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## ANNOUNCEMENTS

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### NEW OCLC MEMBERSHIP REPORT

OCLC received a grant from the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation to explore attitudes and perceptions about library funding and to evaluate the potential for a large-scale marketing and advocacy campaign to increase public library funding in the U.S. The findings of this research are now available in the OCLC report, *“From Awareness to Funding: A study of library support in America.”* Among the findings from the report:

- Library funding support is related only marginally to library visitation.
- Perceptions of librarians are an important predictor of library funding support.
- Voters who see the library as a ‘transformational’ force, as opposed to an ‘informational’ source, are more likely to increase taxes in its support.

The report suggests that targeting marketing messages to the right segments of the voting public is key to driving increased support for U.S. public libraries.

#### Session description:

Libraries face unprecedented demands to adapt to the digital environment. New and emerging tasks related to institutional repositories, non-MARC metadata, networked resources and new generations of users place additional pressure on staffs and workflows built to handle print materials. Yet print-related workloads are not diminishing as fast as digital workloads are growing. Meanwhile, the growth of external competitors, such as Google, increases the need for libraries to focus on user expectations and highlight their own unique attributes.

How can libraries turn these pressures into opportunities? How can librarians adapt workflows, priorities, and

organizational structures to provide those services most important to users? How can library leaders create the capacity to pursue critical new initiatives—without increasing staff? Join R2 to hear advice, both strategic and practical, drawn from their experience in workflow analysis and organizational redesign for academic libraries of all sizes and types.

Sessions will include:

- Why Workflow Redesign (An Environmental Scan) - We will review relevant trends in the information environment that are shaping new demands on libraries; topics include Predictions, Changing Users, and Trends in Collection Development, Acquisitions, and Cataloging/Discovery.
- Workflow Redesign: Principles and Practices - This section outlines R2's own approach to conducting workflow audits, and the business principles that guide their recommendations.
- Creating Capacity in Collections, Acquisitions, Serials, E-Resources, Cataloging and Preservation - We will look at sample recommendations and outcomes in specific areas. The goal is to model the kind of thinking and interaction that will be needed by library managers to undertake a successful workflow analysis.
- MINITEX and OCLC Updates, demos, etc.

## NEXT GENERATION CATALOGING

In the Jan. 2008 *MINITEX/OCLC Mailing*, there was an article about the launch of an OCLC pilot project to explore upstream metadata capture and enhancement using publisher and vendor generated ONIX metadata. Below is an update on the pilot project.

The establishment of data flows and practices that allow the interoperability of metadata and the remix and reuse of existing metadata will be crucial for both libraries and publishers going forward. The ability to leverage

upstream publisher data effectively is also central to the recommendations included in the Library of Congress sponsored *Future of Bibliographic Control* report issued Jan. 8, 2008.

### How the pilot project works

**The role of publishers and vendors** -- Publisher and vendor pilot partners provide OCLC with title information in ONIX format. OCLC crosswalks the data to MARC for addition to WorldCat and, where possible, enriches the data in automated ways through data mining and data mapping. Enriched metadata is returned to publishers and vendors in ONIX format for evaluation of OCLC enhancements.

**The role of libraries** -- Library pilot partners evaluate the quality of metadata added to WorldCat through this process and provide feedback on its suitability for use in library technical services workflows.

**The role of other partners** -- Publishing industry partners such as BISG (Book Industry Study Group, Inc.) assist OCLC with publisher industry data standards and terminologies, as well as providing a forum in which to share ideas and results with the industry.

### **WORLDCAT RECORD STATISTICS**

OCLC distributed a message about their record upgrades and enhancements for FY08 (July 2007 through June 2008). This prompted me to take a look at the MINITEX region cataloging statistics for FY08. As a whole, library staff in MN, ND, and SD cataloged 37,662 original records, upgraded or enhanced 7,366 records, and 368 of these were done by members participating in OCLC's Enhance program. - corrected 2,137,903 bibliographic records.

## LOCAL HOLDINGS MAINTENANCE

### **MULS SURVEY – WE WANT YOUR INPUT**

For more than 30 years, staffs of MINITEX participating libraries have worked together to produce *MULS*, the *MINITEX Union List of Serials*. That's a long time, and there have been a lot of changes over the years – particularly in the world of information technology.

So MINITEX has put together a short, web-based survey that will help us learn more about the current state of MULS: whether and how library staff use the information in MULS, how often staff update holdings records, etc. The survey has just a few multiple choice questions to

- performed 207,742 merges resulting in the deletion of 317,022 bibliographic records.
- added 165 new authority records.
- updated 395,817 authority records.
- referred 765 authority records (name and subject) to the Library of Congress for resolution.

Many of the changes resulted from the processing of 182,348 change requests, an increase of 21% over the same period of fiscal year 2007.

During the same time period, OCLC CIP Upgrade Unit staff:

- upgraded 20,501 CIP records.
- added 1,006 new authority records.
- updated 857 authority records.

These figures for authority records include 450 new series authority records and updates to 247 existing series authority records. This activity with series authorities continues to grow as a result of OCLC's adapting to the Library of Congress's decision to stop series authority work.

## RESOURCE SHARING

### NEW REASONS FOR NO

On July 13, OCLC implemented new “Reasons for No” for users of WorldCat Resource Sharing. This change will happen at a later date for users of OCLC ILLiad - following the release of a new ILLiad Web service. The original Reasons for No were developed by the ILL Protocol Implementers Group (IPIG). Over the years, some have become outdated and new reasons have become necessary. The details of these changes are outlined below.

#### Process

Beginning in 2008, OCLC started working with an ad hoc group of library staff to revamp the Reasons for No as they appear in WorldCat Resource Sharing and OCLC ILLiad. This advisory group consisted of volunteers from the OCLC ILL Users Group at ALA Midwinter, members of SHARES, library staff who participated in discussions on ILL-L, and staff of OCLC Regional Networks, and libraries they contacted.

OCLC presented a list of current Reasons for No, asked for user opinions about the usefulness of the reasons, and suggestions for new reasons. They also asked for opinions about how “Not Found as Cited” should be handled systematically. OCLC staff went through this process four times until they reached a resolution where each proposed change had majority support.

#### Complete list of Reasons for No

Below is the list of Reasons for No that now appear in WorldCat Resource Sharing (as of July 2008). They are in the order in which they appear in the drop-down list. This order corresponds to how often they are used by WorldCat Resource Sharing and ILLiad users.

- In Use/On Loan
- Non Circulating
- Not on Shelf/Missing
- Not Owned
- Lacking Volume/Issue
- Branch Policy Problem

- On Order
- Cost Exceeds Limit
- Technical Processing
- Preferred Delivery Time Not Possible
- Poor Condition

- Volume Issue Not Yet Available
- Not Licensed to Fill
- Required delivery services not supported

### Changes for Conditional Responses

Previous to July 2008, all conditional responses were supplied by users via the Administrative Module and Saved Notes. Now the WorldCat Resource Sharing system will supply four conditional responses for users:

- 1. Not found as cited** (will no longer be a Reason for No)  
Used when the Lender cannot find a requested item based upon borrower-supplied citation information
- 2. Duplicate request?** (new)  
Used when the Lender receives two requests for the same item around the same time. The Lender can confirm that the Borrower truly wants two copies of the same item.
- 3. Borrower concerns/please contact lender** (new)  
Used when a Lender is not comfortable lending an item

## DIGITIZATON & PRESERVATION

### **UPPER MIDWEST CONTENTdm USER GROUP**

MINITEX and WiLS together will sponsor the first Upper Midwest CONTENTdm User Group Meeting this Fall. There are over 40 institutions in the region (MN, SD, ND, WI) currently using CONTENTdm to build their digital collections.

to a particular Borrower until they have a conversation. This may be due to overdue materials, materials with IFM attached that have not been received, etc.

**4. Lacks copyright compliance** (will no longer be a Reason for No)  
Used when the Borrower has not noted CCG or CCL compliance and the Lender wants this information to be supplied before agreeing to supply the item.

### ILLiad impact

OCLC is making these changes first to WorldCat Resource Sharing. At the same time as the changes are implemented in WorldCat Resource Sharing OCLC will be updating the Atlas Systems Web service to include the new Reasons for No in ILLiad. Until that development work is completed and users have upgraded to the new release that incorporates the Web service, users of ILLiad will not have access to these new Reasons for No and users of WCRS may receive some of the older Reasons for No.

### ISO ILL impact

Users of ISO ILL will continue to receive ISO-sanctioned Reasons for No. New OCLC Reasons for No will be mapped to "Other" if there is no logical ISO reason provided.

### Other partners

OCLC is also updated the Web services used by other partners that use WorldCat Resource Sharing. As with ILLiad, there will be some lag time while partner organizations implement the new Web service and users upgrade their software.

*American Society of Cell Biology*

ASCB's Image & Video Library is part of the ASCB family of cell biology educational resources that also include CellBASE, IBioSeminars, CBE -- Life Sciences Education, BioEDUCATE and Community Forums on cell biology topics. The library is a collection of peer-reviewed still images and dynamic videos of the highest quality that cover the field of cell biology in a comprehensive manner. Access to the library is free and open for non-commercial educational and research uses. Users can download any and all images and videos for non-commercial purposes.

#### **Grand Army of the Republic Civil War Portraits**

After the Civil War, veterans who had fought for the Union formed the Grand Army of the Republic. Around 1915, local members put together an album of photographic portraits collected from members over the previous 25 years or so. The leather-bound book was donated to the Seattle Public Library in 1971. Only 106 portraits remain, and some are unidentified, but they all form a remarkable resource for Seattle history which can now be found in this digital collection.

#### **Ira Clemens Photograph Album, 1923**

*Pittsburg State University*

A collection of photographs, postcards, and notes compiled in 1923 by Ira Clemens. The materials concern mining communities and towns in Crawford and Cherokee Counties in Kansas, and Mindenmines, Missouri. The photographs consist primarily of street scenes, churches, public buildings such as libraries and schools, recreational buildings and parks, and residences of miners. The notes typically define the physical location of the community, indicate the population characteristics, identify the major buildings, disclose bank holdings, and describe other features of the community.
