MINUTES

April 24, 1975

The third regular meeting of the Twin Cities Campus Assembly was convened in the auditorium of Nicholson Hall on Thursday, April 24, 1975. Checking or signing the roll as present were 90 voting members of the faculty, 16 voting members of the student body, and 4 nonmembers.

III. REPORT OF THE ASSEMBLY COMMITTEE ON ACADEMIC STANDING

1. Reported for Action (20 minutes)

RECOMMENDATION FOR A CHANGE IN THE TWIN CITIES CAMPUS GRADING SYSTEM

Background Information

The grading policy adopted in 1972 by the Twin Cities Campus Assembly included provision for a two-record academic transcript system. The official University transcript for Twin Cities students is an accomplishment record; the internal University operational record, available to the student and his college, shows supplementary symbols (W, I, N, X), as well as accomplishment grades.

Implementation of the two-record system has proceeded, and about two-thirds of Twin Cities students are now on the two-record computer transcript system. Students on the two-record system who have academic records which begin prior to fall, 1972, have external transcripts under both new and old transcript policies. Prior to 1972, both accomplishment and non-accomplishment grades are shown. That procedure is based on the following provision of the 1972 Assembly action:

- "8. This grading system shall go into effect for the fall quarter, 1972, thereby replacing all previous University systems, but its definitions and provisions may not be applied retroactively to any grades or symbols recorded before that time. Each college shall devise ways to relate the new system to the former systems in a manner best suited to its purposes."

The Committee has received requests from faculty and student groups to change the restriction in the grading policy on converting pre-1972 records to the two-record system. The change would permit the extension of the two-record system to work taken prior to fall, 1972.

The restriction against retroactive application of the two-record procedure was based on the belief that a change in grading activities by teaching faculty members would occur with implementation of the new grading system. That is, knowing that only accomplishment grades would show on University transcripts, instructors would change the way in which they assign grades. The Committee reviewed grade distributions and found no compelling evidence that a disjuncture in grading occurred in fall, 1972.

Given student-faculty concern, the confusion which may result from a transcript prepared under two procedures, and the lack of evidence to support the concern for the effect on grading of the implementation of the new system in 1972, the Committee recommends a policy to convert pre-1972 records for students who are still enrolled and pursuing degrees.

For Action

Delete the following provision of the 1972 Twin Cities Campus Assembly grading policy:

"8. This grading system shall go into effect for the fall quarter, 1972, thereby replacing all previous University systems, but its definitions and provisions may not be applied retroactively to any grades or symbols recorded before that time. Each college shall devise ways to relate the new system to the former systems in a manner best suited to its purposes."

Add in place of the deleted section the following:

"8. The grading policy was effective fall, 1972, thereby replacing all previous University systems. The provisions of the two-record transcript system, including deletion on the official transcript of supplementary symbols defined in the 1972 policy (W, I, N, X) and other non-accomplishment symbols awarded prior to 1972 (e.g., F, Z, U), shall be made available to students under the following conditions:

- a. The student is registered in a Twin Cities college as a regular student as of fall quarter, 1975, or later.
- b. A record will not be changed if the student has received a degree (other than an Associate degree) based on that record.
- c. The conversion of pre-1972 records will follow the schedule for conversion of all student transcript records to the computer transcript system (unless the student elects to have his record converted earlier, out of sequence, under the provisions of the 1974 Assembly policy, wherein he is assessed a fee for the cost of that service).

A motion was made that, in order to avoid approaching the subject of our recent educational reforms on a piecemeal basis, this matter be referred back to the Committee until such time as it or the other relevant committees have had a chance to study systematically the impact of the new credit module and the new grading policies on our educational programs and have brought to the Assembly a set of recommendations.

2. Reported for Action (15 minutes)

USE OF THE GRADE POINT AVERAGE

Background Information

The 1972 Assembly grading policy recommended the discontinuation of the use of the grade point average, because its use diverts attention from interpretation of specific course accomplishments to reliance on a summary figure which masks subtleties of academic accomplishment.

On the other hand, the grade point average has continued to be used by many units within the University, and its unavailability in central offices is a handicap to some students who request its release to non-University agencies.

For Action

Grade point averages will be calculated and made available to both University and non-University agencies according to procedures reviewed and approved by the Assembly Committee on Academic Standing. Specific written request from the student will be required prior to release of grade point averages which contain more information than is contained on the (external) University transcript.

REPORT ON COMMITTEE ACTIVITIES

The Assembly Committee on Academic Standing was established this year to deal with academic standing policy and questions which affect the Twin Cities campus. The recommendation to establish the Committee was contained in the 1972 report to the Assembly on grading policy, but the by-law change necessary to implement the recommendation was not approved until this year.

The Committee has met four times during winter quarter to consider the effect of the implementation of the new grading policy approved by the Assembly in 1972. Action items relating to the retroactive application of the two-record transcript policy and to the use of grade point averages are presented in this docket for consideration by the Assembly. A joint ACAS-SCEP subcommittee has been established to review the level and types of grades awarded. The Committee reviewed the procedures for making exceptions to all-University grading policy and provided guidance to the Office of Admissions and Records on that matter.

V. OLD BUSINESS

Statement by President C. Peter Magrath on the Faculty Salary Recommendations by the Education Division of the House Appropriations Committee:

The highest single priority request in the University of Minnesota's 1975-77 legislative request concerns faculty salaries. Put most simply, faculty salary increases in the past two biennia have averaged only approximately 5 percent at a time when inflation has dramatically eroded faculty purchasing power and when other universities with whom we compete to attract and maintain outstanding faculty have increased their position relative to ours.

For this reason I urged the Board of Regents on my arrival last year to authorize me to revise the University's legislative request so that there would be major and special emphasis on faculty salaries. As a consequence, the University is seeking a 16.5 percent increase for academic salaries in 1975-76 and 6 percent plus a cost-of-living escalator in 1976-77. To reiterate, this is the University's top priority.

The 1975-76 salary increase request includes three components: 12 percent to mitigate the effects of increases in the cost of living; 3.5 percent to reward merit of individual faculty members; and 1 percent to address internal equity problems. For 1976-77 our request has been to address further cost-of-living increases that may well occur through the use of an open appropriation and a cost-of-living formula similar to that used by Civil Service employees. In addition, we are requesting a 6 percent increase—5 percent for merit and 1 percent for internal equity—so as to bring University of Minnesota salary averages into a more competitive position in our traditional market, namely, the Big Ten universities, the University of Chicago, and the University of California. Because the need for faculty salary improvement is so significant a part of this legislative request, I am profoundly concerned at the possible consequence of the current recommendation of the Education Division of the House Committee on Appropriations. The Division recommendation would provide for academic salary increases of 7 percent in 1975-76 and 6 percent in 1976-77. Although I realize that many factors and judgments inevitably go into such recommendations, I am respectfully requesting that the full Appropriations Committee reconsider this matter when they act upon the Education Bill.

This is urgent in my view, for inflation has had a disastrous impact on our faculty salary structure. It is for this reason that the University is seeking a 16.5

percent faculty salary increase for the first year of the 1975-76 biennium, and a 6 percent increase plus cost-of-living escalator for the second year. Our cost-of-living request is not based on individual opinions or guesses. It is based on actual increases in living costs, and no amount of debate or conjecture will change the fact that a total faculty salary increase of 7 percent in 1975-76 will simply not make up the loss in purchasing power our faculty has experienced. Inflation since 1972 has produced a real dollar pay cut for University faculty and, if the Education Bill is enacted as currently recommended by the Education Division of the House, University faculty may well wind up being the only state-supported personnel expected to live with this kind of erosion in their purchasing power. In the long run, this will also have a negative impact on our competitive situation as an American university.

My colleagues and I in the University central administration are doing all that is possible to communicate our most profound concern on this matter, and to seek a reexamination and reconsideration of this issue by the House Appropriations Committee.

VI. NEW BUSINESS

The following motion on athletic fees was approved:

That the Twin Cities Assembly request the Assembly Committee on Inter-collegiate Athletics to bring to the Assembly at its next meeting a report of the proposed ticket price schedule so that the Assembly could vote it up or down.

Appendix 1

ABSTRACT OF DISCUSSION

The meeting was called to order at 3:15 p.m. by George Shapiro, professor of speech and communications and vice chairman of the Assembly, in Nicholson Hall auditorium.

Nominating Committee Report—Mr. Shapiro announced four nominees to fill two 3-year terms on the Committee on Committees for 1974-78. There were no further nominations from the floor, and Richard Skaggs and Clare Woodward were elected in written balloting.

Assembly and Campus Committees—Memberships on committees for next year were approved after announcement of a number of deletions from the printed docket.

Business and Rules Committee Report—Leon Reisman, professor in General College and chairman of the Steering Committee, moved nomination of Mr. Shapiro for another term as vice chairman of the Assembly. A move to close nominations was approved, and Mr. Shapiro was elected unanimously.

Academic Standing Committee—James Preus, associate director of admissions and records and chairman of the committee, presented a recommendation for change in the Twin Cities campus grading system. The proposal, he said, was to permit extension of the two-record system to include work taken prior to fall, 1972, which was the date on which the Assembly had approved adoption of the two-record system. He noted that the new procedure had had little effect on grading. However, he pointed out that a single transcript indicating one procedure prior to fall, 1972, and another after that date was confusing, and he urged approval of the proposal.

John Turner, Regents' professor of political science, moved to refer the matter back to the committee and outlined his threefold concern: that the new credit module was not being carried out as originally proposed; that the S-N grading system was not working to broaden the perspectives of students; and that by making the policy retroactive the University was furthering a hypocritical practice of keeping two sets of books. He urged that the recommendation be examined in terms of the impact on the University's educational philosophy, and his motion included a charge to the Academic Standing Committee and other relevant committees to study the impact of the new credit module and new grading policies on educational programs and return to the Assembly with a set of recommendations.

Robert Holt, professor of political science, agreed that other committees should have an opportunity to respond. He also claimed that the transcript policy discriminated in favor of the rich student over the poor, the former having the resources to change courses more readily, and also that it discriminated against the good student. The Turner motion to recommit the proposal was then approved.

Mr. Preus continued with the second action item—a proposal to continue use of the grade point average so it could be available to both University and non-University agencies. The 1972 policy had asked for its discontinuance. John Webb, professor of geography, observed that the GPA was not an honest measurement because it excluded "incompletes." Responding to a request that the exact definition of the GPA be made available to all those who used it, Mr. Preus said that his committee would have that responsibility. He indicated a number of cases where the GPA was needed, such as for applications for insurance, Phi Beta Kappa interests, and some collegiate units' needs. John Ciabattari,

student, spoke in favor of the motion, holding that the average was a good indication of what the student had done, and the Preus motion was approved.

Hyman Berman, professor of history, recommended that the Academic Standing Committee examine the effects of N-F grading and return to the Assembly with a position to which it could react. Mr. Preus said that the joint Academic Standing-Educational Policy Committee was looking at the overall grading policy and that SCEP was the appropriate body to consider the grading module.

A report of the committee was presented for information.

Placement Services Committee—A report of the committee was presented for information.

President's Statement—Mr. Shapiro read a statement issued that afternoon by President C. Peter Magrath on faculty salary recommendations made the day before by the Education Division of the House Appropriations Committee of the Minnesota Legislature. It contained his reaction to the proposal to cut substantially the University request for faculty salary increase monies for the next biennium by calling attention to the effect on such salaries of the rising cost of living. He also cited the adverse consequences to the University's competitive position in its traditional market. He expressed the hope that the matter would be reconsidered by the full Appropriations Committee.

Athletic Department Report—John Ciabattari, student, called attention to a recent Daily article announcing a drastic increase in ticket prices for athletic events and called for a report from the Intercollegiate Athletics Committee, because there was no other forum in which the student body could react to such actions. He then moved that the committee present such a report to the Assembly so that it would have an opportunity to vote. Russell Hobbie, professor of physics and chairman of the Business and Rules Committee, noted that the committee was empowered to act on such fees but that it should bring those actions for information to the Assembly. The Ciabattari motion was then approved.

The meeting adjourned at 4:30 p.m.
