### GOOD NEWS!

The College of Liberal Arts has been allocated \$9,000 for faculty travel in 1981-82 from a State Legislature appropriation of \$100,000. These funds are intended to be used exclusively for the purpose of securing financial support for projects of research, training or public service. Funds may not be used for recruiting, for international travel, for hand-delivering proposals to agencies, or for anything else.

The travel form is a simple one-page form available in 404 Johnston Hall. Procedures for obtaining travel funds are as follows: (1) fill out Request for Faculty Travel Funds form and return to 404 Johnston; (2) investigator is notified of approval or disapproval; (3) investigator fills out Type 06 Travel Authorization and gives it to the departmental secretary for processing; (4) after the trip is completed, the Travel Expense Voucher is filled out (be sure to keep all travel-related receipts); (5) give the Travel Expense Voucher to the departmental secretary for processing through the CLA Budget Office; (6) file a post-travel report with the Office of Research Development. These reports are mandatory as the College will not be reimbursed for travel funds unless travel reports are filed with the Graduate School!

\* The Committee on Scholarly Communication with the People's Republic of China (CSCPRC) has announced a November 6, 1981 deadline for grants for study and research in China in the natural sciences, engineering, social sciences, and humanities. Requests for application forms should be sent to: CSCPRC, National Academy of Sciences, 2101 Constitution Avenue, NW, Washington, D.C. 20418. Postdoctoral scholars should request forms for the Research Program.

\* Reminder! Preliminary applications for NEH Summer Stipends are due September 25 in 404 Johnston Hall.

\* The Rockefeller Foundation Humanities Fellowships support humanistic scholarship intended to illuminate and assess contemporary social and cultural issues. The program welcomes applications from writers and scholars in the traditional humanistic disciplines and from fields not usually defined as humanistic (such as political science, law, and anthropology) if their humanistic implications are clear and substantial. The ordinary grant will be in the range of \$10,000 to \$15,000, and normally will not exceed \$20,000. October 1 is the application deadline.

\* October 16 is the filing deadline for Bush Foundation Fellowships for Artists. Eligible artists include painters, sculptors, still photographers, graphic artists, film artists, video artists, poets, fiction writers, and creative non-fiction writers who are 25 years old at the application filing deadline. Artists must also be residents of Minnesota for at least one continuous year prior to the deadline. The stipend is \$15,000 maximum for 12 to 18 months, or \$1,250 per month for 6 to 12 months. \* The W. K. Kellogg Foundation has announced that nominations and applications are now being accepted for the Kellogg National Fellowship Program. Awards of up to \$30,000 over a three-year period will be made in behalf of 50 outstanding individuals who hold academic, practitioner, or administrative positions on the staffs of selected institutions and organizations. They will then carry out non-degree, interdisciplinary, self-directed activities to expand their personal horizons beyond the confines of their chosen profession. \* The Rockefeller Foundation has announced a new program of international relations fellowships for postdoctoral work in three broad interrelated areas: regional conflict and international security; international economic policy; and world energy problems. Young scholars and professionals, preferably between the ages of 25 and 35, are encouraged to apply. Research projects of up to two years' duration will be undertaken in a foreign setting. ### FUNDING NOTES

- \* Professor Stephen Gudeman has announced that the fall quarter deadline for submission of McMillan Travel Fund requests is November 9. Application forms are available in the College Dean's Office (215 Johnston Hall). Completed applications should be returned to 215 Johnston in care of Professor Gudeman.
- \* Applications for postdoctoral grants for international research should be submitted to the Social Science Research Council by December 1. These awards support research in one country, comparative research between countries in an area, and comparative research between areas. Countries and areas included are: Africa, China, Japan, Korea, Latin America and the Caribbean, Near and Middle East, South Asia and Southeast Asia. Announcements containing a complete description of program interests are available in 404 Johnston Hall (3-5101).
- \* Two fellows will be appointed for the academic year 1982-83 to the Wesleyan University Center for the Humanities, an institute devoted to advanced study and research in all disciplines of the humanities. Candidates must have received the Ph.D. between June 1, 1978 and November 15, 1981. The annual stipend is \$14,500; completed applications must be received by November 15. For further information, write to: Director, Center for the Humanities, Wesleyan University, Middletown, Connecticut 06457.
- \* A tentative date of November 20 has been set for the receipt of Single Quarter Leave applications. Forms are available in departmental offices and should be forwarded to Geraldine Perreault, 225 Johnston Hall (3-4343).
- \* Applications for new projects under the Fulbright-Hays Training Grants Program, including faculty research abroad, foreign curriculum consultants, group projects abroad, and doctoral dissertation research abroad, should be submitted to the U.S. Department of Education by November 20. Application materials are available in 404 Johnston Hall.
- \* Approximately 35 postdoctoral fellowships will be awarded in 1982 to minorities in a program designed to provide opportunities for continued education and research experience for American Indians and Alaskan Natives,



Black Americans, Mexican Americans/Chicanos, and Puerto Ricans. Eligible areas include the behavioral and social sciences, humanities, engineering sciences, mathematics, physical sciences, life sciences, and interdisciplinary programs of study. U.S. citizens who are members of a minority group, who are engaged in college or university teaching, and who hold doctoral degrees may apply for a fellowship award of one year's duration. Stipends are \$18,500 and \$25,000 plus travel and relocation allowances. Applications must be submitted by February 1, 1982. \* Two Kent Postdoctoral Fellows will be appointed for cross-disciplinary study in the humanities at the Wesleyan University Center for the Humanities. ### \$900,000 GIVEN BY BUSH FOUNDATION FOR FACULTY LEAVES!

The University has been awarded a grant of \$900,000 from the Bush Foundation to support sabbatical leaves for 25 to 30 midcareer tenured faculty members for each of the next 4 years.

Faculty who teach undergraduate students and whose sabbatical work plans show a definite contribution to undergraduate education at the University will be eligible to receive up to 40% of their annual salary in addition to the normal sabbatical half salary. Up to \$1,000 will also be provided for travel expenses.

The first awards will be made for the 1982 academic year; application procedures will be released within the next few months.

\* Application deadline is January 15 for the 1982-83 Small Grants Research Program, which awards funds to faculty members for research projects that promise to strengthen the overall competence of the University in the international field. The program is sponsored by the Office of International Programs, 201 Nolte West, 373-3793.

\* Andrew W. Mellon Postdoctoral Fellowships in the Humanities are available at the following institutions: Bryn Mawr College, Cornell University and Emory University. The deadlines are as follows: Bryn Mawr - January 15; Cornell - February 15; and Emory University - January 4. Since requisites and application procedures vary for each institution, please call 373-5101 for further information.

\* The S&H Foundation has announced a February 15 deadline for applications for its 1982-83 Lectureship Program. The program focuses on fields of public affairs and social sciences, broadly defined. Proposals for coordinated lectures dealing with one broad subject are

preferred. Awards are limited to a maximum of \$2,500 for any one institution. For information on application procedures please call 373-5101.

\* The U.S.-Finland and U.S.-Sweden Cooperative Science programs have been established within the National Science Foundation Division of International Programs. ### BUSH SABBATICAL APPLICATIONS DUE FEBRUARY 23

An application deadline of February 23 has been set for the receipt of applications for the Bush Foundation sabbatical leave program.

Under the Bush grant of \$900,000, faculty who teach undergraduate students and whose sabbatical work plans show a definite contribution to undergraduate education at the University will be eligible to receive up to 40% of their annual salary in addition to the normal sabbatical half salary. Up to \$1,000 will also be provided for travel expenses.

### GOOD NEWS!

Dean Fred Lukermann has announced new programs of College support for faculty travel, conferences and visiting faculty. Following is a brief description of the three programs: (1) Faculty Travel Funds (FTF). For 1982-83, the College will provide a minimum of \$15,000 to support a modest program of faculty travel. The FTF will be used to defray the cost of transportation associated with scholarly and instructional pursuits by regularly appointed faculty. It is important to note that these funds may be used to support transportation to scholarly conferences. Application procedures for FTF funds will be announced shortly; the deadline is the same as for McMillan Fund applications--April 19.

(2) Scholarly Conferences and Publications. Approximately \$20,000 will be available for the granting of one-time funds to help defray the costs of a conference being planned for the following year. A small portion of the fund may also be used for one-time support of publications. A Faculty Scholarly Conferences Committee will be appointed in time for a Spring meeting for consideration of funding requests for conferences to be held during academic year 1982-83.

(3) Visiting Faculty. The College has allocated funds for 1982-83 with which to underwrite one full-time equivalent faculty line for each of the three quarters (about \$50,000 total). Normally the visits would be for a single quarter; a visiting scholar may be requested by a single unit or combination of units. Again, for the coming year only, the Visiting Faculty Committee will meet in early Spring Quarter 1982 in order to review requests for visiting scholars for the 1982-83 academic year.

*Professor Jean Barstow*, Anthropology, has been awarded a American Council of Learned Societies Study Fellowship for her project, "Anthropological Perspectives on Legal Processes: Developing Aboriginal Rights in International Law."
