Abstract:

Alopecia is the medical term for hairloss or baldness. Androgenetic alopecia is hair loss due to changes in hormones, thinning of hair follicles, and decreased time for hair growth. Topical minoxidil (Rogaine) is a safe and effective treatment for patients with androgenetic alopecia.

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Coping with Alopecia

What other treatments are available?

Finasteride (Propecia): This is a daily pill that stops the changing of hormones that play a role in hair loss. This medication is not for women.

Surgery: Hair transplants are performed by a dermatologist or transplant surgeon. During the procedure, hairs from the back or side of the scalp are moved to the front of the scalp.

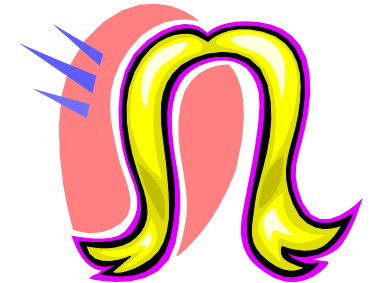

Androgenetic Alopecia

What is alopecia?

Alopecia is the medical term for hair loss. It may also be called baldness.

What is androgenetic alopecia?

Androgenetic alopecia is also known as pattern baldness. In men it is called male-pattern baldness. It often begins in the teens or 20s. Thinning of hair near the temples and the top of the head is common in men.

Androgenetic alopecia in women is called female-pattern baldness. It typically begins later in life. Hair at the front of the scalp is usually not lost.

What causes androgenetic alopecia?

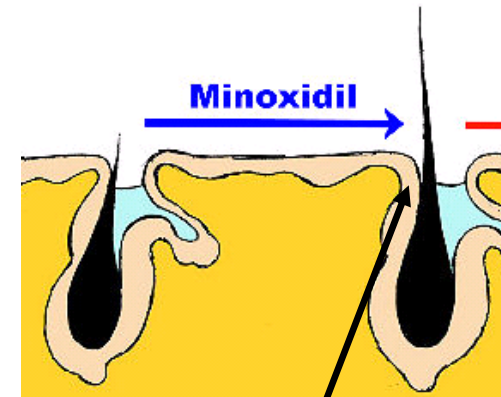
Androgenetic alopecia occurs when the time for hair growth is shortened. Hormones also play a role by shrinking hair follicles.

How is androgenetic alopecia treated?

Androgenetic alopecia does not require treatment. Some choose to let the process run its course. Others pursue new hair styles, pieces, scarves, hats, medications or surgical procedures to help with hair loss.

What is Rogaine?

Rogaine (Minoxidil) : Rogaine is a nonprescription medication that is applied to the scalp. It works by thickening hair follicles and lengthening the time hair has to grow. It is available as a solution or foam. Rogaine may take several weeks to improve hair loss. About 70% of people using Rogaine will notice hair growth.



Rogaine makes the **hair follicle** thicker.

Rogaine solution is available for use in women and men. Women should consult their physician before using the foam.
