this weekend at the Dome.

"This should be an excellent series against Creighton. They beat us four times in four games on their field last spring and our players remember those losses.

"Our men are really fired up about playing in the Dome and meeting Creighton again. It's a total thrill for our entire program to be playing in a major league park. I hope our fans come out to support the team in huge numbers.

"As of right now I expect to start junior righthander Bill Cutshall from Rochester (1-1, 2.17 ERA) and sophomore lefty Bryan Hickerson from Bemidji (0-2 4.37) on the mound Saturday against Creighton. Both pitched awfully well in Texas.

"Hickerson had a no-hitter going into the seventh inning against Texas A&M, but lost a 1-0 decision with two outs in the last of the seventh. Cutshall also pitched extremely well against the Aggies, but had some control problems that got him in early trouble.

"As of this time I'm not certain who will pitch Sunday, but one starter could be senior transfer Rick Hill from Glyndon (1-0, 6.77)."

Anderson said that possibly the most pleasant surprise of the Texas trip may have been the hitting of freshman catcher Tim Hastings from Hopkins. McIntosh only played in five games, but ended up leading the Gophers in batting with a .563 average.

He banged out nine hits in 16 at bats, including a home run and a double, and drove in three runs. He had the game winning hit in the final game. McIntosh may have, for the present, earned himself a starting job as designated hitter. His catching skills still need polishing as he has only had one year of experience behind the plate.

Another freshman, McIntosh's high school battery mate Mike Pavelka (1-0, 6.32) who won the first Gopher victory against Notre Dame, was also impressive. But last Saturday he suffered a muscle pull in the first inning against Sam Houston State and is questionable for this weekend.

Going into this week the Creighton Blue Jays own an 8-4 record on their spring trip to Florida. They have two games scheduled at home Thursday.

GOLDEN GOPHERS TO END FIRST WEEK OF DRILLS WITH GRID CLINIC

Coach Lou Holtz will wind up his first week of spring practice at the University of Minnesota Saturday when hosting a football clinic at the U of M for area high school coaches.

The Golden Gophers kicked off their 1984 spring drills with a three-hour session on Saturday and followed that up with another gruelling workout on Sunday. After a third practice day Monday, Holtz gave his charges Tuesday and Wednesday off before resuming things on Thursday.

Friday will find Holtz and his coaching staff involved in the coaching clinic, with lecture sessions on tap in the morning and an on-the-field observation period in the afternoon. A similar pattern will follow on Saturday.

Thus far Holtz seems pleased not only with what he has seen but also with the progress being made by his squad. "Our squad has worked very hard," he said. "They have hit and they have hustled, and I've told them that if they will continue to do that there will be a place for them on our squad."

Holtz also admitted at being "pleasantly surprised" with the amount of talent he has seen on the practice field. "I'm impressed with the overall talent we have," he said, "and they certainly are in better physical condition than we had anticipated."

In the early spring, Holtz admitted that while he did not like to single out players, there were some Golden Gophers that already were beginning to glitter. The new Minnesota coach liked the work of such defenders as Andre Harris, a 5-11, 187-pound senior free safety from Chicago, IL; Kerry Glenn, a 5-9, 172-pound senior cornerback from East St. Louis, IL; and Larry Joyner, a 6-0, 192-pound sophomore strong safety from Memphis, TN.

And Holtz had special words of praise for Glen Cieslewicz, the 6-3, 235-pound red-shirt senior from Green Bay, WI, who was a starter in 1982 but sat out all of last year following knee surgery. "It's really good to have Cieslewicz back on the squad," Holtz said.

Offensively Holtz pointed to the receivers as "People who caught the ball well," and of those Dwayne McMullen, a 5-11, 173-pound senior from Harrisburg, PA, drew the strongest accolades.

In the passing department, Holtz was pleased one day and unhappy the next. After Saturday's session, he said, "Brett Sadek (6-2, 191, So) threw decently for us," but on Sunday....after a less-impressive workout, Holtz said, "We just did not throw the ball very well today."

Up front the Golden Gophers mentioned by Holtz for top-notch efforts were on the defensive side of things. Those players included Anthony Burke, a 6-2, 238-pound sophomore from Minnetonka; Craig Graffunder, a 6-4, 250-pound senior from Fridley; Steve Thompson, a 6-1, 255-pound sophomore from Aurora, IL; and Craig Paulson, a 6-4, 251-pound senior from Stevens Point, WI.

"Overall I'm pleased," Holtz maintained. "We have a lot of work to do, and we have a long way to go before we can be a good football team. We are not sound fundamentally, and that's where we have the most work to do. But if we strive to be better today than we were yesterday, we can get the job done."

TENNIS TEAM ENTERTAINS IOWA AND NORTHWESTERN

Coach Jerry Noyce's University of Minnesota tennis team will close the dual season at home this weekend with Big Ten matches against Iowa Friday and Northwestern Saturday.

Both matches are slated for 7:00 p.m. at the 98th Street Racquet and Swim Club in Bloomington. The team faced non-conference foe Gustavus on Wednesday.

The Golden Gophers, 22-9 overall and 6-1 in the Big Ten, rebounded from a 7-2 setback at Southern Illinois-Edwardsville and a 5-4 loss at Illinois last weekend with a 7-2 victory at Purdue and a 7-1 triumph over St. Thomas.

Sophomore Swedish stars Fredrik Pahlett and Stefan Eriksson join Matt Grace, Chuck Merzbacher, David Blackstone and Lou McKee in the Minnesota lineup. Pahlett is 26-14 overall and 6-1 in the Big Ten, while Eriksson is 47-10 overall and 7-0 in the Big Ten.

The Big Ten meet is scheduled for May 4-6 at Illinois.

QUOTING LOU HOLTZ. . .

On the subject of the progress made by his Golden Gophers in spring practice, Holtz said, "I feel that our squad has made a great deal of progress thus far. Our players work hard and they hit hard. They have their hearts in the right place....even though sometimes their feet might not be."

On the subject of what has happened to the University of Minnesota football team in recent years, Holtz said, "We can't worry about what is behind us. We must think about what is ahead. We expect our current players to do what is right, to do the best they can and to treat their teammates the way they want to be treated."

On the subject of the 1984 seniors (they are only 14 listed on the spring roster), Holtz said, "Our seniors have had some tough times. This season will be their last chance. When they say something, we want the rest of the squad to listen to them. We need and want their leadership."

On the subject of fumbles (there were eight in last Friday's scrimmage), Holtz said, "The ball is on the ground too much. Those fumbles were the most disappointing thing about our scrimmage. And our receivers have been dropping the ball too much in practice. That is habit forming. It is not the right way to do things, and it is not the way we are going to do it at Minnesota."

On the subject of making third down plays count, Holtz said, "There are four or five plays in any one game that could change or determine the outcome. A player never knows when those plays are going to happen, but he must know that the third downs are critical. And in those situations, a player can't afford an illegal motion or offside penalty or any kind of mental error."

On the improvement of Minnesota's offense in spring practice, Holtz said, "We have a good offensive scheme and we have good talent. We are a little unsound fundamentally, but we are getting better. Our future depends upon how much determination we have and how much we can improve."

On the progress Minnesota needs to make in the time remaining during spring practice, Holtz said, "We've seen a lot of improvement from day to day and week to week, and we can leave the field with a good feeling about ourselves. While we still have a long way to go, we know that we can continue to improve if we retain the kind of intensity we have been showing in practice. That kind of hard work can make us ok."

Although Holtz was not willing to criticize his squad after last Friday's scrimmage, he did point out six critical areas where the University of Minnesota football team must get better if it hopes to win:

- *Turnovers
- *Penalties
- *Mental Errors
- *Allowing the big play, the bomb, by the defense
- *Having loss-of-yardage plays by the offense
- *The kicking game

Holtz also admitted that he was not satisfied with his club's ability to run the ball, and he said that his biggest disappointment was that the ball was on the ground too much (there were eight fumbles in last Friday's scrimmage).

His analysis was not all negative, however. "We've come along better defensively," Holtz said, "and overall we've made a lot of progress. We still may have a long way to go, but we are headed in the right direction."

Among Minnesota's defenders drawing praise from Holtz after last Friday's workout were Jerry Keeble, Glen Cieslewicz and Andre Harris. "They played hard and had good days," Holtz said.

On Sunday it was supposed to be two more baseball games. But after what appeared to be baseball with Northwestern winning 11-9 in 10 innings, the second game was postponed and played Monday.

"Our performance Sunday was anything but college baseball," Anderson continued Tuesday. "I simply can't believe some of the bonehead plays we made, both offensively and defensively.

"Physical errors I can live with. But mental errors are something else. We simply did not have our heads in the game. I was embarrassed to come out of the dugout after the game. I honestly couldn't believe what I had just seen. And I'm certain Northwestern coach Ron Wellman felt exactly the same.

"We take a great deal of pride in our product, college baseball, and to see a game like that develop, well, you had to be there to understand how dismayed coach Wellman and myself were.

"But I have to give credit, too. Our squad and myself had a long, long session to clear the air before Monday's game and I guess we got it all back together. We played an excellent game behind (Jim) Francour's pitching and gained a huge victory. I'm proud of the way our men bounced back. They know they can play good baseball. Now it's up to all of us to keep it going."

Illinois took two of three from Iowa at home the opening weekend, but lost twice at Wisconsin last Saturday. Illinois has lost three Big Ten games to foul weather and stands 2-3 in conference play, 20-20 overall.

The Gophers are now 16-13 for the entire season to go with their 2-2 Big Ten log. But Minnesota faces consecutive road weekends with four games at Wisconsin May 5-6 before closing their West Division schedule at home with four games against Iowa May 12-13.

A pair of juniors, outfielder Jon Beckman and first baseman Alex Bauer, led the Gophers at the plate against Northwestern. Beckman had 6 hits in 10 at bats, scored 5 runs and drove in four teammates. He also had a game winning RBI.

Bauer went 5 for 14 with one run batted in. Each had one extra base hit as Northwestern's vastly improved pitching staff allowed Minnesota just five extra base blows in 116 official times at bat. No UM player hit a home run.

However, Minnesota's pitching staff allowed only one home run and issued just 11 walks in 31 innings pitched. Kampsen appeared in relief three times gaining his third save of the year in Saturday's 4-2 UM win.

But Francour was the Gopher ace of the weekend. On Monday he gave up just four singles and did not allow a runner passed second base. He walked one and struck out two.

The Gophers plan to tune up with two games today (Tuesday) at Mankato State, and a split doubleheader Wednesday against Iowa State. UM and ISU play one game at Siebert Field at 2 p.m., and then move out to suburban Braemar Field in Edina for a 6:30 p.m. nightcap. The schools split two games last week at ISU.

Next week Minnesota plays a single game at 7 p.m. Tuesday against St. Thomas over at Municipal Stadium in St. Paul, and then for the fourth year in a row plays a single game against Mankato State at New Ulm, MN Wednesday.

Minneapolis, MN---University of Minnesota winter and spring sport coaches have signed several outstanding high school prospects who will attend UM next fall and receive athletic scholarship aid.

Gopher head basketball coach Jim Dutcher announced two more signings last week bringing his freshman recruit total to five. Three top prospects opted to take advantage of the one-week, early signing time last November.

The latter signees included George Williams, a 6-8 forward from Skyline High School in Oakland, CA, Mitchell Lee, a 6-9 forward-center from American High School in Carol City, FL, and Elmer Robinson, a 6-5 guard-forward from Lyon Township High School in LaGrange, IL.

Last Wednesday Dutcher announced that Tim Hanson, a 6-5 forward-guard from Prior lake, MN, and Todd Alexander, a 5-11 point guard from Waxahachie, TX, have also inked national letters of intent.

Hanson set a career school record at Prior Lake by scoring 1,238 points in three seasons. Last winter he averaged 23.5 points and 12.6 rebounds and was an all-state selection.

Alexander was all-state in Texas three seasons and had a career scoring total of more than 2,400 points. A week earlier he was named MVP of the Texas Shootout, a tournament featuring 48 of the top basketball players in Texas.

Both Hanson and Alexander are among the finalists for "Mr. Basketball" honors to be awarded in both their respective states.

Gopher hockey coach Brad Buetow has added three more Minnesota high school prospects to his varsity team for the 1984-85 season.

Signing national letters of intent last week are David Grannis, a 5-10, 185-pound forward from South St. Paul, Brett Nelson, a 5-10, 160-pound defenseman from White Bear Lake, and Paul Broten, a 5-11, 160-pound forward from Roseau.

Broten has the most recognizable name of the three. He is the third Broten to sign a national letter of intent to play hockey for Minnesota.

Older brother Neal played at Minnesota in 1979 and 1981 around a year off from school to perform for the Gold Medal-winning 1980 U.S. Olympic Team. Neal is now with the NHL Minnesota North Stars.

Another brother, Aaron, played at UM in 1980 and 1981. He is presently with the NHL New Jersey Devils.

Paul was one of the most sought after high school seniors in Minnesota. He led Region 8 in scoring and, when he becomes eligible, is expected to go quite high in the professional draft.

Nelson and Grannis were also highly recruited. Grannis led the St. Paul Suburban Conference in scoring with 25 goals and 25 assists. Nelson had 10 goals and 12 assists as a defenseman.

All three were captains of their high school teams this past season, and each stood out in the recent "Super Series" between high school all-star teams from Minnesota and Massachusetts played in the Twin Cities.

Another signee was announced by Gopher tennis coach Jerry Noyce who inked Casey Merickel from Wadena, MN.

Merickel has lived the last 1½ years in San Diego, CA, where he competed on the junior level. Noyce said that Merickel is ranked #1 by the Northwestern Tennis Association which includes Minnesota, North and South Dakota. He is also ranked 25th nationally in the 18 and under division by the USTA.

INDIVIDUALS --

Junior Andy Hare (Appleton, WI) and sophomore Brett Sadek (Rosemount) did most of the duty at QB with back-up work from freshman Brad Howe (Santa Barbara, CA) and sophomore Mike Moe (Edina).

According to coach Lou Holtz, "I thought all four quarterbacks who worked today threw the ball very well for the first time out. Unfortunately, we did not catch the ball well at all."

Five runningbacks were interchanged between fullback and tailback with each man mentioned here working both spots. Included were junior Valdez Baylor (Harrisburg, PA), soph Malcolm Nelson (Maywood, IL), soph Demetrius Chism (E. St. Louis, IL), soph Kevin Wilson (Aurora, IL), and soph Donovan Small (Wheeling, IL).

Baylor scored twice in the scrimmage on runs of 22 yards up the middle, and 39 yards on an option pitch play.

Other scores included a 17-yard pass from Hare to junior TE Kevin Starks (Robbins, IL), and a 32-yard pass from Hare to junior flanker Clark Johnson (Roseville).

SOME Q & A WITH COACH HOLTZ --

Q - Your overall view of the first scrimmage in terms of execution.

A - "We will definately use the rest of our allotted spring practice days. However, what I was looking at mostly today was attitude more than execution. But the hitting was awfully good. We are starting to put our offensive and defensive plans together. But the only way we can judge this scrimmage is how we do in next Friday's scrimmage. How much we improve. That will be todays's test."

Q - Have any major questions been answered?

A - "Everything is a question in the first year. What's important is our criteria of expectations. Were they high enough this week, will they be that much higher next week. Those are our major questions at this point."

Q - Are you getting a better idea of who will play for you next fall?

A - "I believe some people have already stuck out. We plan to use a lot of people in the fall. I CAN tell you right now the guy who will not play for us is the guy who continues to make mistakes, the kind of mistakes that beat you. The worst phrase I know of in football is self destruct."

Q - How far has this group advanced during the spring?

A - "My number one goal is to be perfect the first week, perfect the first scrimmage, and then improve from that point on. Naturally, we are not perfect, yet."

IN GENERAL - "I believe our quarterbacks threw well and the runningbacks also did a very fine job. Some individuals in our front defensive line stood out and showed they are willing to deliver a blow and make contact. As for most positions, our real grading will come out in the films this weekend. We hope to begin getting some kind of picture."

GOLDEN GOPHERS IN FINAL HALF OF SPRING GRID DRILLS

New head football coach Lou Holtz will wind up his third week of spring practice at the University of Minnesota Friday by sending his charges through another afternoon scrimmage.

Holtz zipped his squad through their first such confrontation last Friday and then gave his players the weekend off before heading into the final half of the 1984 20-day spring session.

Far from satisfied with the Golden Gophers at this stage of things, Holtz does have hopes for improvement this week and next before Minnesota winds things up with the Spring Game in the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome on Saturday, May 5 at 8 p.m.

Larry Beckish, Minnesota's impressive new offensive coordinator brought on the scene by Holtz, figures the Golden Gophers are about at the stage where he thought they would be mid-way through spring drills.

"We probably are just where we would be at this point," Beckish said. "There are a couple of areas, however, where we had hoped to make more progress than has been shown, like the passing game where we had hoped to be further along."

But Minnesota's offense, in Beckish's eyes, has made progress. "We've put in most of our basic running and passing games," he said. "Now we must take the parts and polish them. In our passing game, for example, we've stressed individual concepts in running our routes, protecting the passer, throwing and catching the ball. Now we have to smooth out the rough edges and put things together on a team basis."

On the other side of things, John Gutekunst, the highly touted defensive coordinator lured to the U of M by Holtz, figures his Golden Gophers still are a little behind schedule but moving ahead.

"We're lagging a bit defensively," Gutekunst added, "probably because we have had to spend so much time concentrating on fundamentals. We have made some progress, but it has just been slower than we had hoped."

According to Gutekunst, "We had planned to have more of a defensive package installed by this time, but it has been a matter of our working on the fundamental things in the early going."

With less than two weeks remaining, Gutekunst looks for more rapid improvement. "As coaches we have to be very patient," he said, "and the players have to be persistent. Up until now, they have been very willing, and they have worked very hard. We expect that to continue through the final 10 practices."

In a brief analysis from Holtz on the overall picture, two areas that still concern him are Minnesota's lack of progress in showing an ability to catch the ball, and in demonstrating an adequate kicking game. Both areas are expected to continue receiving Holtz' full attention through the final stages of spring drills.

This joint promotion is for Gopher baseball camera bugs who want to take pictures on a competitive basis. Fans are asked to take game action pictures from the stands during Saturday's games and send them in to West Photo.

A panel will judge the pictures entered and select two winners who will receive their prizes May 12 when the Gophers play host to Iowa. Cameras will be awarded to the individuals judged taking the two best pictures. Fans may also go on the field between games for pics and autographs with the Gopher players and coaches between games Saturday.

Coach Anderson said Monday that if all goes well this week, he plans to send his two top pitchers against Northwestern Saturday.

This means junior Bill Cutshall from Rochester Mayo and sophomore Bryan Hickerson from Bemidji will get the call. Cutshall is 4-1 with a 2.51 earned run average while Hickerson's figures read 2-3 and 2.73.

Cutshall has won his last four starts and Hickerson his last two. The latter has been the Gopher tough luck pitcher as his teammates have not produced many runs during his starts.

Anderson said he is not all that certain about his Sunday starters. "If junior Doug Kampfen (2-2, 4.13) does not pitch in relief Saturday, he could receive a starting call Sunday," Anderson said.

"I believe we will also lean towards two of three other starters Sunday. Either freshman Mike Pavelka (3-0, 3.00), or seniors Rick Hill (j1-1, 4.23) or Tom Riewer (REE-ver) (0-1, 4.01) could be our pick.

"Whoever goes to the mound, I just hope they can do the job. Our pitchers have been sound lately giving us solid pitching game after game. If they can remain as consistant and our bats come alive, we could be all right.

"I believe the West Division race is wide open. Northwestern took two of four against Wisconsin last week (the last game ended in a tie) and will come in here looking to improve on their record. They are 21-9-1 through last weekend and were recently ranked 25th nationally.

"No longer does Minnesota or anyone else simply put on their uniforms and beat Northwestern. I expect four tight battles this weekend. I just hope we get a favorable bounce or two. We may need it."

Minnesota has won 10 of its last 12 games, including the last seven in a row. During that span the pitchisng staff has a combined ERA of 2.17 while the team batting average has climed from .243 to .305.

"Granted, not all our recent wins have come against NCAA Division I teams, but you still have to pitch and hit to defeat any opponent," Anderson added.

"I believe we are coming into our own and will be ready to face Big Ten opposition. But we can't go into those games with anything less than a total commitment from every one of our players. We have a title to defend. And that's never an easy task. It's harder to stay on top than it was to get there."

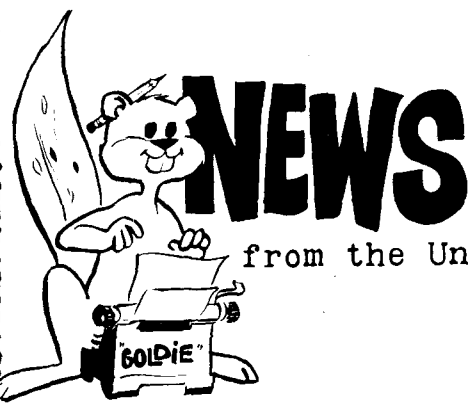

BSB HEADS SOUTH, AGAIN

Minneapolis, MN---After winning three of four games against Creighton University in the 55,000-seat H.H.H. Metrodome in the Twin Cities, the Minnesota baseball Gophers return to real weather this week heading to Oklahoma and Arkansas for five outdoor games.

The Gophers, having won five of their last six outings, carry a 6-9 season record on their trip. Minnesota plays single contests against Oklahoma State in Stillwater Thursday evening, and another single Friday night against Oral Roberts at Tulsa. It's a day doubleheader Saturday against Oral Roberts, and the trip finishes with a single game Sunday afternoon against the U. of Arkansas at Fayetteville.

Moving indoors for the first time in Minnesota's long baseball history, Minnesota took to the new surroundings quickly by winning twice over Creighton last Saturday.

Minnesota relied on the 4-hit, 12-strike out pitching of junior Bill Cutshall (2-1) to win the opener 5-2.

Another junior, Doug Kampsen (1-2), picked up the win in the second game with three innings of solid relief pitching. The game went into the last of the sixth inning scoreless and Minnesota had but one hit to that point.

But junior center fielder Pat Pohl and junior second baseman Mike Pehrson opened the Gopher inning with back to back triples for the first run. Then junior captain and left fielder Jack Schlichting became the first UM player to crack a home run in the Dome depositing a pitch just over the left field barrier.

Minnesota added one more run in the inning to win 4-1.

Creighton took advantage of a Minnesota miscue in the first game Sunday to score five unearned runs in the sixth inning and win the opener 7-3. UM led 2-1 going into the sixth and could have come out unscathed. But a bobbled grounder opened the floodgates with two out and Creighton scored six times.

The second game saw freshman lefty Mike Pavelka (2-0) win his second start of the season, 5-1, even though he needed a save from Kampsen. Pavelka gave up the only Creighton run before Kampsen threw 3 2/3 innings of 1-hit shutout ball.

The Gophers took a 2-1 lead when junior second baseman Dan VanDehey cracked his first homer of the year, a 375-foot line shot to left center, leading off the third inning. The Gophers added two more runs in the inning and another in the fifth to close out the Bluejays. Creighton is now 9-7.

"To be able to play under stable conditions at home this early in the year, and play as well as we did, has to produce positive results later in the year," Gopher head coach John Anderson said Monday.

"We have probably already played more games (15) by April 2 than by any previous Minnesota team. We only lost two games to weather on our spring trip to Texas, and that combined with the four games last weekend is a giant help.

"I said before the season began that for us to succeed we had to get in an awful lot of games for our inexperienced players. And that includes several juniors who are seeing regular duty for the first time.

"I was especially proud of our men Saturday. They were on the field all day long when we held our annual clinic (more than 2,500 attended), and then played two excellent college baseball games that evening. It was a terrific show of dedication on the part of our players.

"But Sunday's first game loss illustrated what I had said before the season. . . that we can't give up a lot of walks (9) and must make the plays on defense (3 errors) to succeed. That's why we lost 7-3. We do not have the power hitting of past year, so to win we have to stay close to every opponent.

"As for this weekend, well, we are simply facing top opposition. The last poll I saw ranked Oklahoma State fifth, Oral Roberts 10th and Arkansas 20th nationally. So we will be facing excellent pitching and hitting. It will give us a real idea of just how our team stacks up. I hope it's a good picture."

TENNIS TEAM AT OHIO STATE AND INDIANA

Following a Wednesday afternoon match at 3:00 p.m. at the 98th Street Racquet and Swim Club in Bloomington against non-conference opponent Hawaii, the University of Minnesota tennis team travels to Ohio State Friday and Indiana Saturday for Big Ten dual matches.

Paced by sophomore Swedes Fredrik Pahlett and Stefan Eriksson, the Golden Gophers are 12-6 this season following last Friday's 6-3 victory over Wisconsin.

QUOTING LOU HOLTZ. . . .

On the subject of 5,000 new season tickets already being sold for its 1984 season at the University of Minnesota, Holtz said, "I don't think they're buying tickets for this fall but for the future, and all I can tell people is that their support makes it a lot easier."

On the importance of spring practice, Holtz said, "Spring practice is critical. There are certain steps to winning, and if you miss any, they won't be apparent until fall. You can't mistake steps for escalators, because there aren't any escalators to success. The successful person is one who goes through what others won't go through. You win by doing the little things."

On what Minnesota hopes to accomplish in spring practice, Holtz said, "We have three objectives in spring practice: To improve every player fundamentally, to evaluate every player and to bring players together as a unit."

On the fact that Minnesota has more than 30 "walk-ons" out for spring ball, Holtz said, "we welcomed and encouraged new candidates, and we have told them that by coming out for spring ball they have made a commitment, a commitment to stick it out through all 20 days of spring practice."

On the length (a three-hour workout) of his first day of spring practice, Holtz said, "There will be some tight games next fall, some games that are decided in the fourth quarter. We call the final portion of our practice our fourth quarter. It's a conditioning period, and it is the kind of extra effort that will enable us to win in the fourth quarter."

On the importance of spring practice, Holtz said, "Spring practice is no more important to a successful football program than a wife is to a marriage. We won't come out of a good spring session with the Rose Bowl invitation, but what we can accomplish should make us a better football team."

On how he evaluated the start of spring practice at the University of Minnesota, Holtz said, "If you are pleased with what you did yesterday, you haven't done much today. The good Lord put eyes in front of our heads so we could see where we are going, not in back of our heads to see where we had been."

On his new coaching staff, Holtz expressed total delight and said, "I'm extremely happy with our coaching staff. This is the first time we have worked together as a unit, and they are doing a remarkable job. They work hard, and they were extremely well organized."

To add incentive to the spring game, Holtz has split the squad, through the draft of the players, into the Minneapolis Maroon Team and the St. Paul Gold Team. The coaching staff drafted seniors on the squad, and the seniors then drafted the remaining team members.

Tickets are still available and on sale at the Bierman Field Building each day from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. A crowd of more than 30,000 is expected.

Concession stands and all other services usually connected with a Gopher home game at the dome will be in normal operation.

BSB TAKES 3 OF 4 FROM ILLINI, AT BADGERS NEXT

Minneapolis, MN---Using stingy pitching as its main weapon, the U. of Minnesota baseball Gophers took three straight at Illinois last weekend after losing the first encounter in extra innings.

That means Minnesota, by winning three of four, raised its Big Ten record to 5-3 and has taken over first place in the West Division conference race.

But now Minnesota heads to a spot where trouble has been the main word down through the years, Madison, WI. The Gophers and Wisconsin play four games Saturday and Sunday. Wisconsin is in third place in the West Division with a 5-4-1 league record. Northwestern, which plays four at Iowa this weekend, is second with a 4-3-1 record.

Minnesota has but eight league games remaining in its hopes to repeat as West Division champions. The Gophers close out regular season Big Ten play at Siebert Field May 12-13 hosting the Iowa Hawkeyes in four games.

"There is little questions that pitching is the thing that's keeping us going at this point," a weary head coach John Anderson said Tuesday after an 11-hour bus trip back from Champaign. "Our entire pitching staff has been throwing smart baseball, which means low strikes and few walks.

"I know you can't live forever on just pitching, but at the same time were are getting some timely hits to win key games. I just hope our hitters begin to come alive a little bit more and maybe once in awhile we can allow our pitchers to relax and not have to bear down on every batter quite so much."

Sophomore lefty Bryan Hickerson (Bemidji), freshman lefty Mike Pavelka (Hopkins) and senior righthander Jim Francour (Marinette, WI) were the big winners for UM last weekend. Both Hickerson (4-3, 1.93 ERA) and Francour (4-2, 2.16) threw complete games at Illinois. Pavelka (5-1, 3.10) needed relief help from junior Doug Kampsen (Roseville) (2-3, 4.39) to gain the highest number of wins on the Gopher staff.

Kampsen had quite a weekend for himself. On Saturday he pitched the last three innings only to see Illinois score two runs after two were out to win the series opener 5-4 in nine innings.

But he came back to gain a save in relief of Pavelka in a 5-1 win on Monday's first game, and then won the second with his bat. After Francour had only given up two hits in six innnings, the second being a home run giving Illinois a 2-1 lead, Kampsen came in as a pinch hitter in the UM seventh and promptly cracked a two-run homer in the 4-2 Gopher victory. Francour retired the side in order in the Illini seventh.

It is expected the same four who started last weekend will get the call against the Badgers.

"EXTRAS" PLANNED FOR SPRING FOOTBALL GAME SATURDAY

When the University of Minnesota holds its annual Spring Game Saturday at 8 p.m. in the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome, a number of "extras" will be added to the fare in hopes of making it a spectacular attraction for the more than 30,000 football fans expected to be on hand.

First of all a special photograph and autograph session is on tap beginning when the gates open at 6:30 p.m. and continuing until 7:10 when the squad will leave the field in preparation for the evening's shootout.

All fans planning on attending the game are urged to bring cameras with them and make their way through the seating areas down onto the playing field where they may have their pictures taken with players as well as get autographs of the current Golden Gophers.

The game itself will feature a squad tabbed as the Minneapolis Maroons squaring off with the St. Paul Golds. The two teams were drafted earlier this week by U of M seniors, and the coaching staff also has been divided to handle the two contingents.

Larry Beckish, Minnesota's new offensive coordinator, will head the Minneapolis contingent. His aides will include George Stewart, John Palermo, Phil Elmassian, Butch Nash, Vince Cerrato and Jeff Schuh.

John Gutekunst, Holtz' defensive coordinator, will handle the St. Paul entry and his staff will include George Wemeier, Jim Hueber, Pete Cordelli, Jim Strong, Greg McMahon and Craig White.

The two squads had, after the weekend draft, one workout this week in preparation for Saturday night's finale, and that will conclude spring football drills at the U of M for 1984.

Coach Holtz pushed his club through a full-scale scrimmage last Saturday under complete game conditions and the results prompted him to admit that while the Golden Gophers had a long road to travel, "We've come a long way" this spring.

There were eight touchdowns scored in the tune-up last weekend and Valdez Baylor led the parade with two of them...one on a one yard run and another on a 29 yard pass from Brett Sadek. Baylor finished with 65 yards in 10 attempts while Sadek hit 14 of 26 attempts for 231 yards and three touchdowns.

Other scores came from David Puk on a 12 yard run, Donovan Small on a six yard pass from Sadek, Mel Anderson on a 56 yard pass from Sadek, Kevin Starks on a 14 yard pass from Sadek and Kevin Wilson on a 16 yard run.

"The hitting was good," Holtz proclaimed, "and the enthusiasm was excellent. We still made too many mistakes, however. We gave up the long gainer, we had too many loss-of-yardage plays, we made some critical mistakes in our kicking game and we had too many mental errors and penalties. We just have to eliminate those self-inflicted wounds."

Hopefully those things will be gone by Saturday night when the spring game takes place. "You can feel the spirit and enthusiasm around our squad," Holtz said. "Our players are learning about competing." He hopes that will be the case Saturday night.

QUOTING LOU HOLTZ

On the subject of his Golden Gophers getting better, Holtz said, "I have seen lots of good things. Our front seven has shown more improvement than any similar group I've been associated with in the past."

On the subject of Minnesota's defensive strength, based upon the improvement shown by the front seven, Holtz said, "No matter how good one area of the defense is, if we have a breakdown somewhere else it will do us no good. We are as strong as our weakest link, and we must strive for a total team concept."

On the subject of his emphasis of the team concept, Holtz said, "We must not worry about an individual performance. We can't have our individual concerned about making great plays but instead striving to eliminate bad plays. This is done only when our players stop being concerned with individual achievements and begin concentrating on the team concept."

On the subject of making every practice day count, Holtz said, "We must come to practice mentally prepared. We must be in the right frame of mind and be able to look at the positive things. We need to be happy, ready to enjoy what we have. We must ask ourselves if we have done our best in practice at everything undertaken. Have we given it everything we have at all times."

On the subject of communicating, Holtz said, "We must be able to communicate with our teammates. We must be able to relate to other players. We must exchange ideas. To communicate we must listen. The Good Lord gave us two ears and one mouth so we can listen twice as much as we should talk."

On the subject of excellence, Holtz said, "Our coaching staff has made a commitment to excellence. We care about our players well being, we care about their academic progress and we care about each player as a person. We respect our players, and we want our players to respect each other. Mutual respect will bring excellence for all of us."

On the subject of what ingredients are necessary for winning, Holtz said, "There are three D's in winning football: defense, discipline and desire. To win we must be physical, we must be willing to hit and we must be able to intimidate our opponents. Putting those three D's into our game will make us able to do those things."

TRACK AND FIELD TEAM HOME FOR MINNESOTA INVITATIONAL

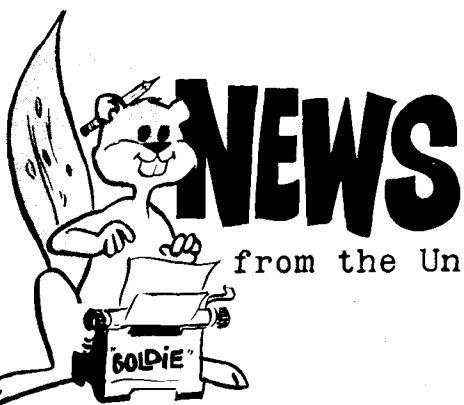

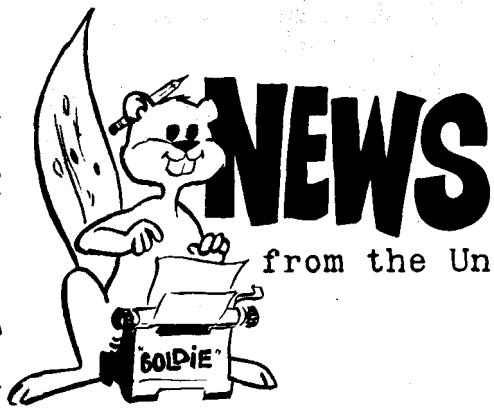
At that press conference, Knight is expected to discuss the US Olympic team that he will put on display in the Twin Cities while Jerry Bell and Coach Dutcher will reveal complete plans for seating, bleacher seats, the portable basketball floor and ticket prices.

Among the former Golden Gophers who have indicated that they will play and currently are members of the NBA Players Association are Kevin McHale of the Boston Celtics, Randy Breuer of the Milwaukee Bucks, Mark Olberding of the Kansas City Kings, Trent Tucker and Ray Williams of the New York Knicks, Mychal Thompson of the Portland Trailblazers (if he has recovered from elbow surgery), and Jim Brewer who played several years in the NBA and this past season played professionally in Italy.

"We plan to have portable bleachers brought in to use on the Metrodome floor," Coach Dutcher said, "and our general seating arrangement should accommodate about 30,000 fans. A similar game schedule in the new dome in Indianapolis already has sold 50,000 tickets, so we hope Minnesota basketball fans will respond in the same way."

GOPHERS HOPE TO REPEAT

Minneapolis, MN---When the Minnesota baseball Gophers host the Iowa Hawkeyes in doubleheaders Saturday and Sunday at Siebert Field, Minnesota can repeat as Big Ten West Division champions by winning twice. Action both days begins at 1 p.m.

The Gophers captured last year's divisional crown with a 12-2 record.

Minnesota's 1984 record reads 8-4 (25-17 overall) while second place Iowa comes in at 6-5.

That places Minnesota 1 1/2 games ahead of the Hawks with four games left to play. Should Minnesota win twice this weekend, they will have successfully defended the same championship won last season.

The Gophers put themselves into this shot at the title by winning three of four games at Wisconsin last weekend. The Badgers took the opener 3-2 Saturday with Minnesota taking the nightcap 5-1 behind the 1-hit, 11-strike out pitching of Bill Cutshall and a final out relief job by Doug Kampsen.

Minnesota swept both games Sunday winning 5-4 and 12-9. A four run first inning in both the latter games got UM off and running.

However, in the second contest, Minnesota found itself trailing 6-4 after the first two innings, but bounced back with eight markers in the last three frames to win going away.

For the second straight weekend, Kampsen was again a huge figure. He worked all four games in Madison gaining his sixth, seventh and eighth saves of the season in the last three. He pitched 6 1/3 innings, gave up eight hits and three runs, walked none and struck out four.

He has appeared in nine of Minnesota's 12 Big Ten games this season, all relief roles.

(OVER)

And for the first time this season on a Big Ten weekend, the Gopher bats came alive. Minnesota went into the Wisconsin series having hit but one home run in its first eight league outings.

The explosion started in the second game Saturday when junior outfielder Jack Schlichting and junior third baseman Scott Schuveiller each cracked out his fourth home run of the year in UM's 5-1 victory.

In continued Sunday as Schuveiller belted out a bases loaded triple in the first inning of both games. He ended the weekend with one home run, three triples, six hits in 14 at bats and eight runs batted in.

Schlichting added his sixth homer of the year, tops on the Gopher varsity, in the second contest while junior first baseman Alex Bauer added a pair of doubles and junior outfielder Jon Beckman chipped in with a triple.

For the entire series Minnesota batters contributed 13 extra base hits out of 39 safe blows. The team's Big Ten batting average increased from .254 to .281.

The Gopher pitching staff, although not quite as sharp as the previous weekend at Illinois, continued to sparkle and shows a combined league earned run average (ERA) of 3.49. That figure is still the best in the Big Ten.

Sophomore lefty Bryan Hickerson still owns the lowest ERA in the conference with an 0.47 mark. He allowed his first earned run of the season at Wisconsin. Hickerson has pitched 19.1 innings, walked nine and struck out 10.

One of the more pleasant surprises for the Gophers this spring has been the emergence of sophomore shortstop Mark Hess. Hess currently leads the Gophers in conference batting with a .400 average. At Wisconsin he accounted for six hits in 12 at bats, scored five runs and drove in one. He has hit safely in six of his last seven Big Ten games.

Another who has come up the ladder fast is junior centerfielder Pat Pohl. Pohl went five for 11 against Wisconsin, drove in two teammates and raised his Big Ten average to .375. Pohl is tied for 12th in the league bat race while Hess is tied for 6th.

In addition, Hess made several spectacular defensive plays to help kill potential Badger rallies.

"Naturally we are more than pleased to be in our present position," Gopher head coach John Anderson said Monday. "All any team can ask is that its destiny be placed in its own hands.

"What we do against Iowa this weekend tells the entire story. We do not have to look to anyone else for help. It's simply up to ourselves.

"It was great to see our hitters come through and take some of the pressure off the pitching staff. I would love to see that again this weekend."

Anderson said he will probably stay with his same pitching rotation for the Iowa series, meaning Hickerson, Cutshall, Mike Pavelka and Jim Francour will probably get the starting calls. Kampsen will be ready, too, as always.

GOLDEN GOPHER GRIDDERS FINISH WITH SPRING GAME

Spring football practice at the University of Minnesota went out in a blaze of glory Saturday night when first-year Head Coach Lou Holtz put his Golden Gophers on display in the most spectacular Spring Game ever staged at the U of M.

The official attendance was recorded at 43,060 in the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome, and the fans in attendance were treated to a superb evening of entertainment which found the Minneapolis Maroons edging the St. Paul Golds 24-17.

"It was a typical game between two very evenly matched teams," Holtz analyzed. "The St. Paul team lost because it had more turnovers, but the outcome was not as important as the fun for everyone involved."

And Holtz was right. The rival coaches had a delightful evening. The honorary coaches were in awe of the sideline activities. The players had the time of their lives, and the fans enjoyed every minute of it."

"I can't express how happy I am over the response of the fans," Holtz exclaimed. "The turnout was tremendous, and I was especially pleased to see so many parents at the game with their kids. That's what it's all about. Now I just hope the fans realize how much interest there is in Golden Gopher football and get their season tickets for next fall. Those tickets are going to be a priority item, and one day soon people won't be able to buy them."

The game found Brett Sadek, sophomore quarterback for the Minneapolis Maroons, leading his club to the win with a 14-of-24 evening. He accounted for 211 yards through the air, and he did not throw an interception.

Donovan Small was one of the top rushers for the winners with 75 yards in 12 carries. He also accounted for two touchdowns. Kevin Wilson was even more productive as he notched 80 yards in 19 carries, and he also had a TD.

Dwayne McMullen led the Maroon receivers as Sadek's favorite target. He registered 116 yards with seven receptions. Lungen Howard chipped in with five grabs for 93 yards.

Andy Hare quarterbacked the St. Paul team and hit 10 of 17 for 112 yards, but he had two intercepted. His backup, Mike Moe, hit four of seven for 28 but also had two picked off by the winners.

As spring drills drew to a close, Holtz figured that his club has been moving in the right direction. "We're not where we want to be," he said, "and we are not where we should be. But we are not where we will be. We made a lot of progress."

Holtz also pointed out that the Golden Gophers seemed excited about the 1984 season. "After two tough years, our players are looking forward to next fall," he explained. "They've been laughed at and criticized. But the support they received this spring and the turnout for the spring game has them primed for their next football season.

So are the victory-starved Golden Gopher fans!

QUOTING LOU HOLTZ

On the subject of his findings when traveling around the state of Minnesota Holtz said....."I am truly amazed at the interest in the Golden Gophers by the people all over the state. They are enthusiastic and encouraging. They want to support the University of Minnesota."

On the subject of the fans' turnout for the spring game, Holtz said....I'm overwhelmed by the size of the crowd. "At Arkansas we had 33,000 for a spring game once, and that was a record. The 43,060 we had here in the Metrodome may be a record that will never be broken."

On the subject of recent events involving the football program at the University of Minnesota, Holtz said...."I'm overawed by the events of the past few days. First it's announced that we're getting our football building built and then we have a crowd like this (43,060) for our spring game. I feel like the Music Man: everything is ready and now you have to play."

On the subject of what was accomplished by the Golden Gophers in spring practice, Holtz said...."We still have a long way to go, a long road to travel, but we've got the train on the right track. Now it's a matter of finding who wants to push it. It's certainly not a downhill situation from here on, but we have made an awful lot of progress."

On the subject of what he feels about the 1984 Golden Gophers, Holtz, said.... "I want everybody to know that I am extremely proud of our squad. These people have not played with a lot of confidence in the past, and they have had to overcome some very difficult experiences. But the spring game helped them a great deal, and we can't wait for next fall."

On the subject of his 1984 squad's physical abilities, Holtz said...."I'm worried about how strong we are and about our physical condition. We have to improve in both of those areas because we don't have a lot of depth."

On the subject of areas within his 1984 University of Minnesota football team that still are causing him concern, Holtz said...."I am aware that we have some weaknesses. I know that we don't have great speed, especially in our defensive secondary. We have to get more speed back there. And I'm extremely concerned about our kicking game."

On the subject of the time available between the spring game and the start of fall practice, Holtz said...."The summer will be a big test for all of us. The players will be on their own, but they know they have to push themselves just like our coaches pushed them through spring practice. It's their time to mentally prepare themselves for the season ahead. It's their time to look ahead to the challenge they will be facing during the 1984 season. It's all up to them."

TENNIS TEAM AND TWO INDIVIDUALS TO COMPETE IN NCAA TOURNAMENT

The Big Ten champion University of Minnesota tennis team makes its first appearance, while sophomore Swedish stars Fredrik Pahlett and Stefan Eriksson make their second consecutive trip to Athens, Georgia this week for the NCAA Tournament.

Coach Jerry Noyce's Golden Gophers open the 16-team dual tournament Saturday against Trinity (Texas). Pahlett and Eriksson begin the 64-man singles and 32-team doubles portion of the tournament Thursday, May 17.

Pahlett, NCAA runnerup a year ago, has suffered through an injury-prone spring in which he compiled records of 28-16 overall and 8-3 in the Big Ten with ailments ranging from a sore back to the sprained ankle that sidelined him last weekend at the Big Ten Tournament. Pahlett will turn professional following the NCAA Tournament.

Eriksson, who will remain at Minnesota next season, enters the NCAA Tournament with 54-9 overall and 12-0 in the Big Ten. The Swedish duo is 11-7 overall and 6-4 overall in doubles play.

Joining Pahlett and Eriksson in the Minnesota lineup are sophomore Matt Grace, 37-14 overall and 9-3 in the Big Ten at third singles; freshman Chuck Merzbacher, 35-13 overall and 10-2 in the Big Ten at fourth singles; junior David Blackstone, 30-15 overall and 11-1 in the Big Ten at fifth singles; and senior Lou McKee, 15-8 overall and 9-3 in the Big Ten at sixth singles.

Likely Minnesota doubles pairings are Pahlett and Eriksson at number one, Merzbacher and Grace at number two, and McKee and Blackstone at number three.

Noyce's squad tallied 58 points compared to runnerup Illinois' 44 en route to Minnesota's second Big Ten title and first outright championship last weekend at Northwestern. Eriksson (#2), Grace (#3), Merzbacher (#4) and Blackstone (#5) took singles flight titles, while Pahlett joined Eriksson and Grace on the All-Big Ten Team.

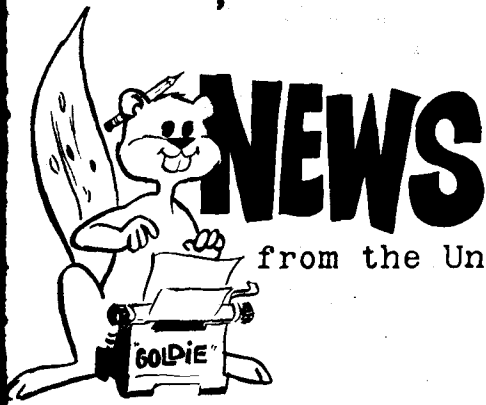
TRACK AND FIELD TEAM HOME FOR GBS-GOLDEN GOPHER LAST CHANCE

GOPHER WIN WEST, HOST BIG TEN

Minneapolis, MN---When Minnesota opened its baseball season, the number one aim of the Gophers was to host the 1984 Big Ten Championship Tournament.

Wishes of the baseball Gophers came to fruition Saturday when Minnesota swept two games from Iowa at home, 8-3 and 3-1, to clinch its second straight Big Ten West Division championship on an 11-5 conference record. UM is 30-18 overall.

The tournament begins Friday at Siebert Field with the Gophers meeting Michigan State (28-22), second place team in the East Division, at 4 p.m. The tourney opener features East champion Michigan (37-17) against West runner-up Northwestern (41-16-1) at 1 p.m. All games are nine innings.

Games continue Saturday at 10 a.m. between losers the first day, with the first day winners meeting at 1 p.m. Then at 4 p.m. the two teams with one loss play.

The title game is scheduled at 1 p.m. Sunday with a second game at 4 p.m. if necessary.

Tickets are \$3 adults and \$2 UM students with paid fee statement and ID card, and also those under 18 years of age. Tickets are expected to go on sale Thursday at Bierman Building, and will remain on sale at Siebert Field throughout the tournament. There are no reserved seats.

PARKING

As parking facilities at or near Siebert Field are almost non-existent, it is recommended that patrons plan to park off 4th Avenue which runs directly behind Williams Arena.

The best spot is lot C-51 right next to the foot bridge that runs directly from that lot over the railroad tracks onto the Bierman Field complex behind the center field fence of Siebert Field.

THE IOWA SERIES

Although Minnesota and Iowa split the doubleheader on Sunday, it did not make any difference as to who would make the playoffs. Minnesota won the first game, 3-1, and Iowa the second, 6-4.

The Gophers finished 11-5 in the final West Division standings while Iowa ended up third at 7-8. Northwestern, by sweeping all four from Illinois, moved into second place with an 8-6-1 record.

For Iowa to have made the playoffs they would have had to win both games from UM Sunday and see Northwestern lose at least once to Illinois.

Junior right fielder and captain Jack Schlichting wielded the hot bat for Minnesota against the Hawkeyes. He broke open the first game Saturday with a grand slam home run, his sixth round tripper of the year, to lead UM.

For the weekend he collected 8 hits in 14 at bats and drove in 8 runs. Jack leads the Gophers in hits (54), runs scored (31) and runs batted in (40) while compiling a .342 batting average.

Freshman catcher Tim McIntosh continues to lead the Gophers in batting with a .374 average followed by junior second baseman Dan VanDehey at .360 and Schlichting.

But for the Big Ten season only, sophomore shortstop Mark Hess really came out of the woodwork for the Gophers. After a slow start on the season, Mark ended up leading the team in conference play with a whopping .426 average on 20 hits in 47 at bats.

In addition, Hess has sparkled on defense giving Minnesota solid strength up the middle.

Junior centerfielder Pat Pohl ended second for UM in Big Ten batting with a .378 average with junior left fielder Jon Beckman at .333 and Schlichting .327 in league play.

The Gopher pitching staff, which ended the season with the best team earned run average in the Big Ten at 3.34, turned in another fine job vs. Iowa.

Sophomore lefty Bryan Hickerson had the best league mark for the Gophers on a 4-1 record and 1.42 ERA in the conference. Hickerson had a complete game in the 8-3 opener against Iowa Saturday, and is expected to be Minnesota's starting pitcher in its tournament opener against Michigan State Friday. He is 6-4 overall.

Junior relief ace Doug Kampsen, who appeared in 11 of Minnesota's 16 league games, did it again against Iowa. He won two games in relief--the second contest Saturday and the first game Sunday. For the weekend he pitched 6 innings, gave up 5 hits, no runs and struck out 3. His league ERA dropped to 2.14 to go with a 2-1 record and 5 saves. He has 8 saves on the entire season.

THE TOURNEY

Minnesota and Michigan will each be appearing in their fourth consecutive Big Ten playoffs since the divisional split started in 1981. They are the only schools to have made it each year.

Michigan won both tournaments it has hosted, 1981 and 1983, while Minnesota, although finishing second to Illinois in the 1982 West Division race, captured the playoffs at Champaign, IL.

The Big Ten tournament rotates each year between the East and West division champions.

Michigan State made its first playoff appearance last spring but was eliminated in two games. This weekend marks the first trip to the finals for Northwestern.

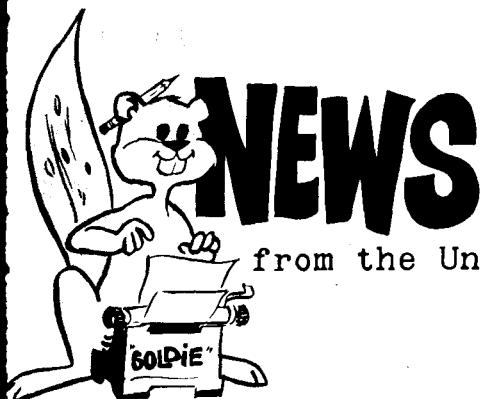

BASEBALL ENDS AT 31-20

Minneapolis, MN---The 1984 Minnesota Gopher baseball season didn't exactly end on a perfect note, but overall coach John Anderson's third edition won another Big Ten West Division title and reached the Big Ten playoffs a fourth consecutive year.

For the first time ever, Minnesota hosted the Big Ten tournament and came up a perfect host. UM didn't win the tourney. Last weekend the Gophers opened with an 8-7 win against Michigan State, but then saw all hopes of another Big Ten championship dashed by losing twice the next day.

In the first outing Saturday Minnesota stranded a whopping 16 baserunners in losing 6-3 to eventual champion Michigan before a near sellout crowd at Dick Siebert Field. Then came a 10-2 loss to tourney runner-up Northwestern and the season was history.

Actually, a 31-20 season record isn't all that bad. Nor was the Gopher Big Ten log of 11-5 for the West Division title.

Add to that that Minnesota and Michigan are the only schools who have made it to every Big Ten tournament (4 years) since the divisional split came about in 1981. Michigan has now won three playoff titles, Minnesota one.

Michigan, after dropping a 6-2 verdict to Northwestern Sunday, came back to defend its 1983 league championship by winning the next game 8-3.

One Gopher player, freshman designated hitter Tim McIntosh (Hopkins), was named to the all-tournament team.

ANDERSON ON THE SEASON

In three seasons as the Gopher diamond boss, Anderson has seen his clubs run up a combined record of 91-63-1 for a winning mark of .590 percent. His Big Ten record reads 31-15 (.674%).

Under Anderson Minnesota has won two West Division titles (1983-1984), and one Big Ten championship (1982).

"Going into the season we realized that we had lost a lot of quality ball players from our 1983 team and that we would see several first year players in starting positions," Anderson said Monday.

"So we were not all that optimistic. Still, we believed if our pitchers overcame the difficulties they suffered in '83, we could make a run at defending the West Division championship.

(OVER)

"Well, that's exactly what happened. Our pitching had to be the highlight of the season. The men we needed to have big years came through. Our team earned run average dropped from 6.11 last year to 3.41.

"Junior Doug Kampsen (Roseville) came up with a school record eight saves, five in the Big Ten. He set another record by pitching in 24 games this year, including 11 of our 16 Big Ten league games.

Bryan Hickerson (Bemidji) was dominating the Big Ten until he hurt his back late in the season, and freshman Mike Pavelka (Hopkins) came up with a surprising six wins on the year.

"Bill Cutshall (Rochester), although at times inconsistent, won some awfully big conference games, and Jim Francour (Marinette, WI) returned from elbow surgery to win two key Big Ten games that we needed badly.

"I suppose our biggest disappointment, besides not winning the playoffs, was that several returning players simply did not match up to the performances they gave us in 1983. We actually believed it would be the vets who would carry us with the new people in starting positions learning what it was all about.

"Well, it just goes to show how much you can predict in baseball. For the most part our new people had great years and the vets did not match up, exactly the opposite of what we figured. I guess that's why coaches gray faster.

"Another factor we had to overcome was the loss of two upperclassmen. Pitcher Bill Thompson (Bloomington) and outfielder Bill Lentsch (St. Paul) suffered shoulder and back problems, respectively. Thompson underwent an operation and says he will be ready to go 100% next spring. We hope Lentsch's problems are solved by next season, too.

"We were forced to move some players into new positions and I believe that affected their play also.

"As to looking ahead, well, right now that's almost impossible. Until the major league draft is held and some of our players face the decision of signing or returning, we simply do not know who will be available.

"But we will once again be strong up the middle. We'll have both freshmen catchers back in McIntosh and Mike Halloran (Edina), plus our double play combination of Mark Hess (St. Anthony) at shortstop and Dan VanDehey (Crystal) at second base with Pat Pohl (Hastings) in center field.

"Each of these men made exceptional contributions. Hess and Pohl led us in batting in the Big Ten portion of our season and all of them played outstanding defense.

"So overall I'm pleased with the results we had this year. Naturally you always want to reach every goal you set up before a year starts, but then, how many teams and coaches ever claim to have accomplished that much.

"This year is history. We are already making plans for a bigger and better season in 1985."

SEVERAL PLAYERS HONORED

Four members of the Minnesota baseball team came in for special honors at the first Gopher Dugout Club Awards Banquet held today (Tuesday) at Nino's Restaurant in Roseville.

Winning brand new awards were: junior pitcher Doug Kampsen both the Richard "Chief" Siebert Memorial MVP and the David Winfield Pitcher of the Year awards; junior captain and outfielder Jack Schlichting (Brooklyn Center) the Dugout Club Player of the Year award; junior outfielder Jon Beckman (Jordan) the Paul Fortin Scholarship/Athlete award; and McIntosh the Paul Molitor Batting Champion award. McIntosh led the Gophers with a season batting average of .373.

In addition to McIntosh being named to the all-tournament team, six players received mention on the 1984 All-Big Ten teams.

Schlichting and Kampsen were named to the first team, Hess to the second team, plus Pohl, Hickerson and junior third baseman Scott Schuveiller (Richfield) made the third team in a vote by the conference head coaches.

Backes, also second in the discus, took the shot title with a mark of 62'11½". Kromer's winning 3,000-meter steeplechase clocking was 8:55.20. Moran recorded a time of 1:52.97 in taking the 800-meter title.

Backes and Kromer have qualified for the NCAA meet May 30 through June 2 at Eugene, Oregon. --UM--

Minneapolis, MN---Finals for U.S. Olympic Greco-Roman wrestling qualifying will be held Thursday, Friday and Saturday, June 7-8-9, at Williams Arena on the University of Minnesota main campus.

According to Wally Johnson, head wrestling coach at Minnesota and co-tournament director, 187 qualifiers from eight regional competitions across the nation will battle for the top six positions in each weight classification.

The top finishers then head for the U.S. Olympic training camp June 16-23 at Grand Valley State College in Grand Rapids, MI. It is at the latter spot where the U.S. Greco-Roman Team will be chosen for the 1984 summer games July 28-August 12 in Los Angeles. The actual competition runs July 30-August 3.

One competitive session is scheduled for 7 p.m. Thursday, June 7, at Williams Arena, with 1 p.m. and 7 p.m. sessions held both Friday and Saturday.

Admission is \$3 adults and \$2 students for the first two sessions, \$4 adults and \$2 students for the third session Friday evening, and \$5 adults and \$3 students for both sessions Saturday.

And all-session pass is also available priced at \$15 adult and \$8 students.

There will be a strong local flavor at the trials as at least three former University of Minnesota competitors will be vying for a spot on the U.S. squad.

Included are former Gopher champions Dan Chandler, Jim Martinez and Tom Press. Chandler and Press have worked as assistant varsity coaches under Johnson at UM the last few years besides competing on the international level in both Greco-Roman and free style wrestling.

FOOTBALL SEASON TICKET SALES REACH RECORD HIGH AT U OF M

With the 1984 football season opener still more than a month away, the University of Minnesota's public season ticket sale has reached an all-time high....and that "all-time" spans more than 100 years.

Ken Buell, U of M athletic ticket manager, announced this week that nearly 24,000 public season tickets have been sold for the 1984 Golden Gopher football campaign as of July 31. That figure tops the 23,447 public season tickets that were sold during the 1957 football season at U of M.

"We feel that at the pace we are going," Buell said, "it is realistic to think we can sell 25,000 public season tickets this year before we open against Rice University on September 8."

In addition, Buell points out, the sale of staff and student tickets is on the increase. "If the current interest in Golden Gopher football carries over to the students and staff members," he says, "our total season ticket sale could reach 35,000 this season." Last year 23,500 season tickets were sold.

Public season ticket applications will continue to be accepted by the U of M athletic ticket office in the Bierman Field Building (516 - 15th Ave. SE, Minneapolis, MN 55455) until September 1. Student ticket orders will be accepted through the month of September.

Single game ticket applications also are being accepted, but Buell has explained that no single game orders will be filled until the season ticket sale has been concluded just prior to the Rice opener.

"There has been a great deal of interest in our game with Iowa on November 17," Buell said, "so that could be our biggest single game seller, but we do still have a limited supply of tickets available for that game." In addition, Buell indicated that the allotment of tickets for Minnesota's September 15 road game at Nebraska has been completely sold.

Six home games are scheduled for the Golden Gophers in the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome this year....all with 7 p.m. Saturday kickoffs. In addition to the September Northwestern October 20 in the 1984 Homecoming game, Michigan State October 27 and Iowa in the finale on November 17.

Marsden is assigned to work with student-athletes in men and women's basketball, softball, baseball, men's golf, women's gymnastics and men and women's tennis. He has both his B.S. and M.A. degrees from the U of M and has taught at the Farmington Middle School. He also has worked as a student coordinator and academic adviser in the U of M's College of Liberal Arts and as a residence hall director at UW Oshkosh.

Berube will work with men and women's cross country and track, men's gymnastics and wrestling. He also will coordinate study groups and the tutorial program. Berube, who has a B.A. degree from William Penn College and a M.A. degree from Missouri, served in advising capacities at Union College, Columbia College and at the University of Missouri. He comes to Minnesota from Florida State where he functioned in a similar capacity in that school's athletic department.

Donahue also indicated this week that she had named Cathy MacMullen as principal secretary and Deane Blomster senior accounts specialist to complete her academic area staff assignments for 1983-84.

MOST GOPHER SEASON TICKET HOLDERS PREFER DOME FOR FOOTBALL

Over half of the Gopher football season ticket holders say they would prefer to keep University of Minnesota home games at the Humphrey Metrodome than move it back to Memorial Stadium, according to a telephone survey recently commissioned by the university.

The survey of past and present season ticket holders found that overall, 53 percent of those surveyed want the university's football team to continue to play in the Metrodome, 36 percent want the games moved back to Memorial Stadium and 11 percent didn't have a preference.

Forty-eight percent of those who made the move to the Metrodome in 1982 are happy with the new location. However, of the those who decided not to renew their tickets when the game locale was changed, 76 percent said they'd like to see the Gophers play in their old home on the Minneapolis campus. A third group -- those who purchased season tickets after the move -- heavily favored keeping the games in downtown Minneapolis by a margin of 4-to-1.

"I think on balance the survey seems to indicate that more people are interested in staying where we are playing the games now than would be if we moved back to Memorial Stadium," said Frank Wilderson, the university vice president responsible for intercollegiate athletic.

The survey results will be used to help the university's Board of Regents decide this fall whether to exercise the last of three one-year options to withdraw from the university's 30 year contract with the Metropolitan Sports Facilities Commission signed in 1982. If the board does not act on the option, the Gophers

(MORE)

will be obligated to play football in the Metrodome for the next 27 years. If the university decides to pull out, the Gophers would likely move back to Memorial Stadium, which would need extensive renovation to bring it up to standards.

"Our final recommendation will be based on many more considerations than just the survey, although the survey is an important piece of information," Wilderson said. "Otherwise, we wouldn't have done it."

In a letter University President C. Peter Magrath told the board that the administration will present information about attendance, income, expenses and other factors before the regents decide -- probably in November -- whether to let the contract stand.

The survey, conducted by the Minnesota Center for Social Research, sampled 1,511 persons representing 20,332 season tickets. The responses of each group -- old purchasers, those who did not buy tickets for the move to the domed stadium (so-called "dropouts") and new purchasers -- were weighted according to the number of tickets that group accounts for. The responses of old purchasers, who make up almost 68 percent of ticket holders, were given a like amount of weight in figuring the overall results. Dropouts carried 6.5 percent of the overall results; new purchasers carried 25.6 percent of the weight.

The survey also looked at plans to buy tickets for the 1984 season and found that 93 percent of old purchasers, 74 percent of new purchasers and 20 percent of dropouts intended to have a reserved seat for Gopher home games.

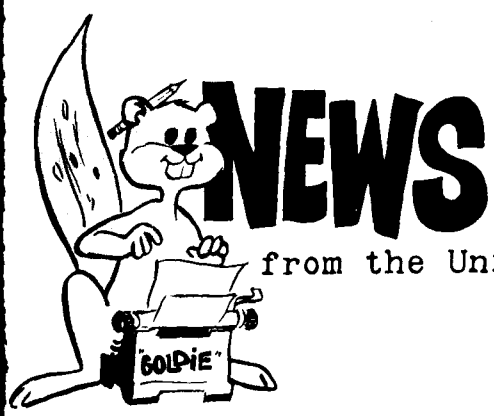
The survey also sampled 487 of the 4,603 students who held season tickets last year and found that 50 percent of them favor keeping football games at the Metrodome and 41 percent favor Memorial Stadium games. Of 500 students selected at random, 40 percent preferred the domed stadium, 48 percent favored the on-campus location and 12 percent didn't express a preference.

GOPHERS OPEN PRACTICE MONDAY

Minneapolis, MN---Head coach Lou Holtz greets his 1984 football hopefuls Monday, the first day of official practice for the University of Minnesota Golden Gophers.

Holtz, who for the last seven years was head coach at the University of Arkansas, takes over a team that last fall went 1-10, and in the last two years had lost 17 consecutive Big Ten games.

More than 80 players, including 45 lettermen, return from spring drills under Holtz, and will be bolstered by 30 freshmen who signed tenders, and more than 50 walk-ons bringing the first day squad roster to 162. This is the largest fall roster at Minnesota in more than a decade.

The squad will practice the first three days in shorts, T-shirts and helmets under NCAA conditioning rules, and then don pads beginning Thursday.

Holtz and his staff have but three weeks to prepare for the season opener Saturday evening, September 8, at the Metrodome against Rice University. The Gophers play six home games in 1984 including Big Ten foes Ohio State, Sept. 29, Indiana, Oct. 6, Northwestern, Oct. 20, Michigan State, Oct. 27, and Iowa, Nov. 17. All home games have a starting time of 7 p.m.

GOLDEN GOPHERS PREPARE FOR 1984 SEASON OPENER

With the 1984 season opener against Rice University at the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome less than two weeks away, first-year coach Lou Holtz has kicked his practice tempo into high gear.

Holtz plans to send his Golden Gophers through another full-scale scrimmage this weekend, and he has high hopes that the results will be more favorable than what he saw in the first such affair last Saturday.

"It was difficult to analyze a scrimmage like that without a good look at the films," he admitted, "but from what I saw on the spot, there was not much to be pleased about."

It was true that the offense scored touchdowns....all four times on plays of over 50 yards....but in general Holtz was more than disappointed in the effort of his offensive unit.

"I was not happy with our execution or our consistency," he said. "We had too many fumbles, too many interceptions and too many penalties. If we are to become winners, we must learn to win on offense. We have to do a lot of improving."

Defensively, Holtz was not quite as critical, but he still was far from satisfied. "We played aggressively on defense," he pointed out, "and the defense controlled the line of scrimmage. But we had some breakdowns that gave the offense those long bombs."

Holtz admitted that one of the most important things his Golden Gophers may have gotten from the scrimmage was an ability to measure progress. "We were able to see exactly how far we still have to go," he stressed, "but the problem is we don't have much time to get there."

Holtz was eluding, obviously, to the fact that Minnesota kicks off its 1984 campaign against Rice of the Southwest Conference on Saturday, September 8, at 7:00 p.m. That doesn't give the Gophers much time to get it all put together.

Consequently Minnesota will continue running through two (and sometimes three) practice sessions each day....at least for the rest of this week.... in preparation for the invading Owls.

Among the individuals who made contributions in last weekend's scrimmage, and who will continue to get close scrutiny in practice this week, were runningbacks Derek Collier and Terry Stewart, a pair of freshmen. Collier had 77 yards in eight carries while Stewart had 45 in nine.

And they were just a couple of the yearlings who could wind up making a contribution to the Golden Gophers this season....perhaps as early as in the Rice game in less than two weeks.

"I felt that with our late start we would have a tough time recruiting," Holtz admitted, "but from what I have seen so far our freshmen are better than we expected. That group includes some good athletes, and they are young people with intelligence and character."

Holtz made it plain, however, that Minnesota will not build it's 1984 club around the freshmen. "We have as many as 15 freshmen who could wind up playing a lot for us," he said, "but our team will not be made by freshmen. It will be made by seniors, and we need our seniors to play well for us and to provide our leadership."

GOPHER TALES--Holtz said after last weekend's scrimmage that Brett Sadek was his number one quarterback and would get the starting assignment against Rice in the '84 season opener.

"Dan Ford, Rickey Foggie and Alan Holt are promising freshmen quarterbacks who will play for us along the way," Holtz said, "but Sadek is our number one guy. He has been very impressive so far."

In last weekend's scrimmage, Sadek attempted 15 passes, completed seven and had one interception to account for 156 yards. Two strikes went for touchdowns...both to wide receiver Dwayne McMullen.

Ford was three of six with one interception for 41 yards, Foggie three of seven for 22 yards and Holt two of three for 20 yards. Foggie also was used some at runningback and accounted for 37 yards on 11 carries.

Freshman Jason Bruce, a wide receiver, chalked up the most electrifying play of the initial scrimmage of the '84 season when he galloped 50 yards for a touchdown on a flanker reverse.

Kicking still is a major worry for Coach Holtz. In a special workout last Saturday morning, Holtz used Adam Kelly, Paul Carlson and Greg Abbey in a punting drill, and none emerged as Holtz' favorite. "I've been very disappointed in our kicking" he admitted. "We still have not solved our problems."

In the area of problems, nuisance injuries have popped up with regularity and kept players from workouts as well as from the scrimmage last weekend. More seriously, three gridgers already have had surgery which is expected to keep them out of action throughout the '84 campaign and into a redshirt year.

That trio includes Brent Griffith (wrist), freshman lineman from Little Falls; Jim Holzheimer (shoulder), sophomore wide receiver from Fond Du Lac, WI; and Ray Armstrong (knee), freshman wide receiver from Jacksonville, ARK.

Hopes for the Golden Gopher improvement in '84 still is evident, at least if ticket sales can be an indicator. The U of M has sold more public season tickets than ever before, but as Holtz points out, "We still have some left."

QUOTING LOU HOLTZ

On the subject of his incoming freshman class, Holtz said..."I haven't really tried to rate them. I just hope that they have what it takes to become sophomores. I do feel, however, that we have as many as 15 freshmen who could win letters in 1984."

On the subject of his first freshman scrimmage, Holtz said...."We saw some good hitting and some good hustle, but there were too many mistakes. You have to remember that we were dealing with new people at new positions who were nervous and anxious to do well. Once they get over the nervousness and gain some experience, we will expect them to contribute."

On the subject of Minnesota's kicking game, Holtz said...."Everybody knows the problems we have with our kicking game, and we were well aware of it coming out of spring practice. We had no kickers, no snappers and no holders. I feel better about some areas but not about all of them. We still have not solved all of our problems."

On the subject of Minnesota's lack of speed, Holtz said...."Our team speed was not good coming out of spring practice. We were aware of our problems then. It is true that we have gained some speed with our new players this fall, so I would say at this point that our overall speed may not be great but it is better than it was."

On the subject of team's strengths Holtz said...."Despite the early loss of Jim Hobbins with a broken bone in his foot, the strength of our offensive team may be in the line. People like Jon Lilleberg and Mark VonderHaar are quality players, and they will be solid up front for us."

On the subject of the tight end position, Holtz said...."A team needs three quality tight ends to be competitive, so at this point I would say that our tight end situation is critical. We have Kevin Starks back, but he is our only returning letterman at that position. We'll have to get help, and it may come from Rob Pinkston, a junior college transfer, and from Tim Juneau, a freshman."

On the subject of Minnesota's quarterback situation, Holtz said...."We started the fall with one experienced quarterback, Brett Sadek, returning. Right now he's our number one man. We brought in five freshman quarterbacks, and that group has talent. We already have moved some of those players to other positions, but we'll get help from the others. Right now I feel comfortable with our quarterback situation, and I feel we will be ok there if we don't have to depend upon the freshmen too early."

On the subject of progress through the early stages of fall practice, Holtz said...."I have been pleased overall with what has happened thus far, and I don't want to undersell any of our players. The squad reported in excellent physical condition, and the players have been working very hard. The attitude is excellent."

GOPHER FEATURED PLAYER - 8/27/84

MARK VONDERHAAR - OT

Minneapolis, MN---Possibly the most devastating thing for an athlete, besides being incapacitated by an injury, is making a 100% mental comeback. The nagging doubt of being reinjured, of never reaching your same level of execution, is often overwhelming.

But on this year's University of Minnesota football varsity, there is a young man who reveals nothing but positive vibes following the most frustrating year of his life.

Mark VonderHaar, the 6-foot-5, 246-pound senior product of Hibbing located in Minnesota's fabled "Iron Range" country, is a study in exceptions. The freak knee injury suffered in practice that struck him down in October of 1982, his junior season, could have broken his spirit. The surgery that followed was so extensive that Mark even had to sit out the entire 1983 season, too.

Asked if that was his toughest time, Mark responded, "Yes, probably. Not being part of the team, not being on the field with my teammates hurt badly.

"But at the same time I believe I grew up the most, matured more than at any previous period of my life. For the first time since I became active in football back in high school, I was able to step back and fully realize there is more to life than the game itself.

"It is so easy to get completely caught up in the game. It sometimes almost takes over your every thought. But being on the outside looking in gave me the opportunity to put the game in a more proper perspective, a chance to realize exactly what part of my life the game plays. So in a backwards kind of way, that injury was kind of a positive break for me."

For a young man who is now under his third offensive line coach (Mark started out at UM as a defensive tackle), it all seems to come out positive. Even having been coached by different men is a plus to VonderHaar.

"If anything, learning different styles and techniques from each man has helped me mature as a player, too," Mark says. "Each taught differently. Each taught separate basics. One was a drive-block coach. Another concentrated mostly on foot movement. Another taught quickness and mobility. So in that sense I have benefited from learning several basics and have incorporated each into my play."

Asked his most memorable experience down through the years, Mark was quick to tell about being in the lockerroom following Minnesota's giant 12-10 upset at Iowa City in 1981. A last minute field goal by Jim Gallery provided the margin of victory.

"I have never seen such total emotion from an entire team," Mark recalls. "Players, coaches, trainers, managers, all of us broke down and cried tears of joy. But the most memorable moment was being embraced by captain Ken Dallafior with tears pouring down his cheeks.

"I was just a sophomore, but we were both offensive linemen and had a tight bond on the field. It was a time I'll never forget.

"But possibly more important to me was Dallafior's style of life away from the game. He was our captain, our leader. The way he conducted himself off the field had more influence on me than any other single item.

"Now that I'm a senior and have the responsibilities of leadership on my shoulders, I actually try to model my actions the way I remember Dallafior handled himself. Again it's probably that year of maturing that has benefited me so much.

"If you can't lead by example, not only in football but in any other area, too, then you don't lead in the proper fashion. If I can only make that kind of contribution as a senior, then I will have carried my share of the load."

There are some that say today's youth is going to hell in a handbasket. Take another look. With young men like Mark VonderHaar coming up, I would say we are in pretty good shape for the future. Some people let a hangnail or a headache drive them out of the picture. VonderHaar took on serious surgery and came back a better man. The name of HIS game is "positive."

GOLDEN GOPHERS KICK OFF NEW ERA AGAINST RICE SATURDAY

A new era of football gets underway for the University of Minnesota on Saturday at 7 p.m. in the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome when first-year Coach Lou Holtz and his Golden Gophers kick off the 1984 college football season by hosting Rice.

Minnesota went 3-8 in 1982 and 1-10 in 1983 (with that lone '83 triumph over these same Rice Owls), and it would not seem appropriate for Golden Gopher fans to hope for something better in the upcoming season.

But Coach Holtz arrived on the U of M scene last December, and he's energetically been working ever since on preparations for Saturday night's assignment against the invaders from the Southwest Conference.

His arrival has provided the Minnesota faithful with a ray of hope, and in last weekend's final tuneup, even Holtz found some reasons for looking ahead with optimism, guarded though it is to 1984.

"We've come a long way," Holtz admitted, "maybe even further than we had expected or had a right to hope. We have to remember, however, that we had further to travel than anyone else, and we still have a long way to go."

Both Minnesota and Rice approach Saturday night's lid-lifter with similar looks. Each club recorded only one win a year ago. Each club comes into the 1984 season led by a new coach. And each club seems to be sporting an abundance of new found enthusiasm.

At Minnesota, that enthusiasm has been contagious. Even the fans have caught it and purchased more season tickets than ever before in U of M history. Those fans look back to '83 when the Golden Gophers nudged Rice 21-17 in Houston, and they figure their favorites should be logical choices to prevail again in '84.

"It won't be easy for us," Holtz has cautioned. "We have to remember that a year ago Minnesota hit the skids after the Rice game. It was all downhill. Rice, however, improved. It got better as the season progressed, and it played its best ball late in the year. That improvement has given Rice something to build on. It will be a very difficult opener for us."

Holtz has tabbed Brett Sadek as his starting signal caller for the Saturday confrontation with the Owls. A sophomore, Sadek started the final five games of the 1983 campaign and does have that experience going for him. But he has been pushed by freshman Rickey Foggie and Dan Ford in fall drills.

"Sadek earned the job last spring," Holtz pointed out, "and he has kept it this fall. He has done everything we've asked of him, and I feel very confident about him."

Slated to join Sadek in the number one backfield are Valdez Baylor, a junior,

at fullback and Donovan Small, a sophomore, at tailback. Veterans David Puk, a junior who led Minnesota in rushing a year ago, and Tony Hunter, a senior, also are ticketed for service as are freshmen Derek Collier and Courtney Holmes.

First we must be able to put together a team of individuals who know, understand and can accept their roles. Everybody wants to drive the truck but nobody wants to load it. We must learn to do our assigned tasks. Second, we must get our players to believe in themselves and believe that they can win. We must develop the right attitude and atmosphere." *****

On the subject of Minnesota's "new look" which will be unveiled Saturday night, Lou Holtz said...."We have new uniforms for 1984. We ordered uniforms which are bigger, stronger and faster than the ones Minnesota wore a year ago." *****

On the subject of the hot weather which greeted the Golden Gophers in early fall drills, Lou Holtz said...."I like the hot weather. It is good for the squad's conditioning. Of course the players don't like it. They think it's too hot or it's too cold or it's too early or it's too late. We have to learn to look at things positively if we hope to make progress as a football team." *****

On the subject of Minnesota's chances for success in 1984, Lou Holtz said...."We have more talent than I had been led to believe or expected to find. Our squad reported for fall practice in excellent physical condition....better than I had anticipated or hoped for. I firmly believe that we have a chance to be competitive, and if we are competitive, we will have a chance to win."

CRAIG GRAFFUNDER - DT

Minneapolis, MN---Every time junior defensive tackle Craig Graffunder walks on the football field, two "other" University of Minnesota head coaches--Roy Griak in track and Brad Buetow in hockey--roll their eyes and sigh.

Back in his schoolboy days at Fridley High School, Graffunder, besides being a top notch football star, was also a standout in the other two sports. He was timed in 14.3 seconds for the 110-meter high hurdles and produced a 10.4 mark in 100-yards reaching the state tournament his senior year, the latter being his biggest thrill in high school.

During that same year, Craig scored 15 goals and 12 assists for the Tiger hockey varsity. Can you just imagine a 6-foot-4, 255-pound giant roaring down the right wing on an ice sheet, or pounding towards the finish line on a track? You can bet plenty of defensemen in hockey are glad Graffunder chose to play football in college.

"I actually didn't really know which route I wanted to follow until my junior year in high school," Craig says today. "I saw my first Gopher football game when I was nine years old. But I never really dreamed about playing for Minnesota.

"What turned it all around was as a junior I finally realized I possessed the skills to compete and play college football. I was recruited by about 10 Division I and twice as many Division II schools.

"But when coach Butch Nash came out to see me play and practice, and then talked to me about become a Gopher, it was all but over.

"Strangely enough, when I made my official recruiting visit to campus, coach Nash had retired. But coach Bruce Vandersall picked up the ball and it was really all over. Minnesota was my place and I've never second guessed my choice."

Graffunder started his career at UM as a tight end, but in the spring of 1982 moved to defensive tackle. The latter position is where he opened the 1983 season only to find out he had played the first game with a stress fracture in his foot. Craig was forced to sit out the next four games returning for the Homecoming contest against Wisconsin.

But it was later in the season when the Gophers played at Michigan State that the name Graffunder entered the Gopher offensive statistics. In the first quarter a fellow lineman batted a Spartan pass attempt into the air behind their line of scrimmage.

Low and behold it went right into Graffunder's arms and he headed goalward. Asked if expected to make it all the way to the end zone, Craig says today, "I guess I have to use that old line of Satchel Paige's, the one where he said 'never look back 'cause someone might be gainin' on you.' Actually, the sun was low and I could see my shadow ahead of me. I just kept looking for other shadows to appear, but none did. It was my biggest thrill in college football."

In his career at UM, thrills have been hard to come by. "In 1982 after we won our first three games, and then fell apart to lose eight straight, that was a real comedown," Graffunder says.

"But last year was worse. Team-wise there was no get up and go. We were ALL guilty in our own right of just going through the motions from midyear on. I hope that I never fall into that frame of mind again whether it be in sports or in my future career after college."

But what about this year? What is different? "I could say it's as different as high school and college football," Craig answered. "Right from the first time we (the team) met with coach (Lou) Holtz, we knew he really cared about each individual, about us as people, not just football products.

"I can say the exact same thing about our position coaches. They, too, are nothing but positive about everything, including football. I believe we all appreciate more than anything else their constant stress towards academics."

Griak and Buetow, eat your hearts out. Craig Graffunder has his total act together, and ice and hurdles just don't seem to be included. Knocking down offensive backs appear much more interesting to this local lad.

GOLDEN GOPHERS FACE FIRST ROAD TEST AT NEBRASKA SATURDAY

Coach Lou Holtz takes his show on the road for the first time this season Saturday to lead the University of Minnesota against the University of Nebraska in Lincoln with the kickoff set for 1:30 p.m.

For the Golden Gophers, it's another one of those "Out of the frying pan into the fire situation," and while there may be a better way to describe Minnesota's predicament, Holtz can't think of one.

"We scouted Nebraska in its 42-7 win over Wyoming last weekend," Holtz said, "and it would appear that we will be facing a typical Nebraska team. They had over 500 yards of offense, and we think they simply are an awesome football team."

Like Nebraska, Minnesota will bring a 1-0 record into Saturday afternoon's confrontation after nudging a gallant Rice University contingent 31-24 in the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome last weekend.

"We earned that one," Holtz proclaimed after recording his first win as the Golden Gophers' head coach. "That was the best Rice team I've seen in eight years as coach at Arkansas and here at Minnesota.

The invading Owls had taken a 21-14 lead over the Golden Gophers in that contest, but Holtz' charges roared back with 17 points in the fourth quarter to gain the win and snap a 10-game U of M losing streak.

"I was especially pleased with the way we came back in the fourth quarter," Holtz stressed. "It was a great come-from-behind win for us. Our people played very hard, and it looked like they enjoyed themselves."

Holtz found a lot of things that were encouraging about Minnesota's win, and one was the fact that he was able to use a lot of players....including a "bunch" of his new freshmen.

For example, sophomore letterman Brett Sadek started at quarterback but gave way to yearling Rickey Foggie. Sadek hit nine of 17 passing attempts for 120 yards and one touchdown. He also rushed eight times for five more yards. Foggie, in his collegiate debut, connected on four of six attempts for 62 yards and a touchdown. And he rushed for 12 times for 50 yards. Both signal callers drew high praise for their efforts.

"I was pleased that we were able to get a lot of players into the game," Holtz said. "At this level of football, it is necessary to develop a lot of players. That includes the quarterback position, and my only regret is that we were not able to use Dan Ford, another freshman quarterback, in that game."

Holtz also had good words for his growing corps of runningbacks who saw duty against Rice. Starting fullback Valdez Baylor wound up as the rushing leader with 69 yards in 13 carries. But Minnesota also used Donovan Small (61 in 15), Tony Hunter (60 in 11), Foggie, David Puk (48 in nine), Kevin Wilson (seven in four) Courtney Holmes (five in one) and Sadek.

But all of that was last week. Now it's on to Nebraska to face a Cornhusker team that humiliated Minnesota 84-13 a year ago. "We know we'll be facing a real challenge," Holtz admitted. "It difficult playing in Lincoln. We just have to convince our players we have a chance."

PETER NAJARIAN - LB

Minneapolis, MN---During the summer of 1981, both the U. of Minnesota football program and an outstanding student/athlete from Central High School in Minneapolis went through some kind of dilemma.

It so happened that one Peter Najarian (nah-JERE-ee-un) simply could not make up his mind whether to accept a scholarship offer from the University of Minnesota, or a similar one from the University of California at Berkeley.

Fortunately, for those whose blood runs maroon and gold at least, Peter finally decided to continue his educational and athletic careers here in the mighty upper midwest.

"My father (Dr. John Najarian, chief of surgery at the U. of Minnesota Hospitals) went to California at Berkeley, but his work and home is here," Peter says today. "So I was kind of caught betwixt and between.

"However, I did not receive one ounce of pressure from my parents or other family members in making my choice. But it was easliy the hardest decision I have ever faced. Probably the biggest difficulty was that both schools have simply excellent medical schools, a field I hope to someday enter.

"But as of this time I can happily say I'm totally convinced I made the right decision. The University of Minnesota is simply a great, great place to live and learn. And I'm also close to home and my family.

"Oh sure, maybe our football results haven't been all that great, but there is more to going to school than just football. No, I'm not down in the dumps about our won-loss record, because I now believe we are about to turn that around.

"I feel extremely fortunate to have been here when coach Lou Holtz decided to come to Minnesota. It breathed new life into all of us. We now are beginning to believe in ourselves, and I think that alone can't help but produce positive results on the field.

"In addition, I have actually found it easier to concentrate on my classwork. Just having that positive frame of mind coming from all sides on the practice field last spring and in pre-fall camp this year had made a world of difference.

"I know my attitude has changed and so has that of my teammates. Now we've got to prove to others what this change means. That comes on Saturday afternoons and evenings."

Even though Peter was forced out of Minnesota's last three games in 1983 and missed much of the last spring practice via a knee injury, he is still ranked as the top Gopher defensive player on the squad.

Fortunately even knee surgery has not slowed his eagerness to get to enemy ball carriers. In the last two seasons Peter has led the Gophers in tackles. After being redshirted his freshman season, he totaled 83 tackles in 1982 and 118 last fall before going out late in the Michigan State game.

He carried on in the same fashion last Saturday by leading the Gophers again in defensive hits as Minnesota defeated Rice 31-24 in its season opener. Najarian led all UM tacklers with 10 and in the fourth quarter recovered one fumble and caused another which led to Minnesota's come-from-behind scores.

During his high school days Peter was vice-president of the school choir, a group which received a superior rating in state competition. He also won eight letters in football, basketball and track, and calls playing on teams that won two city grid championships his biggest prep thrill.

His biggest individual reward came in 1982 when he was named the AP Big Ten player of the week in Minnesota's 36-10 win at Purdue.

The future? "Well, if everything falls into place and I can qualify, I would like to follow the surgical work of my father," Peter says. Dr. John is a world renowned leader in the organ transplant field.

One has to say that Peter Najarian has lofty goals, both on and off the field.

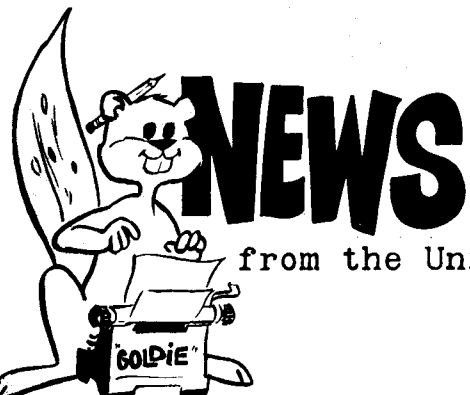

GOLDEN GOPHERS OPEN BIG TEN SLATE AT PURDUE

In the fight game, they might be called preliminaries. In professional football, they sometimes are described as exhibitions. In college circles, however, they normally are referred to as non-conference games.

Whatever the terminology, the situation is clear: The University of Minnesota has concluded that phase of its 1984 football season and is 1-1 after beating Rice University 31-24 in the opener two weeks ago before falling 38-7 at Nebraska this past weekend.

And that brings the Golden Gophers to what first-year Coach Lou Holtz thinks of as the "important" part of the '84 gridiron campaign....the Big Ten Conference season.

Minnesota will make its second straight road trip of the year to kick off the Big Ten wars in West Lafayette, Indiana on Saturday against Purdue University at 1:30 p.m. (EST).

"This is what we have been working for," Coach Holtz has said. And his Golden Gophers apparently hold the same feeling as they prepare for their important first assignment in Big Ten Conference play.

The home-standing Boilermakers probably have the same feeling, however, and they have given every indication in their first two non-conference outings that they have the stuff to give Minnesota all it can handle in the lid-lifter on Saturday.

After a pair of contests, Purdue also stands at 1-1 after upsetting cross-state rival Notre Dame in the opener a couple of weeks ago but then falling to defending National Champion Miami (28-17) last weekend.

The Golden Gophers, therefore, are expected to go into Purdue's stadium knowing they will be facing a severe challenge but in a fairly sound mental condition despite losing that one-sided decision at Nebraska their last time out of the blocks.

"A loss is a loss," Holtz maintains, "and there is no other way to look at what happened to us at Nebraska. But I was really proud of our players. They hit and they hit. They never gave up."

Holtz also paid tribute to the number-one ranked Cornhuskers. "We made some bad mistakes," he admitted, "but we were up against a superb football team. I wish we could have scored on our final possession and ended the game on a positive note. But Nebraska has a very solid defense."

Minnesota, in fact, got its only score of the game on the first play of the fourth quarter when junior fullback Valdez Baylor carried a 63-yard touchdown pass from freshman quarterback Rickey Foggie into the endzone.

"Nebraska's defense really was the difference," Holtz analyzed. "We could not move the ball offensively. You can't beat anybody, especially an excellent team like Nebraska, if you can't move the ball, can't control the ball."

So now Minnesota must get its offensive act back in gear before making the trek to Purdue on Saturday. "We must close ranks," Holtz said. "We just have to regroup for the Big Ten season."

QUOTING LOU HOLTZ. . . .

On the subject of the sellout crowd at Lincoln, Nebraska, last week, Lou Holtz said...."It was a tremendous crowd. They applauded us when we were leaving the field. They support their team and appreciate a good effort. The fact that they all were dressed in red really was impressive. That's what we hope to establish at Minnesota. We need to get our fans to wear our school colors of maroon and gold at the Metrodome and develop a similar kind of pride in the Golden Gophers."

On the subject of the injuries which severely hurt Minnesota at Nebraska, Lou Holtz said...."We had some players who did not make the trip, and we could have used them, and we lost some more during the game. There was a lot of hitting going on, and it was a hard, physical game. But we are making no excuses for our performance because of injuries."

On the subject of the Cornhusker's explosive offense, Lou Holtz said...."Nebraska really hurt us with their misdirection plays. But they have a big and extremely strong offensive line, and they have great quickness. Nebraska is an awesome football team."

On the subject of whether Minnesota really had much of a chance against a team which had posted an 84-13 win one year ago, Lou Holtz said...."If there was a critical play in the game it came in the first quarter when it was 0-0. We had the ball on the Nebraska 27 yard line and we threw an interception which they returned 68 yards. Not only did we fail to score, we lost great field position. I think at that point in the game a touchdown would have given our team a tremendous lift."

On the subject of Minnesota's overall performance against Nebraska, Lou Holtz said...."I didn't think that we really played very well, but maybe we have to give Nebraska credit for that. We were physical and we did play hard, but we made too many mistakes. We made a number of errors in our kicking game, and those are things which we must get corrected."

On the subject of Minnesota's first two opponents (Rice and Nebraska) having such good success with their passing games, Lou Holtz said...."The trouble with our inability to defend well against the pass is that we have faced two good passers who have been given excellent protection. To have a good pass defense, you must have good speed in the defensive secondary and you must have the ability to put pressure on the passer. We must get better in both areas."

On the subject of next Saturday's game at Purdue, Lou Holtz said...."Purdue is a big, strong and physical team. They have excellent offensive chemistry, and they throw the ball well. We have lost 17 straight Big Ten games over a two-year period, and we know that if we hope to break that string we must stop the Purdue passing game."

ANDY HARE - FS

Minneapolis, MN--- How many times have we seen the great high school grid flash not cut the mustard in the college ranks and simply fade out of the sports picture? A lot.

But then there is that other guy. He doesn't see his original dreams fulfilled, so he reaches for a new set of goals and, more often than not, success.

That has been the case for junior Andy Hare. A prep hero who was named high school Player of the Year in Wisconsin as a senior, Hare says today that he came to Minnesota because "I was recruited as a quarterback, my favorite position, while all the other schools wanted me as a defensive back."

Low and behold, greet Minnesota junior free safety, defensive back Andy Hare.

"It's kind of sunny how situations sometimes work out," Hare tells us. "I tried and tried to become Minnesota's starting quarterback, but my passing never even came close to my own standards, much less those of the team.

"So when I was asked to try it at D-back, well, I knew if I wanted to contribute to the team that would be my spot.

"I looked at the move as a compliment. Evidently the coaching staff believed I could help the team. That means they had confidence in my ability as an athlete."

Actually, Hare was named all-state from Appleton West high on both offense and defense (still his top sports thrill), so it was not all that new for him to line up in the secondary.

"Learning to play defensive back is not as hard in mental terms as playing quarterback, but it's twice as hard physically," Hare adds. "It's the only position where you have to learn to backpeddle.

"The it's our responsibility to react to the moves of the receiver even before we know if the play is a run or pass. And we have to be in twice as good shape as anyone else because we probably run several miles in every game."

Asked about the coaching changes he has seen in his time here, Hare said, "Who was here before no longer counts. It's this staff that's important to us.

"Coach John Gutekunst, our defensive coordinator, is in total control. Nothing seems to bother his concentration, unless we make a mistake. He only becomes irritated if we do not correctly handle our individual responsibilities, not do what we are supposed to do.

"And secondary coach Phil Elmassian is easily the most dedicated teacher I have ever been associated with. He works 24 hours a day just to make us better.

"But what really tops our new situation here is coach (Lou) Holtz. His total command for respect impresses me more than anything else. He controls everything. There is no question about the chain of command around here. It's much smoother from top to bottom than in previous years."

A 2.95 student in business, Hare, at this time, is not certain that professional football is in his future. But he is certain that education will play an important role.

"I plan to take advantage of every single opportunity I have been given at the University of Minnesota," he says. "I have considered law school, but one way or another I hope to at least gain a masters degree.

"Once you find out how difficult football really is at this level you realize how tough the pro game is. It is then that know how important your educational opportunities are. Anyone who doesn't take full advantage of that fact is simply missing the boat."

One gets the feeling that Andy Hare will be aboard when his ship leaves the dock.

GOLDEN GOPHERS RETURN HOME TO FACE OHIO STATE SATURDAY

After suffering two straight losses on the road, the University of Minnesota returns to what it hopes will be the "friendly" confines of the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome Saturday to entertain Ohio State in a 7:00 p.m. Big Ten Conference assignment.

The Golden Gophers had opened the 1984 football season by downing Rice University 31-24 in the Metrodome, but then successive setbacks by margins of 38-7 at Nebraska and this past weekend 34-10 at Purdue have stunned Coach Lou Holtz' charges.

"We've just got to regroup," Holtz said last Saturday after his club had suffered its 18th consecutive Big Ten Conference loss. "We've just got to ask ourselves if we played every play at Purdue as hard as we can play. Now we must get ready for Ohio State."

Holtz had said going into the Purdue game that Minnesota would have to stop the Boilermaker's passing game if it hoped to win, and in the process the Golden Gophers would have to control the ball themselves.

Unfortunately, neither happened as evidenced by the fact that Purdue had 146 yards through the air as compared with only 69 for the U of M and ran off 85 offensive plays to only 62 for visiting Minnesota.

An even more startling figure is the defensive statistic compiled by Minnesota's linebackers in the Purdue outing. Peter Najarian, a top candidate for post season honors, was credited with 20 solo tackles and six assists for a total of 26 hits. His partner, Joe Christopherson, had 16 solos and a pair of assists for 18 total tackles. That's 44 hits between them, and the rest of the UM contingent had only 24.

"We just couldn't stop them," Holtz admitted. "Purdue has a fine team, and it played a very physical game against us. Saturday they were a better team than we were. They just ran right at us."

The Golden Gophers trailed only 10-3 at the half against Purdue and seemed to be in contention. Holtz agreed with that observation. "I thought we played hard in the first half. I thought we played well, even though we could not get much going on offense. But our inability to move the ball meant that Purdue was able to control things. We did not have the ball very much in the third quarter, and after they scored their second touchdown, we seemed to let down."

It was that second Boilermaker TD which caused some controversy since it followed what had appeared to be a Minnesota interception by Mark Dusbabek in the endzone. But instead, Minnesota was called for interference and Purdue had the ball on the one.

"A turning point?" Holtz asked. "It sure was. It definitely was the turning point in the game. A very big turning point. In fact we just never seemed to get a break. I can't think of one thing where there was a chance for it to go either way and it went ours."

Now, however, the Gophers must put the Boilermakers out of their minds and concentrate on bouncing back against Ohio State, a powerhouse that whipped Iowa 45-26 last weekend. "It certainly will be a challenge for us," Holtz said. "Our players just have to help pick up each other."

QUOTING LOU HOLTZ. . .

On the subject of a bright spot for his Golden Gophers in their 34-10 loss at Purdue last weekend, Lou Holtz said...."I thought our kicking game was good. Adam Kelly punted well (he averaged 47.7 on six punts), and our coverage was good."

On the subject of the turnover ratio in the Purdue game, Lou Holtz said.... "I was very disappointed in the turnover situation. We had done well in that department against Rice and Nebraska, but against Purdue we threw an interception and lost a fumble, and we did not intercept one of Purdue's 25 passes, and we failed to recover either of Purdue's two fumbles."

On the subject of Purdue controlling the ball for 12:40 of the third period as compared with only 2:20 for Minnesota, Lou Holtz said...."We did not have the ball much in the third quarter. We just could not get anything going offensively. We had kicked off, we covered the kick well and on top of that Purdue had a clipping penalty and had to start on its own 10 yard line. But we just let them drive the ball down the field against us very methodically. We had them third-and-long several times and still gave up the yardage for first downs. We let them control the ball and the clock."

On the subject of Minnesota's injury situation, Lou Holtz said...."We certainly played with adversity in that department. We lost our starting free safety, Andy Hare, in practice on Thursday, and that meant we had to use an inexperienced player in Malcolm Nelson at Purdue. Our secondary had not practiced together, and that had an effect on our performance. We did not suffer any further injuries at Purdue, so our physical situation should be better this week."

On the subject of Minnesota again using three quarterbacks (Brett Sadek, Rickey Foggie and Dan Ford) against Purdue and the possibilities of that practice continuing, Lou Holtz said...."We've used three quarterbacks because we have been searching for the right offensive chemistry. We haven't found it yet, but we hope to do so and come out of it with a set lineup. Against Purdue, I thought Foggie again showed a great ability to move the football, and he knows how to find the endzone. And I also thought Ford did well when he was in there."

On the subject of Ohio State, this week's Golden Gopher opponent, Lou Holtz said...."We could not stop Purdue on the ground, and if you can't stop the opponent's running game you can't expect to win. Ohio State runs the ball extremely well. I thought Nebraska was an excellent football team, but Ohio State might be better. It has a better running back in Keith Byards and it has a better quarterback in Mike Tomczak. I believe that Ohio State is one of the three best teams in the country, and the team that will win the Big Ten. It certainly will be a challenge for us."

GOPHER PLAYER FEATURE - 9/14

Minneapolis, MN---Last Saturday afternoon when Minnesota played Purdue at Lafayette, IN, will remain an important date for many years in the memories of Gopher senior split end Dwayne McMullen, a native of Harrisburg, PA.

With five seconds remaining in the contest, McMullen raced into the the Purdue end zone, turned right towards the flag and gathered in a bullet pass from quarterback Rickey Foggie for Minnesota's lone touchdown of the day.

It evidently wasn't a game winner as the Gophers dropped a 34-10 decision. However, it was a giant catch in the personal career of McMullen.

It marked the 12th time Dwayne had been on the receiving end of a touchdown pass in his career at Minnesota. That means he is tied for the school record for most touchdown passes caught.

Elmer Bailey of St. Paul first set the mark when he played for UM from 1977 through 1979. So the next time McMullen ends up in the end zone with a TD reception, his name will stand alone in the record book.

But that's not the only spot. Dwayne has two more career records in sight and both could be reached in the next few games.

To date he has 78 career receptions which is four short of the school record 82 gathered in by Ken Last from 1964 to 1966. In addition, he is 176 receiving yards short of another school record, that one set by Chester Cooper in 1978-81.

Cooper gained 1,317 career yards while McMullen has already amassed 1,141 yards in his three seasons.

"When this season opened I realistically believed I had a shot at reaching all three career records this season," McMullen said following the Purdue game.

"But at the same time I have not once let thoughts of records get in the way of doing my job. Team goals, team accomplishments are much, much more important to me.

"I have always believed that if you and everyone around does the best job they can, then the records and other items will take care of themselves.

"Actually, my main goals this year did not even include my chance to set some school career records. I have always believed that team and personal goals are a better measure of how an individual contributes.

"I set some of my own before the season started, goals that I believe if they are reached can only enhance what we as a team are trying to do.

"I visualised catching 30 passes, scoring eight touchdowns and gaining 600 yards receiving. If I can reach those marks, then I believe I will have helped our team the best I can. Maybe those were not realistic goals, but they are mine.

"I believe my setting those marks so high is right in line with the teachings I have received from the men who have coached me, starting with the man who recruited me, Charlie Baggett, right up to today under receiver coach Pete Cordelli and, of course, head coach Lou Holtz.

"Each of these men have continually preached the same thing. . .that if you do not set your personal goals high enough, there is no sense setting goals. Oh sure, sometimes you wonder why you set such high marks. They all but seem impossible to reach.

"But when you do reach one, well, then the feeling of total accomplishment makes all the hard workd to get there seem worthwhile. But at the same time if a person just concentrates on reaching his or her owns personal marks, then it is being done at the expense of your teammates.

"Coach Holtz continually focuses on team values, and I believe that's a strong carryover to what each of us will be doing once college days are over."

What McMullen hopes will happen in the future is a career in computer sales and marketing. He got into data processing in high school and it has carried over into his college work.

It he is half as successful in that field as he is catching passes, Dwayne McMullen is going to make some future business staff members just as proud as are his present bosses.

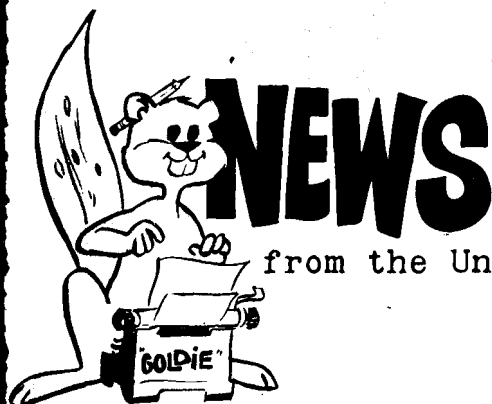

GOLDEN GOPHERS TO HOST INDIANA ON SATURDAY

Minnesota's Golden Gopher football team remains at home on Saturday for its second consecutive Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome appearance when entertaining Indiana University in a 7:00 p.m. Big Ten Conference showdown.

There are a number of unpleasant strings or streaks on the proverbial line in that assignment; and Coach Lou Holtz of the host contingent hopes that Minnesota will be able to snap every one of them.

First of all, the invading Hoosiers have beaten the Golden Gophers three straight years...17-16 at Indiana in 1981, 40-21 here in the Metrodome in 1982 and 38-31 back at Indiana a year ago.

Second, Minnesota, after falling 35-22 to the top-ranked Ohio State University Buckeyes last weekend, now has suffered an unenviable 18 consecutive setbacks in Big Ten Conference play.

Third, and with the dubious distinction of failing to capture and protect the "friendly confines" or home field advantage theory, The Golden Gophers have yet to win a Big Ten Conference game in the Metrodome, a relatively new facility which the Minnesota contingent has occupied since 1982.

The most recent loss, also in Big Ten play, suffered by Holtz' charges in the dome turned out to be another toughie. "Ohio State was big, it was strong, and it did not make critical mistakes," Holtz analyzed after the game, "but even when we were down 21-7 at the half, I thought we could still win it. I told our squad that 21 points was not going to be enough to win that game, and I really believed that."

Holtz was right, of course, but the problem was that unbeaten Ohio State was able to put 14 more points on the board after the intermission, and it was too much for the gallant Minnesota contingent to overcome.

"We played better on offense," Holtz said. "In fact I thought we played well on offense at most times in that game. But games are won with consistent play in all phases of the game. It takes a total team effort on offense, on defense and in the kicking game. That's what we must strive for."

While Holtz was disappointed in the loss, Golden Gopher boosters (a delegation that received a tip-of-the-hat from Holtz for their support in that game) felt Minnesota put up a gallant fight and gained even more respectability.

"We have to give Ohio State credit," Holtz admitted. "That is an excellent football team. But we can walk away from that game with our heads up. Yes, we are disappointed because we played so hard and came so close while still ending up with a loss. But it is not the end of the road."

That road, in the eyes of Minnesota fans is "The road back," continues Saturday night against the Hoosiers. "We need another good week of practice to prepare for Indiana," Holtz stressed. "We just have to encourage each other, to pick each other up. We just have to be ready for them."

QUOTING LOU HOLTZ. . . .

On the subject of Minnesota starting a new quarterback last weekend against The Ohio State University Buckeyes, Lou Holtz said..."We've been searching for the right offensive chemistry. We started freshman Rickey Foggie, and I felt he played very well. I wish that we would have had an opportunity to use Dan Ford (another freshman) more in that game."

G-O-P-H-E-R-S

On the subject of Minnesota's new indoor football facility which was ready for the Golden Gophers to use last week, Lou Holtz said..."The new building is great. Getting in there last week really gave our squad a mental uplift. It helped us have an excellent week of practice."

G-O-P-H-E-R-S

On the subject of Minnesota's gaining more "respectability" with its gutty effort against the highly-touted Buckeyes, Lou Holtz said...."It's a long, uphill struggle, but to make steel you have to go through fire. Despite losing, I still believe that good things can happen to us if we continue to work hard. And I am proud to be associated with this group of coaches and players."

G-O-P-H-E-R-S

On the subject of Minnesota's on-the-field performance against Ohio State, Lou Holtz said..."It is discouraging to lose, but I liked our effort. I have nothing but praise for our people. I would not attempt to criticise anyone after they fought their hearts out like they did. I firmly believe that they practiced and played as hard as they could."

G-O-P-H-E-R-S

On the subject of Minnesota coming back so courageously against Ohio State, Lou Holtz said...."I felt that in order to win that game we would have to move the ball and control the ball. Even when we got behind 21-0, I thought we had a chance to win. We got a touchdown back, and that touchdown of ours at the end of the first half was critical. But the one that hurt was Ohio State's touchdown after the interception. I could not believe that the pass to Kevin Starks was ruled an interception."

G-O-P-H-E-R-S

On the subject of Minnesota's luck....or lack of it...thus far this season, Lou Holtz said...."We have gone through four games and still haven't had a ball bounce our way. Against Ohio State we lose the interception call on the ball that bounced away from Kevin Starks. We miss the interception when the ball bounced off Duane Dutrieuille's hands. I've never seen anything like it. But I am convinced that the ball WILL start bouncing our way."

G-O-P-H-E-R-S

On the subject of something positive coming out of the loss to Ohio State, Lou Holtz said...."The best thing I saw in the Ohio State game, besides our players, was the crowd. I heard there was apathy in Minnesota, but I saw an example of true support. There was an air of electricity, of excitement. It was terrific."

CRAIG PAULSON - DT

Minneapolis, MN---Why would a "Mr. Everything" in the classroom and on the fields and courts for Stevens Point High School in Wisconsin, a captain of three major sport teams, an all-state selection in football, choose to go away to school and not attend his State University?

"There were several reasons that convinced me to accept aid from the University of Minnesota over offers from four other Big Ten schools," defensive tackle Craig Paulson says today.

"The business climate of the Twin Cities had as much to do as anything else with my final decision. Also, at the time (1980) I believed I was joining a solid coaching staff under Joe Salem, and several friends I had on the Gopher varsity helped sell me, too. I didn't foresee at that time, nor did anyone else, what would befall the football program at Minnesota after our first three wins in 1982.

"But, hey, that's all part of going to college in my book. You quickly begin to learn that nothing is certain. Both in and outside the classroom you begin to realize the ups and downs are a part of the whole scene."

According to Paulson, this fifth year marketing, sales and management senior has just about seen it all.

"Yeah, I guess you could say that," Paulson continued. "However, like some of my teammates have already said, I also believe I have become a wiser and stronger man by experiencing the highs and lows.

"By highs I mean being involved in the winning traditions at Minnesota like the 35-31 victory over Ohio State in 1981 and our last Big Ten victory, the 36-10 decision at Purdue in 1982, plus qualifying this year as a Williams Scholar by seeing my cumulative grade point average reach 2.95. These things nobody can ever erase from my memory.

"But then there was the slide that started in '82 and continued right through last year. The 1983 season made me feel about as low as anyone could get. But the big point about that experience now is knowing I made it through the bad times and am now a part of something exciting, something new. Hey, I consider myself a survivor!"

"I have to credit the values given me by my parents and the original commitment I made to the University of Minnesota as the main things that carried me through the rough times. I've been knocked down plenty.

"But I have also been able to fight my way back from the low points because of what I just stated and from what playing in competitive athletics has taught me. You just don't lay there and let others walk all over you. You pick yourself up and get back at it.

"You know, what the other University students and our fans see is the pageantry and showtime of the games on Saturdays. What they don't see is the hours and hours of practice, film sessions, meetings and, oh yes, those numerous visits to the training room.

"But I'm not complaining. Just stating a fact. We have to contend with all those hours because this is the route we as varsity athletes have chosen. It's just that it sometimes makes it a bit hard to compete in the classroom when there is often so many demands made on our time.

"It actually takes me about until Tuesday to fully recover mentally as well as physically from Saturday's game. It used to take longer. The big difference now is Sunday. Sunday used to last five or six hours in the football building. Now we come in about 3 p.m., do a little light lifting to loosen up and visit the trainer if necessary. And that's it."

Often people look at scholarship athletes as individuals on easy street. If these words from a man in the trenches, a defensive lineman, doesn't dispell those thoughts then nobody is paying attention. Craig Paulson, like his Gopher teammates, has paid his dues. . .and is paying attention, too.

Minneapolis, MN---University of Minnesota hockey, like many other major schools, get's an early jump on the 1984-85 season by playing an exhibition game at home Friday (Oct. 5) against Lake Superior State College (LSSC) in Williams Arena. Game time is 7:35 p.m. CDT.

These same teams play again at 7:30 p.m. Saturday in Eveleth for the Annual Hall of Fame Game. This game featuring two college hockey standouts is held each year in connection with the U.S. Hockey Hall of Fame induction ceremonies.

TICKET INFORMATION -- Friday's exhibition game vs. LSSC IS NOT a part of the regular Gopher season ticket program. TICKETS FOR THIS GAME ONLY COST \$4 to the public and \$2 to U. of M. students with a paid fall fee statement. All seats for this contest only are general admission. There are no reserved seats.

Both season and single game tickets for the 1984-85 Gopher home hockey season are now on sale at Bierman Building. However, because of a heavy demand, tickets for the home series vs. Wisconsin and North Dakota at this time are being sold only to Minnesota residents with a limit of four (4) per individual purchase. Call 612-373-3181 for ticket information.

Head coach Brad Buetow is entering his sixth year as boss of the Gopher ice program. His cumulative record stands at 140-62-5 and includes two Western Collegiate Hockey Association (WCHA) championships plus two trips to the NCAA Final Four national tournament.

The biggest problem facing Buetow and his staff this season is getting the Gopher varsity ready to play a game.

"Our first official practice day is today, October 1, and we play our first game this Friday," Buetow says. "That's simply not realistic. We thought plans had been made allowing us to begin earlier, but nothing worked out.

"Our players have been skating on their own for about a week and a half since school started. But this does not allow us to install our systems and concepts. About all that has been accomplished is conditioning.

"But I can say our squad seems to be coming along and rounding into shape. The attitude is excellent and our men are eager to start playing.

"We do have an intrasquad game tonight at Farmington, but I don't really know how much that will do for us as nobody knows who is skating with who or who is on the power play or killing penalties. I expect the game to be ragged.

"We will probably be without three players for the first couple of weeks, too. Senior wing Tom Rothstein (Grand Rapids) is out with a broken thumb while sophomore Corey Millen (Cloquet), who we welcome back from the U.S. Olympic Team, is slowed by a sore back and freshman Paul Broten (Roseau) has a separated shoulder. We hope they return soon as we open the WCHA against Denver in just one week (Oct. 12-13) at home.

"I do believe one large problem has been solved. Originally we were concerned about entering the season with only junior goalie Frank Pietrangelo (peter-AN-ge-lo) ready to play. However, last summer we found another goalie, John Blue from San Jose, CA, in a summer camp and his performance the last week has already made us feel more secure.

"With Frank's experience the last two years and Blue's aggressiveness, we should be in top shape when it comes to goal tending.

"We have a lot of men returning from last year's team (27-11-2) which turned in what I believe to have been an excellent record considering all the injuries we suffered.

"But I'm happy to report that two of the men we lost, centers Rick Erdall (Mpls. Washburn) and Steve Orth (St. Cloud Tech), appear to have fully recovered from knee surgery and will be skating at full strength from the start."

ALUMNI BASEBALLERS PLAY SAT.

Minneapolis, MN---Some great names from the Gopher baseball past will oil up creaking arms and swings Saturday (Oct. 6) when the first U. of Minnesota Alumni Baseball game is set for 12 noon at Dick Siebert Field.

"Our plan for the game is to have one team made up of recent players, and have the other team represent the 'Old Timers'", Gopher head coach John Anderson says. "We are not certain at this time, but we have been told there is a chance three active American League players may return.

"If so, then David Winfield and pitchers Steve Comer and Jerr Ujdur will be with us Saturday.

"Overall the response has been excellent. We expect between 30 and 40 former Gopher players to participate."

Some of the more recent Gopher stars who will perform include Tom and Tim Steinbach, Gary Olson, Ronn VanKrevelen, Gary Jost, Steve Sagedahl, Bill Piwnica and Jim Jetland.

Several "Old Timer" names were once Minnesota household words, too. Included on the latter team will be Bobby Bolf, Bill Davis, Dan Forsythe, Dan McEachran, Jerry Wickman, Jerry Cawley, Bruce Ericson, Jerry Chapman, and former Gopher head coach George Thomas. 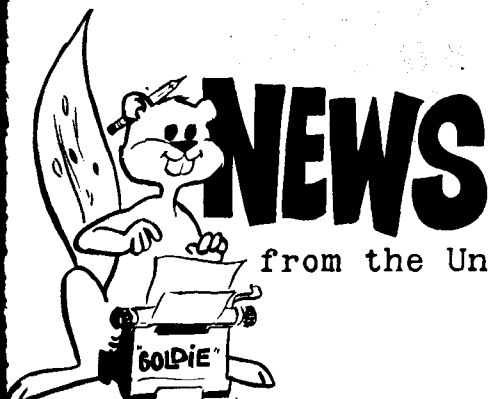

GOLDEN GOPHERS TO INVADE WISCONSIN AFTER SNAPPING STREAK

With the monkey finally off their backs, Minnesota's Golden Gophers head for Wisconsin Saturday to take on the Badgers in an 11:00 a.m. Big Ten Conference football assignment.

Coach Lou Holtz' contingent will risk an overall record of 2-3 and a Big Ten standard of 1-2 in that contest after downing Indiana 33-24 at the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome this past weekend.

The Golden Gophers had lost 19 straight Big Ten outings before that triumph over the Hoosiers, and they had never won a conference game in the Metrodome. It was a spirit-lifting victory for Minnesota.

"There will be no more talk about losing streaks at Minnesota," Holtz proclaimed after last weekend's decision. "It's over. Now we have to get ready for Wisconsin over there. We have some things to correct, but we just have to keep getting better."

Despite his reference to getting things corrected, Minnesota's effort against Indiana appeared to be solid, and it was another step of improvement in the Golden Gophers' climb back to respectability.

"We had some costly penalties that we can't be happy about," Holtz admitted, "but I was pleased with the fact that we did not turn the ball over very often." (Minnesota did not lose a fumble and threw only one interception).

Holtz told his players, however, that they should look ahead to Wisconsin without worrying about those mistakes. "We played about as well as we can play for nearly 50 minutes of the Indiana game," he said. "Except for the first eight minutes of the opening quarter and the last few minutes of the fourth quarter, we played pretty well."

During the last couple of weeks, Holtz has stressed the fact that Minnesota has, at times, played well on offense. He's also maintained that it has done some things well defensively. And he has, for the most part, had praise for the Golden Gopher kicking game. His concern has been that Minnesota had not put all of those things together.

"Saturday night we played a complete game," he said. "We played well offensively, we played well defensively and we played well in the kicking game. Except for the slow start and our becoming a little disorganized at the end, it was a good effort on our part."

All was not all golden in the win, however, as another injury has depleted Minnesota's ranks. "We lost defensive tackle Craig Paulson for the season with knee surgery," Holtz pointed out. "We looked forward to having Craig Graffunder, Steve Thompson and Paulson together, but injuries have kept one or more of those people out of the lineup through the first part of the season. Now getting those people together won't be possible, and Paulson's loss a costly one. But somebody will just have to pick it up for us."

That re-built Minnesota defense will have its hands full again Saturday when taking on the Badgers in a Big Ten television game of the week affair. Wisconsin, despite losing to Illinois last weekend, is 3-2 on the season.... and it has beaten Minnesota six straight times. It's another streak the Golden Gophers would like to end.

QUOTING LOU HOLTZ. . . .

On the subject of Tony Hunter's performance against Indiana last weekend, Lou Holtz said...."Tony is a guy that I have believed in for a long time. Now he showed everybody. His three touchdowns, his 116 yards rushing and 67 yards receiving made it an awesome effort."

G-O-P-H-E-R-S

On the subject of Minnesota's kicking game, Lou Holtz said...."Our kicking game has been excellent. Not only has Adam Kelly done a fine job, we have, for the most part, covered well. And Saturday night against Indiana our return game was very good."

On the subject of Minnesota ending its 19-game Big Ten Conference losing streak, Lou Holtz said...."That's over. It's off our backs. And we know that very often the end of a losing streak is the beginning of a winning streak. Minnesota is on its way back."

On the subject of what the win over Indiana means to the Golden Gophers, Lou Holtz said...."Most of the players on this squad have not been responsible for or even involved in a losing streak that goes back three years. But there will be no more talk about losing streaks at Minnesota. It has been a long, uphill struggle for this team, and I'm especially happy for the players. We can be proud of ourselves."

On the subject of the improvement of the Minnesota offense, and the finding of the right chemistry offensively, Lou Holtz said...."Tony Hunter and Rickey Foggie and Dwayne McMullen are beginning to develop some real offensive threats for us that will cause trouble for our opponents in the future. We now feel that we will be able to do some exciting things offensively."

On the subject of the crowd at the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome for the game against Indiana, Lou Holtz said...."The atmosphere in the Metrodome for the game was exciting. The enthusiasm those fans generated was tremendous. The band, the people...they were outstanding. I can't wait to see a full house, and I really want to thank those people that showed up. It really helps our team."

On the subject of the Big Ten Conference race, Lou Holtz said...."When is the last time anyone can remember Michigan and Ohio State losing on the same day that Minnesota won? There are a lot of Big Ten teams that are still in this year's race. Purdue is in front, and it is a solid football team, but like a lot of people, they have a very tough road ahead of them."

On the subject of things "going against" the Golden Gophers, Lou Holtz said...."It seems like everything that has a chance to go one way or the other goes against us. I won't criticize the officials because they won't win or lose a game for us, but I have never seen a game like ours against Indiana where he had so many penalties. If we hope to win at Wisconsin or anywhere else we must eliminate those mistakes."

Minneapolis, MN---Consider these career totals: 212 rushes, 1,173 net yards, 5.5 average, 31 passes caught for 401 yards, 12.9 average, 8 touchdowns. Not even a microscope could give you negative results from those figures.

But for U. of Minnesota senior tailback Tony Hunter, it has been an uphill battle since the first game he played as a freshman in 1981. Incredible things were predicted for Hunter, but to the unhappiness of countless UM fans, no matter what his contributions have amounted to, he has never totally lived up to expectations. Expectations of others, that is.

Hunter has been the unfortunate victim of one injury following another. Enough injuries to almost qualify him for a special study by the AMA. Hamstring pulls, shoulder separations, torn ankle tendons, charley horses, deep bone bruises, sprains, strains and other hurts that may have permanently sidelined a lesser talent have continually nagged his progress. But never has he been stopped from a lack of effort.

As Tony tells it this season, "For three years I have at times taken remarks about my not being able to play personally. It has really been frustrating. But I have always been taught by my Mother to control the things I can control. Injuries I cannot control.

"Football is a contact sport and all my injuries, except the hamstring pulls, have come from contact. Nobody can ever say I shied away from contact.

"However, my mental preparations for football each year may not have been in the right direction. In the past I always considered the summer months time for total vacation, time to rest up from football, from school, from all of it.

"And then I would try and cram in a conditioning program at the last minute before reporting to fall camp. It was, I finally found out, not the right way for an athlete to prepare himself.

"But coach (Lou) Holtz sat me down last winter and didn't tell me the things I wanted to hear. But he did tell me what I had to do if I wanted to succeed. My Mother always told me to listen to what someone had to say, good or bad. It wasn't what I wanted to hear, but what he said was good for Tony Hunter.

"Not only did coach Holtz wake me up to my academic responsibilities, but at the same time showed me how to prepare myself physically AND mentally during the off season. Also, my backfield coach, Jim Strong, is another positive influence. It was coach Holtz who indentified the problems, and coach Strong who helped put the plans in motion to correct the problems.

"It seemed I spent almost every minute of last summer flexing, stretching, twisting, turning, sprinting, running. All I can say now is that it feels great and all the parts are working."

And work they did last Saturday when Hunter had one of his most productive games ever. He rushed for 116 yards scoring twice on runs of 7 and 15 yards, and turned a short shovel pass into a 67-yard TD in the 33-24 win over Indiana.

However, we are quick to forget he has had even bigger days. In 1982 Hunter carried the ball 26 times to gain 131 yards against Michigan State. That same year he caught five passes for 85 yards against Purdue following a game where he gained 124 yards rushing on just seven carries in a win over Ohio University.

But from his very first game when he picked up 66 yards on 7 carries against Purdue as a freshman, fans expected more and more and more every game. And because they didn't get what they wanted, there have been grumbings.

But when one reflects on his career totals listed at the top, and then realizes the physical difficulties Hunter has come through, the picture suddenly seems less harsh.

Tony Hunter worked at it. He is in the best physical shape of his career. He has found the way to excell. It just took him longer than most fans wanted to wait. But to his way of thinking, the biggest of all is just ahead. "I plan to graduate on time next spring," says the fleet runningback.

IOWA UP NEXT FOR THE DYNAMIC DUO

Senior co-captains Dave Morrison (Lakeville) and John Kromer's (Hudson, WI) 1-2 finishes may become something of a habit around the Big Ten. Certainly, their chances of repeating last week's 1-2 finish at Purdue are good, as Iowa comes to Minnesota for an 8K, Saturday, October 13.

Morrison and Kromer, with times of 24:37.8 and 24:58, were the top two finishers at the Purdue Invitational, won by the host school with the Gophers finishing second. Morrison has been the top Gopher finisher every meet this year, with Kromer joining him as the second Gopher the past two weeks.

Iowa, last year's tenth place team in the Big Ten, comes in looking for revenge for last year's 20-43 loss to the Gophers. Kromer finished second in that meet, Morrison was out the lineup following surgery.

Gophers not competing against Iowa will run in the GBS-Gopher Classic that same day. About 200 people are expected for the Classic, which includes a 3K, 5K and 8K. Race times are 10:00, 11:00, and 11:30 a.m.

Minneapolis, MN---So much for pre-season. Now to the real thing.

With only two weeks of official practice and two non-conference games in hand, the Minnesota hockey Gophers open the 1984-85 Western Collegiate Hockey Association (WCHA) chase Friday and Saturday at home against the University of Denver Pioneers. Both games begin at 7:35 p.m. CDT.

Coach Brad Buetow's sixth Gopher edition allowed just one enemy goal last weekend in defeating Lake Superior State College twice. The Gophers struggled to a 2-0 exhibition win Friday at home, and then took the annual Hall of Fame Game in Eveleth, MN, 6-1 Saturday. Thus, Minnesota carries an official 1-0 record into the Denver series.

"We played much better Saturday," Buetow said Sunday. "We moved the puck a lot better. Our special teams were far from productive, but overall we showed more continuity.

"I have to compliment our men on their physical conditioning. Captain Mike Guentzel (Marble) worked the team out hard in captain's practices for two weeks and our conditioning really showed in the third period Saturday at Eveleth.

"Although it's way too early to make any predictions, I can say our expected quickness proved effective against Lake Superior, and I guess I can't fault our goal tending, either."

"Junior Frank Pietrangelo (Port Robinson, ONT), sophomore Mike Sauer (Bemidji) and freshman John Blue (San Jose, CA) allowed but one goal between them in six periods. Of course, the skaters don't really have their shooting eyes yet, but we are encouraged with their overall play. We will start Pietrangelo Friday and probably Blue on Saturday against Denver."

Denver played a single exhibition game Sunday evening against the U. of North Dakota in Bismark. Although UND won 7-5, the Pioneers showed excellent quickness up front and will pose a solid threat to the Gophers.

The Pioneers return their top three scorers from last season in John McMillan, Dwight Mathiasen and Ian Ramsay, plus their two best defensemen, Grant Dion and Jim Smith.

The biggest DU questionmark appears to be in goal where veteran Pat Tierney has departed. But the Pioneers return two reserves in Jim Dalrymple and Chris Olson and have an outstanding freshman recruit in Chris Gillies. So that problem may have solved itself.

Minnesota took both ends of the series against Denver here last season, but split the two games played in the Mile High City.

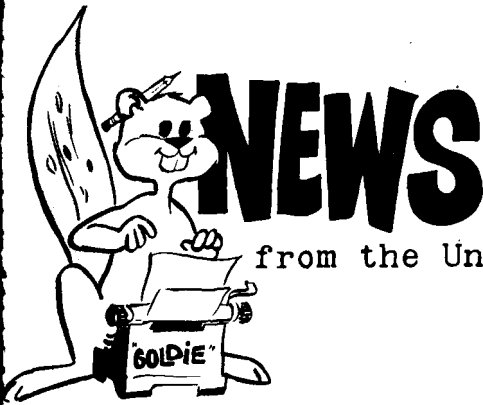

MINNESOTA TO HOST NORTHWESTERN IN '84 HOMECOMING GAME SATURDAY

Minnesota's Gophers, more Golden than they've been in a lot of years, return to the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome Saturday to host Northwestern at 7:10 p.m. in a Big Ten Conference shootout.

That clash with the Wildcats will mark Minnesota's 1984 Homecoming assignment, and Coach Lou Holtz' rejuvenated contingent will be hoping to chalk up its third consecutive triumph.

The Golden Gophers shocked the football world last weekend when upsetting the University of Wisconsin, an 18-point favorite, 17-14 in Madison. In the process, Minnesota upped its season record to 3-3 and its Big Ten log to 2-2.

There were several points of significance in that win. First of all, it was the first time since 1982 that Minnesota had won two games in a row. Second, it was the first time Minnesota had downed the Badgers since 1977. And finally, it was the first time since 1972 that the Golden Gophers had won in Madison.

"It was a tremendous win for us," Coach Holtz emphasized after the game. "It takes on special meaning for us because the win came over a good football team. I felt Wisconsin played very well, and I have great respect for that team. It just makes our winning all the more significant."

Rickey Foggie, Minnesota's freshman quarterback who made his third start as a collegian, was the difference. He completed two of five passes for 19 yards.... but more impressively rushed 24 times for 153 yards and both of Minnesota's touchdowns.

Chip Lohmiller provided the margin of victory with a 26 yard field goal midway through the final stanza, and the Golden Gopher defense also drew praise for its gutty efforts. In the second half, Wisconsin crossed the 50 yard line only once, and on that occasion was stopped by a superb Minnesota goal-line-stand at the three.

Joe Christopherson and Peter Najarian were excellent at linebacker with 12 and 10 tackles respectively (and Najarian had the first interception of his U of M career), but it was Minnesota's patchwork defensive line....with people like Pat Hart, Doug Mueller, Gary Hadd, Joe Stepanek, Steve Thompson, Mark DeSimone and Rich Roth all playing a part. And even offensive linemen Ray Hitchcock, Mychal Pryor and Norries Wilson who were borrowed by the Minnesota defense for its goal line heroics.

"It was a players' victory," Holtz proclaimed, "and I am so very pleased for them. They overcame a great deal of adversity, and we've lost a lot of players that we were counting on. But others picked things up for us, and they helped out each other. I am very proud of what they have done."

As nice as that win was for the Golden Gophers to savor, thoughts this week have to be on the invading Wildcats who have hammered Minnesota two straight years. The Cats fell 31-0 at Michigan last week, and they will bring 1-6 and 1-4 records into the Metrodome.

"Now we've got to keep going," Holtz told his players. "We're even at 3-3, and they can't call us losers. We just have to be ready for Northwestern. We have to keep winning."

QUOTING COACH LOU HOLTZ.....

On the subject of Minnesota's stunning win at Wisconsin last weekend, Lou Holtz said...."It was a great win for us because it came over a class program, a fine team, it was on television and it was at their place."

On the subject of Minnesota's game plan against Wisconsin, Lou Holtz said.... "We knew that we would have to maintain ball control and in the process keep our defense off the field as much as possible if we hoped to win. Our intention was to work for field position, to try to protect the field as much as we could. We achieved those things in the second half, and it made the difference."

On the subject of the game against Wisconsin being nearly an error-free affair, Lou Holtz said...."You have to give Wisconsin credit for going two weeks without a penalty. We were pleased with the fact that we played the entire game without many mistakes. We had only two penalties for 10 yards, and we did not fumble. In fact we've gone through our first six games and lost only one fumble. We cover six basic areas of concern in our practice, and it has paid off."

On the subject of Minnesota winning two straight Big Ten Conference games, Lou Holtz said...."My belief in this football team has been sincere. Against Wisconsin, they proved me right. I believe our athletes are underrated. We maintain that if we can develop players fundamentally, we can give them a chance. Our players have made up their minds that they want to win, and they have been willing to pay the price. If they continue to do so, I feel good things can happen."

On the subject of using Norries Wilson, a 310-pound offensive lineman, during Minnesota's courageous goal-line stand, Lou Holtz said...."Norries is an amazing young man. Last spring he weighed about 340 pounds, and he was not paying attention to his academic life. We did not feel he could help us in that situation. Now he is a totally different person. He's a fine athlete with a good attitude who has a chance to become an excellent lineman."

On the subject of the emergence of Rickey Foggie as a standout Big Ten quarterback, Lou Holtz said...."It is necessary to watch a player every day to really appreciate the progress that is made. Rickey is a great athlete, but he also is a fine leader. He is an exceptional person with outstanding character. He has the instinct and ability to be an exceptional runner, and while he is a good passer, he lacks consistency in his passing game. It will all come together for him, and he will develop into a complete and outstanding quarterback."

GOPHER PLAYER PROFILE -- 10/15/84

GLEN CIESLEWICZ - LB

Minneapolis, MN---"For the first time since I came to Minnesota, five long years, I can now go home to Green Bay and not be taunted by Wisconsin fans that we lost again to the Badgers."

So says senior University of Minnesota linebacker Glen Cieslewicz (siz-LEV-ich) following the shocking 17-14 upset win at Wisconsin Saturday.

"For the last four years I've had to go home and listen to my friends tease me about losing to Wisconsin," Cieslewicz said Sunday. "No more. Now they can show the Gopher program some respect."

"I may have been involved in some bigger, more important wins in the past, but nothing means more to my teammates and myself right now than this victory. We have been browbeaten by everyone. And there were those insulting letters that were reported to have been written by Wisconsin players, too, after we lost so badly last season."

"Even though I didn't play in 1983, I still felt a part of last year's team. So this win is right now the sweetest of them all."

The reason for Glen's absence last year was purely medical. Following a sensational freshman year in 1980 when a special position (X-Back) was created for him, and another outstanding year in 1981, Cieslewicz almost saw his football career come to an end in 1982. But let Glen tell it.

"We were playing in the rain and losing at Northwestern when I got caught in a pile up at the line of scrimmage and someone came down on my leg when I had it planted," he says. "That was it. My knee was all but torn apart."

"Surgery followed and the doctors were not sure I would ever play football again."

It even got so bad for Glen that following winter that he couldn't get around to classes on crutches. So in desperation he dropped out of school and went home to Green Bay.

"I guess I was really feeling sorry for myself at the time," Glen relates today. "But fortunately some of my close friends really got on me and I started a rehabilitation program to rebuild my knee, and the rest of me, too."

"I really worked hard and things finally started to come around. It was then I asked if I could come back to school. I was way behind, but thanks to some good leadership I was able to get caught up with my classwork."

"The rest started with spring practice this year and has continued on this fall. I'm a very, very lucky guy to have had so many people care about me as a person, not just as a football player. I will get my degree now, and I really love playing football once again. Particularly last Saturday."

He'll love it even more come Christmas vacation when Cieslewicz goes home for vacation.

ICERS IN 1ST, TRAVEL EAST

Minneapolis, MN--Minnesota's hockey Gophers, fresh off gaining three points in a home series vs. Denver, this week gains their first outing against a Hockey East Association team under the new interlocking schedule agreement between that group and the WCHA.

Minnesota travels to Beantown for games Friday and Saturday against Boston University. The Terriers last weekend lived up to pre-season expectations by downing Wisconsin twice in Madison, 6-5 and 4-2.

Boston U., like Minnesota, was named the top team in its area in polls conducted prior to the season. The Gophers were picked to rule the WCHA by member coaches in its own Association.

The Gophers got off on the right foot against Denver bouncing back from a 4-4 overtime tie Friday to win going away 9-4 Saturday.

Senior center Rick Erdall, who missed almost all of last season following knee surgery, was the UM hero Friday scoring twice in the third period bringing the Gophers from one-goal deficits each time.

Minnesota had taken a 2-0 lead after the first period on goals by Pat Micheletti and Todd Okerlund. But the Pioneers tied matters in the second, and took leads of 3-2 and 4-3 in the final period. Erdall hit power play goals at 8:50 and 15:43 to bring UM back each time.

Junior goalie Frank Pietrangelo kept UM in the game as the teams battled through a scoreless overtime period. The Gophers outshot Denver 6-3 in the extra session and had several clear scoring chances, but DU goalie Tom Allen was equally stingy and each team gained one point in the standings.

Saturday was a different story as UM raced to a 4-1 first period lead and was never challenged. Micheletti and sophomore Todd Okerlund scored first period goals for UM, and later added a second marker each. Minnesota led 7-2 after two periods and coasted to its first WCHA win of the season.

Freshman goalie John Blue played the first 46 minutes Saturday and acquitted himself extremely well allowing just two goals. But he was banished from the game on a major penalty and Pietrangelo finished up. Blue will sit out Friday's game at Boston University under WCHA disqualification rules.

For the weekend Micheletti and Erdall each notched five points to lead the Gophers. Micheletti had three goals and two assists while Erdall's scores were exactly opposite, two goals and three assists. Okerlund also scored three goals for UM while Corey Millen and captain Mike Guentzel each had a goal and two assists for three points.

In the other pure WCHA series, defending WCHA champion Minnesota-Duluth split its two games at Colorado College.

"I was very pleased to see us come back so strong Saturday after skating from behind to gain the tie with Denver Friday," Gopher head coach Brad Buetow said Monday. "Denver is really improved this year and will be a factor in the league race.

"I believe quickness was our biggest advantage and it really showed Saturday. Our men also played much better position hockey, particularly on defense. Now comes the problem of choosing our first travel squad. We played a lot of people over the weekend.

"Going to Boston University is a real challenge. They are tops in the East and will come at us with all guns firing. It should be a great series."

GOLDEN GOPHER CAGERS OPEN DRILLS

Jim Dutcher tipped-off his 10th year as head basketball coach at the University of Minnesota this week by opening practice for the 1984-85 Golden Gopher cagers with one eye already on the opener November 24 against UW Green Bay.

Minnesota will build towards that initial outing with hopes of improving on its 1983-84 record of 15-13, its' Big Ten record of 6-12 and its seventh place finish in the conference standings.

It will be a difficult assignment for Dutcher who must replace his two starting forwards, Jim Petersen and Roland Brooks, both of whom have graduated. Petersen was the Golden Gophers' third-leading scorer a year ago and their top rebounder. Brooks wound up as Minnesota's fourth leading scorer and third leading rebounder. Those will be tough statistics to replace for the current U of M contingent.

On the credit side of the ledger, Dutcher does have his top scorer from a year ago on hand, and that's the point at which he's going to start building the 1984-85 Minnesota contingent.

Tommy Davis, a year ago, finished with 449 points to pace the Golden Gophers in that department. In three years as a U of M starting guard, Davis has notched 946 points, and he looms as a top candidate for post season honors. He's 6-4 and Minnesota's only senior.

Returning again to team with Davis in the backcourt is Marc Wilson, a 6-1 junior who finished with an 11.3 average as Minnesota second leading scorer last season. And he led Minnesota with 100 assists and 40 steals.

Also returning from Minnesota's 1984-85 starting lineup is John Shasky, 7-0 junior center. A year ago Shasky averaged 6.6 points and 5.5 rebounds a game, and Dutcher hopes for continued improvement at that position.

Two additional "returnees" could figure in Minnesota's plans. One is Paul Van Den Einde, a 7-0 sophomore center, who was used on a limited basis in a relief role a year ago. The other is David Holmgren, a 7-0 red-shirt freshman who could be used at either center or forward.

Dutcher looks for additional help from two other lettermen, 6-7 Kevin Smith and 6-4 Gerald Jackson. Smith played extensively at forward for Minnesota a year ago and will bid for a starting role this time around. Jackson was used in a backup role at guard in '83-'84, and he is expected to be an even more solid Big Ten performer this season.

Four newcomers will have to be ready to contribute as well if Minnesota is to be a winner in 1984-85. And that doesn't fit with Dutcher's "The best time to play freshmen is when they are sophomores" theory.

That delegation of yearlings includes Todd Alexander, a 5-11 guard; Tim Hanson, a 6-5 forward-guard; Mitchell Lee, a 6-9 forward; and George Williams, another 6-9 forward.

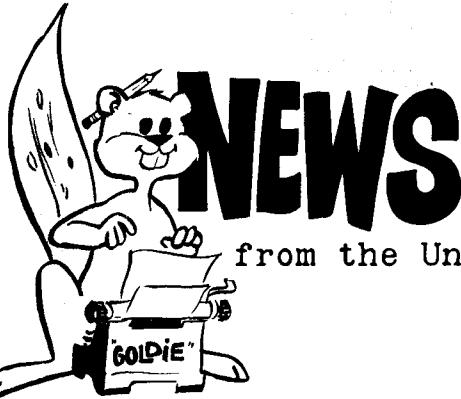

MINNESOTA TO ENTERTAIN MICHIGAN STATE SATURDAY

While still nursing hopes for finishing over the .500 mark, Minnesota's Golden Gophers began preparing to host Michigan State University Saturday at 7:10 p.m. in the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome.

Coach Lou Holtz' disappointed squad will take a 3-4 overall record and a 2-3 Big Ten standard (good for a sixth-place tie with Michigan State and Wisconsin) into Saturday night's contest after falling 31-28 to Northwestern in the 1984 Homecoming game at the Metrodome last weekend.

"I've been involved in some tough losses in my life," Coach Holtz admitted after the Northwestern outing had ended, "but there have been none tougher than this one. To come from as far back as we did, to come that close and still lose is a bitter pill to swallow."

There were some bright spots, however, for Minnesota even in defeat. For example, Dwayne McMullen set two more Golden Gopher records. He established a new career total yards receiving mark of 1,490 to snap Chester Cooper's (1978-81) standard of 1,317 and his 186 yards against the Wildcats erased another Cooper record of 182 set against Ohio State in 1981. McMullen also owns the UM career touchdown record of 15 and the career reception record of 88.

Another record shattered against Northwestern was Paul Giel's (current U of M athletic director) single game punting average mark of 50.2 established against Iowa in 1952. Adam Kelly, against the Cats, booted seven times for an average of 53.6.

Praise for an outstanding effort also went to David Puk, junior fullback, who saw his most extensive service of the season and finished with 85 yards in seven carries. He also accounted for two Minnesota touchdowns on runs of 25 and 27 yards.

But none of those heroics will help the Golden Gophers this week when they entertain Michigan State, a team now holding records identical to those of Minnesota....3-4 on the year and 2-3 in the Big Ten....after falling 23-20 to Ohio State last weekend.

Getting Minnesota to bounce back against the invading Spartans will be a difficult assignment for Coach Holtz who had seen his club notch successive wins over Indiana (33-24) and Wisconsin (17-14) before faltering against the Wildcats.

Asked if the loss to Northwestern, the third straight for a Minnesota grid team, was a step back after those steps forward against Indiana and Wisconsin, Holtz admitted, "I can't tell where we are. I just know that every week is tough, and it is very tough to come back every week."

Holtz maintained, however, that all was not lost. "Our loss to Northwestern really hurts," he said, "but it is not the end of the world. The sun will come up tomorrow. We just have to hope that we learned from our mistakes, that we learned from the loss. We can never give up. We just have to pick up the pieces and go from here."

The "here" is Michigan State University, a team which owns a 13-11-0 edge over Minnesota in a series which got its start in 1950. And the invading Spartans have won seven straight from the Golden Gophers including 34-10 in East Lansing a year ago.

QUOTING LOU HOLTZ. . . .

On the subject of Minnesota's heartbreaking 31-28 loss to Northwestern University in the 1984 Homecoming game last weekend, Lou Holtz said...."We did not play well fundamentally, and I believe that is the reason for our loss. We had too many breakdowns and we just made too many mistakes."

G-O-P-H-E-R-S

On the subject of pinpointing a play or a player that made the difference in the outcome, Lou Holtz said...."We win as a team and we lose as a team. I am sure that nearly every player on our squad is blaming himself for the loss. But it doesn't work that way. We do it together. And we can go back through the game and say that if this had happened or that had happened the results would have been different. But we can't isolate one play and say that made the difference."

G-O-P-H-E-R-S

On the subject of how close Minnesota came to winning its third straight Big Ten Conference assignment, Lou Holtz said...."The game really went back and forth, and we really came close to pulling it out. I felt that we might still have two more chances at the end, and that we could make something happen."

G-O-P-H-E-R-S

On the subject of Minnesota's overall performance against Northwestern, Lou Holtz said...."We made too many mistakes which indicates that we did not play well fundamentally. We had too many turnovers, we had too many missed assignments both offensively and defensively. I felt that we were very flat in the first half, but that we came back and competed well in the second half. And we had the opportunities to win, we just could not quite do it."

G-O-P-H-E-R-S

On the subject of Northwestern (as have so many opponents this season) converting long third-down situations, Lou Holtz said...."It was a case of our having breakdowns at critical times. But I have never seen anyone convert on third and eight and third and 10 as much as Northwestern."

G-O-P-H-E-R-S

On the subject of Minnesota's disappointing loss turning out to be a devastating situation for the 1984 Golden Gophers, Lou Holtz said...."Our season is not over. We made mistakes against Northwestern and we just have to learn from them. We don't need to depend on the great plays to win, but we do have to learn how to eliminate the bad plays. If we do that, we will be back."

G-O-P-H-E-R-S

On the subject of "getting over the hump" Lou Holtz said...."We still have to learn how to win. We must learn how to execute, how to do the little things that make winners out of losers. We must practice over and over those essential things that make the difference. On our final offensive play of the game at the Northwestern three yard line we committed four mental errors that took away an opportunity for us to score and win the game."

JOE CHRISTOPHERSON - LB

Minneapolis, MN---The scene was set in the fall of 1981. Joe Christopherson, a young man who had experienced a dream life as a high school super star, appeared on the threshold of even bigger and better experiences.

He was at his first fall practice as a football scholarship athlete at the University of Minnesota. Everything appeared great.

But for the next three years the only place things were great was in the classroom. Christopherson started out as an Accounting and Business Administration major, but recently switched over to Economics and carries a B- grade point average. It is his plan to graduate a year from December following the 1985 football season. Graduate school in business finance is also in his future.

"I gained the fifth year of eligibility because of missing my original freshman season when I suffered a dislocated kneecap in the final scrimmage of pre-season camp," Joe relates today. "So I just adjusted my academic schedule and stretched it out a bit.

"I guess the main thing I can say about most of my time here is that my academic values and aims have never changed. I place a huge amount of importance on my college degree and nothing will stand in the way of my earning my diploma."

Considering all that has gone on around him the last three years, Joe Christopherson has his feet firmly planted. Actually, opposing ball carriers would be a lot happier if Christopherson wasn't planted so strongly.

Through the first seven Gopher games this season he is second in tackles only to fellow linebacker Peter Najarian. Christopherson has been credited with 62 tackles, including three for 21 yards in losses and, has recovered two fumbles.

Back in high school days at Austin Pacelli, Joe did it all. He ran from fullback and rushed for almost 3,000 career yards. He was also a standout out on the school basketball and baseball teams. But when it came time for college football, Joe was moved to linebacker.

"I really enjoyed playing offense in high school," he says now, "but coach (Joe) Salem wanted me to try it at linebacker. They believed that was where I could make the best contribution, and they were right, too. I really do not have the speed of the offensive backs we have on our team.

"Besides, it suddenly became fun to start doing to ball carriers what defensive players had been doing to me as a fullback all those years."

Asked what personal effect the last three "down" years have had on him, Christopherson replied, "You always go into a season optimisticly and expect to be a winning team. But we kind of had the wind taken out of our sails.

"None of us foresaw what happened starting with the third game of 1982. Actually, the rest of that season and all of 1983 I would just as soon forget altogether. It now seems like kind of a nightmare.

"We, as a team, have been successful at putting all that behind us. The feeling of knowing we can win has returned, that we are not losers. We have come totally together under coach (Lou) Holtz and his staff. We believe in ourselves and each other.

"At the same time I can say I have never once regretted my decision to attend the University of Minnesota. I always wanted to graduate from a great university and that's exactly what I am going to do.

"But right now, besides maintaining my academic levels, we have never worked harder to regain the trust and belief of our great Minnesota fans. We are not that far away from becoming consistent winners.

"Before this year ends and by the time next season is over, football fans will know Minnesota has come to play. . .and win! We believe. We just hope everyone else believes in us, too."

We believe, Joe. We believe.

CROSS COUNTRY TEAM HEADS TO THE BIG TEN CHAMPIONSHIPS

The cross country Big Ten Championships take place Saturday, October 27 in Purdue, and head coach Roy Griak's squad should be healthy and ready.

The team didn't go to last week's Central Collegiate meet in Milwaukee, as scheduled. Instead, Griak gave his team some time to rest up and heal any minor injuries they may have.

The Gophers will be relying on senior co-captains Dave Morrison (Lakeville) and John Kromer (Hudson, WI) to finish high. The rest of the team that will travel to Purdue hasn't been revealed yet by Griak.

The Big Ten meet is a 10K, the first the Gophers will run in this year. In 8K meets, the Gophers beat Drake and Iowa, and finished second in meets to Wisconsin and Purdue. Last year, the Gophers placed seventh in the Big Ten Championships.

The District 4 NCAA's will be November 10 in Champaign, Illinois.

ICERS SPLIT, HEAD BACK EAST

Minneapolis, MN---Before the season started, predictions came down that Minnesota was tops in the West, and Boston University the best of the East in college hockey.

After what happened in Boston last weekend, there is little way of telling which team is superior, or even, in fact, if they ARE the tops in their respective geographical areas.

The schools split a dramatic two-game series at Boston U. The Gophers won Friday 5-2 with a clear domination from start to finish. But the Terriers came back to tie in the final two minutes of regulation Saturday after pulling their goalie, and then won 5-4 with two goals in overtime. Oh, the first apparent score was disallowed by an offside whistle.

The result left Minnesota's record at 3-1-1 for the season, and 2-1-1 in WCHA standings good for five points and a tie for third place. (NOTE: all games played against teams from the Hockey East Association count in the standings of both conferences.)

The Gophers this time hope for as good a result as last weekend when they take another trip out East. Minnesota travels to Orono, ME, and a pair Friday and Saturday against the University of Maine.

"I can tell you for certain that the players, fans and media from the East are every bit as excited about our new interlocking schedule as we are here in the West," says Gopher head coach Brad Buetow. "That was Boston University's first home series of the year and their arena was packed with the fans really turned on. I believe this whole conception of playing games against members of another conference that count in our standings is a super idea.

"It finally provides a measuring stick of relative strengths. That had been mostly speculation in past years as we did not meet each other enough.

"As to the series out there, I believe we played our best game of the year Friday. We beat them to every puck and were in total control. We had a lead of 5-0 before they scored twice in the third period. For the whole game Boston U. only got 15 shots on goal.

"Both Frank Pietrangelo (peter-AN-ge-lo) Friday and freshman John Blue Saturday played well in goals for us. There were several standouts among our skaters, too, but overall it was a team effort in this series.

"But the bad always seems to come with the good, too. Corey Millen, our fine sophomore center, suffered a shoulder separation Friday and will probably miss at least the next two or three series. The absence of his speed and constant scoring threat was notably missing Saturday.

"We will probably move freshman Paul Broten into Millen's center slot this week between wings Tom Rothstein and Todd Okerlund. Broten had a solid series. We'll also move junior Eric Lempe into Broten's spot between Steve MacSwain and David Grannis. The rest of our lines should remain intact, same for the defense and goalie rotation."

Junior wing Pat Micheletti held the hot scoring hand for Minnesota against Boston U. He tallied two goals Friday and added three more points Saturday. His 10 points in league action ties him for first place in the WCHA scoring derby.

Center Rick Erdall chipped in with two power play goals Saturday while wing Roger Bowe added three assists on the weekend.

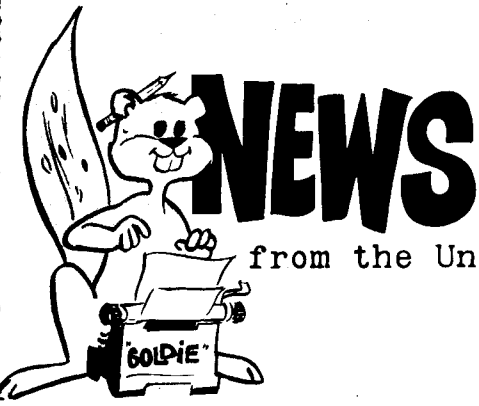

GOLDEN GOPHERS TO INVADE ILLINOIS NEXT

What probably would be described as the toughest part of the 1984 football schedule is next in line for Coach Lou Holtz and his University of Minnesota Golden Gophers.

Saturday Minnesota invades Champaign, Illinois to take on the University of Illinois in a 1 p.m. Big Ten Assignment. The following week the Golden Gophers must play at Michigan, and one week later Holtz' charges return home to close the '84 slate against the University of Iowa.

It will be homecoming at Champaign Saturday, and Minnesota knows it will have its hands full against the Fighting Illini who dropped a tough 26-18 decision at Michigan last weekend. The host club will come into Saturday's assignment with an overall record of 5-4 and a Big Ten standard....good for fifth place....of 4-3.

The Golden Gophers, meanwhile, will put an overall season record of 3-5 and Big Ten mark of 2-4 on the line after dropping another heartbreaker the last time out of the blocks....a 20-13 decision to Michigan State.

"It was an exceptionally disappointing loss for us," Coach Holtz admitted. "There is nothing pleasant about losing, and I can't ask our players to accept the loss when I can't do it. But we can still walk away from the Michigan State game with our heads up, because we played hard."

Unfortunately, hard was not enough, and maybe more than losing the game, Minnesota lost its freshman quarterback Rickey Foggie late in the third quarter with a shoulder separation, an injury which will put the promising signal-caller on the doubtful list for at least a week or two.

"When we lost Foggie we lost our spark," Holtz said. "The loss of Valdez Baylor and Foggie in the second half really hurt our offense. We just could not move the ball after that. We knew that Michigan State was an excellent defensive football team, but before people got hurt, I felt we played well against them offensively. It's just that the critical things went against us."

In that critical department, Holtz read off a devastating list that included two interceptions, not fielding punts, moving offensively inside Michigan State's 10 but not scoring touchdowns and giving up a couple of bombs.

"We were a little embarrassed with our performance in the first half," Holtz said, "but we did come out in the second half and play well. We played together in the second half. I said all week that the Michigan State game would provide us with an opportunity to find out something about ourselves. It did, and we showed courage and character."

Holtz also felt that Minnesota could have come out of the Michigan State game with a win. "I felt all along that we had a chance to win it, but we just did not take advantage of our opportunities," he explained. "It was unfortunate we had to lose, but now we just have to help each other up and come back against Illinois. We may wonder what we have to do to get a break, but if we stay together, it will come."

Looking at Minnesota's remaining schedule makes those prospects tougher, but Holtz has made believers out of the Golden Gophers. They could use something good as they prepare for Illinois, Michigan and Iowa.

QUOTING LOU HOLTZ. . . .

On the subject of the two successive disappointing losses to Northwestern and Michigan State, Lou Holtz said...."Many people operate on the misconception that you win because of a super human effort by someone. That is not true. It takes all 11 people all doing the little things properly to make a unit a winner. If we practice the little things properly, we will be able to do them proper in a game each Saturday."

G-O-P-H-E-R-S

On the subject of knowing what it would take to beat Michigan State, Lou Holtz said...."We knew that to have any success against Michigan State we would have to control the line of scrimmage. We feel that our players have established a reputation for having the ability to come off the ball. We went into the game knowing that our people would be facing a challenge, but they welcomed that opportunity. I feel they can walk away from that game with their heads up....proud because of their efforts."

G-O-P-H-E-R-S

On the subject of two players....Dan Ford and Troy Wolkow....leaving the Golden Gopher football camp recently, Lou Holtz said...."One of the problems with players like Ford and Wolkow leaving is that the media is so very anxious to publicize the fact. They seem to forget about, or don't care about, the number of athletes who stick it out and work so very hard."

G-O-P-H-E-R-S

On the subject of why young players like that find reasons for departing, Lou Holtz said...."I have always opposed freshman eligibility. The loss of intelligent young men like Troy Wolkow and Daniel Ford shows that freshman just are not ready to face complex situations that confront first year people. There is such a great demand for time from a freshman....in academics, in athletics, and even in a social life. Freshmen just are not ready to face those pressures, the pressures they put upon themselves, and too often decisions on what school to attend are based on athletics and not on academics."

G-O-P-H-E-R-S

On the subject of Adam Kelly emerging as a nationally-ranked punter, Lou Holtz said...."Adam Kelly has improved as much as he has over a year ago for several reasons. First of all he was willing to work very hard at it. Second, the ability to kick indoors in a climate controlled situation has helped. And the fact that he has an outstanding long snapper (Scott Guldin) has enabled him to establish a consistent rhythm in his kicking."

G-O-P-H-E-R-S

On the subject of Minnesota's effort against Michigan State, Lou Holtz said...."We played as hard as any team I've ever been associated with. The effort was outstanding. I can't be upset with our team. A team that plays as hard as we do and with the positive attitude we have eventually will have good things happen to it."

G-O-P-H-E-R-S

On the subject of Minnesota's quarterback situation with Rickey Foggie suffering a shoulder injury Lou Holtz said...."I have a lot of confidence in Brett Sadek. He is a winner. We feel, however, that we can't win if we just throw the ball. We need to run the option, and it may mean we will have to bring Alan Holt or Michael Baker out of redshirt."

ANDRE HARRIS - CB

Minneapolis, MN---After seeing Michigan State complete two long bombs for scores in the first half of a 20-13 victory over Minnesota last Saturday, Gopher defensive back Andre's Harris, as might be anticipated, did not come apart at the seams.

"Since I first began back there, I have believe the most important single factor about getting beat deep in the secondary is keeping your composure, showing that you have character," says the senior Chicago cornerback.

"I believe our entire defensive backfield showed both those traits in the second half. Michigan State completed only one of four passes. We adjusted at halftime and they couldn't find receivers open and had to eat the ball several times.

"Our offense darned near pulled it out, too. A break here or there and I believe we would have beaten them."

That's a far different tone from the way Minnesota players reacted the last two years while finishing last in the Big Ten both seasons.

"It became difficult to even get ready for practice back then," Harris continued. "But I can honestly say I never stopped hustling, never stopped working. But it was awfully hard to maintain enthusiasm. I began to think more about the outcome of a game rather than my individual responsibilities. Everything just seemed to come apart.

"But that's no longer the case. If nothing else, each of us now know our main responsibilities. The majority of them are mental, staying alert, reading our keys, knowing what we are expected to do."

That's a strong position taken by a young man to come to Minnesota in 1980 hoping to become a wide receiver and gain the headlines that often go to offensive stars.

"I played both ways at Madam Curie High School in Chicago and we had a winning program there my last two years," Harris says. "I was fortunate to be named offensive player of the week three times, and defensive player of the week three times. I had hoped the winning would carry over.

"But during my first per-fall camp here at Minnesota, I was asked to try it at free safety and ended up staying there for three years. Actually I sat out the 1982 season following knee surgery.

"But this fall I moved to cornerback. And let me tell you there is a lot of difference. At free safety nothing happens to you right away, but at cornerback it's right now! Free safety is more like a zone position while you play cornerback more like man to man.

"At corner by the end of the game you almost believe you know the man you are covering personally. We talk quite a bit. You compliment them on running a good route or making a real tough catch, and in turn they compliment us on good coverage and hustle. What it really comes down to is we don't want them to beat us deep and they don't want us to beat on them," the latter said tongue in cheek.

Harris said the toughest man he has confronted all year was Al Toon of Wisconsin who tried to go deep a lot. He also mentioned solid receivers Len Kenebrew of Indiana, Mike Lanese of Ohio State and Michigan State's Mark Ingram.

Back in high school Harris found a special interest in humanities and social science classes. That has carried over to his classwork here at Minnesota. This past year he changed his study major from Business to General Legal Studies and Marketing.

"If a possible shot at playing professional football does not get in the way, I definitely plan on going to Law School here," He adds. "If I make it I'll be the first in my family to go into legal work."

Harris plans to gain his undergraduate degree next June and then take the Law School Admissions Test.

"Knowing I'm about to graduate has made me concentrate twice as hard on my classwork as well as football," he closed.

MINNESOTA CAGERS INCREASE PRACTICE TEMPO

After putting his 1984-85 University of Minnesota basketball team through their first intra-squad scrimmage of the season at Owatonna on Tuesday, Coach Jim Dutcher plans to increase the practice tempo with three more trial affairs in the next two weeks.

Next Monday (November 5) the Golden Gophers will go at it in a preview at Willmar. Tip-off at the high school there is set for 7:30 p.m. On Thursday (Nov. 8) Minnesota will hold a similar scrimmage at 7:30 p.m. in White Bear Lake before the final intra-squad scrimmage of the pre-season is held at St. Paul Humboldt Tuesday, November 13, at 7:30.

Dutcher, now in his 10th season as the head coach at Minnesota, attempted to divide the squad with the starting five against the reserves for the first half before making some adjustments at the intermission to "even things out" for the second half.

If everyone is healthy....and there have been a couple of nuisance injuries that have popped up in the Golden Gopher camp....Dutcher's starting five has Captain Tommy Davis, the only senior on this year's squad, teaming with junior Marc Wilson at guard, junior center John Shasky at forward, and sophomore Kevin Wilson going with freshman Mitchell Lee at the forwards.

The opposition, for the opening tip-off at least, includes sophomore Gerald Jackson at guard, freshman Todd Alexander at guard, freshman Tim Hanson at guard and forward, freshman George Williams at forward, sophomore Paul Van Den Einde at center and red-shirt freshman Dave Holmgren at forward and center.

At this stage of things, Dutcher is making no predictions, but he is well aware of the fact that he has a big job ahead of him re-building Minnesota's front line where last year's forward, Roland Brooks and Jim Petersen, have departed.

"The strength of our team is in our guards," Dutcher emphasizes. "Davis is the only remaining member of our 1981-82 Big Ten championship team, and as our captain will have to be the player we rely on. He had an outstanding junior season in which he led us in scoring and shot .555 from the field. We hope he can improve upon that again as a senior."

Wilson also is expected to be a mainstay for Minnesota, and also should continue to show improvement over a season where he was Minnesota's second leading scorer and top man in both assists and steals.

But Shasky, a 7-0 cager, is the only other returning starter, and that has Dutcher concerned. "Shasky has the size, strength and ability to be a solid Big Ten center," Dutcher maintains. "He has worked hard on weights in the off season, and we feel he can have his best season as a Golden Gopher."

After that, however, Dutcher must look to people who have limited or no experience to fill out the front line. Smith, 6-7, is ticketed for heavy duty, but Dutcher says "The battle for the other starting forward is far from settled."

Maybe the scrimmages on tap the next two weeks will help Dutcher make those decisions, but the 1984-85 season opener against UW-Green Bay on November 24 seems all too close. There is little wonder Dutcher has increased Minnesota's practice tempo.

ICERS IN WCHA 1ST PLACE

Minneapolis, MN---First place in the WCHA standings is not a totally unfamiliar place for the U. of Minnesota hockey Gophers. But with all the changes included this season---two new WCHA members and the interlocking schedule of 14 games that count in the standings against Hockey East teams---nobody was sure just what was going to happen.

But when Minnesota scored its first season sweep by winning twice at Maine last weekend, 4-2 and 8-1, its league record reached 4-1-1 good for nine points. That's one point better than Colorado College and Michigan Tech who are each 4-2-0 for eight points. UM is 5-1-1 overall.

The Gophers hope to maintain their lead when they return home for the first time in three weeks to host Northeastern Friday and Saturday at Williams Arena. Both games begin at 7:35 CST and will be aired live on KRSI-AM radio in the Twin Cities.

BUETOW ON UM PERFORMANCE

"For this early in the season we are really playing well," Gopher head coach Brad Buetow said Sunday. "Maine's arena is not an easy place to play, but I believe we pretty well dominated both games.

"I'm really pleased with the work attitude of our men. They are going after it hard. Oh sure, we have a long, long road to travel and there is plenty of room for improvement. But we are off to an excellent start and that was our first priority of the season."

Asked what effect back to back road trips had on this team, Buetow said, "I suppose our players are a bit weary from the traveling, but the plusses easily outweigh the minuses.

"I believe it's a strong cultural experience seeing new areas in our country, learning different ways of life. All we heard from individuals out East were positive statements. It's unbelievable the number of comments on how great it is for them to see western teams and different styles of hockey. The enthusiasm for the college game out there is fantastic.

"They (Maine) held the first blueline luncheon ever last Friday and about 100 fans turned out. They were really fired up, too.

"But all that is in the past. Now we have to get ready for Northeastern. I'm certain they want to win some games out here badly. We will have to be ready to go just as hard as in the past. I can tell you now there will be no planned lineup changes for us."

However, there is an outside chance that sophomore center Corey Millen could be ready for duty. He suffered a shoulder separation two weeks ago in the Boston U. series and did not play last weekend at Maine.

MICHELETTI, BOWE, BROTEN SHINE

Junior wings Pat Micheletti and Roger Bowe plus freshman center Paul Broten played strong roles in the Gophers wins at Maine. Micheletti accounted for seven points in the series, including a hat trick Friday. He scored four goals and three assists and now has 17 points (10-7) in six league games. He is number one in the WCHA scoring derby.

Bowe scored a shorthanded goal in each game including the game winner Friday when UM came from a 0-2 first period deficit. Broten, while getting his first collegiate hat trick in Saturday's 8-1 decision, scored two of his goals shorthanded, as was Micheletti's single score in the same game giving the Gophers five goals while killing penalties on the weekend.

GOLDEN GOPHERS TO BATTLE FOR LITTLE BROWN JUG SATURDAY

Still smarting from a 48-3 thumping at the University of Illinois last weekend, the University of Minnesota's Golden Gophers head for Ann Arbor, Michigan Saturday to take on the Michigan Wolverines in the annual battle for the Little Brown Jug.

Kickoff for that Big Ten Conference clash is tabbed for 1 p.m. (EST), and Minnesota fans can only hope that their Golden Gophers will fare better this time out of the blocks against a team which also lost last weekend 31-29 at Purdue.

Minnesota will take an overall record of 3-6 and a Big Ten standard of 2-5 into Saturday afternoon's assignment while the home-standing Wolverines, suffering through their leanest season in more than a decade are 5-4 and 4-3.

The prognosticators don't give Minnesota much of a chance in Ann Arbor Saturday, and they have history on their side. The Minnesota-Michigan series dates back to 1892, and in the 74-game series, the Wolverines hold a commanding 49-22-3 edge.

In fact, the last time Minnesota beat Michigan was in 1977 when the Golden Gophers upset the number-one ranked Wolves 16-0 in Minneapolis. The last time Minnesota won in Ann Arbor was in 1962 when the Golden Gophers drilled Michigan 17-0.

Minnesota and Michigan began playing for the coveted prize, the Little Brown Jug, in 1909. In all, there have been a total of 66 "Jug" games, with the Wolverines winning 44 times and Minnesota 20. There have been two ties.

But no matter what the outcome in Ann Arbor on Saturday, it couldn't seem any worse for Head Coach Lou Holtz who suffered the worst defeat in his coaching career last weekend at Illinois.

"That seemed like as long a day as I've ever spent on a football field," Holtz said after the one-sided contest drew to a merciful close. "Illinois is an awfully good football team with an awful lot of skill players."

Probably the most distressing thing to Holtz about the game was not the final score but instead the mistakes that his charges made. Minnesota had five penalties for 33 yards....three defensively on a drive that led to an Illinois score...fumbled five times (and lost all five) and threw one pass interception.

In addition, the Minnesota defense allowed Illinois 87 offensive plays.... 47 of them rushing attempts....and in the process gave up 241 net yards on the ground to the Fighting Illini.

"We knew going into the game that we would have to control the line of scrimmage and stop the Illinois rushing game if we had any hopes of winning the game. We also knew that we could not commit any turnovers. We just couldn't get the job done.

But it's over, and while Holtz praised Coach Mike White of Illinois for deserving a "Sisters of Mercy Humanitarian Award" for not making the score any more decisive, thought now are on Michigan.

"We've got two games left," Holtz told his squad after the loss at Illinois, "at Michigan next week and then Iowa at home. This one's for the Little Brown Jug. We are not going to hang it up."

QUOTING LOU HOLTZ.....

On the subject of how hard the loss at Illinois was to accept, Lou Holtz said....I don't know of a game that was more disappointing to me. It was a long day, it was the worse defeat I've ever been involved in as a coach, and even more important was how superior Illinois was. They were bigger, faster and tougher. Even worse, they were more emotional than we were."

G-O-P-H-E-R-S

On the subject of the quality of quarterbacks in the Big Ten Conference, Lou Holtz said...."It is amazing, but every week we seem to sing the praises of the opponents' quarterback. Jack Trudeau of Illinois certainly performed like the best quarterback in the Big Ten Saturday. And if there was one better, it was his backup Ken Cruz. And the alarming thing is that nine of the 10 starting quarterbacks in the league will be returning next year."

G-O-P-H-E-R-S

On the subject of Minnesota's quarterback situation and the fact that starter Rickey Foggie did not play at Illinois because of a shoulder injury, Lou Holtz said...."Mike Moe and Brett Sadek did as fine a job as could be expected against Illinois. We had a breakdown here and there, but it was a total team loss, not a quarterback loss. I do not believe that the outcome would have been any different had Rickey Foggie played."

G-O-P-H-E-R-S

On the subject of the possible renewal or extension of the University of Minnesota's lease agreement with the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome this week, Lou Holtz said...."I am not involved in decisions about when we play, who we play or where we play, only in how we play. I do feel the Metrodome gives us a controlled climate which enhances conditions for players at the skill positions, and I am of the opinion that it benefits us in recruiting."

G-O-P-H-E-R-S

On the subject of recruiting, Lou Holtz said...."We must recruit for next year at the skill positions. We need more speed in our players at those positions. We must recruit in our defensive line, and basically we need bigger and stronger players. In high school football, the best athletes normally are people playing in the offensive backfield, so we normally seek those players with the idea of making some position changes."

G-O-P-H-E-R-S

On the subject of Minnesota's game at Michigan this week and the ability of the Golden Gophers to bounce back after three consecutive losses, Lou Holtz said...."Our players will have to do a little soul searching this week. We'll have a prayer meeting and ask our players to look at themselves. I'm not a judge or a jury, and only a player can determine if he has done his best on every play. But the Little Brown Jug is extremely important to us, and we will ask our people to play with toughness and to play with emotion."

Minneapolis, MN---In past years the last place the Minnesota hockey Gophers have wanted to play in is the Broadmoor World Arena in Colorado Springs. Nothing has changed. Only this year the odds are even worse.

This week the Gophers, still atop the Western Collegiate Hockey Association (WCHA) standings, play at Colorado College Friday and Saturday. Both games will be aired locally by KRSI-950 AM radio.

Not a serious threat in recent campaigns, Colorado College has suddenly found new hockey life. The Tigers, idle last week, are 4-2-0 for eight points and tied for third place in the WCHA.

On top of all that, Minnesota has not enjoyed much success in recent years playing at The Broadmoor. Even in championship seasons the Tigers seem to delight in defeating the Gophers above all others.

Minnesota carries a 7-1-1 season record to C.C. (6-1-1 for 13 points in the WCHA). The Gophers stretched their win streak to four games last weekend via 6-1 and 6-5 wins, the latter in overtime, against Northeastern University on home ice.

Again it was the combination of WCHA scoring leader Pat Micheletti, a junior right wing, and his center, senior Rick Erdall, that supplied most of the offensive punch for Minnesota. Each man scored seven points on the weekend, including four power play goals and one game winner.

But it was junior wing Roger Bowe who came up with the weekend clincher. Bowe scored at 8:10 of overtime Saturday on a breakaway to give the Gophers their 6-5 decision and series sweep. It was his second game winner of the season.

Micheletti scored two goals in each game, three of them when UM had a man advantage, and added three assists bringing his league-leading point total to 24 (14-10) in eight games. He has 27 points (15-12) in all games.

Erdall moved up to a third place tie in the WCHA point race by matching Micheletti's seven points on the weekend. Erdall tallied two goals and five assists for 17 WCHA points (6-11).

Freshman John Blue turned in a sparkling performance in Friday's win allowing Northeastern just one goal and stopping 22 shots. He now leads all WCHA net minders who have played at least 40% of their team's games with a 2.31 goals allowed average.

Junior Frank Pietrangelo, who authored the 6-5 overtime win in goal Saturday, is second to Blue in the Association with a 3.31 goal average.

Both men are again expected to split the series this weekend, but head coach Brad Buetow has not announced who will play which night.

Asked if there is some kind of Minnesota jinx connected with playing at The Broadmoor, Buetow replied, "No, I believe all teams have trouble playing out there. Colorado College plays that rink extremely well.

"It's the smallest ice surface in the WCHA and not a place for a finesse game. It inhibits freedom of movement because of lack of size. They really check well in that rink, and are now playing much, much better defensively to give goalie Marty Wakelyn more help. He is really tough on us, too."

Good news for the Gophers is that it appears both center Corey Millen and wing Tom Rothstein will be ready to go full bore this weekend. Both missed last week's games, and Millen has been out for five games with a sore shoulder.

RICK ERDALL - GOPHER HOCKEY CENTER

Minneapolis, MN---There was only one phrase that could sum up Minnesota center Rick Erdall's feelings about the 1983-84 Gopher hockey season. . .frustration!!!

In Minnesota's ninth game of the year, Erdall's skate blade caught in a rut of the ice in Dane County Coliseum at Madison when he was checked. His body turned, but his leg didn't. Thus, a damaged knee that called for surgery.

The injury should have been enough. But the fact that Erdall, then a junior center, was playing in the second period of his 9th game was worse. It mean't that he could not qualify for an injury redshirt season being two periods over the maximum playing time allowed.

"Yes, I sure was frustrated. The whole season," the senior center says now. "But at the same time not all ended up negative.

"By being forced out of action, I was able to sit back and look at hockey from the outside. By watching the whole picture from a distance, I learned that I should be able to do more, make a bigger contribution to the team than I had shown in previous years.

"I went into last year believing I had already suffered my frustrating times. That was back in 1982-83 when we won the WCHA championship and qualified for the NCAA tournament.

"In that season I suffered an injury to my right knee in the playoffs and missed the final four games of the season. Then last year it was my left knee. The right one is now 100% perfect. But my left knee is giving me some minor problems."

There are a few teams and coaches around the WCHA who would just as soon that Erdall was slowed some. Through games last weekend he had helped power the Gophers to first place in the WCHA standings by scoring six goals and 13 assists in nine games for 17 points, second high on the varsity.

Last weekend the Gophers took two at home from Northeastern, 6-1 and 6-5, the latter in overtime, and Erdall came up with seven points on two goals and five assists.

Asked what it took from him to get back and start playing for the Gophers again, Rick replied, "An awful lot of work. When freshman center Steve Orth got hurt the week after I did and was also out for the year, I felt terrible for him. I knew what he would be going through.

"But at the same time I suddenly had someone to work out with. We began spotting weights for each other, worked together on the cybex machine to test our range of motion, and spent hours and hours side by side riding stationary bicycles. In a way I made a new friend. We discussed hockey for hours on end."

Asked further about the potential of hockey player Rick Erdall, the Minneapolis Washburn High School product said, "More than I've done so far. I hope before this season ends to become a forceful player in the WCHA.

"For Minnesota to succeed we need to be strong up the middle. Therefore, I've got to contribute more. I'm working on it."

Also asked about his belief in the potential of the Minnesota Gopher team this year, Rick went on, "With a healthy (Corey) Millen and (Tom) Rothstein and if Orth, Pat Micheletti and I can play the way we are supposed to, and everybody else lives up to what's expected of them, I honestly believe we can be an exceptional team.

"Two years ago we won the WCHA with great players like Butsy Erickson, Scott Bjugstad and others. I don't believe this team has a lot of great players, but we do have a lot of darned good ones.

"We respect every team in the WCHA and Hockey East. But if we can continue to outwork all the others, we can do what's expected of us."

Erdall recently changed his classroom major to Individual Studies (management-humanities-philosophy) and plans on graduating in March, 1986, one quarter short of five years.

CROSS COUNTRY TEAM SENDS TWO TO NCAA REGIONALS

GOLDEN GOPHERS CLOSE SEASON BY HOSTING IOWA SATURDAY

One of the youngest teams in University of Minnesota history will bid farewell to 12 seniors Saturday when the Golden Gophers host arch-rival Iowa in the 1984 season finale at the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome.

Kickoff is set for 7:10 p.m. in that Big Ten Conference assignment as Lou Holtz winds up his first season as head coach at Minnesota hoping to improve an overall record of 3-6 and a Big Ten mark of 2-5 by ending the year on a positive note.

All season long, Holtz has maintained that for the Golden Gophers to be successful, they would have to get solid leadership from their seniors. And while they are not great in numbers, and while injuries already have shelved some of them, those seniors ticketed for service Saturday night are expected to provide the leadership Holtz has been looking for.

The Minnesota gridders making their final appearances are Steve Carlson, kicker from Bloomington, MN; Glen Cieslewicz, linebacker from Green Bay, WI; Kerry Glenn, cornerback from East St. Louis, IL; Andre Harris, cornerback from Chicago, IL; Tony Hunter, tailback from Memphis, TN; John Kelly, center from Roseville, MN; Dwayne McMullen, split end from Harrisburg, PA; Jeff Moritko, offensive guard from Minneapolis, MN; Craig Paulson, defensive tackle from Stevens Point, WI; Rob Pinkston, tight end from Simi, CA; Bob Sudler, fullback from Miami, FL; and Mark VonderHaar, offensive tackle from Hibbing, MN.

Both host Minnesota and visiting Iowa will be hoping to rebound from losses suffered last week. While the Golden Gophers were falling 31-7 at Michigan, the Hawkeyes were being upset 17-16 at home by Michigan State.

Neither the Gophers nor the Hawkeyes were happy about those defeats, and it could mean that both clubs will give special effort to winning the regular-season finale at the Metrodome.

"I hate to lose," Holtz said after the Michigan game. "It really hurts me, and it hurts me to see our players suffer like this. Maybe it will hurt enough so that they will want to do something against Iowa."

Actually Minnesota jumped off to a 7-0 lead in the Michigan game and seemed to be in control after Gary Couch's 22-yard scamper with a Rickey Foggie lateral in the first quarter. But eventually the Wolverines began to dominate. And when Minnesota missed a field goal in the closing seconds of the first half....and then did not score after gaining a first down at the Michigan four in the early part of the third period, it was all over.

"We thought Foggie had scored from the 27," Holtz recalled, "but the official said he stepped out of bounds at the four. We all know that backs are supposed to carry the ball and officials are supposed to signal touchdowns. Each has his own job. But then when we couldn't push it in, we really had the air taken out of us. It really deflated us."

Can the Golden Gophers get some air back for the Hawks Saturday? "We've got one game left," Holtz reminded his players last Saturday. "We've got Iowa left! We're not going to quit now, are we?" There is reason to believe Holtz knew Minnesota would commit itself to giving it a real shot against the Hawkeyes.

QUOTING LOU HOLTZ. . . .

On the subject of the loss at Michigan last week, Lou Holtz said...."It simply was a case of Michigan making the big plays and our not making them. We have a fourth down at the one and can't score, and they have a fourth down at the three and break away from our tackler for a score. They got a couple of long bombs and we didn't. It is very frustrating when we make plays that get us beat."

G-O-P-H-E-R-S

On the subject of turning points, or critical plays in the loss at Michigan, Lou Holtz said...."When we missed a field goal at the end of the first half it really hurt us. It especially hurt when you think that in the third quarter when Rickey Foggie goes out of bounds at the four instead of scoring on a play that would have given us the lead you can see how critical those two plays were to us."

On the subject of errors made by the Golden Gophers against Michigan, Lou Holtz said...."We turned the ball over on interceptions and fumbles way too much. We did some things well in the game, but we still do not know how to overcome adversity. And it is difficult to overcome adversity when you can't protect the ball."

On the subject of the calibre of the Michigan team that beat Minnesota Saturday, Lou Holtz said...."Michigan is a class operation. It is a great atmosphere in which to play a football game, and Minnesota is proud to be in the same conference with them. They are a well coached team that was bigger and stronger than we were and because of that able to control the line of scrimmage."

On the subject of Minnesota's overall performance at Michigan, Lou Holtz said...."We hate to lose, but we can be proud of how hard we played in defeat. It seems like we have to learn everything the hard way, and we know that we can't continue to make mistakes and expect to win. But we played hard, and we had some great efforts collectively."

On the subject of Michigan's defensive middle guard Al Sincich playing so well against Minnesota, Lou Holtz said...."Michigan's middle guard played a great game. They should teach him how to take a handoff. He was in our backfield all afternoon."

On the subject of Minnesota's failing to score from the one, and the effect it had on the game's outcome Saturday, Lou Holtz said...."The crushing thing about our not getting into the endzone was that Michigan turns around and goes 99 yards to score. And they got 68 yards on one play into the strength of our defense. Actually Andre Harris gave it a great effort, made a great play just to catch him on that one."

JOHN KELLY - C

Minneapolis, MN---Senior offensive center John Kelly from Mounds View High School (he actually resides in Roseville) is another member of the 1984 Gopher varsity to have come back from trying times.

Like numerous teammates, John, too, was once sidelined by knee surgery. It happened during the Illinois game in 1982 right after he snapped the ball on a field goal attempt.

It's not so much that Kelly was injured, a risk every athlete in every sport chances every time he/she competes. It's the coming back to face the possibility of another injury, either further damage of the first hurt or something new.

"The toughest part for me both physically and mentally was in pre-fall and the first half of last year," Kelly says today. "I had missed the last half of the '82 season and all spring practice. I still wasn't totally ready to go all-out early last fall.

"But the more I worked, the harder I worked, the better things became. Strength gradually returned and by midseason I was in top shape.

"I guess I was a bit bullheaded about becoming our team's number one center last year. In that respect I hurried my knee rehabilitation a bit. But in the long run I guess it was OK because it is not causing me any problems this season, except for sometimes getting tired."

All the above is but another example of what dedication means when talking about an athlete. So many of us give up so quickly when something goes against the grain. But time after time this type of story comes out from young men and women who, using athletics as their vehicle, rebound to become even better in their personal areas than before.

"I guess I would have to say if it were not for football I might have checked it all and given up following my knee surgery," Kelly says. "But being involved with my teammates, no, make that my friends, there was just no way I was about to sit back and watch the world go by.

"Through team sports we are fortunate to form binding friendships. The comrade we develop goes far beyond winning and losing games. We literally live, die and learn together most of each of our four or five years in college. It's awfully hard to break those type bonds."

Now do you get an idea of what dedication is all about?

As a senior playing his final game for Minnesota at home this Saturday against Iowa, Kelly naturally is concerned about the future. What lies ahead for this Marketing major in the School of Management? For one thing, pro football does not, at this time, appear to play a key role.

"At this point I have to say realistically it's time to move on," Kelly continues. "In the back of my mind would always be that of another possible knee injury. If it were to happen again I might be forced to carry a limp with me the rest of my life.

"So unless something extra special happened, Saturday could well be my last day in a football uniform.

"Furthering my education is the single most important thing to me right now. I plan to receive my undergraduate degree a year from December and then maybe go into law school here at Minnesota. I have kind of been looking at a future in corporate law. But that's not a certainty, either."

Another important item Kelly mentioned was the added responsibilities he gained this season as a member of the senior class on the grid squad.

"Coach (Lou) Holtz) places a lot of 'take charge' jobs on us. The only problem arises in that there are so few seniors. But coach Holtz gives the seniors a lot of credit for, if nothing else, simply making it through. By rewarding us with responsibilities, it is an example to the younger men on our team by showing what it takes to get this far."

Sounds like responsibility and dedication go hand in hand for Mr. Kelly.

ICERS SWEEP, HEAD FOR PROVIDENCE

Nov. 12, 1984

Minneapolis, MN---Yes, Minnesota was picked number one before the WCHA season opened. However, nobody, and I mean NOBODY, believed the Gophers would own a 7-point buldge in the standings after only five weeks of league play.

Minnesota ran its win streak to six straight last weekend by taking two more road games, this time at Colorado College, by defeating the Tigers 6-4 and 5-1. UM is now 9-1-1 overall and 8-1-1 good for 17 points in WCHA action.

But Minnesota faces another rugged road assignment this week with games Saturday and Sunday against the Providence Friars, second place team in the Hockey East standings. Providence is hot off a two-game sweep at Northern Michigan last weekend and is awfully tough to beat at home. (NOTE: there will not be any local radio coverage of the games from Providence this weekend.)

Minnesota used two scoring bursts to defeat Colorado College at The Broadmoor World Arena. After a scoreless first period Friday, Minnesota scored four times in the first seven minutes of the second period and then coasted.

Actually, the Gophers almost coasted a bit too much allowing C.C. to score three power play and one shorthanded goals on Frank Pietrangelo. The junior goalie made 24 saves.

On Saturday Minnesota leaped out to a 3-0 first period margin, including the first two goals off the stick of sophomore center Corey Millen. Minnesota added a shorthanded goal by Tim Bergland in the second period, and a power play score from captain Mike Guentzel in the final stanza.

Brent Gropp, on a power play, scored with less than two minutes remaining for the Tigers to end hopes of a shutout for UM freshman goalie John Blue. Blue totaled 29 stops for the game, many of the spectacular variety. Minnesota outshot Colorado College 84-58 in the two games.

Asked if he was surprised at having a 7-point margin in the standings, Gopher head coach Brad Buetow replied, "You bet I am. But I believe it's a combination of our early consistency and other teams suffering growing pains from playing so much youth.

"Actually if you look at it in correctly, the seven points is not a reality. We have played 10 league games, but some of the other teams have only played eight or six games. So they have from four to eight potential points in hand. It will all even up later on."

Buetow goes on to point out his belief as to why Minnesota has enjoyed so much early success. "If there is only one point I can pick out right now it would have to be an improved team defense," the coach offered.

"Any time you are under a 3.0 goals per game defensive average, then a lot of people are doing something right. Naturally, it starts in goal where (Frank) Pietrangelo and (John) Blue are playing exceptionally well.

"But our forwards and defensemen are coming back hard and picking up their checks quickly, too. The goalies can't do it alone. They must receive a lot of help. So far our skaters have been giving them good help, too."

Asked about Providence, Buetow said, "They have 17 lettermen back from last year and are off that sweep at Northern Michigan. They have good momentum, are solid on defense and have some explosive forwards. We are in for a whale of a series out there. I hope our men are ready for the challenge."

Gopher wing Pat Micheletti kept his scoring streak intact at Colorado College by counting two points Friday and assist Saturday. He has now scored in 27 straight games dating back to last season. He still leads the WCHA scoring derby on 27 points in 10 league games (15-12).

GOLDEN GOPHER CAGERS EYE OPENER

With the 1984-85 basketball season opener less than two weeks away, Coach Jim Dutcher has stepped up the practice pace for his Golden Gophers and in the process provided University of Minnesota fans with an opportunity to get a preview of things to come during the rapidly approaching campaign.

On Saturday, Dutcher will put his Golden Gophers through a full-scale, game-condition intra-squad scrimmage at Williams Arena. Tip-off for that final tuneup has been set for 2 p.m.

No admission will be charged for that affair. In fact, Dutcher has indicated that the first 1,000 fans arriving at Williams Arena on Saturday will be given free a University of Minnesota basketball poster.

Helping lend even more game-like conditions to the workout is the fact that Dutcher will have two Big Ten Conference officials, Bill Herzog and Mike Nevin, working the game.

Ticketed to play for the Gold squad are Tommy Davis, Mitch Lee, Pete Olson, John Shasky, Kevin Smith and Marc Wilson. Making up the Gold squad will be Todd Alexander, Tim Hanson, David Holmgren, Gerald Jackson, George Williams and Paul Van Den Einde.

Saturday's scrimmage will be the finale major workout before the Golden Gophers open their 1984-85 season on Saturday, November 24 at 7:05 p.m. in Williams Arena against the University of Wisconsin--Green Bay.

Minnesota is ticketed to play four games, all non-conference, in succession at Williams Arena in November and early December before hitting the road for a gruelling four-game road trip to Indiana State, Oregon, Arizona and Arkansas.

If the Golden Gophers were to tip off the '84-85 season this week, Dutcher could be expected to open with four lettermen and a freshman. Shasky is set to start at center, and Davis and Wilson are fixtures at guard.

Dutcher now feels he will open with Smith, another letterman, at one of the forward spots and then use Lee, a freshman, at the other position in Minnesota's front line.

Jackson would be Minnesota's first player off the bench in a backcourt spot while a move up front could find Davis moving to a forward position and Alexander coming in at guard. And Van Den Einde appears to be the top backup at center.

"Davis has been playing very well," Dutcher said this week. "He's a veteran, and he is our captain, so he will have to be our leader. He's scored 35 and 30 points in two of our recent scrimmages, and we hope he can continue to score well for us."

Dutcher also has liked the looks of Shasky. "John had 32 points in our last scrimmage," Dutcher said. "He's jumping much better, and he is really much stronger. It's all part of the maturing process, and we feel he can be a quality Big Ten center."

Gopher fans will have a chance to see for themselves in the preview on Saturday.

MORRISON QUALIFIES FOR NCAA CHAMPIONSHIPS

Dave Morrison (Lakeville) qualified for his third NCAA National Championships competition, to be held Monday, November 19 at Penn State, with a fifth-place finish at the NCAA Regionals Saturday, November 10.

GOLDEN GOPHERS OPEN 1984-85 BASKETBALL SEASON ON SATURDAY

The University of Minnesota will tip off its 1984-85 basketball season on Saturday at 8:05 p.m. in Williams Arena by playing host to the University of Wisconsin-Green Bay in a non-conference assignment.

Coach Jim Dutcher, now in his 10th season as head coach at the University of Minnesota hopes that his Golden Gophers can get off to an impressive start this season with a win over Green Bay as they shoot for an improvement over last year's 15-13 record.

There won't be any rest for Minnesota after Saturday night's opener because the Golden Gophers remain at home to entertain Connecticut next Wednesday and then Montana State a week from Saturday.

How good can the current band of Minnesota cagers be? Golden Gopher fans, more than 4,000 of them, visited Williams Arena last Saturday afternoon to get a preview of things to come in an intra-squad scrimmage. They appeared to appreciate what they saw.

"It was a good afternoon's work for us," Dutcher said, "and the fans seemed to like it. People seem to think that we are going to be so bad that when they do see us do something good they react with obvious appreciation."

Why should fans think Minnesota will be so bad in '84-'85? Last year's record was not a great one, even though it did mark the eighth time in nine years under Dutcher that the Golden Gophers had finished above the .500 mark.

However, with last year falling into the "average" category, with both of the starting forwards from the club (Roland Brooks and Jim Petersen) graduating, and with Dutcher building this season around the youngest team he has ever had, chances don't seem very good to followers for Minnesota challenging for Big Ten Conference honors this time around.

"This will be a young team," Dutcher admits, "with only one senior on the roster. And it is true that the real question we have is how well our forwards can perform in the Big Ten. We may wind up using a couple of different combinations before things really are settled."

John Shasky, a 7-0 junior, is a fixture at center, and he will form the foundation for Minnesota's front line. "John is a true veteran for us now, and he is much improved," Dutcher says. "He worked hard on the weights in the off season, and he's put on weight which has made him stronger, and he has improved his jumping ability."

The problem Dutcher has is at forward. Kevin Smith, a 6-7 sophomore letterman, will get a shot at one of those spots and Mitchell Lee, a 6-9 freshman, will open against Green Bay at the other.

Support up front will come from Paul Van Den Einde, a 7-0 sophomore, and Dave Holmgren, a 7-0 redshirt freshman, at center. George Williams, a 6-9 freshman, Tim Hanson, a 6-6 freshman, and Pete Olson, a 6-7 walk-on sophomore, will lend backup help at the forward spots.

The strength of the 1984-85 Golden Gophers will be at guard where Captain Tommy Davis (Minnesota's lone senior) and Mark Wilson will be in their third year as Coach Dutcher's starters.

"Tommy is as good a guard as I have had at Minnesota," Dutcher maintains, "and that says a lot when you think of people like Ray Williams and Trent Tucker playing in the National Basketball Association. He is our leading candidate for post-season honors and will be among the best in the country this year."

Davis led Minnesota in scoring a year ago and ranks as the second leading scorer returning in the Big Ten Conference this year. He is 6-5. Wilson, at 6-1, remains one of the Big Ten's quicker guards and returns as Minnesota's second leading scorer, top assist man and number one steal man.

"We also have good support at guard with Gerald Jackson, a letterman, returning," Dutcher points out. "In addition, we think Todd Alexander, a freshman, has the ability to play early." Jackson is 6-4 and Alexander 5-11.

"We can swing Davis down to forward," Dutcher said, "and use Jackson or Alexander at guard with Wilson. It would make us a very quick team, and it would help our transition game a great deal."

The only question mark among those players, as Minnesota gets ready for Saturday night's opener against Green Bay, seems to be Williams who has a stress fracture in his foot. "We could not use George in our scrimmage last weekend," Dutcher pointed out, "and we will not get another evaluation for a week or so. We just hope to get him back soon."

MINNESOTA ENDS 1984 FOOTBALL SEASON ON HAPPY NOTE

Coach Lou Holtz said "Expect a miracle," and he got one in the season finale at the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome last Saturday night when the University of Minnesota upset the Iowa Hawkeyes 23-17.

All week long, while preparing for the arch-rival Hawks, Minnesota players were urged to think of the finale against Iowa as their 1984 bowl game. They did, and they literally bowled over Iowa.

"It was a great win for us," Holtz said, "and it was a total team victory. I have said all along that we had a good team at Minnesota, that we were just a step away. By winning over a great team like Iowa, I feel that it shows where we are and what hard work can do. The win was a real tribute to this team's character."

The triumph enables Minnesota to finish the season with an overall record of 4-7 and a Big Ten mark of 3-6 which puts them in eighth place ahead of Northwestern and Indiana in the final standings.

"This is a foundation of our building things to come," Holtz predicted. "It leaves no doubt in my mind and there should be no doubt in anyone else's mind that we can do it at the University of Minnesota."

First-year Coach Holtz also maintained that the final-game victory really was an indication of the progress made by the Golden Gophers in just one season (after they were 3-8 and 1-10 in the two previous campaigns).

"I believe that since our loss at Purdue early in the year we have made good progress," Holtz said, "and in every game except the one at Illinois we showed that we were not that far away from being a good team. Our win over Iowa was no fluke. It was very gratifying for our players, it showed what kind of team we really were."

It was a game in which Minnesota had to keep coming back, and come back they did. Iowa went out in front 7-0 early in the second quarter, but the Golden Gophers roared right back on a touchdown pass from Rickey Foggie to tight end Kevin Starks.

Then the most spectacular play in Big Ten Conference history, early in the third period, saw the Hawkeyes go ahead again 14-7. Adam Kelly, punting from his own 12 yard line, set a University of Minnesota record by booting the ball 83 yards. Bill Happel of Iowa then set a University of Iowa record by returning that punt 95 yards for a Hawkeye touchdown and another lead.

Minnesota chipped away with a 40-yard field goal in the same period by Chip Lohmiller and then pulled to within one at 14-13 with a 36-yarder early in the fourth. Iowa seemed to put things out of reach with a field goal of its own and a 17-13 lead, but when Minnesota recovered an Iowa fumble on the 14, Gary Couch responded with a gummy TD run on the next play for a 20-17 Golden Gopher lead. Lohmiller's 34 yard field goal in the final minute was only frosting.

But it was nice frosting. It was part of that miracle. And it made for a nice bowl game for the Golden Gophers.

WRESTLERS TO GO TO THE NORTHERN OPEN IN MADISON

Wally Johnson's wrestling crew hits the road for a long schedule of meets which won't find them at home until January. The Northern Open in Madison, Wisconsin is this weekend's stop. The Gophers will wrestle there Saturday, November 24.

The Gophers will bring a lot of new faces to the Open this year, but with the Minnesota Quadrangular under their belt, some of the younger wrestlers may surprise the large field. Twenty seven schools were entered in the tournament last year, this year's entries are not yet known.

The Gophers found some tough going in the Gopher Quadrangular, but not many schools in the country can compete with Iowa. Minnesota did manage to send one wrestler to the finals of his weight class, Dave Dean, a freshman from Montrose, Michigan. He lost the 177 pound finals to Dave Martin of Iowa, 5-1. In the Northern Open, Dean will be defending former Gopher Mike Foy's championship in that weight class.

ICERS FINALLY HOME - HOST B.C.

Minneapolis, MN---The University of Minnesota hockey Gophers finally return to Williams Arena ice this weekend after four road trips in five weekends. Minnesota plays host to Boston College Friday at 7:30 p.m. and Saturday at 2 p.m. Both games will be aired locally by KRSI-950 AM.

The road action finally caught up with Minnesota last weekend as the Gophers could gain but one point in the Saturday-Sunday series at Providence College.

Minnesota came from behind to gain a 3-3 tie in the first outing, but Providence built a 3-1 third period lead Sunday, and then put down another Gopher rally to win 3-2.

However, even though its lead shrunk, Minnesota continues to lead the Western Collegiate Hockey Association (WCHA) standings by four points over Michigan Tech. The Gophers are 9-2-2 overall, and 8-2-2 for 18 points in league play. Tech swept a home pair from Denver over the weekend and now has 14 points on a 7-3-0 league mark.

Minnesota hopes to regroup this weekend when the Boston College Eagles pay a visit to Williams Arena. And for the third time in five series against a Hockey East team, the Gophers are facing a leader.

Boston College has taken over second place in the Hockey East standings with a 6-3-0 league record. Even though the Eagles dropped a 4-7 decision to Lowell last Saturday, they pinned a 6-3 defeat on Boston University earlier in the week. Only Providence, with 13 points (6-4-1), is ahead of B.C.

Right wing Pat Micheletti, still atop the WCHA scoring derby with 30 points in 12 league games, scored in the third period Saturday to give Minnesota its 3-3 tie. Goalie Frank Pietrangelo stopped 32 Providence shots in the game.

For the weekend Micheletti scored two power play goals, one each night, to keep his scoring streak alive. Dating back to the final 16 games last season and counting all 13 outings this year, the Hibbing, MN, native has scored at least one point in 29 consecutive games.

In all games this season, Micheletti leads the Gophers with 33 points (18-15) while his line center, senior Rick Erdall, is next at 7-14-21. Three more Gophers have 12 points each, including sophomore wing Todd Okerlund (6-6), senior captain and defenseman Mike Guentzel (2-10), and sophomore center Corey Millen (5-7). Millen has only appeared in eight games but has scored in every outing.

Freshman goal tender John Blue was the victim of Sunday's 3-2 loss, but still leads all WCHA netminders with a 2.21 goals allowed average. He has only allowed six goals in his last four starts. Pietrangelo had a 3.28 average in league games and is still undefeated this year with a 5-0-2 record in all games.

The Gopher goalies have split every series this season and are expected to do the same against Boston College with Pietrangelo in the nets Friday.

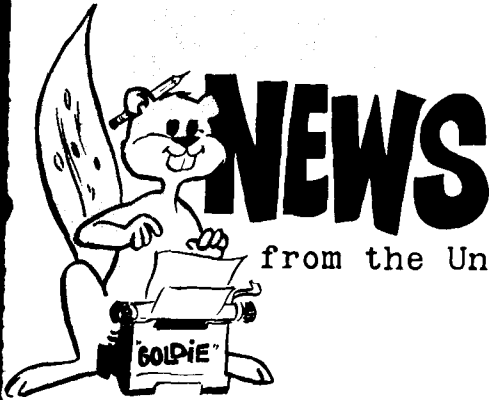

U OF M CAGERS TO ENTERTAIN MONTANA STATE SATURDAY

After playing host to the University of Connecticut Wednesday night, Coach Jim Dutcher's University of Minnesota basketball team will entertain Montana State University in an 8:05 p.m. non-conference assignment at Williams Arena Saturday.

It will be the third straight home start...in a four-game home stand....for Coach Dutcher's youthful cagers, and they hope the old adage about the home floor being friendly will remain true.

Minnesota opened the 1984-85 campaign by nipping an upstart University of Wisconsin-Green Bay contingent 75-71 last weekend, and there were times in that contest when the Gophers thought Williams Arena was anything but friendly.

In fact Minnesota trailed 70-69 with just over two minutes to play in that non-conference shootout before taking charge of things and scoring the final four points of the game to record the win.

"This was the kind of game that we needed," Coach Dutcher said with a relief after things had drawn to a close. "A blowout by Minnesota would have given us false hopes. But this way we found out some things, and we came away with a win."

Dutcher also told his players that they should have come out of the game with more than just a win. "We should have learned a good lesson from this one," he said. "We should have learned that we can never take an opponent lightly, and we should have learned that we can never relax in ANY game."

The 10th-year Minnesota tutor was referring to the fact that each time the Golden Gophers worked themselves into what seemed to be the beginnings of comfortable leads, they let UW Green Bay bounce back.

"There was one point," Dutcher explained, "when we had a 10-point lead in the second half and then came down and took four quick shots. That let them score six unanswered points. We must learn to exhibit patience."

Dutcher did admit, however, that several good things....besides getting a win.... did come out of the '84-'85 opener, and they included some excellent individual efforts by various Golden Gophers.

"Considering the fact that it was the first time against somebody other than ourselves," Dutcher said, "we got pretty good performances out of our younger players." And Dutcher emphasized again that Minnesota has only one senior on this year's squad.

"We will need better performances from our veterans," Dutcher cautioned, "and that includes both patience and consistency. We had a good stretch or two, but nothing like we will need in the future."

Captain Tommy Davis, the lone final-year player on this year's roster, led Minnesota in scoring with 25 points while his running-mate at guard, junior Marc Wilson, had 20....five in the final minute-and-a-half.

"The win wasn't artistic, and it wasn't even pretty," Dutcher admitted, "but to our credit we answered the challenge when we had to. And it still goes into the win column."

Dutcher knows however, as do his players, that every future opponent on the 1984-85 schedule, including this week's foes Connecticut and Montana State, will be much tougher than gutty Green Bay.

"We know that future teams will be much better and our games this week will be much tougher," Dutcher stressed, "but we have to believe that we are going to be that much better, too."

GOPHER TALES---When Montana State rolls into Williams Arena Saturday night, it will be another homecoming of sorts for the visiting Coach, Stu Starner, who (like Dick Lien of UW-Green Bay) hails from Minnesota and once served as an assistant to Dutcher with the Golden Gophers. Starner also was a prep coach at Richfield.

Minnesota's win over UW-Green Bay found the Golden Gophers posting a slim 37-36 edge over the visitors in rebounding, and that's an area where Coach Dutcher knows his charges must improve if they hope to win this season. Junior center 7-0 John Shasky led the way with nine while Davis had seven and freshman Mitch Lee five.

After hosting Montana State on Saturday, Minnesota gets a few days rest before entertaining Ivy League champion Princeton a week from Saturday before departing from Williams Arena for a challenging four-game road trip to Indiana State, Oregon, Arizona and Arkansas.

Minneapolis, MN---Minnesota's streaking hockey Gophers gained an extra bonus in sweeping Boston College at home last weekend, 8-2 and 4-2.

Not only did the Gophers gain four more points in the WCHA standings, but saw their lead increase to six points when its nearest challenger came up with a split series.

Now Minnesota hopes it can maintain its league-leading pace when the U. of Lowell from the Hockey East Association invades Williams Arena for games Friday (7:35 p.m.) and Saturday (2:05 p.m.). Both games will be aired locally by KRSI-950 AM radio.

Gopher head coach Brad Buetow used a new power play unit that provided most of the fire power against Boston College. The line of senior Rick Erdall at center, WCHA scoring leader junior Pat Micheletti at right wing and sophomore Olympic returnee Corey Millen, normally a a center, on left wing combined for 20 points against the Eagles.

On Friday Erdall scored his second career hat trick with all his goals coming on the power play, and chipped in with three assists. The line in mention scored five power play goals in the 8-2 victory.

Although Erdall was shut out Saturday, his new linemates continued to pour it on. When the weekend was over following Saturday's 4-2 victory, both Millen and Micheletti had each scored three goals and four assists.

For his efforts, Millen was named WCHA Player of the Week.

The Gophers never trailed in either contest. Friday saw Minnesota rush to a 4-0 lead before Bob Sweeney got the Eagles first goal midway through the second period.

The same thing happened Saturday when Minnesota took a 3-0 lead into the third period and sophomore Tim Bergland made it 4-0 with a breakaway goal. Eagle scoring leader Scott Harlow then hit both goals for his team on stuff shots reaching around from behind the net.

Once again Gopher goal tenders turned away any hopes the opposition had of mounting a challenge. Junior Frank Pietrangelo stopped 19 B.C. tries Friday and ran his unbeaten record to 6-0-2 for all games. His goals allowed average reads 2.92 for all games played.

Freshman goalie John Blue, leading netminder in the WCHA, dropped his goals allowed average to 2.18 in league play by stopping 29 Eagle shots in Saturday's win. His record is now 5-2-0.

Micheletti ran his consecutive game scoring streak to 31 by counting points in each game. His WCHA scoring total reads 20 goals and 17 assists in 14 league outings. For all 15 games played he has 40 points (21-19).

Lowell, now in its second year of NCAA Division I hockey, has won three of its last four games and six of its last nine outings.

The Chiefs are 7-7-0 for all games, and 6-7-0 for 13 points and tied for third place in the Hockey East standings.

In its last four outings Lowell defeated Boston College 7-5, Northeastern 4-3 in overtime, and last weekend split a home series against Michigan Tech. The Chiefs won 2-1 Friday, but lost to the Huskies 3-2 the next night.

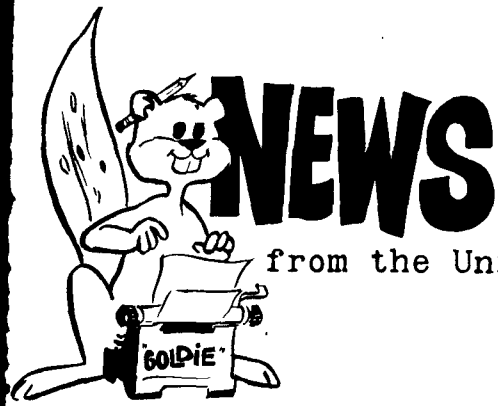

GOLDEN GOPHER CAGERS TO HOST PRINCETON ON SATURDAY

Amid the rigors of fall quarter examinations, Minnesota's Golden Gophers have begun preparations for Saturday's non-conference basketball assignment against Princeton of the Ivy League at 8:05 p.m. in Williams Arena.

That shootout will be the final duel in a four-game home stand by Minnesota before Coach Jim Dutcher takes his youthful cagers on a grueling four-game road trip in another week.

Minnesota will risk an unblemished 3-0 record Saturday against the invading Tigers after downing gutty Montana State University at Williams Arena 85-71 in its most recent action last Saturday night.

Prior to that one-sided verdict over the Bobcats, Minnesota had nudged the University of Wisconsin-Green Bay 75-71 in the 1984-85 season opener and then outlasted the University of Connecticut 61-60 last Wednesday.

"Against Connecticut, we made the big defensive plays when we had to at the end of the game," Coach Dutcher analyzed. "We were down and we came back....

and that's something a good team must be able to do. But we have to learn that we must be able to make our pressure free throws."

Captain Tommy Davis led Minnesota's scoring parade against UCONN with 18 points, but junior John Shasky was the clutch performer who grabbed a rebound and stuffed it back in with 15 seconds remaining to give Minnesota its' margin of victory. Shasky, a 7-0 center, scored 16 points and added nine rebounds against Connecticut.

Against Montana State last weekend, it was a story of Minnesota twice moving into what seemed like comfortable leads only to see the Golden Gophers squander that luxury to the battling Bobcats.

"We have to learn," Dutcher exclaimed, "that when we build up a lead we must remember how we got it and continue to do the same things to keep it. It seemed as though we let our leads get away from us because we tried something else offensively and then lost our defensive concentration. We have to become more consistent if we hope to keep winning."

Kevin Smith, a 6-7 sophomore, was the key in Minnesota's third straight win of the current campaign. Smith turned in his best effort as a collegian by scoring 20 points (he was nine of 11 from the field) and eight rebounds. He also registered four assists and did not have a turnover.

"Saturday's game gave us three wins," Dutcher pointed out, "and while we still have a long way to go, there are a lot of teams who have just as far to go at this stage of the season."

Dutcher seemed pleased, however, with the overall progress of his squad in the early going.... and Golden Gopher fans seemed to concur with Dutcher's assessment that Minnesota was making progress.

"Those first three games did us a lot of good," he said. "Hopefully we continued to learn, and our improvement in getting the ball into good scoring position was obvious against Montana State. In addition, those games gave us an opportunity to get a look at a lot of our new people (Dutcher used 11 players against MSU)."

Those first three have become history, however, and now the Golden Gophers find themselves trying to register win number four while concentrating on the books and final exams during a week which practice times were shuffled from morning to night in an attempt to work around players test schedules.

"We won't be back into a normal practice routine until the end of the week," Dutcher explained, "and we gave the squad last Sunday and Monday off to concentrate on their exams."

And Dutcher has stressed the fact to his players that Princeton will be a very challenging opponent. "We certainly have to work hard to protect our home floor advantage," he told his squad, "but you have to realize that Princeton will be the best team we have met thus far this season."

Can Minnesota "protect" that home floor advantage and record as Dutcher has asked his Golden Gophers to do? They have made progress, and they have improved, but it will take a lot more of the same if Minnesota hopes to tame the Tigers in Williams Arena on Saturday night.

Minneapolis, MN---After scoring a series sweep over Lowell at home last weekend by scores of 6-3 and 5-3, the Minnesota Hockey Gophers can now enjoy a week off from their labor of love and concentrate on term-ending final exams.

The Gophers increased their WCHA lead to nine points over second place Minnesota-Duluth and now have a 12-2-2 league record for 26 points. UM is 13-2-2 overall, has won its last four straight, and only suffered one loss and one tie game in its last 12 outings.

It was largely through the efforts of the newly formed Corey Millen line and freshman goalie John Blue that Minnesota gained its wins against Lowell.

However, Buetow emphasized that the deficit was not all Pietrangelo's fault. "He (Pietrangelo) was unprotected by his defense, both forwards and the defensemen, and was struggling," Buetow said, "so I thought it best to try (John) Blue at that point."

The other change was to move junior left wing to center Millen's line also after the first period. With Todd Okerlund still skating at right wing, this line exploded over the next two periods.

Between them they scored five goals and added nine assists, four by Millen, to insure the come from behind 6-3 win. Anderson and Okerlund each tallied two goals with Okerlund gaining the game winner. Blue shut out Lowell in the final 40 minutes making 18 stops.

On Saturday the Millen line again spearheaded the Gopher attack scoring two goals and three assists as UM led 2-0 after the first period and never trailed. Blue was again in goal and only had to come up with 16 saves in gaining his seventh win of the year. His goals against average is 2.11 as he continues as the stingiest netminder in the WCHA.

BUETOW ON THE GOPHER TO DATE

"I actually have mixed emotions about taking a break at this time," Buetow said Monday. "I realize our men can really use the rest both physically and mentally, but at the same time I'm a bit concerned in breaking our momentum. We have been going awfully good. Sometimes it's difficult to retain momentum once it's broken.

"But I'm certainly happy with our overall play such as cutting down penalties, showing consistency and our team defense holding up. We lead the WCHA in lowest goals allowed average. Every coach points towards that factor.

"I really do not look at us being a nine-point leader with the season half over. Minnesota-Duluth is on a roll and has four games in hand. So I consider our lead to actually be one point at this time. For this week it's optional skating. We'll go back to work for real next week."

JAPANESE ALL-STARS RETURN TO WILLIAMS ARENA

The Japanese All-Stars return for their fifth year of gymnastics competition with the Gophers at 3:00 p.m. on December 8 at Williams Arena.

The meet will also include women's competition, for the first time.

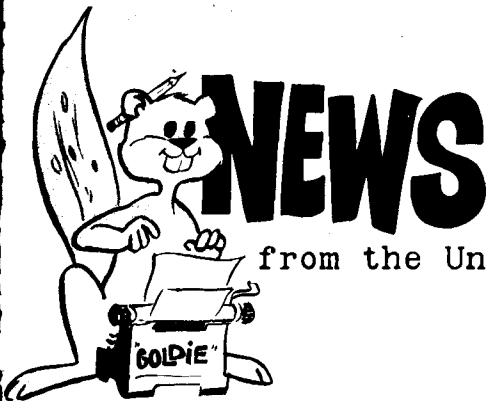

GOLDEN GOPHER CAGERS ON FOUR-GAME ROAD TRIP

After taking on Indiana State University in Terre Haute Tuesday, the University of Minnesota continues an ambitious four-game road trip by invading Eugene, Oregon Saturday for an intersectional basketball assignment against the University of Oregon.

That weekend shootout against the Ducks is slated for a 10:05 p.m. (CST) tip off, and it will be followed by another toughie at Arizona next Monday before Coach Jim Dutcher's contingent closes its four-game trek at Arkansas a week from Thursday.

The Golden Gophers came into this week's competition 4-0 (built on four Williams Arena outings) following last weekend's thrill-packed 46-44 non-conference triumph over defending Ivy League champion Princeton.

Minnesota didn't get that win very easily over what Dutcher described as "A well-coached, extremely well disciplined team that does some things very well."

The invading Tigers did a lot of things well against the sluggish Golden Gophers. They outshot Minnesota from the field .488 to .404, from the free

throw line .667 to .400, had more steals (5-0) and more assists (10-4). Only in the rebounding column did the host club fare better....garnering 32 to only 23 for Princeton.

"Their defense gave us trouble," Dutcher admitted, "but some of those problems were because we played too cautiously on offense. We were way too tentative, and we must become a lot more aggressive if we hope to keep improving."

Captain Tommy Davis led Minnesota with 16 points, but he was the only Golden Gopher to finish in double figures. Kevin Smith, who was four-of-five from the field, was next in line with eight.

"We need to start getting some transition baskets," Dutcher maintained. "We didn't do that against Princeton. And we didn't get any rebound baskets until near the end of the game."

Dutcher was also deeply concerned about his club's inability to score from the free throw line. "We only made one-of-three free throws in the first half and never did get into a one-and-one situation. In the second half we finally started getting the ball inside, and in the process we drew some fouls. But we still couldn't convert them. We HAVE to start making our free throws!"

Despite all that gloom, Dutcher did find some good things about the Princeton assignment. "It still was a win," he pointed out, "and for the third time this season we came from behind, and we won it in the closing moments."

While those come-from-behind verdicts, and those closing-moment wins give Minnesota fans in Williams Arena a lot of anxious moments, they may have done the 1984-85 youth-oriented Golden Gophers some good.

"Those close wins have helped our young team build a little confidence," Dutcher maintains. "Our players are getting to feel that if they can stay with a team, stay close, they can find a way to win it at the end."

The fact that Minnesota was able to protect its home-floor advantage before hitting the road also was a positive factor for Dutcher's squad. "We got a win over Princeton," he explained, "and that made us 4-0. We felt from the beginning of the season that it was necessary for us to win our first four at home.

Now, however, Minnesota finds itself in what may be the toughest road trip any team in America will make this season. "Last week was a tough week for us," Dutcher analyzed, "with an inconsistent practice schedule, players concentrating on studies for final exams rather than basketball and a general break in our normal routine. Now we have a couple of weeks with nothing to think about except basketball."

It will have to as the Golden Gophers make their first trip of the year. "We are facing a very tough stretch," Dutcher admitted. "Every team we are scheduled to play on this four-game swing will have better talent than what we have faced so far."

None of which is expected to prompt Dutcher to change his lineup. Smith will team with Mitchell Lee at forward, John Shasky will hold down the center spot and Marc Wilson will continue to work with Davis at guard.

Minneapolis, MN---With its term-ending exam period completed, Minnesota's hockey Gophers return to action this weekend by paying a visit to Grand Forks and a two-game set against the North Dakota Fighting Sioux Friday and Saturday.

Still atop the WCHA by seven points over second place Minnesota-Duluth, thanks in part to North Dakota's 6-5 victory over the Bulldogs at home last Saturday, games this weekend mark the first time Minnesota has faced a WCHA rival since taking both games at Colorado College November 9-10.

Minnesota is 13-2-2 overall and 12-2-2 for 26 points in league play. UM-Duluth is now 13-4-1 and 9-4-1 for 19 league points. The loss at UND last Saturday ended a 10-game undefeated string for the Bulldogs, and also stopped a 13-game unbeaten streak.

North Dakota, which also got off to an extremely slow start because of multiple injuries and playing probably the youngest squad in the league, has started back with a vengeance. The Sioux have moved up to fifth place in the WCHA standings on a 7-6-1 record for 15 points. North Dakota is 10-7-1 overall.

"Some people have said to me just wait until you get back to playing WCHA teams. Things will not be so easy," Gopher coach Brad Buetow offered.

"Hey, I wouldn't say things have been so easy for any WCHA team in games against Hockey East clubs. We have found that those teams are a whole lot better than some people believed. We know that for sure because both our losses and one tie have come against Hockey East schools.

"Actually, I wish we could have opened our season against some of the WCHA schools. Several were struggling early because of so much youth on their rosters. The fact that we may have had more returning lettermen than just about anyone could have worked to our advantage.

"Whatever the reasons, I'm simply happy that we have had as much success as our record shows at this time. Granted, we have come up with a lot of good bounces of the puck and some other breaks, too. But a whole lot of hard work by every man on our squad has contributed much, much more.

"But we also must remember that most of our WCHA opponents still have two games in hand. That means our present seven-point lead is, in reality, only three points until games played even up.

"I believe the rest we gained last week was good for our players both physically and mentally. I just hope the time off didn't have a negative effect on any momentum we had gained. That will show one way or the other this weekend at North Dakota."

Buetow-coached teams are 12-12-0 against coach Gino Gasparini's Sioux clubs. Last year the schools met eight times with UM taking five wins. However, North Dakota won the last two in a second round WCHA playoff series to end UM's 1983-84 season.

Buetow added that he does not plan any major lineup changes for this week's series, but is still undecided about his goalie rotation. He did say he expects to use both junior Frank Pietrangelo and freshman John Blue in the nets, but is not certain which nights.

The Gophers did get some playing time last Sunday, but lost 3-1 to an alumni team. Former Gopher goalies Mike Vacanti and Ron Docken turned away a ton of shots in the two-period contest. Ahhhh experience, isn't it grand.

ICERS SPLIT AT ND, GO NON-CONFERENCE THIS WEEK

Minneapolis,MN---Minnesota's hockey Gophers leave the WCHA portion of their schedule beginning this weekend knowing they will remain in first place at least until returning to league play in January.

The Gophers split a pair of games at North Dakota last weekend and are now 13-3-2 for 28 points and own a seven point lead in the WCHA standings. UM is 14-3-2 overall.

First up for Minnesota is a home pair this weekend against the University of Illinois-Chicago from the Central Collegiate Hockey Association (CCHA). Games are set at 7:35 p.m. Friday and 2:05 p.m. Saturday at Williams Arena. Both games will be aired live via KRSI-950 AM radio in the Twin Cities.

(OVER)

The Gophers displayed contrasting styles of play at Grand Forks last weekend. According to head coach Brad Buetow, "We probably played our worst game of the year in losing 4-1 Friday, but turned around to display our best game of the year Saturday in winning 5-3. Don't ask me why. It just sometimes comes out that way."

The Fighting Sioux carried the play to Minnesota from the opening bell Friday. It was actually strange that Minnesota held the Sioux to a 1-1 tie in the first period when Todd Okerlund scored for UM just 41 seconds after ND had taken its first lead.

But from that point on it was all North Dakota. The Sioux scored twice in the second period, and one more in the last two minutes even though the Gophers finally got untracked and fired 16 shots on net in the final 20 minutes.

But ND freshman goalie Scott Brower held UM at bay making 34 stops for the night. Had it not been for some excellent goaling by Gopher junior Frank Pietrangelo, the final margin of victory could have been much higher. The loss was Pietrangelo's first of the season.

Minnesota turned the tables Saturday and came out smoking. But again the score read 1-1 after the first period. Sophomore center Corey Millen scored his first of two goals for the game just over a minute after Jim Archibald had put the Sioux in an early lead.

But the second period was the undoing for North Dakota as the Gophers scored four times. Pat Micheletti, Wally Chapman, Kurt Larson and Millen hit for the Gophers with Larson's first goal of the year becoming the game winner.

Gopher freshman goalie John Blue gave up one goal in the second and another in the third period in running his season record to 8-2-0.

His 2.20 goals allowed average continues to lead all WCHA netminders just as Micheletti's 42 points tops all league scorers. Micheletti popped in one goal and added two assists on the weekend. He now has 21 goals and the same number of assists in 18 league games. He is 22-23-45 for all games.

Millen and Rick Erdall also chipped in with three points apiece against North Dakota. Erdall is second to Micheletti in team scoring with 33 points (12-21) while Millen is third at 30 (12-18). Millen, who sat out 5½ games early in the season with a shoulder injury, has scored at least one point in all 14 games he has played.

Illinois-Chicago started out the season with a bang and for awhile was challenging CCHA leader Michigan State for top honors in its league race. However, the Flames have come upon hard times lately and have struggled to remain in the first division.

UIC features no less than seven Minnesota high school products on its 1984-85 roster, including center Scott Knutson from Minneapolis Roosevelt High School who was on the Gopher roster last season. Knutson transferred to UIC last summer and under CCHA rules received instant eligibility.

Minnesota opened its 1983-84 season at UIC winning 12-2 and 5-1. Those games were the first ever between the schools.

CAGERS WIN 2, AT ARK THUR., HOME SAT

Minneapolis, MN---Hey, what's going on out west with those Minnesota basketball Gophers?

After squeezing out four tight wins at home, coach Jim Dutcher's 1984-85 Gopher cage edition took off on a four-game road trip last week. Expectations for any wins were dimmed when UM lost its first road game 94-86 at Indiana State.

But then came the joy. Last Saturday the Gophers overcame a 13-point deficit in the second half to defeat the Oregon Ducks 57-53 when captain Tommy Davis canned six straight free throws in the closing minutes.

On Monday UM went up against undefeated (7-0) U. of Arizona in the Wildcat lair and came away with an 88-79 victory. Minnesota owned a 9-point halftime lead (39-30), saw it disappear in the first few minutes of the second half, but regained the lead and won going away.

Strangely enough the Gophers did it at the free thrown line again, something that does not usually happen to teams on the road.

Arizona, in a desperation attempt to cut into Minnesota's late 12-point lead, continued to foul, and the Gophers continued to convert. Freshman guard Todd Alexander banged home 12 of 12 tries from the line. As a team the Gophers hit 28 of 33 from the charity stripe for a .848% conversion rate.

But the joy may be shortlived as Minnesota has one more stop before coming home Saturday to host the U. of Detroit at 8 p.m. in Williams Arena.

Minnesota takes on nationally ranked U. of Arkansas Thursday in Pine Bluff, AK. The Razorbacks are one of the favorites to win the Southwest Conference title and have only lost once this season.

Davis has been on a tear for the Gophers during the road swing. He canned 25 points in the loss at Indiana State, hit for a season high 28 at Oregon, and jammed home 23 more points against Arizona. He is averaging a team high 21.4 for the season.

Davis has also become the 19th player in UM history to crack the 1,000-point barrier in career points. Through Monday he has totaled 1,096 points good for 12th place on the all-time UM scoring list.

Just ahead of Tommy is Osborne Lockhart who totaled 1,106 points from 1974 through 1978.

After hosting Detroit Saturday, Minnesota will complete the non-conference portion of its 1984-85 schedule when Marquette University comes to town Wednesday, December 26. The Warriors feature sophomore center Tom Copa from Coon Rapids as the key to their lineup.

After the latter game the Gophers rest until January 3-5 when Big Ten powers Illinois and Purdue visit Williams Arena for evening contests. Illinois is heavily favored to repeat as conference champs, a title they shared with Purdue in 1983-84.

3 GOPHERS 1ST TEAM ALL-ACADEMIC

Three University of Minnesota football players were honored this week by being named to the 1984 Big 10 Football All-Academic first team.

The players are senior Craig Paulson from Stevens Point, WI, plus juniors Peter Najarian from Minneapolis and David Puk from Cedar Rapids, IA.

For Najarian, a Central High School graduate, it marks the second straight year he has been so honored. A three-year starting linebacker with the Gophers, he carries a 3.04 cumulative grade point average while majoring in Pre-Medicine.

Puk, Minnesota's leading ground gainer in 1983 and second leading rusher last season running from fullback, also majors in Pre-Med and has a 3.64 GPA.

Paulson was injured and missed the last half of the 1984 season, but as a three-year starter at defensive tackle was still honored. He has a 3.00 GPA in General Studies and has completed his football career at Minnesota.
