OCLC ANNUAL REPORT FOR FISCAL 2008

Jay Jordan, OCLC President and CEO, says fiscal 2008 was an exceptional year for the OCLC cooperative. Writing in the OCLC annual report, Jordan noted that participating libraries set new records in online cataloging and resource sharing and contributed more records and holdings to WorldCat than ever before. At the same time, the membership adopted a new, next-generation governance structure as OCLC began to introduce new, next-generation services.

The new governance structure is designed to make it easier for libraries and knowledge institutions around the world to use OCLC services and participate in the governance of the cooperative. The changes will transform the current Members Council into a Global Council that connects with Regional Councils around the world.

And the new, next-generation Web services are designed to deliver information to people when and where wanted and greatly amplify the power of library cooperation. Some services will interconnect over the Web through machine-to-machine interfaces. Others will reside where they are technically most appropriate, at the local, group or global level.

NETLIBRARY LAUNCHES NEW MEDIA CENTER

NetLibrary's new Media Center is now available! The NetLibrary Media Center is a stand-alone, desktop application for searching, managing, transferring, and listening to NetLibrary eAudiobooks.

Getting Started

Library staff will be able to turn on the NetLibrary Media Center through the Library Resource Center (LRC). Instructions on how staff can activate the NetLibrary Media Center through the LRC will be communicated soon.

Once you have turned on the Media Center, you and your users will be able to download Media Center from the NetLibrary Web site (www.netlibrary.com).

org) and install to your desktop. Complete installation details are available from the NetLibrary Help section. Below are a few of the new features in the Media Center:

- **One-click transfer** to your computer or portable device. The Media Center combines a simpler, more visual user interface with streamlined navigation to create a unique user experience. With a single click, the Media Center will checkout an eAudiobook, acquire the user license, and download the title to your PC or portable device.
- **Enhanced discovery.** You can browse eAudiobooks by genre or search for eAudiobooks by Title, Author, Subject, or Narrator. Results are displayed in your choice of list view or carousel-style glance view and include cover images, bibliographic information, and other descriptive content.
- **Full-featured audio player.** NetLibrary's Media Center allows you to listen to titles directly from your desktop or laptop. Integrated playback controls not only adjust the volume and pause the play, but allow you to jump from section to section and, even, control the pace of the narration.
- **Supported devices.** You can transfer eAudiobooks to a wide range of supported listening devices, including music players and media centers from Archos, Creative Labs, Samsung, Toshiba, and other manufacturers. Also, be sure to watch for upcoming enhancements that will support iPod, Zune and other devices including smartphones.
- **Organize and manage downloaded titles.** Use the "My Stuff" tab to create lists of your favorite titles and organize downloaded eAudiobooks. You can resume listening to an eAudiobook from the point where you last stopped, renew checkout of an expired eAudiobook, or transfer downloaded eAudiobooks to your portable device.
- **Title segmentation.** Lost your place? No problem. For ease of download, playback, and storage, eAudiobooks are divided into segments, approximately 1 hour in length, making it easy to navigate within an eAudiobook.
- **Free training resources.** With easy-to-follow step-

by-step instructions, OCLC's free NetLibrary eAudiobooks guide answers many basic questions, including how to download NetLibrary Media Center, how to search for eAudiobooks, and how to transfer content to portable devices.

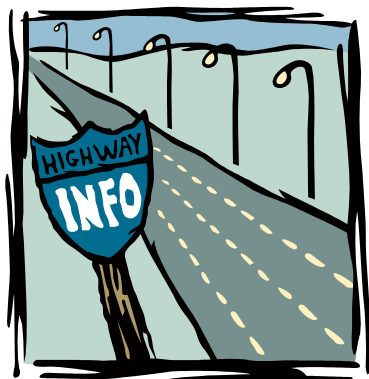

GENERAL

ON THE ROAD WITH BATS

Staff from the MINITEX Bibliographic and Technical Services Unit (BATS) had the opportunity to make some site visits within the past couple of months. We included a short summary of our travels below.

**Century College, White Bear Lake, MN**

On Nov. 13, Virginia Dudley and Mark Wilhelmi drove up to White Bear Lake to visit the Century College library. We received a warm welcome from the staff and our meeting was lively. Discussion covered several topics including MULS, OCLC ILL, WorldCat Registry, and WorldCat Collection Analysis. The staff was particularly interested in OCLC statistics, so we showed them the available reports.

We also toured the library, which is quite new, and we were impressed. It has dark wood furniture and lots of natural light. There's also a fireplace, study rooms, a spacious, well-equipped computer classroom, and a large work area for the staff. It was busy with students coming and going.

After the meeting, Jane Young (the library director), Virginia, and Mark Wilhelmi had lunch nearby at Betty's Pies in White Bear Lake, MN. The food was good, and the pies were wonderful. We highly recommend it!

East Central Regional Library

On Dec. 4, Virginia Dudley and Mark Wilhelmi paid a visit at the East Central Regional Library in Cambridge, MN. We got a nice welcome from the staff and the meeting went well. Most of our discussion focused on cataloging services. They are currently using CatExpress to copy catalog records for non-print titles, getting records for other formats from vendors, staff do original cataloging in their ILS, but they are mulling over the possibility of moving to Connexion. In addition, they are adjusting to their new ILS and are taking inventory at all of their libraries. This is the only site visit that we've conducted so far during which we were served home-made pie!

Pine Technical College, Pine City, MN

On Monday, Dec. 8, Virginia Dudley and Sara Ring drove north to Pine City to visit Pine Technical College Learning Resource and Technology Center.

Ron McGriff is the half-time librarian, and Laurie Jorgenson works for both the library and for the technology half of the center. Before our meeting, Ron took us on a tour of the college. We visited the classroom used for their Gunsmithing program (one of the few gunsmithing programs in the country), and a classroom filled with giant machines used for their CNC Operations (machine tool certificate part of this program) Program. On our tour we learned about a few other interesting programs of which we were unaware like the Johnson Simulation Center. The Center's current projects include scenario and procedural training applications, military immersive simulations, and game development. Pine Technical College also has community programs for child care and an employment and training center.

Fond du Lac Tribal and Community College, Cloquet, MN

Mark Wilhelmi met with Nancy Broughton, the Library Director, and Diane Rauschenfels, the Library Technician, at the Ruth A. Myers Library. A lot has been happening at the college - enrollment has doubled in the last four years and construction was completed recently on the second expansion of the college's main building since it opened in the early 1990s.

We began with a tour of the library. Recently expanded to twice its former size, it is spacious and full of light. There are public computers, study rooms, a staff workroom, comfortable furniture, and a fireplace, and plenty of room on the shelves for additions to the collection. With the expansion also came space for archives and a large classroom for library instruction.

We also took a tour of the college's main building. Located in a grove of towering red pines, this building is in the shape of a thunderbird with sections in each of the four sacred colors of the Anishinaabe/Ojibwe people; white, yellow, red, and black.

CATALOGING

NEW OCLC AUTHORITIES USER GUIDE

At last! An updated authorities user guide from OCLC. In early December, OCLC announced the publication of *Authorities: Format and Indexes*. This new guide replaces an old OCLC three ring binder you might still have on your shelf entitled *Authorities User Guide* (3rd edition).

The new guide, *Authorities: Format and Indexes*, contains detailed authorities-related information that should prove useful to all catalogers (and even non-catalogers) for identifying and verifying information in bibliographic and/or authority records by way of the OCLC authority file. It includes chapters on the authority record format and the authority file indexes. In addition, there is a lot of very helpful general information in the introduction.

It is important to note, however, what the guide does not cover. The guide does not contain procedures for finding, creating, modifying, saving, or exporting authority records. Nor does it explain specialized functions, such as replacing master name authority records or creating records and adding them to the authority file. RECENT CHANGES IN MARC FIELDS FOR SERIES

Many of you have already heard that MARC field 440 has been made obsolete. For those who need more information, here is a little background.

At the ALA Annual Conference in Anaheim last June, the committee that decides such things – MARBI (Machine-

Readable Bibliographic Information) - approved the proposal to make field 440 obsolete. This change was implemented by the PCC (LC Program for Cooperative Cataloging) on Oct. 24, 2008, and it is already reflected in MARC 21 Format for Bibliographic Data. However, the change has not yet been officially implemented by OCLC.

What the Change Means

- Series statements should now be coded using a combination of field 490 (the series statement taken from the item) and field 800-830 (for series traced differently).
- An additional proposal was approved that changes the definition of 490 first indicator (Series tracing policy) value 1 to "Series traced in 8XX field." Thus: the coding '490 0_' means the series is not traced; the coding '490 1_' means the series is traced in an appropriate 8XX field (800-830).
- The change will simplify practices and the need for systems to look multiple places for the authorized series heading
- You will continue to see the 440 field in existing bibliographic records (OCLC is investigating the possibility of doing some kind of automatic conversion of these)

What Should Your Library Do?

You may stop using the 440 at any time, or you may wait until OCLC officially implements the change. Here are a few questions you may be asking yourself, with a few answers.

When you come upon a 440 field, should you change it to a 490 1_/8XX combo?

You may, but it might be a waste of time if OCLC plans to eventually convert these.

Do you need to go back and change all the 440's in your local catalog?

Not necessarily. This would be a local decision, and an easy way to handle it might be simply to make a policy change as of a certain date.

Even before this change, many libraries had stopped using the 440 field, so if you stop using it now, you will be in

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good company.

Macro Help

One of the industrious macro makers in OCLC-user land has created a macro that changes a 440 or a 490 to a 490/830 combination. Anyone wishing to globally convert each of the series statements in their local catalog to a 490/830 combination might want to try it out.

CONTENTdm 5 RELEASED

CONTENTdm 5 was released Dec. 18, 2008. The software update can be downloaded from the User Support Center at any time.

CONTENTdm 5 is a milestone release that includes a wide-range of enhancements throughout the software. These include a new search engine, full Unicode support, scheduled indexing, improved EAD handling, and expanded reporting capabilities. Additionally, CONTENTdm 5 introduces the Project Client, a new client application with robust features for creating and editing digital collections.

Historic Sheet Music Digital Collection

University of Iowa

This collection creates a snapshot of the music Eastern Iowans played and sang in the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries. Much of the music was originally housed at the Cedar Rapids Public Library, and then, dispersed to area colleges and universities upon its withdrawal from that library. Included in this digital collection are a number of songs about Iowa, such as "Way Down in Iowa," "Iowa Corn Song," and "I'm From Iowa (That Beautiful Iowa Song)."

Bear River Watershed Historical Collection

Utah State University

The Bear River Watershed's geography, history, and development are the primary focus of this collection of images, maps, papers, diaries, plat books, and reports. Includes photos of the Bear River taken from 1860s to the 1990s, records of local irrigation companies, diaries that record weather conditions, research on the societal impact of reclamation development in the Bear River Basin, and more.

John Pitcher Spooner California Stereograph Collection
