## IV. REPORT OF THE ADMINISTRATIVE COMMITTEE

## 1. Actions Reported for Ratification

The following actions have been taken since the last meeting of the Senate and are reported for ratification:

1. *Report of the All-University Students' Work Committee.* The Committee reported that it had considered the question of the administration of regulations dealing with dropped and transferred students, as instructed by the Administrative Committee January 10, 1923, and had voted to continue to follow the current practice as provided for in the regulations adopted by the Senate on October 26, 1921.

The following recommendations of the Committee were approved:

a. That the various Students' Work Committees take definite action on all students who would normally be subject to committee action at the end of each quarter whether they return to college the following quarter or not, in order that their status may be made a matter of record in the Registrar's office.

b. That students who are excluded from college on account of low scholarship but who are recommended for transfer and do transfer to another college, should not be permitted to continue to major in the same field of work as that which they were previously following, until such time as they could re-enter the college from which they were excluded; for example, a student dropped from the School of Business should not be permitted to enter the College of Science, Literature, and the Arts and major in Economics.

2. *Textbook Approval.* Voted to approve the use of Dr. Klaeber's text on Beowulf for use in University Classes.

3. *Report of the All-University Curriculum Committee.* Voted to approve the following report of the All-University Curriculum Committee.

The All-University Curriculum Committee, to which was referred the question of credit for work in the University Chorus, wishes to make the following recommendations:

a. That the Colleges be requested to insert in their bulletins a paragraph drawing attention to the Chorus and other cultural opportunities open to University students.

b. That it be the sentiment of this Committee that colleges having free electives should be asked to give serious and favorable consideration to the matter of credit for work in the Chorus.

4. *Text-Book Approval.* Voted to recommend to the University Senate the approval of Sirich and Barton's French Anthology for use in the College of Science, Literature, and the Arts.

## 2. Actions Reported for Information

1. *Physical Education and Hygiene.* Voted to approve the following recommendations of the Senate Committee on Education with reference to introduction of credit courses in Physical Education and Hygiene:

a. It is the consensus of opinion of the Committee on Education that the required work in Physical Education and Hygiene should carry credits and honor points toward a college degree as outlined in the recommendation of the Committees on Physical Education and Athletics and on Hygiene.

b. It is the consensus of opinion of the Committee on Education that three hours per week of Physical Education and Hygiene as outlined in the recommendations of the Committees on Physical Education and Hygiene should be required of all freshmen and sophomores in the University and the question of the feasibility of introducing such required work be referred to the faculties of separate colleges.

2. *Copy of University Publications.* Voted to approve the recommendation of the Librarian that fifty copies of all publications issued by the University be forwarded to the Librarian, with the understanding that twenty-five copies are to be retained as a reserve subject to the disposal of the Library Committee.

3. *Opening Convocation.* Mr. Pierce, as chairman of the University Functions Committee, presented tentative plans for the convocation on Thursday, September 27th, involving the dismissal of all classes at 11:00 in the morning and the assigning of three minutes of class time of each third hour class on that day. Voted to approve the plans as presented.

4. *Class Scrap Day.* A communication from the Student Council asking that October 13th be set aside as Class Scrap Day, with dismissal of third and fourth hour classes, was referred to a special committee with power to act after conference with the Student Council. The President appointed on this committee Deans Nicholson, Freeman, Lyon, Johnston, Haggerty, Leland and Appleby.

5. *Opening Convocation.* The opening convocation held on October 27th was discussed and it was the sense of the Committee that immediate plans should be made for the perpetuation of this feature of the opening week of the fall quarter.

- Academy of Luther Seminary (St. Paul), add to tentative list.
- Maplewood Academy (Maple Plaine), add to published list.
- Breck School (St. Paul), add to tentative list.
- Holy Trinity School (Rolling Stone), add to published list.
- Augsburg Seminary, Preparatory Department (Minneapolis), continue on published list

3. That advanced standing for correspondence work be limited to courses offered by schools holding membership in the National University Extension Association.

## VI. REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON INTER-COLLEGIATE ATHLETICS

To the University Senate:

Your Committee on Intercollegiate Athletics begs leave to submit the following report for the year 1922-23:

The work of this committee has been confined strictly to the problem of intercollegiate athletics; the activities relating to intramural sports having been absorbed by the Department of Physical Education and Athletics by action of the Senate, March 30, 1922.

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Since its appointment May 18, 1922, your committee has held thirty-five meetings, three of them during the summer. Meetings are held bi-weekly during the college year. The problems facing the committee this year have been unusually numerous and difficult resulting from the entire reorganization of athletics and the many changes in personnel and in policy.

Much of the work of the committee has been handled through the following subcommittees: (a) audit, (b) legal, (c) "M," (d) tickets, (e) eligibility.

As indicative of the nature of the activities of the committee, the following may be cited:

1. Appropriation of \$2,800 for furthering intramural athletics.
2. Participation in the employment of Mr. John Griffin, as Conference Commissioner of Athletics, looking toward more harmonious relationships among the members of the Western Conference.
3. Appointment of coaches and assistant coaches for the various sports in which intercollegiate contests are held.
4. Working out relationships with the University Health Service in the interests of all students participating in the various games.
5. Standardizing the requirements for securing the "M".
6. Conferences with members of the All-University Council, with the chairmen of the student work committees, and with the President of the University, in the interest of a better understanding of the problems involved and to secure closer co-operation in working out these problems.
7. Codification of Conference Rules and regulations and fixing responsibility for their interpretation.
8. Recognition of golf as an intercollegiate sport, and the development of hockey.
9. Appointment of student managers for the various sports and the awarding of appropriate "M"'s for distinguished service.
10. Fixing of prices for student tickets.
11. Enlargement of stands and permanent improvement of grounds.
12. Acquiring new property and developing it for athletic purposes.
13. Reorganization of entire plan of handling the finances of intercollegiate athletics, placing the business management, including ticket selling and disbursements, in the hands of the controller subject to the regulations of the committee.
14. Publishing complete statements of the finances of the committee in the Official Daily Bulletin.

**VIII. REPORT OF THE SENATE COMMITTEE ON DEBATE AND ORATORY**

No changes have been made in our intercollegiate relations.

The fall debates with Iowa and Illinois were held December 14. The question debated was: "Resolved that Congress should have power to override decisions of the Supreme Court by re-enacting laws after they have been declared unconstitutional." The members of our affirmative team, Leon Luscher, Carl Munck, and Llewellyn Pfankuchen, met representatives of the University of Illinois on our home platform. The critic judge, Professor Merle Wright of Hamline University, criticized the debate and gave his decision for the Minnesota debaters. Our negative team, Alvin Johanson, Charles Macdonnell, and Walter L. Johnson, debated at the University of Iowa. Professor J. P. Ryan of Grinnell College decided that the Iowa team did the better debating.

The question debated with the University of Wisconsin and Northwestern University, April 19, was: "Resolved that all debts and financial obligations arising out of the World War which shall remain unsatisfied May 1, 1923, should be cancelled without qualification or reservation. Our affirmative team, Walter Rice, Charles Macdonnell, and Haynor Larson, met the Wisconsin debaters at the University of Minnesota. Professor C. E. Lyon of the University of South Dakota acted as critic judge and gave the decision to Wisconsin. Our negative team, Leslie L. Anderson, Ambrose Fuller, and Lester Orfield, debated at Northwestern University. Dr. William E. Bolger of Notre Dame decided for the Minnesota team.

The practice of having a critic judge review the debate and analyze the faults of structure and reasoning seems to us to have a beneficial effect not only on the attitude of the debaters but also on the educational value of their work.

The annual contest of the Northern Oratorical League which is endowed by former Governor Frank O. Lowden of Illinois, was held here, in order of rotation, May 4. It was last held here in 1917.

Attendance at the Pillsbury Oratorical contest, at the Wisconsin-Minnesota debate, and at the contest of the Northern Oratorical League was larger than at any similar contest for several years, and indicates a lively interest on the part of students in such activities.

It is the opinion of this committee that the custom of awarding the Einar Hoidale certificates to students who represent the University in intercollegiate debates and oratorical contests which fell into abeyance during the years of the war, 1917-18, should be revived. Mr. Hoidale agrees to bear the expense.
