V. CAMPUS COMMITTEE ON CONVOCATIONS AND THE ARTS ANNUAL REPORT, 1979-80

The Committee met five times during the 1979-80 academic year. The Committee voted to allocate \$5,975 in partial support of 15 events and \$400 for clerical expenses. Included in these events were lectures by outstanding visitors in the areas of art history, women's studies, the problems of world hunger and of human issues and values, and artistic programs such as dance performances, music demonstrations, poetry readings and a Kokoschka exhibit. In addition, a textile symposium and a presentation of modern German films received partial support, as well as the Fall Out Magazine produced by Midwestern writers.

The Committee co-sponsored events with the Departments of Music, Afro-American Studies, Art History, Theatre Arts, Women's Studies, the University Theatre, the University Art Gallery, Walker Art Center, etc. and with student organizations such as the University Film Society, the Hunger Project Committee, the Program on Human Issues and Values, the Committee on Bio-Medical Ethics, the University Marxist Club, and the South Africa Solidarity Committee.

Six completed information sheets of events were received, indicating good to excellent attendance at the events co-sponsored by this committee. Greater student participation at committee meetings is clearly desirable to assist the committee in evaluating events of special and general interest to the University community.

A copy of the details of each approved committee action is on file in the office of the clerk of the Assembly. The committee would like to thank Professor Ross Smith of Concerts and Lectures for serving ex officio and for offering his expertise to the committee, and Ms. Pat Solstad for her most helpful assistance as secretary of the committee.

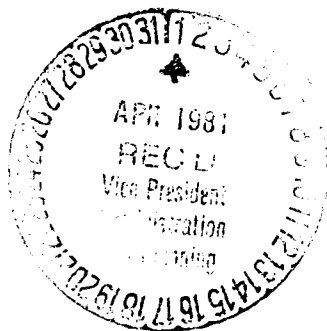
VIII. ADJOURNMENT

VI. BUSINESS & RULES COMMITTEE
CONSTITUTION, BYLAWS, AND RULES REVISION
(5 minutes)

INFORMATION:

The Committee on Business and Rules this year undertook a revision of the Twin Cities Campus Assembly Constitution, Bylaws, and Rules to make those documents parallel to the newly-revised University Senate Constitution, Bylaws, and Rules. A draft of our revision is currently being examined by chairs of committees of the Assembly, who have been invited to submit comments for further revision. We intend to present the revised Constitution to the Assembly for approval at its first meeting in the fall quarter of 1981.

The basic changes from our present TCCA Constitution, Bylaws, and Rules involve realignment of the committees of the Assembly. These, like the Senate committees, have been divided into three types: Assembly committees, Standing committees, and Operations committees.

VII. STUDENT AFFAIRS COMMITTEE
STUDENT SERVICES FEE, MINNESOTA DAILY
(15 minutes)

MOTION

WHEREAS the Student Services Fee is a mandatory fee on each University campus that is collected for all students who register for six or more credits in an academic quarter;
WHEREAS the Student Services Fee supports student activities and services which are an integral part of a University education and "to the common good" and which would not otherwise be available or affordable;

WHEREAS the procedure for determining student services fees is an open and representative process that includes students, faculty, and administrators, and

WHEREAS the Twin Cities Campus Assembly, through its Committee on Student Affairs, is charged by the Board of Regents with supervision of Student Publications;

BE it resolved that the Twin Cities Campus Assembly reaffirms its commitment to the representative process of fee-setting currently in operation and the resulting mandatory assessment of these fees, and

Strongly urges the Board of Regents, upon review of the *Minnesota Daily* refund "experiment," to discontinue the current refund option and to reinstate the Board of Publications fee as a regular part of the mandatory student services fee structure and assessment.

COMMENT:

The above resolution is an adaptation of one which was passed by the Assembly Committee on Student Affairs. Wording has been changed only to make it apply directly to the Twin Cities Campus Assembly. It is an outgrowth of a careful assessment of the *Daily* refund experiment, as well as an examination of the philosophy and principles underlying the mandatory fees process. The resolution calls for the Twin Cities Campus Assembly to reaffirm its position of last year in regard to the *Daily* fee, and to communicate this position to the Regents.

VIII. STUDENT AFFAIRS COMMITTEE

A. STUDENT PUBLICATIONS

INFORMATION:

Last spring the ACSA presented a series of recommendations designed to improve the Board of Student Publications structurally and procedurally. TCCA passed a motion which directed ACSA to implement, among other measures, an appointive process for selection of Board members. Currently Board members are elected in the spring all-campus elections.

ACSA has worked diligently with the Board of Student Publications in order to bring this matter to a responsible conclusion. During the past year the Board has re-written its constitution and bylaws, incorporating all but one of the twelve (12) recommendations which were under ACSA authority to implement. The one exception was the recommendation establishing an appointive process. The Board gave great consideration to this item and decided that it could not voluntarily incorporate it into the constitution. After hearing their arguments, and after considering the alternatives, the ACSA voted to endorse their position subject to consultation with TCCA.

The chair observed that the committee was reporting to the Assembly, for information, the fact that it had not formulated the new constitution in accordance with the directions it received from the Assembly on May 29, 1980. The Assembly is free to place this item on its agenda for action at a later date.

B. SMOKING PARAPHERNALIA

INFORMATION:

The following policy was developed last year in response to the smoking paraphernalia issue, which involved the sale of such items by the MSA TOO store, a student-run business enterprise. The policy was revised this year to agree with the changes in the Regents' Policy on Business Enterprises. Currently, ACSA is in the process of incorporating the revised policy into the Policy Manual for Registered Student Organizations.

POLICY

State and national laws prohibit the sale, possession, or consumption of controlled substances. The Assembly Committee on Student Affairs has recognized that drug-related smoking paraphernalia are not conducive to nor supportive of the well-being of the University academic community. The sale, exchange, or distribution of drug-related paraphernalia by registered student organizations is not permitted.

The Vice President for Finance and the Vice President for Student Affairs shall approve all contracts for student stores and/or other registered student organizations concerning products that may be questionable in terms of drug-related paraphernalia. This policy is consistent with the policy on business enterprises.

1. The Assembly Committee on Student Affairs declares that upon written notification of a violation of the above policy by the Office for Student Affairs, the registered student organization shall lose all rights and privileges as a registered student organization.

2. *In losing the rights and privileges, the registered student organization shall become disestablished and any assets shall be deposited with the Student Organization Finance.*

3. In case of dispute, the registered student organization will have ten (10) days in which to apply for review to the Assembly Committee on Student Affairs.

ABSTRACT

The third meeting of 1980-81 was called to order by vice chair Russell Hobbie, director, Space Science Center, at 3:15 p.m. in 25 Law Building. The minutes of the February meeting were approved.

Nominating Committee, Committee on Committees—Richard Purple, professor of physiology and chair of the nominating committee to provide candidates to fill next year's vacancies on the Committee on Committees, presented six names for approval. The slate was approved by the Faculty Assembly, and Russell Hobbie and Mahmood Zaidi were elected for three-year terms, and Bruce Overmier, for a one-year term, by written ballot at the meeting.

Election of 1981-82 Vice Chair—Robert Brasted, professor of chemistry, nominated Richard Purple, recently elected to a similar post in the Senate for next year. There being no opposition, Mr. Purple was elected by a unanimous ballot.

1982-83 Calendar—Donald Vesley, professor of environmental health and safety and Calendar Committee member, presented the 1982-83 calendar and invited comment. None was forthcoming and it was approved.

Constitution, Bylaws, and Rules Revision—Constance Sullivan, associate professor of Spanish and Portuguese and Business and Rules Committee chair, reported that her committee hoped the proposed revision of the Assembly's constitution, bylaws, and rules could be brought to the Assembly early next fall. A proposal for a separation of powers of the Faculty Assembly and Student Assembly has been suggested by members of the student body and maybe included in the document, she said. Orhan Arkan, student Steering Committee member, noted that the matter had been brought to the attention of the Senate Consultative Committee, where students pointed out that some topics were exclusively concerns of students, just as others are now acted on by the faculty members of the Assembly. He suggested that the Consultative Committee and Business and Rules would continue consideration of a change. Steve Carlson, student, maintained the present Senate constitution was sufficient.

Student Services Fee, Minnesota Daily—David Lawson, student and chair of the Student Affairs Committee, urged that the Assembly approve a resolution calling for the discontinuation of the *Minnesota Daily* refund option in the student services fee structure. He said that a report by Assistant Vice President for Student Affairs Barbara Pilling on the refund option experiment included an outline of the principles that underlay the fees procedure. He said cancellation of the option would be consistent with those principles. (The report is available in the Student Affairs office.) Ms. Eaton, speaking on behalf of the Steering Committee, reported unanimous approval of the resolution by that committee. Steve Carlson, student, contended that the matter should be discussed by a student body group such as the Board of Publications. He could not support the resolution, he said, because the Board of Publications, not the *Daily*, had the right to the mandatory fee, and that Board's responsibilities were not limited to the *Daily*. He maintained that the *Daily* was an administrative monopoly, acting as a rubber stamp for the administration. He said the Assembly would best protect the freedom of publications for students by permitting the Board to carry out its responsibilities. The motion was then approved overwhelmingly with several opposed and one abstaining.

Student Publications—Russell Henly, student and Student Affairs Committee member who chaired the group that dealt with the Board of Publications constitution and bylaws revision, reported that the group had believed the selection of Board members should be by election rather than by the appointive process as directed by the Twin Cities Campus Assembly last year. That way it would play a constructive rather than a destructive role, he said. The chair noted that the Student Affairs Committee was reporting to the Assembly for information that it had not formulated the new constitution in accordance with last year's Assembly instructions, so that body could reintroduce the matter at a future meeting.

Smoking Paraphernalia—Mr. Lawson reported that his committee had drawn up the policy with respect to smoking paraphernalia sales because the MSA Too store, a student-

operated store, stocked those items. ACSA approved a policy banning the sale of drug-related paraphernalia. The committee is currently reviewing that policy and may reword it. Mr. Carlson disputed the intrusion of the Assembly in what he said was a Twin Cities Student Assembly matter. Mr. Lawson disagreed, indicating that Regents' policy made it clear that matters involving disposition of funds were a responsibility of the Student Affairs Committee.

There being no further business brought to the floor, the meeting was adjourned at 4:10 p.m.

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
