LCMR TIMBER DEVELOPMENT STUDY

Study Objectives

The Legislative Commission on Minnesota Resources (LCMR) initiated in the fall of 1979 a major study of opportunities to enhance economic development within Minnesota's timber resource sector. The primary objective of the study was to provide information necessary for establishing a sound basis from which to formulate statewide timber resource goals and the policies necessary for their accomplishment. Of major concern to the study were:

- * informational needs of the state legislature, especially policies to address major timber resource issues, legislation necessary to authorize such policies, and programs to implement policies established by legislation;
- * timber production as a forest land use and the impacts of timber and nontimber policies on each other; and
- * identification of alternative policies, legislation, and programs.

Timber Resource Issue Areas

The commission's timber development study focused on major timber resource issues. Eight issue areas were identified for detailed study:

 timber production as a land use--the role of timber production in the broader context of other forest outputs and other land uses;

- timber supply—the potential physical and economic supply of harvestable wood from Minnesota's forests;
- 3. <u>future forest product demand</u>—the role of Minnesota forests in serving new state, national and international markets with existing or newly developed forest products;
- 4. <u>industrial organization and manufacturing</u>—
 opportunities for improving the manner in
 which the forest products industry is
 organized and means of encouraging manufacturing processes important to meeting
 consumer demand for wood products;
- 5. nonindustrial private forests—the role and significance of nonindustrial private forests and the public programs that affect them;
- county-administered forest lands—the status of county forest lands and the opportunities available for expanding their contribution to statewide economic well-being;
- scientific information and data—the information needs of the timber resource system and the programs that serve these needs; and
- 8. program organization and coordination—the roles, functions, and coordination of the various agencies and programs that affect the timber resource system.

Study Results

The timber development study was carried out by George Banzhaf and Company, Milwaukee, Wisconsin, and led to the following reports:

Procedurally, the company carried out a number of study tasks which eventually led to the above reports. Among the many tasks were: clarification of issues and specification of policy goals; definition of Minnesota's timber resource system, including appraisal of information necessary to do so; specification of analytical models; identification of alternative policies within issue areas; analysis of alternative policies; interpretation of policy analysis; conclusions regarding expected consequences of alternative policies; and presentation of study results.

A variety of information for each issue area was developed by George Banzhaf and Company. For example, general background information regarding the status of the issue area in question, a review of the consequences of alternative policies that might be directed towards an issue, and a summary of policy alternatives. In total, the company identified and discussed the consequences of nearly 200 policy alternatives. The number of policy alternatives by issue areas are:

- timber production as a land use--36 policy alternatives
- timber supply--23 policy alternatives
- future forest products demand--2 policy alternatives
- industrial organization and manufacturing—
 42 policy alternatives
- nonindustrial private forests--27 policy alternatives
- county-administered forest lands--29 policy alternatives
- scientific information and data--15 policy alternatives
- program organization and coordination--23 policy alternatives

CLASSIFICATION OF TIMBER POLICY OPTIONS

Objectives of Classification

The timber policy options presented by George Banzhaf and Company to the LCMR represent a wealth of information on which public and private organizations can base action. The effectiveness of their action may very well be enhanced if the nearly 200 policy alternatives were more clearly labeled as to the type of action they require (e.g., new laws, change in administrative rules, additional financing) and the organizations having authority (jurisdiction) to act on the policy alternative in question. With such thoughts in mind, a systematic review of the policy alternatives presented to the commission by George Banzhaf and Company was undertaken.

The objectives of the review were to develop a systematic format that encourages further review and discussion of the timber policy alternatives which were presented to the LCMR; identify public organizations that have authority (jurisdiction) to act on timber policy alternatives which were presented to the LCMR (e.g., state legislature, state executive agencies, private organizations); and identify action that would be required to make the forest policy in question a reality if deemed to be technically and economically sound and politically desirable (e.g., new state law, change in administrative rules).

<u>Definitions</u>

The objectives of the review were accomplished by the preparation of a policy matrix which is comprised of four major elements: policy alternatives, policy approaches, policy institutions, and policy instruments.

Policy alternatives are specific courses of action concerning forestry, especially timber as an output of forest land. Forest policy alternatives are specified in Minnesota Timber Resources: Prospects for Development, Volume II, Primary Document.

<u>Policy approaches</u> are general means of pursuing development goals for Minnesota timber resource sector. Policy approaches and subsets are:

C. Direct Public Production

- a. land ownership
- b. forest inventory

<u>Policy institutions</u> are public and private organizations that have an interest in and authority to act on a specific timber policy alternative. Policy institutions and subsets are:

<u>Policy instruments</u> are major forces which are a final expression of an agreed-to policy alternative. Policy instruments include state law, administrative rule-regulation, executive order, administrative discretion, legal interpretation, and commission recommendation.

Within the policy matrix there have been identified instances where logical relationships exist between a policy alternative and a particular policy approach, institution, and instrument. For example, the policy alternative "Increase funding for the wildlife habitat evaluation program" (Chapter II, Policy Number 27) is judged:

- a. to require a financial approach, especially funding;
- b. to be within the jurisdiction boundaries of the legislature (especially the appropriations committees and LCMR, less so the policy committees) and the Department of Natural Resources (especially the Division of Forestry and related divisions or bureaus); and
- to require a change in state law and the exercising of administrative discretion.

Judgements about the relationship between policy alternatives and various policy approaches, institutions, and instruments reflect a variety of viewpoints (e.g., those of legislative staff, resource administrators, educators). Obviously, not all persons reviewing the matrix presented here will agree with each relationship suggested. The matrix does, however, provide opportunity for interested parties to question specified relationships and to redefine them in a manner consistent with a differing perspective.
