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### I. GENERAL ANNOUNCEMENTS

**Sponsored Funding Statistics:** The table, below, and graph on the next page summarize trends in CLA sponsored activities (research, public service, and training) over the past five years. In FY 1992, CLA faculty sustained gains achieved the previous year in dollars awarded, although the number of awards dipped slightly. The number of proposals submitted also leveled off, but the dollars requested increased by 49.4%, to \$27,072,975, the most ever requested by CLA faculty. If CLA's general award to proposal ratio continues to be around 60% or more, it is likely that the dollar amount of awards will increase substantially in FY 1993. Sponsored expenditures are considered to be the most accurate way to measure sponsored activity; here also, our gains have been sustained, although they did not increase proportionately last year as much as they did the year before.

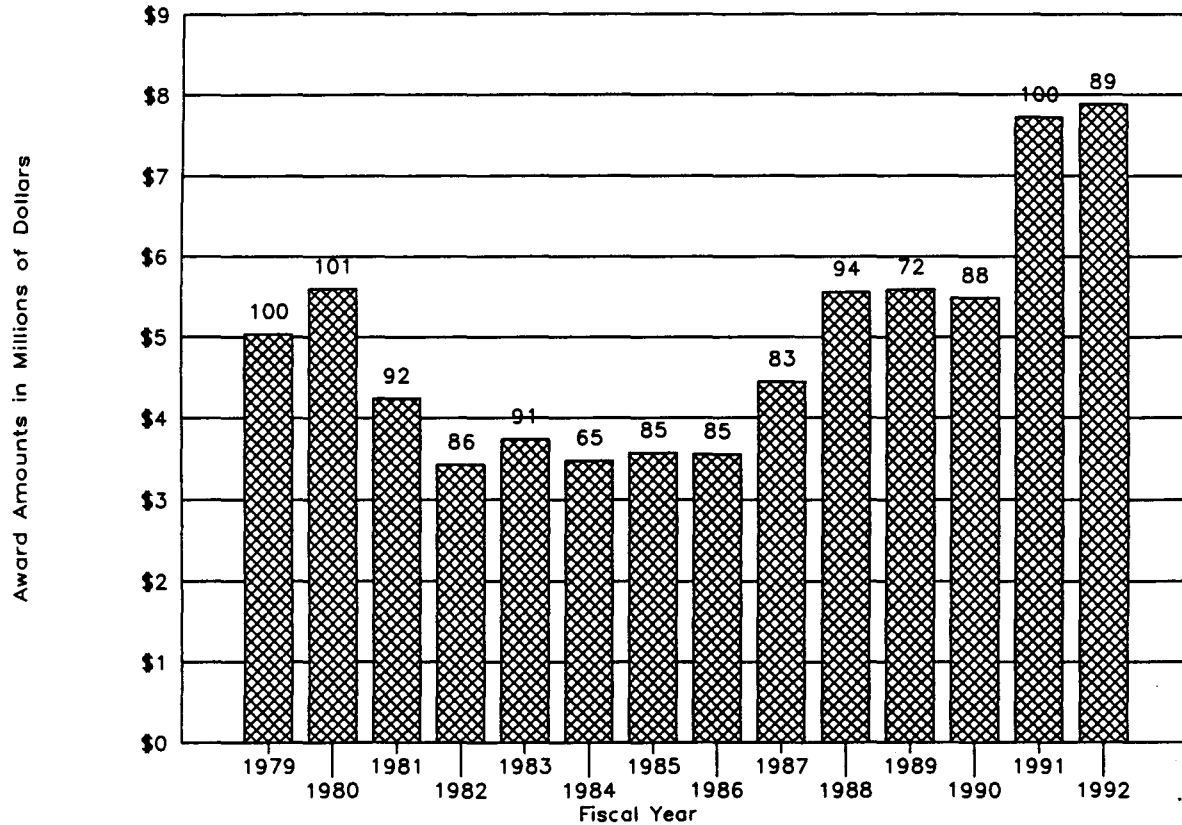

**Monitoring of Sponsored Account Documents.** In order to review expenditures on sponsored accounts for compliance and availability of funds, it is important that all documents on ORTTA monitored accounts be transmitted directly to ORTTA. Departments are encouraged to follow this procedure since disallowances resulting from expenditures that were not reviewed and approved by ORTTA will become the financial responsibility of the department.

## II. FUNDING NOTES

### Internal

**Graduate School Grants-in-Aid.** The fall deadline will be October 5, 1992. A second deadline falls on March 1, 1993. New faculty are encouraged to apply. Information and copies of the application form can be obtained from the Graduate School Research Office, 625-2356.

**McKnight Land-Grant Professorships.** These awards provide two years of support to outstanding young faculty. One individual from each department can be nominated as early as their first year at the University, but no later than the start of the fourth year. Nominations by department chairs will be due in October 23, 1992. Additional information is available from the Dean of the Graduate School.

**Graduate School Faculty Summer Research Fellowships.** November 16, 1992 is the deadline for 1993 Faculty Summer Research Fellowship applications. The purpose of the program is to encourage research and artistic creation by enabling members of the faculty to devote full time to intensive work on their projects for one summer term of approximately five weeks. Information and application forms are available from the Graduate School Research Office (625-2356).

**Office of International Education Faculty Grant Program.** Grants may cover: establishment of collaborative research, training or service; educational exchanges of faculty; completion of individual research of an international nature; curriculum development; international seminars and other programs held at the University of Minnesota or involving international scholars outside the University; participation in international professional conferences held outside the U.S. Applications are due November 15 for activities beginning in January, February or March. Information and application forms are available from the OIE Development Grant Coordinator, 624-5580.

**Bush Sabbatical Program.** Supplementary sabbatical income is provided for mid-career faculty who seek to integrate research and undergraduate teaching. Tenured faculty who are eligible for a regular University Sabbatical Furlough may apply. Application materials are distributed to departments in mid-fall. Applications are first evaluated by the college; CLA has set a November 30, 1992 deadline for its internal review. CLA forwards its recommendations to central administration to meet an early January deadline. Information about the CLA review process is available in the Faculty Affairs Office, 624-9839.

**Single Quarter Leave.** This program is designed to advance special studies, research, scholarly writing, and self-improvement programs that will enrich and strengthen individual knowledge and understanding of scholarship and/or university teaching for faculty members with regular appointments. Applications are reviewed first by the college; there will be a November 30, 1992 CLA deadline for applications for Single Quarter Leaves. CLA will then forward its recommendations to the Office of the Vice President for Academic

Affairs for final review in early January. Direct questions about the CLA review process to the Faculty Affairs Office 624-9839. When available, application materials will be distributed to each department.

**CLA National Fellowship Supplements.** The NFS program is designed to make feasible acceptance of major, if relatively low-paying, fellowships such as those from Guggenheim, NEH and ACLS. This program is available to regular, tenure-track faculty who successfully compete for major national fellowships in non-sabbatical years. It provides up to 50% of academic-year base salary total with the fellowship no more than 100% of the academic salary. Faculty members must be nominated by their department chairs, in a letter to the Dean, which should be submitted as soon as possible after the application for the external fellowship has been transmitted. For additional information, call ORD at 625-4801.

**McKnight Arts and Humanities Endowment.** The University of Minnesota McKnight Arts and Humanities Endowment will allocate \$250,000 a year to supplement the very limited external funding available in the arts and humanities, thus allowing faculty in these areas to pursue their scholarly and creative work in a more supportive environment. The educational outcome of such support will be to enrich both our undergraduate and graduate programs.

**The McKnight Arts and Humanities Summer Fellowships -** Fellows will receive summer support to engage in their scholarly or creative pursuits. Selection is competitive and based on peer review; funds will be used for summer salary, for travel or supplies, and for hiring research assistants. Fellows will also participate in campus-based programs during the following academic year. The application deadline is November 16, 1992.

**The McKnight Arts and Humanities Research Award --** This award will be given each year to four University of Minnesota faculty members who have a strong record of accomplishment in the arts or humanities. This program will provide each recipient with a reimbursement account of \$3,000 per year for three years to support the faculty member's research. Only tenured faculty are eligible for this award. The deadline will be in mid- to late-October, 1992.

**The McKnight Arts and Humanities Travel Award -** This fund will provide airfare for international travel related to research, scholarly, or creative work in the arts and humanities. Both tenured and tenure-track faculty whose research is in the arts and/or humanities are eligible for this award. These awards will be made three times a year (in fall, winter, and spring quarters). The first deadline will be in mid- to late-October, 1992.

Guidelines for all of the program components will be available by mid-fall, 1992. The University of Minnesota McKnight Arts and Humanities Endowment is administered through the Office of the Vice President for Arts, Sciences, and Engineering.

External

General

**Guggenheim Fellowships.** Fellowships are awarded to scholars of high intellectual and personal qualifications who have already demonstrated unusual capacity for productive scholarship or unusual creative ability in the arts. The Fellows are usually between 30 and 45 years old, but there are no age limits. Appointments are ordinarily made for one year, but in no case for a period shorter than 6 consecutive months. Amounts of grants are adjusted to the needs of the Fellows; teachers receiving sabbatical leave on full or part sabbatical salary are eligible for appointment. Guggenheim fellowships may not be held concurrently with other fellowships. Because of limited funds, previous fellows may not apply for another fellowship. Due to continued depression of funding levels, for 1992 the Foundation awarded 149 fellowships for a total of \$3.9 million; there were 3,162 applicants. Deadline for application for 1993 fellowships is **October 1, 1992**. Application forms must be requested directly from the foundation: John Simon Guggenheim Memorial Foundation, 90 Park Avenue, New York, NY 10016, (212) 687-4470; ORD has additional information.

**American Philosophical Society.** The APS grants about \$400,000 a year in support for scholarly research in all areas of knowledge. Approximately 700 applications are reviewed each year; about 30% of applicants receive funding. Grants may cover living costs while away from home; microfilms, photostats and photographs; consumable supplies; and necessary foreign and domestic travel. The maximum grant that will be made for a full professor is \$3,000; up to \$4,000 for others, in keeping with APS's long-standing practice to encourage research by younger and less well-established scholars. The APS will also consider making supplemental grants for travel if an applicant has received other grants (e.g., NEH, Guggenheim, SSRC) that do not include travel that is necessary to the applicant's research program. Deadlines for applying are: **August 1, December 1, February 1, April 1**. Decisions are made within three months. For application forms, briefly describe your project and proposed budget in a letter to: Committee on Research, American Philosophical Society, 104 South Fifth St., Philadelphia, PA 19106.

**Bush Leadership Fellows Program.** This program seeks accomplished, motivated individuals who are eager to prepare for greater leadership responsibilities within their professions and communities. Approximately 40 awards will be made for academic training, internship training or both. Applicants, who must be between the ages of 28 and 54, are selected on the basis of personal strengths, intellect, involvement in the community, and ability to articulate goals and plans for the future. For fellowships lasting from four to 18 months, the deadline is November 30, 1992. For shorter fellowships, lasting from three to 10 weeks, the deadline is February 28, 1993. **Kellogg National Fellowship Program.** This program provides opportunities for outstanding American professionals, in their early years of professional activity in academic, public or private sector settings to broaden their social and intellectual sensitivity, awareness, and leadership potential. The goal is to assist future leaders in developing skills and competencies which transcend traditional disciplinary and professional methods of addressing problems. Awards of up to \$35,000 for a three-year period, plus 12.5% of annual salary (not to exceed a total for three years of \$32,000) will be made to up to 50 people who have leadership potential. Fellows will then carry out nondegree, interdisciplinary, self-directed activities to take them beyond the confines of their profession. They will also participate in Foundation-sponsored seminars to explore a wide variety of problems and issues to develop leadership skills. (These fellowships are not awarded for pursuit of basic research or to complete a degree.) The postmark deadline is December 15, 1992, but applications must be submitted through the Graduate School and will be due there a week earlier. For additional information call the Graduate School Research Office, 625-2356. ORD has Kellogg program information, as well.

**Fulbright-Hays Faculty Research Fellowships Abroad.** The U.S. Department of Education is seeking applications under Fulbright-Hays training grant programs, including faculty research abroad, and doctoral dissertation research abroad. \$910,000 will be available for 25 three- to 12-month faculty research fellowships averaging \$28,000 each; and \$1.8 million for 85 doctoral dissertation research awards averaging \$17,500 each. Projects must focus on Africa, East Asia, Southeast Asia and the Pacific, South Asia, the Near East, East Central Europe, the Baltic States and other new republics of the former Soviet Union, and the Western Hemisphere. This program will not fund projects focused on Western Europe. Preference will be given to projects that emphasize economics, geography, or sociology.

The application deadline will be October 28, 1992. **U.S. Department of Education Group Projects Abroad.** This program is designed for groups of faculty and students doing research abroad. The deadline is October 23, 1992.

\$2.3 million has been requested, but final funding is contingent on congressional action. The plan is to award about 32 grants of \$40,000 to \$200,000. Support will be for projects in sub-Saharan Africa, Latin America and the Caribbean, East Asia, Southeast Asia and the Pacific, East Central Europe, the Near East and North Africa, and South Asia.

Four types of projects will be supported: short term seminars; curriculum development projects; group research or study; advanced overseas intensive language projects.

**U.S. Department of Education International Research and Studies Program.** Grants will be made to institutions and individuals to conduct research and studies of 12 to 36 months, to improve and strengthen instruction in modern foreign languages, area studies, and related fields needed to provide full understanding of the places in which the modern foreign languages are commonly used. \$1,035,000 are available, for about 15 awards ranging from \$30,000 to \$170,000. The application deadline is **November 2, 1992**.

### Humanities and Fine Arts

**American Council of Learned Societies 1992-1993 Competition.** The general programs of the ACLS support postdoctoral research in the humanities; research in the social sciences with a predominantly humanistic emphasis will also be considered. The Ph.D. or its equivalent is required. Younger scholars, independent scholars, women, and members of minority groups are encouraged to apply. The Area Programs, sponsored jointly by the Social Science Research Council, support postdoctoral and predoctoral research and study in the humanities and social sciences. All programs administered by ACLS require U.S. citizenship or permanent residence.

ACLS has conducted extensive research about fellowships in the humanities. The results of this study, "Fellowships in the Humanities, 1983-1991," were published in Spring 1992. LARES presented some preliminary findings in our last issue. The final report is available from ORD. One result of this survey, that demonstrates dwindling resources and increased demand for humanities support, is that ACLS has dramatically changed some aspects of its fellowship program, as described below. The purpose is to distribute fellowships more equitably by narrowing the eligible applicant pool.

Please note that ACLS has tightened eligibility requirements. Guidelines now state that ACLS Fellowships are meant to assist scholars who have not recently held supported research leave. Five years must have elapsed between conclusion of the scholar's last such leave and July 1, 1993. Thus, individuals with supported research leave during the 1992-93 academic year are not eligible for this competition. "Supported research leave" is defined as the equivalent of one semester or more of time free from teaching or other employment to pursue scholarly research or writing supported by sabbatical pay or other institutional funding, major (at least \$10,000) fellowships, and grants, or a combination of these.

The other major change is that applicants must have received the Ph.D. prior to October 1, 1990 to be eligible to apply.

**Fellowships/Grants-in-Aid Program.** This new comprehensive program includes some aspects of the former ACLS Grants-in-Aid. Fellowships are intended primarily as salary replacement to enable scholars to devote two to twelve continuous months to full-time research. Scholars may therefore apply for one of three possible funding periods and stipend levels:

- 1) A minimum of two consecutive months during the summer of 1993, with a maximum stipend of \$5,000 (20% of total academic year salary or \$5,000, whichever



is less);

2) A minimum of six consecutive months to be initiated between July 1, 1993 and February 1, 1994, with a maximum stipend of \$10,000; or

3) Between nine and twelve consecutive months to be initiated between July 1, 1993 and February 1, 1994, with a maximum stipend of \$20,000.

Additional information or application forms may be obtained by writing to the address below; requests for application forms must include the following information: citizenship or permanent residence, highest academic degree received, academic or other position, field of specialization, proposed subject of study, period of time for which support is requested, and the specific program under which application is contemplated. **Shelby Cullom Davis Center for Historical Studies, Princeton.** In the two academic years 1992-94, the Seminar at the Davis Center will focus on the theme "Proof and Persuasion." Applications are invited for fellowships or proposals for papers on these allied themes, proof meaning the divergent histories of what constitutes evidence in different professions; persuasion meaning the multiple techniques used to win or coerce assent. Applications are welcomed from people working in all periods and geographical areas, and from disciplines other than history. A limited number of research fellowships for one or two semesters are offered, up to \$56,000 for the year. The application deadline will be December 1, 1992 for 1993-94. Scholars who would like to offer a paper to one of the weekly Seminars are asked to send a brief description of their proposal and a current curriculum vitae to the Director, Natalie Zemon Davis. **National Humanities Center.** The NHC supports advanced study in history, languages and literature, philosophy, and other fields of the humanities. Each year approximately 40 residential fellowships are awarded to scholars of demonstrated achievement and to promising younger scholars. Fellowships cover salary and travel costs. The application deadline is October 15, 1992. For application material write to Fellowship Program, National Humanities Center, P.O. Box 12256, Research Triangle Park, NC 27709-2256, (919) 549-0661. ORD has additional information, too.

**NEH Research Conferences.** This program has a single annual deadline, January 15. This is a significant change from the twice-a-year deadline cycle many remember, and requires careful adjustment in planning research conferences that might be appropriate projects for NEH support. Grants may not begin until October 1 of the application year, and it is strongly recommended that the actual conference not be planned earlier than a year from the application deadline. In other words, to seek support for a

conference that will take place between January and December 1994, you must apply by January 15, 1993. Program objectives are to advance the state of research in a field or topic of major importance in the humanities. ORD has program descriptions and application forms. For additional information, and if you are planning to apply, we encourage you to contact ORD and NEH conference program staff at (202) 786-0204. Proposal drafts may be submitted for staff review at any time, but no later than six to eight weeks before the January 15 deadline.

**J. Paul Getty Postdoctoral Fellowships in the History of Art and the Humanities.** This program is designed to advance the discipline of art history by supporting the work of outstanding young scholars who show promise of making a substantial and original contribution to the history of the visual arts. Fifteen postdoctoral fellowships are available in 1992-93 for those who have received their Ph.D. degree within the past six years. Senior research grants are awarded to scholars, particularly teams working on a collaborate projects. Scholars of all nationalities may apply. **NEH 1993-94 Dissertation Grants.** As we announced last spring, NEH has initiated a new program, for the first time supporting graduate students who require support to work on doctoral dissertations. Up to 50 grants of \$17,500 will be awarded this year. Eligible candidates must be enrolled in U.S. institutions, with all requirements, including approval of the topic and research plan, except the dissertation completed by the application deadline. No more than two grants will be awarded to candidates from any one Ph.D.-granting institution. **Bush Artist Fellowships** give artists the opportunity to work for substantial portions of uninterrupted time in their chosen art forms. **Travel and Study Grants for Twin Cities-based Artists.** The program, supported by the Jerome, General Mills, and Dayton Hudson Foundations, provides modest funds to artists in a number of media. The purpose is to support significant periods of professional development through personal study, artist-to-artist communication on aesthetic issues, experience of seeing artistic work outside of Minnesota, time for reflection, development of future collaborations, and opportunities for artists to develop their work in other locations. **Harvard University Andrew W. The 1993-94 theme will be "Culture and Memory;" it includes representations of remembering, forgetting, persistent memories, and selective amnesia by individuals, groups, and nations. **George A. and Eliza Gardner Howard Foundation Fellowships.** The Foundation awards a limited number of fellowships (7 or 8 each year) for independent projects in fields selected on a rotational basis. **Social Science Research Council. Grants for Advanced International Research.** Grants are available for periods usually ranging from two months to one year to individuals with Ph.D. degrees or equivalent research experience for research in the humanities or social sciences. These programs are designed to support research in one country, comparative research between countries in an area, and comparative research between areas. Grants may be used for travel, research, and maintenance expenses. Program areas include: Africa, Japan, Korea, Latin American and the Caribbean, the Near and Middle East, Russia and the Soviet Union, South Asia, and Southeast Asia. Grant amounts and desired focus vary according to the program; ORD has additional information. The deadline in all cases is December 1.

**Advanced Research Fellowships in Foreign Policy Studies.** These support up to two years of research on the processes of U.S. foreign policy making, including examination of forces and institutions that are not the typical focus in this area: Comparative studies of policy-making processes; analysis of influences of institutions, groups or broad societal forces on these processes; use of theories and insights from diverse social science disciplines. The program permits—but does not require—fellows to acquire additional training through formal course work, tutorials, or supervised study. Awards will not exceed \$35,000. Deadline for applications is December 1.

SSRC also has a program on Research on the Urban Underclass. Faculty members may apply for the support of undergraduate research assistance for collaborate research with faculty on topics related to the urban underclass. The School of Historical Studies is concerned with the history of the western world, including political, social, artistic, and intellectual history. #### IV. TRENDS AND PROFILES

**NSF Revises Guidelines Forms.** Effective October 1, 1992, the National Science Foundation is revising the Grants for Research and Education in Science and Engineering (GRESE) brochure, and related proposal and grant forms. Because these changes are substantial, it is imperative that researchers planning to apply to NSF obtain these new forms and use them for any deadlines or target dates from October 1. ORD will have copies as soon as they are available.

**NSF Reorganizes Research Divisions.** After a year of planning, NSF has reorganized the two research divisions that make up the new Social, Behavioral, and Economic Sciences Directorate. The divisions of Social and Economic Science and the Division of Behavioral and Cognitive Science have been reorganized into one research division composed of five program clusters. The clusters are:

Anthropologic and Geographic Sciences (Anthropology, Geography and Regional Science);

Cognitive, Psychological, and Language Sciences (Human Cognition and Perception, Social Psychology, and Linguistics);

Economic, Decision and Management Sciences (Economics, and Decision, Risk and Management Science);

Social and Political Sciences (Sociology, Political Science, Law and Social Science, and Measurement and Methods);

Science, Technology and Society (Ethics and Values in Science and Engineering, History and Philosophy of Science and Engineering, and Research in Science and Technology.

The reorganization is scheduled to go into effect October 1, 1992.

### I. GENERAL ANNOUNCEMENTS

#### Resource Reminders:

**CLA Research Development Fund.** Funds are available for CLA faculty to assist in the development of proposals for external funding. Support is offered for costs of photocopying proposals, postage, travel to discuss proposals with agency representatives, and other activities related to proposal preparation. Contact ORD for additional information and application instructions.

### II. FUNDING NOTES

#### Internal

**Office of International Education Development Grants.** Grants may cover: establishment of collaborative research, training or service; educational exchanges of faculty; completion of individual research of an international nature; curriculum development; international seminars and other programs held at the University of Minnesota or involving international scholars outside the University; participation in international professional conferences held outside the U.S. Applications are due **February 15** for April, May, and June activities; **May 15** for July, August, and September activities. Information and application forms are available from the OIE Development Grant Coordinator, 624-5580.

**Bush Sabbatical Program.** Supplementary sabbatical income is provided for mid-career faculty who seek to integrate research and undergraduate teaching. Tenured faculty who are eligible for a regular University Sabbatical Furlough may apply. Women and members of minority groups are especially encouraged to apply. Application materials are distributed to departments in mid-fall. Applications are first evaluated by the college; CLA has set a **November 30, 1992**

deadline for its internal review. CLA forwards its recommendations to central administration to meet a mid-January deadline. Information about the CLA review process is available in the Faculty Affairs Office, 624-9839.

**Single Quarter Leave.** This program is designed to advance special studies, research, scholarly writing, and self-improvement programs that will enrich and strengthen individual knowledge and understanding of scholarship and/or university teaching for faculty members with regular appointments. Applications are reviewed first by the college; **November 30** will be the CLA deadline for applications for Single Quarter Leaves. After its review, the college will then forward its recommendations to the Office of the Vice President for Academic Affairs for final review in early January. For questions about the CLA review process, call the Faculty Affairs Office at 624-9839; application materials have been distributed to each department.

**CLA National Fellowship Supplements.** CLA faculty are encouraged to request nomination by their department chairs for supplements to major national fellowships they may receive during a non-sabbatical year. This program provides up to 50% of base salary, to total with the fellowship no more than 100% of salary. This should make it easier for faculty to apply for and accept major fellowships even in years when they would not be eligible for a sabbatical. A request should be made as soon as the external application has been submitted. For additional information contact ORD or the Dean's office, 624-9839.

**CLA Scholars of the College.** **December 11** is the deadline for nominations for Scholars of the College awards. Each unit with tenured and budgeted faculty can nominate one individual who must be a tenured member of the college; the college will select three recipients this year. The award provides \$3,000 per year for three years to be used for any nonsalary element of support for research and creative activity. Nomination information will be available from the CLA Dean's office, 624-2535.

### External

#### General

**American Philosophical Society.** The APS grants about \$400,000 a year in support for scholarly research in all areas of knowledge. Approximately 700 applications are reviewed each year; about 30% of applicants receive funding. Grants may cover living costs while away from home; microfilms, photostats and photographs; consumable supplies; and necessary foreign and domestic travel. The maximum grant that will be made for a full professor is \$3,000; up to \$4,000 for others, in keeping with APS's long-standing practice to encourage research by younger and less well-established scholars. The APS will also consider making supplemental grants for travel if an applicant has received other grants (e.g., NEH, Guggenheim, SSRC) that do not include travel that is necessary to the applicant's research program. Deadlines for applying are: **August 1, October 1, December 1, February 1, April 1.** Decisions are made within three months. For application forms, briefly describe your project and proposed budget in a letter to: Committee on Research, American Philosophical Society, 104 South Fifth St., Philadelphia, PA 19106.

**Bush Leadership Fellows Program.** This program seeks accomplished, motivated individuals who are eager to prepare for greater leadership responsibilities within their professions and communities. Approximately 40 awards will be made for academic training, internship training or both. Applicants, who must be between the ages of 28 and 54, are selected on the basis of



personal strengths, intellect, involvement in the community, and ability to articulate goals and plans for the future. For short-term fellowships, lasting from three to 10 weeks, the **deadline is February 28, 1993**. **MacArthur Foundation Research and Writing Grants for Individuals.** MacArthur offers a program that seeks to broaden the scope of discussion in the field of **Peace and International Cooperation**, and thus encourages applicants from a variety of disciplines. Grantees have included scholars, journalists, policy analysts, and others interested in approaches which move beyond disciplinary boundaries and which are currently underfunded. Younger women and men and non-U.S. researchers are especially encouraged to apply. Grants range from \$10,000 to \$60,000 for an individual application and up to \$120,000 for a two-person project. #### IV. PROFILES AND TRENDS

**FY 1993 Federal Appropriations Bills Become Law.** Federal appropriations legislation was signed in a more timely fashion than in previous years. As in the last few years, however, there were not major overall increases in budgets for federal grants. At NSF, for instance, the Education and Human Resources Directorate received a \$22.5 million increase above last year's levels, while other programs gained only modestly. At NIH, most institutes received modest increases, as well: Child Health and Human Development -- \$20.09 million increase to \$429.82 million; Aging -- \$17.62 increase to \$401.23 million; Mental Health, \$24.45 million to \$585.71 million.

In Education, graduate fellowships received a 1.8 percent reduction from FY 1992 funding. FIPSE received a notable increase, from \$15 million to \$26.8 million. The increases are specifically for new programs, including training in early childhood education and violence counseling, and a new international education exchange program with the European Community. High priority will also

be given to expand programs that are dedicated to advancing minority Ph.D. and faculty development. International Education received an increase of \$1.7 million, to a total of \$35.5 million, for new language resource centers. Foreign language and area study fellowships were allotted \$12.8 million, a \$0.2 decrease over last year's funding level.

**Corporate and Foundation Proposals at the University.** The University Foundation continues to work to develop and maintain a more accurate view of contributions from these important sources to research, teaching and other activities. A database has been set up to compile corporate and foundation proposals and awards, and information about foundation personnel, objectives, and links to the University of Minnesota. Part of this effort has been the development of a "tracking list" of major national and local foundations in which the University has special interests or concerns, or that themselves have requested central University ranking and/or clearance of proposals. The Henry Luce Foundation has announced its 1993 US-China Cooperative Research Program Competition. The Luce Foundation, while active in Asia, has not had new initiatives in the PRC since the Tiananmen Square uprisings in 1989.

The Henry Luce Foundation announces a competition for grants through its United States-China Cooperative Research Program. This program aims to encourage sustained joint research by American and Chinese scholars on significant topics in the humanities and social sciences that will lead to an improved understanding of China.

Cooperative projects normally involve two or more collaborators on both the Chinese and American sides, working together over a three-year period. American scholars interested in similar topics, but based at different institutions in the US, are strongly encouraged to join forces. Scholars from the PRC as well as Hong Kong and Taiwan are welcome to participate. Graduate students can be involved, but funds cannot be used for tuition payments.

Cooperative research projects should focus on themes that address key intellectual issues within one discipline or across disciplines. Proposals will be evaluated on their intellectual quality, feasibility, potential for mutual benefit, and evidence of institutional support.

After developing a project with Chinese counterparts, the proposal should be submitted by the American side. Any US university or college is eligible to apply, but proposals must be endorsed by appropriate administrative authorities to indicate institutional support for the project.

Requests for guidelines should be addressed to the US-China Cooperative Program. The Henry Luce Foundation, Inc. 111 West 50th St., Room 3710, New York, NY 10020.

Grants for each three-year award will range from \$60,000 to \$180,000, depending on the size and scope of the project. Smaller and larger projects will be given equal consideration. The deadline for grant proposals is March 1, 1993, and awards will be announced in late May.

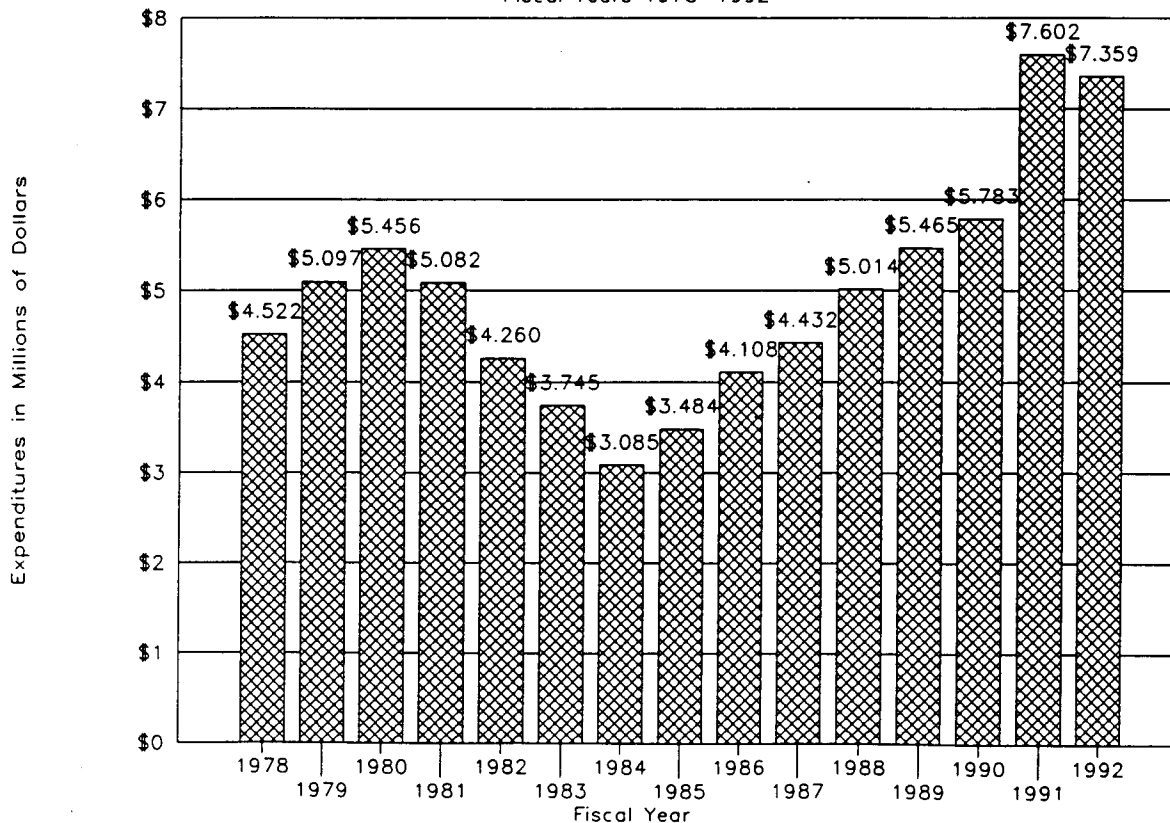
### I. GENERAL ANNOUNCEMENTS

#### **College of Liberal Arts Sees Slight Decrease in Externally Funded Activities.**

Latest figures show a slight decline in the college activities supported by external grants. As the graph, below, illustrates, the total sponsored expenditures for 1992 decreased by 4% over the amount spent in 1991, to \$7,359,529. This is considered the most accurate measure of externally funded activities. Looking ahead, with an increase of 45% over 1991, CLA faculty submitted proposals in FY 1992 requesting \$26,681,426 in funding.

**CLA ORD Faculty Research Development Fund.** Purpose: The fund is designed to encourage and support the development of proposals to secure external funding for research and research-related projects (research, curriculum, collaborative projects, etc.) It provides support for: travel to discuss proposals with funding agencies or collaborators at other institutions; costs of proposal development and preparation (photocopying, word processing, postage or telephone charges); in some cases, unanticipated overhead costs of currently funded projects. Eligibility: Regular College of Liberal Arts faculty are eligible for this support. Procedures: There is no formal application procedure. **National Endowment for the Humanities Fellowships for University Teachers.**

May 1 is the annual deadline to apply for fellowships that provide junior and senior scholars with six to twelve months' support (a maximum stipend of \$30,000) for advanced study or research in history, philosophy, languages, linguistics, literature, archaeology, jurisprudence, the history, theory and criticism of the arts, ethics, comparative religion, and aspects of the social sciences that employ historical or philosophical approaches. Work supported by NEH Fellowships may contribute to scholarly knowledge, to the conception and substance of individual courses in the humanities, or to the general public's understanding of the humanities. Projects may address broad topics or focus on research in a specialized field. **National Endowment for the Humanities Research Division Texts Program.**

June 1 is the deadline for two grant lines in this program:

**Translations.** Support is provided for individual or collaborative projects to translate into English works that provide insight into the history, literature, philosophy, and artistic achievements of other cultures and that make available to scholars, students, teachers, and the public the thought and learning of those civilizations. Applications may propose to translate from any language, and the texts to be translated may be either primary sources or secondary works. Eligible projects include translations of significant single works, the complete works of a writer or school, and collections or anthologies. Applications must demonstrate that the texts to be produced will be of value to a diverse audience but are not likely to be commercially profitable. Awards are made for up to three years, and usually range from \$3,500 to \$100,000 per year.

**Editions.** Grants in this category support various stages in the preparation of authoritative and annotated editions of works and documents of significant value to humanities scholars and general readers. Support is provided for projects that make available important texts and documents that have been either previously unavailable or accessible only in seriously flawed editions. Applicants must demonstrate that the form (printed, microform, or a combination) proposed for the edition represents the most effective means of disseminating the material. Awards are made for up to three years and usually range from \$25,000 to \$100,000.

**Social and Behavioral Sciences****National Research Council Senior and Postdoctoral Research Associateships.**

These Associateships are offered to (1) provide postdoctoral scientists and engineers of unusual promise and ability opportunities for research on problems, largely of their own choice, that are

compatible with the research interest of sponsoring laboratories; and (2) contribute to the overall research effort of these laboratories and to the national scientific and technological welfare.

NRC publishes a catalog which outlines these research opportunities by discipline and title, and by reference to participating laboratories. Major disciplines include: chemistry; earth and atmospheric sciences, engineering, applied sciences, and computer science; life, medical and behavioral sciences; mathematics; physics; and space and planetary sciences.

### I. GENERAL ANNOUNCEMENTS

**Sabbatical Planning:** It is not too early to start looking for sources of sabbatical support for 1994-95. For instance, applications are due May 1, 1994 for NEH fellowships that can be used during that period. Other major fellowships typically used during a sabbatical include ACLS, Guggenheim, and Fulbright, all with deadlines in early fall 1993. A planning schedule should start with requests for application forms and information in mid-July, followed by submission of applications from mid-September to early October. The last application to submit could then be for the internal Bush sabbatical fellowship, due in late November. There may be other more specialized sources of support for your particular project; a place to start is our information brochure on funding sources for sabbaticals.

### II. FUNDING NOTES

#### Internal

**Office of International Education Faculty Grant Program.** Grants may cover: establishment of collaborative research, training or service; educational exchanges of faculty; completion of individual research of an international nature; curriculum development; international seminars and other programs held at the University of Minnesota or involving international scholars outside the University; participation in international professional conferences held outside the U.S. Applications are due August 15 for October, November or December activities; November 15 for activities beginning in January, February or March. Information and application forms are available from the OIE Development Grant Coordinator, 624-5580.

**Graduate School Grants-in-Aid.** The fall deadline will be October 4, 1993. (The winter deadline will fall on the first Monday in March, 1994.) New faculty are encouraged to apply; editorial consulting with departmental colleagues is encouraged. Copies of the application form can be obtained from the Graduate School Research Office, 625-2356.

**Graduate School Summer Fellowships.** The deadline will be November 15, 1993 for summer 1994 fellowships. Please contact the Graduate School Research Office for information and application materials, 625-2356.

**McKnight Land-Grant Professorships.** These awards provide two years of support to outstanding young faculty. One individual from each department can be nominated as early as their first year at the University, but no later than the start of the fourth year. **Fulbright Scholar Grants (CIES).** The Council for International Educational Exchange of Scholars is seeking applications from U.S. scholars for 1994-95 Fulbright grants for research and university lecturing abroad. The deadline will be June 15 for Australasia, India, the Soviet Union and Latin America, except lecturing awards to Mexico, Venezuela and the Caribbean; and August 1 for Africa, Asia, Western Europe, Eastern Europe, the Middle East, lecturing awards to Mexico, Venezuela and the Caribbean, and travel-only awards to France, Italy and West Germany.

For application forms, briefly describe your project and proposed budget in a letter to: Committee on Research, American Philosophical Society, 104 South Fifth St., Philadelphia, PA 19106.

**Guggenheim Fellowships.** Fellowships are awarded to scholars of high intellectual and personal qualifications who have already demonstrated unusual capacity for productive scholarship or unusual creative ability in the arts. The Fellows are usually between 30 and 45 years old, but there are no age limits. Appointments are ordinarily made for one year, but in no case for a period shorter than 6 consecutive months. Amounts of grants are adjusted to the needs of the Fellows; teachers receiving sabbatical leave on full or part sabbatical salary are eligible for appointment. Guggenheim fellowships may not be held concurrently with other fellowships. (For 1991, the Foundation awarded 149 fellowships for a total of \$3.9 million. There were 3,162 applicants.) Deadline for application for 1994 fellowships is October 1, 1993. Application forms

**Kellogg National Fellowship Program.** This program provides opportunities for outstanding American professionals, in their early years of professional activity in academic, public or private sector settings to broaden their social and intellectual sensitivity, awareness, and leadership potential. The goal is to assist future leaders in developing skills and competencies which transcend traditional disciplinary and professional methods of addressing problems. Awards of up to \$35,000 for a three-year period, plus 12.5% of annual salary (not to exceed a total for three years of \$32,000) will be made to up to 50 people who have leadership potential. Fellows will then carry out nondegree, interdisciplinary, self-directed activities to take them beyond the confines of their profession. They will also participate in Foundation-sponsored seminars to explore a wide variety of problems and issues to develop leadership skills. (These fellowships are not awarded for pursuit of basic research or to complete a degree.) The postmark deadline is December 15, 1993, but applications must be submitted through the Graduate School and will be due there a week earlier. Awards of \$4,750 will be available for projects that include research and a travel component. The latter has replaced the separate Travel to Collections program. The University may nominate three members of its faculty for Summer Stipends through an internal competition. The scope of support includes but is not limited to, the following: history, philosophy, languages, linguistics, literature, archaeology, jurisprudence, history and criticism of the arts, ethics, comparative religion and those aspects of the social sciences that employ historical or philosophical approaches. This last category includes cultural anthropology, sociology, political theory, international relations, and other subjects concerned with questions of value rather than quantitative matters. Short proposals for nomination will, as in past years, be submitted to the Graduate School for a September 1 deadline; three nominees will be notified by mid-September with their final proposals to NEH postmarked October 1. Additional information will be available later this summer, when new NEH guidelines are published. **American Council of Learned Societies 1994-1995 Fellowships and Grants.** The general programs of the ACLS support postdoctoral research in the humanities; research in the social sciences with a predominantly humanistic emphasis will also be considered. The Ph.D. or its equivalent is required. The Area Programs, sponsored jointly by the Social Science Research Council, support postdoctoral and predoctoral research and study in the humanities and social sciences. All programs administered by ACLS require U.S. citizenship or permanent residence. Additional information or application forms may be obtained by writing to the address below; requests for application forms must include the following information: citizenship or permanent residence, highest academic degree received, academic or other position, field of specialization, proposed subject of study, period of time for which support is requested, and the specific program under which application is contemplated.
